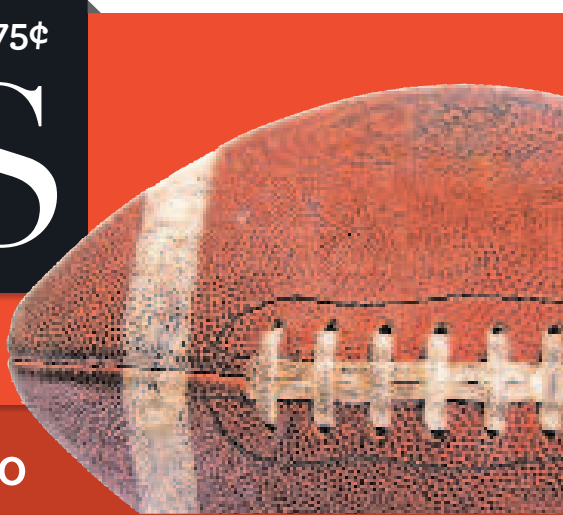

As Colleges Obsess Over Rankings, Students Shrug

When *US News & World Report* debuted its list of “America’s Best Colleges” nearly 30 years ago, the magazine hoped its college rankings would be a game-changer for students and families. But arguably, they’ve had a much bigger effect on colleges themselves.

Yes, students and families still buy the guide and its less famous competitors by the hundreds of thousands, and still care about a college’s reputation. But it isn’t students who obsess over every incremental shift on the rankings scoreboard, and who regularly embarrass themselves in the process. It’s colleges.

It’s colleges that have spent billions on financial aid for high-scoring students who don’t actually need the money, motivated at least partly by the quest for rankings glory.

It was a college, Baylor University, that paid students it had already accepted to retake the SAT exam in a transparent ploy to boost the average scores it could report. It’s colleges that have awarded bonuses to presidents who lift their school a few slots.

And it’s colleges that occasionally get caught in the kind of cheating you might expect in sports or on Wall Street, but which seems especially ignominious coming from professional educators.

The latest example came last week at Claremont McKenna, a highly regarded California liberal arts college where a senior administrator resigned after acknowledging he falsified college entrance exam scores for years to rankings publications such as *US News*.

The scale was small: submitting scores just 10 or 20 points higher on the 1,600-point SAT math and reading exams. Average test scores account for just 7.5 percent of the *US News* rankings formula. Still, the magazine acknowledged the effect could have been to move the college up a slot or two in its rankings of top liberal arts colleges. And so it was hard not to notice Claremont McKenna stood at No. 9 in this year’s rankings, which to people who care about such things sounds much sweeter than No. 11.

“For Claremont, there is I would think a psychologically large difference between being ninth and 11th,” said Bob Schaeffer of the group FairTest and a rankings critic. “We’re a top 10 school; (or) we’re 11th or 12th — that’s a big psychological difference. It’s a bragging rights difference.”

If it was an effort to gain an edge, it backfired badly. Another

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Lunch Re-launched

The first among a set of new federal school meal requirements are poised to take effect this summer.

TWIN FALLS • More vegetables in a variety of colors, plus low-fat milk, are just some of the new national requirements for school meals.

The changes were released last month by first lady Michelle Obama and U.S. Department of Agriculture. It’s the first federal overhaul of school food requirements in more than 15 years.

School cafeterias will be required to increase servings of fruits and vegetables, use more whole-grain products, limit milk to fat free or 1 percent varieties, cut the number of calories students consume and reduce the amount

Zip Line Again Up for T.F. Council Discussion

TWIN FALLS • The next chapter in the long-running Twin Falls zip line saga is expected to be written tonight.

While the Twin Falls City Council declined to weigh in on lawyer John Lezamiz’ appeal of the proposed Snake River Canyon area attraction on Dec. 23, it’s expected to consider the appeal during tonight’s council meeting. Magic Valley Flight Simulation

wants to build its aerial tour attraction in land between Canyon Springs Golf Course and Centennial Waterfront Park. But opposition has followed the proposal in its various incarnations, and the latest effort, although approved by the city’s Planning and Zoning Commission, is no different.

Lezamiz is among the property owners in the affluent canyon rim area that overlooks the golf course, and has ar-

gued that affected property owners weren’t properly given notice of the issue.

of sodium in food served.

But it's not vastly different from what Idaho school districts are already doing.

Susan Henderson, food service supervisor for the Twin Falls School District, said the district — which serves 8,000 meals each day — has been moving in the direction of providing healthier foods.

"It's just not a huge change for us," she said.

That's because Idaho adopted more stringent standards for school meals in 2009.

Colleen Fillmore, USDA Idaho child nutrition director, said the changes include offering more fruits, vegetables and whole grains.

"We have a little bit of a head start," she said.

The first changes to school meals nationwide are scheduled to begin July 1. Other requirements will be phased in over the next few years.

"I feel like it needs to be a gradual change for the kids," said Carolyn Sullivan, food service supervisor for the Jerome School District.

About two years ago, she heard new school meal requirements were on the way.

In Jerome, the majority of elementary school students will be affected, since about 96 percent eat school meals.

One change under the new federal requirements will be a doubling of the amount of fruit served with school breakfasts. Now, students will be given half a cup of fruit.

Henderson is also concerned that students won't eat all the fruit provided with breakfast and will generate more waste.

"If they don't eat it, it gets thrown away," she said.

The new federal requirements are expected to come with a \$3.2 billion price tag nationwide over a five-year period. In order to make the changes, the USDA plans to increase funding by 6 cents per school meal.

Fillmore said she's not sure what requirements school districts will have to

meet in order to receive the funding.

Some of the food requirements are stricter than what's in place now. The USDA, for instance, wants schools to serve a certain number of servings of different-colored vegetables.

"They're very specific in the amounts that the participants will need to offer in those different categories," Fillmore said.

School cafeterias will also be required to offer only non-fat and low-fat milk. And flavored milk — such as chocolate milk — must be non-fat.

Sullivan said the Jerome School District is already ahead of the milk requirement since they made the switch last summer.

It's also close to meeting the new federal requirement for bread, which must be more than 50 percent whole wheat.

In Jerome school cafeterias, white bread isn't offered anymore. The one exception is cinnamon rolls, but Sullivan said food service employees are working on a new recipe.

Under the federal requirements, schools must also serve foods in healthy portion sizes and reduce the number of calories students consume.

Sullivan said she's concerned that despite the healthier food requirements, schools can't control what students eat at home.

"We need parents' help with this, too," she said.

popular list, Kiplinger's "Best College Values," said Friday it was removing Claremont McKenna from its 2011-12 rankings entirely because of the false reporting. The college had been No. 18 on its list of best-value liberal arts colleges. Competitiveness may be

naturally human, but to many who work with students, such behavior among fellow educators is mystifying. Contrary to widespread perceptions, they say, students typically use the rankings as a source of data and pay little attention to a school's number.

"When I started in this business, I thought, 'The rankings are terrible,'" said Brad MacGowan, a 21-year-

veteran college counselor at Newton North High School outside Boston. "But spending all this time with students, I just don't hear that much about them. I'm sure it's colleges that are perpetuating it."

It's hard to know how common cheating like that reported at Claremont McKenna is, given that while US News cross-checks some data with other sources, it

relies largely on colleges themselves to provide it. Modest forms of fudging through data selection are undeniably common, especially in law school rankings. The most high-profile case of outright cheating involved Iona University in New York, which acknowledged last fall submitting years of false data that boosted its ranking from around 50th in its category to 30th.

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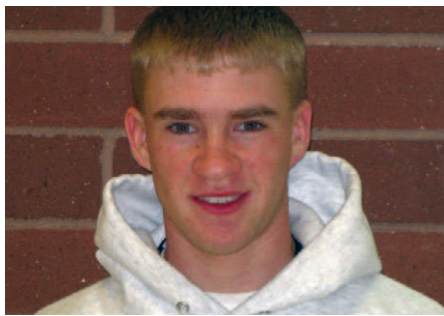

T.F. Outage Causes Brief Super Bowl Scare

TWIN FALLS • The bad news: A Sunday power outage in north Twin Falls meant about 1,200 Idaho Power customers couldn't watch a few hours of the Super Bowl pregame show.

The good news: The juice was flowing well before kickoff, and at six hours, there was plenty of pre-

game show to go around.

According to Idaho Power, 1,219 customers in north Twin Falls lost power shortly before 12:30 p.m. when a substation was locked out. While the interruption shut off power some of the city's busiest shopping areas, including the area around the Magic Valley Mall, it proved to be only brief, as crews restored power before 3 p.m.



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ITD Scrapes Aside Bypass Plowing Rumor

Missed Chances Cost Patriots in Super Bowl

INDIANAPOLIS • Tom Brady's two long incompletions in the final minutes, and several missed chances throughout the game cost the New England Patriots a chance at another Super Bowl victory. It also resulted in their second loss to the New York Giants in the big game in four years, 21-17 on Sunday. "We just came up a little bit short," Brady said. "There were some missed opportunities out there. It was a very hard-fought game. We fought 'til the end. I'm very proud of that." With just over four minutes left, Brady tossed a pass to the left side to a wide-

open Wes Welker near the Giants 20-yard line. But Brady's most reliable receiver — and the NFL leader with 122 catches — couldn't hang on. After the game, Welker sat at a podium and stared straight ahead. His eyes were red. His hands were folded in his lap. He blamed himself. "It comes to the biggest moment of my life, and (I) don't come up with it," Welker said. "Most critical situation, and I let the team down." Minutes later, the Giants marched for the go-ahead touchdown with 57 seconds remaining. But Brady had one last

INDIANAPOLIS • Take that, Brady. You too, Peyton. Eli Manning is the big man in the NFL after one-upping Tom Brady and leading the New York Giants to a 21-17 victory over the New England Patriots in Sunday's Super Bowl — in older brother Peyton's house, at that. Just as Manning did four years ago when the Giants ruined New England's perfect season, he guided them 88 yards to the decisive touchdown, which the Patriots didn't contest as Ahmad Bradshaw ran 6 yards with 57 seconds left. Patriots coach Bill Belichick reasoned the Giants would run the clock down

and kick a short field goal, so he gambled by allowing the six points. The gamble failed. And now Manning not only has stamped himself as the elite quarterback he claimed to be when the season began — in the same class as Brady — he's beaten the Patriots in two thrilling Super Bowls. The Giants (13-7), who stood 7-7 in mid-December, now own the football world, and Manning owns two Super Bowl MVP awards, the same number as Brady. It was a classic can-you-top-this showdown, and Manning won. He finished 30-for-40 for 296 yards and one touchdown, while Brady was 27 for 41 for 276 yards, with two TDs and one interception. "It's been a wild game, a wild season," Manning said. "This isn't about one person. It's about one team, a team coming together." Manning led six comeback victories during the season

and set an NFL record with 15 fourth-quarter touchdown passes. He showed that brilliance in the clutch on the winning drive. He completed five passes, including a sensational 38-yard sideline catch by Mario Manningham to open the drive. On second down at the Patriots 6 and with only one timeout remaining, Belichick had his defense stand up as Bradshaw took the handoff. Bradshaw thought about stopping short of the end zone, then tumbled in untouched. "I was yelling to him, 'Don't score, don't score,'" Manning said. "He tried to stop, but he fell into the end zone." Brady couldn't answer in the final 57 seconds, although his desperation pass into the end zone on the final play fell just beyond the grasp of All-Pro tight end Rob Gronkowski. New England (15-4), winner of 10 straight since a loss to the

Giants in November, was done. "I want to give the Giants a lot of credit," Brady said. "It's a very good football team and they put a lot of pressure on us. We just came up a little bit short." Brady headed off with his head bowed, holding his helmet, while around him was the wild celebration by the Giants, NFL champions for the eighth — and perhaps most unlikely — time. "Great toughness, great faith, and great plays by a number of guys today," Manning said, deflecting some of the attention. Still, he one-upped Brady. And Peyton. "It just feels good to win a Super Bowl, it doesn't matter where you are," Manning said. It was the fifth trip to a Super Bowl for Brady and Belichick, tying the record. And it looked like a successful one when they stormed back from a 9-0 deficit and

Giants' Forgotten WR Manningham Delivers Big Time

INDIANAPOLIS • Mario Manningham is no longer the New York Giants' forgotten receiver. Manningham emerged from the shadow of Hakeem Nicks and Victor Cruz with a catch that will rival David Tyree's Super Bowl helmet grab four years ago, helping the Giants knock off the New England Patriots 21-17 in the NFL championship game on Sunday. Manningham's catch wasn't as improbable as Tyree's grab that led the Giants to a 17-14 win over New England in 2008. It was just as clutch and just as timely, and Tyree was there to see it.

Running a go pattern up the left sideline on a first-and-10 from their own 12 and down 17-15, Manningham made a 38-yard over-the-shoulder catch between two defenders and right in front of Patriots coach Bill Belichick to help set up Ahmad Bradshaw's game-winning 6-yard run with 57 seconds to go. Belichick didn't hesitate to challenge the catch, also contested by Sterling Moore and Patrick Chung. Referee John Parry reviewed it and saw that Manningham had both feet inbounds, putting the Giants at midfield. Manning went back to Manningham on the next three plays. On the first, the

receiver ran the wrong pattern, but he followed that with catches of 16 and 2 yards to move the ball to the 32-yard line. "We just tried to be patient," said Manningham, who finished with five catches for 73 yards. "Got to be patient with this game. We knew big plays was going to come, we just had to take advantage of them." Two passes to Nicks and a couple of runs by Bradshaw got the ball to the 6-yard line, where the Patriots let Bradshaw score so they had a chance to win the game with a last drive. Tom Brady wound up 51 yards short when his desperation pass fell incomplete in the end zone with no time

left, giving the Giants their second Super Bowl victory in four years. "It's been a wild game. It's been a wild season," said Giants quarterback Eli Manning. "We had a great tough bunch of guys. Guys who never quit and have great faith in each other. Proud of our team and the way we dealt with everything all season and came out strong." Nicks, who led the Giants' receivers in the postseason, had a team-high 10 catches for 109 yards, while Cruz had four for 25, including a short touchdown. "I feel good, man," Nicks said. "Blessed to be part of this team, blessed to be in this situation."

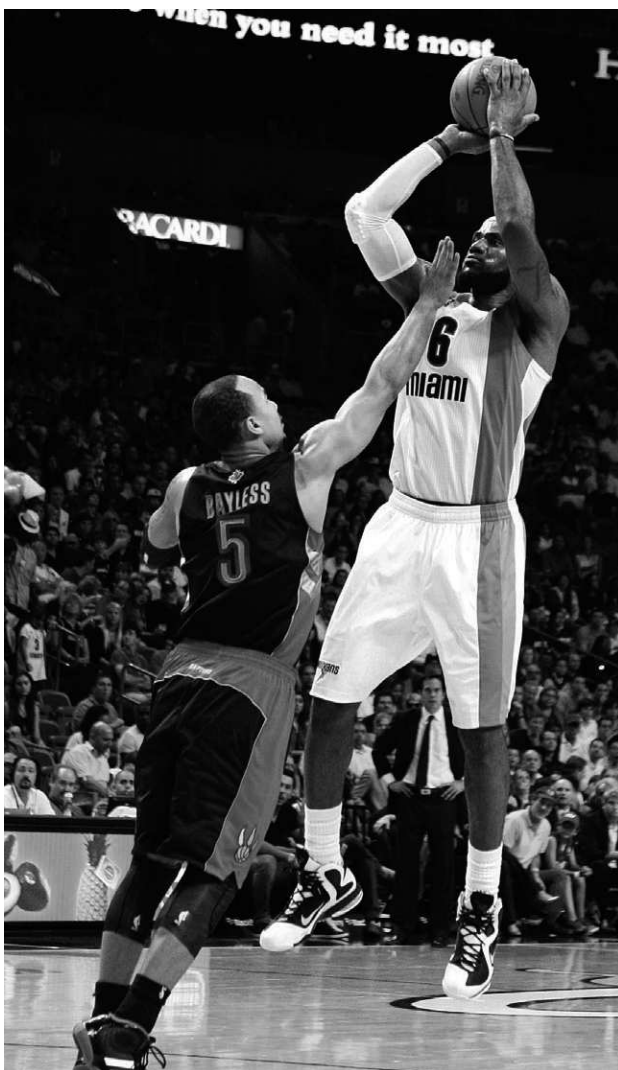

led 17-9 in the third quarter. But the Giants, who reached New England territory on every possession except a kneel down at the end of the first half, got field goals of 38 and 33 yards from Lawrence Tynes. And it looked like Tynes, who kicked them in to the Super Bowl four years ago at Green Bay and again this year at San Francisco, both in overtime, would get called on again.

Then Belichick, known to try just about anything in a game, took a risk that didn't pay off.

"I thought we played very competitive. ... We were in the lead for a good part of the game. We just came up a couple of plays short," Belichick said. "You don't feel good after you lose this game."

The Giants are the first Super Bowl winner that was outscored during the regular season. They were 6-2 after that 24-20 victory at New England, then lost four straight and five of six.

Coach Tom Coughlin insisted "the prize" was still within reach. Now the Giants are holding tight to that Vince Lombardi Trophy.

"What I was concerned with was these guys making their own history," Coughlin said. "This is such a wonderful thing, these guys carving their own history."

New England had the ball for all of one play in the first 11 1-2 minutes, and that play was an utter failure, a rare poor decision by Brady. After Steve Weatherford's punt was downed at the New England 6, Brady dropped to pass in the end zone and had time. With everyone covered and Giants defensive end Justin Tuck finally coming free to provide pressure, Brady heaved the ball downfield while still in the pocket.

Only problem: No Patriots receivers were anywhere near the pass. The Giants were awarded a safety for Brady's grounding in the end zone.

Manning, meanwhile, couldn't have been more on target early, hitting six receivers in the first period, completing his first nine throws, a Super Bowl record. He also was aided by Ahmad Bradshaw, who hardly looked like a running back with a bad foot. Bradshaw broke a 24-yard run, and New England made another critical mistake by having 12 men on the field on a third-and-3 on which the Giants fumbled.

Instead, New York got a first down at the 6, and two plays later Victor Cruz beat James Iheigbo on a slant to make it 9-0, prompting Cruz

to break into his signature salsa move.

Manning's first incompletion didn't come until 1:19 into the second quarter.

At that point, it was 9-3 after Stephen Gostkowski's 29-yard field goal. The Patriots got to the Giants' 11, but All-Pro DE Jason Pierre-Paul blocked a third-down pass.

Soon after, when the Patriots had a three-and-out and Pierre-Paul blocked another throw, Belichick and offensive coordinator Bill O'Brien had a quick discussion. Then O'Brien, soon to take over as Penn State coach, went over to the struggling Brady.

The talk must have helped. On the final series of the opening half, Brady was masterful. Starting at his 4, and ignoring the last time the Patriots began a series in the shadow of the end zone, he was vintage Brady.

With New York's vaunted pass rush disappearing, Brady went 10-for-10 for 98 yards, capping the drive that included two Patriots penalties with Woodhead's 4-yard TD reception with 8 seconds to go in the half. Hernandez and Woodhead each had four catches on the drive that, stunningly, put New England ahead despite being outplayed for so much of the first 30 minutes.

Brady kept firing — and hitting — in the third quarter, with five more completions. The Giants didn't come within shouting distance of the record-setting quarterback. He capped a 79-yard drive to open the second half with a 12-yard TD to Hernandez, but then the game turned. Again.

Consecutive field goals by Lawrence Tynes of 38 and 33 yards brought New York within 17-15. Brady then threw deep for his tight end after weaving away from two pass rushers. His throw was short, and Chase Blackburn picked it off early in the

fourth quarter.

Although the Giants moved into New England territory again, as they did on every drive to that point, they bogged down and punted.

Kyle Stanley Rallies to Win Phoenix Open

PAUL LAWRIE WINS QATAR MASTERS DOHA, Qatar • Former

British Open champion Paul Lawrie chipped in for an eagle and a birdie on his way to winning the Qatar Open on Sunday, shooting a 7-under 65 to hold off Jason Day and Peter Hanson.

Lawrie finished with a 15-under total of 201 to win his seventh European Tour event and his second in Qatar.

The 43-year-old Scot becomes the second oldest winner on the tour behind Miguel Angel Jimenez.

Johnson had 12 rebounds. Durand Scott added 11 points on 3-of-12 shooting for the Hurricanes, who had a chance to win it in regulation but couldn't get a shot off before the buzzer.

chance. He threw a desperation pass half the length of the field into the end zone. Aaron Hernandez went up among three defenders, and the ball was tipped — out of reach of a lunging Rob Gronkowski as the ball fell to the ground and time ran out.

"I felt like I was close," Gronkowski said. "But close isn't there."

Added Brady: "We got to the 50, and ran out of time."

There were plenty more wasted chances by a normally disciplined team that prides itself on not making mistakes.

"I thought we played very competitive, had our moments where we moved the ball and stopped them,"

coach Bill Belichick said. "We were in the lead for a good part of the game. We just came up a couple of plays short."

More than a couple.

The Patriots forced three fumbles, but the Giants kept the ball after each one.

"Those plays like that don't happen too often in a game and we didn't capitalize on the opportunities," wide receiver Deion Branch said.

The worst of those missed chances came when Brandon Spikes recovered a fumble by Victor Cruz with 4:14 left in the first quarter. But the Patriots were penalized for having 12 men on the field. That gave New York the ball at the New England 6.

Two plays later, Eli Manning hit Cruz for a 2-yard touchdown and a 9-0 lead.

Then Brady got hot, completing a Super Bowl-record 16 straight passes, and the Patriots surged to a 17-15 lead. They had a chance to make it a two-possession game when a mix-up on the Giants defense left Welker alone.

On a second-and-11 at the Patriots 44, the sure-handed receiver had a chance to score. All he had to do was catch the ball and, perhaps, make it to the end zone. Amazingly, the ball went off his hands.

"It's one of those plays I've made 1,000 times," he said.

But there were a lot more plays that cost the Patriots their fourth Super Bowl championship in 11 years.

"I think every guy in the locker room wishes they could have done a little more," Brady said.

Evangelicals and Mormons: Can We Talk?

When you make as many mistakes as I do, it's good to get in the habit of learning from them. Just over four years ago, I made a big one about Mormonism, and I thank the good folks at *The Baltimore Sun* for giving me a chance to make it right.

During the 2008 primaries, a *Sun* reporter interviewed me about evangelicals and Mitt Romney. Why, he asked, does a candidate with his squeaky-clean character and demonstrated family values generate so little interest among the Republican Party's evangelical base?

Dusting off my old poli-sci major hat, I suggested a few non-theological reasons: a pro-choice record while Massachusetts governor, a seeming lack of authenticity (a quality evangelicals found especially important in their leaders in the 1990s and 2000s) and ready identification with the Southern Baptist minister and then-Arkansas governor Mike Huckabee.

Evidently, I did not make it clear that I was articulating the theological differences between Mormonism and traditional Christian theology; in the article I was portrayed as somebody who wouldn't vote for a Mormon because I don't think his theology is up to snuff. For the record, I affirm the Constitution's prohibition on any religious test for public office. With Luther, I would rather be governed by an honest and capable man of a different religious faith than by a corrupt and ineffective politician who attended my church.

At the same time, what I tried to convey remains true: There are unbridgeable gaps between traditional Christian orthodoxy and the theological positions taken by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. As Brigham Young University professor Robert Millet notes, "Latter-day Saints are not in the line of historic Christianity and ... do not accept the concepts concerning God, Christ, and the Godhead that grew out of the post-New Testament councils." The theological affirmations contained in the great creeds of the historic church are held by Orthodox, Catholics and Protestants alike; the Mormon church teaches that all of these branches of the historic Christian family tree are apostate and not authentically Christian.

I know many individual Mormons and historic orthodox Christians who believe people in one another's communities to be genuine followers of Jesus Christ. But the religious movements of historic Christianity on the one hand and Mormonism on the other do not recognize one another's movements as Christian. That doesn't mean individual people within those movements reject one another as citizens, or as political leaders — let alone as friends and colleagues. But it does mean that these religious traditions have things to say about one another.

Different religious communities mean different things when they say words like "Christ" and "salvation" and "Scripture" and "God." Sometimes they appear to an outside observer to be referring to the same thing. But if you ask the people using those words, they'll be adamant that when they say "saint" they mean something quite different from what that other fellow over there means when he says "saint."

Among the fruits of recent Mormon-evangelical dialogue is greater clarity about where Mormons and evangelicals are using the same word to mean different things theologically, and where they are using different words to mean similar things theologically.

Evangelicals have had four years to reflect on our community's response to Mitt Romney's candidacy in 2008. I think many of us have recognized that anti-Mormon prejudice colored our initial responses to Mr. Romney's candidacy in 2008, that it should not have then, and that it should not now. That doesn't mean I support the man's candidacy — or, for that matter, that I don't. But it does mean that I look at the candidate, not the sacred book under his arm.

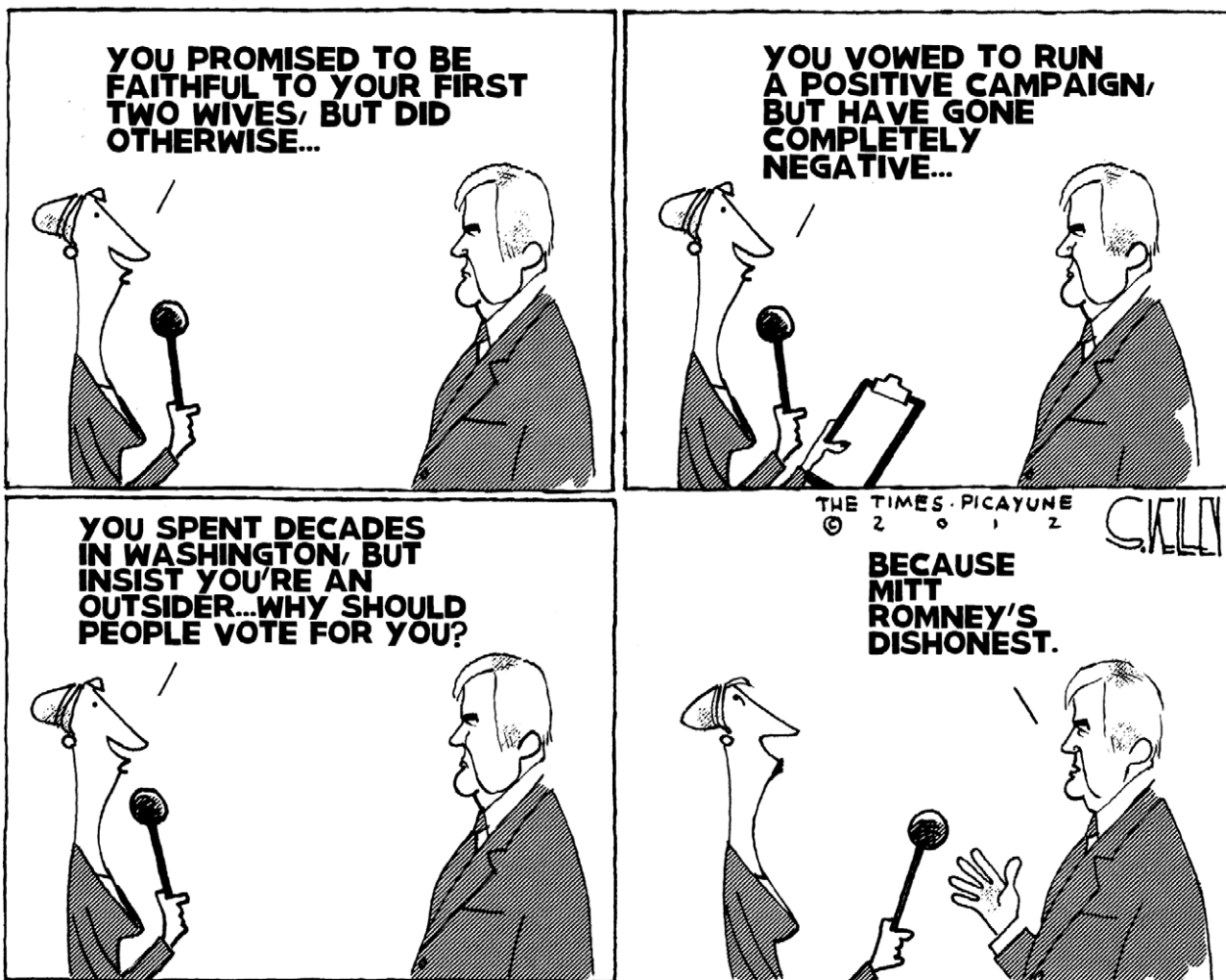

Where There's Smokeless, There's Fire

February is National Children's Dental Health Month. As a dentist, the single biggest future threat I see to the health of Idaho's children is tobacco.

That's one reason I support current efforts to increase the state's tax on tobacco products.

Each year 1,400 youngsters in Idaho become new cigarette smokers. Twenty-four thousand young people alive today will die from tobacco-related illnesses.

In the dental world, smokeless products such as chewing tobacco are a particular concern. They tend to be popular in rural areas and are often wrongly viewed as less dangerous than smoking. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Spit tobacco causes leukoplakia, a disease of the mouth that occurs in more than half of all users in the first three years of use. Studies have found that 60 to 78 percent of smokeless tobacco users have oral lesions. Smokeless tobacco has also been linked to tooth

decay and gingivitis. A study by the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found chewing tobacco users were four times more likely than non-users to have decayed dental root surfaces.

The National Cancer Institute has identified 28 carcinogens in smokeless tobacco products produced in the U.S. Smokeless tobacco users are at a heightened risk for oral cancer compared to non-users and these cancers can form within five years of regular use. Constant exposure to tobacco juice causes cancer of the esophagus, pharynx, larynx, stomach and pancreas.

These facts are truly shocking. If we need to be aware of anything during Children's Dental Health Month, it's the importance of keeping our children from ever using these products.

One positive step would be to increase the tax on all tobacco products. The point, from my perspective, is not so much raising money as raising barriers to teen use of dangerous tobacco products — although the funds could certainly be used to meet smoking cessation, prevention and public health needs.

Studies, and experience in state after state, show that higher

taxes are one of the most effective ways to reduce tobacco use among both youth and adults. Every 10 percent increase in the price of cigarettes reduces youth smoking by 6.5 percent and overall cigarette consumption by about 4 percent.

Those are not small numbers. A recent study indicates tobacco use currently costs Idaho \$319 million a year in health care related costs. Every Idaho taxpayer household, including non-smokers, annually pays about \$539 to cover costs related to smoking.

Idaho currently has one of the lowest cigarette taxes in America, ranking eighth

from the bottom (42nd). Idaho's legislature is considering a tobacco tax this session, and they should certainly factor that statistic into their thinking. By keeping the price of tobacco products so low, we encourage behavior that damages thousands of lives while costing us millions of wasted dollars. Why make it so easy to do the wrong thing?

In my practice I see children with beautiful teeth. Some of those same children will return in their twenties with tooth decay, lesions, gingivitis and diseases such as Leukoplakia — all caused by tobacco products. How can we allow this?

If you are a parent, particularly of a teen, take the time to talk to your child this month about the dangers of tobacco use. Make sure he or she knows that smokeless tobacco is still tobacco. Help them avoid a habit that could ruin their lives.

Parents are the most important voice. Hopefully this year our elected officials will support that voice by making a statement, and by moving the dial on Idaho's current status as a tobacco-friendly state.

College Costs Too Much

The following editorial appeared in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* on Wednesday.

President Obama is right to put more pressure on colleges and universities as well as the states to make a college education more affordable.

A nation that keeps telling its children they need more than a high school diploma to succeed in this increasingly high-tech world shouldn't make it so hard for them to pay for college.

Obama wants to boost the Perkins federal loan program

from \$1 billion to \$8 billion and change the formula for how the money is distributed. Colleges that fail to reduce costs will lose federal aid, an aggressive incentive for the schools to find practical ways to reduce the cost of an education.

The president's plan also calls for a \$1 billion grant competition that would reward states that keep college costs down. An additional \$55 million would be earmarked to help colleges find ways to increase their productivity.

The plan, which was well received by students at the

University of Michigan, where Obama outlined the proposal in a speech last week, would reduce some student-loan interest rates, which have increased in recent years. It would also provide more work-study opportunities for students who need jobs to help them pay their college expenses.

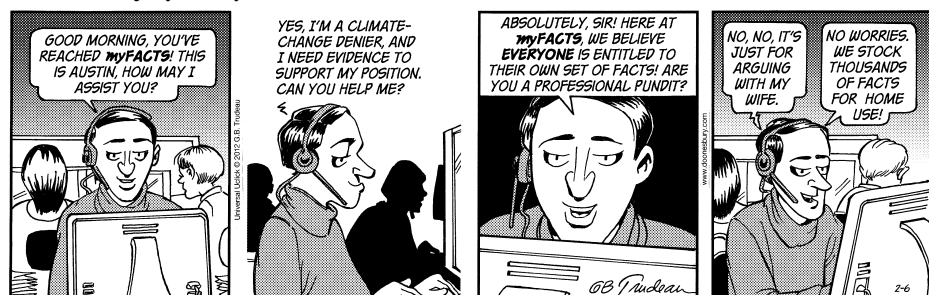
Obama's approach will go a long way toward helping students from low-income families who value a college education but lack the financial resources to make it a reality. The sticker price of a college education, and the likelihood of being in debt

for years, discourages many students from going to college. It is a major reason others never finish.

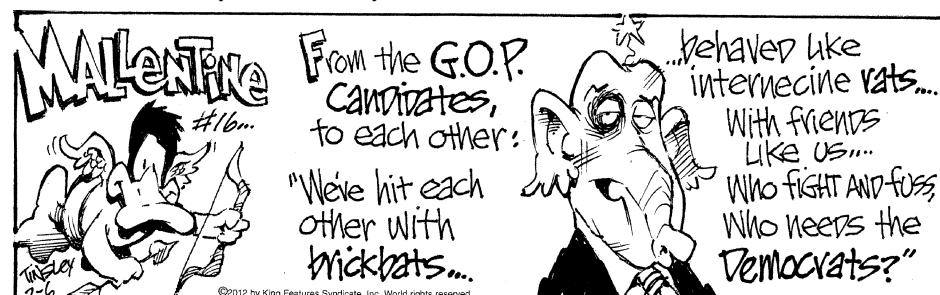
Under Obama's plan, colleges will be required to create a "scorecard" that provides information about a school's cost, its graduation rates, and the likely future earnings of its graduates. That type of practical information can help students make more informed decisions about which college to attend.

Important details, including exactly how Obama expects to pay for the plan when Congress is cutting spending, haven't been revealed. The proposal drew a tepid response from Republicans opposed to any new spending.

N. IDAHO COMMUNITIES MAY LOSE FOREST SERVICE JOBS

GRANGEVILLE • A plan by the U.S. Forest Service to relocate the Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forest supervisor's offices away from Grangeville and Orofino will hurt those communities, Idaho and Clearwater county officials say.

The Forest Service announced last week that moving the supervisor's office to

Kamiah will save \$2 million a year. The agency is leasing a building in Orofino through 2014. Another building is being leased in Grangeville with that lease expiring in 2022.

"What this means is a net loss of 45 jobs sometime between now and when their lease expires in 2022," Idaho County Commissioner James Rockwell told the *Lewiston Tribune*. "That's a very big deal.

"The loss of 45 good-paying jobs in any of our communities has a direct impact on the value of real estate," he said. "It has a direct impact on the retail in that town because you've got 45 fewer families buying things. So in a worst-case scenario, we've got 10 years to plug the holes." Forest Supervisor Rick Brazell said eventually 73 employees are expected to work at renovated offices in Kami-

ah, with money the agency saves being used for on-the-ground management and public service.

"I feel like the Forest Service should contribute to us in different ways," if the supervisor's office is closed, said Clearwater County Commission Chairman Don Ebert. "It wouldn't be so bad if they had an active timber management program. That's what's really hurting.

"The supervisor's office leaving Clearwater County is a great disappointment to us, but it's not the bigger picture. It's just a symptom. There are other, ongoing problems," he said.

Blast Kills Husband of Missing Utah Woman, 2 Boys

GRAHAM, Wash. • A powerful house explosion killed the husband of a Utah woman who has been missing for two years, and his two young sons Sunday, moments after the boys arrived for a visit that was supposed to be supervised by a social worker.

The Child Protective Services worker brought the two boys to Josh Powell's home, and Powell let his sons inside — but then blocked the social worker from entering, Graham Fire and Rescue Chief Gary Franz told The Associated Press.

The social worker called her supervisors to report that she could smell gas, and moments later the home exploded. What's left of the house was still smoking Sunday afternoon, and fire crews were mopping up the scene.

"Everything we know right now, this has become a crime scene," Franz said.

It was a horrific end to a long, bizarre tale. Josh Powell was under investigation in the disappearance of his 28-year-old wife from their West Valley City, Utah, home in December 2009. He claimed he had taken the boys on a midnight excursion in freezing temperatures when she vanished.

The children, 4 and 6, had been living with Susan Powell's parents since Josh Powell's father, Steven, was arrested on child porn and voyeurism charges last fall.

On Wednesday, a judge had denied an attempt by Josh Powell to regain custody, saying she wouldn't consider returning the two boys to their father until he underwent a psycho-sexual evaluation.

The case took a bizarre turn last year after Powell's father, Steve, was arrested for investigation of voyeurism and possessing child pornography. Josh was living at his father's home at the time, and a judge gave Susan Powell's parents custody of the boys.

"It's the most horrifying thing you can imagine happening," said lawyer Steve Downing, who represented Susan Powell's parents, Chuck and Judy Cox, in the custody fight. "The Coxes are absolutely devastated. They were always very fearful of him doing something like this, and he did it."

Jeffrey Bassett, who represented Josh Powell in the custody case, said he received a three-word email from his client just minutes before Powell and his two boys died in a house explosion. It said, "I'm sorry, goodbye."

The email arrived at 12:05 p.m. Sunday, about 10 minutes before the explosion, but he didn't see it until two hours later, when others told him Josh and the boys had been killed. He said he knew Josh was upset after being ordered to undergo a psycho-sexual evaluation recently, but he didn't see this coming.

Sgt. Mike Powell of the West Valley City Police De-

partment in Utah, which is handling the investigation into Susan Powell's disappearance, said it was too soon to say how Josh Powell's death may impact their probe.

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Changes at Tillamook Cheese Leave 47 Jobless

TILLAMOOK, Ore. (AP) • Changes at the Tillamook Cheese Factory have left 47 workers jobless as the co-operative streamlines its operations in Oregon, Idaho and Utah.

The workers were assigned to the factory's packaging operation. The *Oregonian* reports that they punched out for the last time on Saturday.

The Tillamook County Creamery Association announced last month it was cutting the packaging operation because it was inefficient and required cheese

to be shipped from the creamery's Boardman factory, to Tillamook for aging, then out to Idaho to be shredded and sliced, then back to Tillamook for sorting and distribution.

The plan now is to ship the cheese to facilities in Mountain Home, Idaho, and Salt Lake City, where it will be cut, wrapped and distributed. The Tillamook plant will continue manufacturing and packaging chunk cheese.

The 47 workers received a severance plan and job-placement services.

Senate Passes Bill to Limit Idaho Specialty Plates

BOISE (AP) • The Senate has overwhelmingly approved legislation to limit the number of Idaho's specialty license plates.

The chamber voted 31-2 Friday to restrict future specialty license plates only for government purposes or foundations that support government activities.

The bill now moves to the House where a similar version died last year.

The bill's champion is Sen. Jim Hammond from Coeur

d'Alene. He says growth in the program has put government in a position to raise money for private organizations that have gotten clearance for special plates.

The state currently has more than 30 specialty plates that raise \$1.6 million a year, with most of that raised by wildlife plates aimed at benefiting the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

The bill would grandfather in existing special plates.

Obama: Israel Has Not Decided on Attacking Iran

WASHINGTON • President Barack Obama said Sunday he does not think Israel has decided whether to attack Iran over its disputed nuclear program, a standoff that has the Middle East on edge.

The president sought to assure allies and foes alike that the United States was working in lockstep with Israel to solve the crisis, “hopefully diplomatically.”

Obama’s comments came as Israel’s major allies in the West are working hard to talk it out of a unilateral military strike on Iran’s nuclear facilities, arguing forcefully that an attack ultimately would only strengthen the regime in Tehran. Israel fears that Iran is fast approaching a point at which a limited military strike would no longer be enough to head off an Iranian bomb.

“I don’t think that Israel has made a decision on what they need to do,” Obama said during a pre-Super Bowl interview with NBC. He reiterated that the United States has removed no option from consideration in dealing with Iran — an allusion to military intervention — but emphasized that the United States wants a diplomatic solution built around a world coalition.

Iran insists its nuclear pursuits are for peaceful civilian purposes, not a bomb.

After years of worries about Iran’s nuclear program, world leaders are now showing real concern that Israel could attack the Islamic republic imminently — a move that might trigger a broader war and disrupt the international economy.

Iran’s regime says it wants to extinguish the Jewish state, and the West accuses it of assembling the material and know-how to build a nuclear bomb. Just last week, Defense Secretary Leon Panetta would not dispute a report that he believes Israel may attack Iran this spring in an attempt to set back the Islamic republic’s nuclear program.

Obama refused to say whether the United States would get notice from Israel before any potential strike on Iran.

Virus Strikes Cruise Ship out of New Orleans: A stomach virus has stricken people on a third U.S. cruise ship, with a vessel sailing from New Orleans delayed by norovirus. Port of New Orleans spokesman Chris Bonura said Sunday that Royal Caribbean’s “Voyager of the Sea” left a couple of hours late on Saturday because of the illnesses. Earlier in the weekend, a pair of Princess Cruise Line ships sailing from Fort Lauderdale reported outbreaks of illness.

Not that you would know it by watching him on the campaign trail, where the perpetually optimistic candidate has been drawing standing-room-only crowds and promising his political fortunes will improve if he can make it to just one more state.

3 Lost in Ore. Debated Eating Dog

GOLD BEACH, Ore. • Three mushroom pickers lost six nights in the rugged forest of southwest Oregon with no food considered eating their dog, and used their dead cellphone and a sheath knife to flash a signal at the helicopter pilot who found them.

Dan Conne said Sunday from his hospital bed in Gold Beach that he and his wife and son spent the nights huddled in a hollow log with nothing to eat,

and considered sacrificing their pit bull, Jesse, for food.

“She’s that good a dog, she’d have done it, too,” Conne said.

A volunteer helicopter pilot looking outside the search area Saturday spotted Dan and Belinda Conne, both 47, along with 25-year-old Michael, on the edge of a deep ravine in tall timber. They were about 10 miles northeast of the town of Gold Beach, roughly 330 miles southwest of Portland.

“The wife had the Blackberry and I had the knife,” Dan Conne

After U.N. Veto, U.S. Floats Coalition on Syria

BEIRUT • The United States proposed an international coalition to support Syria’s opposition Sunday after Russia and China blocked a U.N. attempt to end nearly 11 months of bloodshed, raising fears that violence will escalate. Rebel soldiers said force was now the only way to oust President Bashar Assad, while the regime vowed to press its military crackdown.

The threat of both sides turning to greater force after Russia and China vetoed a U.N. Security Council resolution raises the potential for Syria’s turmoil to move into even a more dangerous new phase that could degenerate into outright civil war.

The uprising inspired by other Arab Spring revolts began in March with peaceful protests against Assad’s

BIGGER U.S. ROLE AGAINST COMPANIES’ CYBERTHREATS?

WASHINGTON • A developing Senate plan that would bolster the government’s ability to regulate the computer security of companies that run critical industries is drawing strong opposition from businesses that say it goes too far and security experts who believe it should have even more teeth.

Legislation set to come out in the days ahead is intended to ensure that computer systems running power plants and other essential parts of the country’s infrastructure are protected from hackers, terrorists or other criminals. The Department of Homeland Security, with input from businesses, would select which companies to regulate; the agency would have the power to require better computer security, according to officials who described the bill. They spoke on condition of anonymity because lawmakers have not finalized all the details.

Those are the most contentious parts of legislation designed to boost cybersecurity against the constant attacks that target U.S. government, corporate and personal computer networks and accounts. Authorities are increasingly

NYC Protest Gets Heated When Yemeni Leader is Seen

NEW YORK • A protest against embattled Yemeni President Ali Abdullah Saleh outside a luxury hotel in New York got heated Sunday when demonstrators saw him leave the building, with one charging toward him and another throwing a shoe.

“Everybody is living in fear of this guy at home, but here, he’s getting good treatment!” said Yemeni immigrant Nasser Almroot, a Brooklyn grocer.

The dozen angry protesters were kept behind police barricades across the street from the Ritz-Carlton hotel, which was teeming with security guards, both inside and on the sidewalk where

Saleh passed.

The 69-year-old leader is visiting the United States for medical treatment.

He exited the hotel on Central Park South on Sunday afternoon and waved and smiled sardonically toward the yelling protesters — even blowing them a kiss. Suddenly, one of them tried to charge across the street but was restrained by police, who wrestled him to the ground.

“He can’t help it, the killer is here,” Almroot said.

As the man bolted out, a shoe flew in Saleh’s direction. Showing the sole of a shoe is an insult in Arab culture, because it is on the lowest part of the body, the foot. To hit someone with a shoe is seen as even worse.

Snow Traps Thousands in Bosnian Villages

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina • Bosnia used helicopters on Sunday to evacuate the sick and deliver food to thousands of people left stranded by its heaviest snowfall ever, while Pope Benedict XVI donned an overcoat to bless the few pilgrims who braved Rome’s unusually cold weather to visit St. Peter’s Square.

“The snow is beautiful, but let’s hope spring comes

soon,” the pope told the pilgrims, looking out over remnants of Rome’s biggest snowstorm since 1986.

Across Eastern Europe, thousands of people continued to dig out from heavy snow that has fallen during a cold snap that struck more than a week ago and has killed hundreds of people.

In Ukraine, the hardest hit area, temperatures have fallen as low as minus 33 Fahrenheit (minus 36 Celsius). The government said Sunday the country’s death

toll now stands at 131, including many homeless people. About 2,300 other Ukrainians have sought treatment for frostbite or hypothermia.

At the other end of Europe, Britain had its first snowfall of the winter on Saturday — up to 6.3 inches (16 centimeters) — forcing London’s Heathrow Airport — Europe’s busiest — to cancel flights and stranding many drivers overnight on highways. Stansted, Birmingham and Luton airports suspended operations

overnight as snow piled up on runways, but resumed operations Sunday.

Still, Queen Elizabeth II and her husband Prince Philip managed to brave the cold and snow to attend a service at West Newton church on her Sandringham Estate in eastern England on Sunday.

The 85-year-old monarch marks 60 years on the throne on Monday, and her Diamond Jubilee anniversary will be marked by a series of regional, national and international events throughout 2012.

In Bosnia, more than 100 remote villages have been cut off by 6 1/2 feet (2 meters) of snow in the mountains. More than three feet (1 meter) fell in Sarajevo, the capital, where a state of emergency has been declared.

PROTEST SONG ROCKS RALLY

MOSCOW • The most popular protest song in Moscow today comes from burly men in blue berets, unlikely heroes of a peaceful middle-class movement challenging the strongman rule of Vladimir Putin.

The simple but catchy song was performed at a protest rally for the first time this weekend, but many of the tens of thousands in the crowd already knew the words.

On a snowy square across a frozen river from the Kremlin, the protesters sang along with the chorus, which sums up their weariness with Putin as he intends to extend his 12 years in power by winning a presidential election in March: “You’re just like me, a man not a god. I’m just like you, a man not a sod.”

The former paratroopers’ song is just one of the many musical, literary and artistic creations that have inspired and enlivened the protest movement that is still largely the reserve of erudite, urban Russians.

Mikhail Vistitsky, a 45-year-old veteran of the elite force, wrote the lyrics after attending one of the first big anti-Putin demonstrations in late December.

“Mikhail had the idea

that a song, an anthem, was what the whole protest movement needed,” said Stanislav Baranov, who contributed music and several lines to the song. “The lyrics came straight from his heart in like half an hour.”

A video of them and three others performing the song lit up the Internet, getting more than 1 million views in the first few days.

“We are not a professional band, we just expressed our discontent,” Vistitsky, who now runs a small construction business, said during an interview in the closed restaurant where the former paratroopers made the video. “My guitar skills are lousy, I’d be ashamed to play the song without the boys.”

The paratroopers were joined on the stage by some of Russia’s most respected cultural figures, who have played major roles in organizing the protests along with veteran politicians now in the opposition.

The artists’ role in the demonstrations “is more important because they have not been discredited, while politicians have been, by their former government jobs, suspected corruption and so on,” said political analyst Stanislav Belkovsky. “Aesthetic forms of appealing to the protesters are more effective than political ones.”

Saleh signed a deal in November to transfer power to his vice president in exchange for immunity from prosecution.

An election is scheduled for Feb. 21 to select his successor in a nation mired in poverty and divided among powerful tribes and political factions.

Dan Conne suffered a back injury, and Belinda Conne had hypothermia, Curry County Sheriff John Bishop said. All three were hungry, and enjoyed their potato soup and sandwiches at the hospital.

Undersea Documentarian Mike deGruy Dies in Crash

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Mike deGruy, an award-winning cinematographer who spent three decades making documentary films about the ocean, was killed in a helicopter crash in eastern Australia. He was 60.

His employer, National Geographic, said Sunday that deGruy and Australian television writer-producer Andrew Wight died Saturday.

Their helicopter crashed soon after takeoff from an airstrip near Nowra, 97 miles

north of Sydney, police said. Australia’s ABC News reported that Wight was piloting the copter when it crashed.

DeGruy won multiple Emmy and British Academy of Film and Television Arts, or BAFTA, awards for cinematography.

An accomplished diver and submersible pilot, the Santa Barbara resident was the director of undersea photography for James Cameron’s 2005 documentary “Last Mysteries of the Titanic.”

regime, sparking a fierce crackdown by government forces. Soldiers who defected to join the uprising later began to protect protesters from attacks. In recent months, the rebel soldiers, known as the Free Syrian Army, have grown bolder, attacking regime troops and trying to establish control in pro-opposition areas. That

has brought a heavier government response.

More than 5,400 people have been killed since March, according to the U.N., and now regime opponents fear that Assad will be emboldened by the feeling he is protected by his top ally Moscow and unleash even greater violence to crush protesters. If the opposition turns overtly to armed resistance, the result could be a dramatic increase in bloodshed.

At least 30 civilians were killed Sunday, including five children and a woman who was hit by a bullet while standing on her balcony as troops fired on protesters in a Damascus suburb, according to the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, an activist group.

Government forces firing mortars and heavy machine guns also battered the mountain town of Zabadani, north of Damascus, a significant opposition stronghold

that fell under rebel control late last month. Bombardment the past two days has wounded dozens and forced scores of families to flee, an activist in the town said.

“The situation is terrifying. Makeshift hospitals are full,” said the activist, who only gave his first name, Fares, for fear of government reprisal. He said the town has been under siege for the past five days and there is a shortage of food and heating fuel during the cold winter.

The points assigned are a guide in determining who to award this possible contract. The firm may or may not be the highest rated firm as determined by the rating process.

C. The City will evaluate all information received and will use this information to develop a short list of firms under consideration. If a firm cannot be selected based on SOQs alone, the short listed firms may be contacted for additional information, and if warranted, personal interviews.

VI. Terms and Conditions

- A. Any SOQ received after the above-mentioned submittal date will not be considered.
- B. The City reserves the right to reject all responses that are not in the best interest of the City and to waive minor irregularities in any SOQ. The City assumes no obligation in the solicitation of this general statement of qualifications.
- C. The City reserves the right to request clarification or information submitted, and to request additional information from any firm.
- D. Proposals may be withdrawn before the deadline date and time set above for submittal of the SOQs.
- E. The City shall not be responsible for any costs incurred by the firm in preparing, submitting, or presenting its response to the SOQ.
- F. The City shall not be liable for any pre-contract costs incurred by the interested firms participating in the selection process.
- G. Any proposal not fully addressing the requirements of this SOQ may be eliminated from further consideration.
- H. The resulting contract from a proposal must be negotiated and approved by both parties. The City reserves the right to reject any proposed agreement or contract not approved by our attorney.
- I. The City reserves the right to award any contract to another firm, if the successful firm does not execute a contract within thirty (30) days after selection of the firm.

VII. Compensation

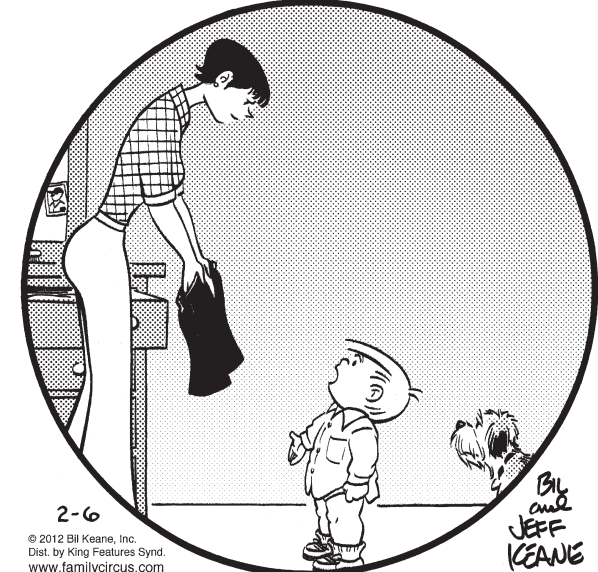

Sitting South, plan the play in three no-trump. West leads the spade two and East plays the 10!

Having been favored by a friendly defense at trick one, don't waste it. This hand is about combining your chances. You could play for nine tricks by simply taking the diamond finesse or the heart finesse, but whichever you do, you are consigning your fate to a play that is no better than a 50 percent shot. Clearly, taking the diamond finesse by leading the king, then low to the jack, is the better finesse to take (since a 5-1 heart break may prevent you from taking five tricks even when the finesse works, while running the diamond jack may not give you enough tricks against 4-1 diamonds). But can you do better?

First, try safely for five diamond tricks by cashing the diamond king and ace. Your chances of dropping the queen and missing five are quite robust — in fact, that will happen about 30 percent of the time. But if the diamond queen doesn't drop, you should run the heart 10, hoping the queen is right and you can make five hearts. Your combined chances come to about two chances in three — quite an improvement on the simple finesse.

Finally, let's revisit the defense. East erred by playing the spade 10 at trick one. If West had led from jack-fourth of spades, declarer would have had the doubleton ace and would surely have played the queen from dummy.

ANSWER: To pass out your negative double, North rates either to be balanced without a four-card major or to have a club-diamond two-suiter. It might be right to lead a spade to try to cash winners before spade losers go on dummy's hearts, but that is a very long shot. It looks logical to choose between the minors, and my vote goes to clubs — which rates to do nothing for declarer he cannot do himself.

DEAR ABBY: How does one let a gum chewer know, tactfully, that the smell is revolting? Besides the irritation and rudeness of chewing/popping with one's mouth open, certain smells often affect me physically.

Your problem is not trivial. Sensitivity to certain scents can trigger serious physical reactions, including closure of a person's air passages.

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

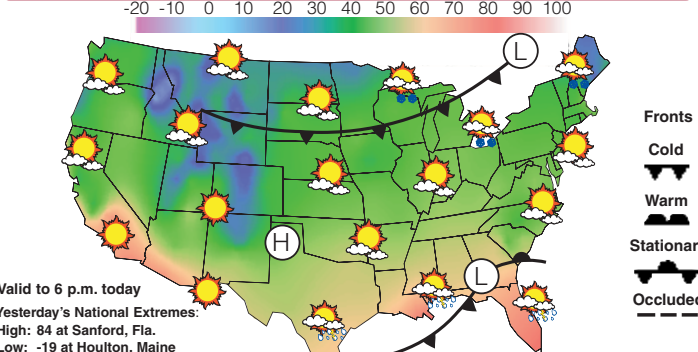
