Chaparelle House to offer assistance, a sudden move can be confusing for some of the residents.
"It's been stressful for my grandpa," said Scott McCollum, grandson of one of the residents who was moving they share a last name, Scott and Kendra are not related.) "He's been here since October. So this really came up out of the blue. It's been tough, but we've been able to find a
place for him. We're going to place for him. We're going to
move him out all at once so he can have all his stuff with him when he moves in."

## NORWAY KILLER ADMITS MASSACRE CLAIMS SELF-DEFENSE

OSLO, Norway • With a defiant closed-fist salute, a rightwing fanatic admitted Monday to abomb-and-shooting massacre that killed 77 people in Norway but pleaded not guilty to
criminal charges, saying he was acting in self-defense. riminal charges, saying he was acting in self-defense. Breivik rejected the authority of the court as it sought to assign responsibility for the July 22 attacks that shocked Norway and jolted the image of terrorism in Europe.
Dressed in a dark suit and sporting a thin beard, Breivik smiled as a guard removed his handcuffs in the crowded court room. The 33 -year-old then flashed his salute before haking hands with prosecutors and court officials.
your mandate from the Norwegian political parties who support multiculturalism,' Breivik said in his first comments to the court.
Eight people were killed in Breivik's bombing of Oslo's government district and 69 were slain in his shooting massacre at the left-leaning Labor Party's youth camp on Utoya island outside the capital. Breivik has said the attacks by Muslims.

WASHINGTON • Americans bought more electronics, started home improvement projects and updated their
wardrobes last month, inspired by wardrobes last month, inspired by warmer weather and a healthier job
market. U.S. retail sales rose 0.8 percent in March, the Commerce Department said Monday.
The increase capped a strong quarter of gains and contributed to a brighter outlook among economists for
growth in the January-March quarter. growth in the January-March quarter.
Businesses are responding by restocking their shelves at a steady pace, a sign that they expect the trend to carry over into the spring.
More retail spending also helped offset a decline in confidence among homebuilders. And it could ease con-
cerns about March hiring, which slowed to half the pace of the previous three months.
"Retail sales soared in March with stores in just about every category recording sharp increases over February levels," said Joel Naroff, chief econ-
omist at Naroff Economic Advisors, "And let's not forget, the February spending was strong."
The more robust retail sales in March contributed to a mixed day of trading on Wall Street. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up roughly 72 points to end the day at 12,921 . But the Standard \& Poors foo index ended the day essentially flat, while the Nasda The retail sales report

Google \$25,000 OverStreet View Probe

NEW YORK (AP) • The Federal Communications Commission has fined Google $\$ 25,000$, saying the online search leader impeded an inves-
tigation into how it collected data tigation into how it collected data
while taking photos for its "Street View" mapping feature.
The FCC said in a report from Friday that Google Inc." "deliberately impeded and delayed" the investigation for months. The agency said that the online search leader did this by not responding to reques
mation and documents.
At the same time, the FCC said it will not take action against Google over its data collection. Part of the reason for that is that it still has "significant factual questions" about the Street View project that haven't been answered. To get some answers, the
FCC had subpoenaed a Google engineer who developed the software code that the company used to collect and store data. But the engineer, who is not named in the report, declined to testify, invoking his Fifth Amendment rights against incriminating himself. In a statement, Mountain View,
Calif.-based Google said it disagrees with the FCC's characterization of its cooperation with the investigation and will be filing a response.
