Bill Could Keep Ed. Retirees Working

Sen.McGee Resigns **Amid Sexual** Harassment Allegation

The embattled Caldwell **Republican** admits no wrongdoing in the latest blemish to his political career.

BOISE • Idaho Sen. John McGee has resigned from the Senate amid allegations of sexual harassment from a Senate attache.



Republican Senate leaders announced the Cald-

well Republican's resignation during a Wednesday afternoon press conference at the Capitol.

"On Saturday afternoon ... the majority leader and I were notified of confidential allegations of sexual harassment against John McGee," said Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg.

After hearing the allegations, the Senate secretary investigated the claims made by the attache, who has not been identified. Hill told reporters he wanted to protect her privacy.

McGee, 39, offered his resignation after Hill and Senate Majority Leader Bart Davis, R-Rexburg, confronted him about the allegations.

"In this situation, my first priority is to ensure a safe, secure and professional work environment for Senate employees," Hill said at the press conference. "My second priority is to protect the integrity and institution of the Idaho State Senate."

"Sen. John McGee does not admit any wrongdoing," Hill added. "I have requested the attorney general's office to further review the matter. We also express our compassion to John Please see McGEE, A2

"Part of it was that I was bored and needed something to do," he said.

Since returning to the work force, he's filled positions such as vice principal in Wells and a part-time counselor at Twin Falls High School.

Now, Fowler works part-time, splitting his time as a school counselor between Canyon Ridge High School in Twin Falls and North Valley Academy in Gooding.

"I've found it to be really rewarding," he said.

Some school districts choose to rehire retired public school teachers or administrators to fill job positions.

One Idaho program - which focuses specifically on hiring retirees as full-time school emplovees - is scheduled to sunset July 1.

But on Tuesday, the House Education Committee voted to introduce legislation that could extend the life of the program.

The program was created in 2007 to address concerns about a shortage of school employees to meet the demands of the federal No

Child Left Behind Act.

Some school districts such as Twin Falls and Kimberly haven't hired any retired educators as full-time employees over the past five years.

Both districts, though, have at least one formerly retired teacher working in a parttime position.

Nonini Proposes Hands-off Policy on State Insurance Exchange

BOISE • The debate over establishing a state-based health care exchange just got more heated.

As a Mini-Cassia lawmaker prepares a bill that would set up Idaho's first health insurance exchange, Rep. Bob Nonini introduced Wednesday a proposal encouraging Idaho's private insurance companies to form their own exchange.

The Coeur d'Alene Republican's hands-off approach to the exchange issue echoes a number of GOP lawmakers' aversion to mandates set by the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. Under federal health care reform, states are tasked with setting up an online clearinghouse that would allow small businesses and indi-

viduals to compare health insurance plans. If they don't, the federal government will set one up for them.

Nonini described himself Wednesday as an outspoken opponent of the federal health care reform. He said he'd reviewed a yetto-be introduced state exchange plan developed by Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, and had major concerns about the costs to the state and consumers

"As I've gone through and dissected it, I find that every part of if drives up health care costs," Nonini said. He also didn't like government interference in the insurance business.

Wood's proposal to set up a state exchange by January 2013 would cost the state \$5 million, but wouldn't spend any of the \$20.3 million the federal government

granted the state to set up its exchange.

Wood said on Wednesday that he's not surprised by Nonini's legislation, but was confident his bill would pass. He's been working with other representatives to make changes to his plan that address their concerns.

"I think we'll get there," he said. Rep. Pete Nielsen, R-Mountain Home, supported Nonini's legislation in committee, saying he wasn't convinced by arguments that the federal government would impose an exchange if the Legislature doesn't act.

"I think that's a pretty poor reason to have a state insurance exchange," Nielsen said.

He added that none of the Republican presidential hopefuls are in favor of the Affordable Care Act, and said there's a good chance it

will be repealed, whether through the challenge made by 27 states before the U.S. Supreme Court or by a new presidential administration.

Rep. Brian Cronin, D-Boise, challenged Nonini and other "freemarket zealots" on the committee to prove that private insurers would step up and solve the problem. Cronin said the companies have had years to act, but haven't been receptive to putting their prices up against each other in an online clearinghouse.

Cronin also said that serious challenges to federal health care reform center on the mandate that every U.S. citizen purchases insurance, not the establishment of state exchanges.

The House Education Committee voted to print Nonini's nonbinding concurrent resolution on a party-line vote.

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BOISE • Despite concerns about the use of live bait and what would happen if Northwest wolves are again declared endangered, a broad wolf depredation bill passed the Senate Resources and Environment Committee on Wednesday.

If it becomes law, the legislation would expand the tools ranchers and landowners can use to take down wolves that attack their livestock, guard dogs or family pets. The bill includes provisions for the use of aerial hunting, artificial light and live bait, and would give ranchers 36 hours to pursue wolves after discovering a loss.

Sen. Elliot Werk, D-Boise, echoed state agency concerns that the bill's passage would jeopardize Idaho's ability to manage its wolves. At a Monday hearing, Jonathan Oppenheimer from the Idaho Conservation League pointed out that the federal government had approved Idaho's Please see WOLVES, A2

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Workers Prepare to Fill Blue Lakes Fissure

TWIN FALLS • When city workers ran across a large fissure at the bottom of lower Blue Lakes, the discovery resulted in more questions than answers.

Workers were looking for what was causing millions of gallons of water to disappear from the lake. Water levels had been dropping for months, and the city of Twin Falls had decided to scour the bottom of the lake to find out why.

Six months later, workers are a few steps away from stabilizing the lake without infringing on others who lay claim to the water.

Starting in early March, Brockway Engineers will begin filling a 50-foot-long crevice with gravel. The crevice was consuming 300 gallons of water every 30 seconds.

"We are set to get going by the first part of March," said Chuck Brockway Sr., senior member of the engineering company. "The plan is to have it done this late spring or at the latest, end of summer."

A contract with Blue Lakes Country Club requires that the city maintain certain water levels at the lake, said Mike Trabert, a Twin Falls staff engineer.

Starting in the mid-1990s, the city began pumping water from the lake while committing to not drastically lower its water levels.

When the fissure was first found in August, the major concern was how filling it would affect water flows to Alpheus Creek and, possibly, to a trout farm.

However, Trabert said that is no longer a fear. Dye was released into the lake and later tracked by city workers to determine where the water was going.

Turns out both the leak and the lake drain to the same place, Trabert said – the creek.

"Before we could do any work, we had to make sure there we knew what the effects would be on the creek and if the water would still end up at the creek," he said. "The data shows it did."

MOUNTAIN HOME MAN ACCUSED OF RAPE

WENDELL • A Mountain Home man has been accused of raping a Wendell woman last October.

Sebastian Zacarias-Delacruz, 31, was arraigned in Gooding County 5th District Court last week on one count of rape, after a judge decided the state had enough evidence to proceed to trial.

On Oct. 23, Wendell police responded to a home on Fifth Avenue East for a 34year-old woman who called police to say she had just been raped.

At a preliminary hearing, the woman said she awoke close to midnight on Oct. 23 to find Zacarias-Delacruz in her room wearing just a jacket, pants and sandals. The woman said her huswhy I'm here," and "I don't understand the word no," as she repeatedly told him to leave. The alleged victim said she tried to use her cellphone to call police, but Zacarias-Delacruz took it and then raped her.

"He had my arm behind my back and pushed my face into the bed," the woman said at the preliminary hearing.

The woman said she tried to push him off her, pulled his hair and pushed on his face as she tried to fight back.

The woman also said she discovered her children's bedroom doors had been closed prior to the attack.

After the attack, the woman said she dialed 911 on her phone repeatedly to attempt to get a dispatcher to call her back. She said her attacker then started taking

McGee, the Senate Majority Caucus chairman, has seen his political career falter since he made headlines for stealing a truck after a day of drinking at a golf tournament in June 2011. McGee was charged with grand theft and driving under the influence for the incident. In July, he pleaded guilty to misdemeanor DUI.

Since, the four-term senator has come under fire for his acceptance of about \$6,000 in annual per diem money meant to defray legislators' costs to pitch up in Boise during the session, despite living less than 30 miles from the Capitol. Many Treasure Valley legislators take a lesser per diem payment.

Now that McGee has resigned, Hill said the party will move quickly to fill the empty caucus seat.

"We will be having another election within the next week or so to elect the next chairman of the caucus," Hill said. A replacement to represent Idaho's District 10 in the Senate will also have to be appointed by the governor.

In a press release, Larry Grant, chairman of the Idaho Democratic Party, said, "For the sake of the Senate, we are thankful that McGee has stepped down today. I am glad that GOP leadership has finally accepted that something must be done to turn around the culture that has rooted itself in the Statehouse."

'Right to Hunt' Clears Committee

BOISE • Idahoans are closer to adding hunting to their list of constitutional rights.

On Wednesday, Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, presented a new version of his Right to Hunt bill to the Senate Resource and Conservation Committee. The bill would allow Idahoans to vote during November's general election on whether to amend the Idaho Constitution, adding a clause to protect their right to hunt, fish and trap.

This is the third printing of the bill, which Heider revised multiple times to address potential legal concerns. New language addresses concerns that the Department of Fish and Game and water users had over how hunting and fishing would be managed through Idaho statutes.

Sen. Elliot Werk, D-Boise, had previously worried that the language of the bill would endanger Fish and Game's ability to do its job. But after hearing testimony from Deputy Director Sharon Kiefer, Werk was convinced.

The bill now goes to the Senate.

Jerome Man to Plead Guilty to Vehicular Manslaughter

GOODING • A Jerome man is expected to plead guilty to vehicular manslaughter for the death of a 9-year-old boy in September.

Mitchell David Barnes, 58, is scheduled to enter a plea and be sentenced on March 5 in Gooding County 5th District Court.

A jury trial in the case had been scheduled to start today.

On Sept. 12, Gooding County sheriff's deputies responded to a crash at the intersection of 3100 South and 1700 East. SIRCOMM dispatchers reported they had received numerous "hysterical" calls about the accident involving a boy and his mother.

Deputies arrived to learn the two had been removed from their vehicle by Wendell firefighters, and found Barnes walking around a white Dodge pickup.

According to the deputies, Barnes kept saying, "I can't believe this is happening. I can't believe I ran the stop sign."

The boy, 9-year-old Brady Hanson, was taken from the scene by Air St. Luke's and was transported to Saint Alphonsus ReTwin Falls County 5th District Court on Tuesday.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled for March 2. Burkhardt is being held in the Twin Falls County Jail on \$5,000 bond.

House to Hear Proposal to **Lift Charter School Cap**

BOISE • Idaho students may have more charter schools to choose from in coming years.

On Wednesday, the House Education Committee voted to print and move to the full House legislation that would lift Idaho's cap on the number of new charter schools that can form each year. Currently, only six charter schools can open in Idaho every year, with a limit of one within the boundaries of each existing school district.

Fifty charter schools have opened since the cap's 1998 inception – an average of 3.6 per year. Only in 2004 were more than six new charters pitched. But proponents of lifting the cap say doing so will make Idaho more competitive to receive charterspecific funding.

Rep. Clifford Bayer, R-Boise, introduced the legislation, saying that the arbitrary cap hurts charter schools'

ability to apply for grants that would replace federal funds that are no longer available. Because of the cap, some organizations are hesitant to award money to Idaho, said Diane Demarest, executive director of Idaho Charter School Network.

Parents and charter school proponents testified in favor of the legislation, saying anything to help charter schools would benefit students and give them more choice.

But others expressed concern about charter schools diverting already scarce money from public schools. Rep. Brian Cronin, D-Boise, agreed.

"I'm troubled by the fact that at a time when our public schools have really been pinched, we have our school boards and administrators saying this is potentially destabilizing for us," Cronin said. He also worried about the quality of new charter schools if the Legislature lifted the cap.

The Jerome School District has benefited from the state's program. There's one teacher who used to be retired, but is working fulltime for the district again.

"To me, it's a win-win sit-Superintendent uation," Dale Layne said, adding that experienced employees bring a lot of knowledge to their positions.

Layne said the school district benefited because it doesn't have to pay for the employee's health benefits.

"It's actually financially a benefit for us," he said.

Once they're hired, retirees can continue to receive retirement benefits from the Public Employee Retirement System of Idaho. But they don't receive more service credit. To qualify, certified teach-

ers or administrators much have reached Idaho's "Rule of 90," which combines age plus years of service, not received any early retirement incentives and retired at age 62 or older.



Sterling Savings Bank Cutting Its Work Force

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) • The parent company of Sterling Savings Bank is laying off 6 percent of its employees in an effort to cut costs.

In a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission, Sterling Financial Corp. said it expected to complete the 150-job reduction in the first three months of 2012. The move is projected to save \$15 million a year, and will cost \$3 million in severance pay.

Chief Executive Officer Greg Seibly says the challenging interest rate environment and uncertain economic outlook led to the cuts.

Sterling spokeswoman Cara Coon says the layoffs affected many divisions with the exception of positions such as customer service.

Sterling Savings Bank has 2,500 employees and operates 175 branches in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California and Montana.

The bank is changing its name to Sterling Bank in a \$3.5 million rebranding.

Rising Sales Indicate Better Year for Housing

Sales of previously occupied U.S. homes rose in January to the highest pace in nearly two years, a hopeful sign ahead of the spring-buying season.

WASHINGTON • The housing market is flashing signs of health ahead of the spring-buying season.

Sales of previously occupied homes are at their highest level since May 2010. More first-time buyers are making purchases. And the supply of homes fell last month to its lowest point in nearly seven years, which could push home prices higher.

Sales have now risen nearly 13 percent over the past six months. While they are still well below the 6 million that economists equate with a healthy market, the gains have coincided with other changes in the market that suggest more sales are coming "The trend is clearly upward," said Ian Shepherdson, chief U.S. economist at High Frequency Economics. The National Association of Realtors said Wednesday that re-sales increased 4.3 percent last month to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.57 million. Single-family home sales rose 3.8 percent. And the number of first-time buyers, who are critical to a housing recovery, increased slightly to make up 33 percent of all sales. That's still below 40 percent, which tends to signal a healthy market.

ket. Fewer homes on the market could help boost prices over time.

Most economists said the January report was encouraging, especially when viewed with other recent positive housing data.

Mortgage rates have never been lower. Homebuilders are slightly more hopeful because more people are saying they might be open to buying this year and they responded in January to that interest by requesting more permits to construct single-family homes.

"The rise in existing home sales in recent months adds to the indication from housing starts, building permits, and homebuilder sentiment that the sector has improved modestly since the middle of 2011," said John Ryding, an economist at RDQ economics.

One concern is the market is still saturated with homes at risk of foreclosure, which lower broader home prices. Those increased to make up 35 percent of sales.

But the supply of homes on the market has plunged to 2.3 million, the lowest level since March 2005. At last month's sales pace, it would take more than six months to clear those homes, consistent with a healthy housing marcause hiring has picked up. More jobs are critical to a housing rebound. In January, employers added 243,000 net jobs - the most in nine months - and the unemployment rate fell to 8.3 percent, the lowest level in nearly three years.

Analysts caution that the damage from the housing bust is deep and the industry is years away from fully recovering. Since the bubble burst, sales have slumped under the weight of foreclosures, tighter credit and falling prices.

Many deals are also collapsing before they close. One-third of Realtors say they've had at least one contract scuttled over the past four months. That's up from 18 percent in September.

Realtors say deals are collapsing for several reasons: Banks have declined mortgage applications. Home inspectors have found problems. Appraisals have come in lower than the bid. Or a buyer suffered a financial setback before the closing.

Sales rose across the country in January. They rose on a seasonal basis by nearly 9 percent in the West, 3.5 percent in the South, 3.4 percent in the Northeast and 1 percent in the Midwest.

Obama Seeks Corporate Tax Rate Cut, Loophole Limit

WASHINGTON • President Barack Obama rolled out a corporate tax overhaul plan Wednesday that lowers rates but also eliminates loopholes and subsidies cherished by the business world. A long-shot for action in an election year, the plan nevertheless stamps Obama's imprint on one of the most high-profile issues of the presidential campaign.

The president's plan to lower the corporate tax rate to 28 percent came on the same day Republican presidential contender Mitt Romney called for a 20 percent across-theboard cut in personal income tax rates, underscoring the potency of taxes as a political issue, especially during a modest economic recovery.

Obama has not laid out a plan for overhauling personal income taxes. But he has called for Bush era tax cuts to end on individuals making more than \$200,000, thus increasing their taxes, and for a 30 percent minimum tax on taxpayers who make \$1 million or more.

Obama decried the current corporate tax system as outdated, unfair and inefficient. "It's not right and it needs to change," he said in a statement.

The president would reduce the current 35 percent corporate tax, which is the highest in the world after Japan but which many corporations avoid by taking advantage of deductions, credits and exemptions. Under his plan, manufacturers would receive incentives so that they would pay an even lower effective tax rate of 25 percent.

His plan would eliminate corporate tax benefits like oil and gas industry subsidies and special breaks for the purchase of private jets – two provisions that Obama has long targeted – and do away with certain corporate tax shelters.

In addition, Obama also would impose a minimum tax on foreign earnings, a move opposed by multinational corporations and perhaps the most contentious provision in the president's plan.

"It's a framework that lowers the corporate tax rate and broadens the tax base in order to increase competitiveness for companies across the nation," Obama said.

Campaigning in Arizona, Romney said that if elected president he would propose lowering the top personal income tax rate to 28 percent from the current 35.

In Congress, Republican reaction was mixed. House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dave Camp, R-Mich., said he appreciated the administration's plan, though it set a corporate tax rate that is higher than the 25 percent he has proposed. He faulted Obama, however, for not offering a wholesale overhaul of the tax system for businesses and individuals.

"While this is a good step by the administration, I will borrow from the president's own words to Congress from just yesterday: 'Don't stop here. Keep going," Camp said in a statement. But Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah, the top Republican on the Senate Finance Committee, dismissed the president's plan as a "set of bullet points designed more for the campaign trail than an actual blueprint for fixing our tax code."

Mini-Cassia Applications Sought for Conservation Program

Budget Panel **OKs Full** Funding for CAT Fund

Panel sets budget at \$36.5 million; Legislature still must approve recommendation.

BOISE • With the state's financial picture improving, members of the Legislature's budget writing panel voted Wednesday to fully fund Idaho's indigent health care program next year.

Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee members set the 2013 Catastrophic Health Care Program budget at \$36.5 million, even though Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter called for freeing up \$19.3 million.

The JFAC's budget recommendation still must be adopted by the full Legislature.

The CAT Fund is a state and county program that covers catastrophic health care costs for residents who cannot pay their medical bills, don't have insurance and aren't covered by Medicaid or other assistance programs.

By law, the state must pay all valid claims submitted through the CAT Fund.

A year ago, lawmakers knowingly under-funded the program's budget.

That forced program officials to return to Boise last month and ask for emergency supplemental funding to keep the program from going bankrupt.

Rep. Fred Wood, a Bur-ley Republican, pushed for the \$36.5 million budget rather than under-funding the program again during the upcoming fiscal year.

County Bonneville Commissioner Roger Christensen, chairman of the CAT Fund board of directors, applauded JFAC members.

"It's a good vote of confidence and it shows good leadership on Wood's part," Christensen said. "I

Authorities Tracing Phone of Mountain Man's Family

Authorities believe they know identity of recluse who is responsible for more than two dozen cabin burglaries in southern Utah wilderness.

SALT LAKE CITY • Troy James Knapp is a wanted man, a mountain recluse authorities say is responsible for more than two dozen cabin burglaries in the remote southern Utah wilderness. He's considered armed and dangerous, a ticking time bomb.

After more than five years on the loose, a virtual ghost in the woods, authorities say they have finally identified their suspect. Now they just have to catch him.

They've tracked him across hundreds of square miles of wilderness near Zion National Park but have always been one step behind, discovering his unattended summer camps stocked with guns and supplies, but nothing else. He has managed to avoid being seen all but twice before retreating into the forest.

Now that authorities believe they know who he is, they're honing in on everyone who knows him. According to court records, detectives are tracking telephone calls to his family members in Moscow, Idaho, trying to determine if he is using a cellphone.

Investigators say family members have had little contact with Knapp, an exconvict they believe is still roaming somewhere across roughly 1,000 square miles of wilderness.

He is believed to have set off on a solitary life some nine years ago after his release from a California prison.

His family, originally from Michigan, has offered little

help – "the ones that will acknowledge having anything to do with him," Supervisory Deputy U.S. Marshal Michael Wingert told AP. "He's just kind of out there on his own. I don't know if he's fed up with civilization."

A recent court order allows marshals and sheriff's detectives to track calls made to and by a couple in their 60s - Bruce and Barbara Knapp of Moscow, who are relatives of the 44-year-old fugitive.

The Knapps haven't returned repeated telephone calls from the AP. No one answered the door at their home Wednesday.

Detectives in Utah's Iron and Kane counties announced late Tuesday that Troy Knapp was their longsought suspect in dozens of cabin burglaries, aided by recent surveillance photos captured of him outside one cabin and fingerprints lifted from another that authorities say finally were matched to him in January.

A Kane County arrest warrant charges Knapp with three burglaries and a weapons charge.

Knapp has a lengthy criminal record that includes assault with a dangerous weapon, Kane County prosecutor Robert Van Dyke said Wednesday. He did not elaborate.

As a teenager, Knapp was convicted in Michigan of breaking and entering, passing bad checks and unlawful flight from authorities, according to court records in Kalamazoo County.

The Utah arrest warrant says Knapp was charged with theft in 2000 in California. Court records indi-

cate he pleaded guilty to burglary and was sentenced to two years in prison.

Utah authorities are calling Knapp armed and "possibly dangerous if cornered." He is using remote cabins for sustenance and warmth during winter – "burning up all their firewood, eating all their food," Iron County Detective Jody Edwards has said.

In summer, the suspect retreats to makeshift camps deep in the forest.

"This guy is probably about as true a survivalist as Davy Crockett," Wingert said.

Knapp "dropped off everybody's radar in 2003 and nobody has heard from him since," he added. "He just dropped off the face of the earth."

"That's wonderful that they know him," cabin owner Bruce Stucki said Tuesday. "Now they need to get him in custody."

Is Censorship the New Pluralism?

at Buchanan might have seen the end of the line coming at MSNBC when last month network president Phil Griffin commented on his latest book, "Suicide of a Superpower," by saying, "I don't think the ideas that (Buchanan) put forth are appropriate for the national dialogue, much less on MSNBC."

When Buchanan was let go last week after 10 years as a commentator on the network, no one was surprised.

I don't agree with some of Buchanan's ideas, especially regarding Jews, his questioning of whether World War II had to happen or whether the United States should be involved militarily in the Middle East, but he has every right to his ideas, as we all have the right to our own. It's called free speech.

The approach to free speech should be like the one taken by the ACLU in 1977 when neo-Nazis made plans to march through the Jewish suburb of Skokie, Ill. While deploring their views, the ACLU defended the group's right to express itself.

Today, is censorship the new pluralism?

Actor Ben Jones, who starred as "Cooter" on the television show "The Dukes of Hazzard," wrote to tell me about a decision by NASCAR to ban the car known as the "General Lee" from appearing at the Sprint Cup series race at Phoenix next month. The image of the Confederate flag on the car's roof, said NASCAR spokesman David Higdon, "...is not something that should play an official role in our sport as we continue to reach out to new fans and make NASCAR more inclusive?" Jones said in a recent statement, "At a time when tens of millions of Americans are honoring their Union and Confederate ancestors during this Sesquicentennial of the Civil War, NASCAR has chosen to dishonor those Southerners who fought and died in that terrible conflict by caving to 'political correctness' and the uninformed concerns of corporate sponsors. "This is also an extraordinary insult to rural Southerners, who are

NASCAR's oldest and most fervent fan base, and it sends a message against inclusion and against the need for diversity.'' Is conformity the new

diversity? Jones is not only an ac-

tor, but a former Democratic member of Congress from Georgia and a strong civil rights proponent.

When the U.S. Supreme Court upholds the burning of the American flag as free speech, while the free exercise of religion is being curtailed at many levels, is this not censoring a particular category of expression? Censorship is also moving beyond its classic definition into a new and even more dangerous area.

As The Daily Caller, a 24-hour news site founded by conservative pundit Tucker Carlson and former Cheney aide Neil Patel, has reported, a liberal group known as Media Matters has not only fed talking points to some reporters and opinion columnists, it has been campaigning to get people fired when they hold ideas with which the left disagrees. According to the Caller, Media Matters hired people to investigate the lives of Fox News employees and compiled an "enemies list?" Media Matters didn't respond directly to the charges; its founder, David Brock, instead pointed to Reuters' criticism of the Caller's "bad journalism" and "lame propaganda" as the reason for Media Matters' silence.

These and many other attempts to suppress

flawed candidates. Michele Bachmann, Herman Cain and Rick Perry all

had their moment in the spotlight – and each melted under the harsh glare. Newt Gingrich vaulted to the top of the polls, but only until people got reacquainted with his mammoth ego and condescending personality. Ron Paul has always been a niche candidate, and the niche is not large.

But Santorum's greatest asset is Mitt Romney, who has not been able to generate broad-based enthusiasm among Republican voters. Despite having a huge war chest and perennial front-runner status, he has lost in five of the nine states that have voted. In six of those, he got fewer votes than he did in 2008. Romney often comes across as clumsy and tonedeaf in relating to voters. But his bigger defect at the moment is that conserva-

But his bigger defect at the moment is that conservatives regard him as an impostor, thanks to his past support of abortion rights, gun control and an individual health insurance mandate. An

Economist/YouGov poll of Republican voters found that only 28 percent regard Romney as a conservative.

That's a problem in a party that has moved steadily to the right in recent years. It's not a problem, however, for Santorum, who qualifies as a conservative with 76 percent of Republicans. When the former Pennsylvania senator claims the mantle of Ronald Reagan, it's believable.

But the conservative themes that have served him well so far may be a fatal handicap in the general election — if not sooner. Often, Santorum seems to be almost trying to give ammunition to those who regard him as a right-wing extremist.

He's asserted the right of states to ban contraception and sodomy, though the Supreme Court has ruled the opposite. His 2005 book "It Takes a Family" accused "radical feminists" of "convincing women that professional accomplishments are the key to happiness."

He accuses President Barack Obama of advancing the agenda of "radical environmentalists." He says that if Republicans lose this election, "It will be the end of the great experiment in the order of liberty and freedom." He warned that a nuclear Iran might carry out an attack on North Dakota.



Wash. State **Officer** Fired for DUI May Regain Job, **Back Pay**

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) • A Spokane police officer fired in 2009 after driving drunk while off duty, hitting a pickup with his truck and leaving the scene of the collision is likely to be rehired and get more than two years of back pay - totaling about \$275,000.

In a settlement mediated by the Washington State Human Rights Commission, Brad Thoma will be rehired March 1 in a demoted position of detective, if the Spokane City Council agrees to the deal on Monday, the Spokesman-Review reported Wednesday.

Under the agreement, the city will also pay his attorney – Bob Dunn – \$15,000. Dunn argues that job-related stress led Thoma to alcoholism and should be regarded as a disability.

He argues that the police department knew Thoma struggled with alcoholism and didn't try to get him help. Thoma filed a complaint about his firing with the Washington State Human **Rights Commission soon** after he was terminated.

Dunn likened the incident to someone who got into a collision as a result of seizure caused by epilepsy.

"If your disease is a result of your job and your employer knows it and you're sick and need some help, it's the duty of the employer" to get the employee help, Dunn said.

Prior to his firing in December 2009, Thoma was a sergeant.

City officials said Thoma was disciplined for his actions, not alcoholism. Assistant City Attorney Erin Jacobson said she is unaware of evidence that the city knew that Thoma was an alcoholic until he claimed to be one after the crash.

Jacobson said the demotion is a sign that the House Oks Legal **Protections for Canal Companies BOISE** • Canal companies are closer to added legal protections after the House approved a bill shielding them from liability for damage to others that's caused by the acts of third parties and acts

of God. The House voted 57-11 Wednesday for the measure from Idaho Water Users Association lobbyist Norm Semanko.

Rep. JoAn Wood of Rigby contends Semanko's bill won't provide blanket immunity for negligent canal companies. Rather, it clarifies they can't be held responsible for what third parties do, including throwing debris in a canal that causes property-damaging flooding.

Rep. Lynn Luker, a Boise Republican, opposed the bill, saying canal companies should be held to existing standards where they must demonstrate their diligence in maintaining their properties, in event of a lawsuit.

Man Ordered to Pay \$90K in Back Child Support BOISE • A federal judge in

Boise has ordered the father of four children who live in Kuna to pay nearly \$90,000 in back child support.

KTVB-TV reports 48year-old Rusty Haile pleaded guilty in November to willful failure to pay nearly \$120,000 in child support.

As part of the plea agreement, he paid \$30,000 before his sentencing date.

On Tuesday, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill sentenced Haile to five years on probation and ordered him to pay the remaining \$90,000.

Court records say Haile moved all over the country and lived in Bermuda for a time to avoid paying child support. At least once, he quit a job to avoid having his wages garnished.

Measure Limiting Asbestos Liability **Clears House**

BOISE • A bill that would limit a national bottle-top maker's liability for asbestos-related health claims in Idaho has won support in the Idaho House.

For years, Pennsylvaniabased Crown Holdings has sought protection at the state level from claims filed by lung disease patients. Crown's ill-fated purchase of an asbestos-tainted company in 1963 has resulted in about \$700 million in payouts, with 50,000 claims still pending. The House approved the bill Wednesday 47-22. The legislation would limit the liability of companies that acquire other companies with assets tainted by asbestos.

The measure that died Wednesday was sponsored by Sen. Jeff Siddoway, a Republican rancher from Terreton.

Siddoway wanted to allow landowners the chance to cash in on these controlled hunting tags by letting them sell them to other hunters, at any price they negotiate.

Anti-tax Rep Pushes Bill to Bail **Out Boise County** BOISE • Call it a bailout bill

for Boise County. This mountainous, sparsely-populated county

north of Boise faces a \$5.4 million court judgment, after a jury ruled in 2010 it broke federal laws by blocking a teen treatment center.

Ever since, it's been trying to figure out how to pay the bill, without burdening its 7,000 residents too much.

Declaring bankruptcy failed. Now, House Majority Caucus Chairman Ken Roberts of Donnelly is carrying Boise County's water.

His measure would allow the county to bond for the money - even if a tax increase necessary to pay off the bonds violates a statutory 3 percent increase limit that normally must win a two-thirds vote.

BOISE • A federal judge in Idaho has sentenced an Oregon man to 10 years in prison for attempted murder stemming from gang activity in both states.

Lodge also ordered 24-yearold Jessie Rodriquez of Ontario, Ore. to serve three years of supervised release and pay \$4,000 in fines.

Prosecutors say Rodriquez is a member of the Brown Magic Clica gang, which has been involved in drugs and weapons trafficking in Idaho and eastern Oregon. Rodriquez admitted to firing shots into a crowd gathered in Parma in July 2006 for a baby's baptism.

He was also convicted of attempted murder of a rival gang member for his role in a separate shooting in Ontario in July 2006 and threatening others with a knife in Payette in 2010.

Otter Backs Bill to Give Security Detail to Lt. Gov. BOISE • A Senate commit-

tee has introduced legislation that would allow Idaho's governor to assign to the lieutenant governor the same security protection afforded to other high ranking public officials.

Idaho Falls Sen. Bart Davis is sponsoring the measure introduced Wednesday in the State Affairs Committee.

The Idaho State Police is authorized by law to provide protection to the governor, the Legislature, Supreme Court and Court of Appeals.

Hunter Numbers Decline

While Idaho's fishing-license sales have been steady, a decline in hunting-license sales is sucking money from conservation and access programs.

TWIN FALLS • Hunting is a popular pastime in Idaho. It's just not as popular as it used to be.

What does that mean for Idaho? Less revenue for outdoors programs.

Hunting license and tag sales have slowly declined over the past several years, according to data from the Idaho Department of Fish and

Game.


"Fishing licenses have stayed relatively steady as far as the numbers of licenses sold," regional conservation officer Gary Hompland said. "Most of that, from what we can tell, is because we've had some really good salmon and steelhead runs the last few years. ... What is really disconcerting is our hunting licenses, both resident and non-resident.

"When those sales start to slump, all of our programs that function primarily on a budget related to those sales are affected."

Hompland has seen it firsthand with his own staff.

Open positions in conservation that used to be filled within a matter of weeks now are held open for months, he said, and some of his law enforcement officers sometimes are sent to help other divisions of the agency such as its fisheries program.

Kelton Hatch, the department's

regional conservation educator, said his hunter-education programs have not been affected much because of slumping sales, in large

part thanks to its volunteer program. About 100 volunteers teach just hunter ed.

Chequamegon Bay a Solid Destination for Ice Fishing

ASHLAND, Wis. • Opportunity is where you find it.

At one time, Americans were urged to "go west" to seek their future. When it comes to ice fish-

ing, there is no opportunity without frozen water.

That isn't an issue in most winters when all of Wisconsin is ensconced in the "ice belt." But there is nothing typical

about the winter of 2011-12. Sometimes even Badger

State ice anglers go north to find the essential ingredient.

"We've got a good 12 inches on part of the bay," said Jim Hudson of Bayfield, Wis., motioning to the white expanse of Chequamegon Bay. "Not too many places can say that about now."

In a year marked by an unusually high number of canceled ice fishing tournaments and lack of vehicle access to many waters, the sight of trucks driving onto the bay north of Ashland caused this visiting angler to do a doubletake.

entire life in and around Chequamegon Bay and the Bayfield peninsula.

And as owner of Hudson's On the Spot Guide Service in Bayfield, he is on the water soft or hard – virtually every day of the year.

"There are patches of open water and some cracks to avoid, too, but we've been getting out here reliably," Hudson said.

Other locals were confident in the ice, too. Organizers for the Book Across the Bay, a 10kilometer ski or snowshoe over the frozen surface of Chequamegon Bay from Ashland to Washburn, said the event was a "go" for Saturday.

A dozen other vehicles were scattered within a halfmile of the landing, west of the bay's break wall. Anglers sat on buckets beside their vehicles and fished.

A few portable ice fishing tents dotted the bay, too.

With the late-afternoon sun shining on the ice, we continued north and parked next to a "sleeper" – a heated, insulated fishing house -

for, Hudson said.

The bay is a unique, relatively fertile ecosystem in the large, cold expanse of Lake Superior. The average depth of "Gitche Gumee" is 500 feet; it's 28 feet in the bay.

At least 16 fish species are available to anglers on the bay: walleye, smallmouth bass, yellow perch, lake sturgeon, burbot, smelt, herring, whitefish, northern pike, coho salmon, chinook salmon, lake trout, splake, brown trout, brook trout and rainbow trout.

The fishery has attracted perhaps most attention in the last couple of decades due to its smallmouth bass.

In-Fisherman Magazine rates Chequamegon Bay on its top 10 list of the world's best smallmouth bass fishing destinations.

The bay has excellent forage and habitat for bass. But protective local regulations one fish daily bag limit and a minimum 22-inch size limit were key to developing and sustaining the high-quality smallmouth fishery.

The rules have been in place since 1994. This time of year, though, Hudson targets other species, primarily perch, splake, lake trout and brown trout. "It's always fun to see what the day holds," Hudson said, dropping a jigging spoon on a light spinning rod. "We usually have a surprise or two."

The sun melted into the horizon, spilling an orange line across the bay.

When the sun touches the trees, it's magic hour for lots of fish and wildlife. If it's February and you're in or around Chequamegon Bay, that includes a native fish famous for its unique looks and delicious flesh.

"It's about 'pout time," said Hudson.

The eelpout, also known as burbot and lawyer, is a bottom-dwelling fish in the cod family.

Many people also call it 'freshwater lobster" for its firm, white flesh.

We set two lines baited with dead smelt on the bottom, targeting eelpout.

At 6 p.m., one of the lines begins to peel off its "rattle reel" holder. The reel is designed to alert a sleeping angler to a bite.

"Let it take some," Hudson said as I picked up the line.

After another 15 seconds, the fish began a second run and I set the hook to a substantial weight.

The line came in hand-

Wildlife Habitat **Gets Helping Hand**

JEROME • Wildlife habitat in the Magic Valley is getting a helping hand, and you can be part of that effort.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game and the Bureau of Land Management invite area residents to join them in planting bitterbrush and sagebrush at a recently burned area near King Hill this spring. The project is part of the Volunteers for Habitat Restoration program, a cooperative effort to improve upland and riparian wildlife habitat in Southern Idaho.

According to Regional Wildlife Habitat Manager Mark Fleming, bitterbrush is a preferred food source where it occurs on mule deer winter range.

"The Blair Trail Fire near King Hill severely impacted habitat for wintering mule deer in our region," said Fleming. "By planting seedlings, we'll help to jump start the recovery of this area. Even with intervention, it could take a generation before we see bitterbrush begin to thrive again."

Sagebrush seedlings are a key component of habitat for the greater sagegrouse, a species of concern in Idaho. Shrub seedlings are important for a variety of game and nongame species alike.

The agencies feel that volunteers are a key component in their efforts to preserve fish and wildlife for future generations. "When a person works on the landscape, they've made an investment in that landscape, and people tend to protect their investments," said IDFG Volunteer Coordinator Ed Papenberg. "We're planting seedlings, but we're also building a community which values its natural resources."

Each planting effort is an all-day affair including driving time, and participants need to prepare for any weather. Planting will take place at various sites near King Hill on the first three Saturdays in April. Interested in signing up? Call Ed Papenberg at 324-4359.

"It's not a mirage," Hudson said with a laugh. "Hop in."

Hudson pointed his pickup north and we smoothly descended the public boat ramp onto the frozen surface.

Anyone with e-mail is probably no stranger to the annual appearance of viral messages breathlessly describing a supposed oncein-a-lifetime close approach of Mars in August.

Mars lies closest when it and the sun are opposite one another as seen from earth, known as opposition. Mars

orbits slower than earth, so the time between successive oppositions, called the synodic period, is just under two years. If Mars's orbit were as nearly circular as Earth's, one opposition would be like any other. But, as elliptical planetary orbits go, Mars's is second only to Mercury's. Consequently, some oppositions bring Mars a lot closer than others.

Such was the August 2003 opposition, which occurred when Mars was near its closest point to the Sun and Earth was near its farthest, a socalled perihelic opposition. This historically close approach spawned the e-mail that wouldn't die and its

Boundary Waters Dogsled Trip is Satisfying in Many Ways

BOUNDARY WATERS CANOE AREA WILDER-NESS, Minn. • Stu McEntyre hadn't been up this way in a long time. Nor had I. We had parked our rigs just off Hwy. 1, the stretch of blacktop that connects

pine, black spruce, aspen and birch passed in a blur.

A mile or so distant, we saw an otter's trail winding deeply into the woods. Also, in the manner of signposts, wolf markings appeared on the trail's sides, while to our amazement we saw an old set of moose tracks, and occasionally those of a deer. Years ago, when I lived in Ely, Stu was a young musher whose winters were consumed by the pursuit of fast dogs and distant races. Others might have preferred beaches. But Stu and his pal Don Beland were keen instead on subzero mornings, frozen water buckets, hard-starting trucks, frigid Alaskan villages and the dream of someday winning the Iditarod. Nowadays Stu's ambitions play out more locally. But he still keeps a few dozen dogs, and in winter he runs trips into the boundary waters with clients who come from as far away as Europe and Japan.

wildly exaggerated mutations.

Three synodic periods later, Mars is coming into opposition once again, on March 3. However, while Mars was unusually close in 2003, this year the planet, just 17 days past its farthest point from the sun (aphelion), is nearly twice as far away.

But it's not all bad news. Perihelic oppositions always occur in the summer months, when the sun arcs high across the daytime sky, and the planets arc low across the nighttime sky. So, Mars at perihelic opposition is always viewed through more atmospheric distortion (unless you live in the Southern Hemisphere). On the flip

side, this year's aphelic opposition will see Mars arc nearly twice as high in the sky, and shine through almost 40 percent less atmosphere, which will make for good telescopic views, despite the greater distance. Seeing Mars is easy. It's currently standing low in the east at nightfall, shining bright orange-red, brighter

Brad Lowe, regional wildlife biologist, said he expects money for the department's Access Yes! - a program designed to improve sportsmen's access through private land to public land will dwindle again this year, just as it has for the past three or more years.

"Unless we can cobble together some more grants," Lowe said, noting that federal aid has helped to secure some long-term contracts.

Access Yes! is funded partially through super hunt sales, he said. Lowe won't know his budget until June.

Nationwide, there were 19.1 million hunters in 1975, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. By 2006 that number had declined to 12.5 million, and by 2025 the number of hunters is projected to be 9.1 million.

The participation rate in hunting is about 1 out of every 20 people. The largest declines by state include Rhode Island (59 percent), California (38 percent) and Iowa (26 percent), according to the 2010 report.

Hompland said he believes there are a couple of reasons for the decline: a dour economy and the changing demographics of hunters.

"We're not recruiting new hunters like we used to," he said, noting that families nowadays are pulled in many directions; single-parent families might not be introducing kids to the outdoors like two-parent families used to. And new technology makes hunting for many people a quick and easy out ing instead of an investment of time and energy in teaching their kids about going afield.

Fishing is another matter. "We haven't seen the same level of decline because resident salmon fishing has been pretty stable," said regional fisheries manager Doug Megargle. "But we're not sitting on our laurels. ...

Idaho is not an anomaly."

Megargle said something Fish and Game tries to do across the board is encourage people to get outdoors.

"We work really hard in trying to make it easy and fun for people to get involved," he said. "We offer fishing clinics, hunting education classes, programs in schools."

The department's fishing trailer, for instance, shows up at family-friendly waters and puts a fishing pole in people's hands. Novice anglers are even taught how to clean fish, Megargle said.

"We're trying to do whatever we can to encourage folks to be outside, to be active, and take advantage of what Idaho has to offer?

Calls Grow for Assad to Resign after 2 Western Journalists Killed in Syria

LOS ANGELES TIMES (MCT)

BEIRUT • Two Western journalists were killed Tuesday in the central Syrian city of Homs, prompting renewed condemnation of the government of President Bashar Assad and allegations that Syrian security forces may have targeted the media.

At least two other Western journalists were reported injured in the shelling of Homs, which opposition activists say has been under government bombardment for almost three weeks, resulting in the deaths of hundreds of civilians.

But it was the deaths of the journalists — among them Marie Colvin, an acclaimed war correspondent and U.S. native who wrote for the *Sunday Times* of London — that seemed certain to raise the profile of the conflict and heighten pressure on Assad and Western leaders.

Reporters Without Borders, a press freedom group, alleged that the building where the two were killed – a makeshift media center in Homs' Baba Amr district – "was believed to have been deliberately targeted, since it was public knowledge that it was used regularly by journalists." The group said 11 rockets hit the structure, which had reportedly been hit before.

The opposition has accused the Syrian government of targeting "citizen journalists" who regularly upload onto the Internet graphic amateur videos showing scenes of damage and death attributed to Syrian security forces. 2nd-degree Murder Verdict in Lacrosse Death Trial

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. • Jurors found a former University of Virginia lacrosse player guilty of second-degree murder Wednesday in the drunken, jealousy-fueled slaying of his ex-girlfriend, rejecting a verdict of first-degree murder and a possible life sentence. George Huguely V, 24, stood straight, flanked by his attorneys, as jurors returned the verdict after approximately nine hours of deliberations. He was convicted in the slaying of Yeardley Love, who was found bloodied, beaten and bruised in the bedroom of her Charlottesville apartment in the early morning hours of May 3, 2010. Huguely displayed no outward emotion as the verdict was read, while some sobbing could be heard in the courtroom filled with family and friends of Love and Huguely. Jurors who returned the verdict immediately began deliberating a sentence. The second-degree murder conviction calls for a sentence of 5 to 40 years.

Fiery Charges as Romney, Santorum Assail Each Other

MESA, Ariz. • Primed for a fight, Mitt Romney and Rick Santorum traded fiery accusations about health care, spending earmarks and federal bailouts Wednesday night in the 20th and possibly final debate of the roller-coaster race for the Republican presidential nomination.

Santorum, surging in the race, also took his lumps from the audience, which booed when he said he had voted several years ago for the No Child Left Behind education legislation even though he had opposed it. Newt Gingrich acted almost as a referee at times.

On foreign affairs, all four Republicans attacked President Obama for his handling of Iran and its attempt to develop a nuclear program, but none of the contenders advocated providing arms to the rebels trying to topple the government of Syrian President Bashar Assad.

The most animated clash of the evening focused on health care in the United States.

Santorum said that Romney had used government money to "fund a federal takeover of health care in Massachusetts," a reference to the state law that was enacted during Romney's term as governor. The law includes a requirement for individuals to purchase coverage that is similar to the one in Obama's landmark federal law that Romney and other Republicans have vowed to repeal. In rebuttal, Romney said Santorum, a former Pennsylvania senator, actually bore responsibility for passage of the health care law that Obama won from a Democratic-controlled Congress in 2010, even though he wasn't in office at the time. Romney said that in a primary battle in 2004, Santorum had supported then-Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania, who later switched parties and voted for the law Obama wanted.

"He voted for Obamacare. If you had not supported him, if we had said no to Arlen Specter, we would not have Obamacare," Romney contended.

Santorum was the aggressor on bailouts.

While all four of the Republicans on the debate stage opposed the federal bailout of the auto industry in 2008 and 2009, Santorum said he had voted against other government-funded rescue efforts.

"With respect to Gov. Romney that was not the case, he supported the folks

tably Al-Jazeera and Al-Arabiya, dubbed "satellites of sedition" by the Syrian government.

A day before the two Western journalists were killed, the opposition said, a well-known amateur videographer and activist, Rami Sayed, was killed by shrapnel in Homs. It alleged that Sayed, a prolific documentarian who had uploaded hundreds of videos of mayhem in Syria, was targeted.

But no definitive proof emerged Wednesday that journalists were deliberately being killed. Scores of buildings in Homs have been shelled, many on multiple occasions, the opposition said. The Syrian government denied that it even knew the two slain journalists were in the country.

Syrian authorities have greatly restricted the media, prompting many journalists to slip into the country illegally, often with the use of intermediaries linked to the opposition. Colvin and Remi Ochlik, the French photographer also killed, are believed to have slipped into Homs via Lebanon.

Their deaths unleashed a new round of official calls for the resignation of Assad, whose ouster is the goal of an almost yearlong rebellion that has gone from protests to armed insurgency.

WASHINGTON (AP) • President Barack Obama is reaping political benefits from the country's brighter economic mood. A new poll shows that Republicans and Democrats alike are increasingly saying the nation is heading in the right direction and most independents now approve the way he's addressing the nation's postrecession period.

But trouble could be ahead: Stillstruggling Americans are fretting over rising gasoline prices.

Just weeks before the summer travel season begins, the AP-GfK survey finds pump prices rising in importance and most people unhappy with how the Democratic president has handled the issue.

On the question of empathy, solid

majorities continue to view him as someone who "understands the problems of ordinary Americans" and "cares about people like you," the AP-GfK survey found.

Thirty percent in the poll describe the economy as "good," a 15-point increase since December and the highest level since the AP-GfK poll first asked the question in 2009.

Study: Colonoscopy Cuts Colon Cancer Death Risk

LOS ANGELES • Millions of people have endured a colonoscopy, believing the dreaded exam may help keep them from dying of colon cancer. For the first time, a major study offers clear evidence that it does.

Removing precancerous growths spotted during the test can cut the risk of dying from colon cancer in half, the study suggests. Doctors have long assumed a benefit, but research hasn't shown before that removing polyps would improve survival – the key measure of any cancer screening's worth.

Some people skip the test because of the unpleasant steps need to get ready for it.

"Sure, it's a pain in the neck. People complain to me all the time, 'It's horrible. It's terrible,''' said Dr. Sidney Winawer, a gastroenterologist at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York who helped lead the study. "But look at the alternative.''

A second study in Europe found that colonoscopies did a better job of finding polyps than another common screening tool – tests that look for blood in stool. Both studies were published in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine.

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in the United States and the fourth worldwide.







THE ACES ON BRIDGE[®]

"New things are made familiar, and familiar things are made new."

Today's deal demonstrates that there is always something new under the sun. On the surface of it, your contract of six spades comes down to establishing clubs or finding the diamonds to lie moderately favorably — a combined chance of about 75 percent. Can you do better?

Against your slam West leads the heart queen to your ace. You draw trump, throwing the heart seven from dummy, and lead a club. If West plays the five or four, declarer would cover, giving up an early club trick to facilitate establishing the suit. He can win the club return and ruff a club, coming to 12 tricks unless clubs are 5-1, in which case he falls back on the diamond finesse.

However, when West produces the club nine, you call for dummy's ace. After cashing the club king, you play the club two and, once East follows with the 10, throw a diamond from hand.

No matter what East does now, the contract is safe. You can ruff the continuation of the club queen and then have two discards for your own diamonds. A heart return provides the extra entry to set up the clubs, while a diamond back surrenders the 12th trick immediately. If West had produced the club queen, the suit would have split 3-3 and, therefore, the heart king and a long club would have provided discards for your losing diamonds.

First, despite your limited values, you cannot rule out game for your side if your partner has a strong hand with either clubs or hearts. Second, you respond to make life harder for your opponents to get their act together.

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

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



BCS Leaders Far From Agreement On Postseason Changes

GRAPEVINE, Texas • Before there will be significant changes to college football's postseason and how to determine a champion, there are plenty of options to be considered.

Conference commissioners who run the Bowl Championship Series are just getting started on that process.

"We're just trying to understand conceptually what the pieces are. ... It's at the very beginning," Big Ten Commissioner Jim Delany said. "While I think people have a reasonable idea on the range of what's under consideration, the study and the inspection and understanding of that range I think is going to be months in the making."

The 11 conference commissioners and Notre Dame's athletic director spent two days meeting with BCS Executive Director Bill Hancock at a hotel at the Dallas-Fort Worth airport. They are scheduled to meet there again March 26.

Hancock characterized the meetings, which encompassed more than eight hours over two days, as "very, very, very productive" with great dialogue and sharing of ideas. He wouldn't get into specifics about what discussed.

"They are determined to do what's best for the game," Hancock said. "Everything is still on the table and there will be a time when they obviously have to start taking things off the table. But that point hasn't come yet."

In a joint statement posted on Facebook even before they had emerged from their meeting room, the group said it had a self-imposed deadline of "sometime this summer" to decide what changes to propose.

The process could take much longer to get finished.

"No one really knows what the actual drop-dead date is," said long-time WAC Commissioner Karl Benson, who takes over as the Sun Belt's commissioner in April.

As Delany described it, "Nothing has been ruled out, nothing has been ruled in. ... This is going to be an extra-inning game."

While there seems to be growing support for creat ing a four-team playoff to determine a champion, how exactly that would work remains to be seen.

But there also appears to be some confusion over what a plus-one model would mean. Some attending the meeting, again without being specific about what they had discussed, indicated that a plus-one model could be a singular championship game played after all the bowls when the top two teams would then be determined.

MARANA, Ariz. • Tiger Woods had to play a lefthanded shot out of the desert. Retief Goosen holed out from 156 yards and didn't even win the hole. Dustin Johnson twice won a hole after taking a penalty drop.

But the strangest sight of all Wednesday at the Match Play Championship didn't come from the golf course.

It was Luke Donald on his way to the airport.

"Golf is like that sometimes," Donald said after his 5-and-4 loss to Ernie Els, becoming only the third No. 1 seed to lose in the opening round. "It's a fickle game, and sometimes it bites you."

It almost took a bite out of Woods, who had to rally to beat Gonzalo Fernandez-Castano; and U.S. Open champion Rory McIlroy, the No. 2 seed who was 3 up with three holes to play and was sweating on the 18th until George Coetzee missed a short putt for par.

Donald was so dominant last year in winning the Match Play Championship that he closed out all six of his matches before they reached the 18th hole. He won't be playing the closing hole at Dove Mountain this year, either.

Els, who only got into the 64-man field when Phil Mickelson took his family on a ski vacation, delivered the biggest shocker in the first round by taking the lead for good on the eighth hole and putting the world's No. 1 player in a hole from which he couldn't recover.

Donald lost in the opening round for the first time in eight appearances in this World Golf Championship.

"I don't think it would have mattered who I played today. I just didn't play well," Donald said. "I struggled. I gave away too many holes and made too many mistakes. You can't do that in match play against anyone, let alone Ernie."

Woods nearly found that out, too.

He trailed the Spaniard with four holes to play, and both of them looked beatable. That changed when Woods drove the par-4 15th green to win with a two-putt birdie, won the 16th with a par and then closed out the Spaniard with an 8-foot par putt for a 1-up win.

"We both made our share of mistakes, there's no doubt about that," said Woods. "But somehow, I was able to move on."

That was the only objective in this World Golf Championship, a singleelimination format in which the only proper use of the word "upset" is the mood of the 32 guys who are headed home.

Among them: • Ian Poulter, the Match Play winner two years ago, suffered his worst loss in nine appearances when Bae Sang-moon beat him, 4 and 3.

• Bill Haas, coming off that monster win at Riviera just three days ago, looked like a winner when he was 1 up on the 17th green and had a 5-foot birdie putt. Ryo Ishikawa holed from 18 feet, Haas missed, and the Japanese star made par on the 18th to win.

THUNDER 119, CELTICS 104 **OKLAHOMA CITY** • Russell Westbrook scored 31 points, Kevin Durant added 28 and Oklahoma City beat Boston for its 11th straight win at home.

Kevin Garnett's return after a two-game absence wasn't enough to lift the Celtics, who were still without point guard Rajon Rondo as he served the second of a two-game suspension.

Paul Pierce and Garnett scored 23 points apiece, and Garnett also had 13 rebounds after missing the previous two games for personal reasons. The Celtics lost their fifth straight.

PACERS 102, BOBCATS 88 CHARLOTTE, N.C. • Tyler Hansbrough had a seasonhigh 22 points and nine rebounds as Indiana continued its dominance of Charlotte.

The Pacers have beaten the Bobcats nine time straight times, including twice this week. This game was much closer than the 35-point rout Sunday in Indianapolis - for three quarters.
