Is Twin Falls' Downtown Churn Good?

The city's center has seen a host of longtime businesses leave as new ventures prepare to move in.

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TWIN FALLS • Shane Cook stood on a Main Avenue sidewalk Wednesday afternoon and watched another piece in his dream of owning a business fall into place.

The longtime restaurant manager smiled as two workmen attached a "Twin Falls Sandwich Company" sign to his storefront. Cook took photographs to remember the moment leading to a May 1 opening.

"I fell in love with this space," he said. "I like things with character. I wouldn't be comfortable in a strip mall."

His decision to locate his first business downtown was based on a gut

feeling, but also on a vision Cook shares with Art Fitzgerald, who has owned the Paris Building for three years. They see downtown Twin Falls as ripe for commercial success if it can attract the right mix of restaurants, entertainment, arts and specialty shops.

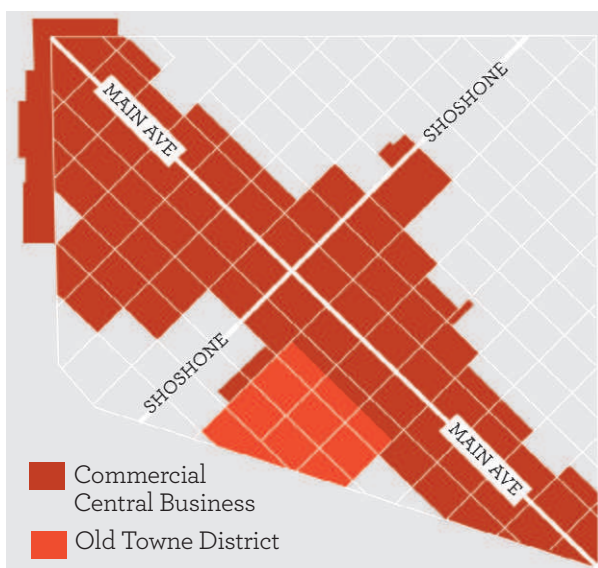
"A lot of people feel that downtown is dead," Fitzgerald said. "That's what I'm trying to change."

He said he has spent \$150,000 refurbishing the Paris, where Cook's shop and a couple more restaurants are coming. One will be "a trendy, high-end pizza company with brick oven," Fitzgerald said.

Not everyone shares their optimism. There are plenty of empty spaces in the downtown core, including businesses that have left recently for other locations.

Fox Floral moved a couple of weeks ago to 215 Eastland Drive. Longtime

Paving the Way for Downtown Housing

A zoning change, approved Monday by the Twin Falls City Council, could make that a little easier to achieve. The change allows for more types of housing, including row houses, duplexes and condominiums, in downtown.

"It won't be the traditional neighborhood you see in Twin Falls," said city Economic Development Director Melinda Anderson. Rather, this housing would be more urban, drawing in younger tenants and people 55 and older.

Charges Brought in Martin Case

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. • The neighborhood watch volunteer who shot 17-year-old Trayvon Martin was arrested and charged with second-degree murder Wednesday after weeks of mounting tensions and protests across the country.

George Zimmerman, 28, could get up to life in prison if convicted in the slaying of the unarmed black teenager.

Special prosecutor Angela Corey announced the charges but would not discuss how she arrived at them or disclose other details of her investigation, saying: "That's why we try cases in a courtroom."

Second-degree murder is typically brought in cases when there is a fight or other confrontation that results in death but involves no premeditation to kill. It carries a mandatory minimum of 25 years behind bars when a gun is used.

Martin's parents expressed relief over the decision to prosecute their son's killer.

"The question I would really like to ask him is, if he could look into Trayvon's eyes and see how innocent he was, would he have then pulled the trigger? Or would he have just let him go on home?" said his father, Tracy Martin.

Corey would not disclose Zimmerman's whereabouts for his safety but said that he will be in court within 24 hours, at which point he can request bail. He turned himself in in Florida.

Zimmerman's new attorney, Mark O'Mara, said Zimmerman will plead not guilty. The lawyer asked that people not jump to conclusions about his client's guilt and said he is "hoping that the community will calm down" now that charges have been filed. "I'm expecting a lot of work and hopefully justice in the end," he said.

Dog Groomer Sentenced for Selling Drugs

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls businesswoman has been sentenced to jail time and probation in a Gooding County drug case.

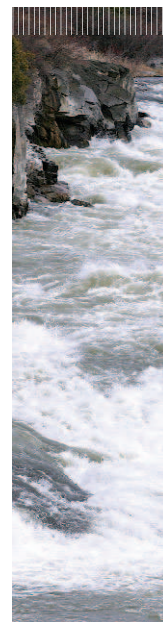
Carlene Harding was sentenced April 3 to serve two to five years in prison, which was suspended for three years of supervised probation and one year in jail. Harding was credited three days in jail.

Harding was originally charged with trafficking between five and 25 pounds of marijuana. The charge was amended to possession with intent to manufacture or deliver. Several drug charges in Twin Falls County were dropped by prosecutors.

According to a report from Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies, Harding had been the subject of investigation since March 2010, during which deputies interviewed various suspects who pinned Harding as "Momma" — a major local marijuana dealer. Deputies sifted through her trash, used K-9 units to sniff out a suspected stash at a local storage-rental business, and served a search warrant on Harding's residence.

The search turned up glass pipes with burnt residue that tested for marijuana; a ledger and other pages with dollar amounts next to names, initials and weights, which had words such as "Hash" written down; a .22-caliber revolver; and a bag full of pills identified as oxycodone, hydrocodone and Alprazolam — all controlled substances.

In an August 2010 interview with investigators, Harding told police she had turned to selling marijuana "because the economy is so bad." Harding owns A Classier Clip dog grooming business on Eighth Avenue East in Twin Falls. She told police that business there had fallen off by half, leading her to selling the drugs on the side.

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Less State-run Preschool Puts Students Behind

TWIN FALLS • Preschool used to be a place to play and learn how to get along with others.

But now, children are also learning skills — such as counting — to help them prepare for a more rigorous kindergarten experience.

I.B. Perrine Elementary School Principal Bill Brulotte said many kindergarten teachers can tell within the first week of school which students went to preschool.

"They have an advantage and they're more likely to be successful in school," he said.

While other options are available, Idaho is one of 11 states without a state-funded preschool program. Plus, children in the Gem State aren't required to go to preschool or kindergarten.

"It's up to parents to decide whether they want students to attend," said Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education.

But the lack of a state program puts Idaho's youth at an educational disadvantage compared to their peers in other states, according to a new report by the National Institute of Early Education Research.

The state funds half-day kindergarten and gives school districts the option of allocating funding for full-day programs. School districts are also required to offer preschool programs for students with special needs.

The Twin Falls School District's preschool program for 3- and 4-year-olds is based at Harrison Elementary School. About 90 children are enrolled this year.

Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said it's a federally funded program, but the state also provides some financial support.

Filer Man Sentenced on Drug, Burglary Charges

TWIN FALLS • A Filer man who pleaded guilty to possession of marijuana and burglary was sentenced on April 2 to do time in the state's retained-jurisdiction program.

Adrian Will, 24, was originally charged with drug trafficking and an additional drug possession charge in connection with a complicated case involving drugs police say were stolen from a Twin Falls man's home. The trafficking charge was amended to possession with intent to manufacture or deliver, while the possession charge was dropped.

Will, along with Michael and Robin Pendleton, both 20, were initially charged with trafficking after police say they found the men with 591 grams of marijuana, a notebook with weights and prices, and six grams of

methamphetamine at a Twin Falls motel in November 2011.

The three led police to Michael Pendleton's uncle, David Henderson, 35, whom they said they stole the drugs from, according to a police report. The marijuana allegedly belonged to a California man who was extradited back to the state on a fugitive warrant.

Will was sentenced to three to five years in prison, which could be suspended if he completes the state treatment program.

Michael Pendleton was sentenced Feb. 27 to three to five years in prison, but could also be released sooner by completing the treatment program.

Robin Pendleton is scheduled to be sentenced April 27.

Henderson is scheduled to be sentenced on a drug possession charge on May 25.

On Tuesday, Zimmerman's former lawyers portrayed him as erratic and in precarious mental condition. But O'Mara said Zimmerman was OK: "I'm not concerned about his mental well-being."

Zimmerman, whose father is white and whose mother is Hispanic, has asserted since the Feb. 26 killing in Sanford that he shot in self-defense after the teenager attacked him. Martin's family argued Zimmerman was the aggressor.

The shooting brought demands from black leaders for his arrest, touched off protests in which people wore hooded sweat-shirts like the one the teenager had on, and set off a furious debate over race and self-defense that reached all the way to the White House, where President Barack Obama observed: "If I had a son, he'd look like Trayvon."

Separately, the U.S. Justice Department's civil rights division is conducting its own investigation.

Corey said the decision to bring charges was based on the facts and the law, declaring: "We do not prosecute by public pressure or by petition."

One of the biggest hurdles to Zimmerman's arrest over the past month was Florida's "stand your ground" law.

Dust Storm Causes Crashes in Jerome, Minidoka Counties

PAUL • An afternoon dust storm near Paul led to two wrecks that shut down east-bound Interstate 84 shortly after 5 p.m. Wednesday.

Idaho State Police and sheriff's deputies from Minidoka and Jerome counties responded to a multi-vehicle crash across the

Minidoka county line. An ISP dispatcher said 18 vehicles were involved, with two people transported to the hospital with injuries.

Agencies also responded to a separate collision involving two semitrailers on the Jerome side of the county line. Dispatchers said there were minor injuries in that crash, but it largely just

caused property damage.

According to ISP, the crashes blocked I-84's eastbound lanes from mileposts 194-201. At one point, emergency dispatchers said eastbound traffic was backed up six miles. Traffic was diverted onto the frontage road, and ISP encouraged drivers to find alternate routes while they were responding to the crashes.

The change affects Twin Falls' downtown and Old Towne areas. Downtown runs the length of Main Avenue and includes surrounding streets, and Old Towne encompasses a southern portion of town that's home to Woody's and Red's Trading Post.

The action wasn't spurred by developer interest, Anderson said. Rather, she and Community Development Director Mitch Humble found that current zoning didn't allow for many types of housing. They wanted to clean up the city's guidelines to pave the way for potential future plans, Anderson said.

There are already a few apartments and studios located above businesses on Main Avenue and surrounding streets, but Anderson hopes to see even more housing options.

And there's already interest from Twin Falls residents.

Mary Shaw said she and her husband have strongly considered living downtown.

"Downtown was always so vibrant, and a fun place to be," Shaw said.

The dream comes with challenges for the city and developers, like renovating old buildings and turning them into livable spaces.

But, Anderson said, "they're not insurmountable."

downtown fixtures Clos Office Supply and Snow's Antiques also have found new homes.

Snow's went to the Lynwood Shopping Center off of Blue Lakes Boulevard earlier this year. Irene Snow said business has improved since the change.

"We don't have any parking meters and there are places for people to come in with horse trailers," she said. "Downtown, people have to watch and see how much time they have before the meter runs out."

Traffic was just one of several factors that prompted Clint Earl and his family to relocate Fox Floral to Eastland. He did traffic studies of the two locations at the same time of day, and said his new spot gets 700 percent more traffic than downtown.

"That's way huge," he said. "I can hold a conversation with someone in the middle of Main Avenue and not worry about being hit by a car."

Like Snow, he mentioned better parking as another motivation. He said customers at his downtown store were always worried about getting a ticket, and sometimes Earl would run out and plug the meter with a quarter to put their minds at ease.

Add increasing rent and declining sales — along with bumpy sidewalks that make it easy to trip — and it was an easy choice to move out, he said.

"I just didn't want to be the last one to leave downtown," Earl said.

Meanwhile, other merchants find the historical area of town a desirable place with lots of potential. Many scoff at talk about parking meters.

Rudy's — A Cook's Paradise owner Tom Ashen-

Little Support

Several state agencies decided this fall not to apply for federal funding for early childhood education.

"We wouldn't want to possibly expand the education system by another grade level without consulting the Legislature first," McGrath said. The state also didn't want to rely on one-time federal funding to start such a program.

Rep. Donna Pence, D-Gooding, said the topic has come up before at the Capitol.

"It's not a topic that goes over well," she said, because the major consensus among legislators is that parents

should prepare their children for public school.

In 2007, Pence supported a bill — which didn't pass — that would have set state educational standards for child-care centers. She said a lot of parents work and can't provide preschool-type education for their children.

The lack of a state preschool program is a "big problem," she said, especially when there are high expectations for students once they get to school.

By the time students leave kindergarten, they're expected to be able to count and write numbers to 100, plus know letters and sounds.

Preschool Options

Despite the lack of a state-

run preschool program, there are a number of options throughout the Magic Valley.

Some are through public agencies — such as the College of Southern Idaho — while other preschools are run by private organizations.

There are preschool programs through the college's preschool lab and Child Care Center — which is just for children of CSI students and employees.

CSI's Head Start program also includes preschool.

Director Mancole Fedder said more than 670 children are enrolled in the Head Start/Early Head Start programs. They're for families living at or below the federal poverty level.

brenner notes there is free parking behind Main Avenue stores, and he calls parking "an overblown issue." For him, the draw is "a sense of community that is unique to downtown. 'Sense of place' is the term that's used a lot."

Rents are lower than other places in town, he said, and downtown business owners have more freedom than those in large malls.

"In a shopping mall they tend to have policies you have to abide by," Ashenbrenner said. "Nobody can say to me, 'You have to be open this Sunday.'"

He's optimistic because downtown has major tenants such as bank headquarters, school district offices, city and county government offices, a St. Luke's outlet, and 150 Glanbia employees coming soon. "In the long run, downtown will be fine," Ashenbrenner said.

Robin Dober owns Hands On, where customers make their own ceramics and

fused glass. She's been downtown for eight years and agrees with Cook that it feels better there.

"I've always liked downtowns," Dober said. "They have a lot of character. The smaller, more unique type of shops tend to be downtown and I fit into that niche."

Boise developer Mark Rivers has been hired by the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency as a consultant to help lure new tenants to downtown. He is escorting one potential business owner around downtown today, and says the area has potential in addition to several challenges.

"It has become the lowest-cost real estate in the market," Rivers said, "and it is attractive if you base your real estate decisions solely on price."

The downside is that many owners setting up shop downtown don't have enough funding and, as a result, "aren't aggressive about

rehabilitating their buildings," he said. "You have to increase the value of real estate there over time and bring new investors to property ownership downtown."

Shawn Barigar, Twin Falls City Council member and president of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, said he is "a huge fan of downtown." He added the area can prosper if it encourages mom and pop stores to locate there, in much the same way Boise's downtown has grown.

"The reality is that chain stores are not going to downtown," Barigar said.

A recent movement by city of Twin Falls officials to encourage downtown housing is a good plan, according to Barigar and Tom Frank, a member of the city's Urban Renewal Agency and the city Planning and Zoning Commission.

"With it, I think we can be viable," Frank said. "Without it, I'm not sure."

Five Magic Valley School Districts to Receive Grants

BOISE • Idaho Public Schools Chief Tom Luna will be in the Magic Valley today to award classroom technology grants. Cassia County, Minidoka County, Buhl, Richfield and Kimberly school districts will receive the grants. They're among 15 districts and charter schools statewide that will receive funding. At 10 a.m., Luna will be

at Popplewell Elementary School in Buhl to award a \$100,000 grant. Then, he'll travel on to the Minidoka County School District's service center at noon in Rupert to present a \$150,000 grant. Finally, a presentation at 3 p.m. at Burley High School will award a \$194,600 grant to the Cassia County School District. Richfield School District will also receive a \$75,000

grant, while Kimberly School District will receive a \$99,945 grant. Technology grants are funded through the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Foundation, which provided \$21 million in 2011 to help create a 21st-century classroom in every Idaho school. The five Magic Valley districts will be pilot districts trying out additional tools in the state's instructional management system.

Man Sentenced for Pulling Gun on Drywall Worker

TWIN FALLS • A 50-year-old Twin Falls man has been sentenced to one year of supervised probation for pulling a revolver on a man he hired to fix drywall. Dale Wayne Snow was originally charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, later amended to assault. He was also charged with exhibition of a weapon. Snow was sentenced to 90 days in jail with 88 days suspended and 2 days credited for the assault charge. For the exhibition charge, he received 180 days' jail time with 178 days suspended and 2 days credited. Court records stated the victim was a subcontractor for Mirage Construction who was doing a drywall job at a home on Alder Drive

when the homeowner, Snow, arrived and began yelling at the man. The man told police Snow yelled and swore at him while he started gathering his tools, saying, "You don't know

who you are messing with." The man became scared and asked Snow to stop yelling at him, according to court records. Snow then pulled out a Taurus .410 revolver and pointed it at the man's face telling him, "I will blow your brains out," the records state. In an interview with police, Snow told them he was afraid of being beat up.

KIMBERLY SEEKS NEW ADMINISTRATOR

KIMBERLY • The city of Kimberly is scrambling to find a replacement for Polly Hulsey, the administrator who resigned earlier this month.

The city is advertising for a full-time city administrator/treasurer. The position will pay at least \$44,000 per year, depending on experience.

"The council has decided to move ahead with a full-time position," Mayor Tracy Armstrong said in an interview Wednesday. "It's our desire to backfill the position as soon as possible."

Hulsey resigned April 2. Her job and \$80,000 annual salary had become the subject of much controversy in the weeks leading up to her resignation.

During a public meeting March 13, several residents praised her as a skilled and able administrator, but others questioned whether the city could afford to pay her salary.

The new city administrator/treasurer will be paid slightly more than half what Hulsey received.

The minimum qualifications for the new position include a bachelor's degree in public administration

Other items before the Kimberly City Council:

- The council unanimously voted to de-annex two properties on the north side of Kimberly Road.

The properties were annexed about three years ago when the city was preparing to extend water and sewer lines to a planned subdivision. But the subdivision was never built, and the water and sewer lines were not installed. The affected prop-

erty owners ended up paying taxes for city services that were not available.

Lance Godfrey, owner of the Select Source hardware store, one of the affected properties, said he was grateful for the city's action.

- City Engineer Tracy Ahrens updated council members on a wastewater treatment study.

Kimberly's wastewater has exceeded limits a few times in the past 10 years for total suspended solids specified in a 1987 agreement with the city of Twin Falls. Flow volume, however, has always stayed safely within specified targets, according to data gathered so far.

The study is about 15 percent complete.

with additional course work in accounting, business administration or a related field from an accredited college. The administrator/treasurer will be in charge of the city's financial management, budgeting and administration of grants and loans. The City Council plans to review applications in a couple of weeks, Armstrong said.

Hulsey's departure has already put in jeopardy a

\$500,000 economic development grant that the city had hoped to land in order to revitalize its downtown core.

Kimberly lost points on its state grant application after Hulsey resigned because she was the lead on the effort.

The city has submitted a letter to the Idaho Department of Commerce seeking reconsideration, Armstrong said at a City Council meeting Tuesday.

500 Straw Bales Burn in Jerome

Santorum Leaves Race Romney Had Locked Up

Over to you, Governor Romney. Rick Santorum has left the Republican presidential race, ending the most successful run by an improbable GOP candidate since publisher Steve Forbes' run in 1996. At the start of the presidential campaign, few in political circles would have predicted that a senator who had lost his last race by 18 points, who had no money, no pollster, and few endorsements, would win 11 contests.

The GOP presidential race was all but over, and now it finally is. Mitt Romney can stop fighting a two-front war, against Republican rivals to his right and President Barack Obama to his left. His aides no longer need to start the morning with a discussion of how to tie off the Santorum challenge and where to spend precious resources.

Though Santorum was not going to win the nomination, he could have wounded the eventual nominee, and Romneyland had to worry constantly about being surprised (as they were in Colorado on Feb. 7 when Santorum won a state Romney was supposed to win). Now Mitt Romney can focus all of his attention on the president, whom he trails by about 10 points.

There have been a lot of presidential candidates who fell from great expectations: Rick Perry, Fred Thompson, Rudy Giuliani, and Phil Gramm, to name a few. They turned themselves into political punch lines with disastrous campaigns. The much smaller class is those who came from nowhere and energized their party, not enough to win the nomination, but enough to cause a stir: Lamar Alexander, Howard Dean and Mike Huckabee. Now Rick Santorum joins that group.

Santorum said the recent health scare of his long-ailing 3-year-old daughter Bella helped him make his decision to end the race. Though polls showed him slightly ahead in advance of the Pennsylvania primary on April 24, it wasn't a certainty that he would win his home state. By ending his campaign now, he burnishes his reputation. He leaves as a champion of grass-roots conservatives.

Having made the right exit, Santorum can now trade in on his personal brand.

Santorum almost missed his chance to leave the race on a high note. Until his daughter's recent bout, he had been planning to fight until the last primary at the end of June. Unlike Newt Gingrich, who though in the race is running from repose, Santorum was still hitting hard on Romney's penchant for flip-flopping and his weakness as a conservative.

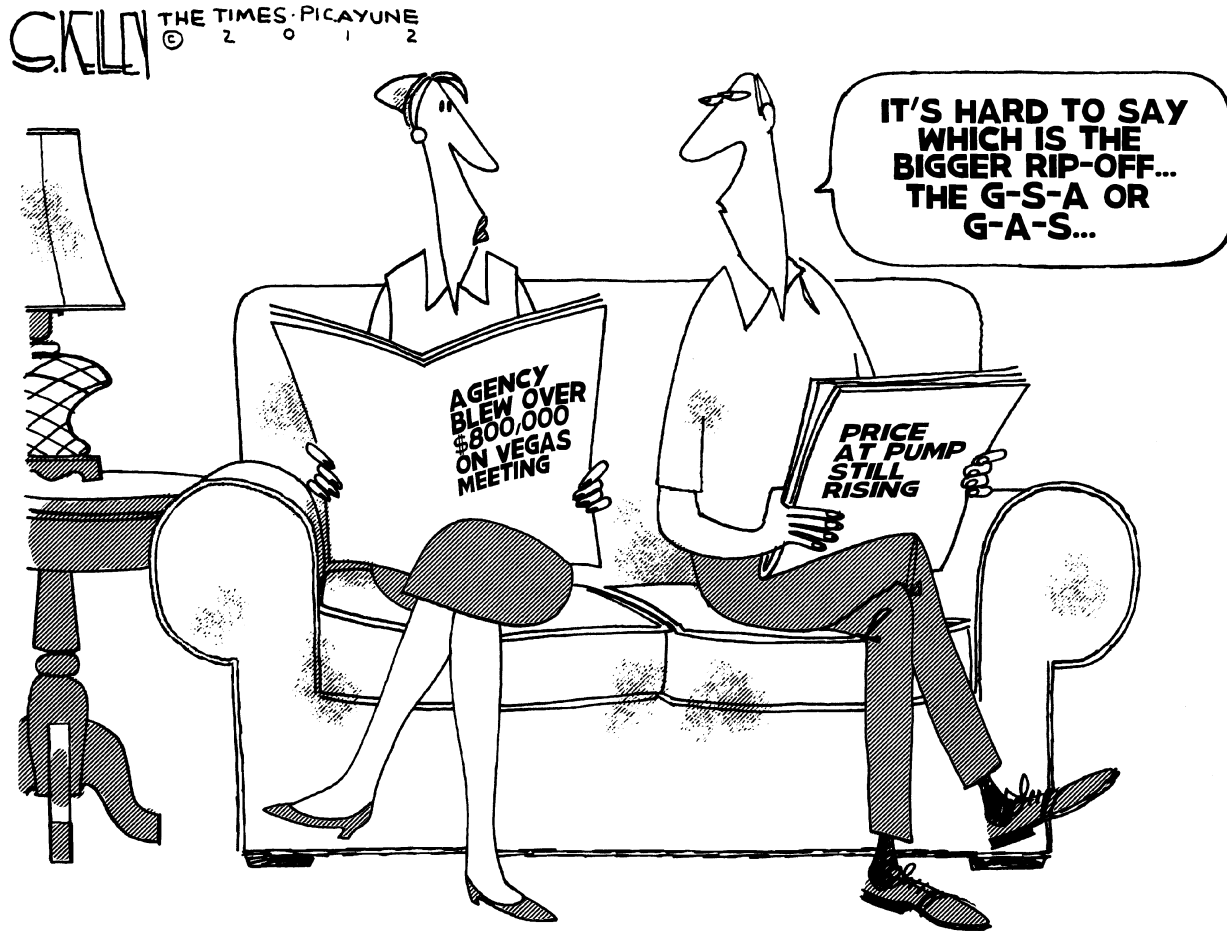
Romney responded to the news with praise and confirmation of Santorum's new stature: "Senator Santorum is an able and worthy competitor, and I congratulate him on the campaign he ran. He has proven himself to be an important voice in our party and in the nation."

Just before the surprise news, Romney's aides were characterizing Santorum as a mildly crazed zealot on the verge of ruining his reputation and permanently damaging his chance to run again.

The message wasn't subtle. Last week the Romney campaign cut and planned to air a very tough ad attacking Santorum. They were reportedly going to spend millions of dollars making sure everyone saw it. The Romney ad, "Historic," hit Santorum for losing his 2006 reelection campaign. "We fired him as senator. Why promote him to president?" asks the narrator.

Santorum's departure was unexpected but it doesn't change the race much. Mitt Romney had the nomination pretty much in hand. He had hundreds more delegates and a steady stream of party poobahs who had been on the sidelines and had bestirred themselves to rally behind Romney.

Santorum didn't mention his rival in his remarks ending his campaign, but that's not extraordinary. It was his day.

Safe Harbor Unaffiliated with Church

I am writing to hopefully clear up a situation that is causing some confusion. Safe Harbor Inc., known as Safe Harbor, which is currently located at 269 Filer Ave. in Twin Falls, is not affiliated with Safe Harbor Ministries, which is located in Jerome.

I have been asked if our nonprofit group has started a church in Jerome. We definitely have not. I had contacted the Safe Harbor Ministries pastor and expressed my concern that their using Safe Harbor in their name could be detrimental to both groups. Unfortunately, they have chosen to continue to do so.

Safe Harbor filed its Articles of Incorporation with the state of Idaho in December 2002. Prior to that, I had to contact the Secretary of State to make sure that no other nonprofit in Idaho already had that name, which they did not. The Articles of Incorporation must be filed prior to obtaining a 501(c)(3) ruling. Safe Harbor obtained that with an Advance Ruling in September of 2003, and it was updated to Public Charity Status in March 2007.

The mission of Safe Harbor continues to be to provide emergency assistance, including short-term shelter. Our nonprofit currently provides emergency assistance at local motels. We cover one or two nights or split a week with other nonprofits for people who are having a temporary crisis.

We are also looking for a suitable building where we can open a soup kitchen as well as other types of assistance, including support groups, self-help classes and workshops to improve skills and abilities. Our goal is to offer breakfast every day and all of the other meals that are not offered at the other soup kitchens.

New Opportunities Open in Myanmar

The following editorial appeared in the *Kansas City Star* on Wednesday, April 11:

The Obama administration has appropriately eased sanctions on Myanmar following its recent elections, the first free and fair contests in many years.

The Association of Southeast Asian Nations has urged the rapid lifting of all sanctions, but Washington should not proceed in haste. The military still holds the whip hand in the former Burma — along

with the vast majority of seats in Parliament, despite gains that gave the opposition most of the seats filled in the April 1 election.

One of the winners was opposition leader and Nobel laureate Aung San Suu Kyi. She is expected to meet today with Myanmar's reformist president, U Thein Sein, another sign of thawing relations between government and the opposition.

Washington has eased some restrictions on travel to the United States by Myanmar's senior leaders and lifted a few economic

sanctions. Washington will allow the opening of an American aid office and permit U.S. non-governmental organizations to perform development work.

Myanmar's isolation became profound in 1990 after the military government set aside an election and clamped down on most dissent. Concern about overdependence on China, the country's only major ally, no doubt played a role in the decision to permit a wider political debate.

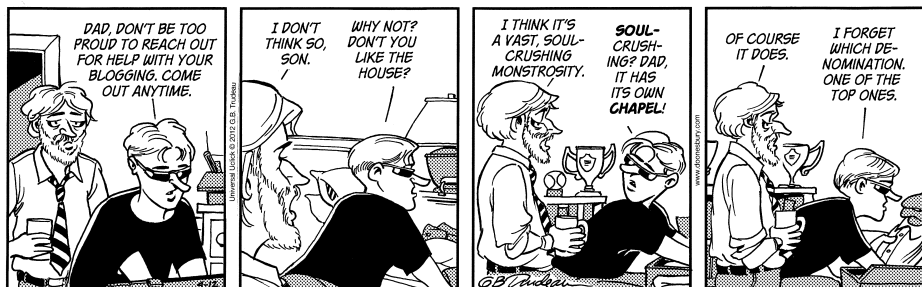

Bodybuilding Company CEO Admits Selling Steroids

BOISE (AP) • The founder of an online fitness and bodybuilding company in Idaho pleaded guilty Monday to illegally selling misbranded dietary supplements that contained steroids, according to federal prosecutors.

Ryan DeLuca, CEO of Meridian-based Bodybuilding.com, also agreed in a plea deal to pay a \$500,000 fine for the company's sale of five products between 2007 and 2009 that contained synthetic anabolic steroids or chemical clones of steroids.

DeLuca, 34, acknowledged the five products — I Force Methadrol, Nutra Costal D-Stianozol, I Force Dymethazine, Rage RV5 and Genetic Edge Technologies SUS500 — were drugs sold improperly under the label of "dietary supplements."

"DeLuca acknowledged at the plea hearing that as Bodybuilding.com's CEO, he was responsible for Bodybuilding.com's sales of misbranded products," prosecutors said in a statement.

The company generated \$1.8 million through the first seven and a half months of 2009 from the falsely labeled products and other similar substances, according to court records.

Each of the five misdemeanor violations of the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act carries up to a year in prison, but in the plea bargain, prosecutors are recommending probation.

Federal officials raided the company's headquarters in 2009 following a two-year investigation that involved a special agent for the FDA buying 23 products from the company that tested positive for anabolic steroids.

Many of the products were neither safe nor legal and by selling them, the company was "misleading, defrauding and endangering its customers," according to the agent.

The FDA cited reports that men between 22 and 55 who had used such products have suffered liver problems, stroke, kidney failure and blockage of an artery in the lung, called a pulmonary embolism.

A company spokesman said the organization had not been manufacturing the products in question.

DeLuca will be sentenced in U.S. District Court in Boise on June 20.

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Guardians of Disabled Men Drop Idaho Lawsuit

BOISE • Three guardians for developmentally disabled Idaho residents have dropped their lawsuit against the state over Medicaid changes.

Russell and Sandra Knapp and Jana Shultz last year sued Idaho Department of Health and Welfare Director Richard Armstrong and Medicaid Administrator Leslie Clement, saying the department's plan to consolidate some Medicaid-covered services would violate their wards' right to freely choose their own health care providers.

But the Knapps and Shultz decided to drop the lawsuit last week, because the consolidation was being implemented faster than the lawsuit could work its way through the court system.

"Ultimately, we got to the point where what we were talking about was bad policy — and the courts don't like to wade into policy is-

sues," said their attorney, James Piotrowski.

Some adults with developmental disabilities — like the Knapp's ward, Jason Knapp, and Shultz' ward, Toby Shultz — live in certified family homes under a Medicaid program that aims to provide a family-style living environment for people who need assistance with daily activities.

Under the program, each certified family home must work with a residential habilitation agency, which provides them with training, oversight and quality assurance. Essentially, the residential habilitation agencies serve as experts in the state's policies and administrative issues, freeing up the certified family home providers to be experts in their own clients.

But last year, under pressure from lawmakers to cut its budget, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare decided to have just one residential habilitation company oversee all the Medicaid-covered certi-

fied family homes in the state.

The switch, which took effect March 15 of this year, also cut the services available to the Medicaid clients. For instance, residents in certified family homes now will get face-to-face visits from residential habilitation employees only once yearly, as opposed to the quarterly or monthly visits they typically got under the old system.

U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill stopped the state from implementing the plan for a time, but declined to renew the injunction in February, allowing the state to move forward with the plan.

In making that decision, Winmill said the first injunction was appropriate because the state had failed to get approval from the federal Medicaid program before making the residential habilitation changes. Winmill said he wouldn't renew the injunction because Idaho officials had since corrected that error.

The consolidation plan threat-

ened to put several small residential habilitation providers out of business, Piotrowski said when he filed the lawsuit last year. Many of those small businesses were available around the clock to help their clients, he said, though they weren't necessarily reimbursed for those services.

On Tuesday, he said the department is now telling certified family homes to call 911 if their client has a crisis during the hours that the statewide provider is closed.

"The department has implemented its selective contract already, and we know the result of that is going to be a shift of a lot of work to already overworked service providers," Piotrowski said. "It's also shifting the problems that used to be solved by residential habilitation agencies to law enforcement agencies and emergency rooms, and you're going to see an increase in ER admissions and law enforcement calls."

Retiring Idaho Rep. Lands at Lobbying Firm

BOISE • Retiring Democratic Rep. Brian Cronin will lead the Boise office of a regional lobbying and communications firm, Strategies 360.

Cronin said Wednesday he will be a senior vice president with the company but has no plans to become a full-time lobbyist.

The Boise lawmaker told the Idaho Statesman he will apply his communication experience initially toward clients less focused on public policy.

Cronin says he still endorses the Democrat-pushed plan for a one-year cooling off period for departing lawmakers or high-ranking state officials before they can lobby the Legislature or executive branch.

He has operated the communications firm Cronin and Associates for a decade and is leaving the Idaho Legislature this year after serving two terms in office.

Strategies 360 has offices in 10 western states and Washington D.C.

Blue Cross Buying Benefit Admin Company

HELENA, Mont. • Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Montana along with Blue Cross of Idaho are buying an Idaho company that provides health products and employee-benefit administration services and merging it with a similar Montana company.

The insurance companies have acquired Peak 1 Administration of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho and merged it with Blue Cross subsidiary Insurance Coordinators of Montana, which is based in Helena.

The Independent Record reports the company will operate under the name of Peak 1 Administration. Insurance Coordinators serves customers in Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Washington and Oregon.

Officials declined to discuss the purchase price.

Robbery Suspect Returns for Drink, Arrested

NAMPA • Officials in southeastern Idaho say 44-year-old woman suspected

of trying to rob a convenience store was arrested after she returned a short time later and tried to buy something to drink.

Police say Stephanie Suzanne Allison went into a Nampa convenience store Friday afternoon, told the employees she had a gun and demanded cash. The clerk refused and she left.

Investigators say employees told the woman to leave when she returned a short time later to buy a drink. Clerks followed her on foot until officers could track her down.

Allison is charged with burglary and attempted robbery and was booked into the Canyon County jail. In Idaho, burglary can be charged if a person enters a building with the intent of committing a felony.

KKK Leader Denies Mailings to Lawmakers

BOISE • A Ku Klux Klan leader says membership applications recently mailed to several Idaho lawmakers didn't come from his group.

Idaho's lone black lawmaker, Democratic Rep. Cherie Buckner-Webb of Boise, was among legislators who said this week they received a mailing from the Knights of the KKK soliciting \$35 in membership dues, a photo and commitment statement.

Buckner-Webb said she believes she was specifically targeted and vowed to renew her fight against prejudice.

But KKK leader Thomas Robb denied involvement from the Knights, saying their materials are easily duplicated and sometimes people send them out because they think it's funny.

Florida Man Gets Prison for Idaho Kidnapping, Rape

BOISE • A Florida man who pleaded guilty to his role in the 2003 kidnapping and rape of an Idaho woman has been sentenced to 30 years in prison.

The Idaho Statesman reports 28-year-old Douglas James Steinemer of Deltona, Fla., was sentenced Tuesday by 4th District Judge Timothy Hansen, who called the offense "every person's nightmare."

Prosecutors alleged

Steinemer and his father, long-distance trucker Hans Holsopple, kidnapped a woman from the parking lot of the Walmart in Mountain Home, took turns repeatedly raping her and dropped her off near the Oregon border.

Steinemer was charged in 2010 after he was arrested in Florida and a DNA sample matched the Idaho case. He implicated his father, who was sentenced to life in prison in March 2011.

Steinemer can ask for parole after 13 years.

Idahoan Claims Mega Millions Cash Prize

BOISE • A trucker from southeastern Idaho has claimed a \$250,000 Mega Millions prize, but he hasn't quit his day job just yet.

Joseph Graham's winning ticket matched the first five numbers of the March 23 national lottery drawing — all

but the Mega Ball. But Graham says he waited so long to cash in his winning ticket because he needed a day off of work.

The American Falls resident got a break from his job last Thursday and made the trek to the Idaho Lottery headquarters in Boise.

The hometown gas station that sold Graham the ticket will receive a \$20,000 bonus from the Idaho Lottery.

Would-be Tamarack Resort Buyer Indicted on Wire Fraud Charges

BOISE • A pension fund trustee and investment adviser from Idaho who made a \$40 million bid to buy a failed ski resort was arrested Wednesday on charges of raiding pension funds he was hired to oversee.

Matthew Hutcheson, 41, of Eagle, was arrested by FBI agents at his home on the same day a federal court unsealed a 31-count indictment accusing him of 17 counts of wire fraud and 14 counts of misappropriating pension funds.

Hutcheson, who served as a trustee and fiduciary for national employer pension funds, is accused of scheming to misappropriate more than \$5 million in assets from two funds starting in 2010.

The indictment claims he used the money in his unsuccessful effort to buy the Tamarack resort and for personal gain, including paying for renovations to his 4,900-square-foot home and buying luxury cars and motorcycles.

"We take allegations of pension fraud very seriously," said U.S. Attorney Wendy Olson.

Hutcheson's attorney Dennis Charney said he was still reviewing the indictment but challenged allegations that his client misused pension funds to pursue the resort in a deal that eventually fell through.

The indictment accuses Hutcheson of using \$3.2 million from the Retirement Security Plan & Trust pension fund to buy a bank note and interest in the golf course at Tamarack.

"As a fund manager, he has full discretion to make investments," Charney told The Associated Press. "Sometimes those investments turn out positive and sometimes negative. There is no fund manager out there who hasn't made an investment that didn't go south."

In November 2010, Hutcheson emerged from nowhere to announce he was offering to pay \$40 million to buy the troubled resort outside Donnelly, located in the central Idaho mountains 90 miles north of Boise.

He formed a company called Green Valley Holdings LLC to negotiate the acquisition and assembled a team to attract investors and develop a strategy to resurrect the resort that took a beating during the economic recession and decline in real estate values.

Tamarack's original investors defaulted in 2008 on a \$250 million loan from a lending group led by Credit Suisse, creating a scenario in which Hutcheson or other investors could try to buy the resort and its assets at a bar-

gain. Tamarack is currently going through foreclosure litigation in an Idaho state court.

At the time he was trying to buy the resort, Hutcheson relished the role of rescuer — not just for the resort but also for the region where it was located.

"I'm on a humanitarian mission for the people of Valley County," Hutcheson told the AP in an interview last year.

Ultimately, Hutcheson's plans crumbled, in part because he failed to attract investors. Then in August, two actuaries from Washington state complained to the U.S. Department of Labor about Hutcheson's handling of \$1.9 million in G Fiduciary, a retirement plan where Hutcheson had served as a trustee.

According to the indictment, Hutcheson used \$2.1 million in G Fiduciary assets for his personal use. Investigators contend Hutcheson, in 12 separate wire transfers, had the money deposited into bank accounts.

The indictment claims he then paid a contractor \$892,000 to remodel his home inside and out, including a 4,100-square-foot barn, swimming pool, hot tub, secondary garage, dog house and landscaping. Hutcheson is also accused of using \$366,000 to repay two personal loans, spending another \$93,000 on three vehicles and \$15,000 to buy a pair of motorcycles and two all-terrain vehicles.

Authorities say he engaged in a similar scheme to transfer more than \$3.2 million from the Retirement Security Plan & Trust, a Texas-based program serving 500 members with more than \$19 million in total assets.

Investigators claim Hutcheson withdrew money from the fund in December 2010 and deposited it into an escrow account set up for Green Valley Holdings. Investigators say Hutcheson then used the money to buy the bank note for the Osprey Meadows Golf Course and Lodge but later lied to auditors who questioned him about the money.

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Judge to Decide Owner of James Castle Artwork Found in Home

BOISE (AP) • A judge this week will decide who owns three bundles of artwork by James Castle found tucked away in the famed artist's home and potentially worth thousands of dollars.

Artwork by Castle, who lived in a northwest Boise home until he died in 1977, is collected worldwide. Individual pieces have sold for as much as \$50,000.

Jeannie Schmidt purchased Castle's home in 1996. Four years later, she found 150 pieces of art and three books Castle worked on as early as the 1930s hidden in his bedroom ceiling, according to The Idaho Statesman.

Schmidt said the trove belongs to her now, and that Castle's niece, who died in 2007, had told her as much when she bought the home. The only true owner was Castle or possibly his sister, Schmidt argued, and both are dead.

But Castle's family, who created a partnership in 1996 to manage and sell his artwork, argue they are the rightful owners through "gift, inheritance and conveyance."

Castle was born deaf and

mute. The self-taught artist's drawings were made with a sharpened stick dipped in soot and saliva. Some are in collections at the Philadelphia Museum of Art and the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

James Huegli, Schmidt's lawyer, told Ada County Judge Deborah Bail during opening arguments Tuesday that Schmidt purchased the home partially because it was owned by Castle, and that the family partnership never claimed ownership to other items she found.

He claimed the family threw a party with pizza and beer just before the "rotten old house" sold because they were happy to have it off their hands, giving away pieces of Castle's art to guests.

Dave Lombardi, attorney for the James Castle Collection limited partnership, said the other items Schmidt found were not art but odds and ends used by Castle to create art that the family didn't care about.

The trial was expected to take three days. The ruling may hinge on a 2001 Idaho

case suggesting that the finder of any lost or abandoned property can keep it unless it's against the wishes of the "true owner."

"This case is about who gets to keep and sell mislaid Castle family property that was found by somebody other than the true owner," Lombardi said.

Lombardi said Castle told

his sister, Peggy Wade, just days before he died that all of his work was hers, and the true owners now are the family members in the partnership through inheritance.

With both Castle and Wade dead, any true ownership has since expired and no one can speculate what Castle might have wanted, Huegli argued.

"In this case, the true owner is James Castle. But he is dead," Huegli said. "What was James Castle thinking (in the 1930s)? He very well might not have wanted anyone to have that art."

Governor Lets Final 3 Bills Become Law, Sans Signature

BOISE • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter allowed the final three bills on his desk to become law without his signature.

Among the measures: A bill that restores funding protections for schools with enrollment declines, but shifts the cost of the program to the districts.

Idaho previously allowed shrinking districts to keep 99 percent of the funding that came with a

departed student, for one year. Those protections were eliminated in reforms proposed by schools chief Tom Luna in 2011.

Luna said Idaho shouldn't give schools money for "ghost students" a year after they'd left. Otter listed that same reason Tuesday when explaining why he didn't sign the 2012 bill that restores the program, at districts' expense.

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Activist: No Violence at Syria Truce Deadline

BEIRUT • A deadline for a U.N.-brokered cease-fire passed without reports of major violence at dawn Thursday, opposition activists said, just hours after Syria promised to observe a halt in fighting.

Under a peace plan by international envoy Kofi Annan, a truce was set for 6 a.m. Thursday, to be followed by negotiations between President Bashar Assad's regime and the Syrian opposition on a political transition.

But there were only dim hopes for an abrupt end to the bloodshed that has roiled Syria for 13 months and claimed more than 9,000 lives.

Syria has backtracked on previous peace plans, has characterized the uprising it's facing as a terrorist plot and has escalated shelling attacks on rebellious areas in recent weeks.

The regime also carved out an important truce condition when it announced Wednesday it would halt the fighting — saying it still has a right to defend itself against the terrorists that it says are behind the country's uprising.

Opposition activists said the Thursday morning deadline passed without reports of major violence.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory of Human Rights, an activist group, said some shots were fired in the Damascus neighborhood of Qadam after midnight Wednesday and that an explosion went off in a car in a Damascus

suburb, causing no injuries.

Fares Mohammed, an activist in the Damascus suburb of Zabadani, said an army tank at a checkpoint fired three shells at a nearby open area between 5:50 a.m. and 6:10 a.m. Thursday.

The rebel Free Syrian Army, a fighting force determined to bring down Assad, has said it will abide by the cease-fire.

Fact Check Finds Romney Skews Case on Women's Jobs

WASHINGTON • Mitt Romney has come up with an "amazing statistic" and Republicans inside and outside his presidential campaign are doing their utmost to spread it around: "92.3 percent of all the jobs lost during the Obama years have been lost by women."

Amazing it may be. As a meaningful measure of Obama's economic record and its effect on women, though, it is dubious at best.

Romney's math is solid as far as it goes. But more men than women have lost jobs since the recession began — that's why economists called it a "man-cession."

In blaming Obama for "turning the clock back 20 years on American women?" as the Romney campaign puts it, Republicans are hoping to counter Obama's perceived advantage with female voters. But they ignore how recessions generally — and the last one in particular — unfold, and they hold Obama accountable for the state of the economy from the time he took office, before his policies could make any difference.

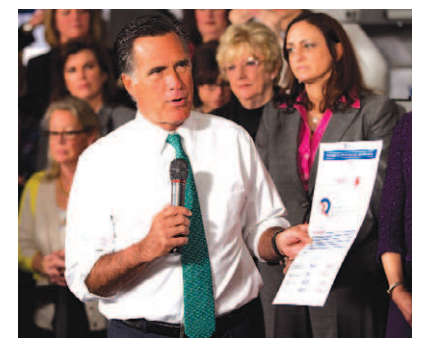
"This is political gaming," said Diane Swonk, chief economist at Mesirow Financial, a financial services company. "You can play a lot of games with statistics — both sides are doing it."

A look at the claim and how it compares with the facts:

ROMNEY: "This is an amazing statistic. The percentage of jobs lost by women in the president's three years, three and a half years — 92.3 percent of all the jobs lost during the Obama years have been lost by women." — Hartford, Conn., on Wednesday.

LANHEE CHEN, Romney campaign policy director, on the Obama administration Wednesday: "They've done a tremendous amount of damage to American women in this economy."

THE FACTS: The deep recession that began 13 months before Republican George W. Bush left the White House hit men harder than women at the beginning. Recessions often do that because male-dominated enterprises such as construction and manufacturing tend to be the first to tumble in a downturn. Eventually, sectors with

more women in the work force follow suit, and that happened mostly after Obama took office.

In the recession that began in December 2007 and ended in June 2009 — with high unemployment lingering to this day — the crisis in the financial sector and bursting of the housing bubble accentuated the damage to jobs held primarily by men. "The initial losses were even more male-dominated than normal because of the nature of the recession," Swonk said.

Women were more heavily represented in jobs that suffered in the recession's later months and beyond, as revenue-strapped state and local governments laid off teachers and cut other public-sector workers.

Romney's claim is based on statistics showing the number of unemployed women grew by 858,000 since January 2009, Obama's inauguration month. But it ignores the disproportionate hit on men the year before Obama became president — and their greater job losses overall.

Some 3.4 million men and 1.8 million women have lost jobs since the recession started, according to the government.

When Obama took office, unemployment for men (8.6 percent) was already sharply higher than for women (7 percent). The rate peaked for men at 11.2 percent in October 2009 and for women at 9 percent a month later.

Since then, the gap has nearly closed. Last month, the rate was 8.3 percent for men and 8.1 percent for women.

Obama Campaign Ready to 'Ramp Up' on Romney

Both sides will pound voters with ferocious arguments over who has the best vision for jobs, economic security and giving Americans a shot at a better life.

WASHINGTON • For all the turmoil of the long primary season, President Barack Obama is right where he expected to be: taking on Mitt Romney and targeting him as a wishy-washy protector of the rich. With the November outcome likely to hinge on the economy, Obama will now engage more directly with the help of an experienced, well-financed campaign organization.

The campaign for the White House took on a decidedly different feel on Wednesday, a true two-man race for the first time. Yet even as Republican Rick Santorum's withdrawal a day earlier changed the dynamic, beginning the general election in earnest, the contours of the Romney-Obama race had al-

ready been becoming clear.

Both sides will keep pounding voters with ferocious arguments over who has the best vision for jobs, economic security and giving Americans a shot at a better life. In sharp and steady doses, directly or through aides, Obama and Romney will also accuse the other of being dishonest with voters and out-of-touch with their daily woes.

Everything gets faster and louder now.

Obama will pick his spots in targeting Romney directly until the election draws closer, needing to juggle the demands of his job and eager to remind everyone that he is the one who is already the president. Obama's Chicago-based campaign, meanwhile, will be working vigorously to challenge Romney and try to define

him.

In a sign of the bitter fight ahead, Obama campaign manager Jim Messina went after Romney the day the race was joined: "The more the American people see of Mitt Romney, the less they like him and the less they trust him." The Obama campaign followed that on Wednesday with a video of some of Romney's most divisive or awkward moments during the Republican primaries, titled: "Mitt Romney: Memories to last a lifetime."

The events that shape the race may well be surprises to the candidates as well as everyone else, like the economic collapse of late 2008. If the campaigns have their way, however, the narratives are set: Romney assailing Obama as an economic failure who had his shot, and Obama depicting Romney as one who would gut middle-class America.

Essentially, Obama has already been running against

AXL ROSE REJECTS ROCK HALL HONOR

NEW YORK • The acrimony that helped dissolve Guns N' Roses nearly 20 years ago still lingers. Axl Rose announced Wednesday that he won't be showing up to see the band inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and declined the honor for himself. In a letter to the hall, band fans and "To Whom It May Concern," Rose listed several reasons for not attending Saturday's ceremony in Cleveland, including a feeling that the hall does not respect him. In declining his own induction, he added: "I strongly request that I not be inducted in absentia and please know that no one is authorized nor may anyone be permitted to accept any induction for me or speak on my behalf."

Prison Panel Denies Manson's Bid for Parole

CORCORAN, Calif. • A prison panel denied parole Wednesday to mass murderer Charles Manson in his 12th and probably final bid for freedom.

Manson, now a gray-bearded 77-year-old, did not attend the hearing where the parole board ruled he had shown no efforts to rehabilitate himself and would not be eligible for parole for another 15 years.

"This panel can find nothing good as far as suitability factors go," said John Peck, a member of the panel that met at Corcoran State Prison in Central California.

Also playing heavily into the board's decision was something Manson had said recently to one of his prison psychologists that Peck read aloud.

"I'm special. I'm not like the average inmate," Peck said. "I have spent my life in prison. I have put five people in the grave. I am a very dangerous man!"

Peck then spoke for the record directly to Manson, who will receive a transcription of the proceedings: "This panel agrees with that statement?"

The panel deliberated for 20 minutes

before making its decision.

POLICE SAY NO CRIME IN HOUSTON'S DEATH

Police have closed their investigation into Whitney Houston's death without finding any evidence of anything other than an accidental drowning, investigators said Wednesday. The Beverly Hills Police Department did not release a detailed report on the case, but Lt. Mark Rosen said the conclusion came after detectives reviewed the complete findings of the coroner's office. Coroner's officials ruled Houston drowned accidentally at the Beverly Hilton on Feb. 11 and that heart disease and cocaine use contributed to her death. — Associated Press

Connecticut OKs Repeal of Death Penalty

HARTFORD, Conn. • The Connecticut legislature has voted to repeal the state's death penalty, and the Democratic governor is expected to sign it into law. That would make the state the 17th to end capital punishment. The House of Representatives voted in favor of the bill 86-62 late Wednesday night.

The bill would abolish the death penalty and replace it with a maximum sentence of life in prison without the possibility of release. It would not affect the sentences of the 11 inmates already on Connecticut's death row.

The proposal cleared its biggest hurdle last week when it won approval in the state Senate.

Connecticut has executed only one inmate in 51 years.

The death penalty has been on the books in Connecticut for more than 150 years.

Romney, who fell short in his 2008 effort to win the GOP nomination.

Every time Obama talks about millionaires paying a fairer share in taxes to help all of America, as he did again Wednesday, it is meant as a contrast to Romney and his vision. Vice President Joe Biden has been out giving a battery of campaign speeches that take on Romney, including another one on Thursday in New Hampshire.

And long before Santorum bowed out this week, Obama had been trying to define the election as a clear, basic choice. His pitch is that Romney will revert to a harmful trickle-down, let-people-flail philosophy instead of spending tax dollars on core priorities and using the government as an enforcer of fairness for all.

Romney sees Obama as a "throwback to the old-style Democrats of the past, big government, welfare state Democrats" who want America to become Europe.

The race is on. It's been on.

"I think people think about this as some kind of switch going off, but it really is more like a ramping up," Obama campaign strategist David Axelrod said as Romney's status as nominee was assured. "There's no big line of demarcation, because the arguments have been developing over a long time."

At the White House, spokesman Jay Carney said Obama will methodically get more into campaign mode. But he said the president is still in a period where he will talk more about the agenda in front of him, both in Congress and on the world stage, than about "his general election opponent."

Yet life gets blurry when a president runs for a second term. Political fundraisers in battleground states and near the White House have become staples of Obama's calendar. Even his official events, like a speech he gave on tax fairness at Florida Atlantic University on Tuesday, take on the unmistakable rah-rah feel of a campaign.

Romney, transitioning to his new role as all-but-sure nominee, showed a bit more swagger with Santorum out

of the race.

"The president's campaign slogan was 'hope and change,'" he said to cheers and laughter in Hartford, Conn. "I think that's changing now to 'let's hope for change.'"

The former Massachusetts governor stuck with his preferred message and itinerary, including Tuesday and Wednesday events in Delaware, Connecticut and Rhode Island, even though those heavily Democratic states will not be in play this fall. He also kept with his recent strategy of emphasizing his concern for women who own businesses, a clear sign that Democratic claims of GOP insensitivity to women have raised alarms.

Obama holds a double-digit polling advantage among women, who have made up a majority of the electorate in each presidential year since 1984. Overall, polling on the race has Obama on the upswing in a matchup with Romney, suggesting the president begins the contest with a slight edge.

GOP Lawmaker Says 75-plus Democrats Are Communists

WASHINGTON (AP) • Republican Rep. Allen West said he believes 75-plus House Democrats are members of the Communist Party, a claim that echoed Joe McCarthy's unsubstantiated 1950s charges that communists had infiltrated the top ranks of the U.S. government.

Addressing a town-hall meeting Tuesday in Florida, the freshman lawmaker was asked how many members of the American legislature are "card-carrying Marxists." West said "there's about 78 to 81 members of the Democratic Party that are members of the Communist Party." He did not provide names.

West's office said Wednesday that the congressman stood by the comments and was referring to the 76 members of

the Congressional Progressive Caucus, the largest group within the House Democratic caucus.

"The Communist Party has publicly referred to the Progressive Caucus as its allies," said Angela Melvin, a spokeswoman for West.

female acolytes was an international spectacle.

Manson and his followers were convicted in the 1969 slaying of actress Sharon Tate and four others.

Referring to the bizarre scene that included bloody scrawling on walls and use of the words "Helter Skelter," the prosecutor claimed the phrase reflected Manson's twisted idea that he could cause a race war with the killings.

No clear motive was ever established.

"I'm done with him," Debra Tate, the sister of the actress, said after the hearing.

"Two down, six to go," she added, referring to the death in prison of Manson follower Susan Atkins and the remaining six people being held in prison for murders and other crimes committed under Manson's watch.

Later, she cried when she described the relief she felt that she will never have to worry again about Manson going free.

"I didn't expect this feeling of joy today," she said through tears.

For four decades, Debra Tate has traveled to whatever rural California prison has held the notorious cult leader and his band of murderous followers for hearings she said are too numerous to count.

"I've tried to take this thing that I do, that has become my lot in life, and make it have purpose," said Tate, 59. She was 17 in August 1969, when Manson sent his minions across LA on two nights of terror.

"I've been doing it for Sharon and the other victims of him for the last 40 years," she said.

Under current law, inmates can be denied the chance to reapply for parole for up to 15 years. The panel's latest ruling would make Manson 92 before he could get another opportunity to make his case.

Authorities read a litany of Manson's prison infractions, including the latest — the manufacture and possession of a weapon, for which he is serving 15 months in an isolation unit. He has not completed his GED or taken any self-improvement classes in prison.

"It's obvious from everything in the record that Mr. Manson remains a danger to the public," said Deputy District Attorney Patrick Sequeira who argued against parole.

Even Manson's state-appointed attorney, DeJon Lewis, found it difficult to argue for a client who had refused to meet with him. He said at the hearing that Manson should be in a hospital, but acknowledged the terror his client caused.

"The murders showed us that anyone could be killed at any time, and no one was safe, not even at home," Lewis said.

Manson has not appeared at a parole hearing since 1997. His most recent hearing was in 2007.

Manson, however, is anything but a recluse. He has a steady stream of visitors who submit requests to see him, including college students writing papers about him, said Theresa Cisneros, spokeswoman for Corcoran State Prison.

Manson must approve all requests.

"He has a large interested public," Cisneros said, adding that Manson receives more mail than most prisoners.

Manson was depicted at the hearing as the evil master of murder, commanding a small army of young followers. He and the three women were sentenced to death. But their lives were spared when the California Supreme Court briefly outlawed the death penalty in 1972.

Atkins died of a brain tumor in prison. Two others, Leslie Van Houten and Patricia Krenwinkel, remain incarcerated.

Manson also was convicted of two unrelated murders.

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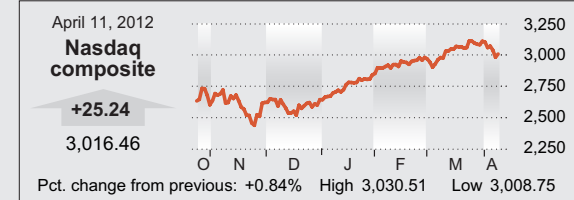
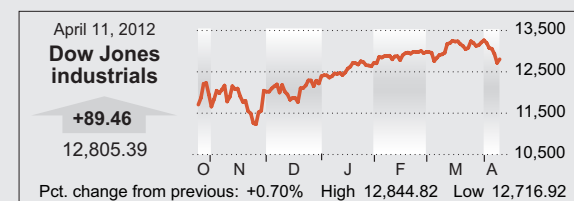

Stocks Make a U-turn, Rising after Big Decline

NEW YORK (AP) • Investors on Wednesday all but forgot the previous day's burdens and sent stocks soaring. It was a stark turnaround from the day before, when they'd pushed the market into a free-fall on worries about European debt and corporate earnings in the U.S. The Dow Jones industrial average climbed as much as 129 points in early trading before settling at 12,805.39, up 89.46 points. The Standard & Poor's 500 rose 10.12 points to 1,368.71. The Nasdaq composite climbed 25.24 points to 3,016.46.

Feds Expand Jeep Wrangler SUVs Fire Investigation

DETROIT (AP) • U.S. safety regulators have expanded an investigation into 23 complaints of fires in Jeep Wrangler SUVs.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration hasn't figured out what caused the fires, but it's asking carmaker Chrysler for information on Wranglers from the 2007 through 2012 model years. When it began March 28, the probe centered on vehicles from the 2010 model year.

The classic Wrangler is among Chrysler's more popular models, appealing to people who like its rugged looks and want to go off-road. Chrysler sold more than 532,000 Wranglers from 2007 through March. It's unknown how many are affected by the investigation.

U.S. Sues Apple, Publishers Over Electronic Book Prices

The Justice Department and several states have sued Apple Inc. and major book publishers, alleging a conspiracy to raise the price of electronic books that Attorney General Eric Holder says cost consumers millions of dollars.

WASHINGTON • The Justice Department and 15 states sued Apple Inc. and major book publishers Wednesday, alleging a conspiracy to raise the price of electronic books they said cost consumers more than \$100 million in the past two years by adding \$2 to \$5 to the price of each e-book.

Attorney General Eric Holder said executives at the highest levels of the companies conspired to eliminate competition among e-book sellers. Justice's antitrust chief Sharis Pozen said the executives were desperate to get Amazon.com, marketer of the Kindle e-book reader, to raise the \$9.99 price point it had set for the most popular titles, which was substantially below their hardcover prices.

The federal government reached a settlement with three of the publishers, Hachette, HarperCollins and Simon & Schuster. But it will proceed with its lawsuit in federal court in New York City against Apple and Holtzbrinck Publishers, doing business as Macmillan, and The Penguin Publishing Co. Ltd., doing business as Penguin Group.

Connecticut and Texas, two of the 15 states filing a separate complaint, reached agreements with Hachette and HarperCollins to provide \$52 million in restitution to consumers, using a formula based on the number of states participating and the number of e-books sold in each state. Other states in the case may sign onto the agreement.

Holder told a Justice Department news conference on Wednesday that "we believe that consumers paid millions of dollars more for some of the most popular titles" as a result of the alleged conspiracy. Pozen said the scheme added and average of \$2 to \$3

to the prices of individual books.

Connecticut Attorney General George Jepsen said the individual book markups went as high as \$5 and the total cost to consumers was more than \$100 million since April 2010, when the scheme allegedly took effect.

According to Pozen, Apple's Steve Jobs told publishers involved in the alleged conspiracy that "the customer pays a little more, but that's what you want anyway."

The lawsuit said the effort to get e-book prices reduced by Amazon.com came as Apple was preparing to launch the iPad. The government said the conspirators agreed that instead of selling books to retailers and letting them decide what retail price to charge, the publishers would convert the retailers into "agents" who could sell their books but not alter the publisher-set retail price. The scheme called for Apple to be guaranteed a 30 percent commission on each e-book it sold, the lawsuit said.

Natural gas prices dip below \$2 • The price of natural gas has dropped below \$2 for the first time in more than a decade. A mild winter and production boom have left the U.S. with more natural gas than Americans can consume. Storage facilities are quickly filling up. The glut has pushed down the futures price of gas 59 percent since it peaked at \$4.85 last summer. On Wednesday, the futures price passed a milestone. Gas dipped below \$2 to end the day at \$1.984 per 1,000 cubic feet. The last time it went below \$2 was Jan. 28, 2002, when it hit \$1.91. Cheaper gas has already lowered heating bills this winter, and air conditioning costs are expected to fall this summer because many utilities generate electricity with natural gas.

piracy, the publisher defendants teamed up with defendant Apple, which shared the same goal of restraining retail price competition in the sale of e-books," the lawsuit said.

Apple did not immediately respond to a comment request.

Macmillan Chief Executive Officer John Sargent said in a letter to authors, illustrators and agents that the company has not settled because it is "hard to settle a lawsuit when you know you have done no wrong."

He said: "Macmillan did not act illegally. Macmillan did not collude."

Sargent said the filing of the lawsuit came after discussions with the Department of Justice that lasted months.

"But the terms the DOJ demanded were too onerous. After careful consideration, we came to the conclusion that the terms could have allowed Amazon to recover the monopoly position it had been building before our switch to the agency model," he said. "We also felt the settlement the DOJ wanted to impose would have a very

negative and long term impact on those who sell books for a living, from the largest chain stores to the smallest independents."

At the heart of the e-book pricing debate is the industry's ongoing concerns about Amazon. Publishers see the "agency model" as their best, short-term hope against preventing the online retailer from dominating the e-book market and driving down the price of books to a level unsustainable for publishers and booksellers.

Since launching the Kindle in 2007, Amazon has made a point of offering best-sellers for \$9.99. The discount is so deep from list prices of \$20 and more that it's widely believed Amazon is selling the e-books at a loss as a way of attracting more customers and forcing competitors to lower their prices. Amazon also has been demanding higher discounts from publishers and stopped offering e-books from the Independent Publishers Group, a Chicago-based distributor, after they couldn't agree to terms.

Arkansas Judge Fines J&J \$1.1B in Risperdal Case

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. • An Arkansas judge on Wednesday fined Johnson & Johnson and a subsidiary more than \$1.1 billion after a jury found that the companies downplayed and hid risks associated with taking the antipsychotic drug Risperdal.

Circuit Judge Tim Fox determined that Johnson & Johnson and its subsidiary, Janssen Pharmaceuticals Inc., committed nearly 240,000 violations of the state's Medicaid fraud law — or one for each Risperdal prescription issued to state Medicaid patients over a 3 1/2-year period. Each violation carried a \$5,000 fine, the state's mandatory minimum amount, bringing the total to more than \$1.1 billion.

Fox issued an additional \$11 million fine for more than 4,500 violations under the state's deceptive practices act, but he rejected the state's request to levy fines in excess of the \$5,000 minimum for the Medicaid violations.

Attorney General Dustin McDaniel said in an emailed statement that the ruling "sends a clear signal that big drug companies like Johnson & Johnson and

Janssen Pharmaceuticals cannot lie to the (U.S. Food and Drug Administration), patients and doctors in order to defraud Arkansas taxpayers of our Medicaid dollars."

Janssen issued a statement in which it said, "We are disappointed with the judge's decision on penalties. If our motion for a new trial is denied, we will appeal."

The Arkansas Supreme Court would hear the appeal.

Janssen attorney Ed Posner argued during Wednesday's penalty hearing that there was no evidence that harm had been done to people who were prescribed Risperdal or to the state's Medicaid program, and that the state's mandatory penalties were therefore inappropriate. At the beginning of the hearing, the companies unsuccessfully lobbied the judge to declare the penalty portions of the Medicaid fraud and deceptive practices laws ruled unconstitutional.

Arkansas was one of several states to sue over Risperdal. A South Carolina judge upheld a \$327 million civil penalty against the J&J and Janssen in December. Meanwhile, Texas reached a \$158 million settlement with the companies in Janu-

ary in which the company didn't admit fault.

Hours after the ruling, shares of New Brunswick, N.J.-based Johnson & Johnson were down 24 cents, to \$64.00.

Jurors in Arkansas were not told about the financial stakes during 10 days of testimony, beyond that Janssen could have seen a \$200 million swing in its revenues if it issued alarming warnings that the drug could cause weight gain, diabetes and other health effects. If upheld, the award would go toward the state's Medicaid fund, which is facing a projected \$400 million deficit next year.

Risperdal, introduced in 1994, is a "second-generation" antipsychotic drug that earned Johnson & Johnson billions of dollars in sales before generic versions became available several years ago. It is used to treat schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and irritability in autism patients. Risperdal and similar antipsychotic drugs have been linked to increased risk of strokes and death in elderly dementia patients, seizures, weight gain and diabetes.

The 12-person jury deliberated for three hours Tuesday before deciding in favor of the state.

Panic But No Tsunami from Strong Indonesia Quakes

BANDA ACEH, Indonesia • Cries of panic and fervent prayers rang out Wednesday as Indonesians rushed to ward high ground after two strong earthquakes raised fears of a killer tsunami.

Alerts were raised as far away as Africa and Australia but this time the big waves didn't come.

In western Indonesia, distraught women ran into the streets clinging to crying children as back-to-back tsunami warnings revived memories of the 2004 disaster that claimed 230,000 lives in nearly a dozen countries. Others screamed "God is great" as they poured from their homes or searched frantically for family members.

"God! What have we done to deserve this?" one mother screamed as residents around her piled into cars and onto the backs of motorcycles. "What sins have we committed?"

Two deadly tsunamis in the last decade — the most recent off Japan just one year ago — have left the world much better prepared.

Sirens sounded along coastlines and warnings spread like wildfire by mobile

phone text messaging. Though often chaotic, evacuations began immediately, with streets clogged with traffic, especially in Aceh province, where 170,000 people were killed in 2004.

Patients were wheeled out of hospitals, some still lying in their beds with drips attached to their arms. And at least one hotel guest was slightly injured when he jumped out of his window.

Countries all along the Indian Ocean — from Australia and India to as far off as Africa — received alerts from the Pacific Tsunami Warning Center in Hawaii saying they should prepare for the possibility of seismically charged waves.

Hours later, the tsunami warnings were lifted, and damage from the tremors was minimal — something experts attributed to the unique nature of the fault line.



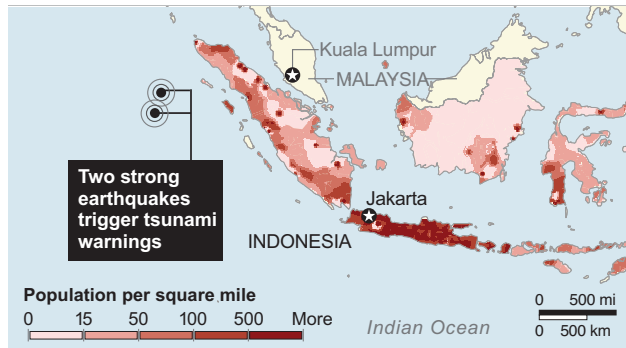

The only wave to hit was less than 30 inches high, rolling to Indonesia's emptied coastline.

The U.S. Geological Survey said the first 8.6-magnitude quake was a shallow 14 miles, striking in the sea 270

miles off Aceh's coast — making it the sixth-largest temblor in the last half-century.

Just as the region was sighing relief, an 8.2-magnitude aftershock followed, again causing only slight damage.



Experts said that's because both tremors were what are known as "strike slip" quakes, where friction and shaking along the fault line occurs horizontally, creating more of a vibration in the water.

In contrast, mega-thrust quakes — like the one that hit off Aceh in 2004 and off Japan just over a year ago — cause the seabed to rise or drop vertically, displacing massive amounts of water and sending towering waves racing across the ocean at jetliner speeds.

Roger Musson, a seismologist at the British geological survey, said initially he'd been "fearing the worst."

"But as soon as I discovered what type of earthquake it was ... I felt a lot better."

The tremors were felt in neighboring Malaysia, where high-rise buildings shook,

and Thailand, India, Singapore and Bangladesh.

Buildings and beaches emptied out, also in Sri Lanka and the Maldives.

But it was Aceh where the real chaos broke loose.

"I'm so scared, I don't want to lose my family again," cried Aisyah Husaini, whose parents and a son were killed in the 2004 tsunami. She clung to her two children in a mosque in the provincial capital, Banda Aceh, where hundreds of people sheltered.

Sitting nearby was 52-year-old Nasir Djamil, who said he and his family weren't taking any chances — they planned to spend the night.

"For sure, this has reawakened all those horrible nightmares," he said. "But I do feel like we learned something, that we know much better now what to do."

N. Korea Readies Rocket for Liftoff

PYONGYANG, North Korea • North Korea fueled up a rocket Wednesday in preparation for what appeared to be an imminent liftoff while the country's young leader strengthened his power with a new title making him the nation's top political official.

Kim Jong Un was named first secretary of the ruling Workers' Party, a new post, while his late father, long-time leader Kim Jong Il, was given the posthumous title of "eternal general secretary" at a special Workers' Party conference, the state-run Korean Central News Agency reported.

Kim Jong Un's formal ascension, nearly four months after the death of his father, comes during a week of events leading up to celebrations Sunday marking the 100th anniversary of the birth of his grandfather, late President Kim Il Sung.

The centennial is a major milestone in the nation Kim Il Sung founded in 1948, and the streets were awash with new posters, banners and the national flag. Outside the city's war museum and the Pyongyang Indoor Stadium,

women in traditional Korean dress gathered in clusters, practicing for this week's events.

North Korea has thrown open its doors to dozens of

journalists from around the world to report on the events this week designed not only to honor Kim Il Sung but also to demonstrate unity as Kim Jong Un takes power.

'WALKING IN NATURE'

Twin Falls' new public trails at Auger Falls are right in town, but they're still overlooked by many.

TWIN FALLS • Springwater flows into the churning Snake River from Auger Falls' high banks. Wide trails offer solitude in a stunning canyon environment, and a growing network of wetlands attracts waterfowl.

But not many walkers venture into this piece of urban wilderness.

Long inaccessible to the public, Auger Falls and the Snake River Canyon land on its southern bank are now in Twin Falls city ownership and open for recreation. But walkers, runners and cyclists are only slowly coming to know this noisy and beautiful stretch of whitewater right under their noses.

"Even though I've lived here 50-plus years, I didn't know it was there," said Debbie Johnstone of Twin Falls, a walker who started frequenting the Auger Falls trail when it opened for public use in early 2010.

In years past, Gail McHenry watched Auger Falls from the north side of the canyon and longed to walk the south-side trail. Now that she may, the Twin Falls woman tackles the six-mile round trip with friends about once a month.

"When I talk about it or post it on Facebook that I've walked it, I'm

About Auger Falls Trail

Private or inaccessible for years, this stretch of Snake River Canyon land is now open to walkers, runners and cyclists. You'll find ponds, wildlife, solitude, springs and Auger Falls itself — a pretty stretch of whitewater.

Find the trailhead: At the north end of Twin Falls, turn west from Blue Lakes Boulevard North onto Canyon Springs Road. After the road descends into the canyon, you'll pass the Centennial Waterfront Park entrance, Canyon Springs Golf Course, the city's wastewater treatment plant and an earthen ramp that offers access to the Snake River. The road terminates at a small parking

area, where a gate keeps vehicles off the Auger Falls trail.

You'll find a portable toilet there but no drinking water; be sure to carry water for your time on the trail.

Trail basics: Here, the wide gravel or dirt trails look like one-lane roads. It's three miles from the parking area to the trails' end: a bridge over Rock Creek, just before the creek enters the Snake River. In and back is a six-mile round trip, but you can lengthen that by looping through alternate sections of trail.

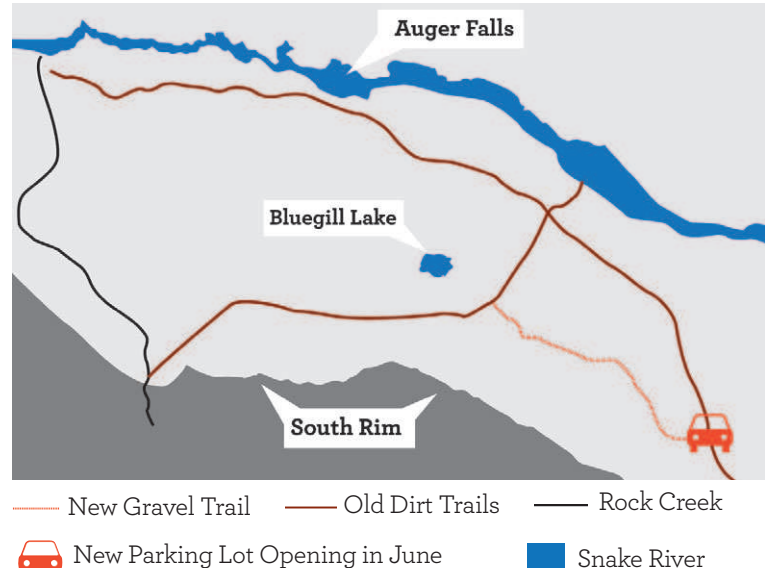
To see Auger Falls, you'll have to get off the trail and descend to the river without a marked trail. Not sure where to do that?

Watch for the row of six big houses on the north canyon rim overlooking the falls.

Rules: Non-motorized use only; bicycles are OK. No shooting. Get out before dusk. Remember that cell reception is spotty in the canyon.

What's to come: About 1.2 miles beyond the current trail entrance, a large, graveled parking lot was constructed in December. By June, city parks director Dennis Bowyer hopes to have a gate installed there — meaning that the city can begin letting vehicles drive to that point. The change will cut down the walk to a four-mile round trip for people who want to see it all.

Baiting Bears

TWIN FALLS • Tom Chaput of Twin Falls will never forget the first time he shot a bear.

He had been hunting only a couple of hours before a blackie came sniffing around the bait. Chaput dropped the animal from his perch in a tree about 10 feet above the ground. He was only 14.

This year, he'll take his daughter Kailey, 15, hunting, hoping that she has the same kind of beginner's luck.

"She gets the first bear this year," he said.

Spring black bear hunting season opens across most of Idaho on Sunday.

About 2,000 black bears are

harvested in Idaho every year and many of them are taken with the help of bait.

Baiting isn't as easy as just scattering some doughnuts on the ground and waiting for the bears to show up.

Chaput has lugged in 5-gallon buckets full of bait while trudging knee-deep through snow.

"People don't realize how much work it is to pack in bait," he said.

Bears aren't picky. Doughnuts, dog food, dried meat and fryer grease are just a few items that have been used with success.

The bait not only attracts the bears, it gives the hunter a chance to get a good look at the animal before taking a shot, said Darrell

Saturn at Its Closest for 2012

As detailed in a recent installment of this column, superior planets — those farther from the sun than Earth — look best when closest.

They're closest near opposition — when they're on the same side of the sun as the Earth — appearing opposite the sun in the sky. Because Mars has a lopsided orbit, some oppositions — like this year's — don't bring Mars anywhere near as close as others.

But the opposition distances of the outermost planets don't vary as much, for two reasons. First, their closest distances aren't that much closer than their farthest, simply because Earth's orbit is puny compared to theirs. Second, it just so happens that their orbits are fairly circular, making one opposition much the same as another.

For example, last month's distant opposition of Mars was 76 percent farther than the next close one will be (in July 2018). But the farthest oppositions of Saturn are only 13 percent farther than the closest ones.

Just over a year passes between oppositions of Saturn; this year, it's Sunday. Even though Saturn will be nearly the same distance as it was at last year's opposition, there will be a significant difference for telescope viewers: Since 2009, the tilt of Saturn's rings has been increasing, so the rings will be tilted five degrees more our way than they were

last year. It's nothing unusual — as Saturn circles the sun every 30 years, it presents its rings at different angles to us. The rings were edge-on in 2009, and are now nearly half as far open as the next maximum, in late 2017.

Don't own a telescope? No worries: CSI's Centennial Observatory will be open Saturday night for its monthly star party, and International Astronomy Day is two Saturdays hence. A telescope view of Saturn's rings with your own eyes is sure to delight.

Nunez, a veteran hunter from Filer.

Female bears with cubs are off limits.

Bait may help, but it's no guarantee of success. Nunez said there have been times when he hasn't seen a bear all season despite using bait the whole time.

Nunez, a representative for Mossy Oak Pro Staff and Hunter's Specialties, provided some tips on bear hunting during a recent seminar at Sportsman's Warehouse.

Bears can smell a human from hundreds of yards away on a calm day, Nunez said, so it's important to cover your scent.

Special spray products are available that effectively mask the hunter's smell, even when the wind is swirling, he said.

Nunez likes to set up his tree stand/blind about 25 feet above the bait site.

"The higher you are, the better it's going to be for the wind," he said.

Nunez also puts soft, wide slip-ons over his boots to muffle the sound of his movement.

"Bears have poor eyesight, but their hearing and scent is so keen. It's amazing," he said.

You need a permit to bait bears in Idaho.

The black bear population here has been fairly

stable in recent years, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. North-central Idaho is one of the most popular hunting areas.

Several years ago, the spring hunting season was extended until June 30 in the Clearwater backcountry, in part because bears were having a negative impact on elk survival rates.

"We saw an increase in bear harvest once we extended the season. Participation and success rates went up," said Jay Crenshaw, wildlife manager for the Clearwater region.

Hunters took 824 black bears in the Clearwater region in 2010 and 709 bears last year. The average harvest was 500 to 600 bears prior to the extension of the season.

surprised at how many people have never heard of it," McHenry said.

Perhaps those six miles — the distance from the Auger Falls parking area to the end of city parkland and back — have something to do with the trail's lack of popularity with less ambitious walkers.

That's about to change. By June, Dennis Bowyer, Twin Falls Parks and Recreation director, hopes to have a gate installed a mile beyond the current parking area. After that, walking, running or cycling just two miles will bring you past Bluegill Lake, several ponds and Auger Falls, and to the trail's endpoint: a spot where Rock Creek tumbles down toward the Snake River. In Johnstone's opinion, that's where the park's real beauty hides.

"It is a place where you just have to think of the creator — you did this just for me? — and be blessed by that," she said.

Transformation Begins

City leaders see the attraction, too.

Twin Falls purchased about 520 acres inside the canyon from a private landowner in late 2002, staff engineer Lee Glaesemann said. And in fall 2011, lengthy Congressional action finally resulted in a transfer of another 160 acres — including a little rim land — from the Bureau of Land Management to the city.

Still, the city had to keep out the public until early 2010, when it traded some land with a private owner to open up pedestrian access to the city-owned acres around Auger Falls, Glaesemann said.

Old dirt roads became part of the park's trail system. But in December, crews constructed a large, graveled parking lot — which drivers will be able to use after Bowyer's gate is installed — and a meandering mile of wide, graveled path that gives walkers another option.

That new trail, which lies closer to the canyon wall than to the river, adds vari-

ety to the scenery.

"You feel like you're more in the mountains," McHenry said. "There's more trees ... we feel a little more secluded."

The area has a complicated history; in the park's wetlands you can see the old remnants of a potato-processing factory's wastewater settling basins, and of a restored gravel pit.

A year ago, crews built a pond west of Bluegill Lake, said Mike Trabert, an environmental engineer for the city. Both the lake and the pond hold agricultural wastewater from a pair of canals that spill over the canyon rim. Walkers are likely to see ducks there — or geese at the edge of Auger Falls, or hundreds of pelicans on the river's opposite bank.

A New Place to Love

While trail use so far has been light, even fewer people venture off the wide trail to see the swirling foam of Auger Falls itself.

"And it's real pretty once you see what it's all about. It's Idaho's hidden treasure No. ...," Trabert said, letting his sentence trail off.

"It's just a beautiful sight to look at," McHenry said.

To McHenry and fellow walkers who call themselves Team Walkie-Talkie, the park's main attraction is its prohibition of motorized use. Another draw: its nonpaved trail surfaces. "It's easier on your joints," she said.

And a drawback: McHenry has noticed an occasional bad smell that she attributes to the city's wastewater treatment plant.

Becky Hurt of Twin Falls is a new member of the Walkie-Talkie women.

"I've lived here all my life, and they're taking me places I've never gone, and Auger Falls is one of them," said Hurt, 54. In March, on her first visit to Auger Falls, she enjoyed walking in what seemed to her a little like wilderness — but without the shots and bullet casings she'd encountered in the Devil's Corral area near Jerome.

"We spooked up a couple of deers that were bedded down, so that was way fun," Hurt said.

A sharp eye might notice petroglyphs discovered last year on a couple of the park's rocks. Trail builders kept clear of the petroglyphs, but Trabert hopes the city won't find it necessary to protect them more aggressively. "Hopefully the public will be nice."

City leaders plan to develop more trails eventually at Auger Falls, and perhaps erect historical signs explaining the canyon's former gold mining, homesteading and orchards.

"There's so many little historic spots down here," Trabert said.

This spring, he's hoping for help from local moun-

tain bikers to designate bike tracks within the park. Meanwhile, minimal development suits McHenry just fine.

"I would like to see it maybe a little more convenient for families, you know, with children, but I don't want it to be paved," she said. "If they get too developed, and then it's not like you're walking in nature."

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Fishing Report

JEROME • Hey, anglers. You don't have to wait until Free Fishing Day to cast your lines. Here are several places where people have been catching fish.

Little Camas Reservoir is about 50 percent ice-free — most of the ice is in the dam area. Area around the boat ramp is dry and clear of ice. Persons with a small boat could probably launch and maneuver thru the open spots around the edge to the big open area on the upper end, that is, if it did not freeze over on a cold night.

Anderson Reservoir: Boats can be launched at Elk Creek. At boat ramp checked a 12-inch kokanee caught on worms. Open water to the Lime Creek and South Fork junction, then the ice starts.

South Fork of the Boise: below Anderson Dam is now closed to all fishing until May 26.

Fish Creek Reservoir: Ice is melting fast; bank fishing is available.

Big Wood River: Will be fishing well this last week of the catch and release season. Warmer temperatures should stimulate bug hatches. Access is good. No spear fishing allowed.

Carey Lake: Ice is nearly all gone. Anglers are fishing from tubes and boats. Bass fishing is slow.

Little Wood Reservoir: Little Wood Reservoir is still iced over but should be fishable from shore within the next week.

Team Works with F&G to Preserve Habitat

BOISE • Idaho Department of Fish and Game is getting some help from an AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps team to improve wildlife habitat in the Boise River area this spring.

The team will be serving on various projects until May 10, and will assist Fish and Game staff members at two wildlife management areas — the Boise River and Cecil D. Andrus WMAs — to improve the areas.

Near Boise, the team will be helping with fence construction and repair, repairing damaged roads and planting silver sagebrush, a desirable wildlife forage plant. Fish and Game has 10,000 sagebrush seedlings that need to be planted, and the team plans to get as many done as possible. The department also needs to have some entrance gates repaired and painted for the upcoming summer.

Project work near Cambridge includes construction and repair of fencing, native shrub planting and removal of exotic weeds, installing bluebird boxes, removing downed trees that are blocking roads and trails, and repairing creek crossings.

"I'm looking forward to working with the Fish and Game department," said corps member Kristen Dyke, "and learning about the wildlife of Idaho while connecting with the communities of southern Idaho."

Steelhead Opener a Spring Rite on the Brule River

ON THE BRULE RIVER, Wis. • Dark hung on for a while Saturday morning on opening day of fishing, with clouds hanging low and stubborn over the valley and the steelhead trout here apparently of the same mood.

Up and down the river it was the same report.

"No fish. I haven't seen one," said Bill Fleischman.

Fleischman sat down on shore to take a break from fishing, with his rod propped up against a tree and a cigar between two fingers.

But as with nearly everyone else who had been skunked so far, Fleischman didn't seem to mind. Being on the Brule for the opener every year, some anglers for decades on end, is a rite of spring that wouldn't be right to miss.

"Spring is officially started," Fleischman declared between puffs. "I've had ducks fly over. A pileated woodpecker. Canada geese. And now an eagle... It's a very good morning."

Chuck Johnson came with his dad, David, and son, Reid. Three generations of Johnson were fish-

ing a bend where the Brule deepens and slows down a bit and where steelhead often hang out on their way upstream to spawn.

But not Saturday morning. Or, if the fish were there, they weren't biting.

Chuck Johnson cast his colorful bit of yarn upstream and watched it drift down, watching his line for any sign a fish had taken the bait. He waited for the telltale pull of a chrome-silver steelhead, a pull that signals an ensuing battle so epic that it draws anglers back for these hard to catch fish season after season.

But, cast after cast, that pull never came.

Johnson pointed his rod tip toward his dad just downstream.

"When even he's not catching fish, I get nervous, because that means there aren't any around," Chuck said.

No one had an agreed upon explanation of why the fishing was so slow. But everyone did agree the weather was pretty good for a Brule opener — thick

clouds but temperatures hovering around 40, light wind and no rain or snow.

"A lot better than last year when it never got past 25 degrees," said Jerry Noonan of Poplar. "I didn't even go out last year. When it's below 28 degrees, you can't keep the ice out of the eyelets on the rod."

On Saturday Noonan, the caretaker at the 1937 vintage Lenfestey cabin on the Brule, was heading down to the river to fish when he ran into two newspaper people. In no hurry to do much, Noonan lit a cigarette and talked about years past and the brotherhood of Brule River anglers who gather each year to waylay the trout migrating out of Lake Superior.

"My initials are in the concrete on the path to the outhouse from 1965. I think I was 12 then... I don't miss many openers," Noonan said. "But this is more of a social thing for us. We see people on opening weekend we probably won't see again until the fall run. It's that way every year."

Confused By an Early Spring? So Are the Fish

KANSAS CITY, Mo. • So, how did the recent onset of summer-like conditions affect the fishes' schedule?

Normally they have a very predictable timetable for when they come in to spawn, based primarily on water temperature and length of day. But when water temperatures shot up quickly in the midst of a recent warm spell, it apparently confused the fish and the fishermen chasing them.

At the James A. Reed Memorial Wildlife Area near Lee's Summit, that trend has been especially noticeable.

"Out here, the peak of our crappie spawn is usually around the second week of April, when the water temperature reaches the low 60s," said Bob Mattucks, fisheries biologist for the Missouri Department of Conservation who fishes the Reed Area for crappies regularly. "But with that warm weather, our water temperature just shot into the 70s and I think it confused the fish."

"Before that, we had crappies trying to spawn already.

Some of the females we were catching already had eggs just flowing out of them. But when the water temperature shot up, the crappies just pulled back.

"The fishing has just gotten real tough."

Are the crappies waiting until length of day and water temperature align to produce traditional spawning conditions? No one knows.

"This is new for everyone," Mattucks said. "This is a historic event."

"We've never seen things happen this fast. So we really don't know how the fish will react."

The same is true in Kansas. In the midst of the rapid warmup, water temperatures climbed to the upper 60s and the crappies moved toward the spawning banks, providing excellent fishing. But many fishermen have reported curious sightings. The male crappies weren't dark, as they often are during spawning. And many of the females that were cleaned still had hard egg sacs, indicated that true spawn was still a ways off.

Even the walleyes were fooled by the rapidly rising water temperatures.

Groups File Bighorn Lawsuit

LEWISTON • Three environmental groups are challenging the Payette National Forest contention that a 2011 Congressional rider prevents further implementation of grazing restrictions designed to protect bighorn sheep.

The rider championed by Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, forbids the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management from spending money implementing domestic sheep grazing reductions beyond those in place on July 1, 2011.

Because of the rider Payette Forest officials announced they will not implement grazing reductions that were set to take effect this summer. A 2010 plan commonly referred to as the Payette Decision called for domestic sheep grazing to be cut by about 70 percent over a three-year period starting in 2011. The plan is designed to protect bighorn sheep from a disease carried by domestic sheep.

Last year, under the first phase of the plan, sheep ranchers lost access to more than 54,000 acres of range land. This year the Soulen Livestock Co. was to lose access to another 7,700 acres. Next year, the plan called for sheep to be kicked off an additional 6,800 acres.

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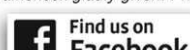
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Titanic's Sinking: Was It More Than Human Folly?

WASHINGTON • After an entire century that included two high-profile government investigations and countless books and movies, we're still debating what really caused the Titanic to hit an iceberg and sink on that crystal-clear chilly night.

Maybe there's more to blame than human folly and hubris. Maybe we can fault freak atmospheric conditions that caused a mirage or an even rarer astronomical event that sent icebergs into shipping lanes. Those are two of the newer theories being proposed by a Titanic author and a team of astronomers.

But the effort to find natural causes that could have contributed to the sinking may also be a quest for an excuse — anything to avoid gazing critically into a mirror, say disaster experts and Titanic historians.

New theories and research are important “but at its most basic what happened is they failed to heed warnings and they hit the iceberg because they were going too fast,” said James Delgado, director of maritime heritage at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

With this week's 100th anniversary of Titanic's sinking, the interest in all things Titanic is steaming faster than the doomed cruise ship on its maiden voyage.

One of the novel new theories says Titanic could have been the victim of a mirage that is similar to what people see in the desert. It's the brainchild of Tim Maltin, a historian who has written three books about Titanic. The latest, an e-book titled “A Very Deceiving Night” emphasizes how the atmosphere may have tricked the Titanic crew on a cloudless night.

“This was not avoidable human error,” Maltin said in a telephone interview from London. “It's just about air density difference.”

It was a beautiful clear night and for a couple of days, there had been something strange going on in the air over the North Atlantic, reported by all sorts of ships, including the crew on Titanic, Maltin said.

The unusually cold sea air caused light to bend abnormally downward, Maltin said. The Titanic's first officer, William McMaster Murdoch, saw what he described as a “haze on the horizon, and that iceberg came right out of the haze,” Maltin said, quoting

from the surviving second officer's testimony.

Other ships, including those rescuing survivors, reported similar strange visuals and had trouble navigating around the icebergs, he said.

British meteorologists later monitored the site for those freaky thermal inversions and said 60 percent of the time they checked, the inversions were present, Maltin said.

The same inversions could have made the Titanic's rescue rockets appear lower in the sky, giving a rescue ship the impression that the Titanic was smaller and farther away, Maltin said.

Physicists Donald Olson and Russell Doescher at Texas State University have another theory in *Sky & Telescope* magazine that fits nicely with Maltin's. Olson — who often comes up with astronomical quirks linked to historical events — said that a few months earlier, the moon, sun and Earth lined up in a way that added extra pull on Earth's tides. The Earth was closer to the moon than it had been in 1,400 years.

They based their work on historical and astronomical records and research in 1978 by a federal expert in tides.

The unusual tides caused glaciers to calve icebergs off Greenland. Those south-bound icebergs got stuck near Labrador and Newfoundland but then slowly moved south again, floating into the shipping currents just in time to greet the Titanic, the astronomers theorized. Maltin said the icebergs also added a snaking river of super-cold water that magnified the mirage effect.

Tides and mirages may have happened, but blaming them for Titanic's sinking “misses the boat,” said Lee Clarke, a Rutgers University disaster expert and author of the book “Worst Cases.”

“The basic facts of Titanic are not in dispute: The boat was going too fast in dangerous waters,” Clarke said. If Titanic had stopped for the night because of ice like the British steamship *Californian* did, “tides and mirages wouldn't have mattered.”

On April 14, the day it hit the iceberg, the Titanic received seven heavy ice warnings, including one from the *Californian* less than an hour before the fateful collision. The message said: “We are stopped and surrounded by ice.” Titanic sent back a message that said “Shut up. We are busy.”

Peruvian Miners Tell of Anguish, Hope Inside Mine

YAUCA DEL ROSARIO, Peru • Peruvian miners trapped for six days in an abandoned copper mine prayed and wept during moments of intense anguish, then told each other jokes and even danced to hold onto hope before they finally walked free Wednesday.

The miners, ranging in age from 23 to 58, walked out without assistance about an hour after dawn from a reinforced tunnel that rescuers had built as they removed more than 26 feet of dirt and rock.

“On the second day, we were saying that they weren't going to get us out, that we were going to die in there,” said Santiago Tapia, 21, the youngest of the miners. Tapia spoke with The Associated Press at the Social Security Hospital in Ica, where all the miners were taken to recover from dehydration.

“Inside, we prayed, we cried. We also cried with our relatives outside who were desperate,” said Tapia, the father of a 2-year-old daughter.

Other moments were lighter. “We conversed, we told each other jokes, talked about our lives, things that had happened to us,” Tapia said. “We also talked about politics, a bit of everything. We made ourselves laugh so we wouldn't feel bad inside there.”

The miners wore sunglasses and were covered with blankets when they walked free. President Ollanta Humala was there to greet them after spending the night at the mine 150 miles southeast of the capital of Lima.

The miners were trapped by a cave-in triggered by an explosion they themselves had set.

They had communicated with rescuers through a hose, in place before the collapse, by which they also received food and medicine during their ordeal in a horizontal shaft dug into a mountainside.

It became their lifeline. “Thanks to that hose we are now still alive,” Tapia said.

“It's pretty ugly inside,” said fellow miner Edwin Bellido. “We slept on the ground on muddy plastic.”

On the first day, miners grew desper-

ate when one of their companions became ill, Bellido said.

But he said the miners kept their spirits up, including by singing and running in the 160-foot-long tunnel. They even danced “to pass the time,” Bellido said.

The Cabeza de Negro mine that they were working had been abandoned in the 1980s.

Humala said the incident points up the dangers of working in such mines in Peru, labor in which tens of thousands are engaged. He said he had given instructions for Cabeza de Negro to be sealed definitively.

The rescue drew some comparisons to the 69-day ordeal of 33 Chilean miners trapped more than 2,000 feet underground in 2010 near the Chilean city of Copiapo.

The Peru rescue was not by any measure a comparable engineering feat because the miners were not similarly trapped deep beneath the earth. Neither heavy equipment nor drilling was required to extract them. Rescuers relied primarily on shovels, pick axes and wheelbarrows.

Two U.S. Marines Killed, 2 Injured in Morocco

RABAT, Morocco • Two U.S. Marines were killed and two severely injured in the crash of a hybrid aircraft Wednesday in Morocco, officials said.

The Marines were taking part in joint U.S.-Moroccan military exercises located in the south of the country based in Agadir, said U.S. Embassy spokesman Rodney Ford in Rabat, who gave the toll.

rine spokesman at the Pentagon in Washington, confirmed that the aircraft involved was an MV-22 Osprey, which takes off and lands like a helicopter and flies like an airplane. The aircraft was participating in a U.S.-Moroccan military exercise known as “African Lion.”

The Osprey was flying from the amphibious assault ship USS Iwo Jima, a defense official said, speaking on condition of anonymity because the matter is in the early stages of investigation.

The annual exercise which began in 2008 runs from April 7 to 18 and involves 1,000 U.S. Marines and 200 soldiers, sailors and airmen. They were working with some 900 Moroccan soldiers.

According to the U.S. Marine website, the exercise involved “everything from combined arms fire and maneuver ranges, aerial refueling and deliveries of supplies, to command post and non-lethal weapons training.”

The main unit involved in the exercise is the 14th

Marines, a reserve artillery regiment based in Fort Worth, Texas, but also includes members of the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit based in Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

The goal of the exercise is to train the two countries' forces to work together.

Further information about the crash was being withheld until the next of kin of the killed and injured Marines were notified, said Rodney Ford, spokesman of the U.S. Embassy in Rabat.

Argentine 'Miracle' Baby Improving after Being Found Alive in Morgue

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) • A mother in Argentina says she fell to her knees in shock after finding her baby alive in a coffin in the morgue nearly 12 hours after the girl had been declared dead.

Analia Bouter named her newborn Luz Milagros, or “Miracle Light.” The tiny girl, born three months premature, was in critical condition but was improving Wednesday in the same hospital where the staff pronounced her stillborn on April 3.

The case became public Tuesday when Rafael Sabatinelli, the deputy health minister in the northern province of Chaco, announced in a news conference that five medical professionals involved have been suspended pending an official investigation.

Bouter told the *TeleNoticias* TV channel in an interview Tuesday night that doctors gave her the death certificate just 20 minutes after the baby was born, and that she still hasn't received a birth certificate for her tiny girl.

Bouter said the baby was quickly put in a coffin and taken to the morgue's refrigeration room. Twelve hours passed before she and her husband were able to open the coffin to say their last good-byes.

She said that's when the baby trembled. She thought it was her imagination — then she realized the little girl was alive and dropped to her knees on the morgue floor in shock.

A morgue worker quickly picked up the girl and confirmed she was alive. Then, Bouter's brother grabbed the baby and ran to the hospital's neonatal intensive care unit, shouting for the doctors. The baby was so cold, Bouter said, that “it was like carrying a bottle of ice.”

A week later, the baby is improving. Bouter said she still has many unanswered questions about what happened. She said she had given birth normally to four other children and doesn't understand why doctors gave her general anesthesia this time. She said she also doesn't know why she wasn't allowed to see her baby before it was put into a coffin.

She said she had to insist on going to the morgue's refrigeration room, where she brought a cell phone to take a picture of the newborn for the funeral. Her husband struggled to open the lid, and then stepped aside to let her see inside.

“I moved the coverings aside and saw the tiny hand, with all five fingers, and I touched her hand and then uncovered her face,” she said in the *TeleNoticias*

interview. “That's where I heard a tiny little cry. I told myself I was imagining it — it was my imagination. And then I stepped back and saw her waking up. It was as if she was saying ‘Mama, you came for me!’”

“That was when I fell to my knees. My husband didn't know what to do. We were just crying and I laughed and cried, cries and laughter. We must have seemed crazy.”

She says the family plans to sue the staff at Hospital Perrando in the city of Resistencia for malpractice, and still wants answers. But they've been focused for now on their little girl, whom she described as amazingly healthy despite being born after just 26 weeks of gestation. So far, she hasn't needed oxygen or other support commonly provided to preemies, she said.

Ahmed Ben Bella, Algeria's First President, Dies at 95

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) • Ahmed Ben Bella, Algeria's first president and a historic leader of its bloody independence struggle from France, died at his family home in Algiers on Wednesday. He was 95.

Family members and the state news agency did not give the cause of death, but twice in the last month Ben Bella had been treated at the military hospital of Ain Naadja for discomfort.

The charismatic Ben Bella, a symbol of pan-Arabist ideology as well as the global anti-colonial movement, was president of Algeria from 1963 until he was overthrown in a military coup in 1965 by the army chief of staff, Col. Houari Boumedienne.

Ben Bella was under house arrest until 1980, and he went into self exile in Switzerland until returning to the country in 1990 as part of the opposition to the ruling political party he helped found.

A giant of Algeria's independence struggle and the country's first few years, he played only a symbolic role in the latter years of his life,

heading the opposition Movement for the Democracy in Algeria Party, which competed in the aborted 1991 elections, winning just 2 percent of the vote.

His party was banned in 1997, but he continued to live in Algeria, often condemning government policies. He was present when the current president, Abdelaziz Bouteflika, was sworn in for his third term in April 2009.

Two years earlier, Ben Bella became head of the African Union's "Group of Elders."

Aside from Bouteflika, Ben Bella was the country's sole civilian leader and was followed by a string of generals. One of the six "historic leaders" of Algeria's revolt against French colonial rule, Ben Bella spent 23 years of his life in French and Algerian prisons.

Through most of the eight-year war of independence, Ben Bella was held in a French fortress. His liberation was one of the main Algerian demands in the drawn-out peace talks that led to the 1962 Evian agreements for Algeria's independence.

Elected president of the newly-independent nation virtually without opposition, he enjoyed less than three

years of an extravagant and erratic leadership before being overthrown in an army coup and imprisoned by Boumedienne, then army chief of staff.

Until Boumedienne's death 13 years later, Ben Bella became a "non person" in Algeria. No public mention of his name was allowed in Algerian media — all state-controlled.

Even the official attacks on Ben Bella's allegedly "arbitrary and wasteful" regime avoided mentioning his name.

Boumedienne died in 1978. His pragmatic and moderate successor, Chadli Bendjedid, freed Ben Bella from more than a decade of detention without trial, ultimately allowing him to go abroad with his wife Zora and their two adopted daughters.

It was Ben Bella's misfortune that he was very much a product of the colonial regime that France imposed on Algeria for 130 years. He spoke better French than Arabic, and the Arabic he spoke was colloquial rather than literary.

As a result, he had difficulty conversing with the leaders of other Arab nations. His often rousing and emotion-charged speeches as president were delivered in Algerian Arabic —

which few citizens of other Arab nations fully understand — and when he wanted to stress a particular argument, he broke into French.

Towson is also located about 60 miles northeast of Guthrie's home neighborhood, Woodland, where his

COLUMBUS, Ohio • In his first speaking engagement with his Big Ten coaching peers, new Ohio State coach Urban Meyer had to defend what he did in his last coaching job.

"When you start saying preferential treatment to players, that's probably a correct statement. We did do that. We do that here. We did it at Bowling Green and Utah," said Meyer, mentioning his previous coaching stops while speaking Wednesday on the Big Ten coaches spring teleconference. "If you go to class, you're a warrior, you do things the right way off and on the field, and you're completely committed to helping us win, you're going to get treated really good."

Meyer said he was disappointed by a story this week in the Sporting News which said he showed favoritism to star players during his six-year tenure at Florida

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RUPERT • Last summer, Chance and Cheyenne Hegsted received the news no high school senior-to-be wants to hear: Mom got a job out of state. The family is moving.

Meanwhile, David Joyce got the call every softball coach would love: Two new girls are moving in. Both are outstanding softball players.

After struggling for the past six years, Minico (6-5) has already matched its win total from a year ago. It would be overstating to say the Hegsted twins are the reason for all Minico's success. Rather, it's more like the Spartans were building a

fire and the Hegsted's just happened to show up with matches.

"They've brought so much to our team that has helped us," said Minico senior Samantha McGhie. "They've pushed us."

The Hegsted's migrated from Tooele, Utah, where they won a state softball championship as sophomores and finished state runner-up last season. In fact, Tooele is like the New York Yankees of high school softball in Utah. It has played in the last nine state title games, winning six.

So naturally, the first question the twins asked when they arrived at Minico was, "How's the softball team?"

The answer was disheartening. The Spartans were just 6-19 last sea-

son and haven't posted a winning season since 2005.

It was hard enough to leave their friends and school behind for their senior year, but to possibly miss out on fulfilling their dreams in the sport they love was almost too much to stomach.

"I cried because my softball career is everything for me and I don't want to lose it," Chance said.

With aspirations to play college ball, the Hegsted's hope their move won't cause them to fall off the recruiting radar. The overall level of competition is higher in Utah, and the twins are adapting to the slower play.

So far, their numbers stack up well. Through 11 games Chance has been charged with just one error at second base, while batting .565 from the leadoff

said that there was a different set of rules for star players such as wide receiver Percy Harvin.

“I’m extremely proud of what we did down there. And throwing great players — not good players, great players — under the bus like that, I don’t get the intent,” he said. “I’ll fight for those guys, man. Those guys did a lot of great things for the University of Florida. And to sit there and call them out four or five years later, I’m not sure of the intent, once again.

“But I’ll always fight for those guys.”

Meyer won two national championships at Florida but twice left the program, each time citing health issues. He retired after the 2010 season, then later took a job as a college football analyst with ESPN for a year. He was hired last November to pick up the pieces of an Ohio State program which has suffered through player suspensions and departures, NCAA sanctions and the forced resignation of coach Jim Tressel due to a memorabilia-for-money scandal.

The Buckeyes, who were 6-7 a year ago and lost their last four games including, ironically, the Gator Bowl to Florida, are on NCAA probation and have been banned from playing in a bowl game after the 2012 season.

Meyer said he had talked to several former Florida players and coaches who were upset by the Sporting News story.

The story cited multiple sources who confirmed that during the 2008 season Harvin, now a member of the NFL’s Minnesota Vikings, physically attacked Florida wide receivers coach Billy Gonzales, grabbing him by the neck and throwing him to the ground. It said that after Harvin was pulled off Gonzales by two assistant coaches, he was never disciplined.

Gonzales, now an offensive coordinator at Illinois, issued a statement earlier on Wednesday.

“In response to a recent story alleging an incident between Percy Harvin and me and while at Florida, the story is inaccurate,” he said in the statement. “It didn’t happen.”

Meyer said he and his staff met or exceeded all standards in terms of graduation rate, wins, abiding by NCAA rules and recruiting quality players.

The story had said there was a “circle of trust” which enabled and pandered to elite players. Meyer denied it on Wednesday.

Asked if he disagreed in particular with a certain contention in the story, Meyer said, “Oh, more than one.”

He seemed particularly upset by the inference that he and his staff had flaunted NCAA bylaws.

“I want to say this real clear: There is no violation that we had as far as that whole conversation,” Meyer said. “I’m not sure why that keeps coming up. So, if you would bold that for me, underline it — there is not an NCAA violation!”

night. Muhammad went first, picking UCLA over his other his other finalists, Duke and Kentucky.

No word on whether he would’ve chosen the NBA if that had been an option.

“I choose to be a Bru-in,” Muhammad said. “So I’ll be at UCLA next year.”

Though he very well could spend the next four years in school, he tellingly made no commitment beyond that.

Noel chose Kentucky, which was no surprise if you knew he had the team’s logo shaved into his head prior to making his announcement. Wildcats coach John Calipari has perfected the one-and-done system — now known as won-and-done — that everyone has played by since 2005.

But really, if a kid is truly serious about getting an education, he should commit to a school for a minimum of three years — just like they do in college baseball. If he wants to go to the NBA, the door should be open as soon as he picks up his high school diploma.

Don’t count on any changes, though.

For everyone beyond the kids, the status quo is working out just fine.

NBA Commissioner David Stern actually wants to increase the age limit from 19 to 20, ensuring a player has to spend two years in college whether he wants to or not — development time that would further reduce the chance of a team making a huge mistake on draft day (see: Kwame Brown) and delaying a player’s progression to the really big money beyond entry level contracts.

“This is not a social program. This is a business rule for us,” Stern conceded recently, show-

ing a lot more forthrightness than the NCAA ever does. “We would like a year to look at them and I think it’s been interesting to see how the players do against first-class competition in the NCAAs and then teams have the ability to judge and make judgments, because high-ranking draft picks are very, very valuable.”

The colleges would certainly go along with a two-and-done proposal to ensure themselves of an additional year of free labor from the best players, undoubtedly boosting their own bottom line even if it did force them to pay a bit more attention to that whole academics thing. As it stands now, the top recruits barely have to find their way to class, needing only to maintain grades for one semester to get through their required season.

Even for an educational system that long ago sold its soul, this is perhaps the greatest farce of all, trying to pass off the one-and-doners as actual student athletes.

Many of the leading prospects already leave home while in high school, going off to play for elite prep schools that travel the country playing games, just like they do in college. Those experiences — combined with opportunities to hone their games in sophisticated AAU programs — certainly raise questions about how much a player really benefits from a single season at a university.

Sure, Brown was a colossal bust after going straight from high school to the NBA as the top overall pick in 2001. But what about LeBron James? And Dwight Howard? And Kobe Bryant? They all took the same route, and it seems to have worked out just fine for them.

Muhammad and Noel should’ve had the same choice.

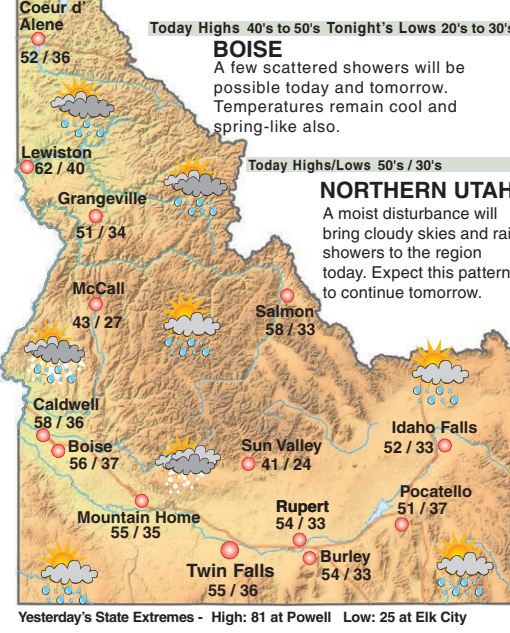

Cora, Marlins Back Guillen as Suspension Begins

PHILADELPHIA • Nearly all the Miami Marlins rushed over to the dugout railing and playfully pretended to listen when Joey Cora sat down to speak about filling in for suspended manager Ozzie Guillen.

Shortly after Guillen addressed the team in the clubhouse Wednesday and apologized for saying he admired Fidel Castro, it was business as usual for the players.

To a man, they had his back.

"It's really a hard time for him and his family," closer Heath Bell said. "We felt bad for him. You have to understand that occasionally guys make mistakes. At least he's owning up to it and not trying to hide or shy away from it. He's going to try and make up for his mistakes."

"He can only be a better person out of it. Like he said, if he doesn't learn from this, he's stupid. That's what he said."

Guillen's comments led to his five-game suspension that started when Miami played the Phillies in the second game of a three-game series. The Marlins, who opened a new ballpark last week and added several marquee free agents over the winter, are off to a 2-3 start.

A day after a contrite Guillen held an hourlong news conference in Miami, he talked to the team for less than 10 minutes and expressed similar emotions.

"There's nothing he needs to apologize to us about," re-

liever Mike Dunn said. "He's our manager and we back him 100 percent."

Outfielder Logan Morrison said: "I love the guy!"

The Marlins conclude the series with Philadelphia on Thursday, before returning home to play Houston on Friday.

Guillen's praise of the Cuban dictator in an interview with Time magazine outraged the Cuban-American community in Miami and led some politicians to call for his dismissal.

"This one was big and he felt it from the beginning," said Cora, a close friend of Guillen who's been coaching under him since 2004 with the Chicago White Sox. "He got shaken, he felt it. After he analyzed what happened, in retrospect, he wouldn't have said what he said. He apologized and it came from the heart and hopefully he makes amends with the community."

"He will."

Cora has filled in for Guillen before, though never under these circumstances. He said he planned to manage games the way Guillen would and was certain players wouldn't be affected.

Things weren't quite the same for him, of course.

"I've never had this many people try to get me to talk," Cora joked. "You guys know me. I don't talk. I barely say 'Hi' to people."

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Records: Petrino, Mistress in Frequent Contact

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. • Former Arkansas coach Bobby Petrino and his mistress were in frequent contact over the past six months, sometimes calling or texting each other dozens of times in a single day — including game days, according to a review of his business cellphone records by The Associated Press.

One of those calls included the very moment when the state police report that led to the end of Petrino's Arkansas career was released.

Petrino was fired Tuesday night for failing to disclose his relationship with Jessica Dorrell, a 25-year-old former Razorbacks volleyball player he hired last month without disclosing his conflict of interest or the fact he had once paid her \$20,000.

Athletic director Jeff Long said he had determined their relationship had been ongoing for a "significant" amount of time, but he did not say for how long.

Records obtained by The Associated Press through a Freedom of Information Act request clearly show Petrino remained in close contact with Dorrell following the April 1 motorcycle accident in which Petrino suffered four broken ribs, a cracked neck vertebra and

scrapes and bruises.

That day, Petrino and Dorrell went for a motorcycle ride on a two-lane highway southeast of Fayetteville and skidded off the road. Petrino and Dorrell talked for 16 minutes earlier that day before the crash at 6:45 p.m., and they also had a 22-minute conversation the following day — while Petrino was still in the hospital recovering.

Petrino's accident report was disclosed by state police on April 5, and the two talked 11 times that day. That included a pair of 2-minute calls around 3:30 p.m. that afternoon, which is when police released the report.

Later that evening, Petrino exchanged four calls with his agent, Russ Campbell, totaling 10 minutes.

The cellphone records show Petrino and Dorrell were

in close contact at least as far back as Sept. 12. The university provided nearly seven months of Petrino's business cellphone records, and that is the first date listed. Among the findings:

Petrino, a married father of four, exchanged 91 texts with Dorrell on Sept. 13 and 84 texts with her over five hours on Oct. 28, the day before a game at Vanderbilt. On Oct. 17, the two swapped 73 text messages, and on four days in a row in the week before a loss to eventual national champion Alabama, Petrino called Dorrell early — at 5:52 a.m., 6:35 a.m., 5:49 a.m. and 7:55 a.m.

The day Arkansas beat Troy, the two exchanged 70 texts. They exchanged 26 texts the day Arkansas beat Mississippi State and four following the Razorbacks' loss to LSU on Nov. 25.

 The Idaho Housing and Finance Association ("IHFA") is implementing a new installment of its Mortgage Credit Certificate Program under Section 25 of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"). A Mortgage Credit Certificate ("MCC") reduces the amount of Federal income tax a qualified home buyer pays by providing a tax credit. Consequently, the home buyer has more disposable income to make loan payments. After all other credits and deductions are taken into account, the value of the MCC is applied directly to the home buyer's remaining Federal tax liability. The amount of the credit may not exceed a taxpayer's total tax liability for a specific year, however, any excess credit may be carried forward to a subsequent tax year for up to three years.
 IHFA continues to issue MCCs under its current program. Additional issuance of MCCs under this new installment of its MCC program is expected to begin in mid July, 2012 for mortgage loans made at that time. MCCs will be made available to eligible home buyers on a first-come, first-served basis and may be used to purchase newly constructed housing, existing housing, or manufactured housing on owner occupied lots. An MCC cannot be issued to a home buyer who is refinancing an existing mortgage.
 The amount of the credit under the proposed program will be twenty five percent (25%) of the yearly interest paid on a qualified mortgage with an annual credit maximum of \$2,000 for the eligible borrower. At least 20% of the amount issued is reserved for MCC's for mortgage loans on single family residences located in targeted counties. A list of targeted counties is available at IdaMortgage.com.
 Present IHFA and Federal regulations require borrowers to meet the certain requirements to be eligible for an MCC including the following, unless IHFA is advised that less restrictive limits can legally be authorized:

1. The borrower must be a first-time home owner, except in the 27 targeted counties. A first-time home owner is defined as a household that has not owned a principal residence for a period of three (3) years prior to the date of executing the MCC-assisted mortgage loan.
2. A borrower with a family of three or more persons must have an annual gross income not exceeding 115% of the applicable area median family income, while a borrower with a family of one or two persons must have an annual gross income not exceeding 100% of the applicable area median family income, except that higher family income limits may be adopted for targeted counties. A list of the current income limits is available at IdaMortgage.com.
3. The borrower must purchase a single family residence, in Idaho, and occupy the housing unit as a principal residence.
4. The borrower must purchase a single family residence with an acquisition cost which does not exceed 90% of the average area purchase price applicable to such residence, except that the acquisition cost may be 110% of the average area purchase price in targeted counties. A list of these purchase price limits can be found at IdaMortgage.com..
5. The borrower must acquire a new mortgage or home loan and meet the credit and underwriting criteria established by the participating lender who provides the mortgage loan. Refinancing of an existing mortgage or land contract is not permissible.

These eligibility requirements and the then current numeric values will be printed and distributed to the public in a Program brochure on Program implementation and will be available online at IdaMortgage.com. The eligibility requirements will not exceed, but may be lower than, the most recently published figures for applicable area median family income and average area purchase price which have been published by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Department of Treasury.

MCCs may be used in conjunction with any privately insured or uninsured fixed rate or adjustable rate loan and such loans are expected to be purchased by IHFA from funds which are not derived from mortgage revenue bonds under Section 143 of the Code. A home buyer may make application for an MCC, through a participating lender or a participating mortgage broker, at the time of loan application. A list of such lenders and mortgage brokers will be available online at IdaMortgage.com. MCCs cannot be used with any mortgage loans supported by mortgage revenue bonds under Section 143 of the Code.

Banks, savings and loan associations, mortgage companies, and other approved financing institutions are invited to participate as lenders. Any lender who wishes to participate will be required to sign a Lender Agreement, which outlines the lender's review and reporting responsibilities. IHFA's list of participating lenders is available at IdaMortgage.com. IHFA will assist lenders in their reporting and other responsibilities.
 Each borrower may be charged up to [\$ 500] as a MCC processing fee.

The Forest Service, Sawtooth National Forest, Sawtooth National Recreation Area, is proposing to authorize MTE Communications, Inc. (Midvale) to install buried fiber optic cable along existing telephone service routes to provide enhanced communication service within the Stanley Basin. The proposed buried fiber optic cable route is from Stanley west along State Highway 21 to Forest Road (FR) 653 and then up Cow Lane (FR 682) about 4 miles. The buried line then switches to overhead on existing Salmon River Electric poles and ends at FR 621 near a commonly used Forest Service fire camp. Other buried fiber spurs include Iron Creek subdivision and a segment connecting the Stanley Museum and Salmon River Lodge within Stanley. No disruption of traffic is expected along the routes.

The new fiber optic cable would be buried in conduit so that replacement and future upgrades could be accommodated without additional ground disturbance. Vegetation would be re-established in disturbed areas by reseeding as needed. Surface areas would be protected from sediment transfer and flow by using standard sediment prevention and retention Best Management Practices (BMPs) at locations within 75 feet of stream channels or standing water.

Today's Highlight:
On April 12, 1862, during the Civil War, Union volunteers led by James J. Andrews stole a Confederate locomotive near Marietta, Ga., and headed toward Chattanooga, Tenn., on a mission to sabotage as much of the rail line as they could; the raiders were caught, and eight of them, Andrews included, were executed as spies. (The raid inspired the 1926 Buster Keaton silent comedy "The General.")

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1811, fur traders employed by John Jacob Astor began building Fort Astoria in present-day Oregon.

In 1861, the American Civil War began as Confederate forces opened fire on Fort Sumter in South Carolina. (The Union troops holding the fort surrendered the following day.)

In 1877, the catcher's mask was first used in a baseball game by James Tyng of Harvard in a game against the Lynn Live Oaks.

In 1912, Clara Barton, the founder of the American Red Cross, died in Glen Echo, Md., at age 90.

In 1934, "Tender Is the Night," by F. Scott Fitzgerald, was first published in book form after being serialized in Scribner's Magazine.

In 1945, President Franklin D. Roosevelt died of a cerebral hemorrhage in Warm Springs, Ga., at age 63; he was succeeded by Vice President Harry S. Truman.

In 1955, the Salk vaccine against polio was declared safe and effective.

In 1961, Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin became the first man to fly in space, orbiting the earth once before making a safe landing.

In 1981, the space shuttle Columbia blasted off from Cape Canaveral on its first test flight. Former world heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis died in Las Vegas, Nev., at age 66.

In 1985, Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, became the first sitting member of Congress to fly in space as the shuttle Discovery lifted off.

Ten years ago: Boston's Cardinal Bernard Law ignored growing demands for his resignation because of sex abuse allegations against priests that began in his archdiocese and spread across the country. (Law ended up resigning in December 2002.) Secretary of State Colin Powell's trip to Middle East was marred by a suicide bombing in Jerusalem that claimed six victims; the White House put on hold Powell's meeting with Yasser Arafat scheduled for the next day (the meeting took place a day later). Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez resigned under pressure from the country's divided military (however, he was returned to office two days later).

Five years ago: A suicide bomber breached security in Iraq's parliament and blew himself up in the dining hall; a Sunni parliament member was killed. CBS fired Don Imus from his radio program for insulting the Rutgers women's basketball team on the air; in the evening, Imus met with team members at the New Jersey governor's mansion in Princeton (Gov. Jon S. Corzine, who was en route to that meeting, was seriously injured when his official vehicle crashed).

One year ago: Japan ranked its nuclear crisis at the highest possible severity on an international scale — the same level as the 1986 Chernobyl disaster — even as it insisted radiation levels were declining at its tsunami-crippled nuclear plant. The state of Ohio executed two-time murderer Clarence Carter for beating and stomping to death a fellow jail inmate. Booming cannons, plaintive period music and hushed crowds ushered in the 150th anniversary of the start of the Civil War during morning ceremonies in Charleston, S.C.
