Furniture Company's Revival Has Global Message

LINCOLNTON, N.C. • When Bruce Cochrane's family furniture company became an empty factory, he wouldn't drive by the building, even though it was just a short ride from home. There were just too many memories of what was – and what he was sure would never be again.

Five generations of Cochranes had been furniture makers, starting with his great-great-grandfather, William, who built church pews in the 1850s. By the mid-1990s, though, the long, proud family tradition appeared to be at an end. Like so many other American industries, the furniture trade was moving to China, land of cheap labor.

Cochrane headed there, too, becoming a consultant to furniture makers there, making occasional trips to offer advice. Back in North Carolina, he saw globalization taking its toll. First, fewer and fewer workers in the plants. Then, shuttered factories. But it took a while to grasp the scope of the loss.

"I didn't give that a lot of thought at the time," Cochrane says. "I was making so much money that I did not really dwell on the implications of what I was doing, of what other people were doing. ... Later on, I saw how sad it was to see a \$50 billion industry move offshore and all the thousands and thousands of jobs that were lost. And I was part of it."

"That," he says, "probably bothered me more than anything — seeing the jobs go away."

More than three years after the factory closed its doors, Cochrane reopened them for a new venture, Lincolnton Furniture Co. Earlier this year, a small work force of about 55 – including several who'd toiled for his late father under the same roof – built the company's first bedroom *Please see* **MESSAGE**, A2

guinea pig on this chilly morning, taking a test ride down one length of the Magic Valley Flight Simulation zip line course to see how high the cable's anchoring posts should be set. Wearing a safety helmet, he took off and ... well, zipped down the canyon.

It was part of the planning Ryker's father, Dave Fairbanks, and partner Jody Tatum put into designing the new attraction, which is projected to open May 1.

Customers will begin their adventure near the Canyon Springs Golf Course clubhouse, where they will meet their two guides and complete a safety training session. There's a 200-foot practice zip line to help everyone get the hang of things.

Then it's on to the main event.

Four separate lines will be set up some of the cables were strung Saturday — with lengths of 460 feet, 830 feet, 380 feet and the grand fiand 110 feet off the ground.

The two guides will stay with each group during their time on the course, Fairbanks emphasized. "A guide will launch you and a guide will receive you," he said.

Tickets will be sold only for the entire course and will cost \$70, although there will be family and offseason rates. There's no age restriction, but participants must weigh between 60 and 270 pounds. Tandem harnesses are available so an adult can zip with a small child.

Tatum and Fairbanks originally wanted a cable to span the Snake River. That dream, along with another plan to start the course higher in the canyon, ran afoul of government regulations. Still, they expect the scaled-down course to provide plenty of excitement.

But the thrill of flight is just part of the experience. Tatum said clients *Please see* **ZIP LINE**, Ag

and dining room pieces, shipping them to stores with a flag-decorated "Made in America" tag.


Lincolnton is part of a small but growing trend called "reshoring" – a reverse mi-gration of U.S. manufacturers from the Far East (mostly China) to West. With rising labor and shipping costs in China, companies producing appliances, cookware, audio earphones, water heaters and other goods have decided it makes economic sense to move some (or all) of their operations back to U.S. soil.

Cochrane knows he's doing something risky, that some folks think he's a bit crazy and believe the furniture business in the U.S. is mostly gone. He's confident, though, this is a smart move, and not just because it feels good – which, by the way, it does.

"To do something like this HAS to be a business decision," he says, "but it is emotional and it is sentimental to be able to come back and make something again and to impact people in such a positive way."

What happens in the cavernous factory on Cochrane Road could bring economic security to workers in a state that, by one estimate, has hemorrhaged tens of thousands of jobs to China in the last decade.

But what happens here could also offer larger lessons about U.S. workers in a global market, the appetite for American-made goods and the future of an industry decimated by foreign competition.



Over a decade of consulting, he'd witnessed dramatic changes in China's economy. Manufacturing workers' wages -58 cents an hour, on average, in 2001 - were approaching \$3. The once abundant labor supply was drying up. Shipping costs were higher because of rising fuel costs. Quality was suffering because of high turnover. It could take three or more months to get a piece of furniture after it was ordered - compared with 30 days or less in the U.S. The clear-cut advantages of manufacturing in China were disappearing.

That same point was made

ing to happen, but companies are starting because the economics are starting to look favorable. I was surprised to see it happening as quickly as it is."

It is happening at a time when Americans - historically proud of the nation's manufacturing might - are showing frustration with the migration of those jobs to China and elsewhere. An ABC News/Washington Post poll in February found that nearly 75 percent of those surveyed favor raising taxes on businesses that move manufacturing jobs overseas.

In January, President Barack Obama hosted a White House forum on in-sourcing, featuring small and large companies that have invested in the U.S. And in his State of the Union speech, Obama called for an economy "built on American manufacturing." He said the resurgence of the U.S. auto industry "should give us confidence."

omists who say some jobs are gone forever because of productivity and robotic gains. And U.S. multinationals eliminated more than 800,000 jobs in the U.S. while adding 2.9 million overseas from 2000 to 2009, according to federal figures.

The trade deficit with China – \$295 billion last year – has cost nearly 2.8 million U.S. jobs from 2001 to 2010 and almost 70 percent have been in manufacturing, according to a 2011 report by the Economic Policy Institute.

The report's author, Robert Scott, found that about a third of all displaced jobs were in the computer and electronic parts industry; other areas include textiles, apparel and furniture. North Carolina's loss of nearly 108,000 jobs ranked it among the top 10 hardest-hit states. Reshoring "is not only a drop in the bucket ... it's not making a dent in the growth of the trade deficit," says Scott. "It's a classic example of counting trees instead of focusing on the forest. You may see a few trees popping up but the forest is still falling down?" mained open and the workers continued to make furniture with the Cochrane name. Over the years, though, more and more work was done in China. The plant finally closed in late 2008, the building was sold and the equipment auctioned off.

Cochrane carefully developed a business plan, and by 2011, he was ready - thanks, in part, to financing from a local bank. The president turned out to be a former company worker.

Last spring, Cochrane who has two partners walked into the empty 300,000 square-foot factory.

He soon added family touches, among them an oil painting of his father, hung on the lobby wall. With their silver hair and Clark Kent glasses, father and son share an un-

says. "If you have a death in the family, you feel like you just can't pick up and go forward. That's how I felt. ... I knew I needed to work. I knew I was still vital enough to do something, but I didn't know what I would do."

Jerry Cochrane had urged her to return to school, so she enrolled in a nearby college to polish her skills.

She was just starting to scope out job prospects when Cochrane called. She knew immediately she wanted the job, but had a moment of hesitation. "Being out of work strips you of your confidence," she says. "I felt, 'Oh, gosh can I do this?' I just needed somebody to reassure me."

Cochrane described his plans to build Americanmade furniture. "He said, 'I really believe it's coming back and we can make some money doing this and we'll have a good time, I promise.""

Padgett is now on the other end of the job search, fielding calls and conducting interviews. She's received about 1,400 applications for what eventually will be about 130 jobs. (Starting salaries range from \$9 to \$16 an hour.)

One caller had a particular ly poignant story: He said he wanted to work for the company because as a boy, he'd lived down the road from the old Cochrane factory. His single mother had struggled to provide for her six kids, he said, and when times got tough, Sonny Cochrane made sure their utility bills were paid.

The man was eventually hired.

About two-thirds of Lincolnton workers have experience in the furniture industry. North Carolina lost nearly 60 percent of its furniture jobs from 1999 to 2010, as the percentage of imported furniture sold in the U.S. doubled.

It has been a slow-motion economic disaster. Padgett says everyone noticed how one factory, then another closed, and yet "it was like we just woke up and it was swept out from under us. It kind of slapped us in the face when it was all gone?'

It was so traumatic that when Cochrane asked Pat Hendrick to return as purchasing manager, she was thrilled but had one question: "'Will you be importing anything?' I didn't want to be involved with anything like that," she says, "because that's how I lost my job."

To Hendrick, her job offer was an answered prayer. Literally. Every day while she was he was still recovering from the death of his wife from breast cancer, and work, he says, "had been a rock to me." After 14 months, Hoyle was hired at another furniture company, only to be laid off last year.

Hoyle, who works in the packing department, is struck by how much has changed since he first walked into the factory as a fresh-faced Army veteran. "These places were all up and running when I got out of school;" he says. "Where are all the people going to go now and what are they going to do? Not everybody can be a computer programmer."

Hoyle's ruddy, mustachioed face breaks into a wide smile as he recalls going to the bank to deposit his first paycheck from the new job.

"I'm 57 years old and soon to be 58, and I've got enough sense to know this area is not full of opportunities for someone like me," he says. "If I could sum it up in one word, it would be grateful?"

In January, Lincolnton's first piece of furniture - a cherrywood nightstand - came off the line. All the workers signed it.

That same month, Bruce Cochrane had two dates in Washington, D.C. The first was the White House conference on insourcing, where he met Obama. The other was an invitation to sit in the first lady's box at the State of the Union speech, where the president spoke of a manufacturing renaissance. (For the record, Cochrane says he's never voted for a Democratic president.)

Cochrane thinks there's an appetite for U.S.-produced goods. He attaches a "Made in America" tag to each piece of his company's furniture, with a message: "We take immeas-urable pride in the fact that our furnishings are made of select solid American hardwoods," he wrote, appending his name.

"I think people realize that made in America means jobs in America," Cochrane says. "And they have experience with a loved one or a family member or a friend who lost a job so it becomes more and more personal to them?"

Bud Boyles, owner of the Carolina Furniture Mart in Lincolnton (where the nightstand is displayed), senses a similar mood.

"Timing is everything and he's definitely got the timing right now," Boyles says. "It might be a hard first year for him but people are saying,

in a 2011 report by The Boston Consulting Group that estimated that "reshoring" by companies could result in 2 to 3 million new jobs. About a quarter would be directly in manufacturing, and the rest would work for suppliers or service industries.

Furniture, the report said, is among the seven areas where this is most likely to occur. The costs of shipping bulky products and the ample supply of wood in the U.S. make it a prime candidate for domestic manufacturing; China has to import wood.

"The pendulum is swinging," says Hal Sirkin, the report's lead author. He says wages are rising 15-to-20 percent a year in China and U.S. workers are, on average, more than three times as productive

The report predicts that by 2015, these industries will likely reach a "tipping point" where the cost advantages of China will have shrunk to a point where U.S. companies may see it's to their benefit to return production or set up a new base here.

"It's still early," Sirkin says. "We don't know all this is go-

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A March trade group survey found expansion in 15 of 18 manufacturing industries, including autos, steel and furniture.

The president's Republican rivals, meanwhile, also have touted the value of manufacturing and talked tough about China. Mitt Romney has vowed to declare China a "currency manipulator" and impose tariff penalties. Rick Santorum, who has emphasized his blue-collar roots, proclaimed he wants to "go to war with China" to create the best business climate for America.

But predictions about a rebirth of manufacturing and muscular rhetoric about resolving trade imbalances are met with understandable skepticism.

Consider the numbers: More than 5.5 million manufacturing jobs were lost from 2000 to 2011, though there has been a modest recovery in recent years. There are econ...

"He always instilled in me that it was OK to take chances," Cochrane says. "He'd always say, 'If you aren't fishing, you aren't catching anything?"

Cochrane remembered those words when trying to decide whether to take the plunge. "I actually had a dream of him telling me that and he was in his fishing gear. At that point, I said, 'Yep, I'm going to do it?"

That decision came more than a decade after the Cochranes got out of the business. In 1997, the family sold the company to another U.S. manufacturer; the factory recanny resemblance. His eyes mist when he mentions him. "I think about how much he would love this," he says.

Starting over, Cochrane also looked to the past, recruiting former company workers.

When he phoned the first two – both weren't working he heard doubt in their voices.

"Both of them said, 'I don't think I can do that anymore," he recalls. "They had lost their confidence. It (joblessness) puts people in such despair. They think there's something wrong with them rather than the circumstances?"

Karen Padgett was one of those first calls. She'd worked her way up from the shipping department to human resources manager, spending 35 years with Cochrane and its successor. When the factory closed, Padgett was adrift.

She was in her 50s, jobs were scarce and a lifetime of working with folks who'd become good friends was suddenly gone.

"It was such a loss," she

"I said, 'God, I'm tired. You're going to have to drop a job in my lap that you know I can do and have people there that I can get along with and work with. I'm just leaving it in your hands?"

Cochrane called at 8:59 a.m. the next day.

Driving back into the parking lot for the first time, Hendrick says she felt as if she'd never left. But two years of unemployment aren't easily forgotten.

"After losing your job of 32 years," she says, "you do have reservations. I'm comfortable here, but I don't think I'll ever have that same sense of security that I thought I had?'

Dean Hoyle understands uncertainty. After nearly 30 years at the factory, he found himself out of work, too, scraping by doing yard work and mowing lawns.

His situation, he says, was even more agonizing because

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There have been small moments of satisfaction these first months, such as touring the factory with a friend, who said he thought he'd never again smell that earthy scent of fresh-cut wood. "It's nostalgic," Cochrane says.

But there have been problems, too. A malfunctioning machine needed fixing and the plant had to be rewired, a costly project. The technology has become so efficient that Cochrane says he'll need half the workers he first expected - though of course that's a mixed blessing, given the area's struggle with unemployment.

three Within years, Cochrane hopes to do \$25 million in business a year. For now, he's determined to prove the naysayers wrong.

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

OTTER TO EMBARK ON TRADE TRIP TO CHINA

BOISE (AP) • Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter for the second time in a little over two years plans to lead a trade delegation to China, a top importer of the state's products.

"The governor is a staunch advocate of growing our business relationships with all of our current international trading partners and in cultivating relationships with new ones," Otter spokesman Jon Hanian told the Idaho Statesman. "That is one of the ways we create more jobs in Idaho?"

During the weeklong trip starting Saturday, Otter and a contingent of business representatives will visit Shanghai, Beijing and Chengdu. In 2011, China ranked fifth among the state's importers by buying \$398 million in goods.

But some of Otter's fellow

state Republicans are suspicious of China. Last July, the party's central committee passed a resolution stating "the stability of our form of government is being undermined by strategies used by the Chinese state-government-controlled entities through investments, corporate takeovers, intelligence operations and rare-Earth monopolization."

Jeff Sayer, director of the Idaho Department of Commerce, said attracting investment isn't the focus of Otter's trip this time, but noted that the governor won't turn down investments based solely on where they come from.

"Increasing international exports and attracting investment capital remain top priorities for the Department of Commerce," he said. "Each of these steps are critical strategies to advance Idaho's economy to \$60 billion."

The \$60 billion represents Otter's Project 60, a plan to increase Idaho's gross state product to \$60 billion while creating job opportunities in the state.

After Otter's previous trip to China, 120 Chinese millionaires invested \$60 million in gold mines and a McCall resort that was part of a plan for them to get green cards for themselves and family members, but that money remains in escrow.

"People are still concerned about the China issue," said Sen. Sheryl Nuxoll, R-Cottonwood, who doesn't want Chinese companies investing in Idaho. "They do not share the same principles and values we do?'

Others don't want Otter going to China at all.

"The role of government is to facilitate commerce, not generate it," said Lori Shewmaker, a Meridian member of the Ada County Republican Central Committee.

But Rep. Pete Nielsen, R-Mountain Home, said selling more Idaho goods to China would be good as it would reduce the U.S. trade deficit.

And others are fine with Chinese investment in the state.

"If there is a way we can retrieve some of the jobs we have lost, we've got to look at it," said Republican Senate Caucus Chairman Russ Fulcher of Kuna.

Still, Otter's webpage de-

votes a fair amount of space swatting aside what he has called nonsense concerning Chinese investment. One of those topics the governor addresses is about a supposed 50-square-mile, self-sustaining city China would build south of Boise.

Otter notes that federal,

state and local laws don't allow a foreign government to acquire a section of American soil to build an autonomous city.

"Nobody is a stronger, more consistent defender of our Idaho sovereignty than me, from all threats, whether it's a foreign influence or a federal agency here at home," Otter has previously pointed out in attempting to quash the rumor.

SAN ANTONIO • Tony Parker scored 28 points and the San Antonio Spurs won their 11th straight game, beating the Utah Jazz 114-104 on Sunday night to maintain their slim lead atop the Western Conference.

Manu Ginobili added 23 points for the Spurs, who are now on their second 11game win streak — a season best in the NBA. But unlike that first 11-game tear that started in January, the Spurs are now fighting off the Oklahoma City Thunder for first place instead of trying to catch them.

Al Jefferson led the Jazz with 19 points and 10 rebounds. Utah dropped 1¹/₂ games behind Denver for the eighth and final playoff spot with nine games to go.

The Spurs (40-14), who face the Jazz again in Salt Lake City on Monday night, have played two more games than the Thunder (41-15). San Antonio overtook Oklahoma City in the standings for the first time all season Friday and owns the tiebreaker with 12 games remaining.

Expect to see the Spurs cashing in on their new stockpile of depth between now and then. Coach Gregg Popovich sat starting center DeJuan Blair for the first time this season, and newcomer Stephen Jackson didn't play, either. Resting them may portend a night off for one of the Big Three on Monday night.

Tim Duncan had 13 points and 16 rebounds, and Danny Green had 14 points. Ginobili was 14 of 15 from the foul line, saying he made the conscious decision to attack the basket, in part, because he's essentially trying to get used to absorbing physical contact after missing 30 games this year because of injury.

"I'm trying to start to be more aggressive going to the rim. I haven't been fouled much," Ginobili said. Devin Harris had 18 points and reserve DeMare

AUGUSTA, Ga. • Bubba Watson started the day by watching the rarest shot in golf. He ended another thrill-a-minute Sunday at Augusta National with a signature shot of his own to

win the Masters. So deep in the trees right of

the 10th fairway that he couldn't even see the green, Watson hooked a wedge off the pine needles from 155 yards to about 10 feet from the hole. That set up a par, good enough to beat Louis Oosthuizen on the second playoff hole.

"If I've got a swing, I've got a shot," Watson said.

It was Oosthuizen who set the tone for this wild day with a double eagle — only the fourth in Masters history — on the par-5 second hole when his 4-iron from 253 yards landed on the front of the green and rolled some 90 feet into the hole for a 2.

"Somehow it fell in my hands today," said Watson, who closed with a 68. "It's amazing. It's a blur, the last nine holes I don't remember anything. Somehow I guess I cried all my tears out."

Tebow Draws Crowd to Texas Easter Service

GEORGETOWN, Texas • Tim Tebow drew a crowd of about 15,000 to an outdoor Easter church service Sunday, telling the gathering it's important to be outspoken about faith while admonishing athletes about not being better role models.

"In Christianity, it's the Pope and Tebow right now," Celebration Church pastor Joe Champion he said. "We didn't have enough room to handle the Pope."

Tebow – devout Christian, backup NFL quarterback and cultural phenomenon – has a flock of admirers drawn as much to his religious leanings as his Heisman Trophy skills.

Tebow told them he welcomed the

attention on his convictions as well as the "Tebowing" prayer pose he often strikes on the field because it puts his faith and prayer in the public conversation.

"It's being talked about," he said. "That's exciting."

Some at the "Easter on the Hill" morning service under sunny skies about 20 miles north of Austin drove more 100 miles to hear Tebow speak. The service took on the feel of a rock concert with more than a 100 school buses shuttling people to the sprawling mega-church campus from local shopping centers and the nearby college.

The service was peppered with lively Christian rock songs and Tebow took the large stage to cheers from those who could see him while others toward the back watched on massive video screens. He sat for a 20-minute interview with Champion to talk about his faith and its role in his public life.

"It's OK to be outspoken about your faith," Tebow said.

He also took a shot at professional athletes who insist they are not role models.

"Yes you are. You're just not a good one," Tebow said.

Champion asked Tebow what he thought needed to change culturally in America.

"First and foremost is what this country was based on: one nation under God. The more that we can get back to that," Tebow said to applause.

U.S. Tops France, Awaits Spain

ROQUEBRUNE, France Having beaten Roger Federer's Switzerland and France on the road, the U.S. Davis Cup team now awaits a more daunting obstacle – defending champion Spain in the semifinals.

John Isner sent the Americans into the next round by winning Sunday's opening singles match -a 6-3, 7-6(4) 5-7, 6-3 victory over sixth-ranked Jo-Wilfried Tsonga of France. The U.S. is in the last four of the Davis Cup for the first time since 2008

"We've had the worst draw you could possibly imagine. I'm shocked that we're still in the Davis Cup this year," U.S. captain Jim Courier said. "We're going to be the underdog in Spain, but we're going to come with guns blazing."

Isner won both his singles in style, dispatching Gilles Simon on Friday and refusing to get rattled against Tsonga. Simon beat 19year-old Ryan Harrison 6-2, 6-3 in Sunday's last match to make the final score 3-2.

In other quarterfinals, host Czech Republic topped Serbia 4-1 and host Argentina beat Croatia 4-1. The semifinals are in September.

Just like four years ago, the Americans beat the French to set up a series against

Spain. That time, Spain won 4-1 at home on clay. Whether Rafael Nadal plays for Spain, Courier expects an intense series.

"Anytime you step on the court against Spain they're tough. They beat us at home last year without Rafa, on hard court, indoors," he said. "They have been the best team in the world for the

past decade."

But Courier did not expect to beat Switzerland, either. And the Americans romped 5-0.

"At the beginning of the year it was my hope that we could stay in the world group because Switzerland away, you think you'll probably lose that match," he said. "Spain, we'll probably lose it on paper ... but we don't play

them on paper. We've got players who are capable, passionate and hungry." Isner certainly is.

"People didn't think we could beat Switzerland. I'm sure there were some people who didn't think we could beat France," Isner said. "The reason I played so well this weekend was because (beating) Roger in the first round was huge for me because prior to that I hadn't really played that great in Davis Cup. Took a lot of pressure off me."

The 11th-ranked Isner was quick to praise Courier's influence.

"He's definitely helped me. He helped in that first tie against Switzerland," Isner said. "He never gets too excited. He doesn't get too mad at us. He's a very even keel."

Isner was just as cool under the blue skies and sunshine at Monte Carlo Country Club. As for Tsonga, he was frantically trying to find out a way to get into the match.

"John played very close to his maximum," Courier said. "The quality of his match was exceptional. John is continuing to improve. I think he played even better than the last time (against Switzerland)."

Isner rose to the challenge, with the Americans unable to turn to ninth-ranked Mardy Fish, who was sidelined with fatigue.

Carmelo's Season-High 43 Trumps Rose's Return

NEW YORK • Carmelo Anthony scored a season-high 43 points, making the goahead 3-pointer with 8.2 seconds left in overtime, and the New York Knicks spoiled a rusty Derrick Rose's return to the lineup to beat the Chicago Bulls 100-99 on Sunday.

Rose scored 29 points after missing the previous 12 games with a strained right groin, but he shot only 8 of 26 from the field and missed a pair of free throws with 19 seconds left in regulation and the Bulls ahead by three.

Despite having their starting five together for only the 11th time this season, the Bulls lost for the third time in four games, their NBA-best record falling to 43-14.

The Knicks increased their lead over Milwaukee to one game for the eighth and final playoff spot in the Eastern Conference. They travel to Chicago on Tuesday, visit Milwaukee on Wednesday, and close a difficult week by hosting Miami next Sunday.

Don't BeSo *Quick to Doubt Supreme Court's* Passions

bamacare's defenders insist the U.S. Supreme Court wouldn't dare nuke the reform law in a 5-4 ideological ruling, lest it shatter the institution's aura



of Olympian dispassion. In the words of University of California law professor Richard Hasen, "the court's legitimacy would suffer in ways which we have never seen."

When I hear that argument, I'm stricken with deja vu. A lot of law pundits said the exact same thing in 2000, when Al Gore and George W. Bush were stalemated during Florida's hanging chad recount crisis. The argument back then was that the high court wouldn't dare wade into a partisan swamp and deliver the presidency to Bush by one vote. As legal analyst Jonathan Turley told me on Dec. 11, justices care about "the legitimacy of the court," and Chief Justice William Rehnquist in particular "is cognizant of that damage because he is a student of the Supreme Court's history."

One day later, Rehnquist and four other Republican appointees stopped the Florida recount by casting their ballots for Bush – and, sure enough, the high court's image took a big hit in subsequent Gallup polls, a drop in public approval that has never been fully reversed. Prior to Bush v. Gore, 62 percent of Americans viewed the court positively. The latest Gallup puts approval at 46 percent.

But why should we assume the high court cares about such things? It didn't in 2000, and it doesn't now. As seen in the oral arguments on Obamacare, it's too busy practicing ideological politics. Some of the brethren behaved like tea-partying Fox News commentators (worrying that the government will make us eat broccoli) and political ward heelers (Antonin Scalia, on the advantage of throwing out the whole law: "You're not going to get 60 votes in the Senate to repeal the rest"). Since when is it Scalia's business to count Senate votes?

Seven years ago, Scalia voted to uphold a law that criminalizes the private cultivation of marijuana for medicinal purposes; he said backyard weed is interstate commerce. If he respected judicial precedent (a conservative doctrine), he would agree that if private pot is interstate commerce, then surely health care, 17 percent of our GDP, is also interstate commerce. The high court even ruled 70 years ago that the wheat farmers grew for personal consumption was interstate commerce.

Yes, if judicial precedent was the yardstick for a decision, this case would be a slam dunk; in fact, conservative legal icon Charles Fried said last month that the health reform law deserves to be upheld, with all Republican appointees signaling their assent. But despite John Roberts' vow, during confirmation hearings, to respect precedent, he has flagrantly ignored it in some big cases, most notably the 2010 Citizens United ruling that opened the floodgates for unlimited political spending by labor, corporations, and the rich. The public is clearly hip to what's happening at the court. According to a new Bloomberg News poll, 75 of Americans believe the justices will be guided primarily by their political views when they rule on Obamacare, not by the constitutional issues. Only 17 percent cited the latter. That's a sad commentary on the high court's waning image, a public attitude that speaks volumes about our hyper-partisan climate. The court is supposed to be our most nonpartisan redoubt; its credibility hinges on that. But as former Federal Communications Commission Chairman Newt Minow reportedly remarked the other day, "Since Bush v. Gore, I think the court's reputation has been blemished as somehow being not as independent as it perhaps was earlier in its history." In today's climate, the ideologues expect the court to deliver political favors, the way old urban hack machines used to deliver Christmas turkeys. But maybe it's naive for us to assume the justices have ever been insulated from partisan emotions. As Chicago columnist Finley Peter Dunne quipped 100 years ago, "No matter whether th' Constitution follows th' flag, the Supreme Court follows th' election returns."

Mike Simpson paints a pretty grim picture, but it doesn't begin to reflect the reality of what lies in store for our country if Congress doesn't take steps to reduce the national debt and establish a budget that's fiscally responsible. What we need are a few good statesmen who are willing to reach across the aisle to their counterparts and work with them to stop the imminent disaster of a failed economy - and it will fail if we continue to spend way beyond our means. We must decrease spending and increase income to start climbing out of debt.

Ironic, isn't it, that Congress, under the leadership of our first black president, is well on its way toward enmaintenance could have extended the life is debatable and points to the real motivation for this bond: new offices for the sheriff.

Get rid of the "big bad wolves," alright, they succeeded. In their place came the coyotes that were far more dangerous and caused far more damage. Any and all attempts to eradicate the coyote failed. The wolves kept the coyote in control.

Shooting wolves out of a helicopter doesn't seem to be very sportsmanlike conduct. Trapping wolves with steel jaw traps is unusually cruel to these animals. It is man that has caused the problems with bears, cougars and wolves. It is man that has come with livestock where the wolves once roamed. That is why

Idaho's Long-term Unemployed to Lose Benefits

BOISE • The state Department of Labor says long-term unemployment benefits in Idaho will expire after Dec. 31, though some jobless workers will be cut off sooner depending on when they started receiving the federal assistance.

Agency spokesman Bob Fick says the jobless benefits are being scaled back because Idaho's jobless rate is improving and a new federal law is phasing out emergency assistance for long-term unemploved workers.

Regular unemployment benefits last up to 26 weeks and are paid by the state. But two long-term benefit programs are funded by the federal government, and are triggered on and off by Idaho's unemployment rate.

Fick says the first program, known as emergency unemployment compensation, will shrink from 53 week of benefits to 13 weeks. The second program, known as extended benefits, currently pays up to 20 weeks of benefits but will be completely eliminated that month.

In total, the maximum weeks of unemployment benefits will drop from 99 weeks to 39 weeks in Idaho, Fick said.



No long-term unemployed workers will get extended benefits after the end of the year under changes approved by Congress in February, he

said. "It's a hard cut off, there is no phase out," Fick said during an interview with The Associated Press on Friday. "Nobody gets squat after Dec. 31."

Idaho's unemployment rate dropped to 8 percent for February, the seventh straight monthly decline and the lowest rate since September 2009.

The labor department estimates 300 jobless Idaho workers are transitioning each week from regular unemployment benefits, funded by the state, to the federally financed extended benefits. As workers make the transition, they're going to get fewer benefits, Fick said.

"Because everyone gets cut

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off at the end of the year," he said.

Meanwhile, the labor department is working to crack down on workers who continue to claim unemployment benefits after returning to Idaho's job force because they have not been reported as a new hire by their employer.

Most Idaho businesses about 70 percent - don't comply with a state law requiring them to report new hires within 20 days. The labor department says it needs that information to prevent people from bilking the system by continuing to collect benefits.

The law, passed in 1997, does not currently include a penalty for those who don't comply.

The agency sought legislation in the 2012 Idaho Legislature that would have slapped non-compliant employers with a \$25 fine. The bill won unanimous approval from state senators but got sidetracked in the Idaho House, where lawmakers feared it could hurt businesses.

The labor department estimated the measure would save Idaho \$5 million annually from unemployment fraud.

"What you see here is what happens when a law has no penalty," Fick said. "Seventy percent of the people required to abide by it have decided not to?"

The agency launched a public awareness campaign last month to remind Idaho employers of the reporting requirement. The department said additional efforts, using social media and the agency's website, are planned.



Officials said the Douglas-fir tussock moth and pine butterfly are becoming more active in the western part of the state. Pine butterfly, which attack and defoliate mature ponderosa pine, are at outbreak levels in the Bitterroot Valley, the report said.

survey found beetle-killed trees on more than a million acres, but that's down from 2 million in 2010 and 3.6 million in 2009.

"We are seeing a continued decline in mountain pine beetle activity in many areas across the state, indicating the epidemic may have reached its peak," said Gregg DeNitto, a Forest Service pathologist and leader of the Forest Service's Forest Health Protection office in Missoula.

The Billings Gazette (http://bit.ly/HmQheU)reports that the aerial survey also found 1.2 million acres defoliated by the western spruce budworm. That's up from about 326,000 acres in 2010, but less than the 2.6 million acres in 2009. Officials said the trees usually survive, but are severely

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

Mike Wallace, '60 Minutes' **Interrogator, Dies at Age 93**

The "60 Minutes" newsman had such a fearsome reputation that it was often said that those were the most dreaded words in the English language, capable of reducing an interview subject to a shaking, sweating mess. Wallace, who won his 21st and final Emmy Award at 89, died Saturday in the New Canaan, Conn., care facility where he had lived the last few years of his life. He was 93. Wallace didn't just interview people. He interrogated them. He cross-examined them. Sometimes he eviscerated them pitilessly. His weapons were many: thorough research, a cocked eyebrow, a skeptical "Come on" and a question so direct it took your breath away.

Unha-3 Rocket in Position at Launch Pad in North Korea

North Korean space officials have moved a long-range rocket into position for this week's controversial satellite launch, vowing Sunday to push ahead with their plans in defiance of international warnings against violating a ban on missile activity.

TONGCHANG-RI, North Korea • North Korean space officials have moved all three stages of a long-range rocket into position for a controversial launch, vowing Sunday to push ahead with their plan in defiance of international warnings refrain from engaging in nuclear and missile activity.

North Korea maintains that the launch is a scientific achievement intended to improve the nation's faltering economy by providing detailed surveys of the countryside.

"Our country has the right and also the obligation to develop satellites and farming hamlets to North Korea's new launch pad in Tongchang-ri in North Phyongan province, about 35 miles south of the border town of Sinuiju along North Korea's west coast.

All three stages of the 91-ton rocket, emblazoned with the North Korean flag and "Unha-3," were visibly in position at the towering launch pad, and fueling will begin soon, Jang said. He said preparations were well on track for liftoff and that international space, aviation and maritime authorities had been advised of the plan, but did not provide exact details on the timing of the fueling or the mounting of the satellite. Engineers gave reporters a peek at the 220-pound Kwangmyongsong-3 satellite due to be mounted on the rocket, as well as a tour of the command center. About two weeks before North Korea unveiled its rocket plan, Washington announced an agreement with the North to provide it with much-needed food aid in exchange for a freeze on nuclear activity, including a moratorium on long-range missile tests. Plans to send food aid, as well as a recently revived project to conduct joint searches for the remains of U.S. military personnel killed during the Korean War, have now been suspended.

Tulsa Police Say Shootings May Have Been Revenge

TULSA, Okla. • Two men were arrested Sunday in a shooting rampage that left three people dead and terrorized Tulsa's black community, and police said one suspect may have been trying to avenge his father's shooting two years ago by a black man.

Police identified both suspects as white, while all five victims in the rampage early Friday were black.

Police and the FBI said it is too soon to say whether the attacks in Tulsa's predominantly black north side were racially motivated. Police spokesman Jason Willingham said that investigators are considering many possible motives but based on Facebook postings, revenge appeared to be a factor.

In a Thursday update on Facebook that appeared to have been written by 19year-old Jake England, he angrily blamed his father's death on a black man and used a racial slur. He said Thursday was the second anniversary of his father's death.

"It's hard not to go off," given the anniversary and the death of his fiancee earlier this year, the posting said.

"It's apparent from the posting on the Facebook page that he had an ax to grind, and that was possibly part of the motive," Willingham said. "If you read the Facebook post and see what he's accused of doing, you can see there's link between the two of them?"

The Facebook page had been taken down by Sunday afternoon.

A family friend, Susan Sevenstar, told The Associated Press that England was "a good kid" and "a good, hard worker," who "was not in his right mind" after losing his father and the January suicide of his fiancee, with whom he'd recently had a babv.

"If anybody is trying to say this is a racial situation, they've got things confused," said Sevenstar, who described England as Cherokee Indian. "He didn't care what your color was. It wasn't a racist thing?'



Syria Scuttles Truce Plan with New Demands

BEIRUT (AP) • AU.N.-brokered plan to stop the bloodshed in Syria effectively collapsed Sunday after President Bashar Assad's government raised new, lastminute demands that the country's largest rebel group swiftly rejected.

The truce plan, devised by U.N.-Arab League envoy Kofi Annan, was supposed to go into effect on Tuesday, with a withdrawal of Syrian forces from population centers, followed within 48 hours by a cease-fire by both sides in the uprising against four decades of repressive rule by the Assad family.

But on Sunday, Syria's Foreign Ministry said that ahead of any troop pullback, the government needs written guarantees from opposition fighters that they will lay down their weapons.

The commander of the rebel Free Syrian Army, Riad al-Asaad, said that while his group is ready to abide by a truce, it does not recognize the regime "and for that reason we will not give guarantees."

Annan's spokesman had no comment on the setback. The envoy has not said what would happen if his deadlines were ignored.

Afghans, U.S. Sign Deal on Night Raids

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) • The U.S. and Afghanistan signed a deal Sunday giving Afghans authority over raids of Afghan homes, resolving one of the most contentious issues between the two wartime allies.

The majority of these raids are nighttime operations in which U.S. and Afghan troops descend without warning on homes or residential compounds searching for insurgents.

The raids are widely resented by Afghans, and President Hamid Karzai had repeatedly called for a halt to all night raids by international forces. He said for months that they would have to stop before he would sign a much-anticipated pact governing the long-term U.S. presence in Afghanistan.

Both countries have said that they wanted that bigger deal signed before the NATO summit in May, so the night raids agreement announced Sunday makes hitting that deadline possible.







I plan on talking to a counselor tomorrow because I am not sure how to handle this. I don't want to get into such a state that I'll let myself overdose again. Thank you for your time. I just need some guidance on how to handle this.

I hope by the time you read this you will have spoken to a counselor about your feelings, because it appears you are suffering from a severe depression, which can impair a person's judgment. How good a contract is six spades here? You may be surprised to know that although the contract looks good, best play will result in only a 90 percent chance.

.

The instinctive line, however, will fail today. Imagine that you win the opening heart lead, draw trump, and play the club king and a club to the jack. East wins to return a club, and unless you follow an inspired line in the diamond suit, you will lose a trick to the diamond queen.

But you can do much better after the lead of the heart king to the ace. Take the spade ace and king, ruff dummy's losing heart, then cash the club king and lead a low club, intending to cover West's card. As the cards lie, when East takes the club eight with the nine, he can do no better than lead a low diamond. When the diamond nine forces the queen, declarer claims the rest.

In this variation, had the diamond nine been covered by the 10, declarer would cash his remaining trumps and discard a diamond from dummy. Then a club to the ace would reveal how that suit lay. If the clubs were 3-3, declarer could claim. If West had four clubs, then the diamond finesse would be a certainty as West could have no more than a singleton diamond. And if East had four clubs and had kept them all, he would be down to one diamond, so it would be correct to play a diamond to the king.

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
