Newcomers Vie for Open House Seat

TWIN FALLS • With Rep. Sharon Block's retirement and Rep. Jim Patrick's run for Senate, the new district 25 found itself with an open House seat.

That opened the door for legislative newcomers Clark Kauffman of Filer and David Funk of Hansen to contend for a spot in the Idaho Legislature. The two face off in the May 15 primary.

Funk, a dairy farmer, is focused on business. Regulations on business encroach on personal freedom, he said, and hamper economic development.

"I feel like I bring some one that actually knows that business inside and out," Funk said.

Kauffman, a farmer, wants to emphasize the state's transportation needs. He understands that funds are tight, but neglected local roads hurt the agriculture industry.

"Those are going to be hard choices, but they need to be done because a state without infrastructure is a state that can't move commerce," Kauffman said.

Both Republicans have leadership experience with industry boards.

The yearly salary for Idaho state representatives is \$16,116, plus living expenses during the legislative session. Representatives serve a two-year term.

Not a Done Deal

City council to consider reviewing P&Z-approved Canyon Park plat.

TWIN FALLS • Cheri Condie spent part of her Friday on the Snake River Canyon rim trail, handing out flyers and talking to visitors about a proposed shopping center near the Perrine Bridge.

The most common reaction, Condie said, is "Why here?" She's getting plenty of attention. Tonight,

the Twin Falls City Council will discuss the possibility of appealing a Planning and Zoning Commission decision to approve the preliminary plat for the Canyon Park development, planned for the empty lot near Golden Corral and the Buzz Langdon Visitor's Center.

On April 10, the Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission approved the plat for the shopping center, which will include retail and restaurant space. Kohl's is slotted to be among

1 in 2 New Graduates Are Jobless or Underemployed

A weak labor market already has left half of young college grads either jobless or underemployed in positions that don't fully use their skills and knowledge.

WASHINGTON • The college class of 2012 is in for a rude welcome to the world of work.

A weak labor market already has left half of young college graduates either jobless or underemployed in positions that don't fully use their skills and knowledge.

Young adults with bachelor's degrees are increasingly scraping by in lower-wage jobs — waiter or waitress, bartender, retail clerk or receptionist, for example — and that's confounding their hopes a degree would pay off despite higher tuition and mounting student loans.

An analysis of government data conducted for The Associated Press lays bare the highly uneven prospects for holders of bachelor's degrees.

Opportunities for college graduates vary widely.

While there's strong demand in science, education and health fields, arts and humanities flounder. Median wages for those with bachelor's degrees are down from 2000, hit by technological changes that are eliminating midlevel jobs such as bank tellers. Most future job openings are projected to be in lower-skilled positions such as home health aides, who can provide personalized attention as the U.S. population ages.

Taking underemployment into consideration, the job prospects for bachelor's degree holders fell last year to the lowest level in more than a decade.

"I don't even know what I'm looking for," says Michael Bledsoe, who described months of fruitless job searches as he served customers at a Seattle coffeehouse. The 23-year-old graduated in 2010 with a cre-

ative writing degree.

Initially hopeful that his college education would create opportunities, Bledsoe languished for three months before finally taking a job as a barista, a position he has held for the last two years. In the beginning he sent three or four resumes a day. But, Bledsoe said, employers questioned his lack of experience or the practical worth of his major. Now he sends a resume once every two weeks or so.

Bledsoe, currently making just above minimum wage, says he got financial help from his parents to help pay off student loans. He is now mulling

whether to go to graduate school, seeing few other options to advance his career. "There is not much out there, it seems," he said.

His situation highlights a widening but little-discussed labor problem. Perhaps more than ever, the choices that young adults make earlier in life — level of schooling, academic field and training, where to attend college, how to pay for it — are having long-lasting financial impact.

Twin Falls Police Seek Vandalism Information

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls Police Dept. is asking for the community's help in locating a suspect or suspects in a rash of thefts and vandalisms from late Saturday night to early Sunday morning.

As of 4 p.m. Sunday, police say they received 13 calls of thefts and vandalism to yard decorations, lighting, vehicles and landscaping at several homes and businesses in the northeast part of Twin Falls. The crimes caused several thousands of dollars in damage, accord-

ing to a police news release.

The suspect or suspects are believed to be in a dark-colored, full-sized pickup, possibly a Ford or Toyota, police said. A white male, possibly late teens to early 20s; short in height, wearing jeans and no shirt, was seen running from one of the crime scenes, according to the news release.

Anyone with information about the crimes is encouraged to contact the Twin Falls Police at 735-4357. Those who volunteer information may remain anonymous and may be eligible for a reward.

T.F. Man Hospitalized after Crash near I-84

TWIN FALLS • A 23-year-old Twin Falls man was airlifted to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise on Sunday after the car he was driving left Interstate 84 and ejected him at 2:36 p.m.

Sean Kunz was in the emergency room at 9:50 p.m. Sunday and a condition report was not available, a medical center spokeswoman said. Idaho State Police said in a news release he suffered non-life-threatening injuries and was transported by air ambulance.

Meanwhile, occupants Teela Olsen, 28, and John Yetzer, 26, both of Glenns Ferry, were taken by ground ambulance to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center with minor injuries, according to state police. Hospital staff could not provide condition reports.

Police said Kunz was not wearing a seat belt while driving the 1975 American Motors Hornet at milepost 170. Police did not know if Olsen and Yetzer wore seat belts at the time of the crash.

A state police spokeswoman said the accident closed the westbound lane for a half hour.

says Harvard economist Richard Freeman, noting the growing risk of a debt bubble with total U.S. student loan debt surpassing \$1 trillion. "If you're not sure what you're going to be doing, it probably bodes well to take some job, if you can get one, and get a sense first of what you want from college."

Andrew Sum, director of the Center for Labor Market Studies at Northeastern University who analyzed the numbers, said many people with a bachelor's degree face a double whammy of rising tuition and poor job outcomes. "Simply put, we're failing kids coming out of college," he said, emphasizing that when it comes to jobs, a college major can make all the difference. "We're going to need a lot better job growth and connections to the labor market, otherwise college debt will grow."

By region, the Mountain West was most likely to have young college graduates jobless or underemployed — roughly three in five. It was followed by the more rural southeastern U.S., including Alabama, Kentucky, Mississippi and Tennessee. The Pacific region, including Alaska, California, Hawaii, Oregon and Washington, also was high on the list.

On the other end of the scale, the southern U.S., anchored by Texas, was most likely to have young college graduates in higher-skill jobs.

The figures are based on an analysis of 2011 Current Population Survey data by Northeastern University researchers and supplemented with material from Paul Harrington, an economist at Drexel University, and the Economic Policy Institute, a Washington think tank. They rely on Labor Department assessments of the level of education required to do the job in 900-plus U.S. occupations, which were used to

calculate the shares of young adults with bachelor's degrees who were "underemployed."

About 1.5 million, or 53.6 percent, of bachelor's degree-holders under the age of 25 last year were jobless or underemployed, the highest share in at least 11 years. In 2000, the share was at a low of 41 percent, before the dot-com bust erased job gains for college graduates in the telecommunications and IT fields.

Out of the 1.5 million who languished in the job market, about half were underemployed, an increase from the previous year.

Broken down by occupation, young college graduates were heavily represented in jobs that require a high school diploma or less.

In the last year, they were more likely to be employed as waiters, waitresses, bartenders and food-service helpers than as engineers, physicists, chemists and mathematicians combined (100,000 versus 90,000). There were more working in office-related jobs such as receptionist or payroll clerk than in all computer professional jobs (163,000 versus 100,000). More also were employed as cashiers, retail clerks and customer representatives than engineers (125,000 versus 80,000).

According to government projections released last month, only three of the 30 occupations with the largest projected number of job openings by 2020 will require a bachelor's degree or higher to fill the position — teachers, college professors and accountants. Most job openings are in professions such as retail sales, fast food and truck driving, jobs which aren't easily replaced by computers.

College graduates who majored in zoology, anthropolo-

gy, philosophy, art history and humanities were among the least likely to find jobs appropriate to their education level; those with nursing, teaching, accounting or computer science degrees were among the most likely.

In Nevada, where unemployment is the highest in the nation, Class of 2012 college seniors recently expressed feelings ranging from anxiety and fear to cautious optimism about what lies ahead.

With the state's economy languishing in an extended housing bust, a lot of young graduates have shown up at job placement centers in tears. Many have been squeezed out of jobs by more experienced workers, job counselors said, and are now having to explain to prospective employers the time gaps in their resumes.

bank tellers, the type of job not expected to return in a more high-tech age.

David Neumark, an economist at the University of California-Irvine, said a bachelor's degree can have benefits that aren't fully reflected in the government's labor data. He said even for lower-skilled jobs such as waitress or cashier, employers tend to value bachelor's degree-holders more highly than high-school graduates, paying them more for the same work and offering promotions.

In addition, U.S. workers increasingly may need to consider their position in a global economy, where they must compete with educated foreign-born residents for jobs. Longer-term government projections also may fail to consider "degree inflation," a growing ubiquity of bachelor's degrees that could make them more commonplace in lower-wage jobs but inadequate for higher-wage ones.

That future may be now for Kelman Edwards Jr., 24, of Murfreesboro, Tenn., who is waiting to see the returns on his college education.

After earning a biology degree last May, the only job he could find was as a construction worker for five months before he quit to focus on finding a job in his academic field. He applied for positions in laboratories but was told they were looking for people with specialized certifications.

"I thought that me having a biology degree was a gold ticket for me getting into places, but every other job wants you to have previous history in the field," he said. Edwards, who has about \$5,500 in student debt, recently met with a career counselor at Middle Tennessee State University. The counselor's main advice: Pursue further education.

"Everyone is always telling you, 'Go to college,'" Edwards said. "But when you graduate, it's kind of an empty cliff."

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Bonnors Ferry Annexation Challenge Continues

SANDPOINT (AP) • A northern Idaho district judge has rejected a request by the city of Bonnors Ferry to dismiss a petition aimed at stopping the city from annexing 77 parcels.

The *Bonner County Daily Bee* in a story published Thursday reports that 1st District Judge Steve Verby disagreed with the city that the Annexation Opposition Group lacked standing in filing a petition for judicial review.

City officials in November announced the annexation. But some landowners don't want to be absorbed into the city because they contend the city's services aren't enough compared to increased taxes.

Others say they don't want to become subject to the city's laws.

Verby in his decision declined to award costs and fees to the group opposed to the annexation because he said the city's motion wasn't frivolous.

Will Herrington, the city's attorney, contended the petition should be thrown out because the group didn't identify landowners who would be affected by the annexation.

He also said the group failed to state a claim upon which relief could be granted.

But the group's attorney, Fonda Jovick, said city officials were the only supporters of the annexation and they ignored objections by landowners.

She provided affidavits from three people who had ownership interests.

BLM Remedies Popular Idaho Site's Drinking Water

BOISE (AP) • A popular southwestern Idaho recreation site's drinking water is back on, after managers remedied a contaminated water tank.

For nearly two years, drinking water at the Bureau of Land Management's Cove Recreation Site on the CJ Strike Reservoir has been turned off due to E. coli contamination.

Since then, BLM had the 13,000 gallon water tank professionally cleaned.

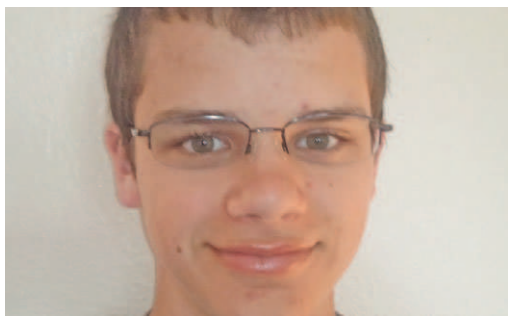
After all the lines, spigots and valves across the site were tested, two suspect spigots and associated water lines were removed.

What's more, the entire water system was chlorinated and flushed.

As a consequence, two rounds of sampling this spring showed no contamination.

The site in the Morley Nelson Snake River Birds of Prey National Conservation Area is about 45 miles south of Boise and is popular among anglers and others.

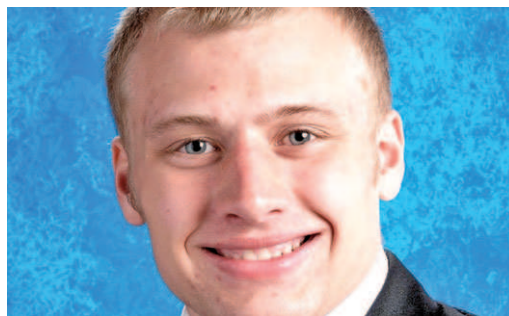

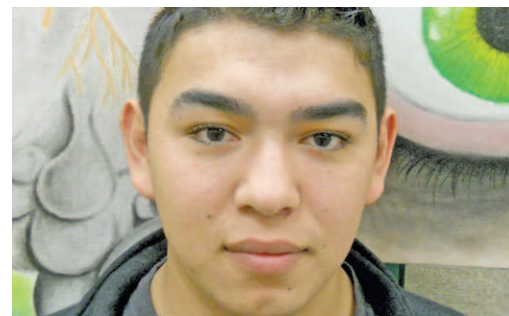

the tenants. The back of the shopping center will face the canyon.

But during the public input period at last Monday's city council meeting, Condie and Kathy MacMillan of Citizens Concerned for our Canyons brought up objections to the

plat approval.

Among them: The plan violates city zoning code that says the city must protect views along the canyon rim, Condie claimed, and the city should do a geological study to make sure the canyon rim is stable enough for the strip mall.

Developer Gerald Martens stressed that the property will have attractive landscaping and walls to block unsightly

garbage bins, and the city council said the stores won't be able to put signage on the back of the building, which will face the canyon.

But Condie and other opponents maintain it will sully the view for frequent users of the canyon rim trail.

City code doesn't allow a citizen to appeal a P&Z decision, but the council may request to review a plat approval.

Tonight's discussion will be about whether to review the P&Z decision, not on whether that decision should be upheld or overturned.

While public input would be allowed at future meetings, "that time and place is not at tonight's meeting," wrote Community Development Director Mitch Humble in the council agenda packet.

But Condie and other de-

velopment opponents are voicing their opinions in other ways, like with flyers and letters to city officials.

Condie isn't anti-development, but wants developers to consider making the shopping center fit in better with the landscape.

"Something is coming, and that something should be appropriate for the canyon rim overlay zone," she said.

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Bureau of Reclamation's Reservoir Proposals Raising Fish Concerns

IDAHO FALLS • The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation has plunged headlong into a battle over the future of eastern Idaho's water.

Providing more water storage by taking water from some of the region's most revered streams will not be easy, and bureau officials know it. There's no way to escape controversy when a proposed project involves waterways such as the Teton River, Fall River, Bitch Creek and Conant Creek.

Bob Schattin, activity manager in the bureau's Boise office, knows all about the importance of those streams to fish populations. Any plans to expand water storage on or near them would take into account anglers' concerns, he said.

At this point, however, a proposal to build as many as five new reservoirs in the Henry's Fork basin is so preliminary that it's impossible to say which alternatives, if any, are real possibilities, Schattin said.

"You just can't look at

one kind of alternative and bring everyone together," he said. "You have to have a package of ideas."

In fact, the new-reservoirs proposal is only a portion of water-management options the bureau is exploring in Idaho's Upper Snake region.

From a pool of 48 ideas, bureau officials have settled on 17 "reconnaissance-level alternatives," which include raising existing dams; expanding aquifer recharge in certain areas; optimization of water management by cities, industry and farms; expanding the Island Park and Ashton reservoirs; and building a new Teton Dam. The first Teton Dam failed in 1976.

The continuing decline in the level of the East Snake Plain Aquifer, which provides water for millions of farm acres throughout southern Idaho, is one of the driving factors behind the bureau's consideration of new water-storage and other controversial projects, Schattin said.

The Henry's Fork basin's position high in the Snake

River system gives water stored there a special value in terms of manipulating water supply for irrigators between Island Park and Glenns Ferry.

Even though senior irrigators rarely call for the restriction of water access in the Upper Snake area, expanding water storage higher in the system could relieve water demands in other areas downstream, Schattin said.

But at what cost? As they stand now, four of the bureau's five new reservoir proposals mention drawing water from the Teton River, a remote and world-class trout fishery. Two would remove water from Bitch Creek, home to one of the United States' core populations of the fragile Yellowstone cutthroat trout species.

A lack of human-regulated flows is one reason Yellowstone cutthroat have thrived in the Teton River and Bitch Creek while populations in streams around them have declined in relation to other fish species, said Kim Trotter, director of the Idaho Falls office for

conservation group Trout Unlimited.

"That is the exact water that they're hoping to capture and hold back from the river for irrigation purposes," Trotter said.

Because Bitch Creek is a favorite spawning area for cutthroat that live in the Teton River, interrupting its water supply could also affect Yellowstone cutthroat trout throughout the Teton River system, said Dan Garren, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game regional fisheries manager in Idaho Falls.

"All these biological systems are connected to some degree," Garren said. "You've got to be careful not to look at the individual pieces without looking at the whole system."

Because the bureau's proposal is at such an early stage, a timeline for when crews could break ground on any of the projects is difficult to pin down, Schattin said. After the bureau has conducted its appraisal, he said, a feasibility study on the projects would require congressional approval.

Idaho Center to Start Charging for Parking

NAMPA (AP) • The director of the Idaho Center in Nampa in southwest Idaho says visitors will be charged \$5 for parking starting May 1.

Craig Baltzer tells the *Idaho Press-Tribune* that the center won't charge for every event at the start while the public gets used to the fee.

He says visitors can pay at the gate using cash or card. Baltzer says the money generated from parking fees will be used for capital improvements and maintenance.

He says one of the first projects will be to repave the parking lot.

Winter Visitation to Yellowstone Remains Flat

POWELL, Wyo. (AP) • More than 89,000 people visited Yellowstone National Park between Dec. 15 and March 15 — a figure similar to the previous winter season.

The National Park Service says 89,279 people visited the park this winter, an increase of about half a percentage point from last season. Snowmobile and snow coach visits were down more than 10 percent this

year, but visitation stayed steady thanks to an increase in automobile traffic through the park's North Entrance.

The *Powell Tribune* reports most Yellowstone visits come during the summer season. For example, last July, the average day brought more than 3,900 visitors through the East Entrance — eight times the number of east gate visitors this entire 71-day winter season.

Hatch Withstands Tea Party Opposition, for Now

SALT LAKE CITY • The tea party movement solidified its presence as a force within the Republican Party two years ago when it helped orchestrate the defeat of three-term Sen. Bob Bennett at Utah GOP's nominating convention. But it fell short this weekend of doing the same to Sen. Orrin Hatch.

The different outcomes raise at least one question: Has the tea party lost some momentum or was it simply outflanked this time by Hatch, who had superior resources and tacked to the right on certain issues?

A national leader of tea party efforts, FreedomWorks, spent more than \$700,000 through a super PAC to defeat Hatch. Yet, Hatch was able to easily advance to a primary and only fell 32 votes short of earning the nomination outright.

Russ Walker, national political director for the super PAC, said Saturday that the measure of the tea party's success was less about the outcome and more about the steps that Hatch needed to take to advance.

"We think it's a victory either way because Orrin Hatch has had to become very conservative and he's

made a lot of promises to his constituents that he's going to vote that way over the next six years," Walker said shortly before delegates voted. "How can you say we lost our mojo when Orrin Hatch had to run to the right of all the other candidates?"

Under Utah's unique nomination system, delegates at the state party convention get first crack at determining who the party's nominee should be in the general election. However, if no candidate obtains 60 percent of the vote, then the top two vote-getters move on to the primary. That's what happened Saturday when Hatch secured about 59.2 percent of the vote while former state Sen. Dan Liljenquist won about 40.8 percent.

After the vote, delegates said Hatch did a much better job of addressing their chief concerns than Bennett did in 2010.

"Hatch saw we had this fever of not liking the incumbent and changed his tune a little bit and went back to some conservative things," said Jared Gomez of Ogden.

At the end of the day, he said that Hatch's victory said more about the race than Hatch ran than it said about the tea party's influence.

"I think the tea party is still strong," Gomez said.

But Jim Walker of Orem, Utah, disagreed. He said he considered himself a tea party member two years ago: "There was a need for it two years ago," he said. He doesn't feel that way now and believes that the effort's effectiveness has certainly waned.

"I think they're a bunch of radicals," he said.

Jim Walker exemplified how tea party influence was just one factor for delegates to consider on Saturday. In the end, he liked both candidates and was so torn over his vote that he was thrilled that the race will go to a June primary. He voted for Hatch in the first round when the senator secured about 57 percent off the vote while Liljenquist managed only about 28 percent. But in the second round, once the field of candidates had been winnowed from 10 to just two, he voted for Liljenquist. He said GOP voters statewide deserved to have a say in the outcome.

There is no one national tea party. Rather, there are hundreds of local tea party groups around the country. FreedomWorks, as much as any organization, has tried to unify support from tea party members behind particular

candidates for federal office. The organization's super PAC did not make an endorsement in the Utah race but made clear that it admired Liljenquist and wanted Hatch defeated.

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Explosion, Fireball Reported in Nevada, California

RENO, Nev. • A loud explosion heard across much of Nevada and California on Sunday morning rattled homes and prompted a flood of calls to law enforcement agencies on both sides of the Sierra Nevada, some of the reporting fireball sightings.

The sound and the light show were likely caused by a meteor that entered Earth's atmosphere, astronomers said.

"It made the shades in my room shake hard enough to slam into the window a couple times," said Nicole Carlsen of the Reno area. "I kept looking for earthquake information, but (there was) nothing. I even checked the front of my house to make sure no one ran into the garage. I wish I had seen the meteor."

Erin Girard-Hudson of Arnold, Calif., told The Union Democrat of Sonora, Calif., that the loud boom that occurred around 8 a.m. made her 2-year-old daughter, Elsie, cry.

"It knocked me off my feet and was shaking the house," she said. "It sounded like it was next door."

No damages or injuries were immediately reported. There were no reports of earthquakes at the time.

Some people reported seeing a brilliant light streak across the sky at the same time. Sightings occurred over roughly a 600-mile line across the two states, including Reno, Elko and North Las Vegas in Nevada, and the San Francisco, Sacramento and Bakersfield areas in California.

Astronomers said they believe the mysterious light was a fireball, which is a very bright meteor. It will take time to determine the path of the fireball and where it broke up, they added.

"From the reports, I have no doubt it was a fireball," said Robert Lunsford of the Geneseo, N.Y.-based American Meteor Society. "It happens all the time, but most are in

daytime and are missed. This one was extraordinarily bright in the daylight."

Lunsford said it's "pretty rare" for fireballs to produce a loud explosion. For that to happen, he explained, the meteor must have survived intact until breaking up about five miles above Earth. Most fireballs are visible at 50 miles above Earth.

"If you hear a sonic boom or loud explosion, that's a good indication that some fragments may have reached the ground," Lunsford told The Associated Press. "We'll have to get some people to work on it to pinpoint where it broke up and see if anything can be found on the ground."

Lunsford said more than 20 people in the two states had filed reports with his group by midmorning about seeing the fireball.

"I have been looking at the sky for 30 years, and I have never witnessed something so

amazing and puzzling. It is an event that makes you glad to be alive," said Matthew Neal of San Francisco. "The main body was bright green and the head was bright red and white."

Greg Giroux of June Lake, Calif., located along the eastern Sierra just west of Yosemite National Park, also was impressed.

"This was by far the brightest fireball/shooting star I've ever seen, especially since it was in full sunlight," he said. "After the flash, it broke up into pieces, then I lost sight of it as it went behind a mountain."

In Nevada, the light show was seen as far east as Elko, about 300 miles east of Reno, and as far south as the Las Vegas area.

Marcia Standifer of Spring Creek, near Elko, and her husband were out drinking coffee when they saw the fireball at the same time.

"It was a very bright ball of

white light, then dimmer to the horizon," she said. "We thought this was very unusual due to the bright daylight and how vivid the object was."

Tracey Cordaro of North Las Vegas said the sighting "took my breath away."

"It was amazing," she said. "It looked as if it was disintegrating rapidly, but was still quite large when it disappeared from my view ... (It was) bright green, visible in the bright sunlight."

Dan Ruby, associate director of the Fleischmann Planetarium at the University of Nevada, Reno, said it's unlikely the fireball had anything to do with the current peak of the Lyrid meteor shower.

"People are putting two and two together and saying it has something to do with the meteor shower," he said. "But the fireball was probably coincidental and unrelated to the peak of the meteor shower."

The fast food restaurant is transforming into a nightclub with celebrity servers and showgirls for a late-night grand opening bash May 4, although it's already open for business.

The two-story, 24-hour Metro McDonald's is located across the street from the City Center de-

velopment and The Cosmopolitan resort on Las Vegas Boulevard. Company representatives say it features sleek furniture, digital menu boards, wireless Internet access and graffiti-like murals.

McDonald's official Josephine Wee says the restaurant complements the landscape and character of Las Vegas and creates a unique experience for diners. It's the first and only of the company's restaurants that's using the "Metro" moniker.

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Men Accused of Setting Booby Traps near Utah Trail

PROVO, Utah (AP) • Two men have been arrested on suspicion of setting booby traps near a popular hiking trail in Utah.

Benjamin Rutkowski, 19, of Orem, and Kai Christensen, 21, of Provo, were booked Saturday into the county jail for investigation of misdemeanor reckless endangerment.

A Forest Service law enforcement officer with military experience discovered trip wires for the booby traps at entrances of a crude shelter made of dead tree limbs in Provo Canyon, said Utah County sheriff's Sgt. Spencer Cannon.

If activated, one trap was designed to send a device made with a large rock and sharpened sticks swinging toward the head of an unsuspecting hiker or camper.

The other trap was designed to cause a person to fall down on sharpened sticks placed in the ground.

Cannon said the shelter was one of many in an area frequented by hikers and campers.

"There was potential for some very serious injury to someone," he told the Deseret News. "If someone fell the wrong way it could have been disastrous or even fatal."

The suspects told authorities that they were targeting wildlife when they set the traps April 15, a day before the devices were discovered. The suspects said they had planned to return and take the shelter down but forgot.

But Cannon was skeptical the target was wildlife, saying that doesn't make sense.

"We believe they knew people would be going there and that's why they put them there," Cannon said.

He said illegal marijuana farmers are known to use booby traps in remote areas, but he's never heard of this type of device in a recreational area.

"People don't go up expecting this and they shouldn't have to," he told the Deseret News.

Investigators used Facebook to find individuals familiar with the shelter and to locate the suspects.

It wasn't immediately known whether the suspects had attorneys.

Ariz. Sheriff Played Probe for Laughs

PHOENIX • An audio recording has surfaced of an Arizona sheriff playing his refusal to cooperate in a racial profiling investigation for laughs at a fundraiser for an anti-illegal immigration group in Texas. He ridicules politicians who sought the probe and displayed contempt toward federal authorities who were — and are still — investigating him on two fronts.

The dismissive comments in 2009 by Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio came as the U.S. Justice Department had already launched a civil rights probe of his trademark immigration patrols and the FBI already was examining abuse-of-power allegations for the sheriff's investigations of political foes.

In the September 2009 speech in Houston, Arpaio boasted that he arrested hundreds of illegal immigrants after politicians and federal investigators started to pick apart his patrols. He said he wouldn't cooperate with the inquiry, but said he would tone down the patrols — if he was proven wrong.

"But I'm not. After they went after me, we arrested 500 more just for spite," the self-proclaimed "America's toughest sheriff" said, pausing for laughter and applause.

In an interview Thursday, Arpaio defended his comments before Texans For Immigration Reform as a collection of humorous off-the-cuff remarks intended merely to show that he wasn't going to back down to critics.

"These are not official, under-oath speeches," Arpaio said. "It's strictly a speech that when I'm talking to certain groups, they like to hear what I have to say, because they know I'm under the gun."

The sheriff currently awaits a lawsuit that the U.S. Justice Department has promised to file over its civil rights allegations. Arpaio's office is accused of racially profiling Latinos and retaliating against critics of its immigration patrols.

Talks to settle the case before going to court fell apart earlier this month when Arpaio balked at a proposal to let a court-appointed official monitor his operations to make sure his office isn't making unconstitutional arrests.

The current status of the criminal investigation against Arpaio's office is unknown. At the time of the speech, the FBI was already several months into its investigation of the sheriff's anti-public corruption squad that criminally investigated county officials and judges who were at odds with Arpaio in legal and political disputes. A grand jury has been investigating those allegations since at least December 2009.

Two county officials and a judge were charged in cases that collapsed in court just a few months after they were filed. An Arpaio

ally who prosecuted the cases was disbarred in a ruling earlier this month by an ethics panel of the Arizona courts.

That decision said the cases were brought to embarrass the trio of county officials and that evidence suggested the sheriff conspired with the prosecutor to intimidate the judge with unfounded criminal charges. But the panel said it didn't have jurisdiction for potential criminal cases.

The FBI declined to provide an update on its investigation. Federal prosecutors didn't respond to a request for an update.

The recording of the Texas speech was given to The Associated Press recently by Joel Robbins, a Phoenix attorney and long-time Arpaio critic who said he bought a copy from the group after reading about it in a newspaper.

At the time of the speech, only Maricopa County Supervisor Don Stapley had been criminally charged, though the sheriff was investigating other county officials.

"We have already indicted one, so I am not their favorite guy," Arpaio said in Houston, drawing laughter. "The county has cut my budget \$35 million just for spite. But I'm still locking them all up. I have ways to get the job done."

Paul Charlton, an attorney who represented Stapley and has listened to portions of Arpaio's speech, described the comment as "close to a confession as you may ever get."

"He is drawing the nexus himself between the budget cut of \$35 million dollars and an investigation of the Board of Supervisors. A threat to lock them up, which in fact he did," Charlton said.

Arpaio maintains that he never investigated county officials because they cut his budget.

Government Investigating Stalling School Buses

DETROIT • The federal government is investigating 5,000 school buses from the 2008 model year that could stall without warning.

There have been no accidents or injuries reported. But in at least three cases, high-pressure oil lines that

connect the oil pump to the fuel injectors allegedly failed on International CE-brand buses.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration posted a notice about the investigation on its website Sunday.

In one case reported to NHTSA, a bus full of students was going 55 miles per

hour when it started smoking and stalled. The driver pulled the bus to the side of the road.

International CE buses are made by Lisle, Ill.-based Navistar Inc. The company says it will cooperate fully with the investigation.

Government investigations sometimes lead to vehicle recalls.

U.S. Attorney Breaks Silence on Medical Pot Probe in Montana

HELENA, Mont. • The Justice Department has broken its long silence about last year's crackdown on medical marijuana operations in Montana, with U.S. Attorney Michael Cotter saying more than two dozen people have been indicted so far and that prosecutions will continue.

The statement released by the U.S. Attorney's Office is the agency's first since a single press release was sent the day after the March 14, 2011, raids on 26 homes, offices and businesses that effectively stymied the state's once-booming medical pot trade.

Then, federal prosecutors said the warrants were part of a long-running investigation into drug trafficking.

More than a year later, prosecutors have provided their first update on the investigation, saying more than 25 people have been indicted on federal drug charges related to the raids and 12 people have been sentenced.

The fallout is still happening, with another recent round of arrests, indictments and plea deals.

will keep targeting large-scale marijuana operations.

"Federal law is clear — the manufacture, distribution, possession and use of marijuana remains unlawful under federal law," Cotter said in the statement Thursday. He added that his office "will continue to support investigations and prosecutions of significant traffickers of all illegal drugs, including marijuana, in an effort to disrupt and dismantle illegal drug manufacturing and trafficking networks in Montana and elsewhere."

The U.S. attorney released his statement as members of a Miles City family of medical marijuana providers became the 10th, 11th and 12th people involved in the raids to be sentenced.

Richard Flor ran the operation and was a co-founder of Montana Cannabis, while his wife Sherry kept the books and his son Justin tended the plants and ran the operation's Billings dispensary.

U.S. Judge Charles Lovell sentenced the men to five years each in prison, while Sherry Flor was sentenced to two years. Those are the harshest sentences of the dozen, whose prison terms have ranged from six months to two years.

leniency, arguing that they were following the state's medical marijuana law. That's been the argument of several providers, and also is the argument asserted in a civil lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of the 2011 raids.

The Flors also said that they believed they were operating with the blessing of the federal government, after a 2009 U.S. Department of Justice memo said federal prosecutors would not pursue people who were in strict compliance with state medical marijuana laws.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Joseph Thaggard said that memo made clear that those involved in medical marijuana had to be in "clear and unambiguous compliance" with state laws, and operators like the Flors were not.

The U.S. Attorney's Office also cited another Montana federal judge's ruling that the federal Controlled Substance Act prevails when there is a conflict between that law and state medical marijuana laws, and said that prosecutors will continue to target large drug organizations.

So far, federal prosecutors have remained true to their word. Prosecutors recently arrested four of the six med-

ical marijuana providers who filed the civil lawsuit against the federal government.

They also reached a plea agreement earlier this month with Tom Daubert, another co-founder of Montana Cannabis and a lobbyist who was the state's face for medical pot advocacy for several years.

"Even though he believed he was in compliance with state law, that is not a defense in federal court," Daubert attorney Peter Lacey said. "It's in his best interest to minimize any effect on his future when it comes to prison time."

It's not clear how many more medical marijuana providers will be targeted in the investigations, but the effect is obvious. The number of registered users and providers has plummeted, and many providers have either shuttered their doors or gone underground in fear that they will be next.

The state Legislature followed the raids with a law that bans commercial sales of medical marijuana, but that portion of the new law is on hold pending a court challenge.

The state Supreme Court will hear arguments on the law on April 30.

Iowa Paper Devotes Front Page to Fighting Bullying

In a rare and forceful act of advocacy, an Iowa newspaper devoted the entire front page of its Sunday edition to an anti-bullying editorial after a gay teen committed suicide. Relatives have said 14-year-old Kenneth Weishuhn Jr. suffered intense harassment, including threatening cellphone calls and nasty comments posted online, after coming out to family and friends about a month ago. He died April 15 from what the local sheriff's office described only as a "self-inflicted injury." *The Sioux City Journal's* front-page opinion piece calls on the community to be pro-active in stopping bullying and urges members to learn more about the problem by seeing the acclaimed new film, "Bully," which documents the harassment of a Sioux City middle school student. It notes that while many students are targeted for being gay, "we have learned a bully needs no reason to strike." — *Associated Press*

Iran Says It Recovered Data from Captured U.S. Drone

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) • Iran claimed Sunday that it had recovered data from an American spy drone that went down in Iran last year, including information that the aircraft was used to spy on Osama bin Laden weeks before he was killed. Iran also said it was building a copy of the drone.

Similar unmanned surveillance planes have been used in Afghanistan for years and kept watch on bin Laden's compound in Pakistan. But U.S. officials have said little about the history of the particular aircraft now in Iran's possession.

Tehran, which has also been known to exaggerate its military and technological prowess, says it brought down the RQ-170 Sentinel, a top-secret drone equipped with stealth technology, and has flaunted the capture as a victory for Iran and a defeat for the United States.

The U.S. says the drone malfunctioned and downplayed any suggestion that Iran could mine the aircraft for sensitive information because of measures taken to limit the intelligence value of drones operating over hostile territory.

The drone went down in December in eastern Iran and was recovered by Iran almost completely intact. After initially saying only that a drone had been lost near the Afghan-Iran border, American officials eventually confirmed the plane was monitoring Iran's military and nuclear facilities.

Hollande, Sarkozy Heading to French Vote Runoff

PARIS (AP) • Francois Hollande, a mild-mannered French Socialist who wants to take better care of the jobless and the poor, is heading to a presidential runoff election against tough-on-immigration Nicolas Sarkozy in a vote that could alter Europe's political and economic landscape.

Hollande heads into the May 6 second round with the upper hand after narrowly edging the conservative Sarkozy in the first round of France's voting Sunday, according to near-complete official results.

In the campaign's biggest surprise, nearly one in five voters chose far right candidate Marine Le Pen instead, handing her a solid third place and a chance to weigh in on French politics with her anti-immigration platform that targets France's millions of Muslims.

With 93 percent of the vote counted, Hollande had 28.4 percent of the ballots cast and Sarkozy 27 percent, according to figures released by the Interior Ministry.

Le Pen was in third with 18.3 percent of the vote so far, the best showing ever by the far right National Front party founded by her father Jean-Marie Le Pen. In fourth place was leftist firebrand Jean-Luc Melenchon with 11 percent, followed by centrist Francois Bayrou with 9.1 percent and five other candidates with minimal support.



U.S., Afghanistan Reach Deal on Strategic Pact

KABUL, Afghanistan • The U.S. and Afghanistan reached a deal Sunday on a long-delayed strategic partnership agreement that ensures Americans will provide military and financial support to the Afghan people for at least a decade beyond 2014, the deadline for most foreign forces to withdraw.

The pact is key to the U.S. exit strategy in Afghanistan because it establishes guidelines for any American forces who remain after the withdrawal deadline and for financial help to the impoverished country and its security forces.

For the Afghan government, it is also a way to show its people that their U.S. allies are not just walking away.

"Our goal is an enduring partnership with Afghanistan that strengthens Afghan sovereignty, stability and prosperity and that contributes to our shared goal of defeating al-Qaida and its extremist affiliates," said U.S. Embassy spokesman Gavin Sundwall. "We believe this agreement supports that goal."

After 10 years of U.S.-led war, insurgents linked to the Taliban and al-Qaida remain a threat and as recently as a week ago launched a large-scale attack on the capital Kabul and three other cities.

The draft agreement was worked out and initialed by Afghan National Security Adviser Rangin Dadfar Spanta and U.S. Ambassador Ryan Crocker. It must still be reviewed in both countries and signed afterward by the Afghan and American presidents.

U.S. forces have already started pulling out of Afghanistan, and the majority of combat troops are scheduled to depart by the end of 2014. But the U.S. is expected to maintain a large presence in the country for years after,

including special forces, military trainers and government-assistance programs.

The agreement is both an achievement and a relief for both sides, coming after months of turmoil that seemed to put the entire alliance in peril. It shows that the two governments are still committed to working together and capable of coming to some sort of understanding.

"The document finalized today provides a strong foundation for the security of Afghanistan, the region and the world and is a document for the development of the region," Spanta said in a statement issued by President Hamid Karzai's office.

Neither Afghan nor U.S. officials would comment on the details of the agreement. A Western official familiar with the negotiations said it outlines a strategic partnership for 10 years beyond 2014.

Reaching any agreement is likely to be seen as a success given more than a year and a half of negotiations during which the entire effort appeared in danger of falling apart multiple times.

Since the beginning of the year, U.S.-Afghan relations have been strained by an Internet video of American Marines urinating on the corpses of presumed Taliban fighters, by Quran burnings at a U.S. base that sparked days of deadly protests and by the alleged killing spree by a U.S. soldier in a southern Afghan village.

Tensions were further heightened by a spate of turncoat attacks by Afghan security forces on their international counterparts.

White House National Security Council spokesman Tommy Vietor said President Barack Obama expects to sign the document before a NATO summit in Chicago next month, meeting the deadline set by the two sides. Many had started to worry in recent

weeks that Karzai and Obama would miss that goal as talks dragged on and Karzai continued to announce new demands for the document.

Much of the disagreement was about how to handle activities that the Afghan government saw as threatening its sovereignty, in particular, night raids and the detention of Afghan citizens by international forces. Those two major issues were resolved earlier this year in separate memorandums of understanding.

But closed-door talks continued for weeks after those side-deals were signed. And then as recently as last week, Karzai said that he wanted the agreement to include a dollar figure for funding for the Afghan security forces — a demand that would be hard for the Americans to sign off on given the need for congressional approval for funding. U.S. officials have said previously that they expected the document to address economic and development support for Afghanistan more generally.

The final document is likely to be short on specifics. U.S. officials involved in the negotiations have said previously that the strategic partnership will provide a framework for future relations, but that details of how U.S. forces operate in the country will come in a later agreement.

The initialing ceremony means that the text of the document is now locked in. But the countries will have to go through their own internal review processes, Sundwall said.

"For the United States, that will mean interagency review, consultation with Congress as appropriate and final review by the president," Sundwall said.

In Afghanistan, the agreement will have to be approved by parliament. The Afghan foreign minister will brief Afghan lawmakers about the document Monday, the Afghan president's statement said.

Suspicion Over 'Entry Point' in Tucson Girl Search

Tucson police are searching for a 6-year-old girl who went missing from her home on the city's east side.

TUCSON, Ariz. • Investigators found "suspicious circumstances around a possible entry point" at the home of a 6-year-old Arizona girl whose disappearance has prompted a massive search, with more than 150 law enforcement officers trying to figure out whether she was abducted, a police spokeswoman said Sunday.

Tucson police Sgt. Maria Hawke wouldn't comment Sunday on whether the entry point was a bedroom window or a door. But family friend Mary Littlehorn said she heard from others close to the family that a window screen in the girl's bedroom had been knocked down.

The parents of first-grader Isabel Mercedes Celis have said they last saw her in her bedroom

at 11 p.m. Friday, according to Hawke. She was discovered missing at about 8 a.m. Saturday, and the parents phoned 911 minutes later.

Officers kept the whole neighborhood block where Isabel lives cordoned off for a second day and fanned out over a wide area looking for clues to the possible kidnapping. A fourth search of a three-mile radius around the home was completed Sunday afternoon in temperatures that reached the high 90s, police Lt. Fabian Pacheco said at a Sunday evening news conference.

Pacheco wouldn't comment on the suspicious "entry point," saying: "I don't want to compromise anything."

Earlier Sunday, Tucson police chief Roberto Villasenor said officers had served at least two search warrants. The girl's parents, identified by friends as

Becky and Sergio Celis, were helpful as police worked to find their youngest child, he said. He said police were still classifying the case as a "suspicious disappearance/possible abduction." "We're not ruling anything out

of the investigation at this point because we really need to keep our mind open about all the information that's been brought to us," Villasenor said. "The family has been cooperating with us."

Littlehorn, who gathered Sunday with other family friends at a police command post, said authorities separated the two parents for hours Saturday as they questioned them. She said it was difficult for them knowing their little girl was out there somewhere.

"She hasn't been allowed to help look for her daughter," Littlehorn said of Becky Celis.

Littlehorn has worked with Becky Celis as a registered nurse at Tucson Medical Center for five years. She said Isabel, whose nickname is Isa, and loved to play baseball and dance; the girl was supposed to play in a baseball game Saturday.

"She's just the sweetest, she is feisty, she's full of life and spirit," Littlehorn said.

Police: 4 Boys Die in Louisiana Home Fire; Mother Charged

Four boys died in a mobile home fire in Louisiana and their mother was charged Sunday with four counts of negligent homicide for allegedly leaving them alone, authorities said.

Capt. Doug Cain, a spokesman for Louisiana Department of Public Safety, told The Associated Press that the fire began just before midnight Saturday in the town of Rayne, about 70 miles west of Baton Rouge in southern Louisiana.

Cain said the boys who died were ages 2, 5, 7 and 8. He said their mother, 26-year-old Shaqueta McDade, was arrested and charged with four counts of negligent homicide. She was being held at the Acadia County Jail.

Rayne police officers interviewed the mother after the fire and arrested her because "she is suspected of leaving the children unattended," Cain said.

Cain identified the victims late Sunday as Jamari McDade, 8; Amous Mouton, Jr., 7; LaShay McDade, 5; and Brian Steiner, 2.

"Since it is a small community, it's devastated our community," said Amy Whatley, the principal of South Rayne Elementary School.

She said Sunday evening

that a fifth boy, a fifth-grader, attends her school and was staying with relatives on the night of the fire. She said the community will come together and support the family during what she called "a horrible tragedy."

Dr. Mark Dawson, the Acadia Parish coroner, also said the four children were home alone when they died, but he was traveling Sunday and had not received a full report on the matter. Dawson said he had no other details immediately available.

Cain said the mobile home was fully engulfed in flames when firefighters arrived. The children were found inside the charred remains of the white mobile home after the fire

was extinguished.

Pictures of the mobile home show it completely destroyed inside a chain link fence. Yellow police tape hung from a gate.

Cain said the Rayne fire Department asked the Louisiana Fire Marshal for assistance in the investigation to help determine the origin and cause of the blaze, which started in the living room. He said that investigation continues.

Cain said he's not sure where the mother was when the fire happened.

Officials with the Rayne Police Department and Acadia Parish Sheriff's Department did not immediately respond to messages Sunday.

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2 Killed in House Fire near Seattle; Door Was Blocked

NORTH BEND, Wash. • Two women were found dead in a house fire in Washington state and detectives are investigating their deaths as a double homicide.

Firefighters had to force their way into the house Sunday morning because the door had been blocked with a couch and other furniture, said Sgt. Cindi West with the King County Sheriff's Office. "It was clearly and intentionally barricaded," she said.

Fire crews also found at least five gas cans in the east King County house that appeared to be full of gasoline, West said.

Detectives with the major crimes unit are investigating the deaths, which West called suspicious. The King County Medical Examiner's Office removed the bodies Sunday, and autopsies will determine the cause of death.

A bomb disposal unit called in to clear the house found a suspicious device, but investigators later determined it was not an explosive device, West said. Hours after the fire, investigators blew up a device at the scene as a precaution, she said.

No one else was found in the home near North Bend. A couple and their daughter live in the home, but the identities of the victims have not been confirmed, and police have not identified suspects, West said.

"We're not calling anybody a suspect because we

don't know what we have," she added.

Cate Reynolds walked to the scene Sunday afternoon with her daughter and other friends who said they were best friends with and recently graduated from the same high school as a young woman who lived in the house. "They wanted to just come and be close and process some stuff," Reynolds said.

Investigators searched for a 2003 blue-grey Toyota Corolla missing from the home, and found it unoccupied in North Bend on Sunday afternoon.

"We don't know that there is a suspect associated with the vehicle, we just want to know where the vehicle is," West had said earlier Sunday.

A neighbor reported the house fire Sunday morning in this rural, wooded community in the foothills of the Cascades, about 30 miles east of Seattle.

When firefighters tried to enter the front door, they found it blocked. Fire crews eventually forced their way in, found the two women's bodies and pulled them outside. Attempts to resuscitate them were not successful.

Firefighters were unable to go back into the house because of the gas cans and other safety reasons. Crews were able to put out the fire about an hour later.

Police say the suspect who was shot also died.

Swing-state Unemployment Down, Obama's Chances Up

The improving economy is swinging the pendulum in Obama's favor in the 14 states where the presidential election will likely be decided.

WASHINGTON • The improving economy is swinging the pendulum in President Barack Obama's favor in the 14 states where the presidential election will likely be decided.

Recent polls have shown Obama gaining an edge over his likely Republican challenger, Mitt Romney, in several so-called swing states — those that are considered up for grabs.

What's made the difference is that unemployment has dropped more sharply in several swing states than in the nation as a whole. A resurgence in manufacturing is helping the economy — and Obama's chances — in the industrial Midwestern states of Ohio and Michigan.

And Arizona, Nevada and Florida, where unemployment remains high, are getting some relief from an uptick in tourism.

"The biggest reason for the president's improving prospects probably is the economy," says Peter Brown, assistant director of the Quinnipiac University Polling Institute.

The Great Recession of 2007-2009 hit several swing states particularly hard. Unemployment peaked at 14.2 percent in Michigan, where the auto industry faced ruin. It also hit double digits in Arizona, Nevada and Florida, which were at the center of the housing bust, and in North Carolina, which lost jobs in textile and furniture plants.

In 2010, the economic misery helped Republicans retake control of the House and gain seats in the Senate. But the GOP can't count on a repeat when voters return to the polls — with much more at stake — on Nov. 6.

After an agonizingly slow recovery, several swing-state economies are finally accelerating:

- The job market is improving in Michigan and Ohio. In Michigan, unemployment fell to 8.5 percent in March from 10.5 percent in March 2011. And in Ohio, it dropped to 7.5 percent from 8.8 percent over the same period, putting it well below the national average of 8.2 percent. A Fox News poll released Friday showed Obama leading Romney 45 percent to 39 percent among registered voters in Ohio.

Many blue-collar workers in Ohio and Michigan credit the federal bailout of General Motors and Chrysler for saving tens of thousands of auto industry jobs, says Paul Allen Beck, a political science professor at Ohio State University. The bailout began under President George W. Bush, but Obama expanded it. "There's a feeling the administration went out of its way to protect jobs that are very important," Beck said.

- In Florida, unemployment tumbled to 9 percent in March from 10.7 percent a year earlier. That was more than twice the nationwide drop of 0.7 percentage point (from 8.9 percent to 8.2 percent) over the same period. A rise in tourism is helping. "People who put off vacations or a trip to Disney World for two or three years got to the point where they feel safe in

terms of financial security to finally take those trips," says Sean Snaith, director of the University of Central Florida's Institute for Economic Competitiveness.

- Even Nevada, a focal point of the real estate collapse, has seen some improvement: Unemployment dropped to 12 percent in March from 13.6 percent a year earlier.

- Unemployment is down over the past year in the 10 other states the Associated Press identifies as swing states: Arizona, Colorado, Iowa, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Wisconsin.

Still, political analysts caution that voter sentiment — not to mention economic momentum — can turn fast. A month before the most recent polling, for instance, Obama was running behind or neck-and-neck with Romney in battleground states.

"The election is not today; it is seven months away," Quinnipiac's Brown says.

A jobs recovery fizzled in mid-2011, so there's no guarantee the unemployment rate will continue to fall this year.

Indeed, Romney was quick to pounce after the government said job creation plunged in March after three strong months of growth. Romney called the numbers "weak and very troubling.... Millions of Americans are paying a high price for President Obama's economic policies."

Higher gasoline prices, up 60 cents this year to a national average \$3.88 a gallon, could also turn voters against Obama. Still, prices have dropped over the past two weeks, and analysts say they could fall further.

Political analysts also wonder whether voters will end up holding Obama responsible for the poor state of the housing market, even if the job market has improved.

Jonathan Ketcham, a marketing professor at Arizona State University who has analyzed voting behavior, says academic studies haven't investigated how housing trends affect voters' decisions. Housing hasn't been a major issue in a presidential campaign before. But since 2006, a drop in home prices has wiped out \$7 trillion in home

equity, the biggest source of wealth for most families.

In Nevada, more than six in 10 homes are "underwater" — they're worth less than the mortgages on them.

In February, foreclosures surged more in Florida's two biggest cities — Miami and Tampa — from February 2011 than anywhere else, according to RealtyTrac. Foreclosures are up partly because they were delayed last year by a legal fight over lenders that processed foreclosures without verifying documents.

Now, foreclosures are rising again in places like Florida where the housing bust did the most damage. That is worrisome for Obama, whose housing policies haven't made much of a dent in the crisis, says Susan MacManus, a government professor at the University of South Florida.

Then again, state economic trends might not even make much difference. Political scientists who study voter behavior say most Americans tend to base their views about the economy — and their votes — more on what's happening nationwide than on what's happening closer to home.

The academic findings might seem to defy common sense. But reports on the ups and downs of unemployment, gross domestic product and other nationwide economic indicators appear constantly on television news, in newspapers and on the Internet.

So in some ways, ordinary Americans hear more about the national economy than they hear about economic conditions in their own communities, says Arizona State's Ketcham. Ketcham also says it "could be that people simply understand that local conditions are beyond the reach of national politicians."

The national economic trend favors Obama, too. Unemployment is down significantly from its 10 percent peak in October 2009. No incumbent president dating to 1956 has lost when unemployment fell over the two years leading up to his reelection contest. And none has won when the rate rose.

Unemployment was 9.8 percent in November 2010.

Last month, eight months before Election Day, the rate was 8.2 percent.

Auditors Call for End to Medicare Bonus Program

WASHINGTON • In a rebuke to the Obama administration, government auditors are calling for the cancellation of an \$8 billion Medicare program that congressional Republicans have criticized as a political ploy.

The nonpartisan Government Accountability Office says in a report to be released today that the \$8.3 billion the administration has earmarked for quality bonuses to Medicare Advantage insurance plans would postpone the pain of cuts to the plans under the new health care law. Most of the money would go to plans rated merely average.

The administration is defending the program, saying that without the bonuses many plans wouldn't have an incentive to improve quality.

But Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, says the GAO report suggests that the administration abused its authority, pumping money to the plans to avoid more criticism over unpopular cuts.

Medicare Advantage is a popular private insurance alternative to the traditional health care program for seniors. More than 3,000 private plans serve nearly 12 million beneficiaries, about one-fourth of Medicare recipients. They offer lower out-of-pocket costs, usually in exchange for some limitations on choice.

President Barack Obama's health care law trimmed Medicare Advantage to compensate for prior years of overpayments that had allowed the plans to offer attractive benefits — and pocket healthy profits.

Republicans fiercely attacked those cuts during their successful campaign to take control of the House in the 2010 midterm elections. Seniors, a key constituency of swing voters, responded by backing GOP candidates.

After the election, the administration announced what it called a "demonstration program" to test whether a generous bonus program would lead to faster, broader improvements in quality. (The health care overhaul law had already provided a smaller bonus program only for top-rated plans.)

GAO, the investigative agency of Congress, did not address GOP allegations that the bonuses are politically motivated. But, its report found the program highly unusual. It "dwarfs" all other Medicare pilots undertaken in nearly 20 years, the GAO said.

Primary Stumbles Warnings for Romney Versus Obama

The pregame warm-up is over.

Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney's urgent task now: Learn the lessons of a primary season peppered with tactical and communications errors that cost time and money while reinforcing doubts about him.

It's a must, even allies say, given that he now faces Democratic President Barack Obama's well-oiled machine, battle-tested and prepared to face the eventual Republican nominee.

At first glance during the primary, Romney's team appeared disciplined compared with his error-prone rivals. He also kept one eye on Obama the whole time.

Yet, Romney gave his primary rivals openings with a series of verbal gaffes that highlighted his vulnerabilities. And he let key states like South Carolina and Colorado slip away by failing to anticipate surging opponents. Unexpected losses in those states dragged out the primary season, preventing Romney from turning his attention to Obama in earnest until earlier this month, when chief GOP rival Rick Santorum dropped out.

Since then, Romney aides have huddled in his Boston headquarters mapping out a general election strategy that they'll try to execute with more precision than they did their primary playbook.

"It's a completely different game in the general election. You have to define a set of states that you have to have, and win them," said Charlie Black, a long-time GOP presidential campaign strategist. "It's a one-day sale."

To succeed against Obama, Republicans say, Romney will have to be nimble as he negotiates the general election chessboard and works to amass the 270 electoral votes needed to win the White House. And allies say he must anticipate an Obama rise in toss-up states and GOP-leaning states Democrats may try to compete in — and work to head off such surges early.

Romney failed to do that in at least two instances during the primary.

The former Massachusetts governor flew with a head of steam into South Carolina after a New

Hampshire victory, and his team all but expected him to cruise to victory in the first-in-the-South primary. But, in a shock to his team, he ended up spending 10 days squaring off against a suddenly ascendant Newt Gingrich, who ultimately ended up winning the state.

Romney then turned to Florida, where he successfully beat back a Gingrich challenge.

But while Romney was doing that, Santorum had skipped ahead to Colorado, and voters in that state were embracing the former Pennsylvania senator as he seized on the breaking debate over the Obama administration's ruling on Catholic hospitals and contraception.

Romney had won Colorado four years earlier, and his team had expected his backers to turn out in earnest again. But by the time Romney turned his attention to Colorado, dropping a token sum on television ads in the campaign's closing days, the state was slipping from his grasp.

"A tactical mistake they made was they did try to win Colorado, and failed," Black said of the Romney campaign. "They got out-hustled."

It was Santorum's three wins — in Colorado, Minnesota and Missouri — that established him as Romney's chief rival — and set the course for two more months of the nomination fight.

So far in the general election, supporters say Romney has shown he's adept at countering Obama — if not working to prevent a rise — in key states.

Romney pre-empted the president this week in North Carolina and Ohio, which Obama won in 2008 and are competitive this year. And, as he has elsewhere, Romney used Obama's own pledges from the 2008 campaign against him in both states.

But even if Romney's campaign successfully limits tactical mistakes, it's an open question whether the candidate himself can avoid the verbal gaffes that have given Republicans and Democrats alike fodder to attack. Such remarks fueled the notion that Romney's nothing more than a wealthy businessman who does not relate to the pain of everyday Americans in a fragile economy.

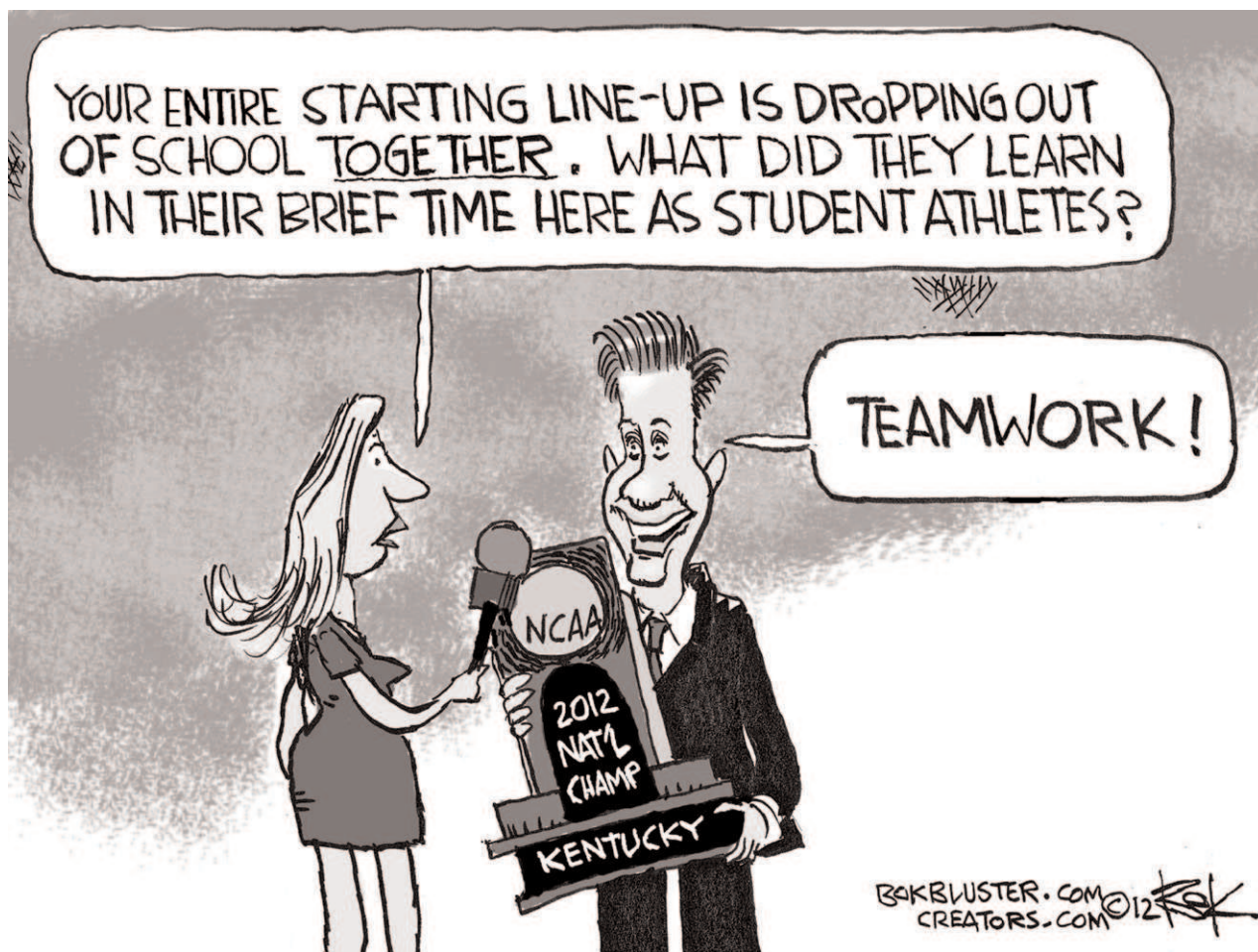

The History of Hailey Hot Springs

These days, Sun Valley is the fashionable resort of the Wood River area. It is home to many rich and famous persons, and the nearby world-class skiing and fishing draws tourists from around the world.

But in the earliest rough mining years, several of the warm springs that grace the valley were the only spas or resorts available to the hard-working Wood Riverites. Of these, the earliest to be developed was the Hailey Hot Springs, located a mile or so west of the town up Croy's Gulch. They were originally owned by Commodore C. Perry Croy and were, at first, named after him.

Early on, the springs were purchased by J.L.G. Smith, whom the editor of the *Wood River Times* laughingly dubbed "Alphabetical" Smith. The new owner built a log cabin for his second wife, Margaret, and their family. He cleaned the springs, dug ditches and built dressing rooms. Meanwhile, Dr. Miller was busy building nearby a hospital for all sick persons but especially those suffering from the effects of mineral poisoning.

The Smith springs were first opened to the public on July 3, 1881. He charged 50 cents for the hack ride from Hailey there and back and another 50 cents for use of the baths, claiming that physicians recommended them for their medicinal properties. By the spring of 1882, Smith had built a small hotel for the accommodation of invalids and had put in a number of large bathtubs for those who didn't like to use the plunge (swimming) baths. He also built a pavilion large enough for eight quadrille sets to dance.

The following year, business was good and he laid plans for building a large, three-story hotel in 1884, surrounded by grounds with a large fountain. But these plans didn't work out and, within a few years, the lack of marital bliss that came to exist between Margaret F. and John Smith, was evident to all who knew them.

By 1888, the couple was

living in almost constant turmoil. "Alphabetical" was much given to strong drink, which made him an exceedingly ugly and bullying fellow, as he seemed to rely upon his herculean strength to do just as he pleased. His life insurance police was canceled on this account, and he brutally beat his wife — for which offense he was reprimanded by the probate judge, besides being fined \$80.

On March 4, 1888, the Smiths were at the house of Charles Haupt, a saloon keeper, after Smith had driven very fast. Margaret Smith told Haupt that she wished the horses would break the "old fool's" (Smith's) neck and kill him. Haupt asked her if she really meant that, and she answered, "Yes, I do mean it! It will save me or somebody else the trouble of killing him sometime."

In the early afternoon of Monday, April 3, a slightly intoxicated "Alphabetical" Smith came home from town in his buggy. Margaret Smith told their 17-year-old son, Willie, to go help with the team, which Willie did. Smith was cursing about Willie and wife all the time. He came in the house still cursing. Smith called her an "old whore," and called Willie a "son of a bitch." Willie told him he didn't want his mother or himself cursed. This made Smith madder. He looked like he was going to hit Mrs. Smith. Willie jumped between them. Smith attacked Willie, who ran around the stove several times evading Smith.

Margaret Smith went to the house of her neighbor and asked for Mr. West; she wanted him to go after W.C. Tatrow, an acting law officer. Said her husband was drunk as usual. She had stood it for 12 years; had had enough.

Margaret came back to her house and went in, Smith following. She tried to go in the bedroom, but Smith kicked in the door, knocking

her down. Smith got her right arm with his left hand. He raised his arm to strike. Willie grabbed him and stopped it. Smith chased Willie outside and around the house.

Smith came in the house and started hitting Margaret again; she picked up a Sharps 45.70 caliber rifle and literally shot the top of the head off of her husband, killing him instantly. The deceased fell to the floor, his brains dropped out and he laid there in a pool of about two quarts of blood, bone and brain matter.

Immediately after the shooting, Margaret laid the rifle aside and then walked to the district attorney's office to give herself up. All who saw her walking and crying surmised that he husband had been beating her again and she was on her way to have him arrested. The district attorney took her statement, and a complaint of murder was made.

Smith's funeral was held April 5 and was largely attended. The corpse was taken to Boise for another funeral. Mrs. Smith was granted permission to take a last look at the corpse and about 12:30, she left the jail to company with her son, Willie, and her two nieces and walked up to the undertaker's. She then returned to jail, the sheriff having kept an eye on her all the while.

Her daughter spent the night with her and would continue to do so until the grand jury had heard her case. Fully a score of ladies of Hailey called upon Mrs. Smith at the jail. They found her quite composed and were satisfied that she had acted in self-defense. Her application for bail was approved.

Over a year would be required before a motion by Margaret's attorney for a change of venue was granted. A trial began in Shoshone on Nov. 1, 1889, and by the following night, she stood acquitted, thanks, in large part, to her attorney, Texas Angel.

But that is just part of the story.

By late August 1888,

Robert Strahorn and Company had taken up the deed conveying to them all the rights and title of the Smith estate in the Hailey Hot Springs, which had been in escrow.

Strahorn planned a plush hotel, complete with steam heat and supplied with hot and cold water and every modern convenience — plunge baths, private dressing rooms, a billiard parlor and a dual bowling alley. A mammoth fireplace was in the west end of the ballroom.

About the time of the opening, Strahorn gave leading newspapers around the region a copy of a work devoted to the merits of Idaho in general and Hailey Hot Springs in particular. The book is bold to say the Hailey Hot Springs supplies the "most delightful resort in America" and proves by statistics that Idaho is the healthiest region in the world.

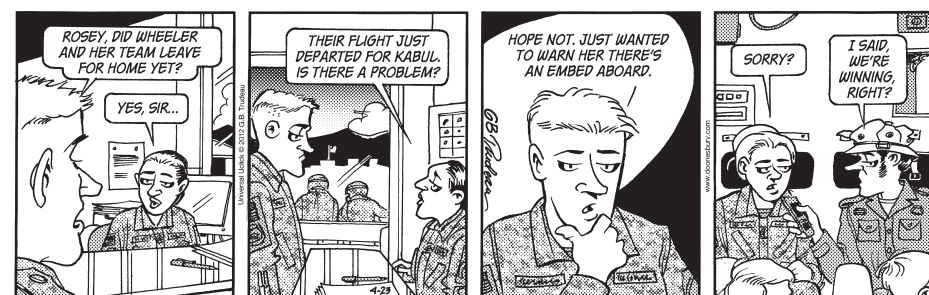
Opening festivities for Strahorn's new Hailey Hot Springs resort took place over several days, beginning June 20, 1889. Special trains were run from Pocatello, Salt Lake City and Boise.

Ten years went by before anything significant happened at Hailey Hot Springs, and then it was huge. The hotel caught fire the afternoon of July 27, 1899. The place was crowded with guests, some of whom barely escaped with their lives. It was totally destroyed.

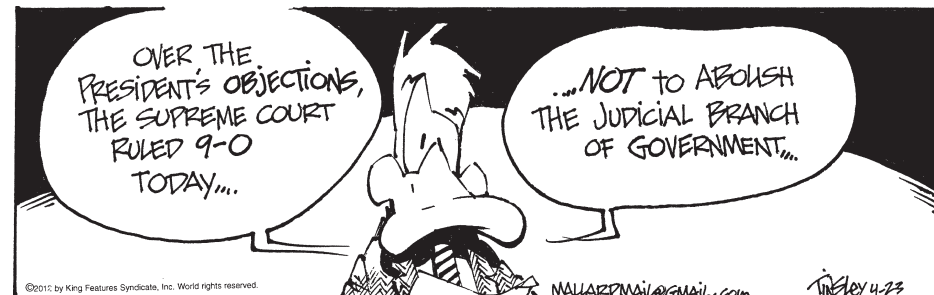
The fire was started by the upsetting of a lamp used by some ladies who were curling their hair. When Mr. Stewart, the lessee, first noticed the smoke, he ran up the stairs to the third floor to give the alarm. Stewart managed to save the safe, his wife's piano, a sofa and some chairs. Another piano belonging to Mrs. Strahorn could not be saved; it was in the ballroom. The concern had cost Strahorn, the sole owner, about \$127,000. When he was telegraphed with the news, he decided against rebuilding.

For Colleges, Rape Cases Present a Legal Minefield

Most victims don't have the resources to pursue lawsuits, which is precisely why Title IX procedures on campus must work for them. That means putting a thumb on the scale in favor of victims.

A closed-door encounter between two college acquaintances. Both have been drinking. One says she was raped; the other insists it was consensual. There are no other witnesses.

It's a common scenario in college sexual assault cases, and a potential nightmare to resolve. But under the 40-year-old federal gender equity law Title IX — and guidance handed down last year by the Obama administration on how to apply it — colleges can't just turn such cases over to criminal prosecutors, who often won't touch them anyway. Instead, they must investigate, and in campus proceedings do their best to balance the accused's due process rights with the civil right of the victim to a safe education.

Lately, though, the legal ramifications of such cases are spilling off campus, with schools caught in the middle.

Colleges that do too little about sexual assault could lose federal funds. The Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights is currently investigating a dozen colleges and universities over their response to sexual violence (documents obtained under the Freedom of Information Act show schools that have recently agreed to take steps to resolve OCR complaints over Title IX policies include universities such as Notre Dame, Northwestern and George Washington).

Meanwhile, judgments in Title IX lawsuits against colleges, usually brought by accusers, are soaring. Compounding the fear: In some such cases, college administrators may be found personally liable.

But when colleges do take action against accused students, those students are increasingly lawyering up themselves, suing for breach of contract and negligence. And in at least two recent cases, in Tennessee and Massachusetts, male students have tread novel legal ground by alleging violations of their own Title IX protections against gender discrimination, arguing a college's sexual assault policies or procedures were unfairly stacked against men.

Whether or not such Title IX arguments hold up, they underscore a new fact of life: For better or for worse, the days when colleges could count on handling such matters quietly behind closed doors are over.

A 1999 U.S. Supreme Court decision established potential liability under Title IX for schools that fail to address sexual harassment and, in its extreme form, sexual assault.

Now, Title IX cases represent "the most expensive

lawsuits in history" against colleges, said Brett Sokolow, managing partner of the National Center for Higher Education Risk Management.

Among them: The University of Colorado faced a \$2.85 million verdict under Title IX after two students were allegedly raped by football recruits and players at an off-campus recruiting event in 2001. An appeals court essentially held that Colorado had an official policy to show recruits "a good time," which created a dangerous culture for sexual assaults. The jury verdict in a sports-related Title IX discrimination case at California State University-Fresno ran to \$19.1 million, though that was later reduced to \$6.6 million.

Such verdicts have cast a cloud of fear over college attorneys and administrators. Some advocates welcome that. They hope it will prompt long-overdue measures to ensure sexual assaults don't deny women access to education.

But there are concerns of overreach.

In March, 2011, in a response to student protesters who had occupied a campus building and were calling for stronger policies to combat sexual assault, the president of Dickinson College in Pennsylvania announced that expulsion would be the only available sanction for rape.

Numerous experts and administrators at other campuses called such a policy unusual and troubling. They say it deprives educators of flexibility in handling cases that often aren't black and white. And like any sentencing minimum, it may have the unintended effect of making conduct boards less likely to convict at all. (Dickinson dropped the policy in guidelines published last December, which refer more broadly to sexual assault, and standardize punishments ranging from one-year suspension to expulsion).

"It drives — not hysteria, that's not the right word — but nearly that," Sokolow said. "It's such a fear-based reaction that a lot of colleges now are expelling and suspending people they shouldn't, for fear they'll get nailed on Title IX."

Hans Bader, a former attorney with the Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights, says campus conduct boards, fearing Title IX lawsuits, will inevitably err on the side of punishment.

"Innocent people get found guilty of harassment because the school realizes

the only way it can avoid liability is to punish everybody in sight," he said.

But that's a legal danger, too. Students accused of sexual violence don't buy the argument that such proceedings are merely "educational," affecting nothing more than their academic standing.

"Fifteen years ago, 20 years ago, if a student got in to trouble he would just drop out and go elsewhere," Sokolow said. "Now colleges are starting to share information, they're starting to put notations on transcripts." With more at stake, "We're seeing more students who want to stand and fight."

Typically, such suits allege breach of contract or negligence, like a recently resolved high-profile case involving Brown University, brought by a former student who contended Brown rushed an investigation and caved to pressure from the accuser's father, a prominent donor.

But recently, at least two have made an apparently novel argument citing the Title IX rights of accused male students. Their argument: Title IX, while requiring numerous protections for sexual assault victims, fundamentally concerns gender equity, and men can be victimized, too.

A federal judge threw out the Title IX claim brought by a male student punished for sexual assault at the University of the South, Sewanee, in Tennessee. But a jury sided with the student on other grounds, agreeing the college failed to provide basic fairness. Sewanee, the jury agreed, allowed a charge to proceed without adequate evidence and gave the accused little more than 24 hours to prepare for a hearing. Also, administrators failed to interview key witnesses, disclose exculpatory evidence, and have adequately trained employees running the process.

Sokolow, who testified on behalf of the accused student (he usually testifies for colleges), called the ruling important because it established that even private colleges can be found negligent if they don't meet basic standards.

Then there's the case of Edwin Bleiler, who was expelled from Holy Cross in Massachusetts on the day he was supposed to graduate last spring, for allegedly sexually assaulting another student. The accuser maintained she'd been intoxicated and unable to give consent to a sexual encounter. Bleiler contends she wasn't incapacitated and acted willingly.

Now, Bleiler is suing Holy Cross, arguing the college's consent and sexual misconduct policies discriminate against male students — violating his Title IX rights. An attorney for Bleiler, Emily Smith-Lee, contends his Title IX claim is stronger than the one dismissed in the Sewanee case: Bleiler's case goes beyond the argument that Holy Cross implemented its sexual assault policy in a discriminatorily shoddy fashion. Rather, it claims the policies are inherently tilted against men, by creating different standards for male and female students.

Holy Cross declined to comment.

Russlynn Ali, the assistant secretary who oversees the Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights, declined to comment on specific cases, and said she did not believe the department had ever received a complaint alleging a male student's Title IX rights were violated in a sexual assault proceeding. But, if it ever did, the complaint would be looked into.

"Title IX protects all students, male and female, against sex discrimination," she said.

Colleges must protect victims, she says. That means abandoning the fantasy they can make everybody happy by also offering accused students the full due process rights they'd enjoy in a criminal trial.

"You can't run a school that way," Murphy said. "If every once in a while a school has to be sued at the cost of being fair to all students, so be it."

All Eyes on Fla. Jail as Zimmerman Awaits Release

SANFORD, Fla. (AP) • All eyes remain on the Florida jail where the man charged with murdering 17-year-old Trayvon Martin is awaiting release on bail, and it could be several days before he leaves.

George Zimmerman's attorney was still working Sunday to secure the money for bail and a safe place for the 28-year-old neighborhood watch volunteer to stay. But residents in Sanford, where Martin was killed, don't expect a ruckus once Zimmerman is released.

City commissioners haven't received calls from nervous residents. Protesters haven't showed up outside the jail. And talk at one local coffee shop seldom focused on the case.

"It's just kind of a non-issue now," said Michele Church, a server at Mel's Family Diner. "That's pretty much all anybody in Sanford wanted, was an arrest, so it could be sorted out in the court system."

On Friday, a Florida judge agreed to let Zimmerman out on \$150,000 bail. Defense attorney Mark O'Mara has said there are several options for where Zimmerman should go, but would not disclose any of them. Circuit Judge Kenneth Lester on Friday indicated Zimmerman would be allowed to leave the state if arrangements with law enforcement could be made for him to be monitored. He will be fitted with an electronic device.

About a half-dozen photographers and cameramen remained camped outside the Sanford jail Sunday, focused on the door marked "Bonds Rooms," where other people who had been arrested and released on bail exited. By mid-afternoon there was still no sign of

Zimmerman, who entered the jail about a week earlier after more than a month of nationwide protests calling for his arrest.

"The mood in Sanford has calmed down tremendously," said Sanford Commissioner Patty Mahany, whose district includes the neighborhood where Martin was killed. "I think now that people are able to see the justice system taking place, even though they understand it's going to be quite slow, people are willing to just remain calm and really we're all getting back to our daily routines."

She said there were no special plans by the city under way in anticipation of Zimmerman's release.

A spokeswoman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office declined to release any information about whether they were increasing patrols or security.

Zimmerman has been the subject of scorn and debate in the weeks after he shot and killed Martin, who was unarmed and returning from buying Skittles and iced tea at a convenience store. The case has been the focus of continuing attention and sparked a discussion about race and the laws of self-defense. Before he turned himself in, members of the New Black Panthers had put out a bounty for his arrest.

Defense attorneys for other high-profile clients who awaited trial on bail have said Zimmerman should leave Florida and refrain from going out in public. Sanford residents say they aren't expecting to see him around the neighborhood anytime soon. "They've already said they're going to move him to a safe place," Church said. "Everyone has calmed down. That's all anyone in Sanford wanted, an arrest."

Detective Bumps into Cigarette-buying Suspect

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. (AP) • A Michigan detective can credit legwork, luck and one man's bad habit for his latest arrest.

A Traverse City police detective went to a local gas station Thursday to show clerks a surveillance video image of someone accused of stealing a woman's credit card a week before. The man Detective Kevin Gay was looking for was buying a pack of cigarettes there.

Capt. Brian Heffner, who leads the detective bureau, said a chance encounter like

this is rare but welcome.

"The odds are definitely against this happening. ... On the exact day and time he's in there, the suspect is buying a pack of cigarettes," Heffner told the *Traverse City Record-Eagle* for a story published Saturday.

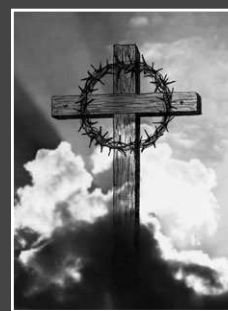
The man, 51, was arrested and faces charges of unlawful use of a credit card, the newspaper reports.

LONDON • English soccer player Fabrice Muamba calls his recovery "more than a miracle" in his first interview since going into cardiac arrest during a match. He still doesn't know if he will play again. The Bolton midfielder's heart stopped beating during last month's FA Cup match at Tottenham, but he was able to walk out of the hospital earlier this week

and return home. "For 78 minutes I was dead and, even if I lived, was expected to have suffered brain damage," Muamba told Sunday's edition of The Sun newspaper. Christian surprised everyone with its run to the Class 1A Division 2 state championship, this corner was a huge fan of the Lions' program for one simple reason: Every Friday night, head coach John Van Vliet would send an email, with an attachment numbering several pages containing everything one could want to know about his game — offensive and defensive statistics, tackles, scoring drives, you name it. And of course, a complete box score, formatted almost identical to what appears in the *Times-News* on Saturday morning for every other team. After being printed, the end result isn't any differ-

ent than what's handed out in college and pro press boxes during fall weekends. Having such a stat-keeping program didn't help Lighthouse Christian win a single game, but it is a small piece toward presenting itself as a big-time program. If you're interested in the service Lighthouse Christian uses, take a visit to Dak Stats Sports Software's home page. Because basketball and wrestling box scores are among the easiest to take over the phone, there wasn't any lamentation in the sports department during the winter season about the absence of such comprehensive statistics. **S3**

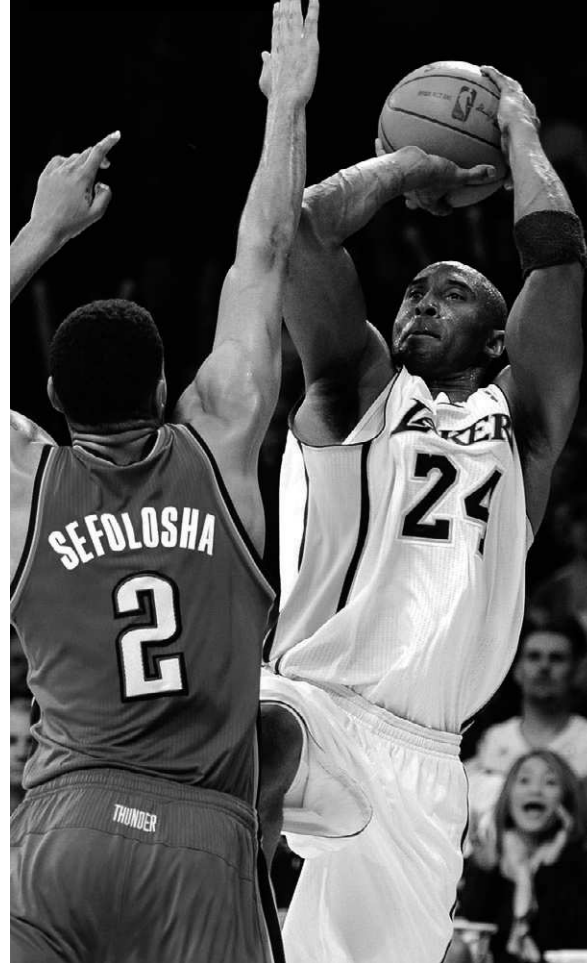

"Those two events take a lot of work," said Bahe. "I don't always try to be the fastest but just try to make my catches smooth. I'm also working hard of my get-off in goats."

Blue Hadden attempted two bull rides and two bareback rides over the weekend and was bucked off prior to the 8-second whistle on all four. He has been riding "big bulls" since he was 14 and started riding bareback only a year ago on a dare.

"Bull riding is such an adrenalin rush and so mental," said the Shoshone cowboy. "It's like when a basketball or football player does something really great only 10 times better."

When watching rodeos, most spectators fear the dangers a cowboy might face getting hung up on a bull more than on a bareback horse but Hadden has his own thoughts on that.

"I'd much rather get hung up on a bull any day than a horse," said Hadden. "Horses are moving a lot faster and when they are dragging you around, you might even hit a fence. On a bull, you are always thinking you have to get back on your feet and try to rip your hand away from the bull. When you do get stepped on, you really don't even notice it. I've been hung up more times than I can count but I still can't get enough of it."

In 1616, English poet and dramatist William Shakespeare, 52, died on what has been traditionally regarded as the anniversary of his birth in 1564.

In 1791, the 15th president of the United States, James Buchanan, was born in Franklin County, Pa.

In 1910, former President Theodore Roosevelt delivered his famous "Man in the Arena" speech at the Sorbonne in Paris.

In 1940, about 200 people died in the Rhythm Night Club Fire in Natchez, Miss.

In 1954, Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves hit the first of his record 755 major-league home runs in a game against the St. Louis Cardinals. (The Braves won, 7-5.)

In 1961, Judy Garland performed her legendary concert at New York's Carnegie Hall.

In 1962, NASA launched Ranger 4 on a mission to the moon. (The spacecraft was supposed to transmit pictures and data just before crashing into the lunar surface three days later; however, due to equipment malfunction, no data was sent.)

In 1968, student protesters began occupying buildings on the campus of Columbia University in New York; police put down the protests a week later.

In 1969, Sirhan Sirhan was sentenced to death for assassinating New York Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. (The sentence was later reduced to life imprisonment.)

In 1987, 28 construction workers were killed when an apartment complex being built in Bridgeport, Conn., suddenly collapsed.

In 1992, McDonald's opened its first fast-food restaurant in the Chinese capital of Beijing.

In 2005, website YouTube uploaded its first video, titled "Me at the Zoo," consisting of 18 seconds of co-founder Jawed Karim standing in front of an elephant enclosure at the San Diego Zoo.

Ten years ago: American cardinals opened an extraordinary meeting with top Vatican officials to discuss a sex abuse scandal rocking the Roman Catholic Church in the United States; Pope John Paul II told the American church leaders there was no room in the priesthood "for those who would harm the young." President George W. Bush's top White House aide, Karen Hughes, resigned to return home to Texas with her family.

Five years ago: Boris Yeltsin, the first freely elected Russian president, died in Moscow at age 76. Congressional Democratic leaders agreed on legislation requiring the first U.S. combat troops to be withdrawn from Iraq by Oct. 1, 2007, with a goal of a complete pullout six months later; President George W. Bush pledged to veto such a measure. Classes at Virginia Tech resumed one week after the killings of 32 victims by a suicidal gunman. Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist and author David Halberstam died in a car crash in Menlo Park, Calif., at age 73.

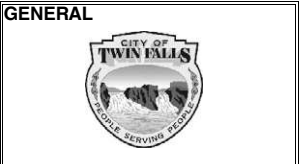
One year ago: Yemen's embattled president, Ali Abdullah Saleh, agreed to a proposal by Gulf Arab mediators to step down within 30 days and hand power to his deputy in exchange for immunity from prosecution. THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

After you have been knocked out of the main event, will a Swiss Teams offer any consolation? Maybe yes, if the right deal comes along. Put yourself in East's seat, defending against six spades, which was played in last year's Yeh Brothers Cup.

When dummy comes down on partner's lead of the diamond three, it would be easy to relax after winning the diamond ace and returning a low diamond.

Declarer ruffs high and starts to run six of his seven remaining trumps. Your partner, who began with hearts solid from the king down, discards one at every turn, while dummy discards diamonds, as do you.

In the six-card ending, you have kept two hearts, a diamond and three clubs to match dummy. On the penultimate trump, when dummy throws a club, what will you discard?

At the table, Subhash Gupta's opponent discarded a heart — and that was fatal. If you pitch a heart, you leave partner controlling the hearts, so dummy's second heart becomes a threat. Therefore, when declarer cashes the heart ace and leads his last trump, West must keep one heart and thus come down to two clubs. Dummy pitches its last heart and you are squeezed between diamonds and clubs. If you had pitched a club earlier and kept your heart guard, your partner could have kept his clubs and pitched his hearts, leaving the suit to you. On the last trump, dummy must relinquish a guard in front of you, and you come under no further pressure.

ANSWER: There is a case that could be made for just about every lead. You could choose either red ace, hoping to find partner with a singleton in that suit, or go somewhat more passive with either black-suit lead. Of course, neither lead is exactly safe, so the question is whether a trump lead can accomplish anything except perhaps clear up a guess. I'd say no and would opt for a club instead.

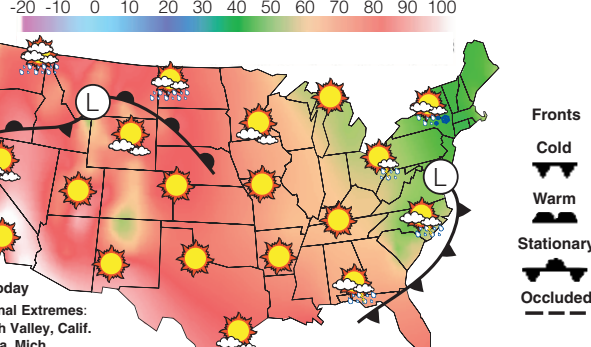
