# GOP Hears from Hopefuls

Candidates for Twin Falls County sheriff both see drugs, school visits as key issues.

 $\textbf{TWIN FALLS} \bullet \textbf{Speeches by both candidates seeking to become}$ Twin Falls County sheriff on the GOP ticket highlighted a Monday evening meeting of the Twin Falls Republican Women.

Incumbent Sheriff Tom Carter and challenger Jack Johnson, the chief deputy at the Jerome County Sheriff's Office, joined local legislators and candidates from several districts at the Turf Club in Twin Falls.

Johnson, a 27-year law enforcement veteran, spoke first, noting his leadership in groups like the Boy Scouts of America  $\,$ and the Twin Falls Optimist Club.

If elected, Johnson said he intends to have deputies in county schools regularly, whether it's daily or weekly — though he can't promise that until he's in the sheriff's chair, looking at

# Solar Trendsetter

Castleford dairy's solar panels are another step in the industry's slowly growing green movement.

**CASTLEFORD** • It took 30 solar panels, but Dan De Kruyf is now a dairy trendsetter.

He's cut his annual propane use by 134 gallons, and by the end of the year, he will have eliminated almost 30 tons worth of carbon emissions at his Castleford dairy.

"As dairy farmers, our margins are tight," said De Kruyf, co-owner of Kowz R Us Dairy. "I'm trying to be fiscally responsible and be a good steward of our resources as well."

Now other dairies are starting to take notice, said Carl Simpson, president of Renewable Energy NW, the company that approached De

Kruyf about installing the solar panels.

"They want to do it because of this success at Kowz R Us Dairy," Simpson said. "We have at least eight other dairies that have expressed interest in setting up a similar project."

De Kruyf's solar panels are designed to heat more than 400 gallons of 55-degree well water to 165 degrees. The dairy uses the hot water to sanitize holding tanks and milking areas multiple times a day.

"Energy prices are only going up," he said. "It doesn't hurt to diversify where our power

The majority of the project was paid through a collection of grants from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, U.S. Treasury and Idaho Power. The total amount came to a little more than \$53,600.

And while more dairies are looking to solar panels to cut costs and carbon emissions, this isn't the first environmental trend the industry has been part of.

In 2008, anaerobic digesters slowly caught on as a tool to reduce methane emissions and harness a renewable energy source. However, a lack of successful projects has made the industry wary of jumping on board with them, said Bob Joblin, a partner with AgPower Group that manages and develops digesters on behalf of several Jerome dairies.

Dairies were able to pay for the cost of digester installation with the help of tax incentives and grant programs, Joblin said. However, those incentives face cuts from Congress.

# Rupert Family Awaits Return of Fallen Soldier

A graveside service in Rupert is planned, but a date remains uncertain.

RUPERT graveside service in Rupert is planned for a U.S. Army soldier killed Thursday Afghanistan, though its date remains uncertain.

Minico High School graduate Chris Workman, 33, was killed along with three other soldiers Thursday in a Blackhawk helicopter crash in the Garmsir District of Helmand Province in southern Afghanistan. The U.S. Army Blackhawk helicopter crashed while responding to a call to evacuate seven wounded Afghan police officers who were injured during a suicide bombing at a checkpoint.

Larry Hansen, of Hansen Mortu-ary in Rupert, said Monday that a graveside service for Workman is planned at the Rupert Cemetery. But it could take weeks before Workman is returned to Idaho, he said. A funeral in Boise will precede the burial in

All funeral details are still pending, Hansen said, adding that Workman has been returned to the U.S. and is in Delaware.

Workman grew up in Rupert, where his family owns a car dealership. He graduated from Idaho State University with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

He lived in Boise prior to following his Army career to Hawaii two years Please see WORKMAN, A2

Idaho is among more than 40 U.S. states moving toward adopting the

more rigorous Common Core Standards in English/language arts and math. They'll be taught in classrooms for the first time during the 2013-14 school year.

"We want to make sure we're preparing kids for post-secondary goals," Schroeder said.

Schroeder is a 1989 Kimberly High alumnus and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Boise State University in 1994. He earned an educational specialist degree from the University of Idaho in

He was hired as a social studies teacher at Kimberly High and later became dean of students.

## MORNING CANAL BREAK CAUSES U.S. 30 FLOODING

**BUHL** • A break in a canal along U.S. Highway 30 between Buhl and Hagerman caused water to cover the highway early Monday morning.

**Emergency dispatchers** began receiving calls at 6:22 a.m. about water on the highway near its intersection with 4500 North Road, said Twin Falls County Sheriff's spokeswoman Lori Stewart.

"It looks like rodents got in and did some digging," she said.

One trailer house was damaged and partially flooded in the incident and the Idaho Transportation Department directed traffic until the flooding was contained.

"Luckily for us it looks like there's little to no damage to the roadway," ITD spokesman Nathan Jerke said.

ITD crews spent Monday morning putting out signs and alerting drivers to the water, which didn't cause a closure of U.S. 30, Jerke said.

The water was only a few inches deep but covered a wide swath of roadway.

ITD will continue to monitor the area to ensure the water caused no longterm damage.

"It's a watch-and-seesituation," Jerke said.

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# **CSI Welding Instructors** Remain on Leave

TWIN FALLS • With spring semester winding down, two College of Southern Idaho welding instructors remain on paid administrative leave.

Juan Martinez and Kent Parish were put on leave April 12 and college administrators continue to investigate a personnel issue.

CSI spokesman Doug Maughan said Monday that he doesn't have any updates on the situation. He anticipates the investigation could last for the rest of the semester.

Welding classes continue as normal. Jim Schlund, a retired CSI instructor, was hired last week to temporarily oversee the students.

Maughan said Schlund is a certified professional technical instructor with decades of experience in diesel technology and corresponding welding skills.

But he can't certify students' end-of the-semester projects since he's not a certified welding inspector. Maughan said college employees are working to find at least one inspector by the end of the week.

Both Martinez and Parish are CWIs, meaning they could evaluate student projects to see if they've mastered different types of welding.

CSI's spring semester will end in just a few weeks. Finals week ends May 10 and graduation is scheduled for May 11.

# US-Afghan Security Pact Sends Warning to al-Qaida

KABUL, Afghanistan • A new strategic partnership that commits the U.S. to defend Afghanistan militarily for 10 years after most foreign forces leave in 2014 is intended to signal that the U.S. will not tolerate a resurgent al-Qaida or attacks launched by militants from neighboring Pakistan.

The agreement, parts of which were read out Monday in the Afghan parliament, is big on symbolism but light on substance. It leaves out specifics, including how much funding the U.S. will provide to support Afghan security forces or how many U.S. troops will stay on after the withdrawal deadline.

Afghanistan, for its part, insisted on approving any American military operations after 2014 and barred the U.S. from using its soil to attack other countries, such as neighboring Pakistan, where the Taliban, al-Qaida and al-Qaida-linked militants all have staging bases.

"In the end, of course, the U.S. and allied interests differ from those of most Afghans," said Andrew Exum, a senior fellow at the Center for a New American Security, a think tank in Washington.

The United States is most concerned with dismantling al-Qaida, while Afghans are most concerned with what infrastructure and financing the United States and its allies will provide beyond 2014."

After 10 years of U.S.-led war, insurgents linked to the Taliban and al-Qaida remain a threat and as recently as a week ago launched a large-scale attack on the capital, Kabul, and three other cities. Both groups operate from within Afghanistan.

It took 18 months of painstaking, often tense negotiations to hammer out the accord, which was reached Sunday and lays out for the first time the relationship the U.S. will have with Afghanistan once the majority of U.S. troops have gone home. It builds on hard-won understandings reached recently on the controversial issues of control over detainees and the conduct of night raids by U.S. special forces.

Exum said the Obama administration had hoped to have the agreement finalized last summer, but Afghan leaders were reluctant to agree to a continued U.S. military presence beyond 2014.

## **HUGE STICKER SHOCK IN** STUDY OF HOSPITAL BILLS

CHICAGO • What do hospitals charge to remove an appendix? The startling answer is that it could be the same as the price of a refrigerator - or a house.

It's a common, straightforward operation, so you might expect charges to be similar no matter where the surgery takes place. Yet a California study found huge disparities in patients' bills \$1,500 to \$180,000, with an average of \$33,000.

The researchers and other experts say the results aren't unique to California and illustrate a broken system.

"There's no method to the madness," said lead author Dr. Renee Hsia, an emergency room physician and researcher at the University of California, San Francisco. "There's no system at all to determine what is a rational price for this condition or this procedure?

The disparities are partly explained by differences among patients and where they were treated. For example, some had more costly procedures, including multiple imaging scans, or longer hospital stays. A very small number were treated without surgery, though most had appendectomies. Some were sicker and needed more intensive care.

But the researchers could find no explanation for about one-third of the cost differences.

Other developed countries have more

government regulation that prevents these wild disparities. U.S. critics of that kind of system favor more market competition, yet the study illustrates that the laws of supply and demand simply do not work well in health care," said Dr. Howard Brody, director of the Institute for the Medical Humanities at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston and a frequent critic of skyrocketing medical costs.

# Social Security Heading for Insolvency even Faster

**WASHINGTON** • Social Security is rushing even faster toward insolvency, driven by retiring baby boomers, a weak economy and politicians' reluctance to take painful action to fix the huge retirement and disability program.

The trust funds that support Social Security will run dry in  $20\overline{33}$  – three years earlier than previously projected – the government said Monday.


There was no change in the year that Medicare's hospital insurance fund is projected to run out of money. It's still 2024. The program's trustees, however, said the pace of Medicare spending continues to accelerate. Congress enacted a 2 percent cut for Medicare last year, and that is the main reason the trust fund exhaustion date did not advance.

The trustees who oversee both programs say high energy prices are suppressing workers' wages, a trend they see continuing. They also expect people to work fewer hours than previously projected, even after the economy recovers. Both trends would lead to lower payroll tax receipts, which support both programs.

Unless Congress acts — and forcefully — payments to millions of Americans could be cut.

If the Social Security and Medicare funds ever become exhausted, the nation's two biggest benefit programs would collect only enough money in payroll taxes to pay partial benefits. Social Security could cover about 75 percent of benefits, the trustees said in their annual report. Medicare's giant hospital

fund could pay 87 percent of costs. "Lawmakers should not delay addressing the long-run financial challenges facing Social Security and Medicare," the trustees wrote. "If they take action sooner rather than later, more options and more time will be available to phase in changes so that the public has adequate time to prepare."

# Romney Roadmap Leaves Voters Guessing

**BOSTON** • Mitt Romney's roadmap for governing the country is so vague that it has even Republican allies questioning his intentions.

"You have to campaign to govern, not just to win," Indiana Gov. Mitch Daniels said in recent days after endorsing Romney. "Go ahead and have the confidence in the voters to explain the fix we're in and then tell them with some specificity what we can do to get out of it in a way that's good for everybody. Romney doesn't talk that way."

It's a sentiment other Republicans decline to express so publicly, and Daniels later downplayed his comment. But it's one that accurately describes the presumptive Republican presidential

nominee's general aversion to detail. In between heaping criticism on President Barack Obama, Romney spent the primary season sketching a broad conservative vision for leading the country should he win the White House. Supporters cheer his general plans for lower taxes, smaller govern-


The Twin Falls Fire Depart-




## **Europe Sent Stocks Lower Monday**

## Judge: DA Can Subpoena NY Occupy Protester Tweets

NEW YORK (AP) • An Occupy Wall Street protester can't stop prosecutors from getting his tweets, a judge has ruled in a clash over the bounds of privacy in an age of living publicly on social networks. In a ruling punctuated with Twitter users' beloved hashtag marks, the judge said prosecutors weren't overreaching by seeking Malcolm Harris' public tweets for weeks before and months after his Oct. 1 disorderly conduct arrest on the Brooklyn Bridge, as well as the user information surrounding the Twitter account he used at the time.

"There is, in fact, reasonable grounds to believe the information sought was relevant and material to this investigation," Manhattan Criminal Court Judge Matthew A. Sciarrino Jr. wrote in a decision Friday.

levels • Abdulrahman Ben Yezza says Libya could start pumping about 1.6 million barrels a day by midyear. That's what Libya produced before the eight-month conflict to oust dictator Moammar Gadhafi. That brought production to a halt. Gadhafi was captured and killed last October.

Current output is about 100,000 barrels a day higher than February's production.

Libya is hosting an oil and gas exhibition that has attracted an American delegation, with representatives of 20 U.S. companies and organizations, including Boeing, ExxonMobil and General Electric.

# **Wal-Mart Faces Big Challenges Amid Bribery Charges**

**NEW YORK** • Allegations that Wal-Mart Stores Inc. covered up the findings of an internal probe that proved its Mexican subsidiary bribed officials in that country could have huge implications for the world's biggest retailer and its executives.

The alleged bribery scheme was revealed by The New York Times, which reported that Wal-Mart failed to notify law enforcement after the company's investigators found evidence of millions of dollars in bribes given to Mexican officials in exchange for getting building permits faster and other favors to help it

aggressively expand in the region.

If Wal-Mart violated the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, which forbids paying bribes to foreign officials, the company could face fines of hundreds of millions of dollars. Top Wal-Mart executives could lose their jobs - or worse, go to jail. And the retailer could suffer a public relations nightmare if a lengthy investigation ensues.

"Unlike prior bad PR stories in recent years, this will be a material distraction for Wal-Mart on multiple fronts," said Charles Grom, a retail analyst at Deutsche Bank.

The Times reported on Saturday that Wal-Mart top brass learned of the bribery campaign in 2005 when a former

company executive provided details about how it was used to help the retailer expand rapidly in Mexico. The paper said Wal-Mart officials launched an investigation, but shut it down despite a report by its lead investigator that Mexican and U.S. laws likely were violated.

Over the weekend, Wal-Mart said it had disclosed the findings of its investigation to the U.S. Department of Justice and the Securities and Exchange Commission in December, and that it met with officials from both agencies to discuss the company's ongoing investigation. But, according to the Times, Wal-Mart only did so after being informed that the paper was looking into the allegations.

## Apple's Squeeze Hits Phone Companies, Competitors

NEW YORK • Apple is set to report another record quarterly profit on Tuesday, continuing the relentless string of results that's made it the world's most valuable company. Those profits don't come out of thin air: A range of businesses -from the company's wireless carrier friends to its PC-making foesare seeing their profits melt away and flow to Apple's bottom line.

Apple's success is good for the U.S. economy, and some businesses, like software developers and memory-chip makers, have benefited from the disruption Apple is causing. But its enormous gains have resulted in others' pains, sometimes in unexpected places.


Wall Street analysts expect Apple Inc. to post a profit of \$9.2 billion for the January to March quarter when it reports on Tuesday. That's roughly in line with the profit expected from the world's largest oil company, Exxon Mobil Corp.


The majority of the profit will come from iPhone sales, especially now that three of the four national U.S. wireless carriers - AT&T, Sprint, and Verizon - sell the phone.

## The New' Charles Colson

fter Richard Nixon lost the 1960 presidential election to John F. Kennedy and the California governor's race two years later



(when he uttered the immortal line to the media, "You don't have Nixon to kick around anymore") the former vice president knew he must reinvent himself to run for president again in 1968.

Thus was born "the new Nixon," an attempt to transform himself from "the old Nixon" the public didn't like, into a warmer, softer, more approachable person. As it turned out, the "new Nixon" was simply the "old Nixon" with a new coat of political paint.

Not so with Charles W. Colson, who died last Saturday at age 80. Colson, was an ex-Marine and Nixon's "hatchet man" who enjoyed going to any lengths to ensure his boss got his way, including re-election in 1972, as the Watergate scandal was just breaking.

No one doubted Colson's political shrewdness. Here's an example. He once told me that Nixon wanted a book hyped because it exposed what he considered bias at CBS News. Colson said he obtained the supposedly secret list of bookstores *The New York Times* used to determine its "best sellers" and then sent people into those stores to buy the book, which made *The New York Times* list for one week before disappearing. But, said Colson, Nixon was satisfied.

That and more occurred before the "new" Charles Colson was born ... again. Unlike Nixon who sought to transform himself by his own political strength and for an earthly agenda, Colson was transformed by a higher power and not by his own efforts. First, though, he had to descend to the depths. He told James Rosen of Fox News that after being a Marine captain and a White House special counsel, the "worst blow of his life" was standing in the federal courthouse in Washington, D.C., and hearing a court officer speak the words, "The United States vs. Charles W. Colson."

Colson plead guilty in 1974 to an obstruction of justice charge relating to attempts to discredit Daniel Ellsberg, a former Marine and military analyst, who three years earlier had released "The Pentagon Papers," a top-secret account of U.S. military activities during the Vietnam War, to *The New York Times*. Colson served seven months in federal prison, but before he went to jail, he said he accepted Christ as payment for his sins.

The world was stunned. Some laughed in derision, thinking Colson was trying to obtain a "stay out of jail" card. Others said none of the Nixon officials should be forgiven for their "high crimes and misdemeanors."

When Colson got out of prison he founded Prison Fellowship, a Christian organization that recruits volunteers to "visit those in prison" in response to the command of Jesus, conduct Bible studies behind prison walls and help ex-convicts find jobs after their release so they won't return to crime and jail.

It has worked. According to Prison Fellowship (www.prisonfellowship.org), prisoners who take part in their faith-based programs have a much lower recidivism rate than other prisoners.

In 1983, Colson established Justice Fellowship, a Christian-based criminal justice reform group. Through Justice Fellowship, Colson became a leading prison reformer, taking positions one doesn't usually associate with Republicans. He criticized the death penalty, mostly for being unequally applied (though he believed in it for rare cases). He opposed the incarceration of nonviolent, non-dangerous offenders, believing restitution was a more redemptive approach for both perpetrator and victim.

I once asked him if he would ever seek a pardon. He replied, "I have the only pardon I need," referring to God. In 2000, he accepted a restoration of his civil rights from then-Governor Jeb Bush of Florida, but was never pardoned by a president. President George W. Bush awarded him the Presidential Citizens Medal in 2008 for his work in prisons.

In one of his many books, "Who Speaks for God?" Colson warned against attaching a heavenly kingdom to the political agendas of the age. He also urged Christians to think and act more like Jesus.

QUINCY, Wash. • Guy Conrad Bonar, our beloved father, passed away peace-


brother, grandfather, great-grandfather and friend, Tuesday fully

A patriot who loved his country and what it stands for, he was most admired for his gregarious personality, warmth, wit and loveable nature. He dedicated his life to his late wife, Mabel of 71 years, and his extended family. He never hesitated to lend a helping hand to family or friends in need, valuing friendship, honesty and integrity above all other virtues. In recent years, he enjoyed daily get-togethers, visiting and swapping stories at Bob's Cafe and Friday luncheons with his Mae and sister-in-law, Mildred "Mickey" Bonar, at the Senior Center of Moses

Guy was born in Bryant, Okla., on Aug. 20, 1914, to his parents, Frank Albert and Ethel Jane (Carter) Bonar. In 1918, his family moved to Buhl, Idaho, where his father and mother homesteaded a tract of land along the rim of the Snake River Canyon. Guy's father died at a very early age and, in 1928 at the tender age of 14, Guy assumed responsibility for farming and caring for his mother, two sisters and one of his brothers. In 1938, he married Mabel (Mae) Dorothy Skidmore of Rexburg, Idaho, in a family ceremony at Harry and Mildred (Skidmore) Bonar's place in Mountain Home, Idaho. Their two children were born in Buhl, Idaho, Larry in 1939 and Donna in 1940.

In 1942, Guy and his family moved to Rexburg, where he worked in a family partnership raising sheep. When the government reduced the amount of public-owned grazing lands, he sold his interest and returned to Buhl in 1945. He and Mae rented and operated the Robert (Bob) Bonnichson Farm at Deep Creek, four miles west of Buhl. During this time, he bought and developed a dry farm in the Roseworth area, south of Castleford near Three Creek. In 1955, he followed opportunities in the Columbia Basin, where he and Mae bought 160 acres near Adams Road and commenced farming and cattle-feeding operations in 1956. On April 11, 1968, he



sold out and moved to Moses Lake. There he worked in construction and, in the late 1970s, bought 200 acres east of Moses Lake and farmed there

for two years and sold off the land. In the early 1980s, he bought a tract of land along Lower Crab Creek east of Moses Lake and developed land home sites known as Sun Ridge Estates. He owned pasture on the east side of Crab Creek, where he ran cattle during the early spring and summer. At the completion and sale of all home sites in Sun

Ridge, he and Mae retired. ## Company Aims to Strike it Rich by **Mining Asteroids** BY SETH BORENSTEIN billions of years ago. Most of Associated Press

**WASHINGTON** • A group of high-tech tycoons wants to mine nearby asteroids, hoping to turn science fiction into real

The mega-million dollar plan is to use commercially built robotic ships to squeeze rocket fuel and valuable minerals like platinum and gold out of the lifeless rocks that routinely whiz by Earth. One of the company founders predicts they could have their version of a space-based gas station up and running by 2020.

The inaugural step, to be achieved in the next 18 to 24 months, would be launching the first in a series of private telescopes that would search for rich asteroid targets.

Several scientists not involved in the project said they were simultaneously thrilled and skeptical, calling the plan daring, difficult - and highly expensive. They struggle to see how it could be cost-effective, even with platinum and gold worth nearly \$1,600 an ounce. An upcoming NASA mission to return just 2 ounces (60 grams) of an asteroid to Earth will cost about \$1 billion.

But the entrepreneurs announcing the project Tuesday in Seattle have a track record of making big money off ventures into space. Company founders Eric Anderson and Peter Diamandis pioneered the idea of selling rides into space to tourists and, Diamandis' company offers "weightless" airplane flights.

Investors and advisers to the new company, Planetary Resources Inc. of Seattle, include Google CEO Larry Page and Executive Chairman Eric Schmidt and explorer and filmmaker James Cameron.

The mining, fuel processing and later refueling would all be done without humans, Anderson said.

"It is the stuff of science fiction, but like in so many other areas of science fiction, it's possible to begin the process of making them reality," said former astronaut Thomas Jones, an adviser to the company.

The target-hunting telescopes would be tubes only a couple of feet long, weighing only a few dozen pounds and small enough to be held in your hand. They should cost less than \$10 million, company officials said.

The idea that asteroids could be mined for resources has been around for years. Asteroids are the leftovers of a failed attempt to form a planet

the remnants became the asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter, but some pieces were pushed out to roam the solar

Asteroids are made mostly of rock and metal and range from a couple of dozen feet wide to nearly 10 miles long. The new venture targets the free-flying asteroids, seeking to extract from them the rare Earth platinum metals that are used in batteries, electronics and medical devices, Diamandis said.

Water can be broken down in space to liquid oxygen and liquid hydrogen for rocket fuel. Water is very expensive to get off the ground so the plan is to take it from an asteroid to a spot in space where it can be converted into fuel. From there, it can easily and cheaply be shipped to Earth orbit for refueling commercial satellites or spaceships from NASA and other countries.

In the past couple of years, NASA and other space agencies have shifted their attention from the moon and other planets toward asteroids. Because asteroids don't have any substantial gravity, targeting them costs less fuel and money than going to the moon, Anderson said in a phone interview.

There are probably 1,500 asteroids that pass near Earth that would be good initial targets. They are at least 160 feet (50 meters) wide, and Anderson figures 10 percent of them have water and other valuable minerals.

"A depot within a decade seems incredible. I hope there will be someone to use it," said Andrew Cheng at Johns Hopkins University's Applied Physics Lab, who was the chief scientist for a NASA mission to an asteroid a decade ago. "And I have high hopes that commercial uses of space will become profitable beyond Earth orbit. Maybe the time has

Space experts said such a bold project has huge startup costs. Diamandis and Anderson would not disclose how much the project will cost overall. Diamandis said by building and launching quickly, the company will operate much cheaper than NASA.

But still the costs are just too high, said Purdue University planetary geologist Jay Melosh, who called space exploration "a sport that only wealthy nations, and those wishing to demonstrate their technical prowess, can afford to indulge?"

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## Suspended **Midwives** Agree to \$5M Deal

**BOISE** • Two midwives have agreed to a \$5 million settlement with a couple who sued them for medical malpractice after their baby suffered permanent brain damage, an attorney said Monday.

Coleen Goodwin and her daughter, Jerusha Goodwin, reached the agreement to avoid a jury trial, said Eric Rossman, attorney for Adam and Victoria Nielson. The trial had been set to begin on Monday in Boise.

The Goodwins, who own a birthing center in Meridian, had their licenses to practice midwifery suspended last month after three babies died. The cases that led to their suspensions were separate from the Nielson's claim.

The Nielsons said their daughter was born without oxygen at The Baby Place in June 2008, leading to permanent brain damage.

"If we had to go to jury trial today, I think a jury verdict would have reflected what they stipulated, if not more," Rossman said shortly after the agreement was reached.

The Goodwins' attorney, James F. Jacobson, didn't return a call seeking comment.

How much money will ever be paid is unclear; the Goodwins, like all other Idaho midwife practices, do not carry costly malpractice insurance and are planning to seek bankruptcy protection, Rossman said.

Their bankruptcy lawyer, Steve French, didn't return a call seeking comment, but the federal bankruptcy court records indicated that no case had been filed by Monday morning.

The Goodwins' licenses were suspended on March 23, after three babies whose mothers began to give birth at The Baby Place later died. Investigators said that in the case of a June 2011 death, Coleen Goodwin delayed paramedics from entering the patient's room for about four min-

## **NV** Energy Drops China Mountain Project after Grouse Delay

CARSON CITY, Nev. • More studies by the federal government on the future of the sage grouse has prompted NV Energy to pull out of developing a major wind energy project touted to supply 100,000 homes.

NV Energy was working with RES America Development to build the China Mountain Wind Project with anywhere from 170 to 200 wind turbines in Twin Falls County, Idaho, and Elko County, Nev.

NV Energy says it has spent \$6 million on the project.

The project would be developed on about 25,000 acres of Bureau of Land Management property, and 10,000 acres belonging to private parties and the Idaho Department of Lands.

But the BLM notified the companies in March it has deferred work on its environment impact statement. It said the project encompasses 42 percent of the sage grouse population in the western United States.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service determined it wants to re-evaluate the status of the bird by 2015. The BLM says it will complete its analysis in 2014.

A draft environmental impact statement by the BLM released in April 2011 said the project "could have more than minor adverse effects to sage-grouse due to the importance of the involved habitat" and population issues in the area of southcentral Idaho and Northern Nevada.

The BLM said, "We believe it wiser to defer continued work on the project so that it can be considered in the context of, and informed by, the analyses and decisions in the Idaho Resource Management Plan resources."

NV Energy then decided to terminate its part in the project and has notified the state Public Utilities Commission.

The Las Vegas-based utility has signed a stipulation with the staff of the PUC and the Bureau of Consumer Protection to bow out of the project. The agreement says it is not a determination that NV Energy "prudently or responsibly administered the project."

The PUC staff and the consumer bureau say they retain the right to examine and challenge the money invested in the project if NV Energy tries to collect it in a future rate increase. The company says it spent \$6 million on the project.

The stipulation is expected to be presented to the PUC on Wednesday.

Nevada reported last month it reached the mandate set by the state Legislature in supplying renewal energy to its customers. The company said it hit 16.7 percent when the obligation was 15 percent in the past





In addition, these teams elevated the entire school.




While Perrigot's research focused on football, he said the implications apply to all sports and activities.

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

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

– Benjamin Franklin

"A slip of the foot you may soon recover, but a slip of the tongue you may never get over."

In today's deal from last year's Yeh Brothers Cup, the point was made that one should not pull a takeout double from fear alone. Particularly if both sides are vulnerable, the benefit of going plus may almost equal the cost of letting a doubled partscore make. If a few doubled contracts do not make, you probably are not doubling enough.

That said, the pain when you double the opponents into game and don't defend accurately may be the critical factor that suggests caution in this area. And the following deal exhibits that theme nicely.

After Huub Bertens' double of three clubs, Jack Zhao judged well not to run to three hearts. At this vulnerability he must have figured that he had every chance of a decent penalty. Right he was ... in a sense.

The defenders cashed two spades and two diamonds, leaving West on play. At this point West was tempted to lead a high diamond to let East discard, but that turned out to be fatal. Either major suit would work to disrupt declarer's entries and to prevent declarer from shortening his trumps.

On West's top diamond play, East threw a spade, and declarer, Frankie Karwur, ruffed in hand, overtook a heart to run the club jack and 10 as East ducked. Then he ruffed another diamond to hand and went back to a top heart. With the lead in dummy, he could score his club ace and queen, whatever the defense did.



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
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
