## Legislature Won't Consider Health Care Exchange

 oill to meet the federal requirement won't be introduced before the Legislature adjourns this year, according to GOP leadership.BY MELISSA DAVLIN
BOISE - At the beginning of Idaho's
2012 legislative session, both Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill and House Speaker Lawerence Denney thought that establishing a state health care exchange would be a ho topic - one that might keep Idaho's awmakers in Boise longer than nor mal.
But with only a couple of weeks ft in the session, both Denney and Hill said Tuesday that the issue is dead in the water.
Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, has been working on a bill that would es tablish a health insurance exchange
in Idaho. The federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act require states to set up their own clearinghouse for health insurance information by January 2013; if they fail to do so, one will be imposed on them. The exchange would allow individuals and small busine
pare insurance policies.
Though Wood has had a bill ready for weeks, it probably won't be introduced, Denney said Tuesday. Wood worked with Sen. Dean Cameron, R -Rupert, and other lawmakers to craft legislation that would appease the federal government while satisfying Idaho legislators the federal health care reform. The issue, Denney said, isn' Wood's legislation. Rather, legislators feel uncomfortable passing a law

Congressman Ron Paul took that vote, edging out Romney 40-38.

lice for investigation, lice for investigation, tence Thompson to serve two days in jail and objected to the withheld judgment. "In this particular
case, a jail sentence is case, a jail sentence is
warranted," Smith said warranted, Smith said. to live by a code of ethics which requires that they keep their private lives unsullied and be constantly mindful of the rights of others. Smith ior "betrayed the badge" and that there is "no angry father defense.
"The defendant needs to know he violated the public's trust," she said. Smith claimed that Thompson took "per-
sonal revenge under the sonal revenge under the color of the law," because witnesses said
Thompson told the boyfriend that he was going to arrest him. Thompson declined to make a statement ing. His attorney, Bob ing. His attorney, Bob served 21 years in the U.S. Marine Corps and has no previous criminal charges. He is not likely to commit further sponsibility for his acspons, he said.

## AChance to Clear Her Record, but Not Her Mind

Malta woman receives withheld judgment for crash that claimed her $4^{-}$ year-old daughter's life.

BURLEY•A Malta woman found guilty of causing a crash that killed her 4-year-old daughter will have a chance to clear her record.
But that doesn't mean Raquel Sanchez-Gutierrez
will ever be able to forgive herself for the August 2011 single-vehicle crash that killed Ruby Sanchez on Idaho Highway 81 near Malta.
"There isn't anything this court can do that compares to the punishment that
Miss Gutierrez is already going through," said Cassia County 5th District Magistrate Judge Rick Bollar while sentencing SanchezGutierrez on Tuesday. A jury

vehicular manslaughter, but acquitted her of a misdemeanor inattentive driving charge stemming from the same
crash.
She received
months of unsupervised probation and a withheld
judgment, meaning if she judgment, meaning if she

Bollar can choose to dismiss the case and clear her record.
Sanchez-Gutierrez's attorney, Kent Jensen, said she was a victim of severe domestic abuse, con-
tributing to a series of events leading up to the crash.
Sanchez-Gutierrez had worked the night before Ruby was killed, Jensen said, and that day had then Baken the child to court in Sanchez-Gutierrez had removed the girl's car seat a few days earlier to get groceries and had forgotten to put it back in her vehicle, ensen said.

Let's See What Burley's Library Could Be

A properly funded, properly planned library is a huge boon for a city. The least that the council, and Burley voters, can do is hear the city librarians out.

This could be the start of something great Tonight, the Burley City Council will be asked to let voters decide in May whether to fund construction of a new city library.
An estimated $\$ 3.2$ million bond issue would mean about $\$ 25$ a year extra in property taxes, based on a home valued at $\$ 120,000$. That's just a little more than $\$ 2$ a month; one nice meal out, or a little less than a tank of gas.
For that investment, Burley residents would get a larger building with features including a dividable community room that would stay open after hours, separate children and adult areas, ample computer space and meeting rooms. The organizers behind the Burley effort appear to have recognized the effects of the recession. Building plans drafted in 2008 have been cut in half, from 28,000 square feet to 15,450 square feet - still much more than the current library's 5,000 square feet.
Librarians have also actively courted donations. The Burley Lions Club has reaffirmed its previous offer pledging $\$ 100,000$ toward the project, while an anonymous donor has offered to match up to $\$ 350,000$ to be raised by the Burley Public Library Foundation. Another \$50,000 has been put toward the new building through other various donations.
But a new building won't come from donations alone. That's why it's so key that the council allow city residents to decide if this is an investment worth making.
A library is more than just a collection of books. For the young, it's a gateway to new worlds full of stories that will stick in their heads, and learning that will last them years. For those seeking employment, it's a place to plan and prepare, to chart a course toward a new career. A library improves literacy and answers questions. And unlike the Internet, its resources come with a local, knowledgeable staff to help navigate hem - though computers and Web access now play a bigger role as well.
A properly funded, properly planned library is a huge boon for a city. Burley's librarians seem to be making an honest, reasonable offer. The least that the council, and Burley voters, can do is hear them out.

# Master the Meatloaf:WithTips <br> by Andrea weigi

Many Americans make meals out of leftovers. knows to refrigerate perishables, not everyone is taking all the proper steps to ensure the next-day food is safe, according to the Institute of Food Technologists, a non-
profit society of food science professionals from academia, government and industry.
The group definitely
supports leftovers and supports leftovers, and even says some foods actually taste better the next day, such as those
with spices, because the flavors have time to meld. But be mindful that bacteria can grow in food. Here are some tips for managing the food properly:
Refrigeration:
course food needs to refrigerated. But people may not realize that you don't need to cool cooked foods before putting them in modern refrigerators. They are built to cool the touch without breaking them, though you can save energy by chilling the food promptly after cooking. You can put it in front of a fan, in an ice bath or divide it into smaller por-
tions in shallow dishes. Just make sure you get the food in there within two hours of cooking, or one hour on hot days.
Do make sure your refrigerator is set at 40 degrees or lower, but use an rather than relying on the refrigerator displays. Storing: The group

can classic that you would can classic that you would think there would be a set tled, go-to recipe. Not so. Meatloaf ranked in the
top five online recipe searches last year: it was second on Google and fourth on Yahoo. The relentless pursuit of a better meatloaf doesn't surprise cookbook author and North Carolina native James V las. stand meatloaf. They reall think it's throwing a lot of garbage together," says Villas, who offers seven recipes for meatloaf in his new cookbook, "From the
Ground Up." "You have to take it seriously. There's take it seriously. There's a
whole philosophy behind meatloaf."
There are many divides in the meatloaf debate: Freeform or loaf pan? Beef, pork, veal or poultry? In
what combination? Coarse ground or finely ground? ground or finely ground? or no gravy? Bacon or no
bacon? (Well, nobody really debates that last one.) The most amazing thing about meatloaf may be that it's so forgiving. No matter
what choices you make on the meatloaf decision tree, you can end up with an excellent result. My go-to recipe came from Cooking Light magazine: It's a sundried tomato and turkey meatloaf served with a red currant and red wine sauce
that bakes in a loaf pan. It's not particularly crusty, but the taste is excellent, and the recipe makes one for now and another for later. Over the past few years,

out of the diner, where it out of the diner, where it has long been a staple. rant versions: baconwrapped thin squares of meatloaf at Lucky 32 in Cary and the smoky slab of meatloaf that is finished on Seaboard in Raleigh While their methods differ, our experts agreed on a few key points. First, use panko bread crumbs. These Japanese bread crumbs are fluffier and coarser than the sandy
version typically used which can produce a mushy meatloaf. "Don't substitute Progresso for panko," says
chef Jay Pierce of Cary's chef Jay Pierce of Cary's Lucky 32. "It's not as densely packed."
Second, make your meat-
loaf a day ahead. This trick loaf a day ahead. This trick
is used in restaurant is used in rechens because the dinner rush is easier if some dishes are made ahead of time. But there is logic to the technique, as 18 Seaboard chef and owner Jason Smith ex-
plains: "It tastes better the plaxt day." And it's easier to slice,
which leads to the third tip: For a nice crust, grill or saute slices of meatloaf. With these techniques, your meatloaf may become as popular as it is at 18
Seaboard, where it makes up 15 percent of sales during lunch, the only time it's on the menu. Smith says, "People compliment us all the time, from little old ladies who make it at home

An editor who sits nearby likes to show me his lunch every day. He presents it for my approval like I'm the Mother Confessor of cooking The great thing about this is his enthusiasm. He takes packinghis ownlunch every day. He likes to discuss the smallest details with the seriousness of a scientist. His regular debate: Pasta. How do you pick the right shape? How do you decide
what kind of sauce? Should yourinse it after you cookit? How can one small thing have somany mysteries? Actually, Ilook forward to his daily quizzes. Like my lunch friend, I like thinking about the mysteries of small
things. So, here are the 10 things. So, here are the 10
thingsIknow about pasta: 1.Pasta comesinall shapes and sizes because no single shape is perfect for everything. Thin, smooth noodles need light, smooth sauces. Heavier noodlesholdheavier sauces. Flat ribbons are for Tubes, shells and curls are for chunky sauces with bits of meat and vegetables. 2. Always start with a big, deep pot and lots of water. We all need room to reach our full potential. Make sure the water is really boiling. The most efficient way to bring water to a boil is to cover it while it heats. But don't cover the pot while the pasta cooks or it will boil over.
4. Always salt the water just before you add the paswater will flavor the pasta better than adding it later. If you season it after you cook it, you'll use more salt because it won't get absorbed intothepasta as it swells.
5. Keepthings 5. Keepthings stirredup at
the beginning. We all get stuck without a little agitation. 6.Don'taddoil.If youdo it right - lots of water at a full boil and stir it at the beginning - yourpasta won't stick

As many Christians observe Lent, they may discover that going meatless on Fridays an act of penance - can get a little boring. Coming up with different takes onfish isn't always easy. And there are a
half-dozen more Fridays to go.
For something different, try fish tacos. They're easy and fun for kids, too. Fish tacos are simply floured, battered and panfried pieces of fi.
They're seasoned with a little kick of spicy cayenne pepper and chili powder. The
batter is thin and doesn't puff batter is thin and doesn't puff up when fried. (If that's what you prefer, mix the batter
with clubsodaorbeer.) with club soda or beer.) You can fry these in a skil-Pan-frying eliminates the need for heating up a mess of oil and havingthat deep-fried smell hanging around. Oncepan-fried, keep them warm in the oven where they

be made in advance and recrisped in the oven.
These are even great as a
leftover. Ifind it best to reheat leftover. I find it best to reheat
them in a toaster oven. The cabbage adds a nice crunch when you bite into

black pepper. And if you don't like cabbage, try some choppedromaine. The cilantro tartar is a different take on traditional tartar sauce that gets some heat
from minced jalapeno pepfrom minced jalapeno peppers. If you chop the jalapeno
with the ribs and seeds, be prepared - that's where most of the heat lies.
This recipe uses smallish flour tortillas, but you can use corn tortillas if you like.

For cauliflower, cut away the stem end and cut the florets from the
core, cutting as close to the core as possible.
To blanch, bring a large
pot of salted water to a boil pot of salted water to a boil and have ready a large bowl of ice water. Place broccoli or cauliflower in the boiling Drain and immediately plunge into the ice water to stop the cooking. (The icy bath also helps retain the broccoli's color.)
To steam, cut as directed
above and steam for 5 above and steam for 5 n
utes. Chill as above utes. Chill as above. vegetables in containers or freezer bags. Keep 10 to 12 months in the freezer. Boiling can make cauliflower watery because it already contains a lot of water. Sauteing works well, but perhaps the best choice is
roasting, which brings out cauliflower's sweet flavor. Choose cauliflower heads that are heavy and creamy white with no dark spots or signs of decay. The cab-bage-like leaves should be bright green with no ye lowing.
Cauliflower, well-wrapped, keeps a good week in the refrigerator.
To use, remove the leaves and trim the stem end from the core. Cut away the florets from the core, cutting
as close to the core as possible. You also can cut the core into small pieces.
To roast, preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Place florets on a baking sheet, drizzle with olive oil and
