Boy Dies after Playing 'Choking Game'

DIETRICH • Dietrich school officials are educating students on the dangers of the "choking game" after their 10year-old classmate died Rasmussen this weekend.

Austin Rasmussen died Saturday as a result of self-inflicted strangulation after playing the game alone at home. He's the son

REACTIONS MIXED TO CITY GRANT PROCESS

Councilman: More publicity may have led to 'false hope' for some applicants.

TWIN FALLS • In any other year, Jonie Benson wouldn't have even known she

As administrator for the Mustard Tree Wellness Clinic in Twin Falls, Benson helps spot possible funding opportunities. So when she found out she could apply for a relatively unknown grant from the city, she immediately sent out an application.

But her clinic wasn't chosen - not a surprise to at least one city official familiar with the grant's history.

On Monday, Twin Falls City Council members selected seven recipients to divide up \$100,000 in city grant funding that, until this year, typically received little attention. The Municipal Outsource Powers Grant is designed to fund organizations that provide services the city could, but doesn't.

CSI Tuition to Hold Steady for Most Students

TWIN FALLS • There's good news for about 97 percent of students at the College of Southern Idaho: No tuition increase next

But for an estimated 3 percent

- those who take 16 credits or more per semester — tuition will increase by about 8.33 percent.

During a Wednesday meeting, college trustees voted 4-1 to approve next year's tuition rates. The board was in agreement with a proposal unanimously backed by CSI's Student Senate.

There are more than 9,000 students taking CSI classes this semester. The majority are parttime students.

Students from Twin Falls and Jerome counties currently pay \$110 per credit, and that won't change next year.

Full-time students taking between 12 and 16 credits currently pay \$1,320 per semester.

Next year, the full-time credit window will shrink to between 12-15 credits. Those who stay in that range will pay the same

amount as this year. Vice President of Administration Mike Mason said it's a step in the right direction. He said over the next four or five years, the college will probably move to a purely per-credit fee system.

Angel Hernandez, vice president of CSI's Student Senate, said student leaders wanted to take it in small steps so the change is less drastic.

"Maybe it would be a good way to start," he said.

Trustee Karl Kleinkopf voted against next year's tuition plan.

He said CSI might be viewed as greedy by raising tuition for some Please see CSI, A2

Former **Inmates** Sue Twin Falls Jail

According to the lawsuit, filed March 26 in U.S. District Court in Idaho, Frank Lee Gorrell, Timothy Eugene Harvell and Jonathan Guidi were among 11 men housed in the 100 block of the jail in January 2011.

At about 2 p.m. on Jan. 11, according to the suit, the men were instructed to go into the recreation room while their cell was searched. Each man was patted down before being escorted to the recreation room, according to the suit. After an hour, jail deputies announced a group strip search.

"All 11 men were crammed into a corner and forced to strip naked and line up in such a small space that they were touching," the three wrote in their complaint. When they were told to turn around, squat and spread their buttocks, the men wrote they were so close that their buttocks or faces would be directly in front of another man's genitals.

When the men complained about the conditions of the strip search, Deputy Virgil Adams allegedly told them "you don't have any rights because you are in my jail," according to the suit.

After the search, the men claim they were taken back to the 100 block, lined up against a wall and searched again. In the suit, they say they were aggressively grabbed in the area of their genitals. The men were then told the cell block was going into lockdown, according to the suit.

The suit claims the defendants "used excessive force on Plaintiffs, sexually harassed them and displayed deliberate indifference to their condition, in violation of their rights to be free from cruel and unusual punishment under the Eighth and 14th amendments to the United States Constitution."

The men demand a jury trial and request compensatory damages for pain and suffering, mental anguish and humiliation.

Carter and jail staff declined to comment Wednesday on the allegations, saying they had not officially been served with the lawsuit.

Few Answers in Heyburn Garbage Vote

HEYBURN • Heyburn city officials who voted to approve a controversial city garbage contract during a March 29 emergency meeting are saying little about why they did so less than 24 hours after declining to make the same decision at a well-attended City Council meeting.

The Heyburn City Council heard plenty of opposition March 28to its decision to award the city's garbage service contract to PSI Environmental Systems, and ultimately decided against finalizing the contract that day.

But citing an exemption in Idaho Open Meeting Law that allows cities facing an immediate financial loss to hold emergency meetings, the city held the March 29 meeting to award PSI the contract without first posting a notice and agenda for 24 hours, as otherwise mandated by

Opposition to the contract stems from PSI's bid coming in 21 percent higher than the least costly option, and its designation of PSI as the city's official commercial garbage contractor when some business owners said they preferred their current provider.

On Monday, Councilman Rocky Baker, who voted against the contract's approval, said he initially understood that the meeting to finalize the contract would be held today before it was scheduled as an emergency.

"I firmly believe this contract is not in the best interest of the city," he said.

On March 29, Councilwomen Cleo Gallegos and Joanne Justesen voted in favor of the contract, with Baker opposing it. Councilwoman Leann Smith was not present at either meeting.

The Times-News' attempts to reach Gallegos, Justesen, Smith and City Administrator Richins were not returned Monday.

Heyburn's attorney, Steve Tuft, offered little comment about why the emergency meeting was called after the council declined to make the contract decision March 28. He said his comments were limited due to a threat that the city could be sued over the is-

Tuft said the city originally asked to hold the meeting on Friday to satisfy the 24-hour notice requirement, but didn't due to his unavailability that day. When asked whether the city appropriately used the emergency meeting clause, Tuft said the city would have suffered immediate financial loss if the contract had not been put in place.

"They would have had a loss if they didn't have a garbage contract in place today," Tuft said. "I think it's legitimate, personally."

The two lowest bidders Western Waste Services and Total Waste Management offered proposals that would have cost residents \$4.46 and \$4.50 per month, respectively. PSI's bid will cost residents \$5.65 per month.

"I've wondered why they (council members who voted in favor of the contract) were adamantly in favor of it," Baker said. "I just didn't feel there was a compelling enough reason to vote against the lowest bidders."

Baker said he also disagrees with the clause designating the city's first official commercial contrac-

"We didn't have a system that was broke, so why designate a hauler when there is a local garbage hauler that employs local citizens?" he asked.

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Woman **Accused of** Drunken Attack

TWIN FALLS • Police have accused a Kimberly woman of battery on an officer after she allegedly kicked an Idaho State Police corporal in the groin during a traffic

Kelli Jean Crane, 41, was charged Friday with driving under the influence, resisting or obstructing officers, driving with an open container of alcohol, reckless driving and battery on an officer, all stemming from the Friday traffic stop. Idaho State Police responded to a 5 p.m. call of an injury crash involving a white Dodge Avenger on U.S. Highway 93 near Hollister. Emergency responders also received several reports of a suspected drunken driver piloting a vehicle of the same description.

The ISP corporal approached the area and saw a white, 2012 Dodge Avenger passing other vehicles and crossing the double yellow line, eventually driving directly toward the officer's patrol car. When a traffic stop was made, the woman, later identified as Crane, began to move throughout the car as it began to roll forward because it wasn't in park.

In court records, the corporal said he yelled at Crane to put her hands on the steering wheel, but she continued to move around in the car.

"I drew my handgun and demanded multiple times for her to put her hands on her steering wheel before she did," he

After Crane allegedly continued to be uncooperative, the corporal said he handcuffed her and held her on the hood of the car to wait for backup when it appeared that she was trying to return to the vehicle.

A Twin Falls County sheriff's deputy arrived and the two carried the woman to the patrol car. The ISP corporal said Crane tried to get out of her handcuffs, so he put her in leg restraints. As the corporal had Crane sit down again, he said she kicked both her feet into his groin area.

After Crane was contained, the corporal said he found a cold Coors Light bottle in the center console that was about a quarter full. Crane was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center for a blood draw and had to be restrained during the procedure, police say.

A preliminary hearing for the battery charge is scheduled for April 13. A pretrial hearing for the DUI, resisting, open container and reckless driving charges is scheduled for May 15.

Murtaugh **Man Arrested For Attempted** Strangulation

TWIN FALLS • A 53year-old Murtaugh man has been arrested for domestic battery and attempted strangulation.

At about 10:15 a.m. Saturday, Twin Falls police were dispatched to a downtown Twin Falls parking lot for a call about a domestic battery. The officer found a distraught woman who said Ramon Ruiz Carrasco tried to choke her following a discussion about their child custody agreement at another location.

The woman said the discussion was fine, but Carrasco followed her as she drove away.

The woman told police that when she stopped at the intersection of Fourth Avenue South and Idaho Street South, Carrasco left his car and began walking toward hers. The woman said she was unable to lock the door in time and Carrasco pulled it grabbed the open, woman's throat and began squeezing.

Court records state the woman tried to pull Carrasco's hand away, but couldn't and began to feel light-headed. Carrasco allegedly told her, "I see you got my message Sunday, don't ever do that again, next time I'll kill you."

Police say the alleged victim's injuries are consistent with her story. Paramedics were called and the woman was examined and re-

In an interview with police, Carrasco said he began traveling in the same direction as the woman but did not approach her and couldn't explain her injuries, officers said.

Carrasco was charged with attempted strangulation, domestic battery and violation of a no-contact order. He was arraigned Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on the charges.

A pretrial hearing for the battery charge and no-contact order violation is scheduled for May 15. A preliminary hearing for the attempted strangulation is scheduled for April 13.

According to court documents, everyone on the scene was uncooperative and argumentative with police, but officers were able to convince them to take Mack inside the house to try to end the disturbance.

Officers were called back about a half-hour later when the original caller said her neighbors were even louder than before.

Arizona's **Immigration** Law Should Be Overturned

The following editorial appeared in the Seattle Times on Monday, April 2:

he U.S. Supreme Court should strike down four troubling provisions of Arizona's anti-illegalimmigration law. They conflict with federal laws and ought not become models for states grappling with illegal immigration.

immigration enforcement. One can debate the efficacy of federal efforts but Arizona's 2010 immigration law was a wrongheaded attempt to supersede federal law.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals blocked key provisions of the law, including requiring law enforcement to question

people about their immigration status, ask for documentation and detain those without it. Arguments that this could lead to racial profiling are persuasive. The immigration status of people arrested would also have to be determined before they could be released.

The appeals court blocked other odious provisions, including making it a state crime for illegal immigrants to try to find work and allowing police to make arrests without warrants if they have probable cause to suspect individuals committed crimes that could make them deportable under federal law.

Placing the burden of immigration enforcement on local police is impractical and expensive. Hard-won relationships between law enforcement and immigrant communities would be damaged if Arizona's law becomes a model for other states.

The United States Conference of Mayors and the National League of Cities filed amicus briefs siding with the federal government. Seattle City Attorney Pete Holmes and attorneys representing 40 other jurisdictions also rightly weighed in on Arizona v. United

The Supreme Court should reject Arizona's law.

Environmentalists Press for Review of Wolf's Death

Groups say photo of trapped wolf posted on Internet suggests animal was tortured.

LEWISTON (AP) • Two environmental groups are calling on state and federal officials to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of a wolf that was trapped and killed in northern Idaho last month by a U.S. Forest Service employee.

Representatives from the Idaho-based Friends of the Clearwater and the Center for Biological Diversity, based in Portland, Ore., contend a photograph of the trapped wolf circulating on the Internet suggest the animal was tortured before it was killed.

The wolf was trapped by Josh Bransford, an employee of the Nez Perce National Forest. A photograph showing Bransford posing in front of the trapped and wounded but still living wolf have circulated on the Internet in recent weeks, drawing criticism from trapping foes who claim the wolf should have been killed before the picture was taken.

The picture was reportedly posted to a trapping website, trapperman.com, then copied and circulated by Footloose Montana, a Missoula-based group opposed to wolf trapping. A description of the photograph on the trapping website suggests the wolf was shot by someone other than Bransford. The photo shows Bransford in the foreground smiling, with the snared wolf in the background in an area of snow stained with blood.

Brett Haverstick, education director for Friends of the Clearwater, said it's illegal for people to interfere with a trapped animal. The groups have asked the Idaho Attorney General, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and the Forest Service to investigate whether animal cruelty or hunting laws were violat-

"This entire incident needs to be investigated as the circumstances surrounding it are incredibly disturbing," Haverstick told the *Lewiston Tribune* in a story published Wednesday. "We expect the agency to do the right thing."

Dave Cadwallader, supervisor of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's Clearwater Region, said the wolf was legally trapped by Brans-

"There is no indication of any violations," he said.

The Lewiston office of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game has received a slew of emails and phone calls about the picture, according to Cadwal-

Elayne Murphy, a spokeswoman for the Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forest, said the forest and the chief's office in the agency's Washington, D.C., headquarters also received calls and messages. Bransford did not respond to a request for an interview made by the Tribune through Murphy. She did say he was not dissuaded by the agency from talking about the incident.

Cadwallader said conservation officers looked into allegations that the animal had been shot by others but found no evidence that would lead to a citation. He said officers were not able to identify who shot the wolf prior to it being dispatched but believe it was likely done by somebody who did not know the wolf was tethered to a trap.

"It seems apparent somebody else shot at it," he said. "In light of the fact that wolf (hunting) season was open and a lot of folks have wolf tags and saw this wolf out in the open, saw this thing and thought it was an opportunity to shoot a wolf?"

He did say when the picture was taken versus when the wolf was dispatched could have been handled differently.

"We don't agree with some of the actions he took. Everything he did was legal, he just needs to be sensitive to how some folks react to certain things," he said. "Trapping is a very valid and viable wildlife management tool. I would suggest you don't take that kind of picture and don't share it on the World Wide Web. I probably would have dispatched the wolf first?

Trappers are required to attend a daylong workshop on wolf trapping before they are allowed to purchase wolf tags. Cadwallader said much of the class is devoted to ethics and the perception some members of the public have toward trapping.

"Maybe we need to do a better job," he said "We certainly include it as part of the curriculum. You can never talk too much about that sort of thing."

Home Video Captures Fatal End to North Idaho Police Chase

Sheriff's officials say homeowner's assertions are untrue and his video shows too little of the melee to draw conclusions.

SPOKANE, Wash. • A homeowner says his surveillance video brings into question the official account of why law enforcement shot and killed a North Idaho fugitive three weeks ago, though police warn against drawing too many conclusions from the footage because it captures just a portion of the chaotic 20minute chase and final encounter.

Video from a home in the Hayden culde-sac where Justin Earl Nicholas Todd, 33, was cornered by police shows a Post Falls officer apparently firing at Todd as the fleeing felon tried to drive past the officer. The officer nearly slipped on the icy road before steadying himself and firing several more shots.

Homeowner Troy Evans suggested the video proves Kootenai County sheriff's officials lied when they said Todd struck Idaho State Police Cpl. Michael Thomas Keys with his car before Keys and Post Falls police Officers Aaron Ogle and Bradley Johnson shot Todd, killing him.

"They need to justify the shooting in my cul-de-sac," said Evans, who has posted a copy of the video to YouTube and authored a guest column critical of the shooting that was published in the Coeur d'Alene Press. "He doesn't hit anybody," Evans says of Todd.

Sheriff's officials, however, say Evans' assertions are untrue, adding that the home surveillance video shows too little of the melee to draw such sweeping conclusions. Footage from police car dash cameras show the full story and verify the official account, said Lt. Stu Miller, of the Kootenai County Sheriff's Department.

"The video that he has is not very good," Miller said. "It's unfortunate that he's basing everything he has on it."

Miller declined to comment on details of the investigation but said the officers involved have spoken to investigators, and prosecutors will review the case to decide if charges are warranted. Video footage from the police cars, as well as the officers' full interviews with investigators, will be made publicly available at that time, he said.

Evans' footage was captured by one of eight surveillance videos at his home on West St. Estephe Court, where he and his wife have lived since 1991.

The video, which Evans provided to The Spokesman-Review and is available online, shows a car driven by Todd skid into view, then back up suddenly after police cruisers begin pulling up behind him. Officers get out of their cars, and one appears to fire two shots at Todd's car before nearly falling, then fires about six more shots as Todd drives in reverse while trying to turn his car around.

"Justin Todd braked and tried to go around that guy," Evans said.

Keys, the Idaho State Police corporal, is not visible in the home security video until after Todd is shot.

The home video shows Todd's car stop and his body slump to the ground after police open his car door.

Evans said he was sleeping when the incident began but watched the aftermath with binoculars. He estimates the shooting happened about 80 feet from his home. Officers performed chest compressions on Todd for several minutes until medics arrived, but he was already dead.

"They sat there and cooked up this story about how this state trooper was

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struck by the car," Evans said.

He questioned why police didn't have a better plan in place for apprehending Todd, who has a history of eluding police.

"They just parked and ran around with their guns," Evans said. "This guy's a professional eluder - what do you expect him to do, just stop and say, 'You got me'?"

"They do absolutely nothing but kill him," he said.

Miller, of the Sheriff's Department, criticized Evans for lambasting police over a "tragedy" based only on the video and said were he involved, he would consider a possible defamation claim against Evans.

"If it were me and it were just me, I'd be hard-pressed not to look at that once it's all documented and out there," he

A week before he was killed, Todd, of Coeur d'Alene, was named the North Idaho Violent Crimes Task Force's "fugitive of the week" for a felony warrant charging him with eluding police and being a habitual offender.

An Idaho State Police trooper tried to stop Todd's car March 12 about 2:20 a.m. after the car triggered an alert system on Interstate 90 that detects stolen vehicles and fugitives.

Keys, Ogle and Johnson joined in the chase, which lasted about 20 minutes before ending in front of Evans' home.

Investigators said Todd's car had recently been painted from blue to white.

They found six cans of black spray paint in the car that indicated Todd, a longtime felon, may have planned to paint it again. They also found a wig, a brass knuckles/stun gun combination weapon, a knife, three cellphones, drug paraphernalia and a police scanner.

A female passenger in the car was not injured.

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At 5 Months, Occupy **Boise Faces** Challenge

BOISE • The Occupy Boise protest reaches the five-month mark today, but with participation waning and a fresh offensive from Idaho officials to remove the group, protesters may be lacking cause to celebrate the occasion.

At its peak late last year, a few dozen tents surrounded the depressionera Ada County Courthouse with a membership to match, drawing the ire of lawmakers and state officials who tried throughout the 2012 legislative session to oust the Occupiers.

The tents have dwindled to about 15, and only a handful of participants watch over the vigil at any given time.

Dooley, Mike avowed Occupy activist since December, lamented the group's diminished involvement. "It's sad. I thought we really had something here," said Dooley, 22, a lifelong Boise resident. "Everyone you see left are the people who actually care about what we're doing here."

Idaho officials are taking another legal jab at the group, asking a federal judge for permission to temporarily remove the Occupy encampment so they can do basic repairs and upkeep to the property. A hearing date has not yet been set on the state's latest motion.

It follows a ruling in February by U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill, who issued a temporarily halt the state's first attempt to boot the protesters – a law banning camping on state-managed land.

A separate bill passed at the end of the session gave the Department of Administration power to make rules regulating the use of grounds, but that law has limited thrust with the restraining order in effect.

In his ruling, Winmill decided Occupy's tents are a symbol of their protest of income inequality and qualify as protected free speech. But he ordered sleeping, cooking and camping-related activities to cease. Winmill will hear arguments on that portion of the case in June.

Now the attorney general's office is asking Winmill to modify his injunction, saying the state needs unfettered access to the land so it can fix damage caused by the protest and also to perform seasonal maintenance, including weekly mowing.

BOISE • Boise resident C.K. Haun has this routine down. He may live in Idaho, but he's a senior engineer at Apple. Long before the sun is up, he arrives at the Boise Airport to catch his regular flight to San Jose, Calif.

"I can do this by autopilot now," he says. "Most of the TSA people know me, and we smile and say hi. Every Monday morning, week in week out."

Haun has been making this commute for seven years. Not long ago, he saw a surprising change. His return flight — the one that came back after the workday - vanished. The only option left was a flight leaving San Jose in the late morning.

Haun says that's bad for him, and bad for Boise. He points to the software developers and hardware manufacturers that call Boise home. Haun predicts they'll have a harder time without that one-day, back-andforth trip.

"It's the whole valley that really is going to suffer if we don't have great movement between the technology hub of the Silicon Valley and the burgeoning technology industries we have up here," Haun says. "Modern transportation is critical for the economic success of the Treasure Valley."

It's no secret that airlines are cutting back. Faced with the double hit of the recession and high fuel prices, they've had no choice but to offer fewer flights and fly fuller planes.

Midsize airports such as Boise's have been especially hard hit. Frontier Airlines recently announced it won't resume service between Boise and Denver this spring. Early this year, Southwest discontinued its flights from Boise to Seattle, Salt Lake and Reno. An American Airlines affiliate has canceled its service from Boise to Los Angeles. The net effect is that there will be 20 percent fewer seats leaving Boise this summer than last.

When he learned of the flight shift, Haun summed up his concerns in a letter. A copy of it landed on the desk of Bill Connors, president and CEO of the Boise Metro

New England

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Chamber of Commerce, who talked it over with airport officials. "All of us agree: That's a strategic route for us," Connors says.

Connors already had been thinking about Boise's air service. He says the city is lucky to be just a short trip from major hubs such as Salt Lake City and Denver.

But that doesn't mean Boise can afford to lose flights. After all, it's one of the most remote cities in the country. Connors says that means Boise must be proactive. "These are market forces at work," he says, "and if those planes aren't full, the airlines are going to make some decisions based on the marketplace. So, now it becomes important to us to see, 'Are there some incentives to keep particular routes alive?"

This isn't just about the San Jose flight. It's about making sure Boise is as wellconnected as it can be. Connors says ensuring that could mean asking hard questions of Boise's business community.

For example, he says, "'How much travel do you do between those two cities, and can you pledge that you're going to buy x number of tickets?' And maybe even go a step further and say, 'Hey, would you kick in a little something for a marketing fund to try to attract these folks?' You know, put a little skin in the game."

Passengers Down 15 Percent

If they do try to retain or attract particular flights, Boise business leaders will be pushing back against big trends. In 2007, the Boise Airport tallied more than 3.3 million passengers. Last year, the number was 2.8 million.

It's those kinds of declines that have airlines scrambling to contain costs. Midsize airports are scrambling, too.

"It's not just Boise Airport that's out there trying to grow again," says Bryant Francis, deputy director of the Boise Airport. "It's all the other airports as well."

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Stocks Suffer Worst Loss in a Month; Dow Off 125

NEW YORK • The price of gold, which has climbed for years like a blood pressure reading for anxious investors, plunged Wednesday to its lowest level in three months.

Gold fell almost \$58 to \$1,614 per ounce. It has declined 15 percent since September, when it hit a peak of \$1,907. It had more than doubled since the financial crisis three years earlier.

Surprisingly, the fall came on an ugly day in the stock market – the Dow Jones industrial average lost 125 points. Last year, a day like Wednesday would have caused fearful investors to buy gold as a protective investment.

"It's difficult to forecast, but I think the gold bull market is over," said Cetin Ciner, a professor of finance at

the University of North Carolina-Wilmington. He likened the surge in gold to dot-com stocks before they collapsed. Some investors buy gold

as a hedge against inflation, and minutes from a Federal Reserve meeting that came out Tuesday afternoon suggested that the central bank believes inflation remains under control.

Gold's attraction as an asset of refuge during crises also seems to have diminished. The economy has picked up, and worst-case scenarios in the United States and Europe have faded.

"Fear has been gold's best friend, and so to the extent that fear is dissipating, gold should fall," said Jim Paulsen, chief investment strategist at Wells Capital Management. "We might look back at these Fed minutes as the line in the sand."

Gold has been hit in recent weeks by striking gold sellers in India, the world's largest buyer of physical gold, who are upset over government tariffs. Another

bearish sign was a surge Wednesday in the dollar, which tends to rise when gold falls.

Gold fetched only \$300 to \$400 an ounce during the 1990s but climbed steadily last decade. By late 2008, it was near \$900. It took off that fall when prices for stocks

and corporate bonds plunged, wiping out years of savings. Even money market funds looked suspect. Investors bid up prices for the safest of assets, like

U.S. Treasury bonds. Others turned to gold.

"During our bout with Armageddon, people ran to it for safety," said Abraham Bailin, a commodity analyst at Morningstar. "It might sound silly now, but that's where it started?'

Demand for gold also surged as the Federal Reserve bought bonds, starting in the spring of 2009, to push down borrowing costs and stimulate the economy, a move known as quantitative easing.

The Fed's efforts to pump money into the banking system and avert a deep recession led to fears of runaway inflation, a concern shared by both the tea party and big-shot investors.

Buying gold soon became a political statement. For those who didn't trust financial institutions or were wary of the government, it was the investment of choice. The television personality Glenn Beck advised viewers to stock up on gold bars.

"Gold became a symbol of your political leanings," Bailin said. "It became a way to speculate on the solvency of the economy?

Sales-tax Collection Likely in Amazon's Future

COLUMBIA, S.C. • When word emerged that Amazon.com Inc. was hunting for new warehouse sites, leaders in this business-friendly Southern state rolled out a welcome mat of tax breaks to lure the Internet retailer.

Code-naming their effort "Project ASAP," South Carolina officials offered up more than \$33 million in incentives, including free land, a property-tax cut and payroll-tax credits. They even agreed to loosen the area's Bible Belt moral code, repealing a decades-old Lexington County "blue law" so Amazon's warehouse could stay open Sunday mornings.

As they discovered, that wasn't enough.

Amazon also insisted on an exemption from collecting the state's 6 percent sales tax on purchases by South Carolinians. Please see AMAZON, M2

When the state Legislature balked, voting down the sales-tax break last spring, Amazon stopped construction on its million-squarefoot warehouse and prepared to leave, throwing thousands of jobs into jeopardy.

The threat worked. After an intense fight that pitted Amazon and local economic-development boosters against small businesses and big retailers like Wal-Mart, lawmakers reversed themselves and handed Amazon a five-year sales-tax reprieve.

The South Carolina episode is one of many confrontations Amazon has faced in its national fight to hang on, for as long as possible, to one of its major advantages over brick-andmortar retailers.

The world's largest Internet retailer currently collects sales taxes from customers in just five states, including Washington, giving it a price advantage of up to 10 percent in most of the country.

But the days of tax-free Internet shopping appear to be coming to an end, something that Amazon itself has conceded in recent months.

States have lost more than \$52 billion during the past six years because of untaxed Internet purchases, according to a University of Tennessee study. Facing massive budget deficits that threaten further cuts to schools and social services, an ever-growing chorus of lawmakers has called for an end to the salestax edge long enjoyed by Internet retailers.

The backlash against the tax break — and Amazon's political tactics – has cut across party lines in many states, uniting tea-party Republicans and liberal Democrats alike.

"The perception of the company has changed 180 degrees. It is viewed as the bully in these situations," said Michael Mazerov, senior fellow with the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, a critic of Amazon's salestax stance.

In Congress, bipartisan legislation to fix the online tax loophole is gaining momentum - and Amazon itself has strongly endorsed the proposals, so long as they also apply to its competitors.

"We have always supported a federal solution," said Paul Misener, Amazon's vice president for global public policy.

Not content to wait, at least 23 states already have

enacted or proposed legislation to force Internet salestax collections.

For years, Amazon has responded to those state moves with bluster, lawsuits, threats to close warehouses and abrupt cuts of ties to thousands of websites in states that forced the tax issue.

"We have vehemently opposed the unconstitutional solutions that the states have taken," said Misener.

But recently, Amazon has backed down in the face of resolute governors and state legislatures, agreeing to collect sales taxes in several states despite its longstanding protestations that states had no legal right to force the

Taxes were on Jeff Bezos' mind right from the beginning of Amazon.

He once told an interviewer he'd thought about founding his Internet bookseller startup on a California Indian reservation to escape taxes. When that proved impractical, Bezos settled on Seattle, in part because Washington's relatively small population effectively would leave more Amazon sales untaxed.

According to confidential internal documents, Amazon also has tightly restricted employee travel to avoid taxes, instructing workers to beware of working in states where their presence might trigger tax liability.

The company has handed out a color-coded U.S. map to employees, ranking states from "green" for the safest destinations, to "red" for those that pose a "significant risk" requiring special approval to visit.

The company's map and travel policy were first disclosed by The Wall Street Journal in August. The Seattle Times obtained copies of the maps and related documents from court filings in a lawsuit brought against the company by a former Amazon software engineer.

In one internal memo, Amazon talked up the need for vigilance, noting the economic downturn has caused states "to become more aggressive and more focused" on Amazon's tax treatment, a trend "which could expose our business to significant tax costs?

Amazon's efforts to avoid collecting sales taxes are defensible in states where it truly has no physical presence, said David Brunori, professor of public policy at Georgetown University and contributing editor to State Tax Notes magazine. "There is nothing irrational or evil about that," he said.

Ham Prices High Heading into Easter Holiday

Ham prices have been higher than usual for the past two years because the cost of pig feed has gone up.

OMAHA, Neb. • Ham will be the centerpiece of many Easter dinners this weekend, but the cost of that traditional main dish may make it harder for families to live high on the hog.

Ham prices have been higher than usual for the past two years because the cost of hog feed has gone up, and some major pork producers are spending millions to convert barns as they phase out cramped cages used to confine pregnant

Ham has been selling wholesale for 75 to 80 cents per pound this spring, which is in line with last year's prices but well above the 55 cents per pound average for the previous five years.

A recent check at one Omaha-area supermarket found boneless Hormel hams selling for about \$2.20 per pound, with bone-in hams slightly cheaper. With sales offered this week to attract Easter shoppers, it was possible to get a bone-in ham for as little as \$1.28 per pound.

Paula Vejvoda of Omaha said she's had her Easter ham in the freezer since Christmas, when she bought it on sale so she could economically feed her two daughters, two exchange students and husband.

"You really have to watch the ads and see who has the best price," Vejvoda said.

That's good advice for families, but hard to do when you're trying to provide ham for hundreds of people at a food pantry.

Joyce Lonergan, food pantry director at St. Anthony's Shrine in downtown Boston, said she tries to arrange to have a special meal at each holiday to help

boost people's spirits, but the prospect seemed daunting when the pantry began shopping for hams back in January. They were selling for \$2.30 per pound, not the 99 cents per pound paid last

With added donations and some breaks from suppliers, St. Anthony's was able to secure ham steaks and chickens for the holiday

"We've made it work only because people have been so generous," Lonergan said.

Livestock economist Shane Ellis said the price of ham isn't likely to drop soon because pork producers costs aren't decreasing. Feed, which is mainly corn, is running about \$6 a bushel - not far from the record \$7.99 per bushel set last June.

Pork producers also are switching from gestation crates to more open pens amid public pressure from consumers and animal welfare advocates who believe the smaller cages are cruel. One major producer, Smithfield Foods, recently said it expects to spend nearly \$300 million by 2017 to convert its

The switch also requires more labor to manage the sows because they tend to fight. Some of those costs are likely to be passed on to consumers.

Americans consume about 51 pounds of pork a year on average, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

While ham is a traditional element of many Easter meals, Ellis said prices typically peak in June, near the height of the grilling season when demand is highest. The low point is usually at the end of the calendar year because that's when large numbers of hogs reach the market.

Many organizations, like the Food Bank for the Heartland, don't even attempt to deliver a special holiday meal to the people they help because their goal is to offer the most nutritious food at the lowest possible price.

Or perhaps to speculate that the price would continue to rise, whatever the reason. Some analysts, like Ciner and Wells Fargo's Paulsen, said that as the price climbed ever higher, everyday investors may have been trying to catch the wave.

 $Gold\ was\ named\ the\ ``best$ investment" in CNBC's quarterly survey of investors released last month, topping real estate and stocks by a wide margin. Nearly half of those surveyed considered it a bad time to buy stocks.

One popular vehicle for buying gold, the SPDR Gold Trust, a fund that trades on the open market like a stock, has attracted hundreds of millions of dollars of investor money each month since its launch in 2004.

It now holds \$67.3 billion worth of gold. That makes it the largest ETF except for the SPDR S&P 500, which tracks stocks, according to Morningstar's Bailin.

Ciner noted that the price of gold dropped Wednesday despite news that Spain had to offer unexpectedly high interest rates to attract investors to buy new government bonds. That suggested that a solution to the European debt troubles is far from over normally a trigger for buying gold, not selling it. "It's pretty obvious that

gold's character has completely changed," Ciner said. "If it was a real safe-haven asset, you would have expected investors to flock to gold."

Bulls pointed out that gold's popularity reflects a widespread skepticism of the financial system and of national currencies - and that investors are fools to feel confident about them.


John Manley, chief equity strategist for Wells Fargo Advantage Funds, said that gold's role as a sort of fourth currency to the three big ones - the dollar, euro and yen - is unlikely to diminish because of those currencies' troubles. Those include the U.S. debt, Japan's aging population and

dissent among European countries about how to solve the debt problem there.

Nicholas Colas, chief market strategist at ConvergEx Group, said he thinks gold's popularity reflects the anxiety of our age. The price may change, he said, but an ounce of gold is always bound to be worth something. Old stock certificates, he said, may wind up worth no more than toilet paper.

"The gold rush isn't over;" he said. "It's just on pause?"

Thompson delivered a painful jolt Wednesday with a payroll purge of about 2,000 workers, or about 14 percent of Yahoo's 14,100 employees. The cuts will save about \$375 million annually as Yahoo tries to boost its earnings and longslumping stock price.

More shakeups loom as Thompson reshuffles divisions and considers selling an online ad-placement service and other operations that don't fit into his strate-

Those potential changes will follow a tumultuous time for Thompson, an affable and well-respected executive who held the top job at eBay Inc.'s thriving PayPal service before being lured away to help salvage Yahoo.

Thompson "definitely seems to be taking a very broad and bold view of what needs to be done at Yahoo," said Standard & Poor's Capital IQ analyst Scott Kessler. "He seems to know it isn't going to be easy and it isn't going to be pleasant."

The specifics of Thompson's vision are still unclear. In comments to analysts and reporters, he has talked generally about doing a better job of analyzing the data that Yahoo collects about its 700 million monthly visitors. That would help the company sell ads and develop mobile services to connect with the growing number of people surfing the Web on smartphones and tablet computers


Once an Internet trendsetter, Yahoo has been outmaneuvered and outsmarted by Google and Facebook in the race for online advertising. Although Yahoo's website remains a popular destination, people have been spending less time there and dwelling longer on Google services and on Facebook.


That shift has made Yahoo less attractive to advertisers, a problem that has been compounded by the company's inability to target marketing messages at the right audience as precisely

as Google and Facebook. After announcing the layoffs Wednesday, Thompson promised to share more details about his plans April 17, when Yahoo Inc. is scheduled to release its quarterly earnings.







When firefighters arrived, they found the three women who live there outside the home and flames coming from the back. Firefighters were able to extinguish the blaze quickly before it moved into the attic area.

Fire investigators say it appears the fire ignited after someone disposed a cigarette in a planter next to the house, causing the planter to catch on fire.

Below, local enthusiasts recommend their favorite spots to climb in southern Idaho.

City of Rocks

If you're looking for a variety of climbs, you can't go wrong at City of Rocks National Reserve, which climbing ranger Brad Shilling said has about "600 fantastic climbs," of all skill levels.

Among the most beloved spots in the park, located two miles north of the Idaho border in Cassia County, are Elephant Rock and Stripe Rock, Shilling said. Both are very popular and might have lines of eager climbers waiting to hop aboard the granite.

Shilling recommends heading farther inside the park. The quality of climbing remains at the same high level, and yet you might find a more private area to explore.

"With every footstep you take, the crowds diminish," Shilling

Don't have rock climbing equipment? Why not go bouldering at Dierkes Lake? No ropes or carabiners are required to climb boulders from which you can safely jump off. Instead you just need a spotter or soft pads to fall on.

"Dierkes has good bouldering," Shilling said. "The rock texture is good. It's not too sharp, and it's not too smooth. It's like Goldilocks and the Three Bears. It's just right."

Follow a trail on the west side of the Twin Falls lake heading north. You'll find a field strewn with climbable basalt boulders.

The Fins

Looking for a distinctive visual experience? Dave Bingham recommends The Fins near Arco.


"It's really a unique area," said the author of the forthcoming book "Idaho Underground: A Climber's Guide to Secret Climbing Crags of Southern Idaho," due out in May. "It's for sure the best limestone climbing in Idaho."

Shoot Your Gun Clean

an you imagine living in a world where the more you ate, the cleaner and shinier you teeth would become? How about dwelling in a realm where the more you shot your favorite firearm, the cleaner and smoother its bore would get?

While you'll probably have to wait until you pass through the Pearly Gates to enjoy the former, believe it or not, the latter can be experienced here

Gunpowder icon Hodgdon Powder Co. recently affected this paradigm shift with the commercial release of its latest offering, CFE223. Developed initially for our primary service cartridge, the 5.56mm NATO, the letters CFE refer to the Copper Fouling Eraser properties of the new propellant. The numerical portion of the acronym, 223 represents the civilian moniker for

Hodgdon's brain child is already proving itself to be a godsend for our warriors in harm's way. Not only does the powder prevent accuracy-robbing and malfunction-breeding copper fouling from building up in the bores and firing mechanisms of their semi- and fully-automatic weapons, it also increases the service life of their weapons by removing stubborn pre-existing metallic fouling.

Copper's unique metallic properties make it both the ally and arch enemy of the rifled tube. To its credit, the metal's malleable nature makes it perhaps the perfect material for forming homogenous bullets and gilded bullet jackets.

On the minus side, each time we send a copperjacketed projectile spinning down the barrel, it plates a microscopically thin layer of metal onto the sharp lands and grooves. Unless regularly and scrupulously cleaned, the weapon's accuracy and



functional reliability will become erratic and eventually deteriorate.

Prior to the advent of CFR, our anti-copper fouling arsenal consisted primarily of a number of noxious ammonia-based solvents and a smattering of abrasive fortified pastes and liquids.

Regardless of which product you chose, you still had to run a patched cleaning rod through the bore for a fortnight.

Those tortuous days are now behind us. To clean and maintain a copperfree bore, all you have to do is fire a goodly number of CFE handloads through your firearm. Upon firing, a special propellant component oxidizes to the molten copper of the fired bullet and blasts it from the bore as microscopic metal fragments.

Additionally, powder residue adheres to the bore preventing the accumulation of copper from subsequent rounds.

Last month, my brother and I decided to put CFE to the test and loaded a representative sampling of .223, .243 and .308 rounds with the new powder. Prior to firing, we cleaned the powder fouling from our test guns and carefully noted levels of copper fouling buildup with his Hawkeye Borescope (gradientlens.com).

One-hundred rounds later, we scoped their bores again and found them to be completely free of fouling. Just as important, the easy-metering spherical powder loads equaled or beat our favorite conventional loadings for accuracy; this is a win-win situation. Good shooting!

four-wheel-drive vehicles can continue up the steep road for another few miles.

"Drive as far as you dare take your car," Bingham said. "It's kind of a creepy road where it gets steeper and steeper."

After parking, hike west toward The Fins, which Bingham said look like "plates stacked on end in a dishwasher rack."

Lava Tubes **Near Shoshone**

From a mountaintop to another extreme: underground climbing.

Another fun spot to climb, Bingham recommends, are the lava tubes near Shoshone.

"I think the unique thing about the lava tubes is you can't imagine that there would be any climbing in this place," Bingham said. "You walk across (a featureless field of sagebrush), and you come to a hole in the ground. It's really peculiar. You scramble down underneath."

The lava tubes offer short sport climbs, from 30 to 70 feet long, Bingham said.

Bingham's directions to the lava tubes: Just south of the Shoshone Indian Ice Cave, about a mile, there's a road called Burmah Road. Go down this road for about a mile, then head north on a little gravel road for a quarter mile. There's a small parking area. Walk directly west for about five minutes back toward the highway.

"You will essentially run into these lava tubes," he said.

Protecting an Exotic Species

New rule restricts hunting of rare exotic antelopes.

A new U.S. regulation that will prevent hunting of endangered African antelope has upset ranchers whose efforts have led to a rise in the numbers of the exotic animals.

FORT WORTH, Texas •For years, hundreds of Texas ranchers have made big money on exotic antelopes, with hunters paying up to \$10,000 to bag just one dama gazelle, a rare animal with short horns curving outward.

Starting Wednesday, however, the U.S. government will stop allowing anyone to hunt the dama gazelle or two other exotic antelopes native to Africa, the addax and the scimitar-horned oryx - unless ranchers obtain a permit.

The move to give the animals full protection under the federal Endangered Species Act is being praised by animal-rights groups that abhor such hunts and has upset the ranchers whose efforts have led to a rise in the numbers of those exotic animals. The ranchers say they won't be able to afford the upkeep for their antelopes — but they also can't legally kill the entire herds or release them.

Texas has the largest population of the animals in the world - far more than even their native Africa. In 1979, Texas had less than three dozen scimitar-horned oryx, just two addax and nine dama gazelles, according to the Exotic Wildlife Association. But by 2010, the state had more than 11,000 scimitar-horned oryx, about 5,100 addax and nearly 900 dama gazelles, according to the association.

Knowing that the new regulations were set to take effect, some ranchers have sold their exotic antelopes. But prices have dropped by up to 40 percent and will drop an additional 50 percent after Wednesday, said Charly Seale, executive director of the Texas-based Exotic Wildlife Association.

The ranchers can apply for federal permits to continue the hunts, but most are refusing because they say it's government intrusion. Seale said just 10 percent of ranchers have sought the permits and he does not expect more to apply. Others are so irate they've threatened to kill the herds or just set them free, but that may not happen because both options are illegal under the federal act, Seale said.

"They are very prolific and had been valuable because a lot of people wanted to hunt them," Seale said. "We've built our herds with our own money, and we increased an extinct population, one of the biggest conservation efforts in the world. And now they're telling us we can't do it? It's ridiculous."

Only a few animal sanctuaries for such animals exist and "they don't want 100; they want two or four," Bulkley said. The Exotic Wildlife Association plans to send about two dozen of the animals to a nature preserve in Senegal.

The rule will not only hurt the \$1.3 billion exotic animal industry in Texas but will cause the scimitar-horned oryx population to be reduced to 1,000 in a decade, Seale said.

However, the animals becoming extinct in Texas is better than what's been going on, Feral said.

Lake Trout Toughies

Guided packages include more than 25 small lakes on Red Lake Indian Reservation

RED LAKE INDIAN RESERVATION, Minn • The waters of the Red Lake Indian Reservation in northern Minnesota typically aren't thought of as a destination for anglers, but a new offering through the band's Seven Clans Casino aims to change that.

Beginning this spring, the casino near Red Lake, Minn., will be offering guided fishing trips on more than 25 small lakes within the reservation boundaries. The guide service doesn't include the tribal waters of Red Lake, but the smaller lakes offer the opportunity for anglers to catch everything from lake trout and rainbow trout to largemouth bass, pike, bluegills, slab crappies and walleyes.

"There's a whole bunch of different lakes, and they're all over the place," said Al Pemberton, director of the Red Lake Department of Natural Resources. "They're all pretty unique, and not a lot of people fish them."

According to Darwin Sumner, outfitters manager at Seven Clans Casino, nontribal anglers have been able to buy licenses to fish the small lakes within the reservation in the past, providing they fished with a Red Lake band member, but this is the first time package trips have been available.

The casino plans to hire two guides to start with, Sumner said, and "hopefully that will expand really quick."

It's easy to fish two or three lakes in a day, Sumner

"Our lakes are so unpressured," he said. "If people want to catch fish of any species, this is the place to come. That's what I've been promoting it as — you can jump from 17 to 27 lakes within a matter of 20 minutes depending on the species you want to target."

Sumner, who has guided on the small lakes in the past, said he typically begins by fishing trout in the morning and then moving to lakes with bass, pike or crappies as daytime temperatures rise.

"With the panfish, they're pretty much temperature related, so when the water gets warmer, they're more active," Sumner said. "With walleyes, it's just about any time with them. There's a good population of walleyes, and they're fairly easy to catch. I've caught them on everything from Mepps spinners

Social Media Bringing Transparency to Snow Reports

DENVER • The era of social media is bringing more transparency to ski resorts' daily snow reports, with skiers and riders using smartphone apps, websites, tweets and video to spread the word in real time, particularly if traditional reports are off.

And the industry itself has been quick to embrace social media to get the word out especially skier raves that attract more customers when fresh powder blankets a mountain.

One day in late February, Vail reported it had received a foot of snow on its renowned slopes. It didn't take long for early skiers to question it via Twitter and Facebook, and Vail retracted its report via Facebook – a first for ski industry observers.

Vail explained that a ski patrol did find a foot of fresh snow against a measuring stake, but that winds had left anywhere from that foot to 2 inches elsewhere across the expansive resort. It also posted a YouTube video showing good powder runs that day on the mountain.

"We're not trying to inflate the figures. We want to be as transparent as we can be," said Vail Mountain spokeswoman Liz Biebl.

The real-time revision prompted Denver architect Scott Parker to cancel his Vail plans that day. "These reports are too close together to vary as much as two feet like they have this year," said Parker, who relies on social media reports rather than traditional reports from Colorado resorts themselves.

Still, with the season in North America now winding down, it highlighted the complexity of snow reporting under the best of circumstances.

Traditionally, ski resorts measure snowfall by using

yardsticks or posting National Weather Service reports that sometimes are based miles away. Even local reports can vary widely, depending on where snow is measured. That poses a challenge for larger resorts like Vail, whose

Resorts say most snow readings are taken at 5 a.m. to give skiers time to get up to the slopes, and a lot can change by the time they get

Any person who has killed a mountain goat in Idaho since 1977 may not apply for a mountain goat permit. Anyone who has killed a California bighorn or a Rocky Mountain bighorn may not apply again for the same type of sheep but may apply for the other subspecies.

Wolf Season Closes in Most Zones

BOISE • If you didn't go wolf hunting this season, you're almost too late.

Wolf trapping seasons closed March 31 in all wolf management zones, and hunting seasons have closed in all but the Lolo and Selway zones. It remains open these two areas through June 30, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

As of Monday, hunters had killed 252 wolves and trapped 123, for a total of 375 wolves. Fish and Game sold about 43,300 wolf tags for the 2011-12 season.

For the remainder of the

2011-12 season, hunters may use two 2012 tags, and take only one wolf per tag.

Wolf seasons are anyweapon seasons, electronic calls may be used, and wolves may be taken incidentally during fall bear baiting.

Hunters must report killing a wolf within 72 hours, and they must present the skull and hide to an Idaho Fish and Game office within 10 days.

The 2012-2013 wolf hunting season will open throughout the state on Aug. 30; the trapping season on Nov. 15 in some zones

Students Pepper-sprayed in Protest over Prices

California college says price increase is an attempt to fund some popular state-required classes amid decline in education aid.

SANTA MONICA, Calif. • The dozens of student protesters who were peppersprayed by police at a California community college weren't just angry about not getting into a meeting of school

They were fuming about a new Santa Monica College plan that would let students who did not get into a needed, high-demand course take the class anyway, but only if they paid hundreds of dollars more.

On Tuesday night, the emotions boiled over at the meeting.

And a day later, the state agency that oversees the state's community colleges

called on the attorney general to judge whether the plan was legal. Agency officials also called for the college to temporarily halt the program.

The college has said the summer pilot program is an attempt to create new ways to fund some popular state-required classes in an era of declining state education aid.

Critics say the plan will create a caste system favoring wealthy students and runs contrary to the idea of community colleges as a gateway into the middle class.

"Students feel they are being backed into a corner. They feel like they have been left out of the discussion," said Joshua Scuteri, a student trustee. "The feeling on campus is it's like the Alamo?"

The school is one of the state's largest two-year colleges, with an enrollment of roughly 30,000 students. About 1,100 classes out of 7,430 have been slashed since 2008.

As a result, students can't get the courses they need to graduate. They have held protests before but wanted to be heard and seen by trustees Tuesday night, students said. They were upset because only a handful of them were allowed into the meeting.

Nursing Director Thinks She Was Target of Shooter

OAKLAND, Calif. • An administrator at a small Christian university where seven people were killed this week said Wednesday she was the alleged gunman's primary intended target after she rejected his repeated requests for a refund of his tu-

Ellen Cervellon, director of the nursing program at Oikos University, said she wasn't on campus Monday when her former student, One Goh, came looking for her then went on his

Two days later, in an interview with AP, a shaken Cervellon said the slayings are haunt-

"I have that weight on my shoulders and I don't know what to do with it," she said, her voice quavering. "Every single one of those students were going to be an excellent, excellent nurse. They're in my heart, and they always will be."

Oakland Police Chief Howard Jordan confirmed Cervellon was the apparent target. Officer Johnna Watson, a police spokeswoman, said later that police are looking into the possibility that other administrators had been targeted.

Goh, 43, was charged Wednesday with seven counts of murder and three counts of attempted murder, plus a special circumstance allegation of committing multiple murders that could make him eligible for the death penalty.

Shackled and showing little emotion, Goh said nothing during a brief court appearance other than a soft "yes" when the judge asked if he understood the charges. He did not enter a

In a police affidavit, Officer Robert Trevino said Goh acknowledged going to the campus on Monday with a .45-caliber handgun and four magazines of ammunition.

"He admitted to kidnapping a woman and forcing her from her office into a classroom at gunpoint," Trevino said in the statement. "He admitted to shooting and killing several people inside the classroom, before taking one of the victim's car keys and fleeing the scene in the victim's car."

Police arrested Goh about an hour after the shooting spree at a supermarket a few miles from campus.

A student wounded in the rampage said Goh burst into the classroom shouting and quickly began firing his weapon. Ahmad Sayeed was shot through the shoulder as he scrambled to get out with other panicked students.

The 36-year-old immigrant nursing student Afghanistan said he did not understand what Goh was velling, though he did hear him order students to line up in front of the classroom.

Sayeed said he has been this frightened once before - when the Taliban attacked his high school in the Nangarhar province of Afghanistan.

Romney Accuses Obama of 'Hide-and-seek' Campaign



WASHINGTON • Mitt Romney unleashed a strong attack on President Barack Obama's truthfulness Wednesday, accusing him of running a "hide-and-seek" re-election campaign designed to distract

voters from his first-term record while denying them information about his plans for a second.

Addressing an audience of newspaper editors and publishers, Romney said Obama's recent remarks to Russian President Dmitry Medvedev on a second-term arms reduction treaty had called "his candor into question." Romney, the likely GOP opponent for Obama in November, also accused the president of undergoing "a series of election-year conversions" on taxes, government regulation and energy

"He does not want to share his real plans before the election, either with the public or with the press," Romney said. "By flexibility, he means that what the American public doesn't know won't hurt him. He is intent on hiding. You and I will have to do the seeking."

Romney spoke to the Newspaper Association of America and the American Society of Newspaper Editors as the Republican nominee-in-waiting, his standing confirmed by three primary victories Tuesday night in Wisconsin, Maryland and Washington, D.C.

He campaigned Wednesday in Pennsylvania, where there's a GOP primary April 24 - though Romney treated it more like the general election battleground it will be in the fall. "Please help me defeat Barack Obama in November!" Romney told a cheering crowd in Broomall, a Philadelphia suburb. Romney will also campaign in Pennsylvania on Thursday.

Holder: Justice Department Will Respond to Texas Judge

Holder spoke a day after 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals Judge Jerry Smith questioned President Barack Obama's remarks this week about an "unelected" court possibly striking down the president's health care overhaul. Smith, during oral arguments in a separate challenge to the health law,

asked the Justice Department for a three-page, single-spaced letter affirming the federal court's authority.

When asked during a Wednesday news conference in Chicago what an appropriate response to Smith would be, Holder said, "I think what the president said a couple of days ago was appropriate. He indicated that we obviously respect the decisions that courts make?

"Under our system of government ... courts have the final say on the constitutionality of statutes," Holder said. "The courts are also fairly deferential when it comes to overturning statutes that the duly elected representatives of the people, Congress,

New Evidence Suggests T. rex Had Down Coat

LOS ANGELES (AP) • The discovery of a giant meat-eating dinosaur sporting a downy coat has some scientists reimagining the look of Tyrannosaurus rex.

With a killer jaw and sharp claws, T. rex has long been depicted in movies and popular culture as having scaly skin. But the discovery of an earlier relative suggests the king of dinosaurs may have had a softer

The evidence comes from the unearthing of a new tyrannosaur species in northeastern China that lived 60 million years before T. rex. The fossil record preserved remains of fluffy down, making it the largest feathered dinosaur ever found.

If a T. rex relative had feathers, why not T. rex? Scientists said the evidence is trending in that direction.

Ex-cops Sentenced in Katrina Killings

NEW ORLEANS • A federal judge sentenced five former police officers to years in prison for the deadly shootings on a New Orleans bridge in the chaotic days following Hurricane Katrina but not before lashing out at prosecutors for allowing others involved to serve lighter penalties for their crimes. The case that wrapped up Wednesday was the centerpiece of a Justice Department push to clean up New Orleans' police department that has long

been tainted with corruption. U.S. District Judge Kurt Engelhardt expressed frustration that he was bound by mandatory minimum sentencing laws to imprison former Sgts. Kenneth Bowen and Robert Gisevius and former officers Anthony Villavaso and Robert Faulcon

for decades when other officers who engaged in similar conduct on the Danziger Bridge - but cut deals with prosecutors are serving no more than eight years behind bars.

"These through-the-looking-glass plea deals that tied the hands of this court ... are an affront to the court and a disservice to the community," he

Police gunned down 17-yearold James Brissette and 40year-old Ronald Madison, who were both unarmed, and wounded four others on Sept. 4, 2005, less than a week after the storm devastated New Orleans. To cover it up, the officers planted a gun, fabricated witnesses and falsified reports. De-

fense attorneys have indicated they will appeal.

Engelhardt also criticized prosecutors for the different ways they charged those who

didn't cooperate with a Justice Department civil rights investigation and those who did. The charges were filed in such a way that they left judges with little discretion in handing out sentences in each set of cases, Engelhardt said.

Faulcon received the stiffest sentence of 65 years. Bowen and Gisevius each got 40 years while Villavaso was sentenced to 38. All four were convicted of federal firearms charges that carried mandatory minimum sentences ranging from 35 to 60 years in prison. Faulcon was convicted in both deadly shootings.

Retired Sgt. Arthur "Archie" Kaufman, who was assigned to investigate the shootings, received six years in prison – a sentence below the federal guidelines. Kaufman wasn't charged in the shootings but was convicted of helping orchestrate the cover-up

Dozens Reported Killed in Syria as **Deadline Looms**

BEIRUT (MCT) • Just days before the deadline for Syria to abide by a United Nations-backed peace plan, 54 people were reported killed across the country Wednesday, including 25 in the city of Homs during continued shelling and sniper fire there.

Since Sunday, when President Bashar Assad agreed to an April 10 deadline for a cease-fire, activists and observers have said the government's violent crackdown against dissidents has intensified.

In Beit Sahm, a Damascus suburb, 15 civilians were reported killed in an explosion that destroyed two buildings. Activists and state media traded blame for the incident.

Syrian state media reported that a building collapsed after explosive devices detonated in the basement as "terrorists" were putting them together.





turing Christmas parties, smoking more than 20 turkeys for his fellow co-workers and their families to



Anti-abortion Grandpa

Faces DC Clinic Lawsuit

With anti-abortion fliers and rosary in hand, Richard Retta, 80, waits for people to approach Planned Parenthood in downtown Washington on Wednesday.

WASHINGTON (AP) • Dick Retta stands outside a Planned Parenthood clinic in downtown Washington three days a week, trying to persuade pregnant women not to get abortions. The 80-year-old grandfather has been coming to the clinic for eight years and said he's personally persuaded over 400 women to

leave this clinic and others. Retta says his approach is friendly, gentle and loving. Government lawyers portray him differently, calling him "among the most vocal and aggressive anti-abortion protestors" outside the clinic.

In court documents, they say he routinely follows patients entering the building and yells at them as the clinic door closes. Last year he physically blocked a woman from entering the clinic, shouting at her not to kill her baby, they say.

As a result they sued Retta over last year's incident, using a 1994 law that makes it a crime to intimidate or interfere with someone obtaining reproductive health services. He is one of a handful of people nationwide charged every vear under the law. Lawyers for the government and Retta have a meeting before a judge Thursday to see if they can come to an agreement in the case, but it's unclear how likely that is.

"They'd like to get rid of me," said Retta, who acknowledges he's persistent and assertive with his message but denies ever blocking access to the clinic.

The Rockville, Md., resident attends Mass daily at a Roman Catholic church. He first began going to abortion clinics, which he calls "abortion mills," in 1998. He was recently retired and saw a note in a church paper inviting people to pray there. At first, he just prayed, but a few years later he took a class on what he calls "sidewalk counseling," approaching women entering clinics. He found he was good at it, he said, and soon he was a regular outside area clinics.

These days he spends Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings outside Planned Parenthood's clinic three blocks north of the White House. He still prays, with a rosary of blue and pink beads and tiny white hearts, but he's also watching for women who look as though they may be coming for an abortion. The telltale signs, he says, are arriving with a man or wearing loose-fitting clothing.

His standard practice, he says, is to approach with the greeting, "Morning, ma'am, can I give you some information?"

Then, walking with them, he might say "if you're pregnant, we have help for you" or "abortions are dangerous, women can die?' He may offer one of several anti-abortion fliers. He says he has 15 or 20 seconds to get his message out before the women get inside the clinic. But if they take a flier, sometimes they'll read it inside and come out, he said. Other times they stop to talk.

"It's very rewarding;" Retta said of the times when a pregnant woman decides to leave. In those cases he gives her a gift: a pair of baby booties.

Fairly often, though, people get angry. Sometimes women tell him to back off or go away. He's been spit on and had fliers knocked out of his hands, he said. Once, a woman blasted him with pepper spray.

He says he's also often jostled by volunteers who stand on the sidewalk wearing tops that say "prochoice clinic escort?' Their job is to ensure access for anyone who wants to visit the clinic, whether it's to get an abortion or other services including gynecological exams, screenings for sexually transmitted diseases or contraception.

But lawyers for the government argue Retta was the aggressor in January of last year when he blocked a patient from entering the clinic, weaving in front of her as she tried to walk around him. Court documents say it took several people to help the woman inside and that Retta made her entrance unreasonably difficult and hazardous.

There has been no plan of any kind to name a starter at the end of spring ball. At the same time, the field won't be whittled down from four, either.

Once the players became comfortable having a local legend around, they began taking advantage of his vast knowledge.

"He's helped with every part of my game," said Minico catcher Marty Pawson, who credits Price for improving his receiving, framing and footwork. "He's not just a good player, he's a good coach. He's been there."

And now he's back where it all started.

In the spring of 2000, Major League Baseball scouts flocked to Warburton Field to watch the all-American catcher bat .636, collect 68 RBIs and belt 17 home runs — all school records.

Price was a seventhround draft pick by the Los Angeles Dodgers and spent his career among four organizations: Dodgers, Royals, A's and White Sox.

Although he never achieved his goal of playing in the majors – perhaps partially due an untimely shoulder injury in 2003 – Price has no complaints about a long, distinguished career in the minors.

"I enjoyed 12 years of it," Price said. "That's not something a lot of people get the opportunity to experience... I thought I worked hard and I thought I did everything I could. I didn't catch some breaks sometimes when I thought I needed to, but I enjoyed it and I did a pretty good job of it."

In his last few pro seasons, the White Sox were grooming Price, who turned 30 last month, to become a coach. While he's currently unsure what the next chapter in his life will entail, baseball, at some level, will certainly be part of Price's future.

"I still want to stay in the game because I still love the game. It's a great game," Price said. "I enjoy working with the kids. I enjoy being able to talk with the kids and interact with them. Greek Track Halts Operations

ATHENS, Greece • Greece's track and field authority suspended all athletic operations Wednesday due to severe spending cuts - the latest twist in the debt-strapped nation's three-year financial freefall.

A text of Wednesday's decision, taken after an emergency meeting of the federation's board, said the suspension was indefinite. The move immediately halts all domestic track and field competitions, including a meet on May 12.

Although the suspension does not affect international competitions like the 2012 London Olympics

at the moment, the federation will meet again in two weeks and could toughen its stance if the government fails to respond.

"(We) call on the sporting leadership ... to intervene and avert the economic dead-end and the disintegration of track and field," the federation said in a statement.

Federation president Vassilis Sevastis told The Associated Press on Tuesday his agency was considering the suspension due to deep cuts in state funding that have left coaching staff and suppliers unpaid for months. He said the federation was unable to cover its basic needs.

"You do not win championships with one player, two players," Mulkey told the crowd. "You need five, six, seven, eight people heading the same direction. I told them in the locker room after the game, many hours after the game when we were still there: 'Any one of you can go to another university and play 40 minutes a game and average double figures, but you would not have gotten this trophy right here?"

Mukley received a congratulatory phone call from President Barack Obama earlier Wednesday. The President picked the Lady Bears to win the national championship before the tournament started.

Not exactly a bold pick. Baylor was a wire-to-wire No. 1 this season.





on Membership

Issues at Augusta

AUGUSTA, Ga. • Jabbed, prodded and poked repeatedly about a topic that never really goes away, Billy Payne wouldn't budge.

Faced with questions at his annual news conference about when a woman would become a member at the home of the Masters, the Augusta National chairman gave different variations of the same answer: That's our business, not yours.

The topic was on the burner again Wednesday, the eve of the year's first major, because one of the club's longtime sponsors, IBM, has a new CEO – Virginia Rometty. The last four CEOs at IBM, all male, have been invited

to be members. Payne's polite-but-firm responses were in direct contrast to those of his predecessor, Hootie Johnson. Faced with the issue 10 years ago, Johnson famously declared female membership would come on the club's timetable and "not at the point of a bayo-

"As has been the case whenever that question is asked, all issues of membership have been and are subject to private deliberations of the members," Payne said when the inevitable question was asked for the first time Wednesday. "That statement remains accurate and that remains my statement."

Asked to expand on his refusal to comment, he gave two reasons: "Number One, we don't talk about our private deliberations. Number Two, we especially don't talk about them when a named candidate is part of the ques-

He did not say whether Rometty was that specific "named candidate."

The issue first came up in 2002, when Martha Burk, then the chair of the National Council of Women's Organizations, campaigned for Augusta National to end its all-male membership and threatened to boycott companies whose executives belonged to the club. Johnson responded by cutting loose corporate backers

and the Masters was televised without commercials for the next two years. A planned protest before the 2003 Masters was a dud and the issue slowly reced-

When Payne replaced Johnson as chairman of the club and of the Masters tournament in 2006, he said there was "no specific timetable" for admitting women. The question was raised at the 2007 and 2010 Masters. Both times, Payne said membership issues were private.

Today, in addition to IBM, Exxon Mobile and AT&T are also sponsors of the Masters.

Contacted after Payne's news conference, Burk said she didn't pay attention to it and had no plans to protest this year because "we saw that didn't work."

It's not her job to pressure the club, she said, but rather, IBM's.

"If they're willing to diminish the company's image, and to discredit in a certain way their new CEO, that's a loud and clear statement," Burk said. "I would regret to see that very much. I think it's astounding that one of the largest corporations in the world is having their strings pulled by a bunch of

old guys in Augusta." Rometty, who took over as CEO on Jan. 1, is said to play golf sparingly. She is more passionate about scuba diving.

IBM spokesman Ed Barbini said the company had no comment.

Because the secrecy level at Augusta National is so high, there could already be a female member that nobody knows about. Though members are visible during the Masters because of their iconic green jackets, not every member is in attendance this week.

Several reporters, trying to get a clearer picture of what goes on inside these gates, came at the question from different angles. Each time Payne graciously swatted them away, preferring to talk about the weather, developments of the club's digital platforms and other issues surrounding the tournament that starts today.

Not So Easy to Cheer for Tiger Anymore

UGUSTA, Ga. • He could have used the 23 minutes to practice his putting, or check out the new slope on the 16th green. It might have been enough time for a quick lunch in the player's lounge, or a friendly chat with first round playing partner Sang-Moon Bae.

But there were questions to be answered, stories to be told. Tiger Woods understands this as well as anyone, so he dutifully headed to the interview room in the Masters media center to face the inevitable onslaught of queries about his game and

A few hours earlier, Rory McIlroy sat in the same room and talked about the final round meltdown last year that would have destroyed a lesser golfer. He was alternately serious and charming, especially so when he talked about a conversation he had with Greg Norman about losing a heartbreaker at Augusta National.

"Sorry. I wasn't born," McIlroy said at one point, drawing laughter when asked if he and Norman discussed a near miss in the 1980s.

A tough act to follow, not that Woods even tried. He had his script, and he was sticking to it.

The questions were mostly friendly, the responses entirely sterile. An attempt at telling a story about his first Masters with Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus had already been told many times, and seemed mostly an exercise in filling the time he was forced to stay in his chair.

That, too, was surely in the script. Better to fill time than to let one question slip in about how he had managed to overcome the emotional turmoil of his past to regain his position as the favorite to win his fifth green jacket this

His game is back, yes. That was perfectly clear two weeks ago when he wore down the field the way Woods always used to in his prime to win for the first time on the PGA Tour since a shocking sex scandal derailed his career and his life.

Took a while, and it came with a new swing. But it sure looked a lot like the same old Tiger we used to know and love.

He's not so loved anymore, though you wouldn't know it by the crowds who cheer his every shot. Maybe they just

love his game. A survey by Nielsen and E-Poll's N-Score, which measures endorsement potential, showed only 17 percent of respondents said they like Woods, compared to 52 percent who thought Phil Mickelson was appealing.

Hardly surprising, because Mickelson feels genuine when he speaks. He's engaging when it comes to fans, and he signs everything put

in front of him. Woods doesn't, and he's got a sordid past to boot. Winning another green jacket isn't going to change that, even if it drives up ratings for

His bag used to be sponsored by major brands like Buick and AT&T. Now it carries the name of an obscure company that makes energy and vitamin supplements that dissolve under your tongue.

Nike still stands behind him, but other corporations who once stood in line hoping to get his signature on an endorsement contract want nothing to do with him. An occasional foray into a group of fans to sign autographs notwithstanding, he still comes across as aloof and arrogant.

Two years ago, Woods sat in the same interview room, talking about his life and his comeback after months away from golf because of the scandal. He claimed he had learned his lesson, and vowed to be a more humble player.

There was no such attempt at introspection on Tuesday. He deflected the only question about his comeback by saying he was happy to be

playing again in his 18th Masters at a place he finds so special. His other answers were so banal that even his favorite journalists couldn't bring themselves to write them down.

Want some insight into Woods? You're better off reading the new book from his former instructor Hank Haney than listening to Woods himself. Haney didn't exactly deliver any bombshells, but he offered up enough to anger Woods to the point where he got into a confrontation recently with a writer who had the temerity to ask about it.

That's the Woods of old, and that may be the only Woods who can win. He's got an insatiable desire to be in control, whether on the golf course or in delivering the message of the day to the media and what remains of his fan base.

It's not so easy anymore, but nothing is. Woods is an old 36 and if he wants to win

at least five more majors to break the record of 18 set by Jack Nicklaus he needs to begin winning them again now. But there's a new generation of players who are not afraid of challenging him, and he hasn't won a major in nearly four years.

Still, when the Masters begins Thursday it will be surprising if Woods' name isn't on the leaderboard. He's been playing the tournament half his life now, and knows the course so well he finished fourth the last two years despite not having confidence in his rebuilt swing.

More importantly, the old swagger has returned. Being in contention won't be good enough.

"I'm here for the green jacket," he said.

Indeed, it could be a win for the ages. A fifth Masters title, and the start of a march toward the record book.

Just don't expect everyone to be cheering.



The project area is described as a generally east-west transect line along existing roads and trails. The transect line enters the Payette National Forest in sec. 23, T 14N:, R 6W:, of the Monroe Butte area and exits the Sawtooth National Forest in sec. 25, T.11N., R.16E. of the Holman Creek

area. The Proposed Action would allow Virginia Tech to place small seismometers in small, hand-dug holes of approximately 6 inches deep, 6 inches wide, and 18 inches long. The small seismometers would be temporarily deployed every 100-500 meters along the sides of existing roads and trails. The small seismometers would be placed in areas previously disturbed by road construction. Where previously disturbed areas are not obvious due to re-vegetation along the edges of a travel corridor, seismometers may be placed within 18 inches from the

obvious edge of the travel surface of existing roads and trails. The placement of the temporary small seismometers would occur between July and September of 2012. seismometers would be set out for a period of 2 to 8 days and then immediately retrieved and the holes filled. Vehicle travel associated with this project would be confined to authorized roads and motorized trails, consistent with the Forest Motor

Vehicle Use Maps. The purpose of the seismometer line is to support the geologic imaging activities associated with seismic reactions resulting from controlled source seismic shots permitted on lands managed by other Federal agencies and jurisdictions, other human-caused seismic activity, and natural earthquake activity that occurs during the deployment period. No controlled source seismic shots are proposed on the Boise, Payette, Sawtooth or Salmon-Challis National Forests, only the seismometer line.



Robert is intelligent, a hard worker, handsome and my best friend. He prided himself on his sobriety, so imagine my shock when I found an empty liquor bottle buried in the trash and three more under the bed. I never thought I'd see the day when he would relapse, but he has.

I am devastated. I didn't know what to say to him or how to react, because I have never been down this road.

I told Robert I knew he was drinking again. I could barely hold back my tears because I knew what a huge personal setback this is for him. He said he didn't want to discuss it, so I didn't push.

What am I supposed to do when the man I love has relapsed? My heart aches for him. I'm trying to be supportive, but I am clueless. Please help.

HELPLESS **DEAR HELPLESS:** The

first thing to do is recognize that this is Robert's problem, and only he can fix it. If you plan to stay involved with him, understand that it is not unusual for someone with a substance abuse problem to fall off the wagon from time to time.

The next thing you should do, and this is important, is find your nearest chapter of Al-Anon. It's an organization that was started by the wife of an alcoholic, and its sole purpose is to help the family and friends of alcoholics. The toll-free phone number is 888-425-2666, and it has been mentioned in this column many times.

There will be meetings for you to attend so you can learn to avoid falling into the trap of trying to "save" or enable Robert, because in order for him to get better he must experience the consequences of going back to drinking. This is not easy to do with someone you care about, and you will need all of the support you can get.

By the way, your letter arrived in the same batch as the one below. It may give you some insight:

DEAR ABBY: A few years ago I talked to my mother about her drinking. She's a binge drinker and her excuse is always, "It's my day off." I am focusing on myself and trying to figure out my life, as well, with the help of Al-Anon — the only thing that has kept me positive.

I knew that once I uttered the word "alcoholic" aloud, my relationship with my mother would forever be affected. I asked her to contact me when she was ready to quit because I can no longer enable her drinking.

I miss the mom who doesn't drink, but I can't be around her when she does. As I grow in my recovery, I may figure out how to do that. But for now, I need to put space between us.

My family is worried something drastic will happen (as her health isn't good) and I will have regrets. But I have expressed my thoughts and accepted that Mom and I may never speak again. Is that wrong?

DEAR STILL A LOVING **DAUGHTER:** No, it's not wrong. Your mother's binge drinking was affecting her health as well as her relationship with you, and while it may have been difficult and wrenching, it was the right thing to do − for both of you. Let's hope that your strength in doing that will give her the strength to stop her alcohol binges.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Today's deal comes from a correspondent who remarked that the adverse result was fortunately just too small to have cost her side a victory in a knockout match. But the lesson of the deal is interesting, even if the play was not found at the table.

In one room, South opened with a weak two spades. West overcalled with two no-trump and North doubled. East removed to three clubs, but that was no real improvement, and eventually went down 500.

South for my correspondent's team decided to pass, and the auction developed as shown. When four spades was passed around to West, he thought for a considerable time before making his final pass.

West led the heart king and ace, then switched to a club. Declarer lost two spade tricks to go with the top hearts, but he could have (and probably should have) succeeded. After winning the club ace, he ruffs a club, ruffs a heart, ruffs another club, then plays off his top diamonds and ruffs a diamond. All he has left in hand are the spade A-Q-10. He exits with the spade queen and sits back and waits to make his ace and 10.

Incidentally, can you see where West went wrong? He should have continued with a third heart at trick three. By doing so, he removes a dummy entry, thus preventing the trump reduction.




