SALES TAX BILL **STALLS AGAIN**

Once again, Idaho lawmakers kill a bill to allow the state to collect the tax on Internet and catalog purchases.

BOISE • After at least five years of debating, refining and tweaking, Idaho's lawmakers still aren't comfortable passing Streamlined Sales Tax.

On Wednesday, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee killed a bill that would have established a system to collect the state's 6 percent sales tax on Internet and other remote purchases its residents make. Committee chairman Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot, said it was the fifth or sixth time the committee has considered the measure.

A motion to pass the bill failed on a 9-9 vote. When there is a tie, the motion fails.

Most who testified Wednesday encouraged the committee to pass the legislation, saying the system would level the playing field for small businesses who must collect the tax, and establish a way to collect a tax that Idahoans are already required to

Shawn Barigar, president and CEO of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, testified in favor of the

"I've heard from many of our members ... that they are at a competitive disadvantage when it comes to competing with out-of-state remote sales," he said.

Barigar shared one example of a Twin Falls retailer who told him about customers coming to his store, writing down details and model numbers of expensive saddles, and then going home to buy them online so they didn't have to pay the sales tax.

Snow Leads to Outages across the Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS • Wednesday's short but heavy snowstorm resulted in power outages for some Magic Valley residents.

Idaho Power Co. reported late-morning outages in Jerome, Paul and Twin Falls that affected a combined 1,637 customers.

The largest outage affected 1,389 customers in Jerome, as the outage spread across many parts of the city. Customers were without power from 10:25-10:55 a.m. The outage was caused by weather conditions, said Brad Bowlin, a spokesman for the utility company.

Tuesday's snowfall also knocked power out to about 130 customers in Paul from shortly after 11:20 a.m. until a little after 1 p.m.

The only outage not directly caused by weather was in Twin Falls. Power was cut to about 100 Twin Falls customers shortly before 11 a.m. after a car hit a power pole.

New Water District Will Monitor **Judged Rights**

State officials plan to create a new water district along the Snake River to monitor water rights resolved by the court.

TWIN FALLS • Idaho water officials are only weeks away from forming a water district that stretches between the Milner and Swan Falls dams.

The new district is being proposed by the Idaho Department of Water Resources and will encompass 520 water rights along the Snake River.

The district is scheduled to officially form in mid-March, but water users will have up to two years to appoint a water-

master and submit individual measurement plans, said Tim Luke, IDWR's water compliance bureau chief officer.

Creating a water district helps IDWR officials monitor water use. More importantly, it brings water-right disputes out of the courtroom and into an administrative process, Luke said.

For the past 25 years, water right claims have been settled through the Snake River Basin Adjudication — a court specifically set up to resolve water ownership across most

The SRBA was created as a result of a 1980s agreement involving Idaho Power's water rights at Swan Falls. After Please see WATER, A2

settling hundreds of thousands of water claims, the court has come close to resolving those few that remain. And that means the Swan Falls/Milner water district can finally form.

"Even at this time, people are moving water rights around," Luke said. "The use might not have changed, but just the location. As an agency, we need to stay on top of it and water districts are a way to do

Nate Jones pumps water near Glenns Ferry. When contacted by the Times-News, he wasn't aware ID-WR planned to form the water district. Though he's interested to see how the district could affect his pumping, he said he can see why IDWR would want to create a district for the

"There isn't a watermaster in the area but there's only so much water you can take," Jones said. "We've become more efficient in our pumping by switching over to pivots. We actually save water, but I don't know who else knows that."

IDWR is requiring that all users in the district submit a measurement plan to the department by 2014. The costs of measuring each water right falls onto the user.

"We are getting comments from people who view this as an unfunded mandate," Luke said. "But people have been doing this for years. The law requires that they pay."

educator-led tutoring sessions each day. The noon hour and afterschool sessions are new

The additions are in line with a district trend toward helping students outside regular school hours instead of pulling them out of

"The thinking is that kids will benefit the most by extra time and help that's individualized in addition to regular classroom instruction," Associate Superintendent Patti O'Dell

Students can still receive smaller group assistance throughout the school day. But schools can also decide to provide after-hours tu-

Some children come to a tutoring session every day, while others just come occasionally.

The school has offered tutoring in the morning for years. Students can read or do homework. Then, they're taken to the school cafeteria for breakfast.

For the new noontime session, teachers assign students to come.

"A lot of that is missing assignment completion," Olmstead said.

Also, it's a chance for students to complete their required reading time, especially if it's a challenge to get it done at home.

The after-school session draws the most students about 25 or 30 daily.

At Harrison Elementary School, the tutoring program is structured a little differently.

The school has two eight-week after-school sessions each year for students who need help with reading and math. About 40 students participate in each session and they're recommended by their teacher.

Families also get involved during a social event at the beginning of the session, and a celebration on the last day.

"It's been a really positive thing," Principal Chris Gillette said of tutoring. "The kids are actually sad to have it end."

Kimberly-Hansen Wastewater Study Could Wrap in 3-4 Months

KIMBERLY • Community leaders in Hansen and Kimberly will soon find out whether construction of a joint wastewater treatment plant would be a smart

Forsgren Associates Inc. of Boise is conducting a feasibility study.

Company representative Brad Bjerke told Kimberly City Council members on Tuesday that the study will be completed in three to four months. He urged people in both communities to keep an open mind.

"Maybe it makes sense for you to do your own plant and for Hansen to do its own, but I think it's smart for you two

(communities) to consider merging that wastewater treatment together," he said. "You're close enough from a standpoint of distance."

Hansen is exploring the possibility of replacing an aging wastewater treatment plant. Kimberly doesn't have a system of its own; its wastewater is piped to Twin Falls for treatment.

The cost of that service could increase when Kimberly's contract with Twin Falls is renewed in the next few months, so city officials are looking at other alterna-

Also on Tuesday, the Kimberly council approved an engineering contract for a recreational vehicle dump that will be connected to the city's wastewater collection

The planned RV dump will be built near the city park and will include a surveillance camera to guard against illegal dumping.

Kimberly's wastewater agreement with Twin Falls could be jeopardized if substances such as carpetcleaning chemicals or dairy industry pharmaceuticals were ever dumped, city officials said.

"Under a worst-case scenario, I think you would be looking at a cancellation of the contract," Public Works Director Rob Wright told the council.

It's possible that the new RV dump could be constructed with a holding tank or vault to prevent any such contamination. Design work

hasn't begun yet.

"Once the (engineering) contract is signed, we will be jumping right into design," Ivan McCracken, an engineer with J-U-B Engineers, told the council.

The RV dump will not add substantially to the city's total wastewater flow, he said. The typical recreational vehicle dumps about 20 gallons of wastewater at a time, while the average house discharges about 350 gallons a day.

The new RV dump was made possible by a \$310,000 state grant. Bids for the project will be put out in June and construction is expected to start in July.

Kimberly's next council meeting will be held March 13 at the new city hall at 242 Highway 30 E.

Prison Ordered for Buhl Child Injurer

Police say Scott Beede violated his probation on an injury to a child conviction.

TWIN FALLS • A Buhl man convicted of injury to a child has been sentenced to spend time in state prison after violating his probation.

Scott Lee Beede was sentenced Tuesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court to five to 10 years in prison. In 2008, he was charged with 10 counts of injury to a child. He eventually pleaded guilty to one of the charges, while the other nine were dropped by prosecutors.

Beede was accused of victimizing five children aged 5-16. Police say he shot a BB gun at two of them, forced another into a hot bath that resulted in burns, and kept two girls inside a cooler while sitting on the lid.

Police say they found BB's lodged in two of the boy's bodies.

Beede was ordered to serve probation, which prosecutors called "a huge opportunity" for him to prove he could live in society. But he couldn't, as police say he violated probation by consuming alcohol and failing to obtain work and ordered treatment.

At Tuesday's sentencing,

prosecutor Suzanne Craig asked that Beede's original jail sentence be imposed. Beede's attorney, public defender Sam Beus, admitted Beede had violated his probation. Beus said Beede's actions

showed a man who struggled with unemployment, consumed alcohol, didn't get mental heath treatment, got scared and then tried to avoid his probation officer, all because of mental health issues. Despite this, his actions did not reflect a return to prior behavior, Beus said.

Beus argued Beede should be placed in the state's retainedjurisdiction treatment program rather than be sent to prison. "I was given a huge oppor-

tunity and I messed up,"

Beede said in court. "I'm sorry for that. I drank and got scared of going back to jail." Beede said he wanted to

complete a treatment program and use the tools he'd receive there to be a productive member of society.

Judge G. Richard Bevan reviewed the case and said since Beede had completed drug and alcohol treatment in the past, retained-jurisdiction programming wasn't a good choice. Bevan also said Beede wasn't achieving the goals he needed to make while on probation.

"Today this has been weighing heavy in my mind," Bevan said, before revoking Beede's probation and sentencing him to the prison term.

TWIN FALLS • A St. Anthony man has been convicted by a Twin Falls jury of indecent exposure and unlawful touching of an officer.

The jury found Randy Scott Hill not guilty of a count of battery on an officer during a Feb. 23-24 trial.

Hill, 42, was charged with the crimes in late December after Twin Falls police received an early morning report on Christmas Eve of a stranger masturbating in the backyard of a man's Second Avenue West home.

The resident told police he grabbed his shotgun and challenged the suspect, who then jumped over the fence officers said they searched the area and found Hill across the alley, again masturbating in an open garage.

When one officer approached Hill to arrest him for indecent exposure, Hill allegedly began trying to hit the officer in the head. After Hill's thick coat blocked shocks from both officers'

Tasers, the officers said they used their collapsible batons as Hill continued to fight. Police say the scuffle end-

ed when Hill fell while trying to throw a lawn chair at them, allowing one officer to use his Taser and arrest Hill. Police say Hill has an extensive criminal history, including prior arrests for battery on a police officer, driving under the influence and indecent exposure. A sentencing date has not

yet been set.

"That's unfair to these business folks," Barigar said. Wayne Hoffman of the Idaho Freedom Foundation was the only person to testify against the legislation. Hoffman told the committee that sales tax makes sense when customers buy from a brick and mortar business. On the way to the store, he said, those customers receive government services in the form of streets and police. The same isn't true for Internet sales tax, he said.

"I can sit there in my living room, in my underwear, and buy a teddy bear from Vermont and never use state services," Hoffman said.

Not all committee members bought it. Rep. Dell Raybould, R-Rexburg,

What's the problem? Idaho law already requires residents to pay the state's 6 percent sales tax on purchases made online or from catalogs. But the state lacks a way to collect the taxes other than trusting people will pay up on their annual tax forms.

What's the solution? Sponsors of a bill to update the tax code say joining a multi-state coalition will streamline the process of gathering sales taxes from across the country. Is this a new tax? No. However, most people don't pay it right now, so if approved, Idaho residents would likely see a difference when buying items online.

pointed out that Idahoans are already required to pay sales tax on remote purchases, and that opposing this legislation is condoning breaking the law. And Rep. Bedke Proposes Capitol Parking Garage

BOISE • Boise's downtown parking situation might get a little less stressful soon.

House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, introduced legislation Wednesday that would authorize the Department of Administration to use money saved by refinancing state-owned buildings to construct a parking garage near the Capitol.

Currently, there is a waiting list of 200 names for a reserved parking space near the Statehouse, the concurrent resolution states. There are 2,300 state employees in the Capitol Mall, but only 1,236 available parking spaces. The shortage is magnified during the Legislative session, with lawmakers, lobbyists and the public also competing for those spots.

"The state needs to address that," Bedke said.

A new parking garage would make parking easier for state employees, Bedke said, while opening up other parking spaces near the Capitol for members of the public.

The bill is co-sponsored by Rep. Joe Palmer, R-Meridian, and Sen. Chuck Winder, R-Boise.

The House State Affairs Committee voted to print the legislation.



Brand-name Deals to Mix with Facebook Friend Posts

New, potentially lucrative advertising opportunities are coming to Facebook as a prelude to its initial public offering of stock. The idea is to lure big brands with the promise of effective, precisely targeted ads that reach the social network's 845 million users.

 $\textbf{NEW YORK} \bullet \textbf{Messages from brands}$ such as Walmart and Starbucks may soon be mixed in with your Facebook status updates and baby photos from friends and family.

Facebook unveiled new advertising opportunities Wednesday to help the world's biggest brands spread their message on the world's largest online social network.

Facebook executives outlined a longterm vision to move from advertisements to stories. Brands you've endorsed by hitting the "like" button will now be able to push deals and other updates right into the news feeds that show your friends' updates, photos and links.

These posts could also show up if one of your friends has interacted with a brand, such as by liking it or commenting on a photo on that brand's page.

The changes come ahead of Facebook's initial public offering of stock, expected this spring. The IPO could value the company at as much as \$100 billion. That means Facebook has to prove it can bring in real advertising revenue from the likes of Wal-Mart, Procter &

Gamble and other massive brands. "Facebook is making serious money from ads right now, but they are not making serious money from major brand advertisers. That's where the ad money is," said Rebecca Lieb, an analyst with the Altimeter Group. "They currently have rather low-rent, shoddy ads on Facebook?

This could now change as Facebook moves to integrate brands' messages into its 845 million users' pages.

Facebook made the announcement at the American Museum of Natural History in New York in a rare East Coast appearance for a Silicon Valley is now seriously courting Madison Avenue.

"We are in a way going back to the future," said Chris Cox, Facebook's vice president of product.

Rather than bombarding people with flashy ads, Facebook is urging companies to integrate themselves into what people are already doing on the site talking to their friends and family, commenting on photos or posting news

"The definition of the word 'advertise' is to draw attention to;' Cox said. "The definition of a story is narration, which you'd think is what people prefer."

Facebook has a vast trove of information about its users' lives, hobbies, likes and dislikes, yet the company has kept advertising fairly unobtrusive to date. Ads for teeth-whitening, wineries and laundry detergent and the like are relegated to the right side of users' Facebook pages. Over time, Web-savvy users have grown to used to ads and many are tuning them out.

Those ads are not going away, but brands will now be able to push updates or as Facebook likes to call, "stories" right into the news feeds. Facebook's challenge will be to keep these ads as unobtrusive as possible so that users are not alienated or driven to "unlike" brands.

The company will collect feedback and test out how its users respond to the changes. It will also roll out the changes slowly. At first, users may see just one message from a brand inside their news feed, or even less. And they won't see messages from random companies they are not connected to in some way — directly or through a friend.

"Facebook has certainly backed down on things," Lieb said. "But they are not just going on what people say. They are going on what they do."

WILL HIGHER DERAIL THE **ECONOMY?**

NEW YORK • The price of gas has jumped 45 cents since Jan. 1 and is the highest on record for this time of year, an average of \$3.73 a gallon. On Wall Street, talk has turned from the European debt crisis to another worry: Will higher gas prices derail the economic recovery?

Not yet, economists say. They argue that the United States is in much better shape than early last year, when a similar surge in fuel prices weighed on economic growth by squeezing household budgets. Americans spent less on clothes, food and everything else.

Rising gas prices hurt less when an economy is improving than when it's slowing down. So economists expect other spending won't be badly hurt, at least for now. If gas breaks its record of \$4.11 a gallon, however, all bets are off.

"Can the economy withstand the increase we've seen so far? The answer is yes," says David Kelly, chief market strategist at J.P. Morgan Funds.

The reasons:

• Jobs. The country has added 2 million over the past year. Those 2 million people with paychecks will spend them, which helps the economy. Lower unemployment also makes people feel better about the economy — and less likely to cut other spending way back.

• Job security. Unemployment claims, the best measure of layoffs, are at a four-year low. Fewer Americans are worrying about losing their job, so they can take the punch of higher gas prices and move on.

• A steadier housing market, the Dow Jones industrial average's clearing 13,000 and other signs of an improving economy also help. Add them together and consumer confidence is the highest in a year. More confidence makes people more likely to keep spending on other things even if gas goes up.

 Gas wasn't the only thing getting more expensive last year. Prices for milk, meat, bread and other foods were rising because of higher prices for grains and other farm goods. Natural gas prices were also on the rise, making it more expensive for Americans to heat their homes.

This year, natural gas prices have plummeted. Unlike last year, filling up the car's tank is about the only thing getting dramatically more expensive. Last year, when Americans were feeling it from all sides, they made tough choices, like cutting out expensive dinners.

The key is what impact gas prices have on other spending in the economy. All consumer spending isn't equal. A dollar spent on gas has less of an impact on the U.S. economy than a dollar spent in a restaurant or at a baseball game. The U.S. is an oil-importing country, so many of the dollars spent on gas ultimately leave the country.

Faster Growth Last Quarter Bolsters Hopes for 2012

WASHINGTON • Stronger hiring and higher pay and savings should support solid growth for the economy in coming months.

That was a key message that emerged Wednesday from a report on economic growth in the final three months of 2011. The economy grew at a 3 percent annual rate in the October-December quarter, up from a previous estimate of 2.8 percent, the Commerce Department

Most of last quarter's

growth stemmed from a jump in company restocking. That happened because businesses rebuilt inventories that had been depleted last summer. Stockpiling is expected to slow sharply this quarter. And as it slows, economic growth could, too. But economists stressed

that the fundamental drivers of the economy - incomes, consumer spending and business investment - are rising. They will likely sustain modest growth this year.

Expectations for growth this quarter are slightly better than they were a month ago. Economists expect the economy to expand at a roughly 2 percent annual pace in the current quarter and about 2.5 percent for the full year, according to the National Association for Business Economics. That would be faster than last year's 1.7 percent growth.

In its first report in January on fourth-quarter growth, the government had estimated that incomes rose only slightly. That estimate was revised Wednesday to show incomes grew much more

than previously thought. After taxes, inflation-ad-

estimate. And in the third quarter,

justed incomes rose 1.4 percent in the fourth quarter. That's nearly double the first

incomes rose 0.7 percent, compared with earlier estimates of a 1.9 percent drop.

Economists had worried that growth wouldn't be sustainable without more income gains. Wednesday's report showed that households were in better financial shape than many had expected.

Some economists detect signs of a self-fulfilling cycle in which more jobs fuel more spending and pay, which spark further hiring and spending.

"Today's figures give encouraging evidence of a virtuous cycle developing where incomes and consumption thought. move up together," said Nigel

Gault, an economist at IHS Global Insight.

Higher incomes should also make it easier for consumers to absorb higher gas prices and keep spending on other items.

"The consumer is in a better position to weather higher gasoline prices than appeared to be the case prior to these revisions," said Joshua Shapiro, chief economist at MFR Inc., in a note to clients.

A big reason for the higher estimate of growth in the October-December quarter was that consumers and businesses spent more than first

Imports, which subtract

from the gross domestic product, rose by a smaller amount. GDP is the broadest measure of the nation's output of goods and services.

The savings rate was revised higher. Americans saved 4.5 percent of their incomes in the October-December quarter. That was down slightly from the third quarter. But it topped the previous 3.7 percent estimate for the fourth quarter. Consumer spending rose

2.1 percent in the fourth quarter, powered by a jump in spending on autos and other long-lasting goods. That's an improvement from the third quarter. And it's much better than spending during the spring, when high gas prices nearly brought consumer spending to a standstill.

Police: Nampa Woman Charged in Mom's Death

NAMPA • A southwestern Idaho woman has been charged with first-degree murder in the death of her 69-year-old mother.

Police say officers went to a Nampa home late Tuesday to investigate a reported disturbance and 40-year-old Kelly Singh answered the door with blood on her clothing. When they went inside, officers say they found Singh's mother in a bedroom with head injuries.

The injured woman, Ruth Collins, died at a Boise hospital on Wednesday.

A coroner determined Collins died from blunt force trauma to the head and ruled death a homicide.

Court documents show Singh is accused of attacking her mother with a hammer. She was arraigned Wednesday on the murder change and is being appointed a public defender. A preliminary hearing in the case has been scheduled for March 14.

Panel Advances Sex Offender **Delisting Bill**

BOISE • Senate lawmakers are trying to give young men convicted under an older definition of statutory rape an opportunity to clear their name from the sex offender registry.

The Judiciary and Rules Committee advanced a bill Wednesday that applies to young men who were convicted of statutory rape before 2010.

In 2010, the Legislature statutory rape cleared charges in cases of consensual sex when a man is within three years in age of his 16 or 17-year-old partner. Previously no girl under 18 could legally give con-

Sen. Les Bock of Garden City says many offenders convicted under the old law might not be found guilty under the new definition.

His bill would give those offenders a chance to petition a judge to lift their sex offender label.

Senate Chooses Fulcher as Leader after McGee Exit

BOISE • Idaho Republican senators chose Russ Fulcher in closed session as majority caucus chairman to replace former Sen. John McGee, who quit last week amid sexual harassment allegations from a young female staffer.

The 27 Senate GOP members chose Fulcher, R-Meridian, on Wednesday, hoping to put what's become a painful issue for the chamber's majority behind them as quickly as possible.

Fulcher actually held the No. 4 Senate post until last year, but lost it when he unsuccessfully campaigned for the Senate president pro tem post.

Idaho Utilities to Senate: Give Us **Energy Credits**

BOISE • Idaho utilities began what's likely a tough legislative fight to force small alternative power projects to hand over their renewable energy credits.

Idaho Power Co., Avista Corp. and Rocky Mountain Power on Wednesday began pushing lawmakers on the Senate State Affairs Committee to award them these so-called "green tags" that result when they buy renewable projects' electrici-

Currently, alternative power developers that include agricultural giants Simplot Co. and Cargill can keep the credits, which are worth up to \$1 million annually when they're sold to utilities in states with renewable portfolio standards that Idaho doesn't have.

Developers say the credits sometimes make the differ-

ence in their small projects' economic viability.

Bill Marking **IEA Milestone** Put on Fast Track

BOISE • Legislation recognizing the 120th year of the Idaho Education Association is being fast-tracked in the Idaho House.

The House Education Committee voted Wednesday to introduce the measure marking the March 3 milestone for the statewide teachers union. The committee bypassed a hearing on the measure, sending it onto the full House for consideration.

Democratic Rep. Shirley Ringo, a retired teacher from Moscow, brought the bill to the committee on behalf of the IEA. Ringo recalled how the group was formed in 1892, after then State Superintendent of Public Instruction Judge J.E. Harroun called for the teachers of the state to organize a permanent association.

The IEA now has 12,000

Man Turns Self in On Charge of **Embezzlement**

IDAHO FALLS • An Idaho Falls man faces a felony charge after prosecutors allege he embezzled more than half-a-million dollars from a business while he worked as its chief financial officer.

Police say 51-year-old Stanley William Mills turned himself in Tuesday and was arrested at the Bonneville County jail on a charge of felony grand theft.

The warrant for Mills' arrest stemmed from an investigation into the alleged embezzlement of more than \$550,000 from Environmental Management Inc. between 2002 and 2008.

Company officials contacted police last June after discovering the alleged theft.

Bill Could Force Idaho to Sell Storage Business

BOISE • House lawmakers' unease with an endowment trust-owned storage business in Boise shined through in a 15-1 committee vote that could force the state Department of Lands to sell the

operation. The Resources Committee voted overwhelmingly Wednesday for the measure requiring the Land Board to sell or lease all improvements on endowmentowned ground, and sell all business operations.

In August 2010, the Land Board's purchase of Affordable Self Storage in Boise drew free-market advocates' fiery critique.

They argued the endowment trust that benefits public schools was encroaching on the private sector by buying a business, rather than merely grazing, timber or commercial buildings, like it's owned for a century.

Leave Afghanistan Now

ost wars have a turning point that either signals the road to victory or the ditch of defeat. In Vietnam, the



1968 Tet Offensive by communist troops against South Vietnamese and American forces and their allies is regarded as the turning point in that conflict. Though communist forces suffered heavy losses, which would normally define defeat, CBS News anchor Walter Cronkite and others in the U.S. media portrayed the operation as an allied loss, thus encouraging not only the anti-war movement, but North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops who believed all they had to do was hang on until America grew tired of the war and quit.

Since the Obama administration appears to care more about not offending those Afghans who want to kill Americans and since it has announced the deadline for the withdrawal of surge-level troops in Afghanistan for later this year, despite the fact that they have stymied the efforts of Taliban insurgents to destabilize the country, maybe it's time to pull all U.S. forces out and leave our puppet, Hamid Karzai, to his fate.

The latest affront comes courtesy of the burning of Korans by U.S. soldiers on a military base near Kabul. Military officials maintain the Korans were being used by imprisoned jihadists to pass messages to other prisoners and were confiscated and destroyed. A spokesman for the NATO-led force said the troops, "...should have known to check with cultural advisers to determine how to dispose of religious material properly." For this unintended action, however, Karzai wants the soldiers to be put on trial and has asked NATO commanders to allow it. If they do, they will have disgraced their uniform.

Does writing in a Koran desecrate it? One might expect it would, but the outrage is over the burning, not the writing. More than 1,700 Americans have died in and around Afghanistan and more than 14,000 have been wounded since the United States invaded shortly after Sept. 11, 2011. And this is the thanks we get? How sharper than a serpent's tooth it is to have a thankless puppet.

When do jihadists apologize for mass murder or religious persecution? Two years ago in Rasht, Iran, Youcef Nadarkhani, a Christian pastor who converted from Islam, was arrested on charges of apostasy. He has been sentenced to hang for his religious conversion. Anyone hear any apologies from "moderate" Muslims about that, much less attempts to shame the ayatollahs, or label them apostates?

The New York Times reported recently that President Obama's three-page apology letter to President Karzai contained these sentences: "I wish to express my deep regret for the reported incident. I extend to you and the Afghan people my sincere apologies." This will only serve as further evidence to our enemies in Afghanistan of America's weakness and lack of resolve in what is likely to be a very long and global war. American impatience, fatigue and a desire not to offend, does not bode well for an American victory or for Afghan liberation. No one worried about offending our enemies during World War II. That's why the forces for good won.

Can Afghanistan be stabilized so as not to pose a threat to America and American interests? Probably not, if the surge forces pull out on schedule and America continues to fight under restrictive and self-imposed rules of war while the enemy does not.

So what's the point? Are we to stay only until after the election so President Obama won't be asked, "Who lost Afghanistan?" If our troops are coming out anyway and if the administration can't define victory, or commit the resources necessary to achieve it, waiting longer only ensures more casualties. As with Vietnam, that is a waste of blood and treasure. Ask the ghosts of the more than 58,000 fallen whose names appear on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, or the ghosts of the politicians who are responsible for putting them in their graves.

Welfare Reform Worked

he primary election campaign has intensified a justified concern about inequality in America: People at the top are rising much faster than everyone else. Even low-income Americans consider relatively high levels of inequality acceptable if they have a decent opportunity to improve their condition. But because they may work fewer hours and at stagnant wages, their gains are very limited.

Among the poor, surprisingly, never-married mothers have gained the most in recent decades. Their story shows the best way to reduce poverty and inequality: by encouraging individuals to work more and by supplementing their earnings with tax credits, child-care subsidies and other benefits for low-income working parents.

Until the mid-1990s, never-married mothers seldom worked outside the home, had poverty rates of Peter H. Schuck and Ron Haskins

over 60 percent and were at least five times more likely than married-couple families to be poor. Then in 1996, congressional Republicans and President Bill Clinton collaborated on a welfare reform law requiring adults on welfare, including never-married mothers, to work.

When Clinton signed the law, many of his strongest political supporters reviled him for entering into "a pact with the devil." They predicted that poor women and their children deprived of welfare would die in the streets. Any employment gains, they insisted, would vanish in the first economic downturn.

The data refute these dire predictions. In fact, according to Census Bureau data, between 1996 and 2000, the percentage of never-married mothers in jobs increased by about a third (to 66 percent), while the poverty rate for these mothers and their children declined by about a third (to 40 percent). For the poorest of the poor, this large an improvement based on their own efforts was unprecedented. Since then, two recessions have reduced these gains somewhat; their employment rate is down to 58.7 percent (still better than for women generally) and their poverty rate is up to 49.3 percent.

Yet even in the worst recession since the Depression, more are employed and they are less poor than they were before the 1996 law. In fact, researchers Bruce Meyer of the University of Chicago and James Sullivan of Notre Dame have found that if all the work-based benefits given to low-income workers were included - such benefits are mostly ignored by the official poverty measure — the incomes of these mothers and children would be even higher and

their poverty rate even lower.

The reasons for this policy success are clear, suggesting some lessons for the future. The 1996 law created strong incentives, both positive and negative, for the most uneducated, untrained and unpromising welfare recipients to join the workforce. As shown by their high employment rates, poor mothers responded to these incentives even more resourcefully than most policymakers had expected despite their often chaotic domestic circumstances. The federal law meshed well with many experimental state and local welfare-to-work programs, helping states pay for job search and readiness, health insurance, child care and other vital work support services.

Most politicians did not cave in to the intentionally inflammatory "dying in the streets" rhetoric; instead, they figured that the program could hardly be worse than the status quo of welfare dependency and that many of the poorest of the poor would end up better off.



Man Pleads Guilty to Disturbing Peace in House Wrecking

SANDPOINT (AP) • A northern Idaho man who tried to tear down a rental home while a woman and two children were inside has pleaded guilty to misdemeanor disturbing the

Paul Fagerlie Finman, 56, reached a plea agreement Monday with prosecutors after the family declined to testify against him.

Finman was ordered to serve 180 days in jail, though the judge suspended all but two days of the sentence and gave him credit for 48 hours already served. He was ordered to pay more than \$400 in fines and court costs.

initially Prosecutors charged Finman with three counts of felony assault for using a tractor to start dismantling the rental house on his property in October 2010. He pleaded not guilty, and his case was scheduled to go to trial this week in 1st District Court.

Finman claimed the family had been evicted from the home and he didn't know anyone was still in the house when he started tearing it down Oct. 8, 2010. He said the family had told him they

would move by Sept. 30,

"It was a very bizarre situation," Finman told the Bonner County Daily Bee.

A judge last year denied a motion seeking to dismiss the case, noting that an eviction order gave the family until Oct. 31, 2010, to leave the home.

A deputy testified during a preliminary hearing that Finman acknowledged he had heard voices from inside the home after he threw a rock through a sliding glass door and it shattered. Finman still proceeded with the demolition, authorities said.

No one was injured during the attempted demolition.

As part of the plea agreement, prosecutors dismissed two of the felony charges against Finman and amended a third to a misdemeanor. Finman's conduct was "reckless, criminal and inappropriate" but no one suffered injuries as a result, said Bonner County prosecutor Louis Marshall.

"They were simply scared," Marshall said.

Alexander Duncan Campbell refused to allow his wife or children to testify because he does not recognize the legitimacy of Idaho's government, Marshall said. Camp-

bell is wanted in Kootenai and Nez Perce counties on arrest warrants stemming

from alleged vehicle and weapons violations. The family's whereabouts

were unknown at the time of Finman's hearing earlier this week, authorities said.

Wolf Population Up 15 Percent in Montana

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • The number of wolves in Montana increased by at least 87 last year despite the state's efforts to reduce the population with an extended hunting season.

Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks said Wednesday that 653 wolves were counted at the end of the year, a population increase of about 15 percent from 2010.

FWP had authorized a quota of 220 wolves in the gray wolf in the Northern Rocky Mountains except for Wyoming. The agency had aimed to



TWIN FALLS • "If carp are farther away you'll need to throw it," said Joey Heck, standing on the bank of a small stream on the College of Southern Idaho campus, a harpoon in his hands. "Otherwise

you'll ..."

Heck jabbed the end of the harpoon into the water where it made a splash. He didn't catch any fish there weren't any - but was demonstrating how to use a harpoon in the wild, like the area's Native Americans used to do.

Heck, exhibits manager at the Herrett Center for Arts and Science, on Saturday will teach the first of eight classes aimed to get people in touch with their inner survivalists. The harpoon segment, "Salmon Jabbin' 101," is part of the lineup of three primitivefishing classes.

The first class Saturday will teach students how to make fish traps and weirs.

"Basically, we'll be making a replica of a willow fish

fish traps from around the region and world, even," Heck said. What students learn in class is more art and survival tactic than practical skill.

"You have to be super careful with traps because the Idaho Department of Fish and Game has lots of regulations with trapping," he said. (Find trapping information on page 44 of the 2011-12 Fishing Rules Brochure or online at fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/fish/rules/generalFish-Info.pdf)

In other classes, students will learn how to build their own fishing kits using native plants, local stones and animal parts; how to make long darts; and how to build fire.

So can you actually do this stuff on Idaho's public lands?

"The bottom line is, any-

thing that involves taking a fish out of the wild ... you must have a fishing license and are subject to all the rules associated with it," said Gary Hompland, regional conservation officer for Fish and Game.

Harpooning for nongame fish, such as carp, and for bullfrogs is allowed; and for game fish at times during fish salvage, Hompland said. Crawfish can be trapped, but there are some restrictions, so check with Fish and Game first. (Find spear fishing information on page 43 of Fish Game's and fishing brochure or at fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/fish/rules/generalFish-Info.pdf)

Throwing darts and spearing big game animals is not allowed, Hompland said. Fish and Game has had requests to make spear hunting legal, he said, but it's something the department hasn't looked at seriously.

"Survival is a little different situation than fishing (or hunting) for sport," he said. "But to use those techniques recreationally is not allowed."

Just the same, the classes are informative and fun, Heck said.

In case you're ever in survival mode, Heck teaches how to throw a long dart using an atlatl - a primitive handheld dart thrower used to achieve greater velocity and distance.

Standing on a grassy hill Feb. 24 near the Herrett Center, Heck gently thrust the atlatl above his head, pushing the long dart into the air. It sailed across the field for several yards before embedding itself in the

Gun Maintenance Tools of the Trade to the slotted tips for effec-

In my last column, I made the suggestion that with the proper tools and training, anyone could learn to clean and maintain their firearms to provide several lifetimes of service.

Follow these simple tips and suggestions today and years from now your descendants could be entering the game fields with your current pride and joy tucked into the crock of their arm.

Let's begin.

The first order of business, if you're unfamiliar with the inner workings of your firearm, is to carefully review the disassembly/assembly resources we discussed previously. Next, arrange the appropriate tools, cleaning chemicals, and several loose parts bins on a large working surface in a well-lighted and ventilated work space.

Before the first screw is loosened or bottle of solvent opened, I shield my eyes from the inevitable wayward spritz or splashes of chemical cleansers with a pair of clear safety glasses. Because most of our popular action/bore cleaners are serious skin irritants, my hands and upper arms are always protected by a pair of

gloves. They provide ample through on a sharp screw head, spring or action sur-

The mechanic's mantra — "the right tool for the right job" - certainly holds true here. If you've ever permanently damaged a delicate screw head or watched helplessly as your undersized screwdriver carved a lightning bolt scratch into your gun's receiver, you'll understand the importance of having a set of true gunsmithing screwdrivers, punches and wrenches.

An adjustable torque screwdriver has often proven invaluable for locking internal and external action screws in place, joining actions to stocks, and buttoning down scope mounts and rings. Though you can find every smithing tool imaginable at brownells.com, I'm partial to Midway USA's excellent line of Wheeler Engineering

For servicing shotguns, which are the primary focus of this article, I prefer stout single piece cleaning rods. They flex less than the jointed varieties and won't scratch the bore as you run them back and forth under

Here's a nifty trick: to remove really stubborn fouling, such as plastic wad buildup in the chamber's forcing cone and choke tubes, attach the forward section of a jointed cleaning rod to a hand-held power drill and spin your troubles away. While conventional bronze bristle brushes continue to do a fine job scrubbing loose fouling from the barrel, I've found shotgun patch jags to be far superior

Sporting goods stores offer an astounding variety of bore and action cleaning chemicals and, truthfully, all of them serve well for casual and detailed cleaning chores. I happen to prefer Gun Slick products, but if you are sensitive to harsh or toxic chemicals, you might want to give MPro-7 clean-

Visitors to Rockies Parks **Spend More Than \$1B**

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • Recreation in the Rocky Mountains' national parks has provided a boon to their surrounding communities as the economy struggles to recover from recession, with visitors spending \$1 billion in the region's four biggest parks in 2010, a new study found.

More than 11 million people who visited Yellowstone, Grand Teton, Rocky Mountain and Glacier national parks also supported 15,412 jobs, according to the study released Tuesday by the National Park Service.

The biggest beneficiaries were gateway towns in Wyoming, Montana and Idaho within 60 miles of Yellowstone and Grand Teton national parks. Those parks drew 6.3 million visitors who spent \$758 million in 2010.

"We're not always in a position to really point to some solid figures of that economic impact;" Yellowstone spokesman Al Nash told the Bozeman Daily Chronicle. "(But) when you look at these kinds of figures and realize that every visitor means over \$90 to the area economy, it reinforces the significant role that visitors to the park play."

The study was conduct-

ed by a Michigan State University researcher for the park service and analyzed 2010 economic data from 394 parks across the country. It found that nationwide, 281 million visitors spent \$12 billion in socalled "local gateway regions" within about 60 miles of the parks.

A little more than half of that spending went toward lodging and meals and 19 percent toward gas and local transportation. The rest went to retail spending, amusements and groceries.

Those numbers were not broken down by park, but Chuck Curtis, who owns four businesses near Yellowstone's northern entrance at Gardiner, Mont., said they sound about right for Yellowstone.

He estimates that park visitors make up about 70 percent of his business.

"Everybody's very busy in the summertime," Curtis said. "That's when you make your living."

The study found that visitors to all national park units - which includes the parks and historic and national landmarks - spent a total of \$610.6 million in Wyoming; \$292.7 million in Colorado; and \$291.4 million in Montana.

Back inside the building, Heck taught me how to make twine-like cordage using the natural fibers of dogbane plants.

F&G Commission Increases **Steelhead Limits** in Upper Salmon

SALMON • The Idaho Fish and Game Commission has increased the bag limits for steelhead in part of the upper Salmon River, effective immediately.

The daily limit is six steelhead, 18 in possession and 40 for the spring 2012 steelhead season. The increase affects river sections 15 through 19 on the upper Salmon River from Long Tom Creek about three-quarters of mile upstream of the Middle Fork Salmon River to a posted boundary about 100 yards downstream of the Sawtooth Hatchery.

All other seasons and rules remain unchanged.

Steelhead anglers must have a valid 2012 Idaho fishing license and steelhead permit. Steelhead anglers may use only barbless hooks, and may keep only steelhead marked with a clipped adipose fin. All other steelhead must be released unharmed.

District Conservation Officer Mike Stoddard will be retiring this month after 29 years as the conservation officer field supervisor in Twin Falls.

Mike Stoddard began his career earlier than most department employees. During his teenage years in Twin Falls, Mike was a member of the Fish and Game-sponsored Boy Scout Explorer Post. Under the tutelage of wildlife research biologist and Explorer Post leader Robert Autenrieth, Mike worked on several Fish

and Game research projects, mostly centered on sage grouse.

As a conservation officer, Mike has been a POST-certified law enforcement firearms instructor and worked for a number of years as a field training officer, helping to train new conservation officers. One of Mike's most notable contributions is his excellent public service. Whenever someone needed help, whether from the Twin Falls County Fair to youth fishing clinics, Mike volunteered. Mike worked closely with Sawtooth National Forest and Shoshone District BLM staff. His assistance varied from law enforcement to help with training and resource monitoring. In one instance, Mike's involvement resulted in him breaking a leg and getting a helicopter ride out of the South

Mike's personal mission involved active support for the National Wildlife Turkey Federation. In 2006 he was selected as the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's Conservation Officer of the Year and represented Idaho at the NWTF National convention in

Memphis. As the current president of the Idaho State Chapter, Mike has assisted the department and turkey hunters in Idaho with numerous turkey habitat and trapping and relocation projects. He also has assisted the local chapter, the South Hills Strutters, with several youth-mentored hunting events and youth fishing clinics.

Mike has been known to be a relentless investigator striving for the truth. He also has a soft spot for young hunters and anglers.

Sportsmen owe Mike a debt of gratitude for his efforts to protect Idaho's most valuable resources. Conservation officers like Mike help remind us of how important it is to maintain a conservation ethic.

Return of Salmon to San Joaquin River Comes at Cost

FRESNO, Calif. • Few people, if any, know the San Joaquin River as well as Louis Moosios.

The 36-year-old fishing guide, whose family owns 400 acres on the Madera County side, has been fishing, boating and swimming in the river since he was a boy.

Piloting his 14-foot aluminum skiff up river, Moosios keeps the 40-horsepower outboard's throttle steady through a series of bends and side channels, and even across a small weir.

"I've snorkeled the entire river from (Freeways) 41 to 99 - that's how you get to know every little turn, every little bush, every big rock and fish hiding spot there is," Moosios

Moosios picks me up below Riverside Golf Course, and it's a 10-minute run to one of his favorite spots: a reclaimed gravel quarry connected to the river. We're here to fish and talk about the river restoration, especially aspects of the project that have received scant attention even though they'll affect nearly everyone who uses the river for recreation.

By now, everyone should be aware Chinook salmon are slated to be reintroduced to the San Joaquin, perhaps as soon as this year. And like in other California rivers where salmon have been re-established after a long absence, those fish will either be off limits to anglers or strictly

catch and release. But what seems to be lost in all of this, even though it's

spelled out in the Draft Environmental Impact Report, is that the presence of salmon will also mean the end of all trout fishing and, potentially, bass fishing.

No more trout fishing in the San Joaquin? It says so right in Section 3.3 of Chapter 21, which quotes California Fish and Game Commission policy: "Domesticated or nonnative fish species will not be planted, or fisheries based on them will not be developed or maintained, in drainages of salmon waters, where ... they may adversely affect native salmon populations by competing with, preying upon or hybridizing with them."

Think about what that means for a moment.

18,000 anglers use Lost Lake Park every year. What are all those people supposed to do now? Simple, it concludes: They'll just have to go to the Kings River instead.

Even though the report lists the impact on trout fishing as "potentially significant," I'll bet this is the first you've heard of it.

By the time the San Joaquin flows into Fresno, where Moosios and I are spending the afternoon, it becomes a warm-water fishery inhabited by bass, crappie, bluegill and catfish. And, yes, the fishing for those species will be

affected as well. Most of the best bass fishing takes place in reclaimed gravel quarries. But the report states these ponds, and there are many of them, must either be filled in or separated from the river so that juvenile salmon don't get swallowed by predators.

T.F. Temple **Posthumously Baptized Slain** Journalist'

LOS ANGELES • In yet another public relations embarrassment for the Mormon Church, a Utah researcher has discovered that slain Jewish journalist Daniel Pearl was posthumously baptized last year in a serious breach of church protocol.

According to records, Pearl was baptized "by proxy" last summer in the Twin Falls temple — much to the surprise of his parents, who learned of the event this week.

Twin Falls temple officials were looking into the matter Wednesday evening and could not confirm or deny Pearl's baptism.

Reached by phone, Pearl's mother, Ruth, said she and her husband were dismayed when informed of the ceremony by a reporter from the Boston Globe, which first reported the news. According to the paper, the researcher is Helen Radkey, an excommunicated Mormon who combs through church

"We realize that the Mormon ministers who baptized our son posthumously meant to offer him salvation in the most honorable way they know how," she said in statement. "To them we say: We appreciate your good intentions but rest assured that Danny's soul was redeemed through the life that he lived and the values that he upheld. He lived as a proud Jew, died as a proud Jew and is currently facing his creator as a Jew — blessed, accept ed and redeemed."

Pearl, who was raised in Los Angeles, was working as a Wall Street Journal reporter when he was kidnapped and killed by terrorists in Pakistan in

In a video that his captors forced him to record just before his execution, he professed his faith, saying: "My father's Jewish. My mother's Jewish. I'm Jewish."

His parents later released a book titled "I Am Jewish," which contains a collection of essays by Pearl.

Posthumous baptisms are common in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, generally referred to as the Mormon Church. The purpose of the sacrament is to ensure that ancestors can join church members in the

Individual Mormons submit to the church the names of persons they wish to have baptized. Then a baptism is performed "by proxy," meaning another person stands in for the dead.

Names are supposed to be submitted with the permission of family members, said Del Traveller, area spokesman for the church. If Pearl's name ended up at the Twin Falls temple, it could have been because the submission was made elsewhere, processed in Salt Lake City and then sent to Twin Falls to disperse the vol-

The practice has long stirred controversy, leading to a 1995 agreement between Jewish faith leaders and the Mormon Church that was supposed to prevent the baptisms of Holocaust

Church rules stipulate that only direct descendants of the dead can submit their names for the sacrament.

North Korea Says It Will Halt Nuclear Activities

WASHINGTON • North Korea raised hopes Wednesday for a major easing in nuclear tensions under its youthful new leader, agreeing to suspend uranium enrichment at a key facility and refrain from missile and nuclear tests in exchange for a mountain of critically needed U.S. food aid.

It was only a preliminary step but a necessary one to restart broader six-na-

tion negotiations that would lay down terms for what the North could get in return for abandoning its nuclear weapons program. Pyongyang pulled out of those talks in 2009 and seemingly has viewed the nuclear program as key to the survival of its dynastic, communist regime, now entering its third generation.

But the announcement, just over two months after the death of longtime ruler Kim Jong II, also opened a door for the secretive government under his untested youngest son, Kim Jong Un, to improve ties with the United States and win critically needed aid and international acceptance.

It also opened the way for international nuclear inspections after years when the North's program went unmonitored.

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said the agreement, which was announced at separate but simultaneous statements by the long-time adversaries, was a modest step but also "a reminder that the world is transforming around us."

"We, of course, will be watching closely and judging North Korea's new leaders by their actions," Clinton told a congressional hearing.

Twisters Devastate 2 Small Towns, Kill 12 in Midwest

Scientists say the tornado that blasted Harrisburg, Ill., killing six, was 200 yards wide with winds up to 170 mph.

HARRISBURG, Ill. • A pre-dawn twister flattened entire blocks of homes in a small Illinois town Wednesday as violent storms ravaged the Midwest and South, killing at least 12 people in three

Winds also ripped through the country music mecca of Branson, Mo., damaging some of the city's famous theaters just days before the start of the busy tourist season.

The tornado that blasted Harrisburg in southern Illinois, killing six, was an EF4, the second-highest rating given to twisters based on damage. Scientists said it was 200 yards wide with winds up to 170 mph.

By midday, townspeople in the community of 9,000 were sorting through piles of debris and remembering their dead while the winds still howled around them.

Not long after the storm, Darrell Osman raced to his mother's home, arriving just in time to speak to her before she was taken to a hospital with a head injury, a severe cut to her neck and a broken arm and leg.

"She was conscious. I wouldn't say she was coherent. There were more mumbles than anything," he said. "She knew we were there?"

Mary Osman died a short time later. The twister that raked Branson seemed to hopscotch up the city's main roadway, moving from side to side.

As sirens blared, Derrick Washington stepped out of his motel room just long enough to see a greenish-purple sky. Then he heard the twister roar.

"Every time the tornado hit a building, you could see it exploding," he said.

At least 37 people were reported hurt, but most suffered only cuts and bruises. After the start of Branson's peak season in mid-March, up to 60,000 visitors would have been in hotels on any given day.

Just six guests were staying at J.R.'s Motor Inn, and all of them escaped injury by taking refuge in bathtubs. Engineers deemed the building a total loss after the second floor, the roof and all windows were destroyed.

Manager Lori McGauley choked back tears thinking about what might have

"We had 25 people booked for next week," McGauley said. "If this happened a week later, we would have lost some people?"

At the 530-room downtown Hilton, intense winds sucked furniture away. Hotel workers were able to get all guests to safety.

Looking at the city's main strip, it was difficult to believe there weren't more serious injuries. A small mall was nearly completely demolished. The Legends Theater, the Andy Williams Moon River Theater and the Branson Variety Theater all sustained significant damage.

The Veterans Memorial Museum was in shambles, and a small military jet that sat in front of the museum was blown

Ohio Shooting Suspect

To a person, they expressed disbelief at how the quiet but friendly boy could now be a suspect in a shooting that left three people dead and appears to have involved a gun that disappeared from his grandfather's barn.

"T.J. was a very fine person," Carl Henderson, a longtime neighbor of the suspect's grandparents, Thomas and Michelle Lane, said Wednesday. "Nice-looking man, very friendly, spoke to you, carried a conversation with you?

The gun, a .22 caliber revolver, was noticed as missing after Monday's shootings and fits the description of the pistol that reportedly was used to kill three students and wound two

others at Chardon High School, said Henderson, a retired police officer and former Geauga County sheriff. He said he has spoken to the grandfather, Thomas Lane, about the gun.

The suspect's grandfather believes the gun is the same, "because the gun was there the day before, in the barn," said Henderson, 74, who says he's been friends with the boy's

> family for nearly 50 years. A law enforcement official familiar with the investigation said the gun used in the shooting, a Ruger .22-caliber

Mark III target pistol, was bought legally in August 2010 from a gun shop in Mentor, Ohio.

The official, who spoke to AP on the condition of anonymity because of the ongoing investigation, said Lane told authorities he stole the gun from his uncle. It wasn't clear Wednesday whether the gun might have been the same one missing from the grandfather's barn. Henderson said he isn't aware of an uncle's involvement with

the gun. Lane, 17, admitted taking a pistol and a knife to the 1,100-student Chardon High and firing 10 shots at a group of students sitting at a cafeteria table, prosecutor David Joyce said.

His publicist, Helen Kensick, confirmed that Jones died of a heart attack near





On the way to today's club slam, North's jump to three no-trump showed about a strong no-trump. When South made a slam-try with his four-club call, North believed his excellent controls more than made up for his

singleton trump. West led the diamond king. Declarer won in dummy and did not relax despite the likelihood that he had at least 12 top winners. Instead he made the expert — and necessary — play of immediately ruffing a diamond, on which East stead he made the expert discarded a spade. Declarer's precaution was aimed at scoring his small trumps should clubs not behave. Next, he played three rounds of clubs, and with a certain trump loser, it looked as if the contract now depended on the heart finesse.

But South had a better plan.

He entered dummy twice in spades, each time to ruff a diamond in hand, as East discarded two hearts, and next cashed the spade queen. There were two possible plays then. South could have tried to throw East in with the winning trump to endplay him in hearts, but he knew East still had a spade left, so that player would be able to cash a spade winner. South found a more elegant

solution. He entered dummy with the heart ace and, when the king fell, claimed his contract. But had the king not fallen, declarer would have led the diamond nine from dummy. If East ruffs in, South can discard his last heart, while if East pitches his spade, South makes his trump nine en passant.

In 1809, the Illinois Territory came into existence.

In 1867, Nebraska became the 37th state.

In 1872, President Ulysses S. Grant signed an act creating Yellowstone National Park.

In 1912, Isabella Goodwin of New York City was appointed the first female police detective.

In 1940, "Native Son" by Richard Wright was first published by Harper & Brothers. In 1954, Puerto Rican na-

tionalists opened fire from the gallery of the U.S. House of Representatives, wounding five congressmen. In 1961, President John F.

Kennedy signed an executive order establishing the Peace Corps.

In 1962, an American Airlines Boeing 707 on a scheduled flight to Los Angeles crashed after taking off from New York's Idlewild Airport, killing all 95 people on board. The first Kmart store opened in Garden City, Mich. In 1971, a bomb went off

inside a men's room at the U.S. Capitol; the radical group Weather Underground claimed responsibility for the pre-dawn blast.

In 1981, Irish Republican Army member Bobby Sands began a hunger strike at the Maze Prison in Northern Ireland; he died 65 days lat-

Ten years ago: Space shuttle Columbia blasted into orbit on a mission to renovate the Hubble Space Telescope. NASA said its Mars Odyssey spacecraft had found evidence that vast regions of Mars may abound in water. Under pressure from prosecutors, the Archdiocese of Boston agreed to turn over the names of people allegedly molested by priests. Grand American series driver Jeff Clinton was killed during practice in a crash at Home-

stead-Miami Speedway. Five years ago: Tornadoes killed 20 people in the Midwest and Southeast, including eight students at Enterprise High School in Alabama. Maj. Gen. George W. Weightman, who had been in charge of Walter Reed Army Medical Center, was relieved of command after disclosures about dilapidated buildings and inadequate treatment of wounded soldiers. An independent commission concluded the National Guard and Reserves weren't getting enough money or equipment.

One year ago: Yemen's embattled president, Ali Abdullah Saleh, accused the U.S., his closest ally, of instigating the mounting protests against him, but the gambit failed to slow the momentum of his ouster (he later apologized to Washington). The GOP-controlled House handily passed legislation to cut the federal budget by \$4 billion and avert a partial shutdown of the government for two weeks. (The Senate passed the stopgap CUTTING SADDLE, show saddle, funding bill the next day.)

He declared himself innocent, despite scientific evidence to the contrary. Said the truth was on his side, when there was no evidence of that at all.

Then he threw a poor urine collector under the bus because, well, he was just a poor urine collector and he was the National League MVP and the guy with the megamillion con-

Well, guess what? The urine collector isn't going to go easy.

Dino Laurenzi Jr. has never been paid a penny to hit a baseball. Dozens of fans don't line up to get his autograph every time he comes out of a big league locker room toting yet another cardboard specimen box with tamper resistant seals. It's something he's done hundreds of times be-

But he's got a reputation to protect, too. A family that, like Braun's, is proud of what he does. A career as a former teacher and athletic trainer and, currently, the director of rehabilitation services at a health care facility.

Valley's Back and Aiming for Better

HAZELTON • Day by day, game by game, this group of Valley Vikings has

gotten better and better. Valley's six seniors went from a 2-18 record as sophomores, to winning the Class 2A District IV tournament championship last year, to a 19-2 record this

And now for their final act, the Vikings hope to accomplish what no Valley team has been able to do for more than a

decade: Win a state tournament game. Last year, Valley earned its first state berth in eight years, and the inexperience showed. The Vikes went two-and-out, with double-digit losses to Melba (the eventual state champion) and McCall-Donnelly. Valley hasn't won a state tournament game since taking state in 2001.

As Valley enters today's first-round game versus Cole Valley Christian (20-2), it will know what to expect.

"It's going to be nice not to have the deer-in-the-headlights look," said Valley coach Steve Hunter. "We won't play as tentative as we did last year. We've been there and we have that mental image of what's going to go on."

All but two players return from last year's squad, and the team has improved significantly in its shooting, confidence and court savvy.

"Their basketball IQ (is better);" Hunter said. "They understand when they see mismatches on the floor and they make adjustments without us having to tell them to do it."

Although the six seniors are its core, junior Justin Johnson leads Valley in scoring and rebounding, averaging 18 points and 7.9 boards per game.

Several players are capable of stepping up, like senior Austin Shawver, who scored 20 points in Valley's district championship win against Declo. Shawver averages 12.4 points and 7.4 rebounds per game.

The Vikings' biggest obstacle is a small one - as in, they are small. Each Valley starter gives up four inches across the line

ball, I know he's going to make a shot," Andru said. "We always have discussions on the court and tell each other stuff."

Said Jakob: "It's pretty great playing with my brother. We have a good connection when we're on the court. Basketball is something we've always done together."

Together, these Howard brothers clean up the glass. Jakob averages a doubledouble of 13 points and 11 rebounds. Andru chips in 10 and nine.

Both said defense is their favorite part of the game.

"I actually like rebounding. That's like the best thing for me (getting a rebound);" said Jakob. "I've always been a defense-first guy. Getting a blocked shot or a rebound feels awesome. You box the guy out, get the rebound and protect the ball and it helps your team."

With the Howard twins owning the boards, Dietrich has been able to push the tempo offensively, letting sophomores Vance Perron and Steven Kent score from the wing. The Blue Devils punched their ticket to state by beating Tri-Valley in double overtime last weekend, marking a return to the state tournament after a one-year absence.

Andru and Jakob got a taste of state their sophomore years, both getting called up from the junior varsity team after the district tournament.

"It was a really good experience. My brother and I both got called up and we got to play some minutes," said Andru, whose team plays Sho-Ban at 6:15 tonight in Caldwell. "The gyms all felt pretty big. I haven't really been in big gyms like that before."

The Blue Devils missed out on the tournament last season, losing to Murtaugh in the district tournament, but Andru said the team won't be intimidated by the state experience this time around.

"We're all getting pumped for state and just getting ready. Practice has been good this week and I think we're ready to go," he said. "This senior year has been pretty great for us. We have a really good team and I'm excited to see how the season is going to finish."

But each of the sophomores has played a critical role in his team still playing basketball this deep into the season.

"But over time I started getting used to everything and really worked on my role, which is to play good defense and hit the open shot when I have it."

It's not unusual to see a handful of teams play a sophomore up to the varsity level. After all, if you're good enough, you're old enough.

But this year has seen more sophomores start to steal the show on an accelerated timetable, as they find themselves sufficiently equipped to beat out older players for key roles.

"During the summer I play with a lot of the kids, and we just have a pretty strong sophomore class," said Connor Meyerhoeffer. "There's quite a bit of talent in the sophomore class, and maybe the older classes aren't quite as deep. But really, the sophomore class is just really talented."

All are skilled, but some were the stars on their respective teams. As it happens, the ones that are still playing have also had consistent senior leadership to rely on while they kept focus on playing sound basket-

"I think playing alongside these seniors and leaning on them let us be loose and not have to worry," said Alec Meyerhoeffer. "We were able to just play, and hopefully next year and the year after we'll be the ones doing what they're doing now."





Dempsey Scores as U.S. Beats Italy for First Time

GENOA, Italy • The United States gained a rare victory over a soccer power, beating Italy 1-0 Wednesday night on Clint Dempsey's goal in the 55th minute for its first win over the Azzurri in 11 games over 78 years.

Dempsey, a Texan who has become an increasingly important element of the American team, took a short pass from Jozy Altidore following Michael Bradley's cross and put a right-footed shot from just inside the penalty area just past an outstretched hand of goalkeeper Gianluigi Buffon.

"I'd like to think that we're closing the gap and hopefully one day we can do something special," Dempsey said.

After returning to the World Cup for the first time in 40 years in 1990 and advancing to the quarterfinals in 2002, the Americans have struggled to make additional progress. They were knocked out in the first round of the 2006 World Cup and the

second round of the 2010 tournament, eliminated both times with defeats to Ghana. They wasted a two-goal lead against Mexico last June and lost 4-2 in he final of the CONCACAF Gold Cup, their regional championship.

That prompted to U.S. Soccer Federation to fire coach Bob Bradley and replace him with Jurgen Klinsmann, the former German national team star player and coach.

"It's historic for us beating a team of Italy's level," Klinsmann said. "But what we wanted to do above everything was to learn, to see how we could do against a team like Italy. I think the boys did very, very well. They played great for 90 minutes."

Among the seven nations considered the world powers Argentina, Brazil, England, France, Germany, Italy and Spain - it was just the ninth win for the United States to go along with 48 losses and six ties. The Americans had been 0-7-3 against Italy and had been

outscored 32-4. "It's a work in progress, trying to get there," Dempsey said. "It was a little bit of workout tonight, but we got the result."

Dempsey scored his 25th goal in 83 international appearances. A native of Nacogdoches who turns 29 on March 9, Dempsey has had the most accomplished season by a U.S. attacking player in European soccer. With 16 goals this season for Fulham, he's become the American career scoring leader in England's Premier League with 43 goals.

"Initially, I was going to stay where I was and have him lay it back to me," Dempsey said. "I saw the guy was covering. So I tried to move to my right to try get open so he could play me the ball. He did a great job of holding it up, playing me, and I just tried to hit it low and hard, far post, and it went in.

"This situation has caused great emotional distress for me and my family," Laurenzi said. "I have worked hard my entire life, have performed my job duties with integrity and professionalism, and have done so with respect to this matter and all other collections in which I have participat-

The rest of the statement detailed how the sample was collected, and what steps were taken to make it secure. Laurenzi said he took samples from three players late on a Saturday afternoon at Miller Park after Milwaukee opened the playoffs last season with a 4-1 win over Arizona, and took them home to his basement rather than leave them unattended at a FedEx drop off location until the following Monday. The samples arrived at a

Montreal lab with all the seals intact, and no evidence that anything was amiss. There was something amiss with Braun's sample, though it reportedly showed a ratio of testosterone to epitestosterone in excess of 20-1, when a ratio in excess

of 4-1 triggers a positive
