Panetta Apologizes for Photos

Two-year-old photos have emerged that show U.S. soldiers posing with bloodied remains of dead insurgents in Afghanistan.

WASHINGTON • Defense Secretary Leon Panetta apologized Wednesday for gruesome, newly revealed photographs that show U.S. soldiers posing with the bloodied remains of dead insurgents in Afghanistan. He said war can lead young troops to "foolish decisions" and expressed concern

the photos could incite fresh violence against Americans.

The White House called the two-year-old photos "reprehensible," joining Panetta and other top military officials in expressing regret for the latest in a string of embarrassing missteps by the U.S. military in a war that's built on earning the trust and confidence of ordinary Afghans. In recent months, American troops have been caught up in controversies over burning Muslim holy books, urinating on Afghan corpses, an alleged massacre of 17 Afghan villagers and other misdeeds.

"This is war. I know that war is ugly and it's violent, and I know that young people sometimes caught up in the moment make some very foolish decisions," Panetta said. "I am not excusing that behavior, but neither do I want these images to bring further injury to our people or to our relationship with the Afghan people."

"My apology is on behalf of the Department of Defense and the U.S. government," Panetta told a news conference in Brussels fol-

lowing a meeting of NATO allies at which the way ahead in Afghanistan was the central topic.

The photos were published in Wednesday's Los Angeles Times. One shows members of the 82nd Airborne Division posing in 2010 with Afghan police holding the severed legs of a suicide bomber. The same platoon a few months later was sent to investigate the remains of three insurgents reported to have accidentally blown themselves up - and soldiers again posed and mugged for a photo with the remains, the newspaper said.

Brackett, Corder Seek Same Senate Seat

TWIN FALLS • Two influential senators, one seat up for grabs.

Newly formed legislative districts force Sen. Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home, and Sen. Bert Brackett, R-Rogerson, to face each other in the May 15 primary. No matter who wins, southern Idaho will lose a respected voice in the Senate. The new Dis-





trict 23 encompasses Elmore and Owyhee counties and the northwest corner of Twin Falls County. Previously, Brackett served rural Twin Falls County and Owyhee County in District 23.

Brackett and Corder acknowledge they vote together on 95 percent of issues, and have worked together on animal cruelty legislation. Both are prolific, each sponsoring or cosponsoring multiple bills over the last two sessions.

But there are key differences. Brackett voted for the Students Come First education reform package in 2011, while Corder opposed it. Corder also opposed a \$35 million tax cut bill for the state's corporations and top earners in the 2012 session, while Brackett supported it. (Corder initially voted against the bill on the Senate floor, but changed to support it at the last minute.)

Candidates **Share Stances** in Buhl

Saving Sage Grouse

A state task force is working on recommendations to restore the desert bird's population, but questions remain over the panel's effectiveness.

TWIN FALLS • Idaho's newest sage grouse advisory group is ready to begin preparing a plan to prevent the bird from being listed as an endangered species.

Appointed by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter in March, the 16-member task force has met for the past four weeks to learn about the fundamentals of the bird, its habitat and threats. Members have been asked to write a plan that will prevent federal officials from listing the grouse as an endangered species.

In 2010, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service declared that the grouse warranted protection under the Endangered Species Act, but held off from listing it. Then in 2011, a federal judge approved a settlement between the government and environmental groups intended to finalize listing decisions for more than 250 endangered species candidates.

FWS officials now have until 2015 to decide if sage grouse should be declared endangered.

Why This Bird?

Due to the sheer size of its range, the impact of a sage grouse listing in Idaho is often compared to the devastating blow the Oregon timber industry received once the spotted owl was listed in the 1990s, said state Sen. Bert Brackett, R-Rogerson.

Brackett is one of the task force's state representatives and one of three members from the Magic Valley. The group also has members from agricultural and energy industries, and conservation groups

"I don't think the state would like to see a listing happen," Brackett said. "I would think we're (the state) smarter now. We don't want to see a repeat of what has happened in the past."

What's the Goal?

In Idaho, the FWS listed wildfires and invasive species as sage grouse's top threats. Grazing and hunting were placed lower on the list. That means Please see **SAGE GROUSE**, A2:

the task force's primary focus is to come up with suggestions that help prevent future wildfires and the spread of plants like cheat grass or juniper.

"The good news is that the scientists say grazing isn't the main threat," said House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley and a local task force member.

"I don't think a lot of people know that there are some grazing techniques to control fire," he said. "It's a way to address high fuel loads, especially in the spring."

Concerned

Not everyone is optimistic about the group's process.

Ken Cole, who works for the Hailey-based Western Watersheds Project, said the group doesn't have enough conservation representation.

Too many of the members represent cattle and energy industries, he argued, masking the larger threat to the grouse. "The underlying cause for

these threats is because of livestock grazing," Cole said. "I don't think they're honestly looking at that."

"Fish and Wildlife Service may accept these recommendations, but they will probably not work," he said.

What's Next?

The group has until June 1 to present its recommendations to the governor. Members and agency advisers have met

every one to two weeks throughout southern Idaho to learn more about the species. However, coming up with

solutions with so many different party interests hasn't been easy, said Jack Oyler, vice chairman for Sportsmen for Fish and Wildlife-Idaho and a Filer resident. "It's been an intense

process. We've been scrutinized as individuals and scrutinized as a group," he said. "And at the end of the day, even if we come up with something, it's probably going to get sued."

Brackett, a Rogerson rancher, has connections in the agriculture and livestock industries, and has served on the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee for six years. He is also a member of the Idaho Sage Grouse Task Force.

Among his biggest concerns: Property rights, education and budget issues.

"I am a conservative," he said. "I am not, though, a right-wing ideologue."

Corder served as the chairman of the Senate Agricultural Affairs Committee

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before being appointed as chairman of the Senate Local Government and Taxation Committee.

"I want to continue to have consistent tax policy," Corder said. "I want us to reason our way through tax policy and budgeting."

Corder tends to be more moderate. "I'm not afraid to vote

against the party lines, and more and more people are seeing that as something they want," Corder said.

In Idaho, the salary for state senators is \$16,116 per year, plus living expenses during the legislative session. State senators serve a two-year term.

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PROBATION FOR **CHILD ABDUCTION ACCOMPLICE**

TWIN FALLS • A 21-year-old Twin Falls man was sentenced Wednesday to two years of supervised probation for aiding in the abduction of a 4year-old boy from his fa-

ther's home. Kelvin Milo Jr. appeared in Twin Falls County 5th District Court to hear his sentence for charges on custodial interference, conspiracy to commit custodial

interference and burglary. Chief Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Stan Holloway acknowledged that Milo was not involved the night of Nov. 29, 2011, when Stefanie Contreras, 29, planned the abduction of her son with David Altes and Daniel Thomas. Thomas, Milo's boss, picked him up the morning of Nov. 30, to go along, Holloway said.

The others involved in the abduction said Milo entered Bearce's home after Thomas fired a shot and Bearce kept coming at him. Milo then held Bearce back Contreras Thomas escaped to a waiting van with the child.

In Milo's version of events, he was told to wait outside and followed instructions until he heard the shot. On his way into the house, the others came running out, so Milo followed.

Milo's attorney, Tim Williams, said his client didn't truly become involved in the crime until he agreed to drive the van in Jerome and transported the mother and child to Ketchum.

> Williams said Thomas usually picked Milo up in the early morning to go to construction jobs and that morning Milo had no idea what was

going to happen. Milo was serving a 10year probation term from a Cassia County case, where he was charged with lewd conduct with a minor under 16. That charge was amended to injury to a

Milo attributes the mistakes he's made to a lack of supervision during his childhood and being on his own since he was 17.

"I'm not really a problem child," he said, "but I've made bad mistakes in my

Judge Richard Bevan followed the state's recommendation, sentencing Milo to one to five years in prison, suspended for probation. He was also sentenced to 48 hours of community service on county work detail and fined \$2,000, of which \$1,500 was suspended.

Milo is scheduled for an April 24 probation violation hearing in Cassia County.

Contreras was sentenced to three years of probation. Altes, 39, was sentenced to up to one year in the state's retained-jurisdiction program. Thomas, 35, is charged with unlawful possession of a weapon by a felon. No hearings are currently scheduled because of separate, pending charges against him.

Local Schools to Test Data Program

Five area school districts received grant funding to use software to better track education results.

TWIN FALLS • Using data is one way school employees track how students are doing and shape what's taught in classrooms.

For teachers at five Magic Valley school districts, that process could be easier during the coming school year. Cassia County, Minidoka County, Buhl, Richfield and Kimberly school districts will receive a one-year grant to pilot Schoolnet, the state's instructional management system.

Buhl Superintendent Byron Stutzman said the district's \$100,000 grant will allow school employees to better use student data such as state test scores — to fill gaps in instruction.

"We should make our decisions on data, not on 'I think, I feel;" he said.

The local recipients are among 15 school districts and public charter schools statewide that will receive grants, funded by the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Foundation.

Some features of Schoolnet are already available in classrooms around the state. But the pilot districts will have access to the full program, such as tools to develop lesson plans, digital content and ways to analyze student progress throughout the school year. For instance, if a first-

grade teacher is doing a lesson on bats, there's a video from Smithsonian Institution scientists that students could watch.

"Whatever subject you're teaching, you have this whole menu of materials,"

Kimberly Superintendent Kathleen Noh said.

That, she said, could save time for teachers since they won't have to spend hours looking for materials to use.

Pilot school districts each have a budget for how to spend their grant money.

The Kimberly School District will use most of the funding to hire a full-time curriculum technology integration coach next year. Noh said the employee will work with teachers to use technology to develop curriculum and tests to align with the new Common Core Standards.

Idaho is among more than 40 U.S. states moving in the direction of using the new English/language arts and math standards. They'll be taught in classrooms for the first time during the 2013-14 school year.

In Buhl, the district plans to hire a part-time district data manager next year, which will cost about \$10,500.

Stutzman said the Buhl School District has been fortunate to receive a few grants recently. However, the money doesn't go toward covering operating expenses.

"Those fixed costs are still dipping into our reserves," he

Minidoka County Superintendent Scott Rogers said grant funding brings in unanticipated revenue. The district, he said, wouldn't be able to afford the Schoolnet software without the grant.

"It's a good way for us to get a high-end program," he

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

Judging, the Cosmic Way

udge J. Harvie Wilkinson III, a Reagan appointee to the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, is a courtly Virginian who combines a manner as soft as a Shenandoah breeze with a keen intellect. His disapproval of much current thinking about how the Constitution should be construed is explained in his spirited new book slender and sharp as a stiletto - "Cosmic Constitutional Theory: Why Americans Are Losing Their Inalienable Right to Self-Governance" (Ox-

A "cosmic theory," Wilkinson says, is any theory purporting to do for constitutional questions what Freud and Einstein tried to do concerning human behavior and the universe, respectively - provide comprehensive and final answers. The three jurisprudential theories Wilkinson criticizes are the "living Constitution," "originalism" and "constitutional pragmatism." Each, he says, abets judicial hubris, leading to judicial "activism?"

Those who believe the Constitution is "living" believe, Wilkinson says, that judges should "implement the contemporary values" of society. This leads to "free-wheeling judging." So Wilkinson apparently agrees somewhat with Justice Antonin Scalia, who stresses the "antievolutionary purpose of a constitution," which "is to prevent change — to embed certain rights in such a manner that future generations cannot readily take them away?" Future generations or contemporary majorities.

Wilkinson is right that judges, comprising an elite and "introverted" profession, are prone to misreading the values of the broader society. But even if judges read those values correctly, judicial restraint can mean giving coercive sweep to the values of contemporary majorities. That a majority considers something desirable is not evidence that it is constitutional.

One problem with originalism, Wilkinson argues, is that historical research concerning the original meaning of the Constitution's text—how it was understood when ratified—often is inconclusive. This leaves judges no Plan B—other than to read their preferences into the historical fog.

Constitutional pragmatists advocate using judicial power to improve the functioning of the democratic process. But this, Wilkinson rightly warns, licenses judges to decide what a well-functioning democracy should look like, and gives them vast discretion



to engage in activism in defense of, for example, those it decides are "discrete and insular minorities."

Insisting that "the republican virtue of restraint requires no cosmic theory," Wilkinson's recurring refrain is that judges should be disposed to defer to majorities, meaning the desires of political, popularly elected institutions. But because deference to majority rule is for Wilkinson a value that generally trumps others, it becomes a kind of cosmic theory - a solution that answers most vexing constitutional riddles.

Wilkinson's premise is


that "self-governance," meaning majority rule, is the "first principle of our constitutional order." But this principle, although important, is insufficient and, in fact, is secondary. Granted, where politics operates – where collective decisions are made for the polity majorities should generally have their way. But a vast portion of life should be exempt from control by majorities. And when the political branches do not respect a capacious zone of private sovereignty, courts should police the zone's borders. Otherwise, individuals' self-governance of themselves is sacrificed to self-government understood merely as a prerogative of majorities.

The Constitution is a companion of the Declaration of Independence, and should be construed as an implementation of the Declaration's premises, which include: Government exists not to confer rights but to "secure" pre-existing rights; the fundamental rights concern the liberty of individuals, not the prerogatives of the collectivity least of all when it acts to the detriment of individual liberty.

Wilkinson cites Justice
Oliver Wendell Holmes as a
practitioner of admirable judicial modesty. But restraint
needs a limiting principle,
lest it become abdication.
Holmes said: "If my fellow
citizens want to go to Hell I
will help them. It's my job."
No, a judge's job is to judge,
which includes deciding
whether majorities are misbehaving at the expense of
individual liberty.

Justice Felix Frankfurter, whose restraint Wilkinson praises, said the Constitution is "not a document but a stream of history." If so, it is not a constitution; it cannot constitute if its meanings are fluid and constantly flowing in the direction of the preferences of contemporary majorities.

picture is worth a thousand words. This is the first thought which crossed my mind as I looked at the architect's illustration of the projected Burley Public Library, which will become more than just a picture if the city's voters pass the proposed bond issue on May 15.

The building itself is striking in appearance with its simple lines and the tall, tinted glass windows which define its exterior. Even more striking is the reflection created by the tinting, which will enhance energy efficiency in the library during all seasons. The chosen location of the proposed building (17th

The students will have immediate access to a priceless collection of books, technology, professional library personnel and comfortable space in which they can choose to pursue their dreams. The entire concept is aesthetic as well as practical.

I recently interviewed a class of 30 Cassia High School seniors, asking them whether or not the bond should pass. Some of their responses are listed here, reinforcing the concept of a library's intrinsic value to all in its community. Out of the

30 students, 26 were in favor of a "yes" vote.

"I think it should be passed so people could be more comfortable in a nice library, even though I don't like to read." (Bobby)

"I think more teenagers would go if they had their own room/place just for teens. There would be more programs, too, like a book night." (Cassia High School senior)

"It can be for our kids." (Raul)

"We need a bigger building where we can talk quietly and study. Also, I think there should be some type of snack bar." (Kelsie)

Obama Puts Feds Above the Law

On March 16, 2012, the king issued an executive order that you need to know about. This order gives an unprecedented level of authority to the president and the federal government to take over all the fundamental parts of our economy in the name of national security in time of national emergency.

This means all of our water resources, construction services and materials (steel, concrete, etc.), our civil transportation system, food and health resources, our energy supplies, including oil and natural gas, even farm equipment, can be taken over by the president and his cabinet secretaries. The government can also draft U.S. citizens into the military and force U.S. citizens to fulfill "labor requirements" for the purposes of "national defense." There is not even any congressional oversight; only briefings are required. By issuing this executive order, the president puts the federal government above the law, which, in a democracy, is never supposed to happen.

Labrador Takes Early Fundraising Lead in 2012

BOISE (AP) • Freshman U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador's fundraising machine is steamrolling contenders for his congressional seat, and he has pulled in more campaign contributions than any other Idaho candidate for Congress so far this year.

The GOP congressman who represents Idaho's western district raised about \$115,000 in the first three months of 2012. capitalizing on political action committees and prominent Idahoans to bring his total to \$532,000 for the two-year election cycle, according to the latest campaign finance reports filed with the Federal Election Commission.

Labrador reports having \$200,000 in cash on hand as he and other candidates ramp up fundraising efforts in advance of the May 15 primary and November general election.

Of Labrador's five 1st District challengers, only Democrat Jimmy Farris, a former professional football player from Lewiston, has reported raising any cash in the race.

Farris posted \$14,000 in campaign earnings during the quarter that ended March 31, bumping his overall total to \$26,000. His donors include NFL free agent tight end Alge Crumpler and Buffalo Bills linebacker Bryan Scott.

Labrador's Republican primary challenger, 50year-old truck driver Reed McCandless of Moscow, did not file a report.

"We're in full campaign mode," said China Gum, Labrador's political director. "We're just trying to stay focused. We're not thinking about other things that may be happening in the race. We're just making sure that Raul is supported, the cam-

supported the way it needs to be so we can get his message out

there." Labrador raised \$79,668 from individuals in the quarter, including \$2,000 from Todd Brinkmeyer of Post Falls, president of Plummer Forest Products, and \$3,500 from Dynamis Energy CEO Lloyd Mahaffey of Eagle.

Labrador even outraised seven-term Republican U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, who corralled \$107,000 first-quarter campaign donations in his reelection bid for the state's 2nd district congressional seat. Campaign finance reports show Simpson more than doubled Labrador's PAC with contributions \$65,000.

Simpson is outpacing Democratic challenger Nicole LeFavour.

LeFavour, a retiring state senator from Boise, reported no PAC funding but has been riding a wave of individual contributions, pulling in \$59,000 in just 12 days in March.

"People just walk up and hand me money,' LeFavour said. "It's pretty wonderful. It's going to take a million dollars, and I'm going to just keep asking people and hope they'll keep being generous."

Simpson earned \$41,700 from individual contributors. He has a sizable cushion with \$715,000 raised for the two-year election cycle.

The 2nd District leaders are poised to cruise to a general election matchup, with neither of their primary challengers reporting campaign earnings to the FEC.

Meridian Birthing Center Investigated after 3 Deaths

MERIDIAN (AP) • The Idaho Board of Midwifery suspended the licenses of a mother-daughter midwife team at a Meridian birthing center that's under investigation following the deaths of three infants.

Jerusha Goodwin and her mother, Coleen Marie Goodwin, of The Baby Place were suspended by the board on March 23 after it concluded it had to intervene following the deaths between October 2010 and August 2011.

State investigators contend the Goodwins impeded paramedics, kept improper records, withheld information and failed to facilitate the immediate transfer of babies and mothers to a hospital for emergency care.

"Due to the nature of the allegations ... as well as the factual support for these allegations, respondent's conduct as a licensed midwife presents an immediate and ongoing danger to the public health, safety and welfare," investigators wrote in the 11-page suspension report for Jerusha Good-

Neither woman responded to phone calls Wednesday seeking comment.

A website for The Baby Place says Coleen Marie Goodwin is the owner of the business, while Jerusha Goodwin is its administrator. It indicates they have helped women in more than 1,000 pregnan-

The women also have been named in a separate 2010 lawsuit stemming from a 2008 birth in which a couple said their child suffered permanent brain damage. The lawsuit filed in Idaho's 4th District Court is set for a jury trial Monday.

In one of the cases that led to the license suspensions, the Meridian Police Department is investigating the August 2011 death of an infant at The Baby

Place whose mother was in labor for more than 48 hours, including more than 10 hours of pushing, KTVB-TV reported Tuesday.

The Board of Midwifery said the baby was born limp and unresponsive, but midwives waited 11 minutes before calling paramedics.

In addition to that case, the board said it is also investigating the October 2010 death of an infant who suffered significant blood loss because the umbilical cord wasn't clamped before it was cut by a student midwife.

And in a June 2011 death, a midwife delayed paramedics from entering the patient's room for about four minutes, investigators said.

Coleen Goodwin "failed to fully cooperate with paramedics. She had to be asked questions multiple times before responding and would not provide adequate information," according to the board's report. "Moreover, respondent initially failed to state why

transport to the hospital was necessary."

Cathy Ward, a Kooskia midwife on the five-member midwifery board, declined to comment. Another board member, Clarence William Blea, a Boise medical doctor, didn't respond to a request for comment.

Ninety-nine percent of U.S. births take place in hospitals, though births using midwives are on the rise.

A 2005 British Medical Journal study — cited by the Idaho Midwifery Council, the industry's state association indicates planned home births by low-risk mothers overseen by certified midwives have mortality rates similar to lowrisk births in hospitals.

Meanwhile, the American Medical Association contends "the safest setting for labor, delivery and the immediate post-partum period is in a hospital or a birthing center within a hospital," so women and their babies have quick access to technology should a medical emergency arise.

Nancy Draznin, vice president of the Idaho Midwifery Council in Genesee in northcentral Idaho, said she isn't familiar with details of the Goodwins' case but hopes the investigations don't undermine the public's faith in midwives.

"Idaho midwives really do set a high standard for care;" Draznin said.

In the lawsuit against the Goodwins, Adam and Victoria Nielson allege the midwives were negligent during the 2008 birth of their child that resulted in permanent brain injury, including cerebral pal-

The Nielsons' lawyer, Eric Rossman in Boise, said his clients' litigation preceded Idaho's midwife licensing law and is not a part of the suspension case.

Like most Idaho birthing centers run by midwives, the Goodwins do not have a medical malpractice insurance policy, so Rossman said a large financial settlement is unlikely.

Still, he said he's pursuing the case without a fee because he believes the midwives should be forced to improve their practices — or be forbidden from offering services.

The civil trial could be postponed because the Goodwins are considering filing for bankruptcy protection. Steve French, their bankruptcy attorney, declined comment.

State Ed Board **OKs University Tuition Hikes**

BOISE • Students at Idaho's public universities will pay \$274 to \$356 more in tuition next year.

The increases approved Wednesday by the state Board of Education are relatively modest compared to those set in recent years as the universities looked to offset declines in state fund-

Idaho State University proposed its lowest tuition increase in a decade, at 4.7 percent, for full-time undergraduate students. The University of Idaho also recommended a smaller tuition hike, at 6.1 percent.

Boise State University requested a 5.7 percent increase and remains the least expensive, with its cost of attendance around \$5,880 next year. The cost of attendance will exceed \$6,000 at Idaho State and the University of Idaho in 2013.

School officials say they still charge less than their peers in other states.

Long Sentences for Meth Dealers

BOISE • A pair of methamphetamine dealers from southwestern Idaho were sentenced to long stints in federal prison, with three additional members of their drug ring due to get their

punishments later this year.

Daniel Pena of Caldwell was sentenced Tuesday in U.S. District Court to 13 years in prison followed by 10 years of supervised release for conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine - and discharge of a firearm in furtherance of a drug trafficking crime.

Monica Martinez of Wilder was sentenced to five years in prison followed by five years of supervised release.

Shane Kenneth Brizendine of Wilder; Armando Jason Saltzer of Nampa; and Mario Bautista, a Mexican national, are due to be sentenced June 25.

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Scorching Talk: Romney, Obama Battle over Economy

CHARLOTTE, N.C. • Their battle joined, challenger Mitt Romney savaged President Barack Obama's handling of the economy on Wednesday while the commander in chief commiserated up close with victims of the recession and warned that Republicans would only make matters

"Obama is over his head and swimming in the wrong direction" when it comes to the economy, Romney said in a scorching speech delivered across the street from the football stadium where the president will deliver his Democratic National Convention acceptance speech this

"Even if you like Barack Obama, we can't afford Barack Obama;" the former Massachusetts governor declared, an evident reference to the president's ability to transcend at least some of the public's dissatisfaction with the pace of the recovery. Romney quoted liberally - and mockingly - from Obama's 2008 campaign pledges to repair the econ-

At the same time, Obama sketched his case for re-election in swingstate Ohio, where he met with unemployed workers who have enrolled in job training programs. Then he spoke at the Lorain County Community

"Right now, companies can't find enough qualified workers for the jobs they need to fill" locally, he said. "So programs like this one are training hundreds of thousands of workers with the skills that companies are looking for. And it's working?" By contrast, he said, between the years 2000 and 2008, Republican policies produced "the slowest job growth in half a century ... and we've spent the last three and a half years cleaning up after that mess?"

Campaign symbolism counted for much on a day that seems destined to be replicated often in the six months until Election Day.

The Republican challenger delivered his scathing denunciation of the president's policies with the Bank of America Stadium over his shoulder. Aides dubbed his remarks a pre-buttal to the president's own, and earlyarriving partisans heard a recorded medley of rock music that included "It's Still the Same?"

Each man taunted the other at

"I wasn't born with a silver spoon in my mouth," Obama said in an evident reference to Romney, whose father was president of American Motors, an automaker.

Romney jabbed that unlike four years ago, when Obama walked through stage-set columns at his convention, things would be different this summer.

3 Agents Forced Out in Wake of Secret Service Scandal

Agents were implicated in prostitution scandal in Colombia that also involved about 10 military service members and as many as 20 women.

WASHINGTON • Moving swiftly, the Secret Service forced out three agents Wednesday in a prostitution scandal that has embarrassed President Barack Obama. A senior congressman welcomed the move to hold people responsible for the tawdry episode but warned "it's not over."

The agency announced three agents are leaving the service even as separate U.S. government investigations were under way.

The Secret Service did not identify the agents being forced out of the government or eight more it said remain on administrative leave. In a statement, it said one supervisor was allowed to retire and another will be fired for cause. A third employee, who was not a supervisor, has resigned.

The agents were implicated in the prostitution scandal in Colombia that also involved about 10 military service members and as many as 20 women. All the Secret Service employees who were involved had their

security clearances revoked. "These are the first steps," said Rep. Pete King, R-N.Y., chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee, which oversees the Secret Service. King said the agency's director, Mark Sullivan, took employment ac-

tion against "the three people he believes the case was clearest against." But King warned: "It's certainly not over."

King said the agent set to be fired would sue. King said Sullivan had to follow collective bargaining rules but was "moving as quickly as he can. Once he feels the facts are clear, he's going to move."

The embarrassing scandal erupted last week after 11 Secret Service agents were sent home from the colonial-era city of Cartagena on Colombia's Caribbean coast after a night of partying that reportedly ended with at least some of them bringing prostitutes back to their hotel. The special agents and uniformed officers were in Colombia in advance of President Barack Obama's arrival for the Summit of the Americas.

A White House official said Wednesday night that Obama had not spoken directly to Sullivan since the incident unfolded late last week. Obama's senior aides are in close contact with Sullivan and the agency's leadership, said the offi-cial, who requested anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly.

In Washington and Colombia, separate U.S. government investigations were already under way. King said he has assigned four congressional investigators to the probe. The House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform, led by Rep. Darrell Issa, R-Calif., sought details of the Secret Service investigation, including the disciplinary histories of the agents involved. Secret Service investigators are in Colombia interviewing witnesses.

In a letter to Sullivan, Issa and Rep. Elijah Cummings of Maryland, the committee's ranking Democrat, said the agents "brought foreign nationals in contact with sensitive security information." A potential security breach has been among the concerns raised by members of Congress.

The incident occurred before Obama arrived and was at a different hotel than the president stayed in.

Sen. Chuck Grassley, the ranking Republican on the Senate Judiciary Committee, said news of the three agents leaving Secret Service was a positive development.

"I've always said that if heads don't roll, the culture in a federal agency will never change," the Iowa lawmaker said in a statement. "Today's personnel actions, combined with the swift removal and investigation, are positive signs that there is a serious effort to get to the bottom of this scan-

New details emerged Wednesday. The next morning, when the hotel's front desk called because the woman hadn't left, the pair argued over the price.

"I tell him, 'Baby, my cash money;" the woman told the newspaper in an interview in Colombia. She said the two argued after the agent initially offered to pay her about \$30 and the situation escalated, eventually ending with Colombian law enforcement involved. She said she was eventually paid about \$225.

The episode took a sharp political turn when presumptive Republican presidential nominee Mitt Romney said he would fire the agents involved.

Romney told radio host Laura Ingraham on Wednesday that "I'd clean house" at the Secret Service.

"The right thing to do is to remove people who have violated the public trust and have put their play time and their personal interests ahead of the interests of the nation," Romney said.

While Romney suggested to Ingraham that a leadership problem led to the scandal, he told a Columbus, Ohio, radio station earlier that he has confidence in Sullivan, the head of the agency.

"I believe the right corrective action will be taken there and obviously everyone is very, very disappointed," Romney said. "I think it will be dealt with (in) as aggressive a way as is possible given the requirements of the law?

AGENTS CALL NUGENT AFTER OBAMA TIRADE

Rocker and gun rights champion Ted Nugent says he will meet with the Secret Service today to explain his raucous remarks about what he called Barack Obama's "evil, America-hating administration" — comments some critics interpreted as a threat against the president. "The conclusion will be obvious that I threatened no one," Nugent told radio interviewer Glenn Beck on Wednesday. Nugent said he'd been contacted by the agency and would cooperate fully even though he found the complaints "silly." -Associated Press





columns. He's not going to want to remind anyone of Greece," Romney said, "because he's put us on a road to become more like Greece," where crushing debt has led to an austerity plan and public protests.

It was only within the past two weeks that Romney shed his competition for the Republican presidential nomination, and he is still in the process of trying to unite his party after a three-month primary struggle in which he had trouble appealing to hardcore conservatives.

But already, elements of the fall campaign are falling into place.

Obama's campaign was airing Spanish language radio ads in Orlando, Fla., Las Vegas and Denver – all in states that the president won four years ago and that figure to be fiercely contested in the fall.

From Ohio, Obama hopscotched to Michigan for two fundraisers, the first a reception at Dearborn's Henry Ford Museum, where Romney in 2007 launched his unsuccessful bid for the 2008 GOP presidential nomi-

Speaking in a museum named for the founder of Ford Motor Co., Obama got some of his biggest cheers when he highlighted his administration's efforts to rescue the American auto industry. Later, at a private dinner fundraiser in Bingham Farms, he said that the industry's recovery didn't just help Michigan, it "helped to give America a vision of what we could be."

For his part, Romney arranged an appearance for Thursday at a factory in Lorain, Ohio, shadowing Obama's Wednesday trip to the area. Obama toured the factory as part of his 2008 campaign -

and it was closed later. Polls consistently show the economy is the top issue for the nation's voters, who will decide whether to accept Romney's indictment or Obama's reassurances. Given recent trends, each man has a case to make.

In Ohio, joblessness was 9.1 percent in February 2009, shortly after Obama took office. It stood at 7.6

last month. In North Carolina, joblessness was 9.5 percent then, and stands at 9.9

In Michigan, where Obama was appearing late Wednesday, it was 12.5 percent in 2009 and is 8.8 percent now.

In all three states, unemployment rose in the months immediately after Obama took office as the recession deepened and financial markets trembled.

"Right now we have two competing visions of our future. And the choice could not be clearer," said Obama. He said he was sure Republicans were "patriots. I'm sure they're sincere in - in terms of what they say. But their theory, I believe, is wrong?

Later Tuesday, two detectives spotted a vehicle outside a nearby apartment complex that matched witnesses' descriptions, Gage said.

The speculation went on since the March 30 drawing, as reporters knocked on door after door chasing the rumored winner.

As locals questioned one another, Butler, a retired computer analyst and longtime Red Bud resident, said he didn't deny being the winner. "I've answered most of them truthfully that, yes, I did, but they didn't catch it," Butler said.

On Wednesday, the suspense ended when Butler and his wife, Patricia, arrived at City Hall under police protection for a press conference before national media.

Amid the buzz in Red Bud about who held the winning ticket, Butler's name was not among those often mentioned. "I didn't know it was the Butlers until about 10 minutes before the press conference," said Red Bud Mayor Tim Lowry. "That was a well kept-secret."

The Butlers took limited questions from the news media, and left City Hall with a police escort. A large group of residents gathered outside City Hall cheered for their newly wealthy neighbors.

The couple held one of three winning tickets for the \$656 million jackpot, claiming a \$218.6 million stake. After taxes, they will get a lump sum payout of almost \$111 million.

On the City Hall lawn, the Illinois Lottery gave away hot dogs and cookies and drinks. A DJ played country and rock anthems, which appropriately included John Mellencamp's "Small Town."

The Butlers said they only told a few people, mostly relatives. They spent the weeks since the lottery drawing talking to financial planners and hiring a lawyer.

"I figured the quieter I keep it, the better we are," Merle Butler said.

Merle Butler worked at General American Life Insurance in St. Louis for 25 years before retiring about eight years ago.



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

No Charges in Calif. Girls Death

LONG BEACH, Calif.

(AP) • An 11-year-old girl won't be charged in the death of a 10-year-old schoolmate she fought with hours before the younger girl died.

The death of Joanna Ramos came after a "fight between two children that ended with unintended and tragic results," but no crime was committed, the Long Beach Police Department said in a statement.

Police referred all inquiries to the district attorney's office. District atspokeswoman Sandi Gibbons said her office could not comment on the decision because the case involved a juvenile.

Joanna was pronounced dead on Feb. 24, about six hours after she tussled with another girl in an alley near her elementary school after classes ended.

Her mother, Cecilia Villanueva, said officials met with the family Wednesday morning, but she still knows few details about the fight and chose not to ask because it was too painful.

"There's nothing they can do that's going to bring my daughter back, nothing. There's nothing I can do," she said, choking back

Villanueva said she felt for the other girl.

"Her life is not the same anymore. I'm not angry because it could have happened to the girl instead of to Joanna," she said.

The name of the other girl has not been made

Joanna's family previously told The Associated Press that she underwent emergency surgery for a blood clot on her brain and was resuscitated several

times before she died. Joanna's older sister, Vanessa Urbina, said Wednesday she was disappointed about the decision. The family knows little more about what prompted the fight than they did when it happened nearly two months ago, she said.

"There's nothing we can do, but I want charges on her," said Urbina, 17. "She killed my sister. She didn't mean to kill her, but she meant to hurt her."

The fight near Willard Elementary didn't appear to be especially violent, no weapons were used, and neither girl was knocked to the ground, police have

Joanna had a bloody nose when she returned to her after-school program, according to witnesses, and had to be picked up early by a relative because she didn't feel well.

By the time Joanna got home, she was complaining of a headache and vomiting.

Before she passed out on the family's couch, she told her mother an 11year-old girl had punched her in the head but refused to say more, Villanueva previously told the AP.

The coroner's office labeled the case a homicide and said Joanna died of blunt force trauma to the head. The autopsy report remained under a security hold Wednesday, said **Assistant Chief Coroner** Ed Winter.

Norway Massacre Gunman Wants Freedom or Death

OSLO, Norway (AP) • The right-wing fanatic on trial for massacring 77 people in Norway says he wants either freedom or death, calling the country's prison terms "pathetic" and arguing for the return of capital punishment, which was last used here to execute Nazi collaborators after World War II.

In the third day of his terror trial, Anders Behring Breivik was grilled by prosecutors about the anti-Muslim militant group he claims to be-

He rejected their suggestions that the "Knights Templar" doesn't exist, but admitted he had embellished when describing the network in a 1,500-page manifesto he published online before the bomb-and-shooting rampage on July 22.

"In principle it is not an organization in a conventional sense," he said, describing it as a leaderless network consisting of "independent cells."

Prosecutors told reporters after Wednesday's hearing that they don't believe the group is real or that the meetings Breivik claims took place in Liberia, Britain and the Baltic countries ever happened.

The issue is of key importance in determining Breivik's sanity, and whether he's ultimately sent to prison or compulsory psychiatric care for carrying out Norway's worst peacetime massacre.

If found sane, Breivik could face a maximum 21-year prison sentence or an alternate custody arrangement that would keep him locked up as long as he is considered a menace to society. If declared insane he would be committed to psychiatric care for as long as he's considered

"Acquittal or the death penalty are the only logical outcomes of this case," the confessed killer said. "I view 21 years in prison as a pathetic sentence?

According to Amnesty International, Belarus is the only country in Europe that still applies the death penalty; two young men were executed there last month. Russia announced a moratorium on capital punishment when it joined the Council of Europe in 1996 and pledged to abolish it, but has not done so.

Norway abolished capital punishment in peacetime in 1905 but retained it for war crimes until 1979. After World War II, Norway executed 24 Norwegians, 13 Germans and one Dane. The last execution was in 1948.

Breivik described himself as a resistance fighter ready to die for his cause. He said there

were too many "keyboard warriors" among Europe's far-right militants, and that they have a lot to learn from al-Qaida, including its methods and glorification of martyrdom.

The 33-year-old Norwegian claims Muslim immigrants are colonizing Europe, with the tacit approval of liberal "multiculturalist" governments. That's why he says he chose to attack the government headquarters in Oslo and the annual summer camp of the Labor Party's youth

Eight people were killed in the Oslo bombing and 69, mostly teenagers, were slain

on Utoya island outside the capital.

"If I had feared death I would not have dared to carry out this operation," he said.

Survivors and relatives of those killed have expressed concern that the trial is giving Breivik a platform to express his radical views. A lawyer for the bereaved on Wednesday questioned him about his

"I am a militant Christian;" Breivik replied, though he added he wasn't "particularly

Asked by one of the five judges of his thoughts on Nazis, he called himself an "anti-Nazi" and a "national

conservative." The difference, he said, is that "I have a more liberal view on ethnicity" than Nazis. As an example, Breivik said he would find it acceptable if 2 percent of the population was not ethnic Norwegian.

According to government statistics, 12.2 percent of Norway's population are immigrants or children of immigrants.

The prosecutors seized on inconsistencies in how Breivik described meetings of like-minded "knights" in Liberia, London, and the Baltic countries in his manifesto, and in interrogations with police.

"What is it you're getting at?" Breivik snapped at a prosecutor, then answered the question himself, saying prosecutors want to "sow doubt over whether the KT network exists."

Breivik claimed to have met a Serb "war hero" during a trip to Liberia in 2002, but he refused to identify him. He also refused to give details of what he claims was the founding session of the "Knights Templar" in London in 2002.

He conceded, however, that he embellished in the manifesto when he described members at the founding session as "brilliant political and military tacticians of Eu-

Lawsuit Says 'Bachelor' Show Discriminates Against Blacks

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) • Two black men are taking "The Bachelor" and "The Bachelorette" to court with a lawsuit that claims the reality shows are blocking contestants of color from starring

Nathaniel Claybrooks and Christopher Johnson filed a federal lawsuit in Nashville Wednesday against the popular TV shows claiming they are engaged in a pattern of racial discrimination that intentionally excludes people of color. The Nashville men said at a casting call in August that they were given scant consideration compared to white men seeking a leading role for "The Bachelor."

Claybrooks said white applicants were given far more time and consideration during the interview process.

"I only wanted a fair shot at the part," said the softspoken Claybrooks, a 39year-old college graduate and electric company meter reader who owns several small businesses. "Looking back at how I was treated at the casting call last year, it was clear that that wasn't possible. I never even had a chance?"

Their attorneys said it is the first racial discrimination lawsuit filed against a reality show. It does not ask for a specific dollar amount of damages, but it does propose to make major changes in how people are seen on TV.

The two men say that after 10 years and a combined total of 23 seasons of "The Bachelor'' and "The Bachelorette;" neither show has featured a single person of color in a





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Turkey hunters should make sure their shotguns are patterned right for the season.

Preparing Your Shotgun for Spring Turkey Season

ne of the great conservation success stories of our day has been the sportsmen-subsidized introduction and reintroduction of wild turkey populations in the American West. Every spring and fall an increasing number of hunters experience the thrill of luring a big amorous Tom into shotgun range with a seductive series of hen clucks and purrs. If your bucket list dreams include mounting a turkey fan and beard in your trophy room, than you'll need to pattern more than just your local Tom's behaviors; you'll have to pattern your shotgun, too.

The Challenge

While few big game hunters question the wisdom of checking the zero of their rifles before opening morning, surprisingly few shotgunners realize that their favorite scattergun can be just as finicky about the ammo it's fed. Since head shooting a gobbler requires precise pellet placement, the only way to know how your shotgun will perform at the moment of truth is to take it to the range and pattern it.

The pattern that a shotgun throws is a function of the gun's barrel length, choke and ammunition.

Top turkey gunners recommend the ballistically efficient and easily maneuvered 26-inch barrel, a tightly constricted choke and a magnum dose of No. 5 or No. 6 hardened or plated shot. Be aware, however, that every gun is a law unto itself and unless you get out there and experiment, you'll never know what yours is truly capable of doing.

Experts suggest that eight to 10 pellet hits in the vital head/neck region are required to cleanly take a big gobbler. Your task is to carefully pattern your gun to discover the maximum range that your preferred choke-shot shell combination will deliver these hits.

and neck is a tricky target at best and many hunters opt for fixed or magnetically attached high visibility fiber optic pipes or beads to aid in shot placement. While specialty gobbler guns may feature pricey cantilever scope bracketed barrels or receivers drilled to accept optical or red dot sights, my budget 870 Express has proven adequately precise with an inexpensive magnetic Hi-Viz sight mounted on its vent rib. Wonderful turkey patterning videos and free printable targets are available online. Check out my favorites at The National Shooting Sports Foundation site, www.nssf.org, and the National Wild Turkey Foundation at www.nwtf.org.

Range Time

When sighting in on a recent weekend, I set my targets out at 30 and 40 yards. After testing three different choke-ammo combinations, I discovered that my modified RemChoked 870 delivered lethal patterns of Remington's 2 3/4 -inch Express Magnum No. 6's out to 30 yards. I have established this as my maximum effective range. While many veteran turkey hunters flock to the pricey new specialty loadings, for my money a conventional magnum dose of No. 5 or No. 6 traditional lead shot does the trick.

Live the dream. Pattern your shotgun and discover the "purr-fect" combination of sights, choke and ammunition to put a gobbler in the gravy this spring.

There are more than 25 cinder cones at Craters, each one a small volcano. The most recent volcanic activity in the area occurred 2,100 years ago. A walk on the North Crater Flow Trail allows you a close-up view of one of these recent flows.

Nearby points of interest include Lava Hot Springs, Jackson Hole and Utah's Cache Valley.

Tip: Don't forget the sunscreen - or your fishing pole. Anglers can try their luck at landing native cutthroat or lake trout in the summer.

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Turkeys Continue to Move North

DULUTH, Minn. • Rick Horton wonders, tongue in cheek, whether wild turkeys near Floodwood, Minn., perk up when they hear the sound of an oncoming freight train. That train whistle could be like a dinner bell to turkeys, which have discovered there's spilled grain along the tracks from freights that carry North Dakota wheat to the Twin Ports during summer months.

"They feed along the tracks on that grain," said Horton, regional biologist for the National Wild Turkey Federation in Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Partly as a result of dependable food sources, Minnesota's turkey population continues to expand its range northward. When the state's first turkey hunting period opens this week, hunters will be able to hunt an expanded zone north to Minnesota Highway 200 and U.S. Highway 2.

"The anecdotal information is that, yeah, they're still expanding, still finding habitats suitable for them and also finding winter food resources," Horton said.

Until this year, the northern boundary of the turkey

zone in Carlton County was along Minnesota Highway 210, but the Department of Natural Resources moved it north for this spring's hunt.

The heart of Minnesota's turkey population remains in southeastern Minnesota, but the birds are doing well across much of the nonforested region of the state.

"The biggest thing they need to make it is food," Horton said. "If they find somebody's bird feeder or deer feeder or the railroad tracks, those local populations will probably make it."

Bob Krepps of Duluth has hunted Carlton County in recent years.

"It's coming on," Krepps said. "That population is going to continue to grow. I think there are a lot of birds there, but still, it's going to be spotty."

Early Spring

The unseasonably warm weather probably won't affect gobbler behavior a great deal, most hunters and biol-

ogists think.

"Certainly, from a plant phenology point of view, we're a month, maybe six weeks, early," said Steve Merchant, wildlife population program manager for the Minnesota DNR. "But I haven't seen much turkey activity until the last few days. Now I'm starting to see gobblers strutting in the open."

In other words, right on schedule.

Breeding activity typically begins in mid-April, although that can vary from north to south across the state. The peak of hatching is about June 1, Horton said. Turkeys have a 28-day incubation period, so most breeding must take place by about May 1 or so, he said.

Still, gobblers are active through May, looking for hens that might not have been bred yet.

The early spring probably means more vegetation in the woods, especially during the middle and later hunting periods. Turkeys may not be as easy to spot.

"You're just not going to see them until they're a lot closer," Krepps said.

Easy Winter

Last spring, the turkey harvest was down a bit in Minnesota, thanks largely to a cold, snowy first two weeks of the season. But this year's mild winter should mean good things for hunters.

"It's been a great winter if you're a turkey," Merchant said. "We don't expect to see a lot of mortality on birds. I think we did have some mortality two years ago. I expect clutch sizes to be large. If we get good spring weather, those nests should produce a lot of

F&G: A Banner **Year for Fishing**

JEROME • The fishing is great in Idaho, and people are catching on; more people are fishing now than most years in the past decade, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

In 2011, Fish and Game sold about 450,000 fishing licenses, down about 5 percent from the former high in 2009. More good news, though: most license and permit sales through March 2012 are above what they were at the same time in 2011, according to the department.

Resident fishing license sales are up about 9 percent; resident junior licenses are up 14 percent; resident disabled licenses are up 16 percent; two-pole permit sales are up 6 percent; nonresident licenses are up 10 percent; salmon permits are up about 6 percent; and steelhead permits are up about 2 percent.

The increase in fishing license sales is not just an indication of good fishing; it is also proof that fishing represents affordable and popular recreation in spite of the economy.

Early Spring Trout Fishing Not What It Used to Be

RED WING, Minn. • Recreation got up quite a head of steam near this scenic river town on Saturday.

Boaters sunbathed as they motored up and down the Mississippi, flanked coming and going by walleye seekers playing hooky from yardwork. Trout anglers found familiar comfort, if not a lot of water, between the narrow banks of Hay Creek, casting to browns and even a few brookies. And bikes both motorized and pedaled seemed everywhere, as were hikers and campers, the entire shebang a real who'swho of goof-offs.



All three major U.S. stock indexes sank after a dismal report about bad loans on the books of Spanish banks. American Plans to Cut Another 1,200 Jobs

DALLAS (AP) • American Airlines wants to eliminate 1,200 nonunion jobs as it cuts costs while under bankruptcy protection. That pushes the company's overall job-cut target to

14,200. It announced plans in February to cut 13,000 union pilots, flight attendants and ground workers.

American, the nation's third-biggest airline, has about 73,000 workers.

American outlined the cuts for many nonunion workers on Wednesday. The company wants to outsource the jobs of all airport skycaps and cargo agents, cancel a planned lump-sum payment that was due for nonunion workers next year, freeze their pension plan, cut vacation and paid holidays, and reduce medical benefits.

Shortages Could Slow Down Ŭ.S. Auto Production

The U.S. auto industry, already stretched to meet growing car and truck sales, faces parts shortages that could limit the number of new vehicles in showrooms later this year and crimp a historic turnaround.

DETROIT • The U.S. auto industry, already stretching to meet rising demand for cars and trucks, is facing shortages of parts and materials that could limit the number of new vehicles in showrooms later this year and crimp a historic turnaround.

The most immediate problem -ashortage of a crucial plastic resin, caused by an explosion March 31 at a plant in Germany - could surface in a few weeks. And later this year or beyond, automakers could be confronted with an even bigger crisis, running short of parts simply because there aren't enough factories and people to make them.

No one is entirely sure how many plants or models will be affected by either problem. Automakers say they are working to avoid shortages in both cases. But it may be tough to manage the intricate chain of companies that make most of the 3,000 parts that go into every car, from tiny valves and computer chips to heavy metal castings for transmissions.

"A lot of them are under pressure because they reduced their staff and temporarily mothballed some of their factories," said Jim Gillette, an analyst with IHS Automotive. "A number of them are struggling to keep up at the moment."

The broader parts shortage dates to the auto industry's near-collapse in 2008 and 2009, when sales plummeted and General Motors and Chrysler were forced into bankruptcy protection. From 2008 to 2011, parts makers cut back on people, closed factories and sold off equipment.

During the downturn, at least 57 parts makers closed, were bought out or went into bankruptcy, according to the Original Equipment Suppliers Association. Nearly 20 percent of auto parts workers — more than 100,000 people – lost their jobs from 2008 through 2011.

U.S. auto sales dropped to a 30-year low of 10.4 million in 2009 but are on the rebound. Last year, they grew to 12.8 million, and analysts are predicting 14.5 million or more this year. If sales rise above 15 million, some automakers will run short of parts, crimping the supply of certain models, said J. Scot Sharland, executive director of the Automotive Industry Action Group, a trade association.

"There's a genuine concern that if that happens, we're going to certainly have some spot outages" at auto assembly plants, Sharland said. "There's still a significant amount of pent-up demand in the market."

Scammers Pose as Gooding Car **Dealership**

But scammers running a website promising Porsches, Bentleys and Land Rovers at cut-rate prices are banking on the idea that the rest of the world knows little about small-town

The Better Business Bureau says the website Wartluftmotors.com claims to sell cars under the name of Wartluft Motor Sports, a Main Street dealership that has been defunct since October 2011. According to a BBB release, the website is registered to a computer last located in the Cezch Republic.

According to the BBB, scammers operate under a veil of false legitimacy to dupe would-be car buyers into sending \$35,000 wires with a \$15 transfer fee to them. A BBB release says that the fictitious cars remain listed as "for sale" on the website, and attempts to contact company officials aren't returned.

"This is a typical non-dealer advertising vehicles they do not possess in order to get you to wire them money," Dale Dixon, CEO of Better Business Bureau serving the Snake River Region, said in a written release. "The website is hijacked."

According to the BBB, Wartluft was a small-engine repair shop that sold outdoor recreation vehicles. Its lot is currently vacant and the phone number listed on the website is disconnected.

Competition Cuts Down Medicare Fraud

WASHINGTON • A yearlong experiment with competitive bidding for power wheelchairs, diabetic supplies and other personal medical equipment produced \$200 million in savings for Medicare, and government officials said Wednesday they are expanding the pilot program in search of even greater

dividends. The nine-city crackdown targeting waste and fraud has drawn a strong protest from the medical supply industry, which is warning of shortages for people receiving Medicare benefits and economic hardship for small suppliers. But the shift to competitive bidding has led to few complaints from those in Medicare, according to a new government report.

The report found only 151 complaints from a total population of 2.3 million Medicare recipients in the nine metropolitan areas, including Miami, Cincinnati and Riverside, Calif.

As a result, the program is expanding to a total of 100 cities next year, along with a national mail order program for diabetes supplies such as blood sugar testing kits. Eventually the whole country will participate.

Medicare traditionally has struggled to manage medical equipment costs. Officials say the program often paid more than private insurers for comparable equipment and was vulnerable to fraud by unscrupulous suppliers ordering expensive but unneeded products for unwitting beneficiaries.

By shifting to competitive bidding

with a limited number of approved suppliers in each area, Medicare will save nearly \$26 billion from 2013-2022, the government estimates, and reduce costs for seniors without cutting benefits.

"What we see is that costs are lower and there is no impact on the health status of our beneficiaries," said Jonathan Blum, deputy administrator for Medicare. "This gives us very strong confidence that we can expand the program. To us, this is a clear success."

The home-care supply industry sharply questioned that conclusion.

"With respect to the number of complaints (the report's) information is downright laughable," said Walt Gorski, a senior lobbyist for the American Association for Homecare. "It defies logic." The group represents suppliers of home health equipment, ranging from oxygen to hospital beds.

The industry says hundreds of economists at academic institutions around the country have concluded that Medicare's competitive bidding model is flawed and could lead to shortages or force beneficiaries to use less desirable cut-rate equipment.

In its report, Medicare said it closely monitored the health of beneficiaries likely to use home equipment in the nine areas involved with the competitive bidding experiment. It then compared the results to data for beneficiaries in other similar areas where competitive bidding has not been instituted yet. Using yardsticks such as emergency room visits and nursing home admissions, it found no significant differences.





'World's Oldest Teenager' Dick Clark Dead at 82

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Dick Clark, the ever-youthful television host and producer who helped bring rock 'n' roll into the mainstream on "American Bandstand" and rang in the New Year for the masses at Times Square, has died. He was 87.


Spokesman Paul Shefrin said Clark had a heart attack Wednesday morning at Saint John's hospital in Santa Monica, where he had gone the day before for an outpatient procedure.

Clark had continued performing even after he suffered a stroke in 2004 that affected his ability to speak and walk.

Long dubbed "the world's oldest teenager" because of his boyish appearance, Clark bridged the rebellious new music scene and traditional show business, and was equally comfortable whether chatting about music with Sam Cooke or bantering with Ed McMahon about TV bloopers. He long championed black singers by playing the original R&B versions of popular songs, rather than the pop cover.

Ryan Seacrest, who took over main hosting duties on the countdown show from Clark after the legend grew frail, said in a statement Wednesday that he was "deeply saddened."

"I idolized him from the start, and I was graced early on in my career with his generous advice and counsel," Seacrest said. "He was a remarkable host and businessman and left a rich legacy to television au-

diences around the world. We will all miss him."

He thrived as the founder of Dick Clark Productions, supplying movies, game and music shows, beauty contests and more to TV. Among his credits: "The \$25,000 Pyramid," "TV's Bloopers and Practical Jokes" and the American Music Awards.

"Dick Clark was a true pioneer who revolutionized the way we listened to and consumed music," record executive Clive Davis said in a statement. "For me he ranks right up there with the giants of our business."

For a time in the 1980s, he had shows on all three networks and was listed among the Forbes 400 of wealthiest Americans. Clark also was part of radio as a partner in the United Stations Radio Network, which provided programs — including Clark's — to thousands of stations.

"There's hardly any segment of the population that doesn't see what I do," Clark told The Associated Press in a 1985 interview. "It can be embarrassing. People come up to me and say, 'I love your show,' and I have no idea which one they're talking about."

The original "American Bandstand" was one of network TV's longest-running series as part of ABC's daytime lineup from 1957 to 1987. It later aired for a year in syndication and briefly on the USA Network. Over the years, it introduced stars ranging from Buddy Holly to Madonna. The show's status as an American cultural institution was solidified when Clark donated Bandstand's original podium and backdrop to the Smithsonian Institution.

Clark joined "Bandstand" in 1956 after Bob Horn, who'd been the host since its 1952 debut, was fired. Under Clark's guidance, it went from a local Philadelphia show to a national phenomenon.

"I played records, the kids danced, and America watched," was how Clark once described the series' simplicity. In his 1958 hit "Sweet Little Sixteen," Chuck Berry sang that "they'll be rocking on Bandstand, Philadelphia, P-A."

As a host, he had the smooth delivery of a seasoned radio announcer. As a produc-

er, he had an ear for a hit record. He also knew how to make wary adults welcome this odd new breed of music in

their homes.
Clark endured accusations that he was in with the squares, with critic Lester Bangs defining Bandstand as "a leggily acceptable euphemism of the teenage experience." In a 1985 interview, Clark acknowledged the complaints. "But I knew at the time that if we didn't make the presentation to the older generation palatable, it could killit."

"So along with Little Richard and Chuck Berry and the Platters and the Crows and the Jayhawks... the boys wore coats and ties and the girls combed their hair and they all looked like sweet little kids into a high school dance;" he said.

But there was more than just twisting on his show. During "Bandstand's" first national season in 1957, Clark integrated the show by adding popular black artists such as Chuck Berry, Chubby Checker, Sam Cooke and Jackie Wilson to the guest lineups. He helped give black artists their due by playing original R&B recordings instead of cover versions by white performers, and he brought black teens on as dancers.

"It still wasn't acceptable for them to dance with white kids, so the blacks just danced with each other. We were waiting for the explosion, but it never happened," Clark told Pennsylvania Heritage Magazine in 1998. "The wonderful part about our decision to integrate then was that there were no repercussions, no reverberations, no battles at all—it just happened right there on a television screen in front of millions of people. That was a giant step forward."

President Barack Obama issued a statement saying he and first lady Michelle were saddened by Clark's passing and lauded him for "reshaped the television landscape forever" and introducing the soundtrack of our times.

"But more important than his groundbreaking achievements was the way he made us feel — as young and vibrant and optimistic as he was;" the statement said.

TWIN FALLS • With the all the walks, errors and misplays, Wednesday's baseball game between Century and Canyon Ridge was decided in the most ironic fashion possible: a moment of fundamental soundness.

Amid all the mistakes, Century executed a suicide squeeze in the eighth inning to plate the decisive run in a 9-8 win over the Riverhawks.

A single, a two-base throwing error and then the sacrifice bunt interrupted what had been a stellar relief outing for Jacob Newton, who took the loss.

This year, she's got her sights once again set on a top-three finish at state — in the boys competition.

No, you didn't read that wrong.

"I really like the pace and the level of play all the way around. I'm used to that from playing (Idaho Golf Association) Juniors in the summer. There isn't as much depth with the girls, and when I get out of my rhythm I actually play worse," said Harr. "I want to improve my game and keep getting better so that I can

hopefully golf in college."

Under Idaho High School Activities Association approval, if a school doesn't have a girls team in a given sport, a girl can compete on the school's boys team. Because Castleford didn't have enough golfers out to field a full girls team, and in order to enhance her own game into one that she hopes will earn her a college scholarship, Harr joined the boys team, where she's hovered around the No. 2 spot in the rotation as the Wolves seek to defend their team championship.

For Harr, the biggest part of adjusting to playing from white tees rather than red was distance, but not off the tee. Hitting longer

irons into greens gives a golfer less control over spin, touch, and other necessary techniques that consistently result in shorter putts.

Once she started getting that down, her scores have improved. On Tuesday she shot a 79 — two rounds of that caliber at state would have her right in the mix for the title.

Having a girl on a boys team is uncommon but not unheard of. Salmon River High School allowed two girls to play on the boys basketball team this year because it didn't have enough interested girls to field a team of any

Eagle forward Egwuonwu headed to Montana State, one of five new players for the Bobcats

Paul Egwuonwu, a 6-8 sophomore forward for the College of Southern Idaho, inked a

National Letter of Intent with Montana State on Wednesday, becoming the third CSI player from this season to move on to a Division I program.

"Paul brings size and a real physical presence to the front line along with being a very skilled player who has proven ability to play on the interior and the perimeter," said Montana State head coach Brad Huse in a release. "He played the role asked of him this year, but we'll look to him to be a more productive and assertive offensive player once he gets here, which he proved he can handle at Northwest Nazarene and in high school."

A 2009 graduate of Capital High School in Boise, Egwuonwu started his college career at Division II Northwest Nazarene in Nampa where he averaged 10.1 points and 4.5 rebounds as a redshirt freshman in 2010-11.

He transferred to CSI this season and averaged 4.6 points and 5.6 rebounds in a reserve role for the 31-5 Golden Eagles. He began the season in the starting lineup, but head coach Steve Gosar opted to go with a fourguard look and Egwuonwu was the first big man off the bench.

"Paul was one of those guys who would make plays that helped us win games, but those plays wouldn't always show up in the stats," Gosar said. "He's just a very bright kid. He has a lot of great basketball knowledge and is so smart defensively. He's a really good team defender and should be a good asset for them on their front line. I know playing Division I ball has been his dream for a long time and I think he has some good basketball ahead of him."

SUMMITT STEPS ASIDE AS LADY VOLS COACH

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. • Pat Summitt, who won more games than anyone in NCAA college basketball history, stepped down Wednesday as coach of the Tennessee Lady Vols, less than eight months after revealing she had early-onset dementia.

"I've loved being the head coach at Tennessee for 38 years, but I recognize that the time has come to move into the future and to step into a new role," the 59-year-old Hall of Famer said in a

statement issued by the school. Longtime assistant Holly Warlick will take over for Summitt, who will become head coach emeritus.

A news conference is scheduled this afternoon at the school in Knoxville.

When the Lady Vols lost in a regional final to eventual national champion Baylor, Warlick's tears were a telltale sign of how draining the season had been and also that it likely was Summitt's last game.

"She is an icon who does not view herself in that light, and her legacy is well-defined and everlasting," athletic director Dave Hart said. "Just like there will never be another John Wooden,

"We didn't even really think about it," Castleford senior Mitch Howard said of welcoming Harr as one of the guys. "All I thought about was that she's another really good golfer, and that's going to help our team out."

Others saw the exact same thing and requested the IH-SAA to do something about it, asserting that Harr shouldn't be able to play with the boys because Castleford, while it doesn't have enough girls for a full team, does have a girls program, albeit one

with just two golfers in addition to Harr.

A vote last week by the association's executive board shot down the appeal and paved the way for Harr to remain with the boys. Because she's declared for the boys program, she cannot compete in any girls competition for the remainder of the season.

"People said that we're stacking our team, and that she's taking a place away from a boy, but that's not necessarily true," Castleford coach Laurie Howard. "She's got to do the qualifying for every meet and if five boys beat her, she's not in the team that week."

Harr hasn't been dislodged in qualifying so far this season. In fact, she's won the qualifying competition on two occasions. But Tuesday was the first time she played from the No. 1 position. She finished in a tie for second, two shots behind the guy she supplanted as Castleford's No. 1, Mitch Howard.

"Last time I didn't think I was ready to play in the No. 1 group," Harr said. "I was still working on adjusting my game and I beat Mitch when he just had a bad day. I've gotten a lot better and now I think I'm ready for that challenge. It'll help Mitch get motivated to keep getting

better too, and that helps our team."

Harr doesn't know how long she'll get to play with the boys. If Castleford gets one more girl out for golf next year the Wolves will have enough for a full team, and she'll be back to try and win another individual girls title.

Wherever she's playing next season, opponents will have to take note.

"If that's what happens, then I'll have to adjust to that," Harr said about the possibility of returning to the girls ranks next season. "Right now I'm just worrying about my game and trying to get better."





• USAIN BOLT: Surprise, surprise. Any talk of the Olympics has to start with the flashy Jamaican sprinter. His performance in Beijing four years ago was magical – gold medals and world records in the 100 meters, 200 meters and sprint relay. Sure, Bolt hasn't been as supernatural the past couple of years, but expect him to peak just in time for the big show in London. There's no reason he can't win another three golds, though world records may be too much to ask. His toughest competition in the 100 and 200 is likely to come from countryman Yohan Blake.

• MICHAEL PHELPS: Another no-brainer. After winning a record eight gold medals in Beijing, the 26year-old American is back for his final big splash before retirement. With a career total of 16 medals, Phelps needs just three more of any color to become the most decorated Olympian in any sport. He called his results over the past three years "horrendous," but he was back in top form at last month's Indianapolis meet. U.S. teammate Ryan Lochte, who won five golds at the 2011 worlds, is Phelps' top rival.

OSCAR PISTORIUS: The South African doubleamputee athlete, who runs on carbon-fiber blades, is looking to make history by becoming the first amputee runner to compete in an Olympics. The "Blade Runner" has already gone under the 400-meter Olympic qualifying time of 45.30 seconds and needs to do it once more at an international meet to be eligible for Olympic selection. Pistorius also plans to run in able-bodied IAAF events in Europe and the U.S. ahead of the Olympics. He'll compete in the Paralympics,

• HIROSHI HOKETSU: At the age of 71, the Japanese equestrian will be the oldest competitor in London. Hoketsu has qualified for the individual dressage competition, riding a 15-year-old mare called Whisper. He competed in his first Olympics in 1964 when he was 23. Hoketsu was 67 when he competed in Beijing, finishing ninth in the team event and 35th in the individual competition. He still won't break the record as the oldest Olympian ever. That distinction belongs to Swedish shooter Oscar Swahn, who was 72 when he won a silver medal at the 1920 Antwerp

• KERRI WALSH/MISTY MAY-TREANOR: Beach volleyball will be one of the main attractions in London, with the competition taking place at a temporary venue in Horse Guards Parade, a stone's throw from Downing Street and Buckingham Palace. No one will get more time in the spotlight than Walsh and May-Treanor, who won gold medals in Athens and Beijing and are favorites for a third title in London. And, yes, the Americans will still be wearing the standard bikini uniforms — not the more modest attire approved recently by the international volleyball feder-

• CHRIS HOY: Winner of three gold medals in Beijing, the British track cyclist is one of the host nation's top hopes for glory on home turf in the spectacular new velodrome. The Scot was knighted "Sir Chris" by Queen Elizabeth II in 2009 and could become Britain's most decorated Olympian. The McHoy" is expected to compete in the keirin and the team sprint events, and possibly the individual sprint. With a career total of four gold medals and a silver, Hoy could eclipse rowing great Steve Redgrave's British record of five golds and a bronze.

• NEYMAR: Argentina failed to qualify for the Olympic soccer competition, meaning Lionel Messi won't be coming. But Brazil did qualify and Neymar is the player to watch. "The Prince" is a prolific goal-scoring striker for Santos, the Brazilian club that Pele, "The King," made famous in the 1960s. The 20-year-old Neymar has already scored nearly 100 goals for Santos in less than three seasons. Pele recently called Neymar the best player in the world — better than three-time FIFA player of the year Messi. The Olympic title is the only significant soccer competition Brazil has yet to

• KEVIN DURANT: It's hard to single out any single player from the star-studded U.S. basketball team. Kobe, LeBron and D-Wade are back from the group that won the 2008 gold medal. So this will be the chance for Oklahoma City Thunder forward Durant to show his Olympic credentials. KD led the U.S. to gold at the 2010 world championships, but the Olympic title is what really matters. Durant, a two-time NBA scoring leader, is averaging nearly 28 points per game this season and should be a key in coach Mike Krzyzewski's lineup for London.

• LIN DAN: Widely considered the greatest badminton player of all time, China's "Super Dan" is a fourtime world champion, fivetime All England winner and the reigning Olympic gold medalist. Standing in the way of 29-year-old Lin's quest for a second Olympic title will be his main rival, Lee Chong Wei of Malaysia. The competition will be held at the Wembley Arena. Get ready for a dose of, you guessed it, "Lin-Danity."

• STEVEN LOPEZ: With five world championships, two Olympic gold medals and a bronze to his name, Lopez is the face of taekwondo in the U.S. He's back for his fourth Olympics and a chance to medal at a fourth games. His sister, Diana, qualified for her second Olympics but brother Mark missed out this time. In Beijing, the Lopez siblings became the first trio from the same family to represent the U.S. at the Olympics since 1904 -and all won medals. Steven Lopez, 33, will be motivated to win gold again this time after settling for bronze in China.

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

Bobby Wolff

"And I am right, And you are right, And all is right as right can be!" – W.S. Gilbert

In today's deal you could argue that West might have raised to four spades over South's four hearts, but West was not sure at this vulnerability what the size of the penalty might be. As it was, he passed, and North bid five hearts as a general try, focusing on spades more than anything else. South looked at his quick tricks and accepted the invitation. In this position one should pass with no control, and cue-bid five spades with the ace and anything but a dead minimum. You can use your discretion with a second-round control, typically bidding slam unless you are otherwise unsuitable.

Against six hearts, when the spade three was led to the jack and 10, East insulted declarer by trying to cash the spade ace, perhaps not seeing the downside of this move.

South was quick to put him right. He ruffed the second spade high, and now it was an easy matter to cross to dummy with a trump and lead the spade queen to pin the nine and establish the eight for a discard.

Of course if the spade nine had not fallen, declarer would have been reduced to taking the club finesse for his contract, and today would not have been his lucky day.

Had the spade nine and eight been switched, declarer could have husbanded the entries to dummy and have brought about this position for himself without any help from the defenders after the opening lead.

ANSWER: You are by no means minimum for the auction, and your singleton diamond suggests that your partner will find four hearts easier than three notrump. So up and bid the heart game and don't hang back. Your shape should help partner ruff out diamonds or set up clubs for discards.



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
