BOISE • For Idaho's House Republicans, being pro-life doesn't mean

supporting an ultrasound mandate. That was the message legislators

delivered after canceling a public hearing on a bill to require women to get an ultrasound before having an abortion. The move came hours after protests against the legislation and a live ultrasound demonstration by supporters of the bill, which passed the Senate on a 23-12 vote

After a closed-door GOP caucus, House State Affairs Chairman Rep. Tom Loertscher, R-Iona, said the move doesn't mean the bill is dead, but that he couldn't guarantee he would schedule a public hearing.

Though the bill had strong Republican support in the Senate, some House members were swayed by constituent feedback and protests.

Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, said he asked Republican women in his district what they thought of the mandate. Of the 12 who responded, only one supported the bill, he said. Some were concerned about a government mandate, while others didn't like what they saw as a privacy violation, Hartgen said.

Stop the Shooting

Poor practices at a popular canyon-rim park may force Jerome County officials to restrict firing guns within its limits.

They were there Tuesday afternoon, spinning circles in the mud and roaring over rises as Jet, their black Lab, occasionally sprinted in pursuit. Even with the roar of engines, nearby gunshots were au-

The popular park just east of U.S. Highway 93, on the north rim of the Snake River Canyon, is a prime spot for shooters to practice. But their continued use of the area is jeopardized by litter they leave and safety concerns for other park users. Officials are weighing options including banning shooting.

"They shoot wherever they want and they don't pack out their garbage," Jerome County Commission Chairman Charlie

Howell said Wednesday as he toured the site.

One popular diversion is to bring broken televisions to the park and use them for target practice, leaving the debris there, he said. He sometimes rides a horse through the maze of trails and knows firsthand about the poten-

tle over your head," he said. As if to illustrate the point,

The Water's About to Flow

TWIN FALLS • Sometimes, fire is the best tool to kick off spring cleaning.

For the past week, Twin Falls Canal Co. ditch riders have used sweat and flame to clear out hundreds of miles of ditches and canals.

By using fire along the ditches, workers can clear out weeds and debris collected over the winter months. The canal system needs to be pristine before the company can make water deliveries to farmers.

The canal network begins above Milner Dam. Water flows down to Murtaugh Lake, where it is later dispersed into the larger network. By next week, the canal company hopes to start trickling water back into its 202,000acre water system, said Manager Brian Olm-

"It's been good weather for ditch burning," Olmstead said. "We should be able to start sometime next week. But it takes awhile. It'll be mid-April before we do any deliveries."

Burley Irrigation District Manager Randy Bingham said he tentatively plans to start wa-

ter into his system around April 16. Not far away, the Minidoka Irrigation District hopes to start a bit earlier, on April 2. Big Please see WATER, A2

JFAC Approves Legislative **Legal Counsel Fund**

BOISE • The legislative session is wrapping up, but budget-setting isn't quite

On Wednesday morning, the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee took care of unfinished budgetary business, including appropriating funding for legislation currently making its way through the Statehouse. The committee also approved \$200,000 for a legislative legal counsel fund, but not without dissent.

The Legislative Legal Counsel Fund appropriation came at the request of legislative leadership, said JFAC cochairs Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, and Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome. Currently, legislators can receive legal counsel from the Attorney General's Office. But because the attorney general is also involved in state matters on which the Legislature may wish to receive legal advice, Senate and House leaders felt lawmakers may need a second opinion.

Cameron cited a recent ex-

ample of Attorney General Lawrence Wasden sitting on the state land board, which found itself in the center of controversy after acquiring a storage business. Proposed legislation, which died in committee, sought to limit the land board's ability to compete with private business. Seeking the attorney general's opinion on that issue may result in a biased opinion, however unintentional, Cameron said.

But some on the committee felt the move was inappropriate. Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, was worried legislators would shop around until they found an attorney who reaffirmed their opinions, while Wasden has been largely nonpartisan, she said.

"As a person of the opposing party, I have really respected the attorney general," Jaquet said.

The committee approved the appropriation 16-4. Among the other appropriations:

• A \$237,000 transfer in dedicated funds and two fulltime positions from the Department of Administration to the Idaho State Historical Society. The move will allow the state to consolidate records management services to the Historical Society. State agencies currently pay the Department of Administration to manage their records.

 \$1.5 million in dedicated funds from license fees, which are currently funneled into the state's general fund, to a newly created account dedicated to alcohol beverage control.

 A \$33,000 combination of program transfers and new general funds for the Council for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing to allow the program to pay its share of indirect costs to the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation and avoid a temporary office clo-

• A \$648,100 combination of federal and general funds for the Division of Child Welfare to increase monthly reimbursement payments to foster families. The request includes \$150,000 in general funds and \$489,100 in federal funds.

 A \$500,000 transfer from general funds to dedicated funds to the state's Constitutional Defense Council.

Classrooms in Buhl to Get Tech **Upgrades**

BUHL • More Buhl classrooms will soon be equipped with interactive projectors and iPads the result of a \$100,000 grant.

Since finding out about the Target Corp. grant in January, school officials have developed a plan for how to spend the money.

Target Corp. chose two school districts including Buhl - and 48 schools nationwide to receive grants. Carla Critchfield, who has three children in Buhl schools, nominated the district through "The Ellen DeGeneres Show."

Superintendent Byron Stutzman said about \$40,000 will go toward putting interactive projectors and document cameras in more class-

"Improving instruction is what we want to do," he said. "This is a chance for us to do that."

The equipment adds to the Buhl School District's existing efforts to improve classroom technology.

Each Idaho school district and public charter school is deciding how to spend \$32 per student in technology money from the Idaho State Department of Education. In Buhl, about \$39,000 is expected to come in this year.

Besides more interactive equipment, Buhl school officials plan to spend \$45,000 in grant money to get one classroom set of iPads for each of the district's three schools.

"One per building isn't nearly enough," Stutzman said, but it's a

The remaining \$15,000 will be used to upgrade software programs in school libraries.

Another grant is headed Buhl's way: The district will receive a \$100,000 Idaho System for Educational Excellence grant on July 1.

The money will be used to train employees on how to better use software called Schoolnet. One feature of the system allows teachers to track student scores on assignments and tests.

"It will help them better monitor students," Stutzman said.

Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, said constituent response affected her colleagues' decision.

"Most of the people they're hearing from are disturbed about the mandate and the ... interference between a woman and her physician," Bell said.

Assistant Minority Leader Elfreda Higgins, D-Garden City, said she was surprised at the news, but added that there was a huge mobilization against the bill.

The move came hours after an ultrasound demonstration organized by antiabortion activists, where six women volunteered to have sonographers give them ultrasounds in a Senate committee room. Outside, dozens of picketers protested the bill and comments about rape victims made by bill sponsor Sen. Chuck Winder, R-Boise.

Six women, in different stages of pregnancy, participated in the demonstration, allowing sonographers from pregnancy crisis center Stanton Healthcare to take ultrasounds. The earliest pregnancy was about 10 weeks. The six women declined to give their last names.

Stanton's Brandi Swindell repeatedly emphasized that the abdominal procedure was non-invasive and not uncomfortable.

ncomfortable. "How is this offensive?" she said at one point as an image of a fetus filled the projector screen.

The difference, demonstrators in the hall said, is that many women choose to have an abortion much earlier than the six women participating in the demonstration. Also, the six women had chosen to keep their pregnancies — of course they wouldn't be upset by seeing an image of the ultraceurd.

Women are already offered a chance to see an ultrasoundimage, said Jennifer Carter of Meridian. "To mandate it is different," she said.

Those protests weren't lost on House representatives.

"They felt like after the hearing in the Senate turned out to be so inflammatory that they weren't sure, with the picketing and everything, if they're ready for that kind of thing again," Bell said

after the caucus. Loertscher agreed.

"It really makes a difference to take a deep breath and take a step back," he said.

Howell said the county has a management agreement with the BLM, but not with the Department of Lands. Talks between the county and state aimed at establishing enforcement policies for the problems haven't been successful.

Jerome County commissioners hope to hold public hearings during the next two months to see what kind of crackdown, if any, citizens favor. Sheriff Doug McFall's office is currently researching the cost if deputies began enforcing restrictions in the park.

At this point, Howell emphasized, Jerome County has no authority to enforce any regulations on stateowned property. That's critical because it's the closest portion of the park to Twin Falls and Jerome, and is the most heavily used by shooters and ATV and motorcycle riders.

For riders such as the Guymons, ridding the park of litter would be welcome.

"There are couches and all kinds of stuff out here," said Dave Guymon, 41, of Jerome.

A quick survey of the area where he and 22-year-old Nate were riding turned up a long list of discarded items. There were lots of shotgun shell casings, a prescription bottle, an antifreeze bottle, an empty oil can, cardboard boxes, lengths of rope and hose, soft drink bottles, broken glass, and even a foam cushion apparently from a chair.

While the Guymons emphasize that everyone should be able to use the park, they're aware that shooters might be practicing anywhere. Some recently took Nate by surprise — he crested a small hill on his ATV just as shooters were firing at the incline below him. He suggested that designating certain areas of the park for different activities might be a safer way to go.

Dave said most shooters don't litter, pinning that la-

bel on just a few careless people.

Tim Yenne, 34, of Jerome, likes to shoot at the park but sides with those who criticize the littering. He was in the park Tuesday, and said he often hauls out garbage left by other people.

"It's a no-brainer," Yenne said. "You can have lots of fun out here without bringing out ridiculous stuff like TVs and chairs."

Still, he opposes any movement to prevent shooting in the park, and said most who do are trying to improve their skills to become safer hunters.

"If they ban it out here, you'll see lots more shooting where people shouldn't be — like in the city limits," he said.

On Wednesday afternoon, Morgan Diaz parked his automobile just beyond the stoplight at Highway 93 and Shoshone Falls Road to shoot his AR-15. The 41year-old Jerome resident said shooters should be welcome at the park "as long as you are responsible."

That means cleaning up after a shooting session, said Diaz, who makes a point of picking up shell casings and other items.

"Everybody has a right to the land," Diaz said, "but if you pack it in, pack it out."

BLM spokeswoman Heather Tiel-Nelson acknowledged that use of the park "has been an issue for a number of years." She hopes things can be worked out so everyone can still enjoy their own brand of recreation.

That's Howell's goal, too. He believes closing the park to shooting would cause more problems than it solved.

"If you shove them off this land they're going to go somewhere else," he said.

SHERIFF SUPPORTS SHOOTING IN PARK

JEROME • Jerome County Sheriff Doug McFall says his office would gladly take on a bigger enforcement role in Snake River Canyon Park if it meant shooters could still practice there.

Jerome County commissioners are discussing ways to curb littering and safety problems in the park. Banning shooting is one option, although no decisions have been made.

McFall says preliminary estimates show it would cost \$5,000 to \$15,000 a year for deputies to step up patrols in the park and enforce any new regulations. The difference in cost depends on whether the sheriff's office is directed to act proactively or in a more reserved role, the sheriff said.

Costs would cover salaries, equipment and fuel required to do the job. McFall said the sheriff's office already has sufficient vehicles for beefed-up enforcement.

McFall favors any man-

agement decision that lets people keep shooting in the park because he supports gun rights and believes regular target practice will make shooters safer in handling their guns.

The options might call for a two-person patrol on Friday evenings and weekends, if commissioners want that kind of surveillance, McFall said. It could call for the hiring of a part-time deputy or use of reserves or off-duty officers.

Deputies already perform limited duties in the park, such as responding when there is a call for help.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management pays the Jerome County Sheriff's Office \$5,000 per year for such services, McFall said, but the Idaho Department of Lands does not pay.

The BLM has about 7,000 acres of land in the park while the Department of Lands has 700 acres.

Cooperate and Compromise: Please!

As the current legislative session grinds inexorably to completion, the disparate priorities of the House, the Senate and the governor have become all too apparent.

Nowhere has this variance of opinion become more obvious than in discussing how to spend Idaho's expected revenue surplus.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter — beginning with his State of the State address in January — has repeatedly emphasized the need to replenish the state coffers; to reestablish a rainy day fund to protect state agencies and state residents in the event of another economic downturn, making a \$60 million deposit into that fund this year.

Last month, the Senate — in an unparalleled act of bipartisanship — voted 32-0 to undo the teacher salary cuts that were a result of this past year's passage of Tom Luna's self-proclaimed "Students Come First" reforms. If that 32-0 seems like a typo, you're not alone in the shock associated with seeing 32 senators — women and men; Republicans and Democrats, representing Idahoans from all corners of the state — agreeing on anything. That unanimous vote to restore \$35 million in teacher salaries over five years ought to be something that gets the attention of the governor and members of the Idaho House.

But apparently not. The House has refused to take up the teacher pay bill and proposed a \$35 million tax cut for the state's highest wage earners instead, also backed by Otter. Far be it from the *Times-News* to suggest that a tiny cut in individual income tax is a politically motivated move associated with it being an election year, so we won't go there.

The trouble with the current situation is that the Senate won't take up the House's tax cut bill and the House has done the same with teacher pay. Not precisely the example of "working and playing well with others" that you'd like to see from our elected officials.

Complicating matters further is the wide range in the estimated surplus. Otter's suddenly optimistic estimate of a \$128 million surplus after the year 2013 is roughly double the estimate of most legislators.


Meanwhile, the Legislature fiddles with peripheral issues such as renewing attempts to remove Occupy Boise tents. Far better for them to move on to the main event.

The House-backed tax cuts seem to us to be the odd man out. Sen. Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home, chairman of the Senate Local Government and Taxa tion Committee, emphasized the state finance department's estimate that the tax bill would only provide \$71 in "relief" to a family of four making \$100,000 per year. That's something he feels would not get Idahoans much "bang for the buck." We agree.

Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, co-chairman of the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, provided a concise summary of the Senate position.

"Our members," Cameron said, "would like to see (the educational funding) bill come forward, as well as substantial revenue being put into guarding against another downturn."

We agree with Sen. Cameron: pay the teachers and replenish the rainy day fund. It's the right thing to do.

Warden Defends Correctional Center

As warden for the Idaho Correctional Center, I take great pride in my job, my staff and the facility that the Corrections Corporation of America manages for the state of Idaho. I can guarantee we are getting that job done for the taxpayers and citizens of Idaho in a cost-effective, efficient, safe and humane manner.

Consider that, as the largest facility in the state to house inmates, on a given day at ICC these essential activities take place in service of more than 2,000 inmates: More than 6,000 meals are prepared, more than 35 programs and vocational training are offered, and more than eight hours of recreation time a day is offered. Add to this more than 32 visitation hours a weekend by friends and relatives, an average of eight religious and faith-based activities a day, and about 128 medical visits carried out daily by medical staff. In short, a prison is like a small community with people

needing food, jobs, doctor's visits and time to practice their faith in a safe and secure environment.

The fact is cost savings of public-private partnership corrections have been affirmed by more than 20 studies performed either by universities, think tanks and government entities, including Harvard Law School, Vanderbilt University and The Reason Foundation, to name a few. This research supports a conservative estimate that partnership facilities offer cost savings of between 10 to 15 percent. Two additional factors make the actual cost savings to states even greater; construction costs and pension costs are shifted away from taxpayers.

My hat is off to all staff at CCA as they work to provide corrections services at efficient costs to taxpayers while operating a modern, humane and safe facility for staff, inmates and the community. At ICC, we're proud to be advancing that mission every day.

Immigration's Loose Rules of Detention

The following editorial appeared in the Los Angeles
Times on Sunday:

his month, the Department of Homeland Security opened the Karnes County Civil Detention Center in Texas — a state-of-the-art facility intended to symbolize the Obama administration's effort to reform a deeply troubled im-

migration jails system. The center, which houses only detainees with no serious criminal backgrounds, has no barbed-wire fencing. Immigrants are free to roam the facility. Those who choose to can do their own laundry.

The administration deserves praise for acting on its promise to treat immigrants as civil defendants awaiting their day in immigration court rather than as criminals serving time. Unfortunately, it hasn't moved as effectively to change the rules governing how detention centers are run. Instead, Homeland Security officials have enacted weak guidelines that look good on paper yet are rarely or inconsistently enforced.

Consider that last month the administration rolled out new standards intended

to curb abuses committed by detention center staff and detainees. Yet the Karnes facility, which opened after the new standards were announced, is not required to comply with them because federal officials didn't bother to write it into the operating contract. Instead, the facility will operate under 2008 guidelines, with an option to shift to the new rules later.



Court Sides with Property Owners over EPA

WASHINGTON • The Supreme Court ruled unanimously Wednesday that property owners have a right to prompt

review by a judge of an important tool used by the Environmental Protection Agency to address water pollution. The court sided with an Idaho couple who object to an EPA order that blocked construction of their new

home near a scenic lake and threatened fines of more than \$30,000 a day. Wednesday's decision is a victory for Mike and Chantell Sackett, whose property near Priest Lake has sat undisturbed since the EPA ordered a

In an opinion by Justice Antonin Scalia, the court rejected EPA's argument that allowing property owners quick access to courts to contest orders like the one issued to the Sacketts would compromise the agency's ability to deal with water pollution.

"Compliance orders will remain an effective means of securing prompt voluntary compliance in those many cases where there is no substantial basis to question their validity," Scalia said.

In this case, the couple contested the determination that their small lot contained wetlands that are regulated by the Clean Water Act, and they complained there was no reasonable way to challenge the order without risking fines that can mount quickly.

Scalia, reading a summary of his opinion in court, noted that the Sacketts have never "seen a ship or other vessel cross their yard?'

The Sacketts now will be able to argue in federal court that their land should not be subject to EPA regulation, said their lawyer, Damien Schiff.

The EPA issues nearly 3,000 administrative compliance orders a year that call on alleged violators of environmental laws to stop what they're doing and repair the harm they've caused. Major business groups, homebuilders, road builders and agricultural interests all joined the Sacketts in urging the court to make it easier to contest EPA compliance orders issued under several environmental laws.

Senate Ethics Panel Vetoes Complaint About Pearce

BOISE (AP) • A Senate Ethics Commission voted unanimously to dismiss a complaint against Republican Sen. Monty Pearce, concluding Democrats couldn't prove he'd violated the chamber's rules governing when conflicts of interest must be dis-

Wednesday's 6-0 vote of three Democrats and three Republicans doesn't mean everybody left in full agreement, however.

Democratic panelist Diane Bilyeu, of Pocatello, felt the process was rushed and didn't fully vet whether Pearce's leases with gas drilling companies posed a conflict.

However, Republican member Jim Hammond, of Coeur d'Alene, saw nothing in Pearce's alleged conflict that would benefit him more than other people who have signed leases for energy exploration.









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

TWIN FALLS • Michigan-based Dart Container Corp. announced Tuesday its acquisition of Solo Cup Co., which operates a Twin Falls plant that employs about 100 people.

Dart's purchase of Solo is estimated at about \$1 billion, and is expected to close by third-quarter 2012, pending regulatory approval. Both companies make disposable food service packaging.

"Dart's leadership team has shown a high level of respect for what Solo has accomplished, and I believe we are putting the company in the right hands to succeed and grow ... "Solo CEO Robert

Korzenski said in a statement.

Dart CEO Robert Dart said the purchase will allow customers the ability to buy a wider range of products from a single vendor. Dart is privately owned, and its CEO said the company will "take the time to integrate Solo in a thoughtful, analytical manner to ensure lasting success."

Dart expects to continue offering products under the Solo brand - including the company's iconic red cups, according to the release.

Solo's Twin Falls plant produces about 2 million plastic utensils and straws daily, manager Mark Leonard told the Times-News in 2011. Its largest client is Costco, which purchases about 85 percent of items made in Twin Falls. The plant opened in 1998.

Dart employs 7,600 workers and operates 20 production facilities worldwide, according to the release.

Senate Passes Tax **Break for Developers**

Bill is designed to help hard-hit developers carry inventory until their fortunes change.

BOISE (AP) • Land developers whose grand designs for their properties were thwarted by the recession could soon win tax relief.

The Senate voted 28-7 Tuesday for the measure, which would exempt the value of improvements to properties until the construction of homes or buildings begins — or the developer unloads the parcel on somebody else.

Twin Falls developer Brad Wills spent about a year working on the proposal, which he introduced to the Legislature earlier this month.

The measure has cleared the House and is now destined for Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's desk.

Advocates, including Sen. Lee Heider of Twin Falls, described the bill as an economic relief effort, to help hard-hit developers carry their inventory until their fortune changes.

Foes, however, feared the bill could undermine revenue to local governments that rely on property taxes.

Sen. Joyce Broadsword of Sagle told colleagues she'd heard from multiple assessors who had concerns about the bill.

U.S. Home Re-sales Have Best Winter in Five Years

WASHINGTON • U.S. home sales are gradually coming back. A mild winter and a stronger job market have helped boost sales ahead of the crucial spring buying season.

The past two months made up the best winter for sales of previously occupied homes in five years, when the housing crisis began. And the sales pace in January was the highest since May 2010, the last month that buyers could qualify for a federal home-buying tax

February sales dipped only slightly to a seasonally adjusted 4.59 million, the National Association of Realtors said Wednesday. That's 13 percent higher than the sales pace last July and just below the revised 4.63 million in January.

Ian Shepherdson, chief U.S. economist at High Frequency Economics, said the lower February's numbers "should not detract from the key point, which is that sales are trending upward."

The sales pace remains far below the

6 million that economists equate with healthy markets. And the number of first-time buyers, who are critical to a housing recovery, continues to lag normal levels, while foreclosures remain high.

Still, Summer Greene, a Realtor in Fort Lauderdale, said she's getting multiple offers for listings. That's been rare since the housing market went bust in South Florida.

"People don't want to wait on the sidelines anymore and the change is very noticeable," Greene said. "There's definitely been a mood shift?"

The median sales prices of homes rose for the first time in four months in February, to \$156,600. And the supply of homes on the market increased more than 4 percent in February to 2.43 million, which could signal that more homeowners became confident in the housing market.

There have been other signs of improvement in the depressed housing market.

Homebuilders have grown more confident in the past six months after see-

A key reason for the brighter housing outlook is the job market has strengthened. From December through February, employers added an average of 245,000 jobs a month. The unemployment rate has fallen to 8.3 percent, the lowest in three years.

Still, economists caution that the damage from the housing bust is deep and the industry is years away from fully recovering.

HP Combines Printer, PC Units in Turnaround Bid

NEW YORK • Hewlett-Packard Co. is combining its printer and PC divisions as it tries to overcome dragging profits, growing competition and the absence of a focused identity.

The move announced Wednesday will help the company streamline its business and save money to invest in growing areas.

HP is also hoping its restructuring will boost innovation.

The change comes as sales of printers and ink, once HP's lifeblood, are falling because people are sharing more documents and photos online instead of printing them.

HP, the world's No. 1 maker of personal computers, is also coping with declining PC sales as consumers in the U.S. and Western Europe delay replacing their

machines and spend money instead on smartphones and tablet computers such as Apple's iPad. The restructuring is one of the

first major steps taken by former eBay chief Meg Whitman since she became HP's CEO in September. Her predecessor, Leo Apotheker, had wanted to sell or spin off the PC business, a plan that contributed to his ouster after 11 months on the job. Under Whitman, HP decided to keep the

unit after all.

Whitman inherited a faltering company that's facing growing competition from mobile devices and internal operational challenges such as a complex supply chain, which HP hopes to simplify by combining the divisions.

Last month, Whitman said HP plans to spend several years turn-

ing its business around. She promised a more stream-

lined and efficient company, and

Wednesday's announcement is a step in that direction. Besides combining the PC and

printing units, HP is unifying its marketing functions under one executive and consolidating other areas of its business. Whitman had said that HP has

been running its business in "silos" for years, making the company "too complex and too slow." On Wednesday, the company stressed that the changes will mean a more streamlined, faster and consumer-focused Hewlett-Packard, one that fits its mantra, "One HP?

Gary Pruitt of McClatchy Is New AP President

NEW YORK • Gary Pruitt, a former First Amendment lawyer who heads the third-largest newspaper company in the U.S., will become the next president and CEO of The Associated Press, the cooperative announced Wednesday.

Pruitt, the chairman, president and CEO of

The Mc-Clatchy Co., will join AP in July, taking over for Tom Curley, who is retiring af-



ter leading the news organization for nine years.

"In Gary, we have chosen a seasoned and worthy successor to Tom Curley to continue AP's transition to a digital news company," said William Dean Singleton, outgoing chairman of the AP Board of Directors and chairman of MediaNews Group Inc. "Gary has deep experience in the changing world of the news industry, an acute business sense and an overriding understanding of and commitment to AP's news mission."

Pruitt, 54, will take over an organization pressed by rapid changes in the news industry. AP has spent most of the past decade working to transform itself, launching new platforms for multimedia content, seeking fresh sources of revenue and protecting the results of its newsgathering in the online marketplace.

"I think AP is successfully transitioning, but the transition isn't over and it never will be," Pruitt said in an interview.

Intense pressure on many media companies has made them increasingly reliant on AP newsgathering. But to continue delivering its journalism, Pruitt said the organization must look for more revenue by expanding in Asia and other fastgrowing regions worldwide and by increasing its product offerings.

"We've got to get it right," he said. "Too many people are counting on us every day for their complete news report. We've got to be able to not just sustain it, but to grow it and improve it."

More than half the world's population sees news reported by the AP on any given day. The not-for-profit cooperative, based in New York and owned by its member newspapers, has about 3,700 employees — about two-thirds of them journalists - in more than 300 locations worldwide, including all 50 states.

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Obama, GOP Vie for Upper Hand on Energy

MALJAMAR, N.M. • Wooing a nation of increasingly angry motorists, President Barack Obama and his Republican rivals are all plunging into gas-pump politics, seeking the upper hand as energy becomes a driving issue in the election cam-

paign. The president is defending his energy agenda this week, traveling Wednesday to a solar panel plant in Nevada and oil and gas fields in New Mexico and the site of a future oil pipeline in Oklahoma that the White House is promising to accelerate. At the same time, GOP opponents from front-runner Mitt Romney on down are vigorously accusing him of stifling domestic production and betting on foolhardy alternative energy methods over traditional oil drilling.

With gasoline reaching \$3.86 a gallon in the U.S. and apparently heading higher, the public is impatient for Obama - or someone in his place – to do something about it.

In truth, a president has little direct control over gas prices, which have risen more than 50 cents a gallon since January in response to a standoff over Iran's nuclear program that has threatened to disrupt Middle East oil supplies.

Well aware of Republicans' criticism, Obama's advisers argue that voters take a sophisticated view toward energy and think about it as a problem demanding long-term answers. They know that talk about future solutions may not satisfy people as they endure high prices, but they're betting that voters will side with the candidate they trust the most to deal with the issue — and they're determined that that will be

"We're drilling all over the place," Obama said in Maljamar, N.M., in a field dot-

ted with oil rigs.

Polls show less certainty about it all. One survey this month by CBS News and The New York Times found that 54 percent of Americans felt the price of gasoline was something a president could do a lot about while 36 percent said it was beyond his control. A recent Washington Post/ABC poll found 50 percent thought the Obama administration could reasonably do something to bring down gas prices, while 45 percent felt the recent rapid rise has been beyond White House control.

Obama has repeatedly argued that drilling for new oil alone will not solve the nation's energy woes or reduce gas prices. He accuses Republicans of claiming they can "wave a magic wand" to return to the days of cheap gas, and on Wednesday, he mocked them for having a "lack of imagination" about alternative energy.

"You'd think that everybody would be supportive of solar power," Obama said from the Copper Mountain Solar 1 facility in Nevada, the largest plant of its kind in the country, with nearly 1 million solar panels. "And yet if some politicians had their way, there won't be any more public investment in solar energy. There won't be as many new jobs?"

Obama carried three of the four states on this week's itinerary - Oklahoma is one of the safest Republican states in the nation – but all four elected Republican governors in 2010. Two of the governors, Brian Sandoval of Nevada and Susana Martinez of New Mexico, have been floated as potential vice presidential choices this year. Obama was making his first visit to Oklahoma as president.

He has been hurt by his administration's decision to pump millions into California solar company Solyndra before it collapsed. And he's been repeatedly criticized by Republican presidential candidates for blocking the 1,700-mile Keystone XL pipeline, which would carry tar sands oil from western Canada to refineries along the Texas Gulf Coast.

The mere mention of Solyndra and Keystone generate instant reactions at Republican rallies.

Romney has blamed Obama for rising gasoline prices and urged the president to fire Energy Secretary Steven Chu, Interior Secretary Ken Salazar and Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Lisa Jackson, calling them the "gas hike trio."

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich has adopted \$2.50 gasoline as a central tenet of his struggling campaign, criticizing Obama for holding up the pipeline project and mocking him as "President Algae" for highlighting research into developing oil and gas from algae.

Former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum, meanwhile, regularly notes his grandfather's work as a coal miner. And he detoured his campaign to tour oil fields in North Dakota recently, labeling himself the only ardent supporter of oil drilling.

"Instead of paying twodigit dollars you're now paying three digits," Santorum said in Illinois. "When you see that zero come up, when it gets into the \$100 range, when you see that zero, think of 'O' for Obama because that's why you're paying that extra amount of money."

On Wednesday, Santorum campaigned at a company in Harvey, La., that services oil rigs in the Gulf of Mexico. He pressed the administration to open more federal lands for leases that he says would both generate revenue for the government and boost U.S. oil production.

"Here's an opportunity for us in this country to do something about it: increasing jobs, lowering energy prices, decreasing the deficit, all of the things you would think he president of the United States would be for," Santorum said.

In many ways, the issue has come full circle for the president. In 2008, candidate Obama criticized an inside-the-Beltway culture for the rise in gasoline prices. "So what have we got for all that experience? Gas that's approaching \$4 a gallon. Because you can fight all you want inside of Washington, but unless you change the way it works you won't be able to make the changes America needs," Obama said at an Indianapolis gas station in April

Bernanke Confident U.S. Banks Could Withstand Euro Shocks

WASHINGTON • Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke told a congressional panel Wednesday that U.S. banks could withstand shocks from Europe, even if the debt crisis there significantly worsened.

The U.S. banking system remains exposed to Europe, but stress tests conducted by the Fed found most banks could weather a severe recession triggered by the debt crisis, Bernanke told the House Oversight and Government Reform Commit-

to the American economy, I think we are in much better shape to meet those challenges than we were a few years ago," Bernanke told the committee.

The Fed looked at how the 19 largest U.S. bank holding companies would handle a recession that drove the unemployment rate to 13 percent and cut stock prices 50 percent. The stress tests found all but four were strong enough to survive.





Let's Go Birding

With warmer weather approaching, now might be your last chance to see wintering fowl. But don't worry, other birds are on their way.

BUHL • Along U.S. Highway 30, just a few miles west of Hagerman, is the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area where more than 100,000 ducks winter in its protected expanse of marsh, wetland, open water and treed habitat.

The WMA also has a small rest stop, which I swung into on my way back from Boise recently. In the parking lot, I met an Oregon couple traveling to Salt Lake City. They had swung into the rest area looking for a place to park.

"We were astonished at the number of ducks and geese in the water, right there by the road," said Dick Moore, 67.

"We want to try and get a better look," said his wife, Lola, 56

The Hagerman WMA has a variety of wintering ducks, including the wood duck, Northern pintail and greater scaup. Of course, you'll spot mallard ducks as well.

"These next few weeks are really the last chance of the season to catch wintering birds," said Fish and Game Regional Wildlife Biologist Rob Lonsinger.

That said, there is time to grab binoculars and a spotting scope and go birding.

southern Idaho will welcome home Ferruginous hawks. Lonsinger said the valley boasts a large breeding population of the hawks, which like to nest in Juniper and other shrub habitat.

Ferruginous hawks can be spotted in the China Mountain area, the Shoshone Basin and Raft River.

With large nests, used year after year, and just 12-14 feet off the ground, they are pretty easy to spot.

"They are pretty sensitive to disturbance so you'll definitely want to watch them with a spotting scope," Lonsinger said.

Of course, you don't have to travel far from home to enjoy winged wonders. A birding guide compiled by the Prairie Falcon Audubon Society (Idaho's local chapter) and members Karl Ruprecht and Jeff Ruprecht says several Twin Falls parks are great places for birding.

The variety of habitat, from basalt cliffs, riparian areas and shrub and marshland at Centennial Park, Dierkes Lake and Shoshone Falls Park is perfect for spotting everything from American white pelicans and great-blue herons to northern orioles, canyon wrens and song sparrows.

You may spot birds in your backyard, said chapter president Sarah Harris.

"We get some great migrating birds that pass

through here," she said. Some to watch out for: Lazuli bunting and western

SMART FISH TACTICS

Understanding biology of the largemouth is key to catching them.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • For a creature with a brain about the size of a nickle, the largemouth bass certainly gets lavish praise for being a ge-

After a frustrating day on the water, many fishermen return to the dock and make the bass out to be the Ph.D of the fish world.

But here's some news for you: The largemouth isn't nearly as smart as it might

"Some fishermen give the bass far too much credit," said Keith Jones, who is in charge of research at the Berkley Fish Research Station in Iowa. "The bass doesn't have the ability to reason. As soon as it hatches, it is genetically pre programmed to follow certain

"It relies on its senses to guide its actions. Its vision, hearing, sense of smell and taste ... that all plays a part. It's a sensory machine, and the sooner we as fishermen learn how those senses guide the bass's behavior, the more fish we will catch."

When it's time to feed, that sensory machine is fully operational.

The bass relies on its vision as its No. 1 asset. It has eyes that are specially adapted for underwater use, allowing for a wide range of vision. Jones said the bass has a maximum viewing distance of about 50 feet. But it has small binocular fields for close-up viewing to scrutinize its prey.

"We have seen many times in our research where a bass will rush across a tank at something, then stop to study it, then it will veer off," said Jones, who wrote the book "Knowing Bass: The Scientific Approach to Catching More Fish."

The bass's eyesight also determines how it sees colors. Light refraction plays an important part in how those colors are perceived. In clear

water, for example, red is one of the first colors to disappear. It turns to shades of gray as it gets deeper. But in murky water, it remains one of the most visible colors.

Whatever the case, the bass' s eyesight isn't nearly as sharp as a human's.

"The sharpness of their vision is only 10 percent of ours," Jones said. "When they look at an object, they don't see nearly the detail we

That's why bass often rely on their unique hearing system to help. They have a lateral line that runs across the body to pick up vibrations.

"The bass uses its eyesight and lateral line in combination when it is feeding," Jones said. "The lateral line is very effective in feeling local disturbances one to two body lengths away."

The bass also uses its sense of smell and taste to determine whether something should be ingested. But its eyesight and hearing are the two primary senses that determine its menu.

OK, here's where it gets

No, the bass isn't a natural brainiac. But it does have the ability to learn " from both positive and negative experi-

"If a bass follows a spinnerbait, gets a good look at it and decides to hit it and then gets stung, he's going to learn to leave it alone because of that negative experience," Jones said. "That can even carry over to group dynamics. The less aggressive bass will hang back and see what happens to the more aggressive ones when they feed.

"If bad things happen to the aggressive ones, even the bass that weren't hooked will

But not all bass behave the same way. Much the same as humans, bass are individuals, each displaying distinct behavior.

"Some individuals are programmed to be more aggressive," Jones said. "Other bass are just as dumb as a box of rocks. Those are the ones that are caught most frequently.

"But others are pre programmed to be more wary and certainly less aggressive."

A 20-year study, led by University of Illinois research David Philipp, provided the first direct experimental proof that vulnerability to angling is an inherited trait.

Beginning in the 1970s,

Philipp and his colleagues tagged and released largemouth bass in a pond in central Illinois. Some fish were caught up to 16 times a year. But when the pond was drained in the 1980s, they found that 200 of the 1,700 bass that were tagged had never been caught.

From that stock, the researchers bred groups of "high-vulnerability" and "low-vulnerability" bass. Then they stocked those fish in the same pond and repeated the experiment. Through three generations, the offspring stayed true to the parents' tendencies.

Another study in Illinois also documented a bass' s learning ability.

A total of 1,027 bass were tagged and released, then fishermen were free to have at them. It took an average of only 24 minutes to catch the first 50 bass. But by the end of the day, it took over two hours to catch one of the marked fish. By the second day, it took five to six hours, and by the third day, 10 to 15 hours. Researchers deduced that the bass were able to learn by the negative experiences of being hooked but being able to escape and see-

ing a fellow fish caught.

It's Just a Phase the Planets Are Going Through



Venus, while brilliant to the unaided eye, can be disappointing in a telescope, showing no surface features or even a break in its global cloud cover.

What it does show is a range of phases, from a thin crescent to nearly full.

Venus and Mercury, the inferior planets (i.e. closer to the sun than Earth), are the only ones capable of appearing as crescents in a telescope. Geometry demands that a planet can appear half illuminated only when its phase angle (between the planet-sun line and the planet-Earth line) is 90 degrees. Seen from Earth, an inferior planet appears half-illuminated when at its maximum angle from the sun, called great est elongation.

On Tuesday, Venus, at greatest elongation, will appear as a "half Venus" in a telescope. After that, it will become an ever-thinning crescent until it's lost in the sun's glare in late May.

Since the phase angle of planets farther from the sun than Earth never approaches 90 degrees, they always appear full or nearly full. Mars, closest of the superior planets, never appears less than 84 percent full. More distant planets are never seen below 99 percent illuminated, and thus always appear full.

The phases of Venus fig-

ure prominently in the history of astronomy.

Galileo observed Venus to traverse from full to crescent in his small telescopes over several months, which can only happen if Venus is closer to Earth than the sun at some times, and further at others. Thus, Galileo proved Copernicus's heliocentric (sun-centered) model of the solar system, and ended the reign of the Ptolemy's geocentric model that had held sway for 15 centuries.

To Galileo's great frustration, Church authorities, clinging to the geocentric view, refused to even look through his telescope to see the evidence for them-

2. Rocky Road: Near Devil's Corral, Jerome

Devil's Corral north of the Perrine Bridge in Jerome is popular for motorized dirt bikes and ATVs, but Goudy said it's too dusty and sandy for mountain biking. But another ride nearby is a good trail for intermediate bikers.

From U.S. Highway 93 north of the Perrine Bridge, take Shoshone Falls Road west. Park at the top of the grade that heads into the canyon, Goudy said, and look for a wooden fence which marks the trailhead.

"You basically meander your way across a piece of single track that we had worn in," said SIMBA member Mike McAuley, who works at the bike shop with Goudy.

The first part of the trail is overgrown, Goudy said. "But that's the funnest part."

The trail eventually widens and takes riders to Devil's Corral. In all, it's about 12 miles to the end and back, Goudy said. "It's pretty flat all the way around, but it does

seem to get kind of rocky." **Information:** Spoke and

3. Up for a Challenge? Indian Spring Road, Kimberly

Head to Indian Spring in the South Hills and you're likely to find mountain bikers, no matter what time of year. Drive south of Hansen on Rock Creek Road; turn west on 2900 North to reach Indian Spring Road.

Rock Temple of Burley said he rides Indian Spring even in winter — as long as it's not too muddy. Like Fuller, he doesn't want to cause ruts on the trail.

"Get up high around Snake Skin and Hot Shot and it's still muddy," Fuller said. "And Dry Gulch above Max, so you have to stay low this time of year."

Several technical trails wind through the hills, so riders have many options. It's not the best place to ride if you're a novice, though, because of switchbacks and inclines.

Indian Spring is a favorite for SIMBA members, especially on the club's weekly Thursday rides, Fuller said.

4. Choose Your Loop: Adam's Gulch, Ketchum

It's still too wet for mountain biking in the Wood River

Valley, said Colin Stelma of Sturtevants Mountain Outfitters in Ketchum. But come May, enthusiasts will be hitting the trails.

One of the more popular trail systems is Adam's Gulch north of Ketchum, he said. And one of that system's more popular trails is Adam's Loop, a seven-mile, single-track trail for intermediate bikers that can be accessed from the gulch's trailhead. From Ketchum, drive about 1.5 miles north on Idaho Highway 75; look for the National Forest access sign at the Adam's Gulch Road junction,

and head west. The mountain loop offers some of the area's most beautiful scenery, including woodland and wildflowers in late

spring and early summer. Adam's Loop is not your only choice, however. "There are a multitude of loops at the trailhead," Stelma said. "From there you can go off in six different directions. You can change things up. If you feel a trail wasn't hard enough for you, there's another one."

Mini-Cassia has at least three good places to mountain bike, said Rock Temple, owner of Rock's Cycling in Burley. His favorite is Cave Canyon Trail near Idaho Department of Fish and Game's Cottonwood Wildlife Management Area in Oakley.

Temple has been mountain biking for about 25 years and enjoys Cave Canyon for its challenges.

"It has some incredibly awesome single-track trails through quaking aspen," he said, noting it's a tough trail with rugged terrain and steep inclines.

The area has several 10mile loops, Temple said, plus this option: Ride the Cottonwood Trail to the South Hills.

He didn't know how many miles that is, but "it's a big, adventurous ride" that includes single track with some more expansive road sections and a rugged terrain of dirt, ruts, rocks, branches and steep hills.

If you're looking for something a bit easier for the family, he said, consider trails near Pomerelle Mountain Resort in Albion. "It's gorgeous there."

SOUTHWESTERN WIS-**CONSIN** • Richie Santiago is no stranger to commitment.

There was the hitch in the U.S. Army, which included duty in the darkness and subzero cold at the North

There's his devotion to wife Tara. And his new role as father to Kinley, the couple's 20-month-old daugh-

And when it comes to fly fishing, he's accustomed to spending the winter months tying flies in anticipation of the March early trout season.

He also fully embraces sharing the angling experience with others. For opening day 2012, that included plans to fish with Taylor Helmuth, a teenager from Wisconsin Rapids.

So March 2 when Santiago had his truck packed and pointed west to the trout fishing nirvana of Wisconsin's Driftless Area, a snowstorm wasn't likely to turn him back.

"Lots of cars in ditches," said Santiago, 28. "I considered it might not have been the brightest idea to keep going. But I was ready for tight lines, to say the least."

The Wisconsin early trout season opened March 3 and runs through April 29. The season is catch-and-release

Santiago took it slow and

with Banks, his 2-year-old Labrador retriever, riding shotgun, safely arrived in southwestern Wisconsin for his rendezvous with Hel-

A senior at Lincoln High School in Wisconsin Rapids, Helmuth, 18, loves the outdoors, including fishing, but had never fished trout in coulee country.

"I'd caught some brook trout near my home, but fishing in the Driftless was like being in a different country," said Helmuth.

Santiago developed a friendship with Taylor's brother Kelsey Helmuth, 24, while the two served in the

When Santiago transitioned out of the Army in 2011 and moved his family to Kenosha, he looked up Taylor Helmuth.

The two share a fishing

"Anything you can do to help people keep that connection to the outdoors, I'm for it," Santiago said.

Santiago grew up in a military family and moved often in his youth. Later, as a student at North Georgia College, he became an avid fly angler in the streams of the southern Appalachian Mountains.

When the Army took him to Alaska, he used his "R & R" to fish for trout and

Though he's fished across North America, Santiago said the Driftless Area of Wisconsin takes a "back seat to nowhere."

"Oh, man, it's an unbelievable gem," Santiago said. "It's such a treasure."

When he learned Helmuth had never fished the area, Santiago made plans for the two to hit the streams of Crawford, Richland and Vernon counties for the opener.

The storm moved through Wisconsin. The season dawned still, with fog hovering in the coulees, and a crisp layer of snow along the

Helmuth began fishing with a spinner. Santiago used

As the two anglers and Banks walked upstream, Santiago pointed out features in the water, including the best spots to cast.

In the first hole they fished, Helmuth tied into a brown trout. The fish was brought to hand and released.

It was the first of many.

"I was hoping to catch two or three trout the whole weekend," Helmuth said. "I caught more than that the first hour."

The pair bounced around, trying different streams in the area. The fog burned off and the sun shined on the ridges and valleys.

By afternoon the pair had caught and released more than 50 trout, Santiago said, mostly brown trout with a few brookies mixed in. The

Then, fishing a new hole, Helmuth had a hit from something entirely different.

The fish struck his spinner shortly after it hit the water, then proceeded to roll and jump on its way to the net.

Santiago knew it was special and couldn't contain his excitement.

The fish was about 10 inches long. Helmuth wondered what merited the extra

"I told him he was one lucky angler," Santiago said.

"He just caught a tiger trout." Santiago snapped a couple photos of Taylor holding the fish before it was released.

A tiger trout is a rare breed, indeed. It occurs when a male brook trout fertilizes the eggs of a female brown trout.

The coloration of the crossbreeds - which are sterile - varies, but often feature a zigzag striping on

Many Wisconsin trout anglers fish their entire lives without catching a tiger.

Santiago said he and Helmuth had a great weekend and made memories that will last for years. He was glad the storm didn't interrupt their

"At some point, I stopped offering suggestions for where he should cast and told him he should buy a lottery ticket," Santiago said. "We're both looking forward to the next outing."

Utah Woman, 101, Paraglides into Record Books

SALT LAKE CITY • A 101year-old Utah woman who ushered in her birthday with a tandem paraglide ride last year soared into the record books Tuesday.

Great-great grandmother Mary Hardison, of Ogden, has been officially recognized as the "Oldest Female to Paraglide Tandem" Guinness World Records. She has supplanted a 100-year-old woman from Cyprus who took her flight in 2007.

Hardison flew with an instructor on Sept. 1, 2011, while four generations of her family watched and cheered. The flight went smoothly and even included a few tricks that Hardison encouraged.

Hardison said she wanted to paraglide because her 75-year-old son began doing it as a hobby.

'I didn't want him to get too far ahead of me, so I decided that I'd go too," she said Tuesday.

Fear never entered the equation for Hardison, who previously rode all of the adult rides at Disneyland to celebrate her 90th birthday.

Hardison said she was shocked to learn her flight had become a world record.

"To me, I was just going on a little ride," she said. "I

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Establishment Starts to Fall in Line Behind Mitt Romney

WASHINGTON • The Republican establishment started to coalesce around Mitt Romney in earnest on Wednesday, with Jeb Bush and other leading Republicans pressuring Rick Santorum to leave the race after a thumping in the Illinois primary.

But, on what should have been a triumphant day, Romney found himself having to defend his conservative credentials anew after one of his own top advisers, Eric Fehrnstrom, remarked that "everything changes" for the fall campaign. "It's almost like an Etch A Sketch," he said. "You can kind of shake it up and we start all

The remark fueled criticism that Romney molds his principles to fit with political goals. Democrats pounced, and by day's end his GOP opponents were waving the draw, shake and erase toys at campaign events in Louisiana.

"The issues I'm running on will be exactly the same," the former Massachusetts governor said in Arbutus, Md., as Republicans and Democrats alike mocked him. "I'm running as a conservative Republican. I was a conservative governor. I will be running as a conservative Republican nominee hopefully, nominee at that point. The policies and the positions are the

It all nearly overshadowed the endorsement from Bush, the son of one president and the brother of another. He had stayed out of the race for months, and some party elders publicly had urged him to become a candidate as Romney struggled to close the deal with the conservative base of the party.

Bush refused, and on Wednesday he made his preference in the race known after Romney's double-digit Illinois victory.

Now is the time for Republicans to unite behind Gov. Romney and take our message of fiscal conservatism and job creation to all voters this fall," Bush said in a written statement. He congratulated the other Republican candidates "for a hard-fought, thoughtful debate and primary sea-

His backing comes amid fresh signs that big GOP donors and other party figures will follow Bush's lead after sitting on the sidelines for much of the primary season. Romney is on pace to win the nomination in June. He has 563 delegates in the overall count maintained by AP, out of 1,144 needed to win the party nod.

Tension Mounts at French Standoff after Three Blasts

A 23-year-old Frenchman of Algerian descent is accused of gunning down three French soldiers and four people at a Jewish school.

TOULOUSE, France • Three explosions rocked a building where Mohamed Merah, the al-Qaida-linked suspect in a string of killings in France, has been holed up for nearly 24 hours in a standoff with French

police. But an uneasy quiet returned early Thursday as balaclava-wearing police troops, members of the elite special raid team, moved among the heavy police presence in the darkened Toulouse neighborhood where Merah had sought cover. The explosions at 11:30 pm Wednesday were a police intimidation maneuver, France's Interior Ministry said, according to the BFM news channel.

The explosions had sparked speculation that police were about to storm the building.

The 23-year-old Frenchman of Algerian descent is accused of gunning down three French soldiers and four people at a Jewish school, including three children, in attacks that

have rocked the country since March 11.

Merah had told negotiators that he would turn himself in by Wednesday afternoon but kept postponing that promise.

"He has no desire to be a martyr," federal prosecutor Francois Molins told reporters earlier Wednesday. "He prefers to remain alive?

That sentiment was underlined by Interior Minister Claude Gueant, who told French television TF1 that Merah told police negotiators that he had refused orders by al-Qaida to carry out a suicide attack in France but agreed to carry out targeted killings.

Gueant said Merah received the al-Qaida orders during travels to Pakistan or Afghanistan.

Gueant also revealed more details about French intelligence's earlier suspicions about Merah. He had been interrogated in November about his travels to Pakistan and Afghanistan but had explained that the trips were for pleasure, not criminal activity.

use of photographs as evidence, that it was a tourist trip," Gueant said.

Two hours before the explosions, which flared bright orange, police doused the streetlights around the building in the leafy Toulouse suburb of Cote Pavee. Reporters were kept at a two-block distance from the scene.

Police cut off electricity and gas to the apartment, and a bomb disposal truck, ambulances and fire trucks were waiting at the ready near the scene of the stand-

Molins said Merah had confessed to the killings during negotiations and said he was motivated by a wish to "avenge Palestinian children" and protest France's overseas military operations. "He has boasted about bringing France to its knees," Molins said. "He

expresses no regret, other

than that he did not have

time for more victims." Funerals for the victims were held Wednesday in Jerusalem and at a French military base in Montauban, where President Nicolas Sarkozy spoke of a

"terrorist execution." Police focused on Merah when they identified his mother's computer IP address as one that was used to answer an online ad for a motorcycle that was posted by the first soldier victim. Special police forces then moved on the five-story apartment building where he was staying.

Was Fla. Shooter a Vigilante or Good Neighbor?

SANFORD, Fla. • George Zimmerman once took criminal justice classes at the community college and was practically a one-man neighborhood watch in his gated part of town, calling police close to 50 times over the past eight years to report such things as slow-driving vehicles, strangers loitering in the neighborhood and open garages.

Now, suddenly, people are wondering if the 28-year-old Zimmerman is an earnest if somewhat zealous young man who was just looking out for his neighborhood, or a wannabe cop who tried to take justice into his own hands.

He has been at the center of a growing furor over vigilantism, self-defense and racial profiling since he shot and killed an unarmed black teenager who was walking through his neighborhood Feb. 26 carrying only a bag of Skittles and an iced tea.

Zimmerman, a light-skinned His-

panic, has claimed self-defense in the slaying of 17-year-old Trayvon Martin and has not been charged, but many black leaders are demanding his arrest, and state and federal authorities are investigating. Florida's Stand Your Ground law on self-defense gives people wide latitude to use deadly force.

Attorneys for Martin's parents say Zimmerman is a "loose cannon." "He's a wannabe police officer,"

lawyer Benjamin Crump said. "Why did he have a gun?" But some neighbors welcomed his

vigilance, at least before the shooting.

Samantha Leigh Hamilton, an autodealership employee who has lived on Zimmerman's street for about a year, said that she once left her garage door up and Zimmerman noticed it while out walking his dog. He notified another neighbor, who let Hamilton know.

"The only impression I have of George Zimmerman is a good one," Hamilton said Wednesday.

Hamilton said another neighbor, a

black woman, would regularly inform Zimmerman when she was out of town so that he could keep an eye on her place. Hamilton said that when she moved into the middle-class, racially mixed community of about 250 identical townhouses, the black neighbor told her, "Hey, if you need anything, you picked a really good area, since George is part of our neighborhood watch?

Zimmerman, who was captain of the neighborhood watch and licensed to carry a gun, made 46 calls to police since 2004, according to department

In one police call report, the dispatcher noted that Zimmerman was calling about a vehicle "driving real slow, looking at all the other vehicles in the complex and blasting music." In another call from last August, Zimmerman reported on two black male teens in the neighborhood. He considered them suspicious.

WASHINGTON • The Army inspector general is conducting a system-wide review of mental health facilities to determine whether psychiatrists overturned diagnoses of posttraumatic stress disorder to save money, a move that comes as the case of a U.S. soldier suspected of killing 16 Afghan civilians has brought fresh attention to the strains of war. Army Secretary John McHugh told Congress on Wednesday that the service is trying to determine whether the change in diagnosis was isolated or a common practice. Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., who pressed McHugh at a committee hearing, said the forensic psychiatry unit at Madigan Army Medical Center on Joint Base Lewis-McChord is being investigated for reversing diagnoses based on the expense of providing care to military members. -Associated Press

SISTERS, Ore. (AP) • Doc Hatfield, a founder of a family ranchers beef cooperative headquartered in Oregon that became a champion of sustainable range management, has died of pancreatic cancer at

Hatfield and his wife, Connie, founded Oregon Country Beef in 1986 with 14 ranch families who were out to get higher prices for beef that wasn't raised on growth hormones or antibiotics. The co-op, now called Country Natural Beef, has grown to more than 100 ranch families in 13 states, The Capital Press reported.

Hatfield died Tuesday in Sisters, said the co-op's marketing director, Stacy Davies.

He was an advocate of such practices as high-intensity, short-duration grazing that allows pastures to recover, and restoring springs by thinning out juniper trees that were overgrown and sucking up groundwater.

Hatfield began as a veterinarian in Montana, Davies said. He brought several cattle breeds to the United States in the 1960s and was a pioneer in breeding livestock, work that played into the cooperative's beginnings.

Consumers wanted a Davies said, but the industry needed animals that would gain weight in feedlots and work well on

ranges. "He really fostered a natural business where the rancher stayed in control of the meat all the way through the system," said Country Natural Beef executive director Dan Probert. "Doc and Connie's vision was that the ranchers would own the company. Because they were such selfless people, they were able to make that model work?'

Hatfield was a founding member of what became the Governor's Watershed Enhancement Board. Davies said it was a revolutionary idea to bring together agency representatives, ranchers, industry members and environmental groups, focusing them on a healthy, working landscape.

"One of Doc's favorite sayings is, 'If it's already been done, it's not worth doing again," Davies said. "He was always looking for a way that would recognize the diversity of a group of people and make diversity a strength, using the collective wisdom of a group?"

Hatfield is survived by his wife and two children.

Move-in Before Marriage No Longer Predicts Divorce

ATLANTA • Nearly half of first marriages break up within 20 years, a new government study finds. With those odds, you might wonder: Would we be better off living together first?

The new research, part of a marriage survey of 22,000 men and women, suggests times have changed from the days when living together signaled poor chances for a successful marriage later.

"It's not playing as big a role in predicting divorce as it used to," said Casey Copen, lead author of the study.

Living together before marriage has been a longgrowing trend. In the late 1960s, only about 10 percent of U.S. couples moved in together first, and they ended up with higher divorce rates.

Today, about 60 percent of couples live together before they first marry.

"It's becoming so common, it's not surprising it no longer negatively affects marital stability," said Wendy Manning, co-director of the National Center for Family & Marriage Research at Bowling Green State University in Ohio.

Researchers with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention looked for trends in first marriages. They interviewed men and women ages 15 to 44 during the years 2006 to 2010. About 40 percent were married.

The study found those who were engaged and living together before the wedding were about as likely to have marriages that lasted 15 years as couples who hadn't lived together.

But what about the couples who were living together but weren't engaged? The new study found marriage was less likely to survive to the 10- and 15-year mark among couples who weren't engaged when they lived together - findings similar to earlier research.

For example, for women, there was about a 60 percent likelihood a marriage would survive 15 years if the couple either hadn't lived together before the wedding or were engaged while they were sharing the same living

But if no firm marriage commitment was made while she and her boyfriend were living together, the likelihood the marriage would last 15 years fell to 53 percent. The numbers were similar

Potential explanations include more lax attitudes about commitment, lower education levels or family histories that made these couples more pessimistic about marriage, Copen said.

The experience of living together before marriage is different for different people, said Richard Settersten Jr., an Oregon State University professor of human development and family science.

Some young people put off marriage because they're pursuing a college education and starting a career. For them, "cohabitation is a trial marriage, usually without kids, that often ends in marriage," Settersten said.

Others - in many cases, people not on a college track - move from one living-together relationship to another, some of them producing children, he said.

When police officers arrived, Martin was lifeless, face down on the ground, while Zimmerman was bleeding from his head and his back was covered in grass, as if he had been on the ground, the police report said. Sanford police issued a

statement Wednesday defending their decision not to arrest Zimmerman. They said that when officers arrived, he claimed self-defense, "which at the time was supported by physical evidence and testimony?"

The police chief said Zimmerman claimed he was attacked by Martin after he had given up his chase and was returning to his truck.

In a letter to the Orlando Sentinel, Zimmerman's father said his son wasn't a racist. Zimmerman's mother is Hispanic. "He would be the last to discriminate for any reason whatsoever,' Robert Zimmerman wrote.

NFL Throws Book at Saints over 'Bountygate'

Meting out unprecedented punishment for a crushfor-cash bounty system that targeted key opposing players, the NFL suspended New Orleans Saints head coach Sean Payton without pay for next season and indefinitely banned the team's former defensive coordinator,

Gregg Williams. Payton is the first head coach suspended by the league for any reason, accused of trying to cover up a system of extra cash payouts that NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell on Wednesday called "particularly unusual and egregious" and "totally unacceptable."

Sending a message by taking a harsh stand, Goodell also banned Saints general manager Mickey Loomis for the first eight regular-season games next season — believed to be the first time a GM was suspended by the NFL – and assistant coach Joe Vitt for the first six games.

In addition, Goodell fined the Saints \$500,000 and took away their second-round draft picks this year and next.

"We are all accountable and responsible for player

health and safety and the integrity of the game. We will not tolerate conduct or a culture that undermines those priorities," said Goodell, whose league faces more than 20 concussion-related lawsuits brought by hundreds of former players. "No one is above the game or the rules that govern it."

Payton, whose salary this season was to be at least \$6 million, ignored instructions from the NFL and Saints ownership to make sure bounties weren't being paid. The league also chastised him for choosing to "falsely deny that the program existed," and for trying to "encourage the false denials by instructing assistants to 'make sure our ducks are in a row."

All in all, Goodell's ruling is a real blow to the Saints, a franchise that Payton and quarterback Drew Brees revived and led to the 2010 Super Bowl title after decades of such futility that fans wore paper bags over their heads at home

Brees reacted quickly to the news on Twitter, writing: "I am speechless. Sean Payton is a great man, coach, and mentor. ... I

Who will replace three starters on the O-line? The Vandals lost starting guard Sam Tupua and tackles Matt Cleveland and Tyrone Novikoff to graduation. And three possible fill-ins — Spencer Beale, Kyle Salm and Ben Westrum — will either be limited or miss spring with injuries.

Idaho will lean on center Mike Marboe and guard A.J. Jones, as well as veterans Guy Reynolds and Jordan Johnson. Brady Lisoski and newcomer Nick Von Rotz are candidates for starting tackle jobs, while Dallas Sandberg and Cody Elenz have impressed Akey with the gains they've made in the weight room.

"We're going to have a lot of opportunity and a lot of work for this crew this spring," Akey said. "And obviously that's going to be very, very important. Just as important as who the starting quarterback is going to be."

What about the skill positions? The Vandals lacked explosiveness on offense last year, and they lost two of their key playmakers — Kama Bailey and Princeton McCarty. Akey hopes Ryan Bass, finally healthy after transferring from Arizona State, will emerge at running back to lead a group that includes newcomer James Baker and redshirt freshmen Todd Handley and Justin Parkins.

At receiver, Idaho will be without top wideout Justin Veltung (turf toe) in spring and slot receiver Marcel Posey (broken wrist) will be limited. Senior-to-be Mike Scott is the top healthy returner.

Can the defense continue its improvement? By far the most stable unit is Idaho's defense, which returns all but a few key starters and welcomes back linebacker Robert Siavii and safety Thaad Thompson after yearlong knee injuries.

Bobcats Get Long-awaited Breakthrough: Sweet 16

ATHENS, Ohio • Walter Luckett arrived in the '70s, made a magazine cover and created a stir, but left without getting the Bobcats very far.

Gary Trent morphed into the "Shaq of the MAC" in the '90s, taking the program to national heights that didn't translate at tournament time.

Ohio University went 48 years looking for more than one shining moment in the NCAA tournament, going through seven coaches and a handful of stars without advancing past that opening weekend. It's finally changed for the school nestled in the hills of southeast Ohio.

The Bobcats have become the tournament's latest mid-major darlings, knocking off Michigan and South Florida to reach the round of 16 for the first time since 1964. They'll play North Carolina on Friday in St. Louis.

The long wait has made it sweet indeed.

"It's very warming," Trent said in a phone interview from Minneapolis, where he's an elementary school intervention specialist. "It's so great to see them advance. There's only 16 teams playing in the country, and Ohio U. happens to be one of them."

Even though the school was on spring break, the students still around campus jammed Court Street after the 13th-seeded Bobcats ousted Michigan in their opening game. Then, the Mid-American Conference tournament champions topped the Big East's best defensive team for another celebration that got more than just the town talking.

"This has been unreal," said Walter Offutt, a transfer from Ohio State. "Let's continue the run."

Their win on Sunday became an immediate talking point. Clark Kellogg was calling the Lehigh-Xavier game when Ohio finished off the Bulls, giving him a chance to exult on the air. Kellogg's son, Nick, is a sophomore guard for the Bobcats.

"Oh wow!" Kellogg said. "Oh my goodness! Way to go Bobcats!"

The postgame celebration was shown on TBS and got more rave reviews. School President Roderick J. McDavis, dressed in a green Ohio jacket, gave players a pep talk: "I told you a few weeks ago there was another level!"

Now, the school has something to talk about other than parties and potatoes.

Ohio, which is known regionally for its annual Halloween party, was ranked the top party school in the country by the 2011 Princeton Review last summer, an annoyance to administrators who have been trying to change that image.

"Honestly, I don't know where that party thing comes from," Trent said. "I've been on other college campuses. It's no more wild than any other."

The football program got its first bowl victory in December, beating Utah State

24-23 in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl with a touchdown drive in the last 2 minutes.

The basketball team was looking for a breakthrough as well - that Sweet 16 thing. Ohio had a chance in 2010 when it beat Georgetown 97-83 in its opening game, then played poorly in an 83-68 loss to Tennessee.

Coach John Groce, who helped Thad Matta take teams to the tournament as an assistant at Butler, Xavier and Ohio State, changed his betweengame approach this time to limit the distractions. He took away their cell phones and limited their internet access between games.

"It wasn't punishment," Groce said. "They did have a couple of hours after they got back to return some of their text messages and emails and tweets and Facebook and MySpace and email, whatever else they do. So we gave them time to do that.

"Then we grabbed the phones, and not one guy that's how I knew this team was really locked in - not one single guy complained."

Groce is getting much credit for the long-awaited breakthrough. "The biggest thing for

him - and he's done a great job of it - is getting his team to play at the right time," Ohio State's Matta said. "As crazy as it sounds, if they don't win the MAC tournament, they're not in the NCAA tournament. That's something he and I had spoken about going into the MAC tournament, knowing that hey, we've got to play our best basketball."

Ohio's last trip to the round of 16 in 1964 included wins over Louisville and Kentucky followed by a loss to Michigan. They lost opening games in 1965, 1970, 1972 and 1974. Ohio beat Illinois State in 1983, then lost to Kentucky. The Bobcats also had opening losses in 1985, 1994 and 2005. They've been ranked in

the AP poll during only four seasons in their history. Ohio was No. 18 for one week during the 1959-60 season, was consistently ranked and made it up to No. 5 during the 1969-70 season - followed by a first-round NCAA loss to Notre Dame – and was ranked for one week during the 1971-72 season, just before Luckett arrived.

The Bobcats also were in the poll during the 1994-95 season, making it as high as No. 14 behind Trent, a three-time MAC scoring champ.

After a big false start, the New York Jets on Wednesday got the quarterback who turned the Denver Broncos from an also-ran into a playoff team last season and became the NFL's most talkedabout player - for a fourthand six-round draft pick. Now Tebowmania is

opening on Broadway.

Eight hours after initially agreeing to a deal, the teams completed the trade that was hung up earlier Wednesday when the Jets apparently balked at repaying Denver more than \$5 million for a salary advance due Tebow. ESPN reported that the two sides had agreed to split that

Despite ultimately pulling off the deal, it was just another bizarre moment for the Jets, a team that has had its share of them over the years, conjuring memories of Bill Belichick's hiring as coach and his resignation one day

The Jets certainly will have lots of explaining to do as "Timsanity" now will take over New York, just a

few weeks after "Linsanity" swept the New York area and the rest of the NBA with the Knicks' sensational Jeremy Lin.

But not everyone's a fan. Hall of Fame quarterback Joe Namath, who led the Jets to their only Super Bowl title in 1969, was

among those unhappy. "I'm just sorry that I can't agree with this situation. I think it's just a publicity stunt. I can't go with it. I think it's wrong," Namath told 1050 ESPN Radio on Wednesday. "I don't think they know

what they're doing over there."

Denver started shopping Tebow after signing Peyton Manning, and the Jets were considered a long shot as late as Tuesday night. But New York went hard after Tebow, envisioning him as a versatile complement to starter Mark Sanchez, who received a \$40.5 million contract extension, with \$20.5 million guaranteed, earlier this month. The Jets also had pursued Manning, but fell out of that race early when there wasn't mutual interest.

Alex Smith Signs Three-year Deal with 49ers

SANTA CLARA, Calif. • No hard feelings on Alex Smith's part that the San Francisco 49ers pursued Peyton Manning.


In the end, Smith is right back where he expected to be all along - with the only franchise he has ever known.

The free agent quarterback signed his three-year deal with the 49ers at last on Wednesday. It will pay him \$8 million per season with \$16.5 million guaranteed, according to a person with knowledge of the contract.

The person, who spoke on condition of anonymity Wednesday because the contract details weren't made public, said Smith's deal can pay him up to \$33 million.

Smith signed at team headquarters a day after Manning was formally introduced in Denver after the 49ers pursued the four-time NFL MVP. San Francisco coach Jim Harbaugh worked out Manning at Duke last week.

"Not offended at all. I would have relished the opportunity to compete for the starting quarterback job with Peyton Manning," Smith said. "I feel I've been through way worse than this. Free agency is always going to be a little crazy, maybe this year more than most. You get to a point you stop worrying about that stuff."

The 27-year-old Smith met with Miami on Sunday but ultimately decided to stay put with the storied franchise that drafted him first overall in 2005. Smith said his talks with the Dolphins during a 5 ½-hour meeting "seemed serious at the time."

Smith said Harbaugh and general manager Trent Baalke came to see him to inform the quarterback they were going to pursue Man-

things happen," Smith said. Everybody involved seemed relieved Wednesday to move ahead with preparations for 2012. The 49ers last week added wide receivers Randy Moss and Mario Manningham — and Smith is eager to get to work with them soon.

"Thanks for choosing the 49ers Alex. Sorry it was a tough week," 49ers CEO Jed York said Wednesday on Twitter.

Smith had a breakthrough season last year, throwing for 3,150 yards and 17 touchdowns to help San Francisco reach the NFC title game.

The Saints now must decide who will coach the team in Payton's place – his suspension takes effect April 1 – and who will make roster moves while Loomis is out. 

"The bounty thing is completely unprofessional. I'm happy the league has made it known it won't be tolerated," said left tackle Jordan Gross, Newton's teammate on the Carolina Panthers. "To think that something like that would happen - guys trying to hurt someone to make a few extra bucks - is just appalling. I mean we have a lot on the line, every single one of us. ... You don't want to see anyone taken out a game."

PROPOSED CITY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF RICHFIELD, IDAHO,
PROVIDING FOR THE CONTROL OF BACKFLOW AND
CROSS CONNECTIONS TO THE CITY POTABLE WATER SUPPLY. REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RICHFIELD, IDAHO:

SECTION 1: The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the public potable water supply of Richfield, Idaho from the possibility of contamination or pollution, by isolating within the customer's internal distribution system(s) or the customer's private water system(s) such contaminates or pollution that could backflow into the public water system.

Furthermore, to promote the elimination or control of existing cross connections, actual or potential between the customer's in-plant potable water system(s) and non-potable water systems, plumbing fixtures and industrial piping systems; and,

To provide for the maintenance of a continuing program of cross connection control that will systematically and effectively prevent the contamination or pollution of all potable water systems.

The City Superintendent shall be responsible for the protection of the public potable water distribution system from contamination or pollution due to the backflow of contaminates or pollutants through water service connections. If, in the judgment of said official, or any other agent of the City of Richfield, an approved backflow-prevention assembly is required, at the customer's water service connection or within the customer's private water system, for the safety of the water system, such official, or his or her designated agent shall give notice in writing to said customer to install such an approved backflow prevention assembly at specific locations on his or her premises.

SECTION 2: The City Superintendent, or his or her agent, in charge of the water department of the City of Richfield is invested with the authority and responsibility for the implementation of an effective cross-connection control program and for the enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance and any other laws, rules, or regulations approved by the Department of Environmental Quality regarding crossconnections.

SECTION 3: No water service connection to any premises shall be installed or maintained by the water user unless the water supply is protected as required by state, federal, or local laws and regulations. Service of water to any premises shall be discontinued by the City of Richfield if a backflow prevention assembly required by any state, federal, or local, law, rule, or regulation is not installed, tested and maintained, or if it is found the backflow prevention assembly has been removed, bypassed, or if an unprotected cross connection exists on the premises. Service will not be restored until such conditions or defects are corrected.

The customer's system should be open for inspection at all reasonable times to authorized representatives of the City of Richfield to determine whether cross connections or other structural or sanitary hazards, including violations of DEQ regulations exist. When such a condition becomes known, the City of Richfield shall deny or immediately discontinue service to the premises by providing for a physical break in the service line until the customer has corrected the condition in conformance with federal, state, and city rules and regulations relating to plumbing and water supplies and regulations adopted pursuant thereto.

SECTION 4: All presently installed backflow prevention assemblies that do not meet the requirements of current regulations, but were approved assemblies for the purpose described herein, at the time of installation and that have been properly maintained, shall, except for the inspection and maintenance requirements under this ordinance, be excluded from the requirements of such rules and ordinances, so long as the City of Richfield is assured they will satisfactorily protect the utility system. Whenever the existing assembly is moved from its present location, requires more than minimal maintenance, or when the City Superintendent, or his or her agent, finds that the maintenance constitutes a hazard to health, the unit shall be replaced by an approved backflow prevention assembly meeting the requirements of this section. SECTION 5: This ordinance is hereby declared to be severable.

Should any portion of this ordinance but declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect and shall be read to carry out the purposes of this ordinance before the declaration of partial invalidity. SECTION 6: All provisions of the current Municipal Code or

ordinances of the City of Richfield which conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the City of Richfield, Idaho, in conflict with this ordinance or any part hereof are especially repealed hereby.

SECTION 7: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication as provided by law.



No matter what came back, declarer could arrange to draw trump and run the hearts.

But at the other two tables, on auctions very similar to the one shown, West led a low club. Since the lead could equally have been from length or shortage, both declarers went up with the ace and ruffed a red suit to hand to play trump from the top, hoping for a 4-3 spade split. They both went down a trick when spades did not

From a psychological and mathematical perspective, I believe both players misplayed the hand. The chance that West held a singleton club is no better than 15 percent, and, especially on this auction, you would surely expect a club lead, no matter what West had in the suit. The best play is to duck the ace and try to win the club in hand. If you do so, draw trump in five rounds, discarding the club ace from dummy, and knock out the club king for a painless 12 tricks. If the club king is to your right, you will still survive, so long as there is no immediate club ruff.


