WASHINGTON • The college
class of 2012 is in for a rude welcome to the world of work. A weak labor market already has left half of young college graduates either jobless or underemployed in positions that don't fully use their skills and nowledge.
Young adults with bachelor's ing by in lower-wage jobs waiter or waitress, bartender, retail clerk or receptionist, for example - and that's confounding their hopes a degree would pay mounting student loans. An analysis of governmen data conducted for The Associated Press lays bare the highly uneven prospects for holders of bachelor's degrees
Opportunities for college aduates vary widely.
While there's strong demand fields, arts and humanities flounder. Median wages for hose with bachelor's degrees are down from 2000, hit by technological changes that are as bank tellers. Most future job openings are projected to be in lower-skilled positions such as home health aides, who can provide personalized attention as he U.S. population ages. Taking underemployment inconsideration, the job holders fell last year to the lowest level in more than a decade. "I don't even know what I'm looking for,' says Michael Bledsoe, who described months of fruitless job searches as he cofved customers at a Seattle

## Bureau of Reclamation's Reservoir Proposals RaisingFishConcerns

IDAHO FALLS • The U.S.
Bureau of Reclamation has
plunged headlong into a
battle over the future of
eastern Idaho's water.
Providing more water
storage by taking water
from some of the region's
most revered streams will
not be easy, and bureau of-
ficials know it. There's no
way to escape controversy
when a proposed project
involves waterways such as
the Teton River, Fall River,
Bitch Creek and Conant
Creek.
Bob Schattin, activity
manager in the bureau's
Boise office, knows all
about the importance of
those streams to fish popu-
lations. Any plans to ex-
pand water storage on or
near them would take into
account anglers' concerns,
he said.
At this point, however, a
proposal to build as many
as five new reservoirs in the
Henry's Fork basin is so
preliminary that it's simpos-
sible to say which alterna-
tives, if any, are real possi-
bilities, Schattin said.
"You just can't look at
one kind of alternative and
bring everyone together," he said. "You have to have a package of ideas." In fact, the new-reservoirs proposal is only a portion of water-management options the bureau is ex-
ploring in Idaho's Upper Snake region.
From a pool of 48 ideas, bureau officials have settled on 17 "reconnaissancelevel alternatives," which include raising existing
dams; expanding aquifer dams; expanding aquifer
recharge in certain areas; optimization of water optimization of cities, industry and farms; expanding the Island Park and Ashton reservoirs; and
building a new Teton Dam. The first Teton Dam failed in 1976.
The continuing decline Snake Plain Aquifer, which provides water for millions of farm acres throughout southern Idaho, is one of the driving factors behind the bureau's consideration of new water-storage and
other controversial projects, Schattin said.

a fireball, which is a very bright meteor. It will take time to determine the path of the fireball and where it broke up, they added.

dreds of illegal immigrants after politicians and federal investigators started to pick apart his patrols. He said he wouldn't cooperate with the inquiry, but said he would tone down the patrols - if he was proven

In an interview Thursday, Arpaio defended his comments before Texans For Immigration Reform as a collection of humorous off-the-cuff remarks intended merely to show that he wasn't going to back down to

speeches," Arpaio said. "It's strictly a speech that when I'm talking to certain groups, they like to hear what I have to say, because they know I'm under the gun.'

file over its civil rights allegations. Arpaio's file over is accused of racially profiling Latinos and retaliating against critics of its immigration patrols.
Talks to settle the case before going to court fell apart earlier this month when Arpaio balked at a proposal to let a courtappointed official monitor his operations to
make sure his office isn't making unconsti make sure his off arrests.
The current status of the criminal investigation against Arpaio's office is unknown. At the time of the speech, the FBI was already several months into its investigation of the sheriff's anti-public corruption squad that criminally investigated county officials legal and political disputes. KABUL, Afghanistan • The U.S. and Afghanistan reached a deal Sunday on a longdelayed strategic partnership agreement that ensures Americans will provide military and nancial support to the Afghan people for at least a decade beyond 2014, the deadline for nost foreign forces to withdraw. The pact is key to the U.S. exit strategy in Afghanistan because it estabishes guidelines withdrawal deadline and for financial help to the impoverished country and its security
forces.
For the Afghan government, it is also a way o show its people that their U.S. allies are not ust walking away.
"Our goal is an enduring partnership with Afghanistan that strengthens Afghan sovereignty, stability and prosperity and that con-
tributes to our shared goal of defeating alQaida and its extremist affiliates,"' said U.S. Embassy spokesman Gavin Sundwall. "We believe this agreement supports that goal." After 10 years of U.S.-led war, insurgents inked to the Taliban and al-Qaida remain a threat and as recently as a week ago launched large-scale attack on the capital Kabul and The draft agree

Early on, the springs were purchased by J.L.G. Smith, whom the editor of the Wood River Timeslaugh ingly dubbed "Alphabetical" alog cabinforhis second a log cabin for his second
wife, Margaret, and their family. He cleaned the springs, dug ditches and built dressing rooms. Meanwhile, Dr. Miller was busy building nearby a hospital for all sick personsbutespecial effects of mineral poisoning The Smith springs were first opened to the public on July 3, 1881. He charged 50 cents for the hack ride from Hailey there and back and another 50 cents for use
the baths, claiming that physicians recommended them for their medicinal properties. By the spring of 1882, Smith had built a small hotel for the accommodation of invalids and had put in a number of large bathtubs use the plunge (swimming) baths. He also built a pavilion large enough for eight quadrille sets to dance.

Special trains wake run from Pocatel and Boise Ten years went by be anything significant happened at Hailey Hot Springs, and then it was huge. The hotel caught fire the afternoon of July 27 , 1899. The place was crow whom barely escaped w their lives. It was totally destroyed.
The fire was started by the upsetting of a lamp used by some ladies who were curling their hair. When Mr. Stewart, the lessee, first no
ticed the smoke, he ran up the stairs to the third floor to give the alarm. Stewart managed to save the safe, his wife's piano, a sofa and some chairs. ## For Colleges, Rape Cases Present a Legal Minefield

Most victims don't have the resources to pursue lawsuits, which is precisely why Title IX procedures on campus must work for them. That means putting a thumb on the scale in favor of victims.
