One Dead, One Under Arrest in Odd Case

Officers discover a dead man lying on a Twin Falls County road, and another man sitting in an idling car in front of him.

KIMBERLY • One man was arrested and an investigation was sparked

Sunday when authorities discovered another man dead on a rural Twin Falls County road.

The Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, Kimberly Police Department and Twin Falls County Prosecutor's Office were still determining what led to the man's death. But the chain of events apparently began, at least from law enforcement's perspective, on Sunday morning when po-

lice were involved in a vehicle pursuit of a brown Ford Taurus.

The chase ended near Hansen, but officers were later called about the Taurus being involved in a possible accident on 3500 East Road, on the northern edge of Twin Falls County near the entrance to Twin Falls Park. Witnesses reported a male lying on the road in front of the car, and a male in the driver's seat.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies and Kimberly officers arrived early Sunday afternoon to find the Taurus still running and the driver sitting in the vehicle. The man lying in front of the car was dead, with apparent gunshot wounds.

The car's driver ignored orders to exit the car, so the officers removed him from it — arresting him for re-

sisting and obstructing an officer.

The names of both men were not released Sunday.

It wasn't clear what killed the deceased man. On Sunday afternoon, law enforcement was still processing the scene and Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs wasn't sure if a firearm or other weapon connected to the case had been found yet.

3 Arrested in Jerome Standoff

Police say little about what led to a nearly nine-hour standoff early Sunday.

JEROME • Three people were arrested Sunday morning following a nearly nine-hour standoff at a Jerome residence.

But police released few details beyond confirming the incident took place, promising that more information would be made available today.

The three — two males and a female — were holed up in a house at the corner of Elm Street and D Avenue. Jerome Police Detective Dan Kennedy said the standoff began at about 2:30 a.m. and ended about 11 a.m.

Though police would not confirm the tie, the standoff and arrests were apparently tied to shots fired in town earlier that night.

The Jerome and Twin Falls county sheriff's offices, Twin Falls Police Department and Idaho State Police all responded to the scene.

Getting a Jump Start on College

Though a few Magic Valley students graduate early from high school each year, local educators aren't sure it's a good idea to try to add to their numbers.

TWIN FALLS • Seventeen-year-old Salome Page is looking forward to graduating from Twin Falls High School this spring.

But she won't have four years worth of memories to relive during the ceremony. That's because she's graduating one year early.

"I just wanted to get a head start on life," Page said, and she's ready to be done with high school.

Next year, instead of being a high school senior, she plans to take classes at the College of Southern Idaho. She wants to earn an associate's degree in dance and then transfer to Idaho State University to study physical therapy.

She's not alone in wanting to gradu-

ate early. Twin Falls High Principal Ben Allen said he has 11 early graduates this year — six finishing a full year ahead of schedule.

"It's an abnormally large number," school counselor Sharee Hamilton said.

There are options for students who want to get a jump start on college. Some programs offer incentives for students to finish high school requirements early, too.

The state's Dual Credit for Early Completers Program pays for students to earn up to 36 college credits during their senior year of high school if they meet state graduation requirements early.

And soon, students may have another option. Idaho's House of Representatives voted Thursday to keep an "8 in 6 Program" proposal — which would

cost more than \$2 million next year — moving forward.

Under the bill, students could earn up to two years of college credit by the time they graduate from high school.

The Idaho State Department of Education would pay for a portion of costs for students who agree to take a full load of classes, including some over the summer.

The program wouldn't be open to all, though — just up to 10 percent of seventh-through 12th-grade students.

Allen said he's concerned that seventh-graders are too young to take college classes.

"I think that's a little bit soon," he said.

It's also important, Allen said, to consider whether younger students are socially ready for college.

"Kids could have the credits, but is it socially wise to have 16 and 17-year-olds in dorms with older students?" he asked.

Neighbor Laura Minard said she awoke at 3:30 a.m. to see her street blocked off and patrol cars and lights spread out.

"It just went haywire from there," she said, describing SWAT and K-9 officers arriving at the scene.

T.F. Council to Consider Funding Salary Survey

Funds sought for study on the competitiveness of Twin Falls city's pay and benefits.

TWIN FALLS • City Manager Travis Rothweiler wants to know if Twin Falls employees are paid enough to want to keep working for the city.

During today's meeting, Rothweiler will ask the Twin Falls City Council to shift \$12,500 from the city's human resources department so the city can fund an outside company to report on the competitiveness of the city's pay and benefits.

The city ordered such a survey in 2010, and it revealed some interesting re-

sults. While the city's benefits package was generally on par with those of similar municipalities and Twin Falls private employers, Twin Falls city employees earned about 7.6 percent less than their counterparts in similar government positions in Idaho.

The city approved a 2 percent increase to its salary table this fiscal year — the first such pay bump since 2008.

The city has struggled with issues of employee turnover in the past. In 2005, a rash of Twin Falls police officers contracted what of-

ficials later dubbed the "Boise flu," quietly taking time off to interview for better-paying jobs in the Treasure Valley. At one point, the force was so depleted that it had to temporarily cancel traffic patrols and stop providing school resource officers.

Rothweiler hopes a new salary survey, and any potential actions taken in light of its findings, will help prevent a recurrence of such work-related maladies.

"It is widely recognized that one of the most important assets the City of Twin Falls has is its loyal, competent, innovative workforce," Rothweiler wrote in his written request to the council.

"Retaining and attracting a high-quality workforce is also one of the City's strategic planning objectives. Compensation is a driving factor in the City's ability to attract and retain employees."

The council is also scheduled to hear a presentation by Scott Hunsaker of Mahlke Husaker & Co. of the city's fiscal 2011 audited financial statements. The annual audit of the city's finances showed no material weaknesses in the city's handling of its finances.

The council will also hear a presentation of tax-supported funds and city water, wastewater and sanitation funding for the first quarter of fiscal 2012.

Despite some concerns, Allen said he doesn't think the 8 in 6 program would have a large impact on Twin Falls High.

"A lot of students already take dual-credit classes due to our relationship with the College of Southern Idaho," he said. Dual-credit classes allow students to earn high school and college credit simultaneously.

Allen said he'd like to see more emphasis and funding put into enhancement programs — such as Advanced Placement and dual-credit classes — instead of hurrying to get students through school.

Jan Roeser, regional economist for the Idaho Department of Labor, said there shouldn't be a rush to get students into the workforce.

Younger college grads compete in a tough job market against people with more experience, she said, and it's hard to get hired.

"Why start churning kids out into extremely responsible positions when they're not quite ready?" she asked.

CSI Instructional Dean John Miller said colleges would need to make sure younger students are mature enough and understand the academic responsibility of taking college classes.

"From the college standpoint, there will be a need for more pre-college advising," he said. CSI would use the

same placement tests to make sure students are ready for college, regardless of age.

Shari Stroud, Boise State University's Twin Falls program coordinator, said high school students would also need to make sure they're taking the right college classes in order to enter a degree program.

Now, the majority of students taking BSU classes in Twin Falls are between ages 25 and 44.

"It would definitely make our student population a little younger," Stroud said about the 8 in 6 program.

Despite incentives for high school students to earn college credit, not many earn two years' worth.

Miller estimates that about six Magic Valley stu-

\$1 Million Powerball Ticket Sold in T.F. County

TWIN FALLS • Someone in the Magic Valley has a winning \$1 million Powerball ticket, the Idaho Lottery announced Sunday.

A ticket sold at an Idaho Lottery retail location in Twin Falls County matches every number but the Powerball from Saturday night's \$336.4 million draw. As such, it's worth \$1 million.

The winning numbers were 1, 10, 37, 52 and 57. The Powerball was 11.

"We are encouraging everyone who played Powerball for last night's draw to check their tickets carefully for winners," Idaho Lottery Director Jeff Anderson said in a statement Sunday. "Too often we see players not match the Powerball and think they do not have a winning ticket."

The ticket's owner has 180 days to claim their prize from Idaho Lottery headquarters in Boise. The person will be the lottery's eighth million-dollar Powerball

winner since 2005 and the 33rd person to win \$1 million or more in Idaho since 1989.

Pollster Rallies T.F. Republicans at Lincoln Day Event

TWIN FALLS • Scott Rasmussen probably didn't need a poll to tell him Americans are frustrated with their government.

But the founder and president of Rasmussen Reports sees quantifiable evidence in the public opinion surveys that his firm routinely conducts.

"People know something is wrong. They are angry," Rasmussen told local Republicans gathered Saturday for a Lincoln Day celebration and fundraiser.

Rasmussen was the keynote speaker at the event sponsored by the Twin Falls County Republicans. He is a nationally known pollster and frequent guest on Fox News, CNBC and other media outlets.

The top priority for Republicans, of course, is to defeat President Barack Obama in the November election.

Whether they'll be able to do that will depend largely on the economy, Rasmussen said. A poor economy will favor Republicans, while a strong recovery could bode well for Obama and the Democrats.

"You don't want to root for the economy to do bad things — America's been through a tough stretch — but you need to understand that's where the dynamics are in this cycle," he told the crowd.

Republicans better produce results if they do regain control of the White House and Senate and maintain their hold in the House, Rasmussen warned the faithful.

A Republican sweep without any resulting change is "the scariest scenario for the nation," he said.

If that happens, an out-

pouring of public frustration could lead to three or four major presidential candidates in the 2016 general election.

"It would blow up everything we know about the party system today because voters are just fed up," he said.

Mitt Romney is the most likely Republican challenger to face Obama this fall, but the former Massachusetts governor doesn't have his party's nomination locked up yet, Rasmussen said.

The Michigan primary in a couple of weeks will be a big challenge and almost a "must-win" for the Republican frontrunner, he said.

On the international front, Americans are overwhelmingly in favor of scaling back overseas military commitments, Rasmussen said.

The United States is bound by treaty to defend 56 countries around the

world, yet a Rasmussen poll found that a majority of Americans are willing to defend only 12.

Sixty percent of respondents said America should defend just four countries: Canada, the United Kingdom, Israel and Australia.

Texas Congressman and Republican presidential candidate Ron Paul has made American's extensive global military presence a major issue in his campaign, saying the U.S. should no longer attempt to play the role of world policeman.

Twin Falls resident Adrian Arp distributed pro-Paul literature at the Lincoln Day event.

"He's not a flip-flopper like Romney or (Rick) Santorum," Arp said of Paul.

U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-

Idaho, told the crowd that all Republicans should support the party's eventual nominee, regardless of who that turns out to be.

"This country cannot take four more years of Barack Obama," Risch said to raucous applause.

Idaho Republicans will get a chance to make their voices heard on March 6, during the state's first presidential caucus. In the past, the state has held a May primary.

The March caucus is something that Idaho Republicans worked hard to get during the past year, said Gretchen Clelland, chairman of the Twin Falls Republican Central Committee.

"That's going to be an exciting event coming in the next few weeks," she said.

Top Republican Wants Vote on Birth Control Mandate

Some Republican members of Congress hope to pass legislation blocking President Obama's tweaked birth control mandate, while the White House shrugged off such talk.

WASHINGTON • Conservatives said Sunday the flap surrounding President Barack Obama's birth control mandate was far from over, with Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell saying he'll push to overturn the requirement because it was another example of government meddling.

While a senior White House official shrugged off such remarks, declaring the issue resolved and new legislation unlikely, the heated rhetoric from Republicans suggested the GOP would try

to keep the debate alive in an election year to rally conservatives and seize upon voter frustration with big government.

"It's riddled with constitutional problems," McConnell said of Obama's broader health-care plan. "And this is what happens when the government tries to take over health care and tries to interfere with your religious beliefs."

Last week, Obama backed down on a mandate that religious-affiliated employers such as Catholic hospitals and colleges cover birth control in their health insurance plans. In a tweak of the rule, those employees would be of-

ferred free coverage directly from their health insurer. But employers would not provide or pay for it.

Al-Qaida Backs Syrian Anti-Assad Movement

Endorsement raises fears that Islamic extremists will try to exploit one of Arab Spring's deadliest conflicts.

BEIRUT • Al-Qaida's leader has called for the ouster of Syria's "pernicious, cancerous regime," raising fears that Islamic extremists will try to exploit an uprising against President Bashar Assad that began with peaceful calls for democratic change but is morphing into a bloody, armed insurgency.

The regime has long blamed terrorists for the 11-month-old revolt, and al-Qaida's endorsement creates new difficulties for the U.S., its Western allies and Arab states trying to figure out a way to help force Assad from power. On Sunday, the 22-nation Arab League called for the U.N. Security Council to create a joint peacekeeping force for Syria, but Damascus rejected it immediately.

In an eight-minute video message released late Saturday, al-Qaida chief Ayman al-Zawahri called on Muslims to support Syrian rebels.

"Wounded Syria is still bleeding day after day, and the butcher (Bashar Assad) isn't deterred and doesn't stop," said al-Zawahri, who took over al-Qaida after Osama bin Laden was killed by U.S. special forces last May. "However, the resistance of our people in Syria is escalating and growing despite all the pains, sacrifices and blood."

The United Nations estimates more than 5,400 people have been killed in Syria since the uprising began in March. But that figure is from January, when the U.N. stopped counting because the chaos in the country has made it all but impossible to check the figures.

While many of the anti-government protests sweeping the country remain peaceful, the uprising as a whole has become more violent in recent months as frustrated demonstrators and army defectors take up arms to protect themselves from the steady military assault. An increasing number of army defectors known as the Free Syrian Army have launched attacks, killing soldiers and security forces.

Syria now has become one of the deadliest conflicts of the Arab Spring, and many fear the country of 22 million at the heart of the Arab world is on the verge of a civil war that could engulf the region.

In a grave escalation of the violence, a string of suicide attacks have killed dozens of people since late December. The latest, twin bombings in the major northern city of Aleppo, killed at least 28 people on Friday, the government said. Some 70 people were killed in earlier attacks in the capital, Damascus, on Dec. 23 and Jan. 6. All the blasts struck security targets.

Nobody has taken responsibility for the attacks, but the regime said they have the hallmarks of al-Qaida and immediately blamed the global terror group.

Saturday's statement by al-Zawahri appears to bolster Assad's accusations, but the Syrian opposition and the Free Syrian Army reject the government's claims entirely. They accuse forces loyal to the regime of setting off the blasts to smear the opposition, terrify people into submission and exploit fears of chaos and sectarian warfare.

Rioting Engulfs Athens, Buildings Burn Before Vote

Greece's parliament approves drastic cuts, which will ax one in five civil service jobs and slash the minimum wage by more than a fifth.

ATHENS, Greece • Greek lawmakers on Monday approved harsh new austerity measures demanded by bailout creditors to save the debt-crippled nation from bankruptcy, after rioters in central Athens torched buildings, looted shops and clashed with riot police.

The historic vote paves the way for Greece's European partners and the International Monetary Fund to release \$170 billion (130 billion euro) in new rescue loans, without which Greece would default on its debt mountain next month and likely leave the eurozone — a scenario that would further roil global markets.

Sunday's clashes erupted after more than 100,000 protesters marched to the parliament to rally

against the drastic cuts, which will ax one in five civil service jobs and slash the minimum wage by more than a fifth.

At least 10 buildings were on fire, including a movie theater, bank and cafeteria, and looters smashed dozens of shops in the worst riot damage in years. Dozens of police officers and at least 37 protesters were injured, 23 suspected rioters were arrested and a further 25 detained.

As the vote got under way early Monday, Prime Minister Lucas Papademos urged calm, pointing to the country's dire financial straits.

"Vandalism and destruction have no place in a democracy and will not be tolerated," Papademos told Parliament. "I call on the public to show calm. At these crucial times, we do not have the luxury of this type of protest. I think everyone is aware of how serious the situation is."

Since May 2010, Greece has survived on a \$145 billion bailout from its European partners and the International Monetary Fund. When that proved insufficient, the new rescue package was approved. The deal, which has not yet been finalized, will be combined with a massive bond swap deal to write off half the country's privately held debt.

But for both deals to materialize, Greece has to persuade its deeply skeptical creditors that it has the will to implement spending cuts and public sector reforms that will end years of fiscal profligacy and tame gaping budget deficits.

Injured Boomers Beware: Know When to See Doctor

Minor injuries can easily become major for aging baby boomers. But knowing when it's OK to self-treat can pay off in the long run.

CHICAGO • It happened to nurse Jane Byron years after an in-line skating fall, business owner Haralee Weintraub while doing "men's" push-ups, and avid cyclist Gene Wilberg while lifting a heavy box.

"It" is that pop, strain or suddenly swollen joint that reminds active older adults they aren't as young as they'd like to think.

Even among the fittest baby boomers, aging bodies just aren't as nimble as young ones, and they're more prone to minor damage that can turn serious if ignored or denied. But not every twist or turn needs medical attention, and knowing when it's OK to self-treat pays off in the long run, in dollars and in health.

Costly knee replacements have more

than tripled in people aged 45-64 in recent years and a study released last week found that nearly 1 in 20 Americans older than 50 have these artificial joints. But active boomers can avoid that kind of drastic treatment by properly managing aches and pains.

Injuries that need immediate treatment cause excruciating, unrelenting pain, or force you to immediately stop your activity and prevent normal motion. Examples are a swollen, bent elbow that won't straighten, or a knee that collapses when you try to stand, said Dr. Charles Bush-Joseph, a sports medicine specialist at Chicago's Rush University Medical Center.

Treatment for more run-of-the-mill activity-related injuries is less clear-cut.

A good rule of thumb for lower-body injuries is this: "If you're able to bear weight, it's safe to self-treat," at least initially. Even if taking a few steps is painful, just being able to put weight on an injury means it's probably not a medical emergency, Bush-Joseph said.

The key for most injuries is what happens over the next two to three

Santorum Plans Aggressive Strategy Against Romney

PORTLAND, Maine • A day after Mitt Romney regained some momentum in the Republican presidential contest, his rival Rick Santorum went on the attack, calling the front-runner "desperate" while promising to compete aggressively to win the state where Romney grew up.

Santorum said Sunday he could do "exceptionally well" in Michigan, where Romney's father served as governor. The Midwestern state and Arizona host Republican presidential nominating contests on Feb. 28.

"We're going to spend a lot of time in Michigan and Arizona, and those are up next. And that's where we've really been focusing on," Santorum told ABC's "This Week." He suggested that a strong showing in those contests would make the presidential contest "a two-man race," dismissing current rivals Newt Gin-

grich and Ron Paul.

Santorum shrugged off his third-place finish Saturday in caucuses in Maine, where he didn't actively compete, as well as his second-place finish in a straw poll of conservative activists.

Romney has been painting Santorum as a long-time Washington insider who pursued home-state projects. Santorum on Sunday described Romney's recent criticism as "desperate."

"You reach a point where desperate people do desperate things," said Santorum, who represented Pennsylvania during his 16 years in Congress, first in the House and then in the Senate.

Maine GOP officials declared Romney the winner of Saturday's caucuses. The results ended a three-state losing streak to Santorum, who swept contests in Colorado, Minnesota and Missouri on Tuesday.

As protests raged Sunday, demonstrators set bonfires in front of parliament and dozens of riot police formed lines to keep them from making a run on the building.

Security forces fired dozens of tear gas volleys at rioters, who attacked them with firebombs and chunks of marble broken off the fronts of luxury hotels, banks and department stores.

Clouds of tear gas drifted across the square, and many in the crowd wore gas masks or had their faces covered, while others carried Greek flags and banners.

A three-story building was completely consumed by flames as firefighters struggled to douse the blaze. Streets were strewn with stones, smashed glass and burnt wreckage, while terrified passers-by sought refuge in hotel lounges and cafeterias.

"I've had it! I can't take it any more. There's no point in living in this country any more," said a distraught shop owner walking through his smashed and looted optician store.

Athens Mayor Giorgos Kaminis said rioters tried to storm the City Hall building, but were repelled. "Once again, the city is being used as a lever to try to destabilize the country," he said.

Conservative New Democracy leader Antonis Samaras said the rioting "hurts the entire country."

"We are seeing scenes from a future that we must do our utmost to avert," he said.

Papademos' government — an unlikely coalition of the majority Socialists and their main foes, New Democracy — had been expected to carry the austerity vote, even if by a narrow margin.

Combined, they control 236 of Parliament's 300 seats, although at least 20 lawmakers from both main parties said they would not back the private sector wage cuts, pension reductions and civil service layoffs dictated by the draft austerity program.

Finance Minister Evangelos Venizelos said the measures were vital to the country's very economic survival.

"The question is not whether some salaries and pensions will be curtailed, but whether we will be able to pay even these reduced wages and pensions," he said. "When you have to choose between bad and worse, you will pick what is bad to avoid what is worse."

The new cutbacks, which follow two years of harsh income losses and tax hikes amid a deep recession and record high unemployment have been demanded by Greece's bailout creditors in return for a new batch of vital rescue loans.

that being so fit would speed her recovery. Within a week after both surgeries, she was back riding an indoor bike.

Overdoing it can aggravate minor injuries, but abandoning activity isn't a good solution, either, because exercise has so many health benefits, said Dr. Steven Haas, an orthopedic specialist at the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York City.

Instead, make sure you're well-conditioned and "listen to your body," Haas said. Switching to less rigorous activities is sometimes the answer. "If your knee is killing you every day after you run, you're probably not doing the right sport."

Haralee Weintraub, 58, changed her exercise routine after injuring her back during a "boot-camp" class at her gym two years ago. The first time it happened, the Portland, Ore., online business owner was doing "full-out toe men's push-ups." A few months later the same thing happened during leg squats — pain that started in her lower back and shot down her leg. Because it was hard to stand, she went both times to the doctor, who diagnosed sciatica, common nerve pain likely caused by an aging disc in her lower back, and by overuse.

A physical therapist had her do exercises to strengthen muscles in her abdomen and near the sciatic nerve in her back, and leg exercises to stretch the buttocks' gluteal muscles.

Weintraub has switched to gentler "girls" knee push-ups and stopped doing lunges. But she still likes to snowshoe, bicycle, hike and walk, and is determined to stay fit.

"Hopefully I'll have another 25 years of activity and not be compromised with physical mobility issues," she said.

Unlike Weintraub, Gene Wilberg tried to tough out his injury, which probably prolonged his recovery. The tip-off that the 62-year-old should have gotten treatment sooner was persistent pain that interfered with his usual activities.

The Naperville, Ill., business consultant was helping his daughter move into an apartment two years ago when he felt a sudden pain in his upper right arm while lifting a box. The pain persisted and made it difficult to twist open jars and pursue hobbies including cycling 15-plus miles a week and skiing. He eventually just stopped using that arm.

She had the cartilage surgically repaired and injections of lubricant medicine for knee arthritis. But she continued rigorous workouts right up until 2010, when she developed hip pain, probably from walking funny to favor her bum knee. By then she needed both knees replaced, but a physical therapist told her

similar to other preventative care measures, is less expensive than pregnancy. But opponents say that unless drug makers stop charging for contraception, the cost is likely to get passed on to employers regardless.

While some Catholic groups applauded the move, including the Catholic Health Association, the nation's Catholic bishops said it continued the attack on religious freedoms — a theme quickly picked up by Republicans trying to wrest control of the White House this November.

"There's no compromise here," said GOP presidential hopeful Rick Santorum, a Catholic and favorite among religious conservatives. "They are forcing religious organizations, either directly or indirectly, to pay for something that they find is a deeply, morally, you know, wrong thing. And this is not what the government should be doing."

In several televised interviews, White House chief of staff Jacob Lew defended the latest plan as the best possible compromise to provide women access to contraceptives and respect the religious freedoms of employers. Churches had always been exempt under Obama's

original plan, although religious-affiliated organizations were not.

"We didn't expect to get universal support of the bishops or all Catholics," he said. "I think that what we have here is a policy that reflects bringing together two very important principles in a way that's true to the American tradition?"

Sen. Roy Blunt, R-Mo., has called Obama's revised plan an "accounting gimmick." He introduced legislation last week that would exempt any organization with moral objections from providing birth control. McConnell said he expects such a bill would be vetoed by the president but that he still wanted a vote "as soon as possible."

House Budget Committee Chairman Rep. Paul Ryan said there were enough votes in the Republican-controlled House to pass similar legislation.

"If this is what the president's willing to do in a tough election year, imagine what he will do in implementing the rest of his health care law after an election," Ryan, R-Wis., told ABC News "This Week."

Lew shrugged off questions about Senate legislation, predicting that they would not "come to pass" and that the president planned to move ahead with implementing the current plan.

Super PACs are the 'New Normal'

The following editorial appeared in the *Chicago Tribune* on Thursday:

One of the surprising things about this year's Republican presidential race is how long it's gone on and how competitive and unpredictable it's been. What's different this year?

It's not just the candidates or the political climate. It might just have something to do with the fact that there are more ways for citizens to spend and contribute money to help candidates they like, or to hinder candidates they don't.

Newt Gingrich, who was pronounced terminal after Iowa and New Hampshire, came back to win in South Carolina through strong debate performances — and a big ad campaign by a so-called super PAC, Winning Our Future, that got millions in contributions from casino tycoon Sheldon Adelson.

A pro-Mitt Romney super PAC, Restore Our Future, spent some \$15 million to help the former Massachusetts governor turn the tables in Florida.

This is all part of the new political landscape that emerged following the Supreme Court's 2010 ruling in *Citizens United v. FEC*. The justices held that corporations and unions have a First Amendment right to engage in "electioneering communications." The super PACs and other advocacy groups have proliferated and prospered partly because of that decision.

President Barack Obama strongly criticized the verdict, and this week, his campaign said he opposed "unlimited special-interest money" in politics and "favors action — by constitutional amendment, if necessary — to place reasonable limits on all such spending."

This week, though, also brought word that administration officials will help raise money for a pro-Obama super PAC, Priorities USA Action, to counter the GOP groups in the coming months. Some of his allies

found the president's change of course disheartening.

But what's so terrible about the infusion of so much money into the presidential campaign? The political action committees' main function is one at the heart of democracy: spreading information and arguments that voters may find useful in casting their votes.

The Supreme Court noted in 1976 that "virtually every means of communicating ideas in today's mass society requires the expenditure of money. ... The electorate's increasing dependence on television, radio, and other mass media for news and information has made these expensive modes of communication indispensable instruments of effective political speech." Limits on spending function as restrictions on speech.

No one, after all, has accused super PACs of bribing voters. All the candidates and their supporters can do is get their message out and hope citizens are persuaded.

Critics warn that lavishly funded groups will be able to drown out everyone else, assuring victory for their candidates. But Romney and Gingrich have both proven the limited utility of money.

It enabled them and their allies to get out their messages — about themselves and about the other guy — but in this week's contests, both got their heads handed to them by Rick Santorum. Ron Paul has attracted a significant share of voters despite being financially outgunned.

The effort to prevent money from finding its way into the political process has proven itself over and over to be a fool's errand. Each time laws have been passed to regulate the flow of cash, candidates and advocates have devised methods to get around the rules.

Many people find the cacophony of claims and counter-claims this year distracting and disturbing. But raucous and harsh though it may sometimes be, it's the sound of democracy.

Will Super PACs Ruin Politics?

The following editorial appeared in the *Los Angeles Times* on Thursday:

We don't know whether President Obama watches "The Colbert Report" but if so, he must have felt a sense of déjà vu when he endorsed a supposedly independent "super PAC" that will air advertising on his behalf. You may remember the show: To comply with campaign finance law, Stephen Colbert, a mock candidate for president, transferred control of his super PAC to pal and business partner Jon Stewart. Hilarity ensued because supposedly there would be no coordination between Colbert and his buddy.

Now Obama has done almost the same thing, despite his longtime opposition to massive special-interest spending in political campaigns. His decision to embrace Priorities USA Action, a political action committee founded by two former aides, is as much an indictment of campaign finance regulation as of an incumbent president who decided to take full advantage of provisions that Republicans have successfully exploited.

In theory, super PACs are independent of campaigns, consistent with Supreme Court decisions drawing a distinction between contributions made directly to campaigns, which can be limited because of their potential for "quid pro quo corruption," and independent expenditures, which supposedly pose less of a threat of such corruption. Campaigns are forbidden to coordinate strategy with independent groups, but it's understandable that some voters are skeptical when they see that the super PACs supporting Newt Gingrich and Mitt Romney — and now Obama — have been organized by former aides. You don't have to believe in telepathy to recognize that they will be attuned to the campaigns' strategies.

Even worse, the Federal

Election Commission has made it possible for campaigns and candidates to raise money — up to \$5,000 per donor — for super PACs and even attend PAC functions. Obama is expected to dispatch Cabinet members as well as campaign officials to PAC gatherings. His top aides have made it clear that they hope wealthy individuals will contribute large sums beyond what they are allowed to contribute directly to the campaign. This may not qualify under the law as coordination, but it gives the lie to the assertion that the campaigns and the super PACs are entities unto themselves.

The Supreme Court was naive in believing that most independent expenditures would be hermetically sealed off from campaigns. It was also too sanguine in concluding that independent expenditures pose less of a potential for corruption or the appearance of corruption than direct contributions to campaigns. Ironically, disclosure of the names of super PAC contributors — a concession to transparency that we support — puts a candidate on notice about who is serving his interests whether there is coordination or not, and can therefore help put the candidate in the contributors' debt.

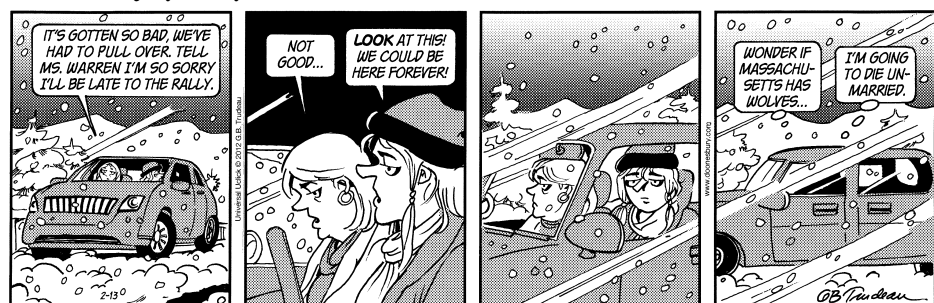
What can be done about all this? Some opponents of the *Citizens United* decision, which allowed unions and corporations to spend unlimited funds on election-related advocacy, are pushing for a constitutional amendment that would in effect overturn it. That's not something that's likely to happen soon. In the near term, the FEC or Congress should tighten the definition of "coordination," forbidding any contact between campaigns and PACs. It also would be refreshing (though we don't actually expect it to happen) if candidates who decry the influence of special-interest money withheld their blessing from groups that purport to be independent.

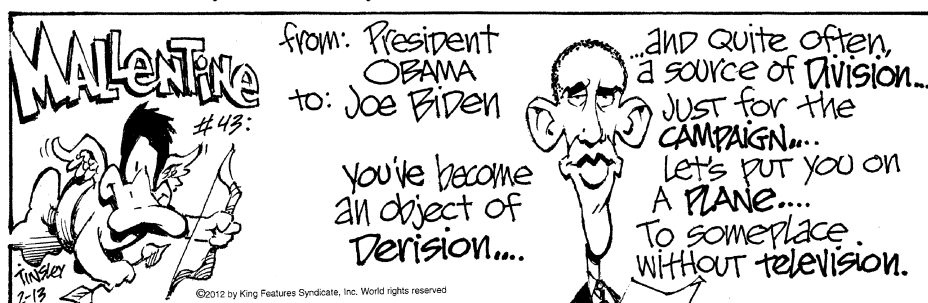

Investigators Seek Answers to Houston's Death

LOS ANGELES • Investigators worked Sunday to piece together what killed Whitney Houston as the music industry's biggest names gathered for a Grammy Awards show that at times felt as much like a memorial as a celebration. Coroner's officials say they will not release any information on an autopsy performed Sunday at the request of police detectives investigating the singer's death. The singer was found in the bathtub of her room at the Beverly Hilton Hotel, but Assistant Chief Coroner Ed Winter declined to say anything more about the room's condition or any evidence investigators recovered.

unsuccessful and the singer was pronounced dead shortly before 4 p.m. He said he could not comment on the condition of Houston's room or where she had been found.

Meanwhile, Houston's daughter was transported by ambulance to a Los Angeles hospital Sunday morning and later released. A source close to the family who did not want to speak given the sensitivity of the matter said she was treated and released for stress and anxiety. Bobbi Kristina Brown, 18, who is Houston's daughter from her marriage to singer Bobby Brown, had accompanied her mother to several pre-Grammy Awards events last week.

"At this time, we ask for privacy, especially for my daughter, Bobbi Kristina," Bobby Brown wrote in a statement released about an hour after she was transported from the hotel. "I appreciate all of the condolences that have been directed towards my family and I at this most difficult time."

He said there were no obvious signs of trauma on Houston's body, but that officials were not ruling out any causes of death until they have toxicology results, which will take weeks to obtain.

Beverly Hills Police Lt. Mark Rosen said that his agency may release more details Monday about Houston's death, but it will depend on whether detectives feel comfortable releasing any information.

A member of Houston's entourage found the 48-year-old singer unresponsive in her hotel room at the Beverly Hilton Hotel on Saturday, just hours before she was supposed to appear at a pre-Grammy gala.

Rosen said there were no indications of foul play when Houston was found by a member of her entourage. Paramedics tried to revive Houston, but were

Sunday's Grammys featured a musical tribute by Jennifer Hudson, whose version of Houston's most famous hit, "I Will Always Love You," ended with Hudson's personal note, "Whitney, we love you." Early in the show, LL Cool J introduced a clip of a glowing Houston at the 1994 Grammys singing her signature ballad, the most downloaded song for much of Sunday on iTunes.

Houston herself won six Grammys and had been expected to perform at the pre-awards gala Saturday night thrown by music impresario Clive Davis, her longtime mentor.

As Houston's Death Casts Shadow over Grammys, Adele Rolls In Awards

LOS ANGELES • On an evening overshadowed by the shocking death of a singer who was once one of pop music's most radiant young stars, the pop stratosphere's latest bright light, 23-year-old British R&B-soul singer Adele, was lauded with Grammy Awards for cathartic music she channeled out of her own pain and despair.

Adele delivered the biggest album of 2011 with "21," her sophomore outing that explored various facets of a painful romantic breakup, and scored the year's biggest single, "Rolling in the Deep," in which the singer reaches to the depths of heartache to find solace and hope.

Those qualities ultimately eluded Whitney Houston, who died Saturday at age 48 on the eve of the Grammy show, after struggling for more than two decades with drug abuse and other issues. She died just hours before she had been scheduled to attend the annual pre-Grammy party hosted by Clive Davis, the veteran music executive who had discovered Houston and signed her to her first record contract nearly three decades ago and guided her to superstardom with soaring hits including "I Will Always Love

You," "Saving All My Love for You" and "Greatest Love of All"

Host LL Cool J opened the show — after Bruce Springsteen & the E Street Band played their latest single, "We Take Care of Our Own" — with a prayer for "our fallen sister," saying it was appropriate to proceed with an award show because "the power of music is what brings us all here." That segued into an upbeat Bruno Mars performance of "Runaway Baby."

The first Grammy of the

prime-time show went to Adele for her song "Someone Like You," selected best pop solo performance, upping her total to three early on, including two pre-show awards. "I shouldn't start getting emotional already," Adele said. "I'd like to thank Dan Wilson, who I wrote this song with. My life changed when I wrote this song ... and being that this is a vocal award, I should thank my doctors. I suppose, who brought my voice back," a reference to the vocal cord microsurgery she underwent after canceling significant chunks of her 2011 tour.

She then won a fourth award, song of the year, for "Rolling in the Deep."

Adele's blockbuster success with music that reaches broadly across age, racial and stylistic differences made her an ideal candidate for multiple Grammys, handed out annually by the Recording Academy, the music industry organization whose membership includes musicians, producers, engineers, managers, record company officials and others.

She was nominated for six awards, including album of the year for "21" and record of the year for "Rolling in the Deep." Rapper Kanye West leads the nominations with seven and, with Jay-Z, took the rap performance award

for their collaboration "Otis." Presenter Marc Anthony said the hip-hop kingpins were not able to attend and, with co-presenter Fergie, accepted the statuette for them.

The Foo Fighters and Bruno Mars tied Adele at six nominations, with rapper Lil Wayne and electronica artist Skrillex right behind at five apiece.

The Foo Fighters, who played their nominated song "Walk," collected four of the six possible Grammys before the evening's ceremony began, during the pre-show awards that cover about 90 percent of the winners for rock album, hard rock or metal performance for the track "White Limo," rock song for "Walk" and long-form video for "Foo Fighters: Back and Forth" before adding a fifth with the rock song award for "Walk."

"This is a special record for our band," Dave Grohl said. "Rather than go to the best studio in Hollywood ... we made this in my garage with a microphone and a tape machine. ... This award shows the human element of making music is the most important thing. It's not about being perfect or sounding absolutely correct. It's about what goes on in here (gesturing to his chest), not what goes on in a computer."

TRIAL SET FOR HONEYMOONER'S DIVING DEATH

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. • A dream honeymoon to scuba dive on Australia's Great Barrier Reef turned into a terrible nightmare, and the horror is about to play out years later in a courtroom in Alabama.

An Alabama man who already served prison time in Australia after pleading guilty to a reduced charge in the death of his bride goes to trial Monday, accused of murdering her for insurance money. Tina Thomas Watson drowned during a scuba dive on the reef just days after her wedding in October 2003.

Gabe Watson is charged with capital murder — which normally is punishable by death — but faces life in prison without parole if convicted because of a deal the state made years ago with Australian officials to guarantee his return to the U.S.

Tina Watson's father said the family has endured eight years of delays and disappointments getting to the trial date.

"It's been a traumatic, excruciating ordeal," said Tommy Thomas, of suburban Helena.

Watson, 34, and Tina met in college. They wed and went to Australia to dive — a trip prosecutors claim Watson meticulously planned so he could kill the 26-year-old

woman and make it seem like an accident.

Watson is accused of killing Tina Watson by turning off her air supply and bear-hugging her as she drowned while diving on a shipwreck in 2003. Don Valeska, an assistant state attorney general handling the case, argues Watson killed the woman believing he could collect on a modest life insurance policy.

Originally charged with murder in Australia, Watson avoided a jury trial there by pleading to a charge of manslaughter and serving 18 months for not doing enough to save his wife. He was an experienced diver; she was a novice.

The defense will argue during the trial that Tina Watson's death was an unintended, horrible mishap. One of Watson's lawyers said the man — who is free on bond and has remarried — was anxious to get the trial started.

"He's nervous. He's ready to get this trial behind him so he can be a free person," defense lawyer Joseph Basgier said after a hearing last month.

The state has subpoenaed people from as far away as Australia and California to testify about what happened that day on a dive boat called the Spoilsport, but it's unclear how many will take the stand.

Induced Labor Lets Dying Texas Man See Daughter

DALLAS • Diane Aulger was about two weeks from her delivery date when she and her husband decided there was no time to wait: Mark Aulger had only days to live, and he wanted to see his child.

Diane Aulger had her labor induced and gave birth to their daughter on Jan. 18. When tiny Savannah was placed in his arms, Mark Aulger "cried, and he just looked very sad," his wife said. He died five days later from complications related to his cancer treatment.

The 52-year-old Texas man was diagnosed with colon cancer in April. He had surgery and, as a precaution, six months of chemotherapy, Diane Aulger said. With no signs of cancer showing up in follow up tests, the treatment seemed successful.

Then in November, Mark Aulger began having trouble breathing. By Jan. 3, he was sick enough to go to the emergency room. His wife said he was told the chemotherapy had caused him to develop pulmonary fibrosis, which causes scarring and thickening in the lungs.

Initially, the Aulgers were hopeful.

"He thought he'd be coming home in a few days with an oxygen tank," said Diane Aulger, who lives in The Colony, about 25 miles north of Dallas.

But on Jan. 16, the doctor delivered more bad news: Mark Aulger's condition was fatal. When Diane Aulger asked how long her husband had, the response was a sobering five or six days.

"Mark said, 'I'd like to see the baby,'" the 31-year-old mother told The Associated Press on Sunday.

Their baby was due Jan. 29, and Diane Aulger had planned a natural childbirth, but when the doctor suggested an induced labor, she immediately agreed. She was al-

ready experiencing pre-labor symptoms, and they scheduled the birth for Jan. 18.

Hospital staff arranged for the Aulgers to share a large labor and delivery room. "Our beds were side by

side," Diane Aulger said. Mark Aulger held his daughter for about 45 minutes after she was born.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. • Al Jefferson had 21 points and a season-high 15 rebounds, and Gordon Hayward added 23 points as the Utah Jazz snapped a three-game losing streak with a 98-88 victory over the Memphis Grizzlies on Sunday night.

Hayward shot 8 of 12 from the field, part of a 51 percent shooting performance by the Jazz on the night. Paul Millsap finished with 16 for Utah, shooting 7 of 11. Raja Bell had 10 points.

Rudy Gay led Memphis with 22 points, while Mike Conley (six assists) and Marc Gasol scored 17 apiece.

Utah's lead was only 69-66 heading into the final period, but the Jazz were 12 of 16 from the field and caused six Memphis turnovers in the final period to pull away.

Utah was able to pull

away in the fourth quarter by not only forcing Memphis into turnovers, but getting to the rim on offense. On three occasions out of the halfcourt set, Derrick Favors was able to score on alley-oop dunks.

That and Hayward's outside shooting helped Utah rebuild its lead to 93-84 with 2:40 left. At that point, Memphis had no answer.

Utah built an early lead and carried a 46-40 advantage into intermission.

Memphis got off to a terrible start, missing its first eight shots, and was still shooting 2 of 11 as Utah built an early double-digit lead, eventually reaching 13 points.

Memphis would score the last eight points of the opening quarter to get back in the game.

But the misfiring continued for Memphis in the half as the Grizzlies shot 35 percent for the first two quarters.

Boys basketball district play begins in earnest this week, and some good teams are certain to have their seasons end earlier than planned.

While the state's girls are busy crowning a champion this weekend in Boise, boys across the Gem State will be playing in district tournaments, positioning themselves for a run at and entry into their respective state tournaments, which run March 1-3.

Some races in District IV promise chills and thrills, while others appear to be more predictable. About the only guarantee is that some very good teams will fall short of their goals and dreams of playing for a state title. Who will advance and who will stay home? Let's take a look ...

Class 4A (1.5 bids)

This is the most predictable of the five area district tournaments. Twin Falls and Jerome have established themselves in another class, with third-place Burley losing all four games to the Bruins and Tigers. The Bobcats

only broke 40 points once against the league's front-runners and lost by an average of 16 points per game.

"They have excellent post players and that's where we're lacking," Burley coach Jack Bagley said.

As for Canyon Ridge, Minico and Wood River, they combined to win just 12 games this year, or one less than Burley. Top to bottom, no team earned a victory against another team above it in the league standings all season long.

But that means little according to Jerome coach Joe Messick.

"When you get to the district tournament, everyone has to understand it's a

brand new season," Messick said. "Teams have to come prepared ready to play every night because any team can knock you off at any time."

This tournament begins Tuesday, with Canyon Ridge hosting Minico, and Wood River traveling to Burley.

Class 3A (1 bid)

Lefty Gets It Right at Pebble Beach

Phil Mickelson — not Tiger — routs field in final round for 40th PGA Tour victory.

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. • He knew his game was getting close, and he broke through with flair Sunday in the Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

That turned out to be Phil Mickelson, not Tiger Woods.

In a big, big way.

Mickelson went from a six-shot deficit to a two-shot lead in just six holes, closed with an 8-under 64 for a two-shot victory over Charlie Wi and gave Woods a Sunday thrashing not many saw coming.

Mickelson and Woods played in the second-to-last group, and Mickelson beat him by 11 shots. He won for the fourth time at Pebble Beach, and became only the ninth player in PGA Tour history with 40 wins.

"Pebble Beach ... it feels awesome no matter what number it is," Mickelson said.

It was anything but that for Woods, who was reduced to a supporting role on a cool, overcast day along the Pacific. Right when it looked as though Woods might still be in the game after

Nickname Wars Prolonged for UND

FARGO, N.D. • More than two months after the University of North Dakota officially dropped its divisive nickname, the public address announcer at a women's basketball game welcomed it back with a familiar roar: "Here come your Fighting Sioux!"

Last week's return was bittersweet for some supporters of the moniker, re-

portedly born some 80 years ago from anonymous letters to a student newspaper but since decried as racist by many American Indians and the NCAA.

The nickname was resurrected after residents generated 17,000 signatures seeking to put the issue to a statewide vote. As part of that process, a since-repealed state law requiring the school to use the nickname went back

into effect — even though the university, the state Board of Higher Education and local lawmakers want it gone.

However, in this decades-old controversy that has endured seven years of legal and political maneuvering, the moniker's supporters are hoping to pull out a last-ditch victory.

"I'm passionate about this," said Doug Samuelson, 36, of Minot, who signed the

petition before a Disney On Ice show in Bismarck. "I guess I feel it's never been a race issue. I always thought it was more about pride than anything else."

Other North Dakota residents, some of whom even back the nickname, have grown weary of the decades-old debate. Steve Huber, a UND graduate, said he did not sign the petition and will vote no on the referendum.

There is a certain amount of intrigue surrounding Buhl, which recently returned 6-3 guard Kade Crossland from an absence of several games due to an ankle injury. Kimberly also returns a key cog in Kevin Brady. But will those additions be enough to beat Filer?

"They have so many players who can flat-out score," Buhl coach Dan Winn said. "You stop a couple of their kids and they've got a couple more who can take it to the rack or shoot it."

While Filer is favored to win this district, memories of last year's tournament in which top-seeded Buhl was upset by Kimberly are a reminder that nothing is guaranteed. And to further underscore that point, Kimberly lost its opening district game before winning three straight to earn a spot in the state tournament.

"One of us has to chal-

lenge Filer," Winn said, referring to Kimberly as well. "I think one of us can. We were the No. 1 seed last year and got upset, so anything can happen. But Filer is the obvious favorite."

Class 2A (1.5 bids)

Even Valley, which won the Canyon Conference by a game over Declo and whose 16-2 record was bested only by Twin Falls in the region, is not a heavy favorite to win this district. Declo handed the Vikings one of its two losses with a 65-61 decision on Jan. 31, and lost by just a point at Valley.

Gooding, which lost to Valley by three points in its regular season finale, split its meetings with Declo, winning by a deuce on its home court while losing by nine at Declo. Tonight, Declo hosts Gooding, with the winner of that game almost certain to play Valley.

Wendell went 1-17 and winless in conference play and is the only team that

safely can be labeled as non-threatening. The Trojans travel to Valley tonight.

Class 1A Division 1 (2 bids)

This division got a jump on the rest of the area with opening-round games on Saturday, and early returns suggest what was thought all along — this race is wide open. Glens Ferry had the best overall record among the eight teams at 14-6. Grace was the only team that went undefeated in league games, posting a 6-0 record in the Snake River Conference's South Division. Shoshone has one of the league's top scorers in Garrett Sant. And Hansen, which went 4-18 last year, has already more than doubled its win total this year to 10-9 and could triple it with a deep run in district play.

All four of those teams won their district opener, but perhaps none as impressively as Hansen, a 77-49 winner against Challis. Sant had 23 points in the Indians'

victory against Oakley, while Grace and Glens Ferry shook off shaky first quarters to dominate Raft River and Hagerman, respectively.

Class 1A Division II (2.5 bids)

It was the third straight week on tour that the winner started the final round at least six shots behind a 54-hole leader going after his first tour victory.

The shocker, though, was how Woods fell apart.

He has been taking big strides with his game over the past few months, and he looked poised to break through after a 67 in the third round at Pebble Beach got him to within four shots of the lead.

But he failed to make birdie on the easy opening stretch at Pebble Beach, and even when he made his first birdie at the par-5 sixth, Mickelson poured in a 20-foot eagle putt to take the outright lead.

"I didn't hit it as bad as the score indicated, but I putted awful," Woods said. "As good as I felt on the greens yesterday, I felt bad today. Anything I tried to do wasn't working. Consequently, I made a ton of mistakes on the green."

Two weeks ago in his 2012 debut at Abu Dhabi, Woods was tied for the lead with unheralded Robert Rock going into the final round and didn't break par, tying for third.

Woods used to own Mickelson, but that changed at the 2007 Deutsche Bank Championship. This was the fifth straight time Mickelson

posted the better score when playing in the same group as Woods in the final round.

Mickelson has won three of those tournaments, although they have yet to be in the final group on those occasions.

Mickelson started his season sluggishly, failing to crack the top 25 at the Humana Challenge and Phoenix Open, and missing the cut at Torrey Pines. He said his putting was as good as ever, and it was a matter of getting his game in sync.

It simply sang on Sunday, mostly his amazing touch on the greens — a long eagle putt at No. 2 that caught part of the hole, long two-putts for par and enough birdies to make him a winner at Pebble Beach again.

"It feels just amazing," Mickelson said. "I felt like my game was there, but coming out the first couple of weeks, I posted some horrendous scores and started to question it. To be able to play the way I did the last 18 holes really means a lot."

Mickelson finished at 17-under 269 and earned \$1.152 million for his first win since the Houston Open last year. He will move to No. 11 in the world.

Ricky Barnes closed with a 67 and finished third. Kevin Na tied for fifth and earned a spot in the Match Play Championship in two weeks at Arizona.

Unfortunately, there's nothing perfect about Tiger Woods anymore.

He used to threaten to make history every time he teed off. Now he just makes excuses, and they all sound the same.

He says he's at peace with himself, and that may well be true. Put him in a red shirt on Sunday, though, and the demons seem to all come back.

It happened last time out in Dubai, when a mop-haired Englishman who had won only one time in his career stared him down in the final round. It happened again on Sunday at Pebble Beach, where he seemed to be trying so hard not to fail that he gave himself no chance to succeed.

Phil Mickelson blew by him like Woods was playing in the pro-am instead of teeing it up with the big boys. Things got so bad you almost wanted him to move up to the forward tees, where at least his amateur partner Tony Romo was finding some success.

He walked up the 18th fairway to the cheers everyone expected when the day began. But they were for Mickelson, who had walked ahead of him after stiffing a wedge to the final green.

It got worse. Mickelson was already in the hole for his final round 64 when Woods lipped out one final short putt for a big, fat 75. He could have — make that should have — putted out before Mickelson to avoid the final embarrassment, but Woods never really practiced the proper etiquette for finishing out of contention.

For what seems like forever now we've been asking what's wrong with Tiger. Now the question becomes what's wrong

with Tiger on Sunday?

The record books will show he lost by nine shots in a tournament he trailed by only two on the final day. Even worse, he was thrashed by Mickelson, his playing partner, by a stunning 11 shots.

Say what you will about his game getting so much better that he has been in contention in his four more recent tournaments. This would have never happened to the Tiger Woods of old.

He didn't always win on Sundays, even if it seemed that way. But he was never blown out the way Mickelson disposed of him on a course where he was once untouchable.

"Anything I tried to do wasn't working," Woods said. "What was frustrating was I had a chance, all I had to do was get off to a good, solid start today and I didn't do that."

Actually, the start wasn't all that bad. It was the middle, where Woods missed two short putts in a row and made three bogeys in a row that destroyed what little chance he had left. By then his body language had conceded defeat, even if he hadn't.

To put his round in perspective, only four of the 68 players who teed off on the final day shot worse. On a day Pebble Beach was there for the taking, Woods got taken.

"I didn't hit it as bad as the score indicated, but I putted awful," he said. "I just couldn't see my lines. I couldn't get comfortable."

For those keeping score at home, he hasn't won a real tournament (I don't count the 16-man invitational he hosts and won in December, though Woods does) in 27 months; hasn't won on the PGA Tour in 29 months. It's been nearly four years since he won his last major at Torrey Pines, and he's now 36 with a history of knee issues.

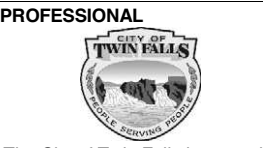

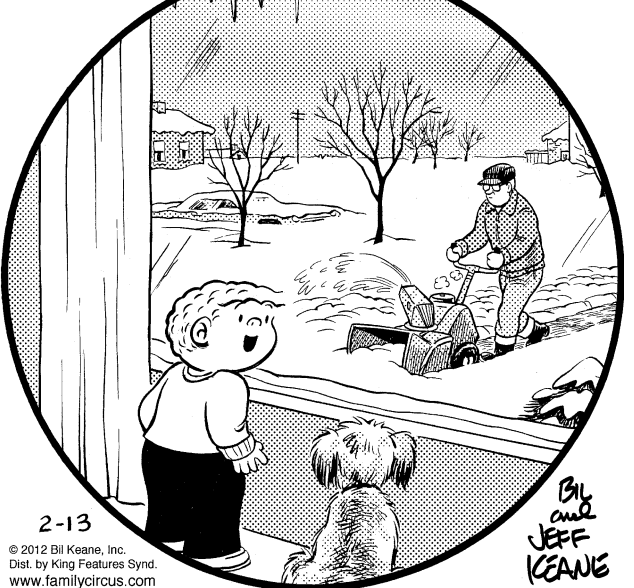

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

To mark the fact that the NEC championships are taking place now, all this week's deals come from last year's event in Yokohama. A field of 64 teams reduces to eight, using a Swiss Teams formula, with a knockout event to follow. The field normally includes up to 16 of the world's stronger teams and a contingent of local Japanese squads.

In today's deal, game was bid and made seven times — eight if you count the result of three spades doubled making nine tricks by one East-West pair. David Bakhshi of England as South was one of the careful declarers who brought home three no-trump via a nice exercise in counting.

North, David Gold, did not think he had enough for a vulnerable pre-empt. However, his delayed route into the auction persuaded his partner to take a shot at the no-trump game.

West led a high club spot to East's ace for a shift to the spade nine, covered by the 10 and won by West's jack.

West now went back to clubs, leading declarer to conclude that the spades were 4-3 and that West had started with five clubs, else East would surely have continued the suit at trick two or put in the queen at trick one.

That being so, Bakhshi cashed the heart ace and king, and when West showed out, he knew to take the diamond finesse against West rather than to play for the drop, since West had to have three diamonds to make up his 13 cards.

ANSWER: Your partner cannot have five spades or he would have acted already. So the choice is to lead your top club (hoping to hit the jackpot) or to play for partner to come through with unexpected length in one of the red suits. Leading through dummy looks like a better chance to me. If so, there may well be a case for leading the heart jack rather than a small card, unorthodox as that might appear.

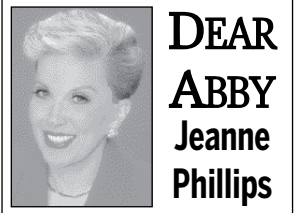
