Occupy Victory? Idaho Senate Debates Changes

Protestors are excited to learn a Senate committee has agreed to consider changes to a bill intended to make them pack up and leave.

BOISE • Supporters of Occupy Boise's encampment across from the Idaho Capitol were elated Wednesday after a Senate committee agreed to consider changes to a bill meant to oust them, including delaying when protesters must pack up their tents and giving them more time to reclaim any property they leave behind.

"This is exciting," Monica Hopkins, director of the American Civil Liberties Union office in Idaho, said as she stood in the Capitol hallway after the State Affairs Committee voted 7-1 to open the measure to possible amendments. The bill would ban camping from state-managed properties.

Last week, the bill blasted out of the Idaho House on a near party-line 54-16 vote, giving the impression it faced smooth sailing on its way through the Republican Senate to Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's desk.

But after about 2½ hours of testimony, almost all of which came from supporters of the free-speech vigil at the old Ada County Courthouse that began in November, Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill said he was open to allowing protesters to remain until July 1. The Rexburg Republican said he believed the tents pose no imminent threat.

The measure would go into effect immediately, should Otter sign it as is after it clears the Senate.

Idaho Falls Republican Sen. Bart Davis, a lawyer, said the existing bill adequately protects free-speech rights but he remains "high-centered" on how it treats any property left behind as "litter."

Davis brandished a draft amendment designed to give protesters at least seven days to reclaim belongings before they're discarded.

"What I do feel uncomfortable with is the seizure and littering component," he said, adding that he feared it would run afoul of protections of due process for private property in the U.S. Constitution's Fifth and 14th amendments.

The Senate will schedule a session to consider changes to the bill.

T.F. Teacher Selected for NASA Program

Jo Dodds, a longtime science teacher at Twin Falls High School, will take flight on a scientific trip to research astronomy.

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TWIN FALLS • About 15 years ago, Twin Falls High School teacher Jo Dodds heard about a NASA program for educators just as it was ending.

The FOSTER program — or Flight Opportunities for Science Teacher EnRichment — came to a close in the 1990s. Since then, Dodds has been hoping for a similar research opportunity to arise.

"I've been waiting ever since," she said. She doesn't have to wait anymore. Dodds is one of 26 U.S. teachers selected to participate in research flights over the coming year aboard NASA's Stratospheric Observatory for Infrared Astronomy.

As part of the Airborne Astronomy Ambassadors program, she'll work alongside professional astronomers and participate in public outreach efforts.

"I'm just so thrilled," she said one week after

Mule Deer Beat Odds after Blair Fire

Fish and Game officials feared the animals would suffer after the summer 2011 fire, but a mild winter has helped the 5,000-head herd survive.

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GLENNS FERRY • The fear that once surrounded an eastern Elmore County deer herd is slowly dissipating.

Not too long ago, a 2011 summer wildfire had wildlife officials preparing for the worst. The Blair Fire de-

stroyed 39,500 acres north of Glens Ferry and left the herd of 5,000 mule deer without their winter habitat.

At the time, biologists from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game thought this would cause the herd to head south, increasing the chances that more of the animals would be hit while crossing Idaho's roads and damage cultivated fields in search of food.

But it hasn't happened. Mild winter conditions allowed the deer to remain in parts of their range that didn't burn, said Randy Smith, Fish and Game regional wildlife manager based in Jerome.

JFAC TO HEAR \$5.7M MILLENNIUM FUND REQUEST

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BOISE • The handlers of a state endowment to help prevent underage smoking will pitch a request to spend \$5.7 million of Idaho Millennium Fund money in the coming fiscal year.

The Joint Millennium Fund Committee based its recommendations on an estimated \$9.1 million in available revenue. Twelve programs requested appropriations for services related to tobacco cessation and education, including the Idaho Supreme Court for use in youth courts, the American Cancer Society for the Idaho Women's Health Check, and the American Lung Association for youth tobacco prevention and cessation programs.

WASHINGTON WOMAN HOSPITALIZED AFTER TUESDAY CRASH

TWIN FALLS • Idaho State Police and Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies investigated an injury accident involving a semitrailer Tuesday night in Twin Falls County.

Police say Charisse Stenerson, 50, of Lynnwood, Wash., was traveling north on U.S. Highway 93 when her vehicle crossed the center line into southbound traffic at about milepost 15. Stenerson's vehicle collided with a Freightliner semi driven by Douglas Lunstad, 37, of Fairview, Mont.

Stenerson's vehicle rolled and came to rest on the west shoulder of the road. She was transported by ground ambulance to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls, where she was listed in fair condition Wednesday afternoon.

Southbound traffic on the highway was blocked for about an hour while officers investigated the crash.

Both Stenerson and Lunstad were wearing seat belts. It is unknown if alcohol was a factor in the crash.

"The weather has allowed them to stay a little bit higher," Smith said. "There's still quite a bit of deer, but it's not the bad scenario we were anticipating."

At one time, Fish and Game officials considered posting signs along Interstate 84 to warn people to slow down, but they were never needed.

Elmore County Sheriff Rick Layher didn't return calls on Wednesday regarding vehicle-animal collisions in eastern Elmore County.

To reduce the damage caused by deer feeding on farmland, Fish and Game helped cover seed costs in the northern farmland closest to the burn areas. Farmers planted feed crops outside of their normal

fields to prevent damage from the deer.

However, the area burned is far from recovered. The fire wiped out the majority of the abundant amounts of bitterbrush and sagebrush in the area, two plants mule deer rely on for food.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management has a two-year rehabilitation plan in progress, but the area will never quite be the same, said Joe Russell, a BLM fire ecologist.

Close to 24,000 sagebrush seeds have been planted, but the area won't be bountiful for another 10 years, he said. The BLM also plans to plant 50,000 bitterbrush seeds every year for the next three years.

"It's going to be a long-term issue in this area," Russell said. "Things don't get better right away. The land changes slowly."

Despite Cuts, DEQ, Ag Departments Laud Successes

The state's ag department is seeking \$175,000 for the expansion of a Twin Falls food quality lab.

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BOISE • Despite budget cuts, Idaho's agriculture and environmental agencies are still trucking along. And in some cases, they're seeing a lot of success.

On Wednesday, the Idaho State Department of Agriculture, Soil and Water Conservation Commission, Office of Species Conservation and Department of Environmental Quality all presented their budget requests to legislators. While funding cuts have forced some departments to find alternative funding sources and restructure their programs, Wednesday's presenters said they're still making progress on their goals.

The DEQ supported the governor's recommendation of a \$61.3 million departmental budget. During her presentation to the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, Director Toni Hardesty cited recent successful programs, including settlement ponds in Twin Falls that reduced water pollution and drinking water loans that made it possible for small communities to update their water systems.

Agriculture's budget request included a one-time supplemental request of \$175,000 for expansion of the Idaho Food Quality Assurance Lab in Twin Falls, \$89,700 from the dedicated fund for poultry inspection, and an ongoing general request of \$900,000 for

aquatic weed control. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter recommended \$36.3 million for the department for fiscal 2013.

The governor recommended a \$13.3 million appropriation for the Office of Species Conservation, a 42.4 percent drop from the \$22.9 million appropriated this year.

Almost all of that lost money is from the Bonneville Power Administration for salmon recovery efforts, said office administrator Nate Fisher. The money goes to projects to improve habitat for salmon — for example, building fences around creeks on private property to prevent cows from trampling through the water, Fisher said.

That money is project-specific and depends on participation from landowners. When there isn't interest in

participation, there is no money, but that doesn't affect other programs, Fisher said.

The office also lost \$1.2 million from fiscal 2011 for wolf management, monitoring and depredation mitigation. The office is still working with the federal government to provide support for ranchers who lose cattle to the predators, Fisher said.

"The state of Idaho feels that wolves were forced on us by the Endangered Species Act," Fisher said. Because of that, he added the federal government should be the one compensating ranchers for cattle and sheep loss.

But, he said, the division is still focused on efforts to keep sage grouse from being listed as an endangered species and restoring habitat for steelhead and salmon.

finding out she was selected.

Beth Pendergrass, spokeswoman for the Twin Falls School District, said she thinks it's a first for the district to have a teacher participate in a NASA program.

Dodds — an Earth science teacher who has taught in Twin Falls for 27 years — will continue teaching while par-

ticipating in the program.

Research flights will be aboard the SOFIA, a modified Boeing 747 that can reach an altitude of 45,000 feet.

The plane is also equipped with a telescope that's 100 inches in diameter. It's primarily used for infrared observations.

"It sees more than the eye can see," Dodds said.

She said the aircraft can go anywhere in the world, but

she doesn't know the locations of the flights yet or how many will be scheduled.

In addition to conducting research, two-person teams of teachers will be responsible for organizing public outreach activities. Dodds will work with Ralph Peterson, who teaches at North Gem High School in Bancroft.

They're co-teachers through the Idaho Science and Aerospace Scholars pro-

gram, which allows high school juniors to take an online space exploration class. The class, developed by NASA, is delivered through the Idaho Digital Learning Academy.

Dodds said she plans to incorporate new ideas from the NASA research project into the astronomy lessons she teaches at Twin Falls High.

"It's just going to enrich everything I do," she said.

No Comment to Be Taken at Gay Rights Bill Hearing

NAMPA • Idaho Sen. Curt McKenzie, R-Nampa, will hold a print hearing in the Senate State Affairs Committee on a proposed bill that would ban discrimination based on gender identity or sexual orientation. But, contrary to an *Idaho Press-Tribune* article printed Monday in the *Times-News*, the print hearing does not allow for public testimony.

If the committee approves the proposal's printing, it will be given a bill

number and assigned to a committee — likely back to Senate State Affairs. If that's the case, McKenzie said he won't schedule a full hearing for the bill, in which the committee would vote to drop the bill or send it to the Senate floor.

"It's not because I favor or disfavor this bill or any other bills that I hold in the drawer," McKenzie said. "If I don't think that it's going to get a majority to get all the way through the process to the governor's desk, I don't have a hearing on it."

The requests, plus an on-going \$80,000 consultant fee, totaled \$7.2 million.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter made a recommendation to spend \$4.9 million from the fund in fiscal 2013.

The committee, which had previously heard testimony from program heads, considered the requests and the governor's recommendation before forming its own.

After considering three alternative appropriation proposals, the committee voted to adopt one submitted by Rep. Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot. Lake's appropriation proposal totaled \$5.7 million, including \$2 million for the Department of Health and Welfare and \$400,000 for public health districts.

Rep. John Rusche, D-Lewiston, had proposed an appropriation of \$6.68 million, including \$3 million for the Department of Health and Welfare. After the meeting, he expressed concern

that the \$2 million recommended appropriation wouldn't be enough to fully fund the department's programs, which include Project Filter and Quitnet.

"If they do it within the \$2 million, I'll be surprised, but pleased," Rusche said.

Lake said although the fund has more money, he didn't want to spend it just for the sake of spending it.

"This is a conservative outfit," he said.

Leftover money will stay in the account. The proposal now goes to the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee.

TWIN FALLS • Changes are on the horizon at the Twin Falls Police Department. Soon, Crime Prevention Officer Luke Allen will be promoted to patrol sergeant and Officer Dan Heil will take his place.

"I'm really excited to do it," Allen said. "I'm at a place in my career where I think it's a good move for me and I think I'm ready to pass on the crime prevention torch."

Allen has been with the department since July 1999, when he started out in the patrol division. Allen has

served parts of his time since October 2007 in the crime prevention unit, serving as the community's primary contact person within TFPD.

"It's been a really good opportunity to develop a different kind of relationship with the community," he said.

In crime prevention, rather than just taking calls for service, officers address different kinds of issues and teach people how to avoid being victimized, Allen said. Still, he's looking forward to managing the street division.

Heil, who has been a TFPD patrol officer for nearly

six years, said he looks forward to approaching law enforcement from a proactive perspective.

"Helping people see law enforcement in a positive way," he said. "So they know police are here to serve them in any way we can."

"You have to go through a period of observation, there's an oral interview and you have to make a resume showing what you've done in the police department," he said. "You have to show what you're capable of"

Allen will be formally

promoted at the Feb. 13 Twin Falls City Council meeting. Both promotions were prompted by Sgt. Mark Marvin's retirement. The 34-year law-enforcement veteran, who runs the department's evidence department, is retiring in just a few weeks and Sgt. Ryan Howe will be the new evidence custodian, Allen said.

Though he's enthusiastic about his new position, Heil said he'll miss some parts of being a patrol officer.

"I'll miss the camaraderie of working with other officers," he said.

Getting together at the end of the night to talk about the calls he and his coworkers took, what they accomplished and new ideas is something Heil won't be able to do as much of in his new job.

"At the same time, it's going to be exciting to branch out and try something different," he said.

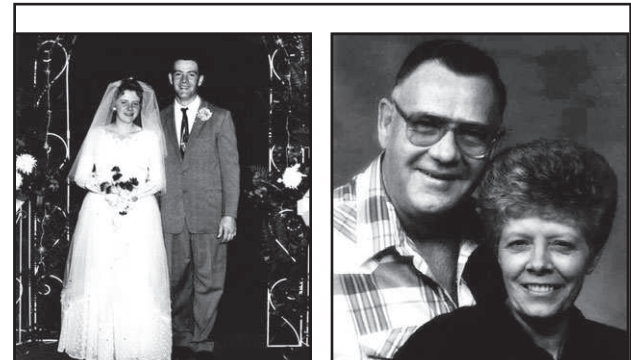

Dietrich Home Invasion Suspect Jailed on Domestic Violence Charge

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TWIN FALLS • A Jerome man whose Tuesday jury trial on charges related to March's Dietrich home invasion was postponed has been arrested after allegedly threatening to kill his girlfriend and her children.

Aaron Zachary Donabedian, 23, was arraigned Wednesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on charges of domestic assault and malicious injury to property.

Donabedian and three others were accused of holding a Dietrich couple at gunpoint during the early morning of March 9,

2011, to take possessions from their home. His trial was delayed this week because defense attorney Ted Larsen said new evidence had surfaced in the case.

According to court records, Twin Falls police responded to a Washington Street South apartment for a report of domestic violence at about 9:49 a.m. Jan. 15.

The officer found the front door appeared to have been kicked in. The woman who called police said Donabedian was her boyfriend and had been at the home. She said he became angry after she got off the phone with her mother.

The woman told police

she gathered her four children and hid in a back room and could hear Donabedian throwing objects around the apartment. She also told police Donabedian came into the room and began telling her she was a snitch and he would get someone to kill her if he went to jail.

Donabedian allegedly picked up a two-foot-long wooden dowel and raised it like he was going to hit the woman, but did not, she believed, because she was holding their child.

According to the police report, the woman said she is testifying against Donabedian in the home invasion trial. He is being held in the Twin Falls

County jail on \$5,000 bond per warrant and is scheduled for a Feb. 22 pretrial.

A new date for the home invasion trial has not been set.

Putin Says He May Face Runoff in Russia's Election

MOSCOW (AP) • Russian Prime Minister Vladimir Putin said Wednesday he could face a runoff in the March presidential vote, his first acknowledgement that he may fail to muster enough support for an outright victory.

Putin's statement signaled he might be willing to accept tarnishing his father-of-the-nation image if he fails to win more than 50 percent in the first round on March 4, rather than risk igniting more public outrage through blatant vote rigging.

Evidence of fraud in favor of Putin's party in a December parliamentary election triggered the biggest protests since the Soviet collapse two decades ago.

Putin said at a meeting with election monitors that "there is nothing horrible" about a runoff and he's ready for one, according to Russian news reports.

But he also warned of the dangers of a second round, saying it would lead to a "certain destabilization of the political situation." The need for stability in Russia has been the mantra of Putin's campaign.

Obama Outlines Homeowner Relief Plan, which Faces an Uphill Battle

WASHINGTON • Putting meat on the bones of a State of the Union pledge, President Barack Obama on Wednesday unveiled a controversial plan to help homeowners who are current on their mortgage payments refinance their mortgages into federally insured loans at today's extremely low rates.

The plan seeks to help homeowners who are unable to take advantage of low lending rates because they

owe more than their home is now worth, a predicament known as being "underwater" on their mortgage.

"If you're ineligible for refinancing just because you're underwater on your mortgage, through no fault of your own, this plan changes that," Obama said during a speech in Falls Church, Va., a suburb outside the nation's capital. "You will be able to refinance at a lower rate. You'll be able to save hundreds of dollars that you can put back into your pocket."

Obama went to great

pains to stress that the new program aims to help responsible homeowners who are hurt by falling home prices and not those buyers who overreached and bought more than they could afford.

In either case, millions of homeowners across the country are trapped in homes worth less than the mortgage they carry, and thus are unable to refinance to improve their cash flow.

Obama estimated annual savings of up to \$3,000 for individual homeowners able

to tap his plan. However, they'd still own a home worth less than its mortgage and taxpayers would be at risk if these homeowners eventually walked away from their new loans.

The program's cost is estimated at between \$5 billion and \$10 billion. To pay for it, Obama proposed a tax on the nation's biggest banks. Republicans have already balked at that idea, making it likely that the proposal will become little more than a political hammer for each side to swing at the other.

Weathermen with an Attitude

NEW YORK • They've bitten their handlers, refused to budge from their beds and lost their shadow-casting jobs to potbellied pigs. And it turns out, not all groundhogs are really that good at predicting the weather.

Not even Bill Murray as a movie weatherman escaped a couple of nips from the furry rodents on the set of his popular "Groundhog Day" that put the annual shadow or no shadow ritual on a loop in 1993.

"Of course, the groundhog's most glaring offense is that its legendary weather predictions are complete bunk," said Linda Lombardi, a former zookeeper who has a blog and a book called "Animals Behaving Badly."

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration analyzed the forecasts of groundhog prognosticators from 1988 to 2010 and concluded there was no correlation between predictions and the length of winter weather in a given year.

Bad forecasting aside, history has a few ugly moments in-

volving groundhog misbehavior on the big day, when designated groundhogs — and some notable surrogates — are supposed to step into the sun each Feb. 2 and predict six more weeks of winter, or not. Legend has it that if the groundhog sees his shadow, winter will last for six more weeks.

As always, the biggest Groundhog Day ruckus (today will be the 126th) centers on prima donna Punxsutawney Phil, the seer of seers, sage of sages, prognosticator of prognosticators in Pennsylvania. But not even Phil has kept his pointy nose clean of misdeeds.

"Phil is not a pet. Phil is truly not as warm and cuddly as perhaps you would want him to be. Phil is, in fact, a wild animal," said Mike Johnston, vice president of Phil's Inner Circle in Punxsutawney, where Groundhog Day began.

Sound familiar, Mayor Michael Bloomberg?

Charles G. Hogg, aka Staten Island Chuck, chomped on the mayor's left index finger in 2009 when Bloomberg tried to coax him into the open using an ear of corn.

"We try not to speak of it," said Mary Lee Montalvo with the Staten Island Zoo.

GOP Race Turns to Nevada Amid Caucus Turmoil

LAS VEGAS • This was supposed to be the Nevada GOP's year of redemption, a chance for Republicans to have a prominent role in picking a challenger for President Barack Obama four years after bungling its first attempt to turn the state into a major player in presidential politics.

But 2012 has not gone as planned. It's now anyone's guess as to how soon a Nevada victor will be declared after Saturday's caucuses.

Voting in all but one caucus — a special, late-evening one for Jewish voters in Clark County that is expected to draw fewer than 300 people — will end by 3 p.m. Pacific time. Most of Nevada's counties will be through with voting by noon.

But the state GOP doesn't plan to release any results until 5 p.m., which could raise questions about the validity of the count.

It also won't release results from Clark County, the state's most populous and home to more than half of all Republicans, until after 7 p.m.

The special caucus itself has the Mitt Romney and Ron Paul campaigns inquiring with the state party about the possibility of voter fraud. Nevada Republi-

can officials have said they will ensure that no one votes twice. But concerns remain that the procedures and the delay in reporting the results will diminish the attention the contest receives from East Coast-based media outlets, given the three-hour time difference.

"We need to look like we know what we are doing," said David Buell, chair of the Washoe County GOP, who has called on party leaders to release the results as they trickle in.

The Nevada GOP last week announced a partnership with Twitter and Google in hopes of allowing the party to release results instantly on the Internet.

In contrast to this year's plans, the results of the 2008 caucuses were largely known before sunset.

The caucus count is just the latest bit of trouble for a GOP contest that has been plagued by a year of missteps and party turmoil, prompting Republicans here to lower expectations just as the contested nominating fight turns to Nevada.

Party officials say they expect no more than 60,000 voters — out of 468,000 registered Republicans in Nevada — to participate. That would be 16,000 more than the number that voted in 2008's non-binding contest.

Taliban Deny They Are Ready for Afghan Peace Talks

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP)

• The Taliban dismissed reports they are preparing to talk peace with the Afghan government, and a NATO report leaked Wednesday shows captured insurgents full of confidence they will seize power after international troops leave.

While both were setbacks to President Hamid Karzai's quest to broker peace with the Taliban, his government

got a big boost from Pakistan's top diplomat who declared her nation's support for an Afghan-led reconciliation process.

Still, steps toward finding a political resolution to the 10-year-old war continue to be bogged down in discussions among the U.S. and its partners over venues, agendas and conflicting interests.

Pakistan's Foreign Minis-

ter Hina Rabbani Khar said she was visiting Kabul to deliver the strong message that Pakistan would stand behind any peace initiative that was widely supported by all ethnic groups in Afghanistan.

"Our only prerequisite to be supportive of an initiative is that it should be Afghan-led," she said. "It should be Afghan-owned. It should be Afghan-driven and

Afghan-backed."

She said the Afghans should determine the way forward and then nations in the region and the greater international community should back the plan.

"This is the way the direction should be seen, rather than the other way around where others determine the direction, and the Afghans, we feel, are sometimes left to follow," she said.

Challenge to Schools: Embracing Digital Textbooks

WASHINGTON • Are hardbound textbooks going the way of slide rules and typewriters in schools?

Education Secretary Arne Duncan and Federal Communications Commission chairman Julius Genachowski on Wednesday challenged schools and companies to get digital textbooks in students' hands within five years. The Obama administration's push comes two weeks after Apple Inc. announced it would start to sell electronic versions of a few standard high-school books for use on its iPad tablet.

Digital books are viewed as a way to provide interactive learning, potentially save money and get updated material faster to stu-

dents.

Digital learning environments have been embraced in Florida, Idaho, Utah, and California, as well as in individual schools and districts such as Joplin, Mo., where laptops replaced textbooks destroyed in a tornado. But many schools lack the broadband capacity or the computers or tablets to adopt the technology, and finding the money to go completely digital is difficult for many schools in tough economic times. And, in some places, adopting new textbooks is an arduous process.

At a time when technology has transformed how people interact and even led to social uprisings in the Middle East, education has too often lagged, Duncan said.

"Do we want kids walk-


ing around with 50-pound backpacks and every book in those backpacks costing 50, 60, 70 dollars and many of them being out of date? Or, do we want students walking around with a mobile device that has much more content than was even imaginable a couple years ago and can be constantly updated? I think it's a very simple choice," Duncan said in an interview.

Tied to Wednesday's announcement at a digital town hall was the government's release of a 67-page "playbook" to schools that promotes the use of digital textbooks and offers guidance. The administration hopes that dollars spent on traditional textbooks can instead go toward making digital learning more feasible.

Additional sections can be added that fit your parents' situation. The binder is never really complete as you will want to update it as needed. Your efforts should result in a good summary of your parents' personal, financial, and legal affairs—which will make it easier for you to help them. Good luck!

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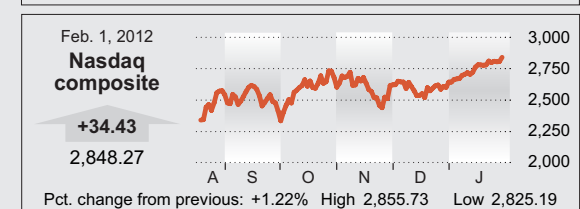
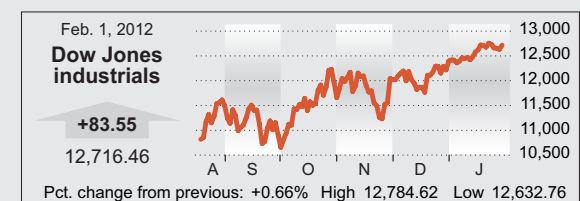

Microsoft Slams Google User Data Policy in Ads

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Microsoft Corp. slammed search rival Google Inc. with full-page newspaper ads Wednesday, saying that recent changes at Google that allow it to internally merge the data it collects on user activity across services such as YouTube and Gmail are meant to allow advertisers to better target customers.

Google has touted the overhaul it announced last week as a simplification of detailed but obtuse policies and a way to provide a better user experience.

Microsoft offered up its own Web-based alternatives, saying for instance that users of its free email service, Hotmail, don't have to worry about the content of their emails being used to help target ads.

Status Update: Facebook to Go Public, Raise \$5 Billion

NEW YORK • Facebook made a much-anticipated status update Wednesday: The Internet social network is going public eight years after its computer-hacking CEO Mark Zuckerberg started the service at Harvard University.

That means anyone with the right amount of cash will be able to own part of a Silicon Valley icon that quickly transformed from dorm-room startup to cultural touchstone.

If its initial public offering of stock makes enough friends on Wall Street, Facebook will probably make its stock-market debut in three or four months as one of the world's most valuable companies. Facebook, which is now based in Menlo Park, Calif., hopes to list its stock under the ticker symbol, "FB," on the New York Stock Exchange or Nasdaq Stock Market.

In its regulatory filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission, Facebook Inc. indicated it hopes to raise \$5 billion in its IPO. That would be the most for an Internet IPO since Google Inc. and its early backers raised \$1.9 billion in 2004. The final amount will likely change as Facebook's bankers gauge the investor demand.

Joining corporate America's elite would give Facebook newfound financial clout as it tries to make its service even more pervasive and expand its audience of 845 million users. It also could help Facebook fend off an intensifying challenge from Google, which is looking to solidify its status as the Internet's most powerful company with a rival social network called Plus.

The intrigue surrounding Facebook's IPO has increased in recent months, not only because the company has become a common conduit — for everyone from dotting grandmas to sassy teenagers — to share information about their lives.

Zuckerberg, 27, has emerged as the latest in a lineage of Silicon Valley prodigies who are alternately hailed for pushing the world in new directions and reviled for overstepping their bounds. In Zuckerberg's case, a lawsuit alleging that he stole the idea for Facebook from some Harvard classmates became the grist for a book and a movie that was nominated for an Academy Award last year.

Following the model of Google co-founders Larry Page and Sergey Brin, Zuckerberg set up two classes of stock that will ensure he retains control as the sometimes conflicting demands of Wall Street exert new pressures on the company. He will have the final say on how nearly 57 percent of Facebook's stock votes, according to the filing.

Even before the IPO was filed, Zuckerberg was shaping up as his generation's Bill Gates — a geek who parlayed his love of computers into fame and fortune. *Forbes* magazine estimated Zuckerberg's wealth at \$17.5 billion in its most recent survey of the richest people in the U.S. A more precise measurement of Zuckerberg's fortune will be available once the IPO is priced and provides a concrete benchmark for determining the value of his nearly 534 million Facebook shares.

The IPO will also mint hundreds of Facebook employee as millionaires because they have accumulated stock at lower prices than what the

shares are likely to be valued at on the open market. Facebook employed 3,200 people at the end of last year.

Depending on how long regulators take to review Facebook's IPO documents, the company could be making its stock market debut around the time that Zuckerberg celebrates his next birthday in May.

When most companies go public, they let Wall Street investment banks handle everything. That means the initial stock price is reserved for big institutional investors, shutting out the average investor.

The IPO filing casts a spotlight on some of Facebook's inner workings for the first time. Among other things, the documents reveal the amount of Facebook's revenue, its major shareholders, its growth opportunities and its concerns about its biggest competitive threats.

The documents show, as expected, that Facebook is thriving. The company earned \$668 million on revenue of \$3.7 billion last year, according to the filing. Both figures nearly doubled from 2010.

"The company is a lot more profitable than we thought," said Kathleen Smith, principal of IPO investment advisory firm Renaissance Capital.

Although she considered Facebook's numbers "very impressive," she said Facebook needs to talk more about where it sees its growth coming from.

"What new areas of business is it expecting to pursue beyond display ads?"

What's not in the documents, yet, is Facebook's market value. That figure could hit \$100 billion, based on Facebook's rapid growth and the appraisals that steered investors who bought stakes while the company was still private.

Facebook heads a class of Internet startups that have been going public during the past year.

The early crop has included Internet radio service Pandora Media Inc., professional networking service LinkedIn Corp. and daily deals company Groupon Inc. Most of those Internet IPOs haven't lived up to their lofty expectations. The list of disappointments includes Zynga Inc., which has built a profitable business by creating a variety of games to

play on Facebook. Zynga's stock fell 5 percent below its IPO price on the first day of trading.

Facebook stands apart, though. As it rapidly expands, people from Silicon Valley to Brazil to India use it to keep up with news from friends and long-lost acquaintances, play mindless games tending virtual cities and farms and share big news or minute details about their days. Politicians, celebrities and businesses use Facebook to connect with fans and the general public.

It's becoming more difficult to tell whether going to Facebook is a pastime or an addiction. In the U.S., Facebook visitors spend an average of seven hours per month on the website each month, more than doubling from an average of three hours per month in 2008, according to the research firm comScore Inc.

More than half of Facebook users log on to the site on any given day. Using software developed by outside parties — call it the Facebook economy — they share television shows they are watching, songs they are playing and photos of what they are wearing or eating. Facebook says 250 million photos alone are posted on its site each day.

To make money, Facebook sells the promise of highly targeted advertisements based on the information its users share, including interests, hobbies, private thoughts and relationships. Though most of its revenue comes from ads, Facebook also takes a cut from the money that apps make through its site. For every dollar that "FarmVille" maker Zynga gets for the virtual cows and crops it sells, for example, Facebook gets 30 cents.

For all of Facebook's success, the company has had its share of troubles. It went through a series of privacy missteps over the years as it pushed users to disclose more and more information about themselves. Most recently, the company settled with the U.S. Federal Trade Commission over allegations that it exposed details about people's private lives without getting legally required consent. And the legal fights over Facebook's origins have been embarrassing and sometimes distracting, though Zuckerberg has consistently denied allegations that have depicted him as a ruthless weasel.

Microsoft Cuts about 200 Marketing Employees

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Microsoft Corp. said it laid off some of its marketing staff on Wednesday as part of an effort to restructure its operations.

The company did not specify how many of its 92,000 employees were let go, but a person familiar with the software maker's strategy said about 200 people lost their jobs.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to disclose details of the restructuring effort.

In a statement, the Red-

mond, Wash.-based company said it was taking steps to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of its marketing operations.

"Some of these changes involved the reduction of a small percentage of marketing positions to better align our resources with our business needs and clarify roles across the marketing function," the company said.

Last month, Microsoft posted flat earnings for the final quarter of 2011 and improved sales of servers, Xbox games and its Office productivity software.

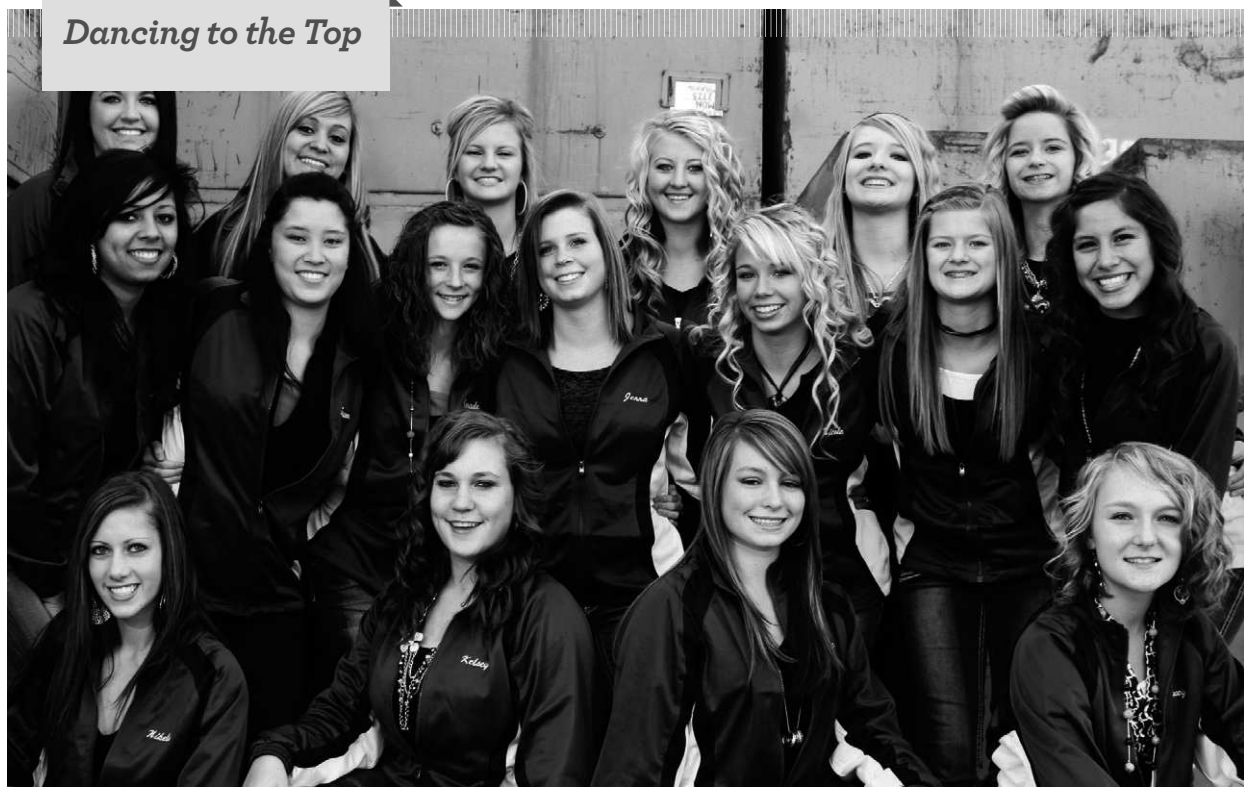

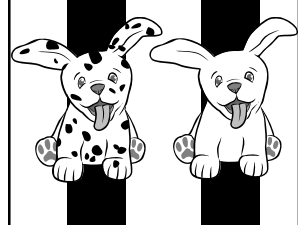

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Those Who Argue Together Stay Together

MINNEAPOLIS • When Bob Gubrud heard about a survey saying that arguing with your spouse at least once a week makes for stronger, longer marriages, he chuckled as he quipped sarcastically, "That must mean that our marriage is fantastic, because sometimes we have one a day."

The Edina, Minn., man and his wife, Rosie, have been married 52 years, so they're clearly doing something right. According to

marriage counselors, their disagreements can help them iron out small differences before they become major issues.

The survey, released this month, found that 44 percent of married couples believe that fighting more than once a week helps keep the lines of communication open. While that survey was done in India, it reinforces similar studies that have been done in the United States, said William Doherty, a professor in the University of Minnesota's Department of Family Social Science.

The studies come with a couple of caveats, he added: For starters, nobody is recommending that you put down the newspaper and pick a fight with your spouse. It's also important to remember that there's a difference between "good fighting" and "bad fighting," and the latter can be as destructive as the former is beneficial.

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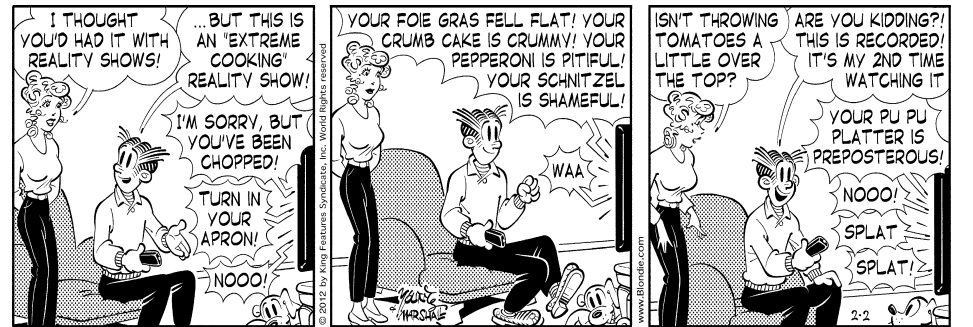

Stopping Iran May Require an Attack

One of several casualties of the vitriolic name-calling between Republican presidential candidates Mitt Romney and Newt Gingrich is what to do about Iran.

In interviews, Romney has spoken about tougher sanctions, but it's been difficult to consider the candidates' positions on Iran — or much else — with the childish talk about who is the bigger liar.

James Clapper, director of National Intelligence, testified Tuesday before the Senate Intelligence Committee. Clapper said that while American sanctions are likely to have a greater impact on Iran's nuclear program, they are not expected to lead to the demise of Iran's leadership.

Clapper said, “We assess Iran is keeping open the option to develop nuclear weapons, in part by developing various nuclear capabilities that better position it to produce such weapons, should it choose to do so.”

Given the apocalyptic statements from Iran's leadership, is anyone in doubt about Iran's intentions? Clapper said Iran is expanding its capability to enrich uranium and that the end product can be used for either civil or weapons purposes.

Clapper acknowledged “Iran's technical advancement, particularly in uranium enrichment, strengthens our assessment that Iran has the scientific, technical, and industrial capacity to eventually produce nuclear weapons, making the central issue its political will to do so.”

The central issue for Israel and the United States is this: can Iran be stopped by a pre-emptive attack, or must we wait until it launches — or threatens to launch — a nuclear missile at Israel, or explodes — or threatens to explode — “suitcase bombs” in U.S. cities?

In the English edition of “Israel Hayom,” the largest circulation Hebrew daily in Israel, former Israeli diplomat Yoram Ettinger writes

about the history of pre-emptive strikes that did not materialize and the consequences of waiting to be attacked before acting: <http://www.israel-hayom.com/site/newsletter-opinion.php?id1298>.

Ettinger believes the reluctance to engage in a pre-emptive strike on Iran's nuclear facilities “is harmful, ignores precedents, plays into Iran's hands and threatens Israel's existence” because it conveys “hesitancy, skepticism and fatalism, aiming to preclude pre-emption and assuming that Israel can co-exist with a nuclear-armed Iran,” which of course it cannot, anymore than the United States could have co-existed with Cuba when the Soviet Union placed nuclear missiles there during the Kennedy administration.

The continuing problem for the United States is that every modern administration has falsely believed that what Israel and America do or don't do can deter the stated objectives of radical Arab and Muslim leaders.

The history and consequences of American and Israeli reluctance to engage in pre-emption has been chronicled by Ettinger. Here is one of several examples: Oct. 5, 1973: Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir rejected the option of a pre-emptive strike against mobilizing Egyptian and Syrian troops. Meir didn't want to appear as the aggressor and damage ties with the U.S., which was pressuring Israel to do nothing, probably out of fear the incendiary situation would be “inflamed.” Following the resultant Yom Kippur War, many came to view the cost of waiting as greater than it might have been had Israel attacked first.

Now Israel and the U.S. face another choice: a pre-emptive strike, or wait and see what might happen.



Are College Students Learning?

In his State of the Union address, President Obama proposed several measures to lower college tuition. University leaders responded cautiously, warning that cost-cutting reforms might also cut into instructional quality.

But here's the big open secret in American higher education: Most institutions have no meaningful way to measure the quality of their instruction. And the president didn't ask us to develop one, either.

Instead, he suggested that the federal government tie student aid to colleges' success in reducing tuition and in helping students move forward. In a follow-

up speech at the University of Michigan on Friday, he called for a “college score-card” that would rank institutions according to cost, graduation rates and future earnings.

“If you can't stop tuition from going up, your funding from taxpayers will go down,” Obama warned. “We should push colleges to do better; we should hold them accountable if they don't.”

Fair enough. But look again at Obama's criteria for “better”: holding down costs, graduating students

and helping them get jobs. There's no mention of whether the students are actually learning anything. At most institutions, including my own, we have no idea if they are. Sure, professors assign grades in their courses, and students are asked to evaluate the classes they take and the professors who teach them. But neither measure gives us any real answer to the \$200,000 question: What knowledge or skills are students acquiring in exchange for the skyrocketing tuition they pay?

And we now have some alarming national data to suggest the answer: not nearly enough. My New York University colleague

Richard Arum and the University of Virginia's Josipa Roksa recently tracked several thousand undergraduates as they moved through two dozen U.S. universities. They found that almost half of them didn't significantly improve their reasoning or writing skills during the first two years of college. And after four years, subsequent research showed, more than one-third of students still showed no significant gains in these areas.

Arum and Roksa based their conclusions on results from the College Learning Assessment, or CLA, an essay test that tries to measure the things universities say they want students to learn: critical thinking, complex reasoning and written expression.

Ethics Needed on County Level, Too

Additionally, ignoring the mind-boggling paper trail of corruption, he signaled his intention to sit on his hands and do nothing by hoping that my inquiries had not “muddied the waters.”

The most egregious case involves the setting up of a company by the top man in the councilman's company shortly before the city was to apply for a \$150,000 grant to buy equipment and supplies which are ancillary to those sold by the councilman's company.

The councilman's employee's company was not registered with the secretary of state, shared real estate assets with the councilman's company, used interchangeable magnetic signs on its and the councilman's vehicles, avoided the bidding process (no surprise there) and, in what can (generously) only be described as a breathtakingly stupid, incriminating coincidence, delayed billing the city for the \$150,000 until

several months after the councilman's re-election.

During my time with the Jerome Sheriff's Office, I had several homicide cases to investigate. Most of them were miles from my office. The two most high profile, Steven Louder shot to death by Jimmie Thomas in Hunt, Meta Jones brutally killed by Sandra Jonas at a home bordering Minidoka County. And like most Jerome law enforcement, I was on the scene after two deputies and a suspect dead in a drug raid gone bad in Eden. Violent crime happened in every corner of the county.

In my decision to run for Jerome County sheriff, I looked at the services provided to the communities of Eden and Hazelton.

Hazelton pays for 20 hours of deputy time, but because of scheduling, that 20 hours is broken up and shorted even. As the sheriff of Jerome County, I would

eliminate the line between east and west, this is one county. Deputies will be responsible to provide services and patrol time to every corner of the county regardless of what areas pay extra and which do not. Class distinctions will end.

Currently, the city of Jerome, which has its own police department, receives the majority of deputy “face” time. The office, jail and most residences are there. The deputies gravitate to the population center. This can be countered. It is the challenge of the sheriff and his command staff to create routines that meet the needs of the communities outside the city limits of Jerome.

As your sheriff, I will think in broader terms when patrol schedules are made, deputies and supervisors will patrol schools and neighborhoods in Eden and Hazelton every day, not limited to 20 hours.

As your sheriff I will include the residents in less-populated areas of the county in my service strategy.

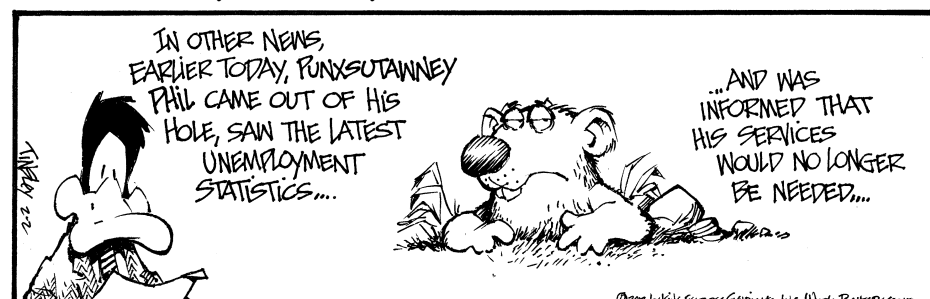

Idaho's No Child Left Behind Plan Praised, Panned

BOISE • State education officials received more than 50 public comments on their plan to adopt a new five-star rating system for schools while rejecting the latest benchmarks under the federal No Child Left Behind law.

A 21-day public comment period ended Wednesday. As of Friday, about half of the comments were supportive of the state seeking a federal waiver to get around the latest testing requirements under No Child Left Behind, which passed in 2001 with broad support but has since been widely panned by critics.

"A waiver will give the state of Idaho more flexibility to address these needs and lift restriction of the law that most likely will hamper continued academic improvement in Idaho," said Kasey Teske, who is principal at Robert Stuart Middle School in Twin Falls.

While several who weighed in on Idaho's plan offered suggestions for the proposed new school grading system, others bemoaned losses to funding for education and took direct shots at Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna, who introduced a polarizing education overhaul that was signed into law last year.

Luna touted his education changes Tuesday, saying Idaho is in a good position to receive a waiver from the latest No Child Left Behind requirements.

"This application for a waiver of NCLB requirements is yet another instance that Tom Luna has no qualifications," said Marilyn Ames, who identified herself as former teacher. "Consider this a 'no star' patron endorsement of this application for waiver and of the Luna plan."

The comments also included specific questions about how special education students will be treated under the new rating system and what will happen to schools that were identified as needing improvement under No Child Left Behind, the nation's governing education law.

"Will they be able to earn a 4- or 5-star rating?" said Barney Brewton, a principal at Seltice Elementary in Post Falls.

Under the new system, Idaho will use standardized test scores to gauge student academic growth and proficiency in grades 3-10, while factors like graduation rates and student enrollment in advanced courses would come into play in later grades.

Idaho is embarking on its own course after opting to ignore the latest requirements for determining school progress under No Child Left Behind, which is known primarily for its emphasis on standardized tests and the labeling of thousands of schools as failures.

Truckers Split on Higher Speed Limit

A bill to raise the limit to 75 mph on rural interstates faces a hearing today.

BOISE • John Forrester, a Caldwell independent trucker, calls it "threading the needle."

As he is driving his refrigerated truck down a rural section of Idaho's interstates doing the maximum 65 miles per hour for trucks, one car passes him and stays in the passing lane slightly ahead of him. A second car, eager to go 75, decides to pass, comes up close to the first car, then darts back into the right lane im-

mediately in front of his truck.

"It gets pretty hairy," Forrester said.

Threading the needle and other risky interactions between cars and trucks could be eased if Idaho allowed trucks to match cars' 75 mph limit, according to Forrester and other backers of a bill to raise the limit.

The Senate Transportation Committee will hold a hearing today on the bill from its chairman, Sen. Jim Hammond, R-Coeur d'Alene. A single limit would keep traffic moving at the same speed and reduce some of the need for passing, Hammond said.

His proposal, Senate Bill 1229, is backed by the Idaho State Police, who say it would make for safer high-

Fed. Judge Considers if Pharmacies Must Sell Contraceptives

TACOMA, Wash. • A federal judge is considering whether Washington state can require pharmacies to stock and sell Plan B or other emergency contraceptives, even in the face of religious objections by druggists who believe they destroy human life.

U.S. District Judge Ronald Leighton heard closing arguments Wednesday in a lawsuit that claims state rules violate the constitutional rights of pharmacists by requiring them to dispense such medicine. The state requires pharmacies to dispense any medication for which there is a community need and to stock a representative assortment of drugs needed by their patients.

Ralph's Thriftway in Olympia, Wash., and two licensed Washington pharmacists sued in 2007, saying that dispensing Plan B would infringe on their religious beliefs because it can prevent the implantation of a fertilized egg. The state says the requirements are legal because they apply neutrally to medicines and pharmacies, and that they promote a government interest — the timely delivery of medicine, including Plan B, which becomes less effective as time passes.

The judge blocked the state dispensing rule in

2007, finding that it would violate the plaintiffs' freedom of religion. But a 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel overruled him, saying that he applied the wrong legal standard and that the rule appeared constitutional because it was neutral and did not directly target religious views.

The appellate court sent the case back to Leighton, telling him to apply the correct standard. He held an 11-day trial to flesh out the matter, and in court Wednesday, he expressed little patience for the state's enforcement of the rules, which he said reminded him of the federal government's arbitrary enforcement of the now-repealed rule against gays serving openly in the military.

The issue is more important than many other freedom-of-religion cases, such as those concerning religious dress or other ceremonial matters, he said.

Leighton said he would rule in a couple weeks, and that he intended to frame his opinion in a way that would encourage the 9th Circuit and the U.S. Supreme Court to address whether pharmacists have a due-process right to refuse to provide medicine that they believe can take a life.

"Somebody at higher pay and higher station will decide this issue," he said.

Governor Creates Panel to Push Nuclear Power

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has created a new panel to investigate how to keep the 63-year-old Idaho National Laboratory and its nuclear energy mission alive and relevant.

Otter's executive order on Wednesday reinforces his support of the industry's presence in eastern Idaho — even amid concern that a French company, Areva, could abandon plans to build a \$3 billion uranium enrichment facility west of Idaho

Falls. The Idaho Leadership in Nuclear Energy will be headed by Department of Commerce Director Jeff Sayer.

It will provide recommendations to Otter on how the INL can continue playing an important role in economic growth and energy security.

The panel will also explore ways to strengthen the broader nuclear industry in Idaho, as well as how to train workers for jobs in the sector.

Lawmakers Seek Texting while Driving Ban — Again

BOISE (AP) • Lawmakers are making another run at banning texting while driving after legislation in past sessions stalled.

The Senate Transportation Committee on Tuesday voted to consider making texting while driving an infraction.

It's now due a full hearing.

Sen. Jim Hammond of Coeur d'Alene is sponsoring the bill that would put those who review or manually prepare texts on wireless devices at risk of fines, if they're caught by law-enforcement officers.

Hammond says the advent of text messages has been accompanied by growing recognition that

it's dangerous to send them while behind the wheel.

He carves out an exception for law enforcement and emergency personnel.

The closest a ban got to passing Idaho's Legislature was in 2010, when now-Congressman Raul Labrador succeeded in blocking a similar measure on a procedural move.

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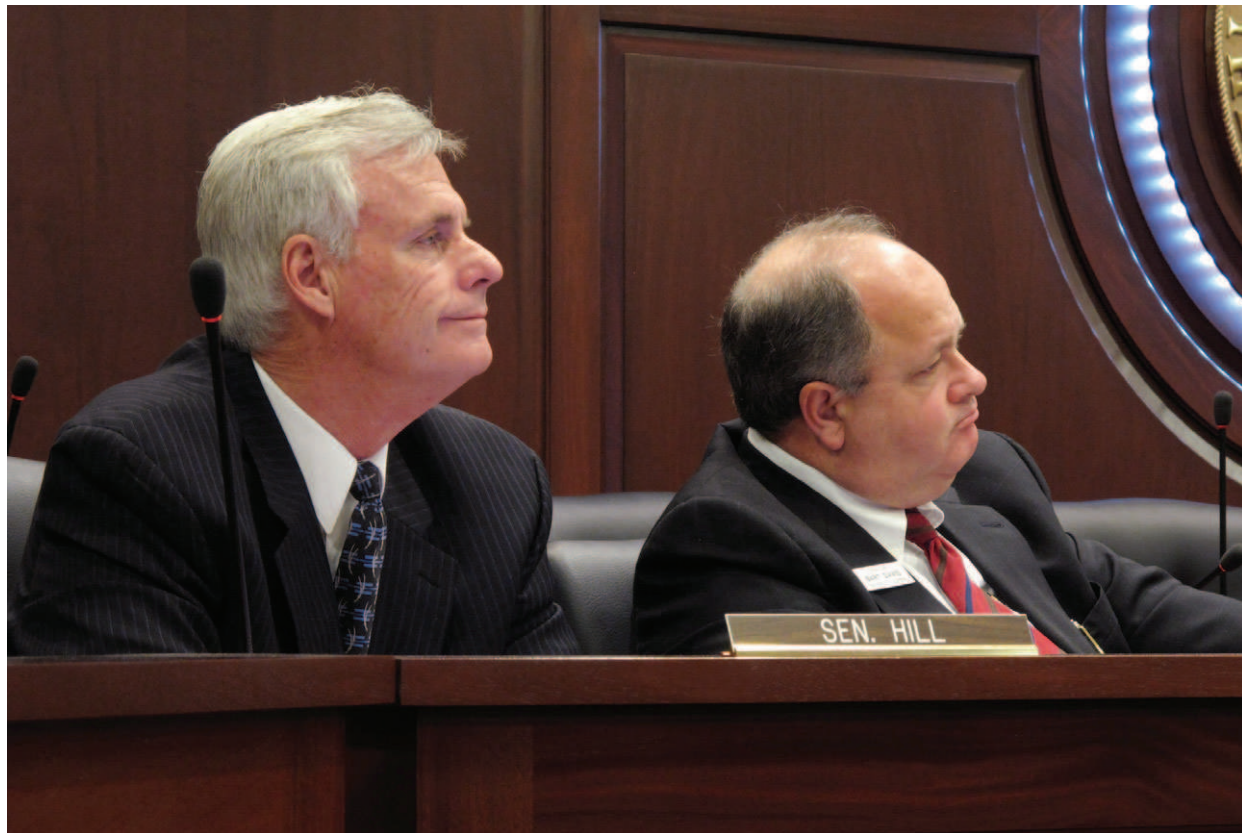

For two weeks, House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke's push to evict Occupy Boise's tents has been one of the centerpiece spectacles of the 2012 Legislature. Stern-faced Idaho State Police troopers have been posted outside hearing rooms, supporters complained of having their backpacks searched, and House Speaker Lawrence Denney locked doors to representatives' offices — just in case.

Against this backdrop, a few homeless people, including registered sex offenders who say their options for finding shelter elsewhere are limited, joined social workers, activists, physical therapists, computer programmers and an array of others to highlight the group's

broad, if somewhat unfocused, message: Government, in particular in Washington, D.C., ignores average people and is a pawn of rich corporations. Wednesday's testimony was no different. Bryan Walker, a Boise attorney, said Bedke's bill has actually added to the group's resolve. "There's nothing in this bill that could kill us," Walker said.

Another supporter, Kristy Kuecken, a social worker, said joining the group has been a tutorial

on the slow grind of making public policy.

"Participating in Occupy Boise has demonstrated to me how difficult making change is," Kuecken said.

Sen. Jim Hammond, the Senate sponsor, said nothing in the measure curtails free speech. "This bill does not silence anyone's voice," the Coeur d'Alene Republican said. "The voice of our citizens was heard in this auditorium today."

Rather, Hammond said the bill underscores Ida-

ho's duty to preserve the highest aesthetic values that many expect from publicly owned ground.

When grilled by Sen. Edgar Malepeai, D-Pocatello, about what he meant by "aesthetic values," Hammond said "it would be the green grass that is intended to be there" — not the image he believes is projected by cardboard signs and makeshift facilities.

"The Capitol Mall is our front yard," Hammond said.

Notable Construction on ITD's Schedule for Magic Valley

SHOSHONE • South-central Idaho's highways are in for a steady diet of bridge work when the weather warms, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

Bridge maintenance and repairs dominate ITD's schedule of projects for the 2012 construction season, with work scheduled on 34 Magic Valley bridges. More than half of the planned projects will take place along Interstate 84.

Perhaps the most notable project will repair the driving surface of the Perrine Bridge in north Twin Falls. The project will reduce the roadway to two lanes for about a month. Bridge work is also scheduled in Burley and Jerome.

ITD also plans to extend the life of its roads through resurfacing projects and laying seal coats on nearly 150 miles of roadway by the year's end.

Traffic will be slowed south of Twin Falls throughout the summer, as U.S. Highway 93 will be rehabilitated from milepost 5.5 to milepost 18 north of Rogerson. Two lanes of Idaho Highway 75 will remain open north of Shoshone during yearlong construction on 8 miles.

In Jerome, a new traffic signal will be installed at the intersection of Main Street and Tiger Drive, near Jerome High School.

TWIN FALLS • Kris Rambur has seen it before — a calendar full of attractive women dressed in bikinis and holding guns.

There are at least three good reasons: It helps women have more confidence in themselves, she said, and gives them protection if they’re ever physically threatened by an attacker. And the third: Having a gun hobby is just plain fun, said Rambur, who target shoots at local

ranges at least three times a week.

‘Bit by the Bug’

On Monday, she and friend Lisa Baily were at the Twin Falls Rifle and Pistol Club demonstrating their skills with firearms.

Hitting a bull’s-eye comes easy to these women. Baily, a 39-year-old Kimberly resident, started shooting about three years ago, while Rambur, 38, has been shooting since she was 17.

Her dad taught her about guns, how to hold a pistol, how to aim. But he never let her load them.

“He’d do things with the gun and then hand it to me,” she said. “I’d shoot it down range and then hand it back to dad, who’d reload it for me. So I never learned the mechanics of gun fundamentals until I took a class. That’s when the drive began. I just got bit by the bug.”

Gun Confidence

Rambur, an administrator for Reno, Nev.-based LMS Defense, teaches

classes for the company where she instructs military and law enforcement personnel as well as civilians about proper gun handling and shooting techniques. Many of her students are women.

Rambur recently relocated to Twin Falls, where the company plans to move its headquarters, and she hopes to see the number of women gun users and concealed carriers increase in the area.

Baily, who owns several guns including an AR-22, said she’d also like to see more women gun users. For her, shooting is a stress reliever, and it’s always fun to target practice with other women.

“Women learn better from other women,” Rambur said. “If there’s a female on the range, they can better relate about how to stand, their posture, and emotionally they’re not as intimidated.”

Taking Guns Afield

Tyna Cummins of Twin Falls held the record in her household for

If you like to fish, you might consider helping the Idaho Department of Fish and Game improve the opportunity in Idaho.

You can do that by spending 10-15 minutes taking the online 2011 Idaho Angler Opinion Survey on the department’s website. But time is running out: The survey closes on Sunday.

The survey is offered only every five to six years, so it’s not often you get the chance to voice your opinion on so many fishing topics. MAKING SNOW

When Mother Nature doesn’t step up, the snowmaking crew at Sun Valley Resort is ready.

SUN VALLEY • A recent snow dumping on Bald Mountain meant that Dennis Harper could take a breather for one of the first times since Halloween.

“I’m happy to step aside and give Mother Nature an opportunity to take over. We can’t compete with Mother Nature,” said Harper, Sun Valley’s snow-making manager.

Maybe so. But Harper and the 18 men and women who work for him around the clock performed miracles, according to the skiers and boarders who frequent Sun Valley.

Using water and compressed air, they covered Sun Valley’s ski hill in white, allowing skiers and boarders to play in the snow when ski resorts in Utah, California and other states had little or no ter-

rain open.

By the time Sun Valley opened to 2,600 skiers on Thanksgiving Day, Sun Valley had used 62 million gallons of water — 20 million gallons more than last year at the same time. It was enough to fill a hundred Olympic-sized swimming pools, said Snowmaker Corey Allen.

“What they’ve done is nothing short of spectacular,” said Bob Gordon, who owns Formula Sports ski shop in Ketchum. “The snowmaking saved our bacon. But, beyond that, it’s every bit as good as the real stuff and maybe even better. It’s very consistent and grooms out real well. And Sun Valley does a fantastic job of working it at night so it’s grippy and fun. We’ve had excellent conditions from Thanksgiving Day onward whether we had natural snow or not.”

Harper is leading free snowmaking tours this year to show how his crew salvaged the first two months of the ski season for Idaho skiers.

Snowmaking by the Numbers

- Bald Mountain’s snowmaking system covers 600 acres of the 2,054 permitted acres.
- It has 555 snow guns and 30 manual guns that the snowmaking crew drags to cat tracks with snowmobiles and hook up to fire hoses.
- Each gun can spew out five to six gallons a minute at higher temperatures and 16 gallons a minute at lower temperatures.
- About 16 percent of it evaporates. The rest of the manmade snow eventually ends up back in the aquifer.
- Sun Valley has 28 pumps and 13 compressors. It takes 17,000 horsepower to run it all at once.
- Sun Valley can pump 2,000 gallons a minute on the River Run side of the mountain and 1,200 gallons a minute on the Warm Springs side.
- Dollar Mountain has one pump with a capacity of 700 gallons a minute. It has 72 compressors and 72 guns — all manually operated. The operation is more energy-efficient than Baldy’s but much more labor extensive of its 12-man crew.
- Sun Valley has to rebuild its snowmaking parts every 10 years.

The free 90-minute tours are offered at 11 a.m. Thursdays and Saturdays. Up to 15 people can take part in each. But on this particular day few people could be persuaded to leave the creamy powder building up on the slopes to take the tour.

Those of us who did followed Harper onto the gondola, which whisked them to the Roundhouse Restaurant. There they cruised down a cat track onto the gentle Roundhouse Slope. Instead of following it straight down, however, they angled to the right heading for a clump of trees along the edge of the slope.

Hidden among the trees was Snowmaking Central — a big concrete building that houses fire horses, snow gun parts, air compressors and the computerized system that monitors Sun Valley's 555 snow guns.

Harper has been watching the snow all his life, first as a sugar beet farmer in the Raft River Valley south of Burley and now as Sun Valley's snowmaking manager. Running Sun Valley's snowmaking system full bore uses about the same amount of water as two farming pivots that cover 250 acres each, he said.

"And we have more fun per gallon with our water than the farmers do," he added.

Harper described how his crew starts with what they call "production snow," putting more water in the snow to make a good hard base that neither skiers nor snow groomers will break through. It was easier building that base this year with the lack of natural snow than last year when Baldy was besieged by natural snow during November and December.

The snowmakers build mountains up to 25 feet tall, which the groomers then spread over the mountain. Once the base is built, the snowmakers change the formula to make a drier, skiable snow, refreshing each slope every couple days with a silky coating of up to two inches of snow.

"People call it gun powder skiing," Harper said.

Sun Valley has pumped 158 million gallons of water to cover Baldy so far this year. It's pumped 34 million gallons on Dollar Mountain, which sports Sun Valley's new super pipe and an ever-expanding terrain park.

Sun Valley pulls some of its water out of the Big Wood River and the rest from wells. It also buys \$20,000 to \$30,000 of water from the city of Sun Valley to make snow for Dollar Mountain.

Sun Valley Owner Earl Holding, who bought Sun Valley following the disas-

trous winter of 1976-77 when little snow fell, immediately made snowmaking one of his priorities, installing 38 miles of pipe beneath the slopes. Over the years he's improved the guns, adding taller guns that allow the water mist to hang in the air longer, thereby producing better snow.

Just recently, Sun Valley bought some new energy-efficient snow guns that use a tenth of the energy of the older guns.

Not only is Sun Valley's \$16 million snowmaking system the largest in North America, but it provides some of the best manmade snow, thanks to the automation and types of guns it uses.

Harper noted he had just returned from a snowmaking convention held at Northstar-at-Tahoe where the resort was open only because of its manmade snow.

"Their system is not automated and you could tell they weren't refreshing the snow because it was hard. Their best skiing was the same as our worst," Harper said.

Sun Valley's \$1.5 million computer system checks temperature and humidity at 110 weather stations installed along the snow gun lines, adjusting the snow that's put out according to the temperatures and wind. It pumps more water out as temperature dips. While the snow guns will run at 30 degrees, it has to be 16 degrees or cooler to hit capacity.

It takes two minutes for the system to survey the situation to determine how many guns can run and boot up according to the priorities that the snowmaking crew has identified.

When staff made the adjustments manually weather conditions often changed by the time they went to the next gun, Harper said.

"We're experimenting this year to see how long the snow can sit and remain silky?"

When the storms do come, as they came this past week, it saves Sun Valley about \$10,000 to \$15,000 a day in electrical bills, Harper said.

But Sun Valley officials don't regret one cent of that electric bill, when they consider what might have been.

"Imagine what it would have been like if we didn't have the product. We might have had one or two runs open at most — probably College and Flying Squirrel like the old days," said Jack Sibbach, the resort's marketing director. "Our numbers have been steady all winter — Christmas was good. And all this had a huge effect on the valley's economy. We haven't had a single complaint on the condition of the snow, either, because these guys have put out such a fabulous product."

Shooting the Bull

Because I admire and use the cartridge so often myself, it was a relative no-brainer to decide that this winter's project gun should be chambered for the efficient little rimfire. The choice of gun platform was made just as easily. I use the .22 LR for plinking, small game hunting and informal target shooting. No rifle is better suited to my particular needs than the Ruger 10-22 semi-auto. The fact that I had two aging standard models languishing away in the gun safe meant that I

could spend my entire skimpy budget on the accessory upgrades.

Since any rifle is only as accurate as its barrel, I funneled the bulk of my funds toward the barrel that I felt was best suited to my needs.

It turned out to be an 18-inch blued/fluted .920 target barrel from Shooter's Ridge.

To avoid the accuracy-robbing barrel droop common when bull barrels are mounted in non-threaded receivers, I secured the hefty tube with a Boise-based Tactical Solutions stainless steel barrel retainer.

I believe that bull barreled

guns are more easily carried and manipulated in the field when secured in thumbhole stocks, so my barreled action took up permanent residence in a Shooters Ridge Realtree Hardwoods HD synthetic stock. It has proven to be the perfect mating.

Since the original 10-22 trigger was surprisingly light and creep free, the first modification that I made to the action was to replace the wimpy factory extractor with a real titan, Volquartsen's Exact Edge Extractor. Failures to extract and eject all brands of ammo have now dropped to nearly zero.

Comeback Cats?

Fish and Game biologists confirm that recent cat sighting in Salmon Challis forest was of a Canada lynx.

Call them the comeback cats.

Idaho Department of Fish and Game biologists say that a cat sighted recently in the Salmon-Challis National Forest was a Canada lynx.

The sighting is the first direct evidence of lynx presence on the forest since 1991, according to Fish and Game.

A recreationist reported the animal to Fish and Game after seeing it in a legally set foot-hold trap targeting bobcat. Once department officials arrived, they assessed the cat for injuries and, finding none, released the lynx. But not before collecting hair and scat samples to determine its origin.

"This would be an extremely rare event, and we're waiting to get genetic

test results before we confirm it's a native, wild lynx," said wildlife manager Tom Keegan.

But conservation officer Dane Cook described the animal as it walked away from the trap: "It had all the classic lynx features: long legs, huge furry paws, ear tufts, and the short black-tipped tail."

Preferred lynx habitat is young, regenerating forests that support its primary

prey — snowshoe hares.

Canada lynx are listed as threatened under the federal Endangered Species Act, and they are designated an Idaho "species of greatest conservation need."

Fewer than 40 lynx records are known for the Salmon-Challis region, dating from 1896 trapping logs to an observation of lynx tracks reported in 2010. The last verified record of a lynx in east-central Idaho was an incidentally trapped animal from the Pahsimeroi Valley in 1991.

If you encounter a lynx, report the sighting to the nearest Fish and Game office.

Burley resident Lanette Hodge was at the store recently looking at guns with her family. Pink pistols hung on the wall.

"It wouldn't matter which color the gun was as long as I knew how to use it," Hodge said, noting she'd probably go for a black one.

"Badass black," said Rambur's 19-year-old daughter, Taylor Rambur. "I think black guns are definitely hotter."

She likes target shooting as a sport, and feels more confident with a gun.

"It's always been something fun," Taylor Rambur said. "But if I needed to defend myself, I'd know what to do."

NOW'S THE TIME TO APPLY FOR SPRING TURKEY HUNTS

It might not be Thanksgiving, but it is turkey time.

You now can apply for spring turkey controlled hunts. The application period opened Wednesday and runs through March 1.

Season starts April 15, though some controlled hunts open later.

And then there's the application period for spring black bear, which ends Feb. 15. Black bear season also begins April 15.

Hunters may apply for

controlled hunts at any hunting and fishing license vendor, Fish and Game office, or online at fishandgame.idaho.gov.

The application fee is \$6.25 per person for residents, \$14.75 for nonresidents.

Spring 2012 bear controlled hunt information is in the 2011 Big Game Seasons and Rules book.

Hunters must have a 2012 Idaho hunting license to apply. Turkey hunters must also purchase a controlled hunt permit for \$7.75, if they are drawn.

Through the Frozen Forest: Yellowstone on Skis

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. • I took a deep breath, positioned my skis and shot down the hillside, whizzing through a forest of trees covered with thick, feathered layers of ice.

I focused all my energy on not crashing into one, but my left ski kept slipping off the trail. Knees quivering and blood rushing in my ears, I willed it back and leaned into the curve to find my wife waiting on the trail ahead.

Somehow I stopped without crashing into her. We just stood there, our labored breathing the only sound in the frozen forest.

After a moment, we continued toward our destination, guided by the smoke signals rising from the pools and geysers in the distance.

My wife Beagan and I are new to cross-country skiing. After moving to the Rocky Mountains about two years ago, we figured it would be a good way to experience the backcountry in winter and stave off cabin fever. So we decided to learn in the wildest place we knew: Yellowstone National Park.

Yellowstone's wilderness is reclaimed when the throngs of summer tourists leave and the temperature drops below zero. Most of the park's roads and services shut down, and the landscape is transformed into an otherworldly land of ice and snow.

Relatively few people venture into the park at this time, just 17,262 overnight visitors last winter compared to the nearly 1.2 million overnight stays between June and September 2010.

The wildlife reemerges with the people gone, and

wolves, foxes, swans, geese, eagles, bison and elk are more frequently seen at this time of year.

It's also a prime time for cross-country skiing. Yellowstone in winter has plenty of trails for novices like us and experts alike. No matter the skill level, a ski trip in Yellowstone leaves you with a sense of the park's beauty that is completely different from the busy summer months.

Beagan and I aimed to insert ourselves into this scene through what we pictured would be an unobtrusive means of transportation. For \$40 each, we got a two-hour lesson and were outfitted with skis, boots and poles for 24 hours.

We spent the first part of that lesson in the Old Faithful parking lot. A groomed trail about a third of a mile in diameter had been cut there, and we practiced kicking and gliding. I was soon sweating through my layers even though the temperature was stuck at minus five degrees.

We moved on to a series of progressively steeper hills to practice stopping and turning. The last one

was our final exam. It was the steepest and involved making a left turn at a high rate of speed to avoid plunging into an icy stream.

Halfway down, my hips lurched, my knees knocked and my arms pinwheeled. I collapsed into a pretzel of limbs, poles and skis. My wife swished past as I picked myself up. I watched as she made the turn effortlessly. We were as ready as we were going to be.

We planned our first outing in our room back at the lodge. The Old Faithful Snow Lodge and the Mammoth Hot Springs Hotel near the northern entrance are the only accommodations inside the park during the winter season from mid-December until the first weekend of March.

There's usually plenty of space throughout the season, with Old Faithful normally running at about 70 percent of capacity and Mammoth about 60 percent full. The exception is Christmas, when the lodges are usually full.

Once you get to Old Faithful in winter, you're pretty much stuck there unless you pony up another \$62 to take the three-

hour snowcoach back to West Yellowstone. The rooms at Old Faithful are \$206 a night, there's no television and reservations are a must at the one restaurant.

But the adventure begins just outside the door with the iconic geyser as the main attraction. I watched alone as Old Faithful hissed, gurgled and finally spewed in the twilight. Mother Nature was putting on a show and the only other attendee was a disinterested fox hopping on and off benches in search of some forgotten scraps.

Most wintertime visitors choose to tour the park by snowcoach or snowmobile. But there's really no better way to become immersed in the park than with a pair of skis. There are the easy outings, such as the trails around the Upper Geyser Basin just outside of the lodge. Then there are the tougher ones, including arduous trails to the Continental Divide.

For those who don't want to waste any more time than necessary, and have an extra \$16.50, a shuttle is available to take skiers to more distant trailheads.

Forecast Looks Good for Chinook Salmon Season

If the chinook salmon returns for 2012 holds up to the early forecast, this year could be the third best in more than 30 years.

The forecast suggests a return that's a little more robust than last year, Idaho Fish and Game's Ed Schriever told the Idaho Fish and Game Commission last week.

The fish are still out in the Pacific Ocean, but the forecast for numbers of returning fish are similar to 2002 and 2010, he said. If the run materializes as forecast, the numbers heading for Idaho look even better — exceeded only by 2001 and 2010.

Northwest fish managers estimate that more than 314,000 chinook bound for Nevada Dam will enter the Columbia River this year — last year the number was about 221,000.

Of those, 129,000 hatchery fish and 39,000 wild fish

are predicted to head up the Snake River to Washington, Oregon and Idaho. Last year's actual return was 96,300 hatchery fish and 31,600 wild fish.

Idaho fish managers estimate that 83,600 of the hatchery fish that cross Lower Granite Dam are bound for Idaho waters.

Last year, more than 33,000 returned to Salmon River hatcheries and about 13,000 returned to Clearwater hatcheries.

It's too soon to tell just how many fish will actually show up, and what any fishing seasons might look like. Idaho fisheries managers expect to present proposed chinook fishing seasons in the Clearwater, Snake, Lower Salmon and Little Salmon rivers to the Fish and Game Commission in March.

In years past, chinook seasons have opened in late April.

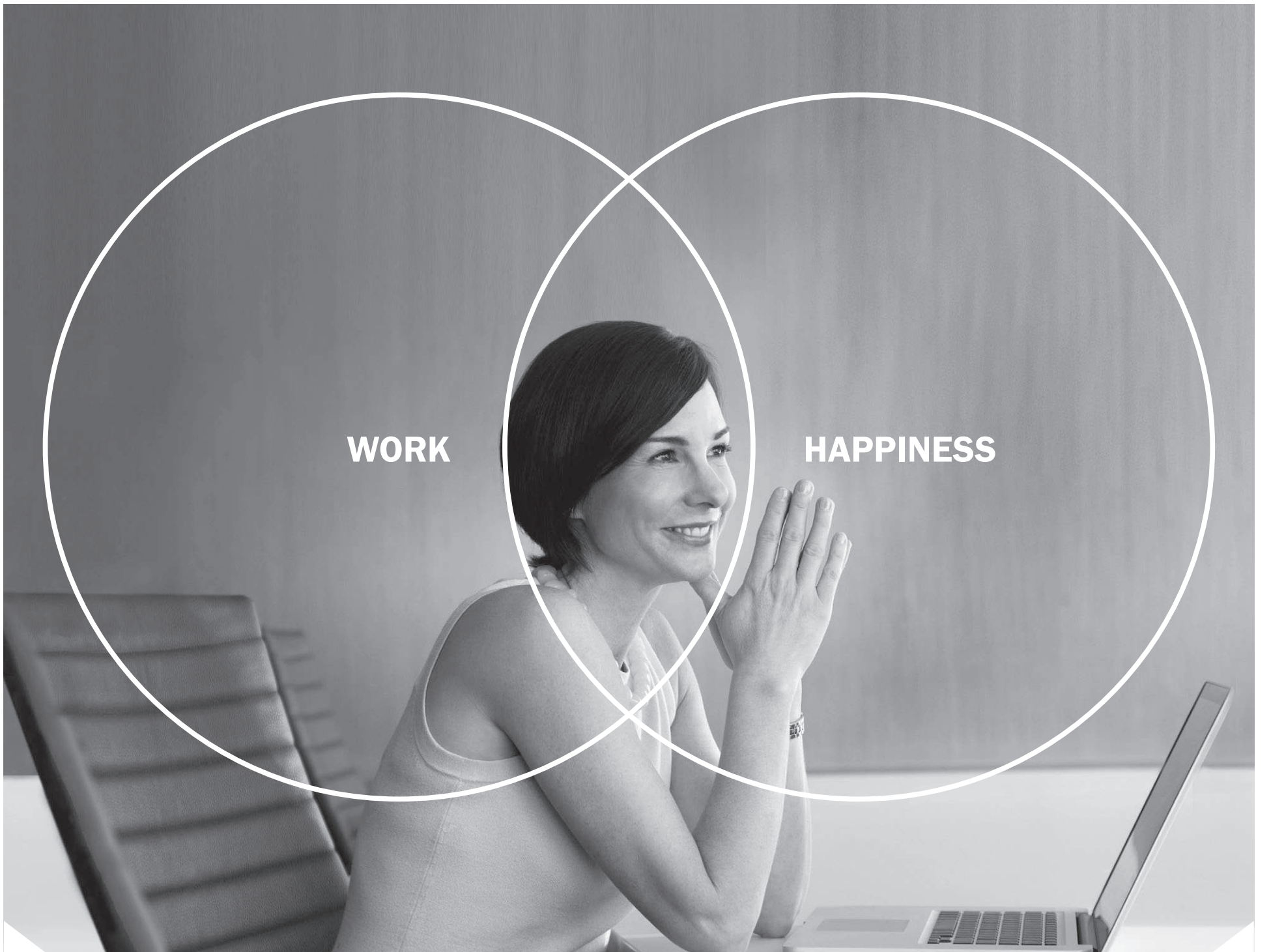

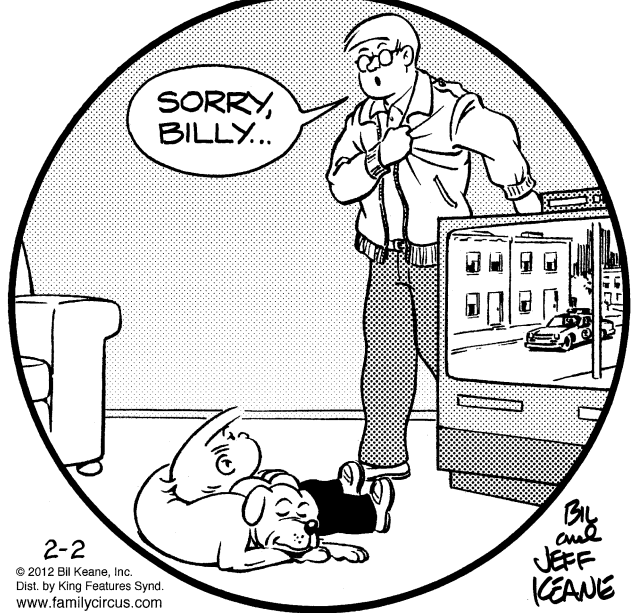

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"The soldier is ... exact in sums, master of the art of tactics."

The play by fourth hand on any trick tends to be a case of winning when you can, and playing small when you can't. But there is scope for both the tactical and strategic duck in fourth chair.

By using these terms, I am trying to differentiate between a play calculated to increase your trick-taking potential within the suit (a tactical play) and one where no further tricks are gained from the suit (in fact, you may even sacrifice tricks), but you end up with more tricks overall than if you had not made the play.

Today's deal is an example of a tactical duck — a variation on the Bath Coup. West leads a top heart (suggesting a king-queen holding without the jack) against three no-trump, and East's discouraging seven may be hard for West to read. If you win the first trick and play on clubs, you might persuade West to win and continue hearts.

But you may feel you are better advised to duck the trick; however, that is not enough. If you follow with the four, West will know his partner's card was a small one, so he will switch, and you are unlikely to get a second heart trick without letting the defenders find the club shift.

Better might be to duck trick one and follow with the 10 from hand. West will now "know" his partner has a high heart and surely will continue the suit. That will give you your ninth trick.

ANSWER: Facing a two-level overcall, which promises both a decent suit and about an opening bid in high-card strength, there is a lot to be said for simply blasting to three no-trump at once. However, the defenders might be able to run the hearts against you. The alternative approach is to cue-bid two diamonds and rebid two no-trump — but that probably will not help you find a heart stopper.

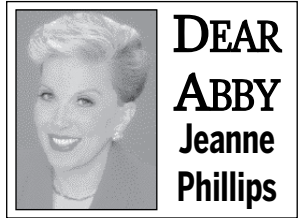

DEAR R.N.: Thank you for sharing your expertise on this subject. I didn't realize patient's rights were specified by the documents you mentioned or that how a resident is addressed is covered in them. Other health care professionals responded similarly, and I stand corrected. **My newspaper readers comment:**

DEAR ABBY: During school and in clinical rotations, we were repeatedly instructed to call clients by their names, especially in situations where memory was impaired. Not only does it help to reorient the patient as to who they are and help them to maintain their identity, but it provides a clear separation as to who is family and who is the caregiver.

The director should not have diminished the importance of the family's feelings on this matter. I suggest they consider relocating their mother to a facility that is more conscientious about the care they are being paid to provide.

DEAR ABBY: Failure to address a patient/resident by his or her proper name is a violation of regulations and could be cited during surveys. If the patient preferred a nickname, the care plan conference team (staff department heads, family and patient) needed to make a notation in the care plan to allow the nickname to be used.

Most of this is covered by the Patient's Bill of Rights and falls under the "right to be treated with respect and dignity." Using terms like "Sweetie" or "Granny" is a symptom of the staff's failure to respect the patient's individuality. They are objectifying and dehumanizing the person and becoming too complacent (or lazy) to learn his or her name. Besides, if an aide approached me and said, "Granny is complaining of pain," which "Granny" am I supposed to attend to?

Broncos Sign 18 More In 2012 Class

BOISE • Boise State's football program uses the motto "Carry The Flag" — when one player leaves, is injured, or substituted out, the replacement steps in and does the best he can.

Filling the gaping hole last year's 50-win senior class left, the Broncos announced 18 student-athletes signed national letters of intent on Wednesday, increasing the 2012 recruiting class to 24. Boise State coach Chris Petersen believes this class will keep expectations high for the Broncos.

"We like these kids a lot," Petersen said. "I think we kind of followed our recruiting model, which is to find good players that are great kids. Our coaches dug deep into their backgrounds, did their homework, and I feel really good and we're really excited about it."

Petersen stresses the importance of

the quarterback position, and perhaps the most-talked about recruit, Nick Patti, will compete for the starting job. Along with five other recruits, Patti enrolled in classes in January and will practice in the spring.

"(Patti's) just a very good player. He can throw, he's accurate, sees the field, he can run, played a very high level of football," Petersen said. "We've had Nick targeted for a long, long time, and I think Nick's had us targeted too, so it seems like a good fit on both sides."

Filling Kellen Moore's shoes is an extremely tall task, and the candidates (Joe Southwick, Grant Hedrick, Jimmy Laughrea) to replace him all have the ability to run, which may change the style of the Bronco offense a bit. For now, that position is completely up for grabs.



"There are four guys that really have a good shot here at being a quarterback," Petersen said. "I have no idea (who will start), I really don't, but I know we have some talent there and we just got to get it dialed in. Hopefully one or two guys really emerge."

California produced more recruits in this class than any other state (11), followed by six from Texas and two from Oregon. Colorado, Florida, South Carolina and Idaho are each represented by one player.

Eagle High's D.J. Dean (6-1, 180) is the lone Idahoan in the class, but Petersen said more will have the option to walk on in the fall. Dean is currently on the Mustangs' basketball team and played on both sides of the ball in football, and his versatility intrigued Petersen.

Late-game Blitz Helps Filer Girls Advance to Title Game

TWIN FALLS • Audrey Croy dominated the first half. When she had to sit most of the second due to foul trouble, Filer kicked it into another gear.

Croy had a double-double by halftime and the Wildcats blitzed Kimberly early in the fourth quarter, earning a 57-47 win at the College of Southern Idaho Wednesday and advancing to the 3A District IV girls basketball championship game.

Filer (14-7) scored the first seven points of the fourth quarter to build a 16-point lead and held off a ferocious Kimberly rally to reach the title game on the same floor, on Feb. 8.

"We just have a team that's really good at staying mellow in tough situations," Filer guard Sierra Koyle said of Kimberly's 14-1 run that got the Bulldogs to within three with a minute to play. "We have a lot of trust in each other."

Koyle scored a game-high 15 points, including seven in the fourth quarter. Despite shooting just 2-for-8 at one point from the foul line, she nailed her last five free throws in the final moments to help keep Filer in front.

Croy finished with 14 points and 11 rebounds before fouling out midway through the fourth, a moment that kick-started Kimberly's run.

"It was frustrating to get the foul, and seeing that I couldn't do anything, but I believe in my teammates that they'll finish through it," said Croy.

The Bulldogs (11-9) turned Filer over after getting the game back to 50-47 and had a shot to cut the gap to one or even tie, but the shot went out of bounds and Kimberly didn't score again.

It was reminiscent of Kimberly's frantic rally to beat Buhl on Monday, but this time the Bulldogs expended too much energy just getting

"I was sure we were going to get that shot and tie the game right there," said Kimberly coach Brett Wright. "That's kind of been our M.O. the last couple of weeks, but we can't keep digging our-

selves that kind of hole."

Kaitlyn Goetz and Heidi Funk both had 12 points to lead Kimberly.

Filer sits back and waits for a week, while Kimberly hosts Buhl on Monday in an elimination game. The winner of that one gets to play the Wildcats again, needing to beat them twice to claim the district's only berth in this month's 3A state tournament in Middleton.

None of the three teams needs reminding that Filer ran the gauntlet last season, not

least the Wildcats — even if they're leaving it in the past.

"It's a different point of view, a different group of girls," Koyle said. "We just need to be ready for either team and make sure we play like we know we can!"

FOURTH QUARTER LIFTS JEROME OVER BURLEY

BURLEY • When playing on the road, entering the fourth quarter hanging on to a two-point lead might seem precarious for most teams.

But the fourth quarter is where the best teams come alive. The Jerome boys basketball team locked down defensively and reeled off an 11-point run to start the final eight minutes and put away the host Burley Bobcats 52-42 on Wednesday.

"Defense is everything to us," said Jerome senior Shaquille Kennedy, who scored five points during the game-clinching spurt and finished with 12. "We picked up our defense in the fourth quarter after they made a little comeback in the third."

Led by senior post Jake Hollifield's 16 points and 10 rebounds, Jerome improved to 15-2 overall and 7-1 in Great Basin Conference play.

"Hollifield is the man down there. He does everything for us," said Kennedy. "We get him the ball, he gets quadruple teamed and he opens it up for the rest of us. I give full credit to him most of the time."

Burley (10-6, 5-3) threw everything it had at Hollifield and Co. The result was two Burley post players fouling out and Jerome converting 24 of 28 free throws.

"We knew we had to play tough if we wanted to win against them. We had to shut down Hollifield and get on the boards and box out. We didn't do that very well," said Burley junior guard Kody Coltrin, who finished with a team-high 13 points.

Jerome outrebounded Burley 31-18.

"We know they like to shoot the 3, so we always want to have a hand up," said Jerome senior guard Spencer Geist, who scored 13 points. "We've really been working on boxing out, and that was our main focus."

houses, people who wear dog collars as a fashion accessory — Buchanan did — probably should not be throwing stones.

"Tell Ray to put the eyeliner, the lipstick and the high heels away," Sharpe shot back. "I'm not saying he's a cross-dresser, but that's just what I heard."

Now that's what I'm talkin' about!

Seriously, any list of the

greatest Super Bowl quotes starts with Joe Namath's guarantee in 1969, continues on through John Matuszak's classic 1986 explanation after getting caught partying on Bourbon Street all night — "To make sure no one else was" — and ends abruptly with that war of words from 13 years ago.

If Namath were playing for any of the coaches since, let alone New England's Bill Belichick or New York's Tom Coughlin this year, his mouth would have been duct-taped before his foot touched the tarmac at the airport. That, or Namath would pull off the tape

knowing full well he would also guarantee himself two-a-days for the rest of his career.

Or worse. Asked on media day what Belichick would do to a player who said the wrong thing, Pats rookie Sterling Moore didn't have to think long.

"I don't know," he replied straight-faced. "And I don't want to find out."

But the rest of us do. Desperately.

We've already seen a much more outgoing and media-friendly Ol' Stoneface this week, not to mention much more expansive. But more forgiving? Who knows?

Tight end Rob Gronkowski is the Patriots' free-est spirit, so maybe in was just coincidence that the transcript of his remarks from media day arrived five hours or so after those of his teammates were stacked on a table for consumption. Either way, there are hints that Belichick has softened a few of his edges because of the latest woman by his side.

But good luck getting that confirmed.

"I think he's got a lady in his life," Wes Welker began, "so that could definitely be the case."

Then realizing he'd already said too much, Welker

quickly added, "I don't know!"

Tide Rolls To Another Strong Class

Every coach claims to have a great national signing day. Nick Saban actually does — every year.

By lunchtime on Wednesday, the Alabama coach had most of his latest highly rated recruiting class locked up.

“He’s the best at (recruiting) in the country,” said Tom Lemming of CBS Sports Network. “Over the last five years, nobody has been better at it than Nick Saban.”

The national signing period for high school football players opened with the usual plethora of pick-a-cap news conferences and a few high-profile flip-flops.

New Ohio State coach Urban Meyer showed that a year away from coaching didn’t hurt his ability to recruit. Meanwhile, Meyer’s old school, Florida, followed a mediocre season with a promising signing day — despite having Southern California pluck a couple of blue-chippers from Gator country.

Missouri didn’t need to leave the state to make the biggest grab of all on signing day, getting a letter of intent from the nation’s most celebrated prospect, receiver Dorial Green-Beckham from Springfield, Mo.

In Tuscaloosa, Ala., there were no surprises for the national champion Crimson Tide. And that was a good thing because Saban and his staff had already lined up a

class that most of the analysts had ranked as either the best in the nation or very close to it.

“There was little intrigue or drama to this class,” said Allen Wallace of SuperPrep Magazine.

No, just talent.

The Tide swept through the South to reload with 26 signees. Alabama went to Baltimore to get wide receiver Cyrus Jones, down to Lynchburg, Va., for defensive tackle Korren Kirven — one of the few late additions — scooped up eight players from Georgia, three from Florida, picked up a quarterback, Alec Morris, from Texas, and even dipped into LSU territory to grab highly touted safety Landon Collins from Geismar, La.

Collins’ selection of Alabama over LSU last month on national TV was memorable for his mother’s vocal disapproval (“Tigers No. 1,” she said, eyes rolling at her son’s choice). On Wednesday, with mom by his side, Collins signed his letter of intent at Dutchtown High School.

Here’s a look around the nation at more of the top stories from signing day.

FLORIDA TROJANS

With NCAA sanctions kicking in at USC, Lane Kiffin had 10 fewer scholarships to hand out this year.

While the quantity is down, the quality of the Trojans’ class was not, and Kif-

fin’s crew made a couple of big scores in Florida on signing day.

Defensive end Leonard Williams from Daytona Beach, Fla., and receiver Nelson Algholor from Tampa both chose the Trojans.

After announcing his decision on ESPNU, Algholor said he was looking forward to catching passes from Matt Barkley, who decided to return for his senior season.

Looks like Kiffin can thank his quarterback for that victory.

QUICK HITS

Florida fans might be worried about some of the recruits that got away from the Gators, but coach Will Muschamp was able to secure a strong class that included Lakewood defensive end Dante Fowler, who switched his Florida State commitment to Florida on Wednesday. ... Stanford landed two of the best offensive tackles in the country, beating out USC for Kyle Murphy from San Clemente, Calif., and Nebraska for Andrus Peat from Tempe, Ariz. Peat’s brother, Todd, plays for the Cornhuskers. ... California was headed toward a top-10, maybe top-five, class before defensive line coach Tosh Lupoi left the staff to join Steve Sarkisian at Washington. It helped the Huskies land blue-chip defensive back Shaq Thompson from Sacramento.

Petersen credited his assistants with doing fine work, especially after three left for other opportunities in the offseason.

“There wasn’t one kid that changed his mind after three coaches moved on, which is rare. With that being said, that’s the price of success,” Petersen said.

The class includes 12 defensive players and 11 offensive players with one specialist in Wale.

Loubeau had 16 points for Texas A&M, which was without two starters.

The win gives Baylor its

first 7-2 conference start since 1968-69 and its fourth 20-win season in the last five.

from Perry Jones III and Jackson finished with 14 points and five assists. Quincy Acy added 11 points and Quincy Miller had 11 rebounds and nine points.

The Bears were down by five before scoring nine consecutive points to take a 53-49 lead with 6 minutes remaining. Acy had two dunks in that span to quiet the crowd a bit.

KRAMER, ISU FILL UP ON O-LINEMEN, RECEIVERS

POCATELLO • As head coach Mike Kramer walked up to the podium, he had the look of a contented man on his face and in his gait. All the travel, phone calls, and in home visits paid off on what he said could turn out to be a “tremendous” recruiting class for Idaho State.

“I think we’ve got a lot of kids who can compete and play right away,” he said. “And they have met the criteria that we’ve established. By that I mean they have high GPAs, test scores and will not have any problems graduating from high school.”

When all is said and done Kramer expects to have between 22-25 players signed all from the high school ranks. “I’m not saying that we won’t ever recruit from the junior college ranks again but because of the academic standards we’ve set we just

weren’t able to find any guys for the positions we really were concentrating on.”

Going into the recruiting period Kramer was looking, in particular, for offensive lineman with size and wide receivers. He appears to have gotten both. Five offensive linemen all bigger than anyone on the current roster have signed letters of intent and four receivers have also joined the program.

Kramer has signed six players from the state of Idaho but said that a few others will also be coming on-board as soon as they finish up some academic issues regarding test scores. He also went into the Deep South and got players from Georgia and Alabama as well as getting prospects from Washington State, where he has roots, and California.

When asked about recruiting on a national scale Kramer replied, “our focus starts at Holt Arena and



works outward in concentric circles. We want to recruit from Idaho and will continue to do so but keep in mind it costs just as much to get an airline ticket from Salt Lake City to Miami as it does to go to San Diego. Our coaches are known in the south for the work they’ve done the past few years and we’re going to get kids from that area if they’ll help raise the level of our program.”

Overall Kramer said this class has the characteristics that he wants in his program — good players, better people, great students.

“Hey, these kids are tough, they all come from programs that know what a winning streak is, that know how to win on the road but more importantly they’re smart. These guys have such high GPAs that there’s no doubt in my mind in 25 years these guys will be running businesses, they’ll be my bosses!”

Manaea Evokes Memories of Vandal Great Keo

MOSCOW • His high school coach likened him to Pittsburgh Steelers safety Troy Polamalu, which makes sense given Ma’ne Manaea’s free-flowing black hair and exuberance roaming the defensive backfield.

Yet Idaho football fans might be reminded of another tenacious safety when watching the 5-foot-11 Manaea — one of the jewels of the Vandals’ recruiting class that was announced Wednesday.

“Similar to Shiloh (Keo)?” UI coach Robb Akey asked. “Physicality, yes. And he might even have a little more suddenness to him.”

Here’s another reason to compare Keo and Manaea: Both signed with Idaho after accomplished prep careers in western Washington.

The Vandals, with a diminished recruiting pipeline in Texas, scoured the Northwest and ended up with six players from Idaho and Washington in their 23-man class. That includes Manaea, Jayshawn Jordan — another Seattle-area defensive back — and Coeur d’Alene High products Chad Chalich and Deon Watson.

Chalich and Watson helped the Vikings win back-to-back 5A state championships, and they verbally committed to Idaho weeks ago — a sign to Akey that his program is well-received by coaches and play-

ers most familiar with UI.

“I can’t tell you how proud I am that the best of Idaho has elected to stay and represent Idaho,” Akey said. “I think that’s a great thing.” The Vandals also signed Eagle High place-kicker Jace Johnson and Issaquah tight end Eric Lemke, to go along with seven junior college players who Akey hopes will have an impact next year.

But securing Chalich — a 6-foot quarterback who was the two-time 5A State Player of the Year — and Watson were clearly two of UI’s main priorities during the recruiting process.

Coeur d’Alene coach Shawn Amos said he was told Akey’s first scholarship offer went to Watson, a 6-3 two-sport standout who will play H-back or defensive end at UI. And Chalich pledged his commitment before the Vandals’ 2-10 season was complete.

“It’s obviously very exciting for those guys and for our program to see them go play at the next level,” Amos said. “And I think it adds a little bit that they’re going together and going to Idaho.”

Amos and Dave Miller — Manaea’s coach at Lakes High in Lakewood, Wash. — said Idaho has traditionally done a good job tracking Northwest talent. This year, it just so happened that there were more capable FBS-level players, particularly in Idaho, who were in-



terested in UI.

“I think they’ve had good inroads here,” Miller said. “I know (Akey) went to some games, some camps and stuff. Idaho has always

done a good job recruiting our guys, and it just happened to be a really good fit for both (Manaea and UI).”

Manaea originally committed to Colorado before it asked him to discuss grayshirting. He played slot receiver, safety and returned punts this year, while starting at outside linebacker at Lakes since his sophomore year.

Two of Manaea’s teammates, Zach Banner (USC) and Cedric Dozier (Cal), signed with Pac-12 programs. But Miller said Manaea was “in the conversation of maybe just being the best pure football player we’ve ever had, from a football player’s standpoint.”

Akey is also excited about the prospects of Trae Armstrong from Glendale, Ariz., a 5-7 tailback with elite track speed who could contribute as a true freshman. The coach also expects two JC offensive linemen — 380-pound Semisi Tupou and Nicklaus Von Rotz — to factor into the rotation in 2012.

Fellow JC signees Matthew Willis and Elijah Sala, both linebackers, and receivers Naje Lovett and Kyren Watts will also have a chance to fill roles left by departed players, Akey said.

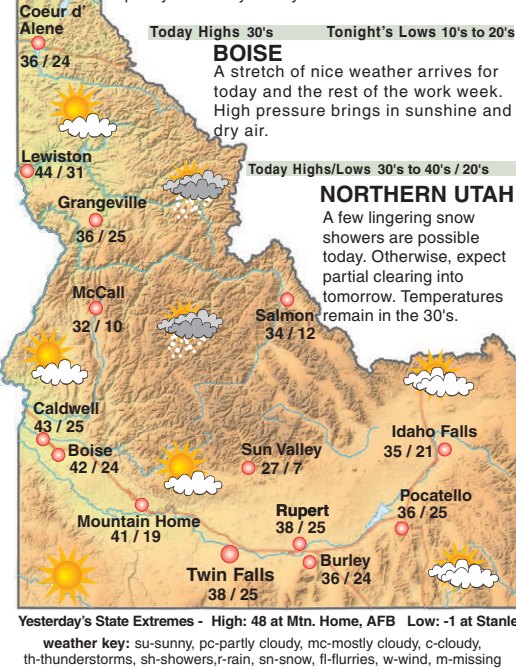

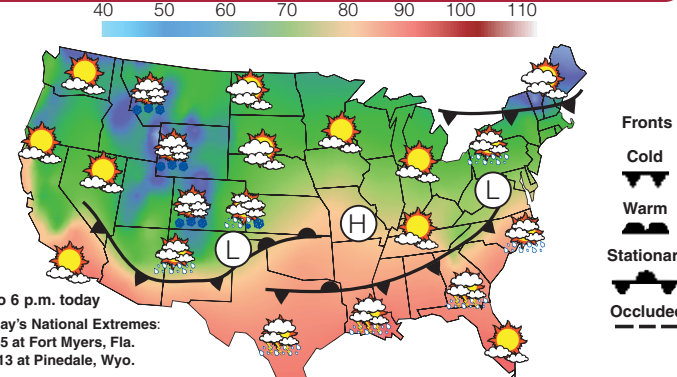

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Overtime to Win The Super Bowl? It Could Happen

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INDIANAPOLIS • Overtime. For the first time.

In each of their trips to the Super Bowl with Bill Belichick as coach and Tom Brady at quarterback, the Patriots threatened to go into overtime. They eked out three wins and lost by three points to the Giants.

When New England and New York face off Sunday at Lucas Oil Stadium, the Patriots will be favored by three. That will be the winning margin, and it will come in an unprecedented extra period.

But who will win?
Glad you asked.

Each team is on a roll, with the Patriots (15-3) winning all 10 games since a home loss to the Giants. New York went into a funk after that victory, losing four straight and five of six before turning it around with closing victories against the Jets and Cowboys to win the NFC East.

The Giants (12-7) have won five in a row, including wins at Green Bay and San Francisco in the playoffs.

In 2008, the Patriots were unbeaten and seeking the first 19-0 season in NFL history when the Giants stunned them. Again, New England has the better record and the Giants took the long route to the big game.

"It's the same teams, but in our mindset, a lot of new players," said Giants quarterback Eli Manning, one of the heroes of the 17-14 win four years ago. "We had 16 guys and New England only has seven guys who were on that team. A lot of guys who are going to be key factors in this game did not play in that last Super Bowl.

"We have the mindset that this is a new game. It's the same teams, but a lot of different makeup. What happened in the last Super Bowl doesn't matter. What happened in the last game of the season doesn't matter. It's about what we do on Sunday and what we do in this game."

What the Giants must do is get a pass rush on Brady. They had five sacks and at least nine hits on him in the 2008 game, and they pressured him throughout the regular-season win last No-

vember. If they can make Brady uncomfortable and rush his throws, it ruins the tempo of New England's no-huddle offense.

With Brady virtually no threat to run, the Giants will try to condense the passing pocket so much that Brady can't step into his throws. If that doesn't happen, All-Pro receiver Wes Welker and dynamic tight ends Rob Gronkowski and Aaron Hernandez could be tough to cover; New York's secondary isn't strong enough to prosper without the big pass rush.

All-Pro Gronkowski's high left ankle sprain is problematic for New England, although pretty much everyone expects him to play. But if he's limited in gaining yards after the catch, a particular strength, it also can hurt the Patriots.

Where New England truly has stepped up recently is on defense, and the Giants will test that improvement. Manning's three wideouts — Hakeem Nicks, Victor Cruz and Mario Manningham — can't all be double-teamed, and each is capable of game-breaking plays. Belichick will come up with something creative to slow them. Does he have the players to implement his schemes against an offense almost as explosive as the Patriots' unit?

"For every team you play, I think our coaches do a great

job as far as scouting them, breaking them down, and then we get our game plan," said Kyle Arrington, who tied for the league lead with seven interceptions. "They make a specific game plan for that team. You definitely want to try to take away their strengths in every game plan that they make up. We're going to go out there and fly around. I can't say enough about how talented they are, how much of a challenge it's going to be."

Too much of a challenge. The game will go into an extra period, and the NFL's rule allowing both teams to have the ball if the first possession results in a field goal will come into play. New England will get that field goal, then Manning will find one of his wideouts in the end zone to win it.
