Another Nursing Shortage?

A state report indicates that the resurgent economy may leave colleges racing to keep up with demand for nurses.

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TWIN FALLS • An improved economy could carry an unfortunate side effect: another statewide nursing shortage. For the last few years, the trou-

bled economic climate has kept Idaho's nursing shortage at a minimum. Experienced nurses pushed off retirement, and even more avoided part-time work in order to keep afloat during the nation's recession. But as the economy stabilizes, many older nurses now hope to retire. This will most likely result in nurses retiring faster than universities can turn out new recruits, predicts a recent Idaho Department of Labor report. The problem isn't a lack of inter-

est in the nursing profession, said Tammy Pehrson, who runs the College of Southern Idaho's practical nursing program. "What we're seeing are these phenomenally long waiting lists," Pehrson said. "It's not unusual to have a lot of students on waiting lists for a year or more." According to the report, there are more than 730 registered nursing jobs across south-central Idaho, with St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center contributing at least 530

Police Suspect Speed, Alcohol to Blame for Burley Crash

Charges haven't been filed, but Daniel Hood may face punishment in the March 2 death of Santiago Maestas.

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BURLEY • Detectives say a Heyburn man was driving 60 mph in the parking lot of a Burley potato plant when he slammed head-on into another vehicle, killing its driver. The speed limit in the parking lot is 15 mph. Albion resident Santiago Maestas, 59, was killed March 2 when Daniel Hood's pickup landed on top of his truck's cab, crushing him after the two vehicles collided. Maestas was leaving the McCain Foods USA plant west of Burley, while Hood was picking up his wife at the end of her shift, according to police. Cassia County Prosecutor Al Barrus said Friday that he had not yet received a copy of the sheriff's investigation, which his office will review to determine if criminal charges will be filed. According to the Cassia County Sheriff's Office report on the investigation, Hood allegedly told deputies at the scene that he had been drinking and had consumed 1 1/2 beers. Hood failed the field sobriety test given to him at the scene, and later began to shake uncontrollably and was taken from the scene to Cassia Regional Medical Center by ambulance. According to the report, Hood's wife told detectives he has frequent seizures. The report indicates Hood may not have been taking his anti-seizure medication as directed. Blood was drawn from Hood at the hospital and sent to the state's lab for blood-alcohol content testing. The report indicates that officials are awaiting results. The report indicates that Hood's driver's license was suspended in December 2010 due to a driving under the influence conviction. His license had not been reinstated at the time of the crash. Detectives were able to retrieve surveillance videos from the parking lot and several witnesses observed the crash.

'Education Is Your Job'

Students from more than 15 Magic Valley schools spent Friday in Jerome, learning how to plan for college.

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JEROME • As their peers sat in the Jerome High School cafeteria Friday, a group of about 15 students from around the state stood in the center of the room. Idaho State University employees Guillermo Caldera and Luis Carrillo asked them to move to different areas to show if they thought "jeans for school" was a need or want. The students were divided, saying they didn't know whether that referred to basic

clothing or designer jeans. But there wasn't any debate about where "money for college" fell. All the students moved closer to "need" signs taped to tables. "That's definitely a need," Carrillo told the students. The exercise was a way to help the teens learn how to manage their finances and pay for college. More than 700 middle and high school students — primarily Hispanic — attended the four-hour Student Leadership Series event.

No Charges Brought in Burley Bicycle Fatality

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BURLEY • No criminal charges will be filed against a Murtaugh man who hit and killed a bicyclist March 9 west of Burley. Lona Linzy Hymas-Smith, 50, of Murtaugh,

was killed while riding her bike after a vehicle driven by Michael Lee Burt, 42, struck her while they both traveled eastbound. Cassia County Prosecutor Al Barrus said Friday that after his office reviewed the investigation files and the law, prosecutors concluded that no charges would be filed against Burt.

"We just don't see any way that we could prove he violated traffic laws, which is what we would have to prove in order to prosecute a manslaughter case," said Barrus. Hymas-Smith was known for her lifelike wood carvings of wildlife and fish, which were commissioned for collections nationwide.

Senate Committee Dumps Bill to Let Military Members Skip Hunter Safety Class

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BOISE • Sorry, military members. If you want to hunt in Idaho, you still need to take the class. On Friday, the Senate Resources and Environment Committee killed a bill that would have exempted

military members seeking an Idaho hunting license from taking a required hunter education class. The legislation would exempt both Idaho residents and out-of-state hunters from having to take the class, whether they were veterans or active-duty. The argument: Military members

already know how to safely handle firearms, said bill sponsor Rep. Lynn Luker, R-Boise. But hunter education teachers who testified disagreed with Luker's logic, pointing out that the classes also teach hunting ethics, laws and wildlife identification. A military member might not know how to

identify private property, or not to shoot near livestock, said commissioner Bill London of the Idaho Conservation Officers Association. Rhett Moore of the Idaho Hunter Education Instructor Association also pointed out the military employs a wide range of people, and not all of them have had extensive

training in gun safety. In the end, senators voted to hold the bill in committee. Sen. Jeff Siddoway, R-Terretton, agreed. "I almost brought this bill two years ago," he said. "Then I started to look into it, and I came to the conclusion that (the requirement) wasn't overly burdensome."

Recurring Cold May Indicate Sinus Infection

I'm 43 years old and have gotten three or four colds in the past six months. It seems like every time I end up with a sinus infection as well. Could it be a chronic sinus infection or something else? What can I to keep this from happening every time I get a cold?

— Tom, Jerome

Answered by Dr. Russ Mayes, St. Luke's Clinic Ear, Nose and Throat:

Initially, it'd be best to be evaluated by your primary care physician to learn whether these colds, which can commonly lead to a sinus infection, are in fact a sinus infection.

The common upper respiratory infection caused by a virus runs its course in 10-14 days. If symptoms persist past 14 days, then you should be concerned that you may have a sinus infection.

The Academy of Otolaryngology recommends that for upper respiratory infections people wait about 10-14 days to see if their symptoms resolve before they're placed on an antibiotic. But if you take a sudden turn for the worse on day 4 or 5, it could indicate a more severe infection which may need to be treated by an antibiotic.

In general, if you have had a cold with a stuffy and runny nose, without other symptoms like a fever or productive cough, a more conservative approach would be advisable.

Conservative treatment might include an over the counter nasal decongestant, irrigation with saline, or a nasal spray for a few days.

If, however, your symptoms persist after 10 or more days, an antibiotic could be the best course of treatment.

If your cold/sinus infection returns after a couple weeks after you took an antibiotic as treatment, it could indicate you have a chronic sinus infection that was incompletely treated. In that case, a more prolonged course of antibiotics will likely clear up the infection.

Most often, a three-week course of antibiotics and steroid treatment will be prescribed. If the infection still persists after this treatment, a CAT scan of the sinuses would be recommended.

A CAT scan will help us answer questions such as: Is there blockage in the natural openings of the sinuses. Is there infection in the sinuses that is not improving with the use of antibiotics? Or is there an anatomic reason for these infections?

If any of these are the case, sinus surgery may be the best course of action. When you have failed conservative measures, then you may be a good candidate for sinus surgery.

The thing to remember is that it's most important to first make an appointment with your primary care physician to discuss all of your symptoms so they can treat you properly or refer you to a specialist if necessary.

The Idaho Commission on Hispanic Affairs and the United States Hispanic Leadership Institute organized the effort to bring the national program to Idaho for the first time.

Margie Gonzalez, executive director of the commission, said the event created momentum in encouraging students to continue on to post-secondary education.

"This has been an amazing opportunity for Idaho," she said.

Tania Delva, a high school sophomore from Blackfoot, said she learned the importance of saving money. Her classmate — high school senior Zaray Lopez — said the event helped motivate her to go to college.

More than 15 Idaho schools — including some in the Magic Valley — sent students. Gonzales said she hopes to hold a similar event in the future for Treasure Valley students.

Throughout the morning, students heard from motivational speakers, attended a college fair and listened to a presentation about finances.

Caldera and Carrillo — both employees with ISU's TRIO Student Services program — spoke to students about topics such as credit cards, the importance of budgeting and applying for college financial aid.

The federally funded TRIO program provides services such as advising and tutoring to students in need, such as those from a low-income family or those with the potential to be a first-generation college student.

Caldera and Carrillo come to Twin Falls and Jerome high schools regularly to work with students.

On Friday, the ISU employees encouraged students to study hard, and take advantage of ways to save money by earning college credit while in high school.

"Education is your job right now," Caldera said.

Carrillo told the students that finances may seem like a foreign language, but he encouraged them to put the information they learned into practice.

of them. And with the average RN pay rounding out to \$60,000 and higher, it's easy to see the attraction.

For this academic year, Pehrson said CSI's registered nursing program received more than 100 applications. Only 50 students were admitted and the rest were either turned away or put on a waiting list.

Statewide, universities accepted more than 1,400 nursing students into their programs and turned away close to 900 hopeful applicants.

At CSI, there must be at least one instructor for every 10 nursing students. However, as interest in the nursing fields grows, hiring nursing instructors becomes more and more strained. According to the report, nursing instructor positions pay about 60 percent less than an average registered nursing salary.

Pehrson said it's always been a struggle to recruit and maintain educators. This is unfortunate, she said, when the number of interested applicants shows

no sign of shrinking.

"People who are applying now are people who are changing careers from being an accountant and now want to

go into health care," she said. "They know these are high-paying jobs and that you can usually get a job fairly soon after graduation."

BOISE • Federal and state agencies are investigating acquisitions by St. Luke's Health System in Boise for possible antitrust and Idaho Competition Act violations. As that investigation happens, Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden asked the health system to stop any efforts to buy Saltzer Medical Group.

The health system, Idaho's largest private employer, received the letter in late February, St. Luke's spokesman Ken Dey said Friday.

The health system has acquired a number of medical practices in the Treasure Valley and southern Idaho. In south-central Idaho, it owns hospitals and clinics in Twin Falls, Jerome and Ketchum, and contracts to manage another hospital in Gooding.

A copy of the letter, obtained from the Attorney General's office through a public records request, said it came to Wasden's "attention that St. Luke's is presently involved in the purchase of

the Saltzer Medical Group. This acquisition, if consummated, directly affects our current antitrust review."

The letter asked St. Luke's to stop any effort to acquire Saltzer, a practice based in Nampa with offices in Caldwell, Meridian and Boise. Dey said St. Luke's has "been exploring" the possibility of doing more than just partnering with Saltzer, but "we're not moving forward with anything with Saltzer at this point."

The letter didn't indicate how broad the review will be or how many acquisitions it might examine. Nothing official has been filed, and St. Luke's hasn't yet been asked to hand over documents or give any other information, Dey said.

"Quite frankly, we're not all that surprised by it," he said. That's because mergers and acquisitions reviews are "fairly common in other businesses" and have become more common in the increasingly consolidated health care industry, he said.

"We have no doubt we've done everything right, so we're going to cooperate fully with everything they need," Dey said. "We haven't done [acquisitions] for market share. This has nothing to do ... with becoming a monopoly."

The letter from Wasden said that selling off some holdings could be among the "various remedies" to address anti-competitive acquisitions.

Wasden said he hoped to resolve any concerns that arise "amicably and informally without the need for litigation and court participation." But having "one more large acquisition in the mix complicates matters and

would result in additional cost and expense for all parties involved."

A call to Saltzer Medical Group was not immediately returned.

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Bill Would Put Surplus Funds in State Reserves

BOISE • On Friday, the House passed a bill to automatically transfer revenue left over after the annual budget is set into the state's reserve accounts.

Rep. Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot, who sponsored the bill, called it "a good transparency bill."

"That was our intent when we developed it," he said.

Rep. Maxine Bell, co-chairwoman of the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, opposed the

bill, saying it may affect JFAC's ability to use the money to pay for deficiency warrants and supplemental requests. Though Lake said the state would be able to dip into the reserve accounts to pay those bills, Bell, a Jerome Republican, objected.

"It should be a savings account, not a checking account," Bell said. "While I understand the reasoning behind (the proposal) and I agree with the philosophy, the process here troubles me a little."

The bill passed 40-27, and will go to the Senate.

Teen Suspect Waives Hearing in Arson Case

Dylan T. Gage, 18, was charged after several suspicious fires were found burning in a home owned by the Max S. Family Trust on Normal Avenue in Burley.

The case will now be bound over to Cassia County 5th District Court. Further hearing dates have not been set.

After the fire, Gage was taken to a Pocatello hospital.

Cassia County sheriff's deputies discovered the fires after responding to a 911 call asking for a welfare check on a man at the home.

The house sustained substantial smoke and fire damage.

House Panel Approves Brewery Expansion Bill

BOISE (AP) • Small breweries in Idaho are toasting a plan under debate by House lawmakers that would lift restrictions on investing in more than one company that brews beer.

The House State Affairs Committee said "cheers" Thursday to a measure that could generate 25 new jobs initially by dumping limits on brewers who make less than 30,000 barrels of beer per year.

Wineries already enjoy freedom to hold a financial

stake in multiple enterprises; brewers are limited to one.

Professional brewer Fred Colby is helping lead the charge.

He owns Laughing Dog Brewery in Ponderay, the second-largest microbrewery in Idaho, but says the antiquated Idaho law forced him to renounce his stake in an up-and-coming new brewery.

Idaho has more than 20 breweries, with three more set to open in 2012.

Idaho Senate Pauses to Honor Fallen Soldiers

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BOISE • It was an emotional end to the week for the Idaho Senate.

On Friday, the lawmakers honored the seven soldiers with Idaho ties who died in combat over the last year with a concurrent resolution.

Senate Majority Leader Bart Davis, R-Idaho Falls, introduced the resolution, saying he got the idea after a friend lost her son in Iraq.

"It is hard to bury the people you love with all your heart," Davis said.

Senators took turns giv-

ing brief bios of each of the soldiers, sometimes pausing to compose themselves. Sen. Melinda Smyser, R-Parma, talked about a soldier who had graduated with her son, and Sen. Pat-

ti Anne Lodge, R-Huston, remembered the son of one of her former students.

The soldiers honored were Pfc. Robert Near of Washington, Sgt. Nathan Beyers of Coeur d'Alene, Spc. Nicholas Newby of Coeur d'Alene, Sgt. Devin Daniels of Council, Spc. Robert Dyas of Nampa, Sgt. Ryan Sharp of Idaho Falls, and Lance Cpl. Kenneth Cochran of Wilder.

Burley Man Gets up to 22 Years in Child Sex Abuse Case

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BURLEY • A Burley man was sentenced to three to 22 years in prison on a charge of felony lewd conduct with a child under 16 after he allegedly had sexual contact with a 14-year-old female.

Manuel De Jesus Delacruz Perez, 34, was sentenced by Cassia County 5th District Judge Michael Crabtree on Feb. 28. Delacruz Perez had entered an Alford plea to the charge, maintaining his innocence and taking advantage of a plea agreement that dismissed charges of felony rape and two felony counts of sex abuse of a child under 16 years old.

The judge also ordered Delacruz Perez to pay a civil judgment to the victim in the

amount of \$5,000.

According to court records, detectives found about 100 text messages between him and the victim, some asking the victim to have sexual contact.



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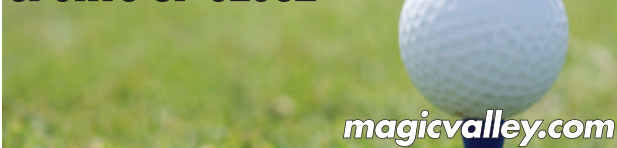

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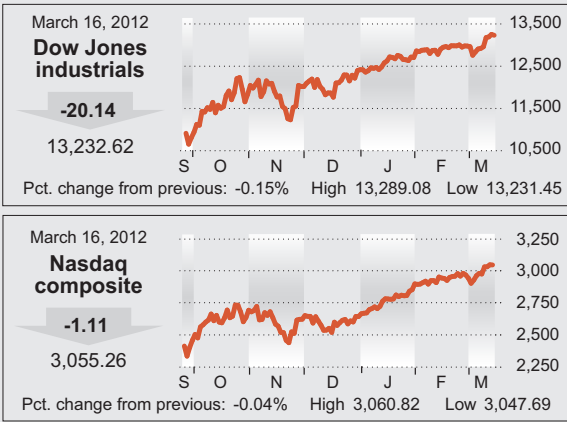

U.S. Stock Market Wavers, Ends Day Mixed

NEW YORK (AP) • It was a mundane end to an electrifying week on the stock market. Stock indexes wavered indecisively between small gains and losses Friday before closing mixed. Earlier in the week, the Standard & Poor's 500 and the Nasdaq composite index were on a tear, hitting levels that hadn't been reached in years. On Friday, the Dow Jones industrial average and the Nasdaq both ended the day down. The Dow fell 20.14 points to 13,232.62. The Nasdaq fell 1.11 points to 3,055.26. AT&T Drops Appeal, Pays Small-claims Litigant

NEW YORK (AP) • AT&T Inc. on Friday gave up on appealing an \$850 award won by an iPhone user in small claims court, and sent him a check.
Matt Spaccarelli, of Simi Valley, Calif., had sued the phone company because it was slowing down the data service on his phone. Spaccarelli has an “unlimited data” plan, but as of this fall, AT&T had begun slowing download speeds for these subscribers if they use more than a certain amount of data in a month. Spaccarelli argued that “unlimited is unlimited,” and the judge agreed at a hearing on Feb. 24.
AT&T initially said it would appeal the decision. It then offered to go into settlement talks with him, in a letter that implied that AT&T was looking at cancelling his service completely.

Higher Gas Prices Threaten Economy If They Persist

The risk is that gas prices could eventually slow growth by causing some people to cut spending on other goods, from appliances and furniture to electronics and vacations.

WASHINGTON • Inflation remains tame throughout the U.S. economy, with one big exception: gas prices.
Those higher prices haven't derailed a steadily improving economy. But if they surpass \$4 or \$5 a gallon, experts fear Americans could pull back on spending, and job growth could stall, posing a potentially serious threat to the recovery.

And the longer prices remain high, the more they could imperil President Barack Obama's re-election hopes.
A few weeks ago, economists generally agreed that the economy was in little danger from higher gas prices as long as job growth remained strong. But fears are now mounting that gas prices could begin to weaken consumer confidence.
The average pump price nationwide is \$3.83 a gallon. Energy analysts say it's bound to climb higher in the weeks ahead.
“It's a thorn in the side of the consumer and businesses,” said Chris Christopher, an economist at IHS Global Insight. The economy this year “would have been better and stronger if

we didn't have to deal with this.”
So far, higher prices aren't undermining the economic recovery, which is getting a lift from strong job creation. It would take a big jump — to around \$5 a gallon — before most economists would worry that growth would halt and the economy would slide into another recession.
That's because an improving economy is somewhat insulated from any threat posed by higher prices at the pump.
The risk is that gas prices could eventually slow growth by causing some people to cut spending on other goods, from appliances and furniture to electronics and vacations. Gasoline purchases provide less benefit for the U.S. economy because about half of the revenue flows to oil-exporting nations, though U.S. oil companies and gasoline retailers also benefit.
Many American businesses suffer, too. They must pay more for fuel and shipping and for materials affected by high oil prices, such as petroleum-based plastics. Profit margins get squeezed.
Even if prices ease after the summer driving season, don't expect gasoline to fall below \$3 a gallon. The government

estimates that this year's average will be \$3.79, followed by \$3.72 in 2013.
Most economists accept a rough guideline that a 25-cent rise in gas prices knocks about 0.2 percentage point off economic growth.
Gas prices also have an outside impact on consumer confidence, Christopher noted. It's a high-frequency purchase. Consumers notice the price whether they're filling up or driving past a gas station.
Along with the unemployment rate and stock market levels, gasoline prices heavily determine how Americans see their financial health.
That effect was evident Friday when a decline was reported in the Thomson Reuters/University of Michigan index of consumer sentiment. The result surprised some economists who had assumed that higher stock prices and lower unemployment would lift consumer sentiment.
The Michigan report showed that “gasoline worries ... are outweighing stock market gains and job growth” when it comes to influencing consumer attitudes, said Michael Hanson, an economist at Bank of America Merrill Lynch.
The price of gasoline has climbed 17 percent since the year began — to a national average of \$3.83 a gallon. That's the highest ever for this time of year. A month ago, it was \$3.52.

Fans, Entrepreneurs Among First Buyers of New iPad

MADISON, Wis. • Apple's latest iPad drew the customary lines of die-hard fans looking to be first and entrepreneurs looking to make a quick profit.
Many buyers lined up for hours, and in some cases overnight, as the tablet computer went on sale in the U.S. and nine other countries. They did so even though Apple started accepting online orders a week ago.
The new, third model comes with a faster processor, a much sharper screen and an improved camera, though the changes aren't as big as the upgrade from the original model to the iPad 2.
As with the previous models, prices start at \$499 in the U.S.
“I don't think it's worth the price

but I guess I'm a victim of society,” Athena May, 21, said in Paris.
Dan Krolikowski, 34, was first in line at a Madison, Wis., mall. He arrived 14 hours before the store's opening and was buying an extra one to sell on the “gray market.”
“Last year I sold one on eBay and made over \$500 in profit,” Krolikowski said, leaning back in a reclining lawn chair he brought. “I'm hoping to do that again this year.”
Those who ordered iPads online started getting them delivered Friday. However, Apple now says there's a two- to three-week shipping delay for online orders. There's also demand in countries where the new iPad isn't available yet.
In Hong Kong, a steady stream of buyers picked up their new devices at preset times at the city's sole Apple store after entering an online lottery.

The system, which required buyers to have local ID cards, helped thwart visitors from mainland China, Apple's fastest growing market. A release date in China has not yet been announced. Apple will begin selling the iPad in 25 additional countries next Friday, mostly in Europe.
At Apple's flagship retail store on New York's Fifth Avenue, the composition of the line, and the way many customers were paying for two iPads each with wads of cash, suggested that many of the tablets were destined to be resold abroad.

Radio's 'This American Life' Retracts Apple China Story

CHICAGO (AP) • The public radio program “This American Life” on Friday retracted a story about what a monologist said he found while investigating Apple operations in China, citing “numerous fabrications.”
The show's Friday broadcast was to detail inconsistencies in the popular Jan. 6 episode that was an excerpt

from writer Mike Daisey's critically acclaimed one-man show “The Agony and the Ecstasy of Steve Jobs,” which currently is at the Public Theater in New York.
“We're retracting the story because we can't vouch for its truth,” Ira Glass, host of the radio show said in a letter posted on the show's website.

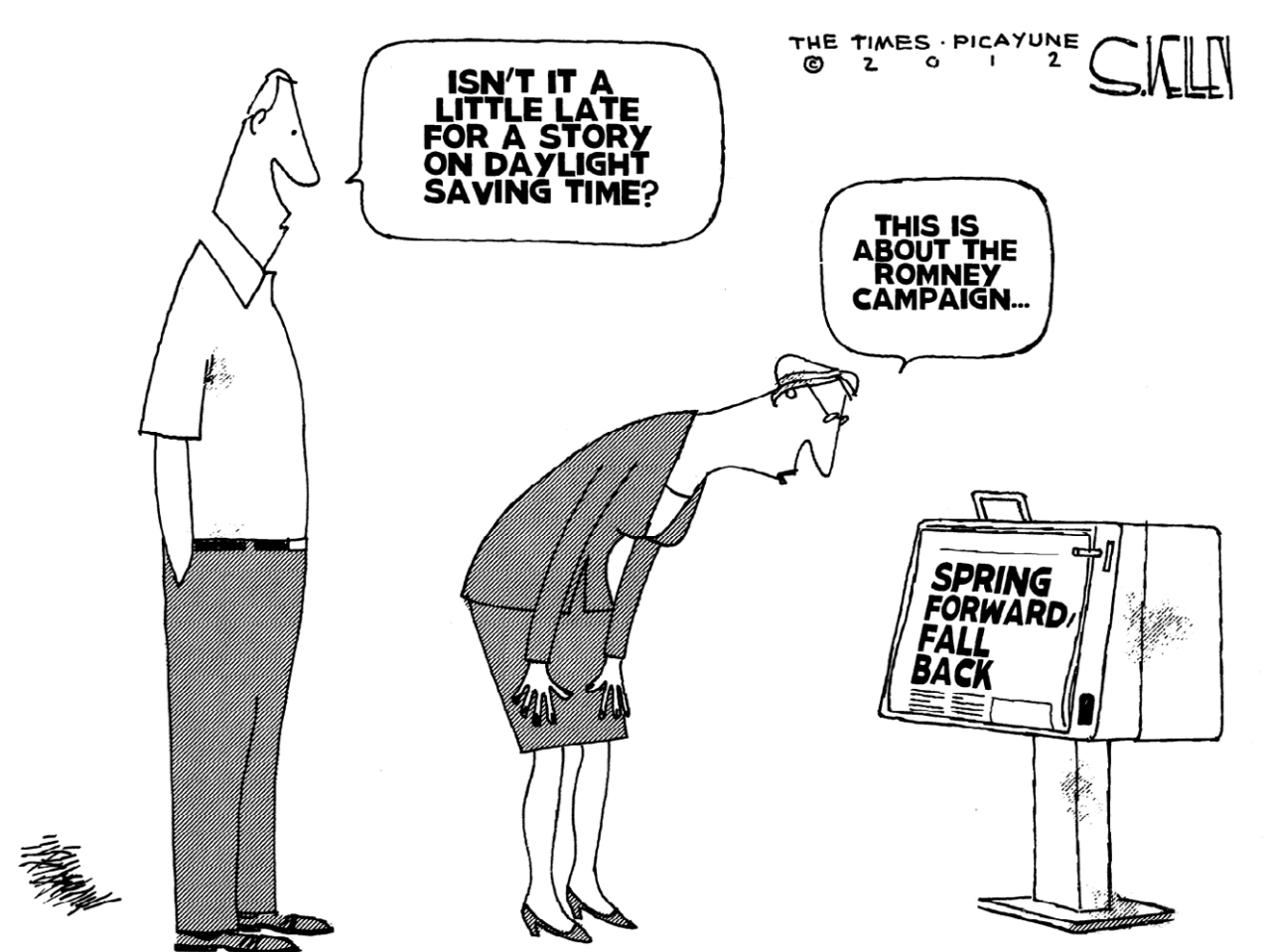

Britannica Yields to the Digital Age

The following editorial appeared in the Los Angeles Times on Thursday:

Two months after Eastman Kodak Co. declared bankruptcy, another household name is succumbing to the relentless march of technology. Encyclopaedia Britannica announced this week that it is discontinuing its best-known product, the 32-volume collection of reference material on everything from aardvarks to zygotes. The company is shifting its focus to the Internet, where it offers a virtual version of its books and a slate of fee-based educational services.

The company’s ability to sell pricey bound volumes for 244 years is a testament not just to the power of its brand, but also to the demand for a convenient, reliable source of information. The market for the latter isn’t going away, and at least four other publishers will keep printing multi-volume encyclopedias after the last set of Encyclopaedia Britannica is delivered.

Yet it seems only a matter of time before the market evaporates for all of these costly editions. For families with a computer that’s always connected to the Internet, free or low-cost research materials online provide an alternative that’s at least as convenient and far more up to date. And smartphones provide access to virtual reference tools anywhere at any time, making a set of bound volumes on a bookshelf appear archaic.

Britannica’s reputation for accuracy will probably ensure that the online version of its reference materials will continue to be cribbed by students around the globe.

How Will It End in Afghanistan?

This has been one of the worst fortnights in the increasingly unhappy 10½-year Afghan war for NATO and, above all, the United States and its ally, Britain.

First there was the burning of the Korans at Bagram air base, which unleashed a wave of religious fury and revenge killings of U.S. troops. Then came the deaths of six British soldiers, incinerated by a giant Taliban bomb last week, which pushed the British death toll in the war over the symbolic 400 mark. Support in Britain for an increasingly unpopular war further deteriorated. Now comes the shooting in Kandahar of 16 Afghan villagers — many of them women and children — allegedly by a rogue American soldier. All this can only have increased the determination of Prime Minister David Cameron and President Obama, his host for talks in Washington this week, to speed up their exit strategies.

But for the majority of Afghans, distressing as these events are, there are perhaps more pressing concerns. What will happen when the Americans and the rest of NATO pull out?

Afghans already feel that electoral considerations are more important to the West than the key question of whether the raw, new Afghan National Army and the Afghan National Police will be up to the task of guaranteeing the country’s security, especially if Pakistan’s intelligence agency, the ISI, continues to back the Taliban.

Although the U.S.-led surge at the end of 2010 reversed the military balance in the Taliban-infested, drug-rich Kandahar and Helmand provinces, the Taliban has since retaliated by extending its grip in the previously secure north. Now, hardly a week goes by without some prominent government official, police

or army chief being ambushed or blown up in Kunduz, Mazar-i-Sharif or even Kabul.

The hemorrhaging IED and suicide-bomb attacks — like the assassination in September of Karzai’s top peace negotiator, former Afghan President Burhanuddin Rabbani, by a supposed peace envoy with a bomb hidden in his turban — has generated a climate of fear and pessimism.

The assassin is said to have been dispatched by the Taliban, who, with its backers, the ISI, are probably the only optimists in Afghanistan. The ISI sees its long-term strategy of manipulating the Taliban insurgency to install a pro-Pakistan government in Kabul as finally paying off.

For this observer, a foreign correspondent for Reuters and Independent Television News for nearly 40 years, the situation conjures up memories of the end of the Vietnam War. National security advisor (and later Secretary of State) Henry Kissinger had to negotiate with his North Vietnamese adversaries from a position of weakness that not even he could disguise. By then all American combat troops were long gone. I watched the North Vietnamese march into Saigon on April 30, 1975; they not only took over the old capital but the whole of the south as well.

Is that what will happen in Afghanistan? Will the Taliban move to fill a vacuum, with Pakistani and ISI backing? One hopes not, and of course it would not happen in one fell swoop as it did in South Vietnam. Many Afghans and non-Afghans fear a Taliban takeover could well lead to civil war. Whatever happens in the Pashtun south and its capital, Kandahar, the Tajik

and Uzbek north will almost certainly fight rather than submit to another Taliban dictatorship. Memories of the massacres that accompanied Taliban rule from 1996 until 2001 are still too vivid for any northerner, and many southerners, to want to see the militants back in power.

Ahmed Shah Massoud, the Northern Alliance leader who was assassinated by al Qaeda suicide bombers two days before 9/11, managed to defy the Taliban for five long years despite receiving precious little support from the United States. He left behind plenty of disciples, and many of his old mujahedin commanders are said to be stockpiling arms. One such commander, Masoud’s successor, Marshal Mohammed Qassim Fahim, is Karzai’s senior vice president.

But short of civil war, is an extremist Islamic state, jeopardizing Western-inspired achievements in education and women’s rights, inevitable? Gen. David Richards, chief of the British defense staff who commanded coalition troops in Afghanistan in 2006-07, does not think so. “I don’t think we are losing, by the way,” he told me. “We are just not succeeding in the time frame that suits and is acceptable to Afghanistan or Afghans and is acceptable to our population and our politicians. So what can we do? Well, since we have only now got the resources to do this correctly, I think we have got to give ourselves more time. People talk about a bit more strategic patience.”

He added: “I believe where we have got the balance right, we are already turning the corner in practical terms.... Which is why, I think, give us a bit longer; 2015 is probably doable, for example. We have just started to get it right, and we might yet succeed.”

But will the politicians give the generals that long? In the light of recent developments, it is doubtful.

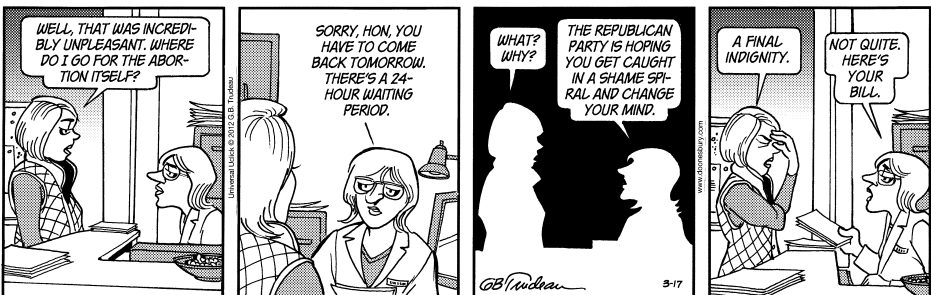

Utah Candidates Begin Wooing New Delegates

SALT LAKE CITY • Out-reach to 4,000 new Republican delegates began immediately Friday for U.S. Sen. Orrin Hatch and the challengers who hope to topple the six-term senator at next month’s state Republican convention.

With only five weeks to educate delegates, candidates must now focus on winning over enough delegates to either win outright or progress to a primary.

For Hatch, that means continuing to emphasize the seniority he has earned during his 36 years of service. For his opponents, the biggest challenge is boosting their name recognition, especially among the many delegates who would like to see Hatch replaced but are unsure about the alternatives.

“From the reports we’re getting, the senator did very well,” said Dave Hansen, campaign manager for Hatch. “We understand that not one vote has been cast, but we’re comfortable with the people who were chosen as delegates.”

One thing is clear: Turnout at the caucuses was huge. Republican Party Chairman Thomas Wright

said initial estimates say between 125,000 and 200,000 people participated, compared with about 58,000 people who attended the 2010 caucuses.

That influx of new people was driven by a push by the state party, which spent \$300,000 on advertising, as well as a call from leaders of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to attend.

Hatch’s most prominent challenger, former state Sen. Dan Liljenquist, said he will devote his energy to educating the new delegates about his legislative accomplishments and his plans to fix the federal debt.

Based on media reports from around the state and postings on Twitter from caucus attendees, many attendees were frustrated by the tea party-affiliated group FreedomWorks, which spent more than \$600,000 on advertising attacking Hatch. That could pose a problem for Liljenquist, because many people associate him with the group.

Liljenquist echoed those concerns and said he wants to make sure delegates understand that the support given to him by FreedomWorks doesn’t mean he is beholden to the group or even the broader tea party

movement. Liljenquist was named the group’s “Legislative Entrepreneur of the Year” in 2011.

He also wants to remind people that other national groups have spent money on the race, and that a good portion of Hatch’s money comes from out-of-state donors.

“People in Utah want to have their own process,” Liljenquist said. “There has been a lot of money spent on both sides from outside of the state, and people should be frustrated.”

Even if there was a backlash against FreedomWorks, it wasn’t widespread and doesn’t translate to strong support for Hatch, said Russ Walker, the group’s executive director, who was in Utah to watch the caucuses. While Walker acknowledged that many areas shied away from choosing ardent anti-Hatch attendees as delegates, he said the reports he’s received indicate fervent backers of Hatch weren’t selected either.

“People wanted delegates who were open to looking at all of the candidates,” Walker said. “That bodes well for Liljenquist and (state Rep. Chris) Herrod, because people already know Hatch.”

Idahoans Brace, Manage Spring Flooding

BOISE (AP) • A handful of communities across the state are bracing for early season flooding or already dealing with knee-deep water in farm fields and streets.

Residents in the central Idaho town of New Meadows began placing sandbags along streets and outside homes and businesses Friday morning. Town officials have also declared a flood emergency after getting hit with water overflowing the banks of Big River and The Little Salmon River.

Elsewhere, state highway officials on Friday closed a section of Highway 55 south of Cascade because of flooding from heavy recent rains.

In eastern Idaho, the combination of rain and melting snow has caused minor flooding in some parts of Fremont County.

The National Weather Service on Friday issued flooding advisories and warnings for many regions in the state.

N. Idaho City Council Man Cleared in Altercation

MOSCOW (AP) • A fire department captain in the northern Idaho city of Moscow won’t face criminal charges following an argument with a former volunteer firefighter.

The Latah County Prosecutor’s Office investigated the allegations against Dan Carscallen, who is also a Moscow city councilman. Former volunteer firefighter Benjamin Dill complained to authorities that Carscallen grabbed him during an altercation at a hospital two weeks ago.

The *Lewiston Tribune* reports the county prosecutor’s office confirmed earlier this week that Carscallen would not be charged in the incident.

Carscallen has said he went to Gritman Medical Center in response to reports Dill was doing an emergency vehicle ride-along without proper clearance. Carscallen has said he held onto Dale’s sleeve “longer than he wanted” and that the incident was blown out of proportion.

OTTER SIGNS PLAN TO BOOST ECONOMY, RESEARCH

BOISE (AP) • Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter has signed legislation creating a \$5 million plan intended to bolster university research and businesses that can help grow Idaho’s economy.

Otter’s signature this week caps one of his chief priorities heading into the 2012 Legislature. In January, the Republican governor urged lawmakers to get behind his so-called Idaho Global Entrepreneurial Mission — or IGEM.

The goal is to get cutting-edge research being done at Idaho universities to commercial markets more quickly.

Otter says IGEM sends a signal to the world that Idaho is ready to enter a new era of opportunity, collaboration and innovation.

The plan would put \$1 million toward grants for startup businesses or technologies, as well as \$2 million each for the Center for Advanced Energy Studies and Idaho’s three research universities.

FORMER IDAHO DEPUTY APPEALS MURDER CONVICTION

LEWISTON (AP) • A former Nez Perce County sheriff’s deputy is appealing his first-degree murder conviction to the Idaho Supreme Court.

The *Lewiston Tribune* reports Joseph A. Thomas’ attorney filed the notice of

appeal earlier this week, claiming 2nd District Judge Michael Griffin wrongly denied some defense motions and should have granted Thomas a new trial.

The 38-year-old Thomas was sentenced to 25 years to

life in prison in the strangulation death of his ex-wife, Beth Irby-Thomas. The Lewiston woman was found May 1. Her body was under a blanket in her living room, and a belt wrapped tightly around her neck.

Police Find Inventory Error for Guns

BOISE (AP) • Police in Boise say they’ve implemented new record-keeping procedures after an audit found incomplete paperwork on 18 guns that were to be destroyed.

Officials say during an audit of the paperwork by the Ada County Sheriff’s Office, the part-time employee responsible for armory record-keeping resigned. No charges were filed.

Deputy Chief of Operations William Bones says there is no evidence that the weapons weren’t destroyed, but the proper documentation to show they were destroyed isn’t there.

The firearms were no longer needed for evidence, were unsafe or were unsuitable for auction.

Police are still investigating what happened to the weapons.

Woman Sentenced for Defrauding Egg Donors

ST. LOUIS (AP) • An Idaho woman who defrauded egg donors in Missouri has been sentenced to probation, along with four months in a halfway house and four months of house arrest.

The *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* reports that 32-year-old Janae Helgerson of Boise, pleaded guilty in federal court in St. Louis in

December to wire fraud. She was sentenced Friday.

Helgerson was arrested in February 2011. Her business, Mid-West Egg Donation, matched couples seeking to conceive a baby with women willing to provide eggs.

Federal prosecutors say six egg donors in Missouri failed to receive nearly \$30,000 owed to them.

Crapo's Domestic Violence Law Hits GOP Snag

WASHINGTON • Idaho Sen. Mike Crapo's attempt to reauthorize an 18-year-old law targeting domestic violence has run into trouble from fellow Republicans because the bill expands tribal rights and adds protections for gays and illegal immigrants.

Senate Democrats seized on the issue Thursday, saying they're shocked at any opposition to renewing the Violence Against Women Act, which passed in 1994 with bipartisan support. Many of the chamber's female members lined up to speak on the Senate floor in favor of the reauthorization.

"It is disheartening that in the last several months, petty partisan gamesmanship has held up policies critical to women's health," Sen. Kay Hagan, a North Carolina Democrat.

Democrats won a fight just last week to preserve contraceptive health insurance coverage for women.

Fifty-eight senators have signed on to support the bill, but American Indian leaders, worried it would lack the 60 votes needed to avoid a filibuster, have launched a lobbying push, meeting with GOP senators.

The Crapo bill narrowly passed the Senate Judiciary Committee last month 10-8, with not a single Republican voting in favor. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, hasn't decided about the bill, a spokesman said.

Law Offers Legal, Other Help

According to a 2010 survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, domestic violence affects more than 12 million people each year. One in four women is a

victim of severe physical violence by an intimate partner, the survey found.

The law encourages collaboration among law enforcement, health officials and community organizations. Among other things, it has paid for short-term housing for abused women and for grants to provide law enforcement with extra staffing, training and technical assistance.

The bill's main sponsors are Crapo and Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Crapo said he doesn't object to the new provision for bidding discrimination against gays and lesbians. "I don't have a problem with that. There are people who have objections to it, but I don't think that would stop the bill," Crapo told the *Idaho Statesman*.

But Republican Sen. Charles Grassley of Iowa complained about that language during the Judiciary Committee hearing, saying he's seen no evidence of discrimination by those in the program.

"The substitute creates so many new programs for underserved populations that it risks losing the focus of helping victims ... if every group is a priority, then of course no group is a priority," Grassley said.

Crapo: We Can Work It Out

Crapo said the new provisions are "satellite" issues that can be resolved. He said he'd be happy just to reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act essentially as it's been in the past but is not going to turn against the bill because of the new provisions.

"Hopefully we will be able

to resolve those issues if we have the bill brought to the floor and we have a robust amendment process like we have on all bills," he said.

But the Democrats who control the Senate may be unwilling to give up the new provisions. Leahy said in a written statement he finds the objections "disheartening."

"Some are saying we seek to protect too many victims," Leahy said. "One thing I know from my time as a prosecutor, and I would hope it is something we can all agree on, is that all victims count."

The Tribal Argument

Another provision questioned by Grassley and others would allow tribes to prosecute non-Indians if they commit a domestic violence or sexual assault crime on a reservation against an Indian.

The National Congress of American Indians says Indian women are assaulted at twice the national average, and the offenders are often non-Indian males.

Opponents say granting such jurisdiction is unprecedented. They point to a 1978 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that tribes lack the inherent authority to arrest and prosecute non-Indians who commit crimes on reservations.

Crapo said he wants to review the Supreme Court ruling and that, if the provision is unconstitutional, it needs to be changed. But if not, it is a reasonable policy move, he said.

"If there is a crime committed inside a reservation, then I think the police authorities within the reservation should have the ability

to enforce the law against that crime," Crapo said.

Expand the Visas?

Crapo is more sympathetic to criticism of a provision to expand the number of visas allowed for illegal immigrants who are victims of domestic violence and sexual assault and who work with police to prosecute offenders. The bill would raise the annual maximum number of such visas from 10,000 to 15,000.

"I am concerned about expanding the visas for any circumstance," Crapo said. "That would be one of the issues that I think we should have a full airing on the floor and let the Senate work its will."

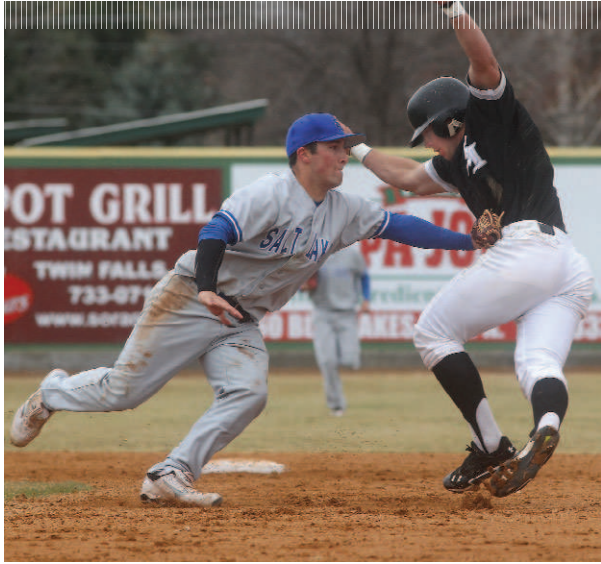

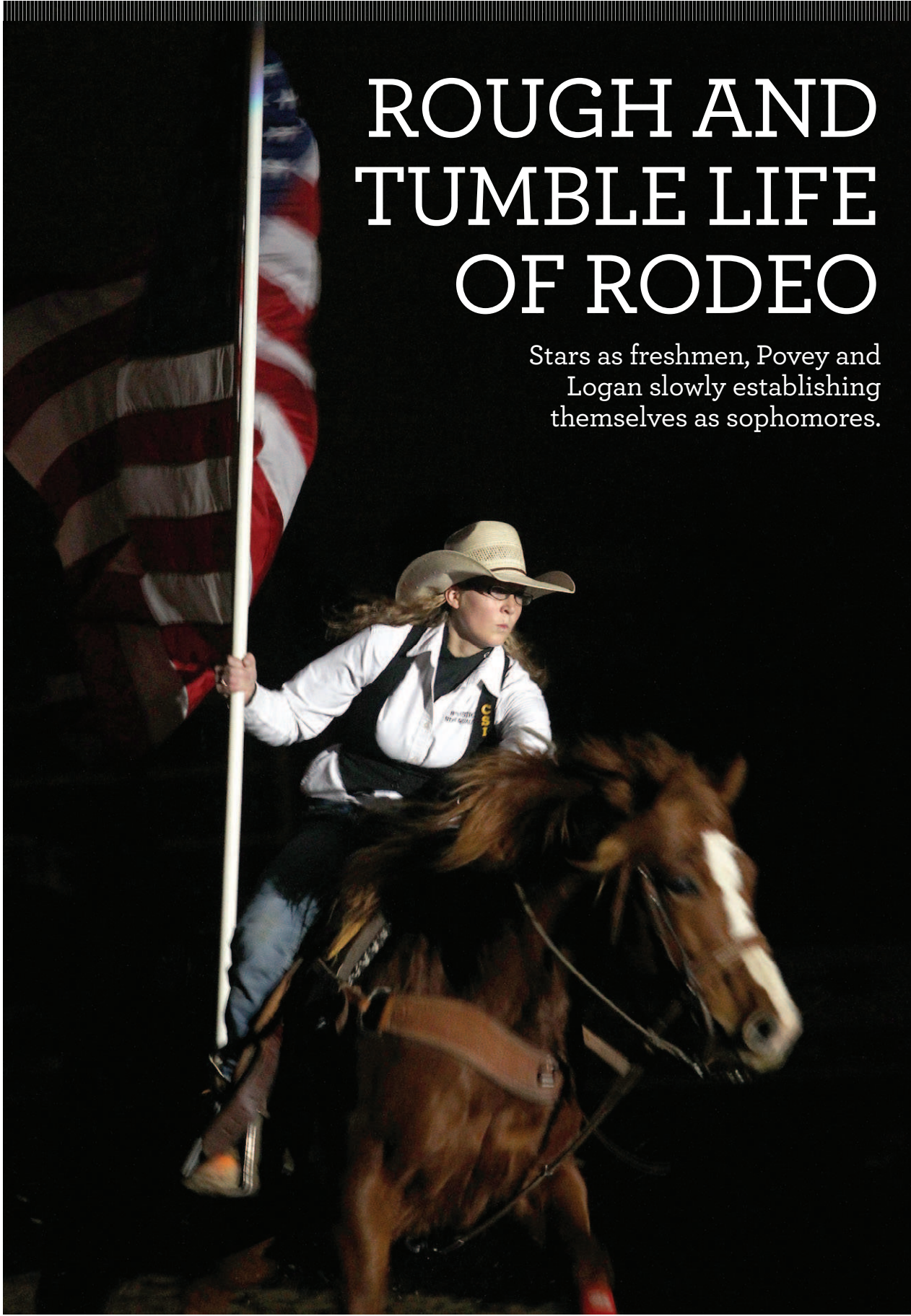

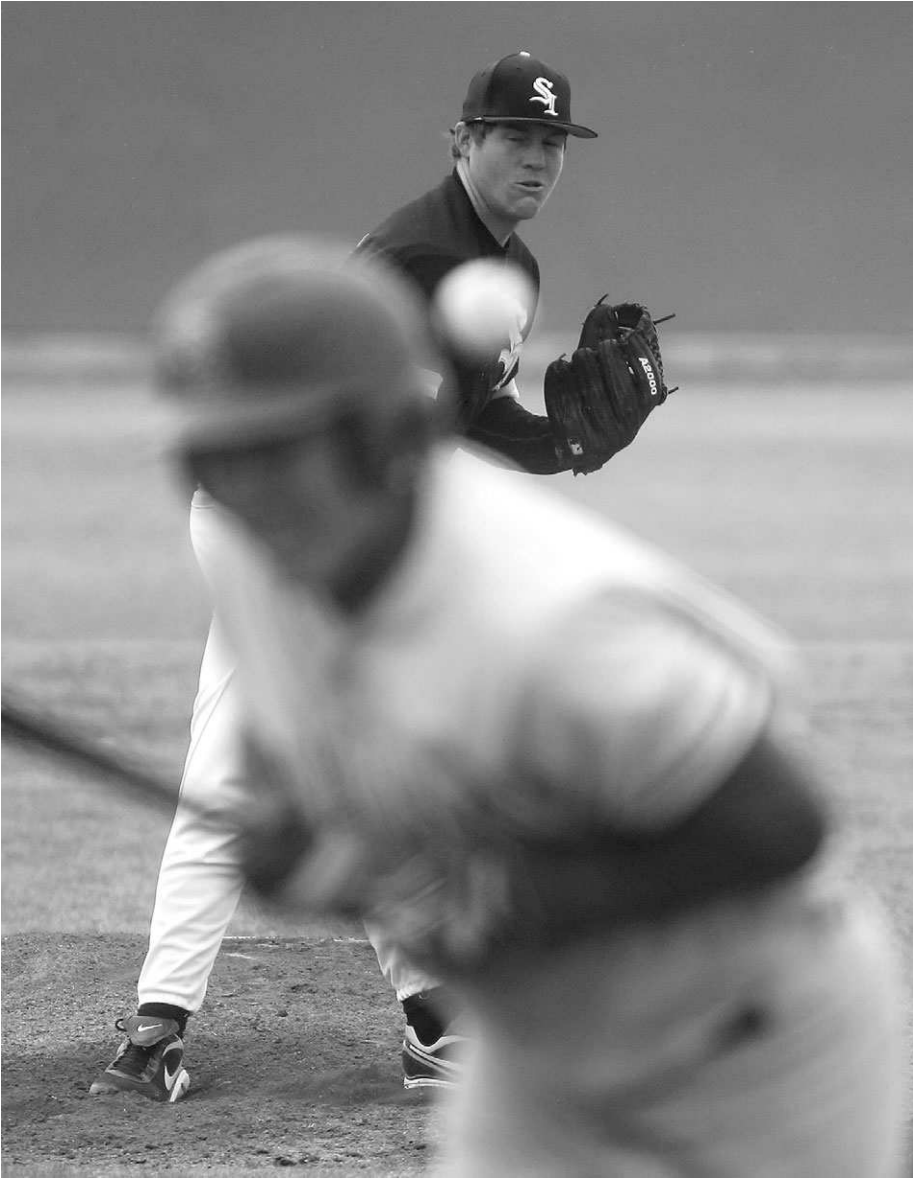

tournament like no other conference in the country.

"We talked about it as a staff, that's the best thing about this league and the worst thing about this league. The worst thing, it's so hard to get out of league, the best thing is, if you get out of league, you are so tested with different styles of play, with tough travel, with tough environments, that you're battled-tested and ready for the national tournament," Gosar said. "I think it prepares you better than any league in the country."

Gosar may be on to something.

Since 2002, CSI has made it to Hutchinson, Kan., for the national tournament five times. The Golden Eagles won it all last year, and finished third in 2007 and fourth in 2005.

Salt Lake made it back-to-back years in 2008-09, winning the championship in 2009 after losing the year before.

USU-Eastern Utah (then called College of Eastern Utah) took third place in 2010, a year after star Darington

Hobson left for New Mexico.

Though it has since moved up to NCAA Division II, Dixie State won the NJCAA national championship in 2002.

Region 18's three championships in the last decade are more than any other region.

Region 5 has two titles since 2002: South Plains (Texas) and Howard (Texas) in 2008 and 2010. Region 2 has two: Midland (Texas) in 2007 and Arkansas-Fort Smith (2006), and Region 11's Southeastern (Iowa) Community College won back-to-back titles in 2003-04.

Paris (Texas) Junior College of Region 14 won the title in 2005.

"The league is so hard, it really doesn't matter who you play. I don't think there's a bye week anywhere in the league. Whether it's Salt Lake or Eastern Utah or North Idaho or anyone else, I just think, you know what, that's league," Gosar said. "Our teams have all represented well at the national tournament. It really is a dogfight."

CSI (30-3) of course won the SWAC dogfight for the second straight year and beat a solid Arizona Western team Tuesday in a bi-re-

gional game to qualify for nationals to defend its 2011 national title.

There were some bumps along the way, and some close calls.

The Golden Eagles' first SWAC loss (they only had two) came to North Idaho in Coeur d'Alene Jan. 14, a 75-71 setback. The Cardinals would be a pain in the Golden Eagles' you know what the rest of the season.

In February, they erased a 20-point halftime lead in Twin Falls to make the game a close contest late before CSI won 69-68. The teams went to overtime for the second matchup in Coeur d'Alene — a 64-58 win for CSI — and CSI had to beat North Idaho a third time in the Region 18 championship game.

"They are a great team and we had some good battles with them this season," said CSI forward Luke Cothron.

CSI's only other SWAC loss was a shocker: the 20-point shellacking at the hands of Snow College in Twin Falls — an 82-62 smacking Feb. 16.

"That was a good thing for us. We needed to be humbled a bit and the guys really responded after that," Gosar said.

Povey has worked hard to get over the hump and to get back into her old winning ways. She currently sits fifth in breakaway roping in the Rocky Mountain Regional standings and 24th in the national standings.

"This team is coming on strong," said Povey. "We're all starting to click and getting to know each other better. We're coming together and everyone is giving their all."

Logan placed sixth in barrels and eighth in breakaway.

For Logan, who placed sixth in barrels and eighth in breakaway on Thursday, her four-legged partner has been the issue for the Jerome cowgirl and the lack of pos-

itive results in her sophomore year.

Logan found out that Bell, her 12-year old mare and the only horse she had competed on through high school and in college, would have to sit out for four months due to an injury.

"I ran her hard in 55 rodeos last summer and in the college rodeos in the fall," said Logan. "She had always been so consistent but I noticed toward the end of the summer that she wasn't turning right. So I took her to the vet and he said to rest her."

So now, she is riding her sister's horse. Heading into the three nights of rodeo at CSI, Logan currently is in seventh place in barrel racing and eighth in breakaway in the regional standings.

"My sister's horse is really fast," said Logan. "I think the

team will deliver at our home rodeo. I'm planning on stepping it up this weekend. My focus is to make it or break it. I need to deliver."

Even when things aren't falling their way, it's quite evident that Povey and Logan love to compete in rodeo and are true cowgirls. Being college students first, rodeo isn't their current employment but in the future it may be the way the two plan on making a living. Trying not to make a mistake or miss but letting the other cowgirls make the mistakes, that's what it's all about.

For the CSI women's team to qualify for nationals, the team will have to finish in one of the top two positions in the region. To make it to nationals individually, each participant has to finish in the top three in their event.

But any momentum carried over from its 17-5 season is minimal, as Declo graduated several key players. And like many 2A softball programs, Declo doesn't have a JV team to help develop players.

"Every year we start over," Osterhout said. "These girls have big shoes to fill."

With the exception of first baseman Daliss Pickup and catcher Chancey Knopp, both team captains, Declo has a new player at every position, including two starters who have never played softball before.

"I've been impressed with the improvement we've had already," Pickup said.

Don't be alarmed by De-

clo's rough start. It's part of the planned process in which the Hornets peak in time for the District IV tournament, which they've won three straight seasons.

Declo's success in recent years can largely be attributed to two things: its move from Class 3A to 2A in 2008, and the hiring of Osterhout and assistant coaches Krissey Darrington and Tiffany Mallory, who have infused the program with a competitive attitude and work ethic. When they took over five years ago, only 12 girls came out for the team. This season, there were 30.

"They're just like one of the players, they love being out there," Pickup said of the coaches. "Especially this year, we've been working really hard... we want to get

first place (at state) instead of second, so there's that competitiveness coming back."

The Hornets' outlook this season depends largely on the development of junior pitcher Stormie Kidd. And if Declo can clean up its fielding behind her, plus find offensive production throughout its lineup, a fourth-consecutive district title and state tournament trip is logical.

The main ingredient, however, will be team chemistry. A big reason for their success, last year's team developed a special bond, which isn't always easy to re-create.

"At first it's kind of weird, getting new girls, but after that we get really close and build new friendships," Knopp said. "We all care about each other and want to push each other. It's a big key for us to

Ex-Rutgers Student Guilty in Webcam Suicide Case

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J. • A former Rutgers University student convicted Friday in the webcam spying episode that ended in his gay roommate’s suicide could be headed off to prison in a case experts say stands as a tragic lesson for young people about casual cruelties and unintended consequences in the Internet age.

A jury found Dharun Ravi guilty of all 15 counts against him, deciding that Ravi not only invaded the privacy of Tyler Clementi and another man but also committed bias intimidation — a hate crime — by targeting Clementi because he was gay.

Ravi, 20, could get up to 10 years in prison by some estimates and could be deported to his native India even though he has lived legally in the U.S. since he was a little boy.

The case stirred a national conversation about anti-gay bullying and teen suicide. It also illustrated the dangers of technology in the hands of people who have grown up with the likes of Twitter and Facebook.

Shooter Soldier Identified; Karzai at ‘End of Rope’

WASHINGTON • Afghan President Hamid Karzai says he’s at “the end of the rope,” and a majority of Americans feel the same way.

Of all the past decade’s setbacks in the endeavor to form a solid alliance with Afghanistan and defeat the Taliban, the war effort has been driven to a new low by the slaughter of nine Afghan children and seven adults allegedly by a U.S. soldier whose identity had been kept secret until late Friday.

A senior U.S. official said the suspect is Army Staff Sgt. Robert Bales, 38. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the legal case that is in its early stages.

The soldier was on his way Friday from a U.S. military detention facility in Kuwait to the maximum security prison in Fort Leavenworth, Kan., though Karzai demanded anew that he be tried under the Afghan justice system.

Karzai also is now insisting that U.S. forces retreat from rural areas immediately and let Afghans take the lead in security next year. But the White House and the Pentagon said Friday that nothing would collapse the war

plan, even after the massacre, the inadvertent Quran burnings by U.S. soldiers and the deaths of seven American servicemen at the hands of their allies.

Polls have shown that up to 60 percent of Americans say it’s time to end the war in Afghanistan. And that’s not lost on the administration.

“The Afghan people are tired of war,” Defense Secretary Leon Panetta, just back from Afghanistan, acknowledged on Friday. “The American people share some of that tiredness after 10 years of war, as well. All of that’s understandable.”

But he also said he is confident that Americans realize the U.S. needs to finish its work of stabilizing Afghanistan to ensure that al-Qaida cannot against use that country as a launch pad to attack the United States. His theme — patience — is likely to dominate the discourse in Washington and in allied capitals in the lead-up to a NATO summit meeting in Chicago in May.

President Barack Obama called Karzai on Friday seeking clarification on the demand concerning U.S. troops in rural areas, and White House press secretary Jay Carney said the leaders agreed to keep discussing the matter, which is at the heart of the military strategy.

ROMNEY, SANTORUM, OBAMA TRADE CAMPAIGN DIGS

CHICAGO • After two Deep South losses, Mitt Romney is intensifying his campaign efforts in the economically challenged Midwest — a friendly region for him — in hopes of regaining his front-runner’s momentum when Illinois holds its Republican presidential primary Tuesday.

But the race for Illinois and its cache of 54 delegates is tighter than might have been expected, thanks to Rick Santorum’s recent rise in opinion polls. And President Barack Obama, the Democrat they both hope to oust, is making his presence felt, too, in his adopted home state.

Romney is clearly mindful of the threat from Santorum. He and his allies are pouring money into the state, near Michigan where he grew up and his father was governor. Romney won the Michigan primary on Feb. 28.

Logistically, he’s also looking to take advantage of Santorum’s failure to get the signatures needed to ensure he’s on the ballot statewide in Illinois.

And Romney’s on the attack.

“We are not going to be successful in replacing an economic lightweight if we

nominate an economic lightweight,” the former Massachusetts governor said Friday during an early morning stop in suburban Rosemont near Chicago. The criticism, focusing on the economy, which is the voters’ No. 1 concern, was a one-two punch against both

President Barack Obama and Republican Santorum. “I am an economic heavyweight, and I know how to fix this economy,” Romney declared.

Romney also began airing a television advertisement in Illinois accusing Santorum, a former two-term senator,

of having little understanding of the economy. And he began airing a radio ad pointing to Santorum’s crushing defeat for re-election in 2006. Santorum lost his seat in Pennsylvania to Democrat Bob Casey by 18 percentage points.

Idaho House Delays Vote on Youth Challenge Program

BOISE (AP) • The Idaho House delayed voting on legislation that allowed for state spending on a military-based program targeted at high school dropouts.

The bill was pulled Friday from the House floor at the request of Majority Caucus Chair Ken Roberts after several lawmakers debated in opposition. The measure would open the door for state alternative school funding to go toward the Youth Challenge Program.

"I think that the two men were very much on the same page" about gradually handing over security responsibility to Afghan forces, with U.S. and other international troops switching to a support role throughout Afghanistan sometime in 2013, Carney said. A final transition to Afghan control is supposed to happen by the end of 2014.

Another pillar of the war strategy is creating meaningful peace talks with the Taliban insurgents, but that, too, suffered cracks in the aftermath of the village massacre. The Taliban said it was no longer talking on terms set by the Americans.

A senior U.S. official familiar with the discussions said American officials presume that the timing of the Taliban announcement following Sunday's killings was an attempt to gain greater leverage. Officials have long calculated that the Taliban would not engage seriously in peace talks unless it had lost more ground militarily.

Despite calls for the Army suspect to be tried in Afghanistan, Bales was flown Wednesday to a military detention facility in Kuwait, where that country's officials expressed unhappiness that they were not first consulted.

It remained unclear when the Army would formally charge the soldier, who was said by his lawyer to be reluctantly serving his fourth tour of duty, his first in Afghanistan after three tours in Iraq in his 11-year military career. Much of what is publicly known about the staff sergeant has been disclosed by the lawyer, John Henry Browne a veteran defense attorney from Seattle who came forward Thursday.

But opponents raised concerns there was no long-term plan for the program and that Idaho could potentially be on the hook for additionally funding should federal dollars fall through at some point.

Lawmakers last year directed the Idaho National Guard to establish a Youth Challenge Program in Pierce. But they did so with the understanding that federal funding would cover most of the program's startup costs.

Despite Food-aid Pact, North Korea Planning Satellite Launch

BEIJING • Two weeks after agreeing to freeze its weapons programs in return for food aid, North Korea announced Friday it is preparing to launch a satellite in mid-April to mark the 100th anniversary of founder Kim Il Sung's birth.

Although North Korea insisted its intentions are peaceful, the timing of the launch could scuttle the newly inked deal with Washington. The technology employed in shooting a satellite into orbit is essentially the same as a long-range missile test. Two previous tests, in 1998 and 2009, were also described by Pyongyang as satellite launches.

In Washington, the State Department called the announcement of the launch a "highly provocative" move that would jeopardize plans to deliver food aid to starving North Koreans, even though

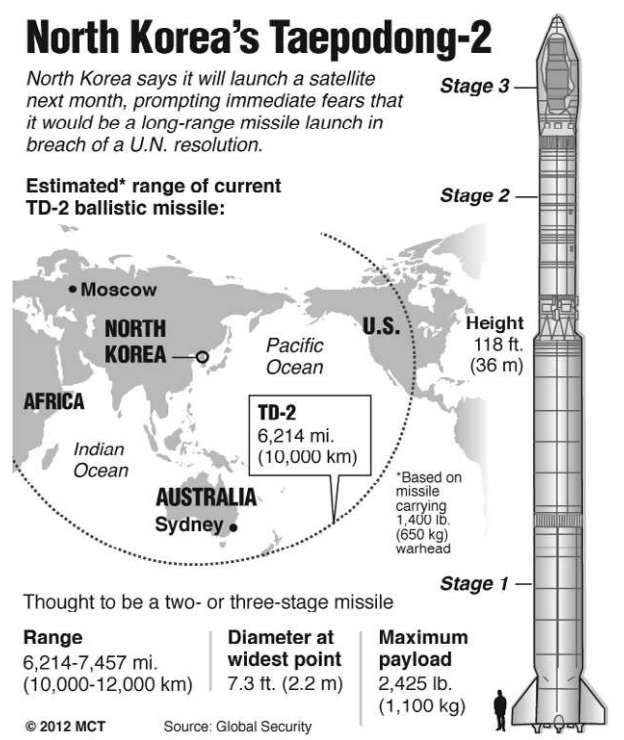
Idaho Trying to Crack Down on Cigarette Rollers

BOISE (AP) • Idaho officials are joining a growing effort across the country to crack down on "roll-your-own-cigarette" operations they say exploit tax loopholes and jeopardize state settlement agreements with tobacco corporations.

The Senate State Affairs committee passed a bill Friday that would impose a strict permitting process on retailers that allow customers to buy loose-leaf pipe tobacco and roll their own smokes using a ma-

chine on site. Loose pipe tobacco is taxed at a lower rate than cigarettes sold in packs. More than 20 states are trying to ensure these vendors pay higher taxes commensurate with producing cigarettes.

Idaho Deputy Attorney General Brett DeLange says the state must actively regulate these retailers or risk the payments it gets from a 1998 settlement with the nation's five largest tobacco companies.



the United States has insisted the assistance did not depend on the deal.

"Such a missile launch would pose a threat to regional security and would also be

inconsistent with North Korea's recent undertaking to refrain from long-range missile launches," State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland said in a statement.

"The welcoming party took evasive action," the official said.

Pentagon officials and military commanders did not disclose these and other details about the incident at Camp Bastion for two days, possibly to play down the seriousness of the security breach. Panetta's plane was abruptly diverted to another part of the air base after the pilot was told of the unfolding incident.

Had the breach occurred several minutes later, Panetta likely would have been on the runway and in the path of the oncoming vehicle.

The senior official called

that scenario "hypothetical," adding that U.S. military investigators continue to believe it is unlikely the attacker, an Afghan interpreter who worked at Camp Bastion, knew Panetta was on the U.S. Air Force C-17.

The botched attack appeared to be one of the most serious security incidents involving a defense secretary in years. It came as several other incidents, including the killing of 16 Afghan civilians allegedly by a U.S. soldier, have strained U.S.-Afghan ties and raised concerns about security on U.S. installations.

The official provided the additional details Friday on the condition that he not be identified because he was discussing a continuing investigation.

After scattering the welcoming party, the truck came to a halt in a ditch and the driver caught fire, apparently when fuel he was carrying in a container ignited. He was apprehended after fleeing the vehicle but later died as a result of his burns.

A gas can and a lighter were later found in the vehicle, the official said. Base personnel noticed smoke rising from the area where Panetta's plane was supposed to park, leading to the decision to divert the aircraft to another location, the official said.

No one in the welcoming party was injured. Panetta was told that there was a security breach, but he was not given more details until hours later, the official said.

"They don't feel like they're spying. It's just their own iPhone they're using, their own laptop," said Annemarie McAvoy, an adjunct professor at Fordham Law School in New York. "Hopefully, parents will use this as an example for their children."

On the Rutgers campus, student Melvin Ways said: "I think the lesson here is not everything is meant to be publicized to the entire world, especially private matters and things that are personal to people."

Prosecutors said Ravi set up his webcam in his dorm room and watched live video of Clementi kissing another man on Sept. 19, 2010, then

tweeted about it and excitedly tried to catch Clementi in the act again two days later. A half-dozen students were believed to have seen the live video of the kissing; no video was taken in the second instance.

On Sept. 22, Clementi threw himself off the George Washington Bridge after posting one last status update on Facebook: "Jumping

off the gw bridge, sorry!" At a courthouse news conference after the verdict, Clementi's father, Joe, addressed himself to college students and other young people, saying: "You're going to meet a lot of people in your life. Some of these people you may not like. Just because you don't like them doesn't mean you have to work against them."

Santorum, just back from campaigning in Puerto Rico for Sunday's primary there, sounded confident despite Romney's heavy organizational and advertising edge — and unconcerned about the criticism of his economic acumen.

Appearing at a Hispanic grocery store in Prospect Heights, Ill., he shot back at his rival.

"I believe in a light touch of government where Governor Romney believes in a

very heavy touch," Santorum said. "So he is an economic government heavyweight."

Obama was fundraising and campaigning in Illinois, too, on Friday and taking his own shots at the Republicans — for negative campaigning.

Noting he was in "the land of Lincoln," Obama said the Republicans weren't exactly appealing to — in the Civil War president's words — "the better angels of our nature." He told his audience at a fundraiser in Chicago, "I'm thinking maybe some Lincoln will rub off on them while they're here."

In a wry reference to the heated Republican race, he said, "We've got some guests in Illinois this week. Apparently they have not wrapped up on the other side."

Romney, after Illinois, headed to campaign in Puerto Rico, where he's hoping to win Sunday's primary.

Santorum faces the same obstacles in Illinois that he has in previous contests — a lack of money and campaign organization. But his message that he's the true conservative in the race could resonate strongly in the rural areas of the state. He was spending Friday and Satur-

day campaigning in some of Illinois' small towns, including Effingham.

Illinois is the highest profile contest of the coming week, and it kicks off a two-week series of five contests before an April lull in the GOP nomination fight that could well stretch into summer. As Obama focuses on the general election, Romney is struggling to clinch the GOP nomination, even though he's well ahead in the fight for delegates to the August GOP national convention. He needs to win 1,144, and is on pace to secure that number by June.

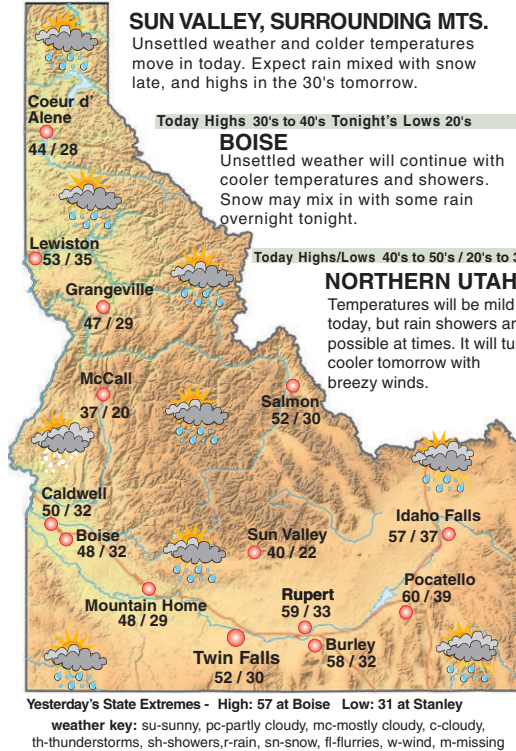

SWISS COUPLE HELD BY TALIBAN IN PAKISTAN IS FREE

ISLAMABAD • A Swiss couple held captive for eight months by the Taliban in Pakistan turned up at an army post close to the Afghan border on Thursday, claiming to have escaped from their captors, the Pakistani army said. They were swiftly flown to safety by the military.

Taliban commanders said a ransom was paid in exchange for the release of the man and woman.

David Och and Daniela Widmer, smiling and looking healthy, briefly waved for waiting cameras at a military airbase close to the Pakistani capital before getting into a van.

The couple, who were apparently on holiday in the country, were seized in July in the southwest province of Baluchistan.

They appeared in a militant video in October, saying their captors were threatening to kill them.

Maj. Gen. Athar Abbas said the couple showed up at an army post in Miran Shah in North Waziristan, an al-Qaida and Taliban stronghold. He said the couple was then flown to Peshawar, the main city in northwestern Pakistan, on an army helicopter.

"They say they escaped from the custody of militants," he said.

Two local Pakistani Taliban commanders said the couple had been freed, but only after an undisclosed ransom had been paid and some Taliban prisoners were released from Pakistani custody. They refused to give their names.

The Swiss government said in a statement Thursday its ambassador in Islamabad was in direct contact with the couple and confirmed "they are uninjured and that, given the circumstances, they are doing well."

It said the couple were taken by helicopter from the Miranshah region to Peshawar and later to Islamabad, and were being kept in a safe place and would return soon to Switzerland.

Swiss Foreign Minister Didier Burkhalter "was clearly relieved at the good news" and thanked Pakistani authorities for their help, according to the statement, which made no mention of any ransom payment.

Militants and criminal gangs often kidnap wealthy Pakistanis and less commonly foreigners.

Mexico Prepares for Pope, Millions of Visitors

LEON, Mexico • One hundred fifty-thousand communion wafers? Check.

Campsites for 350,000? Check.

Three hand-embroidered papal souvenir sombreros? Check.

Official song? Check.

It takes a lot to prepare for the coming of the pope and the 3 million people the host Archdiocese of Leon says he is expected to draw. Facades must be spiffed; campgrounds must be sprayed for dengue-bearing mosquitoes.

The visit of Pope Benedict XVI, his first to Spanish-speaking Latin America, begins in just a week in Mexico's central state of Guanajuato, where he will spend three days and give an outdoor Mass for some 300,000 people before heading to Cuba on March 26.

In the Bicentennial Park in nearby Silao, hammers and heavy equipment pound out the contours of a massive stage large enough for a Madonna concert. The religious order of the Capuchin Poor Clares in San Isidro is making 150,000 Frisbee-sized hosts for the Mass, though it won't require vats of wine. While the masses

eat bread, only the officiates will sip a mere 2.5 gallons (10 liters) of consecrated wine on stage.

Maria de la Luz Yepes of nearby San Francisco del Rincon is overseeing the stitching and stretching of faux suede and velvet on three artisanal sombreros that will be given to Benedict. Each took three weeks to decorate by hand. One has an embroidered face of Benedict inside the cap and features a map of Mexico on the brim. Another shows the Virgin of Guadalupe, Mexico's patron saint.

She said the whole community, a suburb home to tennis shoe factories and makers of the black, spangled sombreros sold in airports and tourist stalls, wants to chip in.

"Even to make the boxes to pack the sombreros," said Yepes, whose 55-year-old family business, Sombreros Salazar Yepes, made the signature Mexican hats for popes Paul VI and John Paul II as well. "They want the sombrero to carry a little bit of everyone here in San Francisco."

The Popemobile landed weeks ago, courtesy of an Alitalia flight, so it will be ready for the pontiff. The church's preparations include giving the 85-year-old pope a slow morning after arrival "to get over jet lag," said the Rev. Federico Lombardi, Vatican spokesman.

When he ventures out, he'll find cities that have put on a shine.

Air Force Disciplining 2 Mortuary Supervisors

DOVER, Del. (AP) • An independent federal investigative agency says supervisors at Dover Air Force Base in Delaware engaged in a campaign of retaliation against whistleblowers who disclosed poor management of the mortuary, including the mishandling of human remains.

The U.S. Office of Special Counsel released a report Friday, saying officials retaliated against four employees who sought to expose wrongdoing. The report found that in one case,

a senior Air Force attorney who reviewed a plan to fire one of the whistleblowers found that "it is almost certain that any reviewing authority would conclude any such discipline was reprisal/retaliation."

The report says Col. Robert Edmondson set the tone for retaliation and was the force behind the actions against the whistleblowers.

The Air Force is taking steps to further discipline Edmondson and another supervisor. The third has resigned.

Rowan Williams to Step Down as Anglican Leader

LONDON • Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams is stepping down at the end of the year, calling an end to a tumultuous decade as leader of a global Anglican Communion that has been sharply divided over sexuality and gender.

Williams, 61, renowned for his formidable learning, announced Friday he will take up a new post as master of Magdalene College, Cambridge.

"I would hope that my successor has the constitution of an ox and the skin of a rhinoceros," he said.

He was appointed in 2002 as archbishop of Canterbury, the senior official in the Church of England and the spiritual leader of the Anglican Communion, which says it represents 85 million people worldwide.

A self-described "hairly leftie," Williams is instantly recognizable due to his thick beard and vigorous eyebrows. His statements, often dense and complex, invariably were gently spoken.

He is the author of more than two dozen books, ranging across theology, poetry, history, economics and the writing of Fyodor Dostoevsky. He eagerly shared debating platforms with his opponents, including atheist biologist Richard Dawkins.

Much of Williams' time as archbishop was devoted to trying to hold the diverse churches within the Anglican Communion together despite an often bitter dispute over homosexuality, which put conservative and grow-

ing African churches at odds with liberal churches in the United States and Canada.

Within England, Williams disappointed liberal supporters by not backing the appointment of a gay priest, Jeffrey John, to a bishopric. Yet conservatives in the church remained suspicious of Williams because, as archbishop of Wales, he had knowingly ordained gay men as priests.

"The worst aspects of the job, I think, have been the sense that there are some conflicts that won't go away, however long you struggle with them, and that not everybody in the Anglican Communion or even in the Church of England is eager to avoid schism or separation," Williams said in an interview with the British news agency, Press Association.

One year ago: The U.N. Security Council paved the way for international air strikes against Moammar Gadhafi's forces, voting to authorize military action to protect civilians and impose a no-fly zone over Libya. U.S. drone missiles hit a village in Pakistan; U.S. officials said the group targeted was heavily armed and that some of its members were connected to al-Qaida, but Pakistani officials said the missiles hit a community meeting, killing four Taliban fighters and 38 civilians and tribal police. Michael Gough, the British actor best known for playing Bruce Wayne's butler Alfred in a series of Batman movies, died in England at age 94. Country music entertainer Ferlin Husky, 85, died in Nashville, Tenn.

Today's deal has several points of interest. First, look at the auction: Does North's pass of four hearts describe his hand? I'd say yes. The pass IS forcing, and I prefer to play double by North as suggesting some defense, with a pass implicitly weak.

South now has to guess whether to bid six spades at his second turn — not unreasonable since any working queen in the North hand gives slam good play — or to go low with a call of four spades. Even the pessimistic action is quite high enough today.

On the lead of the heart king, South ruffs and plays the spade ace, discovering the bad break. Now he must be careful since if he drives out the trump queen, the defenders can force him and he never scores a third club trick. If he plays ace, king and a third club, the defenders lead a fourth club and score a second trump winner. Playing three rounds of diamonds before clubs simply lets East win and lead hearts again, and declarer will be defeated.

The winning line at trick three is simple and elegant — but not easy to find at the table. Declarer must lead the club jack from hand, giving the defenders the awkward choice of winning and providing South with an entry to dummy for the trump finesse, or of ducking.

If West does play low, declarer can simply drive out the spade queen and has five trump tricks and five side-suit winners.

ANSWER: If your partnership is not permitted to jump in spades after the double to show a pre-emptive raise, you can be sure that you will not be applying the appropriate degree of pressure to the opponents when you have a fit and a weak hand. Here it must be best to use a jump to two no-trump for a limit raise in spades and a jump in spades with a hand like this.
