The Honor No Soldier Seeks

Ceremonies like the one that brought home Sgt. Workman help families begin to grieve.

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EAGLE • The death of a fallen soldier becomes real to mothers, fathers, spouses and children the moment their fingers touch the flag-draped coffin on the tarmac at Boise's Gowen Field.

The ceremony is called an "honorable transfer" and it's carried out in Idaho and across the nation when the military turns over the body of a fallen service

member to loved ones, said Chaplain (Maj.) Rob Morris.

"Once they make contact with the casket, they know their loved one is in there," Morris said. "That's when their fears become real, knowing it is their son or husband. That's when the shock hits — that reality — that he's in there."

On Monday, silver clouds drizzled a requiem for Army Sgt. Chris Workman as Morris escorted family members to that mo-

ment, choreographed with military precision.

Workman, 33, a Minico High School graduate, was killed in a helicopter crash April 19 in Afghanistan on a mission with three other crewman to rescue a wounded Afghan police officer.

Workman is at least the 62nd Idahoan who has died in the war on terror since Sept. 11, 2001.

On Monday, soldiers and family waited in silence as Workman's

MURTAUGH SHOOTING VICTIMS IDENTIFIED

The Murtaugh man killed was 42-year-old Jose Luis Mucio-Olayo.

TWIN FALLS • Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb has released names of three men involved in an April 24 shooting near Murtaugh.

Murtaugh resident Jose Luis Mucio-Olayo, 42, died from his injuries due to gunshot wounds while being transported by air ambulance to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center, Loeb said. Javier Carbajal-Galvan, 27, also of Murtaugh, was severely injured and is still in intensive care at St. Luke's with gunshot wounds.

Edgar T. Garcia, 23, of Burley, was shot in the wrist during the incident and drove himself to Cassia Regional Medical Center in Burley the night of the shooting. He was treated and released, Loeb said, adding that Garcia is not in custody, as his office had no reason to arrest him as of Monday.

The names of the men were not released earlier due to the process of identifying Mucio-Olayo and notifying his family of his death.

"It wasn't an easy notification," Loeb said.

Carbajal-Galvan's injuries made communication difficult, which also delayed notifying the man's family of his injuries.

Neither of the surviving men have been arrested nor charged in the shooting.

Several agencies met Monday morning to discuss details in the case. There are still a few things to track down before charges are made, but Loeb said he hopes to bring charges up in the case sometime this week.

"The question at the center of the investigation is who did what and when," Loeb said Friday. "Once we've got the answer to that question, it will answer all these other questions."

None of the men appear to have extensive criminal records in Idaho. Carbajal-Galvan pleaded guilty in July 2007 to an amended charge of misdemeanor domestic battery in Jerome County. He was originally charged with felony domestic battery, injury to a child, and aggravated assault in that case.

In January Mucio-Olayo had an infraction in Jerome County for being a passenger with an open container in a vehicle. An online search of court records for Garcia did not bring up any cases that could be matched to him.

Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies responded to reports of shots fired at 4809 E. 2900 N. at 8:52 p.m. April 24. Deputies arrived to the scene to find two men with gunshot wounds and a Chevrolet Suburban fully engulfed in flames. Officials have not released further details of the shooting incident.

P&Z Member Challenges Incumbent for Jerome Co. Seat

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JEROME • Sam Harris, who has business management and government experience, is challenging incumbent Jerome County Commissioner Cathy Roemer for her District 3 seat in the May 15 Republican primary.

Meanwhile, incumbent Jerome County Commissioner Roger Morley is unopposed for the District 1 spot because his only opponent in the primary, Larrey Anderson, withdrew from the race, according to the Jerome County Clerk's Office.

Morley and the winner of the District 3 race are so far unopposed in the November general election. The four-year commissioner position pays about \$19,000 annually.

Harris has been a member of the Jerome County Planning and Zoning Commission for eight years, and is currently helping revise the county's comprehensive plan. He would like to see more industry come to the county, but says it's important to preserve agricultural land.

"We have plenty of ground set aside for commercial use"

Donabedian Pleads Guilty to Charges

The Jerome man could spend 24 years in prison for his role in the March 2011 burglary of a Dietrich home.

The last of four suspects in a March 2011 home invasion in Dietrich pleaded guilty Friday.

Aaron Donabedian was scheduled to face a jury trial today, but pleaded guilty in Lincoln County 5th District Court.

Donabedian, 23, and three others were accused of holding David and Colleen Conner at gunpoint in their home in the early hours of March 9, 2011, while taking items from the house.

David Conner told police that one suspect took his shotgun, bound him with rope and placed him on the kitchen floor. Meanwhile, the suspects forced Colleen Conner to find money and other valuables.

Donabedian was charged with burglary, two counts of robbery and two counts of aiding and abetting in second-degree kidnapping with a weapons enhancement. In a separate case also related to the home invasion, Donabedian is charged with conspiracy to commit grand theft.

On Friday, he pleaded guilty to amended charges of aiding and abetting in burglary and aiding and abetting in grand theft.

The maximum penalty for aiding in a burglary is 10 years in prison and a \$50,000 fine, while the maximum for aiding in grand theft is 14 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

In a plea deal reached with prosecutors, Donabedian will ask Judge John Butler to give him a minimum 10-year prison sentence, leaving him free to argue for parole during the remaining potential 14 years.

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Hunger Grew in Idaho in 2010

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TWIN FALLS • Close to 17 percent of Idahoans didn't know where to find their next meal in 2010, a new study shows.

The total increased from 2009, showing the effects of lingering recession for many residents across the state, reported Feeding America, the nation's largest food-aid organization that conducted the study.

This is the second year that Feeding America has measured the amount of people facing food insecurity on a state and county level.

For the Magic Valley, both Lincoln and Camas counties continued to top the list, with almost 18 percent of the population facing some sort of food insecurity in 2010.

Jerome County, at 14 percent, saw the most growth in food insecurity, its almost 3,200 affected residents ris-

ing by about 400 from the year before. None of the south-central counties saw a significant decrease.

"It's not getting better," said Leanne Trappen, community services director for South Central Community Action Partnership. "A low unemployment rate isn't the only indicator that we're out of the recession. We have to look at poverty. Poverty and hunger go hand in hand."

Trappen said SCCAP has

increased its number of emergency food distribution spots over the past year to try to provide better access to food in rural areas. Just last month, the low-income assistance nonprofit distributed close to \$40,000 in emergency meals.

"We're there because there is an obvious need," she said.

The study also concluded that the average cost of a meal rose in many south-central

counties at the same time it declined for the state as a whole.

For example, the average cost of a meal in Gooding County shot up from about \$2.55 to about \$2.75. It's only a 20-cent difference, but when added up three times a day for the rest of the year, the total increase per person is nearly \$220.

"People are still making tough choices," Trappen said. "It's making a choice between paying your power

casket was removed from a charter jet at Gowen Field. The family permitted reporters to watch the ceremony, but asked not to be interviewed.

Honoring Sacrifice

Focusing on protocol honors the sacrifice, Morris said, and families find solace in the ritual.

"When the family feels the loved one is being honored and they are being honored," said Morris, "they know their country has not forgotten them."

The protocol starts with notification. The military notifies all requested family members before the Department of Defense releases information about the death to the public.

"When they are first notified, it is denial," Morris said. "They don't accept the fact the loved one is dead."

A casualty assistance officer is assigned to the family to help with arrangements, paperwork, survivor benefits and return of personal belongings, said Col. Tim Marsano, Idaho Guard spokesman.

"They are well trained," Marsano said.

When an Idaho soldier dies overseas, their bodies are first sent to Dover Air Force Base in Delaware. Family members often are flown to Dover to meet the plane.

Specialists are on hand to help the families. "They get into the grieving process at

Dover," said Morris.

Morris has been on hand for more than a dozen such honorable transfer ceremonies at Gowen Field.

"There is a synergy of emotional connection ... that you can't describe for those three minutes when you are at the coffin," Morris said. "It is a unique moment."

Back to 'Regular Life'

On Monday, Morris read Psalm 23 for Workman's family. A military honor guard in full dress uniform transferred the casket into a private hearse.

Police and patriot riders escorted the family to the funeral home.

Many of the families share similar experiences, Morris said. For example, after funerals and burials, extended family members and friends go back to regular life.

That leaves parents, spouses and children in a "time of isolation and they feel extremely alone," Morris said. "Then it is just them picking up the pieces."

So the military came up with a survivors outreach program that networks families of military casualties. They meet on a regular basis to give support and encouragement.

As U.S. military actions in Iraq and Afghanistan wind down, hopes rise for fewer casualties from Idaho and other states.

"Hopefully Sgt. Workman will be the last," Morris said. "I keep saying that with each one."

Jerome Man to Serve up to 10 Years for Meth Trafficking

TWIN FALLS • A Jerome man will face at least three years in prison for trafficking in methamphetamine.

Edgar Raul Aguilar-Bautista, 24, was sentenced April 18 to spend three to 10 years in prison and must pay \$10,265.50 in fines.

Aguilar-Bautista was originally charged with three counts of trafficking after Idaho State Police detectives used a confidential informant to buy meth three times in August 2011.

Prosecutors later dropped two of those charges.

Narcotics detectives seized nearly 175 grams of meth during the investigation.

Two buys were made in Jerome before a third arranged buy resulted in Aguilar-Bautista's arrest in Twin Falls. The ISP report notes that the informant carried documented cash during each buy and walked away with meth sold by Aguilar-Bautista.

The first buy occurred on Aug. 3 at the Jerome Dairy Queen, where the inform-

ant brought \$2,600 — half for a drug debt and half for meth. Detectives seized 29.5 grams from the buy. The second instance happened at Roberto's Mexican Food restaurant in Jerome, and \$1,300 was swapped for 28 grams.

The third buy was arranged for the parking lot of Sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls. The informant was to buy 114.8 grams with \$5,500. ISP was joined by multiple local jurisdictions for the final seizure and arrest.

Twin Falls Residents Injured in Burley Crash

BURLEY • Two Twin Falls residents were injured Monday in a two-vehicle crash on Burley's Overland Avenue.

Dan K. Leigh, 66, and passenger Linda F. Leigh, 61, were both taken to Cassia Regional Medical Center in Burley after Dan Leigh failed to heed a stoplight and hit a vehicle turning onto Overland, according to an Idaho State Police report.

According to ISP, Tyann Searle, 21, of Burley, was turning left from Seventh Street onto northbound Overland in a 2006 Pontiac G6 when Leigh's 2007 Dodge Caravan struck its driver's side.

None of the occupants of either car were wearing seat belts, according to ISP. Traffic was restricted along Overland for nearly two hours while crews investigated and cleared the crash.

ROGERSON • A 2-year-old boy wandered about two miles from his home near Rogerson Monday evening, prompting a large search for him.

More than 30 people from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, county Search and Rescue, various fire departments and other agencies helped find the boy, said Lori Stewart, spokeswoman for the sheriff's office. The boy's family realized he was

missing at about 4 p.m., then called for help after they couldn't locate him.

The boy was found just after 7 p.m., Stewart said — thankfully before the weather became a serious concern. He had been outside playing, then wandered away, she said, with different family members thinking he was with others.

The boy walked about two miles, accompanied by a puppy, Stewart said.

"He was a little homesick and a little cold," she said.

without encroaching on agricultural areas, Harris said. "It should stick to the cities where it belongs."

The U.S. Navy veteran, who served two terms in Vietnam, is making his second run at the commission job. He failed in his first attempt six years ago. "I understand the way the county is run," he said of his qualifications, adding that he favors a new jail because of "horrible conditions" in the current facility.

He would like to see a park on the north rim of the Snake River Canyon move forward with walking trails, but no other development.

Roemer points to helping secure a \$100,000 energy grant to upgrade county buildings as one of her accomplishments in office. Roemer also developed the Jerome County Intermodal Commerce Authority, she said.

"I do the research," Roemer said. "I study the issues so I can make an informed decision."

She is the regional representative on the Idaho Sheriff's Association Jail Standards Committee, and said inspections of the Jerome County Jail convinced her that a new jail is needed. "There's no way I would not be on board" with the jail proposal, she said.

Roemer, a former member of the Jerome County Planning and Zoning Commission, said her goal for

the coming years is to bring economic development to Jerome County. In a campaign flyer, she said she is "not afraid to make tough decisions" and has consid-

tently voted to stay within county budget guidelines — including with her own pay.

"This past year I chose not to take the 5 percent salary increase," she added.

Prosecutors will argue Donabedian should spend a minimum of 20 years in prison.

As part of the agreement, Donabedian signed a no-contact order between him and the Connors, including their children and their respective spouses. He also acknowledged he could face up to 24 years in prison.

When the judge asked why he was pleading guilty, Donabedian said he drove the other suspects to and from the crime.

"I didn't know the exact circumstances, but I drove us there and safely away from there. I do feel I took part in that part of the crime," he said at the hearing.

Donabedian also admitted he knew the crimes had been committed and decided to drive back to Twin Falls anyway.

Hall said the man didn’t have a felony record that officers were aware of and they would most likely seek a warrant against him for felony eluding.

Officers who answered the phone at the Jerome police station declined to comment on the incident.

Former Bank Employee Admits to Stealing from Accounts

TWIN FALLS • A former employee of D.L. Evans Bank accused of stealing money from customer accounts has changed her plea to guilty.

Mylyn Rae Rodig, 39, of Twin Falls, pleaded guilty April 23 to a count of theft by unauthorized control or transfer of property with intent of depriving the owner.

According to court documents, on Nov. 16 a senior

loan officer and a vice president from the bank contacted the Twin Falls Police Department to report Rodig, an operations officer at the bank, had been stealing. Rodig was accused of stealing a total of \$19,000 out of two customer accounts over several months.

According to court records, Rodig told police she faced mounting medical bills over the past three years and was afraid of being sent to collections, de-

claring bankruptcy and losing her job.

Police say Rodig completed the withdrawals from the accounts when she worked at the teller line, then put the cash in her purse when she returned to her desk. The transactions allegedly occurred between Dec. 23, 2010, and Sept. 28, 2011.

A jury trial had been scheduled to begin May 2. Now, a sentencing hearing is scheduled for June 25.

13 Seek T.F. City Council Seat

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TWIN FALLS • Thirteen people want to claim the vacant seat on the Twin Falls City Council, including a former councilman and the Idaho Transportation Department’s regional spokesman.

Applicants had seven days to submit letters of interest for the open seat. At a special Twin Falls City Council meeting on Monday, Mayor Greg Lanting addressed concerns raised by the public and council members that seven days wasn’t enough time for people to decide to apply.

Councilwoman Rebecca Mills-Sojka said she had heard speculation from residents who said Lanting

must already have someone in mind for the position.

“I just want to be transparent and open with the community,” she said.

But others on the council argued that the process had been open, and seven days was enough time for the 13 people who had applied.

Applicants include five candidates from the 2011 council race, former councilman Will Kezele, and ITD spokesman Nathan Jerke.

Last week, longtime Councilman Lance Clow announced he was stepping down. Clow is running unopposed for the Idaho House in District 24.

Clow said he encouraged Lanting to fill the position

Number of Newborns With Drug Withdrawal Triples

CHICAGO • Less than a month old, Savannah Dannelley scrunches her tiny face into a scowl as a nurse gently squirts a dose of methadone into her mouth.

The infant is going through drug withdrawal and is being treated with the same narcotic prescribed for her mother to fight addiction to powerful prescription painkillers.

Disturbing new research says the number of U.S. babies born with signs of opiate drug withdrawal has tripled in a decade because of a surge in pregnant women's use of legal and illegal narcotics, including Vicodin, OxyContin and heroin, researchers say. It is the first national study of the problem.

The number of newborns with withdrawal symptoms increased from a little more than 1 per 1,000 babies sent home from the hospital in 2000 to more than 3 per 1,000 in 2009, the study found. More than 13,000 U.S. infants were affected in 2009, the researchers estimated.

Weaning infants from these drugs can take weeks or months and often requires a lengthy stay in intensive care units. Hospital charges for treating these newborns soared from \$190 million to \$720 million between 2000 and 2009, the study found.

The study was released online Monday in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*.

Savannah is hooked up to heart and oxygen monitors in an Oak Lawn, Ill., newborn intensive care unit. In a pink crib, she sleeps fitfully, sometimes cries all night, and has had diarrhea and trouble feeding — typical signs of withdrawal. Some affected babies also have breathing problems, low birth weights and seizures.

Twin Suicide Bombs Exploded Monday. *In fresh attacks on symbols of state power, twin suicide bombs exploded Monday near a government security compound in northern Syria and rockets struck the central bank in Damascus, killing nine people and wounding 100. The regime and the opposition traded blame, accusing each other of dooming a United Nations plan to calm violence that has largely failed so far. The head of the U.N. observer mission acknowledged that his force cannot solve the country's crisis alone and urged both sides to stop fighting. The attacks are the latest in a series of suicide bombings that started in December.*

'Three Cups of Tea' Lawsuit Rejected

HELENA, Mont. • A federal judge on Monday dismissed a civil lawsuit against author Greg Mortenson, calling claims "flimsy and speculative" that the humanitarian and his publisher lied in his best-selling "Three Cups of Tea" and "Stones Into Schools" books to boost sales.

The lawsuit by four people who bought Mortenson's books claimed that they were cheated out of about \$15 each because the books were labeled as non-fiction accounts of how Mortenson came to build schools in central Asia. They had

asked U.S. District Judge Sam Haddon to order Mortenson and publisher Penguin Group (USA) to refund all the money collected from Mortenson's book sales.

The readers from Montana, California and Illinois filed the lawsuit after "60 Minutes" and author Jon Krakauer reported last year that Mortenson fabricated parts of those books.

The plaintiffs said Mortenson, co-author David Oliver Relin, Penguin and Central Asia Institute were involved in a fraud and racketeering conspiracy to build Mortenson into a false hero to sell books and raise money for CAI, the charity Mortenson co-founded.

Haddon wrote in his ruling that their racketeering allegations "are fraught with shortcomings" and the plaintiffs' "overly broad" claims that they bought the books because they were supposed to be true were not supported in the lawsuit.

The ruling is good news for Mortenson and his charity after the Montana attorney general earlier in April announced a \$1 million agreement to settle claims that Mortenson mismanaged the institute and misspent its funds. The agreement removes Mortenson from any financial oversight and overhauls the charity's structure, but it does not address the books' contents.

WASHINGTON • The military is under-reporting the number of times that Afghan soldiers and police open fire on American and other foreign troops.

The U.S.-led coalition routinely reports each time an American or other foreign soldier is killed by an Afghan in uniform. But The Associated Press has learned it does not report insider attacks in which the Afghan wounds — or misses — his U.S. or allied target. It also doesn't report the wounding of troops who were attacked alongside those who were killed.

Such attacks reveal a level of mistrust and ill will between the U.S.-led coalition and its Afghan counterparts in an increasingly unpopular war. The U.S.

and its military partners are working more closely with Afghan troops in preparation for handing off security responsibility to them by the end of 2014.

In recent weeks an Afghan soldier opened fire on a group of American soldiers but missed the group entirely. The Americans quickly shot him to death. Not a word about this was reported by the International Security Assistance Force, or ISAF, as the coalition is formally known. It was disclosed to the AP by a U.S. official who was granted anonymity in order to give a fuller picture of the "insider" problem.

ISAF also said nothing about last week's attack in which two Afghan policemen in Kandahar province fired on U.S. soldiers, wounding two. Reporters learned of it from Afghan officials and from U.S. officials in Washington. The

two Afghan policemen were shot to death by the Americans present.

Just last Wednesday, an attack that killed a U.S. Army special forces soldier, Staff Sgt. Andrew T. Brittonmihalo, 25, of Simi Valley, Calif., also wounded three other American soldiers. The death was reported by ISAF as an insider attack, but it made no mention of the wounded — or that an Afghan civilian also was killed.

The attacker was an Afghan special forces soldier who opened fire with a machine gun at a base in Kandahar province. He was killed by return fire.

That attack apparently was the first by a member of the Afghan special forces, who are more closely vetted than conventional Afghan forces and are often described by American officials as the most effective and reliable in the Afghan military.

Capitol Mystery: Will Secret Service Head Survive?

WASHINGTON • The director of the Secret Service, Mark Sullivan, could have retired from government nearly 10 years ago and avoided the scandals of the White House gate crashers and, more recently, the one involving a dozen agents, officers and supervisors implicated in a prostitution case.

Instead, Sullivan chose to remain in the Secret Service, where he has spent half his life. The question is: Will Sullivan will be allowed to keep his job as the scandal unfolds in coming weeks?

Sullivan, 58, appears to have weathered the storm's early stages, although details are still shaking out and congressional hearings haven't started. He's credited with taking quick disciplinary action and being open about facts in the sordid affair with members of Congress, with whom he has shrewdly cultivated important relationships over the years.

When Sullivan learned April 12 about reports of prostitutes with Secret Service agents, officers and supervisors in Cartagena, he quickly expressed concern about the president's security, according to a senior Secret Service official who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak publicly. Assured there was no threat, Sullivan instructed all the implicated employees to be removed from Colombia.

Later, Sullivan personally called the chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee at home to talk about the investigation. Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., spoke fondly of Sullivan during a subsequent oversight hearing, noting that he has known the director since Sullivan was just a Secret Service agent.

"I think he's doing all he can to ensure a timely and thorough investigation, accountability for behavior that failed to meet the standards he expects, and certainly the standards that the president of the United States and the American people deserve," Leahy said.

There have been only a few signs so far of eroding support. The White House has said the president — who joked in a speech during the weekend about a new curfew for Secret Service agents — remained supportive of Sullivan.

Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, said last week that Sullivan's job could be secure if the scandal were an isolated incident. "But if it goes much deeper, you know, nothing happens or nothing's changed in Washington if heads don't roll," Grassley said.

Invisible Man Casts Shadow over U.S.-China Talks

WASHINGTON • The blind Chinese lawyer at the center of a diplomatic storm between Washington and Beijing is a taboo topic in each capital. Neither side wants the biggest human-rights issue between the two since Tiananmen Square to disrupt high-level strategic and economic talks set to begin on Thursday.

President Barack Obama's administration and China's officials have signaled that the global economy, North Korea, Iran and Sudan — issues in which millions of lives are at stake — have be-

come far more important in U.S.-Chinese relations. Thus, both refuse to admit anything is amiss as a high-profile dissident is believed to be sheltering with U.S. diplomats in China.

To listen to officials in both countries, Chen Guangcheng is an invisible man.

Obama himself refused to address the issue on Monday, declining to confirm that the blind lawyer is under U.S. protection in China or that American diplomats are attempting to negotiate an agreement for him to receive asylum.

"Obviously, I'm aware of the press reports on the situation in China, but I'm not going to make a statement on

the issue," the president said at a joint White House news conference with Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihiko Noda.

He added obliquely, "What I would like to emphasize is that every time we meet with China the issue of human rights comes up."

Speaking later, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, similarly declined to talk about Chen but said she would raise human rights issues at the upcoming meetings in Beijing. She said she and Obama had worked hard to have "an effective, constructive and comprehensive" relationship with the Chinese

The family called police and rushed Titus to the veterinarian, but the cat was so badly injured it had to be put down.

The Wardle family is hoping someone might have seen something to help them find out what happened.

Man Arrested in Theft, Battery

BOISE (AP) • Police in Boise have arrested a 19-year-old man after a teenage girl reported she was cut in the arm by a man who took her backpack while she walked down the street.

Witnesses called 911 at 6 p.m. Sunday to report seeing a man take the girl's backpack and cut her arm with a knife during a struggle. The girl chased the suspect and grabbed his bike. Witnesses say he punched her in the face and rode away.

Witnesses say the suspect threw a knife into a front yard while others saw him drop a bike in a yard and jump over a fence.

Cameron Moon of Boise was arrested after a foot chase on suspicion of robbery and aggravated battery. Police say the victim and the suspect are acquaintances.

N. Idaho Man Faces May Sentencing in Shoot-out

SANDPOINT (AP) • A northern Idaho man found guilty of threatening his ex-girlfriend with a gun and opening fire on her new beau is scheduled to be sentenced May 21 on two charges of aggravated assault.

A judge upheld the March conviction of 60-year-old Richard Allen Larson last week. Larson was shot twice and nearly died during the February 2011 confrontation with his ex-girlfriend, Lora Adams, and her new partner, John Chester Bilsky.

The Bonner County Daily Bee reports a jury found Larson guilty of threatening Adams with a pistol at the entrance to her home before Bilsky came to her aid. Bilsky told police Larson then opened gunfire and he shot back.

Larson's attorney sought to set aside the conviction, arguing there wasn't enough evidence to show he was the aggressor.

Mother Charged after Son Nearly Drowns in Tub

NAMPA (AP) • Prosecutors in Canyon County have filed charges against a Nampa woman after her 1-year-old son nearly drowned in the bathtub while she was outside smoking a cigarette.

KTVB-TV reports 32-year-old Stefanie Antrim was arrested Thursday afternoon and made an initial

court appearance Friday on a charge of felony injury to a child.

Court records say Antrim told police she left her boys in the tub while she loaded the dishwasher and smoked a cigarette. While she was outside, her 4-year-old began screaming that the baby had turned blue. She

found the boy floating face down in the water.

Police say Antrim's blood alcohol level was one-and-a-half times the legal limit to drive. She acknowledged drinking four or five 16-ounce cans of beer.

The boy was hospitalized overnight and released Friday.

IDAHO MEN ARRESTED AFTER POLICE CHASE

LA GRANDE, Ore. (AP) • Three men from southwestern Idaho have been arrested after police say they tried to elude officers in a stolen pickup.

According to a statement from the Oregon State Police, the chase began when a trooper stopped a pickup for speeding near La Grande, Ore. The statement says the troopers detained the driver, 19-year-old Shane R.J. Sawyer of Caldwell, Idaho, when they discovered the truck was

reported stolen. Police say passenger Kenneth D. Bort, also from Caldwell, then got behind the wheel and fled with another passenger.

Police abandoned the chase near the rural town of Union, Ore., but later arrested both suspects.

Sawyer was arrested on a warrant out of Canyon County. Twenty-year-old Bort and 19-year-old Pedro M. Oregon were arrested on suspicion of eluding police and other charges.

Hunters Find Body in Northern ID

BOISE (AP) • Sportsmen in northern Idaho have stumbled across the body of a suspected suicide victim missing since winter.

Idaho County Sheriff Doug Giddings told the Lewiston Tribune the group found the body of the approximately 64-year-old man while hunting turkeys near Grangeville Saturday.

Giddings says the man appears to have died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound four to five months ago.

The victim has not yet been officially identified.

N. Idaho GOP Leader Goes after Online Critics

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • A Republican leader in northern Idaho is seeking the identity of three individuals who commented anonymously about her on a newspaper website.

Attorneys for Kootenai County Republican Central Committee Chairwoman Tina Jacobson subpoenaed the Spokesman-Review newspaper in eastern Washington last Wednesday, seeking the identity of the three commenters.

An attorney for the Spokesman-Review plans to file a motion to quash the subpoena this week, the Coeur d'Alene Press reported on Monday.

The Spokesman-Review has refused to turn over information about the commenters, according to a lawsuit Jacobson filed last week. Jacobson is suing one of anonymous individuals in Idaho's 1st District Court, saying they posted false statements about her handling of local GOP funds.

The lawsuit doesn't name the Spokesman-Review as a defendant, but alleges the newspaper knows the identity of the com-

menter accused of libel.

"We are very disappointed that we have been subpoenaed in this matter, and we intend to fight it," Spokesman-Review editor Gary Graham said in a statement Monday. "With our attorney's assistance, we intend to protect the names of confidential sources and anonymous posters to the extent provided by the law."

A commenter who posts under the online moniker "almostinnocentbystander" stated on the newspaper's website that "there was \$10,000 missing from the Republican Central Committee funds and that the missing funds were hidden on the person of Mrs. Jacobson," according to court documents.

The statement posted Feb. 14 on the newspaper's website prompted inquiries from two other commenters, who go by the online handles "Phaedrus" and "OutofStatertater." They questioned the substance of the claim, according to Jacobson's lawsuit.

The original commenter, "almostinnocentbystander,"

responded "to the inquiring bloggers with further allegations of missing funds, obstruction of the Republican Party Central Committee treasurer's report and embezzlement," the lawsuit says.

The comments were posted on the newspaper's blog, Huckleberries Online, and were removed by the blog's administrator, who noted that the comment regarding the missing funds was an "unsubstantiated accusation made against a local Republican official," according to court documents.

Jacobson is seeking damages of at least \$10,000 from the anonymous commenter, almostinnocentbystander.

Give 'em 'L' Mitt!

In the 1993 movie "Dave" the faux president (played by Kevin Kline) calls in his best friend (played by Charles Grodin) and they stay up all night balancing the federal budget, not by raising taxes, but by cutting unnecessary and wasteful spending.

If only it were that easy.

Most presidents have talked about cutting spending, but few succeed because Congress holds the power of the purse and is reluctant to give it up.

There have been serious and not so serious attempts to reduce government spending, from Ronald Reagan's Grace Commission to something called OMB Circular A-76, a memo from the Office of Management and Budget to all federal agencies that has been around in one form or another over several administrations. A-76's 2003 revision calls for the identification of "all activities performed by government personnel as either commercial or inherently governmental."

To borrow a song from the musical, "Annie Get Your Gun," commercial ventures should look at government and say about many of its functions, "Anything you can do, I can do better" and then they should be allowed to do it.

The model for this could be the government of former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher. During her time in office, she privatized many industries and utilities previously owned by the government because she believed, correctly, that the private economy could do a better and less expensive job of running them. Her philosophy, mostly absent from the film "The Iron Lady," was: "We should not expect the state to appear in the guise of an extravagant good fairy at every christening, a loquacious companion at every stage of life's journey, and the unknown mourner at every funeral."

Presumptive Republican presidential nominee Mitt Romney could follow her example by challenging the country to look deep inside its Puritan DNA and rediscover the principle of what might be called the three L's: limited government, liberty, and living within our means. Give 'em "L," Mitt!

Here's what Romney should do and it might be the strategy that could work to force even a Republican Congress to obey what the Constitution and common sense require. If elected, Romney should pledge to bring in a team of outside auditors and private entities to determine what government ought to be doing and what it might outsource. If a private company can perform a government function with greater efficiency and at lower cost, let it. If a government agency is redundant or no longer necessary, eliminate it.

No "interest group" should be able to exercise more influence than that of taxpaying citizens.

Traditional spring cleaning finds many of us going through closets, basements and attics, disposing of things we no longer want or need. Toward the same goal, Romney should lead a "spring cleaning" of government.

Romney might cite the "Congressional Pig Book" published by Citizens Against Government Waste (www.cagw.org). The 2012 edition, as always, contains examples of wasteful spending in many government agencies. This year's "Pig Book" shows that while "the number and cost of earmarks have decreased dramatically since fiscal year 2010," the accurate amount of waste is difficult to figure because "transparency and accountability have regressed immeasurably."

Two recent reports from the Government Accountability Office name 51 areas of duplication, overlapping and fragmented government functions, which, if ended, would save an estimated \$400 billion. There's a start to which no one should have an objection.

While President Obama promotes his "Buffett Tax" on millionaires and billionaires, Romney should focus on the government's waste of taxpayer money. If government is such a poor steward of what it now receives, why should it be given more?

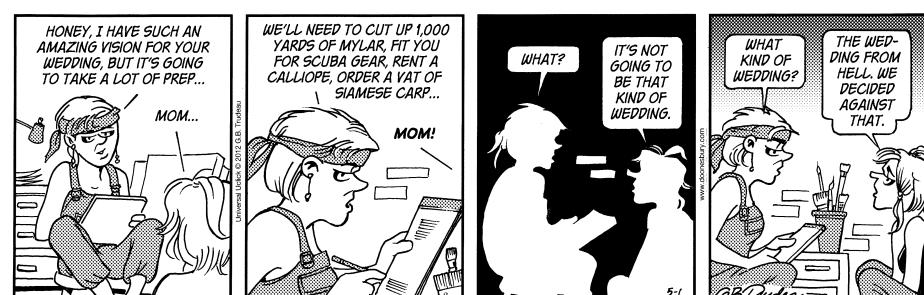

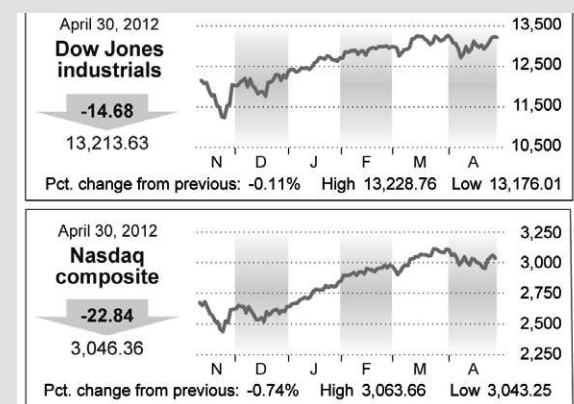
How the Major U.S. Stock Indexes Fared on Monday

Louisiana Pipeline Spills 80,000 Gallons of Oil

TORBERT, La. (AP) • ExxonMobil Corp. says it is cleaning up about 80,000 gallons of oil that spilled from a pipeline in a rural Pointe Coupee Parish, northwest of Baton Rouge.

The company says the pipeline was shut down Saturday night after a loss of pressure. The spilled oil was discovered on Sunday. No injuries have been reported. The company doesn't yet know what caused the pipeline to break.

ExxonMobil said vacuum trucks are cleaning up the site and air is being monitored for quality.

The oil came from a 22-inch pipeline that originates in St. James Parish southeast of Baton Rouge and carries crude oil to northern Louisiana.

Delta Air Lines hopes to cut money from jet fuel budget • Delta Airlines said on Monday that it will buy a refinery near Philadelphia in hopes of saving money. Delta said a subsidiary will buy the Trainer, Pa. refinery from Phillips 66, a refining company being spun off from ConocoPhillips. Delta is paying \$150 million, including \$30 million in job-creation assistance it expects to get from the state of Pennsylvania. Delta's Monro Energy LLC subsidiary will spend \$100 million to make changes to the refinery to maximize the production of jet fuel. The oil refining process still produces other products such as gasoline and diesel fuel.

B&N, Microsoft Team Up on Nook, College Businesses

NEW YORK • Books and bits united Monday as Microsoft provided an infusion of money to help Barnes & Noble compete with top electronic bookseller Amazon. In exchange, Microsoft gets a long-desired foothold in the business of e-books and college textbooks.

With Microsoft Corp.'s \$300 million investment, the two companies are teaming up to create a subsidiary for Barnes & Noble's e-book and college textbook businesses. Microsoft is taking a 17.6 percent stake in the venture.

The agreement underscores the importance of electronic bookstores as traditional booksellers and technology companies jockey for position in the increasingly competitive market.

For Microsoft, the investment is a way

to get back into the e-book business. It has dabbled in the field since at least 2000, but never developed much traction. It was Amazon that blew the market open with the 2007 launch of the Kindle, creating a potent challenge to Barnes & Noble's brick-and-mortar bookstores.

Major Microsoft competitors Apple and Google now have their own e-book stores. All three companies are building businesses that encompass hardware, software and content in an "ecosystem" and e-books and readers are part of the puzzle.

With that perspective, the deal is very important, said Walter Pritchard, an analyst with Citigroup. But he doesn't expect any near-term financial impact from the deal, noting that even if the Microsoft-Barnes & Noble venture is successful, it leaves the Nook a distant second in the e-reader market, behind the Kindle.

Energy Transfer Partners to Buy Sunoco for \$5.3B

DALLAS • Natural gas pipeline company Energy Transfer Partners is buying Sunoco in a deal valued at about \$5.3 billion.

The acquisition would give Energy Transfer the capability to transport crude and other liquid hydrocarbons that are being produced in greater quantities thanks to the boom in shale drilling. Sunoco's pipelines crisscross the country, connecting the Great Lakes and Northeast to America's refining center along the Gulf Coast.

Energy Transfer Chairman and CEO Kelsey Warren said the company has been looking to diversify into oil pipelines in response to an expected slowdown in the natural gas pipeline business. Some oil and gas production companies have been taking natural gas operations offline following a plunge in prices to 10-year lows. Many

are now focused on producing more domestic crude oil, which is both cheaper and of a higher quality than imported crudes.

"We needed to be more diversified," Warren said in a conference call. "We needed to be more involved in the movement of crude."

The acquisition continues a run of deal-making for Energy Transfer. The Dallas company bought Louis Dreyfus Highbridge Energy for \$1.93 billion in May 2011. And Energy Transfer Equity, which owns Energy Transfer Partners' general partner, bought Southern Union for more than \$5 billion in March and Regency Energy Partners for \$300 million in 2010.

Sunoco Inc., based in Philadelphia, will continue its exit from the refining business. It already has shut down a refinery in Marcus Hook, Pa., and it is planning to sell its controlling interest in its Philadelphia refinery to The Carlyle Group.

Idaho Girl with Rare Disorder Thrives after Treatment

BOISE • Eight years ago, the picture of a smiling two-year-old Boise girl with bright blonde curls and a yellow raincoat adorned jars placed in grocery store checkout lines and local businesses.

That little girl was Annabelle Green or "Baby Annabelle," as she became affectionately known, and she was born with a rare, inherited metabolic disorder called Sanfilippo Syndrome, which makes her body unable to process complex sugar molecules. Annabelle desperately needed treatment, and her grandmother, Christine Barrieta, was determined to get it for her. But the treatment was costly and only available at Duke University in North Carolina, so Annabelle's family asked the community for help.

Thanks to fund-raising efforts, in 2004 Annabelle received a stem cell transplant that changed the

course of her illness.

"Without the total support of the entire Treasure Valley and outlying communities, even from Nevada and Oregon, it would not have been possible," Barrieta said. "She is happy, she is still learning, she isn't in pain and I am gracious to the wonderful support of the community."

Now Annabelle is an energetic 10-year-old. She still has the sweet smile and head full of curls. On Friday afternoon, she smiled and laughed as she danced through her house with her grandmother.

In June, Annabelle will attend school with other children for the first time in her life. Annabelle is still developmentally delayed, especially with her speech, but if she had not received treatment, the situation would be much worse.

Eventually Sanfilippo Syndrome can lead to blindness, mental retardation, nerve damage that requires wheelchair use and an in-

ability to care for one's self. Most people with the syndrome live into their teenage years, but others with the more severe forms die at an earlier age.

"Annabelle would be in a vegetative state without the treatment," Barrieta said.

As she happily twirled the hula hoop and ran around the yard, it was hard to picture what life would be like had Annabelle not received treatment.

Annabelle received a stem-cell transplant from donated cord-blood. Barrieta said Annabelle was a medical pioneer at the time. Duke University was the only place with specialists who could perform the treatment, and Annabelle was in very good hands. Dr. Joanne Kurtzberg, who performed the treatment on Annabelle, also performed the world's first cord blood transplant between unrelated people at Duke in 1990 and is a leading researcher in the field.

Stem-cell transplants

have been the source of controversy because of moral objections to the use of stem-cells taken from embryos. The type of stem-cells that Annabelle received are donated from the cord-blood following a live birth, but Barrieta said she heard criticism from people who believed the treatment Annabelle received was wrong. She said people are just not aware of how stem-cell transplants work and how cord-blood can be used.

Since the time that Annabelle received treatment, more advances have been made in cord-blood stem-cell transplants. In 2005, an estimated 6,000 cord-blood transplants had been performed worldwide. By 2011, that number increased to 30,000.

Barrieta hopes that the success Annabelle had will inspire people to support research efforts that lead to a cure.

There is no cure for Sanfilippo Syndrome. While

the treatment has kept Annabelle's body from deteriorating and she is pain free, she still has the syndrome. The treatment and recovery was a long and painful process, but it has greatly increased her quality of life and kept that sweet smile on her face.

\$10K Reward in Killings of Wild Horses in Calif., Nev.

RENO, Nev. • The U.S. Bureau of Land Management is investigating the shooting deaths of nearly a dozen federally protected wild horses and offering a \$10,000 reward in connection with the four separate incidents reported in California and Nevada since the beginning of the year, agency officials said Monday.

The most recent killings involved one horse and two burros on BLM land near Black Rock Canyon in Pershing County about 100 miles northeast of Reno. They were discovered April 9.

The BLM earlier announced a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the shooter or shooters responsible for killing two mustangs in California's Lassen County near the Nevada line.

A BLM crew working on a prescribed fire on April 3 discovered the remains of those horses — which had been dead for several weeks — near

Newland Reservoir about 12 miles southeast of Eagleville.

Earlier, six additional mustangs were found shot to death in northern Nevada — three in Eureka County in January and three in Lander County in February, BLM spokeswoman Heather Emmons said.

"We started seeing a string of these so we thought we would offer a bigger reward," Emmons said Monday.

The three horses found dead in Lander County on Feb 2 were near Bottle Summit on the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest. They were about 10 miles south of U.S. Highway 50 and 30 miles west of Eureka — about 250 miles east of Reno. The three in Eureka County were found Jan. 25 near 3 C Well about 15 miles south of Eureka.

Emmons said she could

not provide any additional information because the investigation is ongoing.

"The perpetrators of these unlawful killings will be vigorously pursued by BLM law enforcement and our partner law enforcement agencies," Abbey said Monday. "We hope this reward offer will generate information that leads to the swift arrest and ultimate conviction of these individuals."

Parker's New Grip on Spurs Clearly Evident Vs. Jazz

SAN ANTONIO — Before Tony Parker took the reins of the San Antonio Spurs, he first needed to disappoint them.

Not just with his words, but with how he played.

Both instances came after Parker retreated to Europe last summer while the top-seeded Spurs were still reeling from a first-round bust. That's when Parker told French journalists that the trio of Tim Duncan, Manu Ginobili and himself likely had no more championship runs left in the tank.

Maybe more troubling to coach Gregg Popovich was later seeing Parker on the court in London.

"Pop was mad at me when he came to London and saw me play with the national team," Parker said after leading the Spurs to a Game 1 playoff victory over Utah. "Thought I played harder with national team. I told him, 'I'll play good this year and I'll play with a different attitude.'"

So far, Parker is holding up his end of the bargain.

Popovich on Monday reiterated how his All-Star point guard this season has played like never before, continuing to heap praise after Parker scored 28 points in the playoff opener against the Jazz, helping give the Spurs their first 1-0 series lead in four years

heading into Game 2 on Wednesday.

On the surface, Parker's performance in the 106-91 victory Sunday was nothing remarkable by his standards. There was his signature slashing, acrobatic layups and the precise pick-and-rolls with Duncan. Even as far as playoff scoring goes, the game didn't come close to cracking Parker's top 10.

But somewhere between a preseason sit-down with Popovich and Ginobili — the fiery, competitive soul of the Spurs — and breaking his hand in January, Parker decided to become more aggressive. Popovich noticed him becoming "more demonstrative" and teammates described him as more determined. His assists shot up to a career-high 7.7 average, all while still leading the Spurs in scoring at 18.3 points per game.

Sometime around then, Parker said, is when it happened.

"It became my team," he said.

Ginobili, who admitted to having seen Parker coast through games from time to time, said the attitude is unlike any he's seen from Parker in their decade together.

"He's always been a great player, don't get me wrong," Ginobili said. "But he took

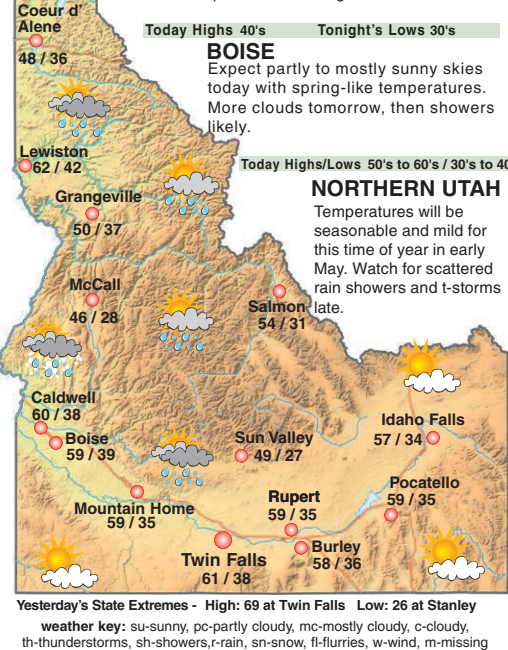

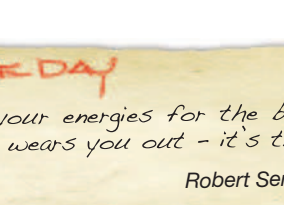

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Tiger Trades News Conference for Facebook

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. • The only questions Tiger Woods fielded before his next tournament came from his fans.

Instead of a news conference before this week's Wells Fargo Championship, Woods answered 19 questions Monday in a 15-minute video posted on his website. The questions were submitted through Facebook and Twitter.

The timing of the decision was peculiar. Woods is coming off his worst performance ever at the Masters, a tie for 40th in which he finished 15 shots behind and was roundly criticized for kicking his 9-iron in disgust after a poor tee shot on the par-3 16th hole in the second round.

Woods typically speaks to the media before every tournament. This time, he will not speak to reporters until his first round Thursday at Quail Hollow.

His agent, Mark Steinberg, did not immediately return a phone call from The Associated Press. He earlier told The Charlotte Observer that Woods' trading the traditional media for social media was not in response to the criticism he received at the Masters.

"The media will continue to have access to him," Steinberg said. "This isn't anything more than a couple of times a year to interact with the fans. They deserve that. This isn't intended to make a statement. This is intended to be more inclusive. This isn't a statement whatsoever. Some in the media might interpret it that way, but that's not the intent."

Among the questions he

took for the video:

— Do you have a good chance of winning?

— Have you ever made an albatross?

— What was the difference between Bay Hill (where he won) and the Masters?

Fans were told that he would answer questions about his next two tournaments — Quail Hollow and The Players Championship — although Woods took the question about how his performance changed from Bay Hill and Augusta. Another question was what he had been working on with swing coach Sean Foley since the Masters.

"At the Masters, I was kind of struggling with my ball-striking a little bit," he said. "Sean and I fixed it. It had to do with posture. My setup wasn't quite right, as well as my takeaway. I just needed to do hundreds of reps. I'm getting dialed in."

Woods, the biggest star in golf with 72 tour wins and 14 majors, has operated under a different set of rules than most other players. In a deal made years ago with the PGA Tour, he only comes to the media center for his pre-tournament news conference when he is the defending champion or is at a tournament for the first time or one he has not played in a long time. Woods always goes to the media center before tournaments at the majors.

This is believed to be the first time he has ever skipped his media obligations before the tournament.

Woods said he was excited to get back to competition,

having taken a full week off after the Masters. He said he has changed his swing over the years to alleviate stress on his left knee, which has been operated on four times.

"Let's end it at four," he said. "Plus, I have two little ones to chase around."

On other topics:

— He said he has made an albatross twice in his career, but not in competition. One was during a practice round at the Walker Cup in Wales in 1995, the other at Isleworth just two days after watching Mark O'Meara make a 2 on the par-5 seventh hole.

— His favorite trophy from the majors is the claret jug awarded the British Open champion.

— Of the next two tournaments, there were more questions about The Players Championship, especially the 70-foot birdie putt he made from the back of the island green on the par-3 17th in the third round of 2001, the only year he won at Sawgrass. Woods said he watched Fred Funk in the group ahead of him four-putt from about the same spot.

"I wasn't trying to make it," he said. "I was trying to get it close and not three-putt. I was trying not to lose a shot. I'll take those accidents."

As for the best putt he ever made on tour? Woods said it was par putt from just inside 4 feet on the final hole at the 1997 Masters, which he won by 12 shots with a record score of 270 for his first major.

"To set the record, all the history it meant at the time, to have my dad there at the back of the green," he said. "By far it was the biggest."

think this might be that one piece of the puzzle we were missing."

It's only a quarter of the way through the grueling NASCAR schedule, and maybe in a different era, slumping teams could still hope for a midseason turnaround.

Nobody has that luxury anymore, so when it becomes evident that something has to change in an effort to save the season, the crew chief is usually the first guy to go.

So it was Erwin to get the first hook of the 2012 season, and he didn't even make it a year with the Petty organization.

He had been let go as Greg Biffle's crew chief last July, and was snapped up rather quickly at RPM, which paired him with AJ Allmendinger. Everybody

seemed happy, and then Allmendinger got an off-season offer to move to Penske Racing. He took the job, and RPM had to quickly find a new driver.

They settled on Almirola, who had 35 previous Sprint Cup starts but none since the last five races of the 2010 season. The results have been sub-par — Almirola has one top-10 finish and is currently 23rd in the standings.

It wasn't good enough.

"It's a goal of the 43 team to make the Chase this year, and I think Mike's experience and knowledge can help get us there," Almirola said. "We've got some ground to make up, but I think we can do it."

That's the present-day mentality in NASCAR, where claiming one of the 12 spots in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship is the new measuring point for a successful season.

Drivers and crews want

to be in the Chase so they can race for the championship, but for team owners, getting one of those slots is often enough to placate the sponsor. Being part of the Chase ensures maximum exposure over the final 10 weeks of the season, and those cars and drivers consistently overshadow the other 31 in the field.

Some have suggested that the pressure to make the Chase is partly to blame for the caution-free racing over the last month. Drivers have to constantly think about the big picture, and maybe aren't taking the chances they once did out of fear of it hurting too much in the standings.

"Racing has changed because right now, there is so much emphasis put on the almighty point, that we live and die by that one point," Nationwide Series points leader Elliott Sadler said last weekend.

and Chandler Harnish was the 11th and final signal-caller taken, getting drafted with the last pick.

Moore, who completed nearly 74 percent of his passes last year, finished his college career among the NCAA all-time leaders with 14,667 career yards passing and 142 career touchdowns

passes. But the 6-foot, 197-pound native of Prosser, Wash., knew many questioned his future in the NFL because of his height and a perceived lack of arm strength.

"There's a lot of ways to evaluate a quarterback," Moore said at the NFL combine in February. "Some evaluate it and put a lot of emphasis on that. That's fine. Smile, and move on." He told the Statesman

this weekend: "I don't think there will probably be a more motivated quarterback."

Boise State had a school-record six players picked in this year's draft. Detroit selected former Boise State receiver Titus Young in the second round last year and he had a productive rookie season as a No. 3 receiver behind

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

"My family pride is something inconceivable. I can't help it. I was born sneering."
— W.S. Gilbert

Thomas Bessis is part of what would surely be the strongest bridge-playing family in the world, since both he and his brother and their parents have been successful in U.S., European, and world championship events.

Here, he was declarer in four hearts. Against that contract, West led the club queen, which was allowed to hold. A second club was ruffed by Bessis, who continued with the heart queen.

When it was not covered, he rose with the ace as, on the bidding, he fully expected East to hold the king — which might even have been singleton. Had West held high-card values, it was perhaps more likely that he would have made an unassuming cue-bid of two hearts, showing diamond support, instead of making the pre-emptive bid of three diamonds directly.

Next came a successful finesse of the diamond queen, then the ace and a diamond ruff eliminated the suit. A club ruff eliminated that suit too, and now declarer exited with a heart and could claim his contract when East won the trick.

The point was that with the minors eliminated, either he would receive a ruff and discard, or the defense would have to broach the spade suit, and with East on lead, the defense could get only one trick. If West had shown up with the heart king, East would have been a lock to hold the spade king, and declarer would have been able to hold his spade losers to one by force.

ANSWER: The best way to make a slam-try here is to jump to four clubs. This is a splinter raise of spades, suggesting short clubs, and lets your partner evaluate his assets accurately. A simple forcing raise of spades might work well, but the key may be whether there are wasted values in clubs.
