Building a Bigger Twin Falls

Residential, commercial construction setting a fast pace after the slowest year in recent history.

TWIN FALLS • The nail guns are busy at 449 Arrow St. in south Twin Falls.

Workers on the roof attach moisture barrier sheeting for a base under shingles. Inside, others tend to the house's frame. Seven men labor in various capacities on the Wolverton Homes construction site, including project manager Ryan Sawers, who oversees the activity.

The scene is being replicated many places across town during the current upturn in residential and commercial building.

"We have 12 projects going now and six more submitted to the city that we haven't heard back about," Sawers said. "Things have really picked up. It's better this spring than it's been for three years?

Wolverton isn't alone. Several contractors and sub-contractors are working at a fast pace, evidenced by recent building permit



IDAHO LEGISLATURE INCHES TOWARD TAX CUT COMPROMISE

The long-held House tax bill will get a hearing today, while budget-setters prepare to prop up state savings.

BOISE • Now, we're getting somewhere.

Senate Republicans came out of a Wednesday morning caucus without having reached consensus on how much money to set aside for tax cuts and savings. But later in the day, the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee made a compromise budget to accommodate both, signaling progress in the Legislature's move toward adjournment.

Tax relief and propping up state savings are the two major issues left for the Legislature to resolve before the session ends. Senate Republican Caucus Chairman Russ Fulcher, R-Meridian, said many senators would rather see most of the money go toward replenishing the state's reserve accounts, which were depleted during the economic downturn.

But tax cuts have been a big priority for both Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and the House, which passed a \$35 million income tax cut earlier in the session.

Initially, Senate Local Government and Taxation Committee Chairman Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home, wasn't planning on hearing

the House tax cut bill, saying he'd prefer to put as much money as possible into savings.

But after the Wednesday caucus, Corder announced a change of plans, saying he would hold a Thursday morning hearing for the House tax bill.

That doesn't mean it will pass, but Corder wouldn't speculate on the meeting's outcome. With that uncertainty, the Joint FinanceAppropriations Committee met Wednesday afternoon to set aside money for the state's savings.

The committee adopted flexible language that put at least \$23 million into the budget stabilization fund and \$21 million into the public education stabilization fund, regardless of the outcome of tax legislation. Any leftover Please see LEGISLATURE, A2

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Be Prepared for May Primary Elections

What you need to know before heading to the polls.

TWIN FALLS • With the May 15 primary elections looming, it's time to start thinking about voting.

Across the Magic Valley, candidates will seek your vote in 21 contested elections. Ranging from the Democratic and GOP candidates for Idaho's District 2 House seat in Congress, to a plethora of county races, there'll be plenty on area ballots when voters head to the polls.

Here's what you need to do to get ready to vote:

How Do I **Register?**

If you're 18 and a legal Idaho resident who will have lived here for 30 days prior to the election, you can register to vote at your local county clerk's office until 5 p.m. April 20.

You can also register at the polls on the day of the election. Here's what you'll need:

 Valid photo identification Proof of residence

People who have lost their

voting rights due to a felony conviction may not register.

What's New This Year?

For the first time in Idaho election history, the Republican party will hold a closed primary. What's that mean for you?

Well, if you want to vote for a GOP candidate in any of the 19 contested area Republican races, you'll need to

be a registered Republican. Last year, the Idaho GOP party decided to go to a closed primary system, arguing that an open primary diluted the party's nominees for the November general election.

The Democratic primary remains open.

Will I Vote for a Presidential Nominee?

No. That's what this year's caucuses were for. Mitt Romney already won Idaho's nod for the GOP nomination, while Gem State Democrats will select their choice during their April 14 caucus.

With President Barack Obama eligible for a second term, the Democratic caucus isn't likely to stir as much interest as the GOP's Super Tuesday version.

What If I Want to Vote Absentee?

Once the ballots are set, likely by next Monday, people will be able to start filling out in-person absentee ballots at their county clerk's office through 5 p.m. May 11. Applications for mailed absentee ballots are due by May 9, and are available at county clerks' offices and Idahovotes.gov.

School Leadership, Technology Highlight Boise State Project

TWIN FALLS • Creating "21st-century classrooms" is a focus for eight south-central Idaho school districts participating in a statewide leadership project.

Boise State University's new Idaho Leads Project provides training to teams of employees from nearly 50 school districts and public charter schools. The idea is to advance education reform and ultimately, student achievement.

The Twin Falls School District plans to use information from project sessions to shape what goes on in classrooms.

Spokeswoman Beth Pendergrass – who is one of the district's team members said the first regional session in February in Sun Valley focused largely on increasing school leadership.

"As we move forward in the 21st century, how do we get our team members on board?" she said.

Each school district participating in the Idaho Leads Project has a 10-member team - including school board members, administrators, teachers and students.

Besides Twin Falls, other area school districts participating are Blaine County, Cassia County, Gooding, Jerome, Minidoka County, Buhl and Castleford.

The 18-month project is funded through a \$3.85 million grant from the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Foundation. School districts don't receive any money, but the grant covers attendance costs at four regional conferences.

Buhl Superintendent Byron Stutzman said one idea he took away from the first meeting was about the role a school district plays in its community.

"We would like to see the school district being the center of the community again," he said about Buhl. "I think that's an important piece."

In Twin Falls, Pendergrass said the school district is trying out a couple of ideas from the first session, though it has no specific plan in place.

One trial idea adds a "technology tool" section to the monthly employee newsletter with suggestions teachers can use in their classroom.

A larger goal is creating the "21st-century classrooms," which involves reevaluating teaching strategies. Technology is a piece of that.

How students are taught in classrooms is shaped partly by research-based methods. That doesn't always work with quickly changing technology, however.

Pendergrass said many teachers are using interactive whiteboards and other specialized software in their classroom.


With new state initiatives, students and teachers alike will be using more technology in coming years.

Each year through 2017, school districts and public charter schools will receive \$32 per student from the Idaho State Department of Education to spend on classroom technology.

Plus, one-third of high schools a year will receive a mobile device for each student starting in fall 2013 – likely, a laptop computer.

Most Magic Valley school districts, including Twin Falls, applied to be in the first round. The ISDE plans to select schools by the end of this school year.

This fall, all teachers and school principals will get a mobile device and state training on how to use it.

both of those jobs, starting in two weeks. Thomson believes it will speed up the permitting process.

"Right now it's a struggle to keep up," he said.

Thomson, the city building official, theorizes that Twin Falls' big commercial projects have stimulated residential construction. That's led by Chobani's new 1 millionsquare-foot plant on Kimberly Road, scheduled for completion this year. "That's been good for us, and good news creates positive feedback," Thomson said. The vogurt production company will help the area in another way, said Melinda Anderson, city economic development director. Chobani uses so much milk as its main ingredient that it will spur a "huge economic impact" to local dairy farmers and the Magic Valley in general, she said. Anderson noted that a state study projects Chobani's employment and the effect on services it uses will account for 3,000 new jobs and a billion-dollar impact to the area within three years. Another big project will break ground this year when Glanbia Foods builds a 35,000square-foot office and 15,000-square-foot research and development facility at the former Kruzer's Nightlife nightclub location. "It will make a big impact on downtown," Anderson said, "and their new facility will have room to grow."

State OKs Funds for Victim **Notification System**

BURLEY • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has signed a bill into law to permanent ly fund a system to notify crime victims of changes to their tormenters' status.

Under the new law, misdemeanor offenders will pay an additional \$10 to a victim fund that will cover the state's participation in the Victim Information and Notification Everyday - or VINE system offered through the Idaho Sheriffs' Association. The system will provide registrants with phone or email notification of their related offender's incarceration, court status, transfer or escape.

Collection of the fees will begin July 1, the start of the state's new fiscal year.

"This allows the victims to remain informed about the offender's status," said Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd.

Jerome County Sheriff's Deputy Spencer Lewis said the notification system gives victims and their families a chance to take action to protect themselves when their offender is released from jail or prison.

"For the victims of violent crimes, it gives them a feeling of security and safety and of transparency, so they are not left in the dark," he said.

Idaho Sheriffs' Association Victim Services Coordinator Tammara Slater said the program has been managed by the ISA since 2009 and is currently funded by grants from the federal Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance. The ISA contracts with Appriss Inc., which sent out and 22,000 notifications to Idahoans last year. Anyone can register for notification.

The new \$10 fee is expected to raise about \$525,000 yearly for the program. The amount is based on the state's an av-

ern Idaho gymnasium.

Also, Jerome High School's class of 2003 has set up the Dan Brown Memorial Fund. Donations can be made at any Wells Fargo branch until April 6 or at tonight's event.

Several things are prompting the building boom. Contractor James Ray points to the relatively low cost of lumber and labor, factors that have resulted in "building prices as low as I've seen in 15 years."

Another Suspect to Face Trial in Wendy's Robbery

JEROME • A second suspect in a January armed robbery of the Jerome Wendy's restaurant will face a trial. Branden Alexan-

der Galbreath, 20, of Galbreath Jerome, has been accused of aiding and abetting in the crime and was charged with grand theft, burglary, robbery, battery, second-degree kidnapping, aggravated assault, and conspiracy to commit robbery.

Admitted robber Nick Maria, 18, testified at a Wednesday preliminary hearing that Galbreath knew Maria and alleged accomplice Taylor Cnossen, 19, were going to rob Wendy's the night of Jan. 26. Maria also said Galbreath waited in the car while the other two entered the restaurant to rob \$900 from its manager at gunpoint, then asked for \$100 of the stolen money once back at Maria's house.

For cooperating with police and testifying, Maria has been offered a place in the state's retained-jurisdiction program and has not yet been arrested or charged in the case.

Jerome Police Detective Dan Kennedy also testified at the hearing about an interview with Galbreath.

In both cases, testimony cited Cnossen, Maria, Galbreath, Jorge Alatorre-Banuelos and Cesar Granados as all hearing the plans for the robbery. Galbreath and Maria differed on a few details such as who owned the gun used in the robbery. Maria testified the gun was provided by Galbreath, Galbreath while told Kennedy the gun belonged to Maria's mother.

Kennedy said he discovered Maria's mother owns a

BY ALISON GENE SMITH black, .22 caliber handgun similar to the one described as used in the robbery.

Defense attorney Stacy DePew argued prosecutors did not have enough evidence to show Galbreath actively participated in the crime. Simply being present during the announcement and then waiting in the car were not enough to show that he was aiding and abetting,

she argued. Cnossen Jerome County

Magistrate Judge Tom Borresen also questioned whether Galbreath's mere presence could be shown to be aiding in the crime, but said he could see how a jury would decide so and ordered the case to be heard in district court on April 23.

Cnossen was charged with grand theft, burglary, robbery, battery and false imprisonment. A district court hearing is scheduled for April 2.

Galbreath was also arraigned Feb. 13 in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on a count of grand theft by possession and/or disposing of stolen property. Alatorre-Banuelos was arraigned earlier that month on a count of burglary. The two were accused of stealing a laptop, jewelry and a handgun from a Twin Falls residence and then pawning the items.

At Wednesday's hearing, Borresen lowered Galbreath's bond from \$250,000 to \$50,000. He also ordered Galbreath to have no contact with Maria, Alatorre-Banuelos or Granados and said he must not enter the Jerome Wendy's restaurant.

After the hearing, Kennedy said he filed the same seven charges as Galbreath faces against Granados and Alatorre-Banuelos earlier Wednesday.

Health District to Seek **Boost from Counties**

TWIN FALLS • Facing a budget deficit, the South Central Public Health District is setting out to request more funds from its county contributors.

During Wednesday's board meeting, Director Rene LeBlanc explained that rising health insurance costs and unexpected employee hires increased the district's spending. This leaves an almost \$170,300 deficit for next year's budget.

SCPHD is now looking to increase its \$1 million in county contributions by 2 percent. The increase would still leave the district with a \$150,000 deficit, but it would help keep it from dipping too much into its reserves,

LeBlanc said.

However, board members who are seated county commissioners expressed concern that counties may not have the extra funds to spare.

"Two percent is reasonable," said Terry Kramer, a Twin Falls County commissioner. "But with less money coming from the state, I don't know what might happen."

The district had cut six employee positions to help stay within budget. However, LeBlanc was soon forced to hire two more employees to ensure the district could adequately perform services and spend needed time billing for reimbursements.

"We have reached a point where if we cut any more staff, we'll have to cut programs," he said. "We will be using our reserves."

Board members won't officially set the budget until April, giving time for LeBlanc to submit his funding requests to all eight counties within the district.

Board members also moved to sell the SCPHD Rupert office location to Minidoka Memorial Hospital.

The three employees there would move to the Burley of fice and shuttle into Rupert for vaccinations and other services.

However, board member Cheryl Juntunen expressed concern that selling the location could send the message that SCPHD is abandoning the area.

"I do think there's a worry we're not coming back," Juntunen said. "So I think we need to make it clear that we're going to still be there."

New Lawyer for Walmart Robbery Suspect

RUPERT • A co-conspirator in the November armed robbery of the Burley Walmart lost his attorney Wednesday after threatening to report him to the Idaho State Bar Association.

Tommy Dean Nash was charged with felony criminal conspiracy to commit robbery and burglary, along with aggravated battery and injury to a child stemming from the Nov. 23, 2011, armed robbery of the store. He appeared via video conference before Minidoka County Fifth District Magistrate Judge Rick Bollar Wednesday and said he didn't understand what was going on regarding his attorney.

"I only saw him twice for a few minutes at a time," said Nash, on why he threatened to report Clayne

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Bollar appointed public defender Daniel Brown to represent Nash, 37, and ordered a new magistrate preliminary hearing. Bollar said he would not allow Nash to "circulate" among defense attorneys by threatening them.

Co-defendant Robert Joseph Lambert, who faces the same charges, waived his preliminary hearings and will face a June 20 jury trial.

Minidoka County Prosecutor Lance Stevenson said a warrant has also been issued for the arrest of a third suspect in the case.

Nash and Lambert were arrested for allegedly attempting to make off with a store cash cart containing more than \$50,000.

According to court records, the men allegedly parked on the south end of the store so Nash could enter to scope out the car's location. Lambert then allegedly donned a mask or hood and forcefully took the cart from an employee.

As he neared the south exit, he allegedly hit a shopping cart with an infant in it, which struck the mother of the child and careened across the floor, nearly throwing the infant to the ground. The child's father allegedly confronted Lambert, who pulled a knife and stabbed the father.

Another shopper al-legedly tried to help the father subdue Lambert and take the knife before he was arrested. Nash left the scene and was later arrested in Gooding County.





T.F. Man Arraigned on Felony Battery Charges

The woman told police Sikain had tied her hands behind her back using a cellphone charger cord and proceeded to strike her with a belt, punch her, kick her and throw her against a wall. The woman said she was able to escape and told a roommate to call police.

When and officer later found Sikain at a home in the 600 block of Polk Street, he said Sikain smelled of alcohol. According to court records Sikain said he had had about six beers at 3 p.m. Police say Sikain told them he and the woman had an argument and she began to strike herself in the back with a wire.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled for April 6.

Those Without Affiliation Don't Always Reject God

he Rise of the Nones" is one of 10 trends changing American life, according to Time magazine's March 12 cover story. That's because the "nones" those who mark "none" on surveys that ask them to identify their religious affiliation - are the fastestgrowing religious group in the United States.

Not surprisingly, the increase in the unaffiliated comes at the expense of America's mainstream religions, which means that Christianity is taking the biggest hit. Mainstream Protestant churches have lost more than a third of their members since 1960. Evangelical churches are also feeling the pinch; Southern Baptists are hurting. Various surveys illuminate this trend: About 75 percent of Americans between the ages of 18 and 29 now consider themselves "spiritual but not religious." Furthermore, all traditional forms of Christian practice have sharply declined from previous decades (including church attendance, Bible study and prayer), and doubts are much sharper regarding traditional Christian beliefs. Although a recent bumper crop of pundits likes to proclaim that we'd all be better off with no religion, I suspect that the majority of us believe that religion, in spite of its flaws, offers individuals the inspiration to be better people and to create a better nation. Seminary and church leaders, in particular, are highly motivated to staunch the decline. Unfortunately, many of them believe that what's really needed is a return to the "faith of our fathers," stricter adherence to creeds and (this is America, after all) better marketing methods. I advocate a radically different solution: the Emerging Church. It's a movement based on understanding the reasons for mainstream religion's dramatic

decline: improved scientific understanding, changing social norms, an increasingly pluralistic religious culture and more freedom to doubt and question - a freedom that until the last three centuries was mostly absent or suppressed and that is still resisted, sometimes violently, in much of the world today.

In my experience, the nones are not rejecting God. They are rejecting doctrinal requirements that they no longer find believable, along with the rigid structures of many organized religions. For that reason, the rise of the nones may well be a new kind of spiritual awakening, one in which doubters are welcome. In the Christian tradition, for example, the Emerging Church invites participation from all who find themselves attracted to the teachings, actions and person of Jesus. It isn't crucial that members call themselves Christians, or that they believe Bible stories literally (rather than metaphorically), or even that they are believers rather than agnostics and atheists. As long as people want to sincerely engage with the teachings of Jesus and with the communities that seek to live by those values - "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you," "Love your neighbor," "Blessed are the peacemakers" - they are welcome. Given that there are already almost 10,000 religions in the world, Jewish author Eric Weiner writes that we need to "invent not a new religion but, rather, a new way of being religious." As the dean of a theology school, I see the Emerging Church attracting an incredible diversity of people into new and experimental

kinds of religious community. The lapsed faithful, exhausted refugees from mainline faiths, former evangelicals, frustrated Catholics and seekers with no background at all in or ganized religion are creating (in Weiner's beautiful phrase) "a religious space that celebrates doubt, encourages experimentation and allows one to utter the word God without embarrassment."

The leaders of the movement share a common fascination with the radical teachings of Jesus, but the communities they form vary widely. Meeting sites range from homes to pubs to parks to churches to convention centers. These groups aren't rigidly hierar-

reality is understood (or doubted) by each of their members.

Emerging Christians don't have a monopoly on spirituality for the nones, however. L.A.'s East Side Jews often meet for discussion, comedy nights or outreach projects. Although they bill themselves as "an irreverent, non-denominational collective for Jews with confused identities," their events usually have a spiritual thread as well. In one meeting the group invited Jewish and Muslim comics, and professors from Claremont Lincoln University, the inter-religious consortium I work with, to take questions from the membership and their invited Muslim guests. The discussion ranged from hilarious to deeply spiritual, and participants were clearly moved. I see an immense yearning for these kinds of communities in America. If religious leaders can quit idolizing doctrinal purity and instead create a place for people who doubt and question as well as those who believe, I believe faith in America will have a vital future. And these new models for "church" will be better equipped to work collaboratively with all Americans, no matter what their religion.

U.S. Supreme Court Turns Down Petition from Duncan

BOISE • The U.S. Supreme Court won't consider whether a man convicted of kidnapping, torturing and murdering some members of a northern Idaho family was competent when he waived his appeal.

The high court rejected the petition from Joseph Edward Duncan III on Monday. Now U.S. District Judge Edward Lodge in Idaho must hold a hearing to determine if Duncan was competent when he decided to waive his right to an appeal in the 2008 death penalty case. If Duncan is found to be incompetent in the matter of waiving his right to an appeal, Lodge must hold an additional hearing to see if he was competent when he represented himself during his sentencing hearing.

Lodge sentenced Duncan to die for kidnapping, torturing and murdering a 9-yearold Coeur d'Alene boy in 2005. Prosecutors said Duncan snatched Dylan Groene and his 8-year-old sister from their home after killing their older brother, mother and mother's fiance. Duncan kept the children at a remote Montana campsite for weeks before killing Dylan and returning with Dylan's sister to Coeur d'Alene, where he was arrested.

Duncan has also been sentenced to two life terms in California state court for torturing and killing 10-year-old Anthony Martinez in 1997. Duncan abducted Mar-

can decided to represent himself even though the court had provided him with three defense attorneys. The court-appointed attorneys were ordered to help Duncan when he asked, but otherwise allow him to present his own defense.

The attorneys objected, telling the court that they suspected Duncan wasn't competent to represent himself, but Lodge rejected that challenge and decided not to hold a hearing on the matter. Instead, he had Duncan examined by a local psychologist who found that while Duncan's thoughts were "somewhat unusual," he wasn't delusional and that he'd waived his right to an attorney knowingly and voluntarily.

Duncan's attorneys, meanwhile, contended that experts they contacted found that Duncan suffered from delusional beliefs, paranoia, grandiosity and psychotic breaks from reality.

Lodge decided to let Duncan represent himself, and Duncan waived his right to an appeal after he was sentenced to death.

The massive engine, which used to power the Northwest Timber Co., has been on display outside the Fort Sherman Museum at North Idaho College since the 1980s. A remodel of the Fort Sherman site set to be completed by June doesn't include plans for the 10-ton turbine.

The turbine's former worksite, Riverstone, has de-

veloped into a mix of condominiums, retails shops and park space. North Idaho College is refurbishing the interior of the Powder House at the Fort Sherman site, and the plans call for transforming where the turbine now sits into a landscaped area for students to gather.

The college wants to have that project done by June, before its president, Priscilla Bell, retires, said Ron Dorn, NIC vice president for resource management.

The museum's 4,000 square feet of shed storage off Northwest Boulevard is full, and it already has hundreds of duplicate pieces it is looking to get rid of.

Even if the museum can't keep the turbine, its goal would be to find a home so that it doesn't have to be scrapped, Dahlgren said.

Senate Votes to Ease Sale of Unwanted Horses

BOISE • Horse stables tired of being stiffed by boarders will likely have an easier time selling animals to recoup their costs.

The Senate voted 33-0 Tuesday to ease requirements for auctions.

Currently, horses must be sold at a licensed public livestock auction. But Sen. Melinda Smyser says these licensed auctions in Idaho typically don't deal in equines.

With this bill, future sales of horses to satisfy liens could occur at a public auction.

Bill Would Stagger Food Stamp Issuance

BOISE • Grocers are asking Health and Welfare to distribute food stamps – or SNAP benefits – over a number of days rather than just the first of the month.

But for the second year in a row, a bill that would answer that request probably won't make it to the governor's desk.

It costs hundreds of thousands of dollars more to stagger issuance, said Senate Health and Welfare Committee Chairman Patti Anne Lodge, R-Huston.

Lodge is holding the bill in committee after it glided through the House Friday, sponsored by Rep. Christy Perry, R-Nampa. "During times when we cannot fund education at the levels we would like, should we spend taxpayer dollars because a company cannot handle all the business it receives?" Lodge asked.

Grocers see little hope for bill, Northwest Grocery Association lobbyist Roy Eiguren said.

The current system overwhelms stores the first

of each month, making it almost impossible to keep shelves stocked and racking up costs in overtime and food spoilage, he said.

"It is a very real problem that is impacting business and consumers in Idaho, and unfortunately our state government is unable to resolve it."

Although single-day issuance is the easiest and cheapest option for the Department of Health and Welfare, "there's no push back at all" if legislators choose to switch over, DHW spokesman Tom Shanahan said.

"We can understand how it has impacted some areas and some grocers. So if the state can fund the equipment and the people, then we're good to go with it."

Canyon County grocers may be rooting extra hard for this bill because 24 percent of county residents use SNAP benefits, Shanahan said. That's higher than any other county by about 4 percent.

Statewide, 239,000 Idahoans receive SNAP benefits, up from 154,000 in mid-2009, when the department switched from five-day to single-day issuance to save money.

Animal Cruelty Bill Passes House

BOISE • House lawmakers have approved a plan to authorize felony penalties for animal cruelty and cockfighting in Idaho for the first time.

The House voted 64-2 Wednesday to pass the bill, which creates a three strikes felony for animal cruelty convictions.

The proposal was amended to also make it a felony to organize cockfighting events accompanied by drugs and gambling, a move that appeases animal rights groups threatening to put an initiative before voters with much stiffer animal cruelty penalties.

Blackfoot Rep. Dennis Lake says the legislation is backed by the livestock industry, which has historically opposed animal cruelty bills. The measure exempts normal animal production practices.

It now heads to the full Senate for final approval.

More Security for U.S. Troops

U.S. military commanders in Afghanistan have assigned 'guardian angels' — troops that watch over their comrades even as they sleep — and other increased security measures.

WASHINGTON • U.S. military commanders in Afghanistan have assigned "guardian angels" – troops that watch over their comrades even as they sleep and have ordered a series of other increased security measures to protect troops against possible attacks by rogue Afghans.

The added protections are part of a directive issued in recent weeks by Marine Gen. John Allen, the top U.S. commander in Afghanistan, to guard against insider threats, according to a senior military official. And they come

in the wake of a spike in attacks on U.S. and coalition forces by Afghans, including the point-blank shooting deaths of two U.S. advisers in Afghanistan's Ministry of Interior.

Some of the changes have been subtle, others not so much.

In several Afghan ministries, Americans are now allowed to carry weapons. And they have been instructed to rearrange their office desks there to face the door, so they can see who is coming in, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity to describe the internal directive.

While Allen did not detail the new measures in a briefing earlier this week, he acknowledged that changes

The first and biggest issue the justices must decide is whether the centerpiece of the law, the requirement that nearly all Americans carry insurance or pay a penalty, is constitutional.

At Cuban Mass, Pope **Urges Greater Openings**

HAVANA • Pope Benedict XVI demanded more freedom for the Catholic Church in communist-run Cuba and preached against "fanaticism" in an unusually political sermon Wednesday before hundreds of thousands at Revolution Plaza, with President Raul Castro in the front row.

Before the pope's departure, he met with the president's brother, revolutionary leader Fidel Castro. Castro grilled the pontiff on changes in church liturgy and his role as spiritual leader of the world's Catholics, a Vatican spokesman said.

Benedict's homily was a notso-subtle jab at the island's leadership before a vast crowd of Cubans, both in the sprawling plaza and watching on television. But he also clearly urged an end to Cuba's isolation, a reference to the 50-year U.S. economic embargo and the inability of 11 American presidents and brothers Fidel and Raul Castro to forge peace.

"Cuba and the world need change, but this will occur only if each one is in a position to seek the truth and chooses the way of love, sowing reconciliation and fraternity," Benedict said

JetBlue Airways Pilot Grew Increasingly Erratic on Flight

RICHMOND HILL, Ga. • JetBlue Airways captain Clayton Osbon showed up unusually late to fly Flight 191 to Las Vegas. The plane was in midair when he eerily told his co-pilot they wouldn't make it there.

Osbon started rambling about religion. He scolded air traffic controllers to quiet down, then turned off the radios altogether, and dimmed the monitors in the cockpit. He said aloud that "things just don't matter" and encouraged his co-pilot that they take a leap of faith.

"We're not going to Vegas," Osbon said.

What unfolded next, according to court documents released Wednesday, was a dramatic chase and struggle in the cabin that ended with passengers tackling Osbon, 49, and holding him down until the co-pilot could make an emergency landing in Amarillo, Texas. He was charged Wednesday with interfering with a flight crew.

A pilot with JetBlue since 2000, Osbon's odd behavior on Tuesday became increasingly erratic after the flight departed New York, worrying his fellow crew members so much that they locked him out after he abruptly left the cockpit, according to an affidavit. Osbon then started yelling about Jesus, al-Qaida and a possible bomb on board, forcing passengers to tie him up with seat belt extenders and zip tie handcuffs for about 20 minutes until the plane landed.

"The (first officer) became really worried when Osbon said 'we need to take a leap of faith," according to the sworn affidavit given by FBI agent John Whitworth. "Osbon started trying to correlate completely unrelated numbers like different radio frequencies, and he talked about sins in Las Vegas."

Osbon left the cockpit soon after and tensions on the plane began to escalate, according to witness accounts compiled by investigators. Osbon, described by neighbors in Georgia as tall and muscular, "aggressively" grabbed the hands of a flight attendant who confronted him and later sprinted down the cabin while being chased.

From inside the locked cockpit, which Osbon tried to re-enter by banging on the door, the co-pilot gave an order through the intercom to restrain Osbon, the affidavit said. Passengers wrestled Osbon to the ground, and one female flight attendant's ribs were bruised during the struggle. No one on board was seriously hurt.

federal charges The against Osbon were filed in Texas. He was being held Wednesday at Northwest Texas Healthcare System in Amarillo and remains under

a medical evaluation. Under federal law, a con-

viction for interference with a flight crew or attendants can bring up to 20 years in prison. The offense is defined as assaulting or intimidating the crew, interfering with its duties or diminishes its ability to do operate the plane.

JetBlue spokeswoman Allison Steinberg said earlier Wednesday that Osbon had been suspended pending a review of the flight.

JetBlue's CEO and president Dave Barger told NBC's "Today" show that Osbon is a "consummate professional" whom he has "personally known" for years. He said there is nothing in the captain's record to indicate he would be a risk on a flight. Fellow pilots, friends and Osbon's neighbors in Richmond Hill, Ga., a bedroom community on the coast just south of Savannah, said they were baffled by the midflight outburst. None recalled any previous health or mental problems.

Solicitor General Donald Verrilli Jr. took a few seconds at the end of the Medicaid argument to make a final plea for the court to uphold the entire law, which he said would "secure the blessings of liberty" for millions of Americans by providing them with affordable health care.

Verrilli told the court that Congress had made a policy decision to fight the high cost of medical care through the new law. "I would urge the court to respect that judgment," he said.

Paul Clement, the lawyer for the states challenging the law, retorted that it would be a strange definition of liberty to make people who may not want it buy health care insurance. And he called Congress' threat to cut all Medicaid funding from states that refuse to expand the program "a direct threat to our federalism?"

Not since 2000, when the court resolved the Bush v. Gore dispute over Florida election returns that sealed George W. Bush's election as president has a Supreme Court case drawn so much attention.

In their questions Wednesday, liberal justices Sonia Sotomayor, Elena Kagan, Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Stephen Breyer took issue with Clement, who was asking that the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act be tossed out in its entirety.

"What's wrong with leaving this in the hands of those who should be fixing this?" asked Sotomayor, referring to Congress.

Chief Justice John Roberts also spoke about parts of the law that "have nothing to do with any of the things we are" talking about.

For example, Ginsburg observed that the act deals with issues such as black lung disease.

"Why make Congress redo those?" she asked. "There are many things" that have "nothing to do with affordable health care?" But Clement said the court would be leaving "a hollow shell" if it decided to excise the several key provisions. "The rest of the law cannot stand," he contended.

Roberts and Justice Anthony Kennedy also asked hard questions of Deputy Solicitor General Edwin Kneedler that indicated they are at least considering Clement's arguments. Kneedler said that the only other provisions the court should kill in the event the mandate is stricken are the two that bar refusing coverage to sick people and limit ing the charges to old or sick people.

Justice Antonin Scalia suggested many members of Congress might not have voted for the bill without the central provisions, and he said the court should not go through each and every page to sort out what stays and what goes.

In the afternoon arguments, the liberal justices made clear they would vote to uphold the Medicaid expansion, for which the federal government would pay almost all the costs.

Justices Sotomayor, Kagan, Ginsburg and Breyer voiced strong disagreement with the states' contention that the expansion of the joint state-federal program would be unconstitutionally coercive.

"Why is a big gift from the federal government a matter of coercion?" Kagan asked.

Even Roberts joined his liberal colleagues in questioning Clement about the states' argument that that the expansion comes with too many strings.

"Well, why isn't that a consequence of how willing they have been since the New Deal to take the federal government's money? And it seems to me that they have compromised their status as independent sovereigns because they are so dependent on what the federal government has done, they should not be surprised that the federal government having attached the - they tied the strings, they shouldn't be surprised if the federal government isn't going to start pulling them," Roberts said.

"Does anyone in Cuba not know how the words themselves condemn the reality there?" Fessio said in an email.

Benedict's trip was aimed largely at building a greater place for his church in the least Catholic nation in Latin America. In his homily, he urged authorities to let the church more freely preach its message and educate its young in the faith in schools and universities.

The meeting began with some jokes about their ages. Castro is 85, Benedict reaches that milestone next month. "Yes, I'm old, but I can still do my job," Lombardi quoted the pope as saying.

Video released later showed Fidel arriving at the embassy wearing a dark warm-up jacket and a scarf. He seemed animated, if unsure on his feet.

"I have felt very good," Castro could be heard telling the pontiff in the choppy footage.

Castro introduced his companion, Dalia Soto del Valle, and two of his children, and asked the pope to send him some books to elaborate on the topics they discussed, Lombardi said. He described the meeting as intense, animated and cordial.



More U.S. CEOs Plan to Hire as **Economic Outlook Brightens**

WASHINGTON • A grow-

ing number of chief executives at large U.S. companies say they are more optimistic about the economy and plan to step up hiring. The brighter view from the boardroom comes after the best three months of job growth in two years.

The Business Roundtable said Wednesday that a survey of its CEO members found that 42 percent expect to hire over the next six months. That's up from 35 percent three months ago.

Nearly half plan to spend more on machinery and other capital equipment and more than 80 percent expect their sales to rise. Both those figures are much higher than three months ago.

The chief executives' overall outlook on the economy improved sharply from the end of last year. The group's outlook index jumped to 96.9 in the current January-March quarter. That's up from 77.9 in previous quarter and the highest reading since last spring.

The group is an association of the leaders of the 200 biggest U.S. companies.

The fourth quarter survey's finding that only 35 percent of CEOs planned to add jobs was the lowest in 5 quarters. Yet the next three months saw the biggest job gains in two years.

The economy has added an average of 245,000 jobs per month since December. That has lowered the unemployment rate to 8.3 percent, the lowest in three years.

It suggests that most of the gains came from smaller companies, rather than the large corporations that make up the Roundtable's membership.

Research shows that small and particularly new businesses create most of the new jobs in the United States. Businesses with fewer than 500 employees account for about 65 percent of jobs created in the past 20 years.

The improvement in the CEO survey suggests the job gains "will continue," said Jim McNerney, chairman of the Roundtable and CEO of Boeing Co.

But plenty of concerns remain, he said. Europe's debt crisis could weigh on the U.S. recovery. Growth has slowed in China. And oil prices have spiked since the fall, driving gas prices up.

companies ordered more long-lasting goods last month, showing businesses are willing to buy equipment and machinery even after an investment tax credit was halved.

The Commerce Department said Wednesday that orders for durable goods rose 2.2 percent in February after a steep drop in January. Greater demand for machinery, computers, autos and aircraft drove much of the increase.

Orders for so-called "core" capital goods, a good measure of business investment plans, rose 1.2 percent. Demand for these goods fell in January by the most in a year, after the full tax credit expired.

A durable good is expected to last at least three years. Orders can fluctuate sharply from month to month. Still, orders have been steadily rising since the recession ended nearly three years ago.

In February, durable goods orders totaled \$211.8 billion, 42 percent above the recession low. Orders remain roughly 14 percent below their peak in December 2007.

The increase in February disappointed some economists, who had hoped to see a bigger gain in orders. Paul Ashworth, an economist at Capital Economics, noted that orders for commercial aircraft were much smaller than expected.

MF Global Executives Cooperating with DOJ Investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) • Three MF Global executives say they are cooperating with a Justice Department investigation into more than \$1 billion in customer money that vanished before the firm collapsed. But they largely deflected questions about the missing money at a congressional hearing Wednesday

Edith O'Brien, a fourth executive who had the authority to approve a transfer, declined to answer questions, invoking her Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination.

Lawmakers expressed frustration over the limited information provided by the witnesses during a threehour hearing of the House Financial Services oversight subcommittee. The panel was trying to piece together what happened in the final days before the firm filed for bankruptcy on Oct. 31.

The witnesses – senior finance executives and the firm's general counsel - barely mentioned MF Global's departed CEO, Jon Corzine.

Corzine, a former Democratic New Jersey senator and governor, testified in December that he never instructed anyone to misuse customer funds.

"Apparently no one did anything wrong, but there's more than a billion dollars missing," Rep. Michael Capuano, D-Mass., the subcommittee's senior Democrat, told the executives.

Rep. Stephen Lynch, another Massachusetts Democrat, said: "It is

utterly disgraceful what has happened here. It's not believable, I've got to tell you."

A key issue raised at the hearing was whether MF Global improperly transferred \$200 million from a customer account to cover a shortfall in an overseas account held by the firm.

O'Brien, a former assistant treasurer at MF Global, was subpoenaed to testify about an email she sent, which appears to contradict testimony from Corzine.

TWIN FALLS • With warmer weather approaching, thrill seekers are eager

to get outdoors. If you're one of them, now is a good time to start planning your adventures. The *Times-News* asked Magic Valley enthusiasts



how the season is shaping up for three of the region's big summer thrills. Here's what we learned:

Drier weather in 2012 is likely to mean a livelier season for rock climbing. River rafters expect high water, and some trips are already sold out. And BASE jumpers hope to draw more attention to the Perrine Bridge with celebrities' help.

Get Wet and Wild

If Randy McBride has his way, Mother Nature will allow at least 30 days to float the premier whitewater on the Murtaugh section of the Snake River. Water flow in

Sleeping Under the Stars

You might not have much luck booking a camping spot at Redfish Lake, but there are other options. Now's a good time to plan your warm-weather camping trips.

TWIN FALLS • The mountains are still buried in snow and summer is three months away, yet it's not too early to start planning a camping trip.

It may, in fact, be too late to reserve some of the more popular campsites the West has to offer.

"A camping spot at Redfish Lake is probably out of the question," said Julie Thomas, a spokesperson for the Sawtooth National Forest.

Campers can reserve their favorite spots months in advance, and many savvy sojourners do just that.

The federal government starts taking online camping reservations Jan. 1, and by 2 p.m. that day many of the most popular sites have been snapped up, Thomas said.

"People come back to the same places every year," she said. "They have gotten used to the way the system works and do their best to get them."

Don't despair. Plenty of

campsites are still available, although you may have to settle for a more remote spot that lacks amenities like flush toilets, showers, or a nearby lodge.

Consider Alturus Lake Inlet campground, for example. It's 17 miles south of Redfish in the Sawtooth range. Nearly half its campsites are designated as first-come, first served.

It has vault toilets, drinking water and some of the best hiking, fishing and canoeing opportunities you're likely to find.

Veteran campers Gale and Sue Chapman of Twin Falls actually prefer more rustic sites. It helps them avoid the crowds. They have a self-contained recreational vehicle, so they don't need a fully developed campground with restrooms and potable water.

Sometimes their campsite is nothing more than a fire pit formerly used by hunters.

"We look for something more out of the way, something that doesn't required reservations," Sue Chapman said. "We like to be where we

can use our ATVs and don't have to pay a fee. That's what we are going to be doing this summer."

Chapman said they've found no-frills/no-fee campsites in the Stanley Basin and some may be available in the South Hills and other areas.

Campers who head into the backcountry need to be responsible.

"You have to take everything with you, and you have to take everything back out," Chapman said.

For families looking for developed campgrounds, there are basically two options: Reserve a spot as early as possible or take your chances at the last minute.

Idaho has 17 state parks that allow camping. Folks can reserve sites up to nine months in advance.

"For those who don't plan in advance, many of our parks will still have a few sites available even on busy weekends," said Jennifer Okerlund, communications manager for the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation.

The IDPR processed about 8,600 camping reservations in 2003, the first year that it offered online reservations. It now processes about 38,000 reservations annually.

"At some of our most popular parks, the spaces are reserved well in advance," Okerhund said.

People sometimes cancel reservations, so it's worth checking the state website occasionally to see if something has opened up. Be flexible.

"I would encourage folks to not limit themselves to the most popular campgrounds, but to explore some of those in more remote locations," Okerlund said.

Camping fees have increased a couple bucks per night for some of the most popular sites, but it's still inexpensive compared with some other forms of entertainment, she said.

"It's still cheaper for a family of four to go on an overnight camping trip than to go to the movies," Okerlund said.

It's likely to be a lot more fun too.

The Art of Outdoors Artist

Artist has helped further many causes with his work.

WICHITA, Kan. • For about 25 years, those who appreciate the outdoors have appreciated the wildlife artwork of Jerry Thomas.

The Scott City, Kan., native has created hundreds of outdoors paintings that have become everything from greeting cards and fine shotgun engravings to prized commissioned pieces and widelycirculated prints.

With fine details down to the number of feathers in a strutting turkey's wing or perfect replication of colors on a rooster pheasant, he's rated as one of the nation's best. But few realize how much the art has done for conservation and other causes through wide-scale sales of limited edition prints and other creations.

As an avid sportsman, Thomas said he feels indebted to conservation groups for enhancing wildlife. As a professional he feels closeness because many supported him greatly in his early days as an artist.

Thomas has no exact figures, but simple math shows his works have raised a lot.

"Ducks Unlimited did over 2,500 prints of one painting and they probably averaged, conservatively, \$250 at auctions," Thomas said. "It doesn't take many of those to get

with the contributions. While governor in the late 1980s, he began working on projects with Thomas. The relationship has held through Hayden's tours with the U.S. Department of the Interior, the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks and years with Kansas Wildscape.

"Jerry's work has done a tremendous amount of good, working with Ducks Unlimited and a host of other organizations," Hayden said. "He's helped raise a tremendous amount of money and his work usually carries a strong conservation message, too."

Other groups include the National Wild Turkey Federation, Waterfowl USA, Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and Pheasants Forever.

The money raised from such sales goes mostly toward habitat and hunting recruitment projects.

Sometimes Thomas has been commissioned for such projects. Other times he's done it so he could keep the original and gain further exposure.

This is the 20th year he's donated the official print for the Governor's Turkey Hunt.

Becky Wolfe, hunt director, said the annul prints are presented to the 200-plus landowners who donate hunting grounds.

Thomas' No. 1 signed print of each painting may bring \$1,000 or more for the hunt that sponsors several college scholarships.

Proceeds have gone for other causes, too.

About 10 years ago funds were needed to create a 250acre wetland hunting area for youth near Milford Reservoir. The project was to honor Zach Hudec, an avid 14-yearold hunter who died unexpectedly.

Selling prints of a painting Thomas did of Hudec's favored hunting spot was a sizable part of the fund raising.

These are especially busy times for Thomas. His home holds several artworks in progress and a gallery of his works has been opened in Scott City.

In the last few years he's

gained a reputation for his western history paintings.

His attention to detail includes perfect replication of the clothing worn and gear carried by participants. Their exact likenesses come from researching old photographs.

Thomas, 53, has donated prints to help with several western causes, like the purchase of land that once held a famed Cheyenne camp Custer and his men failed to conquer near Larned. The U.S. National Park Service manages the site.

Hayden said as much as Thomas' works have already done to promote good causes, the best may be yet to come.

"As Jerry's matured his artwork has matured, too, and he keeps getting better," Hayden said. "He's got a lot of good years left ahead of him."

MILWAUKEE • The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service surveys Americans every five years to assess trends in outdoor activities.

According to a 2009 analysis of the results, one of the most popular "outdoor recreation activities" was wildlife watching.

The Service estimates one-third of U.S. residents engage in wildlife watching.

For purposes of the survey,

HUNTING SEASON CLOSING ON PRAIRIE DOGS

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • State wildlife officials are reminding hunters they can't shoot prairie dogs during breeding season from April 1 to June 15.

Utah keeps a hunting season for Gunnison's and white-tailed prairie dogs on public land, just like game animals. The limits leave enough prairie dogs for such predators as owls and black-footed ferrets.

Gunnison's prairie dogs can be found east of the Colorado River. Whitetailed prairie dogs are found in other spots in eastern Utah. Hunters aren't supposed to shoot another species, the Utah prairie dog, anytime during the year.

Utah prairie dogs live in a large area of southwestern Utah and are protected by the Endangered Species Act.

In addition, no hunting of white-tailed prairie dogs is allowed in Coyote Basin in far eastern Utah.



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Menomonee River Reveals Its First Steelhead of Spring

MILWAUKEE • The welcoming committee was in full view and voice along the Menomonee River in Milwaukee.

Bunches of daffodils jutted skyward from a grassy berm. Red-winged blackbirds rattled the branches of budding trees with their throaty chorus.

And in the water, yet more harbingers of spring.

Here a silvery flash and flutter in the clear, tea-colored water. There, a halfdozen dark shapes, holding along the bottom like footlong submarines.

The feathered migrants such as robins and sandhill cranes are observed by most Wisconsinites. Fewer see the piscine equivalents such as the steelhead and suckers now moving up the Menomonee.

"There are at least four trout right in this pocket," said John Cain of Wauwatosa, casting a fly in a bend of the Menomonee east of Miller Park. "What a sight."

For one of the last days of winter, it was doing a very good imitation of spring.

The calendar is a human

construction. The fish were heeding the more important factors of water temperature and river flow.

The river was flowing about 55 degrees, signaling time to get busy to the steelhead and suckers.

A rapid warm-up had created a strong, concentrated run of fish; the river was alive.

Every few minutes a steelhead would porpoise or slap the surface. Hens turned on their sides and used their tails to clear out redds, or spawning sites.

White suckers joined the trout in the riffles and started their own mating ritual, often grouped in six or more.

Fishing 50 yards upstream of Cain, I drifted a size 12 chartreuse nymph through a run.

The first dozen casts yielded only exercise. After adding a small split shot, however, the fly hesitated on the next drift.

As I lifted the rod, it began quaking with a lively weight. A steelhead briefly thrashed at the surface then fell back with the current, prompting me to follow to the

next pool. The fish held tight to the bottom for a minute then moved upstream. The to-and-fro covered about 50 yards of river before the fish was beached on a rocky bar.

It was a 27-inch hen, sleek and beautiful with an olive back and silver sides. Its cheeks and sides were accented with a blush of pink, befitting its other name, the rainbow trout.

The fish was quickly unhooked and turned into a mild side current, where it slashed its tail and disappeared into a dark pool.

The steelhead might seem as unlikely as an 80-degree day in March. But here they are.

Wild turkeys are an elusive prey, but they can be a tasty reward.

MIAMI • Wild turkey hunters Jeff Budz and Ron Bergeron sat in their blind one morning a couple of weeks ago and listened as their potential Thanksgiving dinner in March grew more and more distant.

Since before dawn, the two hunters had elicited eager gobbling responses from five toms to the various hen noises Budz made using slate, box and diaphragm calling devices. They also had seen a hen fly down from her pine tree roost only a few yards to the north and saunter away.

Early on, the male turkeys sounded fairly close to the hunters' hiding place on the edge of a pasture. They felt pretty confident at least one of those gobblers would strut into the field and approach the lifelike decoy they placed within easy shotgun range of their blind. Budz even got into a lively conversation with a vocal hen. But after an hour or so, the gobbling grew distant and more sporadic. Sometimes, Budz's calls would get no answer at all.

Even though spring gobbler season was only a few days old, the Osceolas seemed to be reverting to the maddeningly typical behavior for which the Florida subspecies is famous: fooling hunters into thinking their brains are addled by testosterone during the mating season – only to escape detection with ease.

Hunter success rates for North America's five subspecies of wild turkeys – (Eastern, Gould's, Merriam and Rio Grande are the other four) – average below 15 percent.

After walking a short distance down the dirt track, Budz stopped and mimicked a hen with his box call. To his joyful surprise, he heard a gobble-gobble-gobble about 150 yards to the south.

Budz backtracked and pulled out the Montana decoy, holding it in front of him as he crept slowly down the path.

Suddenly, there was hurried movement about 20 yards in front of him. The gobbler he had been talking to dashed out of the underbrush and around a bend in the track, disappearing before Budz could get a bead on it.

Some hunters might have given up, believing they had spooked the bird for good.

But Budz advanced, holding the shield and making a couple more hen calls.

As Budz was in mid-step, the gobbler's urge to mate overcame its wariness, and it came sauntering back around the bend. Budz raised his shotgun and blasted it from about 35 yards.

"A subordinate tom, about 2 years old," Budz said.

Its beard measured 8 inches; the spurs on its legs were three quarters of an inch long and it weighed 16 pounds. And that evening, it became a very tasty casserole.

The nearby Castle Rocks State Park, which has a \$5 vehicle entrance fee, also is almost fully open.

At Dierkes Lake, you can already find weekend climbers on the rocks anytime the sun shines.

A Chute and a Prayer

You have only one option if you're looking to BASE jump in the Magic Valley, and you know it as the Perrine Bridge.

The bridge is most popular four times a year, said BASE jumper Sean Chuma: Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day and the Perrine Bridge Festival, this year scheduled Sept. 7-8 at Twin Falls' visitor center.

But that doesn't mean you can't jump at other times of the year. Chuma made nearly 800 jumps in 2011.

Will he beat that this year? He doesn't care. He doesn't do it for numbers.

"I jump all the time," Chuma said. "It's hard to explain why. For one, it's an adrenaline rush. We're known as adrenaline junkies. But I just like to fly. It's a peaceful feeling for me. ... It's the closest thing you can get to being a bird."

Never jumped before? Go tandem. Mark Kissner of TandemBASE in Twin Falls charges \$399 for a jump with an instructor.



Bluegrass Legend Earl Scruggs Dies at 88

NASHVILLE, Tenn. • Bluegrass legend and banjo pioneer Earl Scruggs, who helped profoundly change country music with Bill Monroe in the 1940s and later with guitarist Lester Flatt, has died. He was 88.

Scruggs' son Gary said his father died of natural causes Wednesday morning at a Nashville, Tenn., hospital.

Earl Scruggs was an innovator who pioneered the modern banjo sound. His use of three fingers rather than the clawhammer style elevated the banjo from a part of the rhythm section or a comedian's prop – to a lead instrument.

His string-bending and lead runs became known worldwide as "the Scruggs picking style" and the versatility it allowed has helped popularize the banjo in almost every genre of music.

The debut of Bill Monroe and The Blue Grass Boys during a post-World War II performance on The Grand Ole Opry is thought of as the "big bang" moment for bluegrass and later 20th century country music. Later, Flatt and Scruggs teamed as a bluegrass act after leaving Monroe from the late 1940s until breaking up in 1969 in a dispute over whether their music should experiment or stick to tradition. Flatt died in 1979.

They were best known for their 1949 recording "Foggy Mountain Breakdown, played in the 1967 movie "Bonnie and Clyde," and "The Ballad of Jed Clampett" from "The Beverly Hillbillies," the popular TV series that debuted in 1962. Jerry Scoggins did the singing

After the breakup, Scruggs used three of his sons in

The Earl Scruggs Revue. The group played on bills with rock acts like Steppenwolf and James Taylor. Sometimes they played festivals before 40,000 people.

In a July 2010 interview, Scruggs said in the early days, "I played guitar as much as I did the banjo, but for everyday picking I'd go back to the banjo. It just fit what I wanted to hear better than what I could do with the guitar?'

Scruggs will always be remembered for his willingness to innovate. In "The Big Book of Bluegrass," Scruggs discussed the breakup with Flatt and how his need to experiment drove a rift between them. Later in 1985, he and Flatt were inducted together in the Country Music Hall of Fame.

"It wasn't a bad feeling toward each other as much as it was that I felt I was depriving myself of something," Scruggs said. "By that, I mean that I love bluegrass music, and I still like to play it, but I do like to mix in some other music for my own personal satisfaction, because if I don't, I can get a little bogged down and a little depressed."

He said he enjoyed playing because "it calms me down. It makes me satisfied. Sometimes I just need to pick a few tunes?

At an 80th birthday party for Scruggs in January 2004, country great Porter Wagoner said: "I always felt like Earl was to the five-string banjo what Babe Ruth was to baseball. He is the best there ever was, and the best there ever will be?"

In 2005, "Foggy Mountain Breakdown'' was selected for the Library of Congress' National Recording Registry of works of unusual merit. The following year, the 1972 Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's "Will the Circle Be Unbroken," on which Scruggs was one of many famous guest performers, joined the list, too.

Scruggs had been fairly active in the 2000s, returning to a limited touring schedule after frail health in the 1990s. In 1996, Scruggs suffered a heart attack in the recovery room of a hospital shortly after hip-replacement surgery. He also was hospitalized late last year, but seemed in good health during a few appearances with his sons in 2010 and 2011.

HEMINGWAY SHOWS SOFT SIDE IN NEWLY PUBLIC LETTERS

BOSTON • Ernest Hemingway shows a tenderness that wasn't part of his usual macho persona in a dozen unpublished letters that became publicly available Wednesday in a collection of the author's papers at the Kennedy presidential library.

In a letter to his friend Gianfranco Ivancich written in Cuba and dated February 1953, Hemingway wrote of euthanizing his cat "Uncle Willie'' after it was hit by a car.

"Certainly missed you. in Idaho.

Miss Uncle Willie. Have had to shoot people but never anyone I knew and loved for eleven years," the author wrote. "Nor anyone that purred with two broken legs."

The letters span from 1953 to 1960, a year before the prize-winning writer's suicide. Whether typed or written in his curly script, some of the dispatches arrived on personalized, onionskin stationery from his Cuban villa Finca Vigia.

The author also wrote from Europe, while on safari in Africa, and from his home

The two men met in a Venice hotel bar in 1949, bonding despite a twodecade age difference because they'd both suffered leg wounds in war.

"I wish I could write you good letters the way you do," Hemingway wrote in a January 1958 letter from Cuba. "Maybe it is because I write myself out in the other writing."

Experts say the letters demonstrate a side to Hemingway that wasn't part of his persona as an author whose subjects included war, bullfighting, fishing and hunting.



conscious verse influenced a generation of feminist, gay rights and anti-war activists, has died. She Rich was 82.

Rich died Tuesday at her Santa Cruz home from complications from rheumatoid arthritis, said her son, Pablo Conrad. She had lived in Santa Cruz since the 1980s.

Through her writing, Rich explored topics such as women's rights, racism, sexuality, economic justice and love between women.

Rich published more than a dozen volumes of poetry and five collections of nonfiction. She won a National Book Award for her collection of poems "Diving into the Wreck'' in 1974. In 2004, she won the National Book Critics Circle Award in Poetry for her collection "The School Among the Ruins." According to her publisher, W.W. Norton, her books have sold between 750,000 and 800,000 copies, a high amount for a poet.

She gained national prominence with her third poetry collection, "Snapshots of a Daughter-in-Law," in 1963. Citing the title poem, University of Maryland professor Rudd Fleming wrote in The Washington Post that Rich "proves poetically how hard it is to be a woman – a member of the second sex."

Rich and her husband had three sons before she left him in 1970, just as the women's movement was exploding on the national scene. She used her experiences as a mother to write "Of Woman Born," her groundbreaking feminist critique of pregnancy, childbirth and motherhood, published in 1976.

Unlike most American writers, Rich believed that art and politics not only could coexist, but must co-exist. She considered herself a socialist because "socialism represents



"That is, the resources of a society should be shared and the wealth redistributed as widely as possible."

"She was very courageous and very outspoken and very clear," said her longtime friend, W.S. Merwin, the Pulitzer Prize winning poet. "She was a real original, and whatever she said came straight out of herself."

Rich taught at many colleges and universities, including Brandeis, Rutgers, Cornell, San Jose State and Stanford.

She won a MacArthur "genius'' fellowship, two Guggenheim Fellowships and many top literary awards including the Bollingen Prize, Brandeis Creative Arts Medal, Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize and the Wallace Stevens Award.

But when then-President Clinton awarded the National Medal of Arts in 1997, Rich refused to accept it, citing the administration's "cynical politics."

"The radical disparities of wealth and power in America are widening at a devastating rate," she wrote to the administration. "A president cannot meaningfully honor certain token artists while the people at large are so dishonored."

In 2003, Rich and other poets refused to attend a White House symposium on poetry to protest to U.S.-led invasion of Iraq.

Born in Baltimore in 1929, Rich was the elder of two daughters of a Jewish father and a Protestant mother – a mixed heritage that she recalled in her autobiographical poem "Sources." Her father, a doctor and medical professor at Johns Hopkins University, encouraged her to write poetry at an early age.

Rich graduated from Radcliffe College in 1951 and was chosen for the Yale Younger

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

"If the excitement and frenzy and turbulence that's been stirred up in Kentucky this week could be harnessed, we could solve our energy crisis," Kentucky Sen. Mitch Mc-Connell said on the Senate floor. "Basketball fans from Kentucky have been waiting their whole lives for this game."

This is the grudge match to end them all. It's the fifth time the Final Four

Weary Venus Loses at Key Biscayne

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla. • Venus Williams sagged in the wooden changeover chair as if it were a cushy recliner, her head tilted back, her tank on empty.

She rose slowly to play the final two games and lost both, but grinned as she walked to the exit, perhaps because she was headed for a well-deserved rest.

Weary after winning three consecutive three-set matches, Williams was eliminated Wednesday by Agnieszka Radwanska in the quarterfinals of the Sony Éricsson Open, 6-4, 6-1.

"It was disappointing not to be able to feel my best today," Williams said. "I was able to keep it close in the first set and try different strategies, but it was definitely a mental battle, and today I didn't conquer the mental part of it."

Top-ranked Victoria Azarenka lost for the first time this year when she was beaten by Marion Bartoli, 6-3, 6-3. Azarenka had won 26 consecutive matches, a streak that dated to the beginning of 2012.

In the men's quarterfinals, No. 2-seeded Rafael Nadal continued his bid for his first Key Biscayne title by beating No. 6 Jo-Wilfried Tsonga 6-2, 5-7, 6-4. His opponent Friday will be 2009 champion Andy Murray, who overcame an upset stomach and early deficit to beat No. 9 Janko Tipsarevic 4-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Williams' serve lacked its usual velocity, and by the final game she wasn't even chasing shots in the corner. The tournament was her first since the U.S. Open last August, when she withdrew after being diagnosed with a fatigue-causing autoimmune disease.

Two Williamses were eliminated in 18 hours. Younger sister Serena lost Tuesday night to former No. 1 Caroline Wozniacki.



Today's hand comes from the **Open Teams Semifinal between** Italy and Norway at the first World Mind Sports Games in Beijing three years ago.

In the first room (not shown here), South for Italy bid and repeated his spades. When North now introduced his hearts, South bid three no-trump. The operation was successful, in a sense, but after a club lead, declarer had to use heart entries to try to bring the spades in. When he subsequently found it to be impossible to develop the spade suit, the defenders had time to enjoy their club winners and set up hearts, and declarer finished no fewer than four down!

At the second table the bidding was as shown here. The decision by South, Terje Aa, to remove to four spades was right, as it takes perfect defense to defeat the spade game. However, Fulvio Fantoni and Claudio Nunes were up to the task.

Fantoni led his lone diamond, taken by dummy's ace, Nunes contributing the 10. West switched to a heart. Winning in dummy, declarer played a second spade to the king and ace, and the heart return from Fantoni gave South no chance. He had to play a diamond toward his jack at this point, as he was in dummy for the last time. Nunes rose with the king and returned a diamond for Fantoni to ruff with the defenders' last trump. One down.

On March 29, 1912, British explorer Robert Falcon Scott, his expedition stranded in an Antarctic blizzard after failing to be the first to reach the South Pole, wrote in his journal, "We shall stick it out to the end but we are getting weaker of course and the end cannot be far. It seems a pity

but I do not think I can write more." Scott concluded with: "Last entry. For Gods sake look after our people." (Scott is presumed to have died shortly thereafter; his four companions also perished.)

On this date:

In 1638, Swedish colonists settled in present-day Delaware.

In 1790, the tenth president of the United States, John Tyler, was born in Charles City County, Va.

In 1792, Sweden's King Gustav III died, nearly two weeks after he had been shot and mortally wounded by assassins during a masquerade party.

In 1812, the first White House wedding took place as Lucy Payne Washington, the sister of First Lady Dolley Madison, married Supreme Court Justice Thomas Todd.

In 1871, the Royal Albert Hall in London was opened by Oueen Victoria.

In 1882, the Knights of Columbus was chartered in Connecticut.

In 1943, World War II rationing of meat, fats and cheese began.

In 1951, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were convicted of conspiracy to commit espionage. (They were executed in June 1953.) The Rodgers and Hammerstein musical "The King and I" opened on Broadway.

In 1962, Jack Paar hosted NBC's "Tonight" show for the final time, although the network aired a repeat the following night. (Johnny Carson debuted as host in Oct. 1962.)

In 1971, Army Lt. William L. Calley Jr. was convicted of murdering 22 Vietnamese civilians in the My Lai (mee ly) massacre. (Calley ended up serving three years under house arrest.) A jury in Los Angeles recommended the death penalty for Charles Manson and three female followers for the 1969 Tate La Bianca murders. (The sentences were later commut ed.) In 1973, the last United States combat troops left South Vietnam, ending America's direct military involvement in the Vietnam War. In 1992, Democratic presidential front-runner Bill Clinton acknowledged experimenting with marijuana "a time or two" while attending Oxford University, adding, "I didn't inhale and I didn't try it again." More than a month after winning the Olympic gold medal in ladies figure skating, Kristi Yamaguchi of the United States won the world championship title in Oakland, Calif. Ten years ago: Israeli troops stormed Yasser Arafat's headquarters complex in the West Bank in a raid that was launched in response to anti-Israeli attacks that had killed 30 people in three days. Five years ago: A defiant, Democratic-controlled Senate approved legislation calling for the withdrawal of U.S. combat troops from Iraq within a year. Veteran diplomat Ryan Crocker was sworn in as the new U.S. ambassador to Iraq. West Virginia beat Clemson, 78-73, for its first NIT title in 65 years. One year ago: Gunmen held an Iraqi government center in Tikrit hostage in a grisly siege that ended with the deaths of at least 56 people, including three councilmen, plus the attackers, who blew themselves up. A seriously ill 73-year-old British woman was accidentally dropped into the bitterly cold Norwegian Sea as rescue workers took her off the cruise ship Ocean Countess (Janet Richardson later died at a hospital).

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

What should I do when this happens? I may not even know I did it. I can't fix every scratch I make or clean every track I leave on the rug. I want to be invited, but I also want to be a good guest. What do you think?


