## Daniel Brown Returns Home

 Friday's honorable transfer precedes today's funeral for slain soldier from Jerome.BY JULIE WOOTTON
TWIN FALLS • As the wind howled Friday afternoon at Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport, U.S. Army sgt. Daniel Brown's closest
family members gathered around
his casket.
They placed their hands on it as an Idaho Army National Guard chaplain said a prayer. Brown's body was returned to his family during a private honorable transfer ceremony. Dozens of
Brown's family members stood outside as the charter plane carrying Brown arrived from the Dover Air Force Base in Delaware. Pilots made preparations and then lowered the brown casket with an American flag secured to its top.
"When remains of a fallen com"When remains of a fallen comrade are removed, it's an important
moment," said Col. Tim Marsano, public affairs officer for the Idaho


Army National Guard.
Guardsmen lifted the casket, put it into a car from Rosenau Funeral Home and saluted.
Brown - a 27 -year-old Jerome resident - was killed March 24
while serving in Afghanistan. He while serving in Afghanistan. He
died from wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his unit with an improvised explosive device. After the ceremony, Brown's father, Jerry, shared thoughts about his son.

loving, caring perso"" who loving, caring person" who was a

## MurderSuspectLara Deemed Incompetent

## Rape,Assault Case Progresses against BurleyMan

Tjaden has pleaded not guilty to all day in Cassia County 5th District day in

On Friday, Tjaden - his hands and

feet shackled - turned to watch the female relative he's accused of tormenting as she moved to the witness stand.
The woman told Cassia County 5 th District Masistrate Judge Rick Bollar that Tjaden had forcibly raped her in mid-January and had held a pistol under her chin and threatened to kill her in February.
She testified Friday that Tjaden would not allow her to get a driver's license or go anywhere without him
and would not allow her to have any friends.
Tjaden's attorney, Keith Roark,
questioned the woman regarding a calendar that she alleges she kep and marked the dates of the alleged incidents on.
"You're telling me you destroyed that calendar?" Roark asked. The woman said she threw away he January page after a drink was spilled on it and threw away the rest the calendar when she moved. Roark also questioned the woman about the sequence of dates and how soon she told anyone about the al
leged incidents. leged incidents.

## Serving Alcohol to Minors Is Inexcusable

JEERS to the increasing number of people in Twin Falls County willing to serve alcohol to mi nors. According to numbers from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, the number of citations for dispensing alcohol to minors this year has al ready topped 2011 numbers and we aren't even halfway through the year. At this pace, we're on track to set a record for contributing to alcohol consumption among our youth. That's an accomplishment of which no one in this communi ty should be proud.

CHEERS to Dr. Stanley Mogelson, who has been giving his time to help the Twin Falls County Sheriff's critical response team. The St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center cardiologist told the Times-News, "I thought Twin Falls has been good to me and this was an opportunity to give something back to Twin Falls."
Mogelson was officially deputized as the sheriff's tactical medical officer on Jan. 24. Mogelson is the first doctor to volunteer in this capacity. He met another physician in Arizona who worked with the SWAT team in her home coun ty, and it inspired him to approach the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office with a proposal to offer his services.
Mogelson's presence on scene might mean the difference between life and death for victims with traumatic injuries while they wait for paramedics to arrive.
On his own time and with his own money, Mogelson has pursued new skills and additional certifications to be of help to the team.
As one Magicvalley.com online commenter wrote: "Very cool! Good for you, doc, for show ing your colleagues that there is time to give back. Very impressive!"

JEERS to the Twin Falls City Council who tried to be inclusive during its recent grant award process, but ended up hurting feelings instead. In the past, the same six organizations have been funded with money from the $\$ 100,000 \mathrm{Mu}-$ nicipal Outsource Powers Grant. The grant is designed to fund organizations that provide services the city could, but doesn't.
This year, the city made an effort to advertise the grant and 15 nonprofits responded with applications. But, in the end, the same six organizations from previous years received funding, with the addition of the Twin Falls Senior Citizens Center.
It seems the process got a lot of people's hopes up unnecessarily. Advertising the grant money in an attempt to be inclusive was commendable, but the end result undercut the message the council hoped to send.
Next year, if the city chooses to publicize this round of grant funding, it must be very clear about the purpose of the funding and the kind of organizations it plans to support.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. • Maryland routinely grants divorces for couples who married in other states, and divorces for same-sex couples should be no different, lawyers for a lesbian couple told the state's highest court Friday.
The case involves two women who were married in Californi and denied a divorce in 2010 by a Maryland judge who said their marriage was not valid in the state. Maryland does not currently allow same-sex weddings, but lawyers for the women told the seven-member court that it
would be unprecedented for the state not to recognize gay marriages performed elsewhere. "If you're validly married somewhere else, the rule in Maryland is your marriage is going to be respected in Maryling the court to do here"," said Shannon Minter, legal director for the National Center for Lesbian Rights in San Francisco. Judges in Maryland have been inconsistent about granting divorces for gay couples. Lawyers said judges have granted di-

Then, as the final reflection was read aloud, the pontiff was handed the slender, lightweight wooden cross, which he held steadily for a few minutes. and Romans jammed the boulevard outside the Colosseum and the ancient Roman Forum to pray with him on a mild, cloudy night and listen to hymns. Faithful clutched candles and prayer books. A few held palms or olive branches they had saved
