Council Approves Rim Project's Zoning

TWIN FALLS • Call it an eyesore, or exciting economic development. Either way, the planned shopping center at Canyon Park is getting people talking.

On Monday, the Twin Falls City Council approved a zoning map change that will allow for development of a shopping center on the canyon rim.

The shopping center, planned for the empty land behind Golden

Corral near Blue Lakes Boulevard and Fillmore Street, would have multiple storefronts, a large parking area and landscape, said Gerald Martens of EHM Engineers, who presented on behalf of Canyon Park Development.

Vice Mayor Don Hall asked why developers designed the complex so the back of the stores would face the walking trail and canyon.

"I think that's a great concern for a lot of folks," Hall said.

Martens said the loading docks and dumpsters would be blocked

by screens or landscaping.

That wasn't good enough for some of the Twin Falls residents who testified.

Landscaping or screens may block the view, said Laura Peterson. "But we'll smell the fumes of those trucks that pull in and out when they have to deliver. We will," she

Cheri Condie called the proposed plan an "asphalt ocean," and said the city had a responsibility to protect the aesthetics of the

Among the Twin Falls City Council's other actions:

• Approving a city code change to allow more types of residential buildings in old town and downtown Twin Falls. The proposal, brought by the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency, will allow buildings like row houses, duplexes and condominiums.

• Annexating of Chobani property by the city. The 37-acre piece of land is already owned by Chobani and is slotted for future development, said Community Development Director Mitch Humble. The rest of the Chobani property has already been annexed. The move allows the city to collect taxes from the yogurt plant.

do with unclaimed bodies.

The eight or so cremated remains sit silently on a shelf in the Twin Falls County Coroner's Office with assigned case numbers labeling the outside. Most have identities, but no family to collect

They're unclaimed bodies, each of which found its way to the coroner under different circumstances. A change to Idaho statute, signed into law by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter this past week, gives a timeline and more guidance to counties on how to handle those bodies, but Chambers calls the law potentially problematic.


Currently, Idaho's vague law states that coroners should bury unclaimed bodies, but doesn't expressly prohibit cremation. Counties usually work with funeral homes to make arrangements, and handle each body on a case-by-case basis, depending on if the identity is known and under what circumstances the body was

The county keeps files on unclaimed bodies in case someone does come forward to claim

When the new law goes into effect in July, coroners will have the clear option of cremating remains. The change also dictates that the county must take care of the body within 14 days of death.

Twin Falls County sees about one or two unclaimed bodies a year, Chambers said. It's less of a problem in rural counties. Craig Rinehart, Cassia County coroner, said it hasn't come up in his time in office, and Maria Barriga of the Blaine County Coroner's Office said they've only had one in 35

ducer responsibility, which in and of itself makes it difficult to know how many people are going to apply," Werntz said. "We think it's going to be a smaller number."

Werntz estimated that only about 30 producers will apply for the permit.

The agency's new guidelines also make a producer's nutrient management plan – how much manure is handled and how it's treated – a public document.

That differs from state law, which doesn't allow public scrutiny of such documents.

"I don't think we expect producers to say this is a great permit," Werntz said.

The goal is to protect "waters of the U.S.," a definition that has been contested for years, said

Nick Peak, the EPA's regional CAFO coordinator based in Boise. For example, it remains unclear if many of the Magic Valley's canal systems fall under the agency's

scrutiny, Peak said. Please see FEEDLOTS, A2

Canyon Park **Project Now** Moves Before City P&Z

After Monday's zoning vote, the Twin Falls City Planning and Zoning Commission now weighs the actual Canyon Park plan tonight.

TWIN FALLS • Citizens can voice their opinions about a proposed commercial development on the Snake River Canyon rim today during a public hearing before the Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commis-

The 6 p.m. meeting will be in the Twin Falls City Council chambers across from City Hall.

Canyon Park Development LLC seeks approval of a preliminary plan that would allow it to build a 12-lot shopping complex on 25 acres between Canyon Springs Road and Blue Lakes Boulevard North. The land is currently undeveloped.

The proposal surfaced several years ago with a larger vision, including a hotel and convention center. However, the recession stalled the effort and has scaled back the current

Tina Luper, project administrator for Nielsen & Co., which manages the Canyon Park development, said Monday she does not expect much public testimony during tonight's hearing.

"If recent history repeats itself, we expect it to be fairly quick," she said.

The 12 parcels for commercial outlets will contain about 200,000 square feet of space at full build-out, Luper added.

"We're very excited about it," she

A Planning and Zoning staff report notes there is significant variance in the ground elevation of the proposed subdivision.

"There will be some places where the developer will place a site obscuring retaining wall along the walking trail on the canyon rim," the report says. "Other places will have site obscuring landscaping along the walking trail."



Rinehart had a close call in early 2011, when an elderly woman died and the county couldn't contact her relatives. After 40 days, they finally reached her daughter in north Idaho. Minidoka County Coroner Lucky Bourne had a similar experience where it took two weeks to reach a family member.

"Normally, if we have someone that we know their identity but we cannot find any family, we usually try our very best to (find) any family, any where," Rinehart said.

The new 14-day limit puts a time crunch on that contact time, but Chambers said if he felt confident about a body's identity and the potential to reach families, he would go to the county legal department and ask for an exten-

So why not just cremate

a body during the investigation? Some religions, including Roman Catholicism, Islam, and Eastern Orthodoxy, either discourage or forbid cremation, and Chambers doesn't want to do anything against a person's beliefs. The law still allows for the option of burial, but, Rinehart said, cremation is always cheaper.

Chambers feels comfortable cremating bodies only when the county's investigation shows it won't be a problem. One example: The county cremated a person whose spouse had also been cremated. Though they knew the person's identity, they couldn't find any family members to claim the body.

If they're not sure, they stick with burial.

"The main thing that we're after here ... is the county isn't held liable for doing something to a body that the family didn't want done," Chambers said.

Members of the City Council mostly supported the plan, but Councilwoman Rebecca Mills-Sojka and Mayor Greg Lanting voted against the proposal, saying they wanted to see a bigger buffer between the buildings and the canyon trail.

Councilman Shawn Barigar pointed out that the section of property in question has always been slotted for retail development, and that development — not the city or taxpayers – is responsible for the trail system and access along the canyon

"If you want wide open spaces, that left a long time ago in Twin Falls, no matter how many hundred feet you get back from the canyon," Barigar

In a separate but related vote, the council approved vacating the section of Fillmore Street that runs through the property. That would allow the Canyon Park developers to move the road within the development and add a roundabout in the intersection.

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

County Questions Walcott Access

RUPERT • Minidoka County officials met with several agency officials Monday to discuss concern over whether boating access could be restricted as a management plan is developed for the Minidoka National Wildlife Refuge.

commissioners' "The biggest concern is that you will shut off access for boating," said County Prosecutor Lance Stevenson. "They want to maintain that historic access."

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service is developing a 15-year plan to manage the 20,700acre refuge that encompasses Lake Walcott State Park.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service project leader Tracy Casselman said because of the shared jurisdiction among Fish and Wildlife, the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, they are "kind of on new ground."

Casselman said the agency has identified six priority uses of the refuge that include hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, photography, environmental education and interpretation. Those will receive consideration over all other public uses.

"I don't think hunting and fishing will be eliminated," said Casselman.

But, he said, other types of

boating not associated with fishing could come under "closer scrutiny."

Half of the wildlife refuge is comprised of Lake Walcott, which is used as water storage at Minidoka Dam. The dam lies 12 miles northeast of Rupert.

The refuge extends 25 miles upstream from the dam and includes 80 miles of shoreline around Lake Walcott. The refuge has a documented 243 species of migratory birds, with 85 of those species nesting within its boundaries.

Minidoka County Commissioner Bob Moore said county officials are concerned about the economic impact to the county if boating is restricted on the reservoir.

School Testing Starts as State Awaits Waiver

TWIN FALLS • Over the next month, students around the Magic Valley will head to computer labs to take state standardized tests.

But this year could be the last time their scores will be used to determine if schools make "adequate yearly progress" under the federal No Child Left Behind Act.

In February, the Idaho State Department of Education sent in a waiver that would create a new five-star accountability system. Spokeswoman Melissa McGrath

said the waiver hasn't been approved vet by the U.S. Department of Education. Peer reviewers called two weeks ago with some clarification questions. "We're hoping to hear back soon,"

McGrath said the goal is to transition to the new system next year.

Under the proposal, schools would receive points based on a number of factors, including student improvement. That differs from NCLB's model – a pass-fail system based on whether third-through 10th-grade students meet a set benchmark on the Idaho Standards Achievement Tests.

"Really, the waiver will change what we do in a number of ways," said Wiley Dobbs, superintendent of the Twin Falls School District.

Under NCLB, 100 percent of students are supposed to meet standards

by the 2013-14 school year. And Idaho isn't alone in wanting relief from the continually increasing requirements.

The federal government approved 10 state waivers in February, the first to be awarded. Idaho is among another 28 states seeking them.

In the meantime, ISAT testing began around the state on Monday. The testing window continues through May 10.

At I.B. Perrine Elementary School, testing will happen over the next four weeks. Principal Bill Brulotte said students will only take one test per week. With 680 students at the Twin Falls said testing has to be spread out over a longer period of time. Dobbs said it's important to have a

school and just one computer lab, he

positive testing atmosphere. The tests, he said, are a chance for students to practice stepping up and showing what they know. "Students will be tested in a number

of ways throughout their lives," he said. To encourage students to try their

best, some schools have incentives on testing days. Sandra Miller, student achievement and school improvement director for

the Minidoka County School District, said there are themed days at schools such as "No sweat, we can pass the test," when students can wear sweat pants to school. In Wendell, Superintendent Greg

Lowe said it's important that parents are informed about the ISAT. "If the parents know about it and

how important it is, it doubles our chances of students doing their best," he said.

Brulotte said parents should hang on to their child's test scores. He said children should be making a four- to sixpoint gain every year and staying up with the average range for their grade

Test results are one way schools shape what's taught in classrooms. Plus, they're used to figure out which students need extra help and whether they're ready to move on to the next grade level.

Cramer. Cramer, 36, was sentenced on charges of theft by receiving stolen property, burglary and forgery of a financial transaction card.

According to the Twin Falls Police report, Cramer stole a 17-yearold girl's purse out of her grandfather's car during the night of Oct. 31 and used a debit card from the girl and her grandfather's joint account to purchase gasoline, soda and lottery tickets at a convenience store on Nov. 1.

In another case against Cramer, he is accused of stealing several cards out of a Twin Falls couple's car, then using one of the cards four times at the same chain of convenience stores on Oct. 31, purchasing gas, lottery tickets, soda and doughnuts.

Cramer was also accused by Twin Falls Sheriff's County deputies of stealing and attempting to use credit cards and gift cards out of a Filer woman's car on Nov. 1.

According to court records, in a Nov. 3 interwith sheriff's deputies, Cramer said he and a woman, Rebecca Ilene Vulgamore, 34, would pick a neighborhood to drive around in, get high and walk along streets checking for unlocked vehicles.

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney McKenzie Cole said Cramer admitted to stealing at least 15 different credit cards but had only been charged in the instances where he was caught on video using the cards.

Cramer said he was off drugs for five years before a cousin came to town and they did meth together, which set off the string of burglaries.

"Previous times I was in trouble, it was because I was on drugs," Cramer told the court. "I'd like to be able to get my kids back."

Stoker sentenced Cramer to a place in the state's retained jurisdiction program with the recommendation that he live in a therapeutic community. The underlying sentence is four to eight years in each of the three cases to run concurrently.





Engineering Firm Hired for URA Consultation

TWIN FALLS • One side effect of

development: An overwhelmed city engineering department.

At a Monday meeting, the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency Board approved ongoing consulting services with Riedesel Engineering of Twin

The Urban Renewal Agency (URA) will work with Riedesel for consultation on new projects, said Melinda Anderson, economic development director for the city of Twin Falls.

"It's on-call engineering advice," Anderson said.

Normally, the URA would work

with the city's engineering department. But with so many new projects, like new construction and Chobani, the department is slammed, Anderson said. She cited Glanbia's new Twin Falls corporate headquarters as a project that the URA needs assistance.

The agreement doesn't guarantee other engineering contracts for Riedesel, like for design, and the URA can terminate the ongoing agreement at any time.

When seeking proposals for the on-call consultation, Anderson said she contacted two engineering firms: Riedesel Engineering and Civil Science. In a letter to the URA board, Anderson said she went with Riedesel

because they have a full staff in Twin Falls and they have slightly lower

Anderson said because of time restraints, she didn't get proposals from other engineering firms, but she said she knew Civil Science and Riedesel would work well for the URA's needs.

Idaho law mandates political districts like URAs must seek bids for services like construction, but includes exemptions for other professional services, said city attorney Fritz Wonderlich. URA chairman Gary Garnand said engineering falls under that exemption.

The proposal has no set budget, but for each project, Riedesel will submit a time and materials proposal to Anderson for review before going forward with any work. The board doesn't have to approve that spending, Anderson said, but she will update board members on how much the firm charges.

In the URA agenda, she included a breakdown of Riedesel's hourly billing rates. Among them: \$180 for a three-person survey crew, \$45 for clerical work, \$140 for engineer Kent Atkin and \$120 for engineer Don

Anderson said that even though the agreement doesn't have a budget or cap, "I can't imagine any scenario where the Urban Renewal Agency would be spending hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Altes Sentenced to Rider in Abduction and Drug Cases

TWIN FALLS • If David

Altes can stay away from drugs, Judge Randy Stoker believes the two won't meet in his courtroom again.

"You are at a point in life where you need to decide which way you want to go," Stoker told the 39-year-old, Monday in Twin Falls Countv 5th District Court.

Altes was sentenced to a one-year stint in the state's retained-jurisdiction program for his role in the November abduction of a 4year-old boy from his father's home. Stoker said he would recommend that Altes spend the time in a therapeutic community. Failure to complete the program could result in a twoto five-year prison sentence.

While awaiting sentence on that charge - conspiracy to commit custodial interference – police saw Altes leaving a known drug dealer's house on Feb. 27. After arresting him for driving without privileges, police found Altes had about 7.6 grams of meth on him.

For that reason, probation was not appropriate in the case, Stoker said. For possessing a controlled substance, Altes received two to seven years in prison, also suspended for the retained jurisdiction stint.

While Altes did not physically enter the home or take the boy in the abduction, Senior Deputy Prosecutor Stan Holloway said he knew of the plan and later helped the boy's mother take the boy to the Hailey area.

Defense attorney Loren Bingham contradicted this, saying Altes did not know of the plan to take the boy and was only trying to help his girlfriend and her son escape an abusive situation.

Bingham asked the court to consider probation in the case, but acknowledged that retained jurisdiction could also be a good choice - a compromise between the prison time asked for by the state and Altes' preference for probation.

Stoker agreed, saying the therapeutic community could help with Altes' drug problem as well.

As for the others in the abduction case:

- Stefanie Contreras, 29, the abducted boy's mother, was sentenced to three years of probation.
- Kelvin Milo Jr., 21, pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit custodial interference and will be sentenced April 18.
- Daniel Thomas, 35, is charged with unlawful possession of a weapon by a felon. No hearings are currently scheduled because of separate, pending charges.

While sifting through the box, he found a bugle, tattered papers and some military badges. It appeared to be the belongings of a soldier of some kind. He spent the rest of the day collecting and examining the items he had found. He

needed to find out more. The next morning he stopped by the local coffee shop to ask questions about the lot he was digging on. He stopped at the right place. Three elderly gentlemen were swapping stories as they did every morning. Ed approached the group and asked if they were from the area. They all laughed and said "Who's asking?" Ed explained that he was building a new house on a lot he recently purchased and told them where it was. One gentlemen said, "Oh, you mean the old Norris place? That place was demolished over 50 years ago. Been an empty lot ever since." Ed was intrigued-he hadn't realized there had been a house there. "Place caught fire in the 1940's. I was just a school boy at the time-no one was home, but the place was a total loss. The charred remains sat there for 4 or 5 years before it was cleaned up. I walked past that place twice a day, five days a week, back and forth from school. Went all the way to the 8th grade," the fellow said with a smile. "After that, no one ever rebuilt on the lot. I'm glad to see somebody's doing something with it. Go down and talk to Larry at the court house. He can pull the plat book and tell you all about it." The old guy was right, Larry was a wealth of information. The original farm house was built by Elsie and Thomas Little back in 1845. They moved out and sold to Elijah Miller in 1883. Then in 1916, the place was sold to Henry Norris who tore down the existing two-room farm house and built a new house. That house burned down in 1943.

All of this was great info, now what about the military items? Ed needed to find out exactly what they were. When Ed learned that the Treasure Hunters were coming to town, he thought this would be his chance to learn more about the items he had found. The advertisement had said that the experts would offer advice on any antique and collectible items and they would do it for free. It also said that they would make offers to purchase items. Ed reflected that "learning about the items was very interesting and definitely worth the trip. The entire collection was valued at \$2,200. Most of the value was the sword and the bugle. I decided to take pictures and sell the collection. I had a great time learning about it and thought it should be in a Civil War enthusiast's collection. SOUTH KOREA **SAYS NORTH PREPARING** FOR NUCLEAR

SEOUL, South Korea • Recent satellite images show North Korea is digging a new underground tunnel in what appears to be preparation for a third nuclear test, according to South Korean intelligence officials.

The excavation at North Korea's northeast Punggye-ri site, where nuclear tests were conducted in 2006 and 2009, is in its final stages, according to a report by intelligence officials that was shared Monday with The Associated Press.

Its release comes as North Korea prepares to launch a long-range rocket that Washington and others say is a cover for testing missile technology that could be used to fire on the United States.

The Obama administration said Monday it would consider both a rocket launch and an underground nuclear test as highly provocative and leave Pyongyang more isolated.

"In each case this would be an indication of North Korea's decision at the leadership level not to take the steps that are necessary to allow North Korea to end its isolation, to rejoin the community of nations and to do something about the extreme poverty and depravation that its people suffer," White House spokesman Jay Carney told a news briefing in Washington.

Observers fear a repeat of 2009, when international criticism of the North's last long-range rocket launch prompted Pyongyang to walk away from nuclear disarmament negotiations and, weeks later, conduct its second nuclear test. A year later, 50 South Korean were killed in attacks blamed on the North.

"North Korea is covertly preparing for a third nuclear test, which would be another grave provocation," said the intelligence report, which cited U.S. commercial satellite photos taken April 1.

Syria Fires over Borders with Lebanon, Turkey

BEIRUT • Syrian forces opened fire across two tense borders Monday, killing a TV journalist in Lebanon and wounding at least six people in a refugee camp in Turkey on the eve of a deadline for a cease-fire plan that seems all but certain to fail.

A witness at the Turkish camp said he saw two refugees killed, although that account could not be independently confirmed.

Across Syria, activists reported particularly heavy violence with more than 125 people killed in the past two days.

The Obama administration expressed outrage at the violence spilling over the frontiers, saying the Syrian government appeared to have little commitment to the peace plan that was negotiated by former U.N. chief Kofi Annan.

The latest bloodshed was a sign of how easily Syria's neighbors could be drawn into a regional conflagration as President Bashar Assad's crackdown on a year-old uprising becomes increasingly militarized.

Annan brokered a deal that was supposed to begin with Syria pulling its troops out of population centers by Tuesday morning, with a full cease-fire by both sides within 48 hours. But hopes for the plan collapsed after a fresh wave of violence and new demands by the regime for written guarantees that the opposition will lay down arms first.

Iran Proposal Joins Jockeying before Nuclear Discussions

TEHRAN, Iran • Iran is signaling a possible compromise offer heading into critical talks with world powers deeply suspicious of its nuclear program: offering to scale back uranium enrichment but not abandon the ability to make nuclear fuel.

The proposal – floated by the country's nuclear chief as part of the early parrying in various capitals before negotiations get under way Friday — suggested that sanctions-battered Iran is ready to

But this gambit, at least, appeared to fall short of Western demands that Iran hand over its most potent nuclear material and ease a standoff that has rattled nerves and spooked markets with seesaw oil prices and threats of Israeli military strikes.

"It is important for Iran to understand that the window is closing and that these talks are an opportunity," White House press secretary Jay Carney said Monday. "The decision rests with Iran?

The talks involving Iran and the five permanent U.N. Security Council nations plus Germany, to be held in Istanbul, are the first direct negotiations on Tehran's nuclear program since a swift collapse more than 14 months ago.

Despite far-reaching complexities, the dispute effectively boils down to one issue: Iran's stated refusal to close down its uranium enrichment labs.

For Iran, uranium enrichment is a proud symbol of its scientific advances and technological self-sufficiency. Iran's president, Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, called the nuclear program on Sunday "a locomotive" for other showcase projects such as Iran's space effort.

The U.S. and its allies contend that the same sites that make fuel for reactors could also eventually churn out weapons-grade material. Iran has repeatedly insisted that its nuclear pro-

gram is for peaceful purposes only. The ideas put forth late Sunday by

the nuclear chief, Fereidoun Abbasi, are an attempt to at least acknowledge this huge divide.

Abbasi said Tehran could eventually stop its production of the 20 percent enriched uranium needed for a research reactor, used for medical research and treatments. But, he added, Iran would continue enriching uranium to lower levels of about 3.5 percent for power generation.

The framework addresses one key Western concern. The U.S. and others worry the higher-enriched uranium could be turned into warhead strength more than 90 percent enriched — in a matter of months.

Yet Abbasi also directly snubbed a

demand backed by the U.S. and some other countries. They want Iran's stockpile of 20 percent-enriched uranium to be transferred out of the country. Abbasi indicated that it would re-

"Such a stockpile could enable Iran to make a bomb in the future, should it decide to do so," said Meir Javedanfar, an Iranian-born political analyst now based in Israel.

"Unless an agreement is reached whereby this stockpile is transferred abroad for conversion into nuclear fuel or, at the very minimum, placed under international supervision in an another country, it will be very difficult for the (world powers) to accept Iran's current offer," he said.

Autism Research May Be About to Bear Fruit

ATLANTA • More than \$1 billion has been spent over the past decade researching autism. In some ways, the search for its causes looks like a long-running fishing expedition, with a focus on everything from genetics to the age of the father, the weight of the mother, and how close a child lives to a freeway.

That perception may soon change. Some in the field say they are seeing the beginning of a wave of scientific that should strengthen some theories, jettison others and perhaps even herald new drugs.

"I do think over the next three to five years we'll be able to paint a much clearer picture of how genes and environmental factors combine" to cause autism, said Geraldine Dawson, a psychologist who is chief science officer for the advocacy group Autism Speaks.

The effort has been infused with new urgency by a recent federal report that found autism disorders are far more common than was previously understood, affecting 1 in 88 U.S. children. Better diagnosis is largely responsible for the new estimate, but health officials said there may actually be more cases of autism, too.

If autism's causes remain

a mystery, "you're not going to be able to stop this increase," said Irva Hertz-Picciotto, a researcher at the University of California, Davis who is leading a closely watched study into what sparks autism disorders.

In the past week, a spate of studies released during National Autism Awareness Month has offered tantalizing new information about potential causes. Research published in the journal Nature widened the understanding of the genetic roots of some cases and confirmed the elevated risks for children with older fathers. Another study, released online Monday in Pediatrics, suggested maternal obesity may play a role.

To be sure, finding the causes of autism - an umbrella term for a variety of disorders that delay children socially or intellectually remains daunting. The causes are believed to be complicated, and not necessarily the same for each child. Some liken autism to cancer a small word for a wide range of illnesses. In many cases, autism can be blamed on both genetic problems that load the gun and other factors that pull the trigger.

It has been a growing public concern for two decades, as studies have found it to be more and more prevalent. The U.S. government dramatically

increased funding for autism research in the last decade, and now budgets about \$170 million a year through the National Institutes of Health. That's only about a quarter of what NIH will spend on breast cancer research and \$50 million less than what it will spend on asthma.

But more than a halfdozen foundations and autism advocacy groups have been adding to the pot, putting annual research spending in recent years at

more than \$300 million.

About a third of that has been devoted to finding autism's causes.

The lion's share of money for finding a cause has been spent on genetics, which so far experts believe can account for roughly 20 percent of cases. The earliest success was in the early 1990s and involved the discovery of the genetic underpinnings of Fragile X syndrome, a rare condition that accounts for just 2 to 4 percent of autism cases but is the most common form of inherited intellectual disability in boys

Campaign Says Santorum's Daughter is Recovering

WASHINGTON • GOP presidential candidate Rick Santorum's hospitalized daughter could be released Monday, his campaign said.

Santorum spokesman Hogan Gidley said 3-yearold Bella was doing much better and could be discharged from a northern Virginia hospital by the end of the day.

"The family hopes to take her home from the hospital very soon," he said.

Bella was hospitalized Friday as her father began a brief holiday break from campaigning. He did not campaign Monday so he could be with his daughter, who suffers from a rare genetic condition called Trisomy 18.

Santorum faces an uphill battle against front-runner Mitt Romney in the race for the Republican presidential nomination. The contest next turns to Santorum's home state of Pennsylvania, where both men plan to campaign heavily and where Romney is airing \$2.9 million in TV ads against Santorum.

Gidley said Santorum's campaign schedule Tuesday would depend on his daughter's health, but that "we have a full day of events planned tomorrow, so he should be back on the

campaign trail." In deference to Bella's illness, Romney's campaign pulled down a harsh ad that was running against the former senator in Pennsylvania. Romney spokeswoman Andrea Saul said Monday the campaign asked TV stations over the weekend to pull the ad and replace it with a positive, pro-Romney spot instead.

Romney is far ahead of Santorum in the race for delegates to the Republican National Convention and is the likely GOP nominee. Santorum has said he won't drop out of the race, though he's acknowledged he will have to win Pennsylvania if his campaign is to survive.

Bella was hospitalized in January with pneumonia and Santorum left the campaign trail, ahead of the Florida primary, to care for her. The campaign has not provided details of her latest hospitalization.

Microsoft Deal with AOL Part of Patent Scramble

A valuable patent is less like a forgotten Rembrandt and more like a rusty-butserviceable gun.

NEW YORK • AOL's \$1 billion deal to sell and license patents to Microsoft is another in a series of "Antiques Roadshow" moments in the technology world. Faded companies have been rummaging through their assets recently, and some of them have found musty old patents that turn out to be

worth a great deal. Patents have become a hot commodity in recent years. They give the holder the exclusive right to use certain technologies or business processes in the U.S. Companies such as Microsoft, Apple, Facebook, Google and others are collecting large patent libraries and increasingly using them in lawsuits – to defend their businesses or to attack rivals.

A valuable patent is less like a forgotten Rembrandt and more like a rusty-but-

serviceable gun. "Patents have become legal weapons. They're not representing ideas anymore," says James Bessen, a lecturer at Boston University and the director of a nonprofit that studies patent issues.

Two big deals in the past year have pushed patents into the spotlight.

In July, a consortium that included Apple Inc. and Microsoft Corp. pledged to pay \$4.5 billion for patents from Nortel Networks, a bankrupt Canadian maker of telecommunications equipment. By contrast, Nortel's onceprominent wireless networks business fetched just \$1.13 billion in 2009.

The consortium outbid Google Inc. for the Nortel patents. But Google struck back in August, when it sealed a deal to buy cellphone company Motorola Mobility Holdings Inc. for \$12.5 billion. Motorola is well past its prime as a cellphone maker, but as a technology frontrunner for decades, its engineers had accumulated 17,500 patents for the company. The deal with Google has yet to close.

Google wants Motorola's patents as a defense against lawsuits related to its Android operating software for phones and tablets. Motorola, Samsung Electronics Co. and other phone makers have been riding Apple's coattails

with devices that are similar to Apple's iPhone and iPad. Apple is fighting back, using patent law in an attempt to delay competitors.

Google supplies Motorola and Samsung with phone software, so it doesn't want to see Apple succeed with its lawsuits. It's buying Motorola so it can use its patents to sue Apple, a threat that could force Apple to the negotiating table or avoid suing Google's partners altogether.

Because of their complex-

ity, high-tech products are particularly susceptible to patent litigation. Hundreds of thousands of patents could apply to a smartphone, for instance. A competitor sitting on any one of those patents could ask a court to stop sales of the product. Things rarely get that far, however. Instead, the defendant usually ends up paying the patent owner ongoing royalties.

These royalties can add up: Analyst Pierre Ferragu at Sanford Bernstein estimates that Taiwanese smartphone maker HTC Corp. pays about 10 percent of its revenue to license patents from other companies.

Christopher Marlett, the CEO of MDB Capital, an investment bank that focuses on intellectual properties including patents, says he believes the AOL deal was driven by the rivalry between Google and Microsoft. AOL has Internet-related patents, including some that cover mapping, given that it owns MapQuest, one of the pioneers in that area. Google and Microsoft have their own mapping services.

Much as Google, Microsoft and Apple are doing, Facebook is also buying patents from technology veterans to use in tomorrow's battles.

As a young, successful company with few patents of its own, it needs protection. In March, IBM Corp. sold Facebook 750 patents.

Titanic: The Reality

BELFAST, Northern Ireland • Here, where Titanic, the massive White Star Line luxury liner, was built - the joke for years has been, "It Tribune Media Service was fine when it left here: This year marks the 100th



anniversary of the sinking of the ship "Not even God himself could sink..." and the centenary is being observed in

There are solemn remembrances. A "Requiem for the Lost Souls of the Titanic" is scheduled for St. Anne's Cathedral and there's a Titanic Commemoration Service and Unveiling of the Titanic Memorial Gardens at City Hall.

Elsewhere, the government and entrepreneurs are seeking to make a profit. The Titanic Belfast visitor attraction opened March 31 and is sold out through April 16. MTV UK is staging a "Titanic Sounds" event, which it is billing as "the biggest party in the world." A party about a tragedy; how modern.

In America, where Titanic was headed when it sank April 15, 1912, about 960 miles northeast of New York City, James Cameron's 1997 blockbuster film "Titanic" is being re-released in 3-D. The film gives us the fictional romance between "Rose" and "Jack" and, as generally agreed, even by Cameron himself, a host of historical inaccuracies that may be all a generation of young people will learn about the ill-fated ship and its tragic maiden voyage.

The 1953 film, "Titanic," starring Clifton Webb and Barbara Stanwyck, also contained historical inaccuracies and fabricated scenarios, as did the 1958 film "A Night to Remember," another Hollywood interpretation of the tragic sinking.

The true story of the Titanic, however, is quite different and as far as I know has never been told in a feature film. In Cameron's version, he depicts the wealthy as asserting their privilege over third-class passengers and crew so they could escape in lifeboats not made available to all, a depiction that plays on issues of class warfare and social inequality.

In many cases, the opposite was true, according to documented historical accounts that include real-life examples of rich passengers coming to the aid of the less fortunate. Writing in the March issue of the Christian publication, "Tabletalk," Dr. Harry L. Reeder, a Presbyterian minister in Birmingham, Ala., cites one such example of the selflessness of the rich and their sacrifices for the "lower classes." Dr. Reeder laments the missed opportunity by filmmakers to tell a far more dramatic and compelling story, the real story of the Titanic.

Reeder muses on the "amazing event" chronicled in historic accounts, in which, "Men of power and prestige (including Benjamin Guggenheim, John Jacob Astor and Macy's department store owners Ida and Isidor Straus) sacrificed their lives for women and children of the lower class, many of whom were indentured servants, day laborers, and domestic workers. On this flotilla of self-absorption, self-sacrifice became a prevailing virtue during a crisis moment, and the powerful chose death that the powerless might receive life."

Reeder asks "Why?" and answers his own question: ... the undeniable influence of Christianity. The Christian virtue of self-sacrifice for the well-being of others and the biblical imperative for men to lay down their lives for women and children were chosen instead of self-preservation."

Other ships have sunk with great loss of life. The Lusitania was torpedoed by a German U-boat on May 7, 1915, killing more than 1,100 with nearly 800 surviving, but that ship went down in just 18 minutes, while the Titanic took almost three hours to slip beneath the waters of the North Atlantic, thus giving the Titanic more time for real, as well as manufactured, drama.

Since its demise, Titanic's name has become a brand. Souvenir T-shirts and other tacky memorabilia are for sale. USA Today reports a \$5 bill salvaged from the wreckage is up for auction. The reality, though, is that more than 1,500 people died when the ship sank. Branches of family trees were severed. Parents were lost to children and children who were lost never lived to be parents themselves.



BOISE • The head of a company seeking to build a nuclear power plant in Idaho has agreed to pay \$450,000 to resolve a lawsuit with a group of angry investors.

Shareholders of Alternate Energy Holdings Inc. in late 2010 sued the company, Chief Executive Officer Don Gillispie and Vice President Jennifer Ransom, claiming they schemed to mislead investors about their compensation and manipulated the company's trading value.

Philip Gordon, a Boise lawyer representing the investors, said an agreement was reached in mediation last week, calling on the company to pay \$450,000 by the end of June or face a \$2 million penalty judgment.

A federal judge must still approve the settlement.

Investors say that between 2006 and 2010, Gillispie duped them into buying Alternate Energy stock at an artificially inflated price by hiring stock promoters to manipulate demand for the company and then issuing deceptive press releases touting the company's fiscal health.

"Alternate Energy and certain of its officers and directors made materially false and misleading statements and engaged in a scheme to manipulate and artificially inflate the market price;" the shareholders' lawyers wrote in the complaint.

They also allege that while Gillispie was working to swell the stock price, he and Ransom were secretly unloading their own shares for a profit.

Gillispie denies any wrongdoing.

Accusations of fraud against the company were first made public when the Securities and Exchange Commission filed a lawsuit in December 2010.


BOISE • A new law signed by Idaho's governor will guarantee that clients looking for a backrub or any other massage therapy will get treatment from a licensed professional.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter signed the bill last week after lawmakers this year finally got behind a licensing proposal sought by the industry.





TWIN FALLS • High school athletes often travel a long road to get the chance to play at the collegiate level.

That's speaking in figurative terms, but in the case of Canyon Ridge's Staci Baird, that term can be applied literally as well. The Riverhawk volleyball

player announced Monday that she will continue her playing career at Endicott College, a Division III school in Beverly, Mass., about halfway between Boston and the New Hampshire border.

Or 2,600 miles from Twin Falls.

"I always have wanted to go back east for college," said Baird, who researched the school online. "When I saw it I knew I wanted to go there and as soon as I got on campus, I absolutely loved it and knew that's where I wanted to go."

While visiting the school, Baird got to prac-

Yet the league has taken a series of steps to better protect players in the past couple of years, and just last month expanded the definition of "defenseless players" who may not be hit in the head or neck and cannot be hit by someone leading with a helmet.

While NFL veterans say off-the-books incentives have been around for years, and some current players claim tough talk about hitting opponents where they are injured happens in locker rooms throughout the league, Goodell responded to the Saints case by handing out unprecedented penalties.

In addition to upholding Payton's suspension, which begins next Monday and runs through the Super Bowl in February 2013 - by coincidence, in New Orleans -Goodell also affirmed suspensions of eight games for Saints general manager Mickey Loomis and six games for assistant head coach Joe Vitt. He also kept in place a \$500,000 fine for the franchise and the loss of draft picks this year and next.

Loomis, who along with the team declined comment Monday, and Vitt begin their suspensions after the preseason ends.

Former defensive coordinator Gregg Williams, who left the Saints in January to join the St. Louis Rams, ran the bounty program and has been suspended indefinitely. He did not appeal.

Suspensions for New Orleans players who participated in the bounty pool could be coming within days.

Goodell set a precedent last season when he made Lions defensive tackle Ndamukong Suh sit out for two games after stomping on an opponent, and Steelers linebacker James Harrison one game for a brutal tackle that gave Browns quarterback Colt McCoy a concussion.

The NFL has said as many as 27 players also could be sanctioned in the scandal. That might include former Saints defensive regulars who have signed elsewhere.

The investigation also found that Payton initially lied about the existence of a bounty program and instructed his defensive assistants to do the same.

seconds pre-injury to 4.7 seconds.

"I just got to get back into it and hopefully get a 4.6," Siavii said.

Criner called Siavii's rehab routine and recovery freakish. At the start of spring, the linebacker said he was a month ahead of where doctors thought he'd be. Since then, coach Robb Akey has noticed how quickly Siavii settled into playing shape.

"I think after the first couple days he got it going," Akey said. "He's playing fast and he's fitting things well, so I think it's been a good thing."

Just because their numbers were similar for us and they're both 5-10 and are really quick and can score, that they're the same player.

and Gosar as well. One could not watch a Baylor game on ESPN this past season without a mention of Jackson and CSI in the same sentence. With Harris playing in the SEC, there will be even more exposure for the school. Hardcore basketball junkies have known of CSI's prowess for years, but now the passive fan is becoming more aware of the school's basketball

program. "We couldn't have paid for that kind of commercial," Bate said. "If you

looked at what air time is worth and what we were able to get by that, we were able to get a lot of positive exposure."

For Gosar, who this week is recruiting in Phoenix after having his first weekend off in months, such mentions will go a long way toward getting into the minds of recruits long before he gets a chance to meet them in person.

"We got to find that next group of guards that closely matches the mark Pierre and Fabyon have set for our program," Gosar said.

The rise in interest in CSI basketball won't come from Jackson and Harris going head-tohead on the basketball court. It will come from the next generation of players, ones who saw Jackson and Harris play before huge crowds in nationally televised games and drew the connection that both players were from a junior college in south-central Idaho. And who ultimately

wanted to play here because of them. Now that's a great story.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Even a sheet of paper has two sides."

You never know when squirreling papers away will come in handy. In cleaning out my files, I came across a hand I'd cut out from a U.S. Daily Bulletin from the 1970s. Declarer was Robert Lebi of Canada, who has been

a regular player on Canadian

The lead against four hearts

squads over the last 30 years.

was the club jack to East's king. Next the club ace was cashed, and East now erred by playing a third club, allowing declarer to shorten his hand's trumps. After ruffing, Lebi earned a game swing for his team in this Spingold match by playing a heart to the ace, and, believing his opponent's king to be a true card, played for a trump reduction. He took the spade ace, then ruffed a spade. Now came the diamond ace and king, a diamond ruff, and a spade ruff. Declarer was down to the Q-10 of hearts and a master diamond, while West held J-9-3 of hearts. The diamond jack completed the coup. West had to ruff and lead into the trump tenace to concede the contract.

The Lebi team won their knockout match by less than the swing on this deal, when the other declarer did not ruff a spade when he was in dummy.

Note that if East shifts to the heart king or a diamond, declarer cannot get home. While the heart play could be expensive, a diamond will almost never cost, and as we have seen, it can gain by preventing declarer from shortening his hearts for the trump
