ROGERSON • It wasn't the early morning hour

that managed to quiet 30 high school students. Piled in the bed of a pick-up truck, the students' brief silence was enough to allow a glimpse of a handful of sage grouse trotting across their Jarbidge mating ground.

Some students peered through binoculars as others helped point out a few visible birds that quickly moved away from the group.

"Here's what they're supposed to sound like," said Brad Lowe, a regional wildlife biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. He held out his phone and played a brief audio of the hoots and pops of a sage grouse call.

"The sound you're hearing is skin flapping after they puff out their chest," he said.

Students from Castleford and Filer were the first from Magic Valley high schools to participate in a federal program that promotes youth interaction with the outdoors. After touring the mating ground - called a lek - students heard a short se-

ries of lectures from officials involved in local species and wildlife management.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has held school tours in western and central parts of the state for the past three years. Officials are now looking to expand the program to southern Idaho.

"As school budgets decline, the opportunity for students to get out of the classroom becomes limited," said Jason Pyron, a fish and wildlife biologist with the agency who helped lead the Jarbidge field trip.

"We're trying to explain what people are working on in Idaho at a local level and allow the students to create a connection with the landscape," Pyron said.

Family of former Rupert soldier killed in Afghanistan releases statement, requests privacy.

Through it all is the subtext of terrible loss after Workman, along with three other soldiers, was killed Thursday in a helicopter crash in southern Afghanistan.

Through the Idaho National Guard, Workman's family asked for privacy Tuesday and released a statement that says the soldier will be missed by many, from his "large Greek and Italian family" to his friends from Idaho State Uni-

Plenty of GOP Women, Few Candidates

wice over the past week, area Republican women have hosted forums for candidates in legislative and sheriffs races: The Magic Valley Republican Women at Clear Lake Country Club last Wednesday, and the Twin Falls Republican Women at the Turf Club on Mon-

And while there were plenty of women involved, there is only one female Republican candidate in south-central Idaho: incumbent Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome.

That solidly lines up with the rest of Idaho's lawmakers. In the 2012 legislative session, the Senate had six Republican women, and the House had 12. Women made up just 21 percent of the Republican legislators, while 55 percent of Democratic legislators were women.

But don't think women aren't active in the Republican Party.

"They're always behind the scenes," Bell said. Women are running phone banks, going doorto-door, campaigning, and running meetings.

That shows with the active Republican women's groups in Magic Valley. But why not get their names on the ballot?



Retiring Rep. Sharon Block, R-Twin Falls, said she would like to see more women run for office. Whether they're Democrat or Republican, women bring a different perspective to the Legislature, especially on mental health, family and education issues, she said.

There are barriers, of course, like family. Bell recalled one now-retired legislator who would nurse her baby during debates. She would throw a blanket over the baby's head and breastfeed, offending one of her male colleagues.

Block expects a better balance of Republican women and men in future generations, especially as more younger women are earn higher educations and become politically active.

"I think that's something we need to work on as women, to encourage women to run for office," Block said.

TWIN FALLS MAN ACCUSED OF BASEBALL BAT BEATING

TWIN FALLS • A 30 - year old Twin Falls man allegedly beat a neighbor with a baseball bat Friday, giving him a concussion and broken teeth.

Jacob T. Freeman was charged with aggravated battery with a deadly weapon and arraigned Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

Police responded at 10:27 p.m. Friday to the 200 block of Alexander Street in Twin Falls for a report of battery. Upon arriving, the officer

found a blood-covered man regaining consciousness.

The victim was transported by ambulance to the emergency room at St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center, where he received 13 stitches to close his upper lip and was found to have multiple contusions on his arms and rib area. The victim was diagnosed with a concussion and had four teeth which were broken or knocked out, according to the police report.

The victim's wife told police she saw Freeman leave in a white Ford minivan, which officers later

found at Freeman's home. Freeman was located in the basement shortly after, police said.

Freeman allegedly told police he was afraid of the victim because of past confrontations over Freeman's dog. Before the incident Freeman said he heard the victim calling his girlfriend names and then struck the victim until he was on the ground, not moving, the report states.

After being questioned by police, Freeman was transported to the Twin Falls County Jail and held on \$50,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is set for May 4.

Workman's family plans a funeral in Boise, followed by burial at the Rupert Cemetery.

Larry Hansen, of Hansen Mortuary in Rupert, said Monday that Workman has been returned to the U.S. and is in Delaware.

Col. Tim Marsano, spokesman for the Idaho National Guard, told the *Times-News* in an email Tuesday that no dates for Workman's honorable transfer or funeral have been set.

Though Workman was an active-duty soldier, the Idaho National Guard assists families of fallen Idaho soldiers.

• The family of a man who was buried at a northern Idaho cemetery four years ago says his headstone has been moved and his remains may be lost.

Luanne Melior discovered the problem at the Coeur d'Alene Riverview Cemetery last week, when she and her husband Pat Melior went to pay respects to her father, Dara Brown Warren. It was their first visit in four years to the plot underneath the big maple tree that they'd selected for Warren's cremated remains in 2002.

But Luanne Melior told the Coeur d'Alene Press that they found his headstone had been moved about 100 feet away. Officials with Coeur d'Alene's Park Department did some research, and said the headstone had been placed in the wrong spot originally and was moved when the error was discovered. The family was never notified.

"That's not our normal protocol," Parks Director Doug Eastwood said last week. He said it was likely just a mistake by staff who have since retired.

To resolve the matter, the city offered to move the buried urn and the headstone to the spot the Melior family had want ed, underneath the tree. But when crews dug up the headstone late last week, there was no urn to be found. Now city officials think Warren may have been buried by the tree after all, but his urn was likely destroyed or displaced by subsequent burials at the site.

"We feel horrible about this," Deputy City Administrator Jon Ingalls said. The Meliors "have been gracious to work with, and we're doing everything from here forward to best mitigate the situation."

Ingalls said the department will review its record keeping methods, though they have improved since 2002 with the use of more computers. It's the first time such a problem has come up, he said, and Riverview and adjacent Forest cemeteries have had 20,000 burials since the

Still, Ingalls said, "This is an area you cannot fail?"

The Meliors are moving on, accepting the city's offer to put the headstone, with a flower vase from the city, for Warren beneath the tree. They don't want to involve the family who buried their family member in the spot the Meliors thought they had.

"Why put another family through what we're going through right now?" Pat Melior said. "We finally got the apology we were looking for. That's basically all we wanted anyway?

Instead, the family will pay their respects for Warren, who was from western Washington and died in Arizona in 1997, by

Man Gets at Least 5 Years for Child Injury

POCATELLO • A Pocatello man who was on probation for a felony drunken driving charge when a 2-year-old girl in his care suffered serious injuries has been sentenced to at least five years in prison for felony injury to a child.

Matthew Gonzales was sentenced Monday to five years fixed and five years indeterminate for injuries suffered by Aerabella Beck in

January 2011. The girl suffered a traumatic brain injury that caused blindness as well as a broken arm. Court records say the girl's sight is returning and she is walking and talking.

Gonzales pleaded guilty in January in exchange for a recommended sentence of three years fixed and three years indeterminate. Gonzales' attorney argued for probation and rehabilita-

Sixth District Judge David Nye gave Gonzales the maximum sentence.

Payette Students Accused of Bullying, Battery

PAYETTE • Police in the western Idaho town of Payette are investigating after sixth-graders at a local middle school said they were battered and bullied by a group of eight seventhand eighth-graders.

McCain Middle School administrators also are investigating claims that the older students assaulted six sixth-graders, inflicting minor injuries. The Payette school board will determine whether the students accused of bullying will be expelled.

Payette Police Chief Mark Clark told Boise television station KTVB Monday that his department is looking into possible battery charges.

Bullying has garnered national attention with a string of high profile court cases and feature-length documentaries.

Former Stimson Employee Guilty in Lumber Theft

COEUR d'ALENE • A former employee of Stimson Lumber Co. in Plummer has pleaded guilty to keeping \$581,000 in payments for lumber sold to a business in Spokane, Wash.

The U.S. attorney's office says 32-year-old Trevor Mokry pleaded guilty Monday to aiding the transportation of stolen goods. Sentencing is set for July 16.

Prosecutors allege that between June 2007 and June 2011, Mokry sold lumber to the Spokane business without the permission or knowledge of Stimson and kept \$581,445 the business paid for the lumber.

The government is seeking restitution.

A Knights of the KKK leader has denied his group's involvement in the mailings.

Neb., Iowa, Mich. Governors Say Feds Get in Way

OMAHA, Neb. • The Republican governors of Nebraska, Iowa and Michigan said Tuesday that the federal government is cramping the states' ability to create new jobs and stimulate regional economies.

Nebraska's Dave Heineman, Iowa's Terry Branstad and Michigan's Rick Snyder met in Omaha with representatives of eight other states at the beginning of a two-day summit of the National Governors Association on regional economic development.

The governors and representatives of Alabama, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, North Carolina, South Dakota, Utah and West Virginia are sharing best practices for creating jobs in their

Heineman, who leads the association, held a news conference with Branstad and Snyder on Tuesday, and all three said that proposals of higher taxes and more stringent regulations on businesses, as well as the Obama administration's health care overhaul, are hurting business growth in their states.

"I think you have a huge uncertainty coming from the federal government," Heineman said. "I'd like to see the federal government provide stability when it comes to taxes, regulation and health

Branstad said the federal health care law "would add 150,000 people to the Medicaid rolls in Iowa. It's not affordable; it's not sustainable?

UI Preparing for Public Phase of Fundraising Campaign

MOSCOW • The University of Idaho will unveil the public phase of its sevenyear, \$225 million capital fundraising campaign later this week with a series of events in Moscow.

The university began the silent phase of the campaign, titled "Inspiring Futures," in 2007. UI President Duane Nellis told the Daily News editorial board Monday that the university has already raised a good portion of the \$225 million, but the official number won't be announced until Satur-

He said the university hopes to raise the total amount by 2014, the UI's 125th anniversary.

"We think this is really the way to move the institution forward at a time when state support has re-

ally been limited," he said. The university intends to use the money to recruit and retain high-quality students and faculty, create partnerships with external organizations and improve campus buildings, both with renovations of existing structures and the proposed eventual construction of a new Integrated Research and Innovation Cen-

The \$49 million, 53,000square-foot science center is proposed for the former site of the Navy ROTC building that burned in an accidental fire last summer, Nellis said. He said the new building

will have a heavy focus on interdisciplinary research, like the \$20 million, fiveyear U.S. Department of Agriculture grant the UI received last year to study climate change as it relates to Pacific Northest agricul-

"This will create an incubator space for them to work," he said of interdisciplinary researchers in gen-

Nellis said if fundraising efforts are successful, the Integrated Research and Innovation Center will be the first new building constructed on the UI's Moscow campus in more than 10 years. The university hopes private fundraising will cover about \$15 million of the \$49 million project, with about another \$5 million hopefully coming from state's Permanent Building Fund and the rest from a bond.

He said in addition to the \$62 million the Inspiring Futures campaign plans to dedicate to building improvements across campus, the university hopes the campaign will be able to put \$54 million into existing meritand need-based scholarships, new undergraduate and graduate student endowments and new graduate student research fellowships; \$63 million into new faculty endowments and fellowships; and \$46 million into creating multidisciplinary programs with external agencies, industries and businesses.

Nellis said the UI is currently engaged in 225 partnerships with external groups who collaborate on research and provide internship and job opportunities for students and alumni.

He said even though the capital fundraising campaign hasn't been officially revealed yet, the university is on track to collect a record number of donations this year. He attributed that in part to the improving economy and the prosperity of some UI alumni.

Idaho to Get \$85,000 from Medicaid Fraud Settlements

BOISE • Idaho has joined in Medicaid fraud settlements with two prescription drug makers who are accused of Medicaid fraud, according to Attorney General Lawrence Wasden.

The companies KV Pharmaceutical will pay Idaho about \$64,450 and Dava Pharmaceuticals Inc. will pay Idaho about \$20,130. Idaho Medicaid will get most of the settlement money, but a total of about \$8,672 from the settlements will go to the state's general fund to be appropriated by the Idaho Legislature.

The agreement with KV Pharmaceutical settles allegations that its now-defunct subsidiary Ethex Corp. failed to tell the federal Medicare and Medicaid agency that two of its products didn't qualify for coverage under federal and state programs. Ethex was accused of submitting false quarterly reports to the government related to nitroglycerin and

hyoscyamine sulfate extended-release capsules, which were ineligible for Medicaid reimbursement because of Food and Drug Administration decisions in the late 1990s. Neither drug is currently on the market or ever had full regulatory approval for safety and effectiveness.

Idaho also joined a multistate and federal settlement with Dava Pharmaceuticals. Dava was accused of underpaying the Medicaid Prescription Drug Rebate Program from 2005 to 2009. Drug companies in the program must pay quarterly rebates to state Medicaid programs based partly on whether a drug is a generic or brandname product. Dava said its version of three drugs were generic, which lowered the rebate because of Medicaid. Dava also incorrectly calculated a price for the drugs that ended up charging Medicaid and federal health care programs more than it should have, Wasden

Teams from the National Association of Medicaid Fraud Control Units participated in the investigations and conducted the settlement negotiations with Dava on behalf of the settling

Judge Blocks Bid to Suppress Key Evidence in Powell Case

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)
• A state judge on Tuesday cleared the way for the voyeurism trial of missing Utah mother Susan Powell's fatherin-law, dismissing his request to suppress key evidence in the case.

Judge Ronald Culpepper determined authorities had a proper search warrant when they scoured Steve Powell's home last year. In that search, they uncovered thousands of images of females being videotaped without their knowledge, including Susan Powell.

Steve Powell faces several voyeurism charges and one count of possession of child pornography. His trial is scheduled to start May 7.

Powell's attorneys had argued the warrant was illegal, saying it was essentially a fishing expedition designed to gather general evidence against his son Josh, who was Susan Powell's husband.

Occupy Boise Rebuffs State Call to Reconsider Injunction

Protesters' lawyer, in a response to the state's motion to have U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill reconsider his preliminary injunction, tells Winmill he got it right the first time.

BOISE • Occupy Boise wants a federal judge to uphold his ruling that allowed the protest group's tents to remain on the grounds of the old Ada County Courthouse.

Bryan Walker, an Occupy lawyer, filed a response Monday to the state's motion to have U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill reconsider his preliminary injunction, telling Winmill he got it right the first time.

"There is no change in circumstances. This Court did not err;" Walker wrote in his response. "Rather, things are just as they were when this

Court entered the injunction: the State's unceasing efforts to squelch disfavored political protest still contin-

Winmill decided in February that Occupy's tents constitute a protected symbol of their protest against income inequality and prohibited the state from enforcing a newly passed law banning camping on state-managed land. He decided an around-the-clock protest with tents could continue for the time being but ordered camping-related activities to cease.

An evidentiary hearing is scheduled for June.

But the state attorney general's office asked Win-

mill in March to modify that decision, saying the state needs protesters to temporarily vacate so crews can perform maintenance and repair damage to the grounds caused since Occupy took over the land in November.

Deputy Attorney General Carl Withroe wrote in the motion that the group's vigil "prevents the state from adequately maintaining the property."

"It has caused significant damage to the grounds and Plaintiffs' refusal to temporarily relocate has effectively obstructed the state's efforts to repair and maintain the grounds," Withroe continued.

The state says part of the property also needs to be closed off in May for construction to the old courthouse, which will be renovated into a law library for the University of Idaho.

But Walker rejected that the maintenance or construction represent compelling new evidence to overturn Winmill's initial ruling.

Occupy participants have acknowledged some damage to the courthouse lawn and Walker says they've offered alternative relocations, but he said attempts by protesters to negotiate a temporary move have fallen on deaf ears.

"We've sent them correspondences on three different occasions offering to move the demonstration to non-grassy areas of the Capitol Mall complex, and they've ignored it. They've just flat ignored it," Walker told The AP.

Winmill is reviewing the motion.

Boise Police Make Six DUI Arrests on Connector

BOISE • The Boise Police night STEP team plans to do more targeted DUI enforcement patrols around town like a similar exercise last week on the I-184 Connector, which netted six DUI arrests over a four hour period.

Police arrested six for drunken driving out of 55 people pulled over for traffic violations between 10 p.m. and midnight on the Connector both April 18 and 19. That means more than 10 percent of those pulled over were intoxicated while driving — a fact that concerns Boise police.

"It's very concerning that we found that many drivers — more than 10 percent on a weekday night — who chose to drive under the influence," Boise Police Lt. Bryan Hagler said. "We're very glad officers made arrests instead of having to respond to crashes."

Police officials say the enforcement effort wasn't exactly a secret, as they announced the extra DUI patrols ahead of time on both Facebook and Twitter. The directed patrol—and all arrests—were made on the westbound lanes of the Connector, leading out of Boise.

"It's fairly common to find officers patrolling the Connector, and we put the word out that DUI patrols would be out in force these nights and still we had this high number of DUI arrests," said Hagler. "That shows we need to continue our solid enforcement as well as education efforts to try and keep people safe."

Candidate Restarts Campaign after Assault Arrest

BOISE (AP) • A congressional candidate restarted her campaign after being charged last month with three felony counts of aggravated assault and a weapons charge after police said workers were threatened with a gun at an office supply store.

In an email Friday to the Idaho Statesman, Cynthia Clinkingbeard said, "My legal case is a bit of a fly in the ointment, but I am hoping that will be closer to resolution soon."

A judge has ordered a mental health evaluation for Clinkingbeard, who has a history of bipolar disorder, records show, and until recently had taught at Boise State University and College of Western Idaho.

She was arraigned March 19 on the charges but did not enter a plea. A court hearing on the mental evaluation is scheduled for May 4. Clinkingbeard, 58, of Boise filed as a Democratic candidate for Idaho's 1st Congressional District. Neither she nor her primary opponent, Jimmy Farris, responded to letters from the League of Women Voters regarding a proposed debate on Idaho Public Television.

As a Democrat running in one of the most Republican districts in the nation, Farris lamented not having the opportunity to debate Clinkingbeard on television and give voters an opportunity to hear where he stands on issues.

"I was looking forward to the opportunity to have a legitimate challenge," he told the Statesman's editorial board.

Farris decided against the debate because of Clinking-beard's legal and mental issues, said his campaign coordinator, Toni Sutton.

"We didn't feel like a debate would be really reasonable at this point," Sutton said. "Mental illness is a big issue; that's just not something that you capitalize

Clinkingbeard was a doctor specializing in endocrinology, diabetes and metabolism before her license was revoked in 2005 after authorities concluded her manic episodes were getting worse, according to Idaho Board of Medicine records.

She was placed on leave from her adjunct teaching position at the College of Western Idaho in Nampa for erratic behavior two days before police say she went to Staples in Boise and threatened employees with a handgun

Clinkingbeard had also been teaching a biology course at Boise State University, where she had been an adjunct faculty member since 2006. She was relieved of her duties there in March, following her arrest, school officials said. She went to the Staples to

inquire about campaign posters, store employees said. The employees told police they became concerned when Clinkingbeard started making strange statements about politics and religion, such as telling employees they were going to meet God.

Clinkingbeard was at the front of the store waiting for someone to pick her up when she pulled a 9-mm pistol out of a shoulder holster and pointed it at the back of a store manager, employees told police. The gun was pointed at two other employees before Clinkingbeard left the store in a vehicle, police said.

She was later arrested during a traffic stop. Police said they found a gun in the vehicle and questioned Clinkingbeard before placing her under arrest.

Registered Sex Offender Rearrested in Idaho Falls

Jones, of Idaho Falls, is charged with misdemeanor

indecent exposure, disturbing the peace and unlawful entry. Jones has two prior misdemeanor indecent exposure convictions from 2002.

Police spokeswoman Joelyn Hansen said Jones is "notorious" for these kinds of incidents.

Hansen said that when police arrived at the Civic at 501 S. Holmes Ave. at 5:49 p.m., two Idaho Falls men were detaining Jones. She did not disclose the men's names but said one was an off-duty Idaho State Police officer

A 33-year-old Blackfoot woman said she was using the toilet when Jones exposed himself, Hansen said.

The woman told police she thought a child was in the restroom at the same time.

Jones' criminal record includes a second-degree stalking conviction from 2009 and an unlawful-access-to-schoolchildren conviction from 2008.

He also has a prior conviction of obscene public display of offensive sexual material and an obscene conduct conviction, ac-

cording to the Idaho State Repository.

He has three prior unlawful entry convictions, 12 disturbing the peace convictions, one public nuisance conviction, two simple battery convictions and one trespassing conviction, according to the Idaho State Repository.

Jones remained in custody at the Bonneville County Jail on Monday without bond.

Misdemeanor indecent exposure is punishable by up to six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska • Rocker and gun rights advocate Ted Nugent pleaded guilty Tuesday to transporting a black bear he illegally killed in Alaska, saying he was sorry for unwittingly violating the law

"I would never knowingly break any game laws," Nugent told the court. "I'm afraid I was blindsided by this, and I sincerely apologize to everyone for this."

With his plea, the singer and avid hunter followed through with a signed agreement he made with federal prosecutors earlier this month.

Magistrate Judge Michael Thompson accepted the deal at a U.S. District Court hearing in Ketchikan. Nugent and his attorney

participated by telephone.
Asked by Thompson if the agree-

ment was clear, Nugent responded: "It is with me, your honor:"

According to the document, Nugent illegally shot and killed the bear in May 2009 on Sukkwan Island in southeast Alaska after wounding another bear in a bow hunt. The bow incident counted toward a seasonal limit of one bear in that location. Nugent and his lawyer, Wayne Anthony Ross, said neither of them knew about that law

The judge said he wasn't aware of the "sort of one-strike policy" ei-

"It probably is not widely known, and if there is a side benefit to the agreement reached here today — since apparently newspapers are interested in Mr. Nugent and his doings — this probably will serve to alert a great many hunters to that very issue and may, in fact, prevent violations in the future and court activity for a whole slew of folks."

The plea agreement says Nugent knowingly possessed and transported the bear in misdemeanor violation of the federal Lacey Act.

Ross said after the hearing that he was unaware of any state charges pending. A database search found no state charges against Nugent.

"It seems to me that would be double dipping," Ross said.

The hunt was filmed for Nugent's

Outdoor Channel television show "Spirit of the Wild," according to the plea deal.

Under the agreement, Nugent must pay a \$10,000 fine and serve two years of probation, including a special condition that he not hunt or fish in Alaska or on U.S. Forest Service properties for a year. Nugent used a number of bear-baiting sites on Forest Service land during the Alaska hunt, the document and

He also must create a public service announcement that will be

broadcast on his show every second week for a year after approval by a representative of the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Nugent told the court he wanted to make numerous PSAs to keep the interest level up, "so it's not just the same statement." Thompson said that would be fine, as long as the PSAs were approved before air-

The musician famed for his 1977 hit "Cat Scratch Fever" also must pay the state \$600 for the bear that was taken illegally.

Nugent briefly drew the attention of the Secret Service last week after he rallied support for Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney and said of the Obama administration: "We need to ride into that battlefield and chop their heads off in November."

Airport Discussion Requires Cool Heads

We have to give credit to Burley Mayor Terry Greenman — he knows when he's made a mistake.

At least twice now, while courting other local government officials to join his city's effort to build a new airport, the mayor has said Burley officials will petition the Federal Aviation Administration to close the J.R. "Jack" Simplot Airport as a safety risk if the city can't construct a replacement.

Sure, it might have been a sign of Greenman's dedication to the idea. But it also appeared as if he was holding the city's airport hostage to drum up support.

Is this really how this discussion should go?
Following last year's debacle over proposed airport sites on prime agricultural land, Burley officials have been on the right path, by and large, in their third attempt to replace the aging Simplot airport. Greenman and City Administrator Mark Mitton have turned up at city council and county commission meetings throughout Mini-Cassia, attempting to answer questions and offer information on the city's concerns.

Does that mean they're right about the need to replace the airport? Would a new airport have helped prevent recent fatal crashes? That's still to be determined, but at least Burley is being open with its neighbors — doubly important since the new airport is all but certain to sit outside of its city limits.

That makes Greenman's comments to the Rupert City Council April 10 and Cassia County officials on April 16 all the more perplexing. Why, as Greenman insists he won't play politics over this deal, would he then do so?

The threatened closure was an emotional mistake, he told this editorial board Tuesday morning, brought on by reactions to other people's statements. And he doesn't believe the FAA would actually agree to shut the airport down.

Greenman says he firmly believes the Simplot airport is a dangerous facility, and that the FAA and state aeronautics division feel the same way. He's become practiced at making his case, smoothly laying out costs, procedural details and siting information (though he has yet to reveal the locations on U.S. Bureau of Land Management lands that he says could host the new airport).

But the mayor could put his whole case at risk if he allows people's objections to provoke such odd statements. Leading a city and building an airport require a certain level of maturity, and the ability to handle critics.

After developing a reputation for trying to push its weight around on the airport issue, Burley is going about this attempt the right way. It'd be a shame if something this simple undid all that work.



Marine Booked on Suspicion of Killing Another Marine's Wife

SAN DIEGO • A Marine already in custody in the theft of an assault weapon was booked Tuesday on suspicion of murder in the death of another Marine's wife, authorities said.

The latest allegation against Louis Ray Perez came a week after the body of 22-year-old Brittany Killgore was found in brush near a Southern California lake.

Sheriff's investigators identified the 45-year-old Perez as a person of interest shortly after the body was discovered.

The San Diego County district attorney's office said the case was under

Another suspect, Jessica Lynn Lopez, 25, pleaded not guilty to murder last week in Killgore's death. She is being held on \$3 million bail.

Authorities have not said whether Lopez and Perez knew each other or whether they knew the victim.

Jeff Reichert, Perez's attorney, did not immediately respond to a message seeking comment.

Perez has been in the military for 16 years, has no criminal history, is married and has lived in the San Diego area for about 10 years, Reichert said in court last week. He is being held on \$500,000 bail in Vista, north of San Diego.

Perez was arrested on the weapons charge the day after Killgore disappeared. Prosecutors said he stole the weapon from a man in early February.

That's what Sandy Winn says was the reason her cow, Darcy, wandered from her pen Friday and ended up at takeout window of the fast-food restaurant a half-mile away in Brush, Colo.

Winn tells KUSA-TV (http://on9news.tv/JDk3 (OA) that Darcy is a good cow until she's bored and then she goes looking for attention.

Winn says she didn't know Darcy had escaped her pen until police called asking if the family owned a dairy cow. She says they told her it was "up at McDonalds," so she fetched the cow and took her home.

Brush police clerk Vivian Llewellyn joked Tuesday that Darcy "didn't get her burger."

COOPERSTOWN, N.D. • A North Dakota man was convicted Tuesday of shooting and beheading a university researcher in what prosecutors claimed was an attempt to start a white supremacist

Jurors had the case for less than three hours Tuesday before finding Daniel Wacht, 31, of the eastern North Dakota town of Cooperstown, guilty in the death of 54-year-old Kurt Johnson. Wacht shook his head from side to side as the verdict was read. He faces up to life in prison without parole.

Johnson was last seen alive getting into Wacht's van outside a Cooperstown bar on New Year's Eve 2010. His severed head was found in a crawl space in Wacht's basement about a week later. His body has never been found.

Though Johnson was white, prosecutors contended Wacht was motivated by his attraction to the Aryan Nation. They said he wanted to start a local white supremacist group and make a statement by blowing something up or killing someone.

The defense contended prosecutors didn't have enough evidence to prove Wacht killed Johnson and questioned the alleged mo-

Johnson was a North Dakota State University researcher based in Cooperstown, which has fewer than 1,000 residents and is about 75 miles northwest of Fargo.

The verdict came on what would have been his 56th

birthday — something his brother, Kory Johnson, said was both fitting and painful. Asked if he would implore Wacht to disclose the location of his brother's body, Johnson paused for several

seconds.

"To Mr. Wacht, the jury spoke volumes. Justice has been done here," he said.
"As far as my brother's body, I know his soul is in heaven."

Defense attorney Steven Mottinger said he would consider some pretrial issues for appeal but would not be specific.

"It was a tough case," Mottinger said. "We did what we could with the evidence we had to work with."

Marina Spahr, the Griggs County attorney and lead prosecutor, left the courtroom without commenting. Assistant U.S. Attorney Jonathan Byers, who helped with the case, said he was pleased with the verdict.

"You would like to hope that it provides a little bit of closure for the family. But it doesn't bring him back," Byers said.

Jurors were given the case around noon, and returned the verdict before 3 p.m.

Mottinger contended in his closing argument Tuesday morning that there were no eyewitnesses and no way to prove his client pulled the trigger. Mottinger also asked the jury why Wacht would "kill a white man" for recognition from a white supremacist outfit.

"Hint, guess and suspicion are not and can never be enough," Mottinger told jurors during closing arguments.

However, Spahr told jurors there were "layers of evidence" to prove Wacht was guilty. During his closing, Spahr highlighted evidence that included a love seat cushion found in

Wacht's garbage that was soaked with Johnson's blood and boots and gloves with Johnson's blood on the outside and Wacht's DNA inside.

side.
"You don't have to see
Daniel Wacht pull the trigger to know that he did,"
Spahr said.

James Bolstad, who is now in prison on a probation violation, was a key witness in the case. He testified for prosecutors that Wacht had told him he wanted to do something dramatic to start a local Aryan Nation group.

Mottinger questioned Bolstad's credibility.

"They base their whole theory on a man who admits to multiple felonies, admits his testimony would help him out of his own legal problems," the defense attorney told jurors.

Bolstad is in prison on a probation violation stemming from his conviction in a theft and drug paraphernalia case in 2004.

Environmentalists Warn that Utah Road Dispute Will Be Costly

SALT LAKE CITY • A potential lawsuit by state officials seeking to control thousands of miles of dirt roads that cross Utah's rugged backcountry, national parks and wilderness areas could cost the state millions of dollars in legal fees and lost tourism revenue, environmental groups warned Tuesday.

Representatives of the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance and the Sierra Club also said the increased vehicle access would degrade important habitat for mule deer and sage grouse, and lead to more vandalism and theft at sensitive archaeological sites.

While the lawsuit hasn't been filed, Gov. Gary Herbert in December issued a notice of the state's intent to sue the Interior Department over access to more than 18,000 roads.

There also are lawsuits pending on behalf of specific counties that lay claim to hundreds of other routes. County and state officials argue the roads be accessible because they were used for at least a decade before the federal government closed them.

"We have been attempting to negotiate the solutions for 40 years" but have been continually stymied by Interior officials, said John Harja, the director of the state's Public Lands Policy Office.

Even if the state does get control of these rights-of-way, it doesn't necessarily mean that vehicles will be allowed or that the roads will be paved. But it would mean that state and county officials would have oversight of the roads, and not the federal government.

Although about 100 roads

do cross through national parks, many of them only skirt corners of a park's o- boundaries, Harja said.

The environmental groups have compiled state data to identify which routes most likely would be included in the suit. They unveiled their findings on detailed maps during a news conference at the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance headquarters in Salt Lake City.

The maps show the state is trying claim management over more than 45,000 miles, said Heidi McIntosh, associate director of the alliance.

The state argues access should be maintained on these roads because they are important routes for traveling in the rural areas of the state and they provide access to the outdoors.

But McIntosh said many of the routes are nothing more than horse trails, dry stream beds or hiking paths. "The state and its county partners are now claiming that because there is a mark on the ground, these are highways," she said.

The impact on tourism and outdoor recreation also is a concern, especially because it is one of the state's largest industries.

"Without our awe-in-spiring, pristine, wide-open spaces, Utah is simply another 'flyover' state with little to set us apart from other states vying for new businesses in this challenging economic climate," said Peter Metcalf, CEO and president of outdoor equipment maker Black Diamond. "Utah's remarkable natural beauty gives us an edge."

Police Wind Down Search for Missing Arizona Girl

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) • Police are scaling back search efforts for a 6year-old girl who was last seen Friday night when she was getting ready for bed in her Tucson home.

Tucson Police Chief Roberto Villasenor said Tuesday that law enforcement officials expect to wrap up their intensive search for any sign of Isabel Mercedes Celis by this morning.

More than 20 officers will work through Tuesday night in the neighborhood surrounding Isabel's home, Villasenor said. That's a sharp reduction

the search. Villasenor said the drop in personnel doesn't mean authorities have given up hope of finding

Isabel alive. "Obviously, I'm disappointed that we haven't found her at this point. But that doesn't mean we're giving up hope or that we're not going to continue to use all the resources that we need to try and find her and follow up on these leads," Villasenor said.

He said police will be shifting from searching to an investigative phase, since investigators have re-visited sites they believe could be relevant.

About 50 officers finished searching a city landfill, but Villasenor would not disclose if any leads were found. Authorities had said the landfill search was conducted because trash had been taken out Saturday before police could secure

Authorities said they were following more than 260 tips in the case.

Frozen Cows in Cabin Spur Warnings at **Hot Springs**

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) • Federal forest officials want visitors to a Colorado hot springs to be very careful about what's inside a remote cabin nearby: Frozen cows.

Rangers believe the cows wandered into the cabin near the popular Conundrum Hot Springs during a snowstorm but couldn't find their way out. Air Force Academy cadets found their frozen carcasses while snowshoeing in late March.

U.S. Forest Service spokesman Bill Kight said Tuesday that water samples have been taken to determine if the hot springs was contaminat ed by the dead animals.

Rangers want the carcasses gone before they thaw. Removal options include explosives or burning down the cabin.

In the meantime, officials have posted warning signs about the cows around the hot springs near Aspen in the Colorado Rocky Mountains.



7.5 Percent of Deportations May Get Held

Immigration and Customs Enforcement has offered to temporarily suspend the deportation cases of roughly 16,500 people.

SANTA ANA, Calif. • Immigration officials have offered to shelve 7.5 percent of deportation cases under a massive review of the backlogged U.S. system aimed at focusing on deporting more criminals, authorities said Tues-

Immigration and Customs Enforcement has offered to temporarily suspend the deportation cases of roughly 16,500 people after reviewing more than 70 percent of the immigration cases pending as of mid-April, according to statistics released by the

ICE officials said 2,700 cases have been shelved. The rest still require paperwork and background checks.

It was not immediately clear how many immigrants had been told of the offer or how many had accepted it.

The Obama administration announced in August that roughly 300,000 deportation cases would be reviewed and non-criminals and those illegal immigrants who posed no public safety or national security threat would likely have their cases put on hold indefinitely.

The move was welcomed by immigrant advocates but reviled by critics who called the program an attempt by the administration to work around Congress.

Since then, however, immigrant advocates have complained the government is offering to apply so-called prosecutorial discretion in too few instances, and that those whose deportation cases are put on the back burner still don't get a work permit.

So far, the approval rate "is a very low number," said Gregory Chen, director of advocacy for the American Immigration Lawyers Association.

"You can't expect people to not be able to feed their families and have some source of income and still survive," he added.

Some say immigrants might do better by trying their luck in immigration court, where, for example, they could seek asylum.

More than half of immigrants whose asylum cases were decided by an immigration judge in the 2011 fiscal year actually won their cases, according to statistics from the Executive Office for Immigration Review, which runs the country's immigration court system.

ICE deputy press secretary Gillian Christensen said the review is ongoing. The main focus is to enable authorities to focus on deporting illegal immigrants with criminal records or those who previously ignored court orders to leave the country.

"This review is designed to allow the agency to make the best use of its limited resources," she said in a state-

Of the cases put on hold to date, the vast majority more than 2,000 - involveimmigrants who have lived in the country for a long time and have an immediate relative who is an American citizen. About 175 are children and 180 are college students or graduates who came to the U.S. when they were under 16 and have lived in the country for more than five years, the agency said.

In addition, immigration officials said they are also putting a halt on some deportation orders.

Mark Krikorian, executive director of the Center for Immigration Studies in Washington, said some initially thought the program would bring sweeping change to the deportation process but the latest data shows it hasn't turned out that way.

"I'm glad they pulled their punch," said Krikorian, whose organization favors stricter immigration limits, "though obviously I would have preferred they not do this thing altogether."

Drought May Force Emergency BLM Mustang Roundups

BLM says agency officials already are making plans to haul in water for horses in northwest Nevada's Jackson Mountains.

RENO, Nev. • Extended drought in some parts of Nevada and the West may force a delay in the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's plans to ease up on wild horse roundups as more emphasis is placed on fertility control to keep herd populations in check.

The BLM plans fewer mustang gathers in each of the next three years in the 10 western states that had an estimated 37,000 horses and burros as of February. The total population is 1,500 fewer than last year but 10,000 more than the agency maintains the range can sustain ecologically.

Raul Morales, the BLM's deputy director for natural resources and planning in Nevada, said the agency may have to resort to emergency roundups it has used in the past to rescue parts of herds already hurting for water in the Jackson Mountains and at least two other places in Nevada, which is home to about half the wild horses nationally.

A roundup already is planned in the Jackson Mountains about 150 miles northeast of Reno. But Morales said nearly a third of the 600 animals in that herd

may have to be rescued sooner if Mother Nature doesn't cooperate in the weeks and months ahead.

"We are praying for moisture, but we are on top of it," he told the BLM's National Wild Horse and Burro Advisory Board during a meeting in Reno on Monday.

spokeswoman Heather Emmons said Tuesday that agency officials already were making plans to haul in water for horses in the Jackson Mountains. She said they are closely monitoring as many as a dozen herd management areas across the state, mostly in northwest and north-central Nevada as well as near Las

"Everyone is on heightened alert," she said. "We're keeping pretty close tabs."

Ron Cerri of the Nevada Cattlemen's Association told the panel on Tuesday that he wanted to "commend BLM for getting out ahead of the problem" in the Jackson Mountains.

But Laura Leigh, director of Nevada-based Wild Horse Education, an Internet clearinghouse for information on roundups, said she opposes emergency roundups, especially in the Jackson Mountains. She said if mustangs must be removed, so too should a proportional number of grazing livestock.

"If 50 percent of the horses need to be removed due to the drought or an emergency situation, it should be expected the same restrictions would be on any and all permittees," Leigh told the panel Tuesday.

Rick Myers, a member of the Wyoming State Grazing Board, told the panel his state is "in the midst of severe drought?' Parts of Utah, Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado also report drought conditions.

"I'm positive we are going to have more extreme conditions that are going to make for more gathers this year," Myers said Tuesday.

In general, the agency has been forced to rein in its annual roundups because of the soaring cost of housing the animals – \$44 million last

year or 58 percent of its \$77 million budget for the entire wild horse and burro pro-

With 47,000 animals now in holding facilities and demand for adoptions waning, BLM plans to gather about 7,500 horses and burros in each of the next three years, compared with about 10,000 in each of the past two years.

Angry EU Voters, Citizens Rebel against Austerity

BRUSSELS • For more than a year, European Union officials have called for austerity, austerity and more austerity as a means to solve Europe's debt crisis. Now people who don't want to pay the price are taking their fight from the streets to the

Governments have fallen, more are at risk and in some places, a stark streak of nationalism is on the rise that could swing Europe ever deeper into a fortress men-

At stake is the future of the continent, where countries rich and poor are struggling with mountains of debt and moribund economies - a toxic combination that often seems to require contradictory remedies of belt-tightening and

economic stimulus. Increasingly, the long focus on austerity is convincing Europeans that the German-led mantra of fiscal responsibility is creating a vicious circle of more misery leading to lower growth leading to even greater debt distress.

"What is happening in Europe is the austerity drive is actually slowing down the necessary rebalancing of European economies," said Simon Tilford, chief economist at the Center for European Reform.

Austerity measures aimed at balancing national budgets have led to drastic spending cuts by governments across the continent, including layoffs and pay cuts for government workers, slashing of key services including welfare and development programs, as well as tax hikes to boost government revenues.

Many in Europe have had enough of this harsh medi-

In France, President Nicolas Sarkozy, one of the architects of the EU's response to the financial crisis, is in danger of being turned out of office in next month's runoff with Francois Hollande – a Socialist who is promising not to cut, but to increase public spending by \$26.3 billion by 2017.

Hollande is also promising to re-negotiate a muchvaunted budgetary pact among 25 EU countries meant to enforce national fiscal discipline.

Greece votes in elections next month in which fringe parties hostile to international bailouts requiring steep austerity are expected to make big gains - possibly endangering efforts by the current technocratic government to rein in the nation's debt.

And the Netherlands' 18month-old conservative coalition resigned this week after it failed to agree on cutting its own budget deficit to meet the EU limits it had demanded so fiercely of other countries.

Ex-BP Engineer Arrested in Gulf Oil Spill Case

NEW ORLEANS • Federal prosecutors brought the first criminal charges Tuesday in the Gulf oil spill, accusing a former BP engineer of deleting more than 300 text messages that indicated the blown-out well was spewing far more crude than the company was telling the public at the time.

Two years and four days after the drilling-rig explosion that set off the worst offshore oil spill in U.S. history, Kurt Mix, 50, of Katy, Texas, was arrested and charged with two counts of obstruction of justice for allegedly destroying evidence.

The U.S. Justice Department made it clear that the investigation is still going on and suggested that more people could be arrested. In a statement, Attorney General Eric Holder said prosecutors "will hold accountable those who violated the law in connection with the largest environmen-

in U.S. history? Federal investigators have been looking into the causes of the blowout and the actions of managers, engineers and rig workers at BP and its subcontractors Halliburton and Transocean in the days and hours before the April 20, 2010, explosion.

But the case against Mix focuses only on the aftermath of the blast, when BP scrambled for weeks to plug the leak. Even then, the charges are not really about the disaster itself, but about an alleged attempt to thwart the investigation into it.

In court papers, the FBI said one of the areas under investigation is whether the oil company intentionally

Prosecutors also said BP gave the public an optimistic account of its May 2010 efforts to plug the well via a technique called a "top kill," even though the company's internal data and some of the text messages showed the operation was likely to

SENATE SEEKS TO SLOW CLOSING OF RURAL POSTAL OFFICES

WASHINGTON • The Senate moved Tuesday to impose new restrictions on the closing of rural post offices, adopting a provision that would prevent them from being shuttered for at least a

Under the measure, the ailing Postal Service would be barred from closing post offices for one year if they are located in rural areas — those with fewer than 50,000 people. The exception would be if there was no community opposition.

After one year, the mail agency would have to take rural issues into special consideration, including economic impact, the quality of Internet broadband service and location. Post offices would generally be shielded from closing if the next closest mail facility was more than 10 miles away.

The provision was among revisions to a Senate bill aimed at stabilizing the ailing U.S. Postal Service by providing a short-term cash infusion while delaying controversial decisions on thousands of post office closings and ending Saturday mail delivery.

Obama Pushes Low-rate Student Loans, Wooing Young

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. • President Barack Obama went after the college vote Tuesday, pitching cheaper student loans as he courted the one age group where he has a decided advantage over Republican rival Mitt Romney. go along. In the race for the White House, both the Obama and Romney campaigns see huge opportunities to court younger voters. Though both Obama and Romney have expressed support for freezing the current interest rates on the loans for poorer and middle-class students, lawmakers are still exploring ways to pay for the plan. The timing is important because the rate will double from 3.4 percent to 6.8 percent on July 1 without intervention by Congress, an expiration date chosen in 2007 when a Democratic Congress former Pennsylvania senator

voted to chop the rate in half.

FRESNO, Calif. (MCT) \bullet The carcass of a dairy cow with mad cow disease is being held at a processing facility near Hanford, Calif., company officials confirmed Tuesday afternoon. The cow was taken from an undisclosed dairy in Central California to the Baker Commodities transfer station east of Hanford.

Earlier Tuesday, federal agriculture officials confirmed the mad cow disease case. They said the cow was not scheduled for slaughter for human consumption and did not pose a risk to the food supply or human health. Milk does not transmit the disease.

It is the fourth confirmed case nationwide of the disease, also known as bovine spongiform encephalopathy, or BSE. The carcass will be destroyed, officials said.

Valley Legislators Get Mixed Report Card

Twin Falls business community celebrates some successes but looks forward to next year's session in Boise.

TWIN FALLS • There's always next year.

During a Tuesday meeting at 9 Beans and a Burrito, members of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce met with Magic Valley lawmakers to discuss the legislative session. While the business community celebrated some successes, its members are already looking to next year's session to address other issues.

Two of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry's biggest goals - setting up a state health insurance exchange and addressing the state's personal property tax - never received a hearing and died behind closed doors without

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public testimony this year. Another issue, Streamlined Sales Tax, died on a tie vote in late February after two hours of testimony. That was frustrat-

ing, said Alex LaBeau, president of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry. But the business community is happy about the \$35 million tax cut for corporations and the highest tier of individual taxpayers. That bill was signed into law earlier this

Twin Falls financial advisor Dave Snelson expressed his frustration with what he saw as the Legislature's failure to respond to constituent needs.

"I'm not bashing anybody individually," Snelson said. "I do admire all of you and I respect what you do. I just think the constituents are not represented like they used to be and that's a real concern?

property being developed. Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, explained that many committee chairmen decline to hold hearings on bills if they know it won't pass their committee, and Magic Valley legislators don't always agree with other lawmakers.

"The fact is that people come to the Legislature with different perspectives from their own constituency," Hartgen said.

However, the business community would like to see more of those discussions happen in public, said Shawn Barigar, president and CEO of the Twin Falls Chamber.

"It never even gets to the point to have the discussion," he said.

Co-owner Todd Molitor said trucks from the two firms will no longer drive routes on the same streets, thus saving costs.


"We have so many synergies," he said. "This has been a work in progress."

Boredom, Discontent Set in among Kony Hunters

DJEMA, Central African Republic • An Internet campaign that's gone viral aims to capture notorious rebel leader Joseph Kony, but Ugandan foot soldiers who have spent years searching for the man are starting to ask a question their top commanders prefer to ignore: Is it possible he is dead?

Ugandan army officials say the Lord's Resistance Army leader is alive and hiding somewhere within the Central

African Republic. Rank-andfile soldiers, however, say intelligence on Kony is so limited that if he dies, or is already dead, his foes might never know and could wind up chasing a ghost through this vast Central Africa jungle.

In interviews last week with an Associated Press reporter who trekked with them in the jungle, soldiers in one of many Kony-hunting squads said their task in the Central African Republic could no longer be described as a manhunt. The soldiers, who requested anonymity for fear of punishment, said for years there has been no LRA presence in the areas they patrol.

The soldiers are growing increasingly disillusioned, complaining of boredom and having to carry around heavy guns they never expect to use.

"Our commanders don't want you to know the truth," one of them said on the banks of the Vovodo river, his colleagues nodding in approval. "They want to keep us here, but up to now our squad has never come across any rebels."

Top Military Officers Targeted in Syria

BEIRUT • The gunmen walked into an apartment building before dawn earlier this month in the quiet Damascus suburb of Jaramana, went to the fifth floor and knocked on the door. When the police

commander opened up, the

men shot him dead and left.

Syrian President Bashar Assad's opponents appear to be resorting increasingly to assassinations of loyalist military officers in an escalation of their campaign to bring down the regime. At least 10 senior officers, including several generals, have been gunned down in the past three months, many of them as they left their homes in the morning to head to their posts.

The latest occurred Tuesday, when attackers shot and killed a retired lieutenant colonel and his brother, a chief warrant officer, at a home supplies store in another suburb of the capital, according to the state news agency. Elsewhere in Damascus, an intelligence officer was killed, opposition activists

Such targeted slayings are rising as an intensified crackdown by regime forces in recent months has dealt heavy setbacks to Syria's rebels. For the moment, Assad's troops have shattered the rebels' strategy of trying to seize ground in several cities and provinces.

Their pace appears to have accelerated even more sharply since a cease-fire plan brokered by U.N. and Arab League envoy Kofi Annan went into effect April 12 – and just as quickly began to unravel.

The peace plan was meant to halt 13 months of violence by government forces to put down an anti-Assad uprising in which the U.N. says more than 9,000 people have died. A spokesman for Annan said in Geneva that satellite imagery and other credible reports show Syria has failed to withdraw all its heavy weapons from populated areas as required by the cease-fire deal.

Senators were scheduled to vote on a final measure as early as today.

"Protecting our rural post offices is about more than just maintaining brick and mortar — our post offices are the lifeblood for towns across our state and a source of good-paying jobs in areas hard-hit by the economic downturn," said Claire Mc-Caskill, D-Mo., who cosponsored the amendment, which was agreed to by voice vote. "This amendment protects rural post offices, with a realistic eye toward the future."

The mail agency, teetering on the brink of bankruptcy, says it needs to begin closing thousands of low-revenue post offices and mail processing centers this year as part of a billion-dollar costcutting effort to become profitable again by 2015. Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe previously agreed to delay post office closings until May 15 to allow Congress

to pass legislation. At stake are more than

100,000 jobs, part of a postal cost-cutting plan to save some \$6.5 billion a year by closing up to 252 mail-processing centers and 3,700 post offices. But many local communities worry about layoffs, raising the ire of lawmakers in an election year.

Much of the Senate debate on Tuesday centered on finding ways to provide additional layers of protections to communities affected by potential closings. Bigger proposals that would have forced an immediate move to fiveday-a-week mail delivery or establish an independent commission to make wideranging decisions on cuts and closings, were voted down.

The amendments approved Tuesday would:

 Delay closing of mail facilities until after the November elections to prevent disruption in states that heavily rely on voting by mail. The Postal Service had previously indicated that it would avoid most closings until after the election.

• Allow the Postal Regulatory Commission to veto any proposed postal closing that did not meet set criteria.

• Cap spending on government conferences and require all of the information to be posted on the Internet. The amendment, offered by Sen. Tom Coburn, R-Okla., was approved on voice vote following the scandal over a federal agency spending hundreds of thousands of dollars at a training conference in Las Vegas.

The main postal bill seeks to cut about half the number of mail processing centers the Postal Services currently wants to close - from 252 to 125 – allowing more U.S. areas to maintain overnight first-class mail delivery for at least three more years. Beyond the one-year moratorium on closing rural post offices, the Postal Service would be required to undergo additional layers of approval before closing any mail facility.

In the meantime, the Postal Service would get a cash infusion of roughly \$11 billion, basically a refund of overpayments it made in previous years to a federal retirement fund; the agency could use the money to pay down debt and offer buyouts to 100,000 postal employees



A Cake that Takes Mom on a Tropical Taste Trip

You may not be able to jet Mom off to a tropical island to show your love, but you can at least give her a tropical treat.

The flavors in this cake will remind her of sitting on a beach, sipping a pina colada and being fanned with palm fronds. We start with a banana flavored cake, then layer it with coconut cream and fresh pineapple. You end up with a fantastic presentation and tropical getaway flavor almost as rich as those plane tickets she deserves.

Most grocers carry fresh pineapple that's been peeled and cored and is easy to slice into rings. If you can only find whole pineapples, here's how to do it. First, slice off the top and bottom of the pineapple. Using a paring knife, peel the outer scaly layer from the pineapple. For the prettiest

rings, first cut the pineapple into slices, then use a small round cookie cutter or a paring knife to cut the round core out of the center.

Our recipe calls for caramelizing the pineapple rings, but the cake is just as delicious if you use the fresh pineapple as is.

Banana Colada

Start to finish: 2 hours (45 minutes active). Servings: 12.

For the cake:

2 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon baking soda Pinch of nutmeg Pinch of allspice 1 1/4 cups packed light brown sugar

1 cup sour cream 6 tablespoons (3/4 stick) unsalted butter, very soft 4 very ripe bananas, mashed

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

For the filling: 14-ounce can light coconut

2 egg yolks

1 whole egg 1/3 cup sugar

1/4 cup cornstarch 1 fresh pineapple, peeled, cored and sliced into

1 cup heavy cream Toasted coconut, to garnish

1/4-inch rings

Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Spray two 9-inch cake pans with baking

In a small bowl, sift together the flour, salt, baking soda, nutmeg and allspice. Set aside.

In a large bowl, combine the brown sugar, sour cream and butter. Use an electric mixer to beat until smooth. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, scraping the bowl after each addition. Beat in the bananas and vanilla extract. Sift the flour mixture into the wet ingredients, then stir to combine. Divide the mixture evenly between the prepared cake pans. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted at the center comes out clean. Let cool for 5 minutes and then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

While the cake is cooking, start the filling. In a medium saucepan over medium heat, bring the coconut milk to a simmer.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the egg yolks, whole egg, sugar and cornstarch. Using a ladle, slowly pour a stream of the hot coconut milk into the bowl of eggs while whisking continuously. Repeat with 2 more ladles of hot coconut milk.

Switch to whisking the coconut milk in the pan and slowly pour the warmed egg mixture back into the pan. Continuing whisking and cooking over medium heat until the mixture comes to a boil and thickens, about 2 minutes. Remove from the heat.

Pour the coconut mixture back into the bowl and cover with plastic wrap, pressing the plastic wrap directly onto the surface of the filling. Refrigerate until completely chilled.

To caramelize the pineapple, heat a saute pan over medium-high. Working in batches, place a couple

pineapple rings in the pan and cook until starting to brown, about 2 to 3 minutes per side. Remove the rings to a plate and let cool. Repeat with the remaining pineapple rings until they are all caramelized.

Once all parts of the cake are ready and cooled, assemble the cake.

In a large bowl, use an electric mixer to beat the heavy cream until soft peaks form.

Whisk the chilled coconut filling until smooth. Fold half of the whipped cream into the filling. Once fully incorporated, fold in the remaining half, folding just until incorporated.

Place one of the cakes on a serving platter and spread half of the coconut cream over the top of it. Top with half of the pineapple rings, then set the second cake over that. Top the second cake with the remaining filling, then the remaining pineapple rings. Sprinkle with toasted coconut. A SOPHISTICATED COOK

Don't worry about underbaking: That's exactly what you want to do for this sophisticated-tasting cookie. It should be soft in the center, slightly browned and a little crunchy around the edges. The original recipe called for candied yuzu, an Asian citrus fruit, but grated lime zest is a fine substitute.

The dough needs to be refrigerated for at least 1 hour and up to a day in advance; allow to warm a little before slicing or it will crumble. The cookies are best served on the day they're baked but can be stored in an airtight container for up to 3 days. Adapted from "Pierre Herme Pastries," by Pierre Herme (Stewart, Tabori & Chang, 2012).

Sable Azur

Makes about 60 cookies.

4 teaspoons finely grated lime zest or chopped candied yuzu (may sub stitute any citrus zest or candied citrus)

5 ounces bittersweet chocolate, 60 to 64 percent cacao (preferably Valrhona) 1 1/2 cups flour

1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa powder 1 teaspoon baking soda

10 tablespoons (1 stick plus 2 tablespoons) unsalted butter, at room temperature

1/4 cup superfine sugar 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar 1/2 teaspoon fleur de sel de

Guerande, or other fine sea salt

Chop the chocolate fine, so that the largest pieces

are no bigger than 1/4 inch; smaller is better.

baking soda together into a medium bowl. In the bowl of a stand mixer or hand-held mixer at medium-high speed, beat the butter, sugars and salt until light and fluffy, 3 or 4 minutes. Reduce the speed to low and gradually add the flour mixture, beating until incorporated and stopping to scrape down the sides of the bowl if needed. Add the zest or yuzu and the chopped chocolate, and mix briefly to combine. The dough might seem crumbly; that's okay.

Sift the flour, cocoa and

Divide the dough into 3 equal pieces and shape each into a cylinder about 1 inch in diameter and 10 inches long. If the dough is dry, press it together firmly. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 1 hour or up to 1 day.

Preheat the oven to 365 degrees, or preheat a convection oven to 340 degrees. **Line two** baking sheets

with parchment paper. Slice the chilled cylinders into 1/2-inch-thick rounds. As you cut them, arrange them in staggered rows about 2 inches apart on the baking sheets. Bake for 6 to 8 minutes, until the edges have begun to brown lightly but the centers are still slightly soft. Transfer the baking sheets to wire racks for 3 minutes, then transfer the cookies to wire racks to cool completely before storing in an airtight container.

year to just 17 million pounds in 2010. It recovered slightly last year, and strong prices and new varieties that hold the promise of bigger harvests have farmers hopeful again.

"We probably hit our bottom, and now, we're finally starting to bounce back," said Bill Middleton, 62, who operates an asparagus nursery and grows asparagus near Pasco in Washington's Columbia River basin. "Prices are good. De-

mand is good. It's too early

to tell," he said, "but the indications are that we'll have a strong year."

For an industry on the verge of disappearing, 2010 marked a rock-bottom year, said Alan Schreiber of the Washington Asparagus Commission. But in the past two years, he said, asparagus growers have halted promotions early because demand for fresh asparagus has been so high that it's all been sold.

To meet that demand, Washington farmers planted more new asparagus fields this year than the state has seen in a decade. In all, they are expected to plant slightly more than

6,000 acres, an improvement from two years ago, when they planted about 5,500 but nowhere near the 30,000 acres planted in 1990.

"After a decade of malaise, retrenchment, maybe even collapse - I don't know what you want to call it — we're seeing planting," Schreiber said. "It's not a turnaround, but it's a good sign."

Growers in California, where the asparagus season typically runs from Mid-March through June, are replacing old plants with new ones but don't expect to add a lot of acres, said Cherie Watte Angulo, executive di-

rector of the California Asparagus Commission.

Some in the industry credit Americans' efforts to eat healthier with the increased demand for asparagus. Others say a price drop caused by a bumper crop in Mexico this winter enticed more people to buy fresh asparagus.

"I'm sure a lot of consumers may have even tried asparagus for the first time," said Phil Clouse of Gourmet Trading Co. of Los Angeles, which packages and distributes fresh fruit and vegetables.

"Cast iron is good to use because the heat spreads out through it. Don't use a nonstick pan because the focused heat will simply burn right through and ruin it," he said.

A few minutes later and the small crowd gathered for a solar cooking demonstration at the CSI campus on Friday was ready to try out the tacos. Tortillas came from a makeshift warmer, built with aluminum duct work and a glass top.

"Sitting on the asphalt the warmer can reach about 200 degrees," said CSI environmental technology student Justin Waddell, who built the small box.

Waddell said he enjoyed learning how to build solar cookers during class and liked the thought of cooking without another fuel source.

"It's simple and you don't need wood for a fire or propane for the stove or electricity," Waddell said. "You just need the sun and a way to trap heat and you can cook anything you would on the stove or oven with a solar cooker."

Although solar ovens can be built cheaply, they do take some practice. Nan Jackson, owner of Surviving in Style in Twin Falls, attempted creating a pizzabox oven to bake chocolate chip cookies on Friday.

"My sister told me about this style of oven, but you can also find a lot of designs online," Jackson said.

She wrapped the inside of a cardboard take-out box with aluminum foil and placed a sheet of black paper on the top of the box.

"They didn't turn out," Jackson said of her first cookie attempt. "It didn't get hot enough ... but I'll keep practicing."

Jackson also cooks in a store-bought solar oven. On Friday, she heated soup

her store, which carries the oven for sale. Selling for about \$350, it's essentially a black box with fold-out reflectors that reflect the sun's rays into the oven. A glass lid helps capture heat.

"The stove, sitting on the black asphalt, reaches 375 degrees," she said.

Like many of her customers, Jackson is comforted by knowing she can cook for her family in the event that disaster strikes and power is lost.

"You shouldn't buy one and then simply put it away until disaster happens. You should know how to use it so you are prepared," Jackson said. "There is a learning curve."

Roger Hinton, 48, of Twin Falls, bought a solar oven some 20 years ago after seeing one in a magazine advertisement.

"I thought it would be a hoot," Hinton said. "Anything you cook in a stove you can make in the solar oven."

Hinton takes his oven on annual elk hunting trips; the first time he pulled it

out the other guys in camp poked fun.

"Once we were eating a hot meal they didn't think it was so bad," he said. He simply places meat with potatoes and carrots into a glass baking dish and lets the oven sit in the sun all


Steven and Renee Feil of Buhl have enjoyed their solar oven as well.

They bought a unit a few years ago, and although they simply enjoy cooking in it the Feils said they're also comforted in knowing they are prepared for disaster.

"Even in the summer, I enjoy a baked potato and hot meal," said Renee, 50. "We can place a meal in the cooker and at the end of the day it's done ... The best part is that I'm not roasting my kitchen and heating the entire house at the same time."

"If it's not cloudy or windy out we have the solar oven going," said Steven, 53.

Chard: What It Is and How to Use It

It's a beet, minus the root.

Which doesn't make sense. Except it does. Because it's chard, one of a growing number of common, yet often overlooked greens lurking at your gro-

Chard – sometimes called Swiss chard or rainbow chard (when it sports brightly colored stalks) really is a relative of the beet. But unlike traditional beets — which put their energy into producing finger-staining roots — chard instead produces big, tender leaves and crunchy

Chard has been around for thousands of years and likely originated in the Mediterranean, where it was in heavy culinary rotation until spinach came along.

The taste depends on which part you eat, though not so much on which color. The large, firm leaves are mild, sweet, earthy and just slightly bitter; on the whole, it's a bit milder than spinach. The stalks — which can be white, yellow, red, purple, pink, striped, and so on resemble flat celery with a sweet taste slightly reminiscent of beets.

Why is it sometimes called Swiss chard? No one knows. But we do know it has nothing to do with Switzerland.

When shopping for chard, look for bright, firm leaves



and stalks. Wrapped in plastic and refrigerated, it will keep for two to four days.

How do you use it? The simple explanation is to use the leaves as you would spinach, and use the stalks as you would asparagus. But I tend to think that oversimplifies. It also requires that you treat chard as two separate vegetables — the greens and the stalks.

And there's just no way I'm separating my greens into two parts for different cooking. Who has that sort of time?

I prefer to roughly chop the leaves and finely chop the thicker stalks; this helps the two parts cook in about the same time. And I enjoy the contrast between the more tender leaves and crunchier stalks.

Generally, any flavor that works well with spinach will partner with chard, including butter, lemon, cream, garlic, shallots and vinaigrette. In fact, if you do nothing more than briefly steam or saute chopped chard, then toss it with any (or any combination) of those, you'll have a great side dish.

In Spain and Portugal, for example, chard is sauteed with olive oil, garlic, pine nuts and sometimes raisins, then dressed with lemon juice.

Wake Mom to Freshly Baked Pastries on Mother's Day

No matter how much she would appreciate it, and no matter how much you love your mom — or the mother of your children - you aren't likely to make her croissants from scratch.

Add eager young children who want to help make breakfast in bed for their mom, and the odds get even worse.

And yet it can be done with a minimum of fuss, trouble and time. With a few carefully chosen ingredients, you can prepare delicious impossibleto-mess-up freshly baked pastries, even with the "assistance" of an army of little helpers.

The trick is to outsource the pastry. While technically not the same as true croissant dough, sheets of frozen puff pastry can stand in just fine. They are widely available in the dessert freezer section of most grocers. And, if you care, the dough also happens to be vegan (try that with your typical buttery croissant).

Each 17.3-ounce package of pastry contains two sheets. To use them, simply thaw (don't unwrap them) at room temperature for an hour or so, or overnight in the refrigerator. After that, it's just a matter of cutting each sheet into triangles, then rolling them into

For this recipe, I kept it simple and sprinkled them with a blend of cinnamon sugar. You also could place a dollop of jam at the wide end of each triangle of dough before rolling.

Want to take it all the way? Make croissant's delicious cousin, pain au chocolat. For this, you will want to buy chocolate bars made for this purpose (baking supply shops should have these, as does King Arthur Flour Co. online). Then just wrap the thawed pastry around them (think sandwich wrap), then bake.

Or for the best of both worlds, bake the croissants as directed below, then warm a bit of Nutella chocolate hazelnut spread (microwave it in 10-second bursts) and drizzle it over them just before serving (or offer it in a small bowl on the side for dunking).

The croissants also can be cut and shaped the night before, then placed on a baking sheet, covered with plastic wrap and refrigerated.

Cinnamon Sugar Croissants

To keep the finished croissants vegan, you can substitute a few spritzes of cooking spray for the melted butter. If you like, you also can glaze the croissants after they have baked and cooled. Stir together powdered sugar, a few drops of vanilla or almond extract, and a splash of milk (just enough to make a smooth drizzle). Start to finish: 40 minutes. Makes 24 croissants.

2 teaspoons cinnamon 1/4 cup sugar

Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. In a small bowl, mix together the cinnamon and sugar. Set aside.

One at a time, unwrap and unfold the sheets of puff pastry. Use a paring knife to cut the sheet in half lengthwise. Starting in one corner, cut each half into 6 triangles. Use a rolling pin to lightly roll out each triangle to just barely flatten. Lightly brush the triangles with melted butter.

Sprinkle a bit of the cinnamon sugar over each triangle. One at a time, start with the wide end of each triangle and roll it into a log. Gently bend the ends so they curve inward to form a crescent. Transfer to the prepared baking

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Blancmange **Boasts Delicate Almond Flavor**

Blancmange is an ancient food that some say is the precursor to Italy's panna cotta. (The two are nearly identical.) It began as a savory dish but over centuries morphed into the sweet, custardy dessert we know today. This version has a delicate almond flavor with undertones of citrus. Serve it with a colorful combination of fresh berries, kiwi, mango or other fruit.

You might stretch your culinary abilities a bit with this recipe, in a good way. Making almond milk and working with gelatin involve useful skills that any adventurous cook will want to have. Storebought almond milk is not a substitute.

Adapted from "Pierre Herme Pastries," by Pierre Herme (Stewart, Tabori & Chang, 2012).

Blancmange

6 servings.

- 1 scant cup still mineral
- 1/2 cup superfine sugar 2 vanilla beans


Question: I recently saw a recipe that called for boursin cheese. What is that? And since the recipe didn't specify a flavor, which one should I get?

Dinner in 20 Minutes: Mint Makes this Beef

With the suggested number of peppers, Spicy Mint Beef lives up to its name. But it could easily be toned down for those who live on the mild side.

This recipe is from Food Network megastar Giada De Laurentiis' new book, "Weeknights With Giada" (Clarkson Potter).

Tossing in Thai basil and mint at the end makes the dish. Black soy sauce and/or sweet soy sauce are available at Asian markets. If they aren't easy for you to track down, De Laurentiis suggests using instead 1/4 cup soy sauce with 1/4 cup honey or sugar whisked in.

Serve with instant brown

Spicy Mint Beef

4 servings.

One-pound piece sirloin steak

4 cloves garlic

3 small shallots

3 Thai (bird's-eye) red chili peppers or small serrano peppers

1 medium (4 ounces) red bell pepper 3 tablespoons vegetable or

canola oil 3 tablespoons fish sauce

2 tablespoons sweet soy sauce

2 tablespoons black soy sauce

1 tablespoon Sriracha (hot chili sauce)

1 1/2 cups packed (about 2.4 ounces) Thai (purple)

1 cup packed (.66 ounces; 1 clamshell pack) mint

Place the steak in the freezer while you prep the other ingredients. (This will make the meat easier to cut.) Mince the garlic cloves. Cut the shallots crosswise into

very thin slices. Stem and seed the Thai or serrano peppers, then cut crosswise into very thin slices. Stem and seed the red bell pepper, then cut into very thin strips. Cut the steak crosswise into very thin slices.

Heat the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat, until the oil shimmers. Add the garlic and the small peppers; stir-fry for about 30 seconds, until they are fragrant, then add the shallots and bell pepper. Stir-fry for 1 minute, then add the fish sauce, sweet soy sauce, black soy sauce and Sriracha. Reduce the heat to medium; cook

for 2 minutes, stirring often, until the vegetables are tender.

Increase the heat to medi-

um-high; add the meat and cook for 5 to 7 minutes, stirring a few times, or until just cooked through. While the meat is cooking, coarsely chop the Thai basil and mint leaves (together is fine).

Remove the skillet from the heat; stir in the basil and mint until they are just wilted. Divide among individual bowls or plates; serve warm.

Never open the oven door when a sponge cake is baking; because it has no leavening, the cake will collapse.

Preheat the oven to 340 degrees. Use butter to grease an 8-inch tube or Bundt cake pan with a capacity of 12 cups. Sprinkle with potato flour, then invert the pan and tap sharply to remove any ex-

Place the sugar in the bowl of a stand mixer or hand-held electric mixer. Split the vanilla beans in half lengthwise, scrape out the seeds and add them to the sugar. Add the egg yolks. Beat at mediumhigh speed until pale and fluffy, about 4 minutes, stopping to scrape the sides of the bowl as needed. Your goal is to beat as much air into the mixture as possible.

Sift the flours together into a medium bowl.

Beat the egg whites and $\,$ salt in the bowl of a stand mixer or hand-held electric mixer first at medium speed, then at high speed until the whites form stiff peaks. Use a flexible spatula to delicately fold the egg whites into the sugar-andyolk mixture, then carefully fold in the sifted flours, deflating the whites as little as possible.

Pour the batter into the

prepared pan to come twothirds of the way up the side. Bake for 45 to 50 minutes. Check for doneness by inserting the tip of a small knife in the center; it should come out clean. Cut the limes in half, then squeeze the juice from both halves into the bowl (with the minced ingredients) to yield 2 tablespoons. Add the fish sauce, rice wine vinegar, sake, mirin and the remaining 2 tablespoons of water; stir to form a sauce. NEW YORK • The haul in free agency and through trades has strengthened the Broncos, Bills and Bears. Now comes the lifeblood of any NFL team: the draft.

Denver merely landed the best quarterback ever to hit free agency, Peyton Manning. Buffalo homed in on one player to be a difference maker, 2006 top overdraft pick Mario Williams, and signed him before his only visit to a team ended. Chicago dealt for the No. 1 receiver it lacked, getting Brandon Marshall, and bolstered its roster by signing running back Michael Bush and even a quality backup quarterback behind the injuryprone Jay Cutler in Jason Campbell.

Those moves make all three franchises, none of which had a winning record in 2011 - yes, we know, the Broncos won the pitiful AFC West at 8-8 – more viable contenders.

Since taking the permanent role, Anderson has already hit the ground running. "The thing he's doing right out of the gates is he's

here two nights a week working with the younger kids," said Burley athletic director Gordon Kerbs. "We're fortunate to have him. He stepped up when we were in need and proved he can do a good job for us. I'm excited that he is interested in the program and wants to see it be successful. I think he's a good fit for what we want to do."

Anderson expects a challenge, as Burley wrestling has deteriorated in recent years and finished last season with only nine varsity wrestlers in the program.

"With that atrophy that has occurred here in Burley, I don't foresee turning it around in one season," Anderson said. "It's going to be a work in progress. ... It's not all about the number of kids, but we're looking for those boys who are willing to step up and work to become better athletes. As individuals they need to get better every time they step on the mat and as a team we need to get better."

Anderson attended high school in Rawlins, Wyo., before earning his associate's degree at Ricks College (now BYU-Idaho) and a bachelor's from the University of Wyoming. He began wrestling in the fourth grade, wrestled through high school and briefly at Ricks.



"I think it had a lot of impact on us really," Nix added of putting Williams, end Mark Anderson (another free agency signing), and incumbent tackles Kyle Williams and Marcell Dareus together. "Therefore, we're a little freer as far as who we pick (10th overall)."

Offensive line could be where the Bills go with that selection. It's also what the Bears might address at 19th overall. They've already upgraded their receiving corps and depth in the backfield, and the defense is solid.



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



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When China ZH and Indonesia met in the first phase of the Yeh Brothers Cup, both were on the cusp of qualifying for the top group; but one bad match by either could drop that team into the Swiss. This deal cost the Chinese dearly.

In one room, the Chinese East came in over a no-trump opening to show the minors and bought an exceptionally poor dummy in three clubs doubled. Though he was allowed to escape for down two, minus 300 was not a great score.

In the room shown, declarer, Zhuang Zejun, received a diamond lead and ducked it to the queen. Back came a club won in dummy. Declarer led a low trump to the queen and ace, then played a heart to the nine and East's king. When a second club came back, declarer won in hand and played a third club, planning to pitch a diamond and crossruff. However, West ruffed in, leaving declarer with an inevitable trump and diamond loser.

Had declarer run the heart eight, covered by West, before playing the club, he would have been much better placed. He leads out the spade jack, then the 10, which West must duck, or declarer can draw trump, cash the club winner, then take the heart finesse.

When both trumps are ducked, declarer changes tack and plays the diamond ace, ruffs a heart to hand, and leads the club queen to pitch dummy's diamond, leaving West with just his master trump.
