Twin Falls coroner sees potential problems with new Idaho law on what to do with unclaimed bodies.

TWIN FALLS • Dennis Chambers calls them his security angels. The eight or so cremated re mains sit silently on a shelf in the Twin Falls County Coroner's Office with assigned case numbers
labeling the outside. Most have identities, but no family to collect them.
They're unclaimed bodies, coroner under different circumstances. A change to Idaho statute, signed into law by Gov, C.L. "Butch" Otter this past
week, gives a timeline and more guidance to counties on how to handle those bodies, but Chambers calls the law potentially problematic.
Currently, Idaho's vague law states that coroners should bury unclaimed bodies, but doesn't ex-
pressly prohibit cremation pressly prohibit cremation.
Counties usually work with funeral homes to make arrangements, and handle each body on a case-by-case basis, depending on if the identity is known and unde what circumstances the body was found.
The county keeps files on unlaimed bodies in case someone does come forward to claim them.
When the new law goes into ef fect in July, coroners will have the clear option of cremating remains. The change also dictates the body within 14 days of death. Twin Falls County sees about one or two unclaimed bodies a year, Chambers said. It's less of a problem in rural counties. Craig Rinehart, Cassia County coroner, said it hasn't come up in his time

TWIN FALLS • Federal regulators hope a new permit governing confined-animal feeding operasurface waters. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the new permit will regulate water
runoff created by the state's larger livestock producers of beef and dairy cattle, poultry, sheep and pigs. This new version replaces an earlier permit that expired in EPA state director
Major changes include only requiring the permit for producers who actually discharge waste into
surface waters rather than who propose such a discharge. "There is a certain level of proof itself makes it difficult to know how many people are going to apply," Werntz said. "We think it's going to be a smaller number." Werntz estimated that only about 30 producers will apply for the permit.
The agency's new guidelines also make a producer's nutrient management plan - how much manure is handled and how it's treated - a public document.

TWIN FALLS • Citizens can voice their opinions about a proposed commercial development on the Snake River Canyon rim today dur ing a public hearing before the Twi Falls Planning and Zoning Commis sion.
The 6 p.m. meeting will be in the Twin Falls City Council chambers across from City Hall.
Canyon Park Development LLC seeks approval of a preliminary plan that would allow it to build a 12 -lot shopping complex on 25 acres be-
tween Canyon Springs Road and Blue Lakes Boulevard North. The land is currently undeveloped.
The proposal surfaced several years ago with a larger vision, including a hotel and convention center. However, the recession stalled the effort and has scaled back the current effort.
Tina Luper, project administrator for Nielsen \& Co., which manages Monday she Cark development, said public testimos not expect misht's hearing.

But this year could be the last time their scores will be used to determine if schools make "adequate yearly proft Behind Act In February th
ment of Education sent in a waiver that would create a new five-star account ability system.
Spokeswoman Melissa McGrath said the waiver hasn't been approved yet by the U.S. Department of Education. Pith some clarification questions "We're hoping to hear back soon," she said.
McGrath said the goal is to transition to the new system next year. Under the proposal, schools would receive points based on a number of
factors, including student improvement. That differs from NCLB's model - a pass-fail system based on whether third- through 10th-grade students meet a set benchmark on the Idaho Standards Achievement Tests. "Really, the waiver will change what we do in a number of ways," said Wiley
Dobbs, superintendent of the Twin Dobbs, superintend
Falls School Nistrict.
Under NCLB, 100 percent of students are supposed to meet standards

Stoker said he Altes spend the time in a therapeutic community. Failure to complete the pro gram could result in a two to five-year prison sentence.

on that charge - conspiracy on that charge - conspitinacy custodial inter-
ference - police saw Altes leaving a known drug dealer's house on Feb. 27. After arresting him for driving
without privileges, police without privileges, police
found Altes had about 7.6 grams of meth on him. For that reason, probation was not appropriate in the case, Stoker said. For possessing a controlled substance, Altes received two to seven years in prison, also
suspended for the retained jurisdiction stint.
While Altes did not physically enter the home or take the boy in the abduction, Senior Deputy Prosecutor Stan Holloway said he knew of the plan and later helped the the Hailey area.
Defense attorney Loren Bingham contradicted this, saying Altes did not know of the plan to take the boy and was only trying to help his girlfriend and her son escape
an abusive situation.

Bingham asked the court consider probation in the case, but acknowledged that
retained jurisdiction could retained jurisdiction could also be a good choice - a
compromise between the prison time asked for by the tate and Altes' preference for probation.
Stoker agreed Stoker agreed, saying the therapeutic community could help with Altes' drug problem as well. As for the others in the ab-

In Cameron's version, he depicts the wealthy as as serting their privilege over third-class passengers and crew so they could escape in lifeboats not made availa and social inequality
In many cases, the opposite was true, according to documented historical accounts that include real-life examples of rich passengers coming to the aid of the less fortunate. Writing in the March issue of the Christian publication, "Tabletalk," Dr. Harry L. Reeder, a Presbyample of the selflessness of the rich and their sacrifices for the "lower classes" Dr Reeder laments the missed opportunity by filmmakers to tell a far more dramatic and compelling story, the real story of the Titanic. Reeder muses on the "amazing event" chronicled in historic accounts, in which, "'Men of power and prestige (including Benjamin Guggenheim, John Jacob Astor and Macy's department store owners Ida and Isidor Straus) sacrificed their lives for women and children of the lowe class, many of whom were indentured servants, day la-
borers, and domestic workers. On this flotilla of self-ab sorption, self-sacrifice became a prevailing virtue during a crisis moment, and the powerful chose death that the powerless might receive life.
Reeder asks "Why?" and answers his own question: "...the undeniable influence of Christianity. The Chris tian virtue of self-sacrifice for the well-being of other lives for women and children were chosen instead of self-preservation."
Other ships have sunk with great loss of life. The Lusitania was torpedoed by a German U-boat on May 7,1915, killing more than 1,100 with nearly 800 surviving, but hat ship went down in just 18 minutes, while the Titani look almost three hours to slip beneath the waters of the al, as well as manufactured, drama
Since its demise, Titanic's name has become a brand. Souvenir T-shirts and other tacky memorabilia are for sale. USA Today reports a $\$ 5$ bill salvaged from the wreckage is up for auction. The reality, though, is that more than 1,500 people died when the ship sank. Branches of family trees were severed. Parents were lost parents themselves.

$\$ 450,000$ by the end of June or face a $\$ 2$ million penalty judgment. A federal judge must still approve the settlement. Investors say that between 2006 and 2010 Gillispie duped them int buying Alternate Energy
stock at an artificially inflated price by hiring stock promoters to manipulate demand for the company and then issuing deceptive press releases touting the
company's fiscal health. company's fiscal health. "Alternate Energy and certain of ts officers and
directors made materially false and misleading statements and engaged in a scheme to manipulate and artificially inflate the market price," the share-
holders' lawyers wrote in the complaint. They also allege that while Gillispie was working to swell the stock price, he and Ransom were secretly unloadin their own shares for $\underset{\text { Gillispi }}{\text { profit. }}$ wrongdoing. wrongdoing.
Accusations of fraud against the company were first made public when the Securities and Exchange Commission filed a law suit in December 2010. SEC attorneys claim company executives conspired
