Ultrasound Bill Reaches Senate

The Senate State Affairs Committee heard two hours of heated testimony on the controversial requirement.

BOISE • Do mandatory ultrasounds give abortion-seeking women crucial information needed to make a decision, or violate their privacy and impede their right to seek a legal medical procedure?

That was the heavy question the Senate State Affairs Committee had to consider on Wednesday

morning as it weighed a bill that would mandate pre-abortion ultrasounds. After two hours of testimony, the committee voted 7-2 on party lines to pass the bill to the Senate floor, sparking vocal protests from people who had shown up to oppose it.

The legislation, sponsored by Sen. Chuck Winder, R-Boise, would require physicians to perform an ultrasound on women

seeking an abortion, then record the heartbeat and the gestational age. The law would also establish a list of free ultrasound providers in the state, most of which would be at pregnancy crisis centers.

The law already requires physicians to offer to let women see an ultrasound image, but doesn't mandate the procedure. Under both the current and proposed laws, women aren't forced to see that image.

Emotions ran high as people testified for and against the bill, and

both sides claimed they were supporting women. Supporter Sen. Sheryl Nuxoll, R-Cottonwood, said the requirement offers all the information a woman needs to make an informed decision, while Dwight Scarborough of Boise said he was standing up for women like his daughter by opposing the legislation.

Sue Phillely of Boise presented a petition with more than 4,000 signatures of Idahoans who opposed the legislation. The proposed law "makes a mockery of the expressed

Republican goal of less government," she said. Ardvell Bajema of Fruitland showed photos — one of a fetus at seven weeks, and a graphic picture of an aborted fetus at 10 weeks.

Monica Hopkins of the American Civil Liberties Union also pointed out that the free ultrasounds at pregnancy crisis centers wouldn't count under the law, as the legislation specifies the abortion provider must fill out the form.

"Currently, no abortion provider

WIND IN YOUR WALLET?

Idaho Power seeks changes to some small-scale power contracts that it says will save its customers money.

TWIN FALLS • On Monday, Idaho Power Co. requested approval to stop buying power from projects eligible for certain small-scale federal contracts.

The request is part of the utility company's attempt to improve the Idaho Public Utilities Commission pricing method for the reduced rate contracts. Idaho Power wants to change several key elements of how such contracts are priced. Meanwhile, company representatives argue that they need an agreement "pause" because they are racking up higher rates for their customers.

So What is This?

Idaho Power is required to purchase power from energy projects that are eligible under the federal Public Utilities Regulatory Policies Act. It's a rule that's been around since the 1970s, but with the help of tax incentives, Idaho Power says it's been flooded with requests for PURPA contracts over the past few years.

Specifically, it's seen a rush on wind production. The company has courted some wind projects in the past, but views it as an unreliable energy source in such quantities since it mostly blows at times when the company needs the energy the least, said Mark Stokes, Idaho Power's power supply planning manager.

The company thought PURPA requests would dwindle after the PUC tightened a cap on which projects are eligible in 2010. But that hasn't happened.

A Home to Call Their Own

Idaho charter schools could get the state's help securing facilities under a bill introduced Tuesday.

TWIN FALLS • After five years of renting their school building, Xavier Charter School officials want to own it.

But it won't be an easy process. Unlike school districts, the Twin Falls public charter school can't pursue a voter-supported levy for facility needs.

That leaves the school to issue bonds and pay them back with interest.

Despite the challenges, Board Chairwoman Debbi Burr said the intent has always been to purchase their school building on North College Road.

"We want the school to be here long-term," she said.

Simpson, Allies Plan Another Attempt to Confront Debt

TWIN FALLS • A congressional coalition is assembling legislation to tackle the federal debt, but don't expect to see much action on it this year.

That's according to U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson,

R-Idaho, who said he would love if a bill being prepped by a coalition of House members was introduced for debate this spring. However, he doesn't expect the chances of that are likely before this fall's elections. The bill is based around past proposals such as those by the Simpson-Bowles commission in 2010, using tax changes and spending cuts to tackle national debt issues.

Simpson visited the *Times-News* office Wednesday to discuss some of the pressing is-

sues currently facing the nation and Idaho.

He also remarked on the May primary races for his seat. M.C. "Chick" Heileson of Idaho Falls, who unsuccessfully challenged Simpson two years ago, will vie with him again for the Republican nomination. Meanwhile, three Democrats — Jack Wayne Chappell of Buhl, and Nicole LeFavour and Eldon Wallace of Boise — will compete in their own primary.

Alleged La Oficina Shooter Goes to Trial

JEROME • A man accused of firing a gun near a crowd gathered outside a Jerome bar will face a trial for an aggravated assault charge.

Rogelio Mendoza, 43, was charged with the crime after holding up in a house with two other suspects following the Feb. 6 shooting.

Along with Mendoza, Ayde Demara-Lozano, 50, and Edgar Salazar-Francisco, 23, were charged with resisting or obstructing officers.

Only one witness, Romulo Martinez, was called during the preliminary hearing Wednesday in

Jerome County 5th District Court.

Martinez said a fight broke out in the La Oficina bar at 160 W. Main St. and he went out onto the street when pepper spray filled the air.

He began walking down the sidewalk toward his brother's car when he said he saw Mendoza walking in the street. Martinez said he heard Mendoza say in Spanish that people would have to deal with him if they had a problem.

Mendoza then allegedly took a handgun from his belt and fired two shots at the ground in Martinez's direction.

"I felt pieces of pavement

hit me and on my forehead," Martinez said.

Although defense attorney Stacy DePew said Mendoza's actions didn't qualify as aggravated assault because the gun was not pointed at Martinez at any time, Judge Thomas Borresen disagreed.

"He was close enough such that he was struck with debris from the pavement," Borresen said. "He was afraid as a result of the defendant's actions."

Each suspect has an April 16 pretrial hearing scheduled for the obstructing charges.

Borresen scheduled an appearance in district court for Mendoza for April 2.

ACCUSED WENDY'S ROBBER WILL FACE TRIAL

JEROME • As he finished up his duties closing up the Wendy's in Jerome the night of Jan. 26, Kody Rumsfelt said he heard the back doorbell ring. He assumed it was a co-worker who had just left, returning for a forgotten item. Instead, he was met with the barrel of a gun pointed at him from just a few inches away.

Rumsfelt, a shift leader at the restaurant, testified at a preliminary hearing Wednesday in Jerome County 5th District Court to determine if the state had enough evidence to proceed to trial against Taylor Cnossen, one of the accused robbers.

Rumsfelt said the two masked men demanded his cellphone as he backed into the restaurant's office, then demanded he open the safe and empty its contents for them.

Nick Maria, 18, also testified at the hearing, admitting to robbing the restaurant along with Cnossen.

"He said he was going to rob Wendy's and I could have half the cash if I came with him," Maria said. Just a few hours later, after gathering supplies like masks and duct tape, the

two rang the back doorbell at the Wendy's on South Lincoln Avenue after waiting until the closing manager was alone, Maria said.

As Cnossen, 19, allegedly held the handgun pointed at Rumsfelt, Maria said the manager's hands were shaking so badly he couldn't put the money in the backpack the two had brought.

Later, with more than \$900 emptied from the safe, Maria said Cnossen taped Rumsfelt's hands together behind his back and the two fled to a waiting car, where three more young men waited.

According to a former employer, Cnossen was no stranger to the closing procedure at Wendy's. Patty Lyman, co-owner of the Jerome Wendy's, testified at the hearing that Cnossen worked for her for about four months in 2009, including during the closing shift.

Overall, Lyman said, Cnossen was a good employee besides some teenage attitude problems. Lyman testified Cnossen had bragged to other employees that he was attending a concert rather than coming to work one night. For that reason, she refused to hire him back when he spoke with her just a few

months ago, she said.

Near the end of the hearing, defense counsel Loren Bingham called Cnossen's girlfriend, Kayla Miller, to speak. Miller, 18, said she had picked Cnossen up at Maria's house the night of the alleged robbery at nearly 2 a.m. This contradicted Maria's testimony that he had driven all four men home after counting and dividing the money stolen in the robbery.

Although there were inconsistencies in many of the testimonies, Judge Thomas Borresen said matters of credibility would need to be decided by a jury, and sent the case on to trial.

Cnossen was charged with grand theft, burglary, robbery, battery and false imprisonment. Another man, Branden Galbreath, 20, also faces the same charges in the case, according to online court records. And, Maria testified at the hearing that he will also face charges in the crime. He said there is an open recommendation for a prison sentence with retained jurisdiction from the prosecutor in exchange for his testimony.

Borresen lowered Cnossen's bond to \$150,000 from \$250,000 and scheduled a district court hearing for April 2.

For charter schools like Xavier, a bill introduced in the Legislature Tuesday could provide some help.

Charter schools that raise money for buildings by issuing bonds could get assistance from the state in repaying the interest. The bond levy equalization program is already available to school districts.

Burr said she was pleased to hear about the bill.

"It will help charter schools have some of the same advantages as (other) public schools," she said.

Charter schools are funded using public money and are held to the same standards as other schools. However, they have more freedom when it comes to curriculum.

Magic Valley charter schools include Xavier,

Wings Charter Middle School in Twin Falls, Heritage Academy in Jerome and North Valley Academy in Gooding.

For Xavier, owning their school facility has been a topic of discussion since last fall. Burr said the school board is negotiating with their landlord and can't share more details.

The school pays \$786,000 per year in rent to Twin Falls Development LLC. Under the lease agreement, rent will go up 1.5 percent next year.

Once Xavier owns the building, Burr said the school board could move forward with planning for future projects.

For instance, the school doesn't have an auditorium. Burr said it's a need, especially with the school's classical, fine arts emphasis.

Heritage Academy — which opened its doors this fall — could also be affected by the legislation.

Principal Randy Reddington said he'd like to see the bill go through.

"I think it's a fair opportunity for charter schools," he said.

Heritage Academy has a two-year facility agreement with Magic Valley Christian School — the previous owner of its building.

After Heritage Academy bought the building, Magic Valley Christian agreed to continue carrying the mortgage note while the new school gets on its feet.

Eventually, Heritage Academy officials will have to refinance the building through a regular lender.

But as a new school, Reddington said Heritage Academy doesn't have an established financial track record. Plus, they can't seek a taxpayer support through a levy.

"I think that realistically is one of the challenges charter schools run into," he said.

"We're still seeing a flood of contract requests," Stokes said. "We're trying to prevent our customer rates from getting any worse. Hopefully we can get all the pricing situations worked out."

What Idaho Power Wants:

The company seeks several changes, all of which it argues will keep rates from rising. One would shorten PURPA contracts from last year's 20 years to five.

"Twenty years puts all the risk on our customers," Stokes said. "Our customers still have to pay that higher PURPA rate even if the rate

could be lower."

Another change would be setting a stricter schedule on when a contract is legally enforceable. And, the company wants to base all PURPA pricing — not just wind — more on the company's need for the energy.

What Wind Developers Think:

Not surprisingly, Brian Jackson, president of American Wind Group, says this is an attack on wind energy.

Jackson's company is currently pursuing legal action against the state for improperly limiting two power contracts in Cassia County.

He's optimistic Idaho Power's proposed contract changes won't affect his

company's lawsuit if passed, but says it'll have an impact on the industry.

"In the end, the PUC needs to look at what makes sense and not decide on something at the expense of one party," he said.

The purpose of PURPA was to diversify energy production and ownership, Jackson said. With a federal backing, wind energy developers can go up against the larger utility companies.

And while he understands that wind energy is currently booming, he says that preparing for low load growth isn't the right attitude.

"In a national and global energy crisis, I say we need to be doing more," Jackson said. "I think it's a unique time that the state could take advantage."

entrants into the race. It's the first time he'll run in a closed primary in Idaho — only registered Republican voters can participate — and he noted turnout will be a question, especially with some voters unhappy about having to declare a party. But he doesn't believe closing it will dramatically change his race.

Simpson applauded Wednesday's announcement that a three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld last year's action by Congress to take wolves back off the endangered species list and forbid

judicial review of the change.

It was Simpson who co-authored the rider that allowed the wolf delisting. Since then, critics have argued it set a concerning precedent, and Simpson himself was unsure how often Congress should intervene so directly in species management.

"I don't like this as a means of skirting the Endangered Species Act," Simpson said. "But a lot of times we end up managing these species in court."

"It does concern me and it's something we have to address."

He also touched on the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's recent choice to

delay a final decision on the China Mountain Wind Project, located in the heart of priority sage grouse habitat.

"If you just look at the bird's migration patterns and looked at the most heavily populated corridors, China Mountain was located right there," Simpson said. "The BLM is doing just as good as job as they can. I think Wyoming has the model plan right now and Idaho is looking at that and trying to catch up."

Like many other state officials, Simpson doesn't want to see the bird listed as an endangered species.

"We have to try to prevent a listing and I think we can," he said.

offers free ultrasounds," Hopkins said. A woman who gets a free ultrasound at a pregnancy crisis center might be surprised when she needs a second one from her physician.

People on both sides of the issue invoked the Holocaust, and comments from testifiers often elicited negative reactions from the audience. Committee chairman Curtis McKenzie, R-Nampa, frequently had to remind people to remain respectful.

During the post-testimony debate, two issues

stuck out to the senators: Giving a voice to the unborn, and unnecessary government intrusion into citizens' medical decisions.

Sen. Patti Ann Lodge, R-Houston, said while she is anti-abortion, she was concerned about rape and incest victims having to undergo the ultrasound against their will.

"And I'm also concerned about the state mandating a procedure when we are also fighting against procedures that are placed upon us on the federal level," Lodge said.

Sen. Edgar Malepeai, D-Pocatello, said this is a private issue that should stay between physicians and patients. And Sen. Michelle

Stennett, D-Ketchum, said the state doesn't currently mandate any other medical procedures, with the exception of an injection during execution and a blood draw if someone refuses to take a breath alcohol test when pulled over for suspicion of driving under the influence.

"In at least two cases, it has to do with someone who has behaved criminally," Stennett said. There is no other precedent for an invasive procedure, she added.

In the end, Lodge and her fellow Republicans voted to send the bill to the Senate floor, while Malepeai and Stennett voted against the motion.

Utility Repairs Downed Power Line

EDEN • About 200 Idaho Power customers in Hazelton, Eden and southern Twin Falls were without power for part of Wednesday as a result of a line down along Interstate 84.

The Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center reported the power line down on the road at milepost 180, west of the Vineyard

Road overpass.

The report about the fallen line came in at about 10:24 a.m., and Jerome County Sheriff's deputies along with First Segregation Fire District

out of Eden responded. Idaho Power also sent a crew to assess and repair the situation.

It wasn't immediately known Wednesday what caused the line to come down.

NRA Joins Those Tweaking Hunting Amendment

BOISE • Feel the deja vu?

On Wednesday, the House Ways and Means Committee introduced a house joint memorial that would allow voters to consider adding the rights to hunt, fish and trap to the Idaho Constitution.

Sound familiar? Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, introduced the original amendment in February. The idea, he said, is to preserve the right to hunt, fish and trap in the state's constitution. After multiple tweaks to the language to appease the attorney general, Department of Fish and Game, and the Idaho Water Users Association, Heider crafted legislation that passed the Senate unanimously.

Then the National Rifle Association wanted to put its footprint on the language, Heider said.

The new resolution adds the phrase "including by the use of traditional methods" in the first sentence, and specifies that the right will be preserved for the people and managed through the laws, rules and proclamations "that preserve the future of hunting, fishing and trapping."

It also adds the sentence "Public hunting, fishing and trapping of wildlife shall be a preferred means of managing and controlling wildlife."

Matt Dogali and Lacey Biles of the National Rifle Association said the Fairfax, Va.-based organization didn't support the previous

amendment because the language left it vulnerable to "clever attacks by anti-hunting groups," Biles said.

If the resolution passes the House and Senate, voters will see it on the ballot in November.

Health Insurance Mandate Foe Gives Fodder to Reform

This editorial appeared in Sunday's Los Angeles Times:

Mary Brown, whose case against the 2010 healthcare reform law is pending before the Supreme Court, argues that the government shouldn't be able to force her to carry health insurance. Joined by three other individuals and a small-business trade association, she's asking the justices to rule that the law's insurance mandate is unconstitutional and that the rest of the act should be thrown out with it. But new revelations about her own situation make the case for the other side.

As the Los Angeles Times' David Savage reported, Brown and her husband have fallen on hard times since filing the lawsuit, largely because their auto repair business in Florida failed. The couple has filed for bankruptcy protection, asking a federal court to wipe out close to \$60,000 in consumer debts. Significantly, their unpaid bills include \$2,750 owed to a local hospital and physicians group and \$1,735 to out-of-state medical specialists.

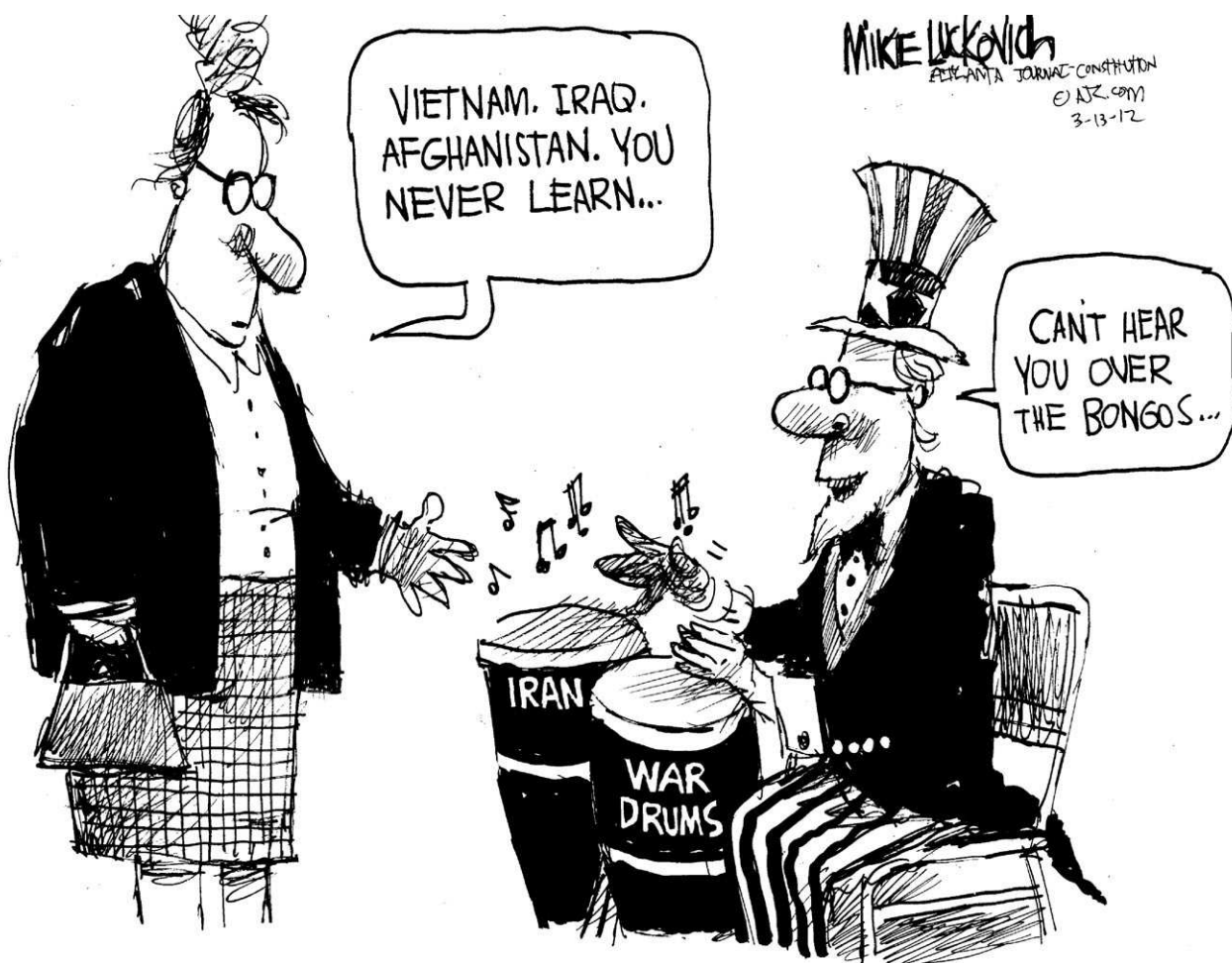
The disclosures are political gold for the Obama administration, transforming Brown from a champion of individual liberty into an exemplar of a problem the new law was designed to address. Uninsured and underinsured Americans rack up about \$60 billion in medical bills every year that they cannot afford, forcing doctors and hospitals to pass those costs on to federal taxpayers and those patients who can pay their bills. It's not impinging on personal freedom to ask people to cover their own medical tabs. The mechanism Congress created to do that is the individual mandate.

The insurance mandate and premium subsidies in the healthcare law are ex-

pected to significantly reduce the amount of uncompensated care and cost shifting. The mandate also helps balance the law's insurance reforms, which bar companies from denying coverage to people with preexisting conditions and from making their policies prohibitively expensive. To prevent people from signing up for coverage when they need treatment, then dropping it when they're healthy, Congress required all adult Americans to maintain health insurance coverage or pay a tax penalty.

Brown and her allies contend that the law wouldn't work as Congress intended if the mandate were removed, so the entire act must be scrapped if the mandate is found unconstitutional. But her own complaints about the cost illustrate the flaw in that reasoning. Much of the law is aimed at slowing the growth of healthcare expenses and improving the quality of care. Those provisions are still valuable regardless of what happens to the mandate. Nor do the insurance reforms fail if the mandate is eliminated. Lawmakers would simply have to find another mechanism to discourage people who can afford insurance from gaming the system. Republicans in Congress have proposed several ways to do so, including financial penalties and waiting periods for people who seek insurance only when they need treatment.

Although Brown is wrong about the mandate, her concerns about cost are valid. In their zeal to make sure insurance policies were comprehensive, lawmakers didn't give people enough flexibility to save money by insuring themselves against only the largest risks. Nor have they done enough to rein in the escalating price of medical care. But those are reasons to keep building on the 2010 law, not to repeal it.



After Santorum Sweep, What's Next for GOP?

Rick Santorum deserves credit for his impressive primary victories in Mississippi and Alabama. Newt Gingrich led us to believe he would win both states. He didn't, but he has vowed to fight on as the "real" conservative candidate, as opposed to Mitt Romney who only "says" he is a conservative.

Romney still has a substantial lead in delegates, but lags in one vital category: enthusiasm. If candidate Barack Obama gave his supporters the political equivalent of a sugar rush in 2008, Mitt Romney is broccoli. It's his Mormon faith; it's his perceived liberal tendencies while governor of Massachusetts; it's his inability as a very wealthy man to connect with average voters; it's all of the above and probably more.

Rick Santorum is the Latin Mass in an age of contemporary Catholic worship. He is an Underwood typewriter, not an iMac computer. He is the U.S. Postal Service, not email. Santorum believes deeply in God when many others either do not, or focus more on themselves than on any higher power. He is a family man in an age of divorce, co-



habitation and out-of-wedlock births. In short, he may be too good for us; too picture-perfect; too religious and too much of a scolder. Voters want to know where the country has gone wrong, but they don't want to believe they are responsible for steering it in that direction, or that they made a mistake four years ago in putting so much faith and trust in President Obama. They want more of John F. Kennedy's 1960 slogan "we can do better" and less of "you could do worse than elect me."

President Obama's latest slide in the polls — from 50 percent approval to 41 percent, according to the latest New York Times/CBS News poll — presents a delicious opportunity for the eventual GOP nominee. But if the candidates continue to squabble and divide the vote, the president could eventually get his act together, perhaps approving a slightly diverted Keystone pipeline, causing gas prices to lower or producing a

stunning foreign policy success, though that is less likely given that so much of the Middle East seems beyond his control.

Nothing is predictable this political season and what seems true today may flip and become less true, even untrue, tomorrow.

Santorum's latest victories tell us nothing about the general election. Any Republican can expect to win Alabama and Mississippi. Equally, Mitt Romney's victory in Hawaii tells us nothing, because that state is mostly Democratic and can be expected to vote for Obama in November.

Newt Gingrich vows to fight on until the Republican National Convention in Tampa Bay, but he can only be a spoiler now. The calendar does not favor him and the voters seem to have decided that while he may have some great ideas among the flood of them he regularly disgorges from his fertile mind, for him, there appears to be no clear path to the nomination. Gingrich hasn't won a primary since Georgia, the state he represented in Congress, and he probably won't win another.

It's down to Romney and Santorum and with no new debates scheduled — the

last formal debate was Feb. 22 — voters are likely to remain divided, which de-

lights the Obama campaign. As of now — and one must always qualify — Mitt Romney still seems the likely Republican nominee. But the real question for Republicans is this: If Romney is having such a difficult time beating Rick Santorum — and to a lesser extent Newt Gingrich — how will he marshal the forces necessary to beat President Obama in the fall? Next week's Illinois primary will say a lot about Romney's rebound strength. If he doesn't win there, he could be in serious trouble.

Republican opposition to the president could be enough to overcome their lack of enthusiasm about Romney, but it's a poor campaign strategy and it could well backfire. At least the Obama campaign is hoping it will.

Cassia County Wrongfully Charges for Drug Testing

It is my belief Cassia County Adult Probation has been wrongfully charging probationers for drug testing.

Close to \$64,000 was allocated for testing in 2011; \$89,000 for 2012, monies which come from the monthly cost of supervision paid by probationers.

Recently we requested printouts of all fees paid by Leesa Woodbury for 2011. Cost of supervision paid for by money order was easily printed at the touch of a button. It took six weeks for them to provide Leesa receipts for drug testing fees. Each receipt had to be print-

ed one at a time. All copies of 2011 receipts show her 2012 address, they say printed and reprinted, payment type, money order, that her color was turquoise, and the heading reads Mini-Cassia Misdemeanor Probation.

The originals we found have her correct address for 2011, none of them say printed, payment type, cash, a few say olive, which was her color, six of the nine months for last year. The heading on printout of cost of supervision reads, Cassia County Adult Probation. None of the numbers on UA receipts correspond with those on supervision fees. Leesa paid more than \$600 for UAs in one year.

With close to 1,000 probation-

ers paying for testing until just recently, plus money being allocated for it, the probationers are due a refund. A complete investigation needs conducted into this matter.

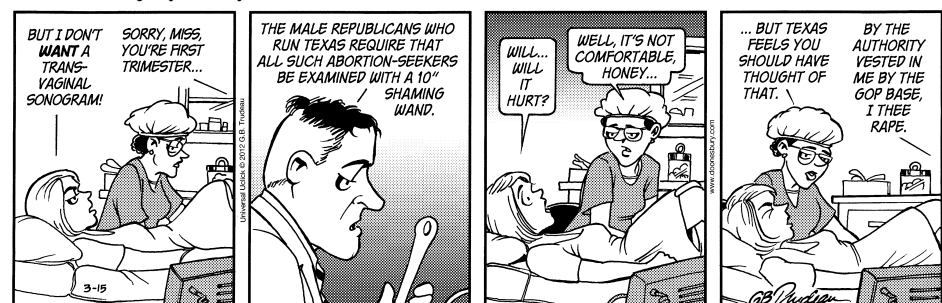

Idaho Ponders First Felony Animal Abuse Penalties

BOISE • Idaho lawmakers, historically reluctant to entertain animal cruelty bills, took two of them head-on Wednesday — either of which would put felony animal abuse laws on the books in the state for the first time.

Spurred by the specter of a much stricter proposed ballot initiative from animal rights groups, the state House took action in passing a measure that toughens penalties for animal torture and gamecock fighting.

The House Agricultural Committee later passed a Senate animal abuse bill sponsored by the livestock industry but considered less appealing by animal advocates.

Idaho is one of only three states without a felony animal cruelty law. Idaho's powerful agriculture industry has been wary of animal cruelty measures, but Wyatt Prescott, vice president of the Idaho Cattle Association, said his group is in favor of legislation that protects animals without harming ranchers' livelihoods.

"Our business is taking care of those animals," Prescott said. "It's impor-

tant for us as an industry to stand up against those that are treating their animals wrong."

Under the House measure sponsored by state Sen. Ken Andrus, people convicted of torturing pets and organizing gamecock fights where drugs and gambling are present could face felony charges.

House lawmakers voted 64-4 to pass the plan, which Andrus calls a realistic proposal that toughens state laws while still protecting Idaho's agriculture industry by exempting livestock and production animals. The measure was applauded by animal welfare groups.

"In my mind, we've done the prudent thing," said Andrus, chairman of the House Agricultural Committee. "I think it's naive to think we cannot do anything."

That committee later approved a plan that would apply to all animals, including livestock, and make certain animal cruelty convictions felony offenses.

The measure comes partly in response to instances where some animal owners facing financial difficulties failed to feed or properly care for livestock, including a high-profile case in 2011

involving dozens of starved and neglected sheep, goats, pigs, llamas and horses.

The agriculture industry-backed legislation was overwhelmingly approved by the Senate in February, but animal rights activists said the plan doesn't go far enough because it fails to address torture or rooster fights.

Both plans face legislative steps before passing, though the industry-supported plan is closer to becoming law.

Idaho and the Dakotas are the only states that do not have felony animal cruelty provisions.

John Goodwin, animal cruelty policy director for the Humane Society of the United States, is putting the heat on the non-complying states, backing a ballot initiative in North Dakota to add a felony to state law.

"We are now in the 21st century. Things have changed and things have evolved. People want their pets to have protections from cruel acts of abuse," Goodwin said.

The North Dakota Legislature is not in session in 2012, though in 2011 a bill that would have made certain repeat animal cruelty offenses a felony died on the House floor despite industry-wide support.

"It was really a fear campaign by a few legislators that were opposed to the changes," said Rep. Corey Mock, the North Dakota Democrat who sponsored the plan. "The vast majority of the state supports changes to the law."

If efforts to enact felonies in North Dakota and Idaho succeed, Goodwin plans to hone in on the South Dakota, which has neither a ballot initiative nor a major animal cruelty bill in the works, in 2013.

Land Board Limits Bill Dies in Committee

BOISE (AP) • A bill to rein in the Idaho state endowment fund's expansion into commercial businesses hit a wall when it failed to muster support in the Senate Resources Committee.

The measure was a response to the endowment's 2010 purchase of Affordable Self Storage, criticized by some as an inappropriate foray into private-sector competition.

It would have required the state Land Board to sell or lease all improvements on endowment-owned ground and sell all business operations.

But it foundered in committee Wednesday for lack of a motion.

After the meeting, Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, said the move wasn't on accident.

"There's more than one way to kill a bill," Heider said. "We weren't necessarily opposed to that policy, but we weren't in favor of it, either." Sen. Bert Brackett, R-

Rogerson, agreed. "It does send a definite message to the Land Board and the Department of Lands," Brackett said. "All said and done, that could be more effective than passing the bill."

The measure had cleared the House, 66-to-3.

But the Senate panel was inundated with pleas from

school boards and the PTA to reject the bill.

These groups argued that the bill would tie the Land Board's hands in investing in properties that produce the highest returns for Idaho's public schools.

U.S. Appeals Court Allows Wolf Hunts

BILLINGS, Mont. • A federal appeals court on Wednesday rejected a lawsuit from conservation groups that want to block wolf hunting and trapping that have killed more than 500 of the predators across the Northern Rockies in recent months.

The ruling from a three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said Congress had the right to intervene when it stripped protections from wolves last spring.

Lawmakers stepped in after court rulings kept wolves on the endangered list for years after they reached recovery goals. Wildlife advocates claimed in their lawsuit that Congress violated the Constitution's separation of powers by interfering with the courts.

But in an opinion authored by Judge Mary Schroeder, the court said Congress was within its rights. Schroeder wrote that

lawmakers changed the Endangered Species Act to deal with Northern Rockies wolves, and did not directly interfere with the court's prerogative to decide when the law is being followed.

The amendment marked the first time Congress has forcibly removed a species' endangered status. It was tacked onto a federal budget bill by Idaho Republican Rep. Mike Simpson and Montana Democratic Sen. Jon Tester.

"This case has made it clear that those who persist in trying to manage wildlife through the courts, in spite of all scientific evidence that this species has recovered, no longer have a defensible position," Simpson said Wednesday.

Michael Robinson with the Center for Biological Diversity, one of the groups that sued to restore protections, said a Supreme Court appeal was possible but no decision had been made.

"We're very disappointed and very saddened," Robin-

son said. "Hundreds of wolves have been hunted and trapped and snared, and they are essential to their ecosystem."

He called the congressional budget bill rider that lifted protections "undemocratic" and said that it set a precedent for future political med-

dling with imperiled wildlife. Wolves once thrived across North America but were exterminated across most of the continental U.S.

by the 1930s, through government sponsored poisoning and bounty programs.

They were put on the endangered list in 1974. Over the last two decades, state and federal agencies have spent more than \$100 million on wolf restoration programs across the country.

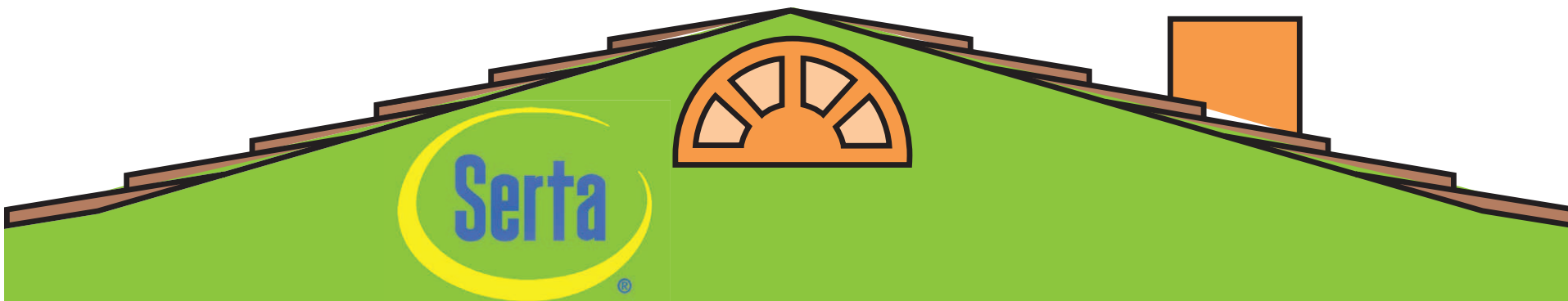

FISHING FOR MONEY

A Jerome man caught a nice surprise when he reeled in a jaw-tagged rainbow trout: a cash reward. The program helps Idaho Power measure stocking success, while drawing anglers onto the river.

TWIN FALLS • Every year, as soon as duck season comes to an end, Dale Boll grabs his gear and heads to the water for another reason: to fish.

He was surprised when last summer at the Bell Rapids boat docks in Hagerman he caught a bit of cash, too.

Boll was awarded \$100 for catching a jaw-tagged rainbow trout with a cash reward posted on its tag. He called a number and soon received a check in the mail from Idaho Power Co. It was an added perk to a pastime the Jerome retiree has enjoyed since childhood.

Boll said he caught as many as 40 jaw-tagged trout last year, but just one with an instant cash reward. The other tags were entered into a drawing to win \$1,000.

Idaho Power, as part of its license agreement to operate 17 hydroelectric power plants on the Snake River and its tributaries, releases 42,000 rainbow trout of at least 10 inches into the Snake each year.

Catch and Call

If you catch a jaw-tagged rainbow trout in the Snake River, record the number on the tag; date and location where you caught the fish; and whether you released or harvested the fish. Also, your name, mailing address and telephone number. Anglers who provide this information will be entered in a drawing for \$1,000; call 800-388-6011.

Fish are stocked in a number of places from CJ Strike near Mountain Home to Centennial Park in Twin Falls, spokesman Brad Bowlin said. Several thousand are fitted with jaw tags.

When an angler catches a tagged trout, he or she can call Idaho Power to give the tag number and where the fish was caught — and to be entered in a \$1,000 drawing.

Idaho Power signs describing the program, with the number for anglers to call, are posted in many locales along the Snake, including Centennial Waterfront Park.

Relieve Stress by Tying Flies, Then Catch Fish

During a visit to Utah's High Uintas one fall day, my friend Jeremy Shoemaker and I visited a scenic river to do some fly fishing.

It was my first time casting a fly line — before that, I was an avid bait fisherman — but Jeremy's patient instruction helped me a great deal. I worried that I'd get the line all tangled, that I'd scare the fish, that I'd frustrate my good friend, who already had been fly fishing many times.

But as we stood dressed in waders in the cold river, I found myself a little surprised: I didn't tangle the line — though I did manage to hook my shoulder at least once — and I even walked away with a trout or two in my creel.

If I remember correctly, Jeremy didn't tie his own flies but had a pretty good

collection of many varieties he'd purchased at Utah fishing shops.

There's nothing wrong with buying flies, of course — but many anglers I've spoken with since my introduction to fly fishing have told me about the thrills they've experienced by catching fish on something they've made themselves. They tell me how much fun it is, what satisfaction it brings, and how tying lowers their stress.

"It relieves stress, takes my mind off whatever," Twin Falls angler Dennis Brauer said in 2010.

That's what I need: stress relief.

You too? There's help in sight, if what these anglers have told me is true.

A fly-tying course will be offered 6:30-8 p.m. Tuesdays beginning March 27 at the College of Southern Idaho's Northside Campus in Gooding, taught by Idaho Department of Fish and Game regional fisheries biologist Scott Stanton. The class, which costs \$30 plus a \$40 supply kit, will teach how to tie dry and wet flies, streamers and nymphs. Call 934-8678.

SNAG A FUR AT ANNUAL AUCTION

NAMPA • It's that time of year again, when the Idaho Department of Fish and Game will auction furs, hides, antlers, traps and miscellaneous hunting and fishing equipment.

Set your calendars for March 31, when the auction takes place at the department's Southwest Region office, 3101 S. Powerline Road in Nampa.

Those interested may view items beginning at 8 a.m. The auction begins at 10 a.m.

All items were either seized by Fish and Game as evidence or salvaged. All carcasses are considered unfit for human consumption and are sold for use of the non-edible portions only.

A taxidermist-furbuyer license is required in advance to bid on bear parts, mountain lion parts or any furbearer for anyone in the business of buying and selling hides or animal mounts. Resident licenses are \$40 for one year, non-resident licenses are \$170. The licenses can be purchased at any Idaho Fish and Game office.

Buyers for personal use are not required to have a taxidermist-furbuyer license.

History has proven time and again that the surest way to guarantee the commercial success of a new centerfire cartridge is to get it adopted as the official U.S. or NATO military service round.

While most popular today in the prolific AR-15 platforms, the .223's abbreviated size allows it to be housed in every con-

ceivable action type popular nowadays: from single shot break open pistols to full blown bull-barreled target, tactical and varmint rifles.

My personal favorites are a vintage Ruger Mini-14 and a wonderfully accurate and affordable heavy barrel Howa Model 1500. The Mini is used for general plinking, jack rabbit and coyote hunting as well as home defense. The Howa is reserved for precision sniping of ground squirrels, prairie dogs and rock chucks.

The .223's military heritage insures an abundance of commercially produced bullets, brass, powders, weapons and aftermarket accessories as well as frequently released lots of inexpensive surplus 5.56mm brass and loaded ball ammo.

But please heed this caution: although the .223 Remington and 5.56mm are generally assumed to be identical and interchangeable, this is absolutely not the case. Because of significant differences in the chamber and throat dimensions, as well as peak operating pressures, .223 Remington ammunition may be safely fired in any 5.56mm weapon, but the converse is not true.

No matter how attractive the bargain, never fire 5.56 ammo in your .223 Remington firearms! For a good technical reference, check out www.thegunzone.com.

In the market for a wonderfully precise, Jack-of-all-trades small game, varmint and home-defense piece? You may want to consider joining the ranks of .223 Remington aficionados; the ammo, loading components and firearms are everywhere. Good shooting!

F&G TO MEET IN BOISE

BOISE • The Idaho Fish and Game Commission will set big game, gray wolf and chinook salmon seasons during a meeting March 21-22 at Fish and Game headquarters, 600 S. Walnut St., Boise.

Kephart Proves That Women Can Love, and Win, the Hunting Chase

BALTIMORE • Kari Kephart grew up as a competitive runner, good enough to win state championships in the two-mile event and in cross country at North Hagerstown High as well as a conference title while on scholarship at Mount St. Mary's.

The only things Kephart hunted for in those days were medals and trophies.

That changed when she met and married Jason Kephart, an avid hunter for most of his life who combined his passion with his profession as a taxidermist.

When I met him, it was, "Oh, really, you hunt?" Kari Kephart, 30, assistant principal at an elementary school in Dorchester County, recalled last week.

She would, too, soon enough. She has now been hunting as long as they've been married — five years — and is part of a growing number of Maryland women who have joined their boyfriends, husbands and female friends as part of the state's female hunting constituency.

"She knew it was my life and she took kindly to it," said Jason Kephart, who like his wife prefers using a bow to a gun.

According to Patricia Allen, wildlife and heritage program manager for the Maryland Department of Natural Resources, the hunting workshops geared toward women "always fill up," most recently a goose

hunt on the Eastern Shore in January. The National Rifle Association often holds Women on Target clinics in Northern Virginia.

Allen, who like Kephart has become an avid hunter after not growing up around it, said the DNR's fall Becoming an Outdoorswoman (BOW) program has become popular since its inception in 1995. A similar program has run nationally since 1991.

Last fall, the DNR had a three-day workshop that included 40 classes.

"Where I grew up it was very unusual for a woman to do something like that," said Allen, who grew up among dairy farmers in upstate New York. "Once I started, I was exposed to it and one of my co-workers mentored me because I had an interest."

Allen said BOW has helped "break down barriers" for women interested in hunting who for a variety of reasons — "intimidation, basic peer pressure, lack of opportunity" — were hesitant to get involved before.

"Some of those barriers were hard to overcome," Allen said.

For Roxanne Fleming, the barrier was plain old sexism. After moving to Essex from Saratoga Springs, N.Y., in 2004, Fleming was turned away from a few hunting clubs on the Eastern Shore because, she said, she was a woman.

So she joined BOW.

"It gives you the camaraderie," Fleming, 54, said. "I was able to find other women with similar interests."

Allen added that another barrier in the past was equipment, with women forced to use guns and bows designed for men. Several manufacturers have designed bows specifically for women — as evidenced by the fact that they now come in bright pink.

"It's easier to find than it used to be," Allen said.

While Allen proved to be a natural, taking down a whitetail deer on her second day of a weekend hunt, it took Kephart a lot longer.

Growing up, Kephart thought that deer hunting was akin to "animal cruelty" and didn't understand the benefits of controlling the herd or stocking the freezer with venison.

Having never pulled back a compound bow or fired a shotgun — "If somebody had told me I'd be doing it, I would never have believed them," she said — Kephart first joined her husband shortly after they got married.

Initially, it was just to watch.

"I sat in the tree stand getting cold and thought I might as well put a bow in my hands," she said.

It took Kephart into their second season together to take down her first whitetail, using a muzzleloader, and until her fourth to shoot one with a bow.

Thee quickly she had as an athlete feeling returned.

"It was amazing," she said. "I had been out so many times without seeing anything. I never imagined that it would be that exciting."

Tags reported to the power company help measure the success of its fish stocking program, Bowlin said.

So far the company, which started the program in 2007, has been pleased with the results.

"The return rate varies from project to project, spring versus fall and year to year," Idaho Power biologist Ben Reingold said. "This year we decided to move fish into areas getting better return rates, which should bring more fish to the creel. We are currently studying this using jaw tags and will compare to previous years and go from there. We would like to see at least 10 percent (return) or better."

The power company still releases trout near CJ Strike but has discontinued fitting

those fish with jaw tags because it received the information it sought in that area, Bowlin said. The company does, however, do occasional creel surveys there.

The company also has stopped its instant cash tags, Bowlin said, but anglers still can be entered into the drawing.

Unofficially, the tagging program serves as an incentive to fishermen.

Boll said he doesn't need an incentive, because he already fishes 150 to 200 times a year. But catching a jaw-tagged trout for him is a bonus.

"I haven't won the \$1,000 yet," he said. "I hope to win it next time."

Drawings are held twice a year, in February and September. February's winner was Boise resident Marvin Channer, who caught a jaw-tagged trout at CJ Strike, Bowlin said. It was a sizeable fish that was stocked in 2009.

Idaho Woman to Do Desert 100 Race for 10th Time

COEUR D'ALENE • Weeks ahead, Tia Flynn is haunted by the race.

At night, she dreams of the course she has tumbled her motorcycle across for years, the hills she has crashed on, the rivers where her bike has been baptized into competition.

Feeding the addiction, she watches the online video of races past. She takes in the roar and growl of 1,000 bikes along an endless stretch of starting line.

"I'm biting my fingernails and my heart rate goes up," she said with a laugh. "I'm all nervous, and it's just six weeks away!"

But the psych-out will ebb.

The Coeur d'Alene woman knows that by the time she starts up her KMT motorcycle on April 1, the day of the notorious Desert 100 race in Odessa, Wash., she will feel nothing but sheer elan.

"There's nothing else like it. When you're out there, anything can happen," said the mother of three, who has been racing dirt bikes since she was 12. "You just have to keep your head, but it clears your head at the same time. You can totally forget about everything, except what's going on in front of you."

This will be her 13th time since adolescence riding the toughest off-road race of the Inland Northwest. The course is 100 miles for men, 50 for women.

Tia fully acknowledges the course is dangerous, a mine field of rocks, crossed with deep rivers and bottlenecks where riders clog and crash.

She broke her collar bone one year, still managing to finish.

"It's really miserable," she said, oddly grinning and laughing. "It's so miserable!"

Winning used to be her goal. But now that she's 47 and her competitors younger every year, she is shooting to finish 10 in a row.

This year will be No. 10. "I don't know anybody who's done 10 in a row," she admitted. "They either crash out or get injured."

"That's huge," is the opinion of Tom Wuest, president of Panhandle Trail Riders Association, of Tia's quixotic goal.

Although Wuest has raced motorcycles since the 1970s, he can't name any riders in the region who have conquered the course 10 times in a row.

It's one starting line he hasn't been to himself. But he still knows the mythical opportunities for self-destruction at the Desert 100.

All riders do. "The Desert 100 is one of the toughest races in the northern region," Wuest said. "It has very dangerous

parts of it, and is technically difficult."

If anyone can shoot for 10 finishes, he added, it's Tia. She's gutsy, he said, "definitely out there" with her riding.

"I would say the amount of time she spends on a bike," he said. "She spends a lot of time in the saddle."

And she has become a self-made spokesperson for female riders, he noted holding an annual women's race that attracts more riders every year.

"Of all the women in our general area up here, her age group and her abilities, she's in the top five," Wuest said.

Tia just calls it a hobby. But it's clearly something more.

The spunky suburban mother, happy to talk up her hearing aid business, might not leave an immediate impression as a devout motorcycle racer.

But she loves being out in the open, she said, the freedom. She loves the fitness of it. And she grew up in a state

of competition, encouraged by her motorcycle racing father, Stan Toland.

Tia competed in about a dozen races a year for a while, though now she's down to six. The garage is cluttered with all her plaques and trophies.

Weekends are consumed with riding, requiring a drive to Juniper in the winter.

There's no imagining her without the bikes, said her husband, Eric.

"I don't know anybody else who races as much as she does," he said. "Oh yeah, it's an expensive hobby. But she usually is the one flipping the bill for most of it."

There's just no race like the Desert 100, Tia said.

It became her holy grail after she got back into riding in 2000, following a cash-strapped, 10-year hiatus when she was kicking out kids, working in the Air Force and obtaining her doctorate in ideology.

"I started riding again, and I was like, 'I'm going to win that Desert 100,'" she said.

Fishing is a Life Skill

Question: "My daughter came home from school the other day all excited about fish and fishing. She mentioned a Fish and Game program called Trout in the Classroom. What is this program about, I've never heard of it?"

TROUT in the Classroom is an aquatic education program provided by the Fisheries and Communication programs of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. The intent of the program is to provide students a basic education about the biology and life history of trout and encourage students to discover the joy of fishing.

The program has been in Magic Valley schools for over six years and has been integrated into more than 15 schools and over 60 classrooms. Instructors include department staff, volunteers and elementary school teachers. About 2,000 students go through the TIC program each year. Equipment and supplies are provided by the department as well as contributions from sportsmen's groups.

Each classroom is supplied with an aquarium and about 150 trout eggs. Students are instructed about the life cycle of trout, and care for trout eggs as they hatch and mature into small fish. Students are provided elemental fish culture concepts and experience during a tour of a department fish hatchery. Students also are provided life history com-

parisons between trout raised in a fish hatchery and trout forced to survive rigors of the wild.

The course also includes information and demonstrations about the importance of habitat and water quality. As the course progresses, students are allowed to dissect study specimens to reveal a fish's special adaptations for surviving in an aquatic environment.

Students also are taught the value of fish as a protein source and instructed in ways of dressing and preparing fish for the table. The culmination of the class is releasing the trout from the classroom into a local pond as well as a fishing field trip where students learn various angling techniques.

In an effort to recruit youngsters into the angling fraternity and to develop an appreciation for wild things, the TIC program sort of follows a famous quote: "I could give a man a fish to feed him for a day, or teach him to fish and feed him for life."

Fishing is a life skill that may provide more enjoyment than almost anything else in life.

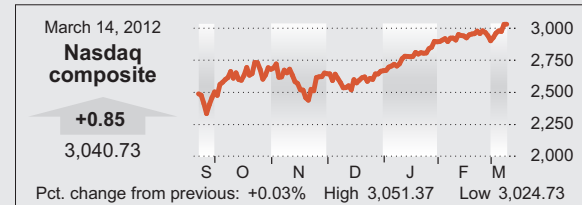
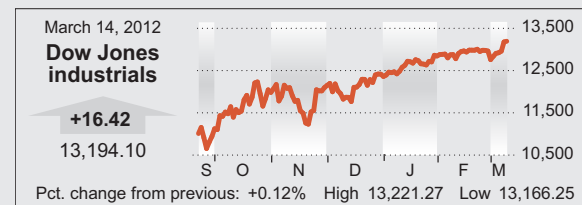

Thieves Are Rolling Tide Detergent Out of Stores

Theft of popular detergent is growing problem for U.S. retailers, costing them \$3.53 billion in 2010, according to National Retail Federation.

WASHINGTON • When police in suburban Washington raided the home of a suspected drug dealer last fall, they found the cocaine, all right, but also something unusual on the man's shelves: nearly 20 large bottles of liquid Tide laundry detergent.

It turns out his customers were paying for drugs not with cash but with stolen Tide, police said.

Tide has become a hot commodity among thieves at supermarkets and drugstores in at least some parts of the country.

For a variety of reasons, the detergent in the familiar flame-orange bottle is well-suited for resale on the black market: Everybody needs laundry detergent, and Tide is the nation's most popular brand. It's expensive, selling for up to \$20 for a large bottle at stores. And it doesn't spoil.

One Safeway supermarket in Prince George's County, Md., was losing thousands of dollars' worth of Tide a week before police made more than two dozen arrests. In West St. Paul, Minn., a man pleaded guilty to stealing more than \$6,000 worth of the stuff from a Walmart and was sentenced to 90 days in jail. Police in Newport News, Va., and other cities around the country have reported a spike in thefts.

In the Washington area, some CVS pharmacies have been attaching electronic anti-theft tags to bottles. One CVS in Washington's well-to-do Dupont Circle neighborhood keeps Tide locked up behind glass.

Charlene Holton, a clerk at a busy, 24-hour CVS in northwest Washington, has seen too many Tide thefts to count.

"It's a hot item! It's gotten out of hand," Holton said. "They usually take maybe four, whatever they can carry out the door. We have to fight for that. It's rough!"

The store has put electronic tags on its Tide, but that doesn't stop the thieves, Holton said. They run out of the store with the detergent and remove the tags later with wire cutters.

It's not clear how new the Tide theft phenomenon is, but organized theft has been a growing problem for U.S. retailers, costing them \$3.53 billion in 2010, according to the National Retail Federation. Other popular items for thieves include baby formula, razor blades and over-the-counter medication.

"We've seen organized retail crime, or the theft of goods for profit, resale or barter, for many years now," said Joseph LaRocca, senior adviser

Schools Can Choose if 'Pink Slime' Is on Menu

U.S. Agriculture Department moves to quell online movement against use of ammonia-treated ground beef filler in school lunches.

ALBANY, N.Y. • "Pink slime" just went from a simmer to a boil.

In less than a week this month, the stomach-turning epithet for ammonia-treated ground beef filler suddenly became a potent rallying cry by activists fighting to ban the product from supermarket shelves and school lunch trays. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is set to announce today it will offer schools choice in ground beef purchases in response to requests from districts.

Though the term has been used pejoratively for at least several years, it wasn't until last week that social media suddenly exploded with worry and an online petition seeking its ouster from schools lit up, quickly garnering hundreds of thousands of supporters.

"It sounds disgusting," said food policy expert Marion Nestle, who notes that the unappetizing nickname made it easier for the food movement to flex its muscles over this cause.

"A lot of people have been writing about it. Therefore, more people know about it, therefore more people are queasy about it, particularly when you start thinking about how this stuff turns up in school lunches," said Nes-

tle, a professor at New York University's Department of Nutrition, Food Studies and Public Health.

The controversy centers on "lean finely textured beef," a low-cost ingredient in ground beef made from fatty bits of meat left over from other cuts. The bits are heated to about 100 F and spun to remove most of the fat. The lean mix then is compressed into blocks for use in ground meat. The product, made by South Dakota-based Beef Products Inc., also is exposed to "a puff of ammonium hydroxide gas" to kill bacteria, such as E. coli and salmonella.

There are no precise numbers on how prevalent the product is, and it does not have to be labeled as an ingredient. Past estimates have ranged as high as 70 percent; one industry official estimates it is in at least half of the ground meat and burgers in the United States.

It has been on the market for years, and federal regulators say it meets standards for food safety. But advocates for wholesome food have denounced the process as a potentially unsafe and unappetizing example of industrialized food production.

The phrase "pink slime," coined by a federal microbiologist, has appeared in the media at least since a critical 2009 New York Times report. Celebrity chef Jamie Oliver has railed against it, and it made headlines after McDonald's and other major chains last year discontinued their use of ammonia-treated beef.

Muppet Manifesto: Blistering Exit for Goldman Executive

Resigning with public essay, director accuses bank of losing its 'moral fiber,' putting profits ahead of customers' interests and dismissing customers as 'muppets.'

NEW YORK • Goldman Sachs, arguably the most storied investment bank on Wall Street, has been compared to a money-sucking vampire squid and called the evil empire of

finance. On Wednesday, it got a black eye from one of its own.

Greg Smith, an executive director at the bank, resigned with a blistering public essay that accused the bank of losing its "moral fiber," putting profits ahead of customers' interests and dismissing customers

as "muppets."

"It makes me ill how callously people talk about ripping their clients off," he wrote.

The decay of Goldman's proud culture of teamwork, integrity and humility, he wrote, threatened the survival of an investment house that weathered two world wars and the Great Depression.

The stinging essay, "Why I Am Leaving Goldman Sachs," appeared on the Op-Ed page of The New

York Times on Wednesday morning. It was the talk of Wall Street immediately and circulated online all day.

CNBC ran clips of the ornery balcony critics from "The Muppet Show." Other websites posted spoofs, including "Why I am Leaving the Empire," by "Star Wars" villain Darth Vader. Smith became a trending topic on Twitter.

The Times said the essay had received 3 million page views online

by 4 p.m. The second-most-viewed story had 500,000, and that was a business section story about the essay.

Goldman CEO Lloyd Blankfein and President Gary Cohn told the bank's employees in an open letter that Smith's claims did not reflect the culture of the bank. They cited glowing internal reviews of the service Goldman provides to clients.

"It is unfortunate that all of you who worked so hard through a difficult environment over the last few years now have to respond to this," they wrote.

Smith worked for Goldman in London when he resigned, but the bank did not provide further details or say how much money Smith made. He previously worked in the New York office.

Smith, identified by The Times as head of the company's United States equity derivatives business in Europe, the Middle East and Africa, wrote that he attended sales meetings in which helping clients was not part of the discussion.

"If you were an alien from Mars and sat in on one of these meetings, you would believe that a client's success or progress was not part of the thought process at all," he wrote.

Smith wrote that Goldman had devolved from a company he was proud to work for when he started 12 years ago. Goldman became a public company in 1999, adding pressure for the bank to turn bigger profits.

On Wall Street, the essay may have been shocking in tone, but it was not surprising in content. Goldman's peers, even some of its customers, take its pursuit of profit as ordinary business.

"I would be very surprised

if it did anything more than anger the people who are already hostile to Goldman," said Lawrence Baxter, a former executive at Wachovia who teaches at Duke University's law school.

Perhaps most surprising was that the essay was written by an insider in an industry known for protecting its own — and at a bank that has been known in the past to look down on its peers.

"In my experience, it's unusual that somebody would talk ill of their firm," said Maryann Bruce, the former president of Wachovia's Evergreen Investment Services. "You don't usually air your firm's dirty laundry."

Bruce left Wachovia in 2007, the same year the bank settled federal allegations that it had mishandled an Evergreen mutual fund by allowing questionable trading. Regulators also found that Bruce had banned such trading in 2000, but that another executive went behind her back to continue the practice.

Smith couldn't be reached for comment. On the Web, he was both praised as a truth-teller and derided as disgruntled, and some people noted that he had waited until after Goldman's bonus season to quit.

"I'm not surprised there is this kind of effort to dismiss him," said Baxter. "The system always marginalizes people who dare to criticize its fundamental working."

James Murdoch: 'I Could Have Asked More Questions'

LONDON • News Corp. executive James Murdoch acknowledged Wednesday that he could have done more to get to grips with the phone hacking scandal that has rocked Britain and threatened his place as the likely heir to his father's global media empire.

Murdoch's admission came in a seven-page letter written to British parliamentarians investigating the scandal. In it, the 39-year-old repeated his insistence that he didn't know the extent of the illegal behavior at his now-defunct News of the World tabloid newspaper, saying that the details had been hidden from him by members of his staff.

"It would have been better if I had asked more questions," Murdoch told the House of Commons' media committee. "However the truth is that incomplete answers and what now appear to be false assurances were given to the questions that I asked."

Murdoch has already appeared twice before lawmakers, who grilled him in detail about what he knew about the phone hacking scandal and alleged at-

tempts to conceal evidence of illegal activity.

Murdoch was the one who signed off on a substantial settlement to one of the first known victims of the practice. The company's former in-house lawyer has said the payoff was aimed at keeping a lid on the scandal, but Murdoch says he had no knowledge of wider wrongdoing and was merely following expert advice.

Critics say that Murdoch was either in on the cover up or too incompetent to realize what he was agreeing to, with lawmaker Tom Watson famously accusing Murdoch of being "the first mafia boss in history who doesn't know he's at the head of a criminal enterprise."

In his letter, Murdoch mounted his most detailed defense yet, accusing his former lieutenants of working behind his back, acting without his authorization, and giving inconsistent testimony to Parliament.

In contrast, he said, "My evidence has always been consistent."

It's not certain whether lawmakers will accept that last claim. Murdoch initially denied knowing anything about a critical piece

of evidence which suggested, as far back as 2008, that illegal behavior went much further than was being publicly acknowledged.

Contradicted by former members of staff, Murdoch later changed his story, saying that while he was told about the damning evidence, its importance wasn't explained to him.

News International's attempts to conceal the scope of the scandal fell apart after the Guardian and The New York Times revealed that phone hacking was endemic at the News of the World, an expose which has led to the paper's closure and the arrests of dozens of journalists and other officials.

The British newspaper arm of Rupert Murdoch's News Corp. has made cash settlements to 58 victims, including celebrities, politicians and the families of crime victims.

James Murdoch himself has resigned from News International, although he retains a senior position in News Corp. and said in his letter that those who saw his resignation as a tacit admission of guilt were wrong.

"I have not misled Parliament," he said. "I did not

know about, nor did I try to hide, wrongdoing?"

In a separate development, police said that a 51-year-old man was arrested Wednesday on suspicion of intimidating a witness.

Scotland Yard said the man taken into custody had been previously arrested on April 5, 2011. Police did not identify the man, but The AP had identified a man arrested that day as former News of the World reporter Neville Thurlbeck, who was 50 at the time.

Police later said he had been released and would return to face more questions next month, following further investigation.

on asset protection for the NRF. LaRocca said that Tide had not shown up previously on lists of the most commonly targeted items, but that several retailers told him this week it has been a problem.

Robert McCrie, a professor of security management at John Jay College of Criminal Justice in New York, said Tide is an ideal target for thieves, in part because high demand makes it easy to resell. The flat economy is a factor, as is the relatively low risk to criminals, he said.

"The idea of somebody making significant money as a drug pusher has been pretty much debunked on the streets. It's risky and really low-profit," he said. "Selling something like this represents little risk of physical danger."

Unlike nasal decongestants, which can be used to make methamphetamine, laundry detergent is generally used for its intended purpose

after it is stolen, authorities and industry officials say. Many thieves are selling it on the street themselves at cut-rate prices, sometimes outside coin-operated laundries.

In Prince George's County, police said they learned from informants, undercover officers and other sources that drug dealers encourage their customers to pay with shoplifted Tide instead of cash.

"I'm out of marijuana right now, but when I get re-upped I'll hook you up if you can get me 15 bottles of Tide," one dealer was quoted as telling an informant, according to police.

The drug dealers then often resell the detergent to unscrupulous retailers such as corner stores, barbershops, even a nail salon. Everybody gets something out of the arrangement: the addict, who doesn't have to scrounge up cash; the dealer, who can double or triple his profit on the drugs; and the retailer, who can acquire Tide for less than wholesale.

Pink Slime

But "pink slime" outrage appeared to reach new heights last week amid reports by The Daily and ABC News. The Daily piece dealt with the USDA's purchase of meat that included "pink slime" for school lunches.

The story touched a nerve with Houston resident Bettina Siegel, whose blog "The Lunch Tray" focuses on kids' food. On March 6, she started an online petition on Change.org asking Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack to "put an immediate end to the use of 'pink slime' in our children's school food."

"When I put it up, I had this moment of embarrassment," she said, "What if only 10 people sign this?"

No problem there. Supporters signed on fast. By Wednesday afternoon, the electronic petition had more than 220,000 signatures. Organizers of Change.org said the explosive growth is rare among the roughly 10,000 petitions started there every month.

Meanwhile, Google searches for "pink slime" spiked dramatically. It has become the food version of Joseph Kony, the rogue African warlord virtually unknown in the United States until this month, when an online video campaign against him caught fire.

But why is "pink slime" striking a chord now?

Issues can go from a simmer to an explosion when content with broad interest — such as like food safety — is picked up and disseminated by widely connected people, said Marc A. Smith, director of the Social Media Research Foundation. These people act like "broadcast hubs," dispersing the information to different communities.

"What's happening is that the channels whereby this flood can go down this hill have expanded," Smith said "The more there are things like Twitter, the easier it is for these powder kegs to explode."

In this case, Siegel thinks the added element of children's school lunches could have set off this round.

"That's what upset me. This idea that children are passively sitting in a lunch room eating what the government sees fit to feed them and McDonald's has chosen not to use it, but the government is still feeding it to them," she said. "That really got my ire."

The USDA — which did not directly address Siegel's petition — buys about a fifth of the food served in schools nationwide. The agency this year is contracted to buy 111.5 million pounds of ground beef for the National School Lunch Program. About 7 million pounds of that is from Beef Products Inc., though the pink product in question never accounts for more than 15 percent of a single serving of ground beef.

Source: U.S. Suspect in Afghanistan Killings Flown to Kuwait

KABUL, Afghanistan • The American soldier accused of shooting 16 Afghan villagers in a pre-dawn killing spree was flown out of Afghanistan on Wednesday to Kuwait, even as many Afghans called for him to face justice in their country.

Afghan government officials did not immediately respond to calls for comment on the late-night announcement. The U.S. military said the transfer did not preclude the possibility of trying the case in Afghanistan, and Defense Secretary Leon Panetta has said the soldier could receive capital punishment if convicted.

The soldier was held by the U.S. military in Kandahar until Wednesday evening, when he was flown out of Afghanistan to Kuwait, said a U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the matter.

Many fear a misstep by the U.S. military in handling the case could ignite a firestorm in Afghanistan that would shatter already tense relations between the two countries. The alliance appeared near the breaking point last month when the burning of Qurans in a garbage pit at a U.S. base sparked protests and retaliatory attacks that killed more than 30 people, including six U.S. soldiers.

In recent days the two nations made headway toward an agreement governing a long-term American presence here, but the massacre in Kandahar province on Sunday has called all such negotiations into question.

Afghan lawmakers have demanded that the soldier be publicly tried in Afghanistan to show that he was being brought to justice, calling on President Hamid Karzai to suspend all talks with the U.S. until that happens.

The U.S. staff sergeant, who has not been named or charged, allegedly slipped out of his small base in southern Afghanistan before dawn, crept into three houses and shot men, women and children at close range then burned some of the bodies. By sunrise, there were 16 corpses.

The suspect was taken into custody shortly afterwards and at some point taken to Kandahar.

"We do not have appropriate detention facilities in Afghanistan," Navy Capt. John Kirby, a Pentagon spokesman, said Wednesday. He said that meant a facility for a U.S. service member "in this kind of case."

The U.S. military has detention facilities in Kuwait that have been used for other troops. Army PFC Bradley Manning was detained in Kuwait after he was taken into custody in Baghdad in 2010 for allegedly leaking government documents in the Wikileaks case.

Kirby said the transfer did not necessarily mean the trial would be held outside Afghanistan. U.S. officials had previously said it would be technically possible to hold proceedings in Afghanistan, noting other court-martial trials held here.

Texas Baby Missing for 8 Years Found, Will Go Home. A

Texas infant who vanished eight years ago will be reunited with his mother after police arrested his former baby sitter who is accused of kidnapping him, authorities said Wednesday. Krystle Rochelle Tanner, 26, remained jailed without bond in San Augustine, about 200 miles southeast of Fort Worth. She was arrested on a kidnapping charge Monday.

Jury Finds Va. Tech Negligent in '07 Shootings. The

The parents of two Virginia Tech students killed in a 2007 campus massacre worked for years to prove university officials were negligent for waiting to warn students of a gunman on campus, and a jury agreed with them on Wednesday. It took jurors 3½ hours to find that university officials botched their response to the April 16, 2007 massacre that left 33 people, including the gunman dead. The jury determined in the wrongful death lawsuit against the state that the parents of Julia Pryde and Erin Peterson each deserved \$4 million, but the award likely will be sharply reduced.

Obama, Cameron: Shift in Afghan War Role in '13

WASHINGTON • Determined to show momentum in a war marred by setbacks, President Barack Obama and British Prime Minister David Cameron said for the first time Wednesday that NATO forces would hand over the lead combat role to Afghanistan forces next year as the U.S. and its allies aim to get out by the end of 2014. The announcement added both clarity and urgency to the path of a war that has fallen into a demoralizing period, rocked by the burnings of Qurans at a U.S. base, deadly protests against Americans and a shooting rampage, alleged against a U.S. soldier, that left 16 Afghan civilians dead.

Bus Crash in Swiss Alps Kills 28, Including 22 Children

Investigators are trying to determine how a modern bus, a rested driver and a seemingly safe tunnel could be in one of the deadliest highway crashes in Swiss history.

SIERRE, Switzerland • A tour bus carrying schoolchildren home from a class trip slammed head-on into a tunnel wall in the Swiss Alps, killing 22 Belgian students and six adults and instantly changing a joyous skiing vacation into a tragedy spanning several European nations.

As authorities tried Wednesday to piece together what happened, parents, classmates and rescue workers struggled to grasp the awful turn of events. Only days earlier, the children had updated a lively blog about the highlights of their adventure: ravioli and meatball dinners, cable-car rides and sing-a-longs.

Police said the bus was not speeding and everyone aboard had been wearing seat belts when it crashed late Tuesday inside the 1.5-mile Tunnel de Geronde on a highway near the

southern town of Sierre, a gateway to the Val d'Anniviers tourist region. No other vehicles were involved.

Belgian authorities flew anxious parents and relatives to the site and called for a day of mourning. The Swiss parliament held a minute of silence for the victims.

Investigators were still trying to determine how a modern bus, a rested driver and a seemingly safe tunnel could produce one of the deadliest highway crashes in Swiss history.

Olivier Elsig, prosecutor for the Swiss state of Valais, said officials were looking at three possible causes — a technical problem with the bus, a health problem with the driver or human error. He said an autopsy would be performed on the driver.

"We will examine everything to find out what happened," Elsig said.

Dr. Jean-Pierre Deslarzes, medical director of the local Swiss rescue service OCVS, said first-responders were traumatized because so many of

the victims were children around 12 years old.

The accident virtually shredded the front end of the bus, leaving only small, barely recognizable pieces in place. Passengers were trapped inside.

"We found an apocalyptic situation when we arrived," said Christian Varone, police commander for Valais.

Swiss President Eveline Widmer-Schlumpf also flew to Sion to pay her respects to the victims, survivors and rescue officials. A crisis center was set up for families of the dead.

Police said 21 of those killed were Belgian and seven were Dutch. Twenty-four other children were hurt.

The crash occurred in a stretch of tunnel where the speed limit was 62 mph. The bus veered, hit a curb, then rammed into a concrete wall in an emergency stop space, police said.

The bus was operated by the Top Tours company, based in Aarschot, about 25 miles northwest of Brussels. A woman who answered the phone at the company's offices declined to comment, but Belgian Transport Minister Melchior Wathelet said Top Tours has a good safety record.

GOP Delegate Fight Moves to Puerto Rico

WASHINGTON • An upbeat Rick Santorum barreled into Puerto Rico on Wednesday in pursuit of another campaign-bending victory in a Republican presidential race where suddenly no primary is too minor and no delegate is conceded. Mitt Romney put nearly \$1 million into television advertising in Illinois, the next big-state showdown.

"If we keep winning races, eventually people are going to figure out that Gov. Romney is not going to be the nominee," said Santorum, eager to

build on Tuesday's unexpected victories in Alabama and Mississippi.

Romney in turn dismissed Santorum as a "lightweight" as far as the economy is concerned.

He also rebutted suggestions that he can't appeal to core conservatives. "You don't

win a million more votes than anyone else in this race by just appealing to high-income Americans," he said on Fox News. "Some who are very conservative may not be in my camp, but they will be when I become the nominee, when I face Barack Obama."

Romney travels to Puerto Rico on Friday, after two days in New York fundraising.

But in a reflection of the importance of next week's Illinois primary, aides announced he would make a previously unscheduled campaign stop in the Chicago area en route to San Juan.

Newt Gingrich, despite losing twice in the South, a region he hoped to own in the race, showed no sign of abandoning his fading campaign.

That presumably suited Romney fine. But not so much Santorum, eager for a race in which he is the sole challenger on the right for Romney, the former Massachusetts governor.

Death of Washington Boy is State's Third Gun Accident in 3 Weeks

SEATTLE • A 3-year-old scrambled out of his child seat after his parents stopped for gas early Wednesday, found a gun police say was left in the car by his father and fatally shot himself in the head.

The accidental shooting in

Tacoma marks the third in three weeks in Washington involving young children, and the second death. The spate of gun violence is raising questions about the effectiveness of the state's gun laws and community awareness of firearm safety.

Tacoma police Officer Naveed

Benjamin said the 3-year-old boy's death highlights the need for people to secure guns.

"It is incredible in light of the other ones," Benjamin said. "You would think people would take more care, not less."

Tacoma police said the boy's death came after his father put his

pistol under a seat and got out to pump gas while the mother went inside the convenience store. The boy's infant sister, who also was in the car when the gun went off, was not injured.

The Pierce County medical examiner has identified the boy as Julio Segura-McIntosh of Tacoma.

Detectives questioned the parents and have called the shooting a tragic accident, Benjamin said. The father has a concealed weapons permit, and no charges have been filed, he said. Pierce County Prosecutor Mark Lindquist said that he is reviewing the case for possible manslaughter charges.

Blagojevich Gives Campaign-style Speech Before Going to Prison

CHICAGO • Rod Blagojevich may have a problem with hidden recording devices, but the convicted former governor of Illinois rarely met a camera he didn't like and that held true even Wednesday with a choreographed-for-TV farewell on the eve of his imprisonment.

Showman to the end, Blagojevich emerged from his Ravenswood Manor bungalow in an appearance timed to catch the top of 5 p.m. newscasts and launched into a campaign-

style monologue reciting a laundry list of accomplishments and insisting he never intentionally broke the law.

"I believe I always, always thought about what was right for the people," said Blagojevich as his wife, Patti, stood by his side and teared up.

Blagojevich, due to begin a 14-year sentence for corruption Thursday at a federal prison in Colorado, spoke for 10 minutes, interrupted only by shouts of encouragement from hundreds of well-wishers and gawkers gathered on his

lawn along with TV crews.

He then mingled for more than half an hour, signing autographs on everything from an ATM receipt to an M&M wrapper and ignoring his 8-year-old daughter, Annie, as she tapped on his elbow and pleaded, "Come on. You've signed enough, Daddy."

Given the abundance of ex-Illinois governors sent to prison, it may come as a surprise that there appears to be no set protocol for their exit from public view. George Ryan went defiantly, declaring that he had "a clear conscience" and would contin-

ue a fight to clear his name.

Dan Walker said nothing, as did Otto Kerner before

him, though Kerner made some sort of quiet statement by showing up at the gate of

a federal prison in Kentucky in a Mercedes and wearing a silk suit.

'Luck' Runs Out: TV Show Canceled after Deaths of Three Horses

LOS ANGELES • HBO's "Luck" didn't have much of it.

The low-rated drama, which is set at a racetrack and stars Dustin Hoffman and Nick Nolte, was abruptly canceled Wednesday after the injury and subsequent euthanasia of a horse used in the production led to widespread criticism. The show already was facing intense criticism from animal-rights activists, who were investigating two previous horse deaths connected to the series last year.

The cancellation comes just days after People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals sent HBO a letter charging that "Luck's" producers ignored advice from animal-safety experts and created conditions that posed "unacceptable" risks to equine performers.

"It is with heartbreak that executive producers David Milch and Michael Mann together with HBO have decided to cease all future production on the series 'Luck,'" HBO wrote in a statement late Wednesday afternoon.

Milch — creator of HBO's "Deadwood" — and film director Mann are known for hard-charging and somewhat obsessive work habits as well as an uncompromising creative style.

Initially, HBO agreed to halt the filming of scenes involving horses pending an investigation into the latest animal death and sought to refute the accusations of poor work conditions: "Recent assertions of lax attitudes or negligence could not be further from the truth." The network said it partnered with the American Humane Association, as well as with racing experts, "to implement safety protocols that go above and beyond typical film and TV industry standards and practices."

In making the cancellation decision, however, the network bowed to the uncertainty inherent in working with live animals — especially when a safety record is already under scrutiny. "While we maintained the highest safety standards possible," HBO said in a statement, "accidents unfortunately happen and it is impossible to guarantee they won't in the future."

Animals are becoming more common in TV and movie productions, a trend that many activists deplore. The AHA, which monitors animal safety in filmed entertainment, kept track of more than 2,000 productions using non-human performers in 2011 — 100 more than in the previous year.

In this week's "Luck" incident, the horse had just passed an inspection by Dr. Gary Beck, a veterinarian for the California Horse Racing Board, according to the AHA. The horse was being walked back to its barn at Santa Anita Park when it "reared up, fell backwards and was injured."

TWIN FALLS • While the College of Southern Idaho men's basketball team prepares to defend its NJCAA national title in Hutchinson, Kan., next week, CSI

women's head coach Randy Rogers sits in his office and watches game film.

The 10th year head coach critiques a potential recruit from California as she plays in a high school state playoff game at Anaheim Convention Center.

"She's got good size, a good handle, but she moves kind of awkward," Rogers said, pointing at his com-

puter screen.

He moves on to talk about a pair of Nevada players he saw on a recruiting trip to Reno for the high school state championships three weeks ago.

"They both come from state championship teams," said Rogers, who brought both players to Twin Falls Tuesday night to watch the CSI men's game. "We need players

like that. Players who bring that winning attitude and ability"

Rogers has kept busy after his Golden Eagles ended a disappointing season last Thursday by bowing out in the first round of the Region 18 Tournament in Salt Lake City.

Wednesday night, Rogers hosted an open gym/tryout for area high school players — something he's never done in his CSI career.

CSI Rodeo Happy to be Home

After a first-place finish by the College of Southern Idaho women's rodeo team and a third by the men's team a week ago at Weber State University, there will be no traveling, motel rooms or unfamiliar arenas for the CSI rodeo team this weekend

Rather they will be participating at home at the Eldon Evans Expo Center in the Shawn Davis Arena. Tonight it's the Rocky Mountain Regional Rodeo beginning at 7 p.m. (with slack to follow). On Friday and Saturday (with a 10 a.m. Saturday slack), CSI will host the 36th Annual CSI Intercollegiate Rodeo at 8 p.m.

"The home crowd is an advantage overall especially with family members offering their support which is always nice," said CSI head rodeo coach Steve Birnie. "We are in our own practice arena. In the timed events, everyone and the horses are use to the building. Most of the horses and bulls have bucked here before."

One of the strongest events for the men's team is in bareback riding where Tyler Nelson leads the national standings. Bradley Dyck, Kegan Hughes, Tyler Hanssen, and Orin Larsen rank third through sixth and have all had strong years in the event for CSI.

Larsen also competes in saddle bronc and ranks fifth.

Trent Jacobson sits in second place in bull riding in the regional standings, Jace Hutchison is fourth and Trasen Jones is seventh. Jacobson ranks 11th in the national standings.

On the women's team side, freshman Korinne Balls is the leader in the region and fifth in the national standings in breakaway roping and third in the women's all-around regional standings. Chuck Povey, Lindsay Davis, Samantha Logan, and Kayla Mulick also rank in the top 10 in the regional standings in breakaway.

Povey is 24th in the national standings in breakaway and Balls sits 14th in the women's all-around national standings. In goat tying, Balls ranks seventh and Mulick 10th. In barrels, Samantha Logan is seventh and Kiara Wanner is 14th.

Damien Young (header) and Jake Eames (heeler) have worked well together and are fourth in team roping.

Krumm ran an up-tempo spread offense and a 3-3-5 during his time in Jerome. Gambles anticipates some differences in scheme and approach, but expects to continue on his predecessor's work.

A Class Above the Rest

Top Middleweight Wrestler: David Borden

During the high school wrestling season, David Borden doesn't do interviews. He's not arrogant. He's focused.

Borden studies past wrestling greats in his quest to become great himself. He read about Dan Gable getting caught up in newspaper articles and TV interviews, which Gable said attributed to losing his final collegiate match.

"Winning last year and having the pressure this year to repeat, I did not want that to happen, that was my biggest fear," Borden said. "I tried to do everything I could this season to prepare myself for that state championship."

Borden made sure nothing stood in his way to becoming a two-time state champion. Not only that, but Borden became the most dominant high school wrestler in Idaho.

At 43-0, Borden gave up just two take-downs all season and was the state's only undefeated wrestler across all classifications. He capped his senior season with the 170-pound Class 4A title.

The journey hasn't come easy. Borden admits he "kind of got my butt kicked" when he began wrestling in seventh grade.

Top Lightweight Wrestler: Stirland Zollinger

It's often said that sports teach young people lessons that will serve them for the rest of their lives.

Stirland Zollinger is proof. Lesson One: Hard work.

"He works harder than any kid I know," said Declo wrestling coach Lawrence Gillette. "Stirland is by far the hardest working kid in the wrestling room, and his teammates would agree with that."

That's saying a lot, considering Declo is the reigning two-time state team champion with 12 state medallists in its room.

Zollinger's work ethic stems from long hours laboring on his family's dairy farm. At wrestling practice, while others take a break to watch their coaches teach moves, Zollinger continues to work, doing jumping jacks while watching.

"When other kids whine about how hard it is, he's like, 'Bring it,'" Gillette said.

Top Upper-weight Wrestler: Layne Lasike

Originally, Layne Lasike wrestled because coaches told him it would make him a better football player.

Turns out, playing football made Lasike a better wrestler.

Whether he's battling in the trenches or on the mat, Lasike gives you everything he's got.

"When I start something I don't quit and I give it my all," the Jerome senior said. "I always felt that if you're going to try, give it 110 percent."

Not even a knee injury his freshman year could shake Lasike's devotion. The thought of reinjuring his knee was always in the back of his mind, but he came back to win a District IV title as a sophomore, then finished third at state as a junior.

"After that happened, I made it a goal to become a state champion," Lasike said. "I just worked harder and my coaches kept telling me that nobody's going to stop me this year."

Nobody did. With a 38-4 record, Lasike won the Class 4A 285-pound state title.

Family and friends are important to Lasike, whose heart is as big as his smile. Achieving balance in his life has attributed

Majerus Back in the Madness

ST. LOUIS • There's a stool in every corner of the Saint Louis gym so Rick Majerus can roam the building and do his scrutinizing comfortably.

The 64-year-old coach likes what he's seeing these days.

Majerus was hired five years ago to elevate the school's national profile, and his work is finally bearing fruit. The Billikens (25-7) are in the NCAA tournament for

the first time since 2000 as the No. 9 seed in the West with an opening-round matchup against Memphis (26-8) on Friday.

Majerus is making his 12th NCAA appearance in his 25th season, one year after enduring the first losing season of his career. He's done it without taking shortcuts, assembling his typical international-flavor roster that includes key contributors from Australia and New Zealand and is just as efficient in the classroom.

Seniors Brian Conklin and Kyle Cassity have already graduated with honors and are working on their MBAs. Sophomore forward Dwayne Evans and sophomore reserve forward Jake Barnett are 4.0 GPA students.

"If academics counted, we might be the national champion," Majerus said. "They're probably No. 1. What box don't we check anymore? We've got great kids, our attendance was up were tremendous this season."

TREMENDOUS TEN

WYATT SMITH, RAFT RIVER
Smith was the District IV champ at 132 pounds and the only thing standing in his way of a Class 2A state title was the four-time champion he met in the finals. Still, the sophomore finished as state runner-up with a 44-2 record.
Smith: "I'm proud of myself for getting to the finals. That was my goal."

CASEY IVEY, VALLEY
The Viking senior medaled all four years at state, capping his career with a Class 2A state championship at 145 pounds. His record was 42-4 this season.
Coach Rick Hall: "He earned it. Casey is one of those kids you can always count on to come in and give you 100 percent every time. He's a fantastic individual. He does everything a coach asks him to do."

TORIN BRUNSON, GOODING
After an injury forfeit in the state semifinals ended his freshman year, Brunson returned strong, finishing his sophomore season with a 30-5 record and Class 2A state championship at 152 pounds.
Coach Clay Robinson: "He came back this year with a renewed focus... At the state tournament he beat some kids who beat him earlier in the year. When he wrestles his style, he is a real tough wrestler. He's got a great shot and he just stays after it; he's always moving."

STEPHEN MEJIA, BUHL
The junior went 39-6 with a District IV title and Class 3A state runner-up finish at 152 pounds.
Mejia: "I definitely improved a lot from last year, all the extra time and effort my coach put in with me really helped... At first I wasn't excited at all (about finishing state runner-up). Now that I think about it, I'm glad I placed top two in the state. It was a fun trip. Next year I hope I do better than I did this year."

STEPHAN ORTIZ, OAKLEY
A two-time state champion, Ortiz finished his senior season with a 35-1 record and runner-up medal at the 2A state championships. The 160-pounder boasts a 117-3 overall record the past three seasons.
Coach Brennan Jones: "The kid knows how to work. Stephan is coachable. He's much more intelligent than you think he is. He inherently understands the intricacies of it. He's just naturally talented."

JASON GILLETTE, DECLO
The District IV champion at 170 pounds, Gillette (36-1) was undefeated until his last match of the season, where he finished runner-up in the Class 2A finals.
Coach Lawrence Gillette: "Jason not win-

ning this year, he's really hungry next year to push himself even harder and take it to the next level. Jason is the biggest reason why I'm coaching. I've coached him since he was in preschool. I'm very happy with what he's done so far."

JOSEPH VALENCIA, MINICO
With a 28-3 record, the Minico senior followed up his District IV championship with a Class 4A state title at 220 pounds.
Valencia: "My mentality going in (to state) was big fish in a small pond. I had nothing to lose, so that's what my mentality was. I thank everybody that supported me. God most importantly. It feels good to be a champion."

OREN CARLTON, BUHL
The senior finished his career as a District IV champion and Class 3A state champ at 220 pounds with a 31-5 season record.
Carlton: "It's been a great experience. All the hard work has given me a lot of heart to never quit and never back down. I don't like to lose. I always worked my hardest and I finished the way I wanted to. Hard work paid off."

KAGE OSTERHOUT, DECLO
Osterhout's meteoric rise took him from a two-and-out performance at state last year, to winning the Class 2A 220-pound state championship this season. The junior had a 31-5 record.
Coach Lawrence Gillette: "Wow, what an improvement he's made. He comes from a family of good wrestlers... and when he decided to work hard, he's become really good. I think he's going to be an animal come next year."

COLE MCGINNIS, GOODING
Just a sophomore, McGinnis won the Class 2A 285-pound state championship. The only losses on his 39-2 record were to 4A champion Layne Lasike of Jerome.
Coach Clay Robinson: "Early in the season he wrestled the returning 3A state champion and beat him pretty good and we knew at that point he was going to have a special year. He just kept working harder and harder. He has natural talent, but his work ethic is phenomenal."

"We really need to have two good weekends for the teams to qualify," said Birnie. "All the teams are getting stacked and are pretty evenly matched. We have had a lot of injuries on the men's team this year. Our women's team has stayed pretty strong all spring. Samantha has had some horse trouble and that put her in a tough spot. Chuck is coming on strong as is Kayla and Lindsay. And Korinne has been the most consistent."

CSI closes out the regular schedule next weekend at Utah Valley University at Heber City, Utah.

For each team to qualify for nationals, they will have to finish in the top two positions. Currently, the CSI men's rodeo team is in fourth place in the Rocky Mountain Region rodeo standings. The men trail third place Weber State University by 396 points, second place Utah State University by 981 points and the regional leader, Utah Valley University by 1,625 points. The women sit in third place trailing second place Utah Valley University by 140 points and region leader, Weber State University by 222 points.

"We've seen some really good things," said Birnie. "The kids are good competitors and they do what they are supposed to do."

TWIN FALLS • Another trio of prep athletes has settled on the College of Southern Idaho for their college start.

The CSI baseball team has added two more players for next year, signing Rocky Mountain High School

(Meridian) infielder Isaac Anderson and Las Vegas (Nev.) High School pitcher and outfielder Dillon Dove each to an NJCAA National Letter of Intent.

Anderson helped the Grizzlies to the Class 5A state tournament last season, while Dove helped the Wildcats to a 21-8 record.

The duo brings the current signing crop to 14 for next season.

The CSI softball team added a sixth signing to next year's class, inking Arianna Huerta of Winslow, Ariz.

Huerta comes from the same high school as current Golden Eagle Gabby Stacey.

"We've never done anything quite to this extent before. I'm just trying to get as many players and coaches in here as we can," Rogers said. "It's a little showcase. I think we've got some prospects coming in. I've been working a little bit harder, trying to get some feelers out there. Bottom line is, we've got to get better."

CSI slogged through an up and down, mediocre season, finishing with a 15-16 record and a 7-8 mark in the Scenic West Athletic Conference, fourth in the standings.

That's a far cry from 34-2 and 32-4 campaigns in 2005 and 2008, when the Golden Eagles won the Region 18 championship and advanced to the NJCAA national tournament in Salina, Kan.

The Golden Eagles won just one road game in conference play this season (against Colorado Northwestern) and Rogers lost to Colorado Northwestern for the first time in his career in the final regular season game.

This season was just the

second losing campaign in Rogers' CSI career (the other was his first season in 02-03) as the Golden Eagles struggled with lack of depth and consistency throughout the year.

"I think we got a lot out of these kids. They worked hard, but as the case was all year we got hurt with some lack of depth," Rogers said. "It was a tough year. I knew coming in, it was going to be difficult. I knew I was going to be tested as a coach."

The Golden Eagles relied heavily on the mostly inexperienced sophomore quartet of Mechela Barnes, Chakala Carthen, Taylor Gipson and Kyle Schierman.

Only Barnes received significant playing time as a freshman, leading the team in scoring, while Schierman struggled with injuries and Gipson and Carthen slowly worked their way into the rotation late in the season.

This season, the four accounted for 73 percent of the team's offense and all played more than 30 minutes a game. Barnes led the team in scoring and Carthen led the SWAC in rebounds.

"I pegged them as substi-

tutes this year, coming off the bench and giving us good minutes," Rogers said after his team lost to Salt Lake in the Region 18 Tournament. "They had to step up and be starters and play heavy minutes. They did a really nice job for us."

Rogers has hit the recruiting trail hard in recent weeks and has trips planned along the Northwest in the coming weeks to replace those four players. Two freshmen, Megan Tanner and Adriana Dent, will be key cogs for the Golden Eagles next season, he said.

"I think her (Tanner's) confidence level has to be high going into next year. We didn't have her coming in playing a lot of minutes this year with Jessy (Saint-Felix) and Chelsie Pitt, but she had to step in due to injuries to those two and play some heavy minutes especially late in the season," Rogers said. "Adriana's got to work on her shot. It isn't consistent enough. She's very active and I think she can be a real energizer for us next year. We're going to need that. ... We're just going to need to get better. It hasn't been like this here in a while."

For inspiration, he looked to all-time greats Gable and Cael Sanderson, as well as his mentor Jake Hruza, a former state champ from Minico.

"I wanted to be like them, I wanted to be one of those greats. I knew to do that I'd have to work extremely hard," Borden said.

Following his second state championship last month at Holt Arena, Borden finally agreed to an interview with the *Times-News*. But rather than reflect on his accomplishments, he preferred to talk about his next goal. Borden has been accepted to the

U.S. Naval Academy, where he plans to wrestle for its NCAA Division I program.

"That's the crazy thing about this sport, there's always something else to work for," Borden said that night at Holt. "I hope my journey doesn't end here. I hope this is just another happy night and then get back at it, try to get the next one."

After state he took one day off, then got back to work.

"(I) can't stay away. I think (I'm) addicted to the waking up early and working out," he said. "I've always had a competitive nature. I've always wanted to be the best. I started wrestling and it just got in my blood. I love it."

Lesson Two: Perspective. Zollinger knows what it's like to win. He also knows what it's like to lose. And thanks to wrestling, he now knows how to handle both gracefully.

He was a state champion as a freshman, followed by two straight years as a state runner-up.

"My whole life goal had been to be a four-time state champ. When I didn't get it (sophomore) year it was really hard for me," Zollinger said.

Losing the Class 2A 126-pound final this season as a junior was difficult as well. But after taking quiet moment alone on the Holt Arena floor, Zollinger gathered himself and celebrated Declo's team championship — a lesson he learned from the previous year.

"I wasn't very happy, and I regret being so grouchy about it and not celebrating

it with my team," Zollinger said about his sophomore experience. "Mentally I was still very disappointed in myself. At first I was just mad about how I didn't do good and I was just being selfish."

A year wiser, Zollinger was able to appreciate his 39-4 record and third consecutive state finals appearance.

"I'd say this season is probably one of the best that I've had," Zollinger said with the conviction of a man who has no regrets. "My record might not have been the best, but we went to a lot of tough tournaments and I feel it was one of my better seasons for sure."

Lesson Three: When life doesn't go according to plan, adjust your goals and fight on.

"In my situation, if I can just be a two-time state champ I'll be perfectly fine with it. It's my new goal, it's what I want more than anything."

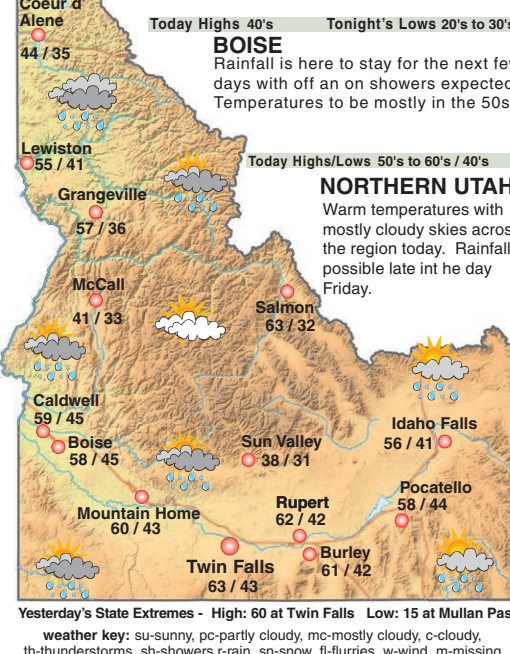

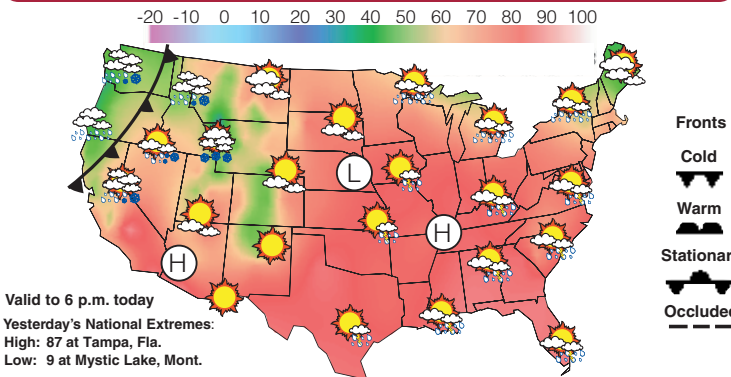

Megabucks for Megatron

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. • Calvin Johnson got the biggest contract in NFL history Wednesday, and he wasn't even a free agent.

The All-Pro wide receiver's eight-year deal through the 2019 season is worth \$132 million, with \$60 million guaranteed, surpassing the \$120 million with \$50 million guaranteed being paid to Arizona's Larry Fitzgerald.

"They were happy to get this thing done with, and I was happy as well," Johnson said. "It wasn't a lot of confrontation. We weren't butting heads or anything. It was just something that we knew needed to get done."

Another All-Pro, guard Carl Nicks, left New Orleans for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and a five-year contract. Considered one of the NFL's best pass blockers, Nicks is a two-time Pro Bowl player and was a key on the Saints' record-setting offense.

Johnson lived up to his "Megatron" nickname with his spectacular receptions in 2011, catching 96 passes for 1,681 yards and 16 touchdowns in leading the Lions back to the playoffs for the first time since 1999.

Jerry Rice, Randy Moss and Johnson are the only players in NFL history with at least 95 receptions, 1,600 yards and 15 touchdowns in a season.

"Calvin's one of those guys — we've said this about a few guys that we have in our building — whatever they pay him is not enough," coach Jim Schwartz said. "He's truly a special player."

Tampa has been among the busiest teams in free agency, hardly surprising after the Bucs slumped from 10-6 to 4-12 last year. Nicks joined cornerback Eric Wright, who also signed Wednesday. Wright got a five-year deal, too.

On Tuesday, the Buccaneers added star receiver Vincent Jackson for five years and \$55.5 million.

"We've made our mark for what we wanted to accomplish," Bucs general manager Mark Dominik said.

KNICKS FIRE COACH, ROUT TRAIL BLAZERS

NEW YORK • Mike D'Antoni is gone, and the Knicks finally got his offense right.

Amare Stoudemire made all seven shots in the first half, Carmelo Anthony passed and shot well, and the Knicks shook off the surprising departure of their coach to rout the Portland Trail Blazers 121-79 on Wednesday night, snapping a six-game losing streak.

Anthony, who denied wanting a trade or having friction with D'Antoni earlier Wednesday, had 16 points on 6-of-12 shooting and tied a season high with seven assists. Stoudemire finished with 17 points and shot 8 of 10, before both stars sat out the fourth quarter while the Knicks rang up their highest point total of the season.

LaMarcus Aldridge and Gerald Wallace each scored 15 points for the Trail Blazers.

LAKERS 107, HORNETS 101, OT NEW ORLEANS • Kobe Bryant scored 33 points, and Los Angeles won its fourth straight game and second straight in overtime.

For the second night in a row, the Lakers climbed out of a double-digit hole in the second half to force an extra period. On Tuesday night, they came back from 17 down to win at Memphis in double-overtime. The Hornets also led by as many as 17 late in the

Tony Parker had 31 points and 12 assists, and Tim Duncan had 21 points and 13 rebounds as the Spurs closed a seven-game homestand by hosting the NBA's biggest drama.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDEN, IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR LATE CHARGES TO BE ASSESSED FOR DELINQUENT BILLS UNDER SECTION 4-401 OF THE EDEN MUNICIPAL CODE; UNDER ARTICLE VIII OF ORDINANCE NO. 1-2006 OF THE CITY OF EDEN; UNDER SECTION 3-402 OF THE EDEN MUNICIPAL CODE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Section 4-401 of the Eden Municipal Code, Article VIII of Ordinance No. 1-2006, and Section 3-402 of the Eden Municipal Code now provides for assessments of fees for water, wastewater treatment and garbage collection services provided to residents of the city; and

WHEREAS, no existing ordinance or code provisions of the City of Eden presently provide for the assessment of late fees for delinquent charges; and

WHEREAS, The City of Eden has not currently adopted by ordinance a policy of charging citizens reasonable fees to recover City costs in the event of the return of a check submitted to the City to pay customer fees due to accounts being closed or insufficient funds being in the account; and

WHEREAS, imposition of late fees for delinquent utility charges and a fee for checks submitted to the City in payment of utility fees which are returned because the account is closed or the account lacks sufficient funds, will promote the welfare of the citizens of the City by encouraging prompt and timely payment of utility fees, and reducing the need for the citizens at large to subsidize financial loss incurred by the City arising from the fault of the customer paying the utility fee; and

WHEREAS, a hearing on the fees imposed by this ordinance was held on the 12th day of March, 2012, at the hour of 7 p.m., at the First Segregation Fire District Meeting Room, pursuant to Idaho Code 63-1311(a) after notice lawfully given.

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Eden, Idaho as follows:

SECTION 1: Late Fees.

Any bill for services sent to a customer under Sections 4-401 or 3-402 of the Eden municipal Code, or under Article VIII of Ordinance No. 1-2006 of the City of Eden, as they now exist or as they may hereafter be amended, not paid within thirty days of the date it is mailed, shall cause the customer to be assessed a late fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00). In the event water service is terminated pursuant to Sections 4-401 of the Eden Municipal Code, or pursuant to Article VIII Ordinance No. 1-2006 of the City of Eden, reconnection shall not be permitted until all delinquent charges, including late fees, are fully paid.

SECTION 2: Disconnection; Reconnection Fees.

Any customer to whose drinking water has been disconnected pursuant to Eden Municipal Code Section 4-401, or Article VIII of Ordinance No. 1-2006 will be required to pay prior to reconnection, all delinquent fees, including late fees, and a reconnection fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00).

SECTION 3: Returned Check Fee.

Any customer who submits a check to the City of Eden for water, wastewater treatment, or garbage services which is returned due to the customer's account being closed or for insufficient funds in the account, will be assessed an additional fee of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) per each returned check. In the event City water services to that customer are terminated pursuant to Eden Municipal Code Section 4-401, or Article VIII of Ordinance No. 1-2006, all fees assessed for the return of checks issued under this section shall be paid to the City in addition to the fees as set forth in Sections 1 and 2 of this Ordinance in order for such service to be reconnected.

SECTION 4: Amendment.

All fees assessed under Sections 1, 2 and 3 of this Ordinance may be amended from time to time by a resolution passed by the City Council.

SECTION 5: Inconsistent Provisions Repealed.

All provisions of the Eden Municipal Code or ordinances of the City of Eden inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6: Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be effective upon its passage and publication as required by law.

On this date:
In 44 B.C., Roman dictator Julius Caesar was assassinated by a group of nobles that included Brutus and Cassius.

Ten years ago: A Houston jury spared Andrea Yates' life after prosecutors stopped short of demanding the death penalty for the tormented mother who'd drowned her five children in the bathtub. (The 37-year-old Yates was sentenced to life in prison; however, she was later acquitted by reason of insanity in a retrial.) TV pioneer Sylvester "Pat" Weaver, who'd created NBC's "Today" and "Tonight" shows, died in Santa Barbara, Calif., at age 93.

Five years ago: In the Senate, Republicans easily turned back Democratic legislation requiring a troop withdrawal from Iraq to begin within 120 days. Actress Angelina Jolie adopted a 3-year-old boy from an orphanage in Vietnam (Pax Thien was her fourth child with Brad Pitt). The body of 6-year-old Christopher Barrios was found in Brunswick, Ga., a week after he'd gone missing. (A neighbor, David Edenfield, was convicted of aggravated child molestation and murdered and was sentenced to death; his wife, Peggy, pleaded guilty in connection with the case and faces a 60-year prison sentence; their son, George, has been deemed mentally incompetent to stand trial.) Former baseball commissioner Bowie Kuhn died in Jacksonville, Fla., at age 80.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"Men must be decided on what they will not do, and then they are able to act with vigor in what they ought to do."

— *Mencius*

Today's deal is all about focusing on the possible things that can go wrong in your four-heart game. Some of them will doom you whatever you do; others will present you with a roadblock that you can hurdle. See which problems you think you can overcome. Of course, the points at issue are bad breaks in the red suits.

Against four hearts, West leads the two top spades and shifts to the club nine. What now? If diamonds break or the jack falls singleton, you will have nothing to worry about but possible bad trump breaks. What can you do about bad diamond breaks? Not much if West has the shortage, but what if East is the one with short diamonds?

The answer is that a 4-1 diamond break will not be fatal — so long as you are careful. Win the club ace, play the diamond queen, then lead the diamond three toward the king.

If diamonds prove to be 3-2, draw three rounds of trump and hope they are no worse than 4-2. But when East has short diamonds (as here), he cannot profitably ruff in, so he may as well pitch a spade.

You win the diamond king, cross to dummy with the heart ace and lead another diamond. Again East discards, so you win the ace. Now you can ruff a diamond in dummy. Whether East overruffs with his trump trick or discards, you will lose only one trump trick and have 10 winners.

ANSWER: With only one feeble spade stop and no diamond fit, you are best advised to pass three diamonds and hope your partner can find a way home. In this auction, if your partner had wanted to force to game, he could have cue-bid two spades at his second turn, so you should assume he has nothing to spare for his jump.
