PICABO • Perched on the back of a mud splattered pickup, Nate Muhn stared Friday through a pair of binoculars and directed a spotlight.

As the leader of a sage grouse trapping expedition, Muhn was in charge of spotting the birds so his net-wielding helpers could snag them

Swinging his light to the right side of the truck, he silently looked out across the snow-covered sagebrush. Then he set the light down and signalled for the truck to stop, muttering that he didn't like the brake lights casting shadows off the volunteers' legs dangling off the tailgate.

"I think we have some brake light covers in here somewhere," he said, rummaging through a plastic tub. "And by covers, I mean duct tape."

Muhn, a wildlife technician for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's regional office, has led such expeditions for the past four nights. The goal each night is to put as many radio collars on the birds as possible before 4 a.m. with the help of three to five volunteers.

"We go until the collars are gone," said Brad Lowe, landowner coordinator for the department's regional office.

Depending on available funding and resources, Fish and Game officials collar sage grouse throughout the state every one to two years. Employees at the Jerome Fish and Game regional office have spent the past several Please see SAGE GROUSE, A2

Health Care Field Expected to See Growth by 2020

Rupert • Employment projections by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics point to health care occupations as seeing the most rapid growth during the next eight years.

But farming, ranching and agricultural management jobs are among those expected to decline the most, according to the bureau.

Robyn Maxfield and her husband, Jerry, started Comfort Keepers in Rupert, Twin Falls and Pocatello in 2001. The company uses College of Southern Idaho nursing students, certified nursing assistants and personal care aides to help its clients remain living at home.

The company was inspired by Robyn's two grandmothers, who needed assistance with driving and help with household chores.

"I saw a need in my own life and filled it," she said.

Maxfield said she sees her industry continuing to expand throughout the next decade and beyond as baby boomers continue to age.

Registered nurses, home health aides and personal care aides are all among the top five occupations projected to see the greatest increases in the number of jobs by 2020, as reported by the labor bureau. Registered nurses topped the list with a projected increase of 712,000 jobs.

Though farming, ranching and agricultural management topped the list of jobs most likely to decline, the numbers are much smaller — those categories are only expected to lose 96,000 jobs. U.S. Postal Service positions account for two of the remaining four spots.

Winners and Losers

Non-agriculture wage and salary employment, which includes nine of 10 jobs in the U.S., is expected to reach 150.2 million jobs by 2020, up from 130.4 million in 2010.

Health care and the social assistance sector will likely gain the most jobs — 5.6 million — followed by professional and business services at 3.8 million, and construction at 1.8 million.

Committee Holds Contraceptives Bill

BOISE • Legislation to counter a federal mandate regarding birth control stalled in a House committee Monday, but will return.

On Monday, the House Health and Welfare Committee held legislation that exempts Idaho employers and insurance companies from a federal requirement to cover contraceptives, abortion-inducing drugs and sterilization.

Unlike most instances when a committee holds a bill, sponsor Rep. Carlos Bilbao, R-Emmett, will be allowed to make changes to the bill to address legislators' concerns.

Bilbao introduced the bill Thursday, saying the birth control coverage mandate under the federal Affordable Care

Act violates his religious beliefs.

Dozens turned out to watch the committee meeting, and most who testified were against the bill. Many women spoke of using birth control to treat debilitating migraines, painful menstrual cycles and endometriosis. Under the proposed legislation, their employer or insurance company could choose not to cover the birth control, regardless of its intended use.

"Basically, my period is really horrible to deal with," said Elizabeth Littman of Boise. But, she said, birth control helps. "With it, I can be at work and be a productive employee."

Rep. John Rusche, D-Lewiston, and Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, both physicians, cited a number of reasons for not supporting the bill. Rusche said employers can't impose their morals on individual employees, and Wood reiterated that contraceptives can be used for a number of different ailments. Contraception is expensive, Wood added, and even at cheap pharmacies

More High-schoolers Say They've Used Marijuana

TWIN FALLS • About 35 percent of Idaho high school students surveyed last year reported using marijuana at least

And nearly 19 percent — about one in five students — said they used the illegal drug within the past 30 days. That's up by about 5 percent over 2009.

Those statistics are included in the 2011 Idaho Youth Risk Behavior Survey, released earlier this month by the Idaho State Department of Education.

Kim Dopson, clinical director for Pro Active Advantage in Twin Falls, said some teenagers say marijuana is more accessible to them than alcohol.

"It is becoming dangerously prevalent," she said.

Pro Active Advantage provides a variety of health services, including substance abuse treatment for adults and teens through locations in Gooding, Twin Falls and Burley.

Dopson said some teens are experimenting with marijuana, but it may be difficult for parents to know which behavioral signs to look for.

"The more information they get the

BOISE • Before a woman receives an abortion in Idaho, she receives three informational pamphlets, a description of available pregnancy and adoption services, and an offer of an ultrasound.

Soon, that ultrasound may be required.

Sen. Chuck Winder, R-Boise, is sponsoring legislation that, if passed, would require doctors to give an ultrasound to women before performing an abortion. The bill would expand a law that requires physicians to offer an ultrasound, but doesn't mandate that they perform the ultrasound before the abortion.

As the bill is written, women could still turn down the offer to see the ultrasound image, Winder said. Both the physician and the woman would have to acknowledge that the ultrasound was performed.

The law wouldn't affect a woman's right to choose, Winder said. Rather, it would help the woman make an informed decision on whether to follow through with the abortion, as well as help the physician identify possible complica-

"They can identify the age of the fetus, the baby, to also look at potential medical related issues that may relate to either the woman or the development of that child," Winder said.

The bill is modeled after similar laws in seven other states, Winder said. Currently, Virginia is considering similar legislation.

Jason Herring of Right to Life Idaho said his organization supports the legislation, saying that ultrasounds often persuade women not to go through with abortions.

"She can't be forced to do that against her will," Herring said. "If she chooses to, that gives her a window into her womb."

Hannah Brass, legislative director for Planned Parenthood, said she hadn't seen the specific bills, but said the organization is concerned that the law would require unnecessary medical procedures. Early-term pregnancies, for example, may require an invasive transvaginal ultrasound.

"There's no reason to do that," Brass said. "It's just a violation of that woman's privacy and her body to require that?"

Brass also said the law shows a distrust of women to make decisions for them-

Winder said he's not sure when the legislation will be introduced, but expects it will be ready in the next couple of weeks.

T.F. Council to Tackle Cracks—on Eastland and Underwater

TWIN FALLS • Cracks on Eastland Drive can make travelling the north-south thoroughfare a literal pain in the backside.

The crack in the lower Blue Lakes is equally jarring to Twin Falls water officials, who have learned that millions of gallons of the city's water supply drain daily out of a Mini Cooper-sized fissure in the lake's floor.

During its meeting today, the Twin Falls City Council will consider taking the next step in soothing both of those pains. But the fixes to the two issues that came to light last summer won't come

Reconstructing Eastland from Falls to Filer avenues will require the council to approve a more than \$830,000 bid by Idaho Sand and Gravel for the "schedule A" portion of the project. The slightly more expensive "schedule B" portion is held up as the city attempts to work out right-of-way purchases with two holdout Eastland property owners.

Among six contractors, Idaho Sand and Gravel produced the lowest bid for both segments.

Fixing the Blue Lakes crack is part of a \$150,000 project to improve the city's water system. But first, the council needs to sign off on an agreement with Blue Lakes Country Club for the work, as the lakes are the golf club's property, and city pumping affects their water levels.

If the agreement is approved, the city plans to

Scam artists posing as the Internal Revenue Service will use mail, email or telephone calls in attempts to gain taxpayers' individual information and bank account details.

Emails requesting tax return information that bear the IRS logo should be scrutinized, as the IRS typically

contacts taxpayers by mail. Also, calls requesting the verification of a bank account number for any reason should not be complied with. The IRS does not typically contact taxpayers by phone.

Always verify the legitimacy of the calling individual and organization before providing any personal information.

weeks attempting to collar 40 of the birds.

It's a slow process. The group started in January; at the end of the month, volunteers had found 22 birds. On Friday night, the group only managed to collar one grouse.

The radio collars will allow the department to track the birds for almost two years. Information gathered from the collars will be distributed to state and federal agencies researching sage grouse habitat.

The project is important, but far from easy. Volunteers sacrifice weekend nights, spending them braving freezing temperatures in the back of a pickup, rolling across fields of sagebrush. On Friday, temperatures were in the 20s and the wind

gathered force as the night went on.

"Are you ready for the coldest night of your life?" Lowe asked, greeting the volunteers as they put on multiple layers of fleece jackets, windbreakers and snow pants. "Because you're about to experience it."

To cover up the sound of the truck, speakers taped to the hood blast a mixture of country and classic rock. If a bird is found, Muhn directs

the truck to its located and a designated "netter" runs alongside until the bird is in lunging distance.

One netter, Tara Barrier, said she learned by the second night to dress warmer and stay alert while riding on the tailgate of the truck.

"I fell off the tailgate last night," said Barrier, a wildlife biologist for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management. "It's a good thing I was wearing so many layers."

in the Youth Risk Behavior Survey last spring at 48 randomly selected public high schools around Idaho. The locations of the schools weren't released.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention developed the survey, which covers categories such as injuries, tobacco use, drug and alcohol use, sexual behaviors that result in sexually transmitted diseases and unintended pregnancies, dietary behaviors, and physical activity.

State and local education officials weren't available to comment on survey results Monday due to the Presidents Day holiday.

marijuana more than oth-That shouldn't come as a surprise. Marijuana is the most commonly used

States, according to the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

About 3 percent of students surveyed said they'd used heroin at least once, while 7 percent have used cocaine, 3 percent have used methamphetamine and 9 percent have used ecstasy.

Ron Jones, a licensed professional clinical counselor for Positive Connections in Twin Falls, said many teenagers experiment with alcohol or drugs.

"What concerns me is the statistic of adolescents who need treatment but aren't getting it," he

More than 5 percent of Idaho teenagers — between ages 12 and 17 need treatment for drug use but don't receive it, according to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration.

Positive Connections stopped providing drug and alcohol treatment about three months ago, Jones said, due to funding constraints.

Wood also objected to spending taxpayers dollars on any eventual lawsuit stemming from the bill.

Rep. Steve Thayn, R-Emmett, said that he supported the intent of the bill, but was concerned about the broad language. Under the bill's definition of "abortifacient," employers could deny coverage for any drug that could induce a miscarriage, including chemotherapy for a pregnant woman, he said.


The committee agreed, voting to hold the bill and give Bilbao a chance to tighten up the language.

"I do support the motive of the sponsor," said Rep. Ken Roberts, R-Donnelly, "but I think that the potential unintended consequences here might be something they want to address."

Alleged Pot Dealer Arrested

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls police say detectives caught an alleged marijuana dealer after an undercover operation that ended last week.

Trey Robert Tickner, 21, was arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Court Feb. 15 on three counts of delivery of a controlled substance, destruction of evidence, and possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

Police say they first set up a controlled purchase with Tickner on Jan. 25 using a confidential informant. The informant planned to pick Tickner up from his house on Julie Lane in Twin Falls and buy a half-ounce of marijuana for \$160. According to police, the informant was able to buy the

marijuana from Tickner and also asked to buy Percocet. Tickner allegedly told the informant he could get Xanax from a doctor soon.

On Jan. 30 the informant, wearing a wire, went to Tickner's house again to attempt a controlled buy of prescription pain pills and more marijuana. Police say the informant was able to buy an eighth-ounce of marijuana for \$50 but was unable to buy the prescription drugs at the time.

Police say they again organized a controlled buy from Tickner using a confidential informant on Feb. 13. The informant and Tickner met in the Hasting's parking lot at 870 Blue Lakes Blvd. where Tickner allegedly sold an eighth of an ounce of marijuana to the informant for \$60.

On Feb. 14 police served a

search warrant at Tickner's home. Detectives reported Tickner ran upstairs into a bathroom and locked the door when they entered the house. One detective entered the bathroom and said he saw Tickner trying to flush marijuana down the toilet. Despite the attempt, the detective said the baggie and some marijuana remained in the toilet water.

Police said they found two pill bottles and a bag containing more marijuana, \$105 in cash, two prescription muscle relaxant pills and a digital scale. Police said they also found rolling papers and a plastic grinder along with a marijuana pipe in the house.

Tickner was held at the Twin Falls County Jail on \$5,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for

The two put their new CPR knowledge to use when they came across a skier in his early 60s who suffered a heart attack on Bald Mountain Saturday morning.

The Sun Valley Ski Patrol received a report at 10:18 a.m. of a skier down on 42nd Street, just below Exhibition on the River Run side of the mountain.

They responded and found the two individuals from Twin Falls performing CPR on the unresponsive

After a couple of uses of the defibrillator, the man revived and the Ski Patrol helped him to the bottom of River Run. St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center was unable to transport him by air from the Wood River Valley because of snowy weather. So the man was taken to an area near Shoshone, where he was transported by helicopter the rest of the way to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin

The man was back home by noon Sunday and word is that he plans to return to Baldy today to thank the Ski Patrol, said Sun Valley spokesman Jack Sibbach.

"The cardiologist said that if it weren't for that couple performing CPR that that guy would've died," Sibbach said. "The efforts of that couple performing CPR and the Ski Patrol saved a life that

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Paul Looks for Delegates, Respect in Caucus States

WASHINGTON • Ron Paul may not win the Republican nomination for president – he has yet to win a single state - but his strategy of trying to amass delegates in caucus states could land him a prominent role at the party's national convention this summer.

Imagine this: A primetime speech at the GOP convention in which Paul criticizes American military action overseas and condemns the war on terror as an overreach of government authority at home. It's enough to make some Republicans cringe.

But they may have little choice if they want to placate Paul's supporters and keep them from becoming a distraction at an event designed to promote party unity and showcase the nominee, whoever it is.

"Paul is fascinating because good ol' Ron will say just about anything he wants to say at any particular time," said Dennis Goldford, a professor of politics at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. "And the last thing you want somebody doing is going off message in primetime at a convention."

With the exception of Maine, the Texas congressman hasn't come close to winning the popular vote in any of the first nine states to vote. However, campaign aides say their knowledge of caucus rules combined with the enthusiasm of Paul's supporters gives them a unique ability to take advantage of a process that

could take several months to sort out. Paul's campaign manager, John Tate, said he is unsure how many delegates Paul has amassed in caucus states. But, he boldly predicted: "We are confident that when all is said and done and some of these caucus states finish their process that we will end up with either a good plurality or a majority of the delegates out of Maine, Iowa, Minnesota, Nevada, possibly Colorado."

Paul echoed Tate's prediction for Iowa and Maine in a broadcast interview Sunday.

OIL JUMPS TO 9-MONTH HIGH AFTER IRAN CUTS SUPPLY

Oil prices jumped to a nine-month high above \$105 a barrel on Monday after Iran said it halted crude exports to Britain and France in an escalation of a dispute over the Middle Eastern country's nuclear program.

By early afternoon in Europe, benchmark March crude was up \$1.91 to \$105.15 per barrel in electronic trading on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Earlier in the day, it rose to \$105.21, the highest since May. The contract rose 93

cents to settle at \$103.24 per barrel in New York on Friday.

Markets in the United States were closed Monday for the Presidents Day

Iran's oil ministry said Sunday it stopped crude shipments to British and French companies in an apparent preemptive blow against the European Union after the bloc imposed sanctions on Iran's crucial fuel exports. They include a freeze of the country's central bank assets and an oil embargo set to begin in July.

Iran's Oil Minister Rostam Qassemi

had warned earlier this month that Tehran could cut off oil exports to "hostile" European nations. The 27nation EU accounts for about 18 percent of Iran's oil exports.

The EU sanctions, along with other punitive measures imposed by the U.S., are part of Western efforts to derail Iran's disputed nuclear program, which the West fears is aimed at developing atomic weapons. Iran denies the charges, and says its program is for peaceful purposes.

Analysts said Iran's announcement

As Santorum Seizes Social Issues, Romney Demurs

STEUBENVILLE, Ohio • Philosophical differences between the top two Republican presidential candidates are becoming starker as Rick Santorum drives harder on religious and social issues that Mitt Romney rarely discusses

In recent days, Santorum has questioned the usefulness of public schools, criticized prenatal testing and said President Barack Obama's theology is not "based on the Bible." On Monday, he likened Obama to politicians who spread fear about new oil-extraction technologies "so they can control your lives."

The remarks contrast sharply with Romney's even-tempered emphasis on jobs, the economy and his resume as a can-do corporate executive.

The differences give Republican voters clear choices to shape their party's identity and image heading into the fall battle against Obama. They also will test whether social conservatives and tea partyers can outperform the GOP establishment in key states such as Michigan and Ohio.

Both men campaigned Monday in Ohio, where their audiences, styles and messages produced distinctly contrasting atmospheres.

Santorum, the former senator from Pennsylvania, appeared in Steubenville before a packed room including many

students and employees of the town's Franciscan University. In his hour-long talk, Santorum never mentioned Romney or Newt Gingrich, who campaigned in Oklahoma.

He aimed squarely at Obama as he discussed abortion, marriage, the church and family. When he touched on non-social issues such as energy and the environment, he couched them in terms of epic struggles between reasonable conservatives and radical, sometimes devious Democrats.

"I refer to global warming as not climate science but political science," Santorum said to loud applause. He said Obama has "radical environmentalist policies" that reject robust

Source: Greece to Get \$170B Bailout, Reduce Debt

BRUSSELS • After more than 12 hours of talks, the countries that use the euro reached an agreement early today to hand Greece €130 billion (\$170 billion) in extra bailout loans to save it from a potentially disastrous default next month, an European Union diplomat

The euro surged as the news broke, climbing 0.7 percent to \$1.328 within minutes. While much depended on the details of the deal, a final agreement on the bailout for Greece will take some pressure off the 17-country currency union, which has been battling a serious debt crisis for two

The deal - details of which were still being worked out by European finance ministers in an all-night session in Brussels - was expected to bring Greece's debt down to 120.5 percent of gross domestic product by 2020, according to the official. That's around the maximum that the International Monetary Fund and the eurozone considered sustainable.

The diplomat spoke on condition of anonymity because a formal announcement was pending.

The country needs the €130 billion (\$170 billion) bailout so it can move ahead with a related €100 billion (\$130 billion) debt relief deal with private investors. That deal needs to be in place quickly if Athens is to avoid a disorderly default on a bond repayment on

Chicago School Draws Scrutiny Over Student Fines

Associated Press **CHICAGO** • A sense of order and decorum prevails at Noble Street College Prep as students move quickly through a hallway adorned with banners from dozens of colleges. Everyone wears a school polo shirt neatly tucked into khaki trousers. There's plenty of chatter but no jostling, no

cellphones and no dawdling. The reason, administrators say, is that students have learned there is a price to pay — literally — for breaking even the smallest rules.

Noble Network of Charter Schools charges students at its 10 Chicago high schools \$5 for detentions stemming from infractions that include chewing gum and having untied shoelaces. Last school year it collected almost \$190,000 in discipline "fees" from detentions and behavior classes — a policy drawing fire from some parents, advocacy groups and education experts.

Officials at the rapidly expanding network, heralded by Mayor Rahm Emanuel as a model for the city, say the fees offset the cost of running the detention program and help keep small problems from becoming big ones. Critics say Noble is nickel-and-diming its mostly low-income students over insignificant, made-up infractions that force out kids administrators don't want.

LOS ANGELES • Millions of Chinese have come to love Big Macs and Whoppers. So when a California-inspired chain put up signs in Shang-

hai announcing the coming

of the Double-Double, local

burger lovers rejoiced. The same can't be said of In-N-Out.

The California company doesn't operate any stores in China. So its owners were miffed to see a red-and-yellow doppelganger called CaliBurger laying claim to its signature burger, touting "Animal Style" fries topped

with cheese, special sauce and onions, and planning to serve thick shakes in palmtree-print cups.

Enforcing its intellectual property rights half a world away might seem a challenge for privately held In-N-Out, whose cult following belies its modest size. But it turns out CaliBurger's founders were Americans with company offices in Diamond Bar, Calif.

They agreed to tweak CaliBurger's menu and decor after In-N-Out filed suit in U.S. District Court in Santa Ana, Calif., for trademark infringement and counterfeiting. In-N-Out wouldn't comment on the settlement except for a statement saving "the matter has been resolved."

But in Shanghai, where CaliBurger opened its first branch last month, some of the restaurant's employees aren't shy about the source of their inspiration. Jonathan Wong, CaliBurger's chef de cuisine and director of training and development, is a former manager at an In-N-Out store in Northern California.

"The model was In-N-Out," said Wong, 28, a native of Hercules, Calif.

Still, CaliBurger has made some tweaks to the In-N-Out formula that even some Southern California die-hards might find an improvement on the original: booze and babes.

DIVISIONS IN ARAB LEAGUE HOBBLE EFFORTS TO RESOLVE SYRIA CRISIS

CAIRO • The Arab League's sharp internal divisions over how hard to push for regime change in Syria are hampering its ability to lead negotiations toward resolving the crisis, analysts said Monday.

The United Nations is looking to the Arab League to lead talks on the next international step to address the bloody, nearly year-old uprising against Syrian President Bashar Assad.

So far, however, the Arab envoys hardly make a united front, and those internal rifts make it unlikely that the group can press forward on demands for tougher sanctions on Syria before the U.N. Security Council, where Russia and China earlier this month vetoed a resolution condemning Assad's violent crackdown.

"There are now three classifications of Arab states: those that are pro-democracy (revolutionaries), those that support democratic reforms and the rest who aren't happy with any

changes," said Ziad Akl, a political analyst and professor at the American University in Cairo. "This dynamic movement never before existed in the Arab League, and it explains its reaction toward Syria."

The Arab League's division comes as two key events play out this week.

On Friday, Tunisia will host the first "Friends of Syria" gathering, which is expected to draw representatives from the United States and its European and Arab allies to plot their next move.

Here are a few tips on how to make it big on the world's biggest video platform.

Subscribers

YouTube's design changes mean that getting on the most-viewed list isn't the ticket to stardom that it once was. That "Evolution of Dance" video that was YouTube's most-watched clip for ages wouldn't cut it in the new YouTube world.

Now, it's all about getting people to subscribe to your videos. Maker Studios cofounder Danny Zappin says most of a video's views now occur in the first few weeks after release because subscribers have been waiting for them.

Make it Good

High-quality videos do better than slap-dash ones. That's why "NicePeter" Shukoff spends weeks researching each episode of "Epic Rap Battles of History" before getting in front of the camera.

Time Releases Well

Many successful YouTube channel operators time their videos to hit the Web in the same way that an episodic series airs on regular television. Ray William Johnson puts up a new video every Tuesday and Friday. When he's not there, he finds someone to fill in.

Maker's Zappin also recommends not uploading new videos in the wee hours or early in the morning.

group Parents United for Responsible Education, which staged protests last week over the policy after Woestehoff said she was approached by an upset parent

Students at Noble schools receive demerits for various infractions — four for having a cellphone or one for untied shoelaces. Four demerits within a two-week period earn them a detention and \$5 fine. Students who get 12 detentions in a year must attend a summer behavior class that costs \$140.

Superintendent Michael Milkie said the policy teaches the kids — overwhelmingly poor, minority and often hoping to be the first in their families to attend college to follow rules and produces in a structured learning environment. He points to the network's average ACT score of 20.3, which is higher than at the city's other non-selective public schools.

While fights can be an almost daily occurrence in some urban high schools, Milkie says there's only about one a year on each Noble campus.

By "sweating the small stuff ... we don't have issues with the big stuff," he said.

Milkie said the fines also help defray the cost of administering after-school detention and the salary of the network's dean of discipline, which otherwise would divert money intended for education.

But Donna Moore said the district is manufacturing problems that lead to unproductive badgering of students, including her 16year-old son, who had to repeat ninth grade at Noble's Gary Comer College Prep after racking up 33 detentions and several sus-"It was nothing egre-

gious, but just that the little things added up: a shirt unbuttoned, shoes not tied, not tracking the teacher with his eyes," said Moore, adding that her son has an attention disorder. "It's not normal to treat a young adult as a 2-year-old ... kids internalize that?"

Woestehoff and Moore said some families have removed their children from Noble schools because they couldn't keep paying the fees, though Moore said her biggest complaint is the infractions. Milkie said Noble sets up payment plans and on rare occasions waives the fees, and students never would be held back a grade solely because they couldn't pay.

Santorum said those institutions include: marriage, which is hurt by the so-called "marriage penalty" in tax policy; the Roman Catholic Church, which he said is under assault by Obama's policies regarding contraception coverage in health care plans; and charities, which he said would suffer if Obama succeeds in ending the tax deductibility for charitable donations.

"It's not surprising to see the president's assault on, first, charities," Santorum said.

It's not unusual for the GOP to face intra-party struggles between conservatives focused largely on social issues such as abortion and school prayer, and those focused mainly on financial matters such as spending and taxes. Sometimes the quarrels become loud and problematic, as when Pat Buchanan called for a "culture war" at the 1992 Republican national convention.

would likely have minimal impact on supplies, because only about 3 percent of France's oil consumption is from Iranian sources, while Britain had not imported oil from the Islamic republic in six months.

"The price rise is more a reflection of concerns about the further escalation in tensions between Iran and the West;" said commodity analyst Caroline Bain of the Economist Intelligence Unit. "Banning the tiny quantities of exports to the U.K. and France involves very little risk for Iran - indeed quite the opposite, it catches the headlines and leads to a

higher global oil price, which is something Iran is very keen to encourage."

Oil prices also rose on hopes that Greece's new bailout deal will be approved on Monday as well as by China's decision to boost money supply bid to spur lending and economic growth. China's central bank said Saturday it will lower the ratio of funds that banks must hold as reserves, a move that frees tens of billions of dollars.

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Idaho Lawmakers Look to Ban Kids from Tanning Beds

BOISE • After two days of emotional testimony from melanoma survivors and dermatologists, an Idaho House committee today approved legislation to ban minors from using tanning beds in the state.

"Tanning in tanning beds is a known cancercausing condition," Rep. John Rusche, D-Lewiston, a retired physician, told the conservative House Health and Welfare Committee. Those who use tanning beds, he said, "might look toasty for a few days, but the downside can be a fatal cancer, and it's totally preventable."

Lawmakers heard hours of heartfelt testimony in favor of the bill, and also heard from a handful of lobbyists who opposed it.

Jerry Deckard, lobbyist for the Idaho Indoor Tanning Association, told the committee, "A 17-year-old can drive a car," with all the risks of driving, "and yet you would not be able to get a sun tan."

Wayne Hoffman of the Idaho Freedom Foundation told the panel that next, the government will fine parents who let their children outside without sunscreen. Rep. Tom Loertscher, R-Iona, bridled. "Could you show me in the bill where it shows you can't let your kids out in the sunshine?" he asked Hoffman, who responded, "Obviously that's not in the bill, but my point is we're finding new ways to invite government interaction with people's families. ... Parents and families should still matter."

Heidi Low of the American Cancer Society told the panel that 34 percent of Īdaho girls have used tanning beds by age 17, and the state is "first in the nation for melanoma deaths." She said, "This bill is a step in the right direction to change this scary statistic."

Similar bans are being debated in states including Washington, West Virginia and Utah.

Jared Scott, a Boise native and Yale fellowshiptrained dermatologist, told the committee that people who have been exposed to indoor tanning beds have a 75 percent increased risk of melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer.

At Rusche's request, the committee sent the bill to the full House's amending order, where he plans to add some minor amendments requested by the Academy of Dermatologists. Committee Chairwoman Janice McGeachin, asked R-Idaho Falls, Rusche if he'd also consider an amendment to lower the proposed \$500 fine for violations.

Rusche said he would, if that's the will of the committee, saying, "I think what's more important is to have a law."

Woman Jailed in Pa. Has Trail of Fake Pregnancies

PITTSBURGH • Barry and Rebecca Vest can't conceive children - or of why a woman pretended to be pregnant and persuaded them to travel from Idaho to Pennsylvania five days after Christmas to adopt a baby that didn't exist.

And what they really don't understand is why that isn't a crime.

The Vests claim to be the latest victims of a woman known to Pennsylvania authorities as 32-year-old Amy Slanina, who, according to court records and interviews, pretends to be pregnant so infertile couples or, in some cases, female friends or lovers will shower her with attention, affection and sometimes money, clothes, food and shelter.

Authorities list Slanina at 5-foot-4 and 175 pounds, and those who've met her said she could pass for being six or seven months' preg-

Others, including the Vests, were convinced she was pregnant sight unseen during fast-moving friendships carried out through text messages, phone calls and emails. Barry Vest, 36, and Rebecca, 31, knew her about a week before they flew to Pennsylvania.

"She's the true definition of a predator: She seeks out an adoptive couple and emotionally abuses them," Barry Vest said from his home in Rigby, Idaho.

Slanina has been in jail in Kittanning, some 35 miles northeast of Pittsburgh, since she was arrested in December on theft of services charges for staying at a battered women's shelter after

allegedly claiming to be the abused wife of a police officer, who authorities say doesn't exist. She used the shelter's computer and a cellphone to contact the Vests.

Rebecca Vest has had two birth mothers back out of privately arranged adoptions since adopting newborn Owen, who will be 5 in April. That's why she thought she knew how to spot red flags before Slanina messaged them through their adoptive profile website.

Slanina never asked for money and knew exactly what to say, Rebecca said.

She called herself Aimee and claimed to be due Jan. 17 but texted Dec. 29 to say she was in labor, shortly after the Vests arranged for their

caseworker to meet her. She

even pretended to have the baby's father provide updates.

Unbeknownst to the Vests, as they flew to Pittsburgh and rushed 30 miles to the hospital in a rental car the next day, Slanina was under arrest.

The updates on her labor, of course, stopped. At the hospital, the Vests grew tired of waiting. Finally, Barry Vest asked at the nurse's station for her room number.

"The nurse said, 'I'm sorry, we're not having any births here or any adoption births;" Barry Vest said.

Rebecca broke down.

A birth mother has the right to change her mind, so the Vests still didn't know they were being scammed, Barry said.

Then, a Kittanning police officer called to explain what he'd learned about Slanina and the women's shelter.

Since the Vests spent \$2,500 rushing to Pennsylvania, Slanina was charged with a section of Pennsylvania's disorderly conduct law - the only statute police could find that might fit her actions. Public defender Chuck Pascal got a district judge to dismiss that charge, though he doesn't dispute Slanina's actions.

"She took on a persona and lied and, as a result of that lie - what? - somebody flew here from Idaho? So what?" Pascal said. "If I were to start criminalizing when one person lies and, as a result of that lie, other people take an action, then everybody's in jail."

Slanina has a different public defender on the women's shelter charges who didn't return repeated calls attempting to get a message to her.

Authorities Searching for Idaho Woman and 3 Kids

PHOENIX (AP) • Authorities say an Idaho woman who allegedly took her three children in a custody squabble may be in the Phoenix metropolitan area on the way to Mexico.

The FBI in Salt Lake City says an Amber Alert was issued Sunday morning for a 9-year-old boy and two girls, ages 5 and 7.

They say 35-year-old Bertha Sabala Guerrero lost custody of the three children last December after

authorities say she left them with a woman she had just met. They were placed in foster care in Caldwell, Idaho.

Authorities say Guerrero picked up the children for a 24-hour visitation Friday and failed to return them the following day. Caldwell police have obtained an arrest warrant for Guerrero for custodial interference.

They say Guerrero has family living in Phoenix and Mexico.

Hunting Investigation

An undercover wildlife investigation in which a Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks employee shot a trophy bighorn ram in 2008 has ended with no convictions.

Earlier this month, a Chouteau County justice of the peace granted the state Attorney General's office motion to dismiss its case against James Reed of Rexburg, Idaho.

"There does come a time, unrelated to the facts of the case, that any more expenditure of state resources is not well advised," said Barbara Harris assistant attorney general.

Two Montanans charged in the investigation were acquitted in three jury tri-

Reed tells *The Billings* Gazette he spent \$45,000 in attorney's fees defending himself against the misdemeanor charge of using a two-way radio while hunting.

Jack Morris of Whitehall, the attorney for all three men, complained that "it took the state of Montana this long to finally come to rate jury trials and three separate acquittals and the untold cost to the taxpayers of Montana, so the state of Montana could attempt to save face and pursue claims that had no merit."

The case gained attention because game warden Justin Gibson ended up shooting a trophy bighorn ram after twice missing on purpose. Gibson had been issued one of 20 tags that had been made available to the public that year, Morris said.

Whitehall filmmaker and taxidermist John Lewton was acquitted of illegal hunting in Chouteau County and acquitted of illegal purchase of the bighorn ram's head in Jefferson County.

Glendive-area rancher and hunting outfitter Blake Trangmoe was acquitted in Chouteau County in November of hunting without landowner permission.

Trangmoe said he spent \$42,000 in legal fees fighting the charges, which he said also kept him from booking \$500,000 worth of hunts in Alaska for the past three years.

Is America Competitive?

tarting with Sputnik in 1957, Americans have suffered periodic bouts of competitiveness anxiety. Who imagined the Soviets would orbit the first Earth satellite? After the Soviets, it was the Germans in the 1970s, then the Japanese and even South Koreans in the 1980s. We lagged in technology, management and overall economic vitality. Could we restore our competitiveness?

It's happening again. The latest fright stems from the sluggish economy — especially lingering high unemployment from the Great Recession – and China's stunning rise. Already, 53 percent of Americans rank China as the world's "leading economic power," finds a Gallup poll. Only 33 percent rate the United States as the leader. (Fact: Per capita incomes in China are only one-sixth the level of those in the United States, estimates the World Bank.) As before, competitiveness studies and conferences have boomed.

The newest entry is a special edition of the *Harvard Business Review* (cover line: "Reinventing America"). "We're in a very serious situation, one that predates and goes well beyond the recent economic downturn," warns dean Nitin Nohria in an introduction. "It won't go away when an economic recovery occurs; in fact ... it may get worse"

Anyone who reads the 16 articles would be hardpressed to disagree. Among the sobering evidence is a survey conducted by business school professors Michael Porter and Jan Rivkin. They asked Harvard Business School graduates - including many chief executives and senior managers of major global businesses about location decisions involving the United States. In only 32 percent of the cases was an American site chosen.

"Though U.S. multinational companies continue to locate the bulk of their activity at home, they have been expanding faster abroad," write economists Matthew Slaughter of Dartmouth's Tuck School of Business and Laura D'Andrea Tyson of




the Haas School of Business at the University of California, Berkeley. Here's what happened from 1989 to 2009: Foreign sales of these U.S. multinationals rose from 24.5 percent of their total to 35 percent; overseas employment jumped from 21.4 percent of their total to 32.3 percent; and research and development conducted abroad went from 9 percent to 15.6 percent of their total.


What explains America's fading allure? To some extent, it's the benign consequence of a wealthier world. If you're Wal-Mart, Marriott or Dell, you can't serve customers in China, Mexico and Brazil from the United States. You need local stores, hotels and distribution centers. This accounts for some of U.S. multinationals' overseas expansion. But the shift also reflects low wage rates (cited by 70 percent of respondents in the Porter-Rivkin study) and the perceived better quality of foreign workers (cited by 30 percent).

How much manufacturing has moved offshore is unclear. A lot, but probably less than most people think. An article by economists Robert Lawrence of Harvard and Lawrence Edwards of the University of Cape Town estimates that factory jobs would have been 2.9 million higher in 2010 if the United States had no trade deficit in manufactured products. However, there's a catch: Although the number of jobs would be higher, they would still be declining over time. Improved manufacturing technology means that fewer workers produce more goods.

What's missing in the Harvard report is originality. The diagnosis leads to the usual solutions: better schools; more emphasis on science and math; simpler taxes; less burdensome regulations; more transparent financial markets; more sensible executive pay. Few suggestions venture beyond the mainstream.

Mixing Medicare and Mudslinging

on't look now, but the 2012 election is turning into a national referendum on what to do about Medicare.

Democrats want to run on the issue — and to charge that Republican proposals to change Medicare into a voucher-based system would end the current guarantee of virtually unlimited healthcare for the elderly.

The chairman of their
House campaign committee, Rep. Steve Israel, DN.Y., has told candidates to
stress three issues:
"Medicare, Medicare and
Medicare."

At least some Republicans — such as Rep. Paul D. Ryan, R-Wis., author of a leading GOP Medicare proposal — say they welcome that fight. "Medicare is the issue," Ryan told reporters last week.

Ryan believes Republicans can only lose if they play defense and allow Democrats to "scare seniors." Instead, he argues that if the party spells out its ideas clearly, it can win a mandate to transform Medicare from a government-run plan to one run mostly by insurance companies.

That means voters may face a choice this fall not only over who should be president but also over how Medicare, the biggest driver of the federal deficit, should cut its costs: through government jawboning and regulation (the method prescribed by President Obama's healthcare reform law) or via free-market pressure applied through insurance

companies (Ryan's prescription, endorsed by the GOP presidential candidates).

In simplified terms, Ryan's plan issues every senior citizen a voucher to buy a private insurance policy and relies on insurance companies to keep costs down. Last month he added a new element: the option of retaining old-fashioned Medicare. But the system would still rely on competition to keep basic costs below the value of the voucher, which would rise within a limit set by Congress.

Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., has signed on to cosponsor Ryan's latest scheme, but most Democrats reject it, charging that it would shift much of the burden of rising costs onto the elderly.

In his budget proposal last week, Obama suggested cuts of about \$300 billion in Medicare spending over the next 10 years, but said they should be borne mostly by drug companies and other providers. And he called for strengthening the new Independent Payment Advisory Board, a federal panel that is supposed to make healthcare spending more efficient but is barred from recommending restrictions in benefits.

"What I will not support are efforts to turn Medicare into a voucher," the president said, planting his feet in opposition to the Ryan-Wyden plan.

And there, in a nutshell, is the problem: A heated, polarized election campaign isn't the best forum to debate complex, competing proposals for bringing down health-care costs.

There's a lot of merit in the Ryan-Wyden proposal. "It's a good compromise," notes Alice Rivlin, an early proponent of Medicare vouchers and the former director of the Office of Management and Budget under President Clinton. "It preserves traditional Medicare; it gives people more options. But now that the Republican presidential candidates have endorsed it, the Democrats feel they have to reject it."

GPS Problem Shouldn't Stifle Innovation

The following editorial appeared in the Los Angeles Times on Friday:

he Federal Communications Commission announced last week that it would seek to block a promising new wireless venture by the Virginia company Light-Squared because of the interference it caused with Global Positioning System signals. The commission's hands may have been tied; GPS plays a crucial role in navigation, and a Commerce Department report found "no practical way to mitigate the potential interference at this time." But the FCC shouldn't leave future start-ups sidelined by the

apparent shortcomings of

GPS equipment. LightSquared sought to use satellite communications airwaves for a new, land-based network that would sell wireless phone and data services wholesale. Its goal was to help companies enter or expand in the market for mobile services, especially in underserved rural areas. The problem was that the frequencies it had acquired the rights to use were close to those used for GPS. Even though LightSquared said it could keep its service within its own frequency boundaries, many GPS receivers - for example, navigation devices for drivers and pilots were disrupted, evidently

because they weren't capable of filtering out signals from the airwaves licensed to Light Squared.

Fixing that problem would be so expensive and time-consuming that the Commerce Department concluded it wasn't a viable option. LightSquared executives disagreed and said they weren't ready to give up on a technical solution. Yet the imprecision of GPS devices highlights the need for clear standards for receivers in any frequency band. Otherwise, this country will have to leave large swaths of valuable spectrum unused simply to avoid disturbing older and potentially less useful technologies.

Considering the rapid in-

crease in demand for wireless bandwidth, the federal government needs to encourage more investment, not less, from the likes of Light Squared. One way would be to make more airwaves available by reassigning underused frequencies, which Congress and the executive branch have been agonizingly slow to do.

Lawmakers may finally authorize the FCC to auction off frequencies no longer needed by television broadcasters as part of a bill to extend a temporary cut in the payroll tax, which would be a welcome development. But some House Republicans have sought to stop the commission from making any of those frequencies available to the public for free, unlicensed uses, arguing that it would reduce the amount of revenue generated by the auctions. Such a restriction would impose a huge barrier to entry for start-ups and innovators.

death in 1975, she moved to Twin Falls. The highlight of her later years was her 100th birthday spent with family and friends.



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Iran Oil Ministry: **Exports Cut** to Britain and France

Iran's Oil Minister Rostam Qassemi had warned earlier that Tehran could cut off oil exports to "hostile" European nations.

TEHRAN, Iran • Iran has halted oil shipments to Britain and France, the Oil Ministry said Sunday, in an apparent pre-emptive blow against the European Union after the bloc imposed sanctions on Iran's crucial fuel

The EU imposed tough sanctions against Iran last month, which included a freeze of the country's central bank assets and an oil embargo set to begin in July. Iran's Oil Minister Rostam Qassemi had warned earlier this month that Tehran could cut off oil exports to "hostile" European nations. The 27-nation EU accounts for about 18 percent of Iran's oil ex-

However, the Iranian action was not likely to have any significant direct impact on European supplies because both Britain and France had already moved last year to sharply curtail oil purchases from Tehran to less than 3 percent of their daily

The EU sanctions, along with other punitive measures imposed by the U.S., are part of Western efforts to derail Iran's disputed nuclear program, which the West fears is aimed at developing atomic weapons. Iran denies the charges, and says its program is for peaceful purposes.

The spokesman for Iran's Oil Ministry, Ali Reza Nikzad-Rahbar, said on the ministry's website Sunday that "crude oil exports to British and

French companies have been halted." "We have our own customers and have no problem to sell and export our crude oil to new customers," he

Britain's Foreign Office declined comment, and there was no immediate response from French officials.

The semiofficial Mehr news agency said exports were suspended to the two countries Sunday. It also said the National Iranian Oil Company has sent letters to some European refineries with an ultimatum to either sign long-term contracts of two to five years or be cut off.

Mehr did not specify which countries were sent the ultimatum, but Spain, Italy and Greece are among Europe's biggest buyers of Iranian oil.

Iran's targeting of Britain and France appeared to be a political decision to punish the two countries for supporting tougher sanctions against Iran over its nuclear program.

Ariz. Sheriff Faces Long **Odds after Gay Outing**

FLORENCE, Ariz. • Pinal County Sheriff Paul Babeu built a reputation as a rising, conservative star by taking a hardline stance against illegal immigration, attacking the Obama administration and appearing alongside Sen. John McCain in a 2010 re-election ad in which McCain urged federal officials to just "complete the danged fence." 44 Killed in Mexico Prison Riot; Guards Detained

The fight between two cell blocks, each with about 750 prisoners, may have been staged as a cover for a prison break, official says after several inmates are reported missing.

MONTERREY, Mexico • An inmate riot that may have been staged to cover a breakout killed 44 prisoners Sunday, and the jail's director and all guards on duty at the time have been detained, a security official said.

Nuevo Leon state public security spokesman Jorge Domene Zambrano said the riot broke out at about 2 a.m. in a high-security section of a state prison in the city of Apodaca outside the northern industrial city of Mon-

The fight between two cell blocks, each with about 750 prisoners, may have been staged as a cover for a prison break, he said. Domene said in counting the dead, officials discovered some prisoners missing, but didn't know yet how many.

Forty-four people died before state police regained control about two

Investigators are looking into whether the fight was started by members of the rival Gulf and Zeta cartels, once the same organization. Their split two years ago has caused a spike in violence in the region around Monterrey, Mexico's third-largest and once the country's symbol of development and prosperity.

The prison had members of both gangs, who were normally separated, fueling theories that the 17 guards on duty could have been involved. The prison director, the director of security and a supervisor also are being held, Domene said.

The victims died from makeshift knives and blows, Domene said, adding that no firearms were found among the prisoners.

Deadly fights happen periodically in Mexico's prisons as gangs and drug cartels stage jail breaks and battle for control of penitentiaries, often with the involvement of officials. Sunday's riot was one of the deadliest so far.

All 2,500 inmates in the prison were incarcerated for federal crimes, and as many as 70 percent had yet to be convicted, Domene said. The inmate population grew by 1,500 in the last year to 180 percent capacity, the result of a crackdown on organized crime and drug trafficking in the last year, he added.

More than 47,500 people have been killed in drug-related violence since 2006, when President Felipe Calderon intensified Mexico's crackdown on organized crime.

Families of prisoners protested outside the prison because they couldn't get information on the victims. Only 10 of the dead had been identified by late afternoon.

Syrian Judge, Prosecutor **Assassinated**

BEIRUT • A pair of judicial officials were assassinated Sunday in Syria's northwest Idlib province and the strife-riven nation faced what could be a critical week, almost a year after the bloody rebellion erupted against the government of President Bashar

Assad. Authorities said "an armed terrorist group" in Idlib city opened fire on a car carrying a judge, Mohammed Ziyadeh, and a prosecutor, Nidal Ghazal. Also killed was the driver, said the official Syrian Arab News Agency.

An opposition activist reached in Idlib contradicted the official version and said Syrian security forces killed the pair because they were cooperating with anti-government rebels active in the region, close to the border with Turkey.

Assassinations by unknown assailants have become a familiar feature of the conflict in Syria, where armed insurgents are fighting to oust Assad, whose family has ruled Syria for more than 40 years.

Sex-changing Treatment for Children: It's On the Rise

CHICAGO • A small but growing number of teens and even younger children who think they were born the wrong sex are getting support from parents and from doctors who give them sexchanging treatments, according to reports in the medical journal Pediatrics.

It's an issue that raises ethical questions, and some experts urge caution in treating children with pubertyblocking drugs and hormones.

An 8-year-old second-

grader in Los Angeles is a typical patient. Born a girl, the child announced at 18 months, "I a boy" and has stuck with that belief. The family was shocked but now refers to the child as a boy and is watching for the first signs of puberty to begin treatment, his mother told The Associated Press.

Pediatricians need to know these kids exist and deserve treatment, said Dr. Norman Spack, author of one of three reports published Monday and director of one of the nation's first gender identity medical clinics, at Children's Hospital Boston.

"If you open the doors, these are the kids who come. They're out there. They're in your practices," Spack said in an interview.

Switching gender roles and occasionally pretending to be the opposite sex is common in young children. But these kids are different. They feel certain they were born with the wrong bodies.

Some are labeled with "gender identity disorder," a psychiatric diagnosis. But Spack is among doctors who think that's a misnomer. Emerging research suggests they may have brain differences more sim-

He specified amniocente-

ilar to the opposite sex.

Spack said by some estimates, 1 in 10,000 children have the condition.

Offering sex-changing treatment to kids younger than 18 raises ethical concerns, and their parents' motives need to be closely examined, said Dr. Margaret Moon, a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics' bioethics committee. She was not involved in any of the reports.

Some kids may get a psychiatric diagnosis when they are just hugely uncomfortable with narrowly defined gender roles; or some may be gay and are coerced into treatment by parents more comfortable with a sex change than having a homosexual child, said Moon, who teaches at the Johns Hopkins Berman Institute Bioethics.

The president is "trampling on a constitutional right," Santorum said of the Obama administration's recent decision to allow employees of religious schools and hospitals to have birth control covered by their insurance policies.

"It is imposing his ideology on a group of people expressing their theology, their

moral code," Santorum told those gathered in the First Redeemer Church, a megachurch that hosted former presidential candidate Mike Huckabee four vears ago.

Obama's campaign said Santorum's initial remarks were another attack on the president's faith by Republican rivals in a nominating contest that has grown increasingly bitter and nega-

"It's just time to get rid of this mindset in our politics that, if we disagree, we have to question character and faith," said Robert Gibbs, Obama's former press secretary, on ABC's "This Week?

"Those days have long passed in our politics. Our problems and our challenges are far too great," Gibbs said.

West leads the heart six, East

playing the queen. What is your

plan? The original declarer counted five diamond tricks and four outside top cards, thinking that the only possible problem was a 4-0 diamond break. He won the second heart and led the diamond three to his ace. Giving his partner a reassuring nod, he continued with a low diamond to dummy's king. If the suit had broken 2-2, he would have survived this piece of carelessness. He could have cashed the diamond nine on the third round, then crossed to dummy's diamond queen to score a fifth diamond trick. Unfortunately, West showed out on the second round, and there was no way for declarer to recover. Whether he led the nine or the seven to dummy's queen on the next round, he would have to win the fourth round of diamonds in his hand. Four plus four did not equal nine, and he was one down.

Since the diamond nine and seven were potential blocking cards, they should have been played under dummy's king and queen. 



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

On this date:

In 1792, President George Washington signed an act

creating the U.S. Post Office. In 1809, the Supreme Court ruled that no state legislature could annul the judgments or determine the jurisdictions of federal

courts. In 1839, Congress prohibited dueling in the District of Columbia.

In 1862, William Wallace Lincoln, the 11-year-old son of President Abraham Lincoln and first lady Mary Todd Lincoln, died at the White House, apparently of typhoid fever.

1907, In President Theodore Roosevelt signed an immigration act which excluded "idiots, imbeciles, feebleminded persons, epileptics, insane persons" from being admitted to the

United States. In 1938, Anthony Eden resigned as British foreign secretary following Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's decision to negotiate with Italian dictator Benito Mussolini.

In 1944, during World War II, U.S. bombers began raiding German aircraft manufacturing centers in a series of attacks that became known as "Big Week." **In 1965,** the Ranger 8

spacecraft crashed on the

moon, as planned, after

sending back thousands of pictures of the lunar surface. In 1971, the National **Emergency Warning Center** in Colorado erroneously ordered U.S. radio and TV stations off the air; some stations heeded the alert, which was not lifted for about 40

minutes. In 1987, a bomb left by Unabomber Ted Kaczynski exploded behind a computer store in Salt Lake City, seriously injuring store owner Gary Wright. Soviet authorities released Jewish activist

Josef Begun. In 2003, fire broke out during a rock concert at The Station nightclub in West Warwick, R.I., killing 100 people and injuring about

200 others.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush visited Korea's demilitarized zone, where he peered at the North, a country he'd described as being part of an "axis of evil." A Cairo-to-Luxor passenger train caught fire, killing some 360 people. At the Salt Lake City Winter Olympics, Jim Shea won the men's skeleton race, finishing the 2 runs at Utah Olympic Park in one minute, 41.96 seconds. (The victory was the culmination of an emotional 2 months for Shea, whose 91-year-old grandfather, Olympic gold medal speedskater Jack Shea, had died 4 weeks earlier.) American speedskater Apolo Anton Ohno won the 1.500 meters after South Korean Kim Dong-sung, who'd crossed the finish line ahead of him, was disqualified.

Five years ago: In a victory for President George W. Bush, a divided federal appeals court ruled that Guantanamo Bay detainees could not use the U.S. court system to challenge their indefinite imprisonment. In New Orleans, thousands of hurricane-weary residents joined with rowdy visitors to celebrate the second Mardi Gras since Katrina. One year ago: Security

forces loyal to Libya's Moammar Gadhafi unleashed heavy gunfire as thousands marched in the rebellious eastern city of Benghazi, cutting down mourners trying to bury victims. 20-year-old Trevor Bayne won the Daytona 500 in only his second Sprint Cup start. Kobe Bryant won his record-tying fourth All-Star game MVP award, scoring 37 points and propelling the West to a 148-143 victory over the East in the NBA All-Star game.



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
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
