ROGERSON $\cdot$ It wasn't the early morning hour that managed to quiet 30 high school students. that managed to quiet 30 high school students. Piled in the bed of a pick-up truck, the stu-
dents' brief silence was enough to allow a glimpse of a handful of sage grouse trotting across their farbidge mating ground.
Some students peered through binoculars as others helped point out a few visible birds that quickly moved away from the group
"Here's what they're supposed to sound like," said Brad Lowe, a regional wildlife biologist with
the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. He held out his phone and played a brief audio of the hoots and pops of a sage grouse call.
"The sound you're hearing is skin flapping after they puff out their chest," he said.
Students from Castleford and Filer were the first from Magic Valley high schools to participate
in a federal program that promotes youth interacin a federal program that promotes youth interac-
tion with the outdoors. After touring the mating ground - called a lek - students heard a short se

TWIN FALLS • A Nevadautility com pany's recent decision to pull out of major wind project along the Idaho and Nevada border has local officials worried about the project's future. "This might be the nail in the coffin for this project," said Twin Falls County Commissioner Leon Mills. forward."
NV Energy was working with RES Americas to build the 170-turbine China Mountain Wind Project. RES had proposed that the project would take up to 25,500 acres of public land south of Twin Falls.

However, U.S. Bureau of Land Management officials announced in March that they would delay a permitting decision on the project for two years because of its location in critical sage grouse habitat. NV Energy's decision to pull out is unfortunate since the China | Mountain project was slated to |

contract for the project to Starr Corp. The item will then go to CSI's board of trustees for final approval.
CSI Vice President of Administration Mike Mason said construction is
slated to begin in early May It will last about one year, ending in summer 2013.

The complex - a $\$ 6$ million project - will be located on 8.5 acres of

## Airport Discussion Requires Cool Heads

We have to give credit to Burley Mayor Terry Greenman - he knows when he's made a mistake. At least twice now, while courting other local government officials to join his city's effort to build a new airport, the mayor has said Burley officials will petition the Federal Aviation Administration to close the J.R. "Jack" Simplot Airport as a safety risk if the city can't construct a replacement.
Sure, it might have been a sign of Greenman's dedication to the idea. But it also appeared as if he was holding the city's airport hostage to drum up support.
Is this really how this discussion should go? Following last year's debacle over proposed air port sites on prime agricultural land, Burley officials have been on the right path, by and large, in their third attempt to replace the aging Simplot airport. Greenman and City Administrator Mark Mitton have turned up at city council and county commission meetings throughout Mini-Cassia, attempting to answer questions and offer information on the city's concerns.
Does that mean they're right about the need to replace the airport? Would a new airport have helped prevent recent fatal crashes? That's still to be determined, but at least Burley is being open with its neighbors - doubly important since the new airport is all but certain to sit outside of its city limits.
That makes Greenman's comments to the Rupert City Council April 10 and Cassia County offi cials on April 16 all the more perplexing. Why, as Greenman insists he won't play politics over this deal, would he then do so?
The threatened closure was an emotional mistake, he told this editorial board Tuesday morning, brought on by reactions to other people's statements. And he doesn't believe the FAA would actually agree to shut the airport down. Greenman says he firmly believes the Simplot airport is a dangerous facility, and that the FAA and state aeronautics division feel the same way. He's become practiced at making his case, smoothly laying out costs, procedural details and siting information (though he has yet to reveal the locations on U.S. Bureau of Land Management lands that he says could host the new airport).
But the mayor could put his whole case at risk if he allows people's objections to provoke such odd statements. Leading a city and building an airport require a certain level of maturity, and the ability to handle critics.
After developing a reputation for trying to push its weight around on the airport issue, Burley is going about this attempt the right way. It'd be a shame if something this simple undid all that work.

brother, Kory Johnson, said was both fitting and painful. Asked if he would implore Wacht to disclose the location of his brother's body, Johnson paused for several

been done here," he said "As far as my brother's body, I know his soul is in heaven."
Defense attorney Steven Mottinger said he would consider some pretrial is-
sues for appeal but would not be specific.
"It was a tough case," Mottinger said. "We did what we could with the evidence we had to work with." Marina Spahr, the Griggs County attorney and lead
prosecutor, left the courtproosecutor, eft the courtAssistant U.S. Attorney

Jonathan Byers, who helped with the case, said he wa pleased with the verdict. "You would like to hope that it provides a little bit of closure for the family. But

Jurors were given the case around noon, and returned the verdict before 3 p.m. Mottinger contended in his closing argument Tues ay morning that there were o prove his client pulled the trigger. ## Environmentalists Warn that Utah Road Dispute Will Be Costly

SALT LAKE CITY • A potential lawsuit by state officials seeking to contro housands of miles of dirt rugged backcountry, national parks and wilderness areas could cost the state millions of dollars in legal fees and lost tourism revenue, environmental groups warned Tuesday Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance and the Sierra Club also said the increased vehicle access would degrade important habitat for mule deer and sage grouse, and
lead to more vandalism and theft at sensitive archaeological sites.
While the lawsuit hasn't been filed, Gov. Gary Herbert in December issued a notice of the state's intent to sue the Interior Department over access to more than 18,000 roads
There also are lawsuits ic counties that lay claim hundreds of other routes County and state officials argue the roads be access be because they were used the federal government closed them.
"We have been attempt ing to negotiate the solutions for 40 years" but have been continually stymied by Interior officials, said John state's Public Lands Policy Office.
Even if the state does get control of these rights-ofway, it doesn't necessarily mean that vehicles will be allowed or that the roads
will be paved. But it would mean that state and county officials would have ove sight of the roads, and not the federal government. Although about 100 roads

### 7.5 Percent of Deportations May Get Held

Immigration and Customs Enforcement has offered to temporarily suspend the deportation cases of roughly 16,500 people.

SANTA ANA, Calif. • Immigration officials have offered to shelve 7.5 percent of deportation cases under a massive review of the backlogged
U.S. system aimed at focusing ons deporting more criminals, authorities said Tuesday.

Enforcement has offered to Enforcement has offered to temporarily suspend the deportation cases of roughly
16,500 people after reviewing 16,500 people after reviewing
more than 70 percent of the immigration cases pending as of mid-April, according to statistics released by the agency. ICE officials said 2,700 cases have been shelved. The
rest still require paperwork and background checks. It was not immediately
clear how many immigrants had been told of the offer or how many had accepted it. The Obama administration announced in August that
roughly 300,000 deportation roughly 300,000 deportation cases would be reviewed and
non-criminals and those illegal immigrants who posed no public safety or national security threat would likely have their cases put on hold
indefinitely. indefinitely.
The move
The move was welcomed by immigrant advocates but
reviled by critics who called reviled by critics who called
the program an attempt by the administration to work around Congress. Since then, however, im-
migrant advocates have com-
plained the government is of-
fering to apply so-called prosecutorial discretion in too few instances, and that those whose deportation cases are put on the back burner still don't get a work permit. So far, the approval rate "is
a very low number" said Grea very low number," said Gre-
gory Chen, director of advogory Chen, director of advo-
cacy for the American Immigration Lawyers Association. "You can't expect people to not be able to feed their families and have some source of income and still survive,'" he added. Some say immigrants
might do better by trying their luck in immigration court, where, for example, they could seek asylum. More than half of immi-
were decided by an immigra-
tion judge in the 2011 fiscal tion judge in the 2011 fiscal year actually won their cases, according to statistics from migration Review, which fruns the country's immigration court system.
ICE deputy press secretary Gillian Christensen said the review is ongoing. The main focus is to enable authorities
to focus on deporting illegal to focus on deporting illegal records or those who previously ignored court orders to leave the country.
"This review is designed to allow the agency to make the best use of its limited re
sources," she said in a state ment. ment. date, the vast majority more than 2,000 - involve immigrants who have lived in the country for a long time and have an immediate rela-
tive who is an American citizen. About 175 are children and 180 are college students or graduates who came to the U.S. when they were under 16 for more than five years, the agency said.

## Chard:WhatItIs and How to Use It

BY J.M. HIRSCH

It's a beet, minus the root. sense. Except it does. Be cause it's chard, one of a growing number of com mon, yet often overlooke greens lurking at your gro-
cer.
Chard _ sometimes called Swiss chard or rainbow chard (when it sports brightly colored stalks) really is a relative of the beet. But unlike traditional energy into producing fin-ger-staining roots - chard ger-staining roots - chard
instead produces big, tender leaves and crunchy stalks.
Chard has been around for thousands of years and likely originated in the Mediter ranean, where it was in
heavy culinary rotation until spinach came along.
The taste depends o which part you eat, though not so much on which color. The large, firm leaves are mild, sweet, earthy and just it's abit milder than spinach The stalks - which can be white, yellow, red, purple pink, striped, and so on resemble flat celery with sweet taste slightly reminis cent of beets.
Why is it sometimes knows. But we do know it has nothing to do with Switzerland. When shopping for chard,
look for bright, firm leaves

and stalks. Wrapped in plas tic and refrigerated, it will
keep for two to four days keep for two to four days.
How do you use it? simple explanation is to use the leaves as you would spinach, and use the stalks as you would asparagus. But 1 tend to think that oversimplifies. It also requires that you treat chard as two sepa-
rate vegetables - the greens and the stalks.
And there's just no way I'm separating my greens into two parts for different cooking. Who has that
sort of time I prefer to roughly chop the leaves and finely chop the thicker stalks; this helps
the two parts cook in about the same time. And I enjoy the contrast between the more tender leaves and crunchier stalks. Generally, any flavor that works well with spinach will partner with chard, including butter, lemon, cream, grette. In fact, if you do nothing more than briefly steam or saute chopped
chard, then toss it with any (or any combination) of
those, you'll have a great side those, y
dish.

In Spain and Portugal, for example, chard is sauteed with olive oil, garlic, pine nuts and sometimes raisins, then dressed with lemon juice.
