Fisher Home No Easy Sell for Hagerman Residents

With the state considering selling author Vardis Fisher's historical homesite, residents in nearby Hagerman have mixed feelings about the land possibly falling into private hands.

HAGERMAN • When state officials first looked at the burnt structure of Vardis Fisher's home, they couldn't help but start thinking of possibilities.

It was 2001 and the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation was looking to attract more visitors to Thousand Springs State Park, increase park revenue and possibly even build a museum dedicated to the "Mountain Man" author's legacy.

However, that dream has slowly faded over the years. The museum was never built, nor was the homesite cleaned up. Instead of wanting to expand, the department is now looking to sell.

Last week, the Legislature approved a measure that would allow Parks and Recreation to prepare to sell the home

Burley Man Escapes Injury in I-84 Crash

Tennessee Good Samaritans helped Mark Miller escape his overturned car before it was hit by a semitrailer early Tuesday morning.

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HANSEN • Mark Miller lost his Honda Accord early Tuesday. All things considered, he's pretty fortunate.

The 37-year-old Burley resident was pulled from his overturned vehicle only moments before it was struck by an eastbound semitrailer traveling on Interstate 84 north of Hansen.

Miller, whom police believe may have been driving under the influence, lost control of his vehicle at about 12:44 a.m., according to an Idaho State Police release.

His car ended up on its top, sprawled across both lanes of the interstate. Moments later, it was rammed by a semitrailer driven by 70-year-old William Fuhrer, of Byron, Calif.

But first, long-haul trucker Lance Pierce, of Nashville, Tenn., safely pulled Miller from his vehicle.

Pierce and his wife, Cynthia, stopped alongside the interstate after witnessing the crash. Cynthia Pierce told the

Across the Border to School

Legislation would give Idaho schools more leverage when it comes to paying other states to teach their students.

TWIN FALLS • For some Idaho students, it's actually faster to get to school in another state.

Four Idaho school districts along the state's borders send students out of state for their kindergarten through 12th-grade education, simply because the schools in places like Nevada and Wyoming are closer.

State Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, has proposed giving the districts some help. But each would still have to decide for itself what's easier — paying to send its students elsewhere, or arranging to bus them in from afar.

Melissa McGrath, communications director for the Idaho State Department of Education, said the bill would give school districts the option to receive additional money to bus students within the state.

"It doesn't mean they have to do that," she said.

The bill passed the Idaho House last week and is scheduled to come up Monday in the Senate Education Committee.

Primary Still Trumps Caucus in Turnout

Despite Super Tuesday excitement, caucus turnout couldn't compare to the accessibility of previous primary elections.

BOISE • Turnout to Idaho's first Republican presidential caucus was huge — Ada County's was the largest for any caucus nationwide, according to the Idaho Republican Party.

But how does it compare to past presidential primary elections?

In the 2008 Republican presidential primary, 4,700 people voted in Twin Falls. On Tuesday, a little more than 2,000 showed up for the county's caucus.

And in Ada County in 2008, about 26,000 cast their ballots for the Republican candidate; 9,000 showed up to caucus this week.

The primaries affected small counties, too. Camas County had 295 voters in 2008, but just 78 showed up to caucus. Minidoka County had 1,915 in 2008, but 847 in 2012.

The week before the caucuses, Jonathan Parker, executive director for the Idaho Republican Party, acknowledged attendance would be a lot lower than for the presidential primaries. That's not an indication of voter apathy, but a reflection of the caucus system's constraints.

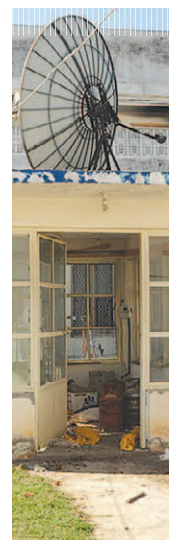
There is no absentee voting, and those participating must be present for the entire event. The combination makes it hard for parents, rural residents and people with night jobs to participate, and impossible for deployed military members and active missionaries.

The tradeoff, Parker said, is attracting national attention and coaxing Republican presidential candidates to visit Idaho and compete for the state's 32 delegates. All four came to the state in the weeks preceding the event.

Another bonus: The crowd's energy. House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, said the Cassia County attendees were "very enthusiastic." And Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, said he saw a lot of new faces at the Twin Falls caucus.

Report: Idaho Wolf Numbers Dip for Second Straight Year

TWIN FALLS • Idaho's wolf populations are at a more controllable level thanks to an increase in hunting kills in 2011, state officials reported.

This is the second consecutive year wolf numbers are down, according to a report from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. The state's wolf population at the end of year was close to 770, down from 850 in 2010.

Federal guidelines require that Idaho's wolf population not dip below 150 and maintains at least 15 breeding pairs. By the end of 2011, state biologists documented 40 breeding pairs.

Fish and Game biologists also reported 101 wolf packs at the end of 2011. These packs are spread out from the Canadian border to Interstate 84, and also roam near Idaho's surrounding

state borders.

"Thanks to Idaho's hunters and trappers, we've made good progress in getting the wolf population under control and into better balance with prey species, such as elk, but we've still got a ways to go," said Jim Unsworth, Idaho Fish and Game deputy director, in a news release.

Almost 300 wolves were killed in Idaho in 2011. Hunters and trappers accounted for 200 deaths while agency control and depredation response kills accounted for more than 60 deaths. The remaining wolves were either killed illegally or their cause of death remains unknown.

The report also noted that wolves killed 71 cattle, 121 sheep, three horses, six dogs and two domestic bison. Almost 50 animals are considered "probable kills" by wolves.

The four affected districts — Bruneau-Grand View, Soda Springs, Swan Valley and Pleasant Valley — span southern Idaho.

All told, it costs ISDE \$1.2 million a year to send the students to other states. But for the 26 who do so in Soda Springs' territory, sending them to Wyoming is considered more feasible.

Max Hemmert, clerk for the southeastern Idaho district, said many of those students live about 80 miles away over a mountain from Soda Springs' schools.

"I don't know how parents will think about bringing them on a bus that distance," he said.

To the southwest, the Bruneau-Grand View School District in Owyhee County is paying almost \$700,000 this year for Nevada officials to educate nearly 60 students living along the border.

The situation got Hartgen's attention four years ago when he became a legislator — his district includes Owyhee County.

School officials told the Associated Press that costs

have increased over the past decade — from about \$7,700 per student in 2002 to more than \$12,000 this year. Superintendent Vickie Chandler didn't return a phone call Wednesday.

Many of the affected students from the Bruneau-Grand View area live in rural, ranching areas. They attend Owyhee Combined School in Owyhee, Nev.

The families of those living within the Duck Valley Indian Reservation don't pay property taxes, Hartgen noted, meaning paying extra to send them to Nevada "really doesn't benefit Idaho in any direct way."

School districts are reimbursed by the ISDE, but there's no limit on the amount of money Idaho will spend. That makes it difficult for school districts to ask for a lower price, McGrath said.

Offering the extra funds for busing gives the districts a second option and

"some leverage to negotiate a better price," Hartgen said.

Of course, the out-of-state schools don't necessarily think it's needed. Jeff Zander, superintendent of the Elko County School District, said his district's tuition agreement with Bruneau-Grand View has been in place for years and is a fair price.

Elko charges based on "what it costs to educate students in a particular attendance area," Zander said. The cost varies based on factors such as enrollment.

"I know that's a significant amount of money for the Bruneau-Grand View School District," he said.

In Elko County, it costs close to \$8,000 to educate each student — but costs are higher for more remote schools. In comparison, McGrath said Idaho spent about \$6,300 per student during the 2009-10 school year.

and the fish hatcheries that accompany it.

"We're looking into all opportunities," said Jennifer Okerlund, Parks and Recreation's spokeswoman. "It might be worth keeping, but we have to look at ways to save the state money."

The Fisher property is located along Fisher Lake. It's a beautiful location but lacks recreational opportunities for visitors, Okerlund said.

One option may be to trade the Fisher property with another site that has more recreational potential, she said.

"The property is limited on recreation," Okerlund said. "The structure is no longer in existence."

The department's recent announcement isn't a surprise to some Hagerman residents, but it's not welcome news, either.

Hagerman Mayor Pete Weir said he's nervous about the possibility of the property being sold to the private sector.

He, too, wanted to see the park's potential come to fruition. He said he was looking forward to the department building equestrian trails and camping sites on the property.

"The property is so unique that you have to wonder if access would be impacted if it was sold to a private owner," Weir said. "Are people going to be able to hunt and fish if it gets sold? These are questions I would like to know."

The property's neighbor, David Tupper, said he also would be sad to see it sold.

"They bought it for a reason," Tupper said. "People use it all the time in the summer, but sometimes it's empty for long periods of time. I guess you could say I have mixed feelings on the state getting rid of it."

The Vardis Fisher home-site is located in Thousand Springs State Park near Hagerman.

To get there, take U.S. Highway 30 to Hagerman and turn east on 2700 South Road. The park unit's entrance is on the north side of the road, about 2 miles from Hagerman, just after the road curves to the south.

A 1-mile walking or riding trail leads past a fish hatchery and to the home-site and Fisher Lake.

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Anti-bullying Bill Sent Back for Revision

Legislators don't condone bullying, but say they're not comfortable with broad legislation that puts educators on the hook for reporting harassment.

BOISE • Anti-bullying legislation isn't dead, but it needs a lot of fixes before it becomes Idaho law.

On Wednesday, the Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee considered a bill to define bullying, outline what responses school teachers and administrators are responsible for, and set up training for school employees. Committee members

identified a number of problems with the bill's structure and language, and recommended amending the legislation before it goes to the Senate for a vote.

Sponsor Sen. Nicole LeFavour, D-Boise, said the law is needed to add protections for students who are bullied.

Legislators' quarrels weren't just with the bill's language. Both dissenting lawmakers and some of those testifying against the

bill emphasized that nobody condoned bullying, but questioned if this proposal was the way to address it.

Jessica Harrison of the Idaho School Boards Association said many school districts have concerns with the broad legislation, especially because it makes school staff responsible for cyberbullying and bullying outside of school property.

"These issues are very difficult to deal with, even when they're confined to the

school setting," Harrison said.

Harrison also pointed out that much of the legislation is unnecessary, as it covers topics already covered in school districts' anti-bullying policies. And, she argued, when school districts are already strapped for cash, asking them to devote more resources to training and reporting bullying is a big burden.

Many parents and educators spoke in favor of the legislation, saying current district regulations aren't enough. Barbara Kemp read a letter on behalf of her 21-

year-old son, who has Asperger Syndrome and was bullied throughout his school years.

"I had thoughts of suicide, and I probably would have gone through with it had I not had a supportive family," she read.

Sen. Sheryl Nuxoll, R-Cottonwood, acknowledged that bullying is a problem, but was concerned that schools, rather than the state, could better address it.

She moved to kill the legislation.

Senate Majority Leader Bart Davis, R-Idaho Falls, pointed out a number of problems with the bill's language, and encouraged LeFavour to work on them.

"I can't support the bill as written," Davis said. "But I can support the concepts that are being proposed."

In the end, the committee agreed with Davis, voting 5-4 to amend the legislation.

Public Can Comment on Judge Cannon's Performance

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

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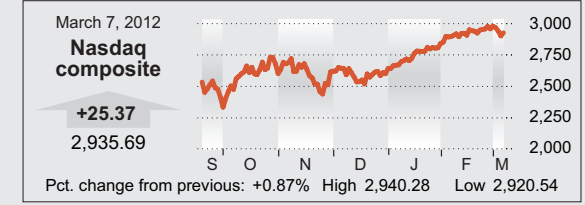
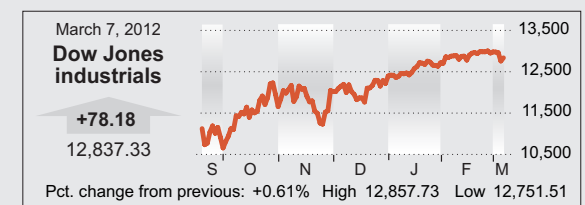

Stocks Close Higher a Day after Big Dive

NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market reclaimed some losses from its biggest dive this year and returned Wednesday to its pattern of steady gains and stable trading. Reassuring reports on productivity and hiring overshadowed worries about the Greek debt crisis. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 78.18 points, or 0.6 percent, at 12,837.33. The S&P 500 index gained 9.27, or 0.7 percent, to close at 1,352.63. The Nasdaq composite index added 25.37, or 0.9 percent, to close at 2,935.69.

Apple Unveils 'New iPad' Touting Sharper Screen, Faster Processor

SAN FRANCISCO • Apple gave the new iPad a bunch of new features but no new name.

When it goes on sale next week in the U.S. and several other countries, it will be “the iPad” or perhaps “the new iPad” — not “iPad 3” or “iPad HD,” as some had speculated.

The lack of a new name could cause confusion for buyers, particularly since the older model, the “iPad 2,” will still be sold.

The new iPad unveiled Wednesday has, as expected, a sharper screen, driven by a faster processing chip that acts as the “brains” of the device. What was more surprising was that the new features mean the tablet computer will be slightly thicker and heavier than the iPad 2, because it needs a larger battery to power the high-resolution screen.

Prices aren’t changing from the previous models. They will start at \$499. Versions capable of accessing cellular networks will cost \$629 to \$829.

Apple is keeping the basic model of the iPad 2 in production and dropping the price to \$399.

The battery life of the new model remains the same:

about 10 hours of use. Apple says the battery capacity is 70 percent higher than for the old model, which suggests that it could have kept the old screen and extended the battery life to 17 hours instead of upgrading the screen resolution.

Apple said the new display will be sharper than the average high-definition television set. In a hands-on demonstration for an Associated Press reporter, text shown on the screen was noticeably crisper. The higher resolution won’t make a dif-

ference, however, for most Web images, which are of low resolution. The new screen should be able to show all the detail in high-definition movies, which the iPad 2 did not. The new screen can also show deeper and more vibrant colors than previous models, Apple said. “We are taking it to a whole new level and are redefining the category that Apple created with the original iPad,” said Apple Inc. CEO Tim Cook at the launch event in San Francisco.

Cook spoke of a “post-PC” era dominated by the iPad and other Apple products. The new iPad will go on sale March 16 in the U.S., Canada and 10 other countries. A week later, it will go on sale in 25 more countries. The latest iPad’s lack of a new name is consistent with Apple’s practices for the iPod. New models have been simply called “iPod.” Consumers are left to figure out which generation of the product they are looking for.

Hiring Grows as Companies Hit Limits with Workers

WASHINGTON • U.S. companies will have to keep hiring steadily to meet their customers’ rising demand.

That’s the message that emerged from a report Wednesday that employers are finding it harder to squeeze more output from their existing staff. It also helps explain why ADP, a payroll provider, estimated Thursday that companies added 216,000 workers last month.

Those findings reinforced confidence that 2012 will mark a turning point for the long-

suffering job market and the economy. Applications for unemployment benefits have tumbled. Consumer confidence is at its highest point in a year. And the stock market has been on a tear since the year began.

Feeding on themselves, those trends tend to fuel further economic growth.

The brighter signs come two days before the government will issue the February employment report. It’s expected to show a third straight month of strong hiring.

Business executives are sensing the shift. A survey released Wednesday by Duke

University’s Fuqua School of Business found that confidence among U.S. chief financial officers has risen to its highest point in a year. As a result, the survey found that companies expect to increase hiring for full-time jobs by 2.1 percent over the next year, up from 1.5 percent in a survey in December.

“This rebound is encouraging because increases in chief financial officer optimism have historically preceded improvements in the overall economy,” said John Graham, a finance professor who directed the survey.

The survey was released the

same day that the government reported a paltry gain in worker productivity at the end of last year. The 0.9 percent annualized increase was half the growth rate from the July-September quarter. Similarly, for the year, U.S. worker productivity grew at its slowest pace in nearly a quarter of century.

Productivity measures output per hour of work. Slower productivity can squeeze corporate profits. But it can lead to more jobs if it shows that companies can’t derive more production from their workers. That often means they must hire to meet customer demand.

After the recession, productivity soared. After laying off staffers, companies managed to make their leaner staffs more efficient. Such productivity growth tends to slow eventually.

“The typical bounce in productivity that we usually see coming out of a recession has run its course,” said Troy Davig, an economist at Barclays Capital. “Firms will likely need to rely increasingly on adding to payroll to increase their output, rather than squeeze existing resources.”

Overworking employees can also dull creativity and lead to less innovation, said Mike

FitzGibbon, co-founder of 3Cinteractive, which builds applications for smartphones.

The company has 12 open positions and plans to add up to 60 jobs this year, on top of its work force of 120, FitzGibbon said. It is analyzing the needs of specific departments to avoid overloading any single employees and determine where hiring is most needed.

FitzGibbon’s inclination to step up hiring reflects a broader trend. The economy has added an average of 200,000 net jobs per month from November through January. That job growth has helped lower the unemployment rate for five straight months to 8.3 percent. Economists predict that more than 200,000 net jobs were added in February, too.

SAGE GROUSE DELAYS WIND PROJECT

BLM defers China Mountain decision for two years to address concerns about the desert-dwelling bird.

ELKO, Nev. • Blame it on the sage grouse.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management is deferring a decision on the China Mountain Wind Project that would straddle the Nevada-Idaho border for two years because of impact to the sage grouse.

David Overcast, the Tuscarora Field Office manager for the Elko BLM District, told Elko County commissioners Wednesday that the BLM Twin Falls and Elko districts chose to wait on a decision until the BLM completes environmental impact statements on conserving the sage grouse to prevent its listing as an endangered species.

Twin Falls District spokeswoman Heather Tiel-Nelson confirmed to the *Times-News* on Wednesday that the delay is also to allow amendments to a resource management plan for the project's Idaho area to incorporate the BLM's new national sage grouse strategy.

"It's an important area,"

Overcast said, reporting that 42 percent of the sage grouse population in a management area is within the proposed project site.

China Mountain has been in the works for several years. Renewable Energy Systems Americas wants to build up to 170 wind turbines along a stretch of Brown's Bench, southwest of Rogerson. The company says the site would generate as much as 400 megawatts of electricity — the first 200 MW of which are slated for a Nevada utility — and create jobs and other economic benefits during construction and throughout its 25-year lifespan.

Suzanne Leta Liou, development manager for RES Americas, said late Wednesday afternoon she was unable to comment on the BLM's decision.

The BLM released a draft environmental review of the proposal about one year ago, gathering public comment on it then.

Elko County commissioners voted Wednesday to send a letter of protest

about the delay. Commissioner Charlie Myers said the letter should express the county's displeasure with the decision because of economic impacts to the county, and protest that the decision was made without public input under the BLM's new interim policies for conserving the sage grouse.

"I am not happy with the decision. It appears to me the company worked hard to mitigate the issue of the sage grouse," Myers said, objecting to the idea that a valuable economic project could be killed by a "stupid bird. That really concerns me."

"We knew you would be concerned, and I will carry your concerns forward," Overcast said.

He said the BLM and wildlife officials looked at a variety of options before deciding to defer the project, and followed the criteria in the new interim policy regarding renewable energy projects.

"We're all just pawns in this thing," said Commissioner Glen Guttry. "... I have no animosity to you folks, you're doing the best you can, but this is very disappointing for the county."

Few Comment at BLM Horse Meeting

KIMBERLY • A federal agency's recent attempt to gather public input on its wild horse management practices didn't quite meet its expectations.

For the second year in a row, the U.S. Bureau of Land Management saw a low turnout to its public hearing on motorized vehicle and helicopter use while gathering wild horses.

The BLM hosts such a meeting every year. However, even though horse gatherers tend to be controversial among animal advocates,

only a handful of people showed up on Wednesday to offer their opinion at the Rock Creek Rural Fire Protection District's Kimberly station.

The two people who did comment at the hearing favored the agency's use of semi-trucks, trailers and pickup trucks in transporting the wild animals.

Tony Ullrich was the first to comment. He wasted no words arguing why he supported the BLM's actions.

"I support it," Ullrich said. "My ideas on using the vehicles are pro. I don't see any other feasible way that you can use."

The Glens Ferry native later said he grew up watching the Saylor Creek wild horse herd and caring for a few of his own. He's now funneling that passion to stay involved in the BLM's wild horse management activities and advocate for better horse welfare across the state.

The hearing ended with BLM spokeswoman Heather Tiel-Nelson reading an emailed comment that opposed the use of motorized vehicles.

"These events are never really popular," she said. "I don't really know why. These are issues people are deeply involved in."

Idaho Officials Fight to Keep Prison Report Sealed

BOISE • Idaho Department of Correction officials say a report on health care and other conditions at a Boise-area prison is so inflammatory that it must remain sealed.

U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill appointed doctor and correctional health care expert Marc Stern last year to see if Idaho is complying with a ruling in a long-running lawsuit brought by inmates at the Idaho State Correctional Institution. Stern's report was filed under seal last month, and the judge ordered attorneys on both sides to review the document to see if any information should be redacted to protect health privacy concerns.

Though they agreed no such redactions were needed, the state says the report should be sealed anyway because the public could mistakenly believe it amounted to the opinion of the court, leading to an "unjustified public scandal."

A hearing on the matter is set for Thursday afternoon.

"The public, and the inmate class members in particular, will likely not understand that at this stage of the proceedings the Report is merely a communication which does not constitute an opinion of the Court," Idaho Deputy Attorney General Colleen Zahn wrote on behalf of the Idaho State Board of Correction.

Zahn said the report has "serious deficiencies" that amounted to more than just the state's disagreement with Stern's findings.

"These deficiencies resulted in inflammatory and unsupported legal findings accusing the Department and its third-party medical contractor, Corizon, Inc., of serious constitutional violations," Zahn wrote.

Circulating those findings would amount to libel, Zahn contends.

But attorneys representing the inmates at the prison argue the state has failed to show compelling reasons to justify keeping the report under seal.

Instead, attorney Allison Blackman with the law firm Stool Rives said, the state simply speculates that laypeople might be confused and then prematurely raises objections to the contents of the report that should instead be brought up later in the court process.

"In reality, it appears defendants bring their motion based on a fear that unsealing the report might subject them to embarrassment, incrimination, or additional litigation," Blackman wrote to the court.

At the least, Blackman contends, the court should allow the inmates who are class-action plaintiffs in the case to have unfettered access to the report. Though the inmates' attorneys have access to the report, and the handful of inmates who were chosen to represent their peers have seen it, none of the inmates have been allowed to bring the documents back to their cells or show it to others at the prison.

The long-running case began in the early 1980s when so many inmates from the Idaho State Correctional Institution began filing lawsuits that the cas-

es threatened to clog Idaho's federal dockets. The judge combined them all into one class-action lawsuit, which became known as the "Balla case" after lead plaintiff Walter Balla.

Over the next three decades, the various federal judges overseeing the lawsuit made three major rulings. They ordered Idaho leaders to stop overcrowding, provide warm clothing to inmates, improve access to medical and psychiatric care and rehabilitation programs, and take other measures to make sure the prison would no longer be, in the words of former U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan, "an extremely violent place to live."

But the case kept bouncing back to the federal courts as inmates maintained that while some issues had improved, problems at the prison continued and wouldn't likely be fixed until Idaho leaders improved prison budgets and facilities. The state, meanwhile, has argued that the prison has changed so dramatically — with new buildings, new contractors, new leaders and evolved policies — that the old Balla rulings essentially focus on a facility that doesn't exist anymore and so are virtually impossible to enforce.

The state contends that if there are still problems at ISCI, inmates should file new lawsuits that accurately reflect the present circumstances.

JFAC SETS MENTAL HEALTH BUDGETS

BOISE • The Joint Finance Appropriations Committee focused on mental health — including state psychiatric hospitals and substance abuse — during its Wednesday budget-setting session. While there were increases to each division's appropriation, not everyone was happy with the amounts.

Sen. Nicole LeFavour, D-Boise, repeatedly voiced her objection to the budgets, saying the state hasn't done enough for Idahoans with mental health problems.

Toward the beginning of the meeting, she passed out

a fact sheet that detailed what she said was proof of shortcomings in the state's mental health treatment. The sheet pointed out that Idaho's mental health general fund expenditures decreased by 22 percent from fiscal years 2008 to 2011, and highlighted recent increases in admittance and recidivism at the state's psychiatric hospitals.

While LeFavour didn't propose alternative budgets, she objected to those proposed.

"Really, the number of dollars we provide in this budget equals treatment directly," LeFavour said.

LeFavour and Rep. Shirley Ringo, D-Moscow, also tried

to add \$309,000 to payments for foster parents. Though they had support from Republicans Sen. Mitch Toryanski and Rep. John Vander Woude, the motion failed.

Budgets set Wednesday ranged from \$19 million for substance abuse treatment and prevention to \$55 million for child welfare. All programs operate under the banner of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Highlights included money for State Hospital South in Blackfoot to hire 10 more employees in fiscal 2013, and \$50,000 to help set up the state's first suicide crisis hot line.

Jail Ordered for Backyard Intruder

TWIN FALLS • A St. Anthony man convicted of indecent exposure and assaulting an officer by a jury was sentenced to jail time Wednesday.

Randy Scott Hill, 42, was sentenced to serve 365 days in jail with 95 days suspended. He was credited for 76 days of time already served for the misdemeanor assault.

He was also sentenced to 180 days in jail for the indecent exposure, with the entire sentence suspended.

Hill also must serve two years of unsupervised probation after he is released from jail. He was ordered to pay \$452.14 in restitution and \$262.50 in fines and fees.

On the early morning of Dec. 24, a man called Twin Falls police reporting that a stranger was masturbating in the backyard of his Second Avenue West home and he had chased him off with a shotgun.

When police arrived they say they found Hill across the alley, again masturbating in an open garage. An

officer attempted to arrest Hill for indecent exposure and said Hill started trying to hit him in the head.

After Hill's thick coat blocked shocks from two officers' Tasers, the officers said they used their collapsible batons as Hill continued to fight. Police say the scuffle ended when Hill fell while trying to throw a lawn chair at them, allowing one officer to use his Taser and arrest Hill.

A motion to dismiss a second indecent exposure charge was filed Monday.

Operation Facelift provides businesses in Magic Valley communities with the paint, light carpentry and volunteer labor needed to improve their curb appeal.



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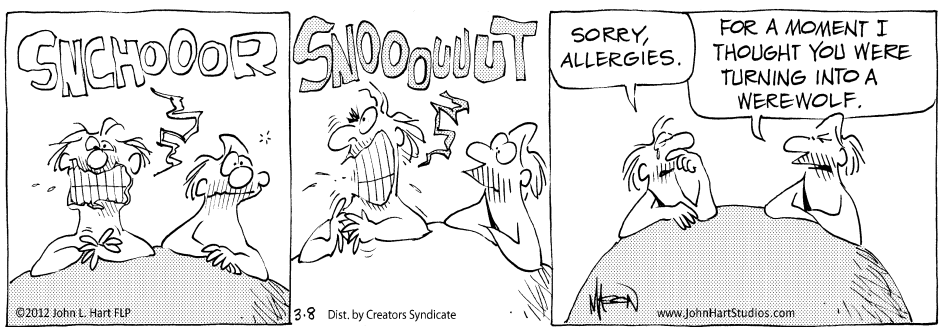
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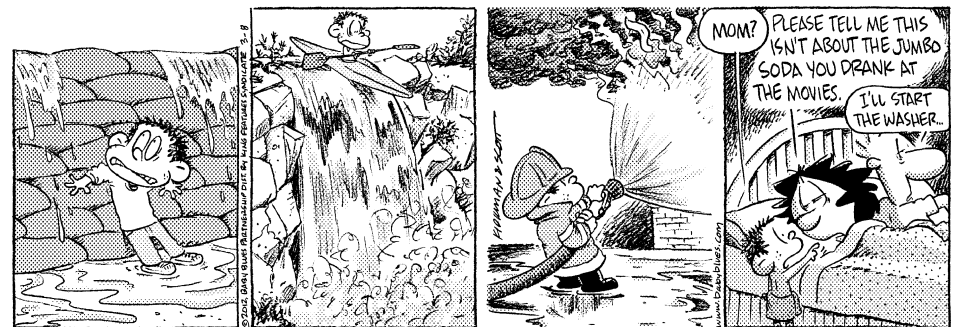
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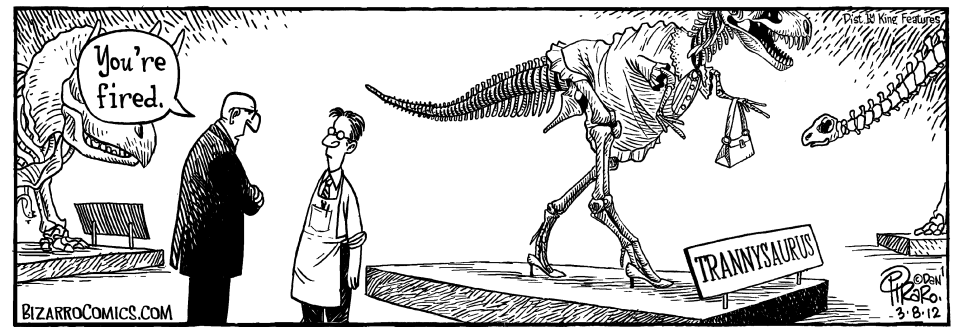

"I'm going to get this nomination."

Mitt Romney, to cheering supporters in Massachusetts before squeezing out a win in pivotal Ohio and capturing four other states with ease Tuesday in the race for the Republican presidential nomination.

Conservatism's Two Faces

Last week, the nation lost an elegant inquisitor and a nasty pugilist. Both were conservatives and natives of Southern California, and they agreed about many matters of policy. But James Q. Wilson delved deeply on matters of significance and left a vast and consequential legacy. Andrew Breitbart raked for muck and accelerated the nation's unhappy race to replace civility with furor. They represented two distinct veins of our national discourse, and of the tensions within modern conservatism.

Breitbart aimed low and spoke at a high pitch. When Sen. Edward M. Kennedy died in 2007, Breitbart wished the senator to "rest in Chappaquiddick" and derided him as a "pile of excrement" and an "unapologetic manslayer." More recently, when he was confronted by Occupy D.C. protesters in Washington, Breitbart screamed, weirdly, shrilly and repeatedly, "Behave yourself!" He called them "filthy, raping, murdering freaks" and demanded that they "stop raping people."

Wilson, meanwhile, spent a lifetime reflecting on deep themes of modern life — the balance between order and expression, the role of police, the uniting human experience of morality. Here is this from his great work, "The Moral Sense": "Beneath our wars, crimes, envies, fanaticisms, persecutions, snobberies and adulteries ... there is a desire not only for praise but praiseworthiness, for fair dealings as well as for good deals, for honor as well as advantage."

I never met Breitbart, who has been described by friends as a gracious and garrulous companion. They surely miss him greatly. But to sympathize with his family and friends is not the same as endorsing his disastrous contribution to our culture. He wounded for fun, flush with arrogance.

Not so with Wilson. Dapper, quiet, modest, Wilson was as interested in the questions as the answers. He was relentlessly critical of glib assumption. He wrote that he was tempted to blame drug abuse or violence or dishonesty on a culture that had drifted from enforcing moral principles. "But I cannot do so with complete confidence," he then added. "It is no easy task to assess the influence of bad ideas on human conduct." It is, to say the least, impossible to

imagine Breitbart writing those words.

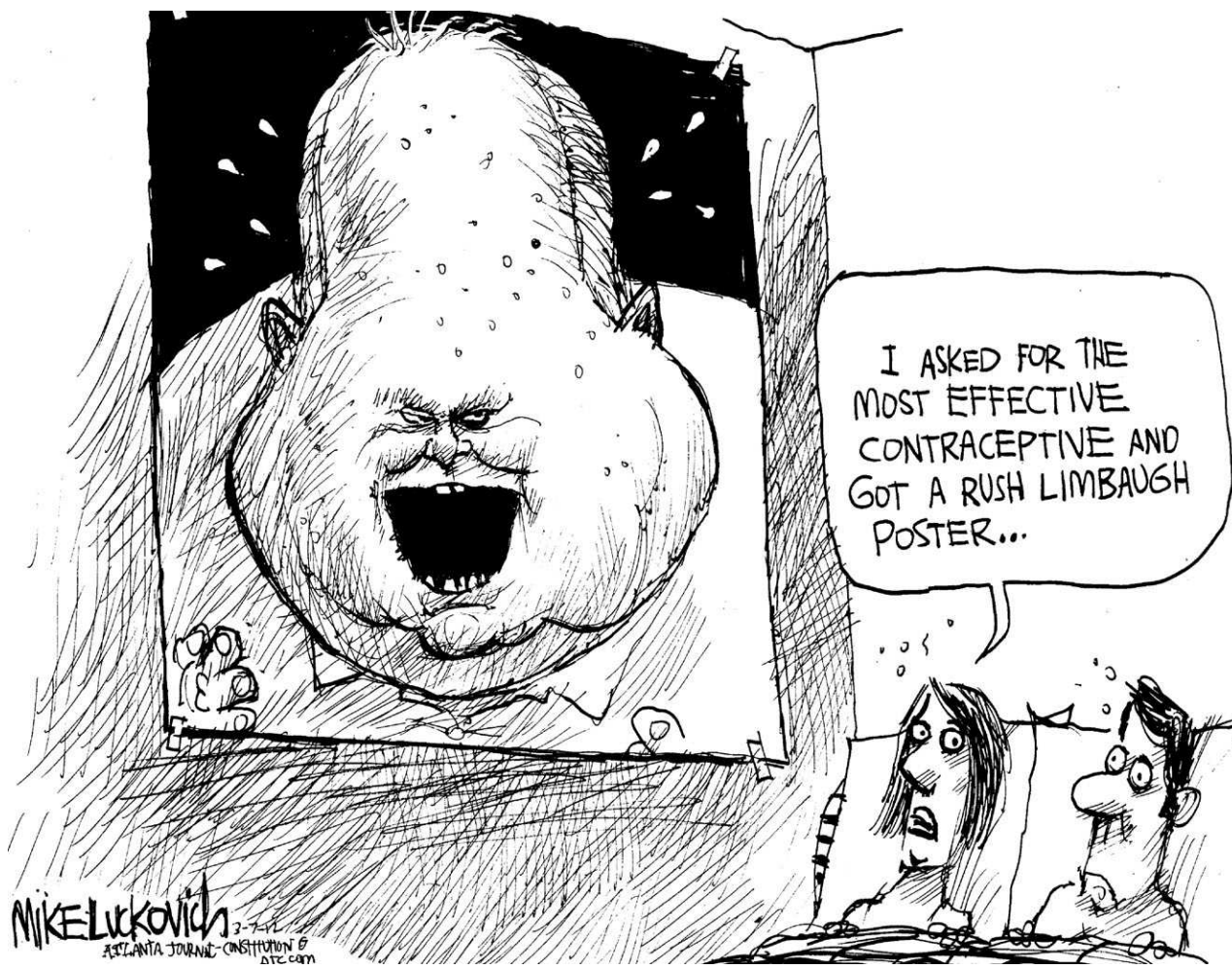
Wilson's eloquence extended across many disciplines, but none had greater impact on the lives of contemporary Americans than his work on policing. In 1982, he and George Kelling coauthored what would become among the most important articles in modern policing, "Broken Windows." In it, they argued that decay was infectious and that focused law enforcement could use small efforts to achieve large results. A broken window that was ignored sent a message to criminals that they could freely operate in the neighborhood. Fixing these small signs of blight not only tidied up a neighborhood but thwarted crime.

That observation was the birth of community policing, and the results have been far-reaching and profound. When Wilson wrote "The Moral Sense," not just the United States but most of the world was struggling with a sustained increase in violent crime that undermined security and optimism. Since "Broken Windows," one police department after another — most notably New York and then Los Angeles, both under the stewardship of William J. Bratton — embraced the essence of Wilson's insights and revamped their approach to public safety.

Last year, 300 people were murdered in Los Angeles. Twenty years ago, more than 1,000 people a year died by homicide on the streets of this same city. Most of those victims were black and Latino. Too many still die, but many more live, and Wilson is partly responsible.

Those hundreds of saved lives annually — and the thousands of other living men and women across the country who would have otherwise fallen to violence — are Jim Wilson's contribution. He wrote compassionately, called Americans to their individual and collective conscience and, through it, made us a better country.

Breitbart shouted and ranted and left behind those he wounded or insulted. Wilson bestowed upon us a legacy of genuine intellectualism and a reminder that ideas, not screeds, are what ultimately serve us all.



Rush Gets Apology Right

The first apology by Rush Limbaugh, posted on his website over the weekend, sounded forced, qualified, almost defensive. The second, broadcast live on his Monday show, sounded sincere and heartfelt.

Rush Limbaugh did something not usually associated with either himself or bombastic talk radio. He apologized for calling a woman a "slut" and a "prostitute."

The woman, 30-year-old Sandra Fluke, a law student at Georgetown University, wants the Catholic school to pay for contraceptives in its insurance policy because, she says, she and her friends cannot afford the cost otherwise. Apparently Fluke is not aware that contraceptive pills, according to John McCormack of The Weekly Standard, "can be purchased for as low as \$9 per month at a pharmacy near Georgetown's campus." Or that some places dispense them for free, along with condoms.

Back to the Limbaugh apology. I have known Rush for some years (he wrote a forward to one of my books) and I think I can tell when he is sincere. A

lot of what he does is the-actrics designed to rev up his audience with red meat and to dramatize a point. It isn't that he is insincere about his positions; rather, it is because the media environment, in which we are all forced to live, requires some to be louder and more emphatic than others to attract attention and ratings.

Limbaugh opened his Monday show sounding contrite: "I acted too much like the leftists who despise me. I descended to their level using names and exaggerations to describe Sandra Fluke. It's what we have come to know and expect from them, but it's way beneath me. And it's way beneath you. It was wrong and that's why I've apologized, 'cause I succumbed. ... Don't be mad at them or mad at her. Everybody here was being true to their nature except me. I'm the one who had the failing on this, and for that I genuinely apologized for using those words to describe Ms. Fluke."

That sounds sincere to me and should end the controversy, but it probably won't. Limbaugh's political enemies have never demonstrated anything approaching contrition when it comes to their desire to destroy him. They have succeeded in getting several sponsors to drop ads from his show and calls for a boycott of his show continue. Limbaugh's detractors have the example of Glenn Beck, late of Fox News Channel, as inspiration. That network dropped Beck in part because, though his ratings were high, few sponsors wanted to be associated with his controversial remarks.

Limbaugh's apology shifts the burden to his critics, including Ms. Fluke. If they keep attacking Limbaugh, they risk damaging their own character for refusing to forgive. In fact, Ms. Fluke went on ABC's "The View" Monday morning to say that Limbaugh's apology changed nothing.

As noted in many other places, there is often a double standard when it comes to speech. Horrible things have been said about conservatives and especially conservative

women, but have a conservative said anything close to those things about a liberal woman and you have the Sandra Fluke controversy. Rush is right, though. Such things ought to be beneath conservatives.

That civil discourse may be on life support is not news to anyone paying attention to political rhetoric. Part of this has to do with fundraising, which mostly relies on negatives, not positives, because as a fundraiser once told me, you can't raise money on a positive. Part of it is also ratings. In an uncertain world, people like to tune into programs — liberal and conservative — that reinforce views they already hold.

Limbaugh might resist this next suggestion, but I speak from experience, having had to apologize for a recent misstatement of my own. Limbaugh should invite Sandra Fluke to lunch and get to know her as a person, not a label. At the very least, he would send an important message that civility and strong political speech do not have to be contradictory.

Who knows, he might even persuade her to become a conservative. From his perspective, and mine, that would be a win-win for everybody, except liberals.

We do need to monitor what happens in our huge fires. The fires have killed a lot more wildlife than the livestock ever have.

I believe it is time we the people of Idaho and the USA voice our thoughts on our lands and fight the special interest groups and the federal judges who only have their own agendas in mind.

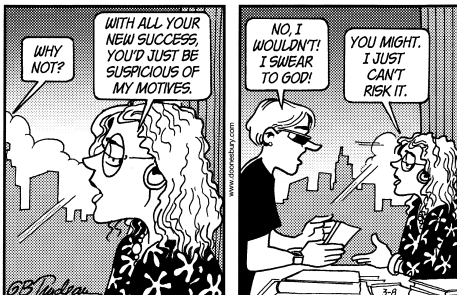
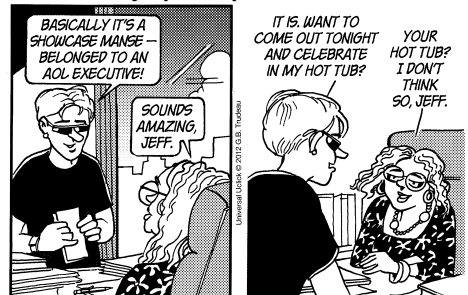

Romney Cleaned up in Idaho, Despite Paul Efforts

BOISE • Texas Rep. Ron Paul tried to put his libertarian stamp on Idaho but ended up getting stomped on by former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney.

Romney's victory in Idaho's first-ever Republican caucus underscored why he's the front-runner in the national GOP race to challenge President Barack Obama next November.

Romney claimed early victories in county caucuses in eastern and southern Ida-

ho Tuesday night, setting the stage for a convincing victory that also included wins in the biggest counties of Ada and Canyon and laying claim to all 32 of Idaho's delegates.

Final results show Romney won 31 of Idaho's 44 counties, while Rick Santorum claimed seven counties and Paul walked away with victories in six counties.

Paul's defeat in the state didn't come for lack of trying.

The Texas congressman, who won 23 percent of the vote in the 2008 presidential

primary, had been counting on Idaho to help build momentum and was confident before the caucus that his supporters in all pockets of the state would deliver at least one Super Tuesday triumph.

Paul, more than any other GOP candidate, made numerous incursions into Idaho in recent weeks, traversing it from the state's far northern forests to its deep southern desert. His presence in the state also included a Tuesday noon rally in Nampa. His wins came in Nez Perce, Latah, Camas,

Idaho, Bonner and Boundary counties.

Fairfield Woman Pleads Guilty to Stealing from Farm Bureau

KETCHUM (AP) • A former secretary for the Blaine-Camas Farm Bureau office in Bellevue has pleaded guilty to embezzling more than \$35,000 from the organization over a four-year period.

The *Idaho Mountain Express* reports 59-year-old Judith G. Shurtz of Fairfield pleaded guilty Monday to

one count of grand theft by embezzlement in 5th District Court.

Blaine County prosecutors charged Shurtz with fraudulently writing about 90 checks to herself between February 2006 and May 2010. An internal audit by the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation discovered the alleged thefts.

Dry, wet, streamers and nymphs are just some of the different types of flies students will learn to tie in this basic

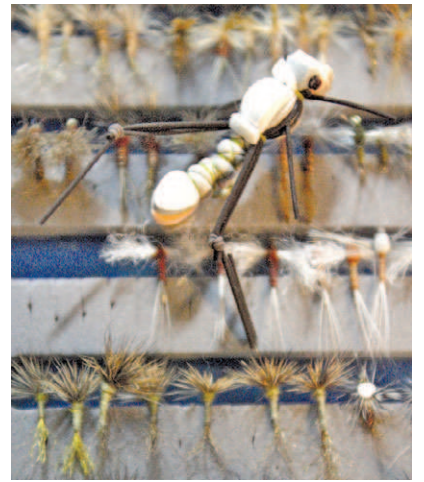
instructional course.

Dog Heaven

Still little known, Twin Falls’ new wetlands area on the Snake River Canyon rim is an excellent destination for walkers and runners — and their dogs.

TWIN FALLS • Dar Wagner watched a family of ducklings grow up last year in the city’s new wetlands on the Snake River Canyon rim. Neighbor Mike Trabert relished the aquatic blooms that covered the lowest of the three ponds. And when winter finally iced over the canal runoff, Debi Kraal pulled out her ice skates.

The three, all residents of Twin Falls’ Meadow Ridge subdivision, are enjoying one of the city’s newest outdoor attractions: a trio of man-made settling ponds circled by at least a mile of gravel trails and planted with rushes, native grasses and poplars. Constructed last year on the canyon’s south rim right above Shoshone Falls Park, the spot is an excellent one for runners who want a soft surface, or for dog owners looking for freedom and fresh air.

“It’s just kind of nice and peaceful out there, and it’s beautiful when the sun sets,” said Wagner, who walks

alone and loves the solitude.

The ponds and trails are on city-owned property, but you’re still likely to find a spot there for solitude. The reason: If you don’t live nearby, the only way to reach the new wetlands without illegally crossing private property is to hike up the paved trail leading from Shoshone Falls Park to the rim.

Though some visitors do cut across private property to reach the ponds, the city discourages that, and it has no access arrangement with private owners, said Dennis Bowyer, Twin Falls Parks and Recreation director.

But it’s worth the hike.

On the unseasonably sunny afternoon of Feb. 24, Trabert’s German wirehaired pointer splashed in the water and chased scents in the brush, occasionally recalled by a shock to her collar. Sherman and Jeanne Stanley’s Shih Tzu trotted ahead as the retired couple talked about the area’s deer, pelicans, porcupines, eagles and hawks.

“She knows the way by heart,” Sherman said, gesturing toward their little pooch. “Even knows where each little piddle spot is,” his wife added.

Building the Wetlands

It’s dog heaven now, but the wetlands had a more mundane reason for being.

Environmental permits for the city’s sewage treatment plant set limits for suspended solids in the treated water pouring into the Snake River, said Trabert, an environmental engineer for the city. To offset those limits for the plant, the city partnered with Twin Falls Canal

Getting There

To reach the new ponds without illegally crossing private property, you’ll first hike up a paved trail from Shoshone Falls Park to the Snake River Canyon rim.

The trailhead: This time of year, it’s free to drive down to Shoshone Falls Park; the city’s toll booth will resume charging a \$3-per-car entrance fee on March 30. The trail begins at the upper west side of the park, where barriers block the road to vehicles.

The paved trail: As it climbs, the paved trail zigzags along shelves of the canyon wall. Overlooks offer dramatic (and sometimes wet) perspectives of Shoshone Falls, and benches offer several chances to rest. You might still encounter icy patches on shaded stretches of trail this time of year.

The new destination: Just after the trail reaches the canyon rim — and as it heads west toward Evel Knievel’s jump site — this paved trail intersects in three places the wide gravel trails around the new ponds. That wetlands area and its trails are on city-owned property, so enjoy! Carry drinking water with you; a drinking fountain in the ponds area won’t be operational for the season until April.

The future: The city is pursuing a land trade that officials hope will provide easier access to the ponds, from Hankins Road.

Biathlon Training

Weekend event tests the skills, endurance of physically-challenged.

SUN VALLEY • Guillermo Tejada jabbed his short ski poles into the snow, pushing himself along the snow in a bucket-like seat mounted on skis.

When he neared the top of the canyon that branched off from the Sun Valley Gun Club, he laid himself down on his side and took up a light wooden Steyr air rifle.

He took a deep breath just like his ski coach had told him to do, then slowly exhaled. He took another

breath. Then he pressed the rifle against the butt of his arm and took aim at a target about 50 yards away.

Pop! Pop! Pop! Pop!
The pops emanating from his air rifle were nothing compared to the IED (improvised explosive device) that blew off his legs in Afghanistan. And the peace and solitude of Sun Valley seemed far removed from the fear he’d occasionally felt rising in him as he patrolled that troubled country.

But this morning on the biathlon range was a solid step toward getting back on his feet, so to speak, after un-

dergoing rehab at the Naval Hospital in San Diego.

Staff Sgt. Tejada was one of seven veterans and civilians who took part in a Paralympic Biathlon training camp this past week on the Nordic trails looping around the Sun Valley Gun Club.

For some it was an introduction to the sport of biathlon — an opportunity to see if it was something they might want to pursue. For others, it was an opportunity to train for an upcoming national competition.

“It’s awesome,” said Tejada. “I love shooting so it’s great to be able to

come here and shoot.”

Rob Rossner, who competed at the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano, paced the target range. He stopped to show Omar Bermejo, a vet who had his mangled right arm amputated two months ago, how to hook his gun

to his remaining arm for stability while shooting.

Double amputees are able to assume the best position, Rosser said, because they can lie down on their bellies and shoot.

Co. to build three settling ponds that remove sediment from irrigation waste that runs off farm fields and into the canal company's Lateral 26, before that water enters the Snake River Canyon.

Trabert and colleagues hope the three ponds will remove the required 733 tons of sediment a year — in the first partial year of monitoring, the wetlands kept 644 tons out of the river — but a second pond-building project near Auger Falls is proceeding anyway.

Crews began cutting the ponds above Shoshone Falls Park in January 2011 and finished them in March 2011, just before the canal company released water into its system and the runoff ponds began filling.

Then city parks coordinator Todd Andersen and his colleagues seeded the area with native grasses and forbs, and they used parts of the old, dismantled Singing Bridge wherever the new trails cross water.

"We kept sections of it just for future projects, and part of them got used there," Andersen said.

Parks workers also planted 85 trees that will eventually shield the ponds from the adjacent police gun range. But the three varieties of poplar are all still young, reaching to just 6 or 10 feet. So the racket can be unnerving to walkers when officers have shooting practice.

"It's a war zone," Jeanne Stanley said.

In terms of noise, but not of danger.

In recent years, the Twin Falls Police Department has completed major safety upgrades "to ensure that rounds do not leave the range," Lt. Craig Stotts said. "If (pedestrians) are on the walking trails and designated areas, they're in absolutely no danger at all."

Desert Oasis

Shooting practice isn't frequent — 40 days of shooting are scheduled in 2012, Stotts said — so the ponds are usually an exquisitely quiet place to enjoy big sky and open space.

Bring baggies to clean up after your dog, but don't expect a lush, tailored park here. The wide gravel trails are still a little muddy at this time of year, and only one of the three ponds has water. (The others will begin to refill when Twin Falls Canal Co. begins its irrigation season in mid-April.) Crews did more trail work in December and January.

A barbed-wire fence marks some of the adjacent private property; though there's an opening in the fence, don't go through it. Soon the area will have more signs to help you see where private property begins, Andersen said.

Stay on the trails, Jeanne Stanley advised, pointing to poison ivy in the brush nearby.

You just might meet Kraal running with her dogs, or Sherman Stanley on his mountain bike.

"I'm starting to see more dogs, more people walking the trail," Trabert said. "It's just a wonderful place to come out and walk."

Catching Crappie

GLEN ELDER RESERVOIR, Kan. • Living in Lawrence, Kan., would seem an ideal location for a crappie guide. The legendary waters of Clinton, Melvern, Perry and Pomona reservoirs are minutes away.

But Chatt Martin often tows his boat three hours west for quality crappie fishing.

"This place isn't a lake it's a factory," Martin said as he stopped his boat on Glen Elder Reservoir. "It just keeps producing so many nice crappie."

Within two minutes of dropping lures into the lake, Martin and a guest both hauled up crappie about a foot long.

In less than three hours Martin, of Crappie Time Fishing Guide Service, and his guest caught more than 100 crappies, releasing many that would have been keepers at most lakes.

Martin has become accustomed to such angling over the past several years at Glen Elder.

The great fishing is partially due to a drought about eight years ago.

Scott Waters, the lake's fisheries biologist, said assorted small trees and brush grew thick around Glen Elder during low-water times.

Heavy rains in 2008 flooded the vegetation and made ideal spawning habitat.

"We were about eight feet low to start, so the water stayed up in the vegetation for two years," Waters said. "We already had a pretty good stock of big fish for spawning. It was amazing."

Waters' annual fall test nettings showed crappie production was more than 10 times normal in 2008 and 2009.

High water in north-central Kansas last spring and summer also has another great class of crappies coming on strong.

"We're really pretty well stacked with fish 10-14 inches," Waters said. "I feel a lot better knowing we have the 2011 year-class coming on, too."

Martin said his clients caught several 17-inch crappie this winter.

With the great crappie population came great numbers of crappie fishermen.

Well, at least compared to what Glen El-

der was used to.

"These people out here don't know what fishing pressure is, compared to places like Perry and Clinton. It's not even close," Martin said on a recent Monday. "We have a whopping three boats on the lake today."

Waters said there are times when there have been 25 to 30 this winter.

Had there been enough ice, that number could have been 100-200 ice fishermen per day.

Pressure will increase when the shallow water spring spawn makes Glen Elder's crappies more accessible.

Still, some of Martin's best angling has been on fall and winter days when the fish were heavily concentrated on the edges of flooded river channels.

"The best day that I know we had an accurate count was when four of us caught and released 202 in about four hours," Martin said. "We were weighing quite a few two-pounders but we quit because the fishing was so good nobody wanted to stop and weigh anymore."

Monday's trip was a side note for Martin, after giving a weekend

of fishing seminars at a nearby boat dealership.

The first two spots he checked held no fish.

His graph lit up when he checked a spot where 18 feet of water dropped off to more than 30 feet.

He never left a 40-yard stretch over the old channel, fishing a 1-ounce tube jig about a reel crank off the bottom.

Several times both

anglers had fish at the same time.

"Days like this out here can spoil you in a hurry. There aren't

many places where you're disappointed with a 12-inch crappie," Martin said with a long laugh. "And I'm supposed to head back and try to catch 10-inchers at Melvern? I don't

mind making the drive out here."

It's more difficult for those who use wheelchairs, he added, since they have to shoot from one side while still strapped into their sit skis. Those who have to shoot from a more awkward position get that figured into their score.

"We don't call it handicapping around here," Rossner said.

This is the 11th Nordic Training Camp Sun Valley Adaptive Ski Instructor Marc Mast has organized for disabled in Sun Valley, but only the second biathlon camp.

Army veteran Andy Soule, a Paralympian who trained at Sun Valley for two years after losing his legs in an IED explosion in Afghanistan, was the first American — either Paralympian or Olympian — to win a medal, said Mast, who runs the WRAP (Wood River Ability Program).

Mast said he hopes to run biathlon camps more frequently once the U.S. Olympic Committee finalizes papers making Sun Valley an official U.S. Olympic/Paralympic Nordic Training site.

"We hope everything's signed and delivered by May or June," he said.

Big Game Season Proposals Now Available

JEROME • The Idaho Department of Fish and Game's proposed changes for the 2012 big game hunting seasons are available online for public review and comment.

The proposals, listed by region, are available at: fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/hunt/?getPage=301.

Beginning this year, wolf hunting and trapping seasons will be set along with hunting seasons for deer, elk, pronghorn, black bears and mountain lions, and will be included in the 2012 big game seasons regulations booklet.

Only those seasons and hunts for which changes are proposed are listed. All others are proposed to remain

the same as they were during the 2011 hunting season.

Comments received by March 12 will be summarized and considered, along with final review of 2011 harvest results and population surveys conducted this winter, as Fish and Game develops final recommendations for this year's seasons.

Spring Black Bear Results Posted Online

Results for the spring black bear controlled hunt drawings are available on the Idaho Department of Fish and Game website, fishandgame.idaho.gov.

Details for obtaining or exchanging tags are explained on the site. Those drawing a spring bear controlled hunt and who have a general season tag may exchange the general season

tag for the controlled hunt tag or may keep the general season tag and buy the controlled hunt bear tag.

Any exchanges of tags must be completed at a Fish and Game office.

F&G Conducts WMA Opinion Poll

The Moon's Cold Surface Masks a Warm Interior

School kids are taught that Earth is geologically "alive" while the moon is "dead." Certainly, the moon appears static compared to the dynamic and ever-changing Earth. But there may be life in the moon yet.

A body's interior heat comes from radioactivity, heat of formation, and external sources. Radioactive elements emit heat as they decay, which accounts for the lion's share of Earth's interior heat. Since, as the leading theory of the moon and Earth's origins suggests, they comprise similar materials, the moon — with 81 times less mass — should have roughly 81 times less heat from radioactivity.

Planets are born when smaller proto-planets fall together into larger agglomerations, whereupon the energy of their infall gets converted

to heat. The larger the body, the more infall it takes to build it, and the more residual heat. Furthermore, heat escapes more slowly from a large object than a small one, just as a larger potato stays hot longer than a small one after they've been removed from the oven.

External sources include the sun (which only heats surfaces), major impacts (which ceased about a billion years ago), and tidal heating by neighboring bodies. Since the slightly egg-shaped moon keeps its long axis perpetually turned our way, Earth's tidal forces don't vary

much (versus, say, Jupiter's moon Io, which is tidally heated to a state of continuous, global volcanism by its neighbors).

So the moon should have long ago solidified through and through. And yet, slight sloshing in its rotation hints that it may still possess a molten layer surrounding its solid core.

Recent research suggests that the moon's radioactive elements may have long ago sunk to the core with dense, titanium-rich minerals, which could explain the lack of volcanism at the "living" moon's surface.

Tying Flies Proves Valuable for Therapy

MILWAUKEE • The squad has rendezvoused at 0800 hours just as it does each Thursday.

Al Dalphonso gives the orders. He's not much for barking, though. More of a lead-by-example type.

"If you pinch it right and get the tension where it needs to be," says Dalphonso, 66, "you don't need a ton of knots."

A U.S. Navy veteran, Dalphonso could be giving instructions on rigging or tying off a vessel.

But he's holding a bunch of pearlescent mylar between his thumb and forefinger. With a thin black thread, he ties the material to a hook.

"You call this a pike fly?" says James White, 62, an Army veteran. "I'd like to take this one home and feed it."

The synthetic, feather and fur creation is longer than many pet fish, no doubt about it. And it's almost as big as some toy dog breeds.

"Remember that pond at Wern Valley has a musky in it," Dalphonso says. "This fly is your ticket."

The 10 men, half mentors and half patients, busily wrap long orange and yellow and silver strands to hooks.

The minutes fly by as the men focus on their creations in the art therapy room at the Clement J. Zablocki Veterans Administration Medical Center in Milwaukee.

It's the Thursday morning fly-tying class of Project Healing Waters, a program designed to assist in

the physical and emotional rehabilitation of disabled active-duty military personnel and veterans through fly fishing and fly tying.

Dalphonso and fellow members of Southeast Wisconsin Trout Unlimited provide the volunteer, expert instruction.

Several of the mentors are also vets, but it isn't required.

The volunteers pair off with the class members and work on creating — flies, friendships, a support system.

"I had one vet tell me he didn't fish," Dalphonso says. "I told him it didn't matter. This is art."

Anyone who has tied flies or done needlepoint or dozens of other handicrafts knows the therapeutic value that comes with the activity.

A fly-tying program was initiated at Zablocki in 2006 by Chuck McCoy, a helicopter pilot in Vietnam who enjoyed fly fishing and also was a patient at the hospital.

McCoy rounded up several avid fly tiers, including Winston, Mike Kolodczik and Joe Valcone, to provide an additional activity for vets.

Then, when Project Healing Waters was started in Milwaukee by Southeast Wisconsin Trout Unlimited in 2008, the program grew.

Fly-tying classes meet every Monday night and Thursday morning.

"It's been a great addition," says Kris Kulas, mental health therapist for the last 24 years at Zablocki. "The guys and gals get a little tired of seeing my face

all the time, and this brings in new people and new experiences."

The volunteers with Project Healing Waters, Kulas says, made the addition of a new program easy, providing equipment and bodies and expertise.

Zablocki has veterans that span several generations and wars — World War II, Korea, Vietnam and more recent conflicts.

"This program reaches all of them," Kulas says. "That's really important."

The class has made flies ranging from "trout dandruff," as volunteer Knitter calls the tiny size 18s and 20s, to 6-inch long feathery concoctions designed to tempt musky and northern pike.

Like all the activities of Project Healing Waters, fly tying helps the veterans identify themselves by something other than their injuries.

Knitter, 66, says he wishes there had been a program like Project Healing Waters when he came back from Vietnam.

"We were just supposed to assimilate," said Knitter,

of Milwaukee. "No one wanted to talk about what we went through."

Project Healing Waters includes fly tying as a step to healing. The program also includes fly casting and fly fishing outings. A rod-building class is also offered periodically.

Like so many volunteer activities, it's beneficial to the mentors, too.

"One of the things where you do something and you feel good about it," said Winston, 76.

Trout Unlimited awards the participants with a fly-tying kit if they stay with the program for six weeks.

Greg Simons, 61, served in the Air Force. Due to injuries, Simons had to learn to use his hands in a new way.

"Good little hobby to do at home," Simons said. He keeps his flies in pill bottles.

Clowry sits at Simons' elbow, encouraging him. Pankau has Parkinson's Syndrome. His hands shake at rest but not when he ties flies.

He has a collection of more than 800 hand-tied

flies.

"My goal is to become a mentor for the guys in the spinal cord unit," says Pankau.

Hopkins, serving today as a mentor, began the program as a patient. He credits TU volunteer Zoan Kulinski for helping him learn to love fly tying and fly fishing.

Hopkins' skill and dedication to the craft earned him first place in the 2010 National Veterans Creative Arts Competition.

He's planning to enter again this year. His theme? Salmon flies in a handmade shadow box.

The Project Healing Waters program is branching out. A group of program graduates, including Hopkins, is starting a fly-tying class at Veteran Quest in West Allis, Wis.

They will teach what they've learned.

"You don't need to be a patient forever," Kulas says. "It's a great way to share the wealth."

As the veterans have learned: With fly tying, there is always room to grow.

Romney Encourages Nomination Rivals to Fold; No Way, They Say

Super Tuesday victories make it increasingly hard for them to catch up, he says, and they are hurting GOP by continuing to try.

WASHINGTON • His delegate lead growing, Mitt Romney gently nudged his Republican opponents toward the sidelines on Wednesday and said he was on track to wrap up the presidential nomination before the party convention next summer. Rick Santorum and Newt Gingrich paid him no mind, vowing to fight on in a campaign marked by persistent ideological divisions.

If anything, the political maneuvering intensified as the marathon pointed toward contests in five states over the next week. Romney's campaign purchased television advertising time in Alabama according to campaign sources, as it pursued a breakthrough in the party's Southern base.

A Santorum ally urged Gingrich to

abandon the race.

In response, the former House speaker said he would consider it — if he thought Santorum was sure to beat Romney and then President Barack Obama. “I don’t,” he added.

And when Santorum was informed that an aide to Romney had said it would take an act of God for any other candidate to amass a majority of convention delegates, Santorum responded heatedly. “What won’t they resort to to try to bully their way through this race?” he said in Lenexa, Kan. “If the governor now thinks he’s now ordained by God to win, then let’s just have it out.”

One day after Super Tuesday, Romney's campaign circulated a memo making the case that his six victories on a single night had increased his delegate lead to a point that it was increasingly hard for any of his rivals to catch up. And

they were hurting the party by continuing to try, it suggested.

“As Governor Romney’s opponents attempt to ignore the basic principles of math, the only person’s odds of winning they are increasing are President Barack Obama’s,” it said.

Romney didn’t go that far in an interview, and he stopped short of a flat prediction that he would achieve his goal of a pre-convention delegate majority. “We think that will get done before the convention, but one thing I can tell you for sure is there’s not going to be some brokered convention where some new person comes in and becomes the nominee,” he said on CNBC’s “Squawk Box.” “It’s going to be one of the four people that are still running.”

After Super Tuesday, Romney has 419 delegates overall, more than his three rivals combined.

Santorum is second with 178, Gingrich has 107 and Paul has 47. It takes 1,144 to win the nomination.

Obama Unveils ‘Clean’ Vehicle Initiative

MOUNT HOLLY, N.C. • Mixing politics with policy, President Barack Obama returned to North Carolina on Wednesday to step up his wooing of this key election-year swing state and to propose new federal incentives to spur “clean energy” vehicles.

In a spirited speech at the Daimler Trucks manufacturing plant — a rare union shop in right-to-work North Carolina — Obama announced a \$1 billion challenge to communities that, he said, could eventually reduce America’s dependence on foreign oil and consumers’ exposure to sticker-shock prices at the gas pump.

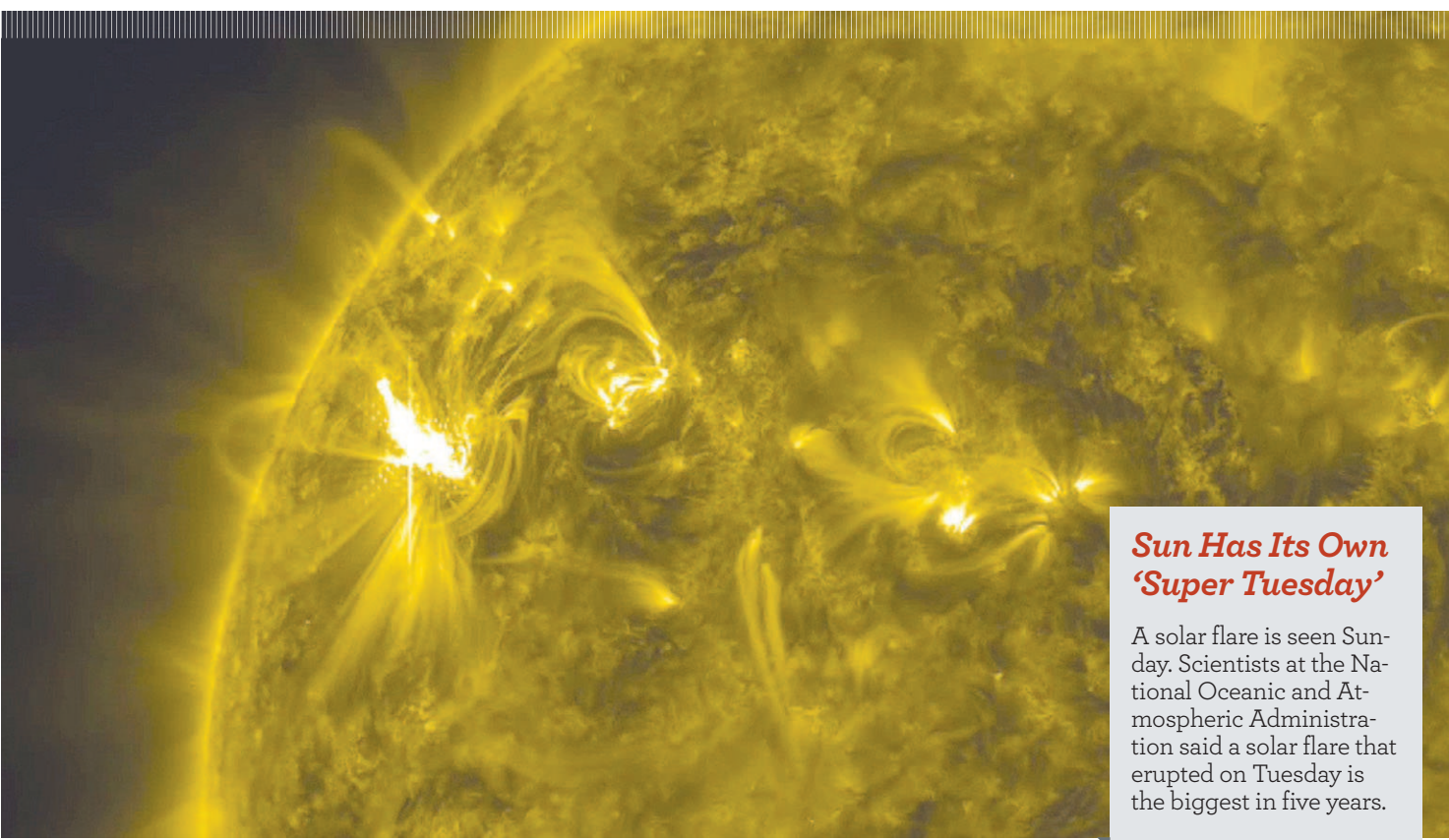
Those willing to shift to more energy-efficient vehicles, the president said, would be rewarded with bigger tax breaks of up to \$10,000 as well as other federal assistance.

“To cities and towns all across the country, what we’re going to say is: If you make a commitment to buy more advanced vehicles for your community — whether they run on electricity or biofuels or natural gas — we’ll help you cut through the red tape and build fueling stations nearby,” he told a crowd that included 450 of the Daimler plant’s 1,450 employees.

“And we’ll offer tax breaks to families that buy these cars (and) companies that buy the alternative fuel trucks like the ones that are made right here in Mount Holly.”

The plant in Gaston County’s second largest city not only manufactures diesel trucks, but also hybrid and natural gas versions. Last November, it became the first company to deliver its 1,000th natural gas truck.

At a time when the Obama administration is pressing the message that the U.S. economy is on the rebound, the president was also careful Wednesday to give a shout-out to the plant for hiring more than 1,000 people last year.

Sun Has Its Own ‘Super Tuesday’

A solar flare is seen Sunday. Scientists at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said a solar flare that erupted on Tuesday is the biggest in five years.

Solar Storm Takes Aim at Earth

Scientists are waiting to see what happens today when charged particles hit Earth at 4 million mph.

WASHINGTON • The largest solar storm in five years is racing toward Earth, threatening to unleash a torrent of charged particles that could disrupt power grids, GPS and airplane flights.

The sun erupted Tuesday evening, and the effects were expected to start smacking Earth between 11 p.m. Wednesday and 3 a.m. MST today, according to forecasters at the federal government’s Space Weather Prediction Center. They say the storm, which started with a massive solar flare, is growing as it speeds outward from the sun.

“It’s hitting us right in the

nose,” said Joe Kunches, a scientist for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. He called it the sun’s version of “Super Tuesday.”

Scientists say the sun has been relatively quiet for some time. And this storm, while strong, may seem fiercer because Earth has been lulled by several years of weak solar activity.

“This is a good-size event, but not the extreme type,” said Bill Murtagh, program coordinator for the space weather center.

The solar storm is likely to last through Friday morning, but the region that erupted can still send more blasts our way, Kunches said. He said another set of active sunspots is ready to aim at

Earth right after this.

But for now, scientists are waiting to see what happens today when the charged particles hit Earth at 4 million mph.

NASA solar physicist Alex Young added, “It could give us a bit of a jolt.” But he said this is far from a super solar storm.

The storm is coming after an earlier and weaker solar eruption happened Sunday, Kunches said. The latest blast of particles will probably arrive slightly later than forecasters first thought.

That means for North America the “good” part of a solar storm — the one that creates more noticeable auroras or Northern Lights — will peak this evening.

Auroras could dip as far south as the Great Lakes states or lower, Kunches said, but a full moon will make them harder to see.

Auroras are “probably the treat

we get when the sun erupts,” Kunches said.

But there is potential for widespread problems. Solar storms have three ways they can disrupt technology on Earth: with magnetic, radio and radiation emissions. This is an unusual situation when all three types of solar storm disruptions are likely to be strong, Kunches said.

That means “a whole host of things” could follow, he said.

The magnetic part of the storm has the potential to trip electrical power grids. Kunches said utility companies around the world have been alerted. The timing and speed of the storm determines whether it knocks off power grids, he said.

In 1989, a strong solar storm knocked out the power grid in Quebec, causing 6 million people to lose power.

In Bin Laden’s Lair, His Wives Split by Suspicions

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan • Osama bin Laden spent his last weeks in a house divided, amid wives riven by suspicions. On the top floor, sharing his bedroom, was his youngest wife and favorite. The trouble came when his eldest wife showed up and moved into the bedroom on the floor below.

Others in the family, crammed into the three-story villa compound where bin Laden would eventually be killed in a May 2 U.S. raid, were convinced that the eldest wife intended to betray the al-Qaida leader.

The picture of bin Laden’s life in the Abbottabad compound comes from Brig. Shaukat Qadir, a retired Pakistani army officer who spent months researching the events and says he was given rare access to transcripts of Pakistani intelligence’s interrogation of bin Laden’s youngest wife, who was detained in the raid.

Qadir was also given rare entry into the villa, which was sealed after the raid and demolished last month. Pictures he took, which he allowed

AP to see, showed the villa’s main staircase, splattered with blood. Other pictures show windows protected by iron grills and the 20-foot high walls around the villa.

Qadir’s research gives one of the most extensive descriptions of the arrangements in bin Laden’s hide-out when U.S. SEAL commandos stormed in, killing bin Laden and four others. His account is based on accounts by an official of Pakistan’s Inter-Services Intelligence agency who escorted him on a tour of the villa, the interrogation transcription he was allowed to read, and interviews with other ISI officials and al-Qaida-linked militants and tribesmen in the Afghan-Pakistan border region.

The compound where bin Laden lived since mid-2005 was a crowded place, with 28 residents — including bin Laden, his three wives, eight of his children and five of his grandchildren. The bin Laden children ranged in age from his 24-year-old son Khaled, who was killed in the raid, to a 3-year-old born during their time in Abbottabad. Bin Laden’s courier, the courier’s broth-

er and their wives and children also lived in the compound.

The 54-year-old bin Laden himself seemed aged beyond his years, with suspected kidney or stomach diseases, and there were worries over his mental health, Qadir said he was told by ISI officials and an

al-Qaida member he interviewed in the border regions.

Bin Laden lived and died on the third floor. One room he shared with his youngest wife, Amal Ahmed Abdel-Fatah al-Sada, a Yemeni who was 19 when she married the al-Qaida leader in 1999. Another wife,

Siham Saber, lived in another room on the same floor that also served as a computer room, Qadir told AP.

The arrival of his eldest wife, Saudi-born Khairiah Saber, in early 2011 stirred up the household, Amal said in her ISI interrogation, according to Qadir.

There was already bad blood between Khairiah, who married bin Laden in the late 1980s, and Amal because of bin Laden’s favoritism for the younger Yemeni woman, Qadir said he was told by tribal leaders who knew the family.

Khairiah showed up at Abbottabad in February or March 2011 and moved into the villa’s second floor, Amal told her interrogators.

Khalid, bin Laden’s son with Siham, was suspicious, according to Amal’s account. He repeatedly asked Khairiah why she had come. At one point, she told him, “I have one final duty to perform for my husband.” Khalid immediately told his father what she had said and warned that she intended to betray him.

Amal, who shared Khalid’s fears, said bin Laden was also suspicious but was unconcerned, acting as if fate would decide, according to Qadir’s recounting of the interrogation transcript.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"Why do you walk through the fields in gloves ... Missing so much and so much?"

One technique all bridge players must become familiar with is the avoidance play. To keep the danger hand off lead, declarer may have to go to great lengths. In today's deal no trick needs to be sacrificed, but declarer does need to be careful.

Against four hearts West leads the diamond king to dummy's ace. Where is your 10th winner coming from, and what precautions do you need to take to prevent the defenders from thwarting your plans?

Rather than relying on the club finesse, you should try to develop a spade trick if you can, which requires spades to be 3-3. But you also need to try to do so without letting West on lead for a club switch. To accomplish this, first you lead the heart jack to your queen. A diamond is ruffed high; then you lead the heart nine to your 10 and advance the spade nine, planning to let it run.

West must cover with the queen, and you win the spade ace, East unblocking the 10. You cross to your hand by leading the heart two to your eight, then lead the spade two. You can cover West's card, and East must now win the defense's spade trick. Consequently, the contract is safe, spades having split.

If you start spades by leading a high one from dummy, East will unblock a spade honor and West can now arrange to win his side's spade trick for the lethal club play.

ANSWER: Your partner's redouble shows extra values and asks you to describe your hand appropriately at your next turn — typically by supporting your partner with extra trump or doubling the opponents with suitable defense. Here you have a balanced hand and no diamond support, so have nothing to say. You must pass and hope your partner knows what to do next.

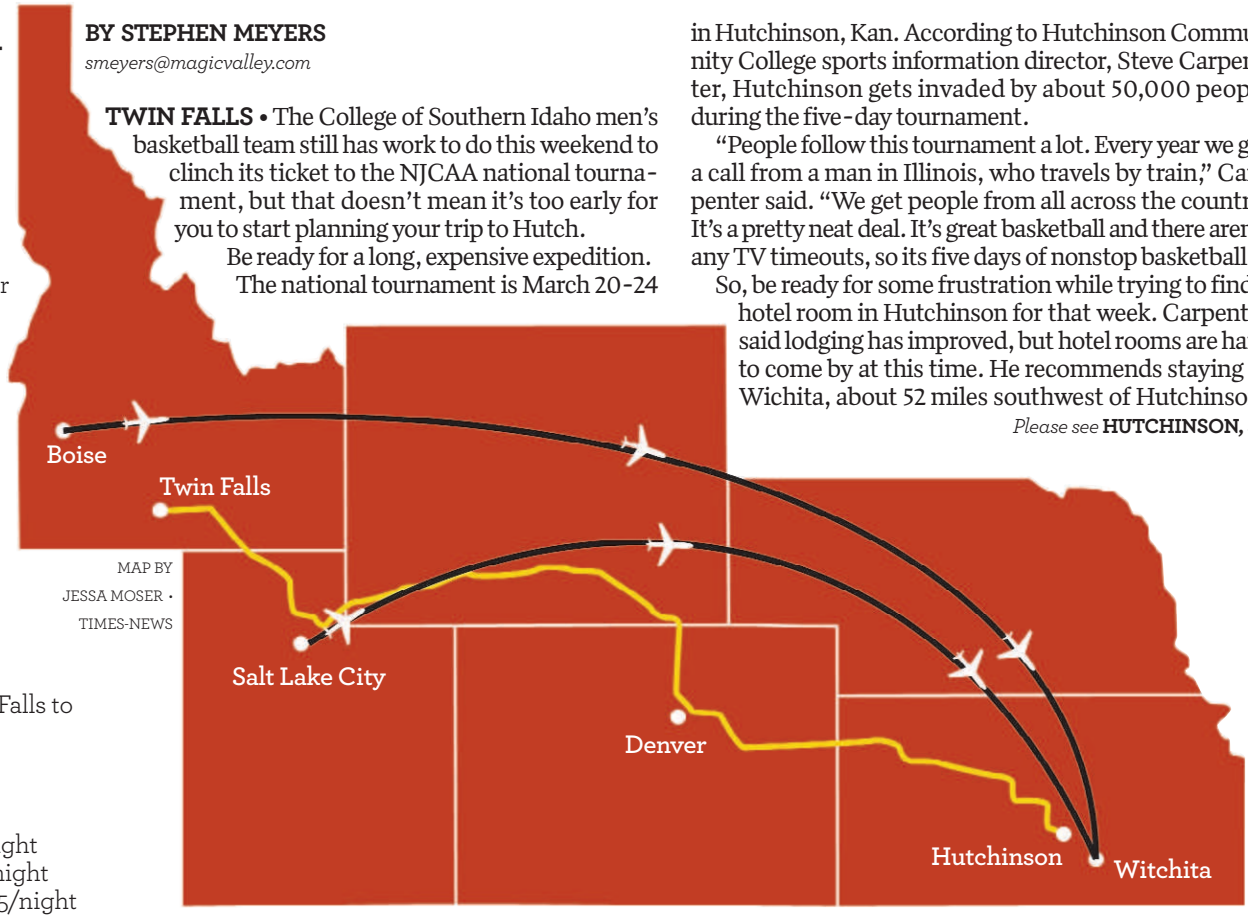

Vandals Hoping for Big Payoff in Vegas

MOSCOW • Over five days in early February, Idaho did more than send a message to the WAC by beating the conference's two best teams. It also set in motion a stretch of quality basketball that carried the team through the regular season.

The question now is, can the Vandals – for the first time since joining the conference in 2005 – make a lasting impression in the WAC tournament?

Idaho, 18-12 and seeded third, rattled off wins in seven of its last eight games entering today's quarterfinal matchup with sixth-seeded Hawaii (15-15). The teams meet at noon at Las Vegas' Orleans Arena, just a week after UI clobbered the Warriors in Honolulu.

"What we've got to make sure we do is bring our best basketball to Las Vegas," Idaho coach Don Verlin said. "That's kind of what I'm challenging our guys with this week is we've got to bring our game."

"It's time to do it in Las Vegas in March."

The Vandals are 1-6 all-time in the WAC tournament, the only victory coming in a play-in game over San Jose State in 2007. They have yet to reach the semifinals, but this is clearly their best chance.

Hawaii has lost five straight while Idaho – in part because of wins over league champion Nevada and second-place New Mexico State – finished with its best conference win percentage (.643) since 1998-99.

The Vandals lead the WAC in field-goal shooting and 3-point shooting, ranking near the top 20 nationally in both stats. They're 11-4 since Jan. 5, and they have wins over every WAC school this season.

Idaho is the only conference member to achieve that feat outside of the

The Ivy League does not offer athletic-specific scholarships, so there is no National Letter of Intent to be signed. But Martinez indicated she's already been accepted into the school and will receive a scholarship of some order.

Irsay still has the jersey, but every good collector knows his limits. The Colts had reached theirs with Manning, and it

was time to say goodbye.

It came a day before Irsay would have had to write a check for \$28 million for a quarterback no one is quite sure can still play. Money, both insisted, had nothing to do with the Colts releasing Manning, even though everyone knew it did. Instead, it was something both vaguely referred to as circumstances that made this parting such sweet sorrow.

The moment Colts fans had

dreaded for months wasn't just bittersweet, it was bizarre. Two men in nice suits awkwardly hugging each other, choking back tears and reminiscing about a magical time that had suddenly gone bad.

To hear Irsay talk about it, they grew up together. They had dreams, and together they worked to make them come true.

To hear Manning describe it, he had nothing but good thoughts and fond feelings toward everyone involved. He still loves the big guy, but he loved the little people, too, and would terribly miss the best equipment handlers in sports.

You almost expected Irsay to

CSI Women Have One Last Chance

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TWIN FALLS • If the College of Southern Idaho women's basketball team is going to get its first signature road win this season, now's the time to get it.

In a win-or-go-home situation, the fourth-seeded Golden Eagles open the Region 18 Tournament in Salt Lake against the host No. 5 Bruins tonight at 5:30 p.m.

"I tell you what, that probably wouldn't be any sweeter than getting that road win over Salt Lake in their place and knocking them out of their own tournament," said CSI women's head coach Randy Rogers. "That would be great for our program and really great for these kids. It's really not a far-fetched deal."

The Golden Eagles (15-15, 7-8 Scenic West) swept the Bruins (16-14, 7-8) in Twin Falls this season, but lost 55-47 in their only trip to Salt Lake.

The game was the second night of a back-to-back and the Golden Eagles actually led by six at halftime after playing what Rogers called one of the best halves of basketball this season. They faltered in the second half, however, and Salt Lake stole its lone win

Why they could lose it: The last two times North Idaho has won the Region 18 Tournament, it did so as the two-seed. Can the Cardinals handle the pressure of being the favorites? She accounts for more than 40 percent of her team's offense and can single-handedly take over a game, evidenced by her 40 points in a win over North Idaho last weekend. The Golden Eagles' also employ a long zone defense that allowed a SWAC-low 56.7 points per game.

Why they could lose it: Santos' supporting cast is suspect. Parry is second on the team in scoring and the Golden Eagles get very little from their frontcourt players.

A win over Salt Lake — which is hosting the Region 18 Tournament for the first time in school history — and CSI plays 2011 Region 18 and NJCAA championship North Idaho in the semifinals Friday.

The Golden Eagles played the Cardinals tougher than any team this season, winning 72-51 in Twin Falls and losing twice in Coeur d'Alene by a combined seven points.

"I think it gets easier. I really do. If we can get past Salt Lake, North Idaho is the team I'm least afraid of," Rogers said. "I think our team matches up well with their guards."

The Golden Eagles haven't won the Region 18 Tournament since 2008 and before they can start preparing for North Idaho, however, they have to get through Salt Lake today in the matchup they've wanted to avoid all season.

"We know it's win or go home," said CSI forward Kylee Schierman. "We're confident. We know we can beat any team in the conference and we're just going to stay relaxed and play our game."

USU-Eastern and Colorado Northwestern play in the 3-6 matchup at 2 p.m. today. The winner there plays No. 2 seed Snow College at noon Friday.

He's been with the program for four years — longer than any current player — and he's watched as a redshirt or played in each of UI's three opening-round WAC tourney losses under Verlin.

This time, Barone said, the Vandals have enough veterans to know what to expect in Las Vegas.

"I think our confidence level as a team is pretty high right now," the junior said. "It's just how we're playing, and everybody is just comfortable right now. I think that's important this time of year and going into this tournament."

Idaho split the season series with Hawaii, with each team winning on the other's homecourt. One of UH's main offensive threats is guard Zane Johnson, who at 6-foot-6 is seven inches taller than UI starting guards Deremy Geiger and Landon Tatum.

To better match up with Johnson last week, Verlin used 6-2 Mike McChristian off the bench for 23 minutes. The junior college transfer, who scarcely played earlier in the year, responded with a career-high nine rebounds and three steals.

"Yes, he hasn't gotten very many minutes," Verlin said of McChristian. "But the minutes he's gotten recently, he's played really well."

The winner of the Idaho-UH quarterfinal advances to meet New Mexico State or Fresno State on Friday at 6 p.m. The Vandals last made the NCAA tournament in 1990.

or McPherson, about 38 miles away.

According to Expedia.com, hotel rooms are available for \$48 to \$205 a night in Wichita and in Hutchinson, it's slim picking with only three hotels showing rooms available, at \$45 to \$85 a night.

Leroy Scantlin of Jerome doesn't have to worry about making hotel reservations. He's been going to the national tournament for about the last 20 years and every year makes his hotel reservation at the Econo Lodge for the next season right after the tournament.

"We have a year-round reservation," Scantlin said. "We have reserved tickets in the same seats every year."

Leroy and his wife, Karolyn have driven the 1,164 mile trip from Twin Falls to Hutchinson "for as long as I can remember," he said.

"We make a little vacation out of it. We have some family that lives in Kansas and we have a lot of friends now who live in there in Hutch. We see them every year, we go out to dinner together. It's a lot of fun."

The drive is about 17 hours and the Scantlins break it up into two days, staying the night in Sidney, Neb., near the Colorado border. They shop at Cabela's, which makes its

corporate home in Sidney, before embarking on the rest of the drive to Hutchinson.

Denver is another logical pit-stop to break up the two-day drive and according to Expedia.com, you can find a hotel for the night from \$44 to \$152. Be sure to fill up the tank in Colorado, which has the lowest gas prices in the nation. You can find gas in Denver for \$3.10 a gallon.

Flying into Wichita is another option, but be ready to pony up some bucks.

A look at Expedia.com Wednesday afternoon showed a low ticket price of \$603 from Boise to Wichita, departing March 19 and returning March 25.

From Salt Lake, the cheap-

est ticket is \$443, with two stops in Los Angeles and Dallas. For \$454 there are tickets available on Frontier, with just one stop in Denver.

Economy lot parking in Boise is \$7/day and \$11.50/day in the garage. In Salt Lake it's \$7/day for economy and \$28/day in the garage. From Wichita, a rental car costs \$220 to \$260/week for an economy car.

Carpenter said driving through Hutchinson is easy, even with the influx of people in town.

"Once you're here, the sports arena is on a major thoroughfare, there is ton of parking and a lot of really good restaurants to check out," Carpenter said. "There are a

ton of people everywhere and it's a lot of fun."

Leroy and Karolyn watch every game in the upper bracket every year and of course watched Pierre Jackson and the rest of the Golden Eagles win the NJCAA national championship last season.

"It's so much fun to get to see all these teams that have been ranked throughout the year and you get to see players before they move onto the next level," Leroy Scantlin said. "We enjoy it. Last year, we didn't think they could make it all the way. This year, if they keep their heads on their shoulders, and keep working hard, they have the horses to go all the way."

Kentucky, Syracuse Have Edge for Top NCAA Seeds

Even the chairman of the tight-lipped NCAA selection committee can't deny this simple fact: Heading into this week's conference tournaments, there's Kentucky and Syracuse, and then everybody else.

In a teleconference to preview Sunday's release of the NCAA tournament pairings, committee chairman Jeff Hathaway all but handed two of the four top seeds to the Wildcats and Orange, each of whom entered their conference tournaments with a record of 30-1.

"I think we all agree that if the season ended today, we know who the two best teams are," he said Wednesday. "If

you're looking at 3 and 4 on the first line and the entire second line, we have the same handful of teams in mind but where they would be laced will be a tremendous debate."

Though Hathaway, the former athletic director at defending national champion Connecticut, did not get specific, among those lumped in to consideration for the other top seeds are Duke, Kansas, North Carolina, Missouri, Ohio State and Michigan State.

The brackets come out Sunday evening, with the tournament starting Tuesday.

When Hathaway was pressed about his Kentucky-Syracuse statement, he tried to back off.

"I don't want to say anyone

should feel secure," he said. "If I did, those two coaches would get after me and say we took away some motivation."

He said injuries or a suspension, each of which the committee considers when making up the bracket, could change the picture.

"The bottom line is, everyone today knows that if the season ended, we would say those two teams are the best in the country," Hathaway said.

As is typical in the lead-up to Selection Sunday, the chairman talked a lot about process but offered few specifics or promises.

He said the Big Ten, widely perceived as the strongest conference top to bottom this season, would not receive special consideration for a top seed.

"The fact of the matter is, conference RPI and conference rankings are not brought up in the rating room at all," Hathaway said, speaking to a change the selection committee made in the time since he joined five years ago.

He said the knee injury to freshman Branden Dawson of Michigan State, denying the Spartans of an eight-point, four-rebound player as they head into the postseason, also could play into their seeding.

"The ... great thing about this situation is, we're going to have the ability to see Michigan State play without him" in the Big Ten tournament, Hathaway said.

Two years ago, Purdue lost two of its last five games heading into the tournament after

say the heck with it, reach into his pocket, pull out a \$28 million check and let the real tears start flowing. Oprah could have joined them onstage and they all could have had a group hug.

Didn't happen, because despite all the warm fuzzies, the NFL is a business. The first thing rookies are told at orientation is that one day they will be cut, no matter what they have meant to the team or their cities.

No one gets to go out on their own terms. It's the

way of doing business, and the way the NFL will always be.

No matter what Brett Favre tried to do, he overstayed his welcome in Green Bay. Joe Montana finished his career in a Chiefs uniform, and any NFL fan of a certain age remembers how difficult it was to see Johnny Unitas in an ill-fated stint with San Diego after 17 seasons with the Baltimore Colts.

It wasn't going to be any different with Manning because he had outlasted his usefulness to the organization. Four neck operations, a missed season, holes to fill everywhere and a huge bonus payment due

meant it was time to go. Nothing personal, just business. Thanks for the Super Bowl. Appreciate the nice new stadium. Good luck in your future endeavors.

"As difficult as this day is, it is made difficult because of the greatness and the things Peyton has done for our city, for our state and for our franchise," Ir-say said. "There will be no other Peyton Manning."

Give Irsay some credit for at least trying to put a good public relations spin on things. Some owners — perhaps his late father, who fled Baltimore with the Colts in the middle of the night — would have simply issued a press release and

made sure Manning was around to clean out his locker.

Still, it was a surreal sight — Manning standing just behind Irsay and looking on while the owner choked up describing how much the quarterback meant to him. It figures to be even more surreal next month when Irsay stands in the same room with another quarterback — future No. 1 draft pick Andrew Luck — and talks about what a great future the Colts will have with their new star. After all, it was Manning who was a top pick himself 14 seasons ago.

"We all know that noth-

ing lasts forever," Manning said. "Times change, circumstances change, and that's the reality of playing in the NFL."

For Manning, that reality is tempered by the fact he will have another press conference in the coming months. He'll put on another team's hat, declare himself excited to be a (insert team name) and say another Super Bowl is his goal. He'll have no lack of suitors, with teams so desperate for a quarterback of his caliber that they will line up to give him millions despite his advancing age and concerns over his health.

The Colts can move on,

too. There's a new coach, new people in the front office, and soon there will be a new team on the field. Fans can move on, too, with the focus shifting from Manning's health to the tantalizing possibility that Luck will be the Colts' next superstar quarterback.

It is, as Manning says, the reality of playing in the NFL. Someone is always going to be looking for your job, and someday someone will get it.

Doesn't matter if you salvaged a franchise. Doesn't matter if you built a stadium.

Nothing personal. Just business.

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
