Two Square Off in T.F. County Sheriff's GOP Race

Seasoned law enforcement officers, Tom Carter and Jack Johnson, seek their party's nomination in an already hotly debated race.

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TWIN FALLS • Two seasoned lawmen are competing to become Republicans' pick to be Twin Falls County's sheriff come 2013.

Current Sheriff Tom Carter faces challenger Jack Johnson, the chief deputy at the Jerome County Sheriff's Office, for the GOP nomination during the May 15 primary election. The man who finds most favor with the county's Republican voters during the closed primary will face independent candidate Kelly Hassani, a senior investigator in Carter's office, during the November general election.

As sheriff, Carter said he has accomplished many of the goals he set for himself when he took office in 2009, but still has works in progress.

"When I took over, the sheriff's office was like an island," Carter said. "They didn't want other departments messing in their business."

N.Y. Transplant Survives Three Days in Idaho Wilds

Todd Peebler, a Type 1 diabetic, trudged nearly 20 miles through snow before he was found in Blaine County.

SUN VALLEY • A 31-year-old man got a rude introduction to his new home in the Wood River Valley last week, spending three days walking in snow up to his waist after his car became stuck in a snow bank near Trail Creek Summit.

Todd Peebler credits his miniature pinscher for saving his life by

sharing her body heat when he stuffed her under his T-shirt at night. During the days, he slogged through almost 20 miles of snow before he was discovered by a Sun Valley dog walker.

"There's no question I'm alive because of her," he said of Lola, his dog. "She weighs just 10 pounds, but that was enough."

Peebler, an insurance salesman from New York, was heading to his new job as a headhunter for

Elevate Recruiting Group in Ketchum when he turned his 2005 Audi A6 onto Trail Creek Road near Mackay at the instruction of his GPS unit.

The dirt road is closed at the top by snow in winter, but that didn't register with Peebler. A Type 1 diabetic, he estimates he had been drifting in and out of consciousness as he drove.

"My girlfriend had called about two hours earlier and said I sounded funny, so I tested my blood sugar, which was 69. I drank

Researcher Looks to Space for State Water Management

University of Idaho scientist Rick Allen is pulling for Congress to continue funding the satellites that track the lifeblood of the West.

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KIMBERLY • When Rick Allen was first asked to help research Idaho's water use, he turned to outer space.

It was an unusual move in 2000. Not too many other states were aware at the time that they could use satellite images to track the precious resource. But jump forward to today, and Allen's vision is now the foundation for managing water across the West.

Allen is a water resource engineer for the

University of Idaho's Kimberly Research and Extension Center. He's also known as the state's lead researcher on NASA's Landsat satellites. The devices are used to measure climate changes and water evaporation from irrigated agriculture.

Allen considers the satellite's images critical to fairly managing the state's limited water supply. But as he helps advise other western states on how to use the satellite information, he's facing resistance for funding future Landsat satellites from Congress.

"The downside to this technology is that it's

not cheap," Allen said. "It cost \$1 billion to research and build Landsat 8."

The satellites are designed to be in orbit for five years. This means that development on Landsat 9 must be immediately. And while scientists need \$125 million to cover the costs in 2013, Allen is uneasy if NASA and the rest of the research team are going to receive it.

There are currently two Landsat satellites in orbit, sending images back to earth every 16 days. The newest Landsat is set to launch next January.

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TWIN FALLS PUBLIC WORKS BUILDINGS IN DISREPAIR

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TWIN FALLS • In the Twin Falls Water Department garage, trucks are parked in a line, bumper to bumper, some with less than two inches between them. In the back, other trailers are shimmied in between poles.

It takes at least two people to successfully maneuver the vehicles into their tight parking spaces, and if someone needs a trailer or truck in the back, every-

thing in front has to come out.

The building, located on Wall Street, presents a problem that Jon Caton wants to solve. The public works director for Twin Falls hopes to persuade the City Council to fund a new complex that would eventually house much of the city's street, water and wastewater operations.

The facility, tentatively slotted for city-owned land near the Twin Falls Animal Shelter, would contain public works offices and storage facilities. There's no set

plan for the facility, said Twin Falls City Councilman Lance Clow, liaison for the city's public works departments. Rather, he imagines buildings being built in stages as the city finds available funds.

"Obviously, money is always the question," Clow said. Caton wants to find the money without raising rates.

The water department isn't the only city building in disrepair. One, a former Parks and Recreation and Street Department

building, is burned out and condemned. Another has mold.

The mold displaced Caton and five other public works employees, who now work out of a rented office on Fillmore Street. The rented office space is accessible only through a couple winding flights of narrow stairs, making it difficult to find for the general public and in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Last week, Caton and City Manager Travis Rothweiler took

Survivor

a Coke, but I really don't remember anything after that until two hours later when I realized that I was sitting in my car and the car was still running but it was stuck in a 4-foot snow bank.

"It was like I'd gotten beamed into the middle of the road. I had no recollection of getting there."

Peebler was 23 miles from the Sun Valley Lodge, but didn't realize that in his disorientated state. Figuring he couldn't be far from civilization, he wrapped a leather bomber jacket around Lola and put her in her travel bag. He then stuffed his iPad, a dog food bowl and dog food into a daypack, along with a copy of "Lapham's Quarterly," which he figured he could read after he got to the hotel.

At the last minute, he pulled a yellow windbreaker over his hoodie and swapped his sneakers for new hiking boots he'd bought in New York.

It was 1:30 in the afternoon of April 2 when he became stuck, and the spring sun had softened the snow. The 6-foot, 230-pound Peebler took one step and sank up to his waist. His next step met the same fate.

He spent the next seven hours post-holing through the snow. As the light dimmed, he took refuge in a dry spot about the size of a kitchen table.

Peebler spread some pine boughs and needles on the ground as he'd seen actors do on the TV show "Survivor." Then he set some twigs and pine branches on fire using a lighter and pages he tore from his magazine.

"We practically slept on top of the fire, we were so cold," he recalled.

Fifteen minutes into the second day of walking, Peebler reached Trail Creek Summit. His renewed sense of hope was short-lived, though, as the strap on Lola's bag broke, he said, sending both dog and bag tumbling down an 850-foot ravine alongside the road.

Peebler wasn't about to leave his dog behind — she'd filled a void in his life after his father died three years ago. He and the dog had become inseparable. So he sat and slid down the slope, ripping the back out of his Levi jeans.

Reunited with Lola, Peebler found there was no way to climb back to the road. For the next 10 hours, he slowly slogged along the creek, balancing himself with two sticks. As dehydration set in, he ignored the threat of giardia to sip the creek water from a tiny canister that had held his diabetic test strips.

As night fell, the soaking wet man took refuge from the biting wind behind a misshapen tree trunk. He couldn't start a fire — his

lighter was rendered useless when he slipped in the river earlier.

"By this time I couldn't feel my hands or feet," he said. "I told Lola, 'If I die, I'm happy to die with you sweetheart.' But I just wanted to not die. I would've been very disappointed if that had been the extent of my life."

To Peebler's surprise, he and Lola made it through the night. And the single-digit temperatures they endured had firmed the snow enough that they could make better progress.

As they walked through waist-deep beaver ponds, Peebler could see the mountain slopes begin to open up, giving him hope that he was getting closer to the valley floor.

Barking dogs a little after 11 a.m. on April 4 confirmed that.

The barking came from 12 dogs that "The Pet Nanny" Maria Corbit had taken to a spot where snow forced the closure of Trail Creek Road.

As she watched him from a distance, Corbit thought Peebler was drunk.

"I figured he was someone who had driven out Trail Creek and gotten stuck. And I couldn't figure out why he wasn't making better time," she said. "I went out to him and he told me the unbelievable story of what had happened. So I called 911 and helped him walk the additional hundred yards to a spot where the ambulance could get to him."

Peebler was just relieved to see Corbit waving her hand.

"I have never before been so happy to see another human being. I've never run a marathon, but I felt like I knew what it must feel like when your body's reached its limit and you reach that finish line," he said.

At the hospital, doctors told Peebler that he likely would not have survived more than a couple hours longer. After consideration, they decided to leave his feet alone. Though swollen, they had not blackened, and Peebler is hopeful feeling will eventually return.

Toni Peebler, Todd's mother, said she's astounded her son survived the ordeal.

"Having been with him through blood sugar lows, I'm astounded he could survive three days without food or water," she said.

In the end, Todd Peebler said, he realized neither money nor material possessions could save him.

"What did was a desire to see my friends, my loved ones again, a desire to hug someone I loved," he said. "Doctors said they have no idea how I survived, that I should be dead. Well, I'm not. I survived and I've vowed to live a better life for my friends, my family and myself."

To help realize his vision of agencies working together, Carter said he deputized police officers in cities within the county to give them jurisdiction outside their respective city's limits and made jail records available on their in-car computers. Sharing information between agencies is a win-win situation, he said.

Carter said he also helped the sheriff's department partner with the Twin Falls Fire Department. Now, in an emergency in the canyon, like a BASE jumping accident, the fire department is the first on the scene.

"They're not waiting for my search and rescue to arrive," he said.

Carter calls many of the changes he made "no brainers." For many accomplishments Carter credits the staff that surrounds him. All major decisions are made as a group, he said.

One of the most important facets of his job is dealing with taxpayer money, Carter said. Giving budgeted money back to the county commissioners each year is a huge accomplishment, he said.

Still, there are issues left to solve.

Drugs and related crimes are a burden on the community, he said.

"Narcotics are still an issue," he said. "If we can continue to chip away at it, that's great."

In order to avoid crowding in the county jail, Carter wants to implement more programs to keep inmates from returning. If and when the jail eventually has to expand, Carter said he would like to see more classroom space built than additional cells.

Alternative programming for nonviolent offenders also appeals to Johnson.

"We need to find every available program out there to keep the violent offenders in custody," he said.

While the two men have many of the same issues at the top of their lists, like improving the relationship between law enforcement and area youth, Johnson believes his education and management skills put him ahead of his competitor.

"I hold the highest certification I can hold at this point," he said,

Combating the drug problem is something Johnson said he's ready to tackle head-on. Solving property crimes such as burglaries often helps find the people spreading drugs through a community, he said.

Working property crimes while also focusing on drug crimes hits the problem from two angles and will make better headway, he said.

Educating kids about drugs is another way to reduce a variety of related crimes.

Johnson also sees himself improving the work atmosphere within the department for deputies.

"I believe in integrity-based leadership and consistent treatment of employees and the public," he said.

If elected, Johnson said he wouldn't make sweeping changes on his own, but rather work with his staff to implement his goals.

Johnson said he has served the public his whole life and would like the chance to continue in this capacity.

"I'm applying for a job with the citizens," he said. "If they choose to hire me, I want to keep serving."

The sheriff's position is a four-year elected term.

Idaho Power: Renewable Energy Development Projects Pushing Costs Up

TWIN FALLS • Idaho Power Co. is requesting a 5.1 percent rate hike, saying a federal incentive program to promote renewable energy development is pushing its costs higher.

A Friday release from the power company says that its costs related to the federal Public Utilities Regulatory Policies Act, or PURPA, have increased by nearly 2.5 percent in the prior year. The federal act sets certain rates power companies must pay to small renewable energy providers. But power suppliers like Idaho Power have argued that larger projects, including many Idaho wind generation developments, have been purposely split into smaller components in an effort to take advantage of the federal rates.

Overall, if the Idaho Public Utilities Commission approves Idaho Power's annual Power Cost Adjustment, the company's customer rates would increase by \$43 million beginning June 1.

By the Numbers

Residential: 3.79 percent
Small general service: 2.73 percent

Large power: 8.56 percent

Irrigation: 5.1 percent
Overall: 5.1 percent

Residential rates would increase by 3.79 percent, equating to a \$2.82 to \$2.88 monthly hike to the typical residential customer's bill.

Idaho Power has asked the PUC to change the way prices are set for PURPA products to take into account factors such as whether the power generated is needed. Strong stream flows have helped hydropower generation meet many Northwest energy companies' demands this year.

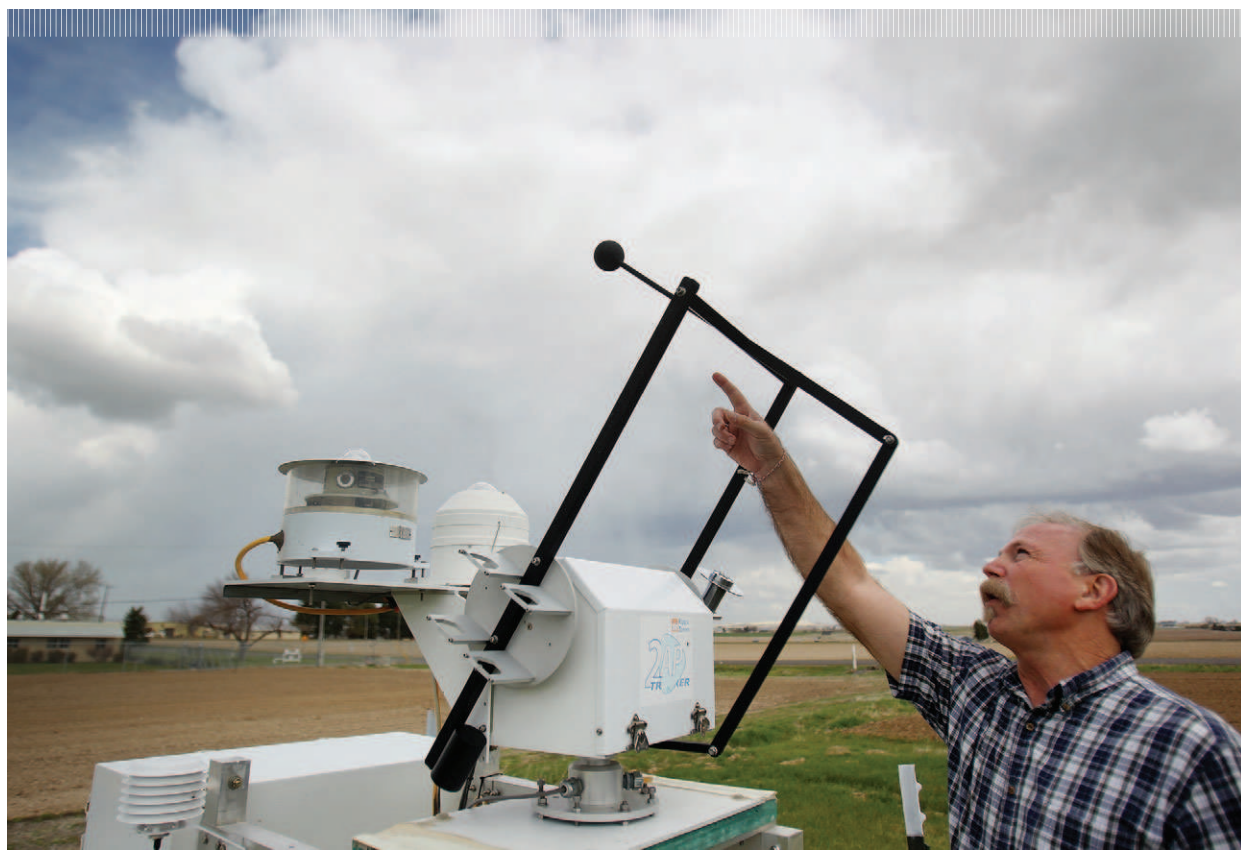

"It's exciting to see an image come alive," Allen said. "But these images are also necessary because you can't manage water rights without being able to measure the water."

One pixel from the satellite covers 30 meters, allowing researchers to identify very specific locations such as field boundaries.

By taking a thermal temperature of the earth's surface, researchers can quantify water use, said Bill Kramber, a senior analyst for the Idaho Department of Water Resources.

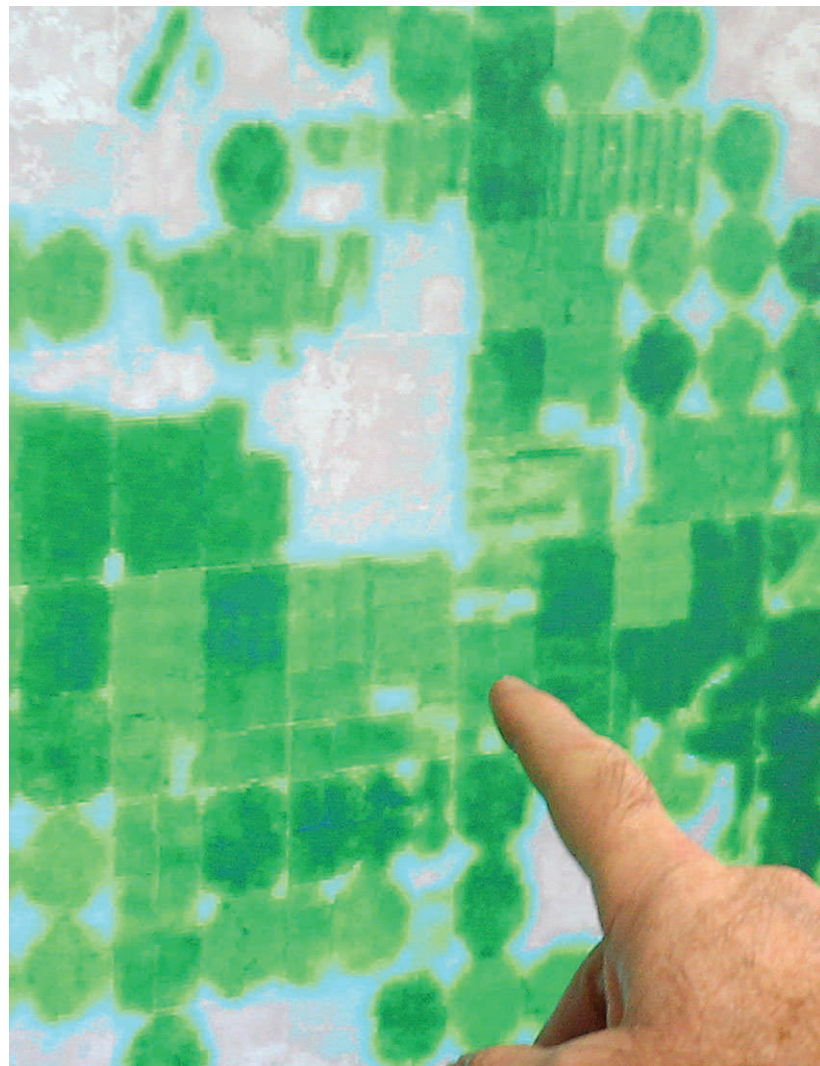
"IDWR uses Landsat for a variety of projects," he said. "Currently we use it to verify water rights. We can check if a water right is being properly irrigated or not."

The satellite's value primarily stems from the continuous information it provides, Allen said. Researchers have catalogued images for the past 30 years. This has allowed agencies and court systems to rely on the information when settling water disputes or land-use conflicts.

"Idaho water is under tension," Allen said. "The more users we have, the more people desire better information. This levels out the playing field."

This week, Allen will travel to Washington, D.C., to encourage lawmakers to continue to fund future Landsat projects.

"I'm a researcher but I will continue to advocate for this project," Allen said. "We've been pushing hard but it's uncertain if we're going to succeed."

(AP) • Emergency responders in Livingston had to swing into action on an unusual call when a 9-year-old girl got stuck in a piece of playground equipment at the city's M Street Park. Livingston Fire and Rescue Capt. Mike Chambers tells *The Livingston Enterprise* the girl became stuck Thursday evening after getting into a swing seat with high sides and leg holes that's designed for smaller children. Chambers says that after the girl's brother and then father failed to extricate her they called the fire department. Chambers says rescuers used large bolt cutters to cut the swing and get the girl out after being trapped for about 30 minutes. He says the girl was calm and unharmed but a bit embarrassed, and gave hugs to all the rescuers after being freed.

Hay Processing Plant Considering North Idaho

LEWISTON (AP) • A Port of Lewiston commissioner says there's a possibility a new employer could be locating to north-central Idaho and become a client of the port. Commissioner Dan Johnson tells the *Lewiston Tribune* in a story published Thursday that a hay processing plant is considering the Lewiston-Clarkston Valley. Port Commissioner Mary Hasenoehrl says the port is in competition with another site for the project. Commissioners discussed details of the hay processing plant in executive session that wasn't open to the public.

1 of Utah's Oldest Mormon Chapels to Be Demolished

PARADISE, Utah (AP) • One of the oldest Mormon chapels in Utah will soon be demolished to make way for a new church. The 133-year-old Paradise 2nd and 3rd Ward church in Cache County will be leveled next month, *The Herald Journal* of Logan reported. Church historians say the chapel, located in the heart of Paradise, was completed in 1877 and features limestone walls. The landmark structure has been added onto multiple times over the years. While there's no evidence

of cracking in the original building's walls, the chapel is not in compliance with seismic codes and has problems with its roof and foundation. Church leaders said while some members wanted to save the chapel, most preferred a new church because of the high cost to renovate the existing one. "Given the fact that the structure was in the shape it was in, it wasn't logical to try to restore it," said Hyrum Stake President Steve Miller, the top Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints leader over the

four wards in Paradise. Miller said he and other stake leaders have asked if original elements of the old chapel could be incorporated into the new church. Original rock will become part of a stone facade, he said, and plans call for a modified steeple that doubles as a bell tower, housing the original bell from the 19th century church. The original chapel features architecture and construction techniques shared by earlier LDS churches and temples, said Garth Norman, a contract archaeologist for the church.

"Some of these early settler-builders had worked on the Nauvoo temple, and could have naturally incorporated their knowledge of temple architecture into the design and construction of the new rock church," he told *The Herald Journal*. Nick Nielsen of Paradise, whose family has used the building for more than a decade, said it will be heartbreaking to see it demolished. "So many people around here have great memories of that building," he said. "It's a noble building and it's sad to see it come down."

Economy Has Habitat Doing More Rehabbing

SPOKANE, Wash. • The national housing slump is having an impact on Habitat for Humanity, as the charity is spending more time rehabbing existing homes these days. Habitat for Humanity is best known for building new homes for low-income people. But last year, 17 percent of its projects involved rehabilitation work on existing homes. That was up from 12 percent just two years before.

battered interior door. Bridges, a bus driver for Spokane Transit, has lived in the house for 14 years, and expected the work to be done in about two weeks. The rehabilitation work is not primarily cosmetic. "The idea is to take care of problems that threaten the health or safety of the homeowner," said Katrina Boyer, a Habitat official in nearby Coeur d'Alene. They recently completed a project to repair the sagging outdoor deck of a home. Habitat for Humanity provided the labor for the work, while the homeowner must pay back the cost of materials over the next two years. Habitat for Humanity was founded in 1976 and has built more than 500,000 homes around the world. Homeowners are usually expected to put approximately 500 hours of "sweat equity" into their own or other project homes, although this amount may vary by location. Former President Jimmy Carter became involved with Habitat for Humanity in 1984. Boyer said many Habitat clients can no longer afford to build new homes, so the Coeur d'Alene chapter started doing rehabs last summer. "We started doing exter-

or repairs like paint, yard work, landscaping," she said. They also do weatherization and projects to make homes handicapped accessible, she said. On the national level, Habitat for Humanity started doing some rehab work about a decade ago, Henderson said. At that time, the goal was to repair foreclosed or abandoned homes in a neighborhood where the group was also building new homes, as a way to preserve the value of the new construction, she said. "It was a holistic approach to stabilization of neighborhoods," she said. Under that system, Habitat for Humanity takes title to an abandoned home, fixes it up, and then sells to a client family, she said. The percentage of rehabs rose from 12 percent in fiscal 2009 to 15 percent in fiscal 2010 to 17 percent last year, she said. That meant that out of 9,323 families served

by Habitat for Humanity last year, 1,603 families received a rehab project, she said. Michone Preston, head of Habitat for Humanity's Spokane chapter, said funding from the U.S. Department of Energy and from the Home Depot Foundation is paying for some work to make existing homes more energy efficient. This year, the Spokane chapter is doing energy efficiency upgrades on 60 to 80 homes, while doing other rehab projects on six to 10 homes. They plan to build 12 to 14 new homes, Preston said. "We generally build a cluster of them at a time," she said. The Spokane chapter has not purchased foreclosed homes. "There is a lot of need in our community for brand new homes," Preston said.

Tribes Distribute Bear-resistant Trash Cans

RONAN, Mont. (AP) • The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes have purchased 125 trash canisters designed to thwart bears looking for an easy meal on the Flathead Indian Reservation. The tribes are giving the containers to homeowners who have had a problem with bears getting into trash. "It allows bears to be bears, and not become dependent on garbage," said Tom McDonald, division manager for the tribes' Fish, Wildlife, Recreation and Conservation Program. "Grizzlies have been here for thousands of years, and for 10,000 to 15,000 years existed with tribal folks without conflicts," said Germaine White, information and education specialist for the tribes' Natural Resources Department. "We want to keep bears from being needlessly destroyed because of conflicts. There are easy solutions to avoiding those conflicts." The 95-gallon containers cost \$300 and were purchased with a Tribal Wildlife Incentive Grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Called Kodiak Cans, they were developed and made by Northland Products of

Prescott, Ariz. Bill and Barb Foust have been testing the containers at their home on the front of the Mission Mountains and say bears so far haven't been able to get into them. "We've been really tickled," Barb Foust said. "We've already had several repeat performances from the bears, and it's been no contest. They can't get into them." Opening the containers involves flipping two small paddles on the front of the containers that keep the lid unlocked long enough to put in trash. Tribal biologist George Barce said a gravity-activated mechanism keeps the lid locked if the container is tipped on its side. The Kodiak Can passed a test with a 600-pound captive Alaskan grizzly at the Grizzly and Wolf Discovery Center in West Yellowstone. "Kobuck the Destroyer," as he's called, failed to crack the Kodiak Can. "He got into a lot of containers we did not think he would be able to," said Bill Lavelle of the Living with Wildlife Foundation in Condon. Trash cans must withstand Kobuck's attempts for one

hour before the foundation will certify the container as bear-resistant. But the cans are also designed to work with fully automated grabber-style refuse trucks, with the metal arms that grab the can pinching the two paddles. McDonald said a related problem officials are dealing with is that some people aren't concerned about bears getting into garbage on their property. That can cause bears to become habituated to human food. "That's not the right attitude for human safety and the long-term survival of bears," he said. Tribal Warden Pablo Espinoza said problem bears are typically trapped and either relocated or killed. He said wardens intend this year to be strict about getting residents to not allow situations that attract bears. "Our fish and game program would really prefer not to be setting bear traps," he said. "Most of our calls are related to garbage. We don't want to be a taxi service where we are transporting bears for no reason." On another front, tribes last year sponsored a seminar showing residents how to put up electric fencing around chicken coops or other poultry or livestock. Last year, landowners with unprotected chickens shot and killed two grizzlies. "There are 6 billion \$2 chickens in the world, and we're killing grizzly bears over them," White said. "A fed bear is a dead bear."

Rancher Ignores BLM Order to Remove Cattle in Nevada

LAS VEGAS (AP) • A southern Nevada rancher is refusing to budge in a showdown on the range with federal land managers. Cliven Bundy maintains he has a right to graze hundreds of head of cattle on rangeland where his family has lived since 1877. But the federal Bureau of Land Management says the Bunkerville ranch owner is violating a 1998 federal court order to remove his

cattle from public land. The Las Vegas Review-Journal reports the BLM had planned to remove his livestock from the range this month, but agency officials in Washington, D.C., have decided to indefinitely suspend the roundup because of safety concerns for people involved. Last week's decision came after Bundy wrote that he "will do whatever it takes to protect his property and rights."

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Westslope Cutthroat Restoration Seeing Success

KALISPELL, Mont. (AP) • A Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks official says a decade-long program to restore Montana's state fish to a chain of 21 alpine lakes above the South Fork Flathead River drainage is showing good results. Jim Vashro tells the *Mis-soulian* that entering the sixth year of the Westslope Cutthroat Trout Conservation

project some of the lakes are showing natural reproduction and anglers are reporting good fishing. Some of the lakes have been poisoned to kill non-native fish and then stocked with cutthroats. Others have been densely stocked each year with genetically pure trout to try to get rid of hybrid populations.

Midwest Towns Say Early Storm Warnings Saved Lives

WOODWARD, Okla. (AP) • The television was tuned to forecasters' dire warnings of an impending storm when Greg Tomlyanobich heard a short burst from a tornado siren blare after midnight Sunday. Then silence. Then rumbling.

The 52-year-old quickly grabbed his wife and grandson, hurrying them into the emergency cellar as debris whirled around their

heads at their mobile home park in northwest Oklahoma. They huddled inside with about 20 other people before the tornado — among dozens that swept across the nation's midsection during the weekend — roared across the ground above, ripping homes from their foundations.

"It scared the hell out of me," Tomlyanobich said. The storm killed five

people, including three children, and injured more than two dozen in Woodward, a town about 140 miles northwest of Oklahoma City. But it was the only tornado that caused fatalities. Many of the touchdowns raked harmlessly across isolated stretches of rural Kansas, and though communities there and in Iowa were hit, residents and officials cred-

ited days of urgent warnings from forecasters for saving lives.

When Tomlyanobich emerged from the underground shelter after the storm subsided, he saw a scattered trail of destruction: home insulation, siding and splintered wood where homes once stood; trees stripped of leaves, clothing and metal precariously hanging from limbs.

String of Attacks Rock Afghan Capital, Provinces

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) • Taliban insurgents struck the heart of the Afghan capital and three eastern cities Sunday, firing automatic weapons and grenades at embassies, government buildings and NATO bases as they launched the spring fighting season with the boldest and most complex assault in years.

The multi-pronged attacks show the Taliban and their allies are far from beaten and underscored the security challenge facing government forces as U.S. and NATO forces draw down. The majority of international combat troops are scheduled to leave by the end of 2014.

The first blasts rocked the diplomatic quarter of Kabul on Sunday afternoon, and soon gunshots and rocket-propelled grenade fire were ringing out across the city. Smoke rose over the skyline as sirens wailed. A loudspeaker at the U.S. Embassy could be heard barking: "Duck and cover. Move away from the windows."

One police officer and 17 militants were killed in the attacks, the most widespread in the Afghan capital since an assault on the U.S. Embassy and NATO headquarters last September blamed on the Haqqani network, a Pakistan-based insurgent group allied with the Taliban. Fighting continued more than 12 hours after the first blasts, with explosions echoing into the night.

The sophistication and firepower of the latest strikes, as well as the high-profile government and foreign targets, bore the hallmarks of the attack last fall and others carried out by Haqqani insurgents.

Obama: 'Angry' If Secret Service Allegations True

CARTAGENA, Colombia (AP) • President Barack Obama, speaking for the first time about allegations that Secret Service agents hired prostitutes, said Sunday that "of course I'll be angry" if those accusations are proven true by an investigation.

Obama said the agents represent the United States and are supposed to conduct themselves with the highest levels of dignity anywhere in the world. "Ob-

viously, what's been reported doesn't match up to those standards," Obama said in a news conference wrapping his appearance at a Latin America summit.

The president never directly mentioned the specific accusations, confirmed by media outlets, that agents were cavorting with prostitutes before the president arrived in Colombia.

The Secret Service sent 11 agents home and placed them on leave for mis-

conduct as the agency reviews what happened.

"I expect that investigation to be thorough, and I expect it to be rigorous," Obama said. "If it turns out that some of the allegations that have been made in the press are confirmed, then of course I'll be angry. ... We are representing the people of the United States, and when we travel to another country, I expect us to observe the highest standards."

Texas Diners Enjoy \$12K, 10-course Replica of Last Meal Served on Titanic

HOUSTON (AP) • Crystal tinkles as women clad in dinner best bow their heads over champagne glasses, listening attentively to the captain's evening address. The Armagnac they sip is circa 1900. The dishes, crystal and silverware also hark back to a bygone era — one when the Titanic sailed the high seas, destined for disaster.

On this evening, though, the captain is Ryan Roberts, executive director of Cullen's restaurant in Houston.

"We're here to remember the people who perished on that fateful night, so if we could just bow our heads in a moment of silence," Roberts said, his white-gloved hands reminiscent of the opulence of the Edwardian era that birthed the lush first-class cabins and dining rooms of what was then the world's largest ship.

It's the 100th anniversary of the maiden voyage of the RMS Titanic, which hit an iceberg in the North Atlantic on a frigid, dark night, killing 1,514 people. And to mark the occasion, 12 people in Houston enjoyed a replica of the lavish 10-course dinner the wealthiest people aboard the ship enjoyed just before the crash.

The dinner was one of many served from New York to Memphis, Tenn., and across the oceans to Hong Kong, as chefs attempted to transport diners to a time when waiters in starched coats and napkins hanging from their arms served an upper class that was far removed from the common man, who filled the lower portions of the Titanic and went largely unnoticed by the wealthy until they perished together in the cold sea.

Truce Eroding as First U.N. Monitors Travel to Syria

BEIRUT (AP) • Syria's 4-day-old cease-fire appeared to be quickly eroding Sunday, with regime forces firing dozens of tank shells and mortar rounds at neighborhoods in the opposition stronghold of Homs, hours before the arrival of a first team of U.N. truce monitors.

Even though the overall level of violence has dropped, escalating regime attacks over the weekend raised new doubts about President Bashar Assad's commitment to a plan by special envoy Kofi Annan to end 13 months of violence and launch talks on Syria's political future.

Assad accepted the truce deal at the prodding of his main ally, Russia, but his compliance has been limited. He has halted shelling of rebel-held neighborhoods, with the exception of Homs, but ignored calls to pull troops

out of urban centers, apparently for fear of losing control over a country his family has ruled for four decades. Rebel fighters have also kept up attacks, including shooting ambushes.

The international community hopes U.N. observers will be able to stabilize the cease-fire, which formally took effect Thursday. A six-member advance team of U.N. observers headed to Damascus on Sunday, a day after an unanimous U.N. Security Council approved such a mission. A larger team of 250 observers requires more negotiations between the U.N. and the Syrian government next week.

U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon expressed serious concern at the Syrian government's shelling of Homs and said "the whole world is watching with skeptical eyes" whether the cease-fire can be sustained.

New North Korean Leader Makes First Public Speech

North Korea's new leader addressed his nation and the world for the first time Sunday, vowing to place top priority on his impoverished country's military, which promptly unveiled a new long-range missile.

The speech was the culmination of two weeks of celebrations marking the centenary of the birth of his grandfather, national founder Kim Il Sung — festivities that were marred by a failed launch Friday of a rocket that generated international condemnation and cost North Korea a food aid-for-nuclear-freeze deal with Washington.

Kim Jong Un's speech took North Koreans gathered at Kim Il Sung Square and around televisions across the country by surprise. His father, late leader Kim Jong Il, addressed the public only once in his lifetime.

Appearing calm and measured as he read the 20-minute speech, Kim Jong Un covered a wide range of topics, from foreign policy to the economy. His speech, and a military parade that followed, capped the carefully choreographed festivities commemorating Kim Il Sung's birthday, which included a massive fireworks display.

It was the best look yet the outside world has had of the young Kim, who is believed to be in his late 20s.

Punctuating Kim's message that the North will continue to pour funds into its military, the parade culminated with the unveiling of a new long-range missile, though it's not clear how powerful or significant the addition to the North Korean arsenal is. Some analysts suggested it might have been a dummy designed to dupe outside observers.

Although the rocket launch Friday was a huge, costly embarrassment for the new leadership, Kim's address was seen by analysts as an expression of confidence by the young leader and meant to show that he is firmly in control.

"Superiority in military technology is no longer monopolized by imperialists, and the era of enemies using atomic bombs to threaten and blackmail us is forever over," Kim said.

His message suggested no significant changes in national policy — the "Military First" strategy has long been at the center of North Korea's decision-making process.

But there was strong symbolism in the images of the new leader addressing the country on state TV and then watching — and often laughing and gesturing in relaxed conversation with senior officials — as the cream of his nation's 1.2 million-strong military marched by.

Outside analysts have raised worries about how Kim, who has been seen but not publicly heard since taking over after his father's December death, would govern a country that has a nuclear

weapons program and has previously threatened Seoul and Washington with war.

At the celebration of Kim Il Sung, he appeared to clear his first hurdle.

The speech was a good "first impression for his people and for the world," said Hajime Izumi, a North Korea expert at Japan's Shizuoka University. "He demonstrated that he can speak in public fairly well, and at this stage that in itself — more than what he actually said — is important. I think we might be seeing him speak in public more often, and show a different style than his father."

Kim said he will strengthen North Korea's defenses by placing the country's "first, second and third" priorities on military might. But he said he is open to working with foreign countries that do not have hostile policies toward his nation, and said he would strive to reunify Korea.

He also stressed the importance of national unity, calling his country "Kim Il Sung's Korea" rather than North Korea.

"That suggests to me that they want to let the country, and the world, know that this

is a 'new' country," said Han S. Park, a University of Georgia professor who works frequently with top U.S. and North Korean officials, after watching the events in Pyongyang.

Despite his youth, Kim has been groomed since his teens to step into this role, Park said, citing conversations with North Koreans with knowledge of the leader's personal history.

Cha Myong Hui, a journalist with the government-run Minju Joson newspaper, said she was struck by how much he resembles his father and grandfather.

"I can tell you every person in my country cried when they heard his voice," she said.

The young leader said he will aggressively pursue economic growth to improve people's daily lives. North Korea has suffered decades of economic hardship following a famine in the mid-1990s and the loss of aid from the Soviet Union. Kim Jong Un's formal three-year succession has coincided with a push to improve the economy by employing modern technology.

Kim made no direct mention of the rocket failure. But North Korea's state media made an extraordinary announcement hours after the launch, saying that the attempt to send a satellite into space had flopped. It still claims past launches succeeded, which international experts deny.

Concerns remain high that North Korea may now feel itself under pressure to make up for the botched rocket launch with a nuclear test — as it did in 2006 and 2009.

The finale in Sunday's military parade added to the worries over North Korea's military. But analysts in Japan and South Korea said further examination is needed to determine whether it's a new intercontinental ballistic missile that North Korea reportedly has been building.

Narushige Michishita, a North Korea military expert at Japan's National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies, said

the missile appeared to be new, but strongly resembled the rocket used on Friday and also the long-range Taepodong-2, which North Korea first launched, unsuccessfully, in 2006.

He said it probably has three stages but did not appear to be big enough to have the 15,000-kilometer (9,000-mile) range needed to effectively attack the United States, which would be the goal of an ICBM for the North.

"I don't think this is a serious ICBM," Michishita said. "Putting it on display has a psychological impact, and that would have been greater if Friday's launch had worked. But North Korea has a very bad record with long-range missiles. I think this is more a propaganda ploy than a military advance."

Spanish King Criticized for Elephant Hunting Trip

MADRID • Spain's 74-year-old king came under scathing criticism Sunday for going on an expensive elephant hunting trip in Botswana amid the nation's deep financial woes.

Making matters worse, an accident on the trip sent King Juan Carlos into surgery. Doctors said Sunday that he was recovering well after a hip replacement but would not be able to resume full duties for more than a month.

His son, 44-year-old Prince Felipe, was nominated to fill in for his father, who Spain's government relies on to patch up diplomatic disputes, boost international trade and serve as the country's high-profile liaison.

Tomas Gomez, Madrid's regional Socialist party leader, said the time had come for the head of state to choose between his public responsibilities "and an abdication that would allow him to enjoy a different lifestyle."

Spanish newspapers were filled with accounts of how hunting trips to Botswana, where Juan Carlos fell, cost more than most Spaniards earn in a year. *El Pais*, Spain's leading newspaper, said the

cost to arrange a hunting trip in Botswana to kill an elephant usually comes in at \$57,850, about twice the country's average annual salary.

Spain is currently perceived as the weakest link in the 17-nation eurozone, and many investors fear it could become the next country to seek an international bailout. But the country with eurozone's No. 4 economy is seen as too big to bail out. Unemployment stands at nearly 23 percent — nearly 50 percent for young workers — and Spain is expected to slide into its second recession in three years soon.

The accident happened Friday while the king was on safari in Botswana's northern Okavango region and he was immediately flown home by private jet. Juan Carlos had a hip replacement early Saturday, and by Sunday had begun walking with crutches, said Angel Villamor, a spokesman for San Jose hospital, where the king is recovering.

Newspaper *El Mundo*, which usually supports Spain's royalty, reported the king had been hunting elephants for four days in Botswana before he tripped and fell before dawn Friday at the chalet where he was staying.

Ticket to Titanic Maiden Voyage Sold at N.Y. Auction

NEW YORK • A New York auction house has sold an original ticket to the 1912 launch of the Titanic and a dinner menu from the ill-fated ocean liner, plus items recovered from the wreckage miles underwater.

On the block Sunday at Bonhams were various Titanic remnants offered to mark the centennial of its sinking.

The historic admission ticket fetched \$56,250, including the auction house premium. The menu, touting choices like the tongue of a castrated rooster and beef sirloin with horseradish, sold for \$31,250.

Both went to private American buyers, said Gregg Dietrich, Bonhams' maritime consultant.

He said one surprise at the auction was the comparatively low price paid for a telegraph that read, "We have struck an iceberg."

That message — sold for \$27,500 — was sent to Titanic's sister ship, the Olympic, about three hours before the Titanic sank just days into its maiden voyage from Southampton, England, to New York. Only about 700 of the luxury liner's more than 2,200 passengers survived.

One important item that did not sell is a handwritten account from the captain of the Carpathia that rescued the survivors, Dietrich said.

"But interest in Titanic artifacts remains strong," he said, noting that Bonhams' Manhattan auction room was filled Sunday with about 60 people, in addition to bidders on the phone and online.

He said many items went to buyers collecting Titanic artifacts for years.

The most curious lot of the day, Dietrich said, sold for \$12,500: three rivets and a piece of porthole glass recovered from the wreckage in the North Atlantic near Newfoundland during expeditions starting in 1987.

Bonhams could not immediately provide a total haul for Sunday's auction.

The biggest sale of Titanic lore has yet to come: 5,000 artifacts with a value of hundreds of millions of dollars owned by RMS Titanic Inc.

A New York auction planned for April was put on hold because of talks with various parties for the possible purchase of the collection, ranging from passengers' personal possessions and parts of the hull to china and the ship's fittings.

DOCUMENTS: UTAH TROOPER FAILED TO FOLLOW PROCEDURES

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A former Utah Highway Patrol Trooper of the Year failed to follow procedures when taking drivers' blood samples in 2010, documents show.

UHP Cpl. Lisa Steed took blood samples from suspected drunken drivers on the roadside by herself on three occasions in spring 2010, according to the documents obtained by *The Salt Lake Tribune*.

She and other troopers were instructed to take blood samples on the roadside only under urgent circumstances and only if at least two other officers were present.

The UHP had previously disclosed that Steed received two reprimands for violations, but documents released for the first time last week show what she did to

earn the discipline.

In 2007, Steed became the first woman to be named Trooper of the Year after making more than 200 arrests of impaired drivers.

But defense attorneys have called Steed's tactics into question.

Salt Lake County District Attorney Sam Gill has said his office has been investigating several dozen pending DUI cases involving Steed after complaints arose.

On April 30, 2010, Steed pulled over a driver in Salt Lake City and exited her patrol car without radioing dispatchers. About two weeks earlier, documents show, supervisors had told troopers to report by radio anytime they got out of their car for a traffic stop. Steed did notify radio dispatchers when she decid-

ed to arrest the man.

Steed obtained a warrant to draw the man's blood, but broke policy again when she failed to notify her supervisor that she was taking the sample. A supervisor is supposed to observe the blood draw, according to documents.

Steed removed the driver's handcuffs so he could give a sample, but the driver became "agitated," removed the needle and threatened Steed with it, the records show. Civilians had to help Steed take the man into custody.

The documents also shed more light on a case Steed testified to in court last month. On March 10, 2010, she pulled over a car and issued the driver a breath test before a field test. UHP policy requires the field test to be conducted first.

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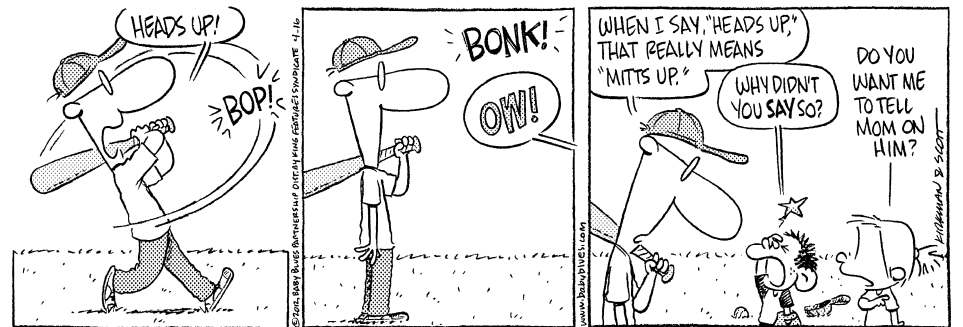
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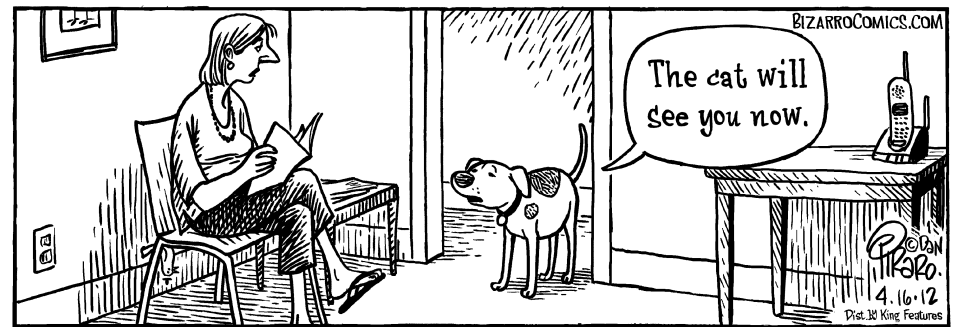
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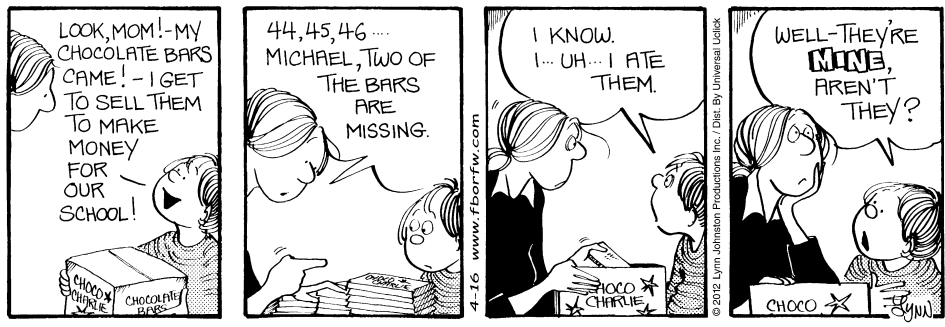
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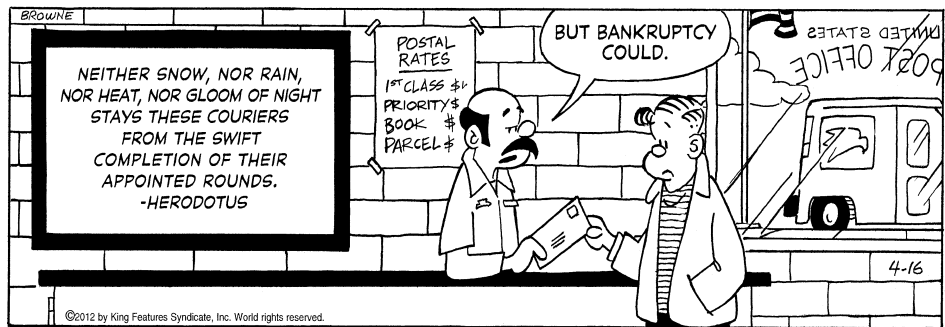

'Supplemental' Just Isn't What It Used to Be

Six years ago, in an attempt to provide tax relief for homeowners, the Idaho Legislature shifted public education spending off of property taxes and largely onto the sales tax.

Now that decision is starting to reverse itself, without any change of heart in the Statehouse.

Hastened by the recently poor economy, supplemental levies funded by property taxes are now a standard part of the budget for most of Idaho's school districts.

"It's become a part of our regular operating expenses," Wendell Superintendent Greg Lowe said last month of his district's two-year, \$155,000 annual supplemental levy that it hopes to renew.

That leaves those districts whose residents have turned down recent levy issues falling even more behind their peers in Idaho's supposedly free, uniform education system.

Former chief state economist Mike Ferguson pointed that problem out in a report released just last week. According to the *The Spokesman-Review* (Spokane, Wash.), he believes the current funding system might violate the Idaho state constitution, thanks to policies that have led more than two-thirds of school districts to secure supplemental levies.

The Legislature couldn't have foreseen that it would hook public schools funding to the sales tax right before the recession sent tax receipts plummeting. But the past few years demonstrate how unwise it is to tie our children's futures to such a variable funding source.

The silliest part of this is that the same homeowners who supposedly were "relieved" back in 2006 are the ones now voting to be taxed extra to ensure their children get a proper education.

Locally, six school districts will ask voters to renew or approve new levies on May 15. A "yes" vote will continue this new path of unequal budgets and voters reassuming their supposed previous burden. But a "no" vote won't be any better. Denying the districts their funds, especially those renewing levies, will only continue the damage of the past couple of years.

The best way to help Idaho schools right now would be for lawmakers to admit their mistake of six years ago and give school funding the stability it deserves. Then, they can continue the discussion about what the public schools of the future will look like. An experiment like Students Come First, after all, stands a much better chance if it's not altering a moving target.

When the resources available for your child's education depends on if you live in Meridian or Murtaugh, that means Idaho's system for funding public schools is broken. Before any sort of discussion can happen on future school spending, we must fix the mess we allowed in 2006.

Learning to Read Before Kindergarten Leads to Success

Regarding Thursday's article, "Lack of State-run Preschool Puts Idaho Students Behind:"

The article contained a

quote by Donna Pence, D-Gooding, who is in favor of state standards for pre-school. The *Times-News* then stated, "... by the time students LEAVE kindergarten, they're expected to ... know letters and sounds!"

When I began teaching kindergarten in 1981 that was true; however, some 30 years later, it is not! Our district's adopted reading curriculum, as approved by the State Board of Education, expects kindergartners to be reading a combination of high frequency (sight) words and decodable words in the context of sentences before they go on to first grade. This is a sample from part of a story my students will be reading next week:

"Do not quit, Quinn. Where will you go? Come with me, Dad. Can we get a hot dog?"

They will be successful thanks to months of work with letters and sounds!

Children who begin kindergarten with prior experience with letters and sounds are in a much better place to handle memorizing sight words and blending sounds into words.

There are numerous support sites online: starfall.com and abc-mouse.com are examples of programs that offer pre-k support. They are not intended to replace parents or programs in preparing children to be successful with kindergarten's rigorous expectations.

Believe me when I say that kindergarten teachers across Idaho did not appreciate being referred to as "overpaid day care workers" by an uninformed legislator from Emmett.

When a teacher can move a child from not even recognizing their own name in print in September to having the foundational skills necessary to successfully read and even write the aforementioned passage in April, I'd say they'd "earned" their "pay for performance"! Not to mention blessed a child with skills that will serve him for a lifetime!

Cosby: Trayvon Martin Case about Guns, Not Race

WASHINGTON (AP) • Actor and comedian Bill Cosby says the debate over the killing of Trayvon Martin by a neighborhood watch volunteer should be focused on guns, not race.

In an interview on CNN's "State of the Union" aired Sunday, Cosby said calling George Zimmerman a racist doesn't solve anything. Cosby says the bigger question is what Zimmerman was doing with a gun, and

who taught him how to behave with it.

The shooting of the 17-year-old Martin on Feb. 26 has ignited a nationwide debate about race and self-defense.

Cosby said during the interview, which was taped Thursday afternoon, that he once owned a gun but no longer does. He says there is a need to get guns off the streets, and that people should be taught to use every possible alternative before shooting someone.

Long Political Fights ahead Over Dueling Tax Plans

Democrats and Republicans are forcing votes in Congress this week on competing tax plans that they know are doomed from the start. But little does that matter to either party.

WASHINGTON • Democrats and Republicans are forcing votes in Congress this coming week on competing tax plans that affect millionaires and smaller businesses, and they know the proposals are doomed from the start.

But that doesn't matter to either party.

Their efforts, including a Senate vote Monday on President Barack Obama's "Buffett rule" proposal to impose a minimum tax on the wealthiest Americans, are more about pontificating than legislating, aimed at voters in November's congressional and presidential elections.

Neutral economists say neither bill would do much for the economy or job creation. Some political professionals are equally unimpressed with their potential impact on voters.

Undaunted, congressional leaders hope to maximize public attention by timing both roll calls with an eye to Tuesday, the annual deadline for filing income taxes with the Internal Revenue Service. The upcoming votes probably are just a start.

Senate Democrats later this year may hold additional votes tied to the "Buffett rule," using his idea of a minimum 30 percent tax on top earners

to raise money for a proposal to create jobs and keep student loan rates from rising.

With trillions in tax cuts dating from President George W. Bush set to expire in January, House and Senate leaders also are considering campaign-season votes on extending popular parts of those reductions, such as preventing the \$1,000 child tax credit from being cut in half.

In addition, Obama and his all-but-certain GOP opponent, Mitt Romney, will spend much of the campaign promoting their tax blueprints as antidotes to an economy still struggling to generate jobs.

Besides raising taxes on the wealthy, Obama would boost levies on many U.S. companies that do business overseas, and on the oil and gas industry. The new money would help lower individual and corporate rates and reduce federal deficits.

Romney would continue all Bush tax cuts, including those

for the richest people, while trimming rates and eliminating estate taxes.

"If this were a heavyweight fight, we're still in the first round where both sides are kind of feeling each other out," Republican consultant Mike McKenna said about the votes in the week ahead.

On Monday, as Congress returns from a two-week spring break, the Democratic-led Senate expects votes on a "Buffett rule" measure by Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse, D-R.I. It would slap a minimum 30 percent income tax on people making over \$2 million yearly and phase in higher taxes for those earning at least \$1 million. Republicans are sure to block the bill, nicknamed for billionaire Warren Buffett, who backs higher taxes on the rich.

The GOP-run House plans a Thursday vote on legislation providing a 20 percent tax deduction for businesses that employ fewer than 500 workers, which covers 99.9 percent of all companies. The proposal, sponsored by House Majority Leader Eric Cantor, R-Va., seems certain to pass, but fail in the Senate.

Big Gaps Found in Nursing Homes' Disaster Plans

WASHINGTON • Tornado, hurricane or flood, nursing homes are woefully unprepared to protect frail residents in a natural disaster, government investigators say.

Emergency plans required by the government often lack specific steps such as coordinating with local authorities, notifying relatives or even pinning name tags and medication lists to residents in an evacuation, according to the findings.

That means the plans may not be worth the paper they're written on.

Nearly seven years after Hurricane Katrina's devastation of New Orleans exposed the vulnerability of nursing homes, serious shortcomings persist.

"We identified many of the same gaps in nursing home preparedness and response," investigators from the inspector general's office of the Department of Health and Human Services wrote in the report being released Monday. "Emergency plans lacked relevant information. ... Nursing homes faced challenges with unreliable transportation contracts, lack of collaboration with local emergency management, and residents who developed health problems."

The report recommends that Medicare and Medicaid add specific emergency planning and training steps to the existing federal requirement that nursing homes have a disaster plan. Many such steps are now in nonbinding federal guidelines that investigators found were disregarded.

In a written response, Medicare chief Marilyn Tavenner agreed with the recommendation, but gave no timetable for

carrying it out.

Nationally, more than 3 million people spent at least some time in a nursing home during 2009, according to the latest available data. Nearly 40 percent of them, 1.2 million, were in the top 10 disaster-prone states. The typical nursing home resident is a woman in her 80s or older, dealing with physical and mental limitations that leave her dependent on others for help with basic daily activities.

Investigators pursued a two-track approach. First they looked at the number of nursing homes that met federal regulations for emergency planning and training. Then they went into the field to test how solid those plans were, in a sample of homes drawn from 210 facilities substantially affected by floods, hurricanes and wildfires across seven states during 2007-2010.

On the surface, things appeared to be in good shape. Ninety-two percent of the nation's 16,000 nursing homes met federal regulations for emergency planning, while 72 percent met the standards for emergency training.

A different story emerged when inspectors showed up at 24 selected nursing homes and started pulling files and interviewing staff.

The specific facilities in California, Louisiana, Minnesota, North Carolina, North Dakota, Tennessee, and Texas were not identified in the report. All had been affected by disasters; 14 had evacuated and the remainder sheltered in place.

A detailed, well-rehearsed emergency plan is a basic requirement for disaster preparedness. But at one home, the emergency plan was in several boxes. At another one, it was on a legal pad.

Of the 24 emergency plans, 23 did not describe how to handle a resident's illness or death during an evacuation. Also, 15 had no information about specific medical needs of patients, such as feeding tubes and breathing equipment. Seven plans were silent on how to identify residents in an evacuation, such as by attaching wristbands or name tags. Inspectors said 15 made no provision for including medication lists.

None of the nursing homes met a government recommendation for a seven-day supply of drinking water if residents had to shelter in place and their regular source of water was unsafe or unavailable.

Twenty-two had no backup plans to replace staff members unable to report for work during a disaster.

Transportation was an Achilles' heel. None of the nursing homes had planned to ensure transportation of adequate food and water for evacuated residents, while 19 had no specific plan for transporting wheelchairs and similar equipment. Twenty-two of the plans did not describe how the nursing home would transport medications.

Seventeen had no specific plan for working with local emergency coordinators to decide whether to evacuate or shelter in place.

Not surprisingly, administrators and staff from 17 of the nursing homes told investigators they faced substantial challenges in responding to the disasters that hit their areas. A common problem was that transportation contracts were not honored after an evacuation was called. Four nursing homes that did evacuate said they had problems trying to keep track of residents and supplies, in some cases temporarily losing patients.

It was a big night for scouts in first- through fifth-grades. After all, they had lots of time invested in preparation. Nine-year-old Gabriel Routt, for instance, spent an estimated 20 to 25 hours honing his green and blue racer.

"He's been talking about (the derby) for days," said LaDeana Routt, his mother.

Two years ago, Heather Wathen's husband, Jim, was out of town when their son remembered it was deadline day for car entry. Heather didn't panic. She pulled the boy out of school and they worked feverishly on assembly and painting.

"Really until the last second," Heather said. "This year we went through three modifications because we kept getting it messed up."

Saturday, children from Hailey to Jackpot, Nev., and from Buhl to Murtaugh gave it their best shot as people stood several rows deep around the four-lane track to watch. Black and white checkered pennants were strung along the race course like automotive prayer flags.

Winning cars sped down the ramp at more than 200 miles per hour.

The boys start with wood

"I like the breaks," Jacobson said. "Mentally it's refreshing to have some time to go over in your mind what you're trying to accomplish and what areas you have to work on."

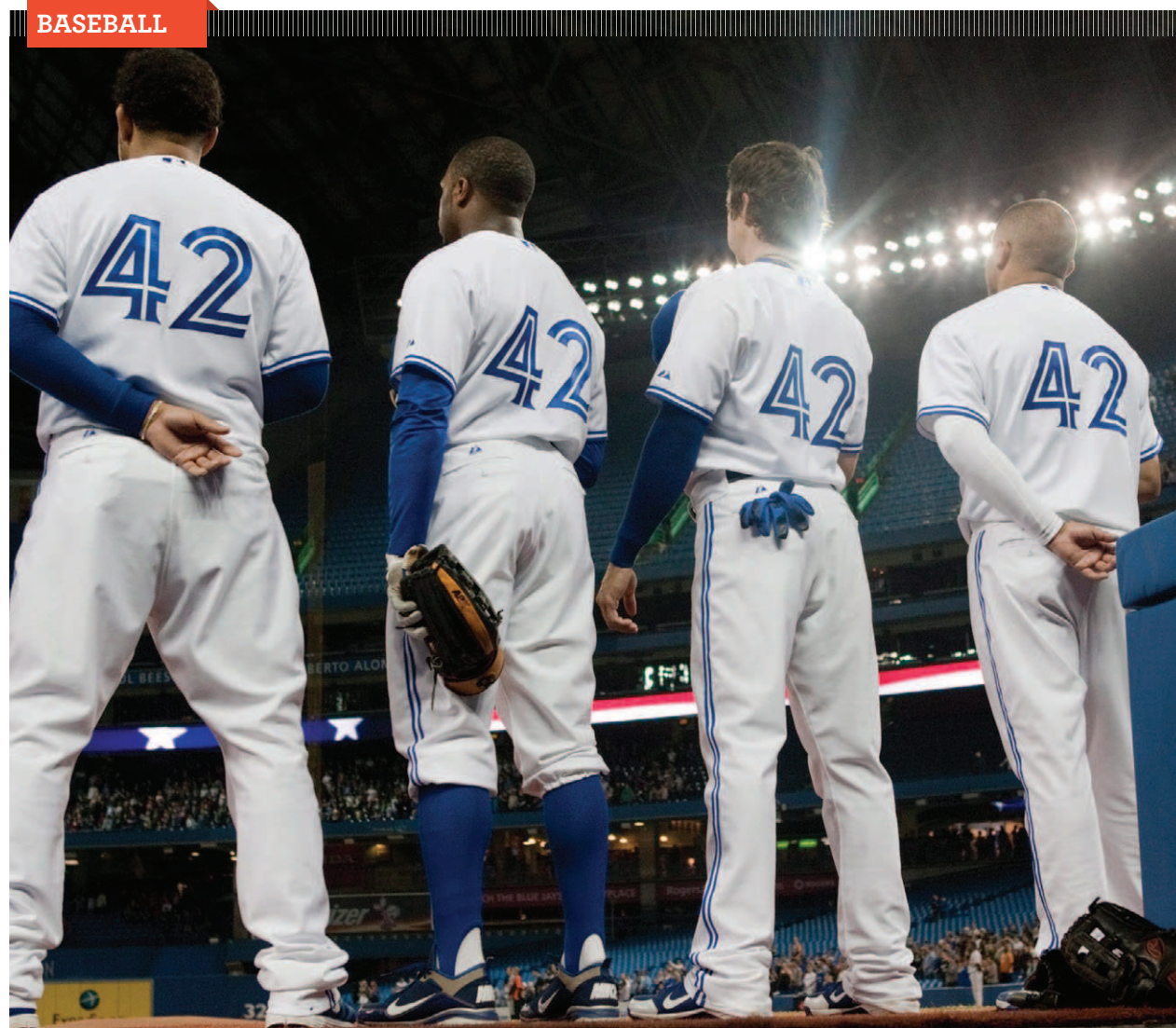

MLB honors Jackie Robinson with ballpark tributes.

NEW YORK • LaTroy Hawkins has heard the stories from his 87-year-old grandfather, about his days of picking cotton in Mississippi, about the times when there were no black players in big league baseball.

And about what it meant when Jackie Robinson broke the game's color barrier.

"Without Jackie, I wouldn't be in front of you," the Los Angeles Angels pitcher told several dozen kids at a Bronx ballpark Sunday. "Jackie's role in my life has

been tremendous."

From Dodger Stadium to Fenway Park, there were ceremonies as Major League Baseball honored Robinson and his legacy. Video tributes and on-field celebrations at every ballpark included his family, his former teammates, players from the Negro Leagues, NBA great Bill Russell and members of the Tuskegee Airmen.

Players, managers, coaches and umpires all wore No. 42 on Jackie Robinson Day to remember the 65th anniversary of the day the future Hall of Famer first took the field with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947. Markers on each base noted the occasion.

Hall of Famer Reggie Jackson, Hawkins and sev-

eral former players joined Robinson's daughter, Sharon, at a youth clinic in a park where the old Yankee Stadium stood. Rachel Robinson, Jackie's wife, and her family were set to take part in a tribute across the street Sunday night before the Angels played the New York Yankees.

Hawkins noted the dwindling percentage of black players in the big leaguers. There were only 8.5 percent on opening day in 2011 — there were twice as many in 1990 when the Richard Lapchick's Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sports at the University of Central Florida started tracking the number.

Hawkins thanked his granddad for always steering

him toward baseball instead of basketball and encouraged parents to do the same. He also said colleges could help by offering four-year baseball scholarships.

"Play the game," Hawkins said.

Asked whether he thought MLB would ever again achieve a high population of black players, he said: "Anything's possible."

Jackson recalled his days in the minor leagues, where he was not allowed to stay in the same hotels or eat in the same restaurants as his teammates. He said he sometimes spent the night on the couch at the apartments of Rollie Fingers, Joe Rudi, Dave Duncan and others.

The Mariners took two of three from the A's, thanks to the long ball and a pair of unearned runs in the fifth inning

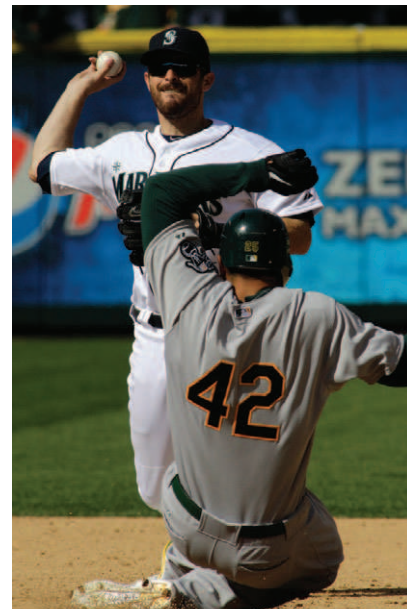
that snapped a 3-all tie. Brandon League pitched the ninth for his fourth save in as many chances.

Regarding what she brought from her freshman year to now, Vierstra says she really finds it to be more about learning how to compete against herself and thinks this year, she has made herself into a better roper.

"I just try to go with the flow and use what God has given me," she said.

Already known for his success at bull riding, senior Colton Barrati needed a way to come up with more points to increase his chances in his bid for the title of all-around cowboy. So in addition to riding bulls and team roping with Filer teammate Kyndal Stradley, Barrati grabbed up a "piggin' string" and added another timed-event, tie down roping which has had

an immediate impact on the standings.

With two previous wins already in the books and a tie for first with Joshua Hilscher from Oakley in bulls on Friday night, Barrati added first place finishes in tie down and team roping on Saturday and a third in tie down on Friday. He picked up 37 points in his three events and catapulted him from fifth to second in the all-around race.

Making the move from junior to high school rodeo, Oakley freshman, Saige Bench has set some high goals for her self. She strives to be the top rookie in the district and to compete for the title of all-around, but to accomplish those expectations, the freshman has a good idea of

what it will take to accomplish them.

"I'll have to practice more and harder," said Bench. "I need to try to get faster to keep up with them (other competitors) and to learn by watching. I have to really concentrate on what I'm doing and if I do bad in an event, I have to brush it off."

Bench competes in five events and calls team roping with brother, Bailey, her favorite event.

"It's a family event," said Bench. "We practice at it a lot and I think we're pretty good at it."

"It was a very embarrassing time in your life," he said.

Jackson paused to "to remember what it was like, what I went through" and reflected on the likes of Roy Campanella and Don Newcombe, black players who followed Robinson to the Dodgers.

"He represented all of us," Jackson said. "I really feel he represented black and white."

Newcombe and former Los Angeles star Tommy Davis threw out ceremonial first pitches at Dodger Stadium before the game against San Diego.

Hall of Fame Dodgers announcer Vin Scully, who had missed five games because of a bad cold, returned to the broadcast booth. Scully, now 84, called Brooklyn games for more than seven years when Robinson played.

"All I want to do is think about the game and Jackie and how grateful I am to be back," Scully said.

Tweeted current Dodgers star Matt Kemp: "Thank u Jackie Robinson!!!"

In Boston, former Robinson teammate Ralph Branca threw out the ceremonial ball before Tampa Bay played Boston. The 86-year-old Branca tossed the pitch on one bounce from the front edge of the mound to his son-in-law, Red Sox manager Bobby Valentine.

Branca remembered being at Ebbets Field a day before Robinson's debut.

"I was in the locker room when Jackie walked in. I walked over, shook his hand, 'Welcome aboard,'" Branca said.

"I didn't think about the color of his skin because I lived on a block that was the United Nations of all. It was four black families, about nine families (of) Italian extraction, two Irish, two German, two Jewish. So it was a league of nations on my block. So blacks, I played with them, went in their house, they came into mine. So seeing Jackie meant nothing special or different to me," he said.

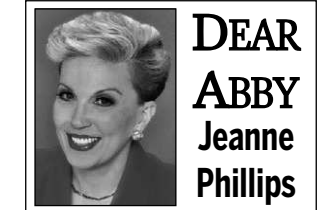

She could tell you what all five women at that table had for lunch that day, but she's particularly interested in mine.

Veronica is a good cook and she's not overweight. But she's driving me crazy. Is her obsession some kind of disorder?

– FOOD-SHY IN OHIO
DEAR FOOD-SHY: Your friend does seem to be preoccupied with food. From your description of her behavior it's surprising that she doesn't have a weight problem. Yet you say she makes dinners and desserts every night.

Could it be that she doesn't eat breakfast or lunch, which is why she's mooching off the others? Or could she be short of money? While I agree that what you have described could be signs of an obsession, it is possible that the woman is famished.

DEAR ABBY: I'm 18 and a high school graduate. My best friend was raped a year ago. It took her a long time to be able to tell me, and although I begged her to tell, she would not go to the authorities. She has heard stories from other girls and has reason to believe the same boy has raped them, too.

I believe if she came forward, the other girls might speak up. Then he won't be able to continue to do this to other girls. But I can't change her mind.

Is there something I can do? Can I go to the police and tell them what she told me? Should I talk to a lawyer? I don't want to see her regret not doing something. She's very fragile and this is so hard for her. She has told very few people. Please tell me how to help her. I don't know what to do.

– WISH I COULD DO MORE, BIRMINGHAM, ALA.

DEAR WISH: The most helpful thing you can do is encourage your friend to contact a rape treatment center. Although the rape occurred a year ago, she can still benefit from counseling to help her recover from the trauma. If she is reluctant to go, then give her the phone number of the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network (R.A.I.N.N.). It's 800-656-4673. A counselor there may be able to help her find the help she needs.

However, she needs to do this for herself. As well-meaning as you are, you can't do it for her.

How do you plan to make four hearts after West leads the spade king?

The nub of this problem is that you want to avoid losing three diamond tricks, but surely West is the favorite to have the diamond ace.

Your first step is to duck the first round of spades, then win the spade ace, and draw trump in three rounds. Next you cash the club ace, king and queen.

Now lead dummy's remaining spade and discard a low diamond, forcing West to win the trick. A diamond return gives you a trick with the diamond king, while a spade exit lets you ruff in dummy and discard a second diamond from hand. Thus you will lose only two spades and a diamond, making the contract.

And what would happen if East had followed to the third spade? If he had followed small, you would still discard a diamond from hand to force West to win the trick. If East was clearly going to win the trick (say, West had a 5-2-3-3 pattern), you ruff the spade and exit with a low diamond from hand. For the defense to stand a chance, East must win the trick and play a third diamond. Now you put up the king, succeeding whenever the diamond finesse succeeds or West wins the ace but has no diamonds left.

Notice that if you hadn't ducked the first trick, East could have gained the lead in spades, whereupon the obvious diamond shift would have scuttled the contract.

ANSWER: The opening lead here is more about temperament than anything else. Some prefer to go passive and not give up a trick; others go for instant gratification by leading a diamond in the hope of cashing out or setting up that suit. Put my vote in with the diamond leaders, but don't ask me to justify it.

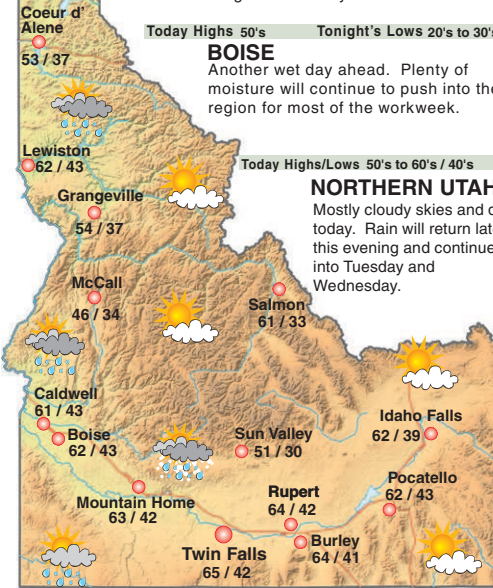

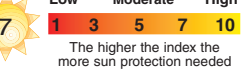

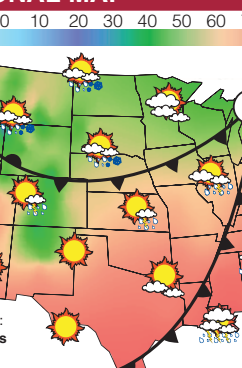
