

TWIN FALLS • They came as refugees, then enriched the community that welcomed them.

This month marks 20 years since the start of the Bosnian War.

According to the Idaho Office on Refugees, those fleeing Bosnia and Herzegovina made up more than half of the 5,000 refugees who resettled in Idaho during the 1990s.

The *Times-News* spoke to three Twin Falls residents who lived through the war. For more

Idaho's Water Outlook Not Dampened by Dry March

Reservoir carryover will help offset southern Idaho's lagging snowpack.

HOLLISTER • Southern Idaho was snubbed by the weather last month.

March's weather patterns broke precipitation record levels across the state. But while the Gem State's snowpack and streamflows came in at record highs, the southern region remained dry and mild.

It's an unintended consequence of transitioning out of a La Nina year, said Ron Abramovich, a water supply specialist for the U.S. Natural Resource Conservation Service in Boise.

Luckily, most Magic Valley water users won't be affected by the area's lack of spring precipitation thanks to last year's high reservoir carryover, Abramovich told about 20 people who gathered Wednesday in Hollister to hear the agency's annual water update.

Almost all of Idaho's reservoirs are holding above-normal amounts of water. Oakley, Salmon Falls and Owyhee reservoirs range from 100 to Please see OUTLOOK, A3:

ISP: 18-Vehicle Pileup May Take Week to Investigate

BURLEY • Idaho State Police officials say it could take them more than a week to wrap up the investigation of Wednesday's 18-vehicle pileup on Interstate 84 near Paul.

Blowing dust cut visibility in the area and led to two crashes that entirely blocked eastbound I-84 at about 5 p.m. Wednesday. The 18-vehicle accident occurred near the Kasota Road exit, while a crash involving three semitrailers occurred only 49 minutes later, about three miles west of the first.

The interstate's eastbound lanes were closed for four and a half hours while crews investigated the crashes and cleaned debris. Traffic was routed through Paul, and returned to the interstate near Burley.

Five people were injured in the crashes, though injuries were minor.

Minidoka Memorial Hospital Administrator Carl Hanson said that both crash patients the Rupert hospital received were released by Thursday afternoon. Cassia Regional Medical Center spokesman Matt Flygare said three patients from the crashes were treated and released from the Burley hospital.

TWIN FALLS • When Burley resident Jake Lake graduated from high school last year, he didn't have to leave the FFA behind.

For the past year, he's been volunteering his time as the organization's state president.

Paul Votes to Raise Sewer, Water Rates

PAUL • Heated at times, a public hearing on the proposed increase in Paul's utility rates drew 18 citizens

Wednesday night. Many – mostly senior citizens were concerned about the rate increases' effect on people with limited incomes.

In the end, the City Council voted to increase sewer and water rates by \$2 each, but not to adopt a \$1 increase in trash removal. In total, the combined rates rose from \$74 to \$78 a month.

One resident testifying about the rates offered comparisons of those paid in surrounding cities. Another asked if the increase was due to unexpected increases. A third complained that rates have gone up every year, but Mayor Randy Jones said there have been no city utility increases for the past three years.

Among the reasons for the increase, Councilman Bruce Hossfeld said that all costs have gone up due to increased gas prices.

Public Works Director Rich Rau explained that the budget reserves are still good. He said spending has increased to comply with state and federal regulations.

One resident objected to the water meters at Meadowbrook, saying she uses less water than her neighbor but pays the same amount. She said she knows people who are going without food and medicines because of "things like this." Council members tried to explain that she was charged for the water she actually used, and Rau noted the meters were paid for by a grant.

Rau listed some of Paul's expenses: meter replacement, multiple testing requirements by the state, new licensing expenses for employees, and having to pay for continuing education that was formerly free. He also noted the many tests which must be performed on city water.

"There is about \$170,000 a year that goes to pay off debt when we put the water and sewer in," he said.

Hossfeld explained that it was important to keep operating systems maintained, or one day people would be hit with a \$10-\$15 increase.

"We're trying to do the minimum to keep up," he said. "I would rather have small increases every couple of years than go six years and then get hit with a big one."

Hailey Skate Park Faces Closure Due to Vandalism

Monday, the mayor visited the park after police found a public art piece had vandalized and garbage was strewn throughout the park. A large wooden sign with the park's rules was also pushed over, according to a press release.

At a City Council meeting Monday, Haemmerle said if another incident of vandalism occurs he will close the park for a day. Following instances would cause week-long or monthlong closures of the park.

April 21 will be a family clean-up day at the skate park and the mayor encouraged participation. In a written statement, he also asked skaters to remember their responsibilities for the park and possible consequences.

Tom Luna Makes Burley Stop

BURLEY • About 100 Magic Valley educators gathered Thursday in Burley to hear Idaho public schools chief Tom Luna and other education officials outline changes made in the Legislature that

will affect Gem State schools

in the coming year.

"I'm happy this year to bring at least some encouraging news about where we are with education, and particularly the budget," Luna said. "This isn't the end of the struggle and all of strife the economy has brought upon you and the schools, but it is an indication that things are finally improving."

Luna said the Legislature approved the state public schools budget for fiscal year 2013 at \$1.6 billion; a 4.6 percent increase from this year. Luna said he's encouraged

that educators won't have to deal with another funding reduction.

The budget will allow the state to increase minimum teacher salaries by \$500 to \$30,500 and fund the expanding technology mandated by the Students Come First

education reforms.

Luna said the average teacher pay in Idaho will increase by more than \$2,000 next year, thanks in part to \$38.8 million in new funding to cover the state's merit-based bonus plan for educators.

"I'm excited about this and

think it's a step in the right direction in helping us keep the great teachers we already have and attracting more of the best and brightest into the teaching profession," Luna said. "We know a highly effective teacher is by far the most important factor in a 21st century classroom."

State Department of Education spokeswoman Melissa McGrath said Idaho education officials hold the annual post-legislative tour to inform educators across the state about law changes and how the public schools budget will impact them through the next school year.

"Since we've passed the Students Come First education reform laws, they are so comprehensive and there are so many changes involved (that) we want to make sure educators at all levels know what the changes are about," she said.

Arma was grateful for the Serbian soldier, but still has a hard time understanding the ethnic divides that drove the conflict. Both she and her husband had close Serbian friends.

"Before, life was just fine. We all lived together," she

The Bajraktarevics managed to escape the country -Amir in the trunk of an uncle's car, Arma and Arna hidden in a truck with other refugees.

It wasn't easy to leave Bosnia. The couple had just built a house, and Arma had opened a beauty salon.

But, Arma said, they had no choice.

"If you don't leave, you will not survive," she said. The family spent a few

years near Dusseldorf in Germany, where Arma worked as a hair stylist. They moved to Twin Falls in 1998. Arna started third grade

and quickly learned English, and Arma started working as a hair stylist. She now owns her own business.

About the Bosnian War

On April 6, 1992, about 40,000 people from across Bosnia and Herzegovina - Muslim Bosniaks, Christian Orthodox Serbs and Catholic Croats — poured into a Sarajevo square to demand peace from their quarreling nationalist

The European Community had recognized the former Yugoslav republic of Bosnia as an independent state after most of its people voted for independence. But the vote went down along ethnic lines, with Bosniaks and Croats voting for independence, and Bosnian Serbs preferring to stay with Serb-dominated Yugoslavia.

The ethnic unity being displayed on the Sarajevo square irritated Serb nationalists, who then shot into the crowd from a nearby hotel, killing five people and igniting the 1992-1995 war. The Serb nationalists, helped by neighboring Serbia, laid siege to Sarajevo and within a few months occupied 70 percent of Bosnia, expelling all non-Serbs from territory they controlled.

Bosniaks and Croats – who started off as allies – then turned against each other, so all three groups ended up fighting a war that took more than 100,000 lives, made half of the population homeless and left the once-ethnically mixed country devastated and divided into monoethnic enclaves.

Alma and Armin Alihodzie

Unlike most Bosnians in

Twin Falls, Armin Alihodzic didn't come as a refugee.

Armin arrived in October 2011 to be with his new wife, Alma, whose family arrived in Idaho when she was 12 years old. While others fled, Armin and his family waited out the war in a village. For five years, they tried to live as normal a life as possible while UN peacekeepers roamed the streets.

He doesn't remember much, and what he does remember, he doesn't like to talk about.

"It's a lot of flashbacks and stories from parents," Armin said as Alma interpreted.

Alma doesn't remember a lot either, but a few memories and stories stick out: Taking her book bag with her to the makeshift bomb shelter under the family stairs; distant sound of grenades; she and her sister hiding under a bed when her father came home from prison camp after a year and a half.

Alma's family left Bosnia near the beginning of the war and spent time in Vienna before coming to Idaho in the mid-90s. When Alma, now 29, returned to Bosnia for the first time in 2010, she was surprised at the still-divided areas. In villages she visited, she saw two schools in one building, with Serbian children on one side and Bosnian-Croatian children on the other.

She asked Armin why, but he said she wouldn't understand. She'd been gone for too long. It's true, Alma said.

"I'm not running away

from my ancestry," she said. "It's just ... I relate to this place a lot more than Bosnia."



Idaho Transportation Department spokesman Nathan Jerke said Thursday that winds generally blow across that section of the interstate from the east and west, but apparently shifted to come from the south prior to the collisions.

"Crashes from blowing dirt are not as common there as they are south of the I-84/I-86 junction," he said.

Jerke said the wind shift and decreased visibility occurred so suddenly it would have been impossible to warn motorists of the hazard.

"Anytime you have conditions like that, slow down and drive to the conditions," he said. "Keep moving if you can because the people behind you will keep moving, but don't go any faster than you can to safely stop."

While an ISP report on the pileup near Paul isn't complete, the crash down the

140 percent of normal. Forecasters expect the reservoirs should adapt to normal summer runoff.

However, as of April 1, snowpack remains a concern in southern Idaho, where some levels are only 40-60 percent of their average for this time of year. In comparison, the Idaho Panhandle is boasting 133 percent of its normal snowpack.

"In some parts of the state, it's the most we've had in years," Abramovich said.

But because the southern Idaho snowpack remains low, forecasts also predict reduced streamflow volumes.

Abramovich said this year's precipitation levels are similar to 2010 and 1994. Based on historical data, as the weather warms up in April, the flows should peak one more time before leveling off.

And while not all the snowmelt will hit the reservoirs, irrigators along the Salmon Tract will have already received their allotment amounts. This year, irrigators will receive .71 acre-feet of water per share. A full allotment is typically 1.16 acre-feet, but is rarely delivered.

"We can only allot what's in the dam," Abramovich said.

The allotment amount isn't huge but could be worse, said Larry Meyer, a board member on the Twin Falls Soil and Water Conservation District.

"If we didn't have the carryover, we'd be in bad shape," Meyer said.

Lunch, Driver's Ed Prices Rise in Filer Schools

FILER • Students will see an increase in prices for some programs and services offered in the Filer School District.

School board trustees Wednesday approved a 10cent increase to the district's hot lunch price. Naomi Mc-Govern, district food service director, announced the change is part of a federal government mandate to keep pace with rising program costs. The price has to increase each year until it is equal to free lunch reimbursement money received from

the federal government. Beginning with the 2012-2013 school year, lunch at Filer Elementary and Hollister Elementary will cost students \$1.80. Filer Intermediate School is moving to \$1.85 and the middle school price will be \$1.90. Filer High School will set its price at \$2 and adult meals will go up to \$3.75.

"This year, our reimbursement money is \$2.77 for free lunch and we get 26 cents in reimbursement for full-price students," McGovern said. "The new nutritional guidelines are changing to more fruits and vegetables, so that kind of meal increases the adult price as well."

Driver's education fees will also see an increase next year to \$130 for Filer School District students and \$150 for out-of-district students.

"We've had an increase in out-of-district students who want to get a good deal and take driver's training over here," said Filer High School Principal Leon Madsen. "I thought we'd better take another look to see if prices couldn't be raised a little."

In other business, school officials and patrons are continuing a campaign to inform residents about a May 15 election to approve a two-year, \$500,000 supplemental funding levy. Public information meetings are scheduled for 7 p.m. April 19 at Filer Intermediate School, and 8 p.m. April 25 at Hollister Elementary School.

Boat Inspection Stations Open Early

HOLLISTER • Boat owners, be prepared to stop.

The Idaho State Department of Agriculture's boat inspection stations have been open since March I and are already catching boats carrying invasive mussels into Idaho.

The department has set up 15 inspection stations across the state as a line of defense against the invasion of zebra or quagga mussels, said Kali Shiller, an ISDA supervisor, while speaking to a small group of people Wednesday in Hollister.

The mussels are not native to the Pacific Northwest but have been found in Arizona, California, Nevada and Utah. The European originated species grows only up to the size of a fingernail, but can attach to surfaces en masse. They can cause millions of dollars in damage by clogging intake pipes and machinery.

Idaho is one of the handful of states that is not afflicted with zebra or quagga mussel invasion, Shiller said.

However, that doesn't mean the state can hold them off forever, she said.

"It's not about if an invasion comes here, but preparing for when it gets here," Shiller said. "These stations have bought us time."

Inspections are free but mandatory for all boat owners driving into the state. Each boat is given a visual scan and a hot water bath with a power

The Magic Valley is home to two inspection stations: along U.S. Highway 93 near the Idaho-Nevada border, and at the Cotterell rest area along Interstate 84 near its junction with I-86. The stations are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Inspections are free, but all boat owners must stop for them.

washer before it can proceed farther.

The inspection station along U.S. Highway 93 near the Idaho-Nevada border in southern Twin Falls County caught its first fouled vessel the second day it was open, Shiller said.

"We have already inspected over 2,000 boats and 11 of those were fouled," she said. "We're going to be keeping our stations open longer this year to make sure we have more time to catch infected boats."

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Twin Falls Police Arrest Tattoo-outed Contreras, Again

TWIN FALLS • A 19-yearold Shoshone man who last week allegedly lied to police about his name, although it was tattooed on his arm and clearly visible, has been arrested again.

This time, Dylan Edward Contreras was charged with driving without privileges, possession of a concealed weapon and inhalation of intoxicants.

A Twin Falls police officer stopped Contreras at about 11 p.m. Tuesday for driving without his lights on in the 200 block of Addison Avenue West.

Police say Contreras verbally identified himself with the correct name during Tuesday's stop. While talking with Contreras, the arresting officer noticed an open beer can in the vehicle's center console, a police report states, though Contreras said he hadn't been drinking.

Contreras allegedly told officers he had a "gat" in the front of his pants, slang for a gun, before he was searched. An officer removed the gun, a 9 mm semiautomatic handgun containing 10 rounds in the magazine.

According to the police report, Contreras does not have a concealed weapons permit.

After putting Contreras through several field sobriety tests, officers arrested him for possession of a concealed weapon, driving without privileges and inhalation of intoxicants. He was booked into Twin Falls County Jail on \$2,500 bond.

Contreras has pleaded not guilty to all charges.

WESTERN STATES PREPARE FOR DANGEROUS FIRE SEASON

Fire experts say this year's drought, low snowpack and record-high temperatures in much of the West portend a dangerous installment of what has become year-round wildfire threat.

DENVER • The West's 2012 wildfire season exploded in earnest last month with a wind-whipped blaze that killed three people in rugged alpine canyon country near Denver. It took a 700-strong federal firefighting team a week of labor, day and night, to tame the blaze - and other states throughout the West took notice.

Fire experts say this year's drought, low snowpack and record-high temperatures in much of the West portend a dangerous installment of what has become a yearround wildfire threat.

Wildfires burned more than 1,500 square miles in Arizona last year and have already torched about 12 square miles this year. Most were caused by people, and fire officials hope the public has learned some lessons from the Wallow Fire, the worst in state history. Campfire embers ignited a blaze that forced nearly 10,000 people to evacuate their homes.

New Mexico, too, experienced its two biggest-ever wildfires in 2011, consuming 245 and 160 square miles, respectively.

"We are approaching this as a season where we still have very high fire danger and there are millions of acres around New Mexico that could burn," said Dan Ware, a New Mexico State Forestry Division

spokesman. January and February were the driest on record in California, where the state Department of Forestry and Fire Protection has battled 679 fires in its jurisdiction — about a third of the state - since Jan. 1, compared to 210 over the same period last year. Fire threats are expected to be above normal in the mountains, the central coast and inland areas such as San Bernardino County, said department spokesman Daniel Berlant.

Nearly all of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, Nevada and Utah have drought conditions that should persist at least through June, according to the National Drought Mitigation Center in Lincoln, Neb.

For much of the West, snowfall this winter was disappointing. Snowpack in Colorado and Utah is only half of average and diminishing fast. Salt Lake City reported its fourth-driest March ever; Denver had a trace of precipitation in what traditionally is the snowiest month of the vear.

"Things are heating up and drying out," said Jason Curry of the Division of Forestry, Fire and State Lands in Utah, where fire officials monitor parched high grasses left over from bountiful 2011 precipitation. "We've got our eyes on the hills?"

In many areas, grass, brush, timber and other wildfire fuels didn't get a winter soaking that allows them to retain water. California had a few storms in March, but "when you miss three or four months without any rain, it just becomes too late," Berlant said.

The National Interagency Fire Center in Boise, Idaho, expects to issue its comprehensive regional outlook May 1. Jeremy Sullens, a wildfire analyst with Predictive Services, an interagency group affiliated with the center, said many states are still transitioning to spring and that green-up the growth of grasses and plants that provide initial fuel for forest and rangeland fires - is in the early stages.

"One of the major factors for the fire season is how precipitation patterns develop through the spring," Sullen said. "So even if we're seeing warmer temperatures in many states across the West, it's all really variable at this

The West's typical wildfire season has run from May to October, peaking in summer months. But climate change and the decades-old practice of putting out fires that nature intended to burn — eliminat - ing fuels - has created a season that starts earlier and sometimes runs longer, said Tim Brown, director of the Western Regional Climate Center in Reno, Nev. Fire managers first noticed the trend in the 1990s.

Idaho is one state that expects a mild wildfire season at least for now. Its mountain ranges are at normal snowpack levels, reservoir managers are dumping water to make room for snowmelt, and the first weeks of spring have brought more snow and rain, even to the desert-like climate of southern Idaho.

Elsewhere in the northern Rockies, fire officials expect a normal 2012 after last year's cool weather and spring floods all but eliminated fire season. Snowpack in Montana and northern Wyoming is at historically average levels, and barring a rapid warm-up, fire season is expected to start in mid-July, said Bryan Henry, a meteorologist with the Northern Rockies Coordination Center's predictive services.

The millions of acres of pine forest, from Canada to Colorado, scarred by the telltale red needles of trees killed by the mountain pine beetle pose another fire uncertainty. Residents of small towns worry about firestorms erupting in beetle kill on surrounding mountainsides. But it isn't known whether the red forest canopies pose a more serious

Matt Jolly and Russ Parsons, U.S. Forest Service ecologists, suggested last year that dead needles can ignite up to three times faster than the green needles of a healthy tree. Beetle-killed trees can burn more intensely and carry embers farther, Jolly said.

Jolly and Parsons are using the data to create models to better predict how a fire will act in stands of beetle-killed trees, but those models aren't ready yet, Parsons said.

Jolly said he did observe a fire last year at the Idaho-Montana line that grew by 26 square miles in a single day when the fire danger was moderate at best. The blaze spread quickly in crown fires through stands of beetle-killed trees as though there had been a prolonged drought, he said.

That is a fearsome thought in a region where firefighters and residents are already preparing for what could be another rough year.

ISU, UI to Seek Smaller **Tuition Increases**

BOISE • Officials at Idaho State University in Pocatello are proposing their lowest tuition increase in more than a decade, while the University of Idaho in Moscow also plans to seek a smaller hike compared with previous

Idaho State University officials confirmed they will recommend a 4.73 percent tuition hike at a state Board of Education meeting next week.

Since 2002, the university's tuition hikes have ranged from a low of 4.75 percent in 2006, to a high of 9 percent in 2010. If approved, the proposal for the 2012-13 school year would represent the smallest tuition jump in 15 years, according to the university's vice president for finance and administration, James Fletcher.

The costs would increase \$274 per year for full-time undergraduate students, under the proposal.

The University of Idaho will propose charging fulltime, undergraduate students 6.1 percent more in tuition next year. The plan, if approved, would represent the university's smallest tuition jump since 2008, when the board approved a 5 percent increase.

Under that plan, full-time undergraduate students would be charged \$356 more per year.

Idaho's public universities have leaned further on student tuition and fees in the economic downturn, citing losses in state support.

The lower tuition increases are being proposed after lawmakers voted in the 2012 session to boost state support for higher education. A budget for next year gives Idaho's public universities \$18.1 million more in state general funds compared with the current fiscal year.

The increased higher education budget was "definitely a factor" in Idaho State's lowered tuition request, spokesman Mark Levine told The Associated Press on Thursday. At the University of Idaho,

the proposed tuition increase for next year will help fund a 2 percent salary increase for employees.

School president Duane Nellis told lawmakers that boosting compensation was his highest priority. The Moscow campus was starting to lose key faculty members as salaries remained

stagnant over the past four years, he said.

The Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee approved a 2 percent, acrossthe-board raise for state workers meeting performance standards. That figure was built into state budgets during the 2012 session, which ended March 29.

Lawmakers gave universities about 60 percent of the money necessary to fund the salary increases, University of Idaho spokeswoman Ysabel Bilbao said.

"They only appropriated a portion of the (change in compensation), leaving the rest to the actual institutions to fund," she said.

Boise State University, which requested the lowest tuition increase at 5 percent last year, is seeking a 5.7 percent tuition increase for next year. The university started with a proposed 7.5 percent tuition increase, a figure that later lowered, was spokesman Frank Zang said.

Lessons from London: Taxing the Working Man's Lunch

he United Kingdom is in the midst of the great pasty crisis of 2012. The pasty is a hot, meat-filled pie, which Prime Minister David Cameron proposes to tax. His recently announced budget both decreases the top income tax rate and increases the cost of a finger food generally eaten by laborers. Class warfare has ensued.

There is an economic logic to the pasty tax. British economic growth - now predicted at 0.8 percent for the year - is anemic. So Cameron seeks to encourage British competitiveness by cutting taxes on businesses and upper-income taxpayers. Given budgetary pressures, however, these tax reductions must be offset by closing tax loopholes elsewhere. One of those loopholes is the inexplicably favorable treatment given to bakeries over other hot food vendors – pasty sellers don't pay the value-added tax while fish-and-chips shops do. But one man's loophole is another man's lunch.

The first tension is between austerity and economic growth. Cameron's budget cuts have reassured global markets. But a sustainable budget is not the same thing as a hopeful, competitive economy. Cameron wants to do more than balance the books of a declining nation. So he is right to adopt supply-side, tax-cutting, pro-business economic measures. Yet this has also required unpopular tax trade-offs and led to attacks on his "millionaire's budget."

Republicans in the United States should expect a similar reward if they gain control of the White House.

A second tension results from a cultural shift. Cameron took leadership of the Conservative Party with the intention of rebranding it. He has been an outspoken advocate for gay marriage, a supporter of foreign assistance and a non-skeptic on climate change. Tim Montgomerie, editor of the ConservativeHome website, calls this Cameron's project of "metropolitan modernization." But not everyone is happy to be modernized. Many Tories remain suspicious of rapid cultural change, skeptical of



global warming and primarily motivated by issues such as welfare dependence and crime. Some of the disaffected are moving outside the traditional party structure. Support for the rightwing UK Independence Party – which attacks the European Union, immigration, wind farms and gay marriage - has risen in polls.

Cameron is losing the unreconstructed right - a political trade-off he must have anticipated. But conservative activists would be more impressed by this repositioning if it had resulted in a majority instead of a coalition — or seemed to be leading toward a majority in the future.

A third tension relates to class. Cameron is generally seen as having a posheducation (taking a first at Oxford) and posh friends. Cameronism is the movement of an urban, upscale, intellectual political class, which can appear dismissive of traditional, grassroots conservatives. But, according to Montgomerie, some conservatives have begun to suspect that their party is "not too right wing, but too rich."

British conservatives are celebrating a melancholy anniversary. It has been 20 years since they last won a majority in Parliament, under the leadership of John Major. Major was the son of a circus trapeze artist. He left school at 16, never graduated from university and spent time on unemployment. Major's accomplishment was to extend a conservative appeal to the striving class — offering the promise of social mobility. And he won more votes than any prime minister before or since — more than Margaret Thatcher, more than Tony Blair.

Cameron — the smart metropolitan who would tax pasties — hasn't duplicated that appeal. In America, Mitt Romney needs to – but it won't be much easier.



Jerome County pays \$250,000 a year plus transportation and salaries to house prisoners in neighboring county jails, including all female offenders. Postmaster General Visits **Potential Closure Sites**

HELENA, Mont. • The top U.S. Postal Service official on Thursday took his case for rural post office closures straight to the people it will hurt most, telling Montana residents that up to 3,600 small post offices around the country need to be shuttered as part of cost-cutting moves.

Rural residents who traveled to Helena to meet Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe answered right back, saying their post offices provide a much-needed lifeline and suggesting cuts be made elsewhere.

One woman from the southwestern Montana town of Basin told Donahoe she has no Internet access and relies on the mail. But like many other rural residents, she does not receive mail delivery.

DeDe Rhodes said if her post office closes, the next one is more than 10 miles away, making her regular trip to pick up mail much more costly.

"I need you to really consider what we are saying. People need their rural post offices;" Rhodes told Donahoe. "Let's look at the urban areas. Maybe they don't need as many post offices because they get their mail delivered right to their door, or at least to the curb."

In Montana alone, about 80 small post offices are slated for closure, from Alzada to Zurich.

The agency needs to reorganize in part because of a 60 percent decline in the number of people paying bills through the mail and the cost of paying into its employee retirement benefits, Donahoe told the gathering in Helena, which is facing the loss of its mail processing center.

Last year, postal losses totaled \$5.1 billion, and those losses are projected to grow.

"We are in a heck of a financial situation. That is why it is so important we move ahead with some of the changes we need to make," Donahoe said. "You have to do something. You can't sit back

Donahoe's Montana visit comes as the Senate prepares as early as next week to take up legislation that would slow, if not stop, the Postal Service's

At the request of Congress, the mail agency previously agreed not to close any facilities before May 15. Donahoe said the agency has to consider competing requests to preserve certain aspects of its services, like six-day delivery, as it weighs a whole slate of reductions that include the

In a report released Thursday, federal auditors stressed that "dramatic changes" were needed to stem the Postal Service's mounting debt and that the agency's proposal to close mail processing centers, estimated to save roughly \$3 billion a year, was an important part of accomplishing that

The report by the Government Accountability Office also noted that the proposal to close mail centers faced tough obstacles due to local communities' opposition to the job losses and cutbacks in service. Labor agreements also make layoffs and forced employee transfers difficult, the report said.

The GAO auditors expressed support for elements of a House postal bill that would set up a new commission to make major decisions on postal cuts, including reducing mail delivery to five days a week. They said that if Congress opted to delay or prevent the closing of mail processing centers, lawmakresidents on the other side of the state whose post office is slated to close.

The tiny eastern Montana town of Ingomar, surrounded by arid farmland and range grass, was in decline even before the railroad through here was abandoned in 1980. But locals say losing its post office would be especially hard.

The postmaster general's trip to Montana was spurred by Senate Finance Committee Chairman Max Baucus, D-Mont., who was met by a group of concerned residents when he passed through the town last year. He promised to bring Donahoe back to answer their questions personally.

Baucus said he is going to use his influential budgetdrafting position to push ideas like Rhodes' proposal to close urban post offices. Baucus said there are 50 post offices within a five-mile radius of the U.S. Capitol.

"It just seems to me if we close post offices, those are the folks who can go one mile or two miles extra;" Baucus

The Postal Service projects its loss this year could be over \$14 billion, and without changes could rise to over \$21 billion by 2016.

"We cannot allow political interests to trump our responsibility to restore the Postal Service to solvency and protect the taxpayer from picking up the tab for surplus facilities;" said Rep. Darrell Issa, chairman of the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee and a sponsor of the House bill.



Prosecutors: Zimmerman Ignored Warning to Back Off

SANFORD, Fla. (AP) • After weeks in hiding, George Zimmerman made his first appearance Thursday in the shooting of 17-year-old Trayvon Martin, and prosecutors outlined their murder case in court papers, saying the neighborhood watch volunteer followed and confronted the black teenager after police dispatchers told him to back

The brief outline, contained in an affidavit filed in support of the second-degree murder charges, appeared to contradict Zimmerman's claim that Martin attacked him after he had turned away and was returning to his vehi-

In the affidavit, prosecutors also said that Martin's mother identified cries for help heard in the background of a 911 call as her son's. There had been some question as to whether Martin or Zimmerman was the one calling out.

The account of the shooting was released as Zimmerman, 28, appeared at a fourminute hearing in a jailhouse courtroom, setting in motion what could be a long, drawnout process, or an abrupt and disappointingly short one for many of the Martin family's supporters because of the strong legal protections contained in Florida's "stand your ground" law on self-defense.

North Korea Fires Long-range Rocket

PYONGYANG, North Korea • North Korea's much-anticipated rocket launch ended quickly in failure early Friday, splintering into pieces over the Yellow Sea soon after takeoff, according to South Korean and U.S. officials.

There was silence on the launch from officials in Pyongyang, which proceeded despite protests from the U.S., South Korea and other countries that called the

launch a cover for a test of missile technology. North Korea said the rocket was part of a peaceful effort to send a satellite into space to the commemorate the anniversary of its founder's birth.

In response to the launch, Washington announced it was suspending plans to contribute food aid to the North in exchange for a rollback of its nuclear pro-

Hasn't Worked? Obama Stands Up for Romney's Wife

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Mommy Wars in the middle of the 2012 presidential race?

Ann Romney fought back Thursday after a Democratic consultant suggested she isn't qualified to discuss the economy because she "hasn't worked a day in her life." The White House, in instant damage-control mode, declared that no one there was saying such a thing. Michelle Obama tweeted her personal support of all mothers.

With women's votes expected to be crucial in November, the remark by consultant Hilary Rosen ignited an immediate uproar: attacks by Mitt Romney's Republican campaign along with the disavowals from President Barack Obama's allies.

Ann Romney, the Republican presidential contender's wife, made her Twitter debut on Thursday in response to the contention she'd never worked: "I made a choice to stay home and raise five boys. Believe me, it was hard work."

The consultant apologized later, on TV.

Romney Courts Gun-rights Group in Presidential Bid

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) • Running for the Senate in Massachusetts, Mitt Romney once assured voters in a state with strong gun-control laws: "I don't line up with the NRA." Now the likely Republican presidential nominee, Romney will headline the National Rifle Association's annual convention Friday and assure tens of thousands of gun-rights activists that he's squarely on their side.

Coming just days after rival Rick Santorum dropped out of the nomination race, the NRA convention in St. Louis provides Romney an opportunity to shore up his credentials with an important conservative constituency that badly wants to oust Democratic President Barack Obama.

Romney leads a list of prominent Republicans including Santorum, Newt Gingrich, House Majority Leader Eric Cantor and Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker - who are scheduled to address more than 65,000 convention registrants during a session billed as a "celebration of American values." Although Obama has virtually ignored gun issues during his term, the NRA considers him a foe and plans to mount an aggressive effort against him.

Skittles Join Food Brands at Center of Tragedy

NEW YORK (AP) • It could've been Starbursts, Twizzlers or Sour Patch Kids. But when Trayvon Martin was fatally shot, he happened to be carrying a bag of Skittles.

The 17-year-old's death at the hands of a neighborhood watchman in February ignited nationwide protests and heated debate about racial profiling and "Stand Your

Ground" laws. For Mars Inc., the privately held company that owns Skittles, the tragedy presents another, more surreal dimension. Protestors carried bags of the chewy fruit-flavored candy while marching for the arrest of shooter George Zimmerman. Mourners pinned the bright red wrappers to their hooded sweatshirts at memorial services.

On eBay, vendors sell \$10 T-shirts with the words "Justice for Trayvon Martin" printed over a cartoon-like rainbow of pouring Skittles.

Wm. Wrigley Jr. Company — the unit of Mars that owns Skittles - issued only a brief statement offering condolences to Martin's friends and family, adding that it would be inappropriate to comment further "as we would never wish for our actions to be perceived as an attempt of commercial gain."

Court: Managers Don't Have to Ensure Lunch Breaks

SAN FRANCISCO • In a case that affects thousands of businesses and millions of workers, the California Supreme Court ruled Thursday that employers are under no obligation to ensure that workers take legally mandated lunch breaks.

The unanimous opinion came after workers' attorneys argued that abuses are routine and widespread when companies aren't required to issue direct orders to take the breaks. They claimed employers take advantage of workers who don't want to leave colleagues during busy times.

The case was initially filed nine years ago against Dallas-based Brinker International, the parent company of Chili's and other eateries, by restaurant workers complaining of missed breaks in violation of California labor law.

But the high court sided with businesses when it ruled that requiring companies to order breaks is unmanageable and those decisions should be left to workers. The decision provided clarity that businesses had sought regarding the law.

The opinion written by Associate Justice Kathryn Werdegar explained that state law does not compel an employer to ensure employees cease all work during meal periods. Instead, an employee is at liberty to use the time as they choose, she wrote.

"The employer is not obligated to police meal breaks and ensure no work thereafter is performed," Werdegar

Tracee Lorens, lead attorney for the plaintiffs, said she believed the court's decision still allowed some wiggle room for the case to get class-action certification.

Wholesale Prices Were Unchanged Last Month

WASHINGTON (AP) • U.S. wholesale prices were flat in March after a drop in energy prices offset rising costs for food and pickup trucks. The figures suggest that modest growth isn't spurring inflation.

The Labor Department says the producer price index, which measures prices changes before they reach the consumer, was unchanged. Excluding volatile food and gas costs, the so-called "core" index rose 0.3 percent.


Wholesale gas prices fell 2 percent, even though gas prices rose for most Americans. That was largely because of seasonal factors.

Costlier pickup trucks caused more than one-third of the rise in core prices. Food prices rose 0.2 percent.

Rate on 30-year mortgage falls near its all-time low • The average rate on the 30-year fixed mortgage dropped near its all-time low this week, making home-buying and refinancing a bargain for those who can qualify. Mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday that the rate on the 30-year loan fell to 3.88 percent from 3.98 percent. That's just above the rate of 3.87 percent reached in February, the lowest since long-term mortgages began in the 1950s. The 15-year mortgage, a popular option for refinancing, plunged to a fresh low of 3.11 percent from 3.21 percent last week. The previous record of 3.13 percent was hit last month.

More Americans Apply for Unemployment Aid

More people sought unemployment benefits last week, pushing the number of applicants to the highest level in two months.

WASHINGTON • More people sought unemployment benefits last week, suggesting that the job market's recovery remains slow.

The increase also likely reflects some seasonal volatility because applications for unemployment aid frequently rise around the Easter holiday. Many school employees are temporarily laid off during spring breaks

and can file for benefits. Weekly unemployment benefit applications jumped 13,000 to a seasonally adjusted 380,000, the Labor Department said Thursday. The previous week's figures were also revised higher. The four-week average, a less

volatile gauge, rose to 368,500. After steadily declining since last fall, applications have leveled off in recent weeks. The four-week average is essentially unchanged over the past two months.

The increase "doesn't ring any alarm bells," said Ryan Sweet, an economist at Moody's Analytics. "Applications can be choppy."

But the trend bears watching, he "If claims continue to climb, it

would be strong evidence that the job market is weakening," Sweet added. When applications fall below

375,000, it generally suggests that hiring will be strong enough to lower the unemployment rate.

The figures come after a disappointing employment report last week that showed that employers added only 120,000 jobs in March, half the average pace in the preceding three months. But many economists downplayed the weak March figures, noting that a warmer winter may have led to some earlier hiring in January and February.

The economy has added an average of 212,000 jobs per month in the January-March quarter, well ahead of last year's pace. And the unemployment rate has fallen from 9.1 percent in August to 8.2 percent in March. One factor is that some people have given up looking for work. People who are out of work but not looking for jobs aren't counted as unemploved.

Moody's Analytics expects job gains to average around 175,000 a month for the rest of the year and for the unemployment rate to fall just below 8 percent by year's end.

Federal tax returns are due Tuesday this year, since April 15 falls on a Sunday and Monday is Emancipation Day, a legal holiday in Washington, D.C.

State tax returns are due Monday. Postal customers are encouraged to mail their returns early in the day. Those who want certification that their tax forms are received by the IRS should use Certified Mail Service.

Consumer Agency Softens Fee Limit

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Obama administration's consumer financial watchdog agency is backing off a plan to limit big upfront fees on credit cards, a move that could hit borrowers with poor credit histories espe-

The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau acknowledged Thursday that its proposal would increase costs for some cardholders and allow banks to charge more in fees.

The CFPB was set up after the financial crisis to protect consumers from loans and cards with hidden fees or other traps. Thursday's decision shows the difficult line the young agency must walk, allowing banks to make enough money so that they can continue to offer loans and cards while protecting consumers from fees that it considers abusive or deceptive.

Bill Bartmann, a financial lawyer and debt-collection executive who generally supports the agency, called it "strategic thinking" on the part of Richard Cordray, the agency's direc-

"He's picking battles, and it's unrealistic to think you can win them all," said Bartmann, who publishes a widely read newsletter on financial regulation.

Fee limits are of particular concern to borrowers with weak credit, including so-called subprime borrowers, and the companies that seek to lend to them.

Md. Passes Measure to Address Child **Identity Theft**

ANNAPOLIS, (AP) • Maryland lawmakers have approved a first-of-its-kind measure to enable parents to protect their children from having their credit damaged by identity theft.

The measure, which a spokeswoman for Gov. Martin O'Malley says he is likely to sign, will allow parents to take the step of freezing their child's credit at any time.

Supporters hope it will be a model for other states to protect not only children, but also disabled and elderly people.

J.K. ROWLING'S NEXT BOOK: 'THE CASUAL VACANCY'

LONDON • It may lack wizards and witches, but J.K. Rowling and her publisher are hoping her first novel for adults, "The Casual Vacancy;" will have the magic touch.

The book's title was announced Thursday by Little, Brown & Co. along with a brief plot synopsis and publication date.

The publisher said the "blackly comic" tale of rivalry and duplicity in a small English town would be available worldwide on Sept. 27.

The book will be Rowling's first post-Potter effort. Her seven-volume saga about the adventures of a boy wizard became one of the most successful fictional series in history and led to a series of extremely

popular films. The new book, aimed at a grown-up audience, will be set in a seemingly idyllic English town called Pagford which is described as far more menacing than its pretty facade would indicate.

It opens with the sudden death of a popular man whose unexpected demise shocks the town. The battle for his seat on the local council sets off "the biggest war the town has yet seen," with rich people fighting poor, parents battling their teenagers, and wives in conflict with their husbands.

The publisher said the 480-page novel will be sold as an e-book and audio download as well as in traditional hardback form.

The seven Harry Potter novels have sold 450 million copies and have been translated into 74 languages.

Rowling's final Potter offering, "Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows," was published in 2007. She published a short Potter spin-off collection of stories, "The Tales Of Beedle The Bard," in 2008.

Rowling said earlier this year she wanted to reach an adult audience, but kept the book's name and publication date secret until Thursday.

Students could enter up to five pieces each, and Popovic said there's a good display of each category, though you'll see more drawings and paintings than other forms of art.

Adults can enjoy Mosquito Bloody Marys, Citronella Coolers and all kinds of buggy snacks as they peruse the 10th Annual Bug Zoo, said Stephanie McCord, who is organizing the creepycrawly affair for the garden.

And the Bug Zoo this year will feature a booth of insects and flies that will be of interest to fly-fishing aficionados, said Kathryn Goldman, the garden's executive director.

But the main fun, of course, is for the kids.

The Bug Zoo Festival will be 1-4 p.m. on April 22 — Earth Day.



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Titanic's Sinking: Was It More Than **Human Folly?**

WASHINGTON • After an entire century that included two high-profile government investigations and countless books and movies, we're still debating what really caused the Titanic to hit an iceberg and sink on that crystal-clear chilly night.

Maybe there's more to blame than human folly and hubris. Maybe we can fault freak atmospheric conditions that caused a mirage or an even rarer astronomical event that sent icebergs into shipping lanes. Those are two of the newer theories being proposed by a Titanic author and a team of astronomers.

But the effort to find natural causes that could have contributed to the sinking may also be a quest for an excuse - anything to avoid gazing critically into a mirror, say disaster experts and Titanic historians.

New theories and research are important "but at its most basic what happened is they failed to heed warnings and they hit the iceberg because they were going too fast," said James Delgado, director of maritime heritage at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

With this week's 100th anniversary of Titanic's sinking, the interest in all things Titanic is steaming faster than the doomed cruise ship on its maiden

One of the novel new theories says Titanic could have been the victim of a mirage that is similar to what people see in the desert. It's the brainchild of Tim Maltin, a historian who has written three books about Titanic. The latest, an e-book titled "A Very Deceiving Night" emphasizes how the atmosphere may have tricked the Titanic crew on a cloudless night.

"This was not avoidable human error," Maltin said in a telephone interview from London. "It's just about air density differ-

It was a beautiful clear night and for a couple of days, there had been something strange going on in the air over the North Atlantic, reported by all sorts of ships, including the crew on Titanic, Maltin said.

The unusually cold sea air caused light to bend abnormally downward, Maltin said. The Titanic's first officer, William Mc-Master Murdoch, saw what he described as a "haze on the horizon, and that iceberg came right out of the haze," Maltin said, quoting from the surviving second officer's testimony.

Other ships, including those rescuing survivors, reported similar strange visuals and had trouble navigating around the icebergs,

British meteorologists later monitored the site for those freaky thermal inversions and said 60 percent of the time they checked, the inversions were present, Maltin said.

The same inversions could have made the Titanic's rescue rockets appear lower in the sky, giving a rescue ship the impression that the Titanic was smaller and farther away, Maltin said.

Physicists Donald Olson and Russell Doescher at Texas State University have another theory in Sky &Telescope magazine that fits nicely with Maltin's. Olson - who often comes up with astronomical quirks linked to historical events - said that a few months earlier, the moon, sun and Earth lined up in a way that added extra pull on Earth's tides. The Earth was closer to the moon than it had been in 1,400 years.

They based their work on historical and astronomical records and research in 1978 by a federal expert in tides.

The unusual tides caused glaciers to calve icebergs off Greenland. Those southbound icebergs got stuck near Labrador and Newfoundland but then slowly moved south again, floating into the shipping currents just in time to greet the Titanic, the astronomers theorized. Maltin said the icebergs also added a snaking river of super-cold water that magnified the mirage

Tides and mirages may have happened, but blaming them for Titanic's sinking "misses the boat," said Lee Clarke, a Rutgers University disaster expert and author of the book "Worst

"The basic facts of Titanic are not in dispute: The boat was going too fast dangerous waters, Clarke said. If Titanic had stopped for the night because of ice like the British steamship Californian did, "tides and mirages wouldn't have mattered."

On April 14, the day it hit the iceberg, the Titanic received seven heavy ice warnings, including one from the Californian less than an hour before the fateful collision. The message said: "We are stopped and surrounded by ice." Titanic sent back a message that said "Shut up. We are busy."

Peruvian Miners Tell of Anguish, Hope Inside Mine

YAUCA DEL ROSARIO, Peru • Peruvian miners trapped for six days in an abandoned copper mine prayed and wept during moments of intense anguish, then told each other jokes and even danced to hold onto hope before they finally walked free Wednesday.

The miners, ranging in age from 23 to 58, walked out without assistance about an hour after dawn from a reinforced tunnel that rescuers had built as they removed more than 26 feet of dirt and

"On the second day, we were saying that they weren't going to get us out, that we were going to die in there;" said Santiago Tapia, 21, the youngest of the miners. Tapia spoke with The Associated Press at the Social Security Hospital in Ica, where all the miners were taken to recover from dehydration.

"Inside, we prayed, we cried. We also cried with our relatives outside who were desperate," said Tapia, the father of a 2-year-old daughter.

Other moments were lighter. "We conversed, we told each other jokes, talked about our lives, things that had happened to us," Tapia said. "We also talked about politics, a bit of everything. We made ourselves laugh so we wouldn't feel bad inside there."

The miners wore sunglasses and were covered with blankets when they walked free. President Ollanta Humala was there to greet them after spending the night at the mine 150 miles southeast of the capital of Lima.

The miners were trapped by a cavein triggered by an explosion they themselves had set.

They had communicated with rescuers through a hose, in place before the collapse, by which they also received food and medicine during their ordeal in a horizontal shaft dug into a moun-

It became their lifeline. "Thanks to that hose we are now still alive," Tapia

"It's pretty ugly inside," said fellow miner Edwin Bellido. "We slept on the ground on muddy plastic."

On the first day, miners grew desper-

ate when one of their companions became ill, Bellido said.

But he said the miners kept their spirits up, including by singing and running in the 160-foot-long tunnel. They even danced "to pass the time;" Bellido said.

The Cabeza de Negro mine that they were working had been abandoned in

Humala said the incident points up the dangers of working in such mines in Peru, labor in which tens of thousands are engaged. He said he had given instructions for Cabeza de Negro to be sealed definitively.

The rescue drew some comparisons to the 69-day ordeal of 33 Chilean miners trapped more than 2,000 feet underground in 2010 near the Chilean city of Copiapo.

The Peru rescue was not by any measure a comparable engineering feat because the miners were not similarly trapped deep beneath the earth. Neither heavy equipment nor drilling was required to extract them. Rescuers relied primarily on shovels, pick axes and wheelbarrows.

Two U.S. Marines Killed, 2 Injured in Morocco

RABAT, Morocco • Two U.S. Marines were killed and two severely injured in the crash of a hybrid aircraft Wednesday in Morocco, officials said.

The Marines were taking part in joint U.S.-Moroccan military excercises located in the south of the country based in Agadir, said U.S. Embassy spokesman Rodney Ford in Rabat, who gave

Capt. Kevin Schultz, a Ma-

rine spokesman at the Pentagon in Washington, confirmed that the aircraft involved was an MV-22 Osprey, which takes off and lands like a helicopter and flies like an airplane. The aircraft was participating in a U.S.-Moroccan military exercise known as "African Lion."

The Osprey was flying from the amphibious assault ship USS Iwo Jima, a defense official said, speaking on condition of anonymity because the matter is in the early stages of investigation.

The annual exercise which began in 2008 runs from April 7 to 18 and involves 1,000 U.S. Marines and 200 soldiers, sailors and airmen. They were working with some 900 Moroccan soldiers.

According to the U.S. Marine website, the exercise involved "everything from combined arms fire and maneuver ranges, aerial refueling and deliveries of supplies, to command post and nonlethal weapons training?"

The main unit involved in the exercise is the 14th

Marines, a reserve artillery regiment based in Fort Worth, Texas, but also includes members of the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit based in Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

The goal of the exercise is to train the two countries' forces to work together.

Further information about the crash was being withheld until the next of kin of the killed and injured Marines were notified, said Rodney Ford, spokesman of the U.S. Embassy in Rabat.

Argentine 'Miracle' Baby Improving after Being Found Alive in Morgue

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) • A mother in Argentina says she fell to her knees in shock after finding her baby alive in a coffin in the morgue nearly 12 hours after the girl had been declared

Analia Bouter named her newborn Luz Milagros, or "Miracle Light." The tiny girl, born three months premature, was in critical condition but was improving Wednesday in the same hospital where the staff pronounced her stillborn on April 3.

The case became public Tuesday when Rafael Sabatinelli, the deputy health minister in the northern province of Chaco, announced in a news conference that five medical professionals involved have been suspended pending an official investigation.

Bouter told the TeleNoticias TV channel in an interview Tuesday night that doctors gave her the death certificate just 20 minutes after the baby was born, and that she still hasn't received a birth certificate for her tiny girl.

Bouter said the baby was quickly put in a coffin and taken to the morgue's refrigeration room. Twelve hours passed before she and her husband were able to open the coffin to say their last good-

She said that's when the baby trembled. She thought it was her imagination — then she realized the little girl was alive and dropped to her knees on the morgue floor in shock. A morgue worker quickly picked up

the girl and confirmed she was alive. Then, Bouter's brother grabbed the baby and ran to the hospital's neonatal intensive care unit, shouting for the doctors. The baby was so cold, Bouter said, that "it was like carrying a bottle of ice."

A week later, the baby is improving. Bouter said she still has many unanswered questions about what happened. She said she had given birth normally to four other children and doesn't understand why doctors gave her general anesthesia this time. She said she also doesn't know why she wasn't allowed to see her baby before it was put into a coffin.

She said she had to insist on going to the morgue's refrigeration room, where she brought a cell phone to take a picture of the newborn for the funeral. Her husband struggled to open the lid, and then stepped aside to let her see inside.

"I moved the coverings aside and saw the tiny hand, with all five fingers, and I touched her hand and then uncovered her face," she said in the TeleNoticias



interview. "That's where I heard a tiny little cry. I told myself I was imagining it - it was my imagination. And then I stepped back and saw her waking up. It was as if she was saying 'Mama, you came for me!

"That was when I fell to my knees. My husband didn't know what to do. We were just crying and I laughed and cried, cries and laughter. We must have seemed crazy."

She says the family plans to sue the staff at Hospital Perrando in the city of Resistencia for malpractice, and still wants answers. But they've been focused for now on their little girl, whom she described as amazingly healthy despite being born after just 26 weeks of gestation. So far, she hasn't needed oxygen or other support commonly provided to preemies, she said.

Ahmed Ben Bella, Algeria's First President, Dies at 95

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) • Ahmed Ben Bella, Algeria's first president and a historic leader of its bloody independence struggle from France, died at his family home in Algiers on Wednesday. He was 95.

Family members and the state news agency did not give the cause of death, but twice in the last month Ben Bella had been treated at the military hospital of Ain Naadja for discomfort. The charismatic Ben Bella,

a symbol of pan-Arabist ideology as well as the global anti-colonial movement, was president of Algeria from 1963 until he was overthrown in a military coup in 1965 by the army chief of staff, Col. Houari Boumedienne.

Ben Bella was under house arrest until 1980, and he went into self exile in Switzerland until returning to the country in 1990 as part of the opposition to the ruling political party he helped found.

A giant of Algeria's independence struggle and the country's first few years, he played only a symbolic role in the latter years of his life,

Movement for the Democracy in Algeria Party, which competed in the aborted 1991 elections, winning just 2 percent of the vote.

His party was banned in 1997, but he continued to live in Algeria, often condemning government policies. He was present when the current president, Abdelaziz Bouteflika, was sworn in for his third term in April 2009.

Two years earlier, Ben Bella became head of the African Union's "Group of Elders."

Aside from Bouteflika, Ben Bella was the country's sole civilian leader and was followed by a string of generals.

One of the six "historic leaders" of Algeria's revolt against French colonial rule, Ben Bella spent 23 years of his life in French and Algerian prisons.

Through most of the eightyear war of independence, Ben Bella was held in a French fortress. His liberation was one of the main Algerian demands in the drawn-out peace talks that led to the 1962 Evian agreements for Algeria's independence.

Elected president of the newly-independent nation virtually without opposition, he enjoyed less than three

heading the opposition years of an extravagant and erratic leadership before being overthrown in an army coup and imprisoned by Boumedienne, then army

chief of staff. Until Boumedienne's death 13 years later, Ben Bella became a "non person" in Algeria. No public mention of his name was allowed in Algerian media – all state-controlled.

Even the official attacks on Ben Bella's allegedly "arbitrary and wasteful" regime avoided mentioning his name.

Boumedienne died in 1978. His pragmatic and moderate successor, Chadli Bendjedid, freed Ben Bella from more than a decade of detention without trial, ultimately allowing him to go abroad with his wife Zora and their two adopted daughters.

It was Ben Bella's misfortune that he was very much a product of the colonial regime that France imposed on Algeria for 130 years. He spoke better French than Arabic, and the Arabic he spoke was colloquial rather than literary.

As a result, he had difficulty conversing with the leaders of other Arab nations. His often rousing and emotion-charged speeches as president were delivered in Algerian Arabic

which few citizens of other Arab nations fully understand and when he wanted to stress a particular argument, he broke into French.

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Vegetable gardens require special soil and care for edible plants to grow and thrive. This type of garden differs from a standard garden in that vegetable plants thrive in high-quality topsoil. Areas near home sites often have very little topsoil to provide nutrients for a garden. You'll need to create the perfect environment for your vegetable garden by adding components to the soil. Preparing soil for your vegetable garden will improve your crop yield.

Prepare your vegetable garden soil the year before you plant your garden. Preparing soil early allows for nutrients and additives to breakdown by decomposition to blend with existing soil. This early soil preparation will increase your chances of having a high-yield crop of vegetables.

Remove all weeds, dead plants and any remaining vegetable plants from the previous growing season. Dispose of these plants completely. Leaving old plants to die over the winter encourages bugs and diseases that can affect soil quality and quickly negate your efforts to improve the topsoil.

Step 3 Evaluate the condition of your soil by taking a sample to the garden center for analysis. This simple test will tell you whether you have porous soil that drains well or clay-filled soil that doesn't encourage water flow.

Step 4

Turn over the top 12 inches of garden soil. This job becomes measurably easier with a rototiller. These stiff-bladed gas tillers make quick work of any garden plot. Tillers can be bought at home improvement stores or borrowed from rental companies. You'll save considerable time and backache.

Add some type of organic matter to the turned-over soil. Manure, compost or humus should be worked into the top 6 inches of soil. Remember that organic matter requires time to break down. It may take a year or two before you see the optimum soil for growing your garden. However, you'll get a nice head start by preparing the soil at least 2 seasons before actual planting.

Step 6

Add bags of topsoil to your garden. The additions of organic material will create good topsoil eventually, but it requires time for additives to break down. Purchase topsoil specifically for vegetable gardens since this soil has a very low weed content.

He was hired last November to pick up the pieces of an Ohio State program which has suffered through player suspensions and departures, NCAA sanctions and the forced resignation of coach Jim Tressel due to a memorabiliafor-money scandal.

The Buckeyes, who were 6-7 a year ago and lost their last four games including, ironically, the Gator Bowl to Florida, are on NCAA probation and have been banned from playing in a bowl game after the 2012 season.

Meyer said he had talked to several former Florida players and coaches who were upset by the Sporting News story.

The story cited multiple sources who confirmed that during the 2008 season Harvin, now a member of the NFL's Minnesota Vikings, physically attacked Florida wide receivers coach Billy Gonzales, grabbing him by the neck and throwing him to the ground. It said that after Harvin was pulled off Gonzales by two assistant coaches, he was never disciplined.

Gonzales, now an offensive coordinator at Illinois, issued a statement earlier on Wednesday.

"In response to a recent story alleging an incident between Percy Harvin and me and while at Florida, the story is inaccurate," he said in the statement. "It didn't happen."

Meyer said he and his staff met or exceeded all standards in terms of graduation rate, wins, abiding by NCAA rules and recruiting quality players.

The story had said there was a "circle of trust" which enabled and pandered to elite players. Meyer denied it on Wednesday.

Asked if he disagreed in particular with a certain contention in the story, Meyer said, "Oh, more than one."

He seemed particularly upset by the inference that he and his staff had flaunted NCAA bylaws.

"I want to say this real clear: There is no violation that we had as far as that whole conversation," Meyer said. "I'm not sure why that keeps coming up. So, if you would bold that for me, underline it there is not an NCAA violation."

"I choose to be a Bruin," Muhammad said. "So I'll be at UCLA next year."

Though he very well could spend the next four years in school, he tellingly made no commitment beyond that.

Noel chose Kentucky, which was no surprise if you knew he had the team's logo shaved into his head prior to making his announcement. Wildcats coach John Calipari has perfected the oneand-done system — now known as won-and-done that everyone has played by since 2005.

But really, if a kid is truly serious about getting an education, he should commit to a school for a minimum of three years — just like they do in college baseball. If he wants to go to the NBA, the door should be open as soon as he picks up his high school diploma.

Don't count on any changes, though.

For everyone beyond the kids, the status quo is working out just fine.

NBA Commissioner David Stern actually wants to increase the age limit from 19 to 20, ensuring a player has to spend two years in college whether he wants to or not – development time that would further reduce the chance of a team making a huge mistake on draft day (see: Kwame Brown) and delaying a player's progression to the really big money beyond entry level contracts.

"This is a not a social program. This is a business rule for us," Stern

ing a lot more forthrightness than the NCAA ever does. "We would like a year to look at them and I think it's been interesting to see how the players do against first-class competition in the NCAAs and then teams have the ability to judge and make judgments, because high-ranking draft picks are very, very valuable."

The colleges would certainly go along with a two-and-done proposal to ensure themselves of an additional year of free labor from the best players, undoubtedly boosting their own bottom line even if it did force them to pay a bit more attention to that whole academics thing. As it stands now, the top recruits barely have to find their way to class, needing only to maintain grades for one semester to get through their required season.

Even for an educational system that long ago sold its soul, this is perhaps the greatest farce of all, trying to pass off the oneand-doners as actual student athletes. Many of the leading

prospects already leave home while in high school, going off to play for elite prep schools that travel the country playing games, just like they do in college. Those experiences - combined with opportunities to hone their games in sophisticated AAU programs certainly raise questions about how much a player really benefits from a single season at a university.

Sure, Brown was a colossal bust after going straight from high school to the NBA as the top overall pick in 2001. But what about LeBron James? And Dwight Howard? And Kobe Bryant? They all took the same route, and it seems to have worked out just





Cora, Marlins Back Guillen as Suspension Begins

PHILADELPHIA • Nearly all the Miami Marlins rushed over to the dugout railing and playfully pretended to listen when Joey Cora sat down to speak about filling in for suspended manager Ozzie Guillen.

Shortly after Guillen addressed the team in the clubhouse Wednesday and apologized for saying he admired Fidel Castro, it was business as usual for the players.

To a man, they had his

"It's really a hard time for him and his family," closer Heath Bell said. "We felt bad for him. You have to understand that occasionally guys make mistakes. At least he's owning up to it and not trying to hide or shy away from it. He's going to try and make up for his mistakes.

"He can only be a better person out of it. Like he said, if he doesn't learn from this, he's stupid. That's what he

Guillen's comments led to his five-game suspension that started when Miami played the Phillies in the second game of a three-game series. The Marlins, who opened a new ballpark last week and added several marquee free agents over the winter, are off to a 2-3 start.

A day after a contrite Guillen held an hourlong news conference in Miami, he talked to the team for less than 10 minutes and ex-

pressed similar emotions. "There's nothing he needs to apologize to us about," reliever Mike Dunn said. "He's our manager and we back

him 100 percent."

The Marlins conclude the series with Philadelphia on Thursday, before returning home to play Houston on Friday.

Guillen's praise of the Cuban dictator in an interview with Time magazine outraged the Cuban-American community in Miami and led some politicians to call for his dismissal.

"This one was big and he felt it from the beginning," said Cora, a close friend of Guillen who's been coaching under him since 2004 with the Chicago White Sox. "He

got shaken, he felt it. After he analyzed what happened, in retrospect, he wouldn't have said what he said. He apologized and it came from the heart and hopefully he makes amends with the communi-

ty. "He will."

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Cora has filled in for Guillen before, though never under these circumstances. He said he planned to manage games the way Guillen would and was certain play-

ers wouldn't be affected. Things weren't quite the

same for him, of course. "I've never had this many people try to get me to talk," Cora joked. "You guys know me. I don't talk. I barely say

Records: Petrino, Mistress in Frequent Contact

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. • Former Arkansas coach Bobby Petrino and his mistress were in frequent contact over the past six months, sometimes calling or texting each other dozens of times in a single day - including game days, according to a review of his business cellphone records by The Associated

One of those calls included the very moment when the state police report that led to the end of Petrino's Arkansas career was released.

Petrino was fired Tuesday night for failing to disclose his relationship with Jessica Dorrell, a 25-yearold former Razorbacks volleyball player he hired last month without disclosing his conflict of interest or the fact he had once paid her \$20,000. Athletic director Jeff Long said he had determined their relationship had been ongoing for a "significant" amount of time, but he did not say for how long.

Records obtained by The Associated Press through a Freedom of Information Act request clearly show Petrino remained in close contact with Dorrell following the April 1 motorcycle accident in which Petrino suffered four broken ribs, a cracked neck vertebra and scrapes and bruises.

That day, Petrino and Dorrell went for a motorcycle ride on a two-lane highway southeast of Fayetteville and skidded off the road. Petrino and Dorrell talked for 16 minutes earlier that day before the crash at 6:45 p.m., and they also had a 22-minute conversation the following day while Petrino was still in the hospital recovering.

Petrino's accident report was disclosed by state police on April 5, and the two talked 11 times that day. That included a pair of 2-minute calls around 3:30 p.m. that afternoon, which is when police released the report.

Later that evening, Petrino exchanged four calls with his agent, Russ Campbell, totaling 10 minutes.

The cellphone records show Petrino and Dorrell were in close contact at least as far back as Sept. 12. The university provided nearly seven months of Petrino's business cellphone records, and that is the first date listed. Among the findings:

Petrino, a married father of four, exchanged 91 texts with Dorrell on Sept. 13 and 84 texts with her over five hours on Oct. 28, the day before a game at Vanderbilt. On Oct. 17, the two swapped 73 text messages, and on four days in a row in the week before a loss to eventual national champion Alabama, Petrino called Dorrell early - at 5:52 a.m., 6:35 a.m., 5:49 a.m. and 7:55 a.m.

The day Arkansas beat Troy, the two exchanged 70 texts. They exchanged 26 texts the day Arkansas beat Mississippi State and four following the Razorbacks' loss to LSU on Nov. 25.

You continue with the club seven to dummy's king, noting with interest that East follows with the jack. How do you think the clubs lie after this fall of the cards?

East will produce two middle cards on the first two rounds when he holds J-10-9, J-10, J-9 or 10-9. So, the odds are approximately 3-1 in favor of East's holding only two clubs. What is more, you are prepared for a finesse against West's 10 after your thoughtful unblock of the eight and seven!

You take your second heart finesse and lead the club three to dummy's six. You then play the club queen and finesse a third time in hearts. Contract made.

For an extra wrinkle, if you play Texas transfers (four diamonds and four hearts show six-card heart and spade suits), a fourspade call can be used to show a balanced invitation with both four-card minors — in other words, exactly this hand. So a direct four-no-trump response will suggest a very flat hand.

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

The Idaho Housing and Finance Association ("IHFA") is implementing a new installment of its Mortgage Credit Certificate Program under Section 25 of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"). A Mortgage Credit Certificate ("MCC") reduces the amount of Federal income tax a qualified home buyer pays by providing a tax credit. Consequently, the home buyer has more disposable income to make loan payments. After all other credits and deductions are taken into account, the value of the MCC is applied directly to the home buyer's remaining Federal tax liability. The amount of the credit may not exceed a taxpayer's total tax liability for a specific year, however, any excess credit may be carried forward to a subsequent tax year for up to three years.

IHFA continues to issue MCCs under its current program. Additional issuance of MCCs under this new installment of its MCC program is expected to begin in mid July, 2012 for mortgage loans made at that time. MCCs will be made available to eligible home buyers on a first-come, first-served basis and may be used to purchase newly constructed housing, existing housing, or manufactured housing on owner occupied lots. An MCC cannot be issued to a home buyer who is refinancing an existing mortgage.

twenty five percent (25%) of the yearly interest paid on a qualified mortgage with an annual credit maximum of \$2,000 for the eligible borrower. At least 20% of the amount issued is reserved for MCC's for mortgage loans on single family residences located in targeted counties. A list of targeted counties is available at IdaMortgage.com.

Present IHFA and Federal regulations require borrowers to meet the certain requirements to be eligible for an MCC including the following, unless IHFA is advised that less restrictive limits can legally be authorized:

The borrower must be a first-time home owner, except in the 27 targeted counties. A first-time home owner is defined as a household that has not owned a principal residence for a period of three (3) years prior to the date of executing the MCCassisted mortgage loan.

2. A borrower with a family of three or more persons must have an annual gross income not exceeding 115% of the applicable area median family income, while a borrower with a family of one or two persons must have an annual gross income not exceeding 100% of the applicable area median family income, except that higher family income limits may be adopted for targeted counties. A list of the current income limits is available at IdaMortgage.com.

3. The borrower must purchase a single family residence, in

Idaho, and occupy the housing unit as a principal residence. 4. The borrower must purchase a single family residence with an acquisition cost which does not exceed 90% of the average area purchase price applicable to such residence, except that the acquisition cost may be 110% of the average area purchase price in targeted counties. A list of these purchase price limits

can be found at IdaMortgage.com.. 5. The borrower must acquire a new mortgage or home loan and meet the credit and underwriting criteria established by the participating lender who provides the mortgage loan. Refinancing of an existing mortgage or land contract is not permissible

The eligibility requirements will not exceed, but may be lower than, the most recently published figures for applicable area median family income and average area purchase price which have been published by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Department of Treasury.

MCCs may be used in conjunction with any privately insured or

uninsured fixed rate or adjustable rate loan and such loans are expected to be purchased by IHFA from funds which are not derived from mortgage revenue bonds under Section 143 of the Code. A home buyer may make application for an MCC, through a participating lender or a participating mortgage broker, at the time of loan application. A list of such lenders and mortgage brokers will be available online at IdaMortgage.com. MCCs cannot be used with any mortgage loans supported by mortgage revenue bonds under Section 143 of the Code.

Banks, savings and loan associations, mortgage companies, and other approved financing institutions are invited to participate as lenders. Any lender who wishes to participate will be required to sign a Lender Agreement, which outlines the lender's review and reporting responsibilities. The proposed buried fiber optic cable route is from Stanley west along State Highway 21 to Forest Road (FR) 653 and then up Cow Lane (FR 682) about 4 miles. The buried line then switches to overhead on existing Salmon River Electric poles and ends at FR 621 near a commonly used Forest Service fire camp. Other buried fiber spurs include Iron Creek subdivision and a segment connecting the Stanley Museum and Salmon River Lodge within Stanley. No disruption of traffic is expected along the routes.



You can raise to two hearts in competition — that shows very little extra beyond four trumps. Today's Highlight:

On April 12, 1862, during the Civil War, Union volunteers led by James J. Andrews stole a Confederate locomotive near Marietta, Ga., and headed toward Chattanooga, Tenn., on a mission to sabotage as much of the rail line as they could; the raiders were caught, and eight of them, Andrews included, were executed as spies. (The raid inspired the 1926 Buster Keaton silent comedy "The General.")

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1811, fur traders employed by John Jacob Astor began building Fort Astoria in present-day Oregon.

In 1861, the American Civil War began as Confederate forces opened fire on Fort Sumter in South Carolina. (The Union troops holding the fort surrendered the following day.)

In 1877, the catcher's mask was first used in a baseball game by James Tyng of Harvard in a game against the Lynn Live Oaks.

In 1912, Clara Barton, the founder of the American Red Cross, died in Glen Echo, Md., at age 90. In 1934, "Tender Is the

Night," by F. Scott Fitzgerald, was first published in book form after being serialized in Scribner's Magazine.

In 1945, President Franklin D. Roosevelt died of a cerebral hemorrhage in Warm Springs, Ga., at age 63; he was succeeded by Vice President Harry S. Truman.

In 1955, the Salk vaccine against polio was declared safe and effective.

In 1961, Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin became the first man to fly in space, orbiting the earth once before making a safe landing.

In 1981, the space shuttle Columbia blasted off from Cape Canaveral on its first test flight. Former world heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis died in Las Vegas, Nev., at age 66.

In 1985, Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, became the first sitting member of Congress to fly in space as the shuttle Discovery lifted off.

Ten years ago: Boston's Cardinal Bernard Law ignored growing demands for his resignation because of sex abuse allegations against priests that began in his archdiocese and spread across the country. (Law ended up resigning in December 2002.) Secretary of State Colin Powell's trip to Middle East was marred by a suicide bombing in Jerusalem that claimed six victims; the White House put on hold Powell's meeting with Yasser Arafat scheduled for the next day (the meeting took place a day later). Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez resigned under pressure from the country's divided military (however, he was returned to office two days later).

Five years ago: A suicide bomber breached security in Iraq's parliament and blew himself up in the dining hall; a Sunni parliament member was killed. CBS fired Don Imus from his radio program for insulting the Rutgers women's basketball team on the air; in the evening, Imus met with team members at the New Jersey governor's mansion in Princeton (Gov. Jon S. Corzine, who was en route to that meeting, was seriously injured when his official vehicle crashed).

One year ago: Japan ranked its nuclear crisis at the highest possible severity on an international scale – the same level as the 1986 Chernobyl disaster – even as it insisted radiation leaks were declining at its tsunami-crippled nuclear plant. The state of Ohio executed two-time murderer Clarence Carter for beating and stomping to death a fellow jail inmate. Booming cannons, plaintive period music and hushed crowds ushered in the 150th anniversary of the start of the Civil War during morning ceremonies in Charleston, S.C.
