Chaparelle Staff Continues Care Amid Sudden Closure

Without phones or a working fire system, staff at the soon-to-shutter facility is still focused on residents' needs.

In the meantime, staff members are doing their best to take care of residents in a facility where the phone lines and the fire system have been turned off.


Assisted Living Concepts - the Wisconsin-based company that owns Chaparelle House - shut off the phone lines Friday despite pleas from interim managers to keep them on, said Rick Holloway, president of Western Health Care.

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare hired Western Health Care to close down the facility after it lost its license last week during an inspection. Please see CHAPARELLE, A2

Long-serving **Senator Faces** Challengerin **Dist.27**

In the newly formed District 27, which includes Minidoka Cassia counties, newcomer Oakley rancher Douglas Pickett is challenging Sen.



and and Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, in the May Pickett 15 primary.

With Declo Sen. Denton Darrington's retirement this session, Cameron would be the most senior member of the Idaho Senate. With that comes influence, Cameron said. If re-elected, Cameron would be able to retain his cochairmanship on the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, where he has helped balance the state's budget during difficult economic times.

"Everything in the Senate is done strictly by seniority," Cameron said. "And a new individual would not have the kind of influence or the ability to protect our priorities, our rural priorities." That includes water and agriculture issues, which Cameron has helped to fund, he said.

But, Pickett said, seniority isn't everything. The Senate needs new ideas, not someone who is tied into the establishment, he said.

"We have an opportunity now to vote for somebody who will go and look for solutions to problems, rather than simply trying to appease special interests or decide things based on political expediency," Pickett said, adding that he sees himself as the true conservative candidate.

In Idaho, the salary for state senators is \$16,116 per year, plus living expenses during the legislative session. State senators serve a two-year term.

Abortion Fight Not Over

Ultrasound still seen as tool in fight against abortion.

TWIN FALLS • Among a sea of baby dresses and posters showing fetal development at the Twin Falls Pregnancy Crisis Center sits a new, hightech ultrasound machine, capable of giving both abdominal and transvaginal ultrasounds.

To Pregnancy Crisis Center Director Marilyn Scott, the ultrasound machine is one of the center's most important tools in the fight against abortion.

The volunteer staff is still receiving training to use the machine - so it is not yet in use on a regular basis.

But Scott said that in her experience, clients

set on getting abortions have changed their mind upon seeing the blurry black and white image of their fetus on the ultrasound monitor. That's why she and others worked for five years to fundraise to bring an ultrasound machine into their office.

It's a battle Scott and the volunteers at the Pregnancy Crisis Center have been quietly waging for years and won't give up on any time soon.

In March, Scott drove to Boise to testify in favor of legislation what would require women to have an ultrasound before getting an abortion, saying that ultrasounds might persuade women not to go through with the procedure.

The bill never passed, and though the legislative session has been over for almost three weeks, Idahoans are still talking about the proposed mandate. And already, opponents and Please see **ABORTION, A2**

At a Glance Abortions in Idaho

In Idaho, women can't just walk into a clinic and immediately get an abortion. Here are the restrictions and requirements:

- A 24-hour waiting period.
- Women must receive three pamphlets that include information on fetal development and abortion alternatives.
- Doctors must offer to allow women to view an ultrasound image of the fetus.
- One parent must give consent before minors get an abortion.
- No abortions after 20 weeks except when the mother's life is in danger.

• Insurance cannot cover the cost of abortion, except when the woman's life is in danger or if an additional premium is paid.

Twin Falls Council Asks about Canyon **Project** Appeal

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls City Council next week will get information from how to appeal approval of a preliminary plat for the planned Canyon Park North development on the Snake River Canyon rim.

That came after questions Monday about how such an appeal would work, following concerns voiced by residents over the project, a planned shopping center.

During Monday's public comment period, Cheri Condie spoke against the project. Mayor Greg

Lanting then asked if there was any way the public or council could appeal the Planning and Zoning Commission's approval of the development's plat.

Lanting said he'd heard from several citizens over the past week wondering about an appeal.

"I think it is safe to say this is a passionate issue by both sides," said City Manager Travis Rothweiler, asking the council to wait until consulting legal counsel before making a decision on how to proceed.

Also Monday, the council heard a presentation from the city's human resources department on wages for city employees.

T.F. JAIL INMATE **ALLEGEDLY FOUND** WITH MORPHINE

TWIN FALLS • A woman allegedly found with morphine pills while she was an inmate at the Twin Falls County Jail was arraigned Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

According to court records, at about 10:46 a.m. April 3, other inmates informed jail deputies that Janelle Renee Harrington, 44, of Lincoln, Neb., was in the bathroom and had a baggie of blue pills. The pills were later identified as morphine.

Sheriff's deputies said they found Harrington sitting on the toilet and ordered her to stand up, without flushing. But they didn't find any pills, according to court records nor did they find pills after a strip search and a cell search.

At lunch that day, a deputy reported walking past the holding cell where Harrington was sitting and noticed one of her hands was under her tray, holding something. The deputy allegedly found a baggie with several blue pills, some blue powder on Harrington's jumpsuit, and a piece of a blue pill where she had been sitting.

Harrington was taken to the emergency room where deputies say a piece of plastic bag and a piece of a blue pill was removed from her body after a cavity search.

Harrington was charged with possession of a controlled substance and possession of a controlled substance by an inmate. She is being held on \$10,000 bond and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for April 27.

Former Walmart Security Guard Charged with Grand Theft

TWIN FALLS • Police say a former Walmart employee who worked security for the store shoplifted more than \$1,400 in electronic items.

On Wednesday, Twin Falls Police responded to the Twin Falls Walmart in the 200 block of Cheney Drive West for a call about an employee theft.

A loss prevention em-

ployee told police he had seen security video of Emma Kathleen Richins, 19, in the store the night before.

At about 11:40 p.m. on April 10, Richins was allegedly spotted on the video with a computer missing its security device. Another security employee told officers Richins was also seen going into the bathrooms at the front of the store and could be heard opening packaging in a stall, according to the police report.

The report says Richins then left the store followed by security employees. She allegedly told the other employees she knew they couldn't detain her when they asked for her receipt for the items.

According to the report, when she was told police were on the way, Richins left the cart with the merchandise and drove away. Officers met with

Richins at her home in the 100 block of Meadowview Lane in Twin Falls on April 12 and arrested her for grand theft. According to police,

Richins called and reported threats because of a drug debt and might have stolen the items to repay her debts.

The items left in the shopping cart totaled \$1,217.28, but police say another \$212.59 worth of merchandise has not been recovered.

Richins was arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on grand theft and burglary charges. A \$1,000 bond was set and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for April 20.

supporters are looking ahead to the next legislative session, readying their arguments if the contentious issue comes up again.

Opponents had many problems with the bill: There was no exemption for victims of rape and incest; it inserted the government into a decision normally made between a doctor and a woman; and Idaho physicians are already legally required to offer women a chance to see an ultrasound image.

But, Scott said, some of her clients claim abortion

Volunteers at the center promote abstinence, and encourage people with unplanned pregnancies to keep the baby or put it up for adoption. Those seeking birth control advice get referred to their physicians, especially because some of the volunteers are religiously opposed to contraception. The idea, Scott said, is to "let that be between her and her doctor."

Scott isn't a fan of the legislative process, but said she is willing to testify again if the issue affects her clients.

Hannah Brass, legislative director for Planned Parenthood Votes Northwest, said the organization is waiting to see what

the original bill sponsor, said he might consider sponsoring the bill again, but only if there are changes. Jason Herring, president of Right to Life Idaho, said he and other bill supporters might try different tactics next year, like introducing the bill earlier in the session to give legislators time to learn all the facts.

"It's hard to say exactly what I will do, what Planned Parenthood will do, about it," Brass said. In the meantime, Planned Parenthood is getting involved with the elections by sending out questionnaires that quiz candidates on issues like sex education and abortion rights.

With no emergency backup system, Western hired an additional employee to check on the residents and monitor the building every 15 minutes, Holloway said.

"I'm shocked that this company is behaving this way," Holloway said. "It's nothing we can't handle but it puts unnecessary stress on the residents and family members."

Assisted Living Concepts didn't provide a comment when contacted by the Times-News on Monday.

For staff and residents, the transition hasn't been easy.

Kendra McCollum has been working as a certified nursing assistant at Chaparelle House for the past two years. Though she's not related to them by blood, Mc-Collum says has learned to consider the facility's 18 residents as her family.

"It's been really rough," Kendra said, wiping tears from her eyes. "It's not fair."

The facility lost its license after state surveyors determined it was inadequately staffed. The state was also keeping a close watch after a complaint filed against Chaparelle House showed that it failed to protect its residents from exploitation.

While local assisted living facilities have reached out to Chaparelle House to offer assistance, a sudden move can be confusing for some of the residents.

"It's been stressful for my grandpa," said Scott McCollum, grandson of one of the residents who was moving out on Monday. (Though they share a last name, Scott and Kendra are not related.) "He's been here since October. So this really came up out of the blue. It's been tough, but we've been able to find a place for him. We're going to move him out all at once so he can have all his stuff with him when he moves in." On a positive note, Holloway commended the Magic Valley's health care community and Chaparelle's staff on making the transition a smooth process. "The staff is losing their jobs and they're still working their hearts out," he said. Kendra said now that she doesn't have a job, she plans to go back to school to become a registered nurse. "I've worked here for two years and this just sickens me," she said. "If I had one thing to tell the families and residents, it would be that I love you all."

On March 29, the Twin Falls County sheriff's narcotics investigation team conducted two controlled purchases of methamphetamine with the aid of a confidential source at Dryden's home, in the 300 block of Eighth Avenue North in Buhl.

The source had been advised by Gooding County sheriff's deputies to arrange to purchase an eighth of a gram of methamphetamine from Dryden.

According to court documents, the source took \$220 to Dryden's home and bought 2.2 grams of meth. About an hour later, the source returned and allegedly picked up an additional half-gram Dryden owed.

On April 10, deputies arraigned another buy between Dryden and the conDryden they were not and asked to buy one-sixteenth of an ounce of meth.

"This is a dangerous (explicative) game we play. This is my life and everyone knows I won't be taken alive. I have to worry," Dryden said, according to court records.

Dryden sold 1/32-gram of meth and 19.5 grams of marijuana to the source that day, the records state.

Curtis Frank Benavidez was also arrested at the scene for frequenting a place where drugs are sold.

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Grant Helps Buhl Afterschool Program

BUHL • The Buhl School District will receive a \$150,000 grant for its after-school program.

The Idaho State Department of Education has awarded \$1.5 million in grants to 11 districts across the state to help boost academic support, cultural enrichment and involvecommunity ment. The money is to "21st Century fund Community Learning Centers."

Competitive grant awards for the 2012-13 school year ranged from \$98,039 to \$150,000. They're renewable for up to five years.

Buhl Superintendent Byron Stutzman said the district will partner with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Magic Valley to look at using grant funding to build a club location in Buhl.

In addition to Buhl, other districts that received funding include American Falls, Blackfoot Community Center/Idaho Science and Technology Charter School, Emmett, Fremont, Kootenai, Madison, Nampa, Pocatello/Chubbuck, Sugar-Salmon and Vallivue.

Structured afterschool programs are a key component in preventing gang activity, drug use and delinquent behavior, according to the ISDE.

TWIN FALLS • A Heyburn man was charged with trafficking in methamphetamine after Idaho State Police made a traffic stop and reported finding more than half a pound of meth.

Jose Tapia Lopez was arraigned Thursday on charges of trafficking, destruction of evidence, eluding and providing false information in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

At 2:18 p.m. Wednesday, an Idaho State Police corporal was patrolling on U.S. Highway 93 near Bridgeview Boulevard in

Twin Falls when he saw a blue 1997 Saturn SC with a window tint that appeared too dark. The corporal followed the driver, later identified as Lopez, as he turned onto Bridgeview and tried to make a traffic stop. The corporal said the driver then pulled into the Magic Valley Mall parking lot and continued to drive. As the driver began to pull toward an exit, the corporal said he hit the Saturn in its left rear corner with the bumper of the patrol car, causing it to come to a stop.

According to court records, Lopez provided police with a false Mexican identification card, but later gave his real name in an interview.

At one point in the pursuit, the ISP corporal lost sight of Tapia. Another officer said that at this point he saw Tapia throw a package from his vehicle. The package was recovered, tested and weighed and according to police contained 231.1 grams of methamphetamine.

Lopez also had a felony warrant in Minidoka County for possession of methamphetamine and one in Cassia County for possession of meth with intent to deliver.

He was held on \$250,000 bond and a preliminary hearing was scheduled for April 20.

U.S. Prepares for Last Major Afghan Offensive


KABUL, Afghanistan • For Taliban militants and U.S. strategists alike, all roads in this impoverished country of mountain passes, arid deserts and nearly impassable goat tracks lead to this ancient capital of 3 million people nestled in a high and narrow valley.

The Taliban made their intentions clear over the weekend, mounting spectacular coordinated attacks that spawned an 18-hour battle with Afghan and NA-TO forces. And now, the U.S. is gearing up for what may be the last major Americanrun offensive of the war – a bid to secure the approaches to the city.

While bombings and shootings elsewhere in Afghanistan receive relatively little attention, attacks in the capital alarm the general population, undermine the government's reputation and frighten foreigners into fleeing the country. That's why insurgents on Sunday struck locations that were so fortified they could cause little or no damage, including the diplomatic quarter, the parliament and a NATO base. "These are isolated at-

tacks that are done for symbolic purposes, and they have not regained any territory," U.S. Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said Monday.

The U.S.-led spring offensive, expected to begin in the coming weeks, may be NATO's last chance to shore up Kabul's defenses before a significant withdrawal of highways into Kabul from the desert south and the mountainous east. These routes are used not only by militants but by traders carrying goods from Pakistan and Iran.

The strategy in eastern Afghanistan involves clearing militants from provinces such as Ghazni, just south of ing Pakistan to the east.

NATO, under U.S. command, will also conduct more operations in eastern provinces such as Paktika and Paktia that are considered major infiltration routes to the capital from insurgent safe havens in Pakistan.

Afghan and U.S. officials blamed the Pakistan-based Haqqani network, which is part of the Taliban and has close links with al-Qaida, for the weekend attacks that left 36 insurgents, eight policemen and three civilians dead in Kabul and three eastern provinces. But Army Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, said officials have not concluded whether the attacks emanated out of Pakistan.

Declining numbers of international troops in the coming months are also forcing coalition forces to focus less on remote and thinly populated places such as eastern Nuristan. They hope to move responsibility for those areas to the Afghan security forces.

Coalition forces last summer made gains in traditional Taliban strongholds such as Kandahar and Helmand provinces in the south, areas they must now hold with fewer troops. By September, as many as 10,000 U.S. Marines are scheduled to leave Helmand and hand over the lead for security to Afghan forces in the former Taliban stronghold.

NORWAY KILLER ADMITS MASSACRE, CLAIMS SELF-DEFENSE

OSLO, Norway • With a defiant closed-fist salute, a rightwing fanatic admitted Monday to a bomb-and-shooting massacre that killed 77 people in Norway but pleaded not guilty to criminal charges, saying he was acting in self-defense.

On the first day of his long-awaited trial, Anders Behring Breivik rejected the authority of the court as it sought to assign responsibility for the July 22 attacks that shocked Norway and jolted the image of terrorism in Europe.

Dressed in a dark suit and sporting a thin beard, Breivik smiled as a guard removed his handcuffs in the crowded court room. The 33-year-old then flashed his salute before shaking hands with prosecutors and court officials.

"I don't recognize Norwegian courts because you get your mandate from the Norwegian political parties who support multiculturalism," Breivik said in his first comments to the court.

Eight people were killed in Breivik's bombing of Oslo's government district and 69 were slain in his shooting massacre at the left-leaning Labor Party's youth camp on Utoya island outside the capital. Breivik has said the attacks were necessary to protect Norway from being taken over by Muslims.

"I admit to the acts, but not criminal guilt," he told the court, insisting he had acted in self-defense.

The key issue to be resolved during the 10-week trial is the state of Breivik's mental health, which will decide whether he is sent to prison or into psychiatric care. Anxious to prove he is not insane, Breivik will call right-wing extremists and radical Islamists to testify during the trial, to show that others also share his view of clashing civilizations. combat troops limits its options. Iran Tightens Grip on Web in 'Soft War' with West

TEHRAN, Iran • Iran calls it the "soft war" with the West: Battles to control, defend and monitor the Internet and other high-level telecommunications. The latest move came quietly when the powerful Revolutionary Guard recently launched what it claims is a hackproof communications network for its high-level commanders.

Largely overshadowed by the showdowns over Iran's nuclear program, the efforts to build a cyber-fortress have become a priority among leaders fearful of Internet espionage and virus attacks from abroad and seeking to choke off opposition outlets at home.

The drive also highlights the stepped up attempts by many nations — particularly across the Middle East — to filter the Web after social networking sites played such a crucial role in the Arab Spring uprisings.

In a video message for Iranian new year last month, President Barack Obama denounced what he called the "electronic curtain" that keeps ordinary Iranians from reaching out to Americans and the West.

"We are not in an imaginary state of threats or sanctions," Revolutionary Guard Deputy Cmdr. Hossein Salami told Guard leaders in late March as he inaugurated the new closed communications system called "Basir," or Perspective. "Threats and sanctions are practically being enforced against us. Communications have changed the picture of the world including threats

The system is vaguely described as a something akin to a closed mobile phone network, possibly involving special relay towers and passcodes.

The Guard's network is separate from Iran's wider goal of creating a socalled "clean" Internet, a plan not fully explained by authorities but apparently seeking to weed out non-sanctioned content.

The Guard's new communications system reflects the increased emphasis on high-level security amid tensions over Iran's nuclear ambitions and the possibility of a pre-emptive Israeli strike to stop what the West suspects is a program aimed at building weapons.

Basir was unveiled days after Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei ordered the creation of an Internet oversight agency that included top military, security and political figures in the country's boldest attempt yet to control the Web.

The panel is headed by President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad and includes powerful figures in the security establishment such as the intelligence chief, the commander of the Revolutionary Guards and the country's top police chief.

AP Wins Pulitzer for Stories on NYPD Spying

NEW YORK • The Associated Press won a Pulitzer Prize for investigative journalism Monday for revealing the New York Police Department's widespread spying on Muslims, while The Patriot-News in Harrisburg, Pa., and a 24year-old reporter captured the award for local reporting for breaking the Penn State scandal that ultimately brought down Joe Paterno.

In a reflection of the forces reshaping the media world, the turmoil-ridden Philadelphia Inquirer won in the public service category for exposing pervasive violence in the city's schools, while David Wood earned a Pulitzer in national reporting for a relative newcomer, The Huffington Post, for stories about the suffering endured by American troops severely wounded in Iraq and Afghanistan.

It was only the second Pulitzer ever awarded for reporting that appeared online only.

A year after the Pulitzer judges found no entry worthy of the prize for breaking news, The Tuscaloosa News of Alabama won the award for

coverage of a deadly tornado. It beat out the Wisconsin State Journal, which was named a finalist for its around-the-clock coverage of the political drama and historic protests over collective-bargaining rights that erupted after Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker's introduction of a budget-repair bill last year. The Journal is owned by Lee Enterprises, the owner of the Times-News.

By blending traditional reporting with the use of social media, The Tuscaloosa News provided real-time updates and helped locate missing people, while producing indepth print coverage despite a power outage that forced the paper to publish at a plant 50

The twister hit just after the news staff had had a session on how to use social media to cover the news, city editor Katherine Lee recalled.

"I think we won because the tornado hit where we live, and we all felt a responsibility to do this well, to tell our story well - about how people came together to help total strangers," Lee said.

Another Pulitzer for investigative reporting was awarded to The Seattle Times for a series about accidental methadone overdoses among patients with chronic pain.

The New York Times won two prizes. David Kocieniewski was honored in the explanatory reporting category for a series on how wealthy people and corporations use loopholes to avoid taxes. And Jeffrey Gettleman received the award for international reporting for his coverage of famine and conflict in East Africa.

Sig Gissler, administrator of the prizes, said the winners in this year's 96th annual competition show that journalism is still a "vibrant force" as a watchdog for the public.

The AP's series of stories available online at http://apne.ws/IrNyPk - showed how New York police, with the help of a CIA official, created an aggressive surveillance program to gather intelligence on Muslim neighborhoods, businesses and houses of worship. It was the 50th Pulitzer won by the news organization.

Things like Housing and Urban Development, which my dad was head of, that might not be around later. But I'm not going to actually go through these one by one. What I can tell you is, we've got far too many bureaucrats. I will send a lot of what happens in Washington back to the states."

Hot Temperatures Force Boston Marathoners to Take It Slow

BOSTON • There are races to run fast, and there are races just to finish. With temperatures hitting the 80s, Monday's Boston Marathon was the latter.

Nearly 22,500 participants braved unseasonably balmy conditions at the 116th running of the storied 26.2 mile race. Organizers stocked extra water and pleaded with runners to slow their pace to avoid heat stroke. Some 4,300 participants registered to run opted to sit out.

A pair of Kenyans outlasted the heat to take first place in their respective races. Wesley Korir prevailed on the men's side, while Sharon Cherop placed first for the women.

"It was brutal, just brutally hot," said 38-year-old runner Jason Warick of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, who took an ice bath before the race to cool his body. "Around 15 miles the

wheels just came off. Then it was just about getting home?'

Organizers said that as of Monday evening, just under 2,000 participants had received some level of medical attention, and about 120 were taken to hospitals in ambulances. One person was taken from the course in serious condition in Wellesley, though the details of their condition were unavailable Monday.

Medical volunteers scanned the finish line for runners displaying signs of heat stroke, assisting those in need to nearby medical tents. By mid-afternoon, dozens of wheelchairs carrying pale and weakened runners stretched outside the tents.

"I've never seen anything like (that)," said 35-year-old Desiree Ficker of Austin, Texas, who used salt supplements during the race to stay moving. "It was really hard seeing the confusion on people's faces."

Organizers said careful preparation and responsible runners prevented more serious problems on what was one of the hottest marathons in Boston history.

Heat was also a problem in the 2004 marathon.



US Economic Outlook Brightens as Retail Sales Rise

WASHINGTON • Americans bought more electronics, started home improvement projects and updated their wardrobes last month, inspired by warmer weather and a healthier job market.

U.S. retail sales rose 0.8 percent in March, the Commerce Department said Monday.

The increase capped a strong quarter of gains and contributed to a brighter outlook among economists for growth in the January-March quarter. Businesses are responding by restocking their shelves at a steady pace, a sign that they expect the trend to carry over into the spring.

More retail spending also helped offset a decline in confidence among homebuilders. And it could ease concerns about March hiring, which slowed to half the pace of the previous three months.

"Retail sales soared in March with stores in just about every category recording sharp increases over February levels," said Joel Naroff, chief economist at Naroff Economic Advisors. "And let's not forget, the February spending was strong."

The more robust retail sales in March contributed to a mixed day of trading on Wall Street. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up roughly 72 points to end the day at 12,921.But the Standard & Poor's 500 index ended the day essentially flat, while the Nasdaq composite fell 23 points.

The retail sales report is the government's first look each month at consumer spending, which represents 70 percent of economic activity.

Consumers are spending more despite paying higher gas prices and seeing little growth in their wages. Shoppers bought more furniture, groceries, clothes and sporting goods last month. They also paid more for gas.

Still, excluding cars, gas and food, sales rose 8.2 percent in the first quarter, the most in two years.

The gain pushed total retail sales to a record high of \$411.1 billion, 24 percent higher than the recession low hit in March 2009.

"This is a good report," said Chris Christopher, an economist at IHS Global Insight. "Consumers are spending despite feeling the pump price pinch."

Other recent data suggest stronger growth in the January-March quarter.

Business stockpiles rose a seasonally adjusted 0.6 percent in February, the Commerce Department said.

wholesalers and manufacturers as well as retailers - grew 0.7 percent, more than inventories. That's a good sign because it is evidence that companies aren't building too much inventory, which can lead to production cutbacks.

OBAMA'S BUFFETT RULE IMPACT ON TAXES, JOBS

WASHINGTON (AP) • President Barack Obama's proposal to impose a "Buffett rule" tax on the rich is generating enormous political wattage, but the plan itself would directly affect only a tiny fraction of Americans. Only around 210,000 taxpayers – a bit over 1 of every 1,000 – would face higher federal taxes if the measure were enacted, according to an estimate by one respected bipartisan research group.

In addition, while Republicans say the plan would be a job killer, only a small proportion of businesses would potentially be subject to the tax, according to data from a 2011 Treasury Department study. These firms make disproportionately large amounts of money, but many of them don't employ any workers

American Jim Yong Kim is Chosen to Lead World Bank

WASHINGTON • Jim Yong Kim, an American who is president of Dartmouth College, has been chosen to be the next president of the World Bank. His selection extends the U.S. hold on the top job at the 187-nation development agency.

Kim, a surprise nominee of President Barack Obama, was selected Monday in a vote by the World Bank's 25-member executive board. He'll succeed Robert Zoellick, who's stepping down after a five year term.

Developing nations waged an unsuccessful challenge to Kim, 52, a physician and pioneer in treating HIV/AIDS and tuberculosis in the developing world.

Kim's selection marks a break from

previous World Bank leaders who were typically political, legal or economic figures. The World Bank raises money from its member nations and borrows from investors to provide low-cost loans to developing countries.

Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner praised the selection, saying Kim "has a lifetime of experience solving complex problems." He said Kim "will help breathe new life into the World Bank's efforts" to promote economic growth around the world.

Developing countries had put forward two candidates for the post: Nigerian Finance Minister Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala and former Colombian Finance Minister Jose Antonio Ocampo. Both argued that it was time to break the hold the United States has had on the World Bank job and provide a greater voice for developing nations.

FCC Fines Google \$25,000 Over Street **View Probe**

NEW YORK (AP) • The Federal Communications Commission has fined Google \$25,000, saying the online search leader impeded an investigation into how it collected data while taking photos for its "Street View" mapping feature.

The FCC said in a report from Friday that Google Inc. "deliberately impeded and delayed" the investigation for months. The agency said that the online search leader did this by not responding to requests for information and documents.

At the same time, the FCC said it will not take action against Google over its data collection. Part of the reason for that is that it still has "significant factual questions" about the Street View project that haven't been answered. To get some answers, the FCC had subpoenaed a Google engineer who developed the software code that the company used to collect and store data. But the engineer, who is not named in the report, declined to testify, invoking his Fifth Amendment rights against incriminating himself.

In a statement, Mountain View, Calif.-based Google said it disagrees with the FCC's characterization of its cooperation with the investigation and will be filing a response.

"As the FCC notes in their report, we provided all the materials the regulators felt they needed to conclude their investigation and we were not found to have violated any laws," the company said in a prepared statement.

irtually everything said and done in a presidential election year distorts the truth, much like concave and convex mirrors



in a carnival attraction alter one's true reflection.

That kind of distortion occurred in the recent dustup over whether women who choose to stay at home can completely understand the economic challenges and personal struggles faced by women who choose, or need, to work outside the home while raising children.

There is no question that professional women receive much more societal validation than "stay-at-home moms." Few magazine covers at the checkout line or full-page ads promoting events and awards to "successful" women, laud mothers who stay home to raise their children. There aren't a lot of television shows today like "Ozzie and Harriett," "Leave It to Beaver" or "Father Knows Best."

The view expressed by Democratic strategist Hilary Rosen that Mitt Romney's wife, Ann, has "never worked a day in her life" and thus can't relate to struggling families is bogus. Can a politician who has never held a job in the private sector relate to those who work there, or are searching for a job there? I'm thinking of the former community organizer, now president, Barack Obama. Can a career politician like Vice President Joe Biden identify with someone who doesn't have the perks planes, limousines, high pay and discounted, or free health care - he has enjoyed for most of his career?

Former Vice President Dan Quayle's wife, Marilyn, who is an attorney, said it best at the 1992 Republican National Convention in Houston: "...having a profession is not incompatible with being a good mother or a good wife. ... Women's lives are different from men's lives. We make different trade-offs. We make different sacrifices. And we get different rewards."

If a woman "chooses" to work at home (and aren't politically liberal women supposed to support a woman's career choice?) and if she feels adequately compensated, shouldn't her choice be affirmed, not only by her husband or partner, if she has one, but also by society?

Similarly, if a woman wants to work, or must work outside her home, shouldn't she be equally supported by society and not made to feel added guilt and pressure? Reasonable people ought to be able to answer, "yes," to both questions.

Still, all of this is a distraction. Even if Ann Romney had chosen to work outside her home (and she did perform a great deal of volunteer work while battling breast cancer and multiple sclerosis), and even if she then could - in Rosen's mind - relate to other women who made that same decision, how would that make anyone else's life better? Would such a choice by Romney have improved the economy so that women who want to work outside the home, but can't find jobs, get one? Would it have allowed women to stay home if they were afforded that "luxury"?

This is what politics has become. It's about feelings and image, not substance and ideas that work. Because of skyrocketing debt, high unemployment and the failed policies they have promoted, Democrats cling to feelings and focus on one's ability to relate. But it's a fiction to believe that the only women's issues of importance are those promoted by the left. Liberal women are attempting to dominate women who share a different political and moral worldview. It's all a house of mirrors; nothing more than a distortion of reality in an election year. Expect to see more of the same between now and November.

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




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




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Mont. Man Gets 25-54 Years in Idaho Woman's Death

BOISE (AP) • A Bozeman, Mont., man was sentenced Monday to 25 to 54 years in prison for killing his former girlfriend at her Boise apartment last year and setting a fire to try to destroy evidence.

Lloyd Hardin McNeil, 32, was sentenced to 15 years in prison for voluntary manslaughter the March 5, 2011, slaying of Natalie Davis, 30. He also was sentenced to a consecutive 25 years for firstdegree arson and 14 years for grand theft.

Fourth District Judge Deborah Bail said McNeil must serve all 15 years for the manslaughter and at least 10 years on the arson charge before he can ask for parole, The Idaho Statesman reported.

Prosecutors said Mc-Neil and Davis had a tumultuous relationship that turned fatal when McNeil suffocated her, soaked her mattress in vegetable oil and set it on fire. Prosecutors said he then took her car, dogs and some jewelry and left town. He was arrested two weeks later in Seattle.

McNeil continues to maintain his innocence, saying the case against him was "ridiculous assumption and speculation" and that he "wished he could have saved" Davis but didn't explain what that meant.

The day before she died, Davis told Boise police she had broken up with Mc-Neil after he tried to shove pills down her throat. She said she planned to move to California.

After Davis' death, a charge that McNeil assaulted her in Gallatin County, Mont., in July 2010 was dismissed.

Idaho Roadblock Remains after Judge Intervenes

BOISE • A judge prohibited a central Idaho county from dispatching a frontend loader to clear boulders that block a remote mountain road, temporarily defusing a local-versus-federal flareup in which one county official threatened to haul off a U.S. Bureau of Land Management manager in "pretty pink handcuffs."

U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill ruled on Friday that Custer County officials for now can't reopen Herd Creek Road after objections of the BLM, which argued the boulder-removal plan violated federal law.

The agency closed the road near a wilderness study area more than a decade ago. But county officials have been warning for months they would remove boulders on Sunday, arguing the BLM didn't properly consult with locals.

Custer County sent heavy machinery to the closed road on Sunday but stopped short of removing the boulders after the decision by Winmill, who wrote the county failed to follow proper guidelines to wrest control of the road from the federal agency.

"Irreparable harm is likely because the defendants intend to reopen the road that passes through, and is proximate to, a wilderness study area that could be adversely affected by traffic," Winmill wrote. "The road has been closed since 1999, and there is no showing of any need for reopening the road at this point?"

Winmill, who said the BLM has a likelihood of succeeding on its argument's merits, scheduled a hearing Thursday in Pocatello on his temporary restraining order.

Custer County Commission Chairman Wayne Butts, among locals in this mountainous region who for years have chafed at federal control of about 97 percent of county territory, said Monday he envisions this case as establishing a beachhead in returning the region's management to people who live here.

Since last year, Butts and other Custer County commissioners have been getting advice from Fred Kelly Grant, a constitutional lawyer and property rights activist who argues the federal government has failed to properly coordinate road closures and other management decisions with local officials.

This month, Butts called state BLM director Steve Ellis and warned him he would forcibly remove any federal officials who tried to stop the front loader from completing its business.

That included BLM district manager Joe Kraavenbrink in Idaho Falls.

"I told Steve if Joe showed up, I'd find a pretty pink pair of handcuffs to have him hauled away in," Butts said, adding he was disappointed with Winmill's restraining order. "I'm shocked that a federal judge would allow himself to be used as the arm of federal activism of the worst sort?"

Bureau of Land Management officials didn't immediately return a phone call Monday.

In their filing seeking the restraining order, they argued that Herd Creek Road was blocked to protect values in the Jerry Peak Wilderness Study area, where no motorized vehicles are allowed.

"BLM-in-Removing stalled barriers to access will constitute a trespass on lands belonging to the United State and likely result in damage to federal government property, damages to natural resources, and a violation of federal law including the U.S. Constitution," BLM lawyers wrote.

Grant, the activist who is also working to block removal of dams on California's Klamath River, didn't return a phone call.

POCATELLO • A 6-yearold Pocatello boy who was hospitalized last week after apparently being beaten has been removed from life support at a Salt Lake City hospital.

The Bannock County prosecutor's office is reviewing the case to decide if charges against the boy's father, Anthony Blake Viles, will be upgraded. Viles was arrested Thursday and charged with felony injury to a child after investigators say he acknowledged striking the boy.

The Idaho State Journal reports Afton Wrigley was removed from life support at Primary Children's Hospital on Sunday evening. The family donated the boy's organs.

Prosecutor Mark Hiedeman says an autopsy was planned Monday and a decision on charges will be made Tuesday.

David Priestley of Franklin told Idaho Fish and Game officials that he was hunting marmots with his son and his nephew, both 9, on April 7 when the buck began circling them, stomping and raking its head.

Priestley called Fish and Game Officer Korey Owens, who shot the animal.

Owens said the age, size and location of the buck were consistent with the deer that attacked Sue Panter last fall, causing puncture wounds, scratches and bruises. Panter's rescuer, Michael Vaughan, was gored in the legs.

The buck's head and neck were taken to the state's Wildlife Health Laboratory in Caldwell for testing.

NOBODY HIRES BOBBY VALENTINE EXPECTING PEACE

hat's not the way he did business in the past, and as his latest run-in with struggling slugger Kevin Youkilis demonstrated, Bobby V. is not about to turn over a new leaf now.

Whether it meant needling opponents, umpires, his players or even his boss – Valentine rarely lets an opportunity pass without reminding everyone who is the smartest guy in the room. That explains why he was so welcome in TV studios and broadcast booths, but perhaps also why Valentine hadn't managed in the big leagues for 10 years until the Red Sox gave him an office last winter. So if nothing else, a culture clash was inevitable.

Boston was coming off an historic collapse in the final month of last season, the last few days of which have been portrayed as a baseball production of "Animal House." Terry Francona, who preceded Valentine in the job and won two World Series titles in his eight seasons there, conceded he'd left it to the players to police the clubhouse themselves and that by the end, a few devoted more time studying takeout menus than lineup cards. Even after leaving, Francona was reluctant to name names. That won't happen with Valentine, who calls things



should remember when Valentine was managing the Mets and Todd Hundley, arguably his best bat, went into a slump in late August 1997. Instead of extra batting practice for Hundley – or as in Youkilis' case, a show of more emotion - Valentine prescribed an entire lifestyle makeover.



Potential Clemens Jurors Question Cost Of Hearing

WASHINGTON Roger Clemens stood and uttered "Morning" to the 90 potential jurors who had gathered in the ornate, sixth-floor ceremonial courtroom, the one deemed big enough to hold them all. After he sat down, he swiveled his chair, as if trying to make eye contact with as many as possible.

Some of those looking back had no idea who he was. Others, including two who survived the first cut, wondered if it was a waste of taxpayer time and money that got him to this point.

The seven-time Cy Young Award winner was back in court Monday in the government's second attempt to prove that he misled a

House committee at a landmark drugs-and-sports hearing in 2008. The first trial last July ended in a mistrial when prosecutors introduced inadmissible evi-Clemens

dence after only two witnesses had been called.

One potential juror said he felt "it was a little bit ridiculous" when Congress held

hearings on drug use in sports because he felt the government should have been focusing on bigger problems.

Nevertheless, the native of Chile – an investment officer for an international bank – was asked to return, the only male to remain in the jury pool among those who were individually screened

on the first day. Another potential juror recalled the 2008 hearing by saying: "At the time, I remember thinking it didn't seem to be a great use of taxpayer money," but she was kept in the pool after she said she could be impartial.

"Even if I don't agree with the reason that you're brought before Congress, you still have to tell the truth If you perjure yourself before Congress, it's still illegal," said the woman, who is an executive for an environmental nonprofit organization.

But another potential juror was excused after she volunteered: "I don't know if that's the best use of government tax dollars at this time." She said her feelings could influence her ability to serve.

Hot Temps Slow Down Boston Marathon

BOSTON • There are races to run fast, and there are races just to finish. With temperatures hitting the 80s, Monday's Boston Marathon was the latter.

Nearly 22,500 participants braved unseasonably balmy conditions at the 116th running of the storied 26.2 mile race. Organizers stocked extra water and pleaded with runners to slow their pace to avoid heat stroke. Some 4,300 participants registered to run opted to sit out.

"It was brutal, just brutally hot," said 38-year-old runner Jason Warick of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, who took an ice bath before the race to cool his body. "Around 15 miles the

wheels just came off. Then it was just about getting home."

Organizers said that as of Monday evening, just under 2,000 participants had received some level of medical attention, and about 120 were taken to hospitals in ambulances. One person was taken from the course in serious condition in Wellesley, though the details of their condition were unavailable Monday.

Medical volunteers scanned the finish line for runners displaying signs of heat stroke, assisting those in need to nearby medical tents. By midafternoon, dozens of wheelchairs carrying pale and weakened runners stretched outside the tents.

"I've never seen anything like (that)," said 35-year-old

Desiree Ficker of Austin, Texas, who used salt supplements during the race to stay moving. "It was really hard seeing the confusion on people's faces."

Organizers said careful preparation and responsible runners prevented more serious problems on what was one of the hottest marathons in Boston history.

Heat was also a problem in the 2004 marathon, when 2,041 of the 18,002 participants who started the race sought medical attention. That's a higher percentage than any year in memory, according to organizers.

"This was the day we were preparing for," said Thomas Grilk, executive director of the Boston Athletic Association

the club's president.

Much of Valentine's tenure with the Mets was no picnic, either, including a stunt in which then-GM Steve Phillips fired his coaching staff and practically dared Valentine to stay on. He did, but lost

that job eventually, too. So all those teammates who stood up for Youkilis, saying they've "got his back" and "that's not the way we go about our stuff around here" would be wise to watch their own backs. Because that's exactly the way Valentine goes about his "stuff."

He might have singled out Youkilis to get his

teammates rallying behind him, or planting the seeds for a trade. Either way, once his comment about Youkilis - "I don't think he's as physically or emotionally into the game as he has been in the past for some reason" - produced exactly the kind of manufactured controversy he specializes in, Valentine said he was simply answering a question. He then denied trying to motivate his third baseman, apologizing in one breath and then hinting he might not be done in the next.

"I'd be surprised if Kevin didn't know I was totally behind him," Valentine said. "We're big boys. I think he'll get it. If not, I'll talk to him a lot more."

during preseason drills? Didn't Kellen Moore start as a freshman?

Well, he did. But Moore also did it with a redshirt year under his belt. And recent history says quarterbacks who start as true freshmen take their lumps – even if the win-loss mark doesn't show it.

Of the top 100 quarterbacks in passing efficiency in 2011, seven were true freshmen. The highest-rated true freshman passer was Utah State's Chuckie Keeton at No. 46, a number he may have improved on had he not missed the Aggies' last four games of the regular season due to injury.

USU went 2-5 in Keeton's starts, although anyone familiar with the Aggies' tough-luck season knows inexperience at quarterback wasn't the reason for that mark.

Down at No. 57 is Louisville's Teddy Bridgewater, a reserve until the Cardinals' third game, who went 6-5 as a starter.

Wyoming's Brett Smith had the best individual record of true freshmen, starting from Day 1 for a team that went 8-5 while finishing 33rd nationally in total offense (80th in passing efficiency).

You'll forgive Bronco fans for scoffing at those statistics. Smith had season-lows in passing (78 yards) and total offense (115 yards) when the Broncos stuffed the Pokes 36-14 on Nov. 26.

Chris Petersen has said your program isn't where you want it to be if you have to start a true freshman at quarterback. Only one of those quarterbacks played for a BCS conference team, a level in which Boise State justifiably believes it would thrive. The record of the seven teams that started

sive line and linebacker. Demarcus Lawrence (five tackles, four solo, one for loss), Sam Ukwuachu (four tackles, one sack, one pass breakup) and Darren Koontz (1.5 tackles for loss and a sack) backed up their coaches' impressions with strong efforts Saturday.

Needs polish: The options at running back are slim after D.J. Wright. Drew Wright is projected to be the backup, but too often on Saturday, the hole would close up before he could hit it. Raphiel Lambert is out for the year with a torn ACL, and Phillip Hogan was unimpressive Saturday. Hope lies in plenty of new bodies coming aboard for preseason drills, plus the nature of the position itself - it's the easiest position to fill on the field.

Not again: The most refreshing aspect of the kicking game is that Petersen understands and is even able to make light of the anxiety within the fanbase over placekicking. Nothing has changed in that department.

But anxiety will be replaced by outright terror if a replacement doesn't emerge for punter Brad Elkin. Whether it was rugby-style or the traditional two-step approach, Bronco punts Saturday rarely sailed high, and one was almost blocked. The Broncos finished tied for 24th nationally in fourth-down conversion attempts and that's a number that will remain high unless solutions emerge in the kicking game.







THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

In today's deal from a charity game in honor of Arthur Loeb to benefit the Lenox Hill Neighborhood House, how do you find out scientifically whether you want to be in slam?

Once hearts are set as trump, North can ask for key cards (the four aces and the trump king). If the response is zero or three - or one or four — the cheapest step asks for the trump queen; the response in the trump suit denies it, and a bid in any other suit promises it. If the responder has two key cards, the immediate response either shows or denies the trump queen.

Today, however, slam has two chances, the first being to find the trump queen, the second to discard North's clubs on declarer's spades. On a nonspade lead, such as the diamond jack, you should cash the heart ace and unblock dummy's two spade honors. Only then do you lead a heart to the king, trying to cash your spade winners to pitch dummy's clubs.

However, at a few tables where key-card Blackwood was not in use, West led the club ace against six hearts, and now the diamondjack shift went to the ace, eight and six.

How to play the trump suit now? After the ace and a small heart sees East follow twice, the old adage is "Eight ever, nine never." However, East's play of the diamond eight was surely significant, suggesting shortage. Since West appeared to have many more diamonds than East, the heart finesse was the odds-on play, and declarer duly took it to make his slam.

TODAY IN HISTORY

In 1492, a contract was signed by Christopher Columbus and a representative of Spain's King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella, giving Columbus a commission to seek a westward ocean passage to Asia.

In 1521, Martin Luther went before the Diet of Worms (vohrms) to face charges stemming from his religious writings. (He was later declared an outlaw by Holy Roman Emperor Charles V.)

In 1861, the Virginia State Convention voted to secede from the Union.

In 1911, the town of Palm Beach, Fla., was incorporated.

In 1941, Yugoslavia surrendered to Germany during World War II.

In 1961, some 1,500 CIA-Cuban exiles trained launched the disastrous Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba in an attempt to topple Fidel Castro, whose forces crushed the incursion by the third day.

In 1969, a jury in Los Angeles convicted Sirhan Sirhan of assassinating Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. The First Secretary of Czechoslovakia's Communist Party, Alexander Dubcek, was deposed.

In 1970, Apollo 13 astronauts James A. Lovell, Fred W. Haise and Jack Swigert splashed down safely in the Pacific, four days after a ruptured oxygen tank crippled their spacecraft while en route to the moon.

In 1972, the Boston Marathon allowed women to compete for the first time; Nina Kuscsik was the first officially recognized women's champion, with a time of 3:10:26.

In 1975, Cambodia's fiveyear war ended as the capital Phnom Penh fell to the Khmer Rouge, which instituted radical policies that claimed an estimated 1.7 million lives until the regime was overthrown in 1979.

In 1986, at London's Heathrow Airport, a bomb



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was discovered in the bag of a pregnant Irish woman about to board an El Al jetliner to Israel; she'd been tricked into carrying the bomb by her Jordanian fiance.

In 1997, former Israeli president Chaim Herzog died in Tel Aviv at age 78.

Ten years ago: Four Canadian soldiers in Afghanistan were killed when they were mistakenly bombed by an American F-16 pilot. (The pilot, Maj. Harry Schmidt, was later fined and reprimanded in a non-judicial hearing.) Secretary of State Colin Powell ended his 10-day Middle East peace mission after failing to get the ceasefire he'd sought between Israel and the Palestinians. A federal judge ruled the Justice Department couldn't interfere with Oregon's assistedsuicide law. (The law was ultimately upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.)

Five years ago: A day after the Virginia Tech massacre, President George W. Bush visited the campus, where he told students and teachers at a somber convocation that the nation was praying for them and "there's a power in these prayers." In Rome, a U.S. soldier went on trial in absentia for the shooting death of Italian intelligence agent Nicola Calipari at an Iraqi checkpoint in March 2005. (However, a court later threw out the proceedings against Spec. Mario Lozano, saying Italy had no jurisdiction.) Actress Kitty Carlisle Hart died in New York at age 96

One year ago: U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton visited Japan, where she expressed confidence the country would fully recover from its tsunami and nuclear disasters. Actor Michael Sarrazin, 70, died in Montreal.


