After Delays, Azure Arraigned on Murder

TWIN FALLS • Damon Wayne Azure, 32, was arraigned Wednesday in Twin Falls 5th District Court on a charge of first-degree murder in the shooting death of his brother. He was also charged with resisting and obstructing officers.

Azure appeared by video conference at the arraignment in a restraint chair, his orange jumpsuit unbuttoned, with long hair and beard.

Judge Nicole Cannon read Azure his rights, but Azure did not speak during the short hearing. His public defender, Marilyn Paul, spoke on his behalf, telling the judge she did not believe he had any questions.

For the count of murder in the first degree, Cannon told Azure he could face up to life in prison or the death penalty. The minimum penalty if convicted is 10 years in prison without parole. For the misdemeanor charge of resisting police, the maximum penalty is a year in prison and a \$1,000 fine.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs asked that Azure be held without bail in the murder case, which Cannon granted. Azure is being held on \$20,000 bond for the resisting and obstructing charge.

In the murder case, Azure is scheduled for an 8:15 a.m. preliminary hearing on Feb. 24. He faces a March 6 pretrial hearing in the misdemeanor case.

Wednesday's arraignment was the third scheduled hearing for Azure. Since his Sunday arrest, he has allegedly refused to speak to Paul or jail staff to complete his booking. Twin Falls County Sheriff's Capt. Tim Miller said Azure had been uncooperative.

Azure is accused of fatally shooting his brother, Seanachan Joe Azure, 31, on Sunday near Twin Falls Park, along the Snake River Canyon north of Kimberly.

CAMERON SEEKS TO REMOVE TEACHER **SALARY**

State budget writers would have to find other ways to pay for Students Come First tech initiatives and meritbased bonuses.

BOISE • Sen. Dean Cameron wants to fund Idaho education reform without dipping into teacher salaries.

On Wednesday, the Rupert Republican introduced a bill that would eliminate planned reductions to state funding for public school educator salaries starting next fiscal year.

In 2011, the Legislature passed three bills that provided the framework of public schools chief Tom Luna's Students Come First reform package. One provision included a schedule of reductions to state salary funding, shifting the money instead to a system of merit-based pay bonuses and the reform package's technology initiatives.

The shift doesn't necessarily equate to a pay cut for teachers. But it will be up to individual school districts to figure out whether to cut staff positions or pay if the shift can't be backfilled in the coming years.

Cameron presented the legislation to the Senate Finance Committee, saying there were better ways to fund the reforms.

This year, \$14.7 million in "salarybased apportionment" is being shifted to help fund the reforms. Cameron's bill wouldn't affect that, instead going into place at the start of fiscal 2013.

If passed, the legislation would force the state's budget-setting Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee to find alternative funding sources for the education reforms.

That might be a difficult task, considering the reduction for fiscal 2013 was put at \$19.6 million, and \$35 million in the following year.

But, Cameron said, it will be easier to find that money upfront than to constantly attempt to backfill the salary reductions outlined in the reform laws.



More Idaho Teachers Left the Profession in 2011

BOISE • Nearly 1,300 Idaho teachers left the profession in 2011, up from about 700 the year before. More than half of the educators who

abandoned teaching last year left for "personal reasons," according to data from the state Department of Education. School districts reported another 96 teachers were fired and 85 were laid off

in 2011, which is about the same as the previous year. The remaining 579 educators left to continue their education or because of military and family obligations. Other reasons included death, leaves of absence or a spousal transfer.

But the number of teachers leaving the profession for person reasons more than doubled to 697 in 2011, up from 314 in 2010, according records that the Idaho Education Association requested from the state's education department.

The statewide teachers union is saddened to hear more teachers are leaving but not surprised, said Idaho Education Association President Penni Cyr. She pointed to new education changes that were introduced last year to limit collective bargaining and eliminate job protections, among other things.

Idaho is also phasing in mobile computers for every high school teacher and student while making online courses a requirement to graduate under the plan, which shifts money from employee salaries to help pay for the changes. Luna wants the state to offset a planned \$19.4 million reduction to salaries in 2013 under his reform plan.

"Teachers are demoralized all over the state," Cyr said. The changes backed by public school

chief Tom Luna have made the state

less attractive to educators, said Cyr, who pointed to a drop in the number of

The 21-year-old soldier was flown to Germany, and later to the U.S. during his recovery from the attack.

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ONE DIES ON SLICK ROADS

Wednesday storm causes one fatality crash, sends multiple vehicles off the road in Magic Valley.

BURLEY • A winter storm that passed through the Magic Valley Wednesday contributed to a one-vehicle Interstate 86 crash that claimed the life of a Grace

The crash occurred near milepost 11, east of Burley. According to an Idaho State Police press release, Allyn Hobbs, 65, lost control of his vehicle, which rolled several times. Hobbs was headed westbound and was not wearing his seat belt. He was ejected from his vehicle and died at the scene.

Slick morning conditions also contributed to six other crashes investigated by ISP Wednesday morning.

Staff at the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center said they didn't dispatch any officers in Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln or Twin Falls counties to any major crashes, but took 10 reports of vehicles that slid off roads.

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd said Oakley received about 2 inches of snow and the roads were icy in the morning throughout the county.

"But the roads weren't too bad in (Burley)," Kidd said. By 10 a.m. the snow and ice had melted, he said.

Cassia County dispatch did not take any calls for serious crashes, but fielded about seven calls for minor crashes and slide-offs, Kidd said.



An overnight winter storm left snow in the Magic Valley, causing a series of Wednesday morning crashes, though travel conditions improved as the day warmed up.

Idaho teaching certificates being issued to people living outside the state.

Idaho granted 633 teaching certificates to educators living outside Idaho in 2011, down from 661 the year before.

Luna countered that his reform plan, called Students Come First, is not to blame.

The data showing more teachers are leaving the profession were collected before the changes were introduced into Idaho schools this year, he said.

However, legislation was approved in the final hours of the 2011 Idaho Legislature to speed up the effective date of the reforms. The move, which made the new laws go into effect immediately rather than July 1, aimed to take the steam out of a voter referendum on the sweeping changes.

Teachers bargained under the new laws last spring, the union said.

Luna maintains that the recession is more likely the culprit for why more teachers are breaking from the profession. For example, a teacher might have left to follow a spouse who lost his or her

job and moved to another state to find work, Luna "I think what you're

seeing is because of the economy," he said. Critics predicted that

educators would flee Idaho because of the reforms and get jobs teaching elsewhere, Luna said, though data from last year show fewer teachers left Idaho for education jobs in other states. The number of teachers who left Idaho for an educational institution in another state dropped to 48 last year, from 119 in 2010.

"These numbers do not support the doomsday scenario," Luna said.

come to Twin Falls prior to the 2008 presidential election, but the location of his planned April visit was changed to Caldwell shortly before the event.

Paul is among a group of GOP candidates who hope to face off against President Barack Obama in this year's presidential election. He's among a group of Republican hopefuls that includes former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney, former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum and former U.S. House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

Santorum stopped in Coeur d'Alene and Boise on Tuesday, while Romney plans a Friday fundraiser and public stop in Boise. Idaho GOP Executive Director Jonathan Parker said the attention GOP candidates are paying to Idaho is exactly what party leaders envisioned when they scrapped the state's May GOP primary election in favor of a Super Tuesday caucus on March 6. Twin Falls County Demo-

cratic Chairwoman Deborah Silver said local Republicans don't seem to have a solid base of support behind one candidate for the coming election.

It's a similar story at the national level, Silver said, adding it's late in the process to have the Republican race so up in the air. However, she said Paul has gained more supporters recently and could be a frontrunner.

"You know, he has a lot of support with the local Republicans," she said. The Twin Falls Liberty

group wants to reach out to younger voters such as Col-

lege of Southern Idaho students and seniors at Twin Falls High School. Seventeen-vear-olds will

be able to vote in Idaho's first Republican Party presidential caucus, as long as they'll turn 18 before the November presidential election.

Citizens Awarded for Valor in July Standoff

TWIN FALLS • Five people just going about their days in north Twin Falls were swept into a frightening situation last July.

On July 15, Clark Cleveland, with his gun blazing at law enforcement and citizens alike, took a hostage at the Twin Falls Hampton Inn on Pole Line Road, killing one man and wounding an Idaho State Police trooper.

On Wednesday, Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter gave awards for valor to five private citizens without whom, he said, that day could have been much worse.

"They were thrown into a terrible situation," Carter said, addressing Rotary Club members gathered at the Turf Club for the presentation. "They chose to do the right thing."

Katherine Hornbacher, a manager at the Holiday Inn Express directly across from the Hampton Inn, was commended for opening her hotel to law enforcement for the day. Carter said she offered a large meeting room and anything else that could be of use to the many agencies who responded to the situation

Another recipient was David Hamilton, who was not present Wednesday. Hamilton witnessed the car accident Cleveland caused on Pole Line Road after a highspeed chase with police, and helped detain Cleveland's passenger, Kyle Moon.

Parvovirus Found in **Wolf Killed in Blaine Co.**

HAILEY • Idaho Department of Fish and Game officials announced they have found parvovirus in a wolf killed in Blaine County on Jan. 22.

A Hailey homeowner shot and killed the wolf after it had appeared sick and injured when coming onto the man's property.

Fish and Game officers retrieved the dead female wolf and reported it displayed symptoms of the virus. Test results sent to a wildlife veterinarian came back positive for parvo and negative for rabies. Parvo is highly contagious among dogs and wolves,

and is known to cause vomiting, diarrhea and eventually death from dehydration.

The last time parvo was found in south-central Idaho wolves was in August 2009. Six young wolves were found dead on forest land north of Fairfield. Autopsy results found that the deaths were the result of the canine parvoviral enteritis.

Fish and Game officials are working with the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare and the State Department of Agriculture to monitor diseases that are most likely to be transmitted to humans and livestock from wildlife.

Environmental Group Sues EPA over State Water Policy

POCATELLO • A federal agency is facing scrutiny of its approval of Idaho's water protection guidelines.

On Tuesday, the Greater Yellowstone Coalition filed a civil case against the Environmental Protection Agency in U.S. District Court in Pocatello. According to court documents, the environmental group is asking a federal judge to order the EPA to set aside its backing of Idaho's antidegradation implementation methods.

The guidelines list standards needed to keep pollution damage from mounting over time in Idaho's bodies of water. The agency approved the policy in August 2011, but GYC says Idaho's rule doesn't do enough and violates the Clean Water Act.

"This rule is extremely important for Idaho. It affects everything from lakes to fisheries to drinking water" said Andrea Santarsiere, a legal associate for GYC. "The goal of the rule is supposed to protect Idaho's highest-quality water."

The group's primary complaint is that the policy is too soft on upholding higher quality water standards for a certain classification of water. The rules allow degradation without public review of some water sources unless the use not the quality - of the water becomes damaged.

Idaho's Department of Environmental Quality is in charge of enforcing the rules. As of Wednesday, DEQ officials were still going through GYC's lawsuit.

"We obviously think we have a document that complies with the EPA and the Clean Water Act," said Don Essig, DEQ's water quality standards coordinator. "We're going to continue using it until we're told differently."

This isn't the first time the state's anti-degradation policy has faced criticism from environmental groups. It took the state a little

more than a decade to ap-

prove an initial anti-degradation policy and another 15 years before an implementation method was adopted. During its inception, the policy became caught between industry advocates vying for fewer regulations and the need to meet federal regulations.

At one point, the EPA requested revisions to Idaho's suggested policy, but went on to approve the document despite the state's lack of changes in response.

The EPA declined to comment on the lawsuit.



Bill Would Give New Teachers Chance at Leadership Pay

TWIN FALLS • A teacher's work day doesn't end once

students go home. Besides tasks such as lesson planning and grading, some teachers serve in leadership positions such as mentoring other teachers, helping with grant writing or providing input as a committee member.

Leadership is just one piece of the puzzle when it comes to the state's pay-forperformance plan to award merit bonuses to educators.

Starting during the next school year, teachers and school administrators will receive a check each year for meeting state and local goals tied to student achievement.

Other bonuses — starting in the 2013-14 school year – will be awarded to school employees who take on leadership roles or work in hardto-fill positions.

The way the current law is written, teachers with fewer than three years of experience aren't eligible for those leadership bonuses. But a bill introduced this week in the Idaho House of Representatives seeks to lift that restric-

Locally, the idea has at least some support.

"I think that we need to look at all employees when it comes to leadership awards," said Ted Popplewell, elementary programs director for the Twin Falls School District.

Susan Hamby — a fourth-

grade teacher at Filer Immediate School - said mentors should have years of teaching experience.

"Basically, if we want to have a strong public education system, we need to take the years of experience and highly qualified teachers to be mentors," she said.

Hamby – who is the regional president for the Idaho Education Association said she hopes the Students Come First school reform laws are changed.

"The pressure inside the

classroom is just amazing," she said.

This year, each Idaho school district and public charter school had to come up with a pay-for-performance plan based on student achievement measures.

Districts don't have to plan how to award leader ship bonuses quite vet.

In Twin Falls, Popplewell said the district's pay-forperformance committee will discuss leadership bonuses when it meets again this

"Basically, we've sat down and thrown out some ideas," he said, but nothing has been finalized yet.

In Kimberly, Superintendent Kathleen Noh said payfor-performance committee members will meet in May to talk about leadership bonus-

Each year, the district already awards stipends, using federal funding, for educators who serve as mentor

"We have some experience with that," she said.

TWIN FALLS • Joshua A. Mort, 30, of Twin Falls, has been accused of assaulting a woman and trying to stran-

Mort was arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Court Tuesday on charges of aggravated assault, attempted strangulation, two counts of possession of a controlled substance and a count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Officers first responded to Mort's home on Second Ave. North at about 12:38 a.m. Tuesday for a call about a fight. Police listened at the door and reported hearing a man yelling in an angry tone. An officer knocked on the door repeatedly and finally, Mort answered. According to police, he said he was arguing with his girlfriend on the phone and she wasn't in the apartment. Police

continued to knock on the

door to check for other

people inside, but got no answer and decided they had to leave.

Less than an hour later, officers received another call about a fight at the same residence. This time, both a male and female could be heard yelling, police said. The officers began kicking down the door when they say they heard a woman crying for help.

Police say it felt like someone was trying to hold the door closed, but when they got it open Mort was sitting on a couch about 10 feet away. Mort was immediately placed in handcuffs and police found a woman in the apartment with blood on her shirt and red marks around her throat and on her chest. Police say the victim had cuts to her back, the back of an arm and on one of her hands.

According to court documents, the victim told police she had been inside the apartment the first time they were there but didn't answer the door. She said Mort then attacked her with a knife and tried to strangle her until she thought she was going to pass out.

Police also reported finding marijuana and methamphetamine paraphernalia in apartment methamphetamine residue inside a glass pipe.

A preliminary hearing for the assault case and a felony drug charge is schedule for Feb. 24. A pretrial hearing on the additional drug charges is scheduled for March 6.

GILMAN USED VICTIM'S PHONE TO CONTACT HER **FAMILY, POLICE SAY**

SPOKANE, Wash. • Triple murder suspect Dustin William Gilman used his victim's cellphone to text message her husband after he killed her, according to new court documents.

Nick Ader, who was in the hospital with pancreatitis, told police he received two text messages from his wife's phone at 9:49 a.m. and 9:51 a.m. Friday saying she was taking one of their sons to the hospital because of a fever.

Two minutes later, Gilman, 22, called Ader and said he was going to visit a girl in south Spokane.

Detectives believe all of it was a farce by Gilman, who is suspected of murdering Ader's wife, Tracy, 32, and her two sons, Damien, 10, and Kadin, 8, in the home he was sharing with them at 4411 N. Whitehouse Street.

The three were dead by the time Gilman arrived at a friend's home about 10 a.m. in Tracy Ader's 2007

Nissan Pathfinder, police say. The friend, identified in court documents as Preston Jahanu, provided numbers for two cell phones Gilman was carrying. They belonged to Tracy and Damien Ader.

Documents give no indication of whether Jahanu spoke with Gilman about the murders. Efforts to reach him have been unsuccessful.

Police found the cellphones when they located Gilman's body Monday in a wooded area north of the city near the Wandemere Bridge. He was dead of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

Ader and her sons, who were students at Willard Elementary School, had been strangled, police say.

Ader was tied to a mattress in the basement with

duct tape over her mouth.

The boys' bodies were found near marijuana plants in the basement. Police believe one of the boys may have been sexually assaulted.

Buhl Considers Pool Fee Increase

BUHL • Buhl's pool is budgeted to run a nearly \$73,000 deficit, but a proposed fee increase may help close the gap.

Daily fees would double to \$2 children ages 4-17 and \$4 for adults. Single-person season passes would increase from \$30 to \$40, and family passes - covering up to four people — would rise from \$60 to \$100.

Though swimming lessons would cost \$45, a few dollars more, adult aerobics and lap swim sessions would remain their current \$2 per session.

On Monday, Parks and Recreation Director Kelly Peterson told the Buhl City Council that the pool has budgeted expenses of



\$107,050 and anticipated revenue of \$34,100. The deficit is currently covered by the city's gener-

al fund. "There are ongoing expenses because of the age (and size) of the pool," Pe-

terson said. Chlorine is one of the bigger expenses. Last year, Peterson said, the chemical cost \$1.60 a gallon. The pool uses 500 gallons a week, though the length of its season depends on weather.


In addition to yearly maintenance, the pool is trying to raise money for small capital improvements. Councilman Kyle Hauser said the West End Mens' Club and Farmers National Bank have provided \$1,000 toward the \$15,000 needed for two new diving boards.

"That'll be one more thing done," Hauser said.

No one testified at a public hearing on the proposed fee increases and the pool's budget prior to Monday's council meeting.

The council will vote on the proposed fee increase at its next meeting.





In fact, most of the nearly 7,000 public comments received by EPA about the original cleanup plan, one of the largest in the nation, called for doing less work and getting the job done faster, Opalski said. On Tuesday, the Idaho Legislature debated and then tabled a resolution calling on EPA to finish the work in five

But local environmentalists are disappointed the EPA is proposing to do less work in the narrow mountain about 50 miles east of Spokane. The Coeur d'Alene River Basin is one of the nation's largest Superfund sites, with heavy metals like arsenic and lead poisoning land, streams, wildlife and humans. The wastes washed into waterways and moved downstream.

"It is unfortunate that the EPA caved in to pressure from Idaho and sliced the cleanup nearly in half;" said Mike Petersen of The Lands Council. "The legacy of heavy metals contamination will continue, however, and Lake Coeur d'Alene and the Spokane River will have poorer water quality than under the original plan."

Petersen said opponents are ignoring the fact that the cleanup is bringing hundreds of jobs to the sparsely populated valley.

The EPA's original plan to clean up the upper basin was released in 2010. The agency hoped to finalize the new plan this spring and begin the work.

A lawsuit calling for the cleanup was originally brought in 1991 by the Coeur d'Alene Indian Tribe against several mining companies. Agreements have since been reached with several mining companies that had historic operations in valley, creating a trust fund of about \$800 million to pay for the work.

Much cleanup work has already occurred around Kellogg, Idaho, where the pollution was making people sick. Before that work, the Silver Valley was so saturated with pollution that it stripped the hillsides of vegetation and poisoned the blood of children, causing physical and emotional problems that continue.

Rachel Maddow and My Lesson in Civility

hen one writes about moral convictions, it's probably a good idea to consistently live up to them. That way people can still disagree with your



convictions, but they have a difficult time accusing you of hypocrisy.

Last week at the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC) in Washington, I failed to live up to one of my highest principles. Here's the background. The story about the Obama administration's attempt to force Catholic and other faith-based institutions to offer employees free contraception in their health care coverage was still fresh. I was asked to be on a panel before what looked like a crowd of about 1,000 conservatives, hungry for "red meat."

A clip was played from Rachel Maddow's MSNBC program. It featured her commenting on the subject. I stupidly said before thinking, "I think she's the best argument in favor of her parents using contraception." I then added, "and all the rest of the crowd at MSNBC, too, for that matter."

It didn't matter that far worse things have been said in print and on TV about me. I am not supposed to behave like that. I co-wrote a book with my liberal Democratic friend, Bob Beckel, called "Common Ground: How to Stop the Partisan War That is Destroying America." We also write a column together for USA Today. One of the principles in which I believe is not to engage in name-calling; which, to my shame,

The next morning I felt bad about it, so I called Ms. Maddow to apologize. It wasn't one of those meaningless "if I've offended anyone..." apologies; it was heartfelt. I had embarrassed myself and was a bad example to those who read my column and expect better from me.

Maddow could not have been more gracious. She immediately accepted my apology. On her show she said publicly, "I completely believe his apology. I completely accept his apology." To be forgiven by one you have wronged is a blessing, it's even cleansing.

Politics has always been a contact sport. Thomas Jefferson and John Adams went at each other like the worst of enemies, using some of the most outrageous and slanderous language. I don't have bona fides equal to their founding of America, so there is nothing of similar magnitude on which I can fall back.

Maddow also accepted my invitation to lunch and we will soon meet in New York. I am looking forward to it. Since the incident, which, of course, garnered a mini-tornado of media and blogosphere coverage, I have watched a couple of her shows. Without engaging in any qualifiers, she is a strong and competent advocate for her position. Why do so many of us only watch programs that reinforce what we already believe? Where is the growth in that? Whatever else she may or may not be, she is my fellow American.

I have many liberal friends acquired over the years. They are impossible to avoid in the media, but I don't wish to avoid them. They became my friends because I stopped seeing them as labels and began seeing them as persons with innate worth. That is what I failed to do in my first response to Rachel Maddow. One might expect a pro-lifer like me to support the birth of fellow human beings and not suggest they should never have been born.

I expect to like Rachel Maddow because my instinct is to separate the value of a person from his or her political position. For some strange reason (demon possession, perhaps) I failed to do that at CPAC.

So, apology delivered and accepted and lunch will soon be served. I'm trying to decide whose career might be hurt more should someone take a picture of us enjoying a meal and - it is to be hoped, at least by me - each other.



Athens on the Potomac

The following editorial appeared in the Chicago Tribune on Tuesday:

resident Barack Obama's budget proposal Monday all but seals the deal: Together, Washington Democrats and Republicans have stopped governing. Both parties now are on automatic pilot. They'll do as little as possible to solve this nation's debt crisis before Nov. 6. Instead they'll wait to see whether American voters firmly choose a direction for the United States and its destructive indebtedness.

How destructive? Conveniently, one of this nation's plausible futures plays out vividly on a TV screen near you: Fire-heaving mobs enraged by the harsh consequences of rampant public borrowing have torched one of Europe's grossly indebted capitals, Athens. Fretful officials in other capitals Rome, Lisbon, Madrid and

more - must wonder whether the flames will rage in their countries next.

None of which evidently dents skulls in Washington, where federal pols from both parties act as if they're weirdly determined to invite Greece's conflagration to leap the Atlantic. With nothing more noble than election strategy busying the Capitol and White House, basic management of the nation's business has to wait for some point beyond Election Day.

Thus the future of what Americans obtusely call our federal debt — in truth it's our current and future tax $payers' \, debt - grows \, bleaker.$ As does, for lack of real reforms, the long-term prospect for Medicare and Social Security: Total expenditures on those programs for seniors, plus the portion of Medicaid that covers their nursing-home expenses, will rise from 43 percent of federal spending today to 54 percent in 10 years.

No wonder, then, that The Washington Post's Ezra Klein continues to describe the U.S. government as an insurance conglomerate protected by a large, standing army. He might add that the conglomerate is racing ever further into debt.

The budget proposal Obama floated Monday, for the fiscal year that begins Oct.1, would do little to reduce that breakneck speed. That said, you can set aside virtually every notion in the president's plan. He knows as well as everyone else in Washington that a Congress looking to November won't pass it.

Monday's document, in truth, is a campaign play book — the vision of government that Obama hopes voters will reward with a second presidential term. Its central

Obama didn't use the Sword - stimulus - but he wants to raise taxes on the wealthy and borrow more money in order to spend

more on economic ... stimulus. Yes, the president's plan does continue to give lip service to debt reduction in future years. But the proposal he floated Monday actually would aggravate the somewhat rosier debt projections he provided to Congress as recently as September.

What we have then is a debt debacle that, even with the president's plan, would continue to grow our debt by leaps and bounds. If you focus on only two numbers from Monday's gully washer of statistics, make them these frightening figures supplied to us late Monday by the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget, based on its extrapolation of details from the president's Office of Management and **Budget:**

- As is, our total debt will, over the next 10 years, rise from today's \$15.3 trillion to \$28.4 trillion.
- Under the alternative plan Obama announced Monday, with its tax hikes and tighter defense spending, total debt also would rise, to \$25.9 trillion.

Redistricting Commission **Applauded**

The League of Women Voters commends the second Reapportionment Commission for quickly producing a plan that has been approved by the Idaho Supreme Court.

Emergency Surgery

Budget-writing panel says \$13.1 million needed to save fund for emergency medical treatment for Idahoans who lack insurance.

BOISE • Members of the Legislature's budget-writing panel voted Wednesday to spend nearly \$13.1 million to prevent the state's indigent health care program from going bankrupt.

Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee members voted unanimously to add the money to the Catastrophic Health Care Program's budget. The money will compensate for the state intentionally setting this year's CAT Fund budget below recommended levels.

The CAT Fund covers the cost of emergency medical treatment for state residents who don't have insurance, aren't covered by Medicaid and cannot pay their bills. By law, the state is required to pay all of the program's valid

Bonneville County Commissioner Roger Christensen, chairman of the CAT Fund board of directors, told lawmakers Jan. 16 that the program was at risk of not meeting its legal obligations to pay those bills if lawmakers did not intervene by this month.

A year ago, Christensen also estimated the program would need \$32 million to meet all of this year's needs. The shortfall resulted last year after lawmakers voted to free up just \$22.2 million in order to pass what appeared to be a balanced budget.

All along, lawmakers knew they could return this year and back-fill the CAT Fund budget, if necessary. The day of reckoning arrived Wednesday.

Even so, the \$13.1 million JFAC members voted to free up was almost \$4 million less than Christensen asked for Jan. 16 to make it through the end of the fiscal year, which ends June 30.

Christensen did not attend this week's hearing, but said \$13.1 million would allow CAT Fund officials to take care of their most pressing needs bills that came due last month and this

If the money isn't enough to pay all of this year's bills, Christensen said CAT Fund officials would hold off on paying the remaining claims until new funding for the 2013 budget year arrives in July.

Doing so, however, would reduce the amount of money for 2013's bills.

That could cause CAT Fund officials return to the Capitol next year to request even more money to make it

through that budget cycle. "We would expect to end the fiscal year and have to push \$3 million or \$4 million forward by just a few weeks into the next fiscal year's budget," Christensen said.

Rep. Fred Wood, a Republican from Burley who pushed for the \$13.1 million, said he hopes to avoid the continuation of budget manipulation tactics that led to what he called structural budget deficits.

Wood said he worked with Matt Ellsworth, a state senior budget and policy analyst, to calculate a new CAT Fund estimate that suggested \$13.1 million could cover all of the program's bills.

"We're not hampering their ability to pay medical bills or take care of any medical expenses or anything like that," Wood said. "(Ellsworth and) the Legislative Services Office felt they could use a different methodology and in our opinion, it's a good estimate."

Wood also said he would push to fund the CAT Fund's 2013 budget request entirely, rather than intentionally undercutting budget estimates and forcing a new shortfall next year.

SW Idaho County Adopts Rules for Gas Developers

BOISE (AP) • Leaders in Washington County have unanimously passed a new set of rules that would require energy companies to get local approval before drilling for natural gas or building refineries and other facilities.

The county regulations approved Monday also impose bond requirements on energy developers interested in tapping the gas reserves discovered in the ground underneath Washington and Payette counties.

But the county's new rules also appear to conflict with state rules already in place, according to a story published Wednesday by The Idaho Statesman.

A bill that passed an Idaho House committee last week would give the state many of the regulatory powers detailed in Washington County's ordinance. The bill, supported by the oil and gas industry, sets up a potential fight between the state and county officials over the best way to regulate a new industry that has potential to create jobs and bolster state and local revenue streams.

In 2010, a Colorado company reported promising discoveries of gas reserves in Payette County, and since then drilling has expanded into Washington County. More than 100,000 acres in western Idaho are now under lease by drillers.

SWAT Standoff Ends Peacefully in Spokane

SPOKANE • A gun-wielding man made an extra long day for some students and caused tense moments for parents at two Spokane Valley schools, but a hostage negotiator ended the three-hour standoff without injuries.

"It happened like it's scripted," Spokane County Sheriff's spokesman Deputy Craig Chamberlin said.

Deputies and Spokane Valley Police officers — who are deputies contracted to work as police officers in the city arrested 39-year-old Ryan Lancaster on the charges of first-degree assault, first-degree burglary and outstanding

The long afternoon started just before 2:30 p.m. when Lancaster went to an apartment on Broadway where his former girlfriend lives. Chamberlin said Lancaster climbed through a window and threatened two women with a gun.

The women "said he attempted to shoot them but it appeared the gun jammed," Chamberlin said. "Then he took off running."

Outside the apartment, the daughter of Lancaster's exgirlfriend ran down to the apartment of 23-year-old Shawn Loughbom and asked

"The girl said (Lancaster) stole my mom's money for income taxes and a laptop," Loughbom said. Lancaster had not yet left.

"I told him he had to leave. The owner of the apartment was following me out," Loughbom said.

The two men followed Lancaster and called 911. He crossed into the field behind North Pines Middle School as one of the classes was holding gym class, Loughbom said.

"They took all the kids and got them off the track. At that point, (Lancaster) started running," he said.

Loughbom and the apartment owner followed Lancaster. "Once he got out of the school zone, he pulled the gun out and pointed it us. He cocked it and said, 'I'm not going back to jail. I got a warrant? I was definitely scared."

The two men backed off and followed Lancaster to a home on Valley Way about a block west of Pines Road. He went into the home occupied by a 57-year-old man and an infant. They were acquaintances, Chamberlin said.

Soon after, police and the sheriff's SWAT team surrounded the home. Central Valley School District officials then placed North Pines Middle School and Broadway Elementary on lockdown. Later, as the standoff continued, they allowed parents to come get the kids one-by-one.

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

U.S. Forest Service Puts **Brakes** on Ski Club's Raffle Prize

HAMILTON, Mont. (AP) • The U.S. Forest Service told a Hamiltonarea cross country ski club that it could no longer use a night in a Forest Service cabin as part of a raffle prize, even though club members raised money and volunteered thousands of hours to build the cabin near Chief Joseph Pass on the Montana-Idaho border.

Beaverhead-Deerlodge National Forest officials notified the Bitterroot Cross-Country Ski Club on Feb. 2 that the USDA Office of Ethics determined using government property as a raffle prize was not allowed, the Ravalli Republic reported Wednesday.

By then, the club had already advertised the prize, which included a gourmet meal, and sold hundreds of raffle tickets for this year's fundraiser.

Ski club president Michael Hoyt wrote to the agency, saying the club felt like it had been blindsided, and the agency didn't consider the efforts the club has made to establish and maintain the trail system.

The Chief Joseph Ski Trail System was established in 1990 after the club's first members agreed to maintain and groom the trails at no expense to the federal government. All the trails are open to the public.

Every year, the club invests more than \$10,000 in volunteer time and money to maintain and groom the trails.

The club conceived of, designed and built the Gordon Reese Cabin as a warming hut as part of the trail system. The club raised more than \$100,000 in cash and materials to build the cabin, which the Forest Service rents out for \$35 a night in the summer. Ski club members continue to volunteer time in the summer to maintain the cabin and fill its basement with firewood.

"With this history, I ask you, what are the ethics, where is the fairness for the Forest Service delivering such an unexpected and dictatorial command to cease and desist at virtually the last minute?" Hovt wrote.

Lawsuit: ISU Faculty's Free Speech Rights Were Violated

POCATELLO (AP) • Faculty leaders at Idaho State University claim administrators violated their free speech rights when blocking them from sending emails to the campus community.

The Idaho State Journal reports a complaint filed Tuesday alleges the university started blocking emails from faculty leaders in November, following a disagreement over the adoption of a new faculty constitution.

On Tuesday, a university spokesman said administrators had not yet seen the complaint and would respond in "due course."

The state Board of Education is expected to discuss faculty governance issues at ISU during a meeting today in Boise. The board voted last year to dissolve the university's previous Faculty Senate, which been at loggerheads with school President Arthur Vailas.

Wolf Season Ends in Most of Montana; 166 Killed

BILLINGS, Mont. Hunters in Montana had shot more than 160 gray wolves as the season came to a close across most of the state Wednesday - a sharp increase from the last hunt

in 2009 but still short of the

state's 220-animal quota. In portions of the Bitterroot Mountains near the Idaho border, state wildlife commissioners are considering an extension to the season in response to complaints about declining elk numbers.

But for most of Montana the season was due to end after sunset Wednesday. The 166 wolves reported killed through Tuesday equaled 75 percent of the statewide quota.

Hunters and trappers in neighboring Idaho have killed 298 wolves to date in a season that runs through June 30. Idaho has no statewide quota.

Some hunters and livestock owners want more wolf hunting. Wildlife advocates have urged restraint.

Wildlife officials said the hunts were meant to strike a balance between those competing pressures.

"The quota is a ceiling; it's not a basement. If we haven't reached the ceiling we haven't failed," said Bob Ream, chairman of Montana's Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission. "It's been a good season and people should treat wolves like other game animals."

Wolves in parts of five Northern Rockies states came off the endangered species list last year under an order from Congress. They remain listed in Wyoming and there is no public hunting for the animals in Oregon, Utah and Washington.

Both Montana and Idaho set their wolf seasons with the aim of reducing the predators' population, in hopes of curbing livestock attacks and propping up elk numbers. Elk herds have declined in scattered areas since wolves were reintroduced to the region in the mid-1990s, but remain robust overall.

It's uncertain what effect the number of wolves actually harvested will have on the animal's overall population. The most recent population count, from the end of 2010, tallied a minimum 566 of the predators in Montana and at least 705 in Idaho.

The 2011 wolf population count for Idaho and Montana is not expected to be completed until month, wildlife officials

In 2009, when there was a minimum of 524 wolves in Montana, computer modeling by state wildlife officials suggested a 165-animal harvest would result in a 14 percent population increase.

Seventy-three wolves were shot by hunters in Montana that year during a brief period when wolves were off the endangered list before a lawsuit restored their endangered status.

Ream said Montana's season could be adjusted next year to loosen hunting restrictions in some peripheral areas of the wolves' range.



JEROME • Clayton Nielson has been a hunter for 60 years, but it's the past five that have him worried.

Why? Technology.

"It seems to have exploded in just that time," said Nielson, a hunter education coordinator for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

When it comes to hunting, fishing and the outdoors, some area sportsmen are finding that technology is a boon, while for Nielson and others it's a burden.

Technology has, for instance, made it easier to track and shoot animals. But that's the very thing Nielson doesn't like. He prefers the more "primitive" experience of hunting going afield without nifty, high-tech

"I think the use of too many gadgets takes away skills and the sense of accomplishment of learning how to do those things without that stuff," he

But Filer resident Tim Triplett has the opposite opinion, saying that technology helps him and other hunters to be more accurate in their

"It's more ethical," he said. "I would much rather take an animal ethically than wound one, having it die a hard

The Pros and Cons of Technology in Hunting

Question: "I saw the Idaho Fish and Game had a booth at the Shot Show in Las Vegas last month. Are there any trends in hunting you've observed at the shows?"

Answer: A couple of trends noticed involve advancements in hunting technology and a general loss of a connection to nature and hunting ethics.

The last several years we have seen an relentless movement in technology to make hunting easier. This movement takes the form of off-road motorized vehicles, lighted and laser sights and night vision scopes, and ultralong range rifles. Since this is a lengthy topic I intend to break it up into a couple of columns.

It may be a sign of the times but the average ages of hunters today are in their 40s. Many older hunters are physically unable to hike the hills like they once did. A huge shift to off-road motorized vehicles for hunting has been one of the biggest complaints to the department from non-motorized sportsmen. Motorized technology today allows nearly everyone access to high ridges and backcountry areas. This increased access dramatically increases vulnerability of big game animals to harvest and was the impetus for the department's off-road motorized vehicle hunting rule.

A sport that was once characterized by hunters on foot, horseback, and a few hardy dirt bike riders is now overwhelmed by ATVs and UTVs. Many narrow horse and foot trails in the mountains have been grubbed out wider to accommodate modern off-road motorized vehicles in an effort to access animal security ar-

Hunters have long been limited by darkness and it's affect on one's ability to see clearly, judge distance, and make a clean kill. That's all changed now with lighted sights, laser range finders, and night vision capability. A sport that once demanded ethical restraint to ensure a clean kill now has technology to accommodate hunting to the very last lawful minute of shooting hours. New commission rules have also allowed hunters whose sight is failing to receive special accommodation using this technology. I'm not opposed to some of the advances that help reduce crippling loss. Due to the excellent light gathering capabilities of new optics hunters are shooting using advanced optics when it's too dark to see with the naked eye. Many of these technological advances have eroded our hunting ethics and our sense of "fair chase." Some of these technological advancements are not lawful for



hunting big game in Idaho.

There is a faction of hunters who no longer subscribe to the principle of getting as close to your game as possible for a clean kill. In fact, this highly competitive group strives to get as far away as possible. Manufacturers producing rifles and cartridges capable of accurately shooting well over 1000 yards and falling under the department's 16pound rule are now commercially available. Military and police long range sniper rifles are now being purchased and used for

hunting. Within these organized groups there appears to be little concern about hunting ethics, clean kills or fair chase. Videos of hunts promoting these firearms show few animals lost as cripples; however good video editing can easily elimi-nate crippled animals from the video. An infatuation with

what has been called "black rifles" formerly known as assault rifles has also been noted. These rifles are typically large capacity magazine fed semiautomatic rifles. Formerly available mostly in .223 caliber on a Colt AR frame for military and law enforcement use, they are now available in calibers all the way up to a .338 Lapua. These rifles are gaining tremendous popularity with some hunters. As an example, we've recently had some women in department sponsored shooting clinics arrive with their own ARs. The movement toward AR's has not been without controversy. A popular outdoor writer recently drew the ire of firearm manufacturers and organized groups when he questioned the use of AR-style rifles as hunting firearms.

The single theme that is common to all these advancements is they ultimately make hunting easier. Many of these advancements also substantially improve hunting success.

To allow these technological advancements and fulfill the department's mandate to manage wildlife resources for continued supplies, sportsmen must understand one of two things must occur: hunting opportunity must be reduced or hunting equipment must be restricted.

This is where a classic clique may be appropriate to describe the dilemma: "You can't have your cake and eat it too."

'Sight Fishing' Offers Anglers an Alternative

DEVILS LAKE, N.D. • Mark Bry had already been fishing a couple of hours, and the day was off to a great start.

The football-sized perch in the back of his vehicle were proof. He'd been on the ice at first light, but the fun didn't start until about 8:30 a.m. In the next hour, Bry and two buddies, Jeremy Worden of Grand Forks, N.D., and Chad Satterlund of Grafton, N.D., had landed upwards of two dozen perch and a half-dozen walleyes.

"The perch bite was one of the better ones I've had in two or three years," Bry, 32, said. "You'd drop the jig down, and they were there. It was a good bite."

The morning perch run was just a warm-up for what Bry had on his plate, though. Owner of Bry's Guide Service on Devils Lake, the Grand Forks middle school teacher was ready to do battle with a northern pike or two.

After that, the agenda would return to perch and, at twilight, walleyes.

This wasn't to be your typical pike fishing excursion, though; Bry's plan was to "sight fish" for pike through a 2x3-foot hole in the ice inside a 6x8-foot pop-up fish house that blocked out the light.

Think of it as darkhouse spearing — without the

"It's fun to watch fish," Bry said. "You can learn a lot in a few hours of doing this. Some of them absolutely destroy it, but some of them are really finicky."

Time was - and not that many years ago when fishing through a hole larger than 12 inches was illegal in North Dakota. Then, in 2001, the North Dakota Legislature legalized darkhouse spearing for pike.

That required cutting a larger hole, and in 2008, the North Dakota Game and Fish Department expanded the law to allow angling through any size hole, providing that holes larger than 10 inches are marked when not in use.

Saturday, "temperature, barometric pressure, wind and relative humidity."

Among the tools the friends brought with them was a handheld weather station that measures barometric pressure, humidity and temperature; a wind meter that tells direction and speed; a rangefinder that determines the distance to an object; and a cell phone with a ballistics application. Data collected from the weather station and wind meter are put into the app, which then tells how many clicks, or minutes of angle, to adjust the rifle's scope.

Perched atop Carter's Model 70 Winchester, chambered for 300 Rem. Ultra Magnum, was a highpowered scope. Carter took aim at a paper target, secured to a board, nearly 900

yards away. "Focus on the target, not on the gun," he said a few minutes later. "And then

Ear plugs in, and then ... BOOM! It wasn't a bull'seye, but Carter hit the target

- something he wouldn't have been able to do at that distance without technolo-

"We've got a bad rap," he said of long-range rifle hunters, "because people say that everyone and their dog is now trying to shoot long range."

But the two friends' harvest-per-shot record attests for itself, he said. "We've had a 100 percent success rate."

The Old Ways

Nielson, to some extent, understands the draw technology might have with some people. But it's not for everyone, he said. It's not for

In an email to the Times-News, he quoted Aldo Leopold, considered by many the founder of scientific wildlife management.

"I have the impression that the American sportsman is puzzled; he doesn't understand what is happening to him," Leopold wrote in "A Sand County Almanac," first published in 1949. "Bigger and better gadgets are good for industry, so why not for the outdoor recreation? It has not dawned on him that outdoor recreations are es-

sentially primitive, atavistic; that their value is a contrast value; that excessive mechanization destroys contrasts by moving the factory to the woods or to the marsh."

"That was 60 years ago!" Nielson said. What would Leopold say today?

A more recent view comes from outdoors writer Chad Love in the May 16, 2011, issue of Field & Stream.

"Is there a groundswell of disenchantment with what modern hunting is becoming?" Love wrote in a column. "Have you thought about giving up your compound, your crossbow or your rifle in favor of some-

thing a bit more rustic?" Love's response to his own question: "In the interest of full disclosure, after some 12 years of shooting both traditional and wheelbows ... I sent my last compound down the river and will be shooting longbows and recurves exclusively from here on out."

Nielson said he knows several hunters who prefer the primitive methods, but he also meets many people who seem to know nothing about the joys of hunting without scopes and other technology.

That's a shame, he said. He especially doesn't like the push for using assault-type rifles for hunting.

"What's the joy in emptying a 10- or 15-round clip into an animal?" he said. "I just don't get it."

His call provided the final nudge I needed to finish a project I've been putting off since the closing of waterfowl seasons in January - giving each of my shotguns a detailed inspection and cleaning.

Here's an interesting quirk of human nature: Even though few of us would expect our motor vehicles to function reliably year after year if they received no more attention than an occasional washing and vacuuming, many hunters and shooters labor under a similar delusion when it comes to their firearms.

Case in point, my nephew Alan is the most natural outdoorsman I've met. He's as comfortable in the elk woods and wetlands as your daughter is at the mall. His skill with a bow, shotgun and snow mobiles is uncanny. Though he fidgets endlessly throughout the year honing and upgrading these tools, as soon as bird seasons end, his lowly Mossberg autoloader is relegated to the dark recesses of his broom closet to slowly oxidize away.

Not surprisingly, his father and I regularly are treated to lively cussing and mud-stomping sessions when his gun jams in the field.

If this tale sounds embarrassingly familiar, take heart. Now is the perfect time to detail strip, inspect, clean and lubricate your firearms.

I confess that a lack of confidence and familiarity with the internal workings of my guns has caused my cleaning regimen to be limited to carefully scrub-



bing the bore and blowing out the action and trigger group with an air compressor or aerosol-blasting solvent.

Happily, there are a number of excellent sources of information that make it possible for a novice gun tinkerer such as myself to conduct and complete a thorough inspection and cleaning of weapons. Most major manufacturers have PDF file owner's manuals on their websites. Distributors and parts houses such as Brownells, Midway USA, Numrich Gun Parts Corp. and Shotgun World offer a staggering array of schematics and replacement parts for most popular domestic and foreign firearms.

Barnes & Noble and Hastings, both in Twin Falls, carry a pretty extensive collection of Gun Digest service guidebooks. And lately, I've become a fan of YouTube videos, where I've found instructional and informational videos for most of the guns in my collection.

Understand, these resources are intended to help a novice become more familiar with his weapons and conduct general inspection and cleaning procedures. Always rely upon the skills of a qualified gunsmith for disassembly and repair of safety and fire-control parts.

Next time, I'll introduce you to some of the tools and techniques that will make sprucing up Ole Betsy a breeze.

swath of white corduroy.

"It's kind of like playing a video game — I've got my big screen right here," Wieand motions to the expansive pic-

ture window in front of him. Wieand is the commander of The Beast, one of two stateof-the-art snow groomers that are so wide, so powerful and so fast that they make the older yellow snow cats look

like pussy cats. The biggest groomer on earth, the futuristic-looking Prinoth Beast is 1 and 1/4 larger than regular groomers, allowing it to groom 40 percent more surface and push 40 percent more snow around than the regular cats. It can cover five more acres per hour than a regular groomer, saving man hours and machine hours, yet its fuel-efficient engine uses the same amount of fuel per acre as earlier models – and every little bit helps, considering Sun Valley's groomers chug a thousand gallons a night.

"With a tiller four feet wider than traditional snow cats, I can groom in two and a quarter hours what it takes a regular groomer four hours to do," Wieand said. "I can also go up steeper slopes the others can't."

The half-million dollar Beast is designed by Pininfarina, an Italian design compa-

ny that also designs Ferraris, Jaguars, Maseratis, airplanes, ships and high-speed trains. It boasts an engine like that of a semi-truck, cranking out 520 horsepower compared with 350 for regular-sized cats.

Last year Sun Valley was among the first ski resorts to purchase one. It added a second to its fleet this year along with two Prinoth Bison groomers.

The "sizable investment" makes a strong statement about Sun Valley's commitment to providing the best snow surface possible for its guests, says Peter Stearns, director of Mountain Opera-

It's also a far cry from the 1970s when groomers drove four-wheel drives pulling tillers behind him. One groomer would chop down the bumps while another rolled over them, says groomer Jeff Dent. "The only run we groomed consistently then was College."

Wieand's work shift begins at 4 p.m. as the lifts are grinding to a stop and the ski patrol

get another half-track wide on Olympic. Let's spend some time on it now while it's cold, get it wide and let it sit. It's too narrow right now."

He turns to the Beastmeister: "Same thing with Cold Springs — widen it out?"

Wieand heads to the garage where he climbs onto the treads of The Beast and into the cab. He punches a few buttons and adjusts the climate control inside the cab to 70 degrees.

Then he slowly backs out of the shop, leaving behind a few piles of snow on the floor that The Beast lugged in earlier that morning as the lifts were cranking up.

He heads up Lower River Run at seven miles per hour past school kids carting cafeteria trays that they will turn into sleds.

"Eleven miles per hour is tops, but it's too fast for decent grooming," he says. "We usually groom between three and six miles an hour. Even then, we put on 35 miles a

Four of the groomers joining Wieand on the slopes tonight have 25 or more years of grooming under their belt. Wieand's been tilling Baldy's

He followed his brother to

gree in forestry at Penn State. He took the grooming job to supplement his summer work building houses back in the days when construction didn't go year-round like it does now.

"I thought grooming was cool. And I like having the different jobs. I don't know if I would want to do either year round," he says.

Wieand continues up Mid-River Run, the steep angle of the hill forcing him back in his seat. The scenery feels strangely different for a skier used to going downhill the other way. But it's the norm for Wieand.

He turns onto a cat track only to see another snow cat coming toward him as it brings the day's garbage down. Wieand backs up onto Mid-River Run to let the cat by him then continues on the cat track to College where he turns uphill again.

The sun is casting long shadows in the folds of the Pioneer Mountains to the east as Wieand reaches the top.

"In spring you get the moon rising on one side as the sun's setting on the other. Once, about 10 years ago, I saw the Northern lights from up here," he says.

Wieand gently maneuvers his lever again and for a second it feels as if The Beast is lurching off the top of the world as it heads over a cornice onto Christmas. Snowballs kicked up by the Beast scatter down the hill as snow sifts through tiny holes in the front blade.

The seat belt keeps Wieand from falling forward as The Beast heads down the steep pitch.

"The first time I ever drove a groomer I was on Upper Canyon and it was dark and I didn't know where I was," he says. "I thought: What the heck am I doing? Now I can groom Warm Springs with my eyes closed."

At the bottom of Christmas Wieand gets out to untie ropes that the ski patrol strung across the cat track when they closed Seattle Ridge earlier in the day. He climbs back into the cab and points the Beast downward again. At the bottom he brings the cat to the very edge of the cat track, spins around and heads back uphill.

"I call this the little ballerina because of the way it pirouettes," he says.

At four miles an hour, it takes The Beast 10 minutes to go down Christmas Ridge and Mid-Christmas - 18 minutes to climb back to the

Snow blows across the windshield, prompting Wieand to turn on massive fourfoot wipers as he swipes a spotlight across the snow to examine his work.

"Doesn't look too bad. It goes faster when we get away from the snow guns," he observes as he weaves the Beast

in between the guns stretching down the middle of the

Wieand has groomed in 80 mile-per-hour winds raking Baldy and whiteouts. Once, he was caught in a slide that pushed the groomer he was driving several feet down the

Tonight he will take a 20minute lunch break about 9 p.m., parking his groomer with the others outside the ski patrol shack. He'll then groom Warm Springs and The Ridge before he turns The Beast over to the graveyard shift at 12:30 a.m.

The extra seat in The Beast allows Sun Valley to offer free rides on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays when guests can catch the gondola down.

One of the guests Wieand has ferried was a Pennsylvanian who used to have a sporting goods store near where Wieand grew up and knew one of Wieand's brothers

"They find that it's just like mowing a lawn, only we're mowing snow instead," Weiand says. SKI magazine ranked Sun

Valley's grooming second best in North America this past year, topped only by Deer Valley. Wieand is more concerned about what the skiers who take to the slopes every day think.



NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks slumped Wednesday in one of their worst showings this year as Greece, slogging through negotiations with other countries over a bailout, once again cast a long shadow over the financial markets. AMR Corp.'s Fourth-quarter Loss • AMR Corp., the parent of American Airlines, said Wednesday that it lost \$1.1 billion in the fourth quarter as it wrote down the value of planes and other property and paid more for jet fuel. The company, which filed for bankruptcy protection in November, said that the results compared with a loss of \$97 million a year earlier, when AMR still hoped to avoid bankruptcy by cutting costs. The most recent loss included \$768 million in special items, including \$725 million from writedowns of aircraft that the company had announced two weeks ago. It also took a \$43 million hit as it changed assumptions on recognition of revenue in its frequent-flier program. Excluding special items, AMR said it would have lost \$209 million, compared to an after-items loss of \$69 million a year ago.

Manufacturers Providing Outsize Boost to Economy

WASHINGTON • American factories are humming - and driving the economy forward.

Manufacturers have been hiring more consistently than other employers, for jobs with better-than-average pay. They just had their best month of growth in five years. And more factory output has raised demand in some other industries, such as shipping, leading to further hir-

"The manufacturing sector is on a tear," said Paul Ashworth, an economist at Capital Economics.

It's an optimistic theme that serves President Barack Obama's political needs. On Wednesday, Obama traveled to Milwaukee to salute a company that brought jobs back to the United States. The president has promoted the nation's manufacturing base as an engine of growth and as evidence of a recovering

No one thinks manufacturing will return to its 1950s peak. After all, the factory sector now makes up barely onetenth of the economy.

But since the recession ended more than 21/2 years ago, factories have been contributing disproportionately to the recovery in hiring and the overall economy.

A big reason, economists say, is that individuals and businesses are making major purchases they delayed during the Great Recession and its aftermath. Consumers are buying more cars and appliances. Companies are investing in industrial machinery and computers.

The release of that pent-up demand gives manufacturing a kick that isn't visible in some other corners of the economy. Manufacturing was hit particularly hard by the recession. Consumers postponed purchases of cars, refrigerators and flatscreen TVs, even as they continued to visit doctors, get haircuts and pay utility bills.

"Manufacturing has punched above its weight, but that's because it was punched in the stomach in the recession," Michael Montgomery, a senior

economist at IHS Global Insight, said. Factory output got off to a robust start this year, and it ended last year with the fastest growth in five years, the Federal Reserve said Wednesday.

Those were the best back-to-back monthly performances since summer 2009, when the recession ended, according to Jonathan Basile, an economist at Credit Suisse.

Manufacturing is delivering an outsize benefit to the economy in key ways:

Jobs

About 9 percent of the nation's jobs are in manufacturing. But last year, factories added 13 percent of new jobs. And in January, about one-fifth of the 243,000 net jobs the economy created were in manufacturing.

Factory growth has also helped to increase hiring in other industries such as shipping, warehousing, department store sales and auto sales. Railroad operators such as Union Pacific have stepped up hiring as their shipments of cars, machinery and other equipment have climbed.

The hiring has boosted struggling Midwestern states such as Ohio and Michigan, which will likely be battleground states in the presidential election.

George Mokrzan, an economist at Columbus, Ohio-based Huntington Bank, said those two states have added a greater percentage of jobs since the recession ended than the nation as a whole.

Wages

Average hourly pay for factory workers making durable goods, such as autos, was \$20.15 in January, according to the Labor Department. That's above the average of \$19.37 for the broad service sector, meaning that each new manufacturing job, on average, fuels more consumer spending than does the equivalent new servicesector jobs.

The service sector, which employs roughly 90 percent of the private-sector workforce, includes everything from restaurants and hotels and retailers to financial service firms and construction companies.

As Clint Eastwood's Super Bowl halftime ad for Chrysler ("Our second half is about to begin?") showed, Americans are thought to respond more emotionally to a rebound in manufacturing than in other sectors. The perception that American manufacturing is healthy again could boost confidence in the economy, some analysts say.

Confidence

Jeffrey Bergstrand, a finance professor at Notre Dame University, calls it "factory nostalgia" but says that it is "economically legitimate?"

"It reminds us of the period of the greatest growth we had in the U.S. economy," Bergstrand said. "It's also ... an association with the boom in the middle class, (when) they were all sharing in that economic boom."

Still, economists caution that expanding factories can do only so much to reduce unemployment. That's because factories have increasingly relied on automation and other advances to produce more goods with fewer people.

Many economists expect manufacturing to keep growing faster than the broader economy for the rest of the year. It's not clear how long that will continue.

"This is nothing more than the manufacturing sector recovering faster because it got hammered worse," Montgomery said.

Payroll Tax Cut: Ironing Out the Final Details

Aides say a key Democratic negotiator had yet to agree to a provision requiring federal workers to contribute more to their pensions.

WASHINGTON • Calling quits to a bruising election-year fight, negotiators on Capitol Hill worked into Wednesday night trying to iron out final details of an agreement to extend a cut in the payroll taxes paid by most Americans. The legislation also would renew jobless benefits for millions more.

The \$150-billion measure taking shape represents a tactical retreat for Republicans, who are generally unenthusiastic about the legislation but eager to move beyond the issue. With campaign season starting, they don't want President Barack Obama and Democrats in Congress to be able to claim the GOP was standing in the way of a middle-class tax cut.

Lawmakers hoped to unveil the measure Wednesday night so it could be voted on Friday in the House and then quickly pass the Senate. It would represent a rare burst of bipartisanship in a bitterly divided Congress.

But aides said a key Democratic negotiator, Sen. Ben Cardin of Maryland, had yet to agree to the measure because of a provision requiring federal workers to contribute more to their pensions. The provision was included to help pay for or "offset" extending unemployment benefits.

It was unclear whether the issue would be resolved Wednesday.

"They are still talking," Cardin spokeswoman Sue Walitsky said. "Sen. Cardin continues to work with his colleagues to ensure the fairness of the offsets."

The legislation would continue a 2 percentage point cut in the Social Security payroll tax, renew jobless benefits averaging about \$300 a week for people languishing for long periods on unemployment rolls and protect doctors from a huge cut in their Medicare reimbursements.

Obama was getting his licks even as talks neared a conclusion.

"I'm glad to see that Congress seems to be ... making progress on extending the payroll tax cut so taxes don't go up on all of you and 160 million working Americans," he said at an appearance at a lock factory in Milwaukee. "It will make a real differ-

ence in the lives of millions of people."
The measure carries a price tag of roughly \$150 billion over the coming year, partly financed through requiring federal workers to contribute an additional 1.5 percent of their earnings toward their pensions. That provision would generate \$15 billion over the coming decade.

Baby Gets Pacemaker 15 Minutes After Birth

SAN FRANCISCO • The name Jaya in Hindi means victorious. And little Jaya Maharaj was just that, when she became one of the smallest recipients of a pacemaker when she was just 15 minutes old. A team of doctors at Stanford University's Lucile Packard Children's Hospital determined the girl born nine weeks premature had only hours to live if they did not perform the surgery. Jaya, who was diagnosed in the womb with a severe heart ailment, entered the world with a heart rate of 45 beats per minute. A health newborn heartbeat is 120 to 150 beats per minute. "The only way to save this baby was to deliver the baby right away and then the pacemaker," said Dr. Katsuhide Maeda, the surgeon whose steady hand stitched the pacemaker's electrical leads to Jaya's walnut-sized heart. Stanford announced details of the operation this week. — Associated Press

Official: 358 Killed in Honduras Prison Fire

COMAYAGUA, Honduras • A fire started by an inmate tore through an overcrowded prison in Honduras, burning and suffocating screaming men in their locked cells as rescuers desperately searched for keys. Officials confirmed 358 dead Wednesday, making it the world's deadliest prison fire

in a century.

The local governor, who was once a prison employee, told reporters that an inmate called her moments before the blaze broke out and screamed: "I will set this place on fire and we are all going to die!"

Comayagua Gov. Paola Castro said she called the Red Cross and fire brigade immediately after receiving the call late Tuesday night. But firefighters said they were kept outside for half an hour by guards who fired their guns in the air, thinking they had a riot or a breakout on their hands.

Officials have long had little control over conditions inside many Honduran prisons, where inmates have largely unfettered access to cell phones and other contraband.

Survivors told investigators the unidentified inmate set fire to his bedding in the farm prison in the central town of Comayagua, 53 miles north of Tegucigalpa. The lockup housed people convicted of serious crimes such as homicide and armed robbery, but also those who had yet to be tried.

The blaze spread within minutes, killing inmates in their locked bar-

"We couldn't get them out because we didn't have the keys and couldn't find the guards who had them," Comayagua fire department spokesman Josue Garcia said.

With 856 prisoners packed into barracks, the prison was at double capacity, said Supreme Court Justice Richard Ordonez, who is leading the investigation. There were only 12 guards on duty when the fire broke out, said state prosecutor German Enamorado.

Ordonez told AP the fire started in a barracks where 105 prisoners were bunked, and only four of them survived. Some 115 bodies had been sent on Wednesday to the morgue in the capital of Tegucigalpa.

Other prisoners were set free by guards but died from the flames or smoke as they tried to flee into the fields surrounding the facility, where prisoners grew corn and beans on a state-run farm.

Survivors told grim tales of climbing walls to break the sheet metal roofing and escape, only to see prisoners in other cell blocks being burned alive.

"I only saw flames, and when we got out, they were being burned, up against the bars, they were stuck to them," said Eladio Chicas, 40, who was in his 15th year of a 39-year sentence.

"It was something horrible," he said as he was led away by police, handcuffed, to testify before a local court about what he saw.

"This is a nightmare."

Ordonez said the inmates' bodies were found piled up in the prison's bathrooms, where they apparently fled to turn on the showers in the hope that the water would save them from the blistering flames.

burned bodies fused to the metal.

"We were awoken by the flames and screams," said homicide suspect Selbim Adonay, 18, one of the prison's many inmates awaiting trial. He wore a dust mask and handcuffs, his jeans torn. "We couldn't do anything because we were locked up."

Defiant Iran Claims Major Steps Toward Nuclear Fuel

TEHRAN, Iran ● In defiant swipes at its foes, Iran said Wednesday it is dramatically closer to mastering the production of nuclear fuel even as the U.S. weighs tougher pressures and Tehran's suspected shadow war with Israel brings probes far beyond the Middle East.

Iran further struck back at the West by indicating it was on the verge of imposing a midwinter fuel squeeze to Europe in retaliation for a looming boycott of Iranian oil, but denied reports earlier in the day that six nations had

already been cut off.

The uncompromising messages from Iran, however, came with a counterpoint. The official IRNA news agency said Iran's top nuclear negotiator, Saeed Jalili, told European Union

foreign policy chief Catherine Ashton that Iran is ready to return to talks with the U.S. and other world powers.

The dual strategy — taking nuclear steps while proposing more talks — has become a hallmark of Iran's dealings for years and some critics have dismissed it as a time-buying tactic. The advances claimed Wednesday could likely feed these views.

In a live TV broadcast, President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad was shown overseeing what was described as the first Iranian-made fuel rod inserted into a research reactor in northern Tehran. Separately, the semiofficial Fars agency reported that a "new generation" of Iranian centrifuges — used to enrich uranium toward nuclear fuel — had gone into operation at the country's main enrichment facility at Natanz in central Iran.

GOP Pushes Back Against Further Cuts in U.S. Nukes


WASHINGTON • Congressional Republicans on Wednesday vowed to block the Obama administration from sharply cutting the U.S. nuclear force, calling potential reductions of as much as 80 percent in the number of deployed weapons "reckless lunacy."

Pointing to the growing number of trouble spots, from Iran to Syria to Egypt, members of the House Armed Services Committee said any significant cuts would undermine the U.S. ability to deter aggression. The AP reported on Tuesday that the administration is weighing several options for new reductions from the current treaty limit of 1,550 deployed strategic warheads.

"It was no joke," said Jon Basso, who bills himself as "Doctor Jon," his scantily-clad waitresses as nurses and customers as patients. Basso said he could tell right away the man in his 40s eating a Triple Bypass burger was having trouble. He was sweating, shaking and could barely talk. Paramedics were called Saturday night, fire spokesman Tim Szymanski said, and the man was hospitalized. His name and information about his condition weren't made public.

In today's deal from the NEC event held in Yokohama last February, Kyoko Shimamura took the slow route to four spades. West led a club to the ace and East then shifted to a low diamond. West won her king and returned a thoughtful low heart, trying to remove dummy's entry and needing her partner to have no more than the heart nine to have a chance to set the game. No luck — but a nice play.

In fact, at double-dummy, East needed to cash the diamond ace at trick two, then shift to a heart, with West covering declarer's card to remove dummy's entry.

At another table, Heather Dhondy received the equally testing defense of two rounds of diamonds. She ruffed, drew trumps, then played the club jack. East, Yukiko Umezu, won and exited in diamonds. Dhondy ruffed and led a heart up, but Etsuko Naito riposted by winning the heart ace to leave the hearts blocked, then played a fourth diamond. Declarer ruffed with her last trump, but (depending on whether she had unblocked the heart king or not) had to concede a club or a heart at the end.

Vlad Isporski for the Bulgarian All-Stars also received the defense of two rounds of diamonds. He pitched his club instead of ruffing, and now when West won and made the mistake of leading a club instead of a trump, Isporski could ruff away the club ace, draw trumps, and lead a heart toward the king, leaving the defense helpless.

ANSWER: Two clubs. This hand raises the issue of what your partner should expect from a twolevel overcall. Any reader who has seen me criticize overcalls on five-card suits may be surprised when I say that an overcall here is perfectly OK — though I draw the line at a jump overcall. Any decent six-card suit tends to be acceptable, though I'd probably pass at unfavorable vulnerability.

On this date:

In 1804, Lt. Stephen Decatur led a successful raid into Tripoli Harbor to burn the U.S. Navy frigate Philadelphia, which had fallen into the hands of pirates.

In 1868, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks was organized in New York City.

In 1918, Lithuania proclaimed its independence from the Russian Empire. (Lithuania, which was occupied by the Soviet Union, then Nazi Germany, then the Soviet Union again during World War II, renewed its independence in 1990).

In 1923, the burial chamber of King Tutankhamen's recently unearthed tomb was unsealed in Egypt by **English** archaeologist Howard Carter.

In 1937, Dr. Wallace H. Carothers, a research chemist for Du Pont who'd invented nylon, received a patent for the synthetic fiber.

In 1945, American troops landed on the island of Corregidor in the Philippines during World War II.

In 1959, Fidel Castro became premier of Cuba a month and a-half after the overthrow of Fulgencio Batista.

In 1961, the United States launched the Explorer 9 satellite.

In 1968, the nation's first 911 emergency telephone system was inaugurated in Haleyville, Ala.

In 1977, Janani Luwum, the Anglican archbishop of Uganda, and two other men were killed in what Ugandan authorities said was an automobile accident.

In 1987, John Demjanjuk went on trial in Jerusalem, accused of being "Ivan the Terrible," a guard at the Treblinka Nazi concentration camp. (Demjanjuk was convicted, but the conviction ended up being overturned by the Israeli Supreme Court.)

In 1998, a China Airlines Airbus A300-600R trying to land in fog near Taipei, Taiwan, crashed, killing all 196 people on board.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush, en route to a three-nation tour of Asia, stopped off at Elmendorf Air Force Base in Alaska, where he told hundreds of cheering U.S. soldiers that "America will not blink" in the fight against terrorism and Osama bin Laden. Authorities in Noble, Ga., arrested Ray Brent Marsh, who'd been operating a crematory where hundreds of decomposing corpses were found stacked in storage sheds and scattered in the woods behind it. (Marsh later pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 12 years in prison.) Former Cabinet member and Common Cause founder John W. Gardner died in Stanford, Calif., at age 89.

Five years ago: The Democratic-controlled House issued a symbolic rejection of President George W. Bush's decision to deploy more troops to Iraq, approving the nonbinding resolution by a vote of 246-182. An Italian judge indicted 25 suspected CIA agents and a U.S. Air Force lieutenant colonel in the alleged kidnapping of an Egyptian terror suspect, Osama Moustafa Hassan (Twenty-three Nasr. Americans were later convicted in absentia along with two Italians.)

One year ago: Bookstore chain Borders filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection and said it would close nearly a third of its stores. (Borders closed all of its remaining stores in Sept. 2011.) Huge crowds called for a political overhaul in Bahrain, and leaders appeared to shift tactics after attempts to crush the uprising stoked protesters' rage.







to hold off Jerome (316).


Borden all won their second straight titles - each at different weight classes with the new additions this sea-

Not after the last nine months. With the bulk of talent returning from last year's Class 4A state tournament runner-up, the Wolverines were penciled in as early favorites to return to state. But in the last 12 months, they lost their point guard and nearly lost

their coach to a brain hemorrhage. Even now, as they prepare for today's tournament opener in Boise against Century, Wood River is dealing with side issues. Interim head coach Kevin Stilling, filling in for his wife and head coach Mendy Benson, is battling laryngitis, and their 2-year-old daughter Tobie broke her leg last week.

It just wouldn't be 2011-12 Wood River basketball without an obstacle.

"It's been one thing right after another, and all I can say is this season has been about so much more than just basketball for us. Any time you see someone close to you literally at the strings of life, it becomes about so much more than the game," said point guard Kaitana Martinez, who returned from an ACL tear with five games left in the regular season.

In mid-to-late June, Benson began experiencing headaches. She went to Boise to get it checked out, and on the way back to Hailey, she got worse.

A CT scan back home detected a brain bleed, and medical personnel got her on a helicopter to Salt Lake City without delay. Stilling followed on land, wondering whether Benson and the baby were going to be OK. His football team would have to go to team camp without him.

"One of my assistants dropped everything and drove me down to Salt Lake in the middle of the night. The whole 31/2 hour drive and the next two days that was all I thought about," he said. "What I was going to do with (2year-old) Tobie by myself was on my mind quite a few times."



But the gelling of a team, and a community, is something the Wolverines are leaning heavily on in the run-up to a hoped-for dream ending to a wild last nine months.

"Rallying around each other, the community and the team is what we've really honed in on," Martinez said. "I still have some of the text messages and phone calls from teammates and friends from when they heard about my injury and about coach Benson. I listened to them the other day again, and you just get the reassurance that things are going to be OK. It's really special."

TCU Drug Bust Nets Four Football Players

FORT WORTH, Texas • Authorities arrested 17 students at Texas Christian University on Wednesday as part of a six-month drug sting, an especially embarrassing blow to the school because it included four members of the high-profile football team.

Arrest warrants painted a startling picture of the Horned Frogs, with a handful of players who allegedly arranged marijuana sales after class or around practice and who told police that most of the team had failed a surprise drug test just two weeks ago.

According to police, players sold undercover officers marijuana during the season and as recently as last week.

"There are days people want to be a head football coach, but today is not one of those days," coach Gary Patterson said in a prepared statement. "As I heard the news this morning, I was first shocked, then hurt and now I'm mad."

The 17 people arrested were caught making "handto-hand" sales of marijuana, cocaine, ecstasy and prescription drugs to undercover officers, police said. They said the bust followed an investigation prompted by complaints from students, parents and others.

TCU has an enrollment of about 9,500 students, but the athlete arrests drew the most scrutiny. The bust came just one day after a thrilling overtime victory by the men's basketball team over a ranked opponent and less than 24 hours after TCU released its football schedule for next season, its first in the Big 12 Conference.

Three prominent defensive players on the team were arrested: linebacker Tanner Brock, the leading tackler two seasons ago, defensive tackle D.J. Yendrey and cornerback Devin Johnson. The other player is offensive lineman Ty Horn.

While school Chancellor Victor Boschini said he didn't think TCU had a "football problem," the arrest affidavits raise the possibility that other players were involved.

In November, a Fort Worth police officer was informed that Horn was selling marijuana to "college students and football players at Texas Christian."






