SOME DISTRICTS WAIT ON STUDENT LAPTOPS

A few local school districts are intentionally staying out of the rush to be the first to get statefunded laptops for their high school students.

TWIN FALLS • Using a laptop at school isn't as simple as just turning it on.

For some school districts and public charter schools, other technology issues need to be adapply for the state's first round of laptop computers for highschoolers in 2013.

"It's not that we didn't want to," Interim Administrator Mel Wiseman said, but there are technology issues to address first.

The Twin Falls public charter school also plans to upgrade



Swindle or a Good Deal?

As legislators consider a 2year moratorium on wind development, critics and supporters seek to win the minds of the public.

JEROME • Drive along Interstate 84 long enough and you'll begin to notice a trend: simple, but catchy billboards warning against the perils of wind energy.

The billboards share their message not in pictures, but with the word "wind" bolded bright red within the word "Swindle." It's a warning sprinkled from Jerome to American Falls, sponsored by the Energy Integrity Project, a recently formed group comprised of anti-wind energy activists.

The group sees a need to correct statements so far by supporters of wind energy that have been inaccurate or biased, said Tauna Christensen, the group's executive director.

"The billboards are there to alert people of the fact that there was a lot of misinformation when wind entered our state," Christensen said. "We're hoping to bring back the attention to the public. It's not all what they said it was going to be."

Christensen's main argument is that wind energy is expensive and does not save ratepayers money. By integrating wind energy with traditional power grids, even those in charge of overseeing Idaho's energy regulations are confused about how much money wind energy saves the state, she said.

However, pro-wind activists aren't too concerned about the group's negative portrayal of wind energy.

Criticisms against wind energy's costs and potential habitat damage have aexisted since its initial development, said Ross Spackman, College of Southern Idaho professor of environmental technology and water resource management.

"It's important that people take a good look at how energy is produced," Spackman said. "If you don't like one energy source, then what are you going to do to replace it? We have a limited amount of options where we can come up with energy but it's something we all need."

SUPREME COURT DENIES LIQUOR APPEAL

A Twin Falls businessman has lost his appeal of the state's liquor-regulation practices, possibly clearing the way to lift an injunction against issuing new liquor licenses in the city.

TWIN FALLS • The Idaho Supreme Court has ruled in favor of the Idaho State Police's Alcohol Beverage Control Bureau in a case brought by Twin Falls resident Dan Fuchs.

Fuchs sued the ABC Board in 2009 over a rule change that denied one person from being on a city's liquor license waiting list multiple times.

Court records show that Fuchs, owner of Dick's Pharmacy, applied for a liquor license more than 20 times in the mid-1990s across six cities: Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Bellevue, Ketchum, Hailey and Sun Valley. In 2007, ISP changed an administrative rule, allowing applicants only one spot on each city's list. Applicants like Fuchs who were already on the list multiple times were not grandfathered into the new law.

Officials at the time said this would prevent people from sitting on the list to speculate, and encourage people who were planning to open "bona fide" restaurants and bars to apply.

Legislators Recommend More Funds for CSI

BOISE • Idaho's three community colleges would get a boost from the state's general fund starting in July, under a budget approved Tuesday by the Legislature's budget-setting committee.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee approved a total of \$28.3 million for the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls, North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene, and the College of Western Idaho in Nampa. While the amount is about \$4 million less than the institutions had asked for, it's still a 20 percent increase from the current year's general fund appropriation.

The JFAC appropriation mirrors Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's recommendation, with one exception: Raises for the colleges' employees. JFAC included a 2 percent permanent raise, while Otter had recommended a 3 percent, one-time bonus. Both Otter and JFAC included money for occupancy costs, or the costs of running and maintaining the colleges' buildings.

Neither JFAC nor Otter recommended funding most of the colleges' requested line items, sought for graduation rate improvement and to backfill

enrollment growth for previous years.

Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, said she thought the governor's recommendation was generous, and praised the community colleges for their role in the recovering economy.

"They're really working together as a team," Jaquet said.

Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome and cochairwoman of JFAC, said both CSI and NIC donated their share of a \$1 million line item to CWI for equity adjustment.

"How gracious that was," Bell said. "(CSI) could have had a third of that million."

Despite having the line items turned down, CSI President Jerry Beck said he was happy with the appropriation.

"We are very pleased with the committee's recommendation, we are very pleased with the governor's recommendation, and we are happy we will be able to continue to serve the Magic Valley at the level of service we have been providing," Beck said.

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FILER WOMAN PLEADS GUILTY IN **TRAFFICKING CASE**

TWIN FALLS • An 18-yearold Filer woman has reached a deal with prosecutors in a marijuana trafficking case.

Crickett Rachel Ray pleaded guilty in Twin Falls 5th District Court Tuesday to a lesser charge of possession of marijuana in excess of three ounces.

A sentencing hearing has been set for May 7.

According to court records, Ray's recommended sentence is two to five years in prison if she does not successfully complete drug rehabilitation in the state's retained-jurisdiction program. Ray was also ordered to undergo substance abuse and mental evaluations.

In court records Ray wrote she was pleading guilty "so I stay out of prison and keep moving forward with my life."

Based on information in the evaluations, the sentencing recommendation may change, court records stated

On Dec. 1, Brydon Scott Walker, 19, of Filer, and Ray called police alleging three Latino males had entered their house at 108 Main St. in Filer at about 9 p.m. The pair said the three men demanded the residents hand over meth. One man, identified only as "Juan," was said to have a gun.

Police made no arrests in connection with the alleged incident, but both Ray and Walker were charged with trafficking in marijuana after police say they found more than four pounds of marijuana and a container of different pills and drug paraphernalia.

In a parked 1997 Mercury Mountaineer outside the house, police say they found a book called "Growing Marijuana - How to Plant, Cultivate, and Harvest Your Own Weed." Court documents also allege the SUV was driven by both Ray and Walker.

Walker is scheduled for a change of plea hearing on March 1.

The laptops will be rolled out to one-third of Idaho's high schools at a time, start ing in the fall of 2013. School districts and charter schools had a Feb. 17 deadline to submit a letter to interest to be considered for the first round.

More than 170 high schools applied - representing about 85 percent of high-schoolers statewide. The Idaho State Department of Education will make a decision by the end of the school year.

The vast majority of Mag-

ic Valley schools applied. But some decided to hold off until a future round.

In addition to Xavier Charter School, others that decided to wait include the Blaine County, Murtaugh, Richfield and Dietrich school districts.

Lonnie Barber, superintendent of the Blaine County School District, said the district isn't completely ready for every student to have a laptop yet.

But one of the district's goals for more than four years is to move students toward "21st-century learning," he said.

Some money from the district's plant facilities levy has been set aside for technology. This year, more than \$350,000 went toward classroom technology in kindergarten through 12th grades.

In some Blaine County classrooms, students are already using mobile devices such as iPads, iPods and laptops.

In Murtaugh, teachers are adjusting to technology changes this year. It's the reason the district didn't apply to receive laptops in 2013.

"Our decision was based on the fact that we put new technology into the classrooms," Superintendent Michele Capps said.

The district is using a "teaching with technology" measure as a factor to award merit pay for fourththrough 12th-grade teachers. Teachers are being asked to take steps such as planning interactive lessons.

Capps said she also wants teachers to receive training before all high school students receive mobile devices.

In the fall, Idaho teachers and principals will receive a laptop. The state plans to provide technology training during the next school year.

"We want every teacher to have professional development under their belt," Capps said.

"We'll hopefully get started by the end of the summer," President Jerry Beck told college trustees during a Monday night meeting.

The project – scheduled for completion by summer 2013 – has a \$6.6 million price tag. About \$4.4 million of the cost will be covered by a federal grant.

During their Monday meeting, CSI trustees unanimously approved a contract with Boise-based CTA Architects for \$35,575. Seven proposals came in from companies wanting to be the commissioning agent.

Vice President of Administration Mike Mason said the college is required to have a commissioning agent for the project since it is pursuing LEED certification.

The Leadership in Energy and Environment Design status is an energy efficiency recognition given by the U.S. Green Building Council.

The ATIC building would be the second on Twin Falls campus to go through the process. The Health Sciences and Human Services Building – completed last year - has gold certification.

Also on Monday, representatives from Lombard Conrad Architects gave trustees an update on the design process.

In November, trustees voted to enter into a \$485,000 contract with the company for the design phase of the project.

Alec Holser from Opsis Architecture – a subcontractor for the project - said the building will be unique,

with spaces adaptable for new programs and equipment that may be needed in the future.

The building will feature two main components labs and classrooms. The design also includes study spaces throughout the building.

Holser said the building will bring the college's technical programs under one roof, instead of spread out in different locations around campus.

"They're programs that tend to get stuck in spaces," he said.

was refunded more than \$5,000 in application fees.

In the suit, Fuchs argued the agency's actions constituted an informal rule that hadn't followed the Idaho Administrative Procedure Act.

ABC argued Fuchs had failed to go through all the administrative remedies necessary before appealing its actions in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. The Supreme Court found the district court erred in dismissing the case on those grounds, but affirmed the court's decisions based on other grounds.

The court concluded Fuchs did not have property interests in each place he was on the waiting list, and therefore it was legal to remove his name beyond the first application in each city.

In November, Judge G. Richard Bevan imposed a requested injunction: ABC could not issue a license in the six cities where Fuchs desired a liquor license. The case was dismissed in March 2010, but Fuchs appealed and successfully argued that Bevan should

keep the injunction for just Twin Falls in August.

Now that the Supreme Court has made its decision, the case of the injunction will head back to the district court. said Supreme Court Clerk Stephen Kenyon.

The ABC bureau currently has four licenses that it has been unable to issue since 2009 because of the injunction.





One Urban Renewal Bill Fails, Another to Be Altered

After two days of testimony, the House Local Government Committee voted 5-4 Tuesday to hold a bill that would eliminate urban renewal districts in Idaho.

Man Fails to Appear for Theft Sentencing

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls man has failed to appear at his sentencing hearing for the theft of \$2,000 in truck tire chains.

Stephen Kenneth Rider Jr., 29, was arrested in December after police said he admitted he had stolen the chains and recycled them at Pacific Steel and Recycling to get money to pay for Christmas gifts for his children.

The felony charge was later amended to misdemeanor petit theft. According to online court records, Rider pleaded guilty to the lesser charge on Jan. 20.

The judge in the case ordered a \$5,000 bench warrant for Rider's arrest. bill. Former state Sen. Rachel Gilbert of Boise called urban renewal "food stamps for businesses."

"I've watched urban renewal districts grow across this state. There are now 70 urban renewal districts across the state of Idaho," Gilbert said. Those districts took \$52 million from the property tax base in Idaho, she said, adding that the free market should deter mine which businesses succeed.

Developer Scott Schoen-

herr of Boise testified against the bill, saying thriving downtowns are key to a community's identity and economic survival. On Friday, Twin Falls Economic Development Director Melinda Anderson also testified against the bill.

Recently, \$17.15 million in urban renewal money provided incentives for yogurt company Chobani to build a new facility outside Twin Falls, including land aquisition, wastewater improvements, water lines, water

meters, and infrastructure for natural gas and electic.

The committee also considered a bill that would require urban renewal districts to get approval from two-thirds of county voters before incurring any new debt.

Anderson testified on Tuesday against the second bill, saying quick action is essential when trying to attract new businesses.

"All I know is companies won't wait around for a vote of the electorate to determine whether or not a project will come to fruition," she said.

The committee voted to hold the bill and allow sponsor Rep. Ken Roberts, R-Donnelly, to make changes.

One Half of Crime Duo Misses Court

TWIN FALLS • Michael and Robin Pendleton, a married Twin Falls couple, were scheduled to be sentenced on drug charges Monday but Robin Pendleton, 20, failed to appear at the hearing in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

Court records Monday indicated that defense counsel Dan Brown was present, but Robin did not appear for the sentencing hearing. The records stated bond in her case was reset to \$150,000.

Charged with trafficking in marijuana, Robin entered a guilty plea on Dec. 27. It wasn't clear Tuesday if she'd reached a plea deal for a lesser charge, as prosecutors had sealed the case.

Her recommended sentence was three to five years in prison, with release sooner depending on successful completion of the state's retained-jurisdiction treatment program.

Michael Pendleton, 20, was sentenced to three to five years in prison, but could also be released sooner by completing the retainedjurisdiction program. He must also pay a \$500 public defender fee and court compliance costs of \$122.

Michael was originally charged with trafficking, but the charge was amended to possession with intent to manufacture or deliver.

The Pendletons and Adrian Will, 23, of Filer, were arrested in November at the Apollo motel on Addison Avenue West in Twin Falls after police were alerted to the area. Officers detained Michael after he stepped out of the motel room, reportedly telling police there was a gun and drugs in the room. Will was detained without incident, but Robin supposedly made a run for it by exiting a back window. Officers caught up with her, and along her path of escape they found methamphetamine, marijuana and a .45-caliber handgun.

Back in the room, officers found 591 grams of marijuana, along with a notebook containing the weights of each packet and a price. There was nearly 6 grams of meth, along with multiple syringes and glass pipes.

The group said they got the drugs from Michael's uncle, David Henderson, 35.

Will is scheduled to be sentenced for possession with intent to deliver and a burglary charge on March 19.

A drug trafficking charge against Henderson was dropped by prosecutors, but he is scheduled to be sentenced for a drug possession charge on April 9.

Proposed Snake River Crossing Dropped

TWIN FALLS • A proposed additional bridge over the Snake River west of Twin Falls has been dropped, the Idaho Transportation Department announced Tuesday.

ITD last reassessed the idea of a new bridge in 2008. That assessment concluded the three existing bridges in the area – the Perrine Bridge and Hansen Bridge near Twin Falls, and the Clear Lakes Bridge near Buhl – can handle cross-river travel until 2030. The reassessment didn't identify when future work would need to begin, nor a way to pay for the project.

ITD spent the past few months discussing the study

with officials from the Filer and Jerome highway districts, and Twin Falls and Jerome county planning and zoning departments. While each group agreed that there was a need for another bridge, none could agree on a solution because it would limits it would place on private property.

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"Based on the community involvement for this proposal, ITD still believes the crossing has a future as a local route as the Magic Valley grows and its transportation needs evolve," said ITD District 4 Engineer Devin Rigby in a news release. "However, this effectively concludes the effort to plan for a crossing at this time. It could resurface as future needs arise."





FORMER SEN. RESIGNS **CANYON COUNTY GOP LEADERSHIP**

NAMPA (AP) • Former Caldwell Sen. John McGee has stepped down as chairman of the Canyon County Republican Central Committee.

The decision to leave the committee post came days after McGee resigned his Senate seat amid allegations he sexually harassed a female Senate aide

Canyon County Central Committee officials say they received McGee's resignation as chairman on Friday. A new chairman will be picked at the committee's next meeting on March 20.

Meanwhile, the Idaho State Police is investigating allegations against the 39-year-old McGee.

McGee resigned his Senate seat last Wednesday after Senate Republican leaders learned of the alleged misconduct. McGee did not acknowledge any wrongdoing.

His troubles began last year when he pleaded guilty to drunken driving in a deal that erased accompanying auto theft charges in that case.

HAZELTON MAN DIES AFTER SEMI LEAVES ROAD IN UTAH

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A semi-truck driver from Hazelton is dead after the vehicle went off a freeway structure in Davis County and landed on railroad tracks.

The Utah Highway Patrol reported the crash about 12:30 p.m. Monday on southbound I-15 at I-215.

The Salt Lake Tribune reports the 62-year-old driver, Dale Eugene Thompson, was hauling hay. Thompson was found dead at the scene. No other vehicles were involved.

Idaho Boy May Face Adult Court in Dad's Shooting

POCATELLO (AP) • A prosecutor in eastern Idaho says he will try to bring the case of a 12-year-old boy charged with first-degree murder in his father's shooting death into the adult court system.

Bannock County Chief Deputy Prosecutor Vic Pearson said he wants the case moved out of youth court to enhance the chances for a longer sentence should the boy be convicted. But Pearson said that doesn't mean he wants the boy sent away to an inappropriate, adult prison.

"We are not seeking to send this individual to the penitentiary," Pearson told the Idaho State Journal. "On the contrary, we feel he should remain under the custody of the juvenile corrections department.

The boy, who turned 12 last month, was arrested on Feb. 17 after his father was shot and killed at their home near Swan Lake. An autopsy concluded the father died from a gunshot wound to the head.

So far, investigators have released few details of the case against the boy, citing protections afforded juveniles under Idaho statute. The court file is also under seal.

Last week, Pearson filed a motion seeking a waiver to have the case moved out of the juvenile system and into district court. Pearson filed the waiver after discussions with the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections and the Attorney General.

The prosecutor's office is concerned about the short amount of time the boy could be incarcerated in the state's juvenile system. Pearson says he hopes to seek a blended sentence, in which an underage defendant serves time in a juvenile facility before being moved to the adult prison system.

The boy's lawyer declined comment on the waiver and other aspects on the developing case.

"It's early in the proceedings, and as we learn more about the case, we will figure out where this case needs to end up," said Dave Martinez, chief public defender in Bannock County.

In deciding whether to move a juvenile case into adult court, Idaho judges have several factors to consider. Those include the seriousness of the offense, the need to protect the community beyond what the juvenile system can provide and the maturity and emotional attitude of the defendant.

House Approves **Research Bill**

\$5 million plan sails through to the Senate.

BOISE • Members of the full House on Monday overwhelmingly approved the Idaho Global Entrepreneurial Mission bill backed by Idaho National Laboratory and Center for Advanced Energy Studies officials.

Pitched by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter during his State of the State address last month, IGEM is a \$5 million plan to increase research funding and help guide Idaho's scientific breakthroughs from the laboratory to the business world.

Plans call for spending \$2 million in state funding on CAES, splitting \$2 million more between Idaho State University and two other colleges and making almost \$1 million available for matching grants or loans to business startups.

Rep. Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot, pushed the proposal, House Bill 546, to passage on a 63-2 vote. Lake said he backed IGEM because it is one of the most meaningful bills to emerge from the Capitol this year.

"We have a lot of different issues coming before the Legislature," Lake said. "I think this one really has a chance at success in the long term."

Although he offered a strong push for IGEM, Lake said the plan should not be considered a shortterm fix as the economy heals itself across the state. Patterned after a sevenyear-old Utah program, IGEM would instead seek to increase research innovations and create jobs slowly over the course of many years.

Reps. Lenore Barrett, R-Challis, and Vito Barbieri, R-Dalton Gardens, were the only lawmakers to oppose the bill. Neither offered an explanation for their "no" votes.

The measure moves next to the Senate.

Efforts to reach INL spokeswoman Amy Lientz and Idaho Department of Commerce Director Jeff Sayer for comment on IGEM were unsuccessful Monday.

As outlined, the program creates a partnership between government and the private industry and establishes a 12-member committee to oversee IGEM and offer progress reports to the state.

CAES Director Bill Rogers told the Post Register earlier this month that IGEM will offer much needed financial and government support to help ideas advance from the research stage to the point where they become commercially viable proposals for businesses. Rogers said the increased partnership between INL, CAES, the state and the state's three public universities also will be key in developing the next generation of the state's high-tech workforce.





Lawmakers Boost State Support for Higher Education

Senate Cans Legislation on Problem Wolves Due to Relisting Fear

BOISE (AP) • A bill that would allow Idaho ranchers to use powered parachutes, helicopters and live-bait traps to hunt problem wolves has died in the Senate.

Senators agreed Tuesday to send the controversial legislation back to the Resources and Environment Committee – a move that likely ends the bill's chances this year.

Republican Sen. Jeff Siddoway of Terreton is a sheep rancher and the bill's lead

BOISE • Lawmakers approved a budget Tuesday for Idaho's public universities that would increase state support by \$18.1 million in 2013 while boosting the pay of state employees who for the most part, have not had a raise in four years.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee crafted a spending plan for higher education that includes \$446.3 million in total funding in the next fiscal year, up from \$396.7 million this year. The budget includes \$227.9 million in state general funds, up 8.6 percent from this year, when state support for higher education was cut to its lowest level in more than a decade.

The increased budget for next year would bring state support for higher education up to levels set in 2006, when Idaho spent \$228.9 million in general funding on Boise State University, Idaho State University, the University of Idaho and Lewis-Clark State College.

Legislative budget writers also increased state support for Idaho's three community colleges, to the tune of \$4.7 million. The funding includes \$1.4 million to cover requests from the colleges for building expenses. That should lessen the need for the colleges to hike tuition and fees for students, said Sen. Bert Brackett, R-Rogerson.

"They got fully funded on their occupancy costs and higher ed did not,' Brackett said after the hearing.

Idaho's universities submitted \$4.8 million in requests to cover building expenses. Lawmakers approved about \$2.4 million, saying some of the projects

that were submitted did not fall within their guidelines for funding occupancy costs. "There were some that dropped off because they just didn't fit the policy," said

Sen. Dean Mortimer, R-Idaho Falls. The money will go toward buildings that include a nursing and health science facility at Lewis-Clark State

College, a center for environmental science at Boise State University, a cadaver lab at Idaho State University's campus in Meridian, and a University of Idaho research park in Post Falls.

A motion spearheaded by Rep. Shirley Ringo, D-Moscow, would have given the schools \$3.4 million for occupancy costs, but that proposal failed to muster enough support.

The budgets for the universities and community colleges still need approval from lawmakers in the House and Senate.

Both spending plans include the 2 percent salary increase for employees.

University of Idaho President Duane Nellis told lawmakers last month that boosting compensation was his highest priority, saying the Moscow campus was starting to lose key faculty members as salaries remain stagnant during the past four years.

"I just can't emphasize enough how we need some indication of support there," Nellis told legislative budget writers in late January.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee has approved a 2 percent, across-the-board raise for state workers meeting performance standards. The committee is now building that increase into budgets for state agencies.

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Idaho House Panel OKs \$36M Tax Cut for Top Earners

BOISE (AP) • Idaho's top-earning individuals and businesses would get tax relief worth \$35.7 million under a bill that cleared a House committee on Tuesday.

The legislation introduced by House Majority Leader Mike Moyle of Star would reduce the income tax from 7.6 to 7.4 percent for corporations and from 7.8 to 7.4 percent for individuals earning upward of \$36,000 before deductions.

The House Revenue and Taxation Committee voted 13-4 to advance the bill for consideration before the full chamber. Blackfoot Rep. Dennis Lake was the one GOP foe.

Moyle said the measure would telegraph Idaho's commitment to economic growth and help it compete with neighbors for new businesses.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter supports the cut, for which he had vowed to set aside funds.

Lewiston Rep. John Rusche called it irresponsible when state agencies and programs are starved for funding.

Idaho Counties Say Trust Lands Would Fix Budgets

OROFINO (AP) • Commissioners from five northern Idaho counties are pitching a deal to Congress that would replace the money lost when federal timber payments end with revenue from land trusts.

Researchers to Screen Teens in Pilot Fitness Program in C'dA

COEUR D'ALENE • Joe Cavanaugh is conscious about his weight, so the 17-year-old has been chatting with his friends about how to turn fat into muscle by lifting weights.

When the Lake City High School junior learned students were invited for consideration as participants in a teen health and research study, Cavanaugh jumped at the chance because he knew it could be just the motivation he needs.

"He came to me," said Melinda Miller, a Coeur d'Alene School District nurse. "He's motivated."

The pilot study's purpose is to find out how teens respond to a 12-week health and fitness program in which they work with fitness trainers, dietitians and nursing students. They will undergo physical fitness evaluations as well as nutrition and exercise counseling and wear a Bodybugg, which tracks calorie intake, type of food eaten and activities.

The grant-funded study's collaborators, including employees from Kootenai Medical Center, University of Idaho and Washington State University, are at Lake City High School today to finish screening nearly 100 students in search of 20 study subjects.

Shawn Burke, co-owner of U Aim High Fitness in Post Falls, came up with the idea for the study. The personal trainer's interest stems from research showing 1 in 3 teens are overweight.

"This whole design is to

give kids a direction that they haven't had before," Burke said. "It also gives them a support system and goals that are attainable."

Baylee Marquis, 15, and her friend, Delaney West, 16, are among the candidates being considered for the study.

"I've always wanted to be fit, but I've never been determined," West said. "Now that I have Baylee and Ms. Miller, that'll help."

and wear a Bodybugg, which tracks calorie intake, type of food eaten and activities.

Burke's experience working with teenagers shows they "really seemed to enjoy working with a professional, having a plan of attack and having accountability," she said. "That's a key part of the program."

Before students are officially enrolled in the study,

they will go through an informed consent process with a parent and study leaders, and will be medically screened, said Marian Wilson, Kootenai Medical Center's clinical research coordinator, who helped obtain the grant.

Thursday. The teens in the study will undergo physical fitness evaluations as well as nutrition and exercise counseling

In addition to physical measures, researchers will use surveys at the start and finish of the study to determine what the teens know about food and exercise, how confident they are about running a mile and how much time they spend sitting in front of a television or computer, Wilson said.

Burke, who is also a physical therapy assistant at Kootenai Medical Center, said participating in the study will be like "taking a 12-week health and fitness class. The grading will be on how they will change physically. We want them all to succeed. But they have to come away with some new knowledge."

During the study, the teens will be able to download information from the Bodybuggs and "see instantly how many carbohydrates, proteins and fats they've had, and they will know how many calories they will need to burn based on what they ate," Burke said.

The students will also take outings to learn how to exercise outside a gym, order healthy food at fast-food restaurants, and cook and shop for healthy food, among other things.

If the pilot is successful, Burke said he'd like to see the program integrated into the community for all teens. But for now, he's happy just to get the idea off the ground.

"Our goal is to have 20 kids, but I've always said my goal is to change one kid. Change that vicious cycle that they've been living for a long time," Burke said. "If we can change this generation, maybe it can help the generations to come."

USFWS to Kill

County Commissioner Stan Leach told the *Lewiston Tribune* that he's joining with commissioners from Idaho, Valley, Shoshone and Boundary counties on a plan to offset the budget loss by setting aside 200,000 forested acres to be managed as a trust.

The commissioners have been meeting with congressional representatives to discuss the idea.

"We're really pitching this as a trial thing to show that it can work," Leach said. "As the certainty of the (act) is fading, we have to do something to protect the county. (The act) is one-half of our road system budget right now."

Counties can't collect property taxes on federal land. That can have a big impact on counties like Clearwater County, where 53 percent of the land is federal, and Idaho County, where roughly 85 percent of the land is federal.

Having federal lands within county borders is "a blessing and a curse," Leach said, because while residents can enjoy the outdoors, there is no way to raise revenue on that land for road maintenance, law enforcement and other services.

"You can't raise enough in property taxes to fund county functions" on public land, Leach said. "The burden falls on our taxpayers. We want to be part of the solution and not part of the problem."

Under the plan, the land would be managed like state trust lands, with any revenue raised from logging, mining or other activities going to the counties. The tracts of land have not yet been identified.

Wolves Seen in Jackson, Wyo.

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) • The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service plans to kill three or four wolves that have brazenly approached homes in Jackson in northwest Wyoming.

Wolf manager Mike Jimenez says there have been numerous sightings of wolves, beginning in late December, that show the animals have made residential areas part of their territory.

He tells the *Jackson Hole*

News & Guide that it appears the wolves are becoming habituated to people and houses.

Jimenez says U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service officials had considered relocating the animals, but decided against it because there aren't many places to relocate wolves.

He says killing the wolves won't have an adverse effect on Wyoming's wolf population.

Restored to Health

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) •

A creek that feeds into the North Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River is coming back to life thanks to a state and federal effort.

Yellowdog Creek was polluted for decades by eroding forest road sediment. But work by the U.S. Forest Service, the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has restored the waterway to health.

Minn. Snowmobiler Dies in Wyo. Avalanche

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) • A snowmobiler from Minnesota is dead after getting caught in an avalanche near Togwotee Pass in western Wyoming.

The Jackson Hole Daily reports the man was snowmobiling with a party of 10 when the avalanche overtook him Monday. Teton County officials on Tuesday identified the victim as 35-year-old Jack Loxtercamp, of Villard, Minn. He was buried in the Dry Lake Creek area.

Grand Teton National Park spokeswoman Jackie Skaggs says Teton County Search and Rescue responded at about 3:30 p.m. after someone activated an emergency beacon.

Sheriff's Capt. Tripp Wilson says the man was dead when rescuers dug him out.

The Bridger-Teton National Forest Avalanche Center says it was the first avalanche fatality in Teton County this season.

Ban on Texting on the Road Advances to House Floor

BOISE (AP) • A bill that would ban texting-whiledriving in Idaho has cleared another hurdle in its long legislative journey and is now headed to the House floor.

The House Transportation and Defense Committee voted Tuesday to advance the legislation but aims to expand the ban to include law enforcement.

The bill cleared the Senate 29-6 last week. Similar legislation has failed several years running.

Coeur d'Alene Sen. Jim Hammond sponsored the bill and told the committee it gives drivers and law enforcement a clear standard to follow while sending a strong message to young drivers.

At least 35 states and Washington D.C. ban text messaging for drivers.

Hammond and law enforcement representatives at the meeting endorsed removing the exception for police and emergency personnel.

TO NORTHWEST PARKS SPEND \$547M

SPOKANE, Wash. • Visitors to national parks in Washington, Oregon, Alaska and Idaho spent \$547 million and supported more than 9,000 jobs in 2010, according to a report released Tuesday by the National Park Service.

"The people and the business owners in communities near national parks have always known their economic value," said Chris Lehnertz, Pacific West director for the park service. "National parks are clean, green fuel for the engine that drives the economy."

The biggest impact was in Washington, which saw 7.3 million visitors spend \$264.3 million in Park Service units and nearby communities, the report said.

About 52 percent of that spending was for lodging, food and beverages, the report said, with 29 percent spent on retail purchases, 10 percent on entertainment and amusements, 7 percent on gas and local transportation and 2 percent on groceries.

Those breakdowns are based on a national total of \$12 billion spent by 281 million visitors to 394 national parks and nearby communities in 2010, the park service said.

Washington is home to 13 units of the national park system, including Mount Rainier, Olympic and North Cascades national parks. The state also has 24 national historic landmarks, 17 national natural landmarks and 1,452 listings on the National Register of Historic Places. Tourism related to NPS sites supported 4,560 jobs in the state, the report said.

Alaska had the second biggest impact, drawing 2.3 million visitors who spent \$208 million in national parks and nearby communities, the report said. The state has 23 units of the National Park system, plus 49 national historic landmarks, 16 national natural landmarks, 1 national heritage area and 410 listings on the National Register of Historic Places. Tourism related to those sites supported 3,698 jobs, the report said.

Oregon attracted 852,258 visitors who spent \$55.2 million at its national parks and nearby communities. The state has five national park units, plus 17 national historic landmarks, seven national natural landmarks and 1,922 listings on the National Register of Historic Places. Tourism related to those sites supported 1,053 jobs, the report said.

Idaho attracted 587,000 visitors who spent \$20.6 million in national parks and nearby communities. Idaho has seven national park units, 11 national natural landmarks, 10 national historic landmarks and 1,021 listings on the National Register of Historic Places. Tourism to those sites supports 490 jobs, the report said.

A Chance to Show Ethics Aren't Optional

Even state Sen. John McGee's harshest critics likely didn't expect the events of last Wednesday.

Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, filled in the details to a packed press conference. McGee resigned after a young woman on the Caldwell Republican's staff alleged sexual harassment on the part of her boss. His options were few: Finally face an investigation by a Senate ethics panel, or step down.

It's likely the end of McGee's political career, which had already weathered much over the past year. He made headlines last June for stealing a truck after a day of drinking at a golf tournament, pleading his resulting charges down to misdemeanor DUI in July. Then, an Associated Press report highlighted McGee among legislators taking a questionably high amount of per diem money meant to defray legislators' costs to pitch up in Boise during the session.

McGee's demise clears one case of troubling ethics out of the Statehouse. But his was far from the first time questions have arisen over a legislator's or state official's ethical lapse - and despite everyone's best hopes, it won't be the last. If one good thing comes out of this situation, let it be the Legislature moving forward with last month's proposed state ethics commission.

Such a commission could have helped investigate Royce Chigbrow, the State Tax Commission chairman and Otter appointee who resigned in 2011 after employees accused him of helping family and friends. It could have contributed more of an air of impartiality to the examination of Athol Rep. Phil Hart, the tax-protesting GOP lawmaker who survived ethics scrutiny in the House last year. Flash back a few years and it could have even been a boon in the 2005 case of former Sen. Jack Noble, R-Kuna: After supporting legislation that would have made him money without declaring a conflict of interest, Noble chose to lie to a Senate ethics panel about it. That panel was chaired, as a matter of fact, by Hill.

This year, a working group of eight lawmakers, split evenly between party and chamber, has met regularly for more than a month to examine other states' ethics commissions and brainstorm what might work for Idaho. Their membership runs the full ideological spread of the Legislature, from north Idaho's Vito Barbieri to Ketchum's Michelle Stennett. The greatest thing the Legislature could do moving forward is to ensure this group is able to finish its task, then take its recommendations seriously. It's true that the Legislature isn't without some form of ethics investigation right now. But it's also clear that something with more teeth that can investigate both lawmakers and state administrators, and wield subpoena power would be a valuable improvement. More so, it would be an important step forward in the eye of the public. It seems common sense that lawmakers willing to hold themselves and the state to a higher standard would be well received back home. What's there to lose?

Somebody, Anybody, Cut the Federal Deficit

The following editorial appeared in the Chicago Tribune on Monday:

he Chicago Tribune has spilled lots of ink criticizing President Barack Obama for running up federal budget deficits and the national debt - currently north of \$15 trillion. Now comes a report from the nonpartisan Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget saving his main Republican challengers would do even worse.

Apart from long-shot candidate Ron Paul, the major contenders for the Republican nomination score poorly in a carefully researched evaluation of their economic plans.

GOP hopefuls Mitt Rom-

Santorum are touting policies that would push the debt well beyond current projections, largely because their proposed tax cuts would out weigh spending cuts, the budget watchdog group reports.

Under Obama's proposed budget for the fiscal year that starts Oct. 1, the nation's public debt would rise to 80 percent of gross domestic product over the next decade, from about 70 percent today. Gingrich's plan would push that debt load to 114 percent of GDP, Santorum's to 104 percent and Romney's to between 85 percent and 96 percent. Paul's plan would put the debt at 76 percent of GDP.

For the record, not that it seems to make a difference to over 60 percent is generally considered too much.

So these are the voters' options: Too much debt, or way too much debt? What a bitter disappointment.

We understand that in an election year, proposed budget plans should be taken at less than face value. No doubt the details of these proposals represent general principles, not the specific legislation that would eventually pass and be signed into law.

Frankly, that's what bothers us the most.

None of these candidates, of either party, has made a priority of cutting the debt and deficit. None, in fact, comes close to the plan put forward in late 2010 by Obama's bipartisan commission known as Simpson-Bowles,

reasonable, achievable compromise. None - including the incumbent - has shown the guts to push for unpopular decisions that would put the country on a sustainable fiscal course.

If the best that Americans can expect is incremental change, at least make it meaningful incremental change. Here too there is reason to be discouraged.

If any single impediment to progress cries out for revision, it's the federal tax code. We would welcome practically any genuine effort to straighten out this 70,000page mess.

The system as it stands imposes a terrible burden on the nation's competitiveness. It distorts the economy, providing incentives to over-invest in real estate, for instance, while punishing companies that bring overseas earnings home. It is riddled with special breaks that make a mockery of fairness. Its very complexity encourages costly, wasteful tax

City P&Z Hears Initial Presentation on Rim Development

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls City Planning and Zoning commissioners received an initial presentation Tuesday on the proposed expansion of the Canyon Park shopping development near the Snake River Canyon rim.

Gerald Martens of EHM Engineers introduced the idea to the commission on behalf of Canyon Park Development LLC, seeking a zoning district change that would allow for a commercial mixed-use development.

The group, a part of Neilsen & Co., first proposed the development several years ago. But the plans, including a high-rise hotel and convention center and up to 50 stores, hit a rough patch along with the country's economy. "Our economy certainly hit a dead spot," Martens said at the presentation. "Markets have changed. We're back."

Martens said he and Neilsen & Co. have worked with city engineers to plan the development. As part of that plan, he asked the city to vacate a right of way along part of Fillmore Street. The road would be moved and rebuilt — the new road would be private, but meet city standards, be open and maintained in a permanent easement for the public, Martens said.

One person who attended the meeting said he lived on Canyon Springs Road, and wanted to know how traffic will be dealt with as Fillmore Street is vacated.

"We'll build a new road before the old road is closed," Martens said. "We'll have to

Michael Keith Spell, 22, and Lester Van Waters Jr., 47, pleaded not guilty Tuesday to one count each of aggravated kidnapping during an arraignment in state district court in Arnold's hometown of Sidney, near the North Dakota border.

Court documents filed by the prosecutor in the case indicate Spell, of Parachute, Colo., has confessed to his role in the crack-fueled abduction and presumed killing of 43-year-old Sherry Arnold of Sidney.

Spell and Waters said little during Tuesday's brief under Montana law if convicted.

Arnold was abducted – apparently at random – while she was jogging near her home on the morning of Jan. 7. Her body has not been found, but Spell allegedly told investigators he pulled her into a car and she was choked to death by Waters before they buried her in a shallow grave on a farmstead near Williston, N.D.

Chicken Slaughter Art Project Ruffles Feathers

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) • Officials have banned an artist from publicly slaughtering chickens in eastern Kansas, saying the proposed art installation would amount to animal cruelty. Lawrence's Assistant City Attorney Chad Sublet said Tuesday that artist Amber Hansen told him she "intends to abide by the city ordinance." Violating the animal cruelty ordinance could lead to a fine of up to \$1,000 and six months in jail. Even keeping the chickens on private land would require her to meet other city codes on animal care. Sublet said Hansen is considering alternatives to draw attention to the process of slaughtering animals, including a public sculpture. Through the project, called "The Story of Chickens: A Revolution," Hansen originally planned to display coops of chickens at locations across Lawrence, where they would be cared for by volunteers. The birds would later be publicly slaughtered by a local farmer and served as a meal.

Prosecutor: Ohio School Shooting Suspect is 'Not Well'

CHARDON, Ohio (AP) • The Ohio teenager accused of killing three students in a shooting rampage in a high school cafeteria chose his victims at random and is "someone who's not well," a prosecutor said Tuesday as the slightly built young man appeared in juvenile court.

T.J. Lane, 17, admitted taking a .22-caliber pistol and a knife to Chardon High and firing 10 shots at a group of students sitting at a cafeteria table Monday morning, Prosecutor David Joyce said. He said Lane didn't know the victims.

Lane will probably be charged with three counts of aggravated murder and other offenses, the prosecutor said.

A thin figure with short dark hair, Lane seemed small next to the sheriff's deputies who led him into court, and said little more than "Yes, sir" in response to questions from the judge.

His face twitched lightly while the prosecutor recounted the attack, and he sniffled and halfclosed his eyes as he left the courtroom under guard.

Romney Sweeps to Double Republican Primary Victory

WASHINGTON • Mitt Romney scored a hard-won, home state triumph in Michigan and powered to victory in Arizona Tuesday night, gaining a two-state primary sweep over Rick Santorum and precious momentum in the most turbulent Republican presidential race in a generation. "We didn't win by a lot, but we won by enough," Romney told cheering supporters in Michigan. He also tweeted his delight - and his determination: "I take great pride in my Michigan roots, and am humbled to have received so much support here these past few weeks. On to the March contests." Santorum was already campaigning in Ohio, one of the Super Tuesday states, when the verdict came in from Michigan. "A month ago they didn't know who we are, but they do now," he told his own supporters, vowing to stay the conservative course he has set.

"I take great pride in my Michigan roots, and am humbled to have received so much support here

Japan Tsunami Debris Spreads Halfway Across Pacific Ocean

The assortment of lumber, boats and other debris from last year's tsnuamis could reach the islands north of Hawaii later this winter.

HONOLULU (AP) • Lumber, boats and other debris ripped from Japanese coastal towns by tsunamis last year have spread across some 3,000 miles of the North Pacific, where they could wash ashore on remote islands north of Hawaii this winter.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration estimated the first bits of tsunami debris will make landfall soon on small atolls northwest of the main Hawaiian Islands. The rest of the debris was expected to reach the coasts of Oregon, Washington state, Alaska and Canada around 2014.

NOAA's tsunami marine debris coordinator, Ruth Yender, told an online news conference Tuesday that agency workers were boarding Coast Guard flights that patrol the archipelago. NOAA also asked scientists stationed at Midway and other atolls to look for the debris.

Debris initially collected in a thick mass in the ocean after tsunamis dragged homes, boats, cars and other parts of daily life from coastal towns out to sea. Most likely sank not far from Japan's eastern coast.

In September, a Russian training ship spotted a refrigerator, a television set and other appliances west of Hawaii. By now, the debris has likely drifted so far apart that only one object can be seen at a time, said Nikolai Maximenko, a University of Hawaii researcher and ocean currents expert. Returns from 82 percent of Michigan's precincts showed Romney at 41 percent and Santorum at 38 percent. Paul was winning 12 according to the popular vote. Two were set aside for the winner of each of the state's 14 congressional districts. The remaining two delegates were likely to be divided between the top finishers in the statewide vote.

With his victory in Arizona, Romney had 152 delegates, according to The AP's count, compared to 72 for Santorum, 32 for Gingrich and 19 for Paul. It takes 1,144 to win the nomination at the Republican National Convention in Tampa next summer.

In interviews as they left their polling places, Michigan voters expressed a notable lack of enthusiasm about their choices. Just 45 percent said they strongly favored the candidate they voted for, while 38 percent expressed reservations and 15 percent said they made the choice they did because they disliked the alternatives.

Wounded British Journalist Smuggled Safely out of Syria

BEIRUT (AP) • A wounded British photographer who had

British photographer who had been trapped in the besieged Syrian city of Homs was spirited safely into Lebanon on Tuesday in arisky journey that killed 13 rebels who helped him escape the relentless shelling and gunfire.

A Syrian diplomat stormed out of an emergency U.N. meeting amid renewed calls for a ceasefire to deliver humanitarian aid. A top human rights official said a U.N. panel's report concluded that members of the Damascus regime were responsible for "crimes against humanity."

The United Nations said the death toll in the 11-month uprising against authoritarian President Bashar Assad was well over 7,500, and activists reported more than 250 dead in the past two days alone – mostly from government shelling in Homs and Hama province.

Woman Charged in Burning of 3,500year-old Fla. Tree

LONGWOOD, Fla. (AP) • Authorities say a central Florida woman is in jail, charged with setting a fire that burned one of the world's oldest cypress trees.

Investigators say two witnesses identified 26-year-old Sara Barnes as the person who caused the 118-foottall bald cypress tree named "The Senator" to burn and collapse Jan. 16.

The Seminole County parks department says ring samples showed the tree was roughly 3,500 years old.

The Orlando Sentinel reports that Barnes also took photos of the fire with her cellphone. The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement searched Barnes' Winter Park home Tuesday and confiscated her cellphone and laptop. Authorities also reported finding methamphetamine, scales and drug paraphernalia. Barnes told investigators she set the fire while trying to use illegal drugs.

Jail records didn't say if Barnes had an attorney.

Partial Remains of 9/11 Victims Went to Landfill

WASHINGTON • Partial remains of several 9/11 victims were incinerated by a military contractor and sent to a landfill, a government report said Tuesday in the latest of a series of revelations about the Pentagon's main mortuary for the war dead.

The surprise disclosure was mentioned only briefly, with little detail, in a report by an independent panel that studied underlying management flaws at Dover Air Force Base mortuary in Delaware. A 2011 probe found "gross mismanagement" there, but until Tuesday there had been no mention of Dover's role in handling 9/11 victims' remains.

Air Force leaders, asked about the 9/11 matter at a news conference, said they had been unaware of it until the head of the independent panel, retired Army Gen. John Abizaid, held a Pentagon news conference Tuesday to explain his panel's findings.

"This is new information to me," Air Force Secretary Michael Donley said.

He said it was unclear whether the matter would be investigated further.

George Little, said Panetta "never would have supported" the disposal of remains in a landfill. "He understands why families would have serious concerns about such a policy."

Debra Burlingame, sister of Charles Burlingame, the pilot of the plane that was driven into the Pentagon by terrorist hijackers, said she was confused by the report. She said she attended a ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery at which unidentified 9/11 remains were buried in an engraved casket.

"They were treated with great respect and great ceremony," Burlingame said. "The Department of Defense was exceedingly sensitive and

The practice at Dover of cremating partial remains and sending them to a landfill began shortly after Sept. 11, 2001, the report said, "when several portions of remains from the Pentagon attack and the Shanksville, Pa., crash site could not be tested or identified."

The terrorist-hijacked airliner that slammed into the west side of the Pentagon killed 184 people, and the plane that crashed in a field near Shanksville killed 40.

The Abizaid report said that in line with Dover's policy, "cremated portions were then placed in sealed containers that were provided to a biomedical waste disposal" company under Air Force contract. "Per the biomedical waste contract at that time, the contractor then transported these containers and incinerated them."

The report said Dover authorities assumed that after incineration "nothing remained."

But a Dover management 'query'' found that "there was some residual material following incineration and that the contractor was disposing of it in a landfill." It added that use of the landfill was not disclosed in the waste disposal contract.

"We don't think it should have happened," Abizaid told reporters.

The lengthening GOP nomination struggle has coincided with a rise in Democratic President Barack Obama's prospects for a new term. A survey released during the day showed consumer confidence at the highest level in a year, and other polls show an increase in Americans saying they believe the country is on the right track.

Along with the improving economy, the long and increasingly harsh campaign, in which Gingrich and Santorum have challenged Romnev as insufficiently conservative, has prompted some officials to express concern about the party's chances of defeating Obama in the fall.

Exit polling showed a plurality of Republican voters in both Michigan and Arizona saying the most important factor to them in the primaries was that a candidate be able to beat Obama in November. Romney won that group in Michigan, where it mattered most, and also prevailed among voters in the state who said experience was the quality that mattered most. Santorum ran particularly well among voters who cited a desire for strong conservatism or strong moral character.

Santorum brushed aside the allegations of hijacking, saying Romney had appealed for support from independents in earlier states.

"We're going to get voters that we need to be able to win this election. And we're going to do that here in Michigan today," Santorum said, referring to blue collar voters with a history of swinging between the parties.

Apple Expected to Unveil Updated iPad on March 7

LOS ANGELES • Apple Inc.'s iPad, the undisputed champ of tablet computers, is about to enter Round 3.

The Cupertino, Calif., technology giant said it would hold an unveiling March 7. The secretive company wouldn't say what it will reveal but it is widely expected to be the launch of its third-generation iPad.

It would come as Apple's tablet competitors, many of which offer devices for less than half the cost of the \$500 iPad, are starting to catch up.

"We have something you really have to see. And touch," Apple said in an invitation emailed to the media. The event will take place at the Yerba Buena Center for the Arts' Novellus Theater in San Francisco.

DreamWorks Revenue for Fourth Quarter • Shares of DreamWorks Animation SKG Inc. fell steeply in afterhours trading Tuesday after the movie studio reported fourth-quarter earnings that were below expectations and warned that costs would increase significantly on its two films set for release this year. The shares dropped \$1.65, or 84 percent, to \$18 after the report. The studio's net income in the three months that ended Dec. 31 came to \$24.3 million, or 29 cents per share, down from \$85.2 million, or 99 cents per share, a year earlier. That missed the average forecast from analysts for 32 cents per share, according to FactSet. Revenue fell 21 percent to \$219 million from \$276 million a year ago, but the company released only two movies in 2011, compared to three in 2010.

Legislation Would Give Tax Credit for New Agribusiness Facilities

BOISE • A local legislator is co-sponsoring an attempt to encourage the growth of agricultural plants.

On Tuesday, Rep. Donna Pence, D-Gooding and Rep. Roy Lacey, D-Pocatello, introduced legislation that would offer a tax credit of up to 30 percent for new businesses that build new processing plants or facilities for value-added improvements to their products.

The idea, Pence said, is to keep as much agribusiness in Idaho as possible. For example, livestock producers lose money by shipping cattle out of state for processing. A tax credit might give enough incentive for someone to build a processing plant here, she said.

The tax credit has a cap of \$500,000.

Some on the House Revenue and Taxation Committee expressed concern that the legislation favored new businesses while snubbing established businesses that might try to expand. But ultimately, the committee voted to print the bill. It next goes to a hearing before the committee.

Microsoft Sees Future in Windows 8 amid iPad Rise

A test, or 'beta', version of the revamped operating system will be unveiled today in Barcelona, nudging it a step closer to its anticipated release this fall.

SAN FRANCISCO • Microsoft is scrambling to preserve what's left of its kingdom.

Since the company released its Windows operating system in 1985, most of the sequels have been variations on the same theme. Not that it mattered much. Regardless of the software's quality, Microsoft managed to remain at the center of the personal computing universe.

The stakes are much different as Microsoft Corp. puts the finishing touches on Windows 8 – perhaps the most important piece of software the Redmond, Wash., company has designed since cofounder Bill Gates won the contract to build the first operating system for IBM Corp's personal computer in the earlv1980s. A test, or "beta"; version of the revamped operating system will be unveiled Wednesday in Barcelona, nudging Windows 8 a step closer to its anticipated mass market release in September or October. The company will offer the most extensive look at Windows 8's progress since it released an early version of the system to developers five months ago. Microsoft designed Windows 8 to help it perform a difficult balancing act. The company hopes to keep milking revenue from a PC market that appears to be past its

prime, while trying to gain a stronger foothold in the more fertile field of mobile devices. It's a booming market that, so far, has been defined and dominated by Apple Inc.'s trend-setting iPhone and iPad and Google Inc.'s ubiquiheaval. As Microsoft has stumbled, faster-innovating companies such as Apple and Google have elbowed their way into a position to steer the direction of computing for the next decade or two.

Ballmer, known for his

cess stemmed from pent-up demand; the previous version, Vista, was so clunky and buggy that many PC users stuck with the system they already had on their machines or switched to Apple's technology on Mac computers.

Windows 8 is radically different from its predecessors. The system won't even have Microsoft's familiar "Start" menu. All applications are spread across a mosaic of tiles, as part of a design Microsoft calls "Metro." The tiles, which resemble road signs, can be navigated with a swipe of the finger on the display screen or with a keyboard and a computer mouse. The tiles also provide a glimpse at the activity occurring in applications connected to the Web, such as email.

The system also is expected to enable users to easily back up their pictures, movies, music and other files on a Microsoft storage service called SkyDrive, which will compete against Apple's iCloud. The operating system's versatility means it can be used to power computer tablets, as well as traditional PCs.

"Microsoft's future path is riding on Windows 8 and its success," said Gartner Inc. analyst David Cearley. "This is a chance for Microsoft to reestablish itself in a market where it's becoming increasingly irrelevant?

If Windows 8 is a hit, it could also help lift the fortunes of struggling PC makers, including Hewlett-Packard Co. and Dell Inc. Besides giving businesses and consumers a reason to consider new PC purchases, Windows 8 is expected to spawn a new breed of hybrid machines that will be part tablet computer, part laptop.

If Windows 8 is a flop, however, it will increase the pressure on Microsoft CEO Steve Ballmer. His 12-year reign has been marred by the company's troubles adapting to an Internet-driven upzealous faith in Microsoft, hails Windows 8 as the catalyst for an exciting – and lucrative - new era at the 37-

year-old software maker. Investors seem to be believers, too. Microsoft's stock has recently been trading its highest levels since April 2008. The shares had climbed 50 cents to \$31.85 afternoon trading Tuesday, leaving them with a gain of 23 percent so far this year. By comparison, Apple's stock has surged 32 percent during the same period, while Google's shares have dropped 4 percent.

Microsoft's financial performance traditionally improves when it releases a new version of Windows. The last upgrade came in October 2009 when Windows 7 hit the market. The company has sold more than 525 million copies of Windows 7 since then. Part of Window 7's suc-

Microsoft badly wants a piece of the tablet market that has been cutting into PC sales since Apple introduced the iPad two years ago.

In the quarter that included the holiday shopping season, Apple shipped 15.4 million iPads, more than doubling the volume from the same time a year earlier. Meanwhile, worldwide personal computer sales dipped slightly, and Microsoft's revenue in its Windows division declined 6 percent. It marked the fourth time in the past five quarters that Microsoft's Windows revenue has fallen from the previous year.

Americans Feeling Better about Economic Recovery

A private research group says that consumer confidence in February rose to the highest level since a year ago, when the U.S. economy's outlook started to look brighter before souring again.

NEW YORK • Americans are feeling better about the economy again, but will it last this time?

A widely watched barometer of consumer confidence surged in February to its highest level in a year as Americans took note of improving job prospects among friends and family and falling unemployment, which is now at a three-year low.

The brighter assessment released Tuesday by a private research group reflected a more upbeat attitude for the

nation generally as the economy picks up. That is a boon for President Obama as he seeks re-election. Polls, including a recent Associated Press-GfK survey, show the Democratic incumbent is beginning to benefit politically from improved views of the economy.

"The economy is getting momentum. Clearly, shoppers are more optimistic about their job prospects," said Amna Asaf, economist at Capital Economics.

But confidence is still below the level of a healthy economy, and trouble could lie ahead. Rising gas prices could sully shoppers' mood and derail the economic recovery. There are also fears about a nuclear showdown with Iran and the festering European debt crisis. Those worries could hurt demand for U.S. imports and make American companies pull back in hiring.

The confidence index is closely watched because consumer spending constitutes 70 percent of U.S. economic activity.

The big question mark is the price of gasoline, which Asaf said has climbed 20 cents per gallon since the confidence survey concluded two weeks ago.

The price of gas is a big issue because it has an immediate effect on shoppers' pocketbooks, particularly low- to middle-income households that are already squeezed by higher costs for basics such as food.

The average U.S. price of a gallon of gasoline was \$3.69, according to the Lundberg Survey of fuel prices released Sunday.

The Conference Board's Consumer Confidence Index now stands at 70.8, significantly higher than the expected 63. A reading of 90 or above indicates a healthy economy. But the index has not reached that level since December 2007, when the recession began.

Still, Tuesday's numbers were closer to levels that indicate a stable economy than to the danger zone that would suggest trouble.

A year ago, the index rose to 72 as the economic outlook was improving. The February 2011 reading was the highest since before the financial crisis in the fall of 2008. After that, the outlook soured again over the spring and summer.

Lynn Franco, director of the Conference Board Consumer Research, hopes the upward trend will have staying power this time.

'Consumers are really feeling like the worst is behind them," she said. "We are finally seeing some traction, and hopefully over the next few months that will prove sustainable?'

The index dropped to an all-time low of 25.3 in February 2009. Over the past 12 months, it has been going back and forth from the high 60s to the low 40s on continued worries about the economy.

In fact, confidence fell last October to 40.9, the lowest since March 2009, during the thick of the recession.

The Conference Board survey of consumers, conducted from Feb. 1 through Feb. 15, showed shoppers are feeling better about the job market.

Those anticipating more jobs in the months ahead increased to 18.7 percent from 16.4 percent, while those anticipating fewer jobs declined to 16.9 percent from 19.1 percent.

RUPERT • Soon every Arrowhead Potato Co. spud will be traceable not only to the farm on which it was grown, but to the very field from which it was pulled.

Arrowhead, owned since 2007 **Jones** by Moss Produce, has received a \$300,000 Value-Added Producer Grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.



"This will allow us to continue to sell potatoes to markets that require a higher standard of quality of safety," said Klade Williams, Arrowhead chief financial officer. "It will allow us to continue to be viable."

Williams said the federal government may soon mandate fruits and vegetables be traceable. For example, the Produce Traceability Initiative has ambitious plans to make every case of produce electronically traceable by 2012.

"The bar keeps raising all the time," said Ron Jones, Arrowhead general manager. Please see **ARROWHEAD**, F2

TWIN FALLS • By 2 or 3 a.m. each weekday, Aaron Adams is at his downtown cafe, prepping his sourdough, whole-wheat loaves and focaccia. So by the time you arrive at the Bakehouse for lunch, fresh loaves will be waiting for the sandwich crowd.

It's an addictive lunch habit, and I've worn a path from the newspaper office to the Bakehouse door.

Adams and his staff serve their pastries, sandwiches and soups in the historical Main Avenue building that for years was home to the Crowley's soda fountain. Enough reminders of the Crowley's days remain — like soda fountain signs and historical photos — to give the space a bit of identity confusion. And the model-train shop occupying a balcony inside the cafe adds another element.

But these are the visual clues that tell you what Bakehouse is all about these days: the vintage range on display; the row of cake stands protecting muffins, cookies and pumpkin rolls; the racks of pretty, retro aprons for sale.

It's about fresh food, made from

Have a 'Second Breakfast'

NEW YORK • Sometimes one breakfast isn't enough. So why not sneak in a second or a third?

ing their morning calories over several hours instead of sitting down to devour a plate of pancakes, bacon and eggs in one sitting. The case of the morning munchies is being fueled by the belief that it's healthier to eat several smaller meals instead of three squares a day.

What qualifies as a snack or a meal is a matter of perspective, of course. But food companies are rolling out smaller bites that feed the growing appetite for morning snacks.

General Mills, Quaker Oats and others are adding to their lineup of breakfast bars and yogurts. Sara Lee's Jim-



my Dean this summer introduced mini breakfast sandwiches. And fast food chains like McDonald's in recent years have expanded their breakfast menus to include morning snacks like smoothies and a fruit-and-walnut pack.

"It's breakfast in stages," says Liz Sloan, president of Sloan Trends, a food industry consulting group. "They'll eat

something at home, then stop at Starbucks or a convenience store for coffee and maybe a little snack."

The deconstruction of breakfast is happening as more Americans eat their meals outside of the home. After all, it's easier and less time-consuming to pop a few snacks in your purse or backpack for later rather than to sit down for a big meal.

Market researcher The NPD Group estimates that the number of times people snack in the mornings will jump 23 percent between 2008 and 2018. That's compared with a 20 and 15 percent increase in afternoon and evening snacking, respectively.

Of course, marketers have tried before to get people to eat outside of typical meal times. For instance, Taco Bell launched the "Fourthmeal" ad campaign in 2006 to tap into customers' late-night cravings with menu items such as the 980-calorie "Volcano Nachos."

Latina Chefs Becoming the New Face in Cooking

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. • A decade after Ricky Martin and Jennifer Lopez helped Latin music explode into the mainstream, Latina chefs are doing the same for food.

From Food Network's Marcela Valladolid and Evette Rios on ABC's "The Chew" to uber-restaurateur Michelle Bernstein and cookbook author Lourdes Castro, these senoritas are proving to be the new face in cooking - especially on television.

The stereotype of Latina mothers living in the kitchen makes sense to these Latina chefs.

"We all grew up around mom in the kitchen, that's just how it was," said Bernstein, who is of Latin and Jewish descent and runs Sra. Martinez and Michy's restaurants in Miami. "And maybe that just better represents what Latin food is, coming from the momma."

"It speaks to Latinas," said Lisa Navarrete, a spokeswoman for The National Council of La Raza, a Hispanic civil rights and advocacy organization based in Washington. "You have a lot of talented women, very personable, very telegenic, who are also great cooks."

Like music, food is a gateway to people learning about another culture, she said. And in this case, one that is expanding. Hispanics are the fastest growing population in the country, accounting for 50 million people, or 1 in 6 Americans.

Also fueling the rise of Latina chefs is the fact that Latin cuisine is no longer considered "exotic" or difficult to cook. More people today are comfortable cooking at home with ethnic ingredients such as jalapenos and cilantro, or marinating meats with Cuban mojo or chimichurri.

"Latin cooking is probably becoming more mainstream than it has been in the past," said Castro, who was born in Miami to Cuban parents. "And women in particular are being focused on more since people want to know what to do with these ingredients?

That's because women traditionally cook the family meals in the Latin community, she said.

Rios, ABC's "The Chew" correspondent, is of Puerto Rican descent. She's a selftaught cook who defines "perfectly Latina" as a woman who can do more than cook: she shows you how to make a cocktail or a dessert, as well.

"I feel like it's a very Latin thing," she said. "Women in general do this, but I feel Latin women are just much more involved in everything?

But Rios also noted that it has taken a while for Latin cuisine to make it big.

For one thing, there is so much variety and so many ingredients that "it's been so hard to make a name for itself," she said. Plus, the Latin culture has a "lot longer to go" in terms of acceptance since American culinary schools have been slow to embrace Latin food. Until now.

The Culinary Institute of America has a new program starting at its San Antonio campus next month focused exclusively on Latin cuisines. It will feature both indoor and outdoor kitchens equipped with Peruvian pachamanca pits, a Brazilian barbacoa pit, Argentinian parilla grills and Mexican wood-fired comals.

That multi-culture experience influenced Ingrid Hoffmann's cooking. The host of "Simply Delicioso" on the Cooking Channel and "Delicioso" on Univision said she grew up eating dishes from different regions. Plates would include a recipe from Peru or Colombia with an Argentinian-style meat.

Having that "multicultural brand" of being on both Spanish and English television will shape the way we view food, she said.

"I think that in 10 years I'm not sure we are even going to be using the word 'ethnic' to describe where a Latin ingredient is going to fit on a shelf in a supermarket," she said.

Latina Magazine has been highlighting Latina chefs for almost two decades.

"While before we had to seek them out, we're now seeing Latina chefs in the mainstream media, with shows on the Food Network and Univision," said Grace Bastidas, deputy editor of Latina Media Ventures. "They're also publishing successful cookbooks and getting the recognition they deserve."

Quinoa Steps In with Nutty Flavor

Having recently fallen in love with the nutty flavor of red quinoa (pronounced KEEN-wah), I've been looking for ways to use the

ancient grain. Updating a favorite recipe seemed like a good start. The dish, called East Indian rice, was clipped about 20 years ago from a newspaper whose name, along with the name of the person who developed the recipe, is long forgotten. It's a simple rice dish with dried fruit and onions cooked right in, and flavored with curry powder, cinnamon and ginger. Yogurt stirred in at the end makes it creamy.

The red quinoa (really a seed, but it is used like a

complex side dish for simply cooked chicken or pork. If you'd like a vegetable

accompaniment, trv steamed broccoli or wilted spinach, or a salad, such as an Asian slaw.

Tips: Rinse the quinoa well before cooking to remove a possible bitter flavor from the coating around the kernels. Can't find (or don't like) quinoa? Use long-grain white rice instead. Increase water to 2 cups.

Make the dish more substantial by stirring in a cup of chopped cooked shrimp or chicken along with the yogurt.

- 1 small onion, finely diced 1 to 2 teaspoons chopped crystallized ginger or

Deen Says She's Ready to Lighten Up her Cooking

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. • A month after being widely criticized for revealing she has diabetes as well as a lucrative

endorsement deal for a drug to treat it - Paula Deen says she's ready to show a lighter side to her famously fatty Southern-style cooking.

Deen

Just don't expect her to swear off butter.

"I am who I am. But what I will be doing is offering up lighter versions of my recipes," the longtime Food Network star told The Associated Press during an interview at the South Beach Wine and Food Festival.

"I will have a broader platform now, trying to do something for everybody," she said. "But you know, I'm Southern by roots. I was taught (to cook) by my grandmother and nothing I can do would change that?"

Food Network general

manager and senior vice president Bob Tuschman says the network is open to working with Deen to shape her show's future. "The discussions for what that could look like are just getting under way,"

he said. The Food Network did not immediately respond to questions regarding Deen's new approach or whether they were involved in the decision.

Last month, Deen drew the ire of many in the health and culinary worlds when she announced that nearly three years before she had been diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes. Roughly 23 million Americans are believed to have Type 2 diabetes, a condition blamed in part on obesity and unhealthy lifestyles.

During those years, she continued to promote her butter- and bacon-laden cooking on television and in books and magazines, and to profit from lucrative endorsement deals with companies such as Smithfield ham and Philadelphia Cream Cheese.

But the harshest criticism was triggered by her simultaneous announcement that she also would be a paid pitch person for drug maker Novo Nordisk's new online program, Diabetes in a New Light, and for its pricy drug, Victoza, which she takes.

Many wondered why she appeared to wait until she had a paying endorsement before revealing her diagnosis.

"Yes, I am being compensated," she said Friday. "It's the way of the world. It's the American way. But I am taking a portion of that compensation and giving it back to the (American) Diabetes Association."

Deen would not say how much she is being paid or what portion would be donated.

Alexander — who began his acting career doing commercials and has appeared on "iCarly" since 2007 considers himself to be "just a kid," but his grown-up role in the kitchen has captured the attention of many in the food industry.

Getting kids to eat healthy is something Alexander understands – he started with himself.

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Mint: What It Is and How to Use It

OFF THE BEATEN AISLE

It's time to move mint beyond juleps and mojitos.

Because in the U.S. mint has struggled to land on the dinner table. We tend to associate it with sweets (after all, it does pair nicely with chocolate) and breath mints.

But elsewhere in the world, especially North Africa, the Middle East and Asia, mint is used to lend a crisp, almost peppery contrast to savory dishes, especially fatty ones (think lamb with mint sauce).

First, the basics.

You'll find fresh mint sold with the other herbs in the produce section, often in large bunches that you'll never manage to entirely use. No worries; it's cheap.

Most of the mint sold at grocers American is spearmint or peppermint, just two of the many varieties (that grow like weeds) available. It should have a mix of large and small leaves that are bright green and firm.

When you get the mint

home, give it a good wash in **Feta-Mint Penne** cold water, then snip off the bottoms of the stems. You can prolong its life – some-times by weeks – if you stand the stems upright in a glass of water and refrigerate.

And be prepared for a minty fresh refrigerator. Mint is as aromatic as it is flavorful (handy since we tend to taste with our snouts as much as our tongues). But that also means you'll want to go easy with it to avoid overpowering other flavors in your dish.

Mint loves vegetables, cooked and raw (it's key to the flavor of fresh Vietnamese spring rolls, for example). It also goes well with roasted poultry and pork, and helps cut through assertive cheeses, such as feta.

Celebrate St. Patrick's Day with a Bit Less Fat

Dublin coddle is considered one of Ireland's national dishes. But like many of Ireland's great foods, it is rich in fat.

Traditionally made with both bacon and sausage to flavor a base of potatoes and onions, Dublin coddle is an insanely good one-dish meal. And it would be a great choice for St. Patrick's Day. Assuming, that is, we can find a way to work it into a healthy diet.

Turned out to be easier than we thought.

We start by opting for leaner meats that still pack tons of flavor, including Canadian bacon, which actually is closer than American bacon to rashers, the variety of pork used in Irish cooking. Canadian bacon and Irish rashers are made from the back loin of the pig rather than the fattier pork belly used for Americanstyle bacon.

For the sausage, we switched to chicken sausage, which is high in flavor, but generally has far less fat and calories than traditional sausage.

The herbs and seasonings already serve the meal well, so we didn't mess around



with those. But we did add a few extra vegetable because, hey, we could all use a few extra servings of those. And for a final punch of flavor, we added apples and apple cider.

Dublin Coddle

Start to finish: 1 1/2 hours

(30 minutes active). Servings: 6.

- 2 tablespoons canola or vegetable oil
- 6 ounces Canadian bacon, chopped
- 10 ounces chicken sausages (any variety), sliced into 1-inch-thick

diagonal slices

- 2 large yellow onions, sliced
- 3 cloves garlic, chopped 2 tablespoons chopped
- fresh sage 2 tablespoons chopped
- fresh thyme 3 tablespoons chopped
 - parsley

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- 2 large russet potatoes, cut into thick slices
- 1 large sweet potato, cut into thick slices
- 2 carrots, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 2 apples, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 1 cup apple cider 1 cup chicken stock

Salt and ground black pepper

In a large Dutch oven over medium-high, heat the oil. Add the Canadian bacon and saute until lightly browned, 3 to 4 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the bacon to a small bowl.

Add the sausage to the pan and brown the slices on both sides, about 3 to 4 minutes per side. Transfer the sausage to the bowl of bacon. Add the onions and garlic to the pan, then saute for 7 to 8 minutes, or until they begin to brown. Stir in the sage, thyme and parsley.

Add the russet and sweet potatoes, carrots, apples and reserved meat. Pour the apple cider and chicken stock over everything. Cover and set over medium-low heat. Cook until the vegetables and potatoes are very tender, about 1 to 1 1/2 hours. Season with salt and pepper.

HOW TO EAT SMART AFTER DARK

nighttime eating isn't a diet downfall in itself. "In general, eating after 7 or 8 p.m. isn't really a problem unless you've already eaten too much during the day," says Karen Ansel, a registered dietitian and spokesperson for the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. Some advice:

If you're trying to lose weight, focus on how much you eat all day, not when you eat. Don't worry if you've eaten healthfully before and need to have dinner after 7. If you've eaten a lot already, however, have a smaller dinner or snack so you don't blow your calorie budget for the day. Pigging out on fatty, salty or sugary foods isn't good any time of day. If you have frequent heartburn, keep your evening meal small and low in fat. Fat relaxes the valve that blocks painful stomach acid from getting into your esophagus. Having big, heavy meals shortly before you lie down to sleep - when gravity also works against you – is a common recipe

for discomfort.

If you have trouble falling asleep, have a small, carbohydrate-rich snack such as a bowl of oatmeal or whole-grain cereal, fruit or air-popped popcorn. Carbohydrates help the

body make tryptophan, an amino acid that promotes deep sleep. Another option is tart dried cherries, which contain a hormone called melatonin that regulates sleep-wake cycles. Note: Avoid alcohol, which

can disrupt sleep. If you need to stay awake or alert, steer away from carbohydrates and focus on healthy proteins such as lean meat, chicken or fish instead.

If you just worked out,

make sure your meal has a combination of protein and healthy carbohydrates for muscle growth and recovery. Two examples: spaghetti and mini meatballs or grilled chicken over mashed sweet potatoes.

Really Good Cake Pops Made Simple

All of a sudden, cake pops are everywhere: Online, at Starbucks, in the Neiman-Marcus catalog. Late-night infomercials hawk countertop appliances for baking tiny spherical cakes.

Angie Dudley, the food blogger also known as Bakerella, who is widely acknowledged with popularizing the bite-sized treats, has a bestselling cookbook ("Cake Pops: Tips, Tricks, and Recipes for More Than 40 Irresistible Mini Treats") devoted to teaching home bakers how to make cake pops resembling pumpkins, sheep, and Kermit the Frog.

They're a fad, yes, but also the most recent iteration of a snack category popular since prehistoric times: Food on a stick. Realizing that cake pops, like shish kebab and corn dogs, are here to stay, I decided to give them a try.

Most cake pop recipes call for baking a cake from a mix, crushing it into crumbs, and mixing it with a can of frosting before rolling the mixture into balls and impaling the balls

pletely. Freezing them for half an hour helped them keep their shape. The candy melts became smooth and creamy in the microwave and coated the chocolate filling without streaking or bubbling. I had to work quickly to apply my decorations – cookie crumbs, Reese's Pieces candies and sprinkles because the coating set up quickly on the frozen balls.

I debuted my cake pops at a recent party. People raved about them – how cute they were, how fun to eat, how delicious. One svelte partygoer said she appreciated the petite portion size of her pop. A burlier guest enjoyed trying pops in every flavor.

Oreo Cheesecake Pops

- 1 (15.5-ounce) package
- Oreo Cookies 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, cut into
- pieces Vanilla, peanut butter, and/or mint chocolateflavored wafers such as Wilton Candy Melts (a 12-ounce package will coat 24 pops)

essary. Scrape mixture into a bowl, cover and refrigerate until well-chilled, at least 1 hour and up to 1 day.

Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Use a small ice cream scoop to form cookie mixture into balls, rolling them between your palms to make them perfectly round. Place on baking sheet, cover with plastic wrap, and freeze until firm, about 30 minutes. Place candy melts in microwave-safe bowl and microwave on medium, stirring every 30 seconds, until just melted. Dip end of lollipop stick into candy coating then insert into a cheesecake ball. Place on baking sheet. Repeat with remaining sticks. Place baking sheet in freezer for 10 minutes to secure sticks to balls. Carefully dip balls into chocolate to cover completely. Rotate stick, tapping it gently on edge of bowl, allowing excess coating to drip off. Apply Oreo crumbs, Reese's Pieces, or sprinkles as desired. Insert ends of lollipop sticks into a piece of Styrofoam.

on sticks. I instantly rebelled against this method because baking a cake, even one from a box, only to have to pulverize it, seemed like a waste of time. Also, canned frosting? Really? There had to be a better-tasting, more wholesome way to get the crumbs to stick together.

I considered several filling options, before settling on a mixture of Oreo cookies and cream cheese developed by Kraft Foods to make Oreo "truffles" and recommended by many lazy cake pop chefs including Bakerella. It gave me a filling with the same consistency as the cake crumbs-and-frosting combination, without any baking. And the cream cheese balanced the sweetness of the crumbs (a common complaint about cake pops made with canned frosting is that they're too sweet).

I placed my filling in the refrigerator and headed to Michael's Crafts for the supplies required to complete the project. I marched directly to the baking and candymaking section of the store, where I picked up lollipop sticks and a circle of Styrofoam, which I'd need to stand the pops upright after decorating them. It was my lucky day, because Wilton candy melts, the easy-to-use candy coating that gives cake pops their smooth and pretty surface, were on sale for \$1.99 per 12-ounce bag. I walked out the door with bags of chocolate, mint chocolate, peanut butter and vanillaflavored wafers in white, yellow, lavender and pink.

Finally, it was time for the fun part. I used a small cookie scoop to make uniform balls of filling, rolling the balls briefly between my palms to round them comAdditional crushed Oreos, Reese's Pieces Candies, and/or green sprinkles for decorating

Quick, Flavorful Potato Curry for a Busy Night

On busy weeknights, we take our dinner shortcuts wherever we can find them. But this doesn't require sacrificing healthy home cooking.

Make smart choices – as in this recipe for red curry potatoes and chickpeas and you can have a great from-scratch dinner on the table in under 30 minutes.

The potatoes are a great example. I speed up the cooking by microwaving them for 5 minutes before adding them to the pan. This saves a little time at the stove, requires no extra effort and doesn't compromise the flavor or texture of the finished dish.

I also turn to jarred Thai red curry paste to provide the bulk of the flavor for the dish. This widely available paste (check the grocer's international aisle) packs big, bold flavor that has kick, but not a lot of heat. And it marries perfectly with starchy ingredients, such as the potatoes and chickpeas.

And for deep, lush and totally effortless flavor, I use canned coconut milk for the liquid. Looking to cut fat? Don't hesitate to use low-fat coconut milk. It won't be quite so lush, but the flavors will still be great.

To make the meal even more substantial (and to stretch it to feed six people), add the meat from a rotisserie chicken at the same time as the potatoes.

Red Curry Potatoes and **Chickpeas**

Start to finish: 20 minutes. Servings: 4.

3 large Yukon gold potatoes, cut into 1-inch chunks

1/4 cup water

- 1 teaspoon ground cumin 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 15-ounce can coconut milk

1 tablespoon Thai red curry paste

15-ounce can chickpeas, drained

1 small red onion, thinly sliced

Salt and ground black pepper, to taste

1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro

1 teaspoon cider or white vinegar

2 scallions, finely chopped

In a medium microwavesafe bowl, combine the potatoes and water. Microwave on high until the potatoes are partly cooked, about 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a large dry saute pan over mediumhigh, toast the cumin and cinnamon for 1 minute. Add the coconut milk and curry paste, then bring to a simmer.

Add the chickpeas and red onion, then return to a sim-

mer. Once the potatoes have cooked, add them to the pan, toss, then cover, reduce heat to low and simmer for 12 minutes. Season with salt and pepper, then stir in the cilantro and vinegar. Serve topped with scallions. Per serving: 520 calories; 220 calories from fat (40 percent of total calories); 24 g fat (20 g saturated; 0 g trans fats); 0 mg cholesterol; 68 g carbohydrate; 13 g protein; 12 g fiber; 560 mg sodium.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. • Want to capture the nation's attention? Try a giant fireball.

It certainly worked for NASCAR, which salvaged its marquee event despite the first ever rainout in 54 runnings of The Great American Race.

The first primetime Daytona 500 in NASCAR history was a win for Fox - its highest-rated Monday night audience since Game 5 of the 2010 World Series - with 36.5 million viewers, up 22 percent from 30 million last year.

And NASCAR surprisingly continued its momentum from last season, partly because of the freak crash in which Juan Pablo Montoya's car hit a truck loaded with jet fuel, injuring no one but scorching the track and forcing a twohour delay.

If there was any doubt NASCAR successfully reached a mainstream audience, sports talk radio personality Jim Rome dispelled it Tuesday afternoon when he said the race was more entertaining than any Monday night NFL game last season.

Rome was particularly fascinated by track workers using laundry detergent to clean up the fuel fire.

Yoga in Olympics? Talk About a Stretch

NEW YORK • The judges will be watching - were the competitor's knees locked? Were the wrists straight? Did the forehead and the knee connect? If not, points are going to be lost.

Seeking the perfect pose will be the order of the day at the National Yoga Asana Championship, being put on March 2-4 by an organization that wants to see yoga asana, or posture, competition become an Olympic sport.

Wait, competitive yoga? Isn't that counterintuitive to something that's usually presented as a spiritual, meditative discipline? Not according to Rajashree Choudhury, who founded USA Yoga, which is holding the competition.

First of all, she says, the focus is on voga postures. "I'm not trying to measure anybody's 'eight states,' " she said, referring the meditative and spiritual aspect of yoga practice. "The posture can be competitive."

Participants must do a series of seven yoga poses in three minutes. Five are compulsory - standing head-to-knee pose, standing bow-pulling pose, bow pose, rabbit pose, and stretching pose. The participants are allowed to pick the last two poses themselves.

The poses show "how someone can have perfect strength, balance, flexibility in the body," Choudhury said.

Competitors who have come in first or second in state meets are expected from 32 states. The New York competition is March 2; the national semifinals on March 3 and the finals on March 4. The winners will take part in an international competition scheduled for June in Los Angeles.

Yoga pose competitions take place in India, where yoga originated, and elsewhere around the world. Choudhury took part in them growing up, as did Please see YOGA, S2

They only won one game by fewer than 10 points. Several of those Senators went on to play college basketball, while Gorrell played football for Boise State.

"It was an extremely good team. I refereed for 19 years in high school basketball, and there have been very few teams that had the talent that that team had. A lot had height similar to ours, but we were lucky to have that kind of talent on our team," Rogers said. "We had six, maybe seven guys that had possibilities to play college ball, so a couple of the second-string guys were college material. Just to get to even play was something."

A Thacker team was as predictable as it was tough to stop. Players went all-out on defense and were among the most fundamentally sound around. Krahn stood 6-foot-8, with the 6-4 Gorrell helping anchor the frontcourt. Gooding's remaining starters went 6-2, 6-2, 5-11.

"Those same years, Wood River had a 6-8, 6-9 guy. Buhl, Mountain Home ... everybody had one. It wasn't like we were the only ones with a big guy," Rogers said. "If you had a 6-4 and another couple of 6-2 guys, it makes a little bit of a difference. Not only were they tall, they were good."

The familiarity of smalltown camaraderie certainly helped, too.

"Being from a small town you grew up together. We played basketball together at the community basketball courts since we were little kids, and you played together with the older kids at the time ... you had to be good because you played with those older kids," Gorrell said. "By the time you got to high school you're very familiar with each other, so when basketball season came it was just a matter of putting it together?

Said Krahn: "All the time we spent on the playground, outside when it was cold, wearing our gloves, shoveling off snow ... we went out and played basketball every day. Didn't matter if it was two or three, four hours, or if it was 23 degrees out or 80 degrees. That dedication and determination, over time, pays off and we were able to enjoy that."

And because the second string was as good as any team the Senators would face that year, according to both LaCroix and Thacker, the biggest pressure they ever contended with was every day against themselves.

"We used to scrimmage at the end of practice, but everything was on a competitive level. Blow the whistle in scrimmage, and you had to run to your position, and if somebody got there before you, you had to sit on the bench. Didn't matter who you were," Gorrell said. "If you made a mistake fundamentally, then the guy on the bench replaced you. You think about that on the bench and, not getting to scrimmage, you made sure you didn't do something stupid again."

Said LaCroix: "If (Thacker) had said to run through a brick wall, we would have tried it."

The team was motivated by the 1966 championship squad, Gooding's first, as well as two losses that denied it an unbeaten season the year before. Gooding lost in the 1971 district tournament to Jerome, then reeled off 33 straight wins that included the back-to-back titles.

"We never worried about whether we were going to win, we just knew we were going to win. Losses to Jerome

and Mountain Home the year before, it killed us. We didn't want to feel like that again," said LaCroix. "We just practiced hard, played hard ... this group of kids had started playing together on Saturday basketball (at age 8-9) and started recognizing we had something special?

After the '72 championship, the team got a police escort back to town after crossing the Gooding County line, and they stopped midtown and had a big pep rally, even though it was near midnight.

"That's something you experience once in a lifetime, that turning out of the community and support. That really pulls community together, the school together and everybody together," Krahn said. "I think we're missing that today and it's a shame, because a lot of kids never get to experience that feeling and it does have a huge impact on a community, especially smaller ones. There's not a lot going on, but I think it gives people a sense of pride. Everybody likes to be associated with a winner."

Thacker came to Gooding after playing at the University of Idaho. He stayed two years

before heading to Washington to continue his career, which ended in 2008 after a brief stint with Lake City. Over 36 seasons, he amassed 534 wins and took another state title, but he holds a particular fondness for his first two teams.

"Those were my first two years of coaching. I didn't realize how tough it would be to go through a season undefeated, and looking back at my coaching years - I had some pretty good teams – it was very difficult to do that," said Thacker, who was inducted into the Washington . "They were a special group ... might be one of the better teams to ever play in the state of Idaho. I love those guys. I look back, they were really good."

When the gang gets back together on Saturday night, they expect to share some fond memories and stories. One thing none of them forgets is what their successes meant to Gooding.

"Some of the guys that are now in their 70s and 80s will stop and talk to me on the street about the games and how everybody's doing," Rogers said. "It played a big part of the community at the time?"

Six Teams Squarely on NCAA Bubble

The college basketball season is winding down and it's time for the NCAA tournament selection committee to zoom in on all those RPIs, SOSs and W-Ls.

The final decisions, at least for some of the final spots, will likely come from something beyond the numbers: The eyeball test. In other words, do they look like NCAA tournament teams?

So, with the regular season starting to wrap up and the conference tournaments starting next week, the teams on the bubble need to make a good impression. A big win at this point in the season could boost them into the 68team bracket, a bad loss to the NIT or home.

There's still a couple dozen teams in position to make a move and we're taking a closer look at six of those.

IOWA STATE: In a conference that includes No. 3 Kansas, No. 7 Missouri and No. 9 Baylor, the Cyclones have quietly made a case for NCAA tourna ment consideration. With its win over Kansas State on Saturday, Iowa State has beaten the Wildcats twice and beat then-No. 10 Kansas last month. The Cyclones have won 21 games and are 11-5 in the Big 12, tied with Baylor for third in the conference. Iowa State has an RPI of 31 and has three wins over teams in the top 50 of the RPI rankings. The Cyclones probably still have a little work to do and don't have an easy schedule, with a road game against Missouri on Wednesday and Baylor at home on Saturday. Get one of those and have a decent run at next week's Big 12 tournament, Iowa State should have a decent shot.

ARIZONA: Sean Miller-coached teams always seem to get better at the end of the season and this one has been no different. The Wildcats were inconsistent early in the season as they inte-grated four freshmen – three after idiki Johnson left the team in December – and the returning players adapted to new roles with Pac-10 player of the year Derrick Williams gone to the NBA. After sweeping the Southern California schools last week, Arizona has won seven of its past eight games, with its lone loss coming on the road to Pac-12 leader Washington. The Wildcats have won 21 games and are 12-5 in conference, with three of those losses by a combined five points. Arizona could be hurt by a down year in the Pac-12, but with a win over struggling rival Arizona State on Saturday and a decent showing in the conference tour-nament after that, the Wildcats will likely be headed back to the NCAAs.

ALABAMA: The Crimson Tide should have gone into a downward spiral the past few weeks after coach Anthony Grant suspended four players, includ-ing Tony Mitchell and JaMychal Green, the team's leading scorers and rebounders. Instead, Alabama has won three straight and six of eight, includ-ing a big victory over fellow bubbler Mississippi State on Saturday. Mitchell has been suspended for the rest of the season, but Green returned against Mississippi State. The Tide has 19 wins, is fourth in the SEC at 8-6 and has a strong RPI of 25. Alabama has a rela-tively easy finishing stretch, with games against Auburn and Ole Miss left, so a halfway-decent run in the conference tourament chuld be conference tournament should be enough to punch its ticket.

HARVARD: The Crimson looked like a lock for the NCAA tournament after going 14-2 in nonconference. After Saturday's 1-point loss to Pennsylvania, their lead in the Ivy League is down to a half game over the Quakers. Harvard missed out on its first NCAA berth since the Truman presidency by losing a one-game playoff to Princeton last eason and could face another winnerseason and could face another winner-goes-dancing game if it finishes the regular season tied with Penn. The Crimson do have a decent resume, with wins over Florida State – on their way to the Battle 4 Atlantis title – and Saint Joseph's, but a loss to Fordham doesn't look good. Harvard has a good shot at an at-large bid with wins over Columbia and Cornell in the final two games, but another one-game playoff loss could lead to a lot of Rolaids being passed around on selection Sunday.

COLORADO STATE: The Rams picked up what appeared to be a huge win over New Mexico last week, but followed it with a loss to No. 21 San Diego State, a game that really could have solidified their resume. It also didn't help Colorado State much that New Mexico got blown out by TCU in its second game last week. The Rams are just 6-6 in the Mountain West and lost to Stanford and Boise State, teams with RPI ratings over 100. The good news for Colorado State is that it's 27th in the RPI and has 17 wins in a schedule ranked fourth-toughest in the nation. The Rams face what could be a huge look-at-us game against No. 17 UNLV on Wednesday before closing out the season against Air Force on Saturday. Without another marquee win or a strong conference tourna-ment, it could get tight for Colorado State.

VIRGINIA COMMONWEALTH: The Rams made an unexpected run to the Final Four last season, have 25 wins and finished a game behind Drexel in the Colonial Athletic Association. Even so, VCU could be left on the outside looking in. The Rams have a win over fellow bubble team South Florida and beat likely MAC winner Akron, but there aren't many other Their RPI also is a so-so 60th and strength of schedule is 213th. Win a few games in the CAA tournament, the Rams could solidify their chances. If not, maybe they'll get lucky and the selection committee will decide last year's run and another chance to see coach Shaka Smart work his magic in the postseason will be enough to give them a nod.

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Spotlight Shines on Delle Donne, No. 8 Delaware

Delaware star Elena Delle Donne's stature is growing with every game. The vice president — of the country, not the school — even made it to a recent game to see the nation's leading scorer.

Vice President Joe Biden, an enthusiastic alumnus, watched Delaware beat Drexel on Jan. 22 and spoke to the team after the game. He slipped into the sold-out arena, sitting near midcourt with Delaware Governor Jack Markell.

Delaware is off to its best start in school history behind Delle Donne, who is averaging 28 points. The Blue Hens made their first appearance in the Top 25 in late November and have shot up the rankings each week. "The combination of Tina Martin and Elena Delle Donne – a great coach and the premier guard in the nation - has been extraordinary to watch," Vice President Joe Biden told The Associated Press in an email. "Their performance also has attracted other great players and excited the state, including me and my granddaughters? Just don't expect to see the 6-foot-5 phenom and eighth-ranked Blue Hens play live on national TV until the NCAA tournament. Two weeks ago, they clinched their second-ever Colonial Athletic Association regular season title beating Drexel 40-39 on a last-second shot by Delle Donne. The junior from Wilmington, Del., scored a season-low 12 points, but there was no doubt where the ball was going with the team down one with 16 seconds left. It would have made for a great TV moment, but Delawarehasn't had the chance to showcase itself on national television yet. "While the women's game has come far in the past decade in terms of TV coverage, I'm still baffled that someone like Elena Delle Donne is never on air for us to see," said Oregonian sports writer Lindsay Schnell, who votes in the weekly AP Top 25 poll. "Voters and fans out west are lucky if we get the occasional highlight on ESPN of her. In reality, most of us won't actually watch her play till the tournament, which is a shame because she's changing the women's game." It's not exactly the fault of ESPN - which broadcasts many of the nationally televised women's games - that the Blue Hens haven't ap

peared on the network yet. ESPN makes up its women's schedule before the season starts and it would have been hard to predict the rise of Delaware.

"The majority of the schedule for ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU and ESPN3 was done prior to the season," said ES-PN senior publicist Rachel Margolis. "The addition of ESPN3 games throughout the season come from local productions at the expense of the schools."

Maybe someone fresh is just what women's basketball needs. Over the last two seasons ESPN's signature women's package on Monday night hasn't been too competitive with most games quickly turning into routs. The average margin of victory has been more than 25 points.

"I think a lot about that," Cruz said of his 2012 potential. "I have to do it. I think this year could be the year. I don't know what I could do. The main thing is to contribute daily and then go from there."

The 31-year-old slugger is so determined to stay off the disabled list and play a full season this year for the twotime AL champion Rangers that he worked to drop 12 pounds from his previous playing weight of 240 and take some pressure off his lower body. He did more jumping drills to strengthen his troublesome legs. He met up with teammate Mike Napoli in Miami to work out this winter and find a program he believes will work finally.

"I feel my hamstrings are strong and flexible. I don't know the last time they felt this way," Cruz said. "I've just got to go out there and play, and make sure I stay there for 150-160 games."

Last year's AL Championship Series MVP has played 128 games or fewer in each of the past three seasons because of injuries, and has never played more than that number of games during his seven-year big league career. He has five stints on the disabled list since 2010 and last year was sidelined for 29 games because of a strained left hamstring and strained right quadriceps muscle.

Now, Cruz also is taking pride in backing up his new incentive-laden \$16 million, two-year contract.

"Yeah, more security, you know, security for my family. That's all about it," he said. "Go out there now and enjoy my game and try to do my best."

He earned it, all right.

Cruz is one of the main reasons the Rangers returned to the World Series for a second straight year. He hit six homers and drove in 13 runs during the ALCS against Detroit — both major league records for a postseason series. That included the first game-ending grand slam in postseason history. Cruz became the first player with extra-inning homers in two games of one series.

Today's deal emphasizes that reaching your best trump fit may not be enough; sometimes, you have to consider whether positional considerations may override playing in the obvious strain. When the United States took on the Netherlands here, Vincent Ramondt and Anton Maas put

up a good smoke screen to get to four spades, but North, David Berkowitz, was unwilling to sell out cheaply. He intelligently competed to five clubs. Larry Cohen made a fine decision when he decided to pass this, protecting the diamond suit from attack.

Ramondt now chose the wellreasoned lead of the spade four. with the idea of putting his partner in for a diamond through. But North held the spade king, which Larry Cohen inserted at trick one. When it held, it gave Cohen pause for thought. Why had West underled his spade ace? There were two plausible reasons: either West was void in hearts, or his diamonds were such that an urgent switch was required.

Since West was marked with no more than three cards in clubs and hearts on the bidding, Co-hen continued with dummy's club queen, then a finesse of the 10 a safety play to make sure he could prevent East from getting the lead in trump. When the club 10 held, the rest of the trumps were drawn, then the hearts were cashed, for 13 tricks. As you can see, five hearts would have failed on a diamond lead by East, since the defenders take two diamonds and a ruff.
