SUN VALLEY [A 31 -year-old
man got a rude introductionto his man got a rude introduction to his
new home in the Wood River Valnew home in the Wood River Val-
ley last week, spending three days walking in snow up to his waist fter his car became stuck in a nit. Todd Peebler credits his miniature pinscher for saving his life by
sharing her body heat when he tuffed her under his T-shirt at night. During the days, he slogged
through almost 20 miles of snow before he was discovered by a Sun Valley dog walker.
"There's no question I'm alive because of her", he said of Lola, his
dog. "She weighs just 10 pounds but that was enough."
Peebler, an insurance salesman from New York, was heading to his new job as a headhunter for

Ketchum when he turned his 2005 Audi AG onto Trail Creek tion of his GPS unit.
The dirt road is closed at the top by snow in winter, but that didn't register with Peebler. A Type 1 diabetic, he estimates he had been drifting in and out of consciousness as he drove.
"My girlfriend had called about two hours earlier and said I blood sugar, which was 69. I drank blood sugar, which was 69.I Irank

## Researcher Looks to Space for State Water Management

University of Idaho scientist Rick Allen is pulling for Congress to continue funding the satellites that track the lifeblood of the West.

KIMBERLY • When Rick Allen was first asked to help research Idaho's water use, he turned to outer space.
It was an unusual move in 2000. Not too many other states were aware at the time that they could use satellite images to track the pre-
cious resource. But jump forward to today, and Allen's vision is now the foundation for managing water across the West.
Allen is a water resource engineer for the Allen is a water resource engineer for the

University of Idaho's Kimberly Research and Extension Center. He's also known as the satellites. The devices are used to measure climate changes and water evaporation from irrigated agriculture.
Allen considers the satellite's images critical o fairly managing the state's limited water supply. But as he helps advise other western
states on how to use the satellite information he's facing resistance for funding future Landsat satellites from Congress. "The downside to this technology is that it's
not cheap" Allen said. "It cost \$1 billion to re search and build Landsat 8."
The satellites are designed to be in orbit for five years. This means that development on Landsat 9 must being immediately. And while scientists need $\$ 125$ million to cover the costs in 2013, Allen is uneasy if NASA and the rest of the research team are going to receive it. There are currently two Landsat satellites in
orbit, sending images back to arth every 16 orbit, sending images back to earth every 16
days. The newest Landsat is set to launch next January.

KunaMen FaceCharges atterGetting TrucksStuck

BOISE (AP) • Three Kuna men who authorities say moved landscaping rocks and then drove their trucks into a muddy irrigation pond and got
stuck have each been charged with felony counts of malicious injury to property.
The Idaho Statesman reports in a story published Sunday that 20-year-old Derik Triton
Hitesman, 19 -year-old Michael J. Ehmke Ir. and 8-year-old Tyler S. Patrick turned themselves in on felony warrants and posted \$5,000 bonds. Their arraignments are Tuesday. Ada County Sheriff's
officials say the men caused damage exceeding $\$ 1,000$ at Sadie Creek Municipal Irrigation Pond on Feb. 17.

"I'm a researcher but I will continue to advocate for this project," Allen said.
"We've been pushing hard but it's uncertain if we're going to succeed."

Original rock will become part of a stone facade, he said, and plans call for a modified steeple that dou-
bles as a bell tower, housing bles as a bell tower, housing the original bell from the 19th century church. The original chapel features architecture and con-
struction techniques shared struction techniques shared temples, said Garth Norman, a contract archaeologist for the church.
"Some of these early set tler-builders had worked on the Nauvoo temple, and could have naturally incorporated their knowledge of design and construction of the new rock church," he told The Herald Journal. Nick Nielsen of Paradise, whose family has used the building for more than a decade, said it will be heart-
breaking to see it demol breaking to see it demol
ished. "So many people around here have great memories of that building," he said. "It's a noble building and it's sad to see it come down.'

national housing slump is national housing slump is having an impact on Habitat
for Humanity, as the charity is spending more time rehabbing existing homes these days. Habitat for Humanity is best known for building new
homes for low-income peohomes for low-income people. But last year, 17 percent
of its projects involved rehabilitation work on existing homes. That was up from 12 percent just two years before.
"When the housing crisis started in many communi-
ties, there was excess housties, there was excess housing stock,", said Sue Hender-
son, vice president of U.S. operations for Habitat for Humanity International, based in Atlanta. "It made sense for Habitat to look at closed properties and put them back into service Not just foreclosed properties. Habitat also updates and weatherizes existing homes, such as the one owned by Pier Bridges of
Spokane. Spokane.
Habitat is in the process of
updating the rundown updating the rundown modest home in northeast Spokane.
"It's beautiful," Bridges said as she studied the cherry wood-colored flooring in
her living room. her living room.

Kim Jong Un's speech took North Koreans gathered at Kim Il Sung Square and around televisions across the country by surprise. His father, late leader Kim Jong Il, addressed the pu
Appearing calme. Appearing calm and measspeech, Kim Jong Un covered a wide range of topics, from foreignpolicy to the economy. His speech, and a military parade that followed, capped th carefully choreographed fes II Sung's birthday, which in cluded a massive firework display.
It was the best look yet the outside world has had of the young Kim, who is believed to beinhislate 20s. sage that the North will con tinue to pour funds into it military, the parade culminat ed with the unveiling of anew long-range missile, though it's not clear how powerful or sig North Korean arsenal is. Some analysts suggested it might have been a dummy designed to dupe outside observers. Although the rocket launch Friday was a huge, costly em barrassment for thenewlead ership, Kim's address wa sion of confidence by the young leader and meant to show that he is firmly in control.
"Superiority in military echnology is no longer mo nopolized by imperiaists, and tomic bombstothreaten and blackmail us is forever over, Kim said.
His message suggested no significant changes in national policy - the "Military Firs" strategy has long been,

NEW YORK • A New York auction house has sold an ligunch of the Titanic and dinner menu from the illfated ocean liner, plus items recovered from the wreckage miles underwater.

Bonhams were varion Bonhams were various Timark the centennial of its sinking. icket fetched $\$ 56,250$, in cluding the auction house premium. The menu, touting choices like the tongue of a castrated rooster and beef
sirloin with horseradish, sold for $\$ 31,250$.
Both went to private American buyers, said Gregg Dietrich, Bonhams' maritime consultant.

He said one surprise at the auction was the comparatively low price paid for a telegraph that read, "W have struck an iceberg."
That message - sold $\$ 27,500$ - was sent to Titanic's sister ship, the Olympic, about three hours before the Titanic sank just days into its maiden voyage from Southampton, England, to New York. Only about 700 of
the luxury liner's more than 2,200 passengers survived One important item that did not sell is a handwritten account from the captain of the Carpathia that rescued the survivors, Dietrich said. "But interest in Titanic artifacts remains strong,' he said, noting that Bonhams' was filled Sunday with about 60 people, in addition to bidders on the phone and online.

He said many items went to buyers collecting Titanic artifacts for years. The most curious lot of the day, Dietrich said, sold for $\$ 12,500$ : three rivets and a piece of porthole glass rein the North Atlantic near Newfoundland during expeditions starting in 1987. Bonhams could not immediately provide a total haul for Sunday's auction. The biggest sale of Titanic lore has yet to come: 5,000
artifacts with a value of hundreds of millions of dollars owned by RMS Titanic Inc. A New York auction planned for April was put on hold because of talks with
various parties for the possivarious parties for the possition, ranging from passengers' personal possessions and parts of the hull to china and the ship's fittings.

## DOCUMENTS: UTAH TR00PER FAILED T0 FOLLOW PROCEDURES

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) •A farmer Utah Highway Patrol Trooper of the Year failed to fllow procedures when taking drivers' blood samples in 2010, documents show. UHP Cpl. Lisa Steed took ed drunken drivers on the roadside by herself on three occasions in spring 2010, ac cording to the documents obtained by The Salt Lake Tribune.
She and other troopers were instructed to take bloo samples on the roadside only $r$ urgent circumstance and only if at least two other officers were present.
The UHP had previously disclosed that Steed received two reprimands for viola ions, but documents re
earn the discipline. In 2007, Steed became the first woman to be named Trooper of the Year after making more than 200 ar rests of impaired drivers. But defense attorneys have called Steed's tactics into question.
Salt Lake County District Attorney Sam Gill has said his office has been investigating several dozen pending DUI cases involving Steed after complaints arose
On April 30, 2010, Steed
pulled pulled over a driver in Salt Lake City and exited her papatchers. About two weeks earlier, documents show, supervisors had told troopers to report by radio anytime they got out of their car for a traf-
fic stop. Steed did notify radio
ed to arrest the man.
Steed obtained a warrant to draw the man's blood, but broke policy again when she failed to notify her supervisor that she was taking the sample. A supervisor is supposed to observe the blood draw, according to documents. handcuffs so he could give sample, but the driver became "agitated," removed the needle and threatened Steed with it, the records show. 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 'Supplemental' Just Isn't What It Used to Be

Six years ago, in an attempt to provide tax relief for homeowners, the Idaho Legislature shifted public education
spending off of property taxes and largely onto the sales tax.
Now that decision is starting to reverse itself, without any change of heart in the Statehouse.
Hastened by the recently poor economy, supplemental levies funded by property taxes are now a standard part of the budget for most f Idaho's school districts.
"It's become a part of our regular operating expenses," Wendell Superintendent Greg Lowe said last month of his district's two-year $\$ 155,000$ annual supplemental levy that it hopes to renew.
That leaves those districts whose residents have turned down recent levy issues falling even more behind their peers in Idaho's sup posedly free, uniform education system.
Former chief state economist Mike Ferguson pointed that problem out in a report released just last week. According to the The Spokesman-Review (Spokane, Wash.), he believes the current funding system might violate the Idaho state constitution, thanks to policies that have led more than two-thirds of school districts to secure supplemental levies The Legislature couldn't have foreseen that it would hook public schools funding to the sales tax right before the recession sent tax receipts plummeting. But the past few years demonstrate how unwise it is to tie our children's futures to such a variable funding source.
The silliest part of this is that the same homeowners who supposedly were "relieved" back in 2006 are the ones now voting to be taxed extra to ensure their children get a prop er education.
Locally, six school districts will ask voters to renew or approve new levies on May 15. A "yes" vote will continue this new path of unequal budgets and voters reassuming their supposed previous burden. But a "no" vote won't be any better. Denying the districts their funds, especially those renewing levies, will only continue the damage of the past couple of years
The best way to help Idaho schools right now would be for lawmakers to admit their mistake of six years ago and give school funding the sta bility it deserves. Then, they can continue the discussion about what the public schools of the future will look like. An experiment like Stu dents Come First, after all, stands a much better chance if it's not altering a moving target. When the resources available for your child's education depends on if you live in Meridian or Murtaugh, that means Idaho's system for funding public schools is broken. Before any sort of discussion can happen on future school spending, we must fix the mess we allowed in 2006.

How do you plan to make four hearts after West leads the spade king?
The nub of this problem is that you want to avoid losing three diamond tricks, but surely West is the favorite to have the dia-

Your first step is to duck the first round of spades, then win the spade ace, and draw trump in three rounds. Next you cash the club ace, king and queen.

Now lead dummy's remaining spade and discard a low diamond, forcing West to win the trick. A diamond return gives you a trick with the diamond king, while a spade discard a second diamond from hand. Thus you will lose from hand. Thus you will lose only two spades and a diamond, making the contract.
And what would happen if East had followed to the third spade? If he had followed small, you would still discard a diamond from hand to force West to win the trick. If East was clearly going to win the trick (say, West had a 5-2-3-3 pattern), you ruff the spade and exit with a low diamond from hand. For the defense to stand a chance, East must win the trick and play a third diamond. Now you put up the king, succeeding whenever the diamond finesse succeeds or West wins the ace but has no diamonds left.

Notice that if you hadn't ducked the first trick, East could have gained the lead in spades, whereupon the obvious diamond shift would have scuttled the contract.
