Idaho Muses Computer Devices for Students

STAR • The classrooms Tom Luna envisioned when campaigning for a 21st century education system look a lot like those taught in Star, a town named after a 19th century navigational tool used by travelers and miners.

With Idaho moving to new technology in its classrooms under reforms advanced by Luna, the state schools chief, he's holding up Star Elementary as an example. The school sits about a mile from the site of the original schoolhouse, where a wooden star nailed to the front door was a key landmark in the

Luna hopes Star classrooms can now serve as a different kind of guidepost, one for the future, one where students and teachers, as he often says, aren't "bound by walls, bell schedules, school calendars, or geography."

"If you're looking for examples of how schools are transforming classrooms into 21st century classrooms, look no further than Star Elementary," Luna said in an email inviting officials to join him on a recent tour.

Star Elementary is using Apple Inc. products, which are becoming more prevalent in Idaho schools. It's a trend the state Department of Education has encouraged, launching a program that allows districts to

borrow iPads for their students.

The technology push at Star Elementary is part of a Meridian School District project that pilots various devices in different schools. At Star Elementary, the technology was purchased with federal funds and money raised by the Parent-Teacher Association.



Idaho Gets Tougher on Animal Cruelty

A bill to bring Idaho its first felony charge for animal cruelty could be signed into law as early as this week.

TWIN FALLS • When animals come into the Twin Falls Animal Shelter, there are sometimes signs that they've been abused or neglected.

But it can be hard to prove.

Shelter Director Debbie Blackwood - a former animal control officer - said the shelter also hears about 10 or so "very heinous" cases each year of area residents abusing animals. And some cases involve multiple animals.

For the first time in Idaho, mistreating pets and livestock could result in a felony conviction under a measure passed Thursday by the Please see CRUELTY, A3

T.F. Council to Pick Grant Recipients

15 applicants will make their pitches today for a piece of \$100K for services they provide in Twin Falls.

TWIN FALLS • From summer concerts and tennis courts to bus service for the elderly and disabled, the 15 organizations that will seek grant funding today all do their part to make Twin Falls a better place to live.

That's the tough part. With only \$100,000 in Municipal Powers Outsource Grant Funding to hand out, the Twin Falls City Council will send some applicants home empty handed after today's 4 p.m. special meeting.

The grant funding is for services that the city could provide but doesn't. That can range from programs for city residents who struggle with substance abuse or psychological issues to arts education and health clinic services. The applicants are diverse,

and many have deep ties throughout the community. That was made clear last week, when half of the City Council announced they'd have to bow out of today's selection process due to ties with some of the applicants.

A total of \$180,173 is being requested, in amounts ranging from \$4,000 to \$40,000. Each applicant will provide a fiveminute presentation, after which participating members of the council are expected to determine which projects to fund.

"This is the iTool building," said Meridian superintendent Linda Clark.

On a recent morning, second graders demonstrated their reading skills by recording themselves with an iPod Touch device and emailing the audio to their teacher for review. Fourth and fifth graders crunched math problems and studied grammar with iPads. A teacher showed off curriculum she developed with Apple software.

"I'm inspired by what I see here," Luna said after the tour. "Every child was engaged and that's what we want to see in every school, and it's important that every teacher have these tools in order to have a classroom like this?

Under Luna's reforms, schools across Idaho are using state funding to buy these same products for elementary and middle school students, with the goal of preparing them for the classrooms that await them in high school.

Idaho will start phasing in mobile computers for every high school teacher and student while making online courses a requirement to graduate. A task force helping implement the changes recommended the device come in the form of a laptop comput-

Among the task force Computer findings: tablets, like iPads, work best in younger grades, while high school students do better with fully-functioning keyboards. That surprised Luna, who said he originally assumed the tablet approach worked well in kindergarten through 12th grades.

"It was kind of an eye opener for me," Luna said. He predicted a compet-

itive bidding process to determine exactly what device Idaho high school students will use starting in 2013. The plan is to equip teachers this fall, while students will be added next year, starting with one-third of high

"I really believe that you will see responses ...that will demonstrate that there's many devices that vendors are convinced will meet the specifications, whether it's a laptop, whether it's an Apple product or a Dell product," Luna said. "I think you'll see that they'll be very competitive. Not just in price but also in capabilities?"

Idaho may be months away from contracting for the devices, but Apple seems well positioned to take advantage.

Several districts purchased iPads and other Apple products with technology money set aside in 2011 under Luna's proposals. Some districts wanted to test the products first, so Luna's department launched the iPad Pilot Project in September.

The agency used leftover federal funds to purchase 110 iPads for school districts to borrow for their classrooms. Nine school districts are taking advantage of the program this year, while ten more signed up for next year.

But Luna dismissed the idea that Apple was being given a leg up in the coming bidding.

"I guess the perception may be there, but it sure wasn't part of the thought process at all," Luna said. 'It was, 'Hey, let's get some out there so that people who want to can use these and start learning from them, and schools are excited to participate in it."

Luna insisted every company will get a fair shot at Idaho's contract, which is expected to be signed no later than July 1.

The selection of a device for Idaho teachers and students will be overseen by the Division of Purchasing at the state Department of Administration, which is headed by Luna's sister, Teresa Luna. Last summer, her agency cautioned Luna's task force against contact with computer vendors eyeing Idaho.

That advice was taken, Luna said.

When visiting schools to review student use of various devices, Luna said it was made clear that computer representatives shouldn't be in attendance. At one point, the group was invited to meet with Microsoft officials but declined.

Apple is among 10 computer companies that took the initial step toward vying for Idaho's contract, responding to a request for information about their products.

Lenovo promoted the durability of its ThinkPad Tablet, a laptop that has a spill-resistant keyboard. Kuno showcased its education-focused computer tablet, with its neatly organized desktop and "very few icons that can distract students?"

Hewlett-Packard recommended a notebook or tablet, but specifically highlighted the HP Mini, a laptop with a 10-inch screen that weighs less than 3 pounds. Dell, IBM, Cisco and Fujitsu also submitted proposals but those were exempt from disclosure under trade secrets portion of Idaho's public records

Apple detailed specifications for its iPad, which remains the most popular tablet computer – having sold 55 million since 2010 despite competition from less expensive de-

"We're going to be marketed to," Luna said. "There's no doubt that Apple, and Dell and HP and any of these players are going to try to make their case. They'll all have equal opportunity, and it'll be a very transparent process."

Blackwood said the bill has good, strong language. "We're excited about it," she said.

The bill would make a third animal cruelty conviction in 15 years a felony.

And an amendment to the bill included language that makes it a felony to organize a cockfight.

According to the amendment, "Every person who knowingly advertises, promotes or organizes a public or private display of combat between two or more gamecocks in which the fighting, killing, maiming or injuring of gamecocks is a significant feature and at which any

controlled substance ... (and) any act of gambling (is present) ... is guilty of a felony."

Currently, Idaho and the two Dakotas are the only U.S. states without a felony animal cruelty law. Otter could sign the bill this week.

Blackwood said efforts during past legislative sessions to pass an animal cruelty bill "failed miserably" and she's happy this bill cleared the Legislature. Currently, animal abuse is a misdemeanor offense in Idaho.

Wyatt Prescott, executive vice president of the Idaho Cattle Association, said the association drafted the bill while working with state legislators.

The association, he said, sees taking proper care of animals as its "first and foremost responsibility."

"Essentially, what (the bill) does is provide a felony provision for repeat violators," Prescott said. But they didn't want people to receive a felony for the first offense.

With the exception of obvious acts of cruelty toward animals, Blackwood said some people just don't know how to take care of them.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's Capt. Tim Miller said there were about 4,600 animal control calls last year in the city of Twin Falls and Twin Falls County.

From October 2010 to September 2011, there were 113 reported animal cruelty issues in the city and county. The year before that, there were 311. Miller didn't have current figures for this

Blackwood said if someone witnesses animal abuse, the first step is to call the animal control division of the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

Former state Sen. Laird Noh - who lives in Kimberly and has a livestock business - said animal cruelty has come up during past years' legislative sessions.

"It's been an ongoing problem and a problem that really needed to be more directly addressed in the Legislature," he said.

Noh said Friday that he didn't have enough information about the bill to comment on the specifics, but he said an increasing number of people want a variety of animals - such as chickens and pigs - in additional to traditional pets.

Noh said people who weren't raised around animals sometimes don't understand the type of care they require.


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Draft Plan for Deer Flat Due Out in June


Deer Flat spokeswoman Susan Kain says the refuge will likely hold two open houses so the public can discuss draft alternative plans.

The Idaho Press Tribune reports that federal law requires the final plan to be submitted this year.

Local residents are concerned the new plan could restrict access to Lake Lowell. But refuge officials say the area is governed by the National Wildlife Refuge System Improvement Act of 1997, which doesn't allow unfettered recreation at the expense of wildlife.

Top BIA Official Resigns to Take LDS Church Post

Echo Hawk, assistant secretary of the Interior for Indian Affairs, is being appointed to the Quorum of the Seventy, which is the Mormon Church's third-highest governing body.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • The top official for the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs is resigning to accept a fulltime leadership position with The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, ending three years with the department that Interior Secretary Ken Salazar says "opened a new chapter" in U.S. relationships with American Indian tribes.

Larry Echo Hawk, the assistant secretary of the Interior for Indian Affairs, is being appointed to the Quorum of the Seventy, the Mormon Church's thirdhighest governing body. The announcement from the church came Saturday during its semi-annual general conference in Salt Lake City.

President Barack Obama appointed Echo Hawk, 63, to oversee the BIA in 2009.

"With Larry Echo Hawk's leadership, we have opened a new chapter in our nation to nation relationships with American Indian and Alaska Native tribal governments, accelerated the restoration of tribal homelands, improved safety in tribal communities, resolved centuryold water disputes, invested in education, and reached many more milestones that are helping Indian nations pursue the future of their choosing," Salazar said in a statement.

During Echo Hawk's

tenure, the Interior Department settled a \$3.4 billion class-action lawsuit with Native American landowners over mismanaged royalties. The settlement reached in late 2009 is under appeal.

Salazar said he would work with Echo Hawk to ensure a smooth transition within the BIA. It was not clear who would be appointed to oversee the BIA after Echo Hawk's depar-

Echo Hawk, a member of the Pawnee Nation, was elected Idaho attorney general in 1990, the first Native American to be elected to the position in any state. He ran unsuccessfully in 1994 for Idaho governor as a De-

He was a Brigham Young University law professor for 14 years before leading the

After his appointment, Echo Hawk said in a speech in Salt Lake City in 2009 that he wrestled with the decision to accept a position that would make him a "face" for a federal government that has had a sordid history of mistreating Indians. He finally reconciled his hesitation by vowing to be an "agent for change" instead of a mere caretaker.

BOISE • Volunteer judges and mediation experts starting Monday will take part in "Resolution Roundup" to help Idaho residents resolve federal cases free of charge in Boise, Pocatello and Coeur d'Alene.

The United States District and Bankruptcy Court, District of Idaho, is partnering with the Ninth Circuit Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee.

Spokeswoman Susie Boring-Headlee tells the *Idaho* Statesman that 30 cases have been chosen in Boise. The goal is to attain resolutions for cases and avoid lengthy and costly trials.

She says the Ninth Circuit created the program to help litigants and districts with heavy caseloads.

She says 12 judges, 23 mediators and law professors from the University of Idaho and Concordia College of Law are volunteering in the program.

Rock Slide Blocks Train Line in N. Idaho

BONNERS FERRY • A Burlington Northern Santa Fe spokesman says large boulders broke off from a

cliff in northern Idaho and blocked a train line connecting Montana to the Pacific Northwest overnight.

BNSF spokesman Gus Melonas says the rock slide happened Saturday night at a spot about 20 miles east of Bonners Ferry.

Melonas says large boulders broke off about 150 feet up from the line probably due to the extreme weather in the region, including rain and freezing and thawing.

Myanmar's Suu Kyi Reported as Winning Historic Vote

Myanmar held a landmark election Sunday that was expected to send Suu Kyi into parliament for her first public office since launching her decades-long struggle against the military-dominated government.

YANGON, Myanmar • She struggled for a free Myanmar for a quarter-century, much of it spent locked away under house arrest. Now, the Nobel Peace Prize laureate whose nonviolent campaign for democracy at home transformed her into a global icon is on the verge of ascending to public office for the first time.

Aung San Suu Kyi, 66, was elected to parliament Sunday in a historic victory buffeted by the jubilant cheers of supporters who hope her triumph will mark a major turning point in a nation still emerging from a ruthless era of military rule.

If confirmed, the election win will also mark an astonishing reversal of fortune for a woman who became one of the world's most prominent prisoners of conscience. When she was finally released in late 2010, just after a vote her party boycotted that was deemed neither free nor fair, few could have imagined she would make the leap from democracy advocate to elected official in less than 17 months, opening the way for a potential presidential run in 2015.

But Myanmar has changed dramati-

cally over that time. The junta finally ceded power last year, and although many of its leaders merely swapped their military uniforms for civilian suits, they went on to stun even their staunchest critics by releasing political prisoners, signing cease-fires with rebels, relaxing press censorship and opening a direct dialogue with Suu Kyi who they tried to silence for decades.

U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton congratulated Myanmar for holding the poll. Speaking at a news conference in Istanbul, Turkey, she said Washington was committed to supporting the nation's reform effort.

"Even the most repressive regimes can reform, and even the most closed societies can open," she said.

The topdown revolution has left Myanmar befuddled and wondering how it happened - or at least, why now? One theory says the militarybacked regime had long been desperate for legitimacy and a lifting of Western sanctions, and its leadership had quietly recognized that their impoverished country, formerly known as Burma, had fallen far behind the rest of skyscraper-rich Asia.

On the street in Yangon where Suu Kyi's opposition National League for Democracy maintains its crumbling three-story headquarters, none of that seemed to matter Sunday. The party's foray into electoral politics was its first since 1990 - when it won a landslide that was promptly annulled by the

"It's the people's victory! We've taught them a lesson!" said a shopkeeper who goes by the single name Thien, who was among a crowd of thousands watching as a digital signboard repeatedly flashed news that Suu Kyi won the Kawhmu constituency south of Yangon.

The crowds swelled as night fell, blocking traffic on the road. Some chanted "We won! We won!" Others clapped, danced, waved party flags and held their fingers aloft in V-for-victory signs. One official party message even told them not to gloat.

As results came in Sunday night from the poll watchers of Suu Kyi's party, spokesman and campaign manager Nyan Win projected the opposition would secure most of the vote, winning 40 of 45 parliamentary seats at stake. Those included four in the capital, Naypyitaw, considered a stronghold of the ruling party whose leaders helped build it. The opposition had contested 44 seats.

Other opposition party members, who asked not to be identified because they were waiting to verify some returns, said they achieved a clean sweep of all the contested seats.

Mexican Agents Probe Family in 3 Ritual Murders

NACOZARI, Mexico • It was a family people took pity on, one the government and church helped with free food, used clothes, and farm animals. The men were known as trash pickers. Some of the women were suspected of prostitution.

Mexican prosecutors are investigating the poor family living in shacks outside a small town near the U.S. border as alleged members of a cult that sacrificed two 10-year-old boys and a 55year-old woman to Santa Muerte, or Saint Death, a figure adored mostly by outlaws but whose popularity is growing across Mexico and among Hispanics in the United States.

The killings have shocked the copper mining village of Nacozari, on the edge of the Sierra Madre, and may be the first ritual sacrifices linked to the popular saint condemned by the Roman Catholic Church. Known as "flaquita," or "the skinny one," the figure known as Saint Death is portrayed as a skeleton wearing a hooded robe and holding a scythe, much like the Grim Reaper.

Authorities say the throats and the wrists of the victims were cut with knives and axes, and their blood was spread on a Santa Muerte altar. Their bodies were then buried near the shacks where the alleged cult members lived.

"We never knew they were part of a Santa Muerte cult," said Jorge Sanchez Castillo, a 54-year-old hotel owner who has a corn field next to the house of the woman believed to lead the group. "This has been a tragic thing for all of us."

Jose Larrinaga, spokesman for the Sonora Attorney General's Office, said 44-year-old Silvia Meraz was the cult leader, and seven people related to her, were detained: her boyfriend Eduardo Sanchez, father, son, three daughters and a daughterin-law. No formal charges have been filed pending further investigation.

"They thought that by offering the blood, they would be protected for some time," Larrinaga said. "According to them, Santa Muerte was going to tell them where the money was. They all identify themselves as fanatic followers of Santa Muerte."

Nacozari has been spared the grisly violence of drug cartels fighting for lucrative corridors along the U.S.-Mexico border, said police chief Jose Miguel Espinoza.

"It was a peaceful town. We'd never seen such violence," he said.

Nations Pledge Millions for Syrian Opposition

ISTANBUL (AP) • A coalition of more than 70 partners, including the United States, pledged Sunday to send millions of dollars and communications equipment to Syria's opposition groups, signaling deeper involvement in the conflict amid a growing belief that diplomacy and sanctions alone cannot end the Damascus regime's repression.

The shift by the U.S. and its Western and Arab allies toward seeking to sway the military balance in Syria carries regional risks because the crisis there increasingly resembles a proxy conflict that could exacerbate sectarian tensions. The Syrian rebels are overmatched by heavily armed regime forces.

The summit meeting of the "Friends of the Syrian People" follows a year of failed diplomacy that seems close to running its course with a troubled peace plan led by U.N.-Arab League envoy Kofi Annan.

Indeed, U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and other participants at the conference in Istanbul uniformly expressed concern that Annan's plan might backfire, speculating that Syrian President Bashar Assad would try to manipulate it to prolong his hold on

Clinton said she was waiting for Annan's report to the U.N. Security Council on Monday on the status of his peace plan.



MILWAUKEE • President Barack Obama's administration launched a multi-pronged assault on Mitt Romney's values and foreign policy credentials Sunday, while a fresh set of prominent Republicans rallied behind the GOP front-runner as the oddson nominee, further signs the general election is overtaking the primary season.

A defiant Rick Santorum outlined plans to leave Wisconsin the day before the state's contest Tuesday, an indication that the conservative favorite may be in retreat, his chances to stop Romney rapidly dwin-

"I think the chances are overwhelming that (Romney) will be our nominee," Senformally comes to an end.

ate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell said Sunday on CNN's "State of the Union." "It seems to me we're in the final phases of wrapping up this nomination. And most of the members of the Senate Republican conference are either supporting him, or they have the view that I do, that it's time to turn our attention to the fall campaign and begin to make the case against the president of the United States."

Both Secretary of State Hillary Clinton and Vice President Joe Biden went after Romney Sunday, underscoring the belief inside Obama's Chicago re-election headquarters that Romney will - sooner than later — secure the right to face Obama this fall. Their involvement comes as both sides sharpen their general election strategy, perhaps weeks before the GOP contest

"I think Gov. Romney's a little out of touch," Biden told CBS' "Face the Nation" in an interview broadcast Sunday. "I can't remember a presidential candidate in the recent past who seems not to understand, by what he says, what ordinary middleclass people are thinking about and are concerned about."

The line of attack is likely to play prominently in the Obama campaign's general election narrative. While Obama is a millionaire, Romney would be among the nation's wealthiest presidents ever elected. And he's opened himself to criticism through a series of missteps.

Romney casually bet a rival \$10,000 during a presidential debate, noted that his wife drives a "couple of Cadillacs," and lists owners of professional sports teams among his friends.


NAMPA • Harvey Dale Loder was born April 26, 1923, in Bradish, Neb., and passed away March 26, 2012, from complications of a stroke.

MIGUEL DE LA MADRID, FORMER MEXICAN PRESIDENT, DIES AT 77

MEXICO CITY • Former Mexican President Miguel de la Madrid, 77, who led the country during economic meltdown and natural disaster in the 1980s and laid the groundwork for freer markets and politics, died

Sunday morning.

De la Madrid died at a Mexico City hospital where he was admitted several weeks ago for lung disease. His death was also reported by President Felipe Calderon and the Foreign Ministry, as condolences poured in from politicians

across the political spectrum. De la Madrid remained a relatively popular figure, despite the persistent air of crisis from the time he took power in 1982 until he left office in 1988. At the time, his Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, ran Mexico from top to bottom, but its hegemony was beginning to show serious cracks.

De la Madrid inherited an

economic catastrophe from his mentor and predecessor, Jose Lopez Portillo, thanks in large part to policies that piled up a huge debt and sent the interest burden and inflation soaring. At the same time, falling oil prices carved into one of Mexico's main sources of income.

LYNDON, Kan. (AP) • Authorities say a packed motor home headed from Texas to Minnesota has crashed in northeast Kansas, killing five people and sending 13 others to hospitals.

The Kansas Highway Patrol said the northbound Freightliner motor home was pulling a trailer when the driver lost control at 9 a.m. Sunday on Interstate 35. The motor home hit a guardrail and a concrete bridge rail before crashing into a ravine.

Trooper Don Hughes said the fatality victims included adults and children. The crash is under investigation. Hughes said he couldn't immediately release the names, ages or hometowns of the victims because their relatives were still being notified.

The survivors were sent to several surrounding hospitals. One of the hospitals, Overland Regional Medical Center, said the three victims it received were in critical condition.

Temporary Outage of Visa **Card Network Sunday**

WASHINGTON • A technical problem affecting the Visa network barred some people around the United States from using their credit and debit cards for about 45 minutes on Sunday, the company said.

The outage was caused by a recent update Visa has made to its system, said Visa Inc. spokeswoman Sandra Chu. She said Visa had trouble processing some transactions as a result, but the system is operating normally now.

Chu said the problem Sunday was unrelated to the security breach potentially affecting Visa and Master-Card customers that was reported Friday by credit card processor Global Payments

The outage occurred from around 12:40-1:20 p.m. MDT, a person from a major bank said. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because bank employees were not authorized to speak publicly. Visa had notified the banks that are members of its network of the prob-

Consumers and merchants reported having Visa cards rejected on Sunday.

At the Shoot Smart gun range in Fort Worth, Texas, manager Jared Sloane said credit and debit transactions stopped working early in the afternoon.

Sloane said a few customers walked out when told they could only pay with cash or check, but otherwise the problem wasn't yet much of a disruption.

Shoot Smart said problems with transactions were persisting at 4:40 p.m. MDT.

Chu said Visa's system was fully up and operational.

Obama's Insurance Requirement Not the Only Health Mandate

WASHINGTON • The individual insurance requirement that the Supreme Court is reviewing isn't the first federal mandate involving health care.

There's a Medicare payroll tax on workers and employers, for example, and a requirement that hospitals provide free emergency services to indigents. Health care is full of government dictates, some arguably more intrusive than President Barack Obama's overhaul law.

It's a wrinkle that has caught the attention of the justices.

Most of the mandates apply to providers such as hospitals and insurers. For example, a 1990s law requires health plans to cover at least a 48-hour hospital stay for new mothers and their babies. Such requirements protect some consumers while indirectly raising costs for others.

One mandate affects just about everybody: Workers must pay a tax to finance Medicare, which collects about \$200 billion a year.


It's right on your W-2 form, line 6, "Medicare tax withheld." Workers must pay it even if they don't have health insurance. Employees of a company get to split the tax with their employer. The self-employed owe the full amount, 2.9 percent of earnings.

Lindsey Donner, a smallbusiness owner from San Diego, pays the Medicare tax although she and her husband are uninsured. Donner, 27, says she doesn't see much difference between the mandate that workers help finance Medicare and the health care law's requirement that nearly everyone has to have some sort of health insurance.

"My understanding of what is going on in the Supreme Court is that it seems to be something of a semantics issue," she said. "Ultimately, I don't see the big difference. If I am paying for Medicare, why can't I also be paying into something that would help me right now or in five years if I want to have children?"

Cheating Scandal as Much About Ethics as Security

hat a shock: Smart guys with affluent parents cheat on tests for fun and profit.

It's true that money can't buy good morals or respectability. A fancy paycheck and fancier home can't insulate your children from their own foibles, fallibility and foolish choices.

The makers of the nation's most-prominent college admissions exams seem to believe that stricter photo ID rules can deter shysters from diminishing the investment made by every student who personally stressed forth their own SAT or ACT scores.

But I wonder whether this isn't so much a security issue as a moral one.

Since last year, authorities on Long Island, N.Y., have been going after a collection of young adults who impersonated others to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test or were clients who paid the fake testers to produce enviable results. As much as \$3,500 exchanged hands, according to news reports about the investigation by Nassau County District Attorney Kathleen Rice.

A total of 20 people were arrested, including a pair of lawyers' sons now attending Emory University in Atlanta and Tulane in New

This past week, new security measures were announced for the SAT and the lesser-used American College Test, starting with the 2012-13 school year.

Among other things, students will have to submit a photo when they register for either exam then bring an admissions slip with that picture and a matching ID on test day; scores with students' photos will be sent to high school guidance counselors for verification; and test-takers will have to sign an acknowledgement that they know violators will be prosecuted.

Having to show a photo ID has not deterred SAT con artists. A driver's license, school ID or passport was already required at check-in. Bamboozlers just produce fake IDs at the door.

Just like adults, kids sometimes cut corners. Test answers written on the inside of a water bottle label; a tiny cheat sheet slid



inside a waistband; a restroom "emergency" to crib from index cards hidden in the toilet seat cover dispenser.

Students too lazy to devise their own methods can find a wikihow.com list that includes the "lanyard," the "gum wrapper" and a "girls only" technique that seems to require more effort than actually studying.

In The Perfect Score, a 2004 movie about SAT cheating, the usual stereotypes – underachieving guy, brilliant stoner, jock, rich girl — try to steal the test answers.

Rice's efforts to make the system more accountable are admirable, but this sentiment was jarring: "If we can't teach 16-, 17- and 18-year-olds that cheating is wrong, shame on us."

If 16-, 17- and 18-yearolds don't know cheating is wrong, shouldn't it be shame on them, and on whoever should have been teaching them right from wrong when they were 6,7 and 8?

Seems to me that what schools and other institutions can teach is the continuing life lesson that wrong choices carry bad consequences.

On The New York Times' discussion page, Cornell University graduate Andrew Daines wrote in 2010 that colleges should require freshmen to study ethics.

"College can be a process of unlearning bad habits just as much as adding to one's knowledge base," he wrote. "A philosophical grounding for goodness, honesty and integrity helps students to see the value of maintaining ethical standards or rising to them."

An ethics course, he said, "can and should be life-changing as it helps students discover new and fascinating intellectual incentives to do the right thing."

Fear of getting caught is an incentive, but surely we can do better than that.



Movies in the Mountains

ollywood was hooked on the idea of Sun Valley right from the start. As the Lodge was going up, Wesley Ruggles, a Paramount director, was looking around Ketchum for locations of the mountain scenes of "I Met Him in Paris." This comedy-romance starred Claudette Colbert, Melvyn Douglas and Robert Young, and it dealt with a role of a working girl with two rival suitors, taking a once-in-alifetime vacation in the Swiss Alps and in Paris.

Ruggles returned to Ketchum in early January 1937 with a construction crew he put to work building a set meant to be a chalet in the Swiss alpine resort. It was erected on the Anderson Ranch, about 7 miles north of Ketchum on the Wood River.

By Jan. 15, many of Paramount Studio's filming crew, techinicians and extras arrived, most of whom were put up in Ketchum and in 60 rooms of the Hotel Hiawatha in Hailey. Forty of the cast and technicians were considered important enought to stay at the Sun Valley Lodge.

The movie makers arrived just in time to witness some of the opening events of Sun Valley's first winter sports season on Jan. 17, 1937. With Count Schaffgotsch and Hans Hauser in charge, and Averill Harriman as judge, a sled dog race was run.

Forty or more Paramount men, minor players and extras, the last large contingent, arrived in mid-February. By now, things were so crowded a hot lunch was prepared on a railroad dining car at the depot, loaded on a large truck with steam tables and was taken up river or wherever action was being

Filming had been expected to take three weeks, but one correspondent wrote, "Movie producers get a bad case of the jitters whenever anyone suggests producing another ... snow picture of any kind since that experience with 'I Met Him in

Paris?... It was expensive, bringing the whole cast and all the cameramen, technicians, etc., up here in the first place, and, in the second place, it took them about twice as long to film as they had thought it would because whenever there was sun and plenty of snow, some of the principals had caught cold and couldn't work, and when they got well again, there was no sun or the snow had melted and they had to wait for more ... and, while I don't know how much all of their rooms cost, today they showed me the suite that Claudette Colbert occupied, at \$48 a day AND they were all here TWO MONTHS!

In the March issue of Paramount Parade, one of the Ketchum location crew said, "Peace and quiet reigns supreme at Ketchum and Hailey when our crew returns to the hotel after a day's scene taken in the snow. Nary a ripple disturbs the restful quiet except in the sulphur natatorium of the ancient Hiawatha Hotel."

Idaho natives found Paramount appalling at this season. Winter, they reasoned, was made for hibernating by the fire. Everyone in town sees the weekly movie show, the local dances are punctuated by rousing fistfights. There is one train daily yesterday's 5:15 arrived today.

As for Colbert, she says

she spent seven weeks on lo-

cation, and never had such difficulty skating, skiing, tobogganing, sledding and skijoring. The second film, shot at

the resort in March 1941, is Sonja Henie in "Sun Valley Serenade," which was an excuse to show her skating techniques that won her renown as an Olympic champion.

Thousand of cheering Salt Lakers welcomed stars of "Sun Valley Serenade" at the world premiere showing at the Centre theatre in Salt Lake City on Aug. 17. From the arrival by air of John Payne, Milton Berle, Margaret Weaver, Linda Darnell and Brenda Joyce until they left for Los Angeles at 10:05 p.m. the actors and actresses were followed by crowds of fans and eager autograph hunters. Sonja Henie was then in New York.

Utah Mayor Defends Police Handling of Susan Powell Case

WEST VALLEY CITY, Utah (AP) • A Utah mayor is defending his police department's handling of the Susan Powell case, insisting it did everything it could to resolve

After Friday's release of court documents linking Josh Powell to the 2009 disappearance of his wife, her family and prosecutors in Washington state questioned why he wasn't arrested for her murder before he killed himself and their two young children two months

West Valley City Mayor Mike Winder told the Deseret News that it's easy to go back and second guess police decisions, especially after the Feb. 5 death of the two boys in a gas-fueled house inferno in Washington.

"It is easy to Monday morning quarterback these things. It is easy for those of us who watch TV to say, 'Hey, there is plenty of evidence," Winder said. "It is a different matter if you are in the legal community to have enough evidence to go in for an arrest?'

West Valley City police have repeatedly said they are treating the case as a missing-person matter. They still don't have a body, and no firm answers on where - and if -a murder took place.

Susan Powell's father, Chuck Cox, said he pleaded with police to arrest his sonin-law, and his two grandsons would be safe had in-



vestigators acted.

"I did everything within my power to ask them, would they please arrest him if they have enough, if they think they're even close, would they go ahead and do it. And they assured me they were doing the best they could at the time," Cox told the Deseret News.

Attorney Anne Bremner, who represents Chuck and Judy Cox, said she was shocked police didn't make an arrest given the information they had.

Among a heap of evidence, West Valley City police found Susan Powell's blood in the family home, a hand-written letter in which she wrote that she did not trust her husband and a young son who said that mom was dead.

"There was compelling evidence he killed her;' said Bremner, a former prosecutor in the King County, Wash., Attorney's Office. "I prosecuted cases on far less than that and won them. There was enough evidence to arrest Josh, and if he had been arrested, the boys would be alive."

But Winder pointed out that Washington state authorities were ultimately responsible for the safety of the two boys.

"They had that informa-



Coming Up with a New Menu Is a Whopper of a Task

Burger King launches 10 menu items including smoothies, frappes, specialty salads and snack wraps in a star-studded TV ad campaign. It's the biggest menu expansion since the chain opened its doors in 1954.

MIAMI • When Burger King set about to fix its ailing empire, the fast food giant started by scrutinizing everything on the menu - even the mayon-

A group of Burger King executives and franchisees last year sat through a lengthy presentation complete with charts and graphs on how oils and eggs affect the quality of the spread. A blind taste test of 30 varieties followed. The verdict: They liked the one Burger King was already using.

"That was actually a pretty hard day;" recalls John Koch, Burger King's executive chef.

It wasn't the only one. Over the past year, Burger King evaluated all of its ingredients from the bacon to the cheese slices it serves on its chargrilled burgers as part of a yearlong quest to reverse years of slumping sales of its Whoppers and fries. The result: On Monday, it plans to launch a lineup of smoothies, frappe coffees, chicken strips and snack wraps. The 10 new items mark Burger King's biggest menu expansion since the chain opened its doors in 1954.

Burger King's food odyssey shows how grueling it can be for a fast-food company to come up with new menu items a process most Americans aren't aware of when they're handed a bag at a drive-thru window. Burger King is the latest chain to revamp its menu as part of the fast-food industry's move away from its single-minded courtship of young men. Once the lifeblood of the industry, the economic downturn hit those junk food fanatics particularly hard. At the same time, Americans' generally have been demanding healthier options.

Burger King has failed to evolve even as competitors have gone after new customers with breakfast items and healthier fare. Last year, Wendy's for the first time edged out Burger King as the nation's No. 2 burger chain behind McDonald's. To stem the decline, Burger King executives last year decided to remodel its aging system of 7,200 stores to make them more contemporary, redesign worker uniforms with aprons so they stay clean and even serve the iconic Whopper in cardboard cartons instead of paper burger wrapping for the first time in more than 20 years. The food, however, is at the heart of its plan.

Consumers have longed for more food options at Burger King, but the revamp is a gamble. The new menu may not go far enough to differentiate Burger King from its competi-

After all, there are striking similarities between Burger King's new items and the offerings of its much-bigger rival McDonald's. The Golden Arches already rolled out specialty salads in 2003, snack wraps in 2006, premium coffee drinks in 2009, and fruit smoothies in 2010.

"Being an innovator is critical in the fast-food industry;" said Darren Tristano, an analyst for food industry researcher Technomic Inc. But in recent years, he said Burger King has been more of a fol-

Burger King executives don't deny that its new items are pretty close to those on McDonald's popular menu. But they say the new menu was created as a result of Burger King's own research.

"Consumers wanted more choices," said Steve Wiborg, president of Burger King's North America operations. "Not just healthy choices, but choices they could get at the competition."

The Ramp Up

The fast-food industry has undergone a shift in recent years. Just five years ago, the top three fast-food companies were all burger chains. But concerns over obesity have paved the way for competitors like Subway, now the secondbiggest chain, and Starbucks, which climbed up the rankings to the No. 3 spot. Smaller players such as Five Guys, which sells made-to-order burgers, are gaining ground too.

McDonald's quickly adapted. The world's biggest burger chain reinvented itself as a hip, healthier place to eat by offering wireless Internet and rolling out a string of hit menu items such as fruit smoothies, iced coffees and oatmeal.

Burger King failed to keep up. Its share of sales among burger chains fell from 17 percent a decade ago to 12 percent last year, according to researcher Technomic. McDonald's share rose from 42 percent to 50 percent.

All Tom McDonald had to do was look at Burger King's competitors to see why sales at the chain were falling. A Burger King franchisee since 1989, McDonald said the chain's menu hadn't changed much over the years.

"We were getting behind with the wraps and salads that were coming on the market," said McDonald, who owns 19 franchises. "We had salads, but they weren't as good as the competition. We focused on burgers maybe longer than we should have?"

McDonald said he expressed his concerns at the company's failure to keep up with the times. But the Miami-based chain had gone through a series of owners over the years, and McDonald said he got little response from corporate about addressing the problems.

He said the attitude from the top changed, however, after New York-based private equity firm 3G Capital bought Burger King last year. That's when Burger King assembled a group of 15 key executives, franchisees and suppliers to evaluate the chain's menu, item by item.

The process, which took three months of daylong meetings, was grueling at times. French fries took multiple days, given the various factors like seasoning, oil and frying method. Even the day for soft-serve ice cream, which was rolled out last summer, wasn't as fun as it might sound: A supplier that had 400 vanilla flavors presented the nuances between Madagascar and honey vanilla.

"Trying to come up with the exact intensity of vanilla you need is a little bit daunting," said Koch, Burger King's chef.

Burger King quietly put some changes in place over the past year. The French fries are thicker so they'll stay hot longer. Burgers now come with one slice of cheese instead of two, so it melts more evenly. And naturally-smoked bacon is now cooked at each restaurant. Previously, Burger King had used a pre-cooked variety with a smoked flavor sprayed on.

The Rollout

Once executives settled on menu items, it was time to go to the masses. Would the new items measure up to those of Burger King's competitors? To find out, the company conducted consumer tests and revised its recipes over months.

Burger King considered making Panini-pressed snack wraps, for example, but tests showed customers wanted something lighter. The wraps it settled on closely resemble the ones offered at McDonald's - a chicken strip sprinkled with cheese, lettuce and dressing wrapped in a flour tortilla. McDonald's even offers the same flavors - honey mustard and ranch.



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Even seemingly straightforward items had to be reworked over and over. The new "Homestyle Chicken Strips" went through 11 variations before the final version was selected. And it took about seven months and six tries before the company found the right mix of creaminess, iciness and tanginess for its strawberry banana and tropical mango smoothies. "They didn't rush these products out to market," said



Wilson's Words Wise in Today's Age

arry Wilson is one of a kind. As the only member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame who was born in Idaho, Wilson's name should be on any short list when the topic of Idaho's greatest contributions to athletics is discussed.

Wilson has long since left Idaho, first for his collegiate career at the University of Utah and later for his pro career - first as a player and general manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, then for Phoenix, where he makes his home, after the franchise moved there in the 1980s. But he made an appearance back in his hometown of Rigby last week to



receive the Hometown Hall of Famer award, which was presented by Allstate and the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

The opportunity to interview Wilson, which came in form of a press release announcing the award's presentation and an inquiring publicist, was too good to pass up. Not only were there questions about his time at Utah, where we are both counted as alumni, but one question this corner viewed as fairly relevant

and helpful to today's high school athletes.

How does one from small town Idaho get noticed by major collegiate athletic programs?

Before we get Wilson's answer, his journey from Rigby to Salt Lake City should be explained.

"Jack (Curtice) was the head coach at (Utah) at the time, and I talked to BYU, Utah State, Idaho State and a couple of West Coast teams," Wilson said. "Coach Curtice sat down with my father and talked with us and told my dad he didn't know if I could (be a star) in football but he'd guarantee I'd get an education.

"(My dad) made the decision for me," Wilson said.

High school kids carry a little more independence these days in such decisions - "Back in that time, your dad could whip your fanny and you had to listen to what he had to say," Wilson said - which is why their activities today can carry so much weight in their ath-

letic endeavors. "You find something you're good at and you perfect it," Wilson said. "You need to appreciate and love what you're doing. The kids I grew up with here ... we played sports all the time. That was our main recreation."

DENVER • In the end, Brittney Griner and undefeated Baylor proved to be too tall a task for surging Stanford.

So once again, the Cardinal will head home without that elusive national title.

Stanford just can't seem to get over the hump, losing to the Lady Bears 59-47 on Sunday night in the NCAA semifinals. This was the Cardinal's fifth straight trip to the Final Four and they have yet to cut down the nets in two decades.

Stanford was on a roll, too, reeling off a school-record 32 consecutive wins. The Cardinal's only loss this season came at Connecticut in early November.

And yet few people gave Stanford (35-2) much of a chance to win against heavily favored Baylor (39-0), which will face Notre Dame for the championship on Tuesday night.

Hall of Fame coach Tara Van-Derveer had a few tricks up her sleeve, surprising Baylor with a rather clever game plan. She elected to pack players into the paint to bottle-up Griner and dared the Bears to find someone else to beat them.

They did - only it took a while.

In the first half, the strategy threw off the Bears and everyone not named Griner combined to shoot a paltry 34 percent.

The final half was a different story as Terran Condrey and Odyssey Sims stepped up, each coming up big over the final 20 minutes. That helped Baylor overcome a very average night by the 6-foot-8 Griner, who was held to a pedestrian 13 points and nine re-

From the youngsters' reperch, Novak Djokovic looked like a tiny figure, yet he still loomed large. The top-ranked Djokovic won his third Sony Ericsson Open title Sunday, holding every service game to beat Andy Murray 6-1, 7-6 (4).

Djokovic improved to 20-2 this year and 90-8 since the start of 2011. He didn't lose a set in six rounds at Key Biscayne.

"I'm playing at the peak of my form ... the best tennis that I have played," Djokovic said. "I have to use that as much as I can."

He also won the tournament in 2007 and last year. Only six-time champion Andre Agassi has more men's titles at Key Biscayne.

Mulling how to celebrate his latest trophy, Djokovic said he might violate his gluten-free diet.

"I cannot guarantee anything," he said with a laugh. "I think I deserve a

fresh bagel." It was Djokovic's first championship since he won the Australian Open in January for his fifth Grand Slam title and third in a row. Now begins the clay season culminating with the French Open, the only major Djokovic has yet to win.

"This is very encouraging for me prior to the clay-court season," he said. "I'm going to have more confidence."

The lone break point Djokovic faced in the final came in the fifth game, and he erased that. He lost only one service point in the tiebreaker, went ahead to stay when Murray doublefaulted to make it 3-2, and closed out the victory when the Scotsman sailed his final forehand long.

"I managed to play my best tennis when I needed to," Djokovic said.

He's enjoying his success. Warming up before a match earlier in the week, he joked with fans and used his racket handle to whack balls to them.

"Honestly, I'm not a big fan of baseball," the Serb said with a smile. "I'm a fan of hitting the home runs with a tennis racket at the practice sessions.

"We try to come up with some crazy ideas and invent new sports on the tennis court. Yesterday we played a little tennis hockey, if you want to call it, or whatever. So we like having fun?

Are there in-state opportunities that are falling by the wayside?





Playing your delicate spade grand slam, you receive the lead of the heart king to the ace. Before playing to the second trick, you need to identify your 13 tricks. The most likely approach seems to be to set up clubs or to play a crossruff. For the latter you need to take five sidewinners and eight trump tricks. In turn, this requires you not to draw all the trumps, but can you draw any rounds of trump? That is the question.

Given the weakness of your trump spots in hand, the contract appears to depend on the clubs breaking 4-3 or else you may suffer an overruff. However, there is a slight extra chance that will cost you nothing to take. Before going after clubs, take precisely one round of trump. Cash the spade queen, then play all three top clubs, throwing hearts from

When West shows out but cannot ruff, declarer can crossruff with impunity. If clubs had been 4-3, then declarer would cash the diamond ace and lead a heart. If East discards, declarer ruffs low, ruffs a diamond low, and leads another heart. If East again discards, declarer ruffs and makes the rest on a high crossruff. If East ruffs in when clubs were originally 4-3, then declarer overruffs, draws the last trump with dummy's jack, ruffs a club, and claims, since dummy's remaining club is high.

ANSWER: You might get strong opinions on this one. Some will tell you "Always lead a major": others will tell you "Never lead from ace-fourth." My view is that against blind no-trump auctions you want to avoid leading from a four-carder headed by one honor if anything else looks attractive. Here, the spade-10 lead from the top of your sequence does look better — at least to me.



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
