## Senate Passes Ultrasound Bill

With its major legislative hurdle clear, a proposal to require abortion-seeking women to undergo a preprocedure ultrasound looks poised to become Idaho law.

## EXPERT SAYS IDAH0 PRISON CARE ‘CRUEL’

BOISE • Medical care is so poor at an Idaho state prison that it amounts to neglect and cruel and unusual punishment, according to a report that was unsealed Monday.
Correctional health care expert Dr Marc Stern said there have been some improvements at the Idaho State Corimprovements at the Idaho State Cor-
rectional Institution south of Boise. But terminal and long-term inmates sometimes went unfed, nursing mis takes or failure likely resulted in some deaths, and one inmate wasn't told for seven months that he likely had can cer, he said.
and the prison health care provider
Brentwood, Tenn.-based Corizon, said they're disappointed and are preparing a response that will show the care deivered to inmates meets constitutional and health care standards.
Stern was appointed to study the care prison near Boise as part of a long-running lawsuit brought by inmates. A federal judge is expected to whether to allow the lawsuit to continue or bring it to a close.
Some of the medical problems described in the report are disturbing, in cluding Stern's findings that inmates who were terminal or required long

At their meeting, Browne said Bales clarified a story, provided initially by the soldier'sfamily, about thetiming of aroadside bomb that blew off the leg of one of Bales' friends. Bales arrived at Fort ast Friday and is being held in the same prison as other prominent defendants. fr. Bradley Manning, who is charged with leaking classified documents to the WikiLeaks website, has been hel here on occasion as he awaited trial.

## 'Lookingto Kill:'4Slain at French JewishSchool

TOULOUSE, France • A motorbike as sailant opened fire with two handguns Monday in front of a Jewish school in the French city of Toulouse, killing rabbi, his two young sons and a girl. One witness described him as a man chasing small children and "looking to kill."
One of the guns he used also had been fired in two other deadly motor-
bike attacks in the area that targeted aratroopers of North African and rench Caribbean origin, officials said. rench President Nicolas Sarkozy sug gested one person was responsible for all the killings.
A massive manhunt was under wa to the highest level ever across a swath of southern France surrounding Toulouse. Hundreds of officers increased security at schools, synagogues
and mosques around the country, and secure the region as long as this criminal" hasn't been caught. Monday's attack revolted France and drew strong condemnation from Israel the worst school shooting in French history.
France has seen a low drumroll of anti-Semitic incidents but no attack so deadly targeting Jews since the early 1980s. This country is particularly sen-
sitive toward its Jewish community besitive toward its Jewish community be-
cause of its World War II past of abetting Nazi occupiers in deporting Jewish citizens.

## Apple to Pay Dividend, Start Stock Buybacks

NEW YORK • Apple is finally acknowledging that it has more money than it needs. But don't expect it to cut prices on iPhones and iPads. Instead, the company said on Monday that it
will reward its shareholders with a dividend and a share buyback program. Apple, the world's most valuable company, sits on $\$ 97.6$ billion in cash and securities. The decision to return some of that money to investors is lear signal that Apple is taking a dif erent approach in the post-Jobs era. Former CEO Steve Jobs resisted calls that the money was better used to give Apple maneuvering room to, for instance, make strategic acquisitions Apple did pay a quarterly dividend be ween 1987 and 1995, but Jobs was no Jobs died in October after along fight with cancer. On Monday, new CEO Tim Cook said that, with as much cash as Apple has on hand, a dividend won't restrain the company's options.
"These decisions will not close any doors for us," he told analy
porters on a conference call.
Had it kept amassing cash and low yielding securities, Apple eventually could have opened itself to a legal chal enge from shareholders, who could have

argued that it was misusing their money Apple said that it will pay a quarterly dividend of $\$ 2.65$ per share, starting in its fiscal fourth quarter, which begins
July l.

The dividend works out to $\$ 10.60$ annually, or 1.8 percent of the current stock price. Analyst Tavis McCourt at Morgan Keegan said the dividend is rel atively generous for a large technolog. ompany. However, Microsolt Corp dividends and Hewlett-Packard Co. pays 2 percent.
