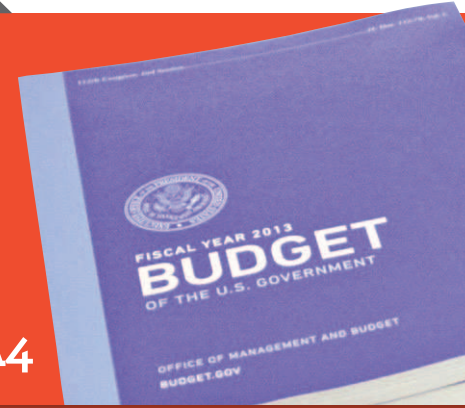

Rupert Man Charged with T.F. Park Murder

Damon Azure refused to cooperate with jail personnel Monday, one day after he was accused of murdering his brother.

TWIN FALLS • One man is dead and another charged with murder after a Sunday incident near Twin Falls Park, along the Snake River Canyon north of Kimberly.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies were called to 3500 E.

4070 N. at about 11:20 a.m. Sunday to check on a report of a possible vehicle-pedestrian accident. When they arrived, they found a man lying in a pool of blood.

The victim was later identified as Seanachan Joe Azure, 31. He was dead, shot in the forehead, mouth, and several times in his torso.

Deputies say the man's brother,

32-year-old Rupert resident Damon Wayne Azure, was sitting in a brown Ford Taurus near the body. Deputies said they recognized the vehicle from an earlier pursuit in Cassia County.

After ordering Damon Azure leave the car, deputies say he began to drive toward the body in the road and then tried to leave the scene. One deputy began to use his vehicle to ram the Taurus in an attempt to push the vehicle into a barrow

pit. Three deputies removed Azure from the vehicle while he continued to resist, even after he was shocked with a stun gun several times.

At that time, deputies said they found an empty speed loader used for a large-caliber revolver in Damon Azure's pocket.

According to deputies, a .44 Magnum handgun with rounds in the cylinder was found in the car. In total, deputies found five .44 Mag-

num shells, two live .44 Magnum rounds and several live .22 caliber rounds when they searched Damon Azure, court documents state.

Damon Azure was scheduled to be arraigned Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court, but court employees said he refused to leave his cell or speak with a court-appointed attorney. The arraignment has been rescheduled for 1 p.m. today.

3 Charged in Jerome Shooting

A Jerome man is accused of aggravated assault for allegedly shooting at a crowd gathered outside a Jerome bar early Sunday morning.

JEROME • Communicating through a court interpreter, three suspects faced a judge on Monday for their alleged roles in Sunday's early morning shooting incident in Jerome.

Rogelio Mendoza, 43, was arraigned on charges of felony aggravated assault and misdemeanor restricting or obstructing officers. Jerome police say he fired multiple shots from a handgun at 1:22 a.m. Sunday, outside of the La Oficina bar at 160 W. Main St.

Mendoza is held in Jerome County Jail on \$2,500 bond, along with \$50,000 bond for an earlier arrest warrant and immigration hold.

Jerome Police Chief Dan Hall said no injuries were reported in the shooting, but witnesses said Mendoza fired multiple rounds near a

Chief Pike, One Year In

Twin Falls' top cop hopes to make continued strides in promoting a positive presence in the community by his department.

TWIN FALLS • Nearing the completion of his first year as Twin Falls' top cop, Police Chief Brian Pike feels a little like a bureaucrat some days.

"Sometimes I don't feel like a police officer," he said. "Those days when I can come in and put on a

gun belt and jump in a car are rare?" Pike misses walking into a school and changing a child's life, or solving a person's problem in the field. But he's now solving problems on a different level.

"You never stop working (as a chief)," he said. "You never stop thinking what can we change or how can we do a better job?"

Pike believes the department has made great strides in his first year on the job, but sees room to move ahead. In his earlier years in law enforcement, Pike was part of a group dubbed Fifth Squad, a group of five officers committed

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Xavier Administrators to Step Down Next Month

The charter school's board will then decide whether to hire a part-time principal, or leave three 'lead teachers' in charge.

TWIN FALLS • Since October, two retired school superintendents have been tasked with leading Xavier Charter School.

Now, interim administrators Mel Wiseman and Kelly Murphy are gradually transitioning out of their positions at the Twin Falls public charter school.

Wiseman said they'll be done with manag-

ing day-to-day operations around the time of the school's spring break, at the end of March.

They're stepping down, he said, because Xavier's operations are stable and with a new leadership structure, senior staff members — not consultants — should be in charge.

"The things that make this school go will be handed out to the educational leadership team," Wiseman said, noting he and Murphy will still be available to provide help if needed.

A new leadership structure was put into place in late January with the start of the school's second semester.

In line with Xavier's European, classical approach to education, there are now three "lead teachers" — Becky Baird, Thad Biggers and

Tiffanie McAllister — who are direct supervisors for the other teachers.

Wiseman said class schedules were restructured this semester to give lead teachers at least two open class periods per day to tackle administrative responsibilities.

School Board Chairwoman Debbi Burr said there's a lead teacher available to handle administrative needs every hour of the school day.

"From my viewpoint, I think it's going really well," she said.

For now, school officials haven't decided whether to hire someone for a "Head of Schools" position — essentially, a principal.

A couple of months ago, board members were preparing to advertise a part-time position. But Burr said they're holding off to see how the new leadership structure works. Also, Biggers has administrative credentials already and has filled in as school administrator in the past. After giving the new

leadership team time to settle in, Burr said the board will decide in March whether to hire an administrator. The school pays Wiseman and Murphy \$6,000 a month, a contract worked out in October. They replaced former principal Everett Borgardner, who resigned this fall after the school board voted to fire him due to policy and procedural violations.

crowd before fleeing the scene in a vehicle. "We are charging him with aggravated assault, indicating we believe he was using force against people, likely to cause great bodily harm," Hall said. The vehicle witnesses reported seeing the suspect leave in was later found at a residence at 527 W. D St., touching off a nearly nine-hour standoff that started at about 2:30 a.m. The home's residents willingly surrendered to police when officers made contact from outside the house, and told police that Mendoza and two other people were in the residence. Hall said it's unclear how the residents knew the suspects, but he believes at least one "had some knowledge of these people." Multiple attempts to contact the suspects in both English and Spanish were unsuccessful, and at 9 a.m., officers assisted by Twin Falls County's tactical unit entered the house. A female suspect, later identified as Ayde Demara-Lozano, 50, was found hiding in the home. She was arrested and later arraigned Monday on a misdemeanor charge of resisting or ob-

structing officers. A male suspect, Edgar Salazar-Francisco, 23, was also taken into custody and arraigned on the same charge. Like Mendoza, Salazar has an immigration hold. Salazar was found hiding in the house's attic. Hall said police unsuccessfully attempted to use tear gas in his arrest. Police say they found Mendoza in another room and took him into custody without incident, also retrieving a weapon. Each suspect was appointed a public defender and will appear in court for April 16 pretrial hearings, with bond set at \$2,500. Separately, Mendoza is scheduled for a Feb. 24 preliminary hearing for his aggravated assault charge. According to online court records, none of the suspects have significant criminal histories in Idaho. Hall said Jerome police were aided greatly by Jerome County sheriff's deputies, along with officers from Twin Falls County, Idaho State Police and the Twin Falls Police Department. "All the agencies were very helpful, and it was a good example of when a major incident happens, how we work together," Hall said.

T.F. Won't Conduct New Salary Survey

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls City Council members voted Monday to have city officials update a previous survey of employee salaries rather than grant funding for an entirely new survey. City Manager Travis Rothweiler requested \$12,500 for an outside company to analyze the city's pay and benefits. The funding would be taken from the city's human resources budget. Rothweiler said he was asking for a new survey because the last survey — which was conducted in 2010 — was not entirely conclusive. "I'm asking for us to take a look at where we rank," Rothweiler said. "I firmly believe for the city of Twin Falls to be competitive, we need to look at all aspects at how we attract and recruit employees." However, many of the council members expressed serious concerns about

BOISE • Rep. Bert Stevenson, R-Rupert, confirmed Monday that he will not seek a ninth term in the Idaho House. Stevenson is chairman of the House Resources and Conservation Committee. He announced that he would not run again at the Twin Falls Lincoln Day celebration on Saturday night. Stevenson told the *Times-News* last week that he hadn't yet decided if he would seek re-election. While Minidoka County needs a voice in the legislature, he said, he wasn't sure if he wanted to run against his friends. Had he decided to file, Stevenson would have run against incumbents Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, or Rep. Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, for one of the two House seats in the new District 27. Both Bedke and Wood have said they plan to seek re-election.

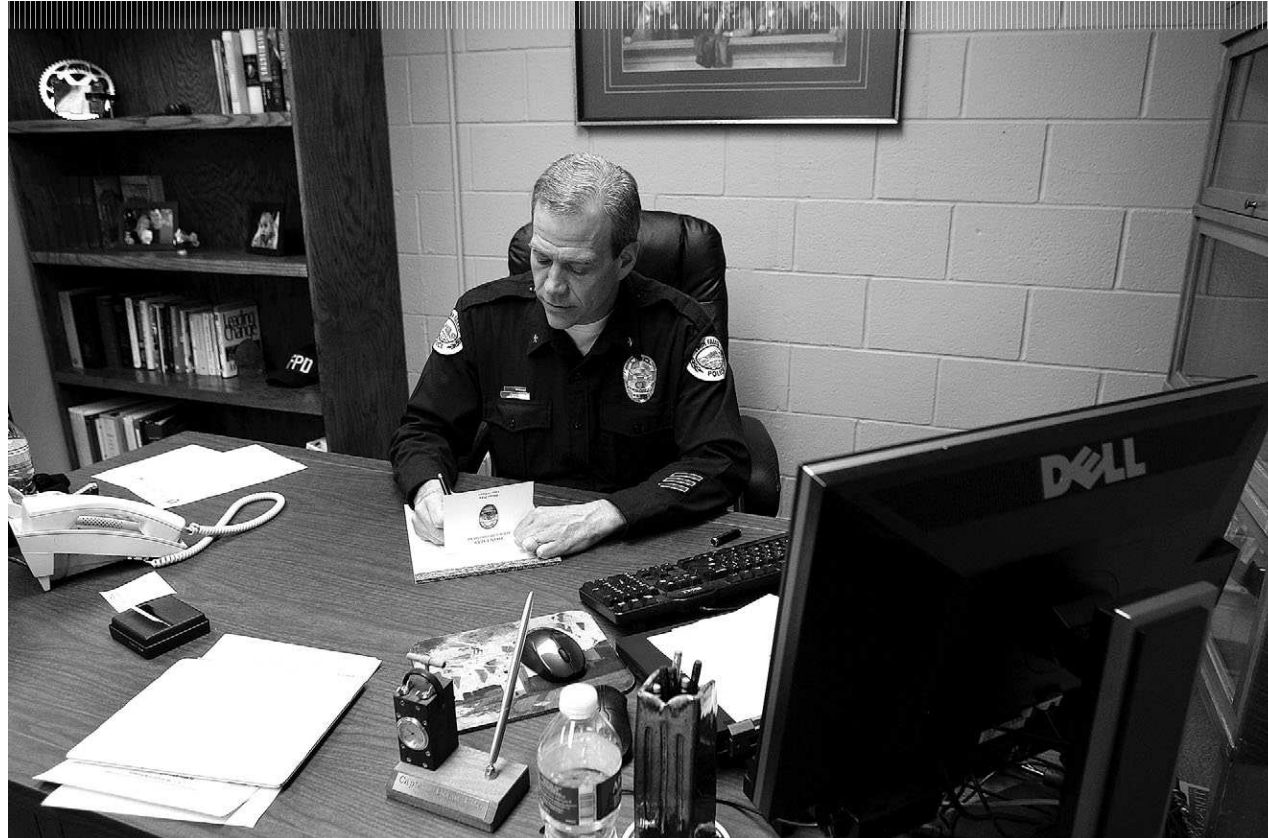

to crime prevention. Now only one TFPD officer maintains the role, something Pike would like to change. It's important for the public to see officers in positive situations, he said, not just during traffic stops or arrests. "I don't want it to be us versus them," he said. Officers work well with the public when they feel like they hold a stake in the police department and the community, Pike said. But good officers can be difficult to retain. Though officers know they won't get rich in law enforcement, Pike said he wants them to have other reasons to stick around than pay, such as a good work environment. It doesn't make sense to train officers for two or three years

just to have them leave for a better-paying police department, he said. "You don't want to be a training ground," he said. "And I think we're better than that." Pike has also tried to avoid hiring what he calls "mercenaries." "They'll probably do OK, but they have no ownership," he said. People who have some ties to the community make better officers, he added. Despite the constant training, Pike likes bringing new blood in to the department and seeing them raise their right hand as they swear to uphold their oath of office. "We all remember that

day," he said. As a reminder of why each officer joined law enforcement, throughout 2012 Pike is presenting each of his officers with their original oath of office they signed when sworn in, mounted on a plaque. On days when they're feeling unappreciated, Pike hopes officers will look to that oath as a reminder of why they're police and let them know others recognize the commitment they've made. "It's going back and saying, this is what it's all about," he said. With about 70 sworn officers consistently comprising the department over the past few years, Pike said he feels comfortable with its size.

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Legislation Would Encourage Donations to Veterans' Nonprofit

BOISE • Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, wants to reward supporters of a veterans' rehab group.

Her legislation, House Bill 488, would give tax credits to people who donate to Sun Valley Adaptive Sports, which serves veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injuries and other conditions related to their service. On Monday, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee voted to send the legislation to the full House after shrinking the size of the tax credit and tweaking how it would appear in tax code.

Jaquet's original bill would have given a credit of up to \$500 for individuals and \$5,000 for corporations that donate to the organization. The section of tax code the incentive would have fallen under expires in 2015.

Rep. Marv Hagedorn, R-Meridian, spoke in support of the legislation, pointing out that many veterans need extra help transitioning into civilian society.

"These folks are very proud and are very hesitant to call anybody," Hagedorn said.

Rep. Ken Roberts, R-

Donnelly, was concerned the incentive fell in the wrong category of the tax code. He pointed out that other organizations in that section were directly tied to the state's general fund, including colleges, universities and the Idaho State Historical Society. Non-profit organizations, such as Magic Valley Rehabilitation Services, are listed in another section.

"I'm certainly supportive of an income tax credit because I think the work that's being done is worthy to be done," Roberts said. "But I highly recommend we put it in the right section of the code."

The committee agreed with Roberts, voting to send on the bill with an amendment that would move it to the section with nonprofits.

After the meeting, Jaquet said despite the section change, she was happy with the move. While the incentive is lower — a maximum of \$100 for individuals and \$1,000 for corporations — it has no sunset clause and won't expire in 2015 like it otherwise would have.

"(Sun Valley Adaptive Sports) will get a lower credit, but it still will get a credit, so that's good," Jaquet said.

He is also charged with resisting or obstructing officers, along with a weapons enhancement.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's Capt. Tim Miller said Azure continued to be uncooperative at the Twin Falls County Jail and deputies hadn't been able to take a mug shot of him to complete the booking process on Monday. Damon Azure is currently being checked on regularly and monitored by video, Miller said.

"The biggest thing is the safety of the prisoner and safety of personnel," he said.

Both Azure brothers have criminal histories in Idaho, according to online court records. Damon Azure has been convicted of burglary, drug charges and unlawful possession of a weapon, among other charges. Seanachan Azure was convicted of aggravated battery in Cassia County. He had also been convicted of a drug charge, domestic violence and several alcohol-related charges.

President Obama's 2013 Budget: Government Still Getting Bigger

The plan states \$4 trillion in deficit savings over the next decade, but most of it would be through tax increases Republicans oppose, less war spending and last year's budget cuts.

WASHINGTON • Taking a pass on reining in government growth, President Barack Obama unveiled a record \$3.8 trillion election-year budget plan Monday, calling for stimulus-style spending on roads and schools and tax hikes on the wealthy to help pay the costs. The ideas landed with a thud on Capitol Hill.

Though the Pentagon and a number of Cabinet agencies would get squeezed, Obama would leave the spiraling growth of health care programs for the elderly and the poor largely unchecked. The plan claims \$4 trillion in deficit savings over the coming decade, but most of it would be through tax increases Republicans oppose, lower war costs already in motion and budget cuts enacted last year in a debt pact with GOP lawmakers.

Many of the ideas in the White House plan for the 2013 budget year will be thrashed out during this year's election campaigns as the Republicans try to oust Obama from the White House and add Senate control to their command of the House.

"We can't just cut our way into growth," Obama said at a campaign-style rally at a community college in the vote-rich Northern Virginia suburbs. "We can cut back on the things that we don't need, but we also have to make sure that everyone is paying their fair share for the things that we do need."

Republicans were unimpressed. While the measure contains some savings to Medicare and Medicaid, generally by reducing payments to health providers, both programs would double in size over the coming decade.

"It seems like the president has decided again to campaign instead of govern and that he's just going to duck this country's fiscal problems," said House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan, R-Wis.

By the administration's reckoning, the deficit would drop to \$901 billion next year — still requiring the government to borrow 24 cents of every dollar it spends — and would settle in the \$600 billion-plus range by 2015. The deficit for the current budget year, which ends Sept. 30, would hit \$1.3 trillion, a near record and the fourth straight year of trillion-plus red ink.

Obama's budget blueprint reprises a long roster of prior proposals: raising taxes on couples making more than \$250,000 a year; eliminating numerous tax breaks for oil and gas companies, and approving a series of smaller tax and fee proposals. Similar proposals failed even when the Democrats controlled Congress.

The Pentagon would cut purchases of Navy ships and F-35 Joint Strike Fighters — and trim 100,000 troops from its rolls over coming years —

while NASA would scrap two missions to Mars.

But there are spending increases, too: The Obama plan seeks \$476 billion for transportation projects including roads, bridges and a much-criticized high-speed rail initiative. Grants for better performing schools would get a big increase under Obama's "Race to the Top" initiative, and there would be an \$8 billion fund to train community college students for high-growth industries.

Republicans accused the president of yet again failing to do anything meaningful to reduce deficits that could threaten the country with a European-style debt crisis unless they are wrestled under control.

As a political document, the Obama plan blends a handful of jobs-boosting initiatives with poll-tested tax hikes on the rich, including higher taxes on dividends and income earned by hedge fund managers. That would allow Obama to draw a contrast with GOP front-runner Mitt Romney, whose personal fortune and relatively low tax rate would be an issue in the general election campaign.

Another contrast with Republicans will come on Medicare, the enormously popular health care program for the elderly. Obama leaves the program mostly alone, while Republicans are on record in favor of gradually replacing the current system in which the government pays doctor and hospital bills with a voucher-like plan that would have government subsidize purchases of health insurance.

Nor does Obama tackle Social Security's fiscal imbalance. Payroll taxes paid into the program fall well short of what's needed to cover benefits; the shortfall is made up by

appear headed for deadlock over big-picture questions such as Medicare cuts and tax hikes, there's still the work of filling in the details of last summer's budget and debt pact, which set tight caps on annual appropriations bills funding the day-to-day operations of government.

Those caps are putting most agencies in a pinch, though the Department of Veterans Affairs would win a 4.5 percent increase, the Energy Department would get a 3.5 percent hike, while Treasury gets a 4.2 percent boost reflecting increases for the IRS.

The Pentagon, which had grown used to budget increases well in excess of inflation until recently, would absorb its first outright budget cut since the post-Cold War "peace dividend" of the early 1990s, including cuts to major weapons systems, fewer combat ships and the reduction in troops.

The budget for medical research at the National Institutes for Health would be frozen after years of reliable increases and the Environmental Protection Agency would bear a 4 percent cut after coming under assault by Republicans for two consecutive budget cycles. Special education grants to schools would be essentially frozen.

On taxes, Obama proposes allowing the Bush-era tax cuts to expire at the end of this year for families making \$250,000 or more per year.

Obama, as he has in the past, also proposed limiting tax deductions taken by the wealthy and would also put in place a rule named for billionaire Warren Buffett that would seek to make sure that households making more than \$1 million annually pay at least 30 percent of their income in taxes.

Obama would also impose a new \$61 billion tax over 10 years on big banks aimed at recovering the costs of the financial bailout and providing money to help homeowners facing foreclosure. The proposal also would raise \$41 billion over 10 years by eliminating tax breaks for oil, gas and coal companies.

Panetta Defends Slimmed-down Budget Plan, Says Congress Must Show It's Serious about Cuts

WASHINGTON • Defense Secretary Leon Panetta is defending his department's slimmed-down, \$614 billion budget plan, telling senators that it's time to step up and show they are serious about reducing the deficit. In testimony prepared for a Senate Armed Services Committee hearing Tuesday, Panetta is warning lawmakers that budget cuts will hit all 50 states. But he says the reductions have been carefully planned and there is little room for changes. Panetta and Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, can expect to meet resistance from lawmakers who have expressed reservations about gutting defense and eroding the country's national security. The proposed defense budget for the year beginning Oct. 1 includes \$525.4 billion in base spending and another \$88.5 billion for the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq. The total is nearly \$32 billion less than this year's budget.

Police: Whitney Houston Was Underwater When Found in Hotel Tub

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. • Whitney Houston was underwater and apparently unconscious when she was pulled from a Beverly Hills hotel bathtub, and she had prescription drugs in her room, authorities said Monday. Two days after her death, Houston's body was taken to a small, Los Angeles-area airport to be flown to New Jersey, where her family was making arrangements for a funeral at the end of the week. An autopsy was done Sunday, and authorities said there were no indications of foul play and no obvious signs of trauma on Houston's body. It could be weeks, however, before the coroner's office completes toxicology tests to establish her cause of death. The 48-year-old singer had struggled for years with cocaine, marijuana and pills, and her behavior had become erratic. Houston was found Saturday at the Beverly Hilton Hotel by a member of her staff about 3:30 p.m., just hours before she was supposed to appear at a pre-Grammy Awards gala, police Lt. Mark Rosen said.

House GOP Has Backup Plan to Extend Payroll Tax through 2012 While Talks Remain Stalled • In an abrupt about-face, House GOP leaders announced Monday that they are willing to extend the 2 percentage point cut in the payroll tax through the end of the year and add the approximately \$100 billion cost to the nation's \$15 trillion-plus debt. House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, Majority Leader Eric Cantor, R-Va., and GOP Whip Kevin McCarthy of California said the House could vote on the payroll tax measure this week, but that the fate of unemployment benefits for millions of the long-term jobless and efforts to forestall a scheduled cuts in fees to doctors who treat Medicare patients would remain in the hands of a House-Senate ne-

gotiating panel that's looking for ways to pay for them.

Bombers Target Israeli Diplomats in India, Georgia; 4 People Wounded in New Delhi Blast: Israel blamed Iran on Monday for bomb attacks on its diplomats' cars in India and Georgia, heightening concerns that the Jewish state was moving closer to striking its archenemy. Iran denied responsibility for the attacks that appeared to mirror the recent killings of Iranian nuclear scientists that Tehran blamed on Israel. The blast in New Delhi set a car ablaze and injured four people, including an Israeli Embassy driver and a diplomat's wife; the device in Georgia was discovered and safely defused. "Iran is behind these attacks and it is the largest terror exporter in the world," Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu told lawmakers from his Likud Party.

help offset the funding loss for the Department of Fish and Game that would come with the passage of Boyle's proposal. Boyle said she didn't work with Gibbs on his legislation, but acknowledged that her bill would take money from the department.

The House Resources and Conservation Committee voted to print both bills.

Idaho Appellate Court Upholds Battery Conviction

BOISE • The Idaho Court of Appeals says there was nothing wrong with the court testimony identifying a man who was found guilty of stabbing two people in a gang fight.

Lazarus Salazar was convicted of two counts of aggravated battery after Canyon County prosecutors said he was responsible for the stabbings outside a Nampa grocery store nearly three years ago. He was sentenced to up to 37 years in prison for the crimes, but appealed, contending that the jury was unfairly swayed by the testimony identifying him on a security videotape and that his sentence was excessive.

Salazar argued the prosecution's decision to use a police officer to identify him on the tape — instead of a lay person — prejudiced the jury. The appellate court rejected his claims in a ruling handed down Monday.

The criminal case focused on a fight between two rival gangs outside a Nampa gro-

cery store nearly three years ago. The fight was caught on the store's video surveillance system, and after reviewing the security videos, police determined that Salazar was the man who committed the stabbings.

But Salazar contended the police detective who testified during the trial about Salazar's identity on the video tape wasn't any more qualified to identify him than the jury themselves would have been. Using the officer to make the identification was prejudicial, Salazar said, because it may have made the testimony — which anyone could have given — seem more valuable because it came from a police officer.

A lower court judge said the testimony was appropriate because the officer had interacted with Salazar once before, and because the prosecutor said Salazar had since changed his appearance, gaining weight, no longer shaving his head and sporting a full mustache instead of a goatee.

The appellate court agreed, finding that Salazar's complaint amounted to little

more than an assertion that the jury believed the detective, and that it was detrimental to his case.

The appellate court also rejected Salazar's claim that his 15- to 37-year sentence was excessive. Salazar was 23 at the time of the offenses and was a gang member, the court noted.

"For one so young, Salazar has amassed a significant criminal record, including convictions for aggravated battery (twice), carrying a concealed weapon, resisting or obstructing officers, eluding an officer (twice), and disturbing the peace," Judge Karen Lansing wrote for the three-judge panel.

Salazar first stabbed someone when he was just 14, the court said, and had only been out of prison for a month when he committed the 2009 stabbings.

"This record shows Salazar to be exceptionally violent and dangerous, and undeterred by a previous imprisonment," Lansing wrote. "It does not show that his sentences for the present aggravated batteries are excessive."

Lawmakers Muzzle Bill Naming Blue Heeler as State Dog

BOISE (AP) • Lawmakers have rejected a bill that would have declared blue heelers the official state dog of Idaho.

Republican Rep. JoAn Wood of Rigby introduced the measure Monday, bringing with her a constituent from Challis who testified blue heelers were the perfect choice for Idaho, with their trustworthy, loyal, independent and brave qualities.

Challis resident Elise Fake also touted the cattle-herding canine as a common fixture on Idaho ranches. But the proposal failed to win over the House State Affairs Committee, where Republican Rep. Ken Andrus offset praise of the dogs by pointing out he had lost sheep to blue heelers.

Other lawmakers on the panel were simply reluctant to favor one group of dog enthusiasts over another.

The committee voted 8-11 to ditch the proposal.

Minor Injuries in Sunday Crash North of Hansen

Beaugard swerved his 2001 Chevrolet Tahoe in an attempt to avoid the collision, but hit the north-turning 2005 Volvo driven by Abel Arteaga, 46, of Rupert, as it crossed in front of him. Both men were wearing seat belts, and were treated for minor injuries at the scene and released.

The crash blocked both lanes of the highway for about 2 1/2 hours. It remains under investigation.

U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador Announces Re-election Bid

BOISE (AP) • U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador officially announced his bid for re-election, saying he wants to continue to work to limit the reach of the federal government.

The Republican Labrador was surrounded by about 30 state lawmakers on the Idaho Capitol steps for Monday's announcement.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, who served three terms in Congress in the same 1st District seat as Labrador, lauded the first-term rep-

resentatives efforts — even though the two fought bitterly in 2009 over Otter's unsuccessful attempt to increase Idaho's gas tax and automobile registration fees.

At the time, Labrador was a state representative.

Democratic candidate Jimmy Farris, a former professional football player from Lewiston, previously announced he would try to unseat Labrador.

Farris has run a low-key campaign and has yet to complete his website.

Santorum, Romney plan Idaho stops this week.

Santorum, the former senator from Pennsylvania, has free, public stops planned in Coeur d'Alene and Boise today. Santorum will visit Coeur d'Alene's Hagadone Event Center from noon to 2 p.m. and Boise's Capital High School from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., according to the Idaho Republican Party.

Romney, the former governor of Massachusetts, is scheduled to appear at noon Friday in Boise for a private fundraiser at The Grove Hotel, party officials said. Jonathan Parker, executive director of the Idaho Republican Party, said GOP officials' decision to push the party's presidential nominating contest forward in the calendar this year has generated signifi-

cant political buzz and led to the interest among candidates.

"I think (the earlier date) has everything to do with the presidential candidates' visits this week," Parker said. "For those candidates looking to solidify their status as a front-runner or who are closely trailing behind this year, Idaho is a real great prize."

Previously, Idaho's presidential nominating contest was held in May, often after the race was a foregone conclusion.

Although Idaho will control just four electoral votes in November's general election, 32 delegates for this summer's Republican National Convention are in play in Idaho on Super Tuesday. The number of delegates each state holds for the GOP contest frequently changes, but Idaho holds a greater number than states such as Iowa, New Hampshire and Nevada because of party history and the GOP's control of the Legislature.

A new Gallup poll released Monday found that Romney and Santorum are locked in a statistical dead heat. The poll found 32 percent of respondents prefer Romney, while 30 percent favor the surging Santorum. Newt Gingrich's support slumped to 16 percent, while Ron Paul received support from 8 percent.

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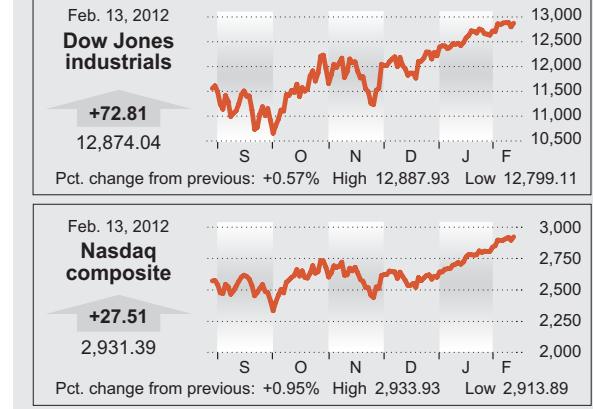

NEW YORK (AP) • Investors shook off their worries about Greece on Monday and got back to their routine of little-by-little gains. The Dow Jones industrial average climbed 73 points — nothing flashy, but enough to regain most of what it lost with an 89-point drop on Friday. Before that, stocks enjoyed a slow, steady climb this year. The Dow closed up 72.81 points, or 0.6 percent, at 12,874.04. It's 16 points shy of its highest close since the 2008 financial meltdown. Apple's Market Capitalization • Apple's stock broke above \$500 for the first time Monday. It was the latest step in a rally that began more than two weeks ago, when the company reported staggering sales and profits for the holiday quarter. The shares hit \$503.83 soon after opening, before subsiding to \$502.60 in after-hours trading. That was up \$9.18, or 1.9 percent, from Friday's close. Apple Inc. and Exxon Mobil Corp. have been vying for the position as most valuable company in the world since last summer, but the latest rally has made the gadget maker 17 percent more valuable than the oil company. Its market capitalization is now \$465 billion, compared to Exxon's \$400 billion.

Study: Idaho Is Fertile Ground for Embezzlers

BOISE (AP) • An investigation firm's study of large-scale employee thefts shows Idaho ranks seventh in the U.S. for risk of embezzlement. Marquet International of Wellesley, Mass. released the report on major embezzlement cases in January. The company reviewed 473 cases of employee thefts in 2011. All the thefts werth in \$100,000 or more, and they represented as much as \$354 million in losses. Chris Marquet told the *Idaho Statesman* that Idaho's high ranking is likely because of the trusting nature of the state's many family-run businesses. He said Vermont topped the risk list for the same reason. "Small businesses are the ones at greatest risk because, typically, they have very little infrastructure or controls. There's no budget for it," Marquet said. "Or no perceived need. The business owner ends up relying on a single bookkeeper for 15 years." Analysts generally expect the level of fraud or embezzlement to be proportional to the state's economic output. Marquet says Idaho's rate is more than two times higher than expected. Still, Idaho doesn't have a large number of big cases: Marquet counted three in 2009, seven in 2010 and six in 2011. Some of the court cases have not concluded. In terms of the number of cases, California had the most with a total of 63 cases of embezzlement over \$100,000. Michigan and Pennsylvania were tied for a distant second, with 28 cases each. The state with the largest estimated overall loss was New York, with \$48.9 million. The Empire State also topped the list for highest average lost per case, \$2.4 million. The study showed that most major embezzlements went on for years, with the average scheme lasting nearly five years. The median loss was \$340,000, and forged or unauthorized checks accounted for more than 38 percent of thefts.

U.S., E.U. Clear Google's \$12.5B Motorola Mobility Bid

The blessings mean Google Inc. just needs to clear a few more regulatory hurdles before it can take control of Motorola Mobility Holdings Inc. and expand into manufacturing phones, tablet computers and possibly other consumer devices for the first time. Google is counting on Motorola Mobility's more than 17,000 patents — a crucial weapon in an intellectual arms race with Apple, Microsoft and other rivals to gain more control over smartphones, tablets and other mobile devices. The Justice Department ended a six-month review of the deal after concluding it won't stifle competition in the mobile device market. European regulators reached the same conclusion. In granting its approval, though, the European Union raised concerns about Motorola's aggressive enforcement of its patents. EU Competition Commissioner Joaquín Almunia said regulators will "keep a close eye on the behavior of all market players in the sector, particularly the increasingly strategic use of patents." Google still needs government approvals in China, Taiwan and Israel. The main concerns are believed to revolve around Google's Android operating system, free software that now powers more than 250 million mobile devices made by a variety of manufacturers, including Motorola Mobility. Competition could be hurt if Google gives Motorola Mobility the most advanced versions of Android or withholds the mobile software from other cellphone makers. Google, though, has pledged to make Android available to all its mobile partners. Even if Google were to discriminate, cellphone makers still could rely on mobile software from Microsoft Corp., Research in Motion Ltd. and Hewlett-Packard Co., among others. Almunia said in a statement Monday that EU regulators didn't believe the deal would diminish competition. "This is an important milestone in the approval process and it moves us closer to closing the deal," Don Harrison, Google's deputy general counsel wrote in a blog post. Without setting a specific timetable, Google has expressed confidence it will be able to take over Motorola Mobility early this year. It already has been six months since Google announced plans to buy Motorola Mobility, which has been struggling as Apple's iPhone and other smartphones made by rivals such as Samsung Electronics overshadowed its line of products.

Rates Rise at Weekly Treasury Auction

WASHINGTON (AP) • Interest rates on short-term Treasury bills rose in Monday's auction to the highest levels since late last summer. The Treasury Department auctioned \$33 billion in three-month bills at a discount rate of 0.095 percent, up from 0.08 percent last week. Another \$31 billion in six-month bills was auctioned at a discount rate of 0.13 percent, up from 0.10 percent last week. The three-month rate was the highest since

three-month bills averaged 0.115 percent on Aug. 1. The six-month rate was the highest since these bills averaged 0.150 percent, also on Aug. 1. The discount rates reflect that the bills sell for less than face value. For a \$10,000 bill, the three-month price was \$9,997.60, while a six-month bill would equal \$9,993.43 that sold for an annualized rate of 0.097 percent for the three-month bills and 0.132 percent for the six-month bills.

Reagan's Overlooked Legacy: Decency

Every Republican presidential candidate claims to be the heir to Ronald Reagan's legacy. For years, Republican partisans have carried Reagan's memory before them as the ancient Israelites carried the Ark of the Covenant. Just invoking his name proved your ideological purity, and would smite the dreaded RINO (Republican in name only).

Problem is, those who most fervently claim to adhere to Ronald Reagan's principles don't seem to understand Reagan's greatest principle: decency.

Ronald Reagan practically has been deified as a small government, anti-tax, pro-life, all-American conservative who never compromised his principles. Like the Gipper he played in the movies, Reagan surely would have liked to score a touchdown on every play. But if he could only get the three yards in a cloud of dust, he would take it to get another first down on the way toward attaining his goals.

Ronald Reagan signed legislation that legalized abortion in California six years before Roe v. Wade. He did so because he saw that legalized abortion would come to California, either with or without his signature. To stand pat on his “principles” would have meant the legislature would have written a far more liberal bill and passed it over his veto. By staying engaged, Reagan stayed relevant and was able to negotiate the bill more to his terms.

When Reagan became president, he inherited a dispirited military — the “hollow force” — that had been gutted, disrespected and left to decay after the Vietnam War. He vowed to return America's pride and strength, and rebuild our military.

Rebuilding the military was hugely expensive. His budget needed to be passed by House Speaker Tip O'Neill and the Democrat-controlled Congress. Reagan had to support the Democrats' priorities if he wanted his priorities funded. It meant deficit spending and in 1986 led to a substantial tax hike.

Americans saw one of the biggest peacetime expansions of the federal government since World War II. But we also gained the finest military the

world has ever seen, which helped prompt the fall of the Berlin Wall and the collapse of the Soviet Union.

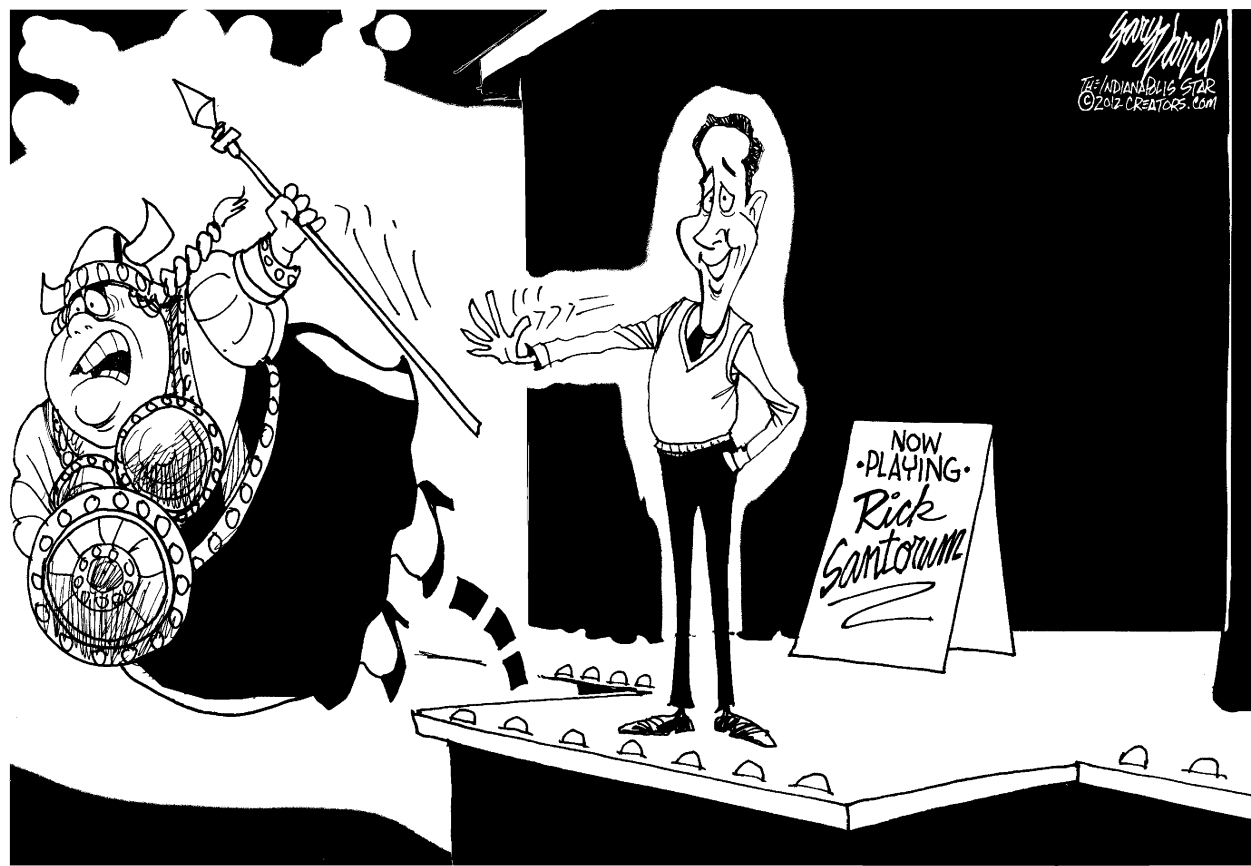
President George W. Bush was savaged by some in his own party for his attempt to create a guest worker program and a more rational path to citizenship for immigrants. Yet many of those same critics, who lionize Ronald Reagan's “True North Principles,” conveniently forget that Reagan initiated an amnesty for millions of illegal immigrants.

Today, we have Republican presidential candidates attacking the free market, private enterprise and the capitalists who invest in America. One demands a halt to immigration. Others spent years on Capitol Hill or as K Street lobbyists while portraying fellow candidates as “career politicians.” All of them claim to be the true heirs to Ronald Reagan's legacy, even as they violate Reagan's “11th Commandment”: “Thou shalt not speak ill of a fellow Republican.”

As a politician, Ronald Reagan was a clear-eyed practitioner of realpolitik. He worked with Republicans and Democrats alike to achieve his goals, and he would take half a loaf over nothing. He knew the limit of presidential power in our constitutional democracy and respected it.

As a man, Reagan had a sunny optimism and faith in the goodness of his fellow Americans. While his political opponents disagreed with him over policy, he did not consider them his enemies. He viewed them as his fellow citizens, and right or wrong, he valued them. He was a true gentleman.

If Republicans want to honor his legacy, we should remember the man he really was — not the myth we've created to advance our personal interests. If we can emulate the decency, civility, good will and patriotism that was Ronald Reagan — and live the 11th Commandment — we can truly honor him in the second century after his birth and make America that gleaming city on the hill that he dreamed of.

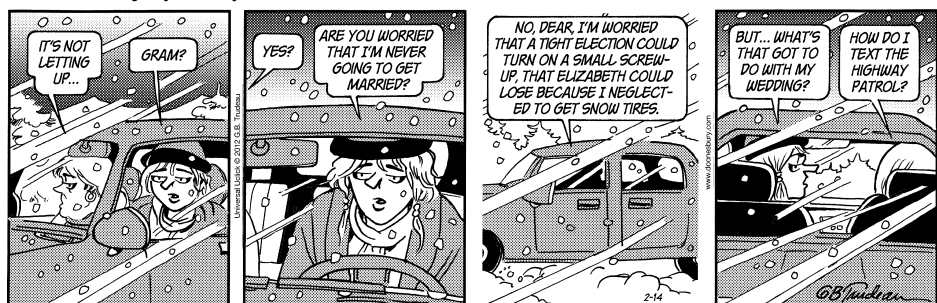

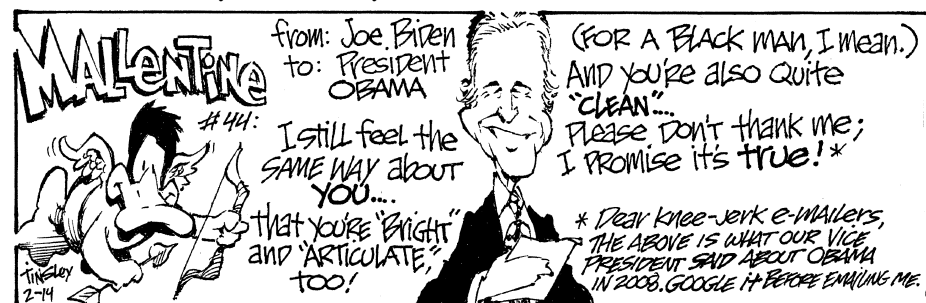

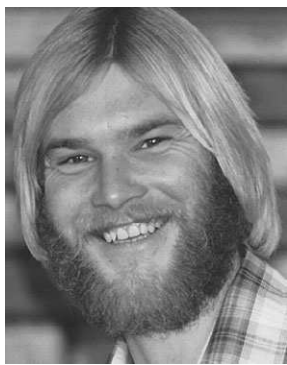

Feds: Mich. Militia Members Ready to Trigger Revolt

DETROIT • Displaying guns, vests and other military gear, a prosecutor told jurors Monday that members of a Midwest militia were willing "to go to war" in an extraordinary plot to kill a police officer as a springboard to a broader rebellion against the U.S. government.

Some of the evidence was placed directly in front of the jury box as trial opened for seven members of a group called Hutaree, who are charged with conspiring to commit sedition as well as weapons crimes.

Still, defense attorneys dismissed any talk by the defendants as little more than fantasy and equated the group more to a "social club" than a militia.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Christopher Graveline said the anti-government Hutaree was looking for some type of conflict to trigger an attack — maybe a traffic stop, a search warrant or a dispute between authorities and another militia.

"They wanted to start an armed confrontation. ... The war to them meant patriots rising up against the government," said Graveline, who held up automatic weapons and other items seized after nine people were arrested in southern Michigan, Indiana and Ohio in March 2010.

The defendants are accused of conspiring to someday ambush and kill a police officer, then attack the funeral procession with explosives and trigger a broader revolt against the U.S. government.

Graveline showed the jury a

video clip of leader David Stone declaring, "Welcome to the revolution." The government placed an undercover

agent inside the Hutaree and also had a paid informant. More than 100 hours of audio and video were recorded.

"They were ready, willing and able to go to war. They were preparing for war," the prosecutor said.

Man Gets 10 Years for Burglary During Funeral

countability. The homeowner reported \$2,000 in items were taken, including jewelry.

Prosecutors allege the burglary was planned by Wandler and Kimberly Dawn Phillips using a newspaper obituary.

Phillips was sentenced to 10 years with the Department of Corrections with five suspended for her role in the burglary.

Phillips and Wandler were ordered to pay joint restitution of \$2,077.

Feds Recover \$4.1B in Health Care Fraud in 2011

MIAMI • Federal authorities say they recovered \$4.1 billion in health care fraud judgments last year, a record high which officials on Monday credited to new tools for cracking down on deceitful Medicare claims.

The recovered funds are up roughly 50 percent from 2009. Attorney General Eric Holder and Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius were expected to make the announcement at a news conference today.

The Department of Justice and the Department of Health and Human Services told The Associated Press that agencies are doing a better job of screening providers before they get in the system and have beefed up enrollment requirements. Now investigators are conducting site visits to make sure moderate risk providers have a legitimate office. Higher risk providers are also subject to fingerprint and criminal background checks.

Authorities have long said the solution to solving the nation's estimated \$60 billion to \$90 billion a year Medicare fraud problem lies in vigorously screening providers and stopping payment to suspicious ones.

They also say it is important to end the antiquated system of paying the claims then chasing suspicious ones. By the time officials catch on to bogus billing patterns, crooks typically dump that provider ID and open a new one, or flee the country. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services has come under fire for lax screening as violent criminals and mobsters are also getting involved, seeing the fraud as more lucrative than dealing drugs and having less severe criminal penalties.

Halting Medicare fraud has become even more paramount as the scams that once bilked \$1 million or \$2

million a decade ago have morphed into sophisticated multimillion-dollar networks involving doctors, patient recruiters and patients.

"Fighting fraud is one of our top priorities and we have recovered an unprecedented number of taxpayer dollars," Sebelius said in a statement. "Our efforts strengthen the integrity of our health care programs, and meet the president's call for a return to American values that ensure everyone gets a fair shot, everyone does their fair share, and everyone plays by the same rules."

Federal health officials said Monday they are also doing a better job of sharing

data with other agencies.

Officials credited the spike in recovered funds in part to strike force teams set up in fraud hot spots around the country, including Miami, Detroit and Los Angeles.

The teams charged 323 defendants, who collectively billed the Medicare program more than \$1 billion last year. That includes a massive bust in February 2011, in which more than 100 doctors, nurses and physical therapists were charged with fraud in nine states. Stopping Medicare's budget from hemorrhaging that money will be key to paying for President Barack Obama's health care overhaul.

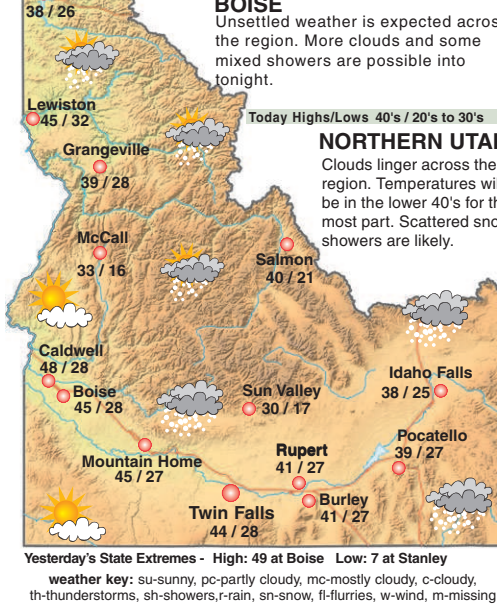

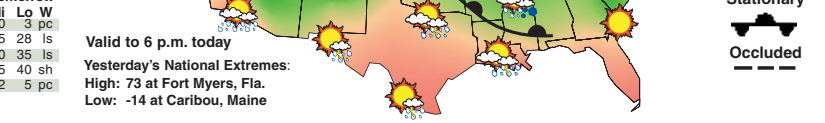

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF MINIDOKA IRRIGATION DISTRICT, MINIDOKA AND CASSIA COUNTIES, IDAHO, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF ASSESSMENT BONDS, SERIES 2012 IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$3,150,000, AND SERIES 2013 IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$1,400,000; PROVIDING FOR THE DATE, FORM, DESIGNATION, AND REGISTRATION OF THE BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF THE BONDS TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE BONDS BY THE ANNUAL LEVY OF ASSESSMENTS AGAINST ALL ASSESSABLE PROPERTY IN THE DISTRICT; ESTABLISHING FUNDS AND ACCOUNTS; PROVIDING FOR RELATED MATTERS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Minidoka Irrigation District, Minidoka and Cassia Counties, Idaho (the "District"), is an irrigation district duly organized and operating under and pursuant to Title 43, Idaho Code; and WHEREAS, the Board of Directors (the "Board") of the District, by adoption of a resolution on December 9, 2009, ordered a special election to be held within the District on February 2, 2010, for the submission to the electors of the District the question whether or not the District should be authorized to incur an indebtedness and issue the bonds of the District in a principal amount not to exceed \$14,750,000 for the purpose of financing the District's proportionate share of the costs of improvements to and rehabilitation of the spillway and head-works for Minidoka Dam on the Snake River and costs and fees related thereto; and

WHEREAS, at the special election, duly noticed, held, and conducted within the District on February 2, 2010, the requisite two-thirds majority of the qualified electors of the District approved the issuance of the bonds of the District for the foregoing purpose; and

WHEREAS, said special election, the issuance of bonds, the apportionment of benefits and assessments, and all other matters related thereto were duly confirmed by the District Court of the Fifth Judicial District of the State of Idaho, in and for the County of Minidoka, by Order duly entered on January 23, 2012, in Case No. CV 2011-1030, of said Court, all pursuant to and as required by Sections 43-406 through 43-408, inclusive, and Section 43-2204, Idaho Code; and

WHEREAS, the Board now deems it necessary and desirable to authorize the issuance and sale of the bonds of the District in the aggregate principal amount of \$4,550,000; and

WHEREAS, the United States of America, Department of Agriculture has offered to purchase the bonds of the District; and

WHEREAS, Sections 57-227 through 57-230, inclusive, Idaho Code, authorize the sale of bonds, including assessment bonds of irrigation districts, at private sale to the United States of America without prior publication of notice as may otherwise be required by law; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined to issue the bonds of the District in the form of two (2) fully registered, amortized bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$4,550,000 to the United States of America, Department of Agriculture.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF MINIDOKA IRRIGATION DISTRICT, Minidoka and Cassia Counties, Idaho, as follows:

Section 1: DEFINITIONS

As used in this Bond Resolution, unless the context shall otherwise require, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

Act means, collectively, Chapters 4 and 22 of Title 43 and Chapters 2 and 9 of Title 57, Idaho Code, as amended.

Board means the Board of Directors as governing body of the District.

Bonds mean, collectively, the Series 2012 Bond and the Series 2013 Bond.

Bond Fund means the Bond Fund established in Section 8 hereof.

Bond Register means the books for the registration and transfer of the Bonds pursuant to Section 6 of this Bond Resolution.

Bond Registrar means the District Treasurer as bond registrar, transfer agent, authenticating and paying agent for the Bonds, appointed and designated in Section 6 of this Bond Resolution.

Bond Resolution means this resolution, adopted on February 13, 2012, authorizing the issuance and sale of the Bonds.

Capital Improvement Fund means the fund by that name established in Section 8 hereof.

Chairman means the chairman or other presiding officer of the Board.

District means the Minidoka Irrigation District, Minidoka and Cassia Counties, Idaho.

Fiscal Year means the fiscal year of the District.

Registered Owner means the owner of a Bond whose ownership is registered upon the Bond Register.

Secretary means the secretary or other officer having custody of the official records of the District.

Series 2012 Bond means the Minidoka Irrigation District Special Assessment Bond, Series 2012, herein authorized to be issued, sold, and delivered in the principal amount of \$3,150,000.

Series 2013 Bond means the Minidoka Irrigation District Special Assessment Bond, Series 2013, herein authorized to be issued, sold, and delivered in the principal amount of \$1,400,000.

Treasurer means the treasurer of the District.

Section 2: PURPOSE OF BONDS

The Bonds are being issued for the purpose of paying the District's proportionate share of the costs of improvements to and rehabilitation of the spillway and head-works for Minidoka Dam on the Snake River, together with legal fees, engineering fees, and other fees and costs related to said improvements and to the issuance of bonds therefor (the "Project").

Section 3: DESCRIPTION OF BONDS

The Bonds, designated "Minidoka Irrigation District Special Assessment Bond, Series 2012," in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,150,000, and "Minidoka Irrigation District Special Assessment Bond, Series 2013," in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,400,000, are hereby authorized to be issued, sold, and delivered pursuant to the Act. The designation of each Bond is hereby authorized to be modified to accurately reflect the year of its delivery.

Each Bond shall consist of a single, transferable, amortized special assessment bond, substantially in the form annexed hereto as Exhibits "A" and "B", respectively, shall be issued in fully registered form, shall be dated as of its date of delivery, and shall bear interest on the unpaid balance at the lower of the rate charged by the United States of America at the time of the loan approval or at the time of loan closing.

Each Bond shall be payable in annual installments of principal and interest, with the first installment of principal and interest being due one year from the date of delivery of such Bond, and annually thereafter until maturity. Each Bond shall be executed by the manual signature of the Chairman, countersigned by the manual signature of the Treasurer, and attested by the manual signature of the Secretary.

Section 5: PLACE AND MANNER OF PAYMENT

Both principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America to the Registered Owner thereof, at the address of such Registered Owner as shown on the registration records of the District, or at such other address as shall be designated in writing to the District by the Registered Owner.

Section 6: BOND REGISTRAR

The Treasurer is hereby appointed as bond registrar, transfer agent and paying agent, and is herein referred to as the "Bond Registrar." The Bond Registrar shall keep, or cause to be kept, sufficient books for the registration and transfer of the Bonds. The Bond Registrar is authorized, on behalf of the District, to carry out all of the Bond Registrar's powers and duties under this Resolution.

C. Capital Improvement Fund. There is hereby established in the office of the Treasurer of the District a fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the District, known as the "Minidoka Irrigation District Capital Improvement Fund" (the "Capital Improvement Fund"), into which shall be deposited all of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds, except accrued interest, if any, which shall be deposited into the Bond Fund. The proceeds of the Bonds shall be used to pay for the costs of the Project, including, but not limited to, the reasonable and necessary costs of issuance of the Bonds. Monies in the Capital Improvement Fund may be invested in lawful investments until needed for the purposes for which the Bonds are issued. Any investment earnings shall accrue to and be used solely for the purposes of the Capital Improvement Fund. In the event there are funds remaining in the Capital Improvement Fund after all expenditures for improvements as set forth hereinabove, any surplus funds shall be deposited into the Bond Fund and used for the payment of principal of and interest on the outstanding Bonds as the same shall accrue.

D. Bond Fund. The proceeds of assessments levied to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds, together with other funds of the District made available for such purpose, as set forth in Section 9 of this Bond Resolution, shall be kept by the Treasurer in a special fund, which is hereby created, separate and apart from all other funds of the District, which is hereby designated the "Minidoka Irrigation District Special Assessment Bonds Bond Fund" (the "Bond Fund") or such other designation as shall conform to banking requirements and good accounting practices, which Bond Fund shall be used for no other purpose than the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same fall due. Monies in the Bond Fund may be invested in lawful investments until needed for the purposes of the Bond Fund, and all investment earnings shall accrue to and be used solely for the purposes of the Bond Fund. The Bond Fund shall be maintained by the Treasurer until the principal of and interest on the Bonds have been paid in full.

Section 9: COVENANTS AND UNDERTAKINGS

A. Levy of Assessments. In accordance with the provisions of Chapters 4 and 22 of Title 43, Idaho Code, as amended, there shall be levied on all assessable property in the District, in addition to all other assessments, a direct annual assessment in an amount sufficient, together with other lawfully available funds of the District made available for such purpose by the Board for such year, to meet the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds as the same mature.

Said assessments in each of said years shall be levied, assessed, certified, extended, and collected by the proper officers and at the times, all as fixed by law, and as other assessments are levied, assessed, certified, extended, and collected in, for and by the District and by the same officers thereof and are hereby appropriated for the purpose of paying the Bonds until the Bonds shall be fully paid.

Principal of or interest on the Bonds falling due at any time when the proceeds of said assessments or other funds may not be available shall be paid from other funds of the District and may be reimbursed from the proceeds of said assessments or other funds when said assessments or other funds shall have been collected. Said assessments and other funds duly designated for such purpose when collected shall be placed in the Bond Fund and shall be used for no other purpose than for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Bonds as the same become due, so long as the Bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the District from paying the interest on or the principal of the Bonds from any other funds in its hands and available for that purpose, or to prevent the District from levying any further or additional assessments which may be necessary to fully pay the interest on or the principal of the Bonds.

Section 10: REMEDIES

The Registered Owner of a Bond may, by appropriate legal action, compel performance of all duties required of the Board and the officials of the District by the provisions of Title 43, Idaho Code, and the provisions of this Bond Resolution. In the event that a Bond issued pursuant to this Bond Resolution is permitted to go into default as to the payment of principal and interest, and such default is not cured within thirty (30) days of its occurrence, the Registered Owner of the Bond may, pursuant to Section 43-2202, Idaho Code, apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for appointment of a receiver to collect and distribute the assessments pledged to the repayment of the Bond.

Section 11: PUBLICATION

Pursuant to Section 43-2202, Idaho Code, this resolution shall be published one (1) time in a newspaper of general circulation in the District. For a period of thirty (30) days from the date of such publication, any person in interest may file suit in any court of competent jurisdiction to contest the regularity, formality or legality of the proceedings authorizing the Bonds or the legality of this Bond Resolution and its provisions. After the expiration of such thirty (30) day period, no one shall have any right of action to contest the validity of the Bonds or the provisions of this Bond Resolution, or the validity of the pledges and covenants made in the Bonds or in this Bond Resolution, and the Bonds, this Bond Resolution, and the provisions made for the payment of the Bonds shall be conclusively presumed to be legal.

Section 12: SALE OF THE BONDS

The sale of the Bonds to the United States of America, in accordance with its Loan Approval Conditions pertaining to the Project, is hereby approved. The Chairman, Treasurer, and Secretary are, and each of them is, hereby authorized to do or perform all such acts as may be necessary or advisable to comply with the Loan Approval Conditions and to carry the same into effect.

Section 13: FURTHER AUTHORITY

The Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, and other officers of the District are, and each of them is, hereby authorized to do or perform all such acts and to execute all such certificates, documents, and other instruments as may be necessary or advisable to provide for the issuance, sale, and delivery of the Bonds and the fulfillment of the covenants and obligations of the District contained herein and therein.

Section 14: MISCELLANEOUS

A. Ratification. All proceedings, resolutions, and actions of the Board, the District, and their officers, agents, and employees taken in connection with the authorization, sale, and issuance of the Bonds are hereby in all respects ratified, confirmed, and approved.

B. Severability. It is hereby declared that all parts of this Bond Resolution are severable, and if any section, paragraph, clause, or provision of this Bond Resolution shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of any such section, paragraph, clause, or provision shall not affect the remaining sections, paragraphs, clauses or provisions of this Bond Resolution.

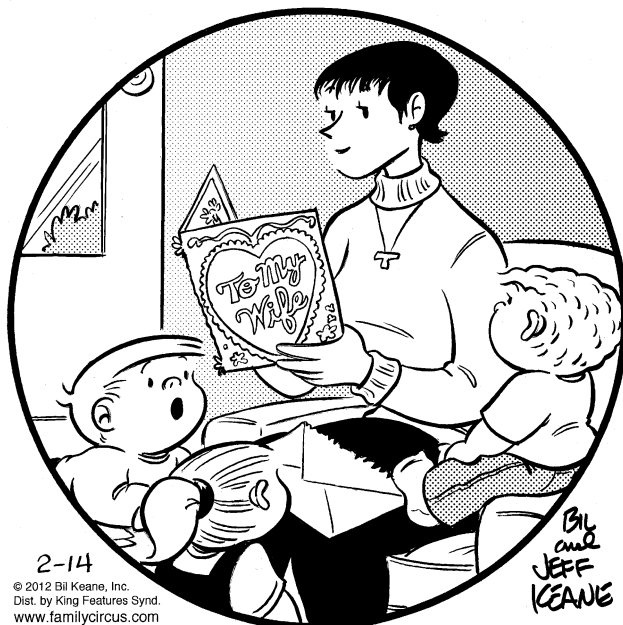

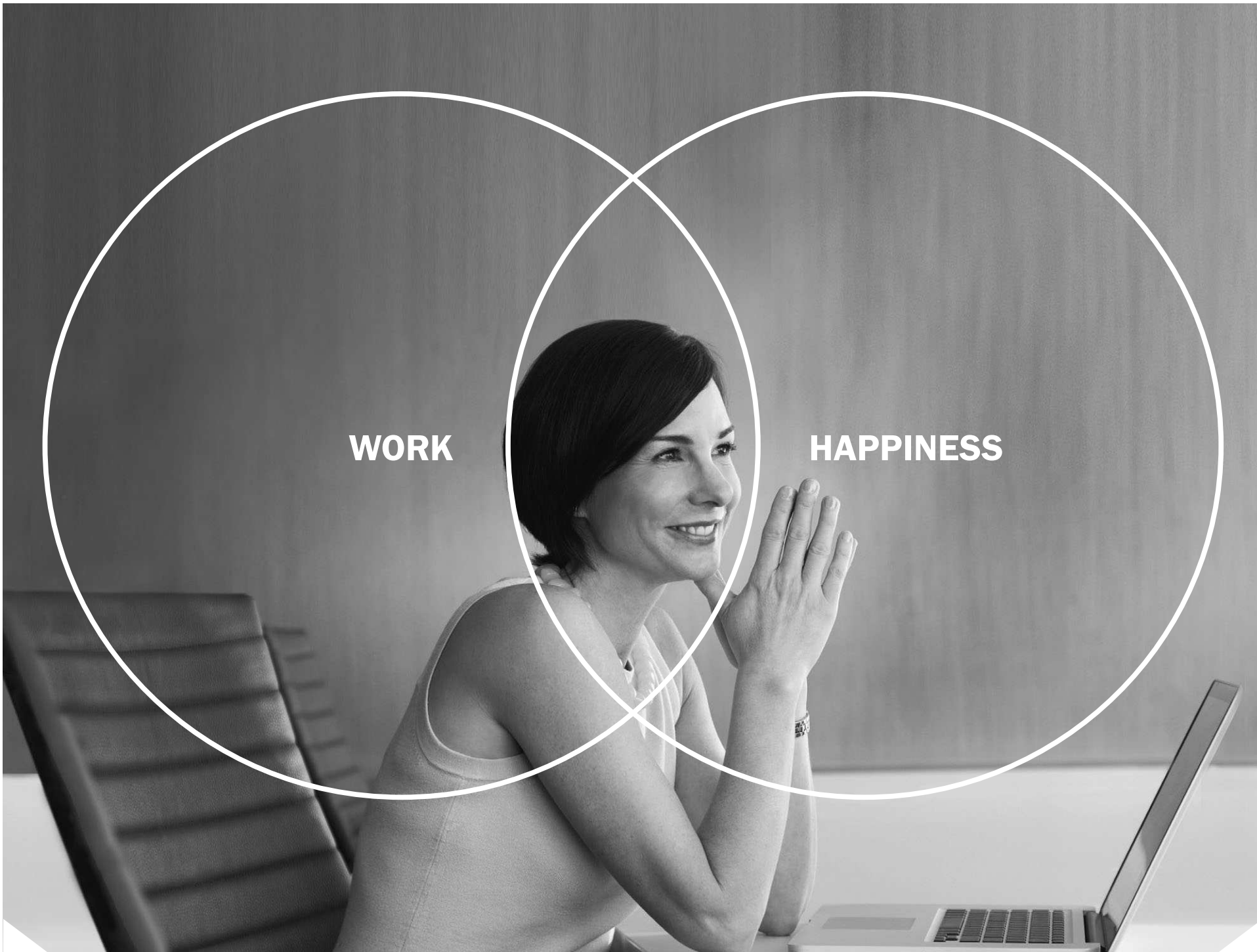

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

In the finals of the 2011 NEC tournament in Yokohama, Japan, both tables in today's deal reached six hearts on a spade lead, but in one case with North declarer, and in the other case with South.

For the losing Chinese team, Peng (North) won the spade lead in dummy, cashed the diamond king, then drew three rounds of trump ending in the North hand. Next he led a spade up, and David Gold, for the Anglo-Dutch winners, hopped up with the spade queen and returned the suit to eliminate any pressure in the endgame: down one. In fact, once declarer had cashed the heart ace and king, he could no longer make the hand.

Ricco van Prooijen showed how to do it at the other table. Sitting South, he won the spade lead in hand, played one top trump from hand, then led the diamond king, and crossed to a trump in dummy as East pitched a spade. Now declarer ruffed a diamond high, played the club ace, ruffed a club, and ruffed another diamond with his last high trump.

Next he ruffed a club to dummy, and East had either to let go a spade — in which case declarer would draw the trump and play on spades — or pitch a diamond, his actual choice.

Van Prooijen drew the last trump, cashed the diamond ace, and led a spade toward his jack at trick 12, with East down to the Q-10 of spades. Contract made.

ANSWER: Although you have a beautiful hand, you have no reason to assume that your partner has anything at all — even four hearts — since he might have been forced to act with nothing. Having doubled already to show a good hand, you can raise to three hearts now to show an even better one and rely on partner to bid game with as little as queen-fifth of hearts and a black king.

On this date:

In 1862, Confederate President Jefferson Davis signed a proclamation making Arizona a Confederate territory.

In 1876, inventors Alexander Graham Bell and Elisha Gray applied separately for patents related to the telephone. (The U.S. Supreme Court eventually ruled Bell the rightful inventor.)

In 1895, Oscar Wilde's final play, "The Importance of Being Earnest," opened at the St. James's Theatre in London.

In 1903, the Department of Commerce and Labor was established. (It was divided into separate departments of Commerce and Labor in 1913.)

In 1920, the League of Women Voters was founded in Chicago; its first president was Maud Wood Park.

In 1929, the "St. Valentine's Day Massacre" took place in a Chicago garage as seven rivals of Al Capone's gang were gunned down.

In 1949, Israel's Knesset convened for the first time.

In 1962, first lady Jacqueline Kennedy conducted a televised tour of the White House in a videotaped special that was broadcast on CBS and NBC (and several nights later on ABC).

In 1979, Adolph Dubs, the U.S. ambassador to Afghanistan, was kidnapped in Kabul by Muslim extremists and killed in a shootout between his abductors and police.

In 1989, Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini called on Muslims to kill Salman Rushdie, author of "The Satanic Verses," a novel condemned as blasphemous.

Ten years ago: Launching his defense against war crimes charges, former Yugoslav president Slobodan Milosevic justified his actions as a "struggle against terrorism" and said he was a victim of twisted facts and "terrible fabrication." Enron executive Sherron Watkins told a House subcommittee it was common knowledge at the company that partnerships were used improperly to hide debt and inflate profits.

Five years ago: Challenged on the accuracy of U.S. intelligence, President George W. Bush told a news conference there was no doubt the Iranian government was providing armor-piercing weapons to kill American soldiers in Iraq, and he said he would fight any attempt by the Democratic-controlled Congress to cut off money for the war. ConAgra recalled all Peter Pan and Great Value peanut butter made at a Georgia plant because of a salmonella outbreak.

One year ago: President Barack Obama unveiled a \$3.7 trillion budget plan that would freeze or reduce some safety-net programs for the nation's poor but turn aside Republican demands for more drastic cuts to shrink the government to where it was before he took office. Protesters took to the streets in Iran, Bahrain and Yemen, inspired by the popular uprising in Egypt that brought down President Hosni Mubarak. The TV game show "Jeopardy!" began airing the first of three episodes pitting human players Brad Rutter and Ken Jennings against an IBM computer named "Watson." (Watson ended up winning with a cumulative total of \$77,147 versus \$24,000 for Jennings and \$21,600 for Rutter.)
