Senate Passes Ultrasound Bill

With its major legislative hurdle clear, a proposal to require abortion-seeking women to undergo a pre-procedure ultrasound looks poised to become Idaho law.

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BOISE • Which should the government value more — a woman's right to privacy and medical consent, or the right to life for the unborn?

After nearly two hours of debate, the Idaho Senate voted 23-12 Monday to pass a bill to require women to receive an ultrasound before un-

dergoing an abortion. But during discussion, many senators made it clear that the issue was difficult to navigate.

The bill's opponents focused on the issue of government intrusion into a decision normally made between a doctor and a patient, while supporters emphasized the need to give a voice to the unborn by persuading pregnant women to avoid abortions.

A few anti-abortion Republicans opposed the bill, saying in a year when the state is fighting federal health care mandates, the legislation is hypocritical.

"My problem with this bill is it ... forces procedures on you whether you wish them or not," said Sen. Jim Hammond, R-Coeur d'Alene. "And that's the kind of stuff that raises health care costs."

Hammond said while he doesn't agree with abortion, he thought this was government overreach.

"We often talk about less government, about the government being too intrusive," Hammond

said. "I have a concern that here we're intruding in an area that belongs between the physician, the patient and maybe that patient's clergy?"

"I hope this bill isn't just another litmus test to prove you're truly a conservative," he told his fellow legislators.

Sen. Shawn Keough, R-Sandpoint, also said Idaho was opening itself up to the risk of lawsuits from people claiming the bill is unconstitutional. Keough emphasized that she is anti-abortion, but said people who aren't doctors shouldn't make decisions on what is and isn't

a mandatory medical procedure.

"I truly believe that none of the rest of us is qualified in that regard," Keough said. "We have our opinions, and we have our feelings, but we're not doctors."

Other senators acknowledged that the issue wasn't black and white, but said their concerns for the unborn outweighed worries about women's choices. Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, said three of his grandchildren are adopted, and he felt indebted to the biological mothers who decided to give birth instead of abort the children.

TWIN FALLS • Montana Steak House looks more like a showroom for game-show prizes than a restaurant lately. The Twin Falls eatery is hosting a fundraiser Saturday

in support of Pvt. Terence "Bo" Jones, a Twin Falls soldier who lost both legs Feb. 7 after stepping on an antipersonnel mine while on foot patrol in southern Afghanistan.

Jones is currently recovering at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, with his family by his side.

While the family is in Texas, bills continue to pile up back home, said family friend Roy "Shaggy" Long. "Shaggy said, 'Let's pass the hat and

see what we can do,'" said Jeff Burget, a friend of Long's.

Burget is engaged to Jacque Gress, whose family owns the Montana Steak House. When the Gress family heard about the need for a space for an event, they were on board. From there, what began as a passing of a hat grew.

"In Twin Falls we're a bunch of individuals," Long said. "But it's not hard to make them rally."

As word spread of a raffle in support of Jones and his family, donated items started pouring in.

Wes Wall, owner of Adventure Motorsports, furnished a 2012 Honda

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Funding Concerns Affect School Calendar Decisions

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TWIN FALLS • Planning a school calendar for next year isn't as simple as picking start and end dates.

School district budgets affect a range of details, including the number of school days and how many unpaid furlough days employees have to take.

A number of Magic Valley school districts are waiting until the state's legislative session ends before moving forward with next year's budgeting process and coming up with a school year calendar.

"At this point, it's kind of a waiting game," Twin Falls School District spokeswoman Beth Pendergrass said.

Speak Up

The Twin Falls School District is asking for parent and community input on next year's school calendar. A survey can be found at <http://svy.mk/tfsdcal>.

After a few years of budget cuts, some districts hope to add days back to their school calendar in the fall.

Kimberly School District Superintendent Kathleen Noh said she'd like to see two more days included in next year's calendar. But a decision hasn't been made yet.

"We postponed a final decision until

EXPERT SAYS IDAHO PRISON CARE 'CRUEL'

BOISE • Medical care is so poor at an Idaho state prison that it amounts to neglect and cruel and unusual punishment, according to a report that was unsealed Monday.

Correctional health care expert Dr. Marc Stern said there have been some improvements at the Idaho State Correctional Institution south of Boise. But terminal and long-term inmates sometimes went unfed, nursing mistakes or failure likely resulted in some deaths, and one inmate wasn't told for seven months that he likely had cancer, he said.

The Idaho Department of Correction

and the prison health care provider, Brentwood, Tenn.-based Corizon, said they're disappointed and are preparing a response that will show the care delivered to inmates meets constitutional and health care standards.

Stern was appointed to study the care prison near Boise as part of a long-running lawsuit brought by inmates. A federal judge is expected to consider the report as he decides whether to allow the lawsuit to continue or bring it to a close.

Some of the medical problems described in the report are disturbing, including Stern's findings that inmates who were terminal or required long-term care and who were unable to

Senate Passes Bill on End-of-life Control

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BOISE • Over objections that doctors already honor their patient's wishes, the Senate voted Monday to pass a bill to prevent physicians from denying patients' requests for food, fluids and life-preserving medicine.

Cottonwood, sponsored the bill, saying the current law allows too many loopholes that may cause confusion for physicians or patients. Currently, a physician can deny treatment if they've made a goodwill effort to find another doctor willing to administer the treatment, Nuxoll said. This bill would close that loophole, while still preserving the

right of a patient to decline such treatment if they wish. Sen. Dan Schmidt, D-Moscow, said he didn't see the need for the bill. Schmidt, a physician, said doctors already provide care through a person's death according to their end-of-life directives. The bigger problem, he said, was a lack of communication between physicians and patients.

"I think that the Legislature — I'm sorry — but I don't think you're going to make that better," Schmidt said. But Nuxoll referenced court cases where patients' families and physicians butted heads over treatment. Sen. Michelle Stennett, D-Ketchum, was one of 10 who voted against the bill. Stennett said she had no problem with the concept, but said the legislation was a waste of time, as doctors already honor living wills. "Passing it or not did no damage, I don't think," Stennett said.

"And I don't know what went on in the rooms when those children were born, but I'm so grateful because they blessed our lives," Heider said. He referenced Idaho abortion statistics, and said his grandchildren could have been among those numbers had their birth mothers decided not to carry them to term.

"I'm certainly grateful that those numbers are not higher than they are," Heider said, adding he supported the legislation on the chance it might convince other women to have their babies.

Sen. Sheryl Nuxoll, R-Cottonwood, said women deserve more information before making the decision to abort.

"Shouldn't we require information to be provided to women so that they do not fall into the despair and guilt that most often happens after an abortion?" Nuxoll said.

All seven Senate Democrats opposed the bill, with Republicans Keough, Hammond, Tim Corder of Mountain Home, John Goedde of Coeur d'Alene and Joyce Broadsword of Sagle joining them.

The proposal now moves to Idaho's conservative House, where its passage may be met with less resistance than in the Senate.

Group Plans Ultrasound Demonstration at Capitol

BOISE (AP) • Anti-abortion activists hope to gain attention with a live ultrasound exhibition in the Idaho Capitol, part of their efforts to convince lawmakers to require a sonogram on women before an abortion.

Republican Sen. Sheryl Nuxoll of Cottonwood announced the exhibition in the Capitol's West Wing 53 at noon on Wednesday.

Nuxoll says lawmakers, their families, Capitol staff and media will be allowed inside.

The bill to force Idaho women to undergo an ultrasound before getting an abortion passed the Senate Monday, 23-12.

It's been among the 2012 Legislatures most-contested issues.

Wednesday's planned exhibition, with women in all stages of pregnancy, will likely be hotly debated, as well.

Previously, activists from Boise's Stanton Healthcare, an anti-abortion center that's also behind the Idaho exhibition, held a similar 2011 exhibition in Washington, D.C.

St. Patrick's Day Normal for Area Law Enforcement

TWIN FALLS • St. Patrick's Day revelers didn't get too out of hand for area law enforcement last weekend.

Twin Falls police arrested four people between March 16-18 for driving under the influence and three minors in possession of alcohol.

"We stayed busy responding to bar incidents, loud party complaints, MIPs, and DUIs," TFPD Lt. Craig Stotts said.

TFPD had extra officers out looking for drunken drivers, Stotts added.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's deputies arrested two people for driving under the influence, said spokeswoman Lori Stewart. The department ran DUI traffic emphasis patrols from March 10-18, she said.

In total, 11 people were booked into the Twin Falls County Jail between March 16-18 for alcohol-related charges, according to online records.

the legislative session ends," she said.

This year, Kimberly cut seven days from its school calendar — meaning fewer work days for employees. There are 183 school calendar days.

"We want to get back educational time," she said.

In Jerome, Superintendent Dale Layne said some furlough days and job positions could be restored next year.

This year, employees have taken more than eight furlough days and a 1 percent pay cut. Also, 26 job positions were cut, with negative results for the district, Layne said.

Now that voters approved a one-year, \$650,000 supplemental levy earlier this month, district administrators are moving forward with the budgeting process.

For the Twin Falls School District, discussions about next year's calendar began in January.

Pendergrass said the number of days in the calendar will depend on negotiations with the Twin Falls Education Association.

Pendergrass said district administrators want to hear from employees, parents and community members about what schedule they'd like to see next year. They've created an online survey on the matter, receiving nearly 370 responses so far.

In Buhl, Superintendent Byron Stutzman said he hopes to increase the district's number of school days for students next year. Wendell Superintendent Greg Lowe said he'd like to see fewer employee furlough days.

For the Blaine County School District, next year's calendar has already been approved. The school board decided on a calendar last week that will be in place for the next three years.

Spokeswoman Heather Crocker said there aren't any major changes in store.

One difference is that teacher in-service days — which are days off for students — will be scheduled for whole days instead of half days. Crocker said that decision was made based on employee, parent and community input.

The district's calendar will include 190 teacher contract days and there won't be any furlough days.

Rancher ATV at a deep discount for the raffle. Farmers National Bank then donated the \$5,500 ATV to the cause.

"It's an old Idaho scene," he said. "There's a sheep herder and a creek. It's a taste of Idaho."

For Bo's father, Tim Jones, the fundraising event is overwhelming.

Jones said Bo is down to one surgery a week but has a long road of recovery ahead. In about three weeks the 21-year-old will be moved to the VA Polytrauma Center in San Antonio. There, he'll receive long-term, one-on-one care working with his limbs.

Through all the surgeries and intense pain his son remains cheerful, Jones said.

"For him to be this far ahead is just an unbelievable, strong will to survive," he said.

move on their own were sometimes left in soiled linens, given inadequate pain medication and went periods without food and water. Stern said those conditions were "inhumane."

Emergency care was also found deficient in the report, with medical staffers routinely failing to bring parts of a basic resuscitation device — a ventilator mask for rescue breathing — to inmates experiencing medical emergencies. Prison guards reported to Stern that they sometimes had to call the health staffers multiple times to get them to respond to inmate emergencies, and sometimes the nurses only responded by phone, telling the guards to have the inmates request care the following day.

In another case described by Stern, a nurse who found an inmate unconscious and having serious breathing problems didn't take any other vital signs and failed to give the man oxygen.

"Such evaluation was

critically important at this point because it was highly likely the patient was not getting enough blood to his brain and required resuscitation," Stern wrote.

Instead, he contends, the nurse moved the patient to the health unit and only assessed him a few minutes later, when he was having a heart attack. The patient died.

"It is impossible to know if immediate application of life saving measures in the living unit would have saved this patient," Stern wrote. "However, failure to provide these measures greatly reduced any chance for survival."

The report focuses only on the Idaho State Correctional Institution, though Corizon provides medical care for all inmates in Idaho's state-run prisons.

Inmates at the Idaho State Correctional Institution, called ISCI, sued more than 30 years ago, alleging that they were subject to violence and rape by fellow inmates, denied adequate medical care, subjected to poor diets and forced to deal with extreme overcrowding.

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Survey Prompts More Questions for T.F. Council

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TWIN FALLS • Results from a community survey may have created more questions than answers for Twin Falls City Council members.

During Monday's meeting, City Manager Travis Rothweiler presented a summary of the almost 400 responses to the survey of residents' feelings about the city they call home. He compared the data from when the same survey was done in 2009 to give council members an idea of what improved or changed over the years.

The results didn't always signal what services the city needs to improve, but possibly in what areas the city needs to improve its com-

munication with the public, Rothweiler said.

For example, this year's survey saw a drop in approval of the city's senior services. However, Councilman Don Hall said this could be contributed to the recent negative attention focused on it.

"During the time the survey went out, it was receiving some bad press. That contributes a lot to how people perceive it," he said, referring to coverage of recent budget issues at the Twin Falls Senior Citizens Center.

According to the survey, citizens said they saw an increase in available public parking, despite the fact that the city hasn't added any additional free parking.

"It provides a lot of ques-

tions and opportunities to figure out why that is," Rothweiler said. "It's an insight to the perception."

The council voted to appoint three new members to the Traffic Safety Commission and the Development Impact Fee Advisory Committee.

The council voted unanimously except on the fee advisory appointment. Councilwoman Rebecca Mills Sojka voted "no" on appointing Suzanne Hawkins to the committee.

During the discussion period, Sojka pointed out that Hawkins, a recent candidate for City Council, received the majority of her campaign funding from a development group for that race.

Yet More Changes to Right to Hunt Amendment

BOISE • The "Right to Hunt" amendment may be running out of time, but don't count it out yet.

The resolution, sponsored by Sen. Lee Heider, R-Twin Falls, would allow voters to consider adding the right to hunt, fish and trap to the Idaho Constitution. But a slew of tweaks from multiple groups have slowed the proposal's progress through the Legislature. Though this year's legislative session is winding down, Heider is holding out hope that the

amendment will make it on November's ballot.

The legislation's language has undergone a handful of changes to appease groups like the Idaho Water Users Association and the Department of Fish and Game, as well as Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden. The latest group to get involved was the National Rifle Association.

The language added by the NRA, on controlling wildlife through hunting, sparked objection from Fish and Game. So Heider spent Monday on the phone with the different groups, craft-

ing new changes and making sure everyone was OK with them.

The House Resources and Conservation Committee passed the bill with the proposed amendments, and Heider hopes it will get through the House in time for the Senate to consider it before the session's end, which is expected in the next week.

But, Heider said, the back-and-forth is necessary. After all, it's not every day you get to add to the constitution.

"Although it's a lot of work, it'll be worth it in the end," Heider said.

Balloon Pilot Killed in Ga., Passengers are Safe: As a fierce thunderstorm that seemed to come out of nowhere closed in, hot-air balloon pilot Edward Ristaino spotted an open field 4,000 feet below and calmly and tersely warned the five skydivers aboard the craft, "You need to get out now." He may have saved their lives, but he lost his own. With lightning spidering across the sky and the wind rocking their parachutes, the skydivers floated safely to the ground, while the balloon was sucked up into the clouds, then sent crashing to earth. Ristaino's body wasn't found until Monday, nearly three days later. "If we would have left a minute later, we would have been sucked into the storm," said skydiver Dan Eaton. The group had taken off Friday evening. —Associated Press

PANEL SAYS PROBLEM SCHOOLS HURT NATION'S SECURITY

WASHINGTON • The nation's security and economic prosperity are at risk if America's schools don't improve, warns a task force led by former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and Joel Klein, the former chancellor of New York City's school system.

The report, obtained by The Associated Press, cautions that far too many schools fail to adequately prepare students. "The dominant power of the 21st century will depend on human capital," it said. "The failure to produce that capital will undermine American security."

The task force said the State Department and U.S. intelligence agencies face critical shortfalls in the number of foreign language speakers, and that fields such as science, defense and aerospace are at particular risk because a shortage of skilled workers is expected to worsen as baby boomers retire.

According to the panel, 75 percent of young adults don't qualify to serve in the military because they are physically unfit, have criminal records or inadequate levels of education. That's in part because 1 in 4 students fails to graduate from high school in four years, and a high school diploma or the equivalent is needed to join the military. But another 30 percent of high school graduates don't do well enough in math, science and English on an aptitude test to serve in the military, the report said.

The task force, consisting of 30 members with backgrounds in areas such as education and foreign affairs, was organized by the Council on Foreign Relations, a New York-based research and policy organization focused on international issues. The report was scheduled to be released Tuesday.

Too many Americans are deficient in both global awareness and knowledge that is "essential for understanding America's allies and its adversaries," the report concludes.

LAWYER DESCRIBES TALK WITH AFGHAN KILLINGS SUSPECT

FORT LEAVENWORTH, Kan. • The lawyer for the Army sergeant accused of slaughtering 16 Afghan civilians met with his client behind bars for the first time Monday to begin building a defense and said the soldier gave a powerfully moving account of what it is like to be on the ground in Afghanistan.

Lawyer John Henry Browne said he and Robert Bales, who is being held in an isolated cell at the military prison, met for more than three hours in the morning at Fort Leavenworth. Browne, co-counsel Emma Scanlan and Bales were expected to talk again in the afternoon.

"What's going on on the ground in Afghanistan, you read about it. I read

about it. But it's totally different when you hear about it from somebody who's been there," Browne told The Associated Press by telephone during a lunch break. "It's just really emotional."

Bales, 38, has not been charged yet in the March 11 shootings, which sparked protests in Afghanistan, endangered relations between the two countries and threatened to upend American policy over the decade-old war. Formal charges could be filed within a week.

Browne, a Seattle attorney who defended serial killer Ted Bundy and a thief known as the "Barefoot Bandit," has said he has handled three or four military cases. The defense team includes a military defense lawyer, Maj. Thomas Hurley.

At their meeting, Browne said Bales clarified a story, provided initially by the soldier's family, about the timing of a roadside bomb that blew off the leg of one of Bales' friends. It was two days before the shooting, not one, and Bales didn't see the explosion, just the aftermath, Browne said.

The details of the blast could not be

immediately confirmed.

Bales arrived at Fort Leavenworth last Friday and is being held in the same prison as other prominent defendants. Pfc. Bradley Manning, who is charged with leaking classified documents to the WikiLeaks website, has been held there on occasion as he awaited trial.

Bales is "already being integrated into the normal pretrial confinement routine," post spokeswoman Rebecca Steed said.

That includes recreation, meals and cleaning the area where he is living. Steed said once his meetings with his attorneys are complete later in the week, Bales will resume the normal integration process.

Bales' wife, Karilyn, offered her condolences to the victims' families Monday and said she wants to know what happened. She said her family and her in-laws are profoundly sad. She said what they've read and seen in news reports is "completely out of character of the man I know and admire."

'Looking to Kill:' 4 Slain at French Jewish School

TOULOUSE, France • A motorbike assailant opened fire with two handguns Monday in front of a Jewish school in the French city of Toulouse, killing a rabbi, his two young sons and a girl. One witness described him as a man chasing small children and "looking to kill."

One of the guns he used also had been fired in two other deadly motorbike attacks in the area that targeted paratroopers of North African and French Caribbean origin, officials said. French President Nicolas Sarkozy suggested one person was responsible for all the killings.

A massive manhunt was under way and the terrorism alert level was raised to its highest level ever across a swath of southern France surrounding Toulouse. Hundreds of officers increased security at schools, synagogues

and mosques around the country, and Sarkozy said 14 riot police units "will secure the region as long as this criminal" hasn't been caught.

Monday's attack revolted France and drew strong condemnation from Israel and the United States. Sarkozy called it the worst school shooting in French history.

France has seen a low drumroll of anti-Semitic incidents but no attack so deadly targeting Jews since the early 1980s. This country is particularly sensitive toward its Jewish community because of its World War II past of abetting Nazi occupiers in deporting Jewish citizens.

French prosecutors were studying possible terrorist links but the motive for all three attacks was unclear. Still, issues about religious minorities and race have emerged prominently in France's presidential campaign, in which the conservative Sarkozy has taken his traditional hard line against immigration.

News that the gun was used in attacks last week around Toulouse fueled suspicions that a serial killer was targeting not only Jews but French minorities.

In all three cases, the attacker came on a motorcycle, apparently alone, and then sped away.

Monday's attack was as quick as it was terrifying. A 30-year-old rabbi, Jonathan Sandler, and two of his sons were killed just before classes started at the Ozar Hatorah school, a junior high and high school in a quiet neighborhood, Toulouse Prosecutor Michel Valet said. The Israeli Foreign Ministry said the sons were 4- and 5-years-old.

Another child, the 7-year-old daughter of the school principal, was also killed, school officials said. Valet said a 17-year-old boy was also seriously wounded.

"He shot at everything he had in front of him, children and adults," Valet said. "The children were chased inside the school."

Romney Seeks Primary-fight Breaking Point

CHICAGO • His confidence surging, Mitt Romney pointedly ignored his Republican rivals on the eve of today's high-stakes primary election in Illinois and turned his fire instead on the Democrat he hopes to oust in the fall.

Romney pushed into President Barack Obama's home territory, assailing Obama's economic credentials on the Chicago campus where the president taught for more than a decade.

"Freedom is on the ballot this year," Romney told students and supporters, contending that the nation's recovery from recession was being limited by an "assault on our economic freedom" by Obama. "I am offering a real choice and a very different beginning," he said.

While Republican rival Rick Santorum courted anti-Romney conservatives across Illinois, the front-runner was trying to show he was more than ready to rise above the grinding GOP primary battle and move toward a general election matchup against Obama. Romney has secured more delegates than his opponents combined, and his nomination seems more assured each week as Santorum's shoestring campaign struggles under the weight of continued disorganization.

Obama, Romney Sweep Health Care Laws Under a Rug

WASHINGTON • Now here's a tag team for the ages: Richard Nixon, Mitt Romney, Barack Obama.

The arc of history joins all three in the cause of universal health care, a goal promoted by Nixon four decades ago and advanced in laws enacted by Romney and Obama in turn. So where are the high fives between the president and the former Massachusetts governor?

The most significant health care law since Medicare gets barely a shout-out from Obama. And when Romney must talk about the law he won in Massachusetts, it's because someone's got

him on the defensive in the Republican presidential primary campaign.

"Big health care reform turns out not to be very popular — and actually unhealthy for the candidates who did it," says Robert Blendon, a Harvard professor who tracks public opinion on the subject.

The Supreme Court will decide if the new federal health care overhaul or any part of it is unconstitutional after arguments next week. If the law that Republican opponents call "Obamacare" survives, "Romneycare" will stand in the history books as a guidepost for it, hardly the first time a state has served as a laboratory for national social policy.

The federal and Massachusetts laws share much, including a requirement

that individuals carry health insurance, a provision that taxpayers provide help for those who can't afford it and protections against denial of coverage. And ObamaRomneycare shares more with Nixon's never-implemented approach — an insurance system anchored in the private market with a hefty government safety net — than with the Clinton administration initiative that collapsed in the 1990s under the weight of its own complexity and reach.

Obama and Romney are not overly modest men, but you might think so when it comes to this subject.

Health care got two sentences in Obama's State of the Union speech, one more than he devoted to an unfair-trade case against Chinese tires. Romney sticks to the Republican line that Obama's law must be repealed, and gives so-so reviews of his own law. "Some things worked, some things didn't, and some things I'd change," he says when pressed.

Ethics Panel Convenes, Asks for 'Specific' Charges

BOISE • The Senate Ethics Committee investigating whether a Republican lawmaker violated the chamber's disclosure rules told Democrats on Monday to provide more specifics on how measures he voted on stood to benefit him financially.

Democrats allege Sen. Monty Pearce, of New Plymouth, failed to adequately disclose details of oil and gas leases on his land in Payette County when he voted in committee and in the Senate on rules and bills governing the industry.

An ethics panel member, Sen. Jim Hammond, R-Coeur d'Alene, suggested the minority party expand its "general" allegations of a conflict of interest to include specifics about how they believe Pearce could personally profit.

A deputy attorney general has advised the panel that such allegations needed to meet two key criteria: That a lawmaker would directly gain private pecuniary benefit, and that he or she belonged to a group that would derive more from a bill than would similarly-situated members of the general public.

"If we were to do a fair and complete job on this, that's a very important step," Hammond said. "We need to know how, in what specific instances, this senator acquired any pecuniary gain."

The panel plans to meet again Tuesday.

Senate Minority Leader Edgar Malepeai, D-Pocatello, pledged to outline some areas where his party contends bills in front of the Senate would help Pearce to profit from leases he signed last November with Snake River Oil & Gas, an Arkansas-based company that's prospecting for energy in western Idaho.

But Malepeai suggested much of that discovery work lies with the Senate Ethics Committee itself.

"We're going to give some specifics," he said following the ethics hearing. "However, some of that specificity can't be uncovered unless the ethics committee does what it's supposed to do."

Last Wednesday, Pearce told colleagues during testimony on a bill to curb local government control of drilling projects that he had oil and gas leases on his land in Payette County since the 1980s. The bill passed on a 24-10 vote.

A day later, Democrats lodged their formal complaint, saying Pearce's belated, Senate-floor disclosure was insufficient and that he should have provided details about his leases during more than a dozen previous hearings and floor sessions on numerous oil and natural gas industry-related measures now in front of the 2012 Legislature.

According to Senate rules, a senator who has a conflict of interest must disclose it to the presiding officer or the chamber before the legislator can vote.

Pearce has hired Chuck Peterson, a well-known defense attorney who helped win acquittal for Randy Weaver in his 1993 trial in which he was accused of murdering a federal agent during the Ruby Ridge standoff. Last week, Pearce maintained he'd done nothing wrong and on Monday, he said his lawyer had advised him against speaking about the investigation publicly.

Chief Deputy Attorney General Brian Kane spent the morning session outlining the duties of the ethics committee — and the questions they had to resolve as they consider options ranging from dismissal of the charges to a dismissal recommendation.

"Just because you own property and at some future point could be affected by the decision doesn't necessarily create a conflict," Kane said. "The real key here is...No. 1, identify whether it is directly linked, and then, to identify what the benefit is. You have to show that connectivity."

Kane added that questions about conflicts of interest often come up from members of government. He said he always suggests to officials that they come down on the side of full disclosure in instances where there could be even the hint of perception that they have a personal stake in a decision.

"You have two courts," Kane said. "I may be able to get you a win in a legal court. I may not be able to get you a win in that court of public opinion."

Deal Signed, Bison Going to Fort Peck

BILLINGS, Mont. • Sixty-five bison from Yellowstone National Park were due to arrive at northeast Montana's Fort Peck Reservation on Monday under a long-stalled initiative to repopulate parts of the West with the iconic, genetically pure animals, a tribal official said.

Tribal and state officials signed an agreement late Friday allowing the transfer to take place, said Robert Magnan with the Fort Peck

Fish and Game Department. The date of the shipment was kept quiet until it was underway to avoid a court injunction, he said. A group of northeast Montana landowners and property groups filed a lawsuit in state district court in January seeking to stop the transfer.

Several prior attempts to relocate the animals failed because of opposition from cattle producers and difficulty finding public or tribal land suitable for the bison.

State wildlife officials

have said the relocation of the Yellowstone bison may help answer the question of whether the species can be reintroduced to some public lands in Montana where they once roamed freely. Overhunting wiped out vast herds of bison that once roamed across most of North America.

The animals have been confined to quarantine just north of the park for several years. They were captured leaving the park during their winter migration and tested extensively to make sure they were free of brucellosis. That disease, which can cause pregnant animals to abort their young, was for many years the primary argument for preventing Yellowstone bison from roaming freely outside the park.

Utah Crash Victim Planning Wedding Proposal Dies

LOGAN, Utah (AP) • A Utah man injured in a car crash while returning home with an engagement ring for his girlfriend died Sunday night.

The family of Adam Goodsell, 32, announced his death in a post on a Facebook page that had been used to update his condition. Goodsell died nine days after he suffered severe head injuries after his vehicle rolled near Wellsville, Utah, about 75 miles north of Salt Lake City.

"Adam has returned to his heavenly father and mother. Rest In Peace Adam! You will always be in our hearts. We love you and

are grateful to have had you in our lives," the post reads.

Family members have not responded to phone messages by The Associated Press.

The accident happened while Goodsell was returning to his home in Preston, Idaho, after purchasing an engagement ring for his girlfriend. Emergency crews found the ring in a puddle after the vehicle was towed.

Goodsell's father gave the ring to the woman, Goldie Chaney, while Goodsell was hospitalized.

In a 911 call prior to the accident, Goodsell told a dispatcher that the brakes on his Land Rover had failed

and the ignition pedal was stuck.

"Yes, I am, uh, coming out of Sardine Canyon; my brakes went out; my gas pedal is stuck..." Goodsell told the dispatcher.

The dispatcher asked for more information, but the call was cut off.

Emergency crews arrived to find the vehicle rolled into a ditch 50 yards from the edge of the road.

Utah Highway Patrol officials say the Land Rover was traveling at about 80 mph when it drove to the right side of the road, then veered to the left and hit a concrete barrier, then traveled right again and rolled off the highway.

House Approves Bill to Cap Annual State Spending

BOISE (AP) • The House has approved a bill that aimed at capping annual general fund spending at a little more than 5 percent of total personal income in the state.

The bill approved 48-21 Monday would set the cap at a rate of 5.3 percent of the total personal income generated by Idahoans, estimated at \$54.1 billion for fiscal year 2013. The state's current cap is 6.3 percent of total personal income.

The measure also requires that any revenue above projected spending cap be diverted to state rainy day accounts, with any left-overs used for tax relief.

House Republican Majority Leader Mike Moyle says the lower cap signals the GOP commitment to small government.

House Minority Leader John Rusche says the lower rate could hamper the state's ability to provide necessary services.

SENATE PANEL TO CONSIDER BILL TO EXPAND ATV HUNTS

BOISE (AP) • A Senate committee will take up a bill that would expanding hunting privileges on Idaho trails for all-terrain vehicle-riding sportsmen.

The legislation before the Senate Resource Committee Monday would curtail the power of Idaho Department of Fish and Game power to relegate ATV-mounted hunters to established roads in designated areas.

The agency's rules require hunters in a third of Idaho's hunting units to steer clear of off-road vehicle trails.

The House-approved bill lifts those restrictions, something ATV users say will help clarify where they can ride.

ATV-mounted hunters and their legislative allies also contend that the Fish and Game is illegally using hunting rules to close otherwise open federal land to them.

Fish and Game opposes the measure, which they say could hurt their ability to manage game.

SHERIFF: E. IDAHO GIRL BURIED UNDER FIREWOOD DIES

ST. ANTHONY (AP) • Authorities say an 8-year-old eastern Idaho girl found buried underneath a collapsed woodpile has died from her injuries.

The Fremont County Sheriff's Office reports that the girl was reported missing around 4 p.m. Sunday.

Deputies who responded say they located the child underneath a firewood stack that had collapsed.

The girl was transported to a Rexburg hospital, where she died as a result of her injuries.

The sheriff's office did not release her name.

Report: Idaho Misses Mark on Open Government

BOISE, (AP) • A new report by a watchdog group ranks Idaho among the lowest states when it comes to operating a government that is transparent, accountable and has viable protections against corruption in place.

The 50-state report was issued Monday by the Cen-

ter for Public Integrity.

Using a report card grading scale, the authors gave Idaho a D-minus and ranked the state 40th overall. No state received an A and just five states earned B grades.

The study considered strength of laws and policies designed to encourage open government and deter cor-

ruption. It also considered access to information, campaign finance laws, lobbying disclosure and ethics enforcement.

As part of its overall score, Idaho received failing grades in categories for executive accountability, legislative accountability and ethics enforcement agencies.

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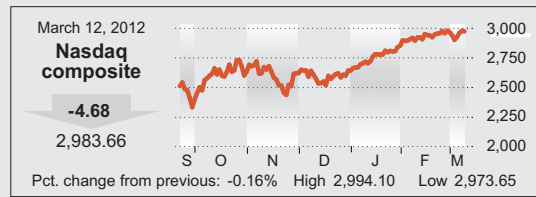
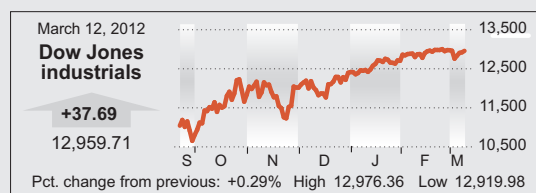

Benchmark oil for April delivery was up 34 cents to \$107.40 at midday Singapore time in electronic trading on the New York Mercantile Exchange. The contract rose \$1.95 to settle at \$107.06 per barrel in New York on Friday.

On Friday, the University of Michigan said its consumer sentiment index for last month was below analysts' expectations, driven by worries about gasoline prices, which soared 6 percent in February.

Apple to Pay Dividend, Start Stock Buybacks

NEW YORK • Apple is finally acknowledging that it has more money than it needs. But don't expect it to cut prices on iPhones and iPads. Instead, the company said on Monday that it will reward its shareholders with a dividend and a share buyback program.

Apple, the world's most valuable company, sits on \$97.6 billion in cash and securities. The decision to return some of that money to investors is a clear signal that Apple is taking a different approach in the post-Jobs era.

Former CEO Steve Jobs resisted calls to issue dividends for years. He argued that the money was better used to give Apple maneuvering room to, for instance, make strategic acquisitions. Apple did pay a quarterly dividend between 1987 and 1995, but Jobs was not involved with the company at the time.

Jobs died in October after a long fight with cancer.

On Monday, new CEO Tim Cook said that, with as much cash as Apple has on hand, a dividend won't restrain the company's options.

“These decisions will not close any doors for us,” he told analysts and reporters on a conference call.

Had it kept amassing cash and low-yielding securities, Apple eventually could have opened itself to a legal challenge from shareholders, who could have argued that it was misusing their money.

Apple said that it will pay a quarterly dividend of \$2.65 per share, starting in its fiscal fourth quarter, which begins July 1.

The dividend works out to \$10.60 annually, or 1.8 percent of the current stock price. Analyst Tavis McCourt at Morgan Keegan said the dividend is relatively generous for a large technology company. However, Microsoft Corp., pays 2.5 percent of its stock price in dividends, and Hewlett-Packard Co. pays 2 percent.

Energy and phone companies often pay dividends worth more than 5 percent of their stock price.

In absolute terms, Apple will pay one of the richest dividends in the U.S. It will spend more than \$10 billion on dividends in its first year, placing it just below companies including AT&T Inc.

and Verizon Communications Inc., which use dividends as their main way to attract investors.

Exxon Mobil Corp., the world's second largest company by market capitalization, pays about \$9 billion in dividends annually.

Apple generated \$31 billion in cash in the fiscal year that ended in September, and is on pace to generate even more in the current year. That means its cash pile will continue to grow even with a dividend and a buyback program, albeit at a lower rate.

Even if it had no net cash, Apple would hardly be financially con-

strained, since it could borrow all the money it needs.

The dividend opens up ownership of Apple shares to a wider range of stock mutual funds, potentially boosting the stock price in the long term. Many “value-oriented” funds are not allowed to buy stocks that don't pay dividends.

Apple said the \$10 billion share buyback program will begin next fiscal year, which starts Sept. 30, and run for three years.

Investors had been expecting the announcement, driving Apple's stock up 37 percent since management hinted in January that a dividend was in the works.

Jerome Freightliner Considers Future Growth

A new building at Crossroads Point may be only the first step for the Warner Truck Center shop.

JEROME • Warner Truck Center opened a Freightliner dealership three weeks ago in the Crossroads Point development just north of Twin Falls and is already looking ahead to expansion.

The new 62,000-square-foot building near the intersection of Interstate 84 and U.S. Highway 93 employs 43 people.

“We anticipate doubling that within the next couple of years,” said Steve Swope, the local general manager.

Although the company sells Freightliner trucks and Sprinter Vans made by Mercedes Benz, much of the business is devoted to servicing all makes of trucks. The facility includes a 70-foot paint bay, 18 mechanical bays and another 15 body, trailer and tank repair bays.

There's also a computer-controlled alignment machine and a fast lube pit. A 7.5 ton bridge crane spans the length of two shops to remove engines from trucks and perform other tasks.

Warner Truck Center, based in Salt Lake City, seized the chance to move

into southern Idaho in July 2010 when the company bought Southern Idaho Freightliner from Orlan Stearns. On top of purchasing the dealer agreement with Freightliner and existing business equipment, Warner has added another \$100,000 worth of shop equipment, according to Swope.

“We had our eye on this because of easy access to the freeway,” Swope said. “A lot of our business is freeway traffic.”

Warner Truck Center CEO Bart Warner called the site “the perfect location to build a world-class facility to serve the medium and heavy truck industry.”

Most of the shop's workers, including Swope, were employed by the previous owner. Warner has added five extra employees, Swope said.

He noted the facility carries more than three times the inventory of parts that Southern Idaho Freightliner had in stock. In addition, driver amenities such as a lounge with cable TV, recliners, showers, a workout area and quiet room for reading or relaxing have been added.

“Truckers can take a break while their truck is being worked on,” Swope said.

The facility sits on 10 acres and Swope said another 8.5 adjacent acres also have been purchased.

“We have plenty of area for growth,” he said. “We're here for the long run.”

METS' FUTURE BRIGHTENS WITH MADOFF SETTLEMENT

NEW YORK • The New York Mets' owners scored an early-season victory Monday, stabilizing the club's financial future in a deal with a trustee for Bernard Madoff's fraud victims that requires them to pay millions less than they might have — and lifts a dark cloud from a team whose dismal play seemed to mirror its misfortune in the owner's box.

Mets CEO Fred Wilpon and team President Saul Katz, co-majority owners, emerged smiling from a Manhattan federal courthouse after a judge announced the agreement, which makes it likely they'll pay much less than the agreed-upon \$162 million, if any at all; guarantees they will owe nothing until the end of four years; and averts a high-profile civil trial.

“Now I guess I can smile, maybe I can take a day off, but I can't wait to get back to our businesses, which I love,” Wilpon, sporting dark sunglasses, said outside court as he pledged to rejoin the Mets on Tuesday at spring training in Florida. He stood with Katz, who rested his hand on Wilpon's shoulder under a sunny sky.

Starbucks Opening Evolution Fresh Juice Store

SEATTLE (AP) • Starbucks Corp. is pushing beyond coffee with the opening of the first Evolution Fresh Inc. juice store, the company said Monday.

Starbucks, which is looking for new businesses for growth, purchased the California-based juice maker in November for \$30 million. Evolution Fresh had been selling its juices in grocery stores such as Whole Foods groceries. The first Evolution Fresh store is in Bellevue, Wash.

Aside from juices, Starbucks says Evolution Fresh shops will have wraps, soups, salads, vegetarian and vegan options and other offerings.

Starbucks shares rose 34 cents to close at \$53.55 Monday.

Evolution Fresh, started by Naked Juice founder Jimmy Rosenberg, is one of the few larger juice companies that still cracks, peels, presses and squeezes its own fruits and vegetables rather than using pureed or powdered ingredients. It also uses a process called high-pressure pasteurization to make the juice without heating it.

Next week, the U.S. Supreme Court will hear three days of oral arguments in the healthcare lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of the Patient Protection and Affordable Health Care Act, otherwise known as “Obamacare.”

We now know the law was based on phony predictions about its cost. After promising the price would be under \$940 billion over 10 years, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office has issued a correction of its initial estimate, which appears to have been based on sleight of hand accounting tactics by congressional Democrats and the White House. CBO now projects the measure will cost taxpayers at least \$1.76 trillion over a decade.

Randy E. Barnett, the Carmack Waterhouse professor of legal theory at the Georgetown University Law Center, is troubled by the administration’s shifting rationale in its defense of the health care law: “First they told us this was an easy ‘Commerce Clause’ case. Then they (said) it was an exercise of the Tax Power. Now it is the Necessary and Proper Clause. If the mandate was so obviously constitutional, the government would not be shifting its position 10 days before oral argument.”

Ilya Somin, an associate professor at George Mason University School of Law, adds, “Despite this seeming shift, the federal government’s brief almost completely fails to consider the question of whether the mandate is ‘proper,’ as well as ‘necessary.’ The Supreme Court has made clear that these are two separate requirements, both of which have to be met. And a law that can only be defended by a rationale that gives Congress a blank check to enact virtually any other mandate clearly is not ‘proper.’”

Many wonder what will happen to needed reforms in health care should the individual mandate — the heart of Obamacare — be struck down. That question is answered in a timely new book published by the Pioneer Institute, a Boston-based public policy research organization, titled “The Great Experiment: The States, the Feds and Your Healthcare.” In a series of essays compiled by Joshua Archambault, director of Health Care Policy at the Pioneer Institute, and with a forward by Jeffrey S. Flier, M.D., the dean of Harvard Medical School, experts propose the states take the lead in reforming health care, as Massachusetts did, rather than dictate a one-size-fits-all system from dysfunctional Washington.

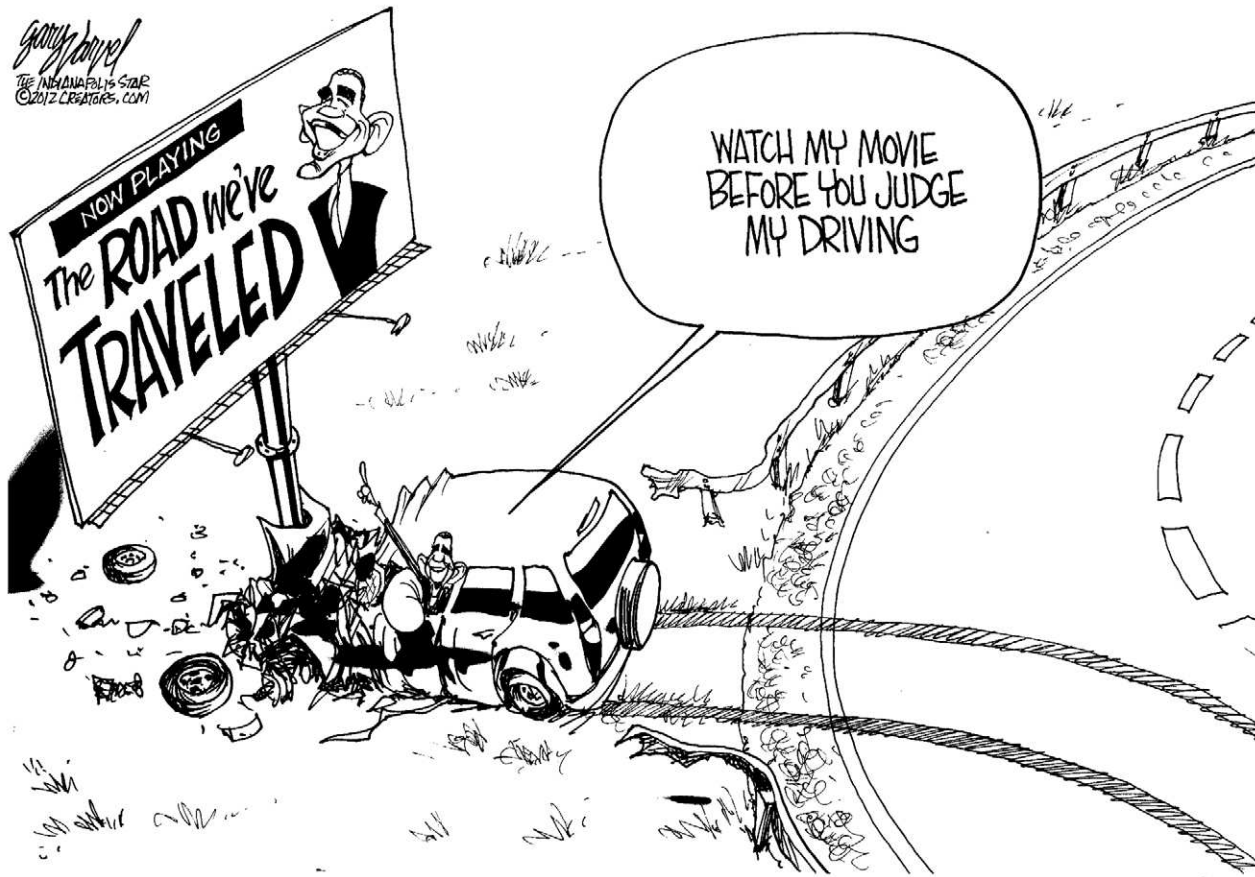
The authors propose what they call “Competitive Federalism” that would allow for a federal partnership, but permit states to fashion their own approach to health care based on their individual circumstances. Refundable tax credits, high-risk pools and Medicaid reform are among the specific recommendations for maintaining the high quality of health care America now enjoys while providing coverage and reducing costs for people whose access to care is now limited and for those now paying the bills.

Along with the bipartisan Medicare reform plan developed last year by Rep. Ron Wyden (D-OR) and Paul Ryan (R-Wis), which was dismissed by supporters of the status quo who prefer the issue to a solution, these are serious and doable proposals that deserve congressional consideration.

As Pioneer Institute Executive Director Jim Stergios writes, “Despite years of effort and mountains of regulations, the federal government has proven incapable of screening for quality (health care), and acting on that information. It is time for states and the federal government to hit the reset button.”

The Supreme Court might give them that opportunity. We should know by June how the likely slim majority will rule. Much of our future depends on the Court’s decision because it goes to the heart of what the government can be allowed to impose on a free people.

If the high court doesn’t invalidate the individual mandate, there will be no stopping government from threatening our most valuable possession: liberty.

IRS Should Investigate Tax Code Abuses, Regardless of Politics

This editorial appeared in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch on Wednesday:

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, has it right. “Sending the IRS on a politically motivated witch hunt,” he said Friday, “is simply unacceptable and could have a chilling impact on the constitutionally protected right to free speech.”

Therefore, the IRS must scrupulously avoid any taint of political favoritism as it aggressively pursues investigations of possible tax code abuses by political advocacy groups. It must disregard the groups’ liberal or conservative leanings, and, if it finds abuse, it must come down hard on the violators.

To be fair, that’s not exactly what Hatch had in mind. The senior Republican on the Senate Finance Committee was trying to discourage the IRS from conducting such investigations, which he suspected

were an attempt by Democrats to get the agency to impede fundraising and electoral spending activities by groups with conservative agendas.

Even so, the investigations should proceed — and with some urgency — as a tsunami of campaign cash threatens to drown this year’s elections, much of it flowing from corporations, labor organizations and business associations that take pains to hide their identities and their self-interests.

This page long has decried the obscene amounts of money that now drive and distort the American political process. The U.S. Supreme Court aggravated the problem with its 2010 Citizens United decision, abolishing limits on how much corporations, business groups and organized labor can contribute to political campaigns. Congress could require disclosure, the court reasoned, and public knowledge of who and what

gave how much to whom would reduce the risk of corruption.

But ingenious political operatives quickly discovered a way around disclosure: Certain kinds of IRS-authorized nonprofit groups are entitled to keep their donors’ names secret. So some political advocacy committees started spinning off so-called 501(c)4 “social welfare” groups and funneling contributions through them.

But IRS rules say that if a social welfare organization becomes primarily engaged in political activity, it no longer qualifies as a 501(c) group. Given the millions of dollars some of these groups are spending on political advocacy, the IRS has an obligation to see if they still are entitled to their status and the privileges that come with it.

The IRS also needs to find out if the groups’ corporate and special-interest donors have been treating these political contributions as tax-de-

ductible business expenses.

Hatch’s concerns about possible political motives may stem from the fact that Republican and right-tilting advocacy groups outnumber Democratic and left-tilting ones by two to one.

The field of so-called independent-spending political groups is a numerical and acronymic rat’s nest of Super PACs, 527s and 501(c)4s. Of the 138 such groups charted by the non-partisan Center for Responsive Politics as of Monday, 81 are conservative and 42 are liberal with the balance independent or not affiliated.

Thirty-seven of the 138 are 501(c)4 groups, 23 of them conservative and 14 liberal. And while some of these groups voluntarily disclose the names of donors, many — on both sides of the political spectrum — do not. Hiding donor information neither inspires confidence nor, as the Supreme Court naively hoped, thwarts corruption.

Evolving Opinions on Evolution

The following editorial appeared in the Detroit Free Press on March 12:

It’s been just 150 years since the publication of “On the Origin of Species,” in which Charles Darwin outlined his argument that all life forms descended from a common ancestor. That is scarcely an eyeblink in the epic context of evolutionary time, so perhaps we ought not to get too bent out of shape over a Gallup Poll suggesting that less than half of American adults are willing to acknowledge Darwin was on to something.

In fact, data gathered on the bicentennial celebration of Darwin’s birthday and reposted this week show that just 39 percent of those

surveyed in a 2009 random sample of 1,018 respondents say they “believe in the theory of evolution,” while 25 percent reject Darwin’s argument outright.

Another 36 percent, or nearly all the rest of those surveyed, said they had no opinion either way, which strikes us as a little like having no opinion whether the law of gravity has merit. But we’re cheered by the possibility that this noncommittal third of the country is keeping an open mind, at least for the time being.

Americans’ continuing reluctance to embrace Darwin’s argument is slightly more alarming when you consider that virtually everything biologists have discovered since either confirms or refines his theory of

natural selection.

Indeed, the more education those polled in the Gallup survey reported, the more likely they were to subscribe to Darwin’s theory. While just 24 percent of those who had completed high school or less said they believed in the theory, the percentage of believers doubled to 53 among college graduates and 74 among postgraduate degree-holders.

The opposite correlation was observed among those who attended church regularly; just 24 percent of those who attended weekly said they believed in evolution, compared with 55 percent of those who said they attended church seldom or never. Gallup said its previous research shows that

church attendance rates are fairly constant across educational groups, suggesting that differences in attitudes toward evolution were a direct reflection of respondents’ religious beliefs.

What is most worrisome, to those of us who struggle in the even more amorphous realm of public policy, is the absence of consensus about the validity of basic scientific method — the process of testing hypotheses about how the world works against repeated and disciplined observations of the world. How can Americans find common ground on the subject of, say, global warming if most of us remain suspicious about a scientific consensus that has endured more than a century longer?

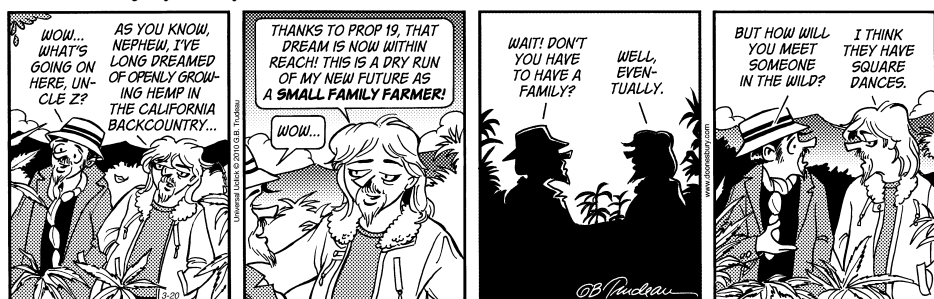

DENVER • The Denver Broncos got their Man. Make that Peyton Manning.

Pending final contract negotiations, Manning will join John Elway's Broncos with hopes of winning another Super Bowl.

So much for Tebowmania. Still to be decided is what happens to last season's quarterback sensation, Tim Tebow.

The Broncos and Manning agent Tom Condon spent Monday working out parameters of a deal expected to be worth about \$95 million over five years after the NFL's only four-time MVP called Elway, the Broncos' revered QB-turned-executive, and told him he had decided to come to Denver.

Tennessee Titans owner Bud Adams also said Manning let him know that he had picked the Broncos. Adams released a statement Monday confirming the Titans were out of the running and later said to *The Tennessean*: "He called me himself and told me he wasn't coming, that he made his mind up to go with Denver."

Besides the Titans, the San Francisco 49ers had been a finalist in the chase for Manning, who turns 36 on Saturday and missed all of 2011 because of multiple neck surgeries.

ESPN first reported the record-setting quarterback instructed his agent

to negotiate the details of a deal with the Broncos, less than two weeks after the Indianapolis Colts released him rather than pay a \$28 million bonus.

"I think it's a great place for him," Broncos defensive end Robert Ayers said outside the Broncos' complex. "I don't think he made a bad decision. I think he made a great decision. Hopefully we can prove him right and hopefully we can win a lot of games here."

Despite being sidelined all of last season, Manning's success in the past — the Colts averaged a 12-4 record from 2001-10 — made him by far this offseason's top potential signing and perhaps the most desired free agent ever.

He was wooed to Denver by Hall of Fame quarterback Elway, who led the Broncos to two Super Bowl championships and now serves as their vice president of football operations.

Elway, who retired from the game after winning his second straight title in 1999, never sounded all that convinced Tebow was the answer at the sport's most important position and now could trade the enormously popular but flawed QB.

Tebow energized the Broncos in leading them to the playoffs last season — and has fans all over the country — but his play was erratic.

"I wouldn't say I feel bad for him," Ayers said. "It's a business. And I'm pretty sure Tim understands that. ... We wish him luck, no matter what he

Haney Portrait of Woods: A Player Never Satisfied

ORLANDO, Fla. • Tiger Woods' fascination with the Navy SEALs and how he might have incurred his leg injuries are sure to generate plenty of buzz when Hank Haney's book goes on sale next week.

There also is plenty of gossip involving other players, such as the time Ian Poulter invited himself to ride home on Woods' plane after a practice round at Oakmont.

But there is a bigger picture in "The Big Miss," which chronicles the six years Haney spent as his

swing coach.

He shows Woods to be a complicated person who sought change to keep stimulated, who was rarely satisfied, self-centered in his pursuit of greatness and whose work ethic in the gym was geared toward being accepted as an athlete.

"In Tiger's mind, satisfaction is the enemy of success," Haney writes.

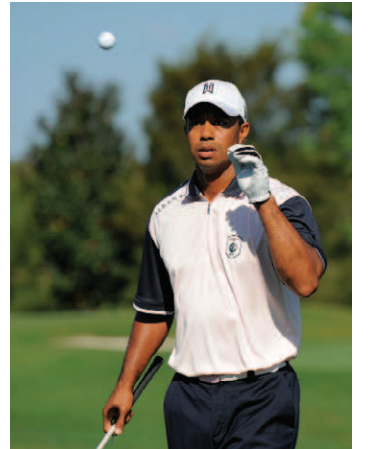
The book goes on sale March 27 — one week before the Masters — and it already has been getting plenty of attention because of a few sections that raise questions about how Woods injured his leg.

Haney cites Corey Car-

roll, one of Woods' closest friends at Isleworth, as saying that Woods injured his right Achilles tendon doing Olympic-style weightlifting as he returned from reconstructive knee surgery in December 2008.

Haney also tells of a woman who approached him during an outing in Minnesota last year. Her husband was a Navy SEAL in California and told her Woods came in for training in 2007 at a Kill House — an urban-warfare simulator — and "got kicked pretty hard in the leg, and I think he hurt his knee pretty bad."

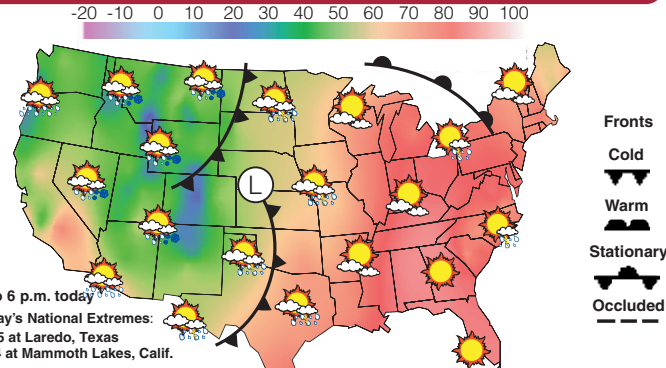

For that, Bronco fans can thank the good people running the Indianapolis Colts. Without Manning on the open market, Elway likely would have been forced by popular demand to keep Tebow, just as the Broncos were finally forced to play him last year. Manning gave him an opening, and Elway reacted like the gambling quarterback he once was in landing the kind of quarterback he always wanted. The move was brilliant, assuming Manning is healthy and remains healthy. That's a big assumption, but

Vegas oddsmakers quickly gave it their stamp of approval, lowering the odds of the Broncos winning the Super Bowl from as high as 50-1 to 10-1. There are no odds on what happens to Tebow now. That's too hard to predict, even for the grizzled bookies who thought by now they had seen everything in sports. Does he remain in Denver as a backup to a quarterback who almost never took a snap off when he was healthy? Hard to imagine, especially because the new offense essentially will be Manning's offense — no match for Tebow's skill set. And surely Elway wouldn't want to be in his box hearing chants of "We want Tebow!"

once again, should Manning somehow get off to a rocky start in Denver. But what do you do with a wobbly armed quarterback who never seems to pick it up until the fourth quarter? A quarterback who somehow found ways to win, but whose real attraction is as an attraction who can fill seats? Nobody's going to offer a first-round pick for him like the one the Broncos used prior to Elway's arrival in 2010 to select him in the first place. Nobody's going to re-tool their entire offense to take advantage of his running skills when there are still so many questions about his passing skills. And what owner — other than, maybe, newcomer

Shahid Khan in Jacksonville — is going to pay a premium for a Tebowmania craze that might already be over? None of this, of course, is Tebow's fault. He did everything asked of him in Denver, taking the Broncos to the playoffs for the first time in six years and even winning a playoff game against a battered Steelers team. He did it with utmost humility and utmost class, deferring credit to his teammates and making them believe they could win. But the Broncos lost their last three regular season games — and the case could be made they should have lost their last six. They backed into the playoffs, as defensive coordinators fig-

ured out ways to take away Tebow's legs and keep him contained. Great guy, yes. Great character, sure. Visits orphanages, hospitals, even consoles death row inmates. A few weeks ago he was in Las Vegas where, instead of hitting the clubs like most players, he took center stage at an evangelical church and thousands of people waited for hours for him to speak. But NFL general managers aren't looking for players their daughter should marry. They're looking for quarterbacks who can take them deep into the playoffs, and Tebow so far hasn't shown he's capable of doing that. He's a running quarterback in a league where running

quarterbacks don't survive long, and an erratic passer in a league where precision passing is about the only way to move the ball on a consistent basis. Denver fans embraced him because he took a team going nowhere and led them somewhere. With Manning aboard they're no longer desperate, and, already, Tebowmania seems so yesterday. They're moving on with the prettier girl at the dance and so will Tebow's teammates. "I wouldn't say I feel bad for him," Broncos defensive end Robert Ayers said Monday outside the team's training complex. "It's a business. And I'm pretty sure Tim understands that."

does. I hope he's here. He's a great leader, a great locker room guy." Manning was cut loose March 7 by the Colts. The move marked the end of an era, a 14-year alliance between the team that drafted Manning No. 1 overall and the QB who brought Indianapolis from football irrelevance to the 2007 Super Bowl title and a second appearance in the NFL championship game three years later. But with Manning's rehab continuing, the Colts decided it was time to rebuild from top to bottom, and they are ex-

pected to take Stanford quarterback Andrew Luck with the top pick in April's draft. Two days after standing alongside Colts owner Jim Irsay at an emotional farewell news conference, Manning began his free agency tour in the place it was ending: Denver. Manning landed on Tebow's turf with all the trappings of star treatment — flown to town on a chartered plane, then spending the day with Elway, coach John Fox and general manager Brian Xanders. From there, Manning crisscrossed the country in search of a new team, as various clubs courted a guy with more than 50,000 yards passing, nearly 400 touchdowns and 11 Pro Bowl selections. After Denver, next

up was a meeting with the Arizona Cardinals, and he also spent time speaking with — or throwing for — the Titans, 49ers and Miami Dolphins, with TV cameras and even helicopters often on the trail. In the end, though, Manning decided he wanted to trade in his Colts horseshoe helmet for one adorned by a Bronco. The move would allow him to stay in the AFC, a conference he knows well and one considered weaker than the NFC at the moment, and would re-establish the tantalizing prospect of playing against his brother, New York Giants quarterback Eli, in a Super Bowl. They already have three titles in the family.

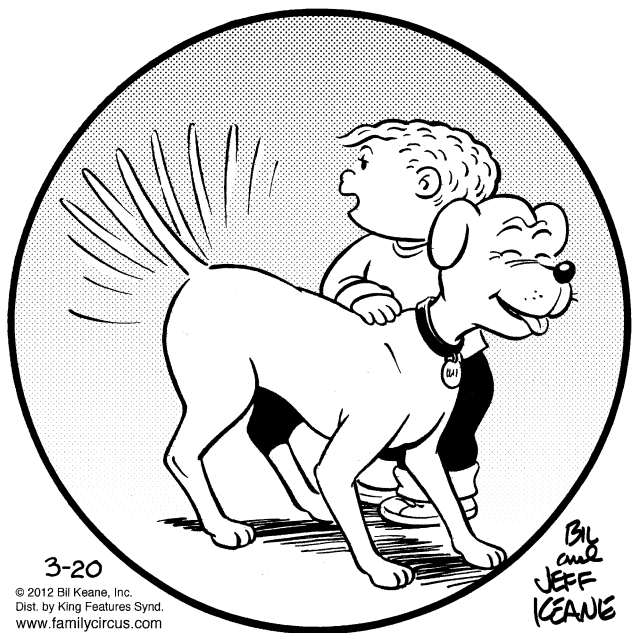

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Sometimes, a defense may seem so obvious that it might almost be insulting to point it out. But when an opponent misses it at the table, maybe others will learn from his mistake (plus enjoy a touch of schadenfreude).

Check out this deal from the first qualifying session of the Norman Kay Platinum Pairs in last year's Spring Nationals at Louisville, the source of the rest of this week's deals.

East-West had missed out on five spades when East made the simple raise to four spades — quite reasonable, but had he tried four diamonds, his partner would surely have got it right. In auctions of this sort, when you have hearts and the opponents have spades, describing your hand to help partner judge the five-level should be mandatory. In this case, East could not foresee the denouement when he bid four spades, but he might nonetheless have taken the risk of helping the opponents in the defense to ensure his side competed appropriately.

That said, at least it behooved the defense to beat five hearts and lessen the damage. West led the diamond king against five hearts and continued the suit. Now the contract made when a spade loser vanished on the clubs!

I blame both defenders, but especially East. West might have worked out that a spade switch at trick two could be necessary, but East surely should have overtaken the diamond king to cash the spade king. West will signal count and East will take the second spade trick before the rats get at it.

ANSWER: Although it is possible to construct specific hands where slam will make, it is asking too much to expect your partner to cover all those losers, and if you make a slam-try, you may get into the no-man's land of the five-level. While you might make a splinter bid of four clubs if your singleton club honor were in the diamond suit, here a simple raise to game should be enough.

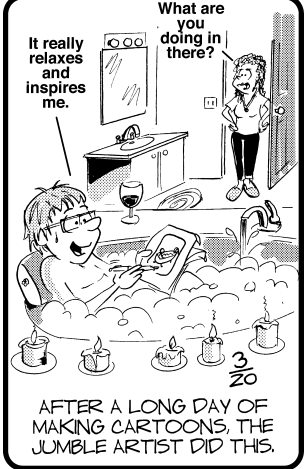
