# Jerome Hospital Sees Merger's Benefits

New technology and a long-term strategy are in the works for St. Luke's Health System's newest Magic Valley location.

**JEROME** • Months after quietly merging with the state's largest employer, Jerome's hospital is set to receive some benefits from its new owner.

St. Luke's Health System has set aside \$780,000 for the Jerome medical center — formerly St. Benedicts Family Medical Center — to be used for technological upgrades.

Before the integration, St. Luke's hospital administrators promised to set the Jerome location up to use electronic medical records. The health system is remaining true to its promise by setting aside \$280,000 to be spent immediately on the

Another \$500,000 will be used to purchase a digital mammography system, a feature the hospital currently lacks, said Jim Angle, CEO for both St. Luke's Jerome and St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls.

Angle spoke in front of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce

# **Irrigation District Approves** Fish Farm Deal

SWID water users still have a few steps before completing their end of the deal, intended to resolve current and future water disputes in the region. But getting voter approval marks the last major hurdle for the district.

"If someone had a major problem with the purchase then I would have hoped that person would have voted no," said Randy Brown, SWID board member.

The Aberdeen-American Falls, Bingham, Magic Valley and North Snake groundwater districts have already purchased the fish farms, including the majority of Blue Lakes Trout Farm's production facilities and their associated wa-

# **Supreme Court Weighs** Whether Company's Product Killed Calves

**BOISE** • There's no question that 100 heifer calves died in 2005 at J&J Calf Ranch. The question: What killed them?

On Wednesday, the Idaho Supreme Court heard an appeal from Land O'Lakes, which had previously been found liable for the deaths after the Twin Falls County ranch's owners fed the calves the company's milk replacer. The company argued that owners Jesus Hurtado and John Reitsma hadn't proven that the milk replacer was the

In 2005, the ranch lost more than 100 heifer calves in a four-month period. The heifer calves had been fed a milk replacer produced by Land

O'Lakes. Bull calves that had been fed another milk replacer didn't die.

When Hurtado and Reitsma switched the heifer calves to the other product, the deaths stopped. In 2007, a Twin Falls County jury found the company liable for the deaths.

Attorney David Maguire, representing Land O'Lakes, asked the court to reverse that decision, arguing that Hurtado and Reitsma hadn't sufficiently proven that the cause of death was the feed replacer. Maguire pointed out that fecal samples from the heifer calves showed evidence of scour, or severe diarrhea, which can be caused by cryptosporidiosis. Cryptosporidiosis can come from any number of sources, including flies, which Maguire contended were present on

The College of Southern Idaho is working with Chobani and the Idaho Department of Labor to create a plan to train employees once they're

But there won't be training sessions to help prospective employees get a job at the multimillion-dollar plant under construction in southeast Twin Falls. The plant is scheduled to open this summer.

"We are not anticipating there will be some immediate training programs to qualify people to work there," CSI Instructional Dean Todd

He said he couldn't share more details because CSI administrators signed a non-disclosure agreement with Chobani.

Information requested through Chobani about the company's plans wasn't received Wednesday in time for this report.

CSI plays a role in providing employee training when a major new employer comes to the Magic Valley. Training is paid for using Idaho Department of Labor workforce development training funds.

This time with Chobani, Schwarz said there will be a need for skilled

"The operation here will be so much more highly automated than the plant in New York," he said. "The nature of the workforce will need to be very highly skilled in this operation."

CSI might also provide upgrade training to help Chobani employees advance their skills in the future. Plus, Schwarz said, there could be an impact on degree programs the college offers.

"I'm anticipating that we'll be creating some new programming," he

Chobani has started its hiring process, but it's not quite in full swing, Schwarz said.

# Burley Golfers Offer Advice for Course

**BURLEY** • Several Burley golfers shared their ideas Tuesday on improving the city's golf course, which continues to operate at a deficit.

City Councilman Russ Mallory asked the golfers to speak before the council after he received calls from some "irate" golfers when the city offered discounted season passes for new golfers.

Golfer Bill Morgan said the city should offer price reduction incentives to golfers who purchase season passes early. He said the city should budget from year to year for major capital expenses at the course.

Though she doesn't golf, Tracy Wallin said employees at the course are not "real friendly."

And Max Covington, a golfer, said the costs at the course have gone up each year for several years, corresponding to a decrease each year in the number of players.

estimated that process will finish in about 90 days.

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Burley Praised for Budget

But the city's golf course was in the red, causing some issues in its general fund.

BURLEY • City of Burley officials were commended Tuesday night for running "a very tight ship" as they heard the results of their annual audit.

Though some city funds went over budget, its cash balances increased nearly \$970,000 and its debt decreased more than \$1.1 million. Increases to its utility funds, cash balances and capital assets added nearly \$3.8 million to its net assets, said Ed Evans of Evans & Poulsen P.A.

"Mr. Mitton watches over

that very closely and it was right on budget," Evans said, referring to City Administrator Mark Mitton.

The decrease in debt was due to payments made on the city's new well and storage tank, as well as the wastewater plant.

Burley collected \$2.2 million in property taxes, which paid for the general fund, \$1.5 million; the library, \$351,110; and general obligation bond payments, \$355,030.

"I want to make it clear to everybody that we are doing well," said Terry Greenman, Burley mayor. "And you can thank your lucky stars you

live in Burley, Idaho."

There were a few weak spots. The fire department went over budget more than \$60,000. The swimming pool exceeded its plan by nearly \$14,000. The city's legal costs ran more than \$11,000 above the mark, and the city's administrative budget went over by more than \$8,000.

Most notably, Burley's golf course went over budget by \$87,396 and required a transfer of more than \$102,976 from the general fund. Councilman John Craner said all but a \$15,580 shortfall was due to the course's debt payments.

The city paid off the course's clubhouse in 2011, so it will have to pay about \$45,000 less in debt service

Evans said the general fund operated within budget before transfers were

made to the golf course. The fund was about \$8,000 under budget before the transfers and about \$40,000 over budget afterwards.

Evans said the increases in the city's utility funds are healthy because the city is planning future upgrades.

"Overall it was a very good year. We stayed under budget except for the general fund, would have been under budget except for the transfers made at the end of the year that we talked about at the golf course," Mitton said.

# FILER REZONE WOULD LET HOME PROJECT PROCEED

 $\textbf{FILER} \bullet \textbf{Officials} \ in \ the \ city$ of Filer have decided to pursue changing the zoning of select property on the southeast end of Main Street from commercial to residential.

The decision was made Tuesday after Sheri and Larry Underwood came before the City Council with a plan to tear down their existing residence. But the current commercial zoning, except where fire or natural disasters clear the way for rebuilding, limits construction to remodeling the existing structure.

"What I want to do is take down a substandard house and put up a new house, and that's something that could be done in a lot of places all through Filer," Larry Underwood said. "I'm not asking for anything more than what was done when the house next door burned down."

Changing zoning requires that homeowners residing within 300 feet of the Underwood property be informed of the proposed change and be given an opportunity to comment during a public hearing tentatively scheduled for March.

"I'd rather see a new home in there and get it done right with a rezoning," Mayor Bob Templeman said. "The city will contact people in those four or five houses extending back along Main Street from Fair Avenue and work with them to bring it back to residential."

In other business, council members approved using \$690,000 in remaining USDA Rural Development grant funding to complete the installation of collection pipe and close out phase three of the city's \$15 million sewer plant project. Pipe boring under the railroad tracks north of town and on Ramsey Street still needs to be finished.

"We talked about maybe doing West Midway by the LDS Church first, because farmers will probably be out there working by April," said City Maintenance Director Bud Compher.

on Wednesday to update the business community on the merger's progress.

He briefly mentioned that the hospital is in the middle of developing a three-year management plan for the Jerome location. Though Angle declined further comment to the *Times-News* about the plan, St. Luke's Health System spokesman Ken Dey said it will be a strategy on how best to manage the hospital in the long term.

"A lot of it will be determined by local focus groups we have scheduled to start later this summer," he said.

During his presentation, Angle did stress that the transition into the health system was continuing smoothly for St. Luke's Ierome.

One of the remaining decisions is whether St. Luke's from the Magic Valley board, said Dawn Soto, a board member for the Jerome foundation. Both the Twin Falls and

Jerome foundation boards are volunteer-based entities that raise donations for the medical centers, she said.

"During a joint meeting, we discussed the benefits and challenges if we decided to combine the two," Soto said. "The benefits would be access to more resources. But a challenge might be one with perception. People may not want to give if they feel like their money won't be staying in the community."

The two boards don't have

a deadline on when they

have to make a decision, but Soto said she expects the two to merge. "We're not in competition

with the other board," she said. "I think we can overcome the challenge if we decide to integrate."

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# Crime Victims Program Moves to Senate

**BOISE** • The Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee voted Wednesday in favor of funding a program helping victims of crime track those who committed it.

VINE, which stands for Victim Information and Notification Everyday, gives crime victims information on the custody status of the offenders. The program is currently funded with grant money that expires in December.

The bill funds the program by charging offenders \$10 per conviction. That money would then go to a fund run by the state police for the program, said Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo.

Victim advocates testified in favor of the bill. Sen. Bart Davis, R-Idaho Falls, spoke positively of VINE, saying it had helped him get information on the man convicted of murdering his son, Cameron, in 2003.

The committee advanced the bill to the Senate with a recommendation to pass it. Sen. Steve Vick, R-Dalton Gardens, voted against the bill, saying that while he appreciates the VINE program, he feels it should be supported by the general fund.

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# Heider's Hunting Amendment Clears Committee

**BOISE** • Hunting and fishing are integral parts of Idaho's identity. But should the right to participate be inked into Idaho's Constitution?

That's a question Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, would like to see on November's ballot. On Wednesday, he introduced a joint resolution that would allow Idahoans to vote on adding an amendment to the state Constitution that would protect the right to hunt, fish and trap.

sons for introducing the legislation, Heider recalled teaching his kids to hunt.

"This year I took two of my grandchildren and watched them shoot their first deer," he said. "All these things become memorable in our lives." And that right must be preserved for future generations, he added.

The two-sentence proposed amendment says the rights to hunt, fish and trap "shall forever be preserved for the people through the laws, rules and proclamations of the state." It also makes it clear that the amendment doesn't create a right to trespass on private property, divert water sources or infringe on other private rights.

Heider said his original proposal was much longer, but he pared it down to make it simpler and easier to understand. He based the amendment off other states' constitutions.

Committee members supported the idea, but took issue with some of the wording. Sen. John Tippets, R-Montpelier, suggested the words more specific, viable law than "preserved."

Sen. Elliot Werk, D-Boise, gave a hypothetical scenario where a low-income person couldn't afford hunting tags.

"Then they are being denied what we have granted them as a constitutional right," Werk said. And if the person successfully sued using that premise, it could endanger the Idaho Department

of Fish and Game's ability to manage wildlife, he said.



In another Twin Falls case, Donabedian will be sentenced for theft by receiving stolen property on Feb. 28.

Donabedian and three others were accused of holding David and Colleen Conner in their home at gunpoint early on the morning of March 9, 2011, and taking items from the house. David Conner told police that one suspect took his shotgun, bound him with rope and placed him on the kitchen floor. Meanwhile, the suspects forced Colleen Conner to find money and other valuables.

Donabedian's charges connected to the case have varied over time. According to online court records, he currently faces a charge of criminal conspiracy.

The other suspects -Gabriel Baker, Jamie Taylor and Jeremiah Bennett - all pleaded guilty last summer to assorted felony charges and are serving time in state

# SOURCES: NEW MILITARY ROLES FOR WOMEN

**WASHINGTON (AP)** • For the past decade women in the U.S. military have served, fought and died on the battlefields in Iraq and Afghanistan.

On Thursday, Pentagon rules will catch up a bit with reality, recommending to Congress that women be allowed to serve in more jobs closer to the front lines.

According to defense officials, the new rules are expected to continue the longheld prohibition that prevents women from serving as infantry, armor and special operations forces. But they will formally allow women to serve in other jobs at the battalion level, which until now had been considered too close to combat.

In reality, however, the necessity of war has already

propelled women to the front lines — often as medics, military police or intelligence officers. So, while they couldn't be assigned as an infantryman in a battalion or company going out on patrol, they could fly the helicopter supporting the unit, or move in to provide medical aid if troops were injured.

The officials said the new rules will change that, and formally allow women to be assigned to a battalion and serve in jobs such as medics, intelligence, police or communications officers. The changes would have the greatest effect on the Army and Marine Corps, which ban women from more jobs than the Navy and Air Force do — largely because of the infantry positions.

# For Santorum, New Challenges Follow His Big Election Victories

ALLEN, Texas • One day after Rick Santorum's startling breakthrough in the presidential race, his few aides decamped to distant states to start building campaign organizations from scratch. It was evidence of his challenge in converting sudden momentum into victories in the rush of contests ahead.

"We definitely are the campaign right now with the momentum, the enthusiasm on the ground," the former Pennsylvania senator said Wednesday, hours after capturing Republican caucuses in Minnesota and Colorado and a non-binding primary in Missouri.

"We feel like going forward we're going to have the money we need to make the case we want," he said.

To replenish his coffers, Santorum arranged a weekend of fundraising events in California. It's good timing, too: In the day since he won Tuesday's contests, Santorum raised more than \$1 million as donors started to take a second look at his candidacy. He plans to start campaigning in Washington state on Monday, and then Ohio and Michigan in the following days.

At the same time, aides conceded he was making little or no effort in the caucuses in Maine that end this weekend, and they are still working on plans for competing in primaries in Michigan and Arizona on Feb. 28, as well as the delegate-rich, 10-state Super Tuesday a week later.

Santorum's caucus successes vaulted him ahead of Newt Gingrich into second place in the competition for Republican National Convention delegates. The Associated Press count showed Mitt Romney leading with 112

Romney's Tuesday Losses Show Conservative Doubts

**ATLANTA (AP)** • Mitt Romney still can't seem to win over the bulk of the conservatives who make up the bedrock of the Republican Party.

Despite primary victories that have established him as the GOP presidential front-runner, his stunning trio of defeats this week laid bare the difficulties that still could undercut his path to the party's nomination — and hamper him in the general election to follow.

Not that he would acknowledge as much Wednesday.

"I don't think the conservative base changes its mind day to day," Romney told reporters, dismissing the notion that he's got a problem with the party's core supporters. "The places where I campaigned actively, we got actually in some respects record support from the conservative base."

Such denials aside, Tuesday's three-state caucus sweep by Rick Santorum illustrated the degree to which many conservative voters remain skeptical of Romney's commitment to the GOP base's principles, especially given what some of them see as his history of shifting priorities. And he hasn't been able to sell them on his main argument — that he's the most likely in the primary field to beat Democratic President Barack Obama.

delegates, followed by Santorum with 72, former House Speaker Newt Gingrich with 32 and Texas Rep. Ron Paul with 9.

"I believe that conservatives are beginning to get it, that we provide the best opportunity to beat President Obama," Santorum said, a jab at both Romney and Gingrich.

Yet he came under fresh attack during the day from Romney as a supporter of earmarked federal spending, and a resumption appeared likely soon in the ad wars that so far have worked to the advantage of the better-financed former Massachusetts governor.

"We're always going to have a huge spending gap, but money can't buy people's hearts," said Ron Carey, an unpaid volunteer who was Santorum's chief adviser in Minnesota and whose car served as a travelling campaign office.

"He has a huge upside when people

get to know him," added Carey, a former state party chairman.

Even so, an AP analysis of year-end spending reports showed Santorum may have to stretch to cover all the states that vote in the next few weeks.

While current figures are not available, he reported that at year's end he had a 10-member campaign payroll at a quarterly cost of \$49,000 — the smallest of any of the Republicans in the race. He also is helped by paid consultants and unpaid volunteers, as are other candidates.

By comparison, Romney reported a 92-member staff and a quarterly payroll of \$1.3 million. Gingrich said he had 23 paid aides, at a cost of \$279,000, and Paul, who has yet to win a primary or caucus, paid \$381,000 for a staff of 33.

President Barack Obama reported a 430-person campaign staff, which cost \$4.7 million for the final three months of 2011

# More Photos Found in Calif. Teacher Abuse Case

LOS ANGELES (AP) • The scandal embroiling an elementary school where two teachers were arrested last week on lewdness charges widened Wednesday with revelations of 200 more inappropriate photos of children and that one teacher sent warmly written birthday cards and presents to students who participated in his "games."

The case of a third-grade teacher accused of feeding children his own semen in bizarre "tasting games" in his classroom over a five-year period has garnered international headlines.

More than half admitted describing someone's prognosis in a way they knew was too rosy. Nearly 20 percent said they hadn't fully disclosed a medical mistake for fear of being sued. And 1 in 10 of those surveyed said they'd told a patient something that wasn't true in the past year.

The survey, by Massachusetts researchers and published in this month's Health Affairs, doesn't explain why, or what wasn't true

The survey offers "a reason for patients to be vigilant and to be very clear with their physician about how much they do want to know," she said.

The findings come from a 2009 survey of more than 1,800 physicians nationwide to see if they agree with and follow certain standards medical pro-

the voluntary standards are that doctors should be open and honest about all aspects of patient care, and promptly disclose any mistakes.

A third of those surveyed didn't completely agree that doctors should 'fess up about mistakes. That's even though a growing number of medical centers are adopting policies that tell doctors to say "I'm sorry" up front, in part because studies have found patients less likely to sue when that happens.

Not revealing a mistake is "just inexcusable," said Dr. Arthur Caplan, a prominent medical ethicist at the University of Pennsylvania. Beyond decency, "your care now has to be different because of what happened."

# **Facebook Discloses Details on Bonuses**

# For College Bound, a Look at Financial Aid Changes

The problem is that navigating the universe of financial aid can be confusing. That's because there's a vast patchwork of grants, scholarships and loans available. But a failure to properly compare the options and explore the alternatives could mean the difference in thousands of dollars in debt upon gradua-

Adding to that confusion is a spate of headlines in recent weeks regarding changes in financial aid. To help navigate this process, here's a look at what's behind the recent changes:

#### **Comparing Costs**

As part of his broad plans to make higher education more affordable, President Barack Obama recently said he wants to make it easier for families to size up the cost of college.

As it stands, there isn't a

uniform template for financial aid award letters and officials say the forms can be difficult to decipher, even misleading. For example, schools usually provide a total "out of pocket" cost after subtracting aid such as grants and scholarships. But some schools also subtract loans from that figure, even though loans have to be repaid and actually push up costs because of interest charges.

In other cases, interest rates and other loan terms are not spelled out. Officials say this could lead to students taking on more debt than they real-

To address the issue, the Department of Education and the newly created Consumer Financial Protection Bureau announced in October that they are developing a model financial aid form. There aren't any plans yet to make the form mandatory. But once a template is finalized, Congress could vote to require colleges to use it to maintain access to federal aid. The adoption of such a form has also been widely supported by student advocates.

Separately, Obama is pushing for a "college scorecard" that would require schools to disclose their graduation rates, rate of employment and debt repayment among graduates.

#### **Interest Rates**

Taking out a student loan to attend college has become the norm, with two-thirds of graduates leaving campus in debt. But not all loans are alike. So it might have caught your attention last month when Obama said in his State of the Union address that the fixed interest rates on student loans are set to double in July if Congress fails to act.

Before you panic, keep in mind that there are primarily two types of federal student loans: subsidized and unsubsidized. The difference is that the government doesn't start charging interest on subsidized loans until the student graduates. With unsubsidized loans, interest starts accruing right away.

The loans also come with different interest rates. Unsubsidized loans currently charge a fixed rate of 6.8 percent. The interest rate on subsidized loans was gradually lowered to its current fixed rate of 3.4 percent over the past few years. But the law that temporarily reduced the rate sunsets in July.

So unless Congress extends the reduction, the rate on unsubsidized loans will snap back to 6.8 percent.

This may affect even families that are relatively well off; not everyone who qualifies for a subsidized loan is from a low-income household. This could be the case for students who are attending expensive schools or have other siblings in college. Eligibility is based on financial need, which is determined by a formula on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

Then there are private student loans, which come with entirely different terms. These are widely considered to be an option of last resort since the interest rates tend to be higher and variable, meaning they rise and fall with a benchmark rate. And since benchmark rates are at record lows, the rates of private lenders are likely to rise in the years ahead.

#### Hardship Clauses

Another difference to note between private and federal loans is that the latter come with greater safety nets.

The issue came to light last week when Sallie Mae, a private student lender, said it was changing how it handles a fee it charges unemployed borrowers who seek to suspend payments.

Sallie Mae isn't cancelling the \$50 fee, but said it will now apply the money toward the borrower's loan balance if on-time payments are resumed for six months in a row. The change came after an online petition asking the company to drop the fee collected more than 77,000 signatures on Change.org.

By contrast, borrowers who are unemployed or suffering economic hardship aren't charged to defer payments on federal student loans. In addition, they can apply for a program called Income-Based Repayment, which caps monthly payments at 15 percent of annual income above \$16,300. Those who earn less don't have to make any payments; any remaining debt after 25 years is forgiven, or 10 years for those entering public service jobs.

For borrowers who take out at least one federal loan this year, the cap on monthly payments will be lowered to 10 percent of income above \$16,300. Borrowers will also be relieved of payments sooner, with any remaining debt forgiven after 20 years.

# Source: N.Y., California to Sign Mortgage Settlement

**ALBANY, N.Y.** • New York and California have agreed to sign the proposed settlement between U.S. states and the nation's biggest mortgage lenders over foreclosure abuses, according to a source close to the negotiations.

Bank of America, JPMorgan Chase, Wells Fargo, Citibank and Ally Financial agreed to the settlement – for an estimated \$37 billion as of Wednesday for lowering homeowners' mortgage principal, refinancing, a reserve account, and checks to homeowners. However, they were seeking releases from further legal liability, which have been one subject of negotiations for the past several days with state attorneys general who wanted to pursue investiga-The settlement grants

immunity from civil lawsuits brought by the attorneys general against the lenders over narrowly defined "robo-signing" cases.

**SAN FRANCISCO** • Federal prosecutors

on Wednesday significantly expanded a long-running trade secrets case when they unsealed an indictment that accuses a company owned by the Chinese government of conspiring with a California couple to steal trade secrets from DuPont Co. The indictment unsealed in San Fran-

cisco alleges Pangang Group, several of its subsidies and two others conspired with Walter Liew and Christina Liew to steal secrets on how to manufacture titanium oxide, which is used to whiten an array of products from paint to toothpaste. Last month, DuPont reported nearly \$2 billion

in quarterly revenue for the unit that makes the compound.

Feds Charge Chinese Firm with Trade Secret Theft

The case began in April when DuPont filed a civil lawsuit against the Liews. The FBI began investigating and obtained a warrant to search the Liews' Orinda home on July 19.

According to an FBI affidavit, agents found keys to a safety deposit box during the search. When agents asked about the keys, the Liews looked at each other and, according to the FBI, Walter Liew said to his wife, "You don't know, don't know," in Mandarin Chinese. The FBI said one of the agents searching the Liews' house that day spoke Mandarin Chinese, apparently

unbeknownst to the couple. The agents ultimately traced the keys to the Bank of East Asia, where an employee said Christina Liew had been in the branch on the same day as the search. The safety deposit box was also in Christina Liew's name. In addition to trade secret theft, the couple have been charged with lying to investigators. Walter Liew has been jailed on a no-bail

warrant, while his wife is free on \$1 million bail. Lawyers for the couple didn't return phone calls.

The FBI says it seized several incriminating documents from the safety deposit box that that appeared to belong to DuPont and contracts tying the couple to Pangang, a steel manufacturer owned by the Chinese government in China's Sichuan province.

# Provider for Idaho Online School Accused of Fraud

**BOISE (AP)** • A private for-profit company hired to provide curriculum for Idaho's largest online charter school is the target of a lawsuit alleging federal securities fraud.

A complaint filed in Virginia last week alleges K12 Inc. officials made false and misleading statements regarding the company's business and financial results in order to inflate K12's stock price.

The lawsuit was filed on behalf of investors who bought K12 stock between 2009 and last year. It alleges among other things that K12 used deceptive student recruiting practices and improper academic assessments to increase its enrollment and revenues.

K12 disputes the claims.

A spokeswoman for Idaho Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna says the lawsuit is not related to any schools in the state. K12 provides curriculum to schools including the Idaho Virtual Academy.

# **IDAHO GOP CERTIFIES 5 CANDIDATES FOR MARCH CAUCUS**

BOISE (AP) • Idaho Republican Party officials say that five GOP presidential candidates have qualified for the March 6 caucus planned in every county around the state.

Party officials confirmed Monday that the five candidates making the ballot include: Texas congressman Ron Paul, former Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney, former Pennsylvania senator

Rick Santorum, former U.S. House Speaker Newt Gingrich and longshot contender Buddy Roemer.

The party's central committee approved last year the idea of moving Idaho's Republican nominating contest up from May to the so-called Super Tuesday date in March.

The goal is to bring more attention to the state and make its 32 delegates more relevant.

# Idaho Revenue Exceeds **Projections for February**

BOISE (AP) • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's proposed budget got a little boost from the latest tax revenue collections that were \$6.3 million above projections.

Tuesday's release of figures for January point toward continued economic strengthening.

Otter aides have been roaming the Capitol with preliminary numbers recently — to make the case that Idaho revenue will be sufficient to support the Republican's 2013 budget proposal.

That includes a proposed \$41 million raise for teachers and state employees, as well as a \$45 million tax cut.

# MINE RESEARCH LINKS FISH **DEFORMITIES TO SELENIUM**

**BOISE** • A research team hired by the J.R. Simplot Co. has linked selenium discharged from the waste of the company's phosphate mining to high rates of deformities in trout, including cases of brown trout fry with two heads, missing fins and cranial deformities.

Those findings would appear to undermine the company's recent proposal to relax the water quality standards for two seleniumtainted creeks near Simplot's Smoky Canyon Mine in southeast Idaho's phosphate

But to Simplot, the deformity data is just one component of a complex research project that when viewed as a whole supports setting a new standard for measuring selenium concentrations and cleaning up the polluted

And there is plenty at stake for both the company and environmentalists as the state Department of Environmental Quality begins its review of Simplot's request.

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For Simplot, working with rules allowing for higher levels of selenium than currently allowed could save time and money devoted to cleanup and future monitor-

For environmentalists, a change in standard could open the door to legal challenges or other mining companies seeking the same change in a region already impaired by decades of mining. And at least one federal agency has already weighed in, raising concerns about Simplot's research and claims the company is underestimating the potential impacts any change could have on fish.

Last week, Simplot, which has operated Smoky Canyon since 1984 in the forested mountains near the Idaho-Wyoming border, submitted paperwork seeking an exemption from federal water quality standards set for Crow and Sage creeks.

Simplot officials say the current standard - pegged to selenium concentrations in the creek water - is overprotective and sets unrealistic cleanup expectations. Instead, the company is seeking to tie the standard to selenium levels in fish eggs, a change Simplot and some government scientists say more accurately measures toxicity.

The question for state and federal environmental regulators is whether approving Simplot's proposed standard will adequately protect the environment, fish and wildlife.

"From a scientific point of view, we have to ask if it's a standard that is appropriate. Does it protect aquatic life?" said Barry Brunell, administrator of the DEQ's water quality di-

Simplot is one of several companies that have been mining the region for decades, excavating rock to get the phosphate ore that is a key ingredient in farmbased fertilizers and other products. But mining has come at a cost to the environment, and Simplot and other companies are legally obligated to clean up selenium and other toxic mining wastes in a region dotted

with 17 separate Superfund sites.

Since the 1990s, selenium has been was blamed for wiping out trout populations in area streams and killing sheep and other livestock that have fed on seleniumlaced grass.

In its petition to the state, Simplot argues that changing the water quality standard can be done without bringing any more harm to the environment.

To better understand selenium levels, researchers hired by Simplot compared in a lab setting brown trout fry spawned from eggs squeezed from fish captured from Sage and Crow creeks with eggs taken from hatchery trout.

Results show rates of mortality and deformities including fry with two heads or severe mouth and cranial malformation — to be anywhere from 75 to 100 percent for the wild fish, depending on how close the wild fish were to the pollution source. The mortality/deformity rate in hatchery eggs is typically 15 percent, according to federal fish biologists.

# U of I Defends Infrequent Use of Campus Alert System

MOSCOW (AP) • Officials at the University of Idaho defended their infrequent use of a campus emergency alert system, after it was not used when a gun was fired into a residence hall on the Moscow campus over the weekend.

The university also didn't immediately issue an alert last August, when a professor gunned down a graduate student at her off-campus home three days after resigning, the Lewiston Tribune(http://bit.ly/x1IONP) reported Wednesday.

There is no strict set of rules for how and when the system is used, said security director Matt Dorschel. His department considers using the system on a case-bycase basis, and the decision often centers on whether there is a clear and present danger, he said.

"It could be a weather event or a natural disaster, not just a crime, that would lead us to use the system," Dorschel said. "That's what we talk about when we bring our response group together to make those decisions."

In the most recent case, the university reported no one was injured when a single gunshot was fired at the Targhee Fine Arts residence

hall around 11:30 p.m. Sunday. The bullet hit a lighting fixture then ricocheted into a cinder block wall.

An initial investigation suggested the gun may have been fired from a nearby street. Witnesses reported two men traveling in a white sport utility vehicle were in the area around the time of the shooting, though no suspects were named.

Authorities who responded determined the incident was most likely isolated and there was not enough information to prompt a campus alert, Dorschel said.

"Notifications need to be more than just an alert," he said. "We need to have a message that is informative but also instructive, so that we can give concrete actions that our campus community can take to mitigate the risks to themselves or others."

The university contracts a private company to provide the alert system. Faculty and staff are automatically subscribed to receive alerts through email, text messages and voicemail. Students are also included in the database of subscribers, but they can opt out and choose not to receive the messages.

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### Blaine Co. Man Faces **Deportation**

The Idaho Mountain Express (http://bit.ly/ xPQytC) reports 26-yearold Raul Torres-Escobedo was sentenced Tuesday to 218 days in jail. District Judge Robert J. Elgee gave Torres-Escobedo credit for 215 days he'd already spent in jail, making him eligible to be released on Friday.

Court records indicate he will be turned over to federal immigration authorities for likely deportation.

Torres-Escobedo was arrested in Hailey on July 5 after a patrolman stopped him for having only one operating headlight.

### Sali Mulls Another Election Bid, Seeks Idaho Plate

BOISE (AP) • As former state and U.S. Rep. Bill Sali considers another run for elected office, he's also seeking the Legislature's assistance in promoting a nonprofit foundation created by him and his wife.

The former Republican lawmaker on Wednesday asked the House Transportation Committee to help create an "In God We Trust" license plate, with proceeds benefiting the American Heritage Foundation.

He and his wife, Terry, founded it last month.

The committee agreed to vet Sali's plan — to use license-plate proceeds to promote discussion about America's founding and qualities he thinks exemplify proper citizenship.



# Fudging the Numbers

he Obama administration is touting the latest unemployment numbers released last week by Tribune Media Serv the U.S. Department of Labor as proof its policies



are working. But a closer look at the actual number of able-bodied people who are willing to work, but are not, reveals a different picture.

As economist John R. Lott has written, not only is the drop in the unemployment rate from 8.5 percent to 8.3 percent still half a percentage point higher than when President Obama took office three years ago, the number of unemployed is higher. Compared to January 2009 when 11.6 million Americans were jobless, today, writes Lott, "there are 12.8 million unemployed and 43 percent have been out of a job for more than six months. The average length of unemployment has increased dramatically since the recovery started. Back in June 2009, 'only' 29 percent of the unemployed had been unemployed longer than six months."

The way government counts things, slowing the rate of increased spending amounts to a cut and reducing the percentage of unemployed people by two-tenths of 1 percent counts as more people finding jobs, which then counts as progress.

Lott examined the Labor Department's statistics and found nearly 1.2 million Americans no longer in the labor force. That means most have given up looking for work and are no longer counted as unemployed. That fact skews the statistics to make the employment picture appear better than it is.

Real unemployment is mostly ignored by the major media, which was happy to tout the latest jobless rate reduction as a boon to President Obama and a problem for Republican frontrunner Mitt Romney. Most reporting has focused on the impression voters might have of an economic recovery, or at least trending in the right direction. The opposite is true and it is up to Romney to make that case.

After an initial tepid reaction to the unemployment numbers, Romney rebounded, but it came a day late after the news cycle had moved on and the media cheerleading for President Obama had achieved the

Many in the major media can't be counted on to tell the truth about the economy if doing so makes Obama and his policies look bad. Consider how some in the media collectively claimed the recession had not eased as the 1992 election neared. After the inauguration of President Clinton, it was reported that, in fact, the recession had ended more than a year earlier. Through the election, the media completely accepted the Democratic line the recession had not abated.

This means the Republican nominee will have to go over or around the media to make his case. The best way to do this is not with statistics, but with real people. The Republican candidates for president should identify unemployed people who have lost their jobs, or who have given up looking for one. Have them tell their stories and let the candidates put the blame on the president and congressional Democrats whose plans to raise taxes, drastically increase spending and impose Obamacare on the country has added to the economic uncertainty and the reluctance of businesses to hire new workers.

Featuring real people who are out of a job and desperately want to work would help undermine the Democrats as the party of compassion, while simultaneously blunting the Republican stereotype as the party that doesn't care about the poor.

Democrats seem eager to get more people onto food stamps than to adopt policies that would free them from addiction to government and give them the dignity of a real job and the self-sufficiency that goes with it.

Romney must be less reactive and more proactive, less responsive to Obama and the news of the day and more concerned with creating his own news every day. Going on the offensive about unemployment is a strategy that can work.

# Silence on Drones Could Backfire

The following editorial appeared in the Los Angeles Times on Tuesday:

hen the Londonbased Bureau of Investigative Journalism released a report Sunday claiming that U.S. drone strikes have killed dozens of civilian rescuers and mourners in Pakistan, the American media scarcely noticed. Similarly, while other countries hotly debate America's covert program of targeted assassination, its legality has never been considered by a U.S. court and is seldom discussed by Congress, which has ceded extraordinary authority over the drone program to the president and the CIA.

That silence could well come back to haunt this country.

The Bureau of Investigative Journalism's findings are worth a look - not because they're an ironclad assertion of facts on the ground in Pakistan's tribal areas, where solid information is hard to come by, but because of the questions they raise about the drone program. The three-month investigation turned up evidence that at least 50 civilians were killed when they tried to rescue people injured in a drone attack, only to be hit with another round of missiles. If this is true, it's a tactic that seems borrowed from the playbook of Islamist terrorists, who have been known to set off bombs in crowded areas, wait for rescuers to arrive and then explode more bombs to

maximize the carnage. Evewitness accounts in such places as the tribal areas must be regarded with great skepticism; playing up alleged U.S. atrocities is a common recruiting strategy for terrorist groups. But claims of secondary drone strikes are so frequent that they call for further investigation. Meanwhile, Washington Post reporter Joby Warrick, in his recent book, "The Triple Agent," describes a 2009 drone attack at the funeral of a Taliban operative that was aimed at a senior commander; he escaped, but dozens of civilians, including children, were reportedly killed in the strike. Are funerals appropriate targets, even when they provide an opportunity to lure dangerous terrorists out of hiding?

# In Grizzly Country, Caution is Key

Grizzly bears are tucked away in their winter dens for at least another six weeks. But grizzly specialist Kim Annis is already embarking on northwestern Montana's rural talk circuit.

Hired four years ago by Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks, Annis speaks to hundreds of people each year at libraries, schools and community events about living in grizzly country.

At least 40 grizzlies - scientifically known as Ursus arctos horribilis, or "horrible northern bear" - inhabit the Cabinet-Yaak ecosystem of North Idaho and northwestern Montana. Annis wants to arm people with information so they can "coexist amicably" with the big bears, she

She runs electric-fencing workshops to show people how to keep bears out of chicken coops, pig pens and orchards. She tells people what to look for in a bear spray. And she teaches people about grizzly behavior so they can reduce their chance of injury during encounters.

"When you deal with bear conflicts reactively, you're already behind the curve," said Annis, who worked with black bears in Florida before moving to Montana. "We're trying to be proactive to prevent those conflicts from happening in the first place."

Last year, four grizzlies and one hunter were killed during bear-human con-

A Porthill, Idaho, man shot and killed a grizzly that was near the family's pig pen. His children were outside at the time.

In another incident, a hunter mistook a grizzly for a black bear and shot it. The wounded bear attacked his hunting partner, and when the man shot the grizzly again, the bullet traveled through the bear and fatally struck the hunting partner. In a separate incident, another grizzly was killed in the Cabinet Mountains by a hunter who mistook it from a black bear.

A fourth grizzly was killed on private property near Libby in an incident determined to be self-defense.

One of Annis' most recent audiences was employees at Revett Minerals' Troy Mine, a copper and silver mine in Lincoln County. Many of the mine workers hunt, fish and camp in Montana's backcountry, so Annis' talk was more than an academic lecture.

Annis encourages people to rehearse possible scenarios, so they'll act appropriately in adrenaline-charged situations.

Her first message: Avoid surprising bears by making loud noises, and be especially vigilant in areas such as creek bottoms, where the sound of the water and heavy brush make it difficult to hear and see.

Her second message: Cede ground. If people do see a grizzly, Annis tells them to back slowly away without drawing attention to themselves. People's instinct is often to try to scare the grizzly off, but that often escalates the situation, she said.

"Shooting at the ground or making loud noises or shooting over the bear's head can force the bear into a defensive position," she said. "Now they feel threatened, and they're going to do something about it."

Her talk, given with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist Wayne Kasworm, has become an annual event at the Troy Mine. Bruce Clark, the mine manager, thinks the sessions have helped reduce animosity toward the federally protected grizzlies.

"In our employees, we see less irritation with the grizzly bear," he said. "As we become more educated, we accept the bear more than we did in the past, and we accept some of the changes that are coming because of the bear."

Clark, 56, grew up in Troy.

has concluded that intensive one-on-one education reduces human-wildlife conflicts. But Annis said it's too soon to assess the results of her outreach.

The number of bear conflict calls she fields each year is still increasing. That's to be expected, Annis said, as more people learn that she's available as a resource.

# Trial Set for Window Shooting Incident

TWIN FALLS • A 23-yearold Twin Falls man will face a court trial without a jury for charges of using a deadly weapon and malicious injury of property.

In December, Daniel Williams was accused of using a .45 caliber handgun to shoot out the window of

# Hailey Men Sentenced in Poaching

CHALLIS • Two Hailey men have received stiff penalties and fines after being caught poaching in Custer County, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game announced Wednesday. A total of 49 citations and 21 warnings were issued to seven individuals Monday by Custer County Magistrate Judge Charles L.

Juan Pasillas-Garcia, 44, of Hailey, was sentenced to 540 days in jail, but all but 40 were suspended. He also must pay \$3,262 in fines and fees and his hunting, fishing and trapping privileges were suspended for 15 years. In addition, he forfeited two firearms to Fish and Game and was put on four years' probation.

Jose Pasillas-Garcia, 30, of Hailey, pleaded guilty to failing to produce game for inspection. He was given a 30day suspended jail sentence and fined \$570. In addition, he was put on two years' probation and will be required to complete 40 hours of community service.

In the same case two Phoenix, Ariz., men — Sergio Pasillas-Garcia, 39, and Bernardo Amaya, 38 – were each sentenced to serve 40 days in jail, received thousands of dollars in fines and lost hunting privileges. Martin Pasillas-Garcia, 45, of Torrence, Calif., was sentenced to 900 days in jail with all but 80 days suspended and must pay more than \$8,500 in fines. He also lost hunting privileges for 30 years.

The men were caught after Fish and Game Regional Investigator Ryan Hilton hid in the brush at the Yankee Fork drainage area for nine hours after he watched two hunters leave their truck and hike up the mountain.

"It was a long, cold day, but by being out there I was able to hear the shots that we later confirmed illegally killed a six-point bull elk closed season and also took video of them loading an illegal deer into their truck," Hilton said in a statement released by Fish and Game.

Fish and Game reports their investigators worked around the clock to catch the poachers, who have been hunting illegally in Idaho for years.

# ISP Steps Up Seatbelt Patrol

TWIN FALLS • Idaho State Police are in the middle of a two-week campaign to stop unbelted drivers in the Magic Valley region.

The enhanced patrols started Monday and will go through Feb. 20.

The Idaho Transportation Department provides periodic funding for extra patrols to crack down on impaired and other law-breaking drivers.

Since not wearing a seat belt is a secondary offense in Idaho, state troopers have increased their enforcement of speed limits and traffic laws in order to cite drivers and occupants who aren't wearing seat belts at the time.

According to Idaho law, everyone in a vehicle must wear a safety restraint. Violators older than 18 receive a \$10 fine for failing to buckle up, while those younger than 18 also must pay \$51.50 in court costs if they or anyone else under 18 in the car aren't wearing their seat belts. Adult drivers can also be ticketed for unrestrained children in the vehicle.

"Those occupants wearing

a seatbelt during a speed-related crash increase their chance of survival greatly," Lt. Kevin Haight, ISP District 4 patrol commander, said in a press release about the patrols.

According to the release, 55 of the 163 vehicle occupants who were injured in accidents in the Magic Valley in 2009 were unrestrained. Statewide, 73 people who died in crashes in 2010 were not wearing a seat belt.

In a similar campaign in November, ISP ticketed 71 people for seat belt violations in the Magic Valley.

# Solitude on Snowshoes

For some of southern Idaho's best winter scenery, try snowshoeing at Craters of the Moon. It's free. intriguing and as easy as walking.

**CAREY** • Roads and parking lots disappear, but even thick snow can't erase the rugged volcanic landscape. With protruding lava rocks offering dramatic contrasts, craters and cones become a study in black and white, a place of profound solitude.

That transformation was tardy this winter at Craters of the Moon National Monument. But in mid-January, park workers finally had enough snow to groom the monument's winter trails - one of southern Idaho's best destinations for snow-

And the price? Absolutely

The monument charges no entry fees from November to April. Don't have snowshoes? You can borrow a pair for the

day from the visitor center for free, or pay a suggested \$5 dona-

tion if you like. If it's your first time on snowshoes — or you brought children along — start with the 1.5-mile loop trail that begins and ends at the visitor center. Its gentle grades are fine for all but the smallest children, and you'll see a lot of varied terrain in that strange and beautiful landscape.

#### The Ranger's Lessons

Choose a Friday afternoon in February for that loop trail, and you can make the walk in the company of interpretive park ranger Lennie Ramacher. The monument's guided snowshoe walks are also an engaging nature lesson on how the animals of Craters of the Moon escape, hibernate or adapt to survive

heavy snows.

With their slender legs, deer are among the escapers, Ramacher said, pausing last week's Friday tour to pull a laminated photograph of deer from his backpack.

"They'd be postholing all over the place," he said. So deer retreat to lower elevations or to south-facing slopes where snow

cover is lighter. They bed down and burn fat reserves instead of looking far for food.

Ramacher helps his listeners on snowshoes think like deer: That unappealing can of spam in the pantry, or a delectable pizza down the icy road? "They're going to choose the can of spam every time."

hunting and fishing, drew from his own life when writing the play.

"I had a lot of embarrassing dates," he said in a telephone interview, "and so I kind of worked them all together into this. Dealing with girls' fathers, that sort of thing. It's a funny

Behrens portrays about 15 characters during the two-hour show aimed at children and adults alike, including Rancid Crabtree and even a snake on a bike. His favorite character to play is Crazy Eddie.

"I like Crazy Eddie because he's the engine of the shows," Behrens said. "In a relationship, there's always a Crazy Eddie. They're the one who propels the relationship forward and comes up with the ideas and plans, like 'Let's go camping in the rain!"

Behrens enjoys performing a one-act show because it forces the audience to fill in the blanks. There are few props and no costume changes.

"I just change the voice and posture," Behrens said of switching characters. "It's really up to the audience to see that character and create that character."

McManus said Behrens can be "absolute magic" on stage.

"One time I was walking behind three women after a show Tim did in Montana," said Manus, who now lives in Washington state. "One woman said, 'I could see cows and barns and streams and mountains, and all of a sudden it occurred to me, he's up there by himself?"

Behrens has performed about 1,500 McManus shows, including "Scrambled McManus" and "A Fine and Pleasant Misery," during the past 19 years. The two met when Behrens was in grad school at Eastern Washington University. Mc-Manus was Behrens' writing professor and adviser.

Behrens loves doing the show because the laughter can get so loud, it hurts his ears, he said.

His mini-lessons on animal behavior also offer beginners a chance to catch up or catch their breath. And they're interspersed with snowshoe pointers - like avoiding exposed rocks, or zigzagging up a slope, or stepping over cross-country tracks in deference to skiers.

Stopping at another wellchosen vista, Ramacher pulled out a photograph of the yellow-bellied marmot, better known to most Idahoans as a rock chuck.

"Not all of us can afford to winter in Tucson," he said. Marmots don't have the resources to migrate, either. So they spend September to March in pockets under the snow, huddled together in marmot balls of perhaps a dozen animals, with their body temperature – and calorie consumption turned way down.

"These put all other hibernators to shame," Ramacher

And an adapter? Ramacher had one of those in his backpack, too: The weasel changes from gray-brown to white for winter, then hunts passageways under the snow for voles, mice and chipmunks.

Yes, winter's snows tax the plants and animals of Craters of the Moon. But without them, it would be hard for anything to live the rest of the year in this harsh environment of lava.

To make the point, Ramacher pulled one more lesson from his pack: a large but lightweight cinder and a water bottle. He invited a listener to pour water onto the rock and notice how little ran off. The rocks of Craters store

winter's melt like sponges, to nourish life above and replenish the aquifer below.

#### Snowshoe **Anytime**

Ask him all the questions you like. Your nature lesson from Ramacher might be an almost private one.

Craters of the Moon this year moved those short, guided snowshoe walks from Sundays to Fridays, hoping to capitalize on some school districts' move to a four-day school week, he said. But participation so far has been

Longer-standing more popular are Craters' two- to four-mile Saturday walks preceded by a classroom session. Those usually fill up in advance and often have a waiting list; of the three Saturday excursions remaining in February, only Feb. 18 still had room by Wednesday.

But you can come any day of the week to snowshoe either the 1.5-mile dedicated trail or the seven miles of groomed cross-country ski trails, including a 1.2-mile length of trail newly added this winter. Pick up a free, color-coded map at the visitor center that indicates where you'll encounter the easiest and most difficult

# 3 Mont. Men Face Charges in Killing, Selling of Eagle

#### BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) •

Three Montana men each face up to a year in prison on charges that two of them captured and killed an injured golden eagle then sold it to the third man for \$100, authorities said Tuesday.

Curtis Foster, 58, Glenn Reum, 57, and Doug Standing Rock, 64, were released on special conditions after pleading not guilty in an arraignment before U.S. Magistrate Judge Keith Strong in Great Falls.

The defendants face charges of violating the Bald and Golden Eagle Act and the Migratory Bird Treaty. In addition to prison time, they could be fined up to \$15,000 each if found guilty.

An affidavit filed by federal prosecutors alleges that Foster and Reum, both of Pablo, picked up the injured eagle last year after seeing it along a highway near Lincoln.

They packed the injured animal into a cooler then took it to the Budget Inn Motel in Havre, where the pair allegedly kept it in a bathtub for a week while they discussed what to do with it.

After first attempting to kill the bird by strangling it with a bungee cord, Reum killed it by hitting it in the head with a hammer, according to the affidavit signed by Assistant U.S. Attorney Jessica Betley.

In early 2011, Foster sold the dead bird to Standing Rock, who lives in Box Elder on the Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation. Foster wanted the eagle for ceremonial purposes, prosecutors allege.

Attempts by The Associated Press to locate the suspects were unsuccessful Tuesday.

According to prosecutors, Standing Rock told a special agent from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service that he knew it was illegal to buy and sell eagles and acknowledged that he did not have a permit for the animal. The bird had been buried but Standing Rock provided its wings to the



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### THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

— Francis Quarles

'We spend our midday sweat, our midnight oil; We tire the night in thought, the day in toil.

Against four hearts, West leads the spade king. Good deceptive declarer play is to drop the spade eight on this trick, trying to persuade West that East's spade five is high, not low. But West was not born yesterday. He refuses to take the bait, instead switching to the diamond queen. Plan the play from here on.

The first key point to bear in mind is that since West passed as dealer and has already shown up with 10 points. East must have the club king. If you take an early club finesse. East will win his king and shift back to spades, setting up four winners for the defenders. How can you avoid the need for taking the club finesse?

The answer is rather subtle: Duck the diamond queen, win the diamond continuation, and play the heart king and a heart to the jack. Cash the diamond ace (discarding a club) and club ace, and take the ruffing club finesse.

It would not have done West any good to cash the spade ace at trick three, since you would have the rest of the tricks without needing to work hard. But note that West might have worked out to shift to the diamond jack so as not to give the show away. It would not matter if East was confused about the location of the diamond honors since he does not need to know what is going on.

ANSWER: With a maximum in the 12-14 range and a heart stop, a contract rates to play just as well with you as declarer, so I would bid one no-trump now. Conceivably, three no-trump might be better from your partner's hand, but you cannot afford to pass up the opportunity to bid no-trump now, or you may not get another chance.

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
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#### "If you're still sleeping, I can try askin' Daddy first."





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

# **House Panel Considers Youth Concussion Law**

ATLANTA - Former Falcons kicker Matt Bryant can still remember taking a hit during an elementary school football game.

The sky turned yellow and he saw green dots. At 10 or 11, he didn't recognize the incident as a possible concussion.

Now a father of seven children, Bryant is pushing for legislation in Georgia that would help educate young players and their parents, coaches and others about the dangers of concussions and the need to protect student athletes from serious brain injury.

"I've probably had concussions and didn't know it," Bryant told a panel of Georgia House representatives in a hearing Thursday. "The whole education part of this is important."

Lawmakers heard testimony from Bryant and former Falcons linebacker Buddy Curry in support of House Bill 673. The legislation is part of a national push by NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell and NCAA President Mark Emmert, who are urging 19 governors to support similar proposals across the country.

Currently, 31 states already have such laws and another 14 are considering such legislation, which is modeled after Washington state's 2009 "Zackery Lystedt Law," named for a middle school football player who sustained brain damage after he suffered a concussion and returned to play.

That law requires that a player who shows signs of a concussion be removed from a game or practice, and bars the player from competing again until being cleared by a licensed health care professional trained in concussion evaluation and management.

The language for Georgia's version of the bill is still being finalized as current and former lawmakers and doctors testified before the House Health and Human Services Committee for more than an hour.

# Love Preparing For a Ryder Cup Year

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. • There is plenty of evidence that this is a Ryder Cup year.

The U.S. players are starting to earn points from regular PGA Tour events, with Kyle Stanley atop the standings based on his runner-up finish and win in consecutive weeks. Davis Love III walks onto the range and players call him "captain."

Love, however, said the race to make the team really doesn't start until late May. That's when two dozen or so players begin getting fitted for uniforms.

"When I always played, you went to the Memorial, got measured for clothes, and you started choking on points," Love said Wednesday. "So that's probably the time that it's serious, when you get measured for your clothes and the points start settling out."

Love still hasn't announced his assistant captains, saying he will work with European captain Jose Maria Olazabal to find a good time when they can do that together. He thinks four assistants is a good number.

Love said he would consider past captains, and especially longtime friend Fred Couples, even though Couples could be a distraction because the players like him so much. Couples is 2-0 as Presidents Cup captain.

Padraig Harrington has played on every Ryder Cup team for Europe since 1999, and he barely made it on the last team as a captain's pick. This year might be particularly difficult for the three-

time major champion. Europe is so strong at the top that many feel it will be the toughest team to make in history. That's especially true for Harrington, who is coming off such a poor sea-

son that he has fallen to No.

93 in the world. While his two majors in 2008 keep him eligible for the four majors, he is not in the two World Golf Championships over the next month.

Those are the short fields that, in short, offer free points.

"There's no doubt I'm behind the eight-ball at this stage," Harrington said. "I haven't got very many points. It's not going to be a year that I can play well and get into it. I'm going to have to play great to get into the team. I'm not going to be able to pick up easy points and qualify that way. I'm going to have to actually really play well to force my

Back then it was all about money and television ratings. Still is, because the more the ratings go south the better a playoff looks.

"The reason for the sagging ratings is the fans are recognizing what these games actually are," said Matthew Sanderson, cofounder of Playoff PAC, a Washington, D.C., organization in favor of playoffs in college football. "They realize that these aren't anything other than glorified exhibition games that have little legitimacy."

BCS officials would surely disagree. They like to think they've gotten it right every year, using computer programs no one can explain and polls that defy explanation to pick the two most worthy teams in the country to play for the title.

It's a system laden with so many flaws that it can't be trusted. Even when the BCS does get it right, there's always a school that feels its been wronged.

The four-team playoff wouldn't eliminate that totally. But it's a lot easier to pick four qualified teams than just two, even if No. 5 if left furning on the sidelines.

The format isn't terribly complicated. The No. 1 team in the rankings would play at home against the No. 4 team. The No. 2 team would host the No. 3 team, and the winners would meet, say, two weeks later on a neutral site.

Had the system been in place this past season, LSU would have hosted Stanford and Oklahoma State would have traveled to Alabama for a semifinal game. Those games would not only have sparked more interest in the title game, but could have changed the complexion of it entirely.

**BCS** Executive Director Bill Hancock said Tuesday there will be meetings later this month on a possible format change, with a goal

of a final decision by summer, when negotiations are expected to begin on a new television deal with ESPN to replace the current one that runs through the 2013 season.

"The tricky part is our 11 conference commissioners and the Notre Dame AD may have 12 different opinions about the direction we should go over the next six to eight months," Hancock said.

Complicating the issue is how to deal with the major bowls, which now host the title game on a rotating basis. Other than the Rose Bowl, though, they've been so co-opted by corporate greed and the demands of television that they've become increasingly marginalized. Does the Orange Bowl really deserve the BCS title game next year after the West Virginia blowout of Clemson was the least-watched Orange Bowl in nearly two decades?

Sanderson said he is skeptical the BCS will follow through and actually implement a playoff system. If it does, he said, it likely will be a hybrid of the existing system, and not something that brings meaningful reform to the postseason.

"I'm not encouraged by talk, though I would be encouraged by them actually following through," he said. "For umpteen rea sons, I doubt their motives for even engaging in this discussion."

With good reason, because the BCS was never about giving fans something they wanted. It was — and still is — all about big schools maintaining control of college football and reaping the profits that come with it.

That's worked well over the years for members of the cartel. They foisted a system on college football that no fan likes, excluded schools they didn't like and happily collected hundreds of millions of dollars from the TV networks.

# Memphis Final Piece For Coast-to-Coast Big East

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The Big East has acquired all the pieces needed to build a new coast-to-coast conference. Putting them all together, though, is going to take a

The conference wanted to rebuild itself into a 12-team football league that can hold a championship game, and Memphis officially became that 12th member on Wednesday when it accepted an invite it has long coveted.

But the new Big East isn't scheduled to be fully functional until the 2015 football season. As for the next three years, what the Big East will look like is anybody's guess.

Memphis is the seventh school, and fourth from Conference USA, to sign up since December for future membership in the Big East. The Tigers will compete in the Big East in all sports.

"It certainly is an historic day for us," University of Memphis President Shirley Raines said during a teleconference with Big East Commissioner John Marinatto and Memphis Athletic Director

R.C. Johnson. Memphis has been trying to upgrade its conference affiliation for years, and the Big East was always the most likely landing spot. The Tigers were snubbed during the Big East's last massive expansion in 2005 and lost a longtime rivalry

with Louisville in the process. Now with the Big East in need replacements for West Virginia, Pittsburgh and Syracuse, there was finally room

for Memphis. Marinatto called Memphis

a "perfect fit." "There were a number of contributing factors for our membership in making the decision to invite Memphis, including among other reasons its geography in the heart of our future membership makeup, its Central time zone presence, its top-50 media market, as well as its outstanding corporate and community support, quality athletic facilities and the overall brand and competitiveness of its athletic programs," Marinatto said. Marinatto has traveled

across the country in recent months to recruit new members. In December, the Big East announced Boise State and San Diego State from the Mountain West Conference would join in 2013 for football only, and Houston, SMU and Central Florida, from C-USA, would become members in all

Last month, Navy football jumped on board, though that

won't happen until 2015. The Big East pitched Air Force and BYU on joining, but couldn't work out a deal with either. Temple was also being considered, but the Philadelphia school and former Big East member was passed over for Memphis because the conference wanted to bolster its new west wing.

Memphis gives the Big East 11 football teams committed for the 2013 season, still one short of the 12 needed under NCAA rules to hold a conference championship game. The league could ask the NCAA for a waiver to play a title game with less than 12, though Marinatto said there are no plans for that and the Big East championship football game will debut after Navy joins.
