## Legislature Won't Consider Health Care Exchange

Once a hot-button issue, a bill to meet the federal requirement won't be introduced before the Legislature adjourns this year, according to GOP leadership.

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**BOISE** • At the beginning of Idaho's 2012 legislative session, both Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill and House Speaker Lawrence Denney thought that establishing a state health care exchange would be a hot topic — one that might keep Idaho's lawmakers in Boise longer than normal.

But with only a couple of weeks left in the session, both Denney and Hill said Tuesday that the issue is dead in the water.

Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley, has been working on a bill that would establish a health insurance exchange in Idaho. The federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act requires states to set up their own clearinghouse for health insurance information by January 2013; if they fail to do so, one will be imposed on them.

The exchange would allow individuals and small businesses to compare insurance policies.

Though Wood has had a bill ready for weeks, it probably won't be introduced, Denney said Tuesday.

Wood worked with Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, and other lawmakers to craft legislation that would appease the federal government while satisfying Idaho legislators who don't want anything to do with the federal health care reform.

The issue, Denney said, isn't Wood's legislation. Rather, legislators feel uncomfortable passing a law

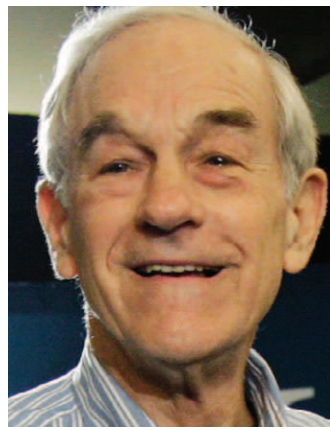

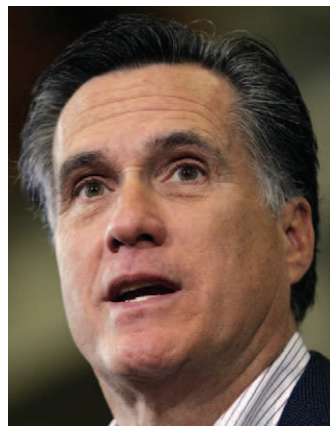
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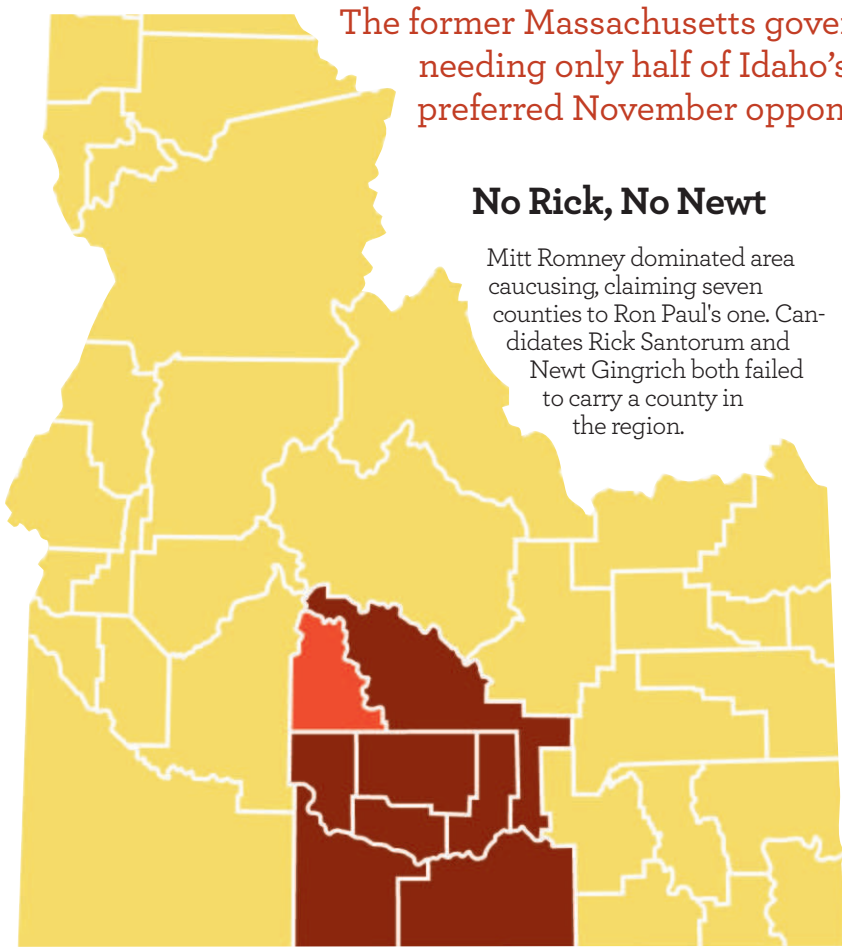

# IDAHO VOTES FOR ROMNEY

The former Massachusetts governor roared through the Gem State, needing only half of Idaho's 44 counties to be named the state's preferred November opponent for President Barack Obama.



### No Rick, No Newt

Mitt Romney dominated area caucusing, claiming seven counties to Ron Paul's one. Candidates Rick Santorum and Newt Gingrich both failed to carry a county in the region.

**TWIN FALLS** • GOP presidential front-runner Mitt Romney secured a seven-county regional knockout punch during the state Republican party's first Super Tuesday caucus.

The south-central Idaho victories helped Romney dominate the Idaho caucus, as the Associated Press called this state his with half of the state's 44 counties reporting. By that time, Romney had secured 77 percent of votes cast.

Locally, the former Massachusetts governor claimed nods from all but Camas County. Congressman Ron Paul took that vote, edging out Romney 40-38.

It's a decided defeat for the Texas conservative, who stumped heavily in Idaho leading up to the caucus.

With the state Republican party holding its first Super Tuesday caucuses to select its preferred nominee to challenge President Barack Obama, excitement was high Tuesday night.

Turnout was heavy across the valley, as Burley High School used multiple overflow rooms to handle the Cassia County crowd. Thousands of Republicans also flocked to Canyon Ridge High School.

With an estimated 2,500 people flooding the Twin Falls school's gymnasium, parking lots and hallways, the event got a late start, and some late arrivals were locked out.

But after a 45-minute delay, Romney took Twin Falls County in the first round. By that time, he'd already claimed victory in most of the Magic Valley.

Attached next to the Becks' smiling children is an image of a sage grouse. The words underneath both ask, "Who are you going to protect?"

It's a document that the U.S. Bureau of Land Management will read over and take into consideration as it begins to sift through the comments on the proposed Gateway West electrical transmission line project. The submitted comments will help influence the agency's final report on the project's effects and impacts.

The 1,100-mile, high-voltage transmission project would run across southern Wyoming and southern Idaho. Project leaders have mapped out several alternate routes along various sections of its path, but there has been growing concern over the use of private land and about protecting wildlife areas.

## Twin Falls Sees Thousands

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**TWIN FALLS** • Twin Falls County Republican voters came out in full force for their first-ever GOP caucus Tuesday night.

The event at Canyon Ridge High School started about 45 minutes late due to the large crowds. But it made up for the delay with efficiency — participants chose Mitt Romney in the first round with nearly 60 percent of the vote.

Gretchen Clelland, chairwoman of the Twin Falls County Republican Party, estimated more than 2,500 voters attended. One hour before the caucus' scheduled 7 p.m. start, lines of people stretched around the outside of the school and inside hallways.

Traffic was backed up on Washington Street North and North College Road as people searched for places to park.

Jean Hams managed to make it inside the school gym with time to spare and a front row seat.

For Hams, voting — including in caucuses — isn't a new thing. The 86-year-old Twin Falls resident participated in caucus votes while living in other states.

Hams said she votes because "I'm an American."

"I always vote," she said. "I believe every person makes a difference."

M.C. Kinslow of Twin Falls and her husband were among those locked out of the Twin Falls caucus when they arrived right on the edge of 7 p.m.

## Cassia GOP Packs into Three Rooms

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**BURLEY** • Phrases like "repeal Obamacare," "open up Keystone oil drilling" and "life begins at conception" lit up a packed house at the King Fine Arts Center in Burley Tuesday at Cassia County's first Republican caucus.

The crowd that filled the 1,300-seat King Fine Arts Center and the 300-person Burley High School Little Theater to capacity before spilling into the school's band room selected Mitt Romney as their preferred nominee for the GOP presidential nomination.

"I think it's great," said Alan Andersen of Springdale. "There are a lot of people here wanting to be a part of this process. It's a full house and it's great to see all these people who want to be involved. There are more people here than I expected."

Participants registered at their precinct booths before taking their places in one of the three rooms.

A counting committee was established in the arts center and a dozen GOP members were nominated to help count the ballots. Four representatives of the active Republican

# Ever to the Right

It's like a sideways limbo. Instead of how low can you go, how right can we get?

This year's election marks the first time voters will have to register as Republicans in order to vote in the GOP primary, a move that may alienate moderate conservatives who aren't affiliated with the state's majority party.

Idaho is undeniably conservative. But with that conservatism comes a solid independent streak. Many non-affiliated voters and registered independents will want to keep it that way, even if it means not having a say in the primaries.

Consider, too, that two of the House's prominent moderate Republicans, Reps. Leon Smith of Twin Falls and Tom Trail of Moscow, are retiring. A large handful of Democrats, both moderate and liberal, are also calling it quits.

So how will that affect the ideological makeup of

the Legislature next year?

It might not, said House Speaker Lawrence Denney, a Midvale Republican.

The Legislature represents a good cross-section of Idaho, Denney said, and he doesn't expect that to change much next year. There might be a slight shift to the right, he said, but with high turnover in the House and Senate, there's no way to tell.

Senate Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, agreed.

"People represent their constituents," Hill said. If voters elected a moderate before, they'll likely do the same.

Without a crystal ball, we'll have to wait until next year to see.

# Cassia Co. Deputy Sentenced on Misdemeanor

Jarrold Thompson's disturbing the peace charge will be cleared from his record if he completes the court's requirements.

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**BURLEY** • A Cassia County sheriff's deputy will likely avoid jail time and a permanent mark on his criminal record for a guilty plea to misdemeanor disturbing the peace.

Deputy Jarrod A. Thompson received a withheld judgment Tuesday after he agreed to plead guilty to the charge, which was amended from misdemeanor battery. If he pays court costs and meets the terms of a 12-month supervised probation, the charge will be wiped from his record.

Thompson, 44, was charged after a September 2011 incident in which he allegedly got into an altercation with his teenage daughter's boyfriend.

Idaho Deputy Attorney General Jessica Smith, who was assigned to prosecute the case after it was turned over to Idaho State Police for investigation, asked the court to sentence Thompson to serve two days in jail and objected to the withheld judgment.

"In this particular case, a jail sentence is warranted," Smith said. She said officers agree to live by a code of ethics which requires that they keep their private lives unsullied and be constantly mindful of the rights of others. Smith said Thompson's behavior "betrayed the badge" and that there is "no angry father defense."

"The defendant needs to know he violated the public's trust," she said. Smith claimed that Thompson took "personal revenge under the color of the law," because witnesses said Thompson told the boyfriend that he was going to arrest him.

Thompson declined to make a statement during Tuesday's hearing. His attorney, Bob Nielsen, said Thompson served 21 years in the U.S. Marine Corps and has no previous criminal charges. He is not likely to commit further crimes and has taken responsibility for his actions, he said.

When the case was moving toward trial, Nielsen said Thompson told him he didn't want to cause further embarrassment to the sheriff's office or prosecutor's office.

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd previously told the Times-News that the matter fell under personnel confidentiality laws and he could not discuss whether Thompson will face any departmental disciplinary action.

# BLAINE CO. TURNOUT PLEASES ORGANIZERS

**HAILEY** • Maurice Charlat confessed that he thought nine or 10 Republicans might show up for Blaine County's caucus Tuesday night.

The longtime lion of the Republican party in Blaine County was far less prepared to see 380 people show up to cast a vote in what has traditionally been regarded as the bluest county in the state.

He wasn't the only one wowed by the turnout.

"I'm so surprised to see so many," said Dale Ewerson, regional chairman of the Republican Party.

"If people don't think there's a Republican presence in Blaine County, they're wrong," said Connie Hoffman, vice chairwoman of the Blaine County Republican Women. "Just look at all these people."

Many in the crowd milled around nibbling cookies and lamenting how they weren't sold on any of the candidates. But they were united

in their belief that President Obama has to go — a sentiment expressed by the NOObama button Hailey resident Todd Helmeke wore.

Stasha Maricich and Desiree Midby — both seniors at Wood River High School — wore signs and buttons affirming their allegiance to Ron Paul.

"He's going to cut inflation and bring up the value of the dollar," said Midby. "He's going to lower gas prices — and I drive an expensive car," added Maricich.

David Gardner threw his support behind Mitt Romney. "I'm supporting him because he's a business man," he said, citing Romney's role in starting Staples. "He knows what'll help small business grow."

After the Boy Scouts posted the colors and led the crowd in pledging allegiance to the flag, it took just one vote for those in the gym to crown a king for the night.

Mitt Romney won on the first ballot with 230 votes, or

60.53 percent. Ron Paul was second with 79 votes. Newt Gingrich received 47 votes, Rick Santorum got 23 and Buddy Roemer won 1.

"You've got to keep what was started here tonight going," he pressed Ed Terrazas, chairman of the Republican Party in Blaine County. "Just look at this crowd!"

Expedition Inspiration will hold its 16th annual public forum featuring a panel of specialists from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Sun Valley Inn Lighthouse Room.

Enter "Expedition Inspiration" in the search area at the top of the page, then click on the "live" window when the Expedition Inspiration search page comes up.

The scientists are in Sun Valley for the annual Laura Evans Memorial Breast Cancer Symposium, which brings together researchers from all over the world to share and brainstorm about their work.

"I have no doubt there will be some powerful messages regarding the fight against cancer at this year's Open Forum," said Krista Detwiler, a

spokeswoman for Expedition Inspiration.

This year's attendees include researchers from London, The Netherlands, the National Cancer Institute and many distinguished U.S. hospitals and universities.

Dr. Kimberly Allison, who serves on Expedition Inspiration's board of directors, said one in eight American women will develop invasive breast cancer over the course of their lifetimes.

"The question should be not how to find a cure but, rather, cures, for breast cancer," added Allison, who recounts her own journey from physician to patient in her memoir, "Red Sunshine." "We're on the cusp of personalized medicine. Half of the cancers have mutations that are unique to a particular individual, so we're about to uncover a whole new realm."

Expedition Inspiration was founded by the late Ketchum resident Laura Evans. It has promoted a can-do attitude among breast cancer survivors, and raised funds for breast cancer research through mountain climbs and hikes organized near Sun Valley and around the world.

The school's cafeteria was filled with booths for political candidates and tables

where voters checked in.

Dave Hawkins, a volunteer at the voter registration table, said there was a steady stream of new registrations before the caucus. He didn't have exact figures.

Before the vote, a local supporter for each GOP hopeful was given the chance to speak for five minutes. No one spoke in support of Newt Gingrich or Buddy Roemer, who has pulled out of the GOP race to run as a third-party candidate.

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# A Chance to Clear Her Record, but Not Her Mind

**Malta woman receives withheld judgment for crash that claimed her 4-year-old daughter's life.**

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**BURLEY** • A Malta woman found guilty of causing a crash that killed her 4-year-old daughter will have a chance to clear her record.

But that doesn't mean Raquel Sanchez-Gutierrez will ever be able to forgive herself for the August 2011 single-vehicle crash that killed Ruby Sanchez on Idaho Highway 81 near Malta.

"There isn't anything this court can do that compares to the punishment that Miss Gutierrez is already going through," said Cassia County 5th District Magistrate Judge Rick Bollar while sentencing Sanchez-Gutierrez on Tuesday.

A jury convicted Sanchez-Gutierrez of misdemeanor vehicular manslaughter, but acquitted her of a misdemeanor inattentive driving charge stemming from the same crash.

She received four

months of unsupervised probation and a withheld judgment, meaning if she completes her probation, Bollar can choose to dismiss the case and clear her record.

Sanchez-Gutierrez's attorney, Kent Jensen, said she was a victim of severe domestic abuse, contributing to a series of events leading up to the crash.

Sanchez-Gutierrez had worked the night before Ruby was killed, Jensen said, and that day had then taken the child to court in Burley to see her father. Sanchez-Gutierrez had removed the girl's car seat a few days earlier to get groceries and had forgotten to put it back in her vehicle, Jensen said.

Jensen said Sanchez-Gutierrez is now the single parent for her other children. The proceeds from an automobile insurance policy will be set aside as a scholarship fund for them.

After conferring with Cassia County Prosecutor Al Barrus, Deputy Prosecutor Dallin Creswell recommended the withheld judgment in the case.

Bollar said Sanchez-Gutierrez is a hard-working individual and a "benefit to the community."

# Despite Options, Area Higher Ed Numbers Lag

**Despite Twin Falls presences of Idaho's three major universities, fewer south-central Idahoans have a bachelor's degree than their counterparts across the state.**

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**TWIN FALLS** • With only a couple of months left until graduation day, Gina Barton is wrapping up work on a bachelor's degree in business.

It's a process she's gone through without leaving Twin Falls. After two years at the College of Southern Idaho, she's continuing her education through Boise State University's Twin Falls program.

Barton, a single mom with a 4-year-old son, decided to pursue a bachelor's degree in order to have more opportunities.

"As a single mother, I need to make sure I have a complete foundation built for us," she said, also citing a tight job market.

For the first time, more than 30 percent of U.S. adults — ages 25 and older — have a bachelor's degree or higher, according to a U.S. Census Bureau report released earlier this month. Soon, Barton will count herself among those ranks.

The College of Southern Idaho doesn't offer bachelor's degree programs. But there are local options through BSU, Idaho State University and the Universi-

ty of Idaho.

Ken Campbell, CSI's director of information technology services, said about a third of CSI students continue their education at a four-year university within a few years after graduation.

Shari Stroud, program coordinator for BSU's Twin Falls programs, said the number of students has held steady over the past few years.

This semester, there are 130 students enrolled in bachelor's degree programs — 73 for accounting or general business, 32 for criminal justice and 25 for social work.

For University of Idaho programs, there were 49 students enrolled in Twin Falls at the end of the fall semester.

But many more students from south-central Idaho are enrolled at the University of Idaho's main campus. In total, about 543 students in the region were enrolled at the end of the fall 2010 semester.

In Idaho, about 24.3 percent of residents age 25 and older have a bachelor's degree or higher. That's based on U.S. Census statistics from 2006-2010.

But locally, the percentages in south-central Idaho

counties lag, except Blaine County. From 2006-2010, about 43 percent of the county's residents had at least a bachelor's degree.

Twin Falls County had nearly 17 percent, while Minidoka County came in the lowest at 9.4 percent.

Archie George, director of institutional research and assessment at the University of Idaho, said numbers may reflect the types of jobs available in the region.

Some jobs, he said, don't require advanced degrees.

# BLM Wild Horse Meeting Tonight in Kimberly

**KIMBERLY** • A federal agency is requesting public input on the use of motor vehicles and helicopters in wild horse management areas.

The Bureau of Land Management hopes to gain feedback today on how it should use motorized vehicles during three horse gathers planned this summer and fall in Idaho.

BLM officials have proposed to remove excess horses in the Challis Herd Management Area in October. In order to follow the BLM's management plan, it must keep the Challis herd below 185 horses.

Later in November, the BLM would like to treat and remove horses in the Black

Mountain and Hard Trigger Herds. Officials are looking to treat adult mares with a fertility control vaccine and also remove excess horses.

The BLM uses helicopters to take aerial counts of herds and to monitor population distribution. Semi-trucks, trailers and pickup trucks are used to transport the animals.

The hearing will take place tonight, starting at 5 p.m. at the Rock Creek Rural Fire Protection District, 242 U.S. Highway 30 in Kimberly.

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## Idaho Power Requests Average \$3.56 Monthly Hike

**BOISE (AP)** • Idaho Power Co. wants regulators to let it hike residential customers' rates by an average of \$3.56 monthly, to pay for a new natural gas power plant that's nearly completed.

Idaho's biggest utility filed the request with the Idaho Public Utilities Commission Tuesday.

It could have been bigger. But the Boise-based company has also filed additional regulatory paperwork for a revenue-sharing deal.

That will help offset the rate increase from the \$391 million Langley Gulch power plant in southwestern Idaho.

Idaho Power built the Langley Gulch plant to meet demand and accommodate the addition of hundreds of megawatts of wind power that's become part of its system.

When wind doesn't blow, Langley Gulch will take up the slack during peak demand periods.

The request will be subject to public hearings.

## Man Gets Probation for Sex with 16-year-old Girl

**OROFINO (AP)** • A 35-year-old Idaho man who pleaded guilty to having sex with a 16-year-old girl he has since married has been sentenced to eight years of probation.

The Lewiston Tribune reports 2nd District Court Judge John Stegner suspended a two- to five-year prison term for Jeremy A. Simmons of Orofino for sexual battery of a minor child. But Stegner imposed the probation and required Simmons to register as a sex offender.

Prosecutors allege Simmons was living with the 16-year-old girl and his ex-wife last April when the ex-wife's daughter heard Simmons and the teen having sex.

Simmons pleaded guilty in September and the teen asked the judge to rescind a no-contact order. Court records say Simmons said he intended to marry the teen.

Idaho law allows 16-year-olds to marry with parental consent.

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### Ask The Plant Lady

**Question:** Dear Plant Lady, Some of my indoor plants are getting too tall and wide for their areas. What time of year can I trim them and how far back can I go without killing them? Signed "Haircut Hailey"

**Answer:** Dear Haircut, Big plants like Rubber trees, Dracaenas, Scheffleras and Ficus can successfully be trimmed 1/3 of their newer growth to shape them this time of year. Don't be afraid...they love it and cuttings can sometimes reroot if treated right. Small plants like Pothos, Creeping Charlies and Ivys benefit from regular trimming to keep them lush and thick. Always trim just above a growth node.



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## Last Megaloads Leaving Port of Lewiston for Canada

**LEWISTON (AP)** • The final two oversized loads of oil field equipment at the Port of Lewiston were set to be shipped out 18 months after the first massive Korean-built equipment arrived by barge via the Columbia and Snake rivers.

Imperial Oil moved three loads on Sunday and planned to move two more late Tuesday, weather permitting, company spokesman Pius Rolheiser said.

"There will still be some additional loads coming out of the port, but they'll be legal loads on conventional trailers as opposed to these over-legal loads on hydraulic trailers," Rolheiser told the *Missoulian*.

Rolheiser estimated the company has 100 loads remaining at the Port of Pasco in Washington, which also will travel Interstate 90 and 15 through Montana.

Previous loads have traveled from Lewiston north to Coeur d'Alene on Highway 95 then through western Montana on Interstate 90 and Interstate 15, and into northern Alberta, Canada for an oil sands project.

The two final shipments are 24 feet wide and 15 feet high. One is 215 feet long and weighs 415,000 pounds. The second is 135 feet long and 255,000 pounds.

The first of 34 immense loads of equipment arrived at Lewiston by barge in the fall of 2010 but were stranded there by legal protests and an environmental review in Montana.

Imperial Oil/ExxonMobil ultimately opted to reduce the size of the origi-

nal loads and ship them via interstate rather than the proposed two-lane routes of U.S. Highway 12 over Lolo Pass and Highway 200 in Montana. The smaller shipments began last summer.

"We hope ExxonMobil now has a greater understanding about Idaho and Montana geography and history, and the tenacity of rural people protecting their way of life and the unique values of the places they call home," said Linwood Laughy, who lives along Highway 12 in the Kooskia, area.

"We also hope other corporations that might be considering the Highway 12/200 route will choose the interstates for their transportation needs," he said. "An even better plan would be to build their equipment not in Asia but in the United States and Canada."

Members of Wild Idaho Rising Tide have regularly protested the large loads as they move through Moscow, Idaho. Several demonstrators have been arrested, including two on Sunday night.

Moscow Police Chief David Duke said officers arrested Cass Davis, 47, and James Prall, 67, after they and two women were dragged off the road and the men ignored orders not to re-enter the highway.

Davis and Prall pleaded not guilty Monday to misdemeanor charges of resisting arrest and obstructing a peace officer.

Wild Idaho Rising Tide officials have said they plan to protest Tuesday's loads, as well.

## Panel Suggests Agency Changes after Child's Death

**BOISE (AP)** • A panel of independent experts investigating the circumstances surrounding the torture and killing of an 8-year-old Boise boy by his mother's boyfriend is recommending the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare emphasize child safety and improve communication.

The report by the 13-member Robert Manwill Blue Ribbon Panel released Monday also said the agency must improve reporting procedures. The agency responded to the report with actions officials said had already been taken or planned to take based on the panel's recommendations.

"We are constantly searching for the right balance between parental rights and elevated risks to children," Health and Welfare Director Dick Armstrong wrote to the panel after receiving the report. "I believe you have provided new definition to the evolution of the tools available to child welfare professionals."

Daniel Ehrlick was sentenced in September to life in prison after being convicted of first-degree murder in the 2009 killing that he tried to cover up by stuffing rocks in the boy's pockets and dumping his body in a canal.

The boy's mother, Melissa Jenkins, was sentenced to 25 years in prison for her role in the slaying. She pleaded guilty to aiding and abetting second-degree murder as part of an agreement with prosecutors.

The panel in its 10-page report with six-page addendum also made recom-

mendations concerning "contact children."

Contact children aren't under court jurisdiction stemming from a Child Protection Act case, but are children social workers may come in contact with during the course of their duties. Manwill fell in that category as social workers were checking the home because of his mother's other son, an infant who had been previously removed from the home.

Authorities say Manwill was hidden in a closet when social workers visited the home weekly.

"If a parent is or is not really being protective of their child, we want to have the ability to know who they are and go have a conversation with them," Armstrong said.

The panel also recommended the state create a child death-review com-

mittee. Idaho is the only state without one.

"You'd think in a case like this you might go back and find some smoking gun," said Elizabeth Brandt, a University of Idaho law professor who served as the panel's chair. "The shocking thing is that in this state we do not have a regular process of child death review."

The boy, who lived primarily with his father in New Plymouth, was visiting Jenkins and Ehrlick in Boise when he disappeared. Prosecutors claim Ehrlick, who is more than 6-foot tall and weighed 277 pounds at the time, tortured the 50-pound boy in a pattern of escalating violence that ended with fatal injuries to his head and chest.

After the boy disappeared, some 2,300 volunteers searched for him.

# Chinese Spoken, Taught At Meridian Elementary School

Gateway School of Language and Culture is the only public elementary school in Idaho joining the national trend of adding Chinese to its curriculum, according to Principal Craig Ayala-Marshall.

**MERIDIAN** • Adam Li holds up a tomato and asks his kindergarten class to identify it.

“Fan qie!” a half-dozen students eagerly call out.

Li next holds up a potato. The students quickly respond: “Tu dou!”

In the classroom next door, Susan Parker stands before her first-grade class using an interactive smart board to show various monetary combinations. She points to a \$1 bill and a penny, inquiring about the amount. A dozen kids raise their hands. Parker calls on 6-year-old Keirstan Knutson.

“Yi yuan ling yi fen,” answers Knutson, who comes to school from Mountain Home each day.

These scenes of kindergarten and first-graders speaking, reading and writing Mandarin Chinese does not take place in a distant land, but at a Meridian School District elementary school in West Boise.

Gateway School of Language and Culture is the only public elementary school in Idaho joining the national trend of adding Chinese to its curriculum, Principal Craig Ayala-Marshall said. It's Meridian's only dual-language elementary school program. Elsewhere in the Treasure Valley, the Boise district offers a Spanish dual-language program at Whitney and Whittier schools.

At Gateway, about 70 kindergartners and first-graders from as far away as Elmore and Canyon counties are taught half the day in English and half the day in Mandarin Chinese. The teacher conducts the entire half day in Chinese, except for the occasional explanation in English. Gateway's halls, classrooms and gymnasium are filled with bilingual Chinese-English signs.

April Truax drives her 6-year-old daughter, Sasha, from Southeast Boise every day to take advantage of the kindergarten program.

“There is nothing like it in the Valley and it is one of few in the nation,” Truax said. “It really is amazing to see firsthand how much they learn and how much fun they have doing it.”

She said she chose the “trailblazing program” to broaden her child's horizons. “I think this opens up their minds to new and creative ways of thinking.”

Truax has applied to have her other daughter, Francesca, 4, enroll in the kindergarten program this fall.

## ‘Little Sponges’

Marly Ader, 7, started the Chinese program in the fall as a first-grader. With just six months of instruction, she already has learned dozens of words and she easily follows Parker's Chinese instructions. Ader is mastering writing in Chinese and can sing songs in Chinese, including Happy

Birthday, which she and her fellow students sang for two classmates last week.

After school she shares new words she's learned with her family and teases her older brother by speaking to him in Chinese, knowing he cannot understand.

She often thinks about her Chinese class. When she goes ice-skating, she carves the new Chinese symbols and words she has learned into the ice with her skates.

Ader loves learning a new language so much, she said, that for Christmas she wants a Rosetta Stone Mandarin Chinese language program. Next she would like to learn Polish.

Young children are adept at learning languages and develop a more natural accent than late learners, Parker said. “They have uncorrupted hearing,” she said.

While they are learning Chinese, children also are increasing their English vocabulary and skills at the same time — developing two different languages simultaneously.

“They are phenomenal,” said Li. “They are just like little sponges.”

An afternoon observing Gateway's Chinese classes also showed young children are adept at technology.

Six-year-old Knutson also is Parker's IT person. When the smart board balked, Parker asked Knutson in Chinese to help. The first-grader went to Parker's computer, small fingers scurrying quickly across the keyboard. Within moments, the smart board was back online.

“It is my job to fix it when there is a problem,” Knutson said proudly.

## Transforming a Traditional School

The Meridian district chose Mandarin Chinese for its first language-immersion program after researching national trends and discussing what the world will need 10 to 20 years down the road, when current students will be entering the workforce. Mandarin Chinese came up at the top of the list as the language most likely to provide students with a unique skill, Ayala-Marshall said.

Gateway launched its Chinese program with its fall 2010 kindergarten class. In fall 2011, it added a first-grade program and this fall the school will add second grade.

The program will expand a grade level each year as that initial class ages. Ayala-Marshall said the Meridian district plans to continue its Chinese immersion program at Lewis and Clark Middle School and then at Renaissance High School.

In fall 2010, McMillan Elementary changed its name to Gateway School of Language and Culture and began serving grades kindergarten through five as a magnet school.

One-fifth of the 352 students enrolled in Gateway are in the Chinese-immersion program. The others are in the school's international enrichment program. Each grade level focuses on a different continent, learning about its geography and culture. Enrichment-program students also receive an hour of Mandarin Chinese instruction per week.

Just 18 months into the school's new magnet program, Ayala-Marshall said it is proving successful — not only bringing diversity to the students, but to the school itself.

Thirty percent of the program's students are from outside the Meridian district and 20 percent are non-white, making Gateway the Meridian district's most ethnically diverse elementary school.

“Parents drive in from all over the Valley for this program,” the principal said.

# Idaho Lawmakers Throw Out Ethics Commission Idea

**BOISE** • Idaho lawmakers won't create a new independent ethics commission this year, House Speaker Lawrence Denney said Tuesday, despite weeks of study and initial support for the concept from leaders in both houses.

“I think we're at the point where we're ruling out the independent ethics commission,” Denney told the Idaho Press Club.

Senate President Pro-Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, said, “We put together a working group, and it didn't function quite as well as we had hoped it would, as far as coming to consensus and so forth. So it's late in the session, but we are putting together some things.”

Hill and Denney said both houses are looking at possible changes in their internal rules to improve the House and Senate ethics committee processes. Denney said, “In the rule that we are looking at proposing, we will have training every year in ethics. ... I think what we need to do is do a better job of training our members as to some of those subtle things that they need to be looking out for, the traps they can get caught in.”

Rep. Phylis King, D-Boise, who served on ethics working group and proposed her own ethics commission bill this year, said, “I think it's unfortunate. I think they've missed another opportunity to show we could make things work better here.”

Forty-one states, including Washington, have independent ethics commissions. In Idaho, ethics complaints against lawmakers go before committees of fellow lawmakers appointed by the speaker and president pro-tem.

Rep. Eric Anderson, R-Priest Lake, who last year lost a committee vice-chairmanship after he filed an ethics complaint against fellow North Idaho lawmaker and tax protester Rep. Phil Hart, said he drafted a proposed House rule change last year to have members of the House, from both parties, elect members to a bipartisan ethics commission every two years, rather than have the speaker appoint members each time an ethics complaint arises. This year, other lawmakers are championing the same proposal.

“I think it's a really large step in the right direction,” Anderson said. “I think that what we had by rule before was inadequate.”

After Anderson filed his ethics complaint against Hart, a Hart supporter, North Idaho political activist Larry Spencer, filed his own ethics complaint against Anderson. Anderson said he underwent an extensive investigation of his finances, home ownership and more, though the investigation concluded the complaint was unfounded. “That was no fun,” he said.

After that, the House changed its rule last year to clarify that no one but a House member can file an ethics complaint against another member. Anderson said he didn't think that was the answer, either; he thought perhaps outside complaints should

be taken up by another entity, such as the Attorney General's office, rather than just ignored. “I would rather know about it and have it investigated, like Larry's complaint,” he said. “At least you have somebody objectively looking at it.”

Rep. Cliff Bayer, R-Boise, who served on the ethics working group, said the group met for four and a half weeks, with each of the eight members taking a turn chairing the panel, and he emerged praising the “positive dialogue” and championing House rule changes.

After much study, the four Democrats on the eight-member working group generally favored an independent ethics commission, and the four Republicans generally favored an improved in-house ethics process within the Legislature.

“I think we have to be very careful with crossing over with powers of different branches of government,” Bayer said.

Denney said he saw a “separation of powers problem” with an independent commission.

King, however, noted that the ethics working group received an Idaho Attorney General's opinion suggesting an independent commission, depending on how it's structured, “would likely respect the separation of powers.”

Hill and Denney said they haven't given up on other ethics reforms passing this year, including Idaho's first-ever financial disclosure requirements and possibly “revolving door” legislation to require public officials to wait a year before turning directly to paid lobbying.

Hill said financial disclosure legislation is more likely, even though there are still deep differences on that issue between the Senate, which passed a disclosure bill unanimously in 2009, and the House, which hasn't considered it. Idaho is one of just three states without disclosure requirements.

The revolving-door legislation, Hill said, “just hasn't been as high on the priority list as some of those other things.”

This year saw high-profile examples of Idaho officials turning to lobbying, from the longtime deputy director of the state Department of Insurance taking a position heading up government affairs for one of the state's two largest insurance companies, to the governor's former chief of staff immediately signing on as a lobbyist for firms including the Corrections Corp. of America, which has a multimillion-dollar contract with the state to operate a privately run prison south of Boise.

Hill said the Senate Republican caucus will consider possible rule changes later this week, and he also plans to share the proposal with minority Democrats. He called ethics reform one of the top issues lawmakers must address before they wrap up this year's legislative session, which is expected to end around March 23.

“These are not going to be big, giant steps,” Hill said. “I know some others are not going to be satisfied, but I think we're going to make some progress.”

### Investigators: Northern Idaho Fire Likely Arson

**COEUR D'ALENE** • Fire investigators say a fire that destroyed a helmet business and a vacuum cleaner business was likely caused by arson.

The *Coeur d'Alene Press* reports that investigators found a gas can under a desk in the building housing Helmet Outlet USA. A report from the Kootenai County Sheriff's Department states that Fire Marshal Jeryl Archer II determined that gasoline had been poured on the desk before the fire started.

The Friday night blaze also destroyed a Kirby vacuum business located in the same building.

Michael Murphy, who

owns the building and the helmet business, said both are considered a total loss.

### Idaho Bill Exempts Soldiers from Hunter Ed Course

**BOISE** • The state would exempt military members from having to take a safety course in order to get a hunting license under legislation advanced by the Idaho House.

The chamber voted 49-21 to approve the measure, which also allows veterans to bypass the hunter's education course requirement.

Idaho now says anyone born after Jan. 1, 1975, seeking a hunting license for the first time has to complete the educational program. But Republican Rep. Lynn Luker of Boise says that

shouldn't be required of military members and veterans.

Luker also contends his bill, which now goes to the Senate, may result in increased license sales.

But critics included Republican Rep. Fred Wood of Burley, who said his status as a veteran didn't mean he knew enough to be issued a hunting license.

### Idaho House Approves Plan for Online Course Review

**BOISE** • The Idaho House has approved a plan for the review and approval of online courses that students can choose from when fulfilling their new graduation requirement.

The state is requiring high

school students to take at least two credits online under reforms backed by Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna. A bill approved by House lawmakers on a 65-0 vote Tuesday directs the state Board of Education to determine how Luna's department will review and approve online courses.

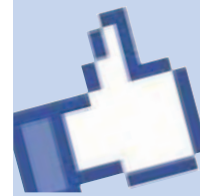
Democratic Rep. Donna Pence says this move will ensure the courses meet state standards.

A task force aimed at helping implement Luna's plan has recommended that schools be provided with a list of online course providers approved and contracted by the state. Luna's department wants to create a course clearinghouse online.

# Let's See What Burley's Library Could Be

A properly funded, properly planned library is a huge boon for a city. The least that the council, and Burley voters, can do is hear the city librarians out.

This could be the start of something great in Burley.

Tonight, the Burley City Council will be asked to let voters decide in May whether to fund construction of a new city library.

An estimated \$3.2 million bond issue would mean about \$25 a year extra in property taxes, based on a home valued at \$120,000. That's just a little more than \$2 a month; one nice meal out, or a little less than a tank of gas.

For that investment, Burley residents would get a larger building with features including a dividable community room that would stay open after hours, separate children and adult areas, ample computer space and meeting rooms.

The organizers behind the Burley effort appear to have recognized the effects of the recession. Building plans drafted in 2008 have been cut in half, from 28,000 square feet to 15,450 square feet — still much more than the current library's 5,000 square feet.

Librarians have also actively courted donations. The Burley Lions Club has reaffirmed its previous offer pledging \$100,000 toward the project, while an anonymous donor has offered to match up to \$350,000 to be raised by the Burley Public Library Foundation. Another \$50,000 has been put toward the new building through other various donations.

But a new building won't come from donations alone. That's why it's so key that the council allow city residents to decide if this is an investment worth making.

A library is more than just a collection of books. For the young, it's a gateway to new worlds full of stories that will stick in their heads, and learning that will last them years. For those seeking employment, it's a place to plan and prepare, to chart a course toward a new career. A library improves literacy and answers questions. And unlike the Internet, its resources come with a local, knowledgeable staff to help navigate them — though computers and Web access now play a bigger role as well.

A properly funded, properly planned library is a huge boon for a city. Burley's librarians seem to be making an honest, reasonable offer. The least that the council, and Burley voters, can do is hear them out.

# Congress and Transportation: Going Nowhere Fast

The following editorial appeared in the Dallas Morning News on Monday:

It would be easy to call the gridlock in Congress laughable, except for the real impact it has on our everyday lives — such as the gridlock on highways.

Case in point is the massive transportation spending bill, a confusion of practical and political priorities that lawmakers seem incapable of turning into clear federal policy that state and local planners can bank on. Since a five-year transportation funding plan expired in 2009, Congress has managed only a series of nine stopgap measures to keep federal gasoline taxes flowing back to the states.

Lawmakers are now in the throes of their latest attempt at a replacement

plan, but the House and the Senate have strayed off in uncertain directions, seemingly oblivious to the date later this month when the current temporary highway bill expires.

Of the two, the Senate is closer to having its act together. It has forged a bipartisan approach to a two-year bill that would continue many current programs, including the use of gas taxes to support public transportation. That's important federal policy of 30 years' standing that must be retained.

Solving traffic congestion in urban areas takes more than widening highways that will simply fill back up with motorists. With talk of \$5-a-gallon gasoline, commuting options need to be preserved. Dallas Area Rapid Transit would not have been able to expand or operate its

light-rail system without dedicated revenue from the federal highway fund.

Still, the Senate bill has been hit with a blizzard of distracting amendments, including — of all things — one to strip mandated contraceptive coverage from the federal health care law. Please!

The House, meanwhile, weighed in with a stinker of a transportation bill that would have scrapped the guaranteed transit support and helped pay for expanded road projects through more offshore drilling, including in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. It was as if House leaders were going out of their way to pick partisan fights, never mind the prospects of getting something to the president's desk.

The House bill — now under revision — did have a few things leaders could be proud

of: It was earmark-free, would speed approval for federal projects and would serve as the transportation blueprint for five years.

Certainty in funding is something local transportation officials crave, rather than shorter-term spending plans and vague priorities. States have become subject to billions of dollars in surprise "rescissions," in which Washington reduces the amount of funds provided in previous legislation. Further, the federal highway fund is close to empty, since Americans have been driving more efficient cars and paying fewer gas taxes to Washington.

All of this paints a picture of a Congress getting the nation nowhere fast on transportation, despite the reality of an aged system of highways, bridges, rails and ports.

No two comments are alike. One person submitted 90 pages focusing on the dangers of transmission line projects, while others touched on land-use issues. If you have the time, all 2,600 comments are available online at bit.ly/xICgJC. In the meantime, here are some excerpts of comments submitted from the Magic Valley:

**William Brockman, Kimberly:** "Lets explore the big question. Do we need it? Probably not. With the wind farms and solar projects being proposed in Southern Idaho we may be able to produce our own green energy here at home. As we all know there is already a corridor of B.L.M., Forest Service and State land that is 29 miles wide and runs the length of Cassia and Twin Falls Counties. Let's use it!"

**Robert and Christine Gertschen, Hagerman:** "While we remain dubious about the need and the cost of the overall project, we strongly support the alternative with the lowest deleterious environmental impacts. We own a home and proper-

ty in Hagerman, Idaho and are particularly concerned about that portion of the project."

**Robert and Joanne Holland, Cocoa, Fla.:** "My wife and I have been coming to Idaho since 1989 in order to paraglide and hang glide. We fly the area south of Declo. Your lines would impact the airspace such that we would no long be able to pursue our sport ... Your lines need to be routed away from the hills and mountains south of Declo, ID."

**Betty Slifer, Filer:** "First I am not convinced that it is needed. It CERTAINLY is not needed for Idaho. And why should Idaho citizens suffer from living under massive transmission lines and towers and from paying higher power rates so that Vegas, Arizona, and California can benefit?"

**Matt Darrington, Burley:** "I am opposed to the proposed route through Cassia County, Idaho. The proposed route calls for the line to run through large swaths of private property, which in many instances is prime farmland. This large transmission line will not only diminish the view shed but will also likely interfere with radio signals."

to build a system for which the rules are still being written.

Reached Tuesday afternoon, Wood said he hadn't heard leadership's sentiment about the issue. He said the comments from Hill and Denney surprised him.

"I'm still going to try to get it in committee," Wood said. "I don't know if I'll be

successful or not."

It doesn't help that most of Idaho's lawmakers are against complying with the Affordable Care Act, and Idaho is one of 27 states challenging the constitutionality of the act in the U.S. Supreme Court. Without legislation to set up an exchange, Idaho will await the outcome of the challenge, which isn't expected until June.

"We've never been able to get critical mass to even introduce a bill," Denney said.

# RESTORING THE CUTS

McGeachin pushing bill to undo some of last year's Medicaid reductions.

**BOISE** • Rep. Janice McGeachin is carrying new legislation designed to undo some of the Medicaid funding cutbacks she pushed to reduce state spending a year ago.

The Idaho Falls Republican said there have been several unintended consequences to last year's Medicaid reform law, which reduced state spending by cutting benefits for mentally and developmentally disabled adults.

The new proposal, House Bill 609, cleared the House Health and Welfare Committee on a unanimous voice vote Tuesday and is headed to the full House with a recommendation for approval.

McGeachin seeks to restore preventative dental care for adults with developmental disabilities.

Additionally, the bill would undo a section of last year's law that forced some Medicaid recipients with a dual diagnosis to choose between either mental health therapy or developmental disability services. Before the change, they received both.

McGeachin said she originally was under the impression some Medicaid clients' therapy services were duplicated and lawmakers sought to avoid paying for the same benefits twice.

"Originally, we intended just to ensure people participating in either of those categories weren't receiving the same skills (twice)," McGeachin said. "The way it turned out ... our legislation wasn't written correctly."

If signed into law, that change would restore both mental health and developmental disability therapies to about 600 adults who had

been forced to choose between the two.

If approved, McGeachin's new bill would add about \$1.5 million in state spending to next year's budget. But it actually would increase total funding for Medicaid benefits by up to \$8 million, once federal matching contributions are calculated.

Idaho Department of Health and Welfare spokesman Tom Shanahan said department officials support McGeachin's bill.

There are about 35,000 adults in the state's enhanced Medicaid program. Shanahan said the new bill would restore dental services to about 12,000 of those individuals.

"The main focus we have is restoring the dental cuts for people with developmental disabilities," he said. "We've been in contact with the Idaho State Dental Association, and, in talking with them, we thought that (cut) had the potential of having the largest long-term effect."

# Oregon Man Indicted on Rape Charge

# WYOMING PASSES WOLF BILL WHILE LAWSUITS STILL LOOM

**CHEYENNE, Wyo.** • The Wyoming Legislature has sent Gov. Matt Mead a bill to change the state's wolf-management law — a critical step toward ratifying the agreement the governor reached with the federal government last year over how to end Endangered Species Act protections for the animals.

However, uncertainty remains over possible legal challenges to Wyoming's wolf management plan. Many hunters and ranchers in the state worry that a large wolf population poses an unacceptable threat on livestock and other wildlife.

Under the bill now awaiting Mead's signature, the state would allow trophy hunting for wolves in a flexible zone around Yellowstone National Park beginning this fall, while classifying wolves as predators that could be shot on sight in the rest of the state.

"I'm obviously pleased with the progression of the wolf bill," Mead said Monday. His agreement with the federal government requires Wyoming to maintain at least 10 breeding pairs of wolves and at least 100 individual animals outside of Yellowstone and the Wind River Indian Reserva-

tion. Mead said he spoke with Interior Secretary Ken Salazar in Washington late last month. "He reminded me that they've taken a lot of pressure on this, but he remains committed to what Wyoming's doing," Mead said of Salazar.

Wyoming had an estimated 343 wolves at the end of 2010: eight breeding pairs and 113 individuals inside Yellowstone and 19 breeding pairs and 230 individuals outside the park, said Steve Ferrell, the governor's wildlife policy adviser.

It remains uncertain whether Wyoming can secure congressional protections against legal challenges to the delisting action. Congress ear-

lier extended such protection to wolf delisting actions in Idaho and Montana.

If Congress fails to fireproof Wyoming's wolf delisting plan against legal challenges, many say they expect the state to be back in court as soon as the ink dries on the final federal delisting action this fall.

Doug Honnold, a lawyer with Earthjustice in Bozeman, Mont., has represented environmental groups in fighting wolf delisting efforts. He said Tuesday he believes it's likely that Wyoming's wolf plan will be challenged without congressional protection.

"Probably the issue that has most people who care about

wolves hopping mad is that Wyoming still is taking an approach where in the vast majority of the state that wolves are designated as predators and the shoot-on-sight laws remain in place," Honnold said.

"And what the Fish and Wildlife Service in Wyoming cooked up is to have a relatively small area where the predator status would be shifted for a few months and wolves would have to run the gauntlet," Honnold said. "And we believe that's an inappropriate approach to make sure that wolves are fully protected."

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# Democrats Seek Hearing into Judge's Obama Email

**HELENA, Mont.** • Two top Democrats on the House Judiciary Committee called for a hearing Tuesday to examine a Montana judge's conduct in forwarding an email that included a racist joke involving bestiality and President Barack Obama's mother.

Reps. John Conyers of Michigan and Steve Cohen of Tennessee told Committee Chairman Lamar Smith, R-Texas, in their letter that the committee has a duty to investigate the potential consequences of Judge Richard Cebull's email.

"At a minimum, forwarding this email illustrates poor judgment and of conduct that was unbecoming of a federal judge," they wrote. "More troubling, however, is the possibility that public disclosure of the judge's conduct may not only undermine the public's view of his personal credibility and impartiality as a judge, but also the integrity of the ... federal judiciary."

A hearing would determine whether further investigation or legislative action was needed, they wrote. Congress can remove a federal judge for misconduct by impeachment in the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate confirmation, but such action is rare.

Smith had no immediate response to their hearing request.

At least three complaints have been filed with the San Francisco-based 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals against Cebull regarding the email, which he forwarded to six friends on Feb. 20. One of the complaints was

filed by Cebull himself. He asked 9th Circuit Chief Judge Alex Kozinski "to conduct an inquiry as to whether recent activity of mine constitutes misconduct."

Cebull did not return a message from The Associated Press on Tuesday. He has previously said that he forwarded the email because he disliked Obama and denied allegations of racism. News of the email broke Thursday when it was forwarded to a *Great Falls Tribune* reporter.

The judge sent Obama a letter of apology Thursday in which he said he accepted responsibility, assured the president that it will never happen again and said he had asked for a judicial review.

"Honestly, I don't know what else I can do," Cebull wrote. "Please forgive me and, again, my most sincere apology."

The White House confirmed Tuesday that it had received the letter.

Cebull was nominated by former President George W. Bush and received his commission in 2001. He has served as chief judge of the District of Montana since 2008.

The two other known complaints have been filed by the good-government advocate, Common Cause, and by the Montana Human Rights Network.

David Madden, the assistant executive for the 9th Circuit, declined to say whether other complaints have been filed, citing confidentiality in the judicial

misconduct process. Cebull and the other groups waived confidentiality when they filed their complaints, he said.

"We have acknowledged receiving Judge Cebull's complaint and announced that the matter will be investigated. That is the extent of what we can say publicly at this time," Madden said.

The 9th Circuit has the ability to censure or reprimand the judge, order that no new cases be assigned to him for a designated period of time or ask the judge to retire. If the conduct potentially constitutes grounds for impeachment, the 9th circuit could refer the matter to the Judicial Conference of the United States, which oversees the federal court system.

Conyers and Cohen wrote that a legislative inquiry is necessary regardless of the results of the 9th Circuit's conclusions.

The last federal judge to be impeached and convicted was U.S. District Judge G. Thomas Porteous of Louisiana in 2010. Prosecutors said gambling and drinking problems led Porteous to begin accepting cash and other favors from attorneys and bail bondsmen with business before his court.

# Clark County, Nev. Leaders Ban Pets on Las Vegas Strip

The *Las Vegas Sun* reports the ordinance adopted Tuesday would still allow animals from 5 a.m. to noon, and the ban doesn't apply to service animals.

Ordinance sponsor Chris Giunchigliani's insisted she's not trying to

push panhandlers off the Las Vegas Strip. She said the ban would reduce dog bites and would prevent pets from having to endure sizzling summer sidewalks in Sin City's neon corridor.


The bustling corridors funneling tourists between casinos are popular places for panhandlers who sometimes bring animals along.

The ban will be in place for a year before it's up for review again.

## World Powers Agree Iran Nuclear Talks Can Resume

**TEHRAN, Iran** • Efforts to find a diplomatic solution to Iran's disputed nuclear program appeared to get a boost Tuesday when world powers agreed to a new round of talks with Tehran, and Iran gave permission for inspectors to visit a site suspected of secret atomic work.

The two developments countered somewhat the crisis atmosphere over Iran's nuclear program, the focus of talks in Washington between President Barack Obama and Israel's visiting prime minister.

Speaking at a news conference, Obama said he saw a "window of opportunity" to use diplomacy instead of military force to resolve the dispute over Iran's nuclear program.

He said he is focused on "crippling sanctions" already imposed on Iran and on international pressure to

keep Tehran from developing a nuclear weapon. Iranians need to show they are serious about resolving the crisis, he said, adding that his policy is not one of containment but of stopping Iran from acquiring a nuclear weapon.

The U.S. and its allies say Iran is on a path that could lead to the production of a nuclear weapon. Iran denies that, insisting its program is for energy production and other peaceful purposes.

Speaking in Brussels, EU foreign policy chief Catherine Ashton said the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council and Germany had agreed to a new round of nuclear talks with Iran. Previous talks have not achieved what the powers want — an end to uranium enrichment on Iranian soil. The last round ended in failure in January 2011.

Ashton said the EU hopes Iran "will now enter into a

## VETERANS PRONE TO DRUG ADDICTION GET RISKY PAINKILLERS

**CHICAGO (AP)** • Morphine and similar powerful painkillers are sometimes prescribed to recent war veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress along with physical pain, and the consequences can be tragic, a government study suggests.

These vets are at high risk for drug and alcohol abuse, but they're two times more likely to get prescriptions for addictive painkillers than vets with only physical pain, according to the study, billed as the first national examination of the problem. Iraq and Afghanistan vets with PTSD who already had substance abuse problems were four times more likely to get these drugs than vets without mental health problems, according to the study.

Subsequent suicides, other self-inflicted injuries, and drug and alcohol overdoses were all more common in vets with PTSD who got these drugs. These consequences were rare but still troubling, the study authors said.

The results underscore the challenge of treating veterans with devastating physical injuries and haunting memories of the horrors of war. But the findings also suggest that physicians treating these veterans should offer less risky treatment, including therapies other than drugs, the study authors and other experts say.

Opium-based drugs like morphine and hydrocodone can dull excruciating physical pain. Relatively few veterans are prescribed such drugs. But some doctors likely prescribe them for vets who also have mental pain "with the hope that the emotional distress that accompanies chronic pain will also be reduced. Unfortunately, this hope is often not fulfilled, and opioids can sometimes make emotional problems worse," said Michael Von Korff, a chronic illness researcher with Group Health Research Institute, a Seattle-based health care system. He was not involved in the study.

# Romney Wins Ohio, Four Other Super Tuesday States

**WASHINGTON** • Mitt Romney squeezed out a win in pivotal Ohio, captured four other states with ease and padded his delegate lead in the race for the Republican presidential nomination but was forced to share the Super Tuesday spotlight with a resurgent Rick Santorum.

On the busiest night of the campaign, Romney scored a home-state win in Massachusetts to go with primary victories in Vermont and in Virginia — where neither Santorum nor Newt Gingrich was on the ballot. He added the Idaho caucuses to his column.

Ohio was the big win, though, and the closest contest of all as the Republican rivals battled for the chance to face Democratic President Barack Obama in November. Santorum countered

crisply, winning primaries in Oklahoma and Tennessee and the North Dakota caucuses — raising fresh doubts about Romney's ability to corral the votes of conservatives in some of the most Republican states in the country.

Ohio was the marquee

matchup, a second industrial-state showdown in as many weeks between Romney and Santorum. It drew the most campaigning and television advertisements of all 10 Super Tuesday contests and for good reason — no Republican has ever won the White House without carry-

ing the state in the fall. After trailing for much of the night, Romney forged ahead in a count that stretched past midnight. With votes tallied in 99 percent of the state's precincts, he led by about 12,000 out of 1.1 million cast.

Gingrich had a victory in his column, too — his first win in more than six weeks. The former House speaker triumphed at home in Georgia, but a barrage of attack ads by a super PAC supporting Romney helped hold him below 50 percent and forced him to share the delegates.

Texas Rep. Ron Paul pinned his hopes on Alaska as he scratched for his first victory of the campaign season.

Santorum waited until Oklahoma and Tennessee fell into his column before speaking to cheering supporters in Ohio. "This was a big night tonight," he said.

## Twin Sisters, 73, Found Dead Together in California Home

When they were young, Patricia and Joan Miller sang and danced for Bing Crosby, troops and their friends.

But as the identical twins grew older, they became less interested in socializing. When people called, the sisters came up with excuses to get off the phone. Without explanation, they stopped sending birthday cards to a childhood friend. And on the rare occasion when they left their home, the two women didn't chat up the neighbors.

Never married and without children or pets, the Miller sisters withdrew into their four-bedroom

sustained process of constructive dialogue which will deliver real progress in resolving the international community's long-standing concerns on its nuclear program."

The time and venue of the new talks have not yet been set.

Britain's foreign secretary, William Hague, said the onus would "be on Iran to convince the international community that its nuclear program is exclusively peaceful."

German Foreign Minister Guido Westerwelle called for a diplomatic solution. "A nuclear-armed Iran must be prevented," he said.

This week Obama warned the U.S. would use military action to protect its interests if necessary, while appealing for time for sanctions against Iran to show their affects. In his public statements during a visit to Washington, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu thanked Obama for his support but did little to counter concerns that Israel might go ahead on its own with an attack on Iran. Israel considers Iran an existential threat because of its nuclear program and its references to destruction of the Jewish state.

On Tuesday, Obama implied that Israeli pressure for urgent action was not supported by the facts, saying that a decision was not necessary within the next weeks or months.

The U.N.'s International Atomic Energy Agency last year published a report that included what it said was evidence of Iranian activity that could be linked to weapons development. The head of the IAEA, Yukiya Amano, said Monday that his organization has "serious concerns" that Iran may be hiding secret atomic weapons work, singling out the Parchin military complex southeast of Tehran.

On Tuesday, Iran appeared to respond partially to those concerns, granting long-sought permission to IAEA inspectors to visit the Parchin compound. Iran describes the site as a military base, not a nuclear facility.

The semi-official ISNA news agency stated a key condition: such a visit would require an agreement between the two sides on guidelines.

"Given that Parchin is a military site, access to this facility is a time-consuming process, and it can't be visited repeatedly," ISNA quoted the Iranian statement as saying. It added that following repeated IAEA demands, "permission will be granted for access once more."

Inspecting Parchin was a key request by senior IAEA teams that visited Tehran in January and February. Iran rebuffed those demands at the time, as well as attempts by the nuclear agency's team to question Iranian officials and secure other information linked to the allegations of secret weapons work.

The Parchin complex has been often mentioned in the West as a suspected base for secret nuclear experiments — a claim Iran consistently denies. IAEA inspectors visited the site in 2005, but only one of four areas on the grounds, reporting no unusual activities.

Last year, the IAEA's report said there were indications Tehran has conducted high-explosives testing to set off a nuclear charge at Parchin. Iran denied the atomic activity and insisted that any decision to open the site rests with the armed forces.

# \$7 Billion Swindle May Keep Stanford behind Bars for Life

**Stanford, a former Texas tycoon, whose financial empire once spanned the Americas, was convicted Tuesday for allegedly bilking investors out of more than \$7 billion in a massive Ponzi scheme he operated for 20 years.**

**HOUSTON** • Texas tycoon R. Allen Stanford spent more than 20 years charming investors, who handed him billions of dollars they had spent their lives accumulating through hard work and saving.

Stanford promised them safe investments that would help fulfill their dreams of being able to retire comfortably or pay their children's college tuition. All the while, he was pulling their money out of his Caribbean bank to pay for a string of failed businesses and a jet-setting lifestyle.

Stanford, once considered one of the wealthiest people in the U.S., with a financial empire that spanned the Americas, was convicted Tuesday on charges he bilked investors out of more than \$7 billion.

Prosecutors said his business acumen was nothing more than an old-fashioned Ponzi scheme, and jurors convicted him on 13 of 14 charges, including conspiracy, wire and mail fraud. He was acquitted on a single count of wire fraud that accused him of bribing a regulator with Super Bowl tickets.

Stanford looked down when the verdict was read in

federal court in Houston, where his financial empire was based. His mother and daughters hugged one another, and one of his daughters started crying.

"We are disappointed in the outcome. We expect to appeal," Stanford attorney Ali Fazel said after the hearing. He said he couldn't comment further because of a gag order Hittner placed on attorneys in the case.

Prosecutors and Stanford's relatives declined to comment on the verdict, but former investor Cassie Wilkinson found comfort in it.

"As an investor, you have to doubt whether or not you were stupid or just taken advantage of. This relieves that doubt. It's a vindication," said Wilkinson, 62, who lives in Houston. She declined to say how much money she and her husband lost.

Romney picked up at least 183 of the 419 Super Tuesday delegates at stake. Santorum gained at least 64, Gingrich 52 and Paul at least 15.

That gave the former Massachusetts governor 386, more than all his rivals combined, a total that included endorsements from members of the Republican National Committee who automatically attend the convention and can support any candidate they choose. Santorum had 156 delegates, Gingrich 85 and Paul 40. It takes 1,144 delegates to win the nomination at the Republican National Convention in Tampa, Fla., this summer.

The split of the states ensured that the most turbulent Republican presidential campaign in a generation would continue.

Already, the candidates were looking ahead to the next contests, Kansas and Wyoming caucuses on Saturday, followed by Alabama and Mississippi primaries on March 13.

Restore our Future, the super PAC that backs Romney, disclosed a near-\$1 million investment for television ads in Illinois, the next big-state primary on the calendar, on March 20. The organization is already airing commercials in Mississippi and Alabama, as is a group that supports Gingrich, although at lower levels.

Ohio Republicans were a party divided, based not only

on the popular vote but also on interviews with voters as they left their polling places.

Santorum outpolled Romney among Ohioans with incomes under \$100,000, while Romney won among those with six-figure incomes and up. Romney won among working women, Santorum among women who do not.

Santorum won among self-described conservatives, while Romney outpointed his rival among those who said they are moderate or liberal.

Santorum was preferred by the half of the electorate that is born-again. Romney was the favorite among the half of the electorate that said it is not.

In interviews in all the primary states, Republicans said the economy was the top issue and an ability to defeat Obama was what mattered most as they made their Super Tuesday choices.

They also indicated nagging concerns about the candidate they supported, even in Massachusetts. There, one-third of all primary voters said they had reservations, and about three-quarters of those voted for Romney.

Massachusetts is a reliably Democratic state in most presidential elections, but in Ohio, 41 percent of primary voters said they, too, had reservations about the candidate they supported. No Republican has ever won the White House without capturing Ohio.

Gingrich's victory was his first since he captured the South Carolina primary on Jan. 21, and the former House speaker said it would propel him on yet another comeback in a race where he has faded badly over the past six weeks.

# San Diego Man Arrested in Fatal Cannonball Incident

**SAN DIEGO** • A 39-year-old handyman and explosives enthusiast was arrested Tuesday after a bizarre incident in which his live-in girlfriend was killed when a cannonball rocketed through the couple's trailer in eastern San Diego County.

Richard Fox, 39, was arrested on charges relating to the negligent discharge of explosives causing injury. Fox's girlfriend, 38, was killed instantly, according to the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection.

Fox and a friend were loading a homemade cannon with powder from fireworks when it exploded shortly after midnight, sending shrapnel into the trailer where Fox, his girlfriend, and their 4-year-old daughter lived.

The child and three other adults in the trailer were unharmed.

Fox, who had been drinking, was burned in the explosion and treated at a local hospital, authorities said. The couple had lived in the trailer in Potrero, in rural eastern San Diego County, for several years.

that the White House tried to suggest was not about stealing some attention from Republicans. Obama officials insisted it was just a good day to get the president out for a full questioning for the first time since a sunset news conference in Hawaii back in November.

Eager to remain the president and not the candidate, Obama often says there will be a time for politics this year. Yes, like now.

It came up right away, of course, that voters in 10 states were going to the polls to help pick his November competitor.

Because Obama brought it up.

"I understand there are some political contests going on tonight," he said with a wry grin upon entering the White House briefing room.

There are days when Obama waves off re-election questions as premature. This was not one of them.

Consider:

- Obama led off by offering ideas to help struggling homeowners, and finished his thought by saying: "I'm not one of those people who believe that we should sit by and wait for the housing market to hit bottom." That was a direct shot at presidential candidate Mitt Romney and his comments on the foreclosure crisis.

- Obama, in fielding questions about keeping Iran from getting a nuclear bomb, hardened his position in intensely domestic political terms. He called out Republicans for making big threats and "beating the drums of war." He scoffed at them for ultimately, in his view, spelling out a playbook for Iran that mirrors his.

"If some of these folks think that it's time to launch a war, they should say so, and they should explain to the American people exactly why they would do that and what the consequences would be," Obama said. "Everything else is just talk."

He offered himself as the one who thinks through war, not the one who rushes the nation into a mistake. The implication about his competitors was clear.

- Obama was pressed on whether he actually wants higher gasoline prices as a way to promote alternative

fuels, a charge made by Newt Gingrich, one of the Republican presidential candidates. Obama jumped in to offer his political analysis on that one.

"Do you think the president of the United States, going into re-election, wants gas prices to go up higher?" Obama said. "Is there anybody who thinks that makes a lot of sense? I want gas prices lower because they hurt families."

- Obama positioned himself as a voice of civility and — to a nation of voting parents — maturity in the debate over whether health insurance plans should cover contraception. He said he called Sandra Fluke, the woman called a "slut" by radio host Rush Limbaugh, with his own two young daughters in mind. There's a way to debate, Obama said, that doesn't involve being demeaned.

It wasn't long before another reporter had him talking about the race for the women's vote in general.

"I believe that Democrats have a better story to tell women," Obama said. He then repeated his re-election pitch about fairness for the middle class.

- Obama, confident all the while, looked like the guy who cannot wait to get into a one-on-one fight with a Republican nominee. He has expected it to be Romney all along.

When asked what he had to say to Romney, who has accused him of being feckless, a smiling Obama said: "Good luck tonight!"

The president ended the news conference on his terms, with more reminders of his incumbent powers.

Yes, he's eager to bring the leaders of the G-8 nations to the presidential retreat at Camp David in Maryland. And, yes, as commander in chief, he knows there will be troubles as the American-led war in Afghanistan winds down, just as there were in Iraq.

"None of this stuff is ever easy," Obama said. "It never has been."

Before long, the attention shifted back to the Republicans and their big night. But Obama had succeeded in dominating much of the news cycle.

On Wednesday, he's off to promote his agenda in Charlotte, N.C. That just happens to be the site of this summer's Democratic National Convention.

**Lehman Brothers bankruptcy** • The Ritz-Carlton Kapalua hotel in Hawaii, a luxury ski resort in the Rockies and a Manhattan boutique hotel are among the last holdings of Lehman Brothers, the investment house whose spectacular bust triggered the worst of the 2008 financial crisis. The bank said Tuesday that it will begin unloading its stakes in those properties in April as it prepares to exit Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection and finally meet its end. Lehman's \$639 billion bankruptcy remains the largest in U.S. history. It went under on Sept. 15, 2008, the same week that the government rescued AIG and the \$700 billion bailout for major banks was conceived.

**Dow Falls More Than 200, Interrupting 2012 Rally**

**NEW YORK** • Stocks suffered their biggest losses in three months Tuesday, the first hiccup in a strong and steady rally to start the year. Wall Street worried about the global economy and waited while Greece pressured the last investors to sign on for its bailout.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell more than 200 points, giving up more than a quarter of its 745-point advance since Jan. 1, the best start to a year in the U.S. market since 1998.

The sell-off, which spread west from Europe, also interrupted a period of unusual calm on Wall Street. Before Tuesday, the Dow had not fallen 100 points for 45 straight trading sessions, the longest streak since 2006.

The decline of 203.66 points was the worst for the Dow since Nov. 23 and left the average at 12,759.15. It was only last week that the Dow closed above 13,000 for the first time since May 2008, four months before the worst of the financial crisis.

“When things go straight up and don’t ever correct or have some sort of normal pullback, as an investor, that makes me nervous,” said Ed Hyland, a global investment specialist with J.P. Morgan Private Bank.

The gradual rally had been powered by optimism about the U.S. economic recovery. But investors realized that Greece’s debt problems, Europe’s economic problems and Israel’s Iran problems were still very much their problems, too.

Stocks fell sharply from the opening bell and never mounted a serious comeback. The Dow was down as much as 227 points. All but one of the 30 stocks in the average finished the day lower. Intel managed a gain of 7 cents.

All 10 industry groups in the Standard & Poor’s 500 declined. Bank stocks, which typically take a hit when there is any reason to worry about Greece, led the declines, followed by industrial and materials companies, which depend on strength in the world economy.

Alcoa, which makes aluminum and depends heavily on world economic demand, fell 4.1 percent, the worst of the Dow 30. China revised its projection for economic growth on Monday to 7.5 percent this year, down from 8 percent.

The Standard & Poor’s 500 index fell 20.97 points, its worst decline since Dec. 8, to 1,343.36. The S&P had not declined 1 percent or more for 45 straight trading days, also the longest streak since 2006. That year, the S&P put together 94 in a row.

The Nasdaq composite index dropped 40.16 points to 2,910.32. The Nasdaq last week broke through 3,000 for the first time since December 2000, during the collapse in dot-com stocks.

Last year, sell-offs like this were much more common. The S&P fell by at least 1 percent on 48 trading days, roughly one in every five. During the depths of the financial crisis in the last four months of 2008, it happened roughly one in every three days.

Tuesday in Germany, Spain and France, and 1.9 percent in Britain. Greece stepped up pressure on private investors to swap their Greek government bonds for replacements with a lower face value and interest rate.

Major banks and investment funds have signed on for the swap, but it remains unclear whether hedge funds, which had already bought the bonds at a steep discount and may profit from bond insurance payouts if Greece defaults, will agree. The deadline is Thursday.

The swap is vital for Greece to cut its debt and get a bailout of (euro) 130 billion, or \$172 billion, from other countries and the International Monetary Fund. Without the bailout, Greece could default on its debt later this month and rattle markets around the world.

Bill Stone, chief investment strategist for PNC Wealth Management, called Tuesday’s decline “fairly rational,” considering how much the market has climbed and the economic worries in Greece and the rest of Europe.

“You need the pullback to give people opportunities to want to get involved again,” Stone said.

The price of oil slipped \$2.02 to \$104.70 per barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. New York crude has risen from \$96 last month amid fears of a disruption in global oil supplies driven by the potential for military conflict with Iran.

President Barack Obama said diplomacy can still resolve the crisis over Iran’s possible pursuit of nuclear weapons and accused his Republican critics of “beating the drums of war.” Iran dominated Obama’s first news conference of the year.

The price of gold fell \$31.80 per ounce, or 2.1 percent, to \$1,672.10 per ounce. Silver, platinum and copper all fell more than 2 percent because of concerns about Europe and weaker economic demand in China.

“Global growth fears now are hitting home, and we’re seeing selling across the board,” said Matt Zeman, a market analyst for Kingsview Financial.

Yields on U.S. government debt also fell as investors moved their money into what they perceive to be a safer asset. The yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note fell to 1.96 percent from 2.01 percent late Monday. Bond yields fall when their prices rise.

**Survey: 1 in 5 Families Struggle with Medical Debt**

**ATLANTA (AP)** • A survey shows 1 in 5 Americans say their families are having trouble paying their medical bills. Worse, half of those who are struggling say they are unable to pay a single dime toward those debts.

Peter Cunningham, who studies the issue for an independent health policy research group, says it may be the largest such study ever done on the matter.

The survey of 52,000 people was conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention from January through June of last year. It’s the first time the government agency has looked at the issue in such a comprehensive way.

Lower-income people struggled the most. They were three times more likely to have difficulty paying their medical bills over the past year. It’s the first time the CDC has asked the medical debt question in its long-standing, in-person health survey, so there is no previous data to compare it with.

# The Freshest Coffee: 3 Locally Roasted Beans or Blends

**TWIN FALLS** • Call it snobbery if you like, but there's just no brew like the beans roasted days ago, then ground each morning in your kitchen. But in Magic Valley, local roasters are scarce, and many coffee lovers rely on whole beans roasted elsewhere and shipped in — lengthening the time it takes to reach the cup.

Ready to experience something truly fresh instead? We sought out three local coffee roasters and asked about their best beans.

## Peaberry Blend

Tanzania's peaberries — those rounded, single beans that grew alone in the coffee cherry — are the best known of these rare beans. But the Dominican Republic in recent years has become able to process beans to the specialty-quality level, said Paul Graff, co-owner of micro-roaster Twin Beans Coffee in Twin Falls, and Graff has located some Dominican peaberries from the Cibao Altura plant.

The result is his two-bean Peaberry Blend, a medium roast developed in December and not yet marketed. The blend's Tanzanian peaberry has the

typical bright, mellow, almost sweet flavor, Graff said, while a Dominican peaberry “brings an earthiness to the cup and also helps with the body.”

Peaberry Blend is \$11.50 per pound or \$6.50 for a half-pound, and Graff roasts to order. The current harvest will last through late summer. Call 420-4880 or search Twin Beans Coffee on Facebook to order.

## Finca Rosma

The selection of beans at By The Way Espresso is in constant, rapid flux. Co-owner Larry Collins roasts just

**HANSEN** • The baby smiled and patted her mommy's shoulder, while Atsuko Ratto busied herself in the kitchen.

It's a sight often seen in the Ratto home — Atsuko doing housework while her 8-month-old girl, A.J., watches from the cloth pouch on her mother's back.

It's a way to keep A.J. entertained

while allowing Atsuko to do what needs to be done. On Friday, what needed to be done were Japanese egg rolls, a family-favorite recipe.

Atsuko learned to make them from her mother in Osaka, Japan, where she grew up. It wasn't until the late '90s that she met Joe Ratto, who was there attending school. They married in 1999, and he

brought her to the U.S., back to Hansen where Joe grew up.

Atsuko brought along her egg roll recipe. But she's made them often enough that she didn't need to read a recipe on Friday.

Atsuko made the egg rolls look like child's play, as she quickly sliced green peppers, onions, celery and large shiitake

mushrooms.

“You want to cut everything the same size,” she said.

Atsuko placed ground pork in a wok, a large one handed down from Grandpa Ratto, and included sprinkles of ginger root, which helps tone down the gamy taste of the meat, she said. She soon included cut bean thread noodles and the thinly sliced veggies.

“I put green peppers in last,” she said, because they cook quickly.

“Sometimes I forget to put them in, but I didn't forget today.”

By the time the filling was finished, A.J. was asleep on her mother's back.

Atsuko's mother-in-law, Julie Ratto, who lives next door, retrieved the baby while Atsuko stretched her arms to loosen the tightness in her shoulders.

She then set to work filling the egg roll wraps she buys from an

# A Plot to Call Your Own

Community gardens appeal to apartment dwellers yearning for garden rows, to first-time growers needing pointers — and to a lot of others.

**TWIN FALLS** • Those crocus blooms already coloring some Magic Valley flower beds might have you thinking ahead to tender peas and garden-fresh peppers.

Don't have a plot to call your own? No worries. There are community gardens you can stick a shovel into close to home. In these gardens, anyone can rent a plot for the growing season and keep — or donate — the harvest it produces.

## Gooding Community Garden

Last year the new Gooding Community Garden had an impact far greater than its acre-and-a-half size. In its first harvest, the garden produced an estimated 6,000 pounds of produce, said Eric Moore, who got the garden off the ground. Instead of the high school FFA purchasing ears of corn to

sell for fundraising, it used a third-acre of the community garden to raise the crop, learning agronomics and making more money along the way.

The garden is behind the U.S. Food and Drug Administration building in Gooding where Moore works, although it's not affiliated with the agency.

The garden proved so popular

that the number of 20-by-25-foot garden plots available this year will increase from 18 to 25. Garden plots for the disabled are also available, Moore said; an Eagle Scout project built raised beds to accommodate those with mobility issues.

A butterfly greenhouse is planned this year, Moore said, which will add to the visual experience and assist in pollination. “We’re working with a (University of Idaho) entomologist on the specifics of the plan.”

Farmers’ donations in tilling the soil and giving compost and corporate donations of cash and equipment “mean there is no cost and we have shovels, buckets, gloves, hoes, Master Gardeners, hand tools ... there are no barriers. If you don’t speak English we will find someone who speaks your language and help you. This garden is for the entire community,” he said.

The garden is open year-round. Information: Moore at 934-8481, ext. 112.

# College of Southern Idaho

Demand continues to outstrip plot availability at CSI’s community garden.

Ag professor Jim Wilson said about a dozen folks remain on the waiting list for one of the 25-by-50-foot garden spots.

“Typically 25-30 gardeners come back year after year, so there is a possibility that those on the waiting list will get their chance at a garden plot this year,” Wilson said.

When will would-be gardeners find out whether they should plan on cultivating sweet corn, cherry tomatoes and green beans alongside everyone from elderly garden hobbyists to refugees? Soon, Wilson said. “We

# Making Fudge? Rely on Temp

**Question:** I have a fudge recipe that makes 5 pounds and calls for cooking the sugar for 6 1/2 minutes. If I cut it in half, should I also cut the cooking time in half?

**Answer:** Time isn’t the best judge of fudge. While the cooking time might vary when you reduce the amount of ingredients, it also could vary even if the ingredients stayed the same.

We checked with Megan Lambert, a pastry and baking expert at Johnson & Wales University in Charlotte, N.C., who agreed that temperature is a much more reliable method, even for the full batch of fudge.

“I would hate to overcook or undercook 5 pounds of fudge,” she said.

A classic fudge usually is cooked to 234 to 240 degrees, also known as the soft-ball stage. It is then cooled to 110 degrees and beaten until it begins to set. The best way to know when you’ve reached both of those points is to use a candy thermometer.

10 pounds at a time, at least three times a week, and sells the beans from his drive-through stand near Jerome.

At the moment, he’s particularly fond of a bean from the Finca Rosma plantation in the Huehuetenango region of Guatemala.

“It’s kind of a classic Guatemalan, and it has kind of a refined acidity, bright on the front end. ... This has a juicy body and is kind of real sweet. And it’s clean,” Collins said. “The Guats this year have just been dreamy!”

His supplier shops small lots of coffee around the world, so this stuff won’t be around for long. Collins started roasting the Finca Rosma beans in late February and predicts he might have them for another two weeks.

His whole beans are \$12 for a 12-ounce bag. You can call 324-1017 to ask about availability of various coffees, but you’ll have to buy them from his small stand at 5720 U.S. Highway 93. It’s set back from the highway near a golf course.

# Taza de Valle

A lot of tourists visit Hailey Coffee Co.’s roasting operation and cafe, and even the ones who make a point of saying they’re from Seattle praise the coffee as the best they’ve had, owner Carrie Morgridge said.

Her signature blend — used in all of Hailey Coffee’s espresso drinks — is a three-bean formula dubbed Taza de Valle, from Sumatra, Colombia and Guatemala.

“It’s a combination of two light and one dark bean, and so it’s a mild flavor and it’s rich and it’s smooth,” Morgridge said.

Hailey Coffee roasts beans five to seven times a week. For whole-bean Taza de Valle, you’ll pay \$12.95 for a 1-pound bag at hailey-coffee.com; or \$11.75 for a 12-ounce bag at the cafe, 219 S. Main St. in Hailey, 788-8482.

Asian store in Utah. You can find them locally, Atsuko said, but she always stocks up on supplies when in Salt Lake City.

She added a flour-and-water paste to seal the wraps' edges and deep-fried the egg rolls to a golden brown.

Just about an hour had passed since Atsuko sliced the vegetables. Now a plate of steaming-hot egg rolls sat on the counter, waiting for her husband.

"A lot of times when we have family gatherings," Julie said, "everyone will bring their own stuff." Atsuko brings egg rolls.

On Friday, she prepared enough filling for 50 egg rolls. Whatever she doesn't use, she freezes for later.

One of the next family gatherings: the birthday of Atsuko's father-in-law, Joe Ratto, on April 1. But there'll be no fooling with Atsuko's egg rolls.

- 5 to 6 dried shiitake mushrooms
- 1 (2-ounce) package vermicelli bean thread noodles

- 3 to 4 carrots, grated
- 1 (8-ounce) can bamboo shoots
- 1 tablespoon sesame oil or vegetable oil
- 2 pounds ground pork
- 2 tablespoons chicken bullion
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 pepper
- 1 tablespoon oyster sauce
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon sesame oil

**For the paste:**  
 3 1/2 tablespoons flour  
 3 tablespoons water

**Hydrate mushrooms** in 2 cups of cold water for at least 24 hours. If you don't have 24 hours, break mushrooms in half and add a pinch of sugar for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

**Add enough** cold water in a saucepan to cover a full package of noodles. Cover and wait until most of the noodles are clear (though some will still be white), about 30 to 60 minutes. Drain noodles and add 1/4 cup of the water from hydrating the mushrooms. **Slice all** the vegetables. **Warm** a frying pan. When it's hot, add 1 tablespoon sesame or vegetable oil and brown the pork. Add sliced vegetables, noodles and mushrooms. Cook until vegetables are tender, and drain liquid. Mix

1/2 cup water with chicken bullion and pour over vegetables. Add salt, pepper, soy sauce, oyster sauce and 1 tablespoon sesame oil. **Put this filling** in wrappers and roll, pulling corners in as directed on the package. Use a flour paste to seal the wraps. Put in deep-fryer and cook until brown, about 5 minutes.

# Marinate Steak in Guinness for St. Patrick's Day

As much as I love the dark, velvety richness of Guinness lager, that love isn't strong enough to drag me into an Irish pub on St. Patrick's Day.

I'd rather be at home, avoiding the crowds and enjoying my Guinness both from a pint glass as well as in my cooking. Because Guinness can do wonderful things to your cooking, including help you change up the classic menu while still using traditional Irish flavors.

I didn't create this Guinness-marinated flank steak sandwich with grilled onions and Boursin cheese for St. Patrick's Day per se, but I often serve it on the day because it is spot on. It is a refreshing change from beef stew and corned beef and cabbage.

While this recipe is decidedly not authentic, it's still beef. And the marriage of beef and Guinness is magical. Remember the company slogan, Guinness is good for you. And I say, good for flank steak, too! Flank steak and thick slices of red onion are marinated in pure Guinness, then grilled until they are caramelized on the outside and tender on the inside.

You can serve this dish as a meal with boiled potatoes and cabbage, or serve it on slabs of country bread as a sandwich fit for a leprechaun or a saint.

### Guinness Marinated Flank Steak Sandwiches with Grilled Onions and Boursin Cheese

The depth of flavor from the Guinness marinade is enhanced by a touch of rich herb and garlic cheese that melts on the hot steak and onions. Freeze the cheese to make it easier to shave just enough on the top of the grilled steak and onions. This prevents too much cheese from being layered on when spreading the soft cheese.

Onions are easier to grill without falling apart if you skewer them before cooking. Cut an onion into 1/2-inch thick slices. Thread the center of each onion with a bamboo skewer that has been soaked in water. Place the onion skewers (they look like lollipops) on the cooking grates and turn once halfway through cooking. Start to finish: 30 minutes

active (plus 1 to 2 hours marinating). Servings: 4.

- 2-pound flank steak or London Broil, at least 1-inch thick
- 14.9-ounce can Guinness beer
- 2 large red onions, cut into 1/2-inch slices
- 1 small container Boursin cheese
- Olive oil
- Kosher salt
- Ground black pepper
- 8 thick slices sourdough or country bread

**Use paper towels** to pat dry the steak, then set it in a glass or stainless steel container with a tight cover. Pour the Guinness over the steak and set aside. Cut the onion into 1/2-inch-thick slices. Set the slices on top of the steak, then cover the container and refrigerate for 1 to 2 hours. **Heat a gas** or charcoal grill to medium. Set the cheese in the freezer.

**Remove the meat** and onions from the marinade and pat dry. Brush everything with a thin coat of olive oil, then season with

salt and pepper. **Place steak** and onions on the cooking grate over direct heat and sear for 6 to 8 minutes. Turn the steak and onions and sear on the second side for another 6 to 8 minutes. (Alternatively, you also can sear the steak and onions on a stovetop grill or grill pan for several minutes per side, then finish cooking in a 350-degree oven set on a rack over a sheet pan.)

**Transfer the steak** and onions to a platter. Remove the cheese from the freezer and use a vegetable peeler or paring knife to shave Boursin on top of the steak and onions. Cover with foil and set aside.

**Brush each** slice of bread with oil, then grill them until lightly toasted, about 1 to 2 minutes. Thinly slice the steak, then assemble sandwiches with the bread, steak and onions.

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# KNOW HOW TO STORE, REHEAT FOOD SAFELY

Many Americans make meals out of leftovers. And while everyone knows to refrigerate perishables, not everyone is taking all the proper steps to ensure the next-day food is safe, according to the Institute of Food Technologists, a non-profit society of food science professionals from academia, government and industry.

The group definitely supports leftovers, and even says some foods actually taste better the next day, such as those with spices, because the flavors have time to meld. But be mindful that bacteria can grow in food.

Here are some tips for managing the food properly:

**Refrigeration:** Of course food needs to be refrigerated. But people may not realize that you don't need to cool cooked foods before putting them in modern refrigerators. They are built to cool dishes that are warm to the touch without breaking them, though you can save energy by chilling the food promptly after cooking. You can put it in front of a fan, in an ice bath or divide it into smaller portions in shallow dishes. Just make sure you get the food in there within two hours of cooking, or one hour on hot days.

Do make sure your refrigerator is set at 40 degrees or lower, but use an appliance thermometer rather than relying on the refrigerator displays.

**Storing:** The group recommends thin-walled metal, glass or plastic containers that are no more than two inches deep. Bags, foil and plastic are good for odd-shaped food.

Keep cooked meat for only three to four days. Uncooked meats, poultry and seafood will last only a day or two. Raw roasts, steak and chops can last three to five days. Casseroles, veggies and other side dishes will last three to five days also. Ditto for pie.

**Freezing:** This totally halts bacteria growth in most foods for months. Recommended storage times are more for nutritional value and quality. Uncooked meats can be stored eight to 12 months, while frozen cooked meats will lose flavor after three months. The freezer should be at zero degrees.

**Reheating:** Use a thermometer to ensure proper temperature. Meats should be heated to 165 degrees in the center. Sauces, soups and gravies should be brought to a boil. Never reheat in a crock pot, slow cooker or chafing dish.

Steak and whole cuts of beef or lamb can be left a bit rare when reheated as long as they were initially cooked at a high temperature to sear the surface and kill bacteria. If you use a microwave, use a lower power setting to reheat without overcooking.

# Master the Meatloaf: With Tips from Chefs, You Can Mix Up a Delicious Take on the Classic Dish

Meatloaf is such an American classic that you would think there would be a settled, go-to recipe. Not so.

Meatloaf ranked in the top five online recipe searches last year; it was second on Google and fourth on Yahoo. The relentless pursuit of a better meatloaf doesn't surprise cookbook author and North Carolina native James Villas.

"People just don't understand meatloaf. They really think it's throwing a lot of garbage together," says Villas, who offers seven recipes for meatloaf in his new cookbook, "From the Ground Up." "You have to take it seriously. There's a whole philosophy behind meatloaf."

There are many divides in the meatloaf debate: Free-form or loaf pan? Beef, pork, veal or poultry? In what combination? Coarse ground or finely ground? Ketchup glaze or not? Gravy or no gravy? Bacon or no bacon? (Well, nobody really debates that last one.)

The most amazing thing about meatloaf may be that it's so forgiving. No matter what choices you make on the meatloaf decision tree, you can end up with an excellent result. My go-to recipe came from Cooking Light magazine: It's a sundried tomato and turkey meatloaf served with a red currant and red wine sauce that bakes in a loaf pan. It's not particularly crusty, but the taste is excellent, and the recipe makes one for now and another for later.

Over the past few years, meatloaf has made its way out of the diner, where it has long been a staple. There are excellent restaurant versions: bacon-wrapped thin squares of meatloaf at Lucky 32 in Cary and the smoky slab of meatloaf that is finished on the wood-fired grill at 18 Seaboard in Raleigh.

While their meatloaf methods differ, our experts agreed on a few key points.

First, use panko bread crumbs. These Japanese bread crumbs are fluffier and coarser than the sandy version typically used, which can produce a mushy meatloaf. "Don't substitute Progresso for panko," says chef Jay Pierce of Cary's Lucky 32. "It's not as densely packed."

Second, make your meatloaf a day ahead. This trick is used in restaurant kitchens because the dinner rush is easier if some dishes are made ahead of time. But there is logic to the technique, as 18 Seaboard chef and owner Jason Smith explains: "It tastes better the next day."

And it's easier to slice, which leads to the third tip: For a nice crust, grill or saute slices of meatloaf.

With these techniques, your meatloaf may become as popular as it is at 18 Seaboard, where it makes up 15 percent of sales during lunch, the only time it's on the menu. Smith says, "People compliment us all the time, from little old ladies who make it at home to the man who eats at Herons (a five-diamond restaurant in Cary) on an expense account."

## Sundried Tomato Turkey Meatloaf

I found this recipe in *Cooking Light* magazine several years ago. It makes one loaf to enjoy now and one to stash in the freezer. While the red currant wine sauce may seem superfluous, I think it is essential to the taste of the dish. Yield: 2 meatloaves, 5 servings each.

1/3 cup sun-dried tomatoes (not oil-packed)  
3 slices bread  
1 medium onion  
4 cloves garlic  
1 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
1/2 cup thinly sliced basil  
1/4 cup chopped parsley  
2 1/2 pounds ground turkey  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup red currant jelly  
1/4 cup dry red wine  
1 teaspoon all-purpose flour

**Place sun-dried** tomatoes in a bowl. Cover with boiling water. Let sit for 5 to 8 minutes.

**Preheat oven** to 400 degrees. Coat two metal loaf pans with cooking spray.

**Place bread** in food processor and mince until fine. Place bread crumbs in a large bowl and set aside.

**Mince onion** and garlic in food processor and add to bread crumbs. Drain tomatoes and slice. Then add tomatoes, cheese, basil, parsley, turkey and eggs to the bread crumb mixture. Mix together using hands.

**Divide meatloaf** mixture in two and place in pans. Smooth out the top. To freeze, wrap with plastic wrap, removing as much air as possible and then wrap with heavy duty foil and freeze. Or bake at 400 degrees for 55 minutes or until the internal temperature is 160 degrees.

**Combine red currant** jelly, wine and flour in small saucepan. Bring to a boil and cook for 5 minutes until jelly melts.

## More Meatloaf Tips

Here is some more advice from our experts: **Do not overmix** your meatloaf or it will turn out like a brick. Mix using your hands until the ingredients are just combined. **A free-form** meatloaf allows you to develop a crust on the outside, but it can dry out. Consider this trick: lay slices of bacon on top to baste the meatloaf while cooking but remove 15 minutes before finished to then develop crust.

**If you bake** your meatloaf in a loaf pan,

which ensures a moist loaf, consider draining the fat 15 minutes before the end of the cooking time to develop a crisp top. This method is best served by cooking ahead, which makes slicing the meatloaf easier. If you cut into a loaf-pan-baked meatloaf while it is still hot, it will fall apart.

**Before you** form the meatloaf or place in the loaf pan, make a test patty and cook it to test for seasoning.

## Lucky 32's Meatloaf

Yield: 8 servings.

4 tablespoons butter  
3/4 cup chopped yellow onion  
1/2 cup finely chopped celery with stems and leaves  
2 teaspoons minced fresh garlic  
1/2 cup diced green bell pepper  
1/4 cup chopped green onion  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup half-and-half  
1/2 pound ground pork  
1 1/2 pounds ground chuck  
1 teaspoon Tabasco  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire  
1 teaspoon ground mustard  
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper  
1 tablespoon fresh thyme  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt or to taste  
3/4 teaspoon black pepper or to taste  
1 cup panko bread crumbs  
12 slices bacon

**Preheat oven** to 350 degrees.

**Melt butter** in skillet over medium-high heat and saute onions until golden. Add celery, garlic and bell pepper and saute until tender. Spread vegetables out on a cookie sheet to cool and allow some moisture to evaporate.

**Combine eggs** and half-and-half in a large bowl. Mix until combined. Add sauteed vegetables, pork, beef, Tabasco, Worcestershire, mustard, cayenne pepper, thyme, salt and black pepper. Mix well. Work bread

crumbs into meat mixture by hand and set aside.

**Line a loaf pan** with 12 bacon strips, six on each side, so that the bacon will wrap the meat loaf. Place a strip at the joint where the bottom meets the side of the pan and bring the strip up the side of the pan and allow the excess to fold over the outside of the pan. Continue in this manner alternating from side to side. When bacon is all laid out, place meat mixture in pan. Fold the bacon strips over the top of the loaf, completely wrapping loaf with bacon.

**Place meatloaf** in oven and bake until thermometer inserted in the center reads 160 degrees.

## Savor Cafe's Meatloaf with Sriracha Barbecue Sauce

Savor Cafe chef and co-owner Lori Pearson says she make the meatloaf a day ahead and then heats slices on a gas grill before serving. Yield: 2 three-pound loaves, 6-8 servings each.

2 tablespoons olive oil or bacon fat  
1 green bell pepper, diced  
1/2 red bell pepper, diced  
1/2 diced yellow onion, diced  
6 eggs  
1/4 cup spicy Dijon mustard  
2 tablespoons salt  
2 tablespoons black pepper  
2 cups panko bread crumbs  
5 pounds ground sirloin  
Sriracha Barbecue Sauce (recipe follows)

**Preheat oven** to 350 degrees.

**Heat olive oil** or bacon fat in a large skillet over moderate heat. Saute peppers and onion until tender. Set aside. Let cool.

**Whisk together** eggs, mustard, salt and pepper in large bowl. Once vegetables are cool, add to eggs. Add bread crumbs. Let sit 10 minutes.

**Add ground beef** and lightly knead with hands until thoroughly mixed. Mold meatloaves into rounded ovals in baking dishes. Bake for 50 minutes, rotating dishes in oven after 25 minutes. As meatloaves bake, make Sriracha Barbecue Sauce (recipe below.)

**Slice meatloaf** and serve immediately. Or make meatloaf a day ahead, slice and grill to reheat.

## Sriracha Barbecue Sauce

From chef and owner Lori Pearson of Savor Cafe in Charlotte. Sriracha is an Asian hot sauce widely available in supermarkets.

1/2 onion, cut into chunks  
1/2 red pepper, seeded and cut into chunks  
1/2 green pepper, seeded and cut into chunks  
1 cup spicy barbecue sauce  
1/4 cup ketchup  
2 tablespoons Sriracha sauce

**Place onion** and peppers in a food processor and chop until finely diced. Add barbecue sauce, ketchup and Sriracha sauce and whip together until combined. Serve with Savor Cafe's meatloaf.

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# Love Pasta? 10 Things You Should Know

An editor who sits nearby likes to show me his lunch every day. He presents it for my approval like I'm the Mother Confessor of cooking.

The great thing about this is his enthusiasm. He takes such pride in cooking and packing his own lunch every day. He likes to discuss the smallest details with the seriousness of a scientist.

His regular debate: Pasta. How do you pick the right shape? How do you decide what kind of sauce? Should you rinse it after you cook it?

How can one small thing have so many mysteries?

Actually, I look forward to his daily quizzes. Like my lunch friend, I like thinking about the mysteries of small things. So, here are the 10 things I know about pasta:

**1. Pasta** comes in all shapes and sizes because no single shape is perfect for everything. Thin, smooth noodles need light, smooth sauces. Heavier noodles hold heavier sauces. Flat ribbons are for cheese and cream sauces. Tubes, shells and curls are for chunky sauces with bits of meat and vegetables.

**2. Always** start with a big, deep pot and lots of water. We all need room to reach our full potential.

**3. Temperature** counts: Make sure the water is really boiling. The most efficient way to bring water to a boil is to cover it while it heats. But don't cover the pot while the pasta cooks or it will boil over.

**4. Always** salt the water just before you add the pasta. Salt added to the cooking water will flavor the pasta better than adding it later. If you season it after you cook it, you'll use more salt because it won't get absorbed into the pasta as it swells.

**5. Keep** things stirred up at the beginning. We all get stuck without a little agitation.

**6. Don't** add oil. If you do it right — lots of water at a full boil and stir it at the beginning — your pasta won't stick together. Besides, the oil will keep the sauce from clinging.

**7. When** you drain pasta, save some cooking water. A splash or two of starchy cooking water is magic for pulling a sauce together. (Try this: Put a heatproof serving bowl in the sink and drain some of the pasta water into it as you drain the pot. Use a splash or two of the pasta water as needed, then empty the bowl and add the pasta and sauce to the warm bowl.)

**8. Never** rinse pasta. The starch clinging to it helps it hold onto the sauce.

**9. Strike** while it's hot. If you add hot pasta to hot sauce, it will absorb more sauce and flavor.

**10. Give** things a chance to come together: Cook the pasta until it's almost, but not quite, done, then drain it and add it to the sauce. Add a splash of cooking water. Stir it all together and cook for a couple of minutes longer. Add anything you need to finish it, like cheese or fresh herbs, and serve.

## Fish Tacos Offer New Twist to Lenten Fridays

As many Christians observe Lent, they may discover that going meatless on Fridays — an act of penance — can get a little boring. Coming up with different takes on fish isn't always easy. And there are a half-dozen more Fridays to go.

For something different, try fish tacos. They're easy and fun for kids, too.

Fish tacos are simply floured, battered and pan-fried pieces of fish nestled in a warm tortilla.

They're seasoned with a little kick of spicy cayenne pepper and chili powder. The batter is thin and doesn't puff up when fried. (If that's what you prefer, mix the batter with club soda or beer.)

You can fry these in a skillet instead of deep-frying. Pan-frying eliminates the need for heating up a mess of oil and having that deep-fried smell hanging around.

Once pan-fried, keep them warm in the oven where they will stay crisp. They also can be made in advance and re-crisped in the oven.

These are even great as a leftover. I find it best to reheat them in a toaster oven.

The cabbage adds a nice crunch when you bite into these. You can doctor up the cabbage, too, with a splash of vinegar and some salt and black pepper. And if you don't like cabbage, try some chopped romaine.

The cilantro tartar is a different take on traditional tartar sauce that gets some heat from minced jalapeno peppers. If you chop the jalapeno with the ribs and seeds, be prepared — that's where most of the heat lies.

This recipe uses smallish flour tortillas, but you can use corn tortillas if you like. With either one, a good way to heat them is to microwave them. Place several on a microwave-safe dish, cover with paper towel and wrap with plastic wrap. Microwave 1 to 1 1/2 minutes. Remove from the microwave and let sit a minute before removing the plastic. When you do remove the plastic, do it so the steam escapes away from you.

Here are a few other ideas for fish tacos:

**If you don't** want batter and fry the fish, bake it. Brush with a little oil, season as desired and bake in a 400-degree oven. Bake 10 minutes for every 1-inch of thickness.

**Consider using** shrimp in place of fish. Bake or saute shrimp until they're opaque. Serve with the same cilantro tartar sauce.

**Try different** sauces. Top the tacos with sour cream mixed with lime zest, cilantro and lime juice. Make an avocado sauce by pureeing ripe avocado with lime juice and sour cream until it's the consistency of a sauce. Drizzle over the fish.

**Make pico de gallo.** Mix chopped tomatoes, onions, cilantro, lime juice, a bit of olive oil and vinegar. Season with salt, pepper and a few pinches of sugar to taste. This goes well with any baked fish.

### Fish Tacos with Cilantro Tartar Sauce

Makes: 12 tacos. Preparation time: 15 minutes. Total time: 1 hour. Use any firm fish for this recipe. Mahi-mahi and tilapia work well.

#### For the cilantro tartar:

1 cup low-fat mayonnaise  
1/3 cup chopped cilantro  
1 tablespoon lime juice  
2 tablespoons capers, plus a little caper juice  
1 small jalapeno pepper, minced (with seeds, if desired)

#### For the fish:

1 1/4 to 1 1/2 pounds cod fillets  
1 cup Drake's Crispy Frymix (or favorite fish-fry mix)  
1/3 cup all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1/2 teaspoon chili powder  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1 cup oil for frying  
12 6-inch flour tortillas

#### For serving:

2 cups finely shredded cabbage  
4 green onions, thinly sliced  
1 avocado, halved, pitted, diced

**To make the tartar:** In a small bowl, combine all the tartar ingredients. Set aside. You can make this one day in advance.

**To make the fish:** Rinse and pat dry the cod fillets well. Cut fillets into 2- by 1-inch pieces. Set aside.

**Mix the fry mix** with 1/2 to 3/4 cup water. The batter should be very thin, like pancake batter. On a shallow dish or pie plate, mix the flour, cayenne pepper, chili powder and salt and black pepper.

**Preheat the oven** to 300 degrees.

**When ready** to fry, in a large nonstick skillet, heat the oil over medium-high heat. The oil should cover the bottom and come up at least 1/4 inch in the skillet.

**Working in batches,** dredge several pieces of fish in the flour mixture and then dip in the batter, allowing the excess batter to drip off.

**Place in the hot oil** and fry on all sides until browned, about 5 to 6 minutes.

Transfer to a baking sheet and place in the oven to keep the fish hot. Repeat with remaining fish.

**Microwave** the flour tortillas to warm.

**To assemble,** place some cabbage on each tortilla. Top with 2 to 3 pieces of fish and a dollop of tartar. Garnish with green onions and diced avocado.

## An Irish Stew That Isn't Afraid of a Little Flavor

If you're a purist, Irish stew is one of the easiest dishes to make for St. Patrick's Day.

That's because according to culinary lore, the only ingredients are lamb, potatoes, onions and water. Supposedly, adding anything else clouds the true flavors of the stew. And if you're really going to stay true to tradition, all you're allowed to do is dump those ingredients in a pot (preferably over an open fire) and walk away for the day.

The good news is that making a far more flavorful version of this stew isn't all that difficult, and your efforts are rewarded with a rich, brothy meal with layers of flavor that complement — rather than compete with — the core ingredients.

And no open fire or all-day simmering needed.

### Irish Lamb Stew

Start to finish: 2 hours  
(30 minutes active).  
Servings: 6.

2 pounds lamb stew meat, cut in 1 1/2-inch pieces  
Salt and ground black pepper  
2 tablespoons olive oil  
2 leeks, white parts only, sliced  
2 medium yellow onions, chopped  
1 pound carrots, cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces  
1 pound parsnips, cut into

1 1/2-inch pieces  
1 quart vegetable broth  
3 bay leaves  
3 sprigs fresh thyme  
1 1/2 pound (24 ounces) new potatoes  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

**Season the lamb** with salt and pepper.

**In a large** Dutch oven or heavy bottomed pan over medium-high, heat the oil. Working in batches, Add the lamb to the pan and sear on all sides, making sure not to overcrowd the pan. As each batch is browned, use a slotted spoon or tongs to transfer it to a plate.

**When all** the lamb has been seared, add it all back to the pan. Add the leeks, onions, carrots, parsnips, broth, bay leaves and thyme. Bring the mixture to a simmer, then cover and cook for 1 hour. After 1 hour, add the potatoes and continue to cook until the potatoes and the lamb are tender when pierced with a fork, about another 30 minutes.

**Remove** the bay leaves and thyme stems. Stir in the parsley and season with additional salt and black pepper, if needed.

**'Supercalifragilistic-expialidocious' Composer Dies**

**LONDON** • How do you sum up the work of songwriter Robert B. Sherman? Try one word: "Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious."

The tongue-twisting term, sung by magical nanny Mary Poppins, is like much of Sherman's work — both complex and instantly memorable, for child and adult alike. Once heard, it was never forgotten.

Sherman, an American who died in London at age 86, was half of a sibling partnership that put songs into the mouths of nannies and Cockney chimney sweeps, jungle animals and Parisian felines.

Robert Sherman and his brother Richard composed scores for films including "The Jungle Book," "The Aristocats," "Mary Poppins" and "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang." They also wrote the most-played tune on Earth, "It's a Small World (After All)."

Sherman's agent, Stella Richards, said Tuesday that Sherman died peacefully in London on Monday. Son Jeffrey Sherman paid tribute to his father on Facebook, saying he "wanted to bring happiness to the world and, unquestionably, he succeeded."

Jeffrey Sherman told The Associated Press that his father had learned the craft of songwriting from his own father, Tin Pan Alley composer Al Sherman.

"His rule in writing songs was keep it singable, simple and sincere," Jeffrey Sherman said. "In the simplest things you find something universal."

really very complex. "He was a very simple guy — complex but simple. If you ever want to know about my Dad, listen to the lyrics of his songs."

Robert A. Iger, president and CEO of The Walt Disney Co., said in a statement that the company mourned the loss of "one of the world's greatest songwriters and a true Disney legend." Three Broadway marquees — including The New Amsterdam Theatre, where "Mary Poppins" is playing — were to dim their lights Tuesday night in Sherman's honor.

The Sherman Brothers' career was long, prolific and garlanded with awards. They won two Academy Awards for Walt Disney's 1964 smash "Mary Poppins" — best score and best song, "Chim Chim Cher-ee." They also picked up a Grammy for best movie or TV score.

Their hundreds of credits as joint lyricist and composer also include the films "Winnie the Pooh," "The Slipper and the Rose," "Snoopy Come Home," "Charlotte's Web" and "The Magic of Lassie." Their Broadway musicals included 1974's "Over Here!" and stagings of "Mary Poppins" and "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang" in the mid-2000s.

"Something good happens when we sit down together and work," Richard Sherman told The Associated Press in a 2005 joint interview. "We've been doing it all our lives. Practically since college we've been working together."

The brothers' awards included 23 gold and platinum albums and a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

# PANCETTA: WHAT IT IS AND HOW TO USE IT

Are you about over bacon yet?

Neither am I. In fact, our national obsession with cured pig has only made me all the more eager to explore lesser known — but equally delicious — pork parts.

And there are plenty to choose from. One of the most widely available — yet often overlooked — is pancetta, a close relative of American bacon.

So let's start there. Bacon usually is made from the belly or side of the pig. It is cured (either dry or wet) with salt, spices, and sometimes sugar, then smoked.

Pancetta is the Italian version. Typically made from the belly, the curing process is the same, but the meat usually is not smoked. During curing, it often is seasoned with black pepper, cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon and herbs.

While most American bacon is sliced into thin strips, slabs of pancetta usually are rolled into a log.

And that's how it's sold at the deli. The log can be sliced to any thickness. Most grocers also sell it in packages pre-sliced and, more commonly, cut into thick cubes.

Thanks to smoking, bacon usually has a slightly brownish color; pancetta tends to be bright or deep red.

The flavor of pancetta tends to be clean and assertively bacony — go figure! — and just a bit sweet, especially compared to commercially produced bacon. The curing process for the latter often is as little as a few minutes. Pancetta is cured for days or weeks.

Pancetta can be eaten thinly sliced and raw, similar to prosciutto, but more often it is cooked, which gives it an intensely savory flavor. Think of it as maxed out bacon.

Pancetta is a must-have for authentic carbonara. And browning small chunks of it is a classic start to many Italian recipes.

## Pancetta Hummus with Balsamic Drenched Tomato

*This recipe was inspired by a hummus dish I tried at a Turkish restaurant. The hummus was mixed with crisped salami, then served warm. It was delicious, though not as good as this pancetta version. Start to finish: 15 minutes. Servings: 4.*

4 ounces pancetta, finely cubed  
16-ounce package prepared hummus  
4 large, thick slices sourdough bread, toasted  
2 large tomatoes, cut into thick slices  
1 small red onion, finely diced  
Balsamic vinegar  
Ground black pepper

**In a medium skillet** over medium-high heat, cook the pancetta until crispy and browned, about 5 minutes. Remove the skillet from the heat and add the hummus, mixing well.

**Thickly slather** a quarter of the hummus-pancetta mixture over each slice of bread. Top each with 1 or 2 slices of tomato and a quarter of the red onion.

**Drizzle each** sandwich with balsamic vinegar, then season with pepper. *Per serving: 480 calories; 200 calories from fat (42 percent of total calories); 23 g fat (8 g saturated); 0 g trans fats; 15 mg cholesterol; 52 g carbohydrate; 19 g protein; 9 g fiber; 1,070 mg sodium.*

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## You'll Need a Food Processor to Make This Ratatouille

Carol Newman from Crofton, Md., was searching for a beef ratatouille recipe that she said was in the manual that came with her Sunbeam Le Chef food processor many years ago. She said it was made with thinly sliced beef, eggplant, mushrooms and zucchini.

Barbry Hogue from Bend, Ore., sent in the very recipe Newman was looking for from her copy of the 1979 Sunbeam Le Chef food processor cookbook. She said the booklet is still on her shelf after all these years and that she still uses the food processor.

Clearly, this was a recipe designed for the food processor. All the slicing and dicing can be done with the processor, and that helps make short work of the prep. However, the meat needs to be nearly frozen in order to get it to slice cleanly in the processor. I found it easier to slice the meat by hand with a sharp knife and then use the processor to slice all the vegetables quickly and uniformly. This is a very hearty and tasty dish — just be sure you allow enough cooking time, at least 2 hours, for the meat to get good and tender.

### Beef and Mushroom Ratatouille

Serves 8 to 10.

- 2 1/2 pounds chilled or partially frozen boneless beef shoulder or chuck, sliced in pieces that will fit in food tube opening
- 1/4 cup oil
- 3 medium onions, peeled and quartered
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 can (28 ounces) tomatoes
- 1 tablespoon oregano
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pound fresh mushrooms
- 1 medium eggplant, peeled
- 2 zucchinis, ends trimmed

**With the slicing** disc in position, process strips of beef into slices. Set aside. Heat 2 tablespoons of oil in a large saucepan or Dutch oven. Add half the beef slices and brown them on all sides over medium-high heat. Take care not to crowd the pan. Remove the browned slices; add the remaining oil and beef, and brown. Lift the browned meat from pan and set it aside.

**With steel cutting** blade in place, chop the onions and garlic medium-fine in the food processor. Add them to the drippings in the pan and saute 1 minute. Return the beef to the pan, along with the tomatoes, oregano, salt and pepper. Break the tomatoes into chunks with a spoon. Heat beef mixture to boiling then reduce heat, cover, and simmer about 1 1/2 hours or until the beef is tender, stirring occasionally.

**Rinse the mushrooms** and cut off the tips of stem ends. With the slicing disc in place, process mushrooms. Peel the eggplant and process with the slicing disc. Process zucchini with the slicing disc. Add mushrooms, eggplant and zucchini to the beef mixture in pan. Cover and simmer 30 minutes or until the vegetables are tender, stirring occasionally.

# Give Your Cauliflower Some Welcome Variety; Roast It to Bring Out Sweet Flavor

Cauliflower has come a long way from just sitting on a veggie tray. Several years ago, it was popular in low-carbohydrate diets. When cooked and mashed with milk or cream, it has the texture and nearly the taste of mashed potatoes.

Some may wonder whether you should blanch broccoli or cauliflower before freezing, and then, how to cook it.

These cruciferous vegetables contain properties that may help ward off certain cancers. They also are excellent sources of vitamin C and fiber.

Before freezing broccoli or cauliflower, it's best to blanch or steam them first. For broccoli, trim off the stalks and cut them into pieces; separate the crown into florets. For cauliflower, cut away the stem end and cut the florets from the core, cutting as close to the core as possible.

To blanch, bring a large pot of salted water to a boil and have ready a large bowl of ice water. Place broccoli or cauliflower in the boiling water for about 3 minutes. Drain and immediately plunge into the ice water to stop the cooking. (The icy bath also helps retain the broccoli's color.)

To steam, cut as directed above and steam for 5 minutes. Chill as above.

Once chilled, pack the vegetables in containers or freezer bags. Keep 10 to 12 months in the freezer.

Boiling can make cauliflower watery because it already contains a lot of water. Sauteing works well, but perhaps the best choice is roasting, which brings out cauliflower's sweet flavor.

Choose cauliflower heads that are heavy and creamy white with no dark spots or signs of decay. The cabbage-like leaves should be bright green with no yellowing.

Cauliflower, well-wrapped, keeps a good week in the refrigerator.

To use, remove the leaves and trim the stem end from the core. Cut away the florets from the core, cutting as close to the core as possible. You also can cut the core into small pieces.

To roast, preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Place florets on a baking sheet, drizzle with olive oil and sprinkle with a few pinches of kosher or sea salt; toss to coat. Roast about 20 to 25 minutes or until the florets are slightly golden.

Another roasting option is to cut the cauliflower into steaks. Trim the stem end away and steady the whole head, core side down. Slice into 1/2- to 1-inch-thick pieces. Place on a sided roasting pan that's been drizzled with olive oil. Give the cauliflower another drizzle of oil and season as desired. Roast until nicely browned on both sides, about 10 minutes per side.

### Sauteed Cauliflower with Israeli Couscous

Makes: 6 side dish servings. Preparation time: 15 minutes. Total time: 30 minutes. Look for Israeli, also called pearl, couscous in the ethnic aisle of some grocery stores. It's sold plain or tri-color. Israeli couscous grains are larger than traditional couscous. Adapted

from Food Network magazine, January/February 2011 issue.

- 1 1/2 cups Israeli (pearl) couscous
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 4 cups cauliflower florets
- 1 small shallot, peeled, sliced
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- Pinch of cinnamon, optional
- 1/4 cup dried tart cherries or golden raisins
- 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley or snipped chives

**Cook the couscous** according to package directions until just tender. Drain if needed; set aside.

**In a large** skillet, heat the olive oil. Add the cauliflower and shallots and saute about 5 minutes or until the florets are slightly browned. Season with salt and pepper and cinnamon, if using. Add the cherries and saute about 2 minutes. Stir in the cooked couscous and red wine vinegar. Taste and adjust seasoning if needed. Sprinkle with chopped parsley or chives and serve hot.

### Mac and Cheese-style Cauliflower

Makes: 8 (1 cup) servings.

Preparation time: 15 minutes. Total time: 1 hour.

Look for nutritional yeast at health food stores and some grocery stores. It's adds a cheesy and nutty flavor to many dishes. It's optional in this recipe. To make your own bread crumbs, tear firm, fresh bread into pieces and whirl in a food processor or blender until crumbs form. Adapted from *Vegetarian Times* magazine, January/February 2012 issue.

- 8 heaping cups cauliflower florets
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 shallot, peeled, minced
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled, minced
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 2 cups 1 percent low-fat milk
- 2 cups grated extra-sharp Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup nutritional yeast, optional
- 1 pinch cayenne pepper
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 1/2 cups fresh bread crumbs or panko bread crumbs
- Fresh chopped parsley or snipped chives for garnish, optional

**Preheat oven** to 350 degrees. Coat the bottom of a 13-by-9-inch baking dish with cooking spray and set

aside. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add cauliflower florets and boil 5 to 7 minutes or until just tender. Drain and reserve 1 cup cooking liquid; set aside.

**In the same pot**, melt the butter over medium heat. Add shallots and garlic and saute about 2 minutes. Whisk in flour and cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Whisk in milk and 1/2 cup of the reserved cooking liquid; cook 7 to 10 minutes or until sauce is thickened, whisking constantly. If the sauce is too thick at this point, add more of the reserved cooking liquid. Remove from heat and stir in cheese, nutritional yeast, cayenne pepper and egg yolks until cheese is melted. Fold in cauliflower.

**Spread cauliflower** mixture in the baking dish. Sprinkle with bread crumbs. Spray bread crumbs with cooking spray. Bake 30 minutes or until casserole is hot and bubbly and bread crumbs are crisp and brown. Garnish with fresh chopped parsley or chives, if desired.

### Crispy Cheese Cauliflower

Serves: 4. Preparation time: 15 minutes. Total

time: 35 minutes. To toast the panko bread crumbs, use a toaster oven. Or place them on a small pan and toast in the oven while it's preheating. Watch carefully, because they burn easily. Adapted from *USA Weekend* magazine.

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 cup freshly grated or shredded Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 cup plain panko bread crumbs, toasted
- Cayenne pepper to taste
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- Salt and black pepper, to taste
- 1/2 large head cauliflower, separated into medium-size florets (about 3 1/2 to 4 cups)
- 1/2 cup finely chopped parsley

**Preheat oven** to 450 degrees. Spray a baking sheet with nonstick spray. Place the egg whites in a bowl and whisk until frothy. In a pie plate, combine cheese, panko, cayenne, Italian seasoning, salt and pepper.

**Dredge cauliflower** florets in egg white and then roll in the cheese mixture. **Place on** the baking sheet. Bake 15 minutes. Remove to plate and sprinkle with parsley. Serve as a side dish.

# Report: Colts, Manning Breaking Up

**INDIANAPOLIS** • The Peyton Manning era in Indianapolis is expected to end today, according to a report.

Citing anonymous sources, ESPN reported Tuesday that the Colts plan to hold a news conference to announce the long-expected decision. Manning is expected to attend.

Team owner Jim Irsay and Manning's agent, Tom Condon, did not immediately respond to messages left by The Associated Press. Team spokesman Avis Roper said he could not confirm the decision or the news conference because Irsay was out of town and unreachable.

Manning turns 36 later this month, and missed the entire 2011 season after a third neck surgery. Before that, he'd never missed a game in his 13 NFL seasons.

He is owed a \$28 million roster bonus on Thursday, and with the Colts holding the top draft pick, they apparently have decided it was too risky and pricey to keep the four-time league MVP.

Manning led the Colts to the 2006

NFL title, and in 2009 he brought the Colts to the cusp of history with a 14-0 start.

It's been bad news ever since. The Colts pulled their starters against the New York Jets and lost the final two games that season. Indy then wound up losing to New Orleans in the Super Bowl. During the offseason, Manning had the first of his neck surgeries.

Then, after making an early playoff exit in the 2010 season, Manning underwent another neck surgery to repair a damaged nerve that was causing weakness in his throwing arm.

Last July, Irsay signed Manning to a new five-year, \$90 million contract extension that everyone expected would keep Manning in Indy for the rest of his career.

But when the nerve did not heal as quickly as anticipated, Manning had two vertebrae fused together in September, a surgery that forced him to miss the first game of his career. There are still questions about how strong Manning's arm is.

But there is no doubt about the impact he's had on Indy's franchise over the past 14 seasons.

# Saints GM, Coach Admit Bounty Blame

Almost a week after the NFL pointed to them for failing to stop a bounty program involving some two dozen Saints players, coach Sean Payton and general manager Mickey Loomis apologized and took the blame for violations that "happened under our watch."

"These are serious violations and we understand the negative impact it has had on our game," Payton and Loomis added. "Both of us have made it clear within our organization that this will never happen again, and make that same promise to the NFL and most importantly to all of our fans," Payton and Loomis said in a joint statement Tuesday.

Payton and Loomis also said New Orleans owner Tom Benson "had nothing to do" with the bounty pool.

"We acknowledge that the violations disclosed by the NFL during their investigation of our club happened under our watch. We take full responsibility," they said.

The league's investigation, released last Friday, said the bounty program was funded primarily by players for the past three seasons and was overseen by former Saints defensive coordinator Gregg Williams. He admitted to running the program and apologized within hours after the report surfaced.

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# March's Madness in Full Swing This Week

The madness of March kicked off over the weekend with some wild finishes and the first NCAA tournament berths.

Now, it's time for the big boys to get going.

After teams like No. 11 Murray State, Virginia Commonwealth and Creighton secured spots in the 68-team bracket, all the major conferences will play their tournaments this week.

There's still plenty to be decided and the possibility of some must-watch games, so if you're a college hoops fan it might be time to stock

the fridge and check the vacation schedule at work.

This should be good.

**Big East, Through Saturday, New York.** The BEast is typically one of the most difficult conference tournaments to get through and this year's should be no different. No. 2 Syracuse is the favorite after finishing the regular season 30-1 and 17-1 in conference, the lone loss coming while Fab Melo was suspended. It doesn't figure to be easy for the Orange, though. Not only is Syracuse dealing with the distraction of self-reported violations of its own drug code, it's had some squeakers down the stretch. The Big East is also loaded with eight, possibly even nine teams with a shot at getting into the NCAA tournament. No. 9 Marquette played well down the stretch, while No. 13 Georgetown, No. 23 Notre Dame, Louisville and Cincinnati appear to have their NCAA invites waiting. Defending national champion Connecticut, South Florida, West Virginia and Seton Hall all could use a good conference tournament, so there figures to be hard-fought games from the start at Madison Square Garden.

**ACC, Thursday-Sunday in Atlanta.** North Carolina, Duke. That's all you need to know

about this conference tournament. OK, maybe not all, but the possibility of a third matchup between these rivals makes the ACC tourney worth watching. The sixth-ranked Blue Devils won the first matchup on freshman Austin Rivers' buzzer-beating 3-pointer — you know, the one you've seen on ESPN hundreds of times — but the fourth-ranked Tar Heels got their revenge last week by routing Duke. But before we get ahead of ourselves and lock those two neighboring teams into the final, don't forget about No. 17 Florida State. The Seminoles beat Duke and North Carolina in January and finished third in the ACC. Virginia and North Carolina State also are angling for NCAA bids, so keep an eye on them.

**Big 12, Today-Saturday in Kansas City, Mo.** Another season, another conference title for No. 3 Kansas. The Jayhawks earned their eighth straight Big 12 title in the regular season and will head into the conference tournament as the No. 1 seed. Again, Kansas can lock up a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament if it wins the Big 12 tournament and could even sneak in if it loses. Either way, it's not going to be an easy run for the Jayhawks. No. 5 Missouri beat Kansas in February and No. 25 Iowa State, making its own bid for an NCAA invite, also knocked off the Jayhawks. No. 12 Baylor is capable of beating anyone at any time, too. The marquee matchup in the

final would be another Border War between Tigers and Jayhawks. Could be right up there with Duke-Carolina III.

**Big Ten, Thursday-Sunday, Indianapolis.** The regular season was a weekly beatdown and the battles figure to continue in Indy. No. 8 Michigan State appeared to be a lock to win the regular-season title, taking a two-game lead with two games left. The Spartans tripped up, though, losing to No. 15 Indiana, then blew a 15-point lead to lose to No. 7 Ohio State on Sunday in what coach Tom Izzo called the toughest loss in his 17 years in East Lansing. That created a three-way tie between Michigan State, Ohio State and Michigan. The conference tournament will feature five teams in the Top 25 — Wisconsin is No. 14 — so every game, even the first-round ones, has the potential to go down to the wire. Ohio State has to be the favorite heading in, particularly after Michigan State freshman Brandon Dawson went down with a knee injury.

**SEC, Thursday-Saturday, New Orleans.** Top-ranked Kentucky is the clear favorite after setting a school record with 30 regular-season wins and becoming the third team since Alabama in 1956 to go unbeaten in SEC play. What the conference tournament likely will determine is whether the Wildcats get a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament — they may get one even with a

loss — and how many teams get in. The SEC could be in line to get six teams into the big bracket, but the games will have to fall just the right way. Tennessee and Vanderbilt should have good enough resumes to get in and No. 22 Florida will likely get a nod despite struggling at the end of the season. Alabama, Ole Miss and Mississippi State could use a good run through the tournament and Arkansas may have to get the automatic bid after losing five of its final six games.

**Pac-12, Today-Saturday, Los Angeles.** A down year in the Pac-12 could mean an ugly selection Sunday. Yes, just one bid. Washington won the regular-season title, but could be left out if it doesn't win the conference tournament. Even though it didn't win the regular-season title, California has been pegged as the team with the best chance at getting an NCAA tournament invite, but that could go away quickly with a weak conference tournament. Arizona appeared to be in line for an at-large NCAA bid after winning seven of eight games, only to end the season with a loss to Arizona State, which could be an inexcusable setback in the eyes of the NCAA tournament selection committee. Oregon also is considered to be on the bubble and the conference was so, uh, competitive that five or six different teams could end up earning the automatic berth.

The NFL said it confirmed Benson was unaware of the program, and that he told Loomis to stop it immediately, but that Loomis did not. The league also said Payton, though not directly involved, was aware of the bounty pool, but did nothing to stop it.

Williams now is defensive coordinator for the St. Louis Rams. He met with NFL security officials on Monday as part of the league's on-going investigation.

Once it concludes — the league says there is no timetable — Roger Goodell likely will hand out the stiffest penalties of his 5½ years as commissioner.

Goodell has frequently taken a hard line on any action that threatens player safety. He suspended Detroit's Ndamukong Suh for two games for stomping on an opponent last season; banned Pittsburgh's James Harrison for one game after a series of flagrant hits that culminated in a collision with Cleveland quarterback Colt McCoy's helmet; and has ramped up the amount of fines for what the league terms "egregious hits."

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said before handing out any penalties, Goodell will review the information with his staff and consult with others, including the union and player leaders.

The players' union has not seen a full report of the investigation, so it can't be certain if Goodell will levy punishment under the on-field discipline or the personal conduct policy. There's a major distinction, because players can appeal on-field punishment to independent arbitrators Art Shell and Ted Cottrell. Appeals under the personal conduct policy are heard by Goodell and other league officials.

"The commissioner has broad authority to impose discipline for violation of league rules. We're not going to put it in a category right now," Aiello said.

The NFL hasn't cited specific players, but fines and suspensions are probable for those found to have participated in the bounty program.

"We take this issue seriously and we continue to look into it," union spokesman George Atallah said.

Goodell fined the New England Patriots \$250,000 and their coach, Bill Belichick, \$500,000 for the Spygate scandal in 2007, when the team was caught illegally videotaping the Jets' sideline. New England also was stripped of a first-round draft pick.

That violation pales in comparison to a bounty of up to \$50,000 over the last three seasons that rewarded players for knocking targeted opponents out of games. The Saints can expect heavier sanctions than those given the Patriots, with suspensions likely for Loomis and Payton and a seven-figure fine for the organization.

I thought our chemistry last year was special, I thought our guards last year were special. I think we have very similar chemistry this year," said CSI head coach Steve Gosar. "I do think we have a special inside core in those guys. They each bring something different to the team and they all look out for one another."

At 7-0, 270-pounds, Bunch is the team's intimidator in the paint. Playing just 11.6 minutes per game, he averages 1.7 blocks and 4.4 rebounds and his massive size disrupts a dozen plays a game.

"If they come into the paint, they know they're going to get it thrown right back into their face," said Bunch, who missed the first round of the season due to a concussion.

He made his season debut Dec. 2 against Laramie County and for the past month has been in the starting lineup for the fourth-ranked Golden Eagles (27-3, 13-2 Scenic West).

"We threw him in, taught him some plays and banked on what he learned last year. Thanks heavens, he retained quite a bit of it," Gosar said. "He played through being tired, he made some big stops and is a game-changer inside."

Bunch brings the bulk, while the 6-8 Egwuonwu brings an athleticism which rivals that of his shorter, quicker teammates.

Egwuonwu can defend point guards, he can guard the low post, and he can blow up a pick and roll. He grabs rebounds (6.3 a game) and he can score (season-high 13). Gosar praised Egwuonwu's versatility and his savvy on the defensive end.

"I see one play ahead, one pass ahead. If someone is going to get beat, I can help them out," said Egwuonwu, who played at Northwest Nazarene last season. "My last school, I scored a ton of points, but we didn't win a lot of games. I realized that to win, you have to play defense. I've really bought into that."

Santo buys into just about anything the team needs him to do.

A skilled jump shooter, Santo's

greatest skill might actually be the dirty work of taking a charge, something he had never done before arriving from Brazil as a freshman last season.

"I never had one. I didn't know what to do. When I came in, they told me, 'Every one you get, you get a pair of socks,'" said Santo, who averages six points and four rebounds. "I learned how to fall back. I just wait for them to touch me and I fall back. I don't even know how many pair of socks I have now."

Santo was a key bench contributor to last year's championship squad and has taken on more of a leadership role this season, he said, trying to model himself after Jackson, Smith and Mitch Bruneel.

"He's a tremendous competitor and his passion for the game and passion for the team makes him such a joy to coach," Gosar said.

The last piece of the frontcourt puzzle might be the most important if CSI is going to repeat as national champions.

Cothron has the gaudy stats: 15.4 points, 8.7 rebounds and 2.7 blocks,

but most of those numbers came in nonconference play before being suspended for most of February. He has the gaudy recruiting profile: UNLV and Kansas are interested in the 6-8 forward, but he has struggled with consistency on defense.

He returned against North Idaho two weeks ago, but played sparingly. This weekend, however, Cothron recorded a double-double in just 11 minutes against USU-Eastern Utah and scored 13 points against Colorado Northwestern.

"We saw some wonderful things at Eastern Utah and at Colorado Northwestern, some big-time post moves and rebounds," Gosar said. "That is what we need, and we also need that on the defensive end. That attention to detail. If we can get him to help us on the defensive end, he could be an immense help to us."

Said Bunch of the front court foursome: "No one can guard us. When teams go to man-to-man, it's over. They know what time it is when they do that. No one can stop us. No one is coming into the paint against us."

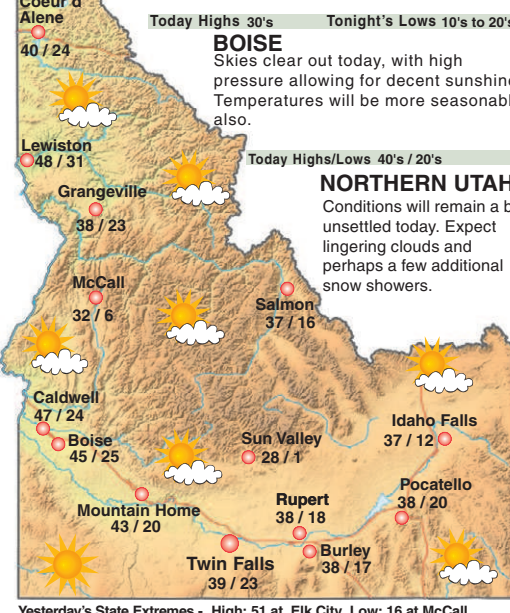

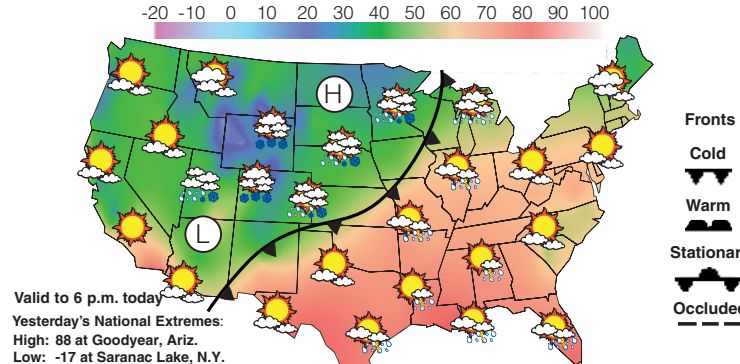

# WGC Events Gaining Traction

**DORAL, Fla.** • Tiger Woods already has left his own mark in world golf.

History will decide what it means.

The number that defines greatness in golf is 18. It has been that way since 1986, when Jack Nicklaus won his 18th professional major at the Masters. And it will stay that way unless — or until — Woods wins the five more majors he needs to pass him.

"While he has been gone for 2½ years, these guys who have all learned how to play, or all learned how to win, are probably no longer afraid of Tiger," Nicklaus said. "In my opinion, I still think Tiger will regain what he does. He will come back and play very, very well. Whether he breaks my record is another issue. I still think he will. But he still has to go do it."

If not, Woods might have to settle for another standard.

The next step below the majors are the World Golf Championships, and Woods has amassed an amazing record. When he last won a WGC at Firestone in 2009, that gave him 16 world titles out of the 32 he played, an astounding rate of 50 percent.

What does that mean?

For one thing, he has padded his bank account. Woods has made more than \$22.2 million in the WGCs alone, which is nearly 25 percent of his career PGA Tour earnings. His official WGC money is more than all but 25 players have made in their careers.

More than money, and more than trophies that probably are packed away in a box, it means that Woods won 16 events against the best players in golf. The fields are small, and they tend to include players from overseas who are just getting started (Louis Oosthuizen) or might never be

heard from again (Shiv Kapur). But for most of their 13-year existence, they have included at least the top 50 in the world.

The World Golf Championships are still not what they should be.

Along with bringing together the best players from all corners of the globe, it would help to take the tournaments around the world. And if they are mostly going to be in America, it would be better to move them to iconic venues instead of merging them with former PGA Tour events, which is what happened at Doral.

They deserve a higher status based on the players they attract and the winners they produce.

Hunter Mahan joined elite company two weeks ago when he won the Match Play Championship and became only the sixth player to win multiple WGC events. The others are familiar names — Woods, Phil Mickelson, Ernie Els, Geoff Ogilvy and Darren Clarke.

Martin Kaymer won the HSBC Champions last November and became the 10th player with a WGC title and a major. He joined Woods, Mickelson, Els, Ogilvy, Clarke, Mike Weir, Stewart Cink, David Toms and Vijay Singh.

The WGC event this week at Doral used to travel to Europe every other year until 2006. Woods has won it six times on six courses in four countries. That gives it a little more punch than winning the Bridgestone Invitational seven times, all at Firestone.

"I think Tiger gave them credibility by winning 14 of the first 20, or whatever it was. He won almost every one of them," Ogilvy said. "If you do look at the list of guys who have won them, generally, at that time they were one of the best in the world."

That's because the best in the world are there.

In that respect, it can make them the most difficult events to win next to the majors. The majors have history and prestige, and with that comes pressure that cannot be com-

pared with other events.

Paul Azinger is famous for saying cash and prestige are the only things that made him choke. The WGCs are heavy on cash.

These aren't the best 74 players in the world at Doral, rather 74 top players who qualified through the world ranking of the money lists on the six major tours.

Then again, the majors have their share of players who can't be considered serious contenders — aging champions at the Masters, amateur qualifiers at the Opens, club pros at the PGA Championship.

What might boost the credibility of the WGCs is to expand the field and introduce a cut. To some, the WGCs have the appearance of free money. The courses? No one can argue with Firestone, which once hosted a PGA Championship. And while Doral has produced a winning score of at least 16-under par the last four years, a course doesn't have to have high scores to be a good test.

# Few Complaints for New NCAA's TV Format

**NEW YORK** • Turner Sports chief David Levy had dinner with his new partners at CBS before last year's NCAA tournament and wondered why they kept predicting lots of calls from upset viewers.

CBS was accustomed to hearing complaints from fans frustrated by its decisions in switching among games. Sure, executives at both companies were confident their 14-year, \$10.8 billion deal to televise every tournament game in its entirety across four networks would better serve viewers. But even at their most optimistic, they didn't expect the reaction to be so positive so quickly.

"We have not helped the economy because the freelance employees we hired to man the phones are no longer being hired," CBS Sports Chair Sean McManus said Tuesday.

A survey commissioned by CBS and Turner found that 91 percent of respondents preferred the new format to the old one. Even taking that with a grain of salt, other numbers back it up.

Average viewership for the tournament was up 7 percent from a year earlier, when games were only on CBS. The tourney averaged its highest rating since 2005.

Games were watched by 12 million new in-home viewers, and returning viewers increased their time spent by 24 percent. And a figure advertisers like to see: The median age of the audience dropped from 49 to 46 and viewership increased 21 percent among adults ages 18-34.

Levy said the most surprising stat might have been how many fans stuck with a game from start to finish, even if it was a blowout. That was always the dilemma CBS faced — whether it stayed with a rout or switched to a closer contest, somebody was always unhappy.

Network executives were heartened to see corresponding shifts in viewership immediately after an announcer with a lopsided score informed viewers of a tight finish on another channel.

"For those in the truck and for the announcers, it's very unnatural to be in the middle of your game that you're producing and directing and announcing and having someone ... saying, 'You need to tell the viewers to leave your game to go to this game,'" said Jeff Behnke, senior vice president and executive producer for Turner Sports.

But they quickly grew comfortable with it, and this year flashing colors and subtle audio in the graphic showing other scores will further encourage viewers to pick up the remote.

The biggest change in 2012 is that some fans will no longer be able to watch every game for free online.

Most, but not all, viewers who get TBS, TNT and truTV on their cable or satellite systems will be able to watch games aired on those channels online at no cost. Fans can also pay \$3.99 to see every game on multiple platforms — online, mobile and tablet. Games on CBS will still be free online. Levy said he was confident fans would quickly learn how to "authenticate" so they can watch the Turner networks online just as they rapidly figured out how to find truTV last year.

# Prince Harry Runs with Usain Bolt in Jamaica

**KINGSTON, Jamaica** • It wasn't much of a race, but then it really couldn't have been as the world's fastest man and Britain's Prince Harry met up on a track Tuesday in the Jamaican capital.

blazoned with Jamaica's colors of green, black and gold, the prince got off to a false start and was about 50 meters down the track as Usain Bolt bent over with laughter. The Olympic medalist then jogged up to a grinning Harry, making one of his signature skyward points for a crowd of onlookers at the

University of the West Indies in the Jamaican capital.

Harry then joined Bolt for a few pointing poses to an appreciative crowd.

Later, the two exchanged pleasantries and talked about running for a small audience, including many athletes. The prince noted Jamaica's international rep-

utation as a track and field powerhouse and said it was impressive for a small nation of nearly 3 million.

"Don't go running off to America because you have a clear talent your country needs," he told a group of up-and-coming Jamaican athletes as he sat beside Bolt.

**THE ACES ON BRIDGE** Bobby Wolff

*"And new foul tricks unguessed before Will win and justify this War."*

Martin Schaltz is furthering the Danish Schaltz family's illustrious bridge tradition — he is the third generation of bridge players to gain international status. In this deal he sat East in the Youth Individual Tournament at the first World Mind Sports Games.

Against two spades West led the club queen, taken by South's king. South, eyeing dummy's trump void philosophically, played the spade ace, then a low spade, won by East's 10. Schaltz now tabled the heart queen, which declarer instinctively ducked. South naturally expected East to hold the heart jack as well, with the ace in West's hand. His thinking was that with the heart 10 on the table, he was "guaranteed" a heart trick. If East continued with the heart jack, he would cover; the ace would win, establishing dummy's 10. And should East next play a low heart, South would duck, and West's ace would beat the air.

But none of this logical reasoning allowed for Schaltz's trickery. East continued with a low heart, South confidently ducked — but it was West who won with the jack. Back came a heart to East's ace, and only now did Schaltz give his partner the club ruff. West cooperated in this fine defense by returning his fourth heart, enabling East to ruff with his last trump, the queen.

With the spade king and diamond ace still to come, it was the defenders who made the requisite eight tricks, leaving declarer down three.

## TODAY IN HISTORY

**On this date:**  
In 1793, during the French Revolutionary Wars, France declared war on Spain.

In 1850, in a three-hour speech to the U.S. Senate, Daniel Webster of Massachusetts endorsed the Compromise of 1850 as a means of preserving the Union.

In 1876, Alexander Graham Bell received a patent for his telephone.

In 1911, President William Howard Taft ordered 20,000 troops to patrol the U.S.-Mexico border in response to the Mexican Revolution.

In 1926, the first successful trans-Atlantic radio-telephone conversations took place between New York and London.

In 1936, Adolf Hitler ordered his troops to march into the Rhineland, thereby breaking the Treaty of Versailles and the Locarno Pact.

In 1945, during World War II, U.S. forces crossed the Rhine River at Remagen, Germany, using the damaged but still usable Ludendorff Bridge.

In 1960, Jack Paar returned as host of NBC's "Tonight Show" nearly a month after walking off in a censorship dispute with the network.

In 1965, a march by civil rights demonstrators was broken up in Selma, Ala., by state troopers and a sheriff's posse.

In 1975, the U.S. Senate revised its filibuster rule, allowing 60 senators to limit debate in most cases, instead of the previously required 2/3 of senators present.

In 1981, anti-government guerrillas in Colombia executed kidnapped American Bible translator Chester Bitterman, whom they'd accused of being a CIA agent.

In 1994, the Supreme Court, in *Campbell v. Acuff-Rose Music, Inc.*, ruled that a parody that pokes fun at an original work can be considered "fair use" that doesn't require permission from the copyright holder. (The ruling concerned a parody of the song "Pretty Woman" by the rap group 2 Live Crew.)

**Ten years ago:** The House passed, 417-3, a bill cutting taxes and extending unemployment benefits. By a razor-thin margin, voters in Ireland rejected a government plan to further toughen the country's already strict anti-abortion laws.

**Five years ago:** Sex offender John Evander Couey was found guilty in Miami of kidnapping, raping and murdering 9-year-old Jessica Lunsford, who'd been buried alive. (Couey was sentenced to death, but died of natural causes in September 2009.) Ten people, most of them children, were killed in the Bronx, New York, when fire tore through their home. A suicide attacker blew himself up in a cafe northeast of Baghdad, killing 30 people.

**One year ago:** Reversing course, President Barack Obama approved the resumption of military trials at the U.S. prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, ending a two-year ban. Charlie Sheen was fired from the sitcom "Two and a Half Men" by Warner Bros. Television following repeated misbehavior and weeks of the actor's angry, often-maniac media campaign against his studio bosses.
