Jackson, the former College of Southern Idaho star, didn't hesitate, gobbling up the middle-schoolers with enthusiasm and asking their mom to take a photo with his iPhone.

He looked right at home in his second home.

"Here you go, dudes," Jackson said as he handed Preston and Brady Nelson autographed Baylor University posters. "Let's take these pictures."

The former CSI star is back in town for the weekend, and dozens of people shuffled in and out of La Fiesta Mexican Restaurant Friday night to chat with the Baylor University jun-

The 5-10 guard autographed Baylor team photos, basketballs and magazines and talked hoops with CSI boosters and fans.

"Pierre has been part of our family the last two years. He said he wanted to come back to visit, so I decided to put together this meet and greet," said Renee Marsing, Jackson's former booster parent. "I knew so many people were following his time at Baylor and would like to see him again."

Daniel Brown Returns Home

Friday's honorable transfer precedes today's funeral for slain soldier from Jerome.

TWIN FALLS • As the wind howled Friday afternoon at Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport, U.S. Army Sgt. Daniel Brown's closest family members gathered around his casket.

They placed their hands on it as an Idaho Army National Guard chaplain said a prayer.

Brown's body was returned to his family during a private honorable transfer ceremony. Dozens of Brown's family members stood outside as the charter plane carrying Brown arrived from the Dover Air Force Base in Delaware.

Pilots made preparations and then lowered the brown casket with an American flag secured to its top.

"When remains of a fallen comrade are removed, it's an important moment," said Col. Tim Marsano, public affairs officer for the Idaho

Army National Guard.

Guardsmen lifted the casket, put it into a car from Rosenau Funeral Home and saluted.

Brown − a 27-year-old Jerome resident – was killed March 24 while serving in Afghanistan. He died from wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his unit with an improvised explosive device.

After the ceremony, Brown's father, Jerry, shared thoughts about

Dems' Caucus Not Just for Show

With a seated president, Idaho Democrats' presidential caucus will be more about local representation this year.

TWIN FALLS • It's no surprise who the Democratic presidential nominee

Though President Barack Obama is the only candidate attendees can pick for the Idaho Democratic Presidential Caucus on April 14, there are more reasons to participate, party officials said. Among them: A chance to become a delegate to the national convention in September and maybe, just maybe, meet the commander in chief. Still, some local organizers are skeptical that will be enough to draw participants.

On the surface, there isn't much of a

reason to attend the caucus, said Kent Jensen, one of the organizers of the caucus in Minidoka and Cassia counties. While Idaho had a huge turnout for the 2008 caucus, "it's really not as big a deal as it was four years ago," Jensen said.

But Larry Grant, chairman of the Idaho State Democratic Party, said there are plenty of other reasons to go. At the county caucuses, attendees select delegates to represent them at the state convention, held June 14-16 in Boise. There, party members will help craft

the state party's platform and pick delegates to go to the September national convention in North Carolina.

Kathy Tanaka, organizer of the Lincoln County caucus, was worried about finding someone to be a delegate. The state party doesn't pay for people to attend either the state or Please see CAUCUS, A2

Murder Suspect Lara **Deemed Incompetent**

BURLEY • A man charged with first-degree murder for allegedly strangling his wife in their Burley home has been deemed not competent to assist in his own defense.

Jose Antonio Lara, 29, was charged after his wife, Joann Lyn Lara, 25, was found dead on the couple's bedroom floor Jan. 11. He was slated for a preliminary hearing in Cassia County Magistrate Court Friday, but a psychiatric evaluation report that came back Thursday changed



the course of the case. "Further proceedings will be stayed," 5th District Magistrate Judge Rick Bollar said Friday.

Based on the report by Twin Falls psychologist James Tyson, Lara is not competent to as-

sist in his defense. The Idaho Legislature banned the use of insanity as a defense in 1882, but a defendant must be able to assist in their defense in order to stand trial. Idaho does not allow an insanity defense.

Bollar said the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has 90 days to prepare a plan of

treatment for Lara and report back to the court.

"This will be a restorative plan," Bollar said.

If Lara is restored to competency following treatment, he will be returned to court to face charges. If not, commitment proceedings will be initiated or Lara will be released.

Lara's attorney, Keith Roark, said Lara's psychiatric evaluation wasn't ordered until last week due to a miscommunication. Roark and Cassia County Prosecutor Al Barrus did not receive the report until Thursday afternoon.

According to court records, Joann Lara was found with a thin cord wrapped around her neck, which displayed "significant ligature marks." Jose Lara allegedly told detectives that he and Joann had been arguing when he took a black belt away from her and used it to strangle her from

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
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Sleeplessness May Be Caused by Sleep Apnea

I have difficulty sleeping. What could be occurring and is it treatable?

leep is as important as the air we breathe, water we drink, food we eat and exercise.

Sleep apnea is one of the most common and treatable conditions for those who have difficulty sleep. ing. Some common signs and symptoms of sleep apnea are chronic snoring, pauses in breathing, gasps for breaths, waking up with a racing heart, high blood pressure and restless sleep.

Sleep apnea refers to a breathing pause that lasts at least 10 seconds. Sleep apnea occurs when the muscles in the back of the throat fail to keep the airway open, despite efforts to breathe.

It's also typically accompanied by a drop in your oxygen saturation of 4 per cent or more. When your oxygen level drops, your heart works harder to compensate. Adrenalin kicks in, making your heart race, which could lead to heart

How can you tell if you have sleep apnea? Do you lose energy during the day? Are you irritable, moody, and have excessive daytime sleepiness? Does your difficulty in sleeping disrupt your daily life? If so, you may have sleep apnea.

How do I check for sleep apnea? Talk to your primary care physician about your difficulty in getting a good night's rest. They may suggest that you take a sleep test, which can determine whether you have sleep apnea.

With the sleep test, you could also find out there are potentially other causes of your difficulty sleeping it could be restless leg syndrome, narcolepsy or other health ailments that require a different course of treatment.

Sleep apnea is treated by using a Continuous Positive Airway Pressure ma-

chine that provides a gentle, quiet stent of air to keep your airway open while you sleep. It is approximately:85 percent effective in the treatment of sleep apnea.

If you have a mild case of sleep apnea, you could be fitted with a custom-fit mouth guard that will increase the airway size. Surgery is also another treatment possibility.

Regardless of the cause of your difficulty sleeping, these tips may help: Set a schedule and go to bed at the same time each night, exercise 20-30 minutes per day, and avoid caffeine, nicotine and alcohol.

Relax before bed and make sure your room temperature is comfortable for sleeping. Don't eat two to three hours before your regular bedtime and try to sleep until the sun comes

If these techniques don't get you back into a good sleeping pattern, see your primary care physician for guidance.

national convention, and no one she has talked to is eager to go, she said.

'Nobody can afford to do that," Tanaka said.

Grant said that for people in the Magic Valley, a trip to Boise shouldn't be a problem. He did acknowledge that Democrats in outlying counties, like in the northern or eastern parts of the state, would have a harder time making it to the event.

While the party doesn't pay for travel or accommodation, it does try to set up Boise home stays for outof-towners, Grant said.

Sally Boynton Brown, communications director for the Idaho State Democ-

ratic Party, said during nonelection years, the conventions travel throughout the state to reach rural party members.

Etha Carruthers of the Twin Falls Democratic Party said nationwide, caucus attendance is hitting 10 percent of what it was in 2008. For Twin Falls, that would mean about 80 people showing up Saturday, she said - easily enough to find willing delegates.

Already, Twin Falls and Jerome Democrats have expressed interest in attending the state convention for various reasons, she said.

"For some people, it's writing the platform, and for some people, it's just a chance to go and be part of the whole experience," Carruthers said.

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Wendell Cracks Down on Door-to-door Sales

WENDELL • In an effort to protect citizens from getting conned or harassed, the Wendell City Council on Thursday passed an ordinance updating its regulations on peddlers and soliciting private residents.

Last year, some Gooding County residents had horse tack stolen after a door-todoor magazine subscription sales crew came through the area, Mayor Brad Christopherson said.

"What we're trying to prevent is the fraud," Christopherson said.

The city has had an ordinance on the books since the late '50s banning peddlers, but it was out of date, he said.

"In 1958, Wendell had a city jail and the ordinance was written so that if you were caught you were thrown into it and you also had to work for \$5 a day," he said. "We don't have a jail anymore and so it's cheaper to update the ordinance versus build a jail. Plus, the old ordinances didn't have exemptions."

The new ordinance passed unanimously by the council allows civic, school and political groups to solicit residents, as well as certain nonprofits and legitimate busi-Sales under court order,

businesses with established clientele, the selling of newspaper subscriptions, and marketing farm or garden products are a few examples of allowable exemptions, as long as they have obtained the correct license through City Hall.

A violation will be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of \$150 to \$1,000 and possible jail time.

In other business, the council learned the fundraising drive for the city's animal shelter is making progress.

Shelly Harral, deputy city clerk and member of Anything's Pawsable, which is raising funds for the shelter, reported that almost \$4,000 of the \$9,000 needed had been raised.

The group has been selling cinder block sponsorships and holding bake sales and barbecues to raise the funds.

It will hold another community bake sale from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. today at Simerly's, 280 South Idaho St.

"We hope everyone brings something out," she said.

After hearing how well the group is doing, other city departments decided to donate nearly \$1,000 to the cause.

Public Works Director Joe Durham said the quicker the permanent shelter is built, the "better public works will be," as dogs are now kept in a makeshift shelter in his department's space.

The scammers are targeting the senior population, police said in a news release.

"Once they have gotten you involved in the scam they will continue to call you and make threats to your family if you don't send the money," the news release said.

Police became aware of the scam after getting a call from an elderly woman who had become a victim, Twin Falls Police Sgt. Luke Allen said.

Police warn residents to be wary of anyone calling about a prize or lottery if you haven't entered a contest.

Once a victim has sent money to a scammer, it's difficult, if not impossible, to recover the funds, police said.

New Charges Against Alleged Fair Arsonist

TWIN FALLS • A Filer man appeared in court Friday morning for charges stemming from a fire that he and several juveniles allegedly set at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds.

Roman Barbier, 19, waived his preliminary hearing, but his charges were amended from arson in the third degree to arson in the second degree. A charge of burglary was also added.

According to Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies, Barbier and a group of juveniles entered a beef barn being used to store camp trailers at the Filer fairgrounds on the afternoon of March 24, with the intent to set fire to the trailers.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies came to the assistance of Filer police after hearing about a large fire at the fairgrounds over the

By the time they arrived, Filer Fire Department personnel had extinguished the flames, but deputies noted lighter fluid and fire damage on a tire cover two trailers away from a camper that was completely destroyed by fire.

Filer police were able to identify a juvenile male from video surveillance and brought him in for questioning.

The boy told police he and several others, including Barbier, entered the barn to play.

According to deputies, Barbier admitted to starting the fire after spraying WD-40 in the bedroom of a 26foot trailer.

A 17-year-old male has also been charged with arson in the second degree.

Barbier is scheduled to be arraigned in district court on April 18.



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

According to numbers from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, the number of citations for dispensing alcohol to minors this year has already topped 2011 numbers and we aren't even halfway through the year. At this pace, we're on track to set a record for contributing to alcohol consumption among our youth. That's an accomplishment of which no one in this community should be proud.

CHEERS to Dr. Stanley Mogelson, who has been giving his time to help the Twin Falls County Sheriff's critical response team. The St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center cardiologist told the *Times-News*, "I thought Twin Falls has been good to me and this was an opportunity to give something back to Twin Falls."

Mogelson was officially deputized as the sheriff's tactical medical officer on Jan. 24. Mogelson is the first doctor to volunteer in this capacity. He met another physician in Arizona who worked with the SWAT team in her home county, and it inspired him to approach the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office with a proposal to offer his services.

Mogelson's presence on scene might mean the difference between life and death for victims with traumatic injuries while they wait for paramedics to arrive.

On his own time and with his own money, Mogelson has pursued new skills and additional certifications to be of help to the team.

As one Magicvalley.com online commenter wrote: "Very cool! Good for you, doc, for showing your colleagues that there is time to give back. Very impressive!"

JEERS to the Twin Falls City Council who tried to be inclusive during its recent grant award process, but ended up hurting feelings instead. In the past, the same six organizations have been funded with money from the \$100,000 Municipal Outsource Powers Grant. The grant is designed to fund organizations that provide services the city could, but doesn't.

This year, the city made an effort to advertise the grant and 15 nonprofits responded with applications. But, in the end, the same six organizations from previous years received funding, with the addition of the Twin Falls Senior Citizens Center.

It seems the process got a lot of people's hopes up unnecessarily. Advertising the grant money in an attempt to be inclusive was commendable, but the end result undercut the message the council hoped to send.

Next year, if the city chooses to publicize this round of grant funding, it must be very clear about the purpose of the funding and the kind of organizations it plans to support.





SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Nearly one-fifth of Idaho's traditional lottery ticket revenues come from sales to Utah residents, who trek across the border from the state that outlaws all forms of gambling.

An analysis of Idaho Lottery Commission financial data from 2011 shows 19.4 percent of lottery ticket sales came from sites on the Utah border, The Salt Lake *Tribune* reported.

The store owners say the vast majority of those sales come from Utahns.

Alexis Daniels, manager of the Top Stop Chevron in Malad, Idaho, says 99 percent of the store's lottery

tickets are sold to Utahns. Top Stop is the top-selling lottery store in Idaho – especially busy amid highjackpot drawings like the \$656 million Mega Millions record set last week. "I'd just like to say thank

you to all the people from Utah who come up to buy tickets," Daniels said.

The data showed Utahns play scratcher and pull-tab games far less often. The stores along the border sold 6 percent of the state's scratch cards and 3 percent of its pull tabs.

For all lottery games combined, border stores accounted for 10.5 percent of Idaho's lottery revenue

U of I Faculty Backs Plan to Give Domestic Partners Benefits

MOSCOW (AP) • Gay and lesbian partners of employees working for the University of Idaho would receive health insurance benefits under a plan being pushed by the institution's faculty governing board.

The University of Idaho Faculty Senate voted this week to recommend a policy to extend benefits to domestic partners. During a brief discussion, no faculty member at the meeting voiced disagreement with the policy's goal of treating employee spouses and partners equitably, according to a story published by *The Moscow-Pullman Daily News* (http://bit.ly/HjtGRs).

"It's time for the University of Idaho to take leadership on this issue," said Don

Crowley, chairman of the political science department,

Given that the state does not recognize gay marriage or domestic partnerships, determining who qualifies for the benefits would be left to the discretion of the university.

The Idaho Constitution defines a heterosexual marriage as the only valid, legal union in the state and has been interpreted as prohibiting public or government entities from providing samesex benefits to partners.

But Idaho courts have yet to interpret whether the law conforms with the U.S. Constitution.

"If the Idaho Constitution is interpreted as prohibiting us from (providing partner benefits), then the Idaho

Constitution probably is in violation of the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment," Crowley said.

The faculty tried to extend benefits to domestic partners in 2010 by providing jobplacement assistance to the domestic partners as well as spouses of employees.

But the plan was rejected by President Duane Nellis, who expressed personal support for the policy but said the wording exposed the university to legal risks.

Nellis declined to weigh in Friday on the most recent proposal.

"I am waiting for feedback from our legal department at this time," he said in a statement issued to The Associated Press. Professors on the partner benefits committee say three federal court cases decided since then legitimize the domestic partner language. The proposal approved by the senate deals only with health insurance, and not job-placement assistance or any other benefits.

Kathy Aiken, dean of the university's College of Letters, Arts and Social Sciences, said the senate shouldn't sacrifice doing what's right to dodge a court challenge.

"(Nellis) did the wrong thing last time, and we're asking him this time to do the right thing," she said.

She noted that a policy must be implemented before the courts can interpret its constitutionality.

Drilling Fees Pay for New National Forest Lands

Offshore drilling fees are financing the purchase of \$41.6 million worth of new national forest lands in 15 states.

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said Thursday the 28 different purchases from North Carolina to Oregon will protect clean water and fish and wildlife habitat, absorb private inholdings within wilderness areas, and support outdoor recreation spending that contributes \$14.5 billion annually to the economy.

In Idaho, projects include the \$3.5 million purchase of an old homestead within the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness Area, protecting streams where three protected fish species live. Another \$1 million will buy habitat for threatened steelhead and bull trout, Canada lynx, elk, and portions of the Nez Perce National Historic Trail in the

tional Historic Trail in the Clearwater National Forest. Nationally, the purchases from willing sellers represent about 20,000 acres, which were chosen from 68 appli-

cations.

The money comes from the Land and Water Conservation Fund, created in 1964. Congress taps mitigation fees paid by companies drilling for offshore oil and gas to finance the fund year to year. The fund is capped at \$900 million a year. Other federal agencies also use it.

Projects are typically proposed by local organizations and evaluated by the U.S. Forest Service. Purchases often are arranged with help from organizations like the Trust for Public Lands and Nature Conservancy.

Otter Signs \$35 Million Tax Cut

BOISE • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has signed off on a \$35 million tax cut for Idaho's corporations and high-income earners.

Otter signed the measure Thursday, essentially marking a victory after making tax relief one of his chief priorities for lawmakers in the 2012 Legislature.

The measure cuts the top individual tax rate from 7.8 percent to 7.4 percent and the corporate rate from 7.6 percent to 7.4 percent.

Idaho's improving economy is projected to generate a \$105 million surplus in fiscal year 2013. The extra cash enabled lawmakers on the final day of the session to strike a deal splitting the funds between Otter's tax cut, rainy-day savings and restoring cuts to teacher salaries.

The benefit to a family of four with a gross income of \$100,000 is about \$71.

Governor Signs Texting Ban

BOISE • Texting drivers caught by police will face a fine come midsummer.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter on Thursday signed a statewide ban on textingwhile-driving, an infraction that will set violators back

The measure bars motorists from using smart-phones and other handheld devices to review, prepare or send written communications.

With the new law, which takes effect July 1, Idaho joins 35 states and Washington D.C. in prohibiting drivers from texting.

Idaho National Guard Troops Poised to Deploy

BOISE • About 60 members of the Idaho National Guard are getting ready to head overseas to take part in combat missions in Afghanistan.

Col. Tim Marsano says about 60 troops from Company A, 1-168 General Support Aviation Battalion will deploy Saturday, with the first stop scheduled for Ft. Hood, Texas. The unit is based at Gowen Field in Boise and includes pilots and support crew assigned to eight Black Hawk helicopters.

The crew will train and prepare in Texas for two months before starting a yearlong assignment in Afghanistan. The crew focuses on rescue missions and transporting personnel and equipment.

Deputy Dies after Accident

BOISE • A southeastern Idaho jail deputy who was hospitalized after a boating accident earlier this week has died.

The Bonneville County Sheriff's Office issued a statement Friday saying 46-year-old Mark Weaver of Hamer succumbed to injuries he sustained during the accident Wednesday at Mud Lake. A witness reported Weaver fell into the lake off a sinking boat at about 1 p.m.

Emergency medical responders found Weaver wearing a life jacket, but face down in the 48-degree water.

Former Hospital Official Charged with Theft

GRANGEVILLE • The former president of a Grangeville hospital foundation has been charged with 10 felony counts of grand theft and computer crimes for allegedly withholding or transferring money from organization

into her personal account.

The criminal complaint filed against Laurie Anne Rockwell, 50, does not state how much money is missing from Syringa Hospital Foundation events, thrift store and tuition assistance funds. But the charges al-

lege Rockwell took more than \$1,000 from each account between January 2008 and January 2011 and deposited the cash into her personal accounts.

The case was investigated and is being prosecuted by the Idaho Attorney General's office. Rockwell is married to Idaho County Commissioner James Rockwell.

Man Pleads Guilty to Making Bomb Threat

LEWISTON • A northern Idaho man who doused himself in gasoline and threatened to set off bombs in downtown Lewiston faces up to five years in prison.

The Lewiston Tribune reports (http://bit.ly/I3Inbp) 45-year-old Fredrick D. Purdin pleaded guilty Wednesday to falsely reporting an explosive in a public place, which is a felony, and calling 911 to report a false alarm, a misdemeanor.

Police say Purdin threatened to set off explosives last August in parking lots adjacent to the Lewiston Police Department station and the Nez Perce County Courthouse. A bomb squad was called in from eastern Washington and found materials that could be used to make an explosive, but not an actual device.

Purdin's sentencing is scheduled for May 16.


All but two of Minico's runs were unearned.

"Very shocking, and it was a great day," Couples said after a 5-under 67, which gave him a share of the lead with Jason Dufner. "There was a lot going on there, and for me to be a part of it, it's really amazing."

The buzz going into the Masters was built around all the best players on top of their games, and that element was very much in place. Rory McIlroy charged up the leaderboard. Lee Westwood is right there. So is Sergio Garcia and even Phil Mickelson.

prise - was club-kicking Tiger Woods. Just two weeks after Woods won Bay Hill by five shots and became an instant

iron some 15 yards. Woods didn't make a birdie after the third hole and shot 75, his highest score at Augusta since 2004.

7 Injured, over 2 Dozen Missing after Jet Crash

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. • A fighter jet that malfunctioned just after takeoff hurtled into a Virginia Beach apartment complex on Friday in a spectacular crash that sent flames and black smoke billowing from the rubble.

The two pilots managed to eject just before impact, suffering minor injuries along with five others on the ground. Several residents described hearing a loud explosion and looking out their windows to see the red and orange blaze. In the confusion that followed, two men helped one of the bloodied pilots from the two-seat F18 Hornet move to safety.

"Oh, my God, I heard three really loud explosions, then the black smoke went up high in the sky," said 71-yearold Felissa Ezell, who lives in a townhouse near the crash site.

By evening, emergency crews were

searching through the charred remains of the complex, where some 40 apartment units were damaged or destroyed. No fatalities had been reported.

Seven people, including the pilots from nearby Naval Air Station Oceana, were taken to a hospital. All except one of the pilots were released by late after-

Capt. Tim Riley said more than two dozen residents remained unaccounted for, although all but the six most damaged apartments had been searched.

"What I'm praying for, what I'm thinking about now is that we don't find any more victims," Virginia Beach Mayor Will Sessoms told reporters.

The plane had dumped loads of fuel before crashing, though it wasn't clear if that was because of a malfunction or an intentional maneuver by the pilots, said Capt. Mark Weisgerber with U.S. Fleet Forces Command. The jet went down less than 10 miles from Oceana.

National PTA Seeks to Reverse Drop in Membership

When Otha Thornton, presidentelect of the National PTA, signed up to help lead the PTA at Maryland's Meade Senior High School in 2005, the chapter had about 25 members. Within two years, membership soared to 400 as the school community mobilized to boost morale and academic performance. Now he's trying to rekindle that spirit on a larger scale as the PTA strives to reverse a steady decrease in its national membership.

"I tell parents: 'Other people are making choices for you and your children. We need you at the table,"' said Thornton, who will become the National PTA's first male African-American leader next year.

By any measure, the PTA is one of the most venerable and iconic of America's volunteer-based nonprofits. It was founded in 1897 as the National Congress of Mothers and at its peak in the 1960s claimed about 12 million mem-

Membership plummeted in the late 60s and 1970s, in part because of the racial rifts caused by school desegregation, then stabilized. But it has dropped steadily over the past 10 years from about 6 million to under 5 million.

Demography is part of the reason: Compared to the PTA's heyday, there are many more single parents and working mothers now who feel they can't spare extra time for engagement at their children's schools.

Refugees Flee Violence, Talk of Mass Graves BY ANDREA GLIOTI AND ELIZABETH A. KENNEDY

REYHANLI, Turkey • After days of relentless shelling and sniper attacks, thousands of Syrian refugees streamed across the border into Turkey with horrific accounts Friday of mass graves, massacres and burned-out homes.

The latest reports of escalating violence fueled accusations that President Bashar Assad is rushing to stamp out as much of the year-old uprising as he can before a U.N.-brokered cease-fire next week.

The trigger for the new waves of refugees was an offensive in Idlib province, which borders Turkey and has become increasingly rebellious against the Assad regime.

Activists reported about 100 dead in the villages of Taftanaz and Killi in recent days.

A photograph provided to The Associated Press by a Syrian activist showed at least a dozen corpses wrapped in blankets in what appeared to be a mass grave in Taftanaz. The AP could not verify the authenticity of the photograph, but witnesses also described a mass grave.

"They destroyed the whole village," a refugee who asked to be identified by only one name, Anas, told the AP on Friday after fleeing Killi. "If he has to kill, Bashar would even kill 1 million people. He doesn't care."

Hikmet Saban, another Syrian refugee who reached Turkey, described the devastation in Taftanaz, located several miles outside the city

"Helicopters and tanks are bombarding continuously," he told Turkey's state-run Anadolu agency. "Taftanaz has been burnt to the ground for three days." Activists posted video they said showed a helicopter gunship firing a missile at Taftanaz and a mosque hit by

The escalating violence has dimmed hopes that the fighting, which the U.N. says has killed more than 9,000 people, will end anytime soon. The country appears to be spiraling toward civil war - a fearsome development that could bring a regional conflagration.

A vital geopolitical linchpin, Syria borders five other nations and has close ties to Iran and powerful militant groups, such as Lebanon's Hezbollah.

Assad last week accepted a ceasefire deadline brokered by international envoy Kofi Annan, which calls for his forces to pull out of towns and cities by Tuesday and for everyone to lay down their arms by 6 a.m. local time Thursday.

Western leaders have cast doubt on Assad's intentions, suggesting he is playing for time and is not serious about the plan, which aims to pave the way for talks between the regime and the opposition on a political solution.

Syria denies that the revolt is a popular uprising at all, saying instead that it is facing a foreign conspiracy by armed gangs and terrorists who want to destroy the country.

The revolt began in March 2011 with mostly peaceful protests, but the violent government crackdown has led many to take up weapons. A fighting force called the Free Syrian Army, made up largely of army defectors, is determined to bring down the regime by force of arms.

On Friday, Syria's state-run news agency, SANA, appeared to acknowledge the recent spike in violence, but

Md. High Court Hears Lesbian Divorce Case

ANNAPOLIS, Md. • Maryland routinely grants divorces for couples who married in other states, and divorces for same-sex couples should be no different, lawyers for a lesbian couple told the state's highest court Friday.

The case involves two women who were married in California and denied a divorce in 2010 by a Maryland judge who said their marriage was not valid in the state. Maryland does not currently

allow same-sex weddings, but lawyers for the women told the seven-member court that it would be unprecedented for the state not to recognize gay marriages performed elsewhere.

"If you're validly married somewhere else, the rule in Maryland is your marriage is going to be respected in Maryland, and that's what we're asking the court to do here," said Shannon Minter, legal director for the National Center for Lesbian Rights in San Francisco.

Judges in Maryland have been inconsistent about granting divorces for gay couples. Lawyers said judges have granted divorces for about half a dozen gay couples, but their clients

and at least two other couples were denied. As a result, some couples are waiting for a ruling from Maryland's high court before filing for divorce, the lawyers said.

The Court of Appeals' ultimate decision may have limited effect because same-sex weddings, and by extension divorces, are set to start in the state in January. Opponents of the law passed this year are seeking to overturn it in a potential voter referendum. The Maryland Marriage Alliance says it has collected 20,000 of the nearly 56,000 signatures needed to get

the issue on the ballot. The high court's judges asked about that potential referendum and its effect on the current case. Lawyers said the outcome of any referendum was not relevant. They said it will only address whether voters want to allow same-sex marriages in Maryland, not whether the state should recognize same-sex unions performed elsewhere. Even if voters decide not to allow same-sex marriages, state courts should grant divorces for same-sex couples, the lawyers said. They cited Wyoming and New Mexico as states with similar practices

Pope Marks Good Friday

ROME • Pope Benedict XVI encouraged those threatened by unemployment and other economic woes to draw courage and strength from the suffering of the crucified Jesus Christ as the pontiff presided over a Good Friday candlelit Way of the Cross procession at the ancient Colosseum.

Benedict, who turns 85 on April 16, didn't carry the cross during the hour-long procession itself. Instead, he listened intently to mediations on suffering that he asked an elderly Italian couple to compose for the traditional ceremony. Then, as the final reflection was read aloud, the pontiff was handed the slender, lightweight wooden cross, which he held steadily for a few minutes.

Thousands of tourists, pilgrims and Romans jammed the boulevard outside the Colosseum and the ancient Roman Forum to pray with him on a mild, cloudy night and listen to hymns.

Faithful clutched candles and prayer books. A few held palms or olive branches they had saved from Palm Sunday, which opened solemn Holy Week ceremonies in the Catholic church.

"The experience of suffering and of the cross touches all mankind. It touches the family, too," the pope said in a brief homily at the end of the procession, which he observed from an elevated landing

Dressed in red robes to symbolize the blood shed by Jesus, the pope added that "these days, too, the situation of many families is made worse by the threat of unemployment and other negative effects of the economic crisis," such as worry about the future of young people.

But Benedict advised families to "look to Christ's cross. There we can find the courage and strength to press on.

U.S. Borrowing Up but Consumers Shy Away from Plastic

WASHINGTON • Americans took out more loans to buy cars and attend school in February but used their credit cards less frequently for the second straight

The Federal Reserve said Friday that consumers increased borrowing by \$8.7 billion, the sixth straight monthly increase.

The jump in borrowing was driven by \$11 billion increase in the category that mostly measures demand for auto and student loans. Borrowing on credit cards fell by \$2 billion after a \$3 billion decline in January.

Total consumer borrowing rose to seasonally adjusted \$2.52 trillion. That's nearly at pre-recession levels and up from a post-recession low point of \$2.39 trillion reached in September 2010. Borrowing had tumbled for more than two years during and immediately after the recession.

Consumer borrowing rose by \$18.6 billion in January, following similar gains in December and November. The gains for those three months were the largest in a decade.

A rise in borrowing could suggest that consumers are feeling more confident about the economy. However, few are comfortable enough to step up credit card use. Consumers carried \$799 billion in credit card debt in February - 15 percent less than they held in December 2007, the first month of the Great Recession. And student loan debt surpassed the \$1 trillion mark for the first time at the end of last year.

Steven Wood, chief economist at Insight Economics, said February's borrowing increase was strong. But he noted that it was the smallest increase since October.

"Consumers still appear to be reluctant to use their credit cards," Wood said in a note to clients.

Ketchum Officials See Steady Rise in 'Tourist Tax' Receipts

KETCHUM (AP) • Officials in Ketchum say their local option sales tax receipts have risen steadily over the past six months.

March totals for the socalled "tourist tax" show a 4.5 percent increase compared to March 2011. Officials see the hike as a good sign for an economy so closely tied to the ski and recreation industry.

The Idaho Mountain Express reports that LOT receipts are up 4.7 percent in the fiscal year that began Oct. 1 compared to a year

U.S. Job Market Takes Spring Break after Hiring Binge

WASHINGTON • The U.S. job market took a breather in March after its best hiring stretch since the Great Re-

Employers added 120,000 jobs last month half the December-February pace and well short of the 210,000 economists were expecting. The unemployment rate fell from 8.3 percent in February to 8.2 percent, the lowest since January 2009, but that was largely because many Americans stopped looking for work.

Still, few economists expect hiring to fizzle in spring and summer, as it did the past two years. And they blamed seasonal factors for much of Friday's disappointing report from the

Labor Department. "We don't think this is

the start of another spring dip in labor market conditions," said Paul Ashworth, chief U.S. economist with Capital Economics.

The report was also closely watched in political circles. If employers retreat on hiring, consumers could lose confidence in the economy and potentially dim President Barack Obama's re-election hopes.

Ashworth and economists cited weather for the latest jobs report. A warm January and February allowed construction companies and other businesses that work outdoors to hire workers a few weeks earlier than usual, effectively stealing jobs from March. It helps explain a 7,000 drop in construction

Alan Amdahl, who has run his own construction company in Sioux Falls, S.D., for three decades, said

a mild winter helped contribute to a flurry of new remodeling jobs. He started hiring in January.

"Our winter didn't really exist," he said. "It's just incredible. People didn't hibernate?'

Economists also say the numbers can bounce around from month to month. Consistently creating 200,000 jobs a month is tough. The economy hasn't put together four straight months of 200,000 or more new jobs since early 2000.



Anthony Chan, chief economist at JP Morgan Wealth Management, noted strong growth among businesses that are especially sensitive to the economy's health. Hotels and restaurants hired 39,000 workers. Manufacturers added 37,000.

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Egyptian Ex-regime

Strongman to Run for President

CAIRO • A former strongman of ousted President Hosni Mubarak's regime announced his presidential candidacy Friday, shaking up an already heated race that is emerging as a contest between two longtime rivals — former regime officials and Islamists who have surged in influence.

Omar Suleiman, one of the most powerful figures of Mubarak's regime, had said earlier this week that he would not run. But he said he changed his mind after hundreds of people rallied in Cairo to support a bid.

The announcement drew outrage from youth activists who spearheaded the popular uprising that toppled Mubarak last year and have since been disappointed by the continued influence of members of his ex-regime. Liberals and revolutionaries have been largely squeezed out of the presidential race. Some have vowed to boycott the May 23-24 balloting altogether.

"I find it incomprehensible that one of the top figures of the old regime, who should be on trial right now as a criminal, is actually considering running for president," said Mohammad Radwan, who took part in last year's mass protests.

The 75-year-old former general must get 30,000 signatures by Sunday's official filing deadline or the backing of at least 30 parliamentarians in order to run. Suleiman could be the ruling generals' preferred candidate, someone who would try to keep the old political system intact and protect the privileges of the military.

Suleiman, who appeared on television on Feb. 11, 2011, to announce that Mubarak would step down and hand power to the country's military leaders, served as Egypt's intelligence chief for 18 years at a time when the regime was accused of carrying out torture and human rights abuses against dissenters. He also was longtime

a confidant of Mubarak. That makes him suspect in the eyes of many Egyptians, who had hoped to stamp out the old regime altogether and usher in a transition to democracy.

A win for Suleiman would largely keep control of Egypt in the hands of the military. Egypt's last four presidents have all been military men.

His decision also was the latest surprise in the first presidential race since Mubarak was ousted after nearly 30 years in power.

Last week, the Muslim Brotherhood, Egypt's most organized Islamist movement, named its chief strategist and financier Khairat el-Shater as a candidate, reversing an earlier pledge not to participate in the election. The long-outlawed Brotherhood already controls about half of the seats in parliament and would completely dominate the political arena if el-Shater wins.

The Brotherhood's Freedom and Justice Party posted Suleiman's announcement to run for president on its official Facebook page, with five photos of Suleiman smiling and shaking hands with top Israeli officials to the

backdrop of the Israeli flag. "This is a bullet to the Egyptian revolution," Brotherhood party spokesman Ahmed Khairy said. "His candidacy means that the revolution is not moving down its natural path and it means that the Egyptian cit-



Suleiman's entry in the race is likely to be welcomed by Egyptians who fear their country might be slipping into chaos after a turbulent year of deadly protests against the military's continued rule that have battered the economy. His insider knowledge of the political system could make him one of the front-runners in the crowded field.





THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

In today's six clubs, South shook his head reflectively as dummy came down, thinking that he should have been in the grand slam. A few seconds later he was shaken awake when he cashed the club king and realized he had an inevitable trump loser.

After winning the opening lead with his diamond ace, he cashed the heart ace and played a club to the king. The heart king and queen followed, allowing declarer to throw both his losing diamonds away. After the spade ace and king both stood up, South advanced the spade eight.

West did the best he could when he discarded a diamond, and declarer ruffed low in dummy. Now came the club queen, and after nine tricks (three spades, three hearts, one diamond and two clubs), a four-card ending had been reached, with the lead in dummy. North had four losing red cards, declarer held the A-J-9 of clubs and the spade queen, and West had three clubs to the 10 and a diamond.

Now declarer led a heart from dummy and ruffed high. To avoid being endplayed in trumps at the next trick, West underruffed, a defense that would have been good enough had East held the master spade. (South would have led a spade to East, and West would have scored his club 10.) But when declarer led his spade queen, West could score only one of the last three tricks whatever he did.
