The sun won't glint off of trout in the future at three of Kay Hardy's fish farms, but she's happy to be playing a part in a game-changing water deal.

WENDELL • Nestled behind the roar of Niagara Springs quietly sits a small, but important fish farm.
"Not many people know about this gem," said Kay Hardy, president of Idaho Trout Co.,
which owns Rim View Trout, located south of which owns Rum iew Trout, located south of tem in this community."
Intellectually, she said, water rights fascinate her. But when it comes to running a business, she needed to come up with a way that both met the needs of the community and resolved the legal issu
pany's water rights.
Her solution was a game-changing decision. Last year, Hardy and a handful of groundwater districts announced they had made an agreement outside of a courtroom. The deal allowed the pumpers to buy the water rights and facilities to three fish farms,

Block, who has served six terms in the House, said there "I just decided," she said.
Block was first elected in 2000, and has served as chairwoman of the House Health and Welfare Committee. She is currently chairwoman of the House Commerce and Human Resources Committee.
Block said she was especially proud of the work she's done for Idaho families, health and public safety, especialy on issues relating to mental health and substance abuse.
"This is a job that a person cannot do alone," Block said. "And I am grateful for all of the support that my constituents have given me.'
After hearing of Block's plans, Clark Kauffman of Filer declared his intent to run for the seat Block is vacating. "I've known Sharon a long time and I think she's done a great job for her constituents," said Kauffman, who plans
to file as a Republican. "If there's an opening there ..I Ithink it's an opportunity I thought was worth stepping into." Kauffman is a current board member and former president of the Idaho Grain Producers Association.

TWIN FALLS • Resistance to a proposed commercial zip line in Twin Falls resurfaced Friday in front of Twin Falls County commissioners
John Lezamiz appealed the city's decision to grant a special-use permit for
the attraction to Magic Valley Flight Simulation earlier this year. During Friday's public hearing, Lezamiz urged commissioners to overturn the permit given by the city's Planning and Zoning Commission. Lezamiz argued that the company failed to notify the proper

Canyon Springs Road, the sole access into the Snake River Canyon area where the zip line would be built.
Lezamiz also argued that the road was already at maximum capacity and adding the zip line would create dangerous walking conditions for pedestrians.

Judge Delays Occupy Boise Decision until Monday

ily stall a new Idaho law designed to ily stall a new Idaho law design boot them from state land. U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Win-
mill told attorneys during a court hearing that they'd have to wait until Monday morning for his ruling on the lawsuit brought by the protesters.
Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter on
Tuesday signed the law that Tuesday signed the law that bans camping on state-managed land. It
requires the protesters to clear the requires the protesters to clear the
grounds of the old Ada County Courthouse, where they've been camping for nearly four months, by Monday at 5 p.m.
Lawyers for Occupy Boise contend the state's new law infringes on constitutional rights to free
speech. They filed motions asking the judge to prevent the state from evicting the campers, claiming fundamental rights and freedoms are at stake. "The plaintiffs' round-the-clock
symbolic politiol symbolic political assembly lies
squarely at the intersection of two squarely at the intersection of two
bedrock American freedoms: speech and assembly," Occupy Boise lawyer Bryan Walker wrote in court documents.
"The purpose of this vigil is pri-
marily to express the marily to express the protesters' message," Walker said during the
hearing Friday. hearing Friday.
At issue is wh
At issue is whether that message,
and how it's being expressed, is guarded by the First Amendment. Also being debated: Does a law meant to evict the protesters serve a compelling state interest? In passing the legislation, state lawmakers claimed they are simply send a message that it's not appropriate for groups to camp out on state-managed land indefinitely. "People wishing to assemble and protest are free under the statutes to continue to do so," state Attorney General Lawrence G. Wasden argued in court documents. "They
just cannot camp on state property not designated for camping." Much like the original Occupy

arch as well. The pain in the ball of your foot may be related to the plantar fasciitis if you're compensating for heel pain by walking differently, or it could $b$

tion. Treatments for plantar fasciitis are the same as other inflammatory con-
ditions. Ways to reduce the nflammation to your heel are to apply ice to the area; take anti-inflammatory ication, like Motrin or buprofen; or use steroid jjections. Stretching, splints or physical therapy are often necessary to reduce the tightness of the ascia or Achilles' tendon. Arch supports or supportsupporting the fascia. Most fasciitis conditions can be resolved with nonsurgical treatments, but esistant cases sometimes equire surgical treatment. Most cases of plantar

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## G0P Proposal WouldCut Fundsfor Local Governments

BOISE • When a property is tax-exempt, who should tax-exempt, who should
make up the difference: the government or other taxpayers?
It's a question House Majority Leader Mike Moyle wants to address. On Friday, the Republican from Star inwould force local governments to shrink their budgets to accommodate new property tax exemptions within their boundaries. The idea, Moyle said, is to
avoid shifting the burden onavo other taxpayerstomake up for tax-exempt properties, like churches, hospitals and schools.
Under the proposal, municipalities and other taxing districts would have to decrease their budgets based
upon any new exemptions uponany new exemptions

from the entity's taxable from the entity's taxable base, thus reducing available
tax revenue.
Taxing districts would still
be able to add levies to mak up for lost tax revenue, said House Assistant Majority
Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, after the meeting. In orley, after the meeting. In orwould have to hold public meetings and post notices about the increase. "It doesn't just happen utomatically," Bedke said. If passed as printed, the applied to include Micron's $\$ 2.5$ million tax exemption which would affect Ada County's budget.

This rotehyperbole, this disrespect for the genocidal victims of Nazism, has been commonsince the early George W. Bush era - Republican Sen. Phil Gramm said in 2002 that a Democra

Nazi Germany" - but at leas there was an upside. There

was notalk of Nazis among our presidential candidates. The knee-jerk smears were confined to the lower strata. Until now.
I'm referring, of course, to the rhetorically challenged Rick Santorum. What fol-
lows are verbatim remarks lowa the surging candidate uttered last weekend. You mayneed to read it twice, because Santorum tends to ramble through the English language like bison trampling amber waves of grain. He was arguing that Americans need
to be vigilant about Obama: "But remember, the Greatest Generation, for a year and a half, sat on the sidelines while Europe was under darkness, where our closest ally, Britain, was be
ing bombed and leveled, while Japan was spreading its cancer all throughout Southeast Asia. America sat from 1940, when France fell, to December of ${ }^{\text {4 }} 41$, and did almost nothing. Why? Because we're a hopeful people. We
think: 'Well, youknow, he'll think: 'Well, youknow, he'll nice guy. Imean, it won't be near as bad as what we think. This'llbe OK! Ohyeah, maybe he's not the best guy - and after a while, you found out things about this guy over in Europe, and he's
not so good of a guy after all. 'But you know what? Why
do we need to be involved? We'll just take care of our own problems. Just get our amilies off to work and our be OK'" Once thicket, the point is clear. Obama is like that "guy over Europe," the bad guy we gnored for toolong; ;if we don't wise up, America's lat ter-day Hitler will conquer

Jew"Once again, Nazi imagery was used in apolitical debate where it has noplace," and Santorum issued the standard apology. His latest outburst is disgraceful not merely because he equated Obama with
Hitler, but also because botched the actual history. It is factually wrong to say that America "did almost nothing" prior to entering the war. Recognizing the Hitler reat, FDR goaded Congress opass the Lend-Lease law, States to shipmaterial to

Hitler's enemies - in today's dollars, $\$ 620$ billion's worth. We also shipped destroyers to torum's faux history we wev er saw Hitler as a "nice guy" - as evidenced by the numerous domestic boycotts of German goods duringthe '30s. Newt Gingrich went the Nazi route last June, declar-
ing during a debate that he would requireMuslim Americans to sign a loyalty oath to work in his administration; after all, he said, "We didthis in dealing with the Nazis" - an apparent reference toAmmericas postwar Germany It seemed over the top to equate Muslim Americans with Nazis, but Newt touts himself as a historian. Ican see why Nazi analogies are popular. Politicians and commentators want to plains why Glenn Beck, dur ing his first 18 months on Fox News, reportedly invoked Adolph 147 times. But that tactic doesn't stimulate debate; it stifles it. Regardless of what we may think of ObaNazi "metaphor" (SantoNazi's motaphor" dishonors the tens of millions who were beaten, tortured, bombed, and sent up the chimney. Facile comparisons have no place in our civic discourse. By continuing to make them, we dish

president of the Air Combat Command Accident Investigation Board, wrote that due to a lack of evi-

much experience as possible before they go to war. Two of the Marines who died were aboard the AHin the UH-1 Huey utility helicopter. They were flying in a remote section of the 1.2-million-acre Yuma Training Range Complex as part of a two-week standard training
called "Scorpion Fire" that involved a squadron of about 450 troops from the 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing.
