Simpson Again Challenged by Heilesen

The showdown of Idaho Falls residents will determine the GOP candidate for Idaho's U.S. House District 2 seat.

TWIN FALLS • Showdown, part two.

Chick Heilesen is once again challenging Congressman Mike Simpson in this year's Republican primary on May 15.

Heilesen, who also ran in 2010, attacked Simpson for voting to extend the debt ceiling and not cutting spending aggressively enough.

When it comes to spending and tax increases, Heilesen says he'll "just say no."

Simpson, a member of the House Appropriations Committee, takes a more measured approach to budgeting. It's crucial to get the deficit under control, he said, but it will take a combination of tax changes and cutting government spending.

That takes compromise that Congress is struggling with right now, Simpson said.

"The Democrats don't want to reform the entitlement programs, and the Republicans don't want to look at the tax code," Simpson said. And while everyone knows it's crucial to do so, few are willing to in an election year, he said.

Heilesen focuses on limited government, and would like to eventually shut down agencies like the Department of Education and return control to a state level. He also hopes to do away with regulations that stifle economic growth.

"The government should stay only within what they're designated to do and leave us alone," he said.

Simpson agrees that it's important to cut regulations.

Is This the Year the Flames Return?

After a couple of quieter years, this wildfire season may be closer to what firefighters fought in 2007 — but there's no guarantee.

TWIN FALLS • There's a hesitation in Chris Simonson's voice when he talks about this year's upcoming fire season.

"I'm not going to say it's just like 2007," he said, pausing to choose his next words carefully. "But we're having some similarities."

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management fire management officer was referring to the Murphy Complex Fire that consumed more than 650,000 acres southwest of Twin Falls. It's one of the worst fires on record for Idaho

and one that Simonson hopes he doesn't have to see again.

However, this year's warm temperatures, combined with high fuel loads and early fire activity could heighten the region's risk for a busy wildfire season.

Already, BLM fire crews have responded to 10 wildfires since February.

CONVICTED KILLER AGAIN SEEKS RETRIAL

KETCHUM (AP) • A Boise attorney and the Idaho Innocence Project are trying to get a new trial for a woman who was convicted of killing both her parents after a fight about her boyfriend.

Twenty-five-year-old Sarah Marie Johnson was 16 in 2003 when prosecutors said she shot Alan and Diane Johnson with a rifle at the family's Bellevue home. Fifth District Judge Richard Bevan already ruled last year that Johnson's claims of ineffective legal counsel and new evidence didn't warrant a new trial. Now her attorney, Dennis Benjamin with the firm Nevin, Benjamin, McKay & Bartlett, has asked the judge to reconsider.

"We believe Sarah's innocent," Benjamin told the *Idaho Mountain Express* on Tuesday. "I believe that in my heart. I'm suggesting that she's completely innocent."

Benjamin is working on the case with Deborah Whipple, an attorney with the Idaho Innocence Project. The attorneys contend that some DNA evidence wasn't tested in the original criminal case, that new scientific methods can be used to identify other possible suspects and that Johnson had ineffective legal counsel

throughout her court proceedings.

The Idaho Attorney General's Office, which is representing the state of Idaho in Johnson court proceedings, declined Monday to comment on Benjamin's filings. However, Deputy Attorney General Kenneth Jorgensen filed a response on April 16 to Benjamin's claims, arguing that the case should not be reopened because the claims were made too late, after legal deadlines had passed.

During Johnson's trial, prosecutors described Johnson as a selfish, self-absorbed killer who shot her parents out of a "fantasy" to marry her older lover and live off her inheritance money. Prosecutors said the parents had threatened to have Johnson's boyfriend, a 19-year-old undocumented immigrant named Bruno Santos, arrested.

Her attorneys countered that there was no blood found on her body after the murders, and contended that if she had been the one to pull the trigger, she would have been covered in blood. In subsequent appeals, her attorneys said fingerprints had been discovered on the murder weapon that matched those of a renter who had been living in the family's guesthouse.

Time-released Technology

State education officials are trying to pare down the pool of schools whose students will get mobile devices first.

TWIN FALLS • In fewer than two years, some Magic Valley students will receive a mobile device to use at school.

But their peers within the same school district might have to wait a little longer.

Under the state's Students Come First reforms, mobile devices — most likely, laptop computers — will be distributed to students at one-third of Idaho's high schools at a time starting in the 2013-14 school year.

In south-central Idaho, devices will go to 3,372 students during the first round. And, there's a cap of 1,124 per school district.

In Cassia County, only two high schools — Burley High and Cassia High — will be considered for the first round.

Superintendent Gaylen Smyer said the district originally submitted a letter of interest to receive mobile devices for all five of its high schools during the first round. But now, that won't happen.

Melissa McGrath, spokeswoman for the Idaho State Department of Education, said the distribution plan ensures that a wide variety of school

The largest wildfire was close to 200 acres near Dietrich in April, Simonson said. It's a larger amount than in years past and it could be a sign of things to come.

It's particularly an increase from last year. While there was plenty of fire fuel throughout the state, a delayed, wet spring resulted in wildfires consuming just a little more than 380,000 acres in 2011, less than in years past.

The National Interagency Fire Center's latest regional outlook reports that fuel that wasn't consumed last year is now dry and ready to burn. As temperatures begin to warm up by July and August, the likelihood of fire will be above average, according to the report.

BLM crews are prepping fire engines and testing equipment before the season begins. For south-central Idaho, the BLM has 17 engines and five water trucks that hold 4,000 gallons. Each one must be

tested and inspected before the start of the wildfire season.

"We test flow and pressure in our pumps and we're also checking our chainsaws," said Mitch Silvester, engine captain for the BLM. "It generally lasts about three weeks to go through all the engines."

Simonson said he isn't eager for a bad fire year but he's trying to prepare for all situations.

"We'd like to see low fire seasons," he said. "It's a heavy expense to the taxpayer and it has the potential to destroy a lot of habitat."

Filer Boosts Wastewater Contract by \$30K

FILER • The extra time and cost of completing Filer's new wastewater treatment facility meant a raise Tuesday for the organization that helped the city oversee the project.

The Filer City Council granted a request from the Region IV Development Association for a \$30,000 increase to its original \$90,000 administration service contract.

Region IV, a nonprofit, has been responsible for keeping

track of expenditures involved in constructing the treatment facility. Candy McElfresh, a planning representative for the group, told council members that increases in project costs and the fact that the work took longer than expected added to Region IV's work, and required the change.

"This project was scheduled to be done last fall and its costs have gone from \$12 million to \$14.5 million," McElfresh said. "We have a lot of additional work than

we initially signed on for."

The price tag rose due to extra costs to replace city collection system piping, she said.

"There's still about \$700,000 in funds that will be used to complete what remains of our collection system," said Filer Mayor Bob Templeman. "Candy has done a great job working up a spreadsheet that accounts for every nickel and dime that has been spent."

In other business, city officials are looking for volunteers interested in doing

some painting and light carpentry during the second Operation Facelift, scheduled for June 11-22. Sponsored by the Filer Urban Renewal Agency and similar groups across the Magic Valley, the project's goal is to help improve the curb appeal of select buildings and potentially attract new businesses to the community. TWIN FALLS • You don't have to wait until May 15 to vote in the primary election.

Early voting is open from Monday-Friday until May 11 at each county clerk office. The last day to request a mail ballot is May 9.

Whether you vote early or on election day, be familiar with the new voting laws. The Republican primary is open only to those who register as a Republican, while the unaffiliated

and Democratic ballots are open to any registered voter.

Before you go, know the party you wish to affiliate with and the ballot you want to request, and remember to bring a photo ID.

If you vote on May 15, be sure to look up your polling place, as some have changed since last election.

districts will be included in the first round.

The state, she said, wants to make sure that large school districts won't receive all the mobile devices for one region.

The technology will go out to 28,500 high school students statewide during the first round. The level of interest, though, has far surpassed that mark.

Earlier this year, 174 schools — representing about 84 percent of Idaho's public high school students — submitted a letter asking to receive the devices first.

In order to narrow that down, districts had a Friday deadline to submit a separate application.

The information will be reviewed in May. Recipients for the first round will be announced in early June.

Smyer said he talked to high school administrators to determine which Cassia County high schools would be most ready for the first round.

"Two schools felt more strongly about wanting to be on the front end," he said.

If the district is selected for the first round, the other three high schools will have to wait another year to get mobile devices.

That's the scenario Twin Falls School District administrators want to avoid.

Spokeswoman Beth Pendergrass said if the district is selected for the first round, officials don't want to distribute the mobile devices to just one high school. The goal is to have all three high schools receive the technology at the same time.

Many Magic Valley school districts are already moving in the direction of using more mobile devices in classrooms. Smyer said the state's initiative will speed up the process in Cassia County.

"We're anxious to try to implement more technology in our schools," he said.

In addition to students, all Idaho high school teachers and principals will receive a mobile device. Those are scheduled to go out this fall.

Federal Grants Help with Health Center Expansions

Organizations in Twin Falls and Glenns Ferry will use close to \$4 million to expand or consolidate their offices.

TWIN FALLS • Two south-central Idaho health centers will expand their offices after each was awarded a federal grant.

Family Health Services in Twin Falls and Glenns Ferry Health Center Inc. won close to \$4 million as part a program under the Affordable Care Act, the health care reform bill that passed in 2010. The new law will fund \$1.5 billion in building and renovation costs for community health centers over the next five years.

The money is earmarked for expansion costs because community health centers across the country are expected to see 1.3 million new patients over the two years, according to a news release from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Family Health Services will use its \$2.7 million grant to build one new facility in Burley so that it can consolidate its three existing facilities under one roof, said Lynn Hudgens, CEO for the nonprofit health care provider for low-income people.

The new facility will expand its dental exam rooms from four to six and upgrade the majority of its medical equipment, Hudgens said.

"We desperately need this," he said. "We're seeing more patients but our space remains tight. This is going to allow us to expand and give us the room to expand in the future."

Hudgens said the new facility will be open by the end of 2013.

Glenns Ferry Health Center will use the \$1.2 million grant to expand its Mountain Home office, said Leslyn Phelps, the nonprofit's CEO.

"We're going to be redesigning the whole medical exam rooms," Phelps said. "We want to design it so that the whole staff works under a new concept to improve quality"

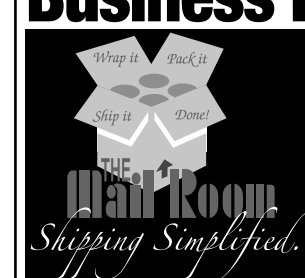

Jerome Jail Bond Meeting Tonight

JEROME • Jerome County will host an informational meeting about its funding proposal for a new county jail at 7 tonight in the courthouse annex, 233 W. Main St., Jerome.

County Commissioners and consultant Reed Miller of Ormond Construction will be on hand to answer questions about the proposal's cost, design and

other factors.

A \$10.7 million bond issue to build the jail will be on Jerome County's primary election ballot May 15. Commissioner Roger Morley said the cost to Jerome County property owners, if the measure passes, would be \$31 per \$100,000 of assessed property value.

A similar informational meeting will be May 10 at the same location and time.

T.F. Council Candidate Interviews to Remain Closed

TWIN FALLS • The public and press won't be allowed to sit in as candidates interview for the open Twin Falls City Council seat.

The public normally elects City Council members to serve two-year terms. But when a mid-term vacancy opens, a city's mayor can appoint someone to the seat. That person will serve until the next general election.

In April, Councilman

Lance Clow stepped down, and 13 people applied to fill the spot. The council's selection committee — Mayor Greg Lanting and councilmen Don Hall and Chris Talkington — heard speeches from candidates on Tuesday and chose four finalists to interview for the position.

Because the council won't have a quorum, the Friday interviews don't fall under public meeting law, but aren't necessarily closed. It's up to the mayor to decide whether to allow the public

and press to sit in, said Twin Falls City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich.

Lanting said he will keep the interviews private, even if the candidates are OK with opening up the process.

"I really feel that we can choose the best candidate when they're alone, just asking the question, and there's no reporter there," Lanting said. The press and public might hamper candid responses from the candidates, he said.

"I apologize, but I have the

right to close this so I'm going to keep it closed," he said.

The four candidates are Christopher Reid, Suzanne Hawkins, Allen Starley and Gary Garnand. After the interviews, the mayor will appoint one of the four to the council. The other council members will vote on whether they approve the appointment at Monday's meeting.

If approved, the new council member will start immediately and sit in on that night's meeting.

Three Arrested in Fight Involving Baton, Machete, Rival Tattoo Shops

TWIN FALLS • Three people from Jerome were arrested Tuesday night after police say they entered a tattoo parlor in Twin Falls and started a fight at about 7:30 p.m.

Vincent Brennan, 29, Edgar Lora, 19, and Brienna Zuiderveld, 24, allegedly went to the Ascension Tattoo shop at 671 Filer Ave. because they had an issue with an employee at the store, said Lt. Craig Stotts with the Twin Falls Police Department.

Brennan and Zuiderveld were both released without charges Wednesday, but Lora was charged with aggravated battery and arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Court.

Employees who were interviewed by police said Brennan showed up with Lora and Zuiderveld to fight because someone was "slandering his tattoo business," court records state. The records show Lora is

employed at Sick and Twisted Skin Machine in Jerome.

According to online jail booking records, both Brennan and Lora list "tattoo artist" as their occupation.

"Some words were exchanged and during the exchange a fight broke out," Stotts said.

One of the Ascension Tattoo shop owners provided police with surveillance footage of the incident.

According to court documents, the video shows Brennan aggressively walk into the store, then headbutt an employee twice before hitting him in the left side of the head, knocking him into a shelf, the police report says. As he fell, the victim's head struck the shelf causing him to briefly lose consciousness.

According to the report, the video also shows Brennan punching another employee and a customer who was in the shop. At that time, Lora brandished an extendable baton and hit an employee with it. After two

people took the baton away from Lora, the report says Zuiderveld left the shop and then returned with a machete.

"She unsheathed the machete and held it in the air," the report said.

Zuiderveld threatened to use the machete but did not, Stotts said.

The brawl eventually de-escalated and the three fled the shop for Jerome, where they were later arrested and detained by Jerome police before being transported to the Twin Falls County Jail.

According to the report, an officer visited the victim who lost consciousness at the emergency room at St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center. The man had a concussion, the report said.

Five no-contact orders were issued, stating Lora must stay 300 feet from several people who were present in the shop.

Lora was held on \$10,000 bond before bonding out Wednesday. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for May 11.

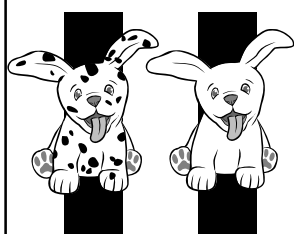

All the Way with LBJ

Around noon on Saturday, Nov. 23, 1963, almost exactly 24 hours after the assassination in Dallas, while the president's casket lay in the East Room of the White House, Arthur Schlesinger, John Kennedy's kept historian, convened a lunch at Washington's Occidental restaurant with some other administration liberals. Their purpose was to discuss how to deny the 1964 Democratic presidential nomination to the new incumbent, Lyndon Johnson, and instead run a ticket of Attorney General Robert Kennedy and Sen. Hubert Humphrey.

This example of the malignant malice of some liberals against the president who became 20th-century liberalism's most consequential adherent is described in Robert Caro's "The Passage of Power," the fourth and, he insists, penultimate volume in his "The Years of Lyndon Johnson," which when completed will rank as America's most ambitiously conceived, assiduously researched and compulsively readable political biography. The new volume arrives 30 years after the first, and its timing is serendipitous: Are you seeking an antidote to current lamentations about the decline of political civility? Immerse yourself in Caro's cringe-inducing catalog of humiliations, gross and petty, inflicted on Johnson by many New Frontiersmen, and with obsessive hatred by Robert Kennedy.

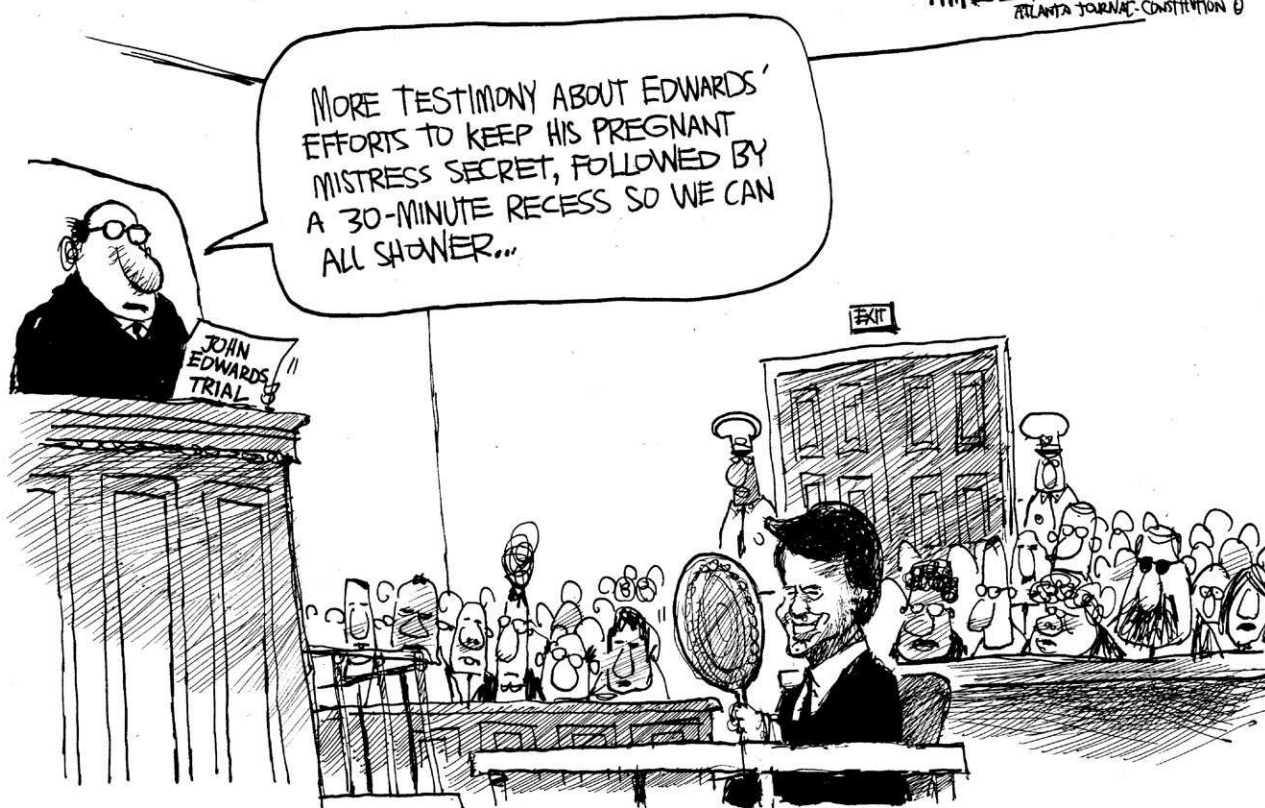
Caro demonstrates that when, at the Democrats' 1960 Los Angeles convention, John Kennedy selected Johnson, an opponent for the nomination, as his running mate, Robert Kennedy worked with furious dishonesty against his brother, trying to convince Johnson to decline. Had Robert succeeded, his brother almost certainly would have lost Texas, and perhaps both Carolinas and Louisiana — President Eisenhower had carried five of the 11 Confederate states in 1956 — and the election.

Johnson, one of the few presidents who spent most of their adult lives in Washington, had no idea how to win the presidency. Convinced that the country was as mesmerized as Washington is by the Senate, Johnson did not formally announce his candidacy until six days before the 1960 convention.

Johnson did, however, know how to use the presidency. Almost half the book covers the 47 days between the assassination and Johnson's Jan. 8 State of the Union address. In that span he began breaking the congressional logjam against liberal legislation that had existed since 1938 when the nation, recoiling against Franklin Roosevelt's plan to "pack" the Supreme Court, produced a durable congressional coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats.

Caro is properly enthralled by Johnson putting the power of the presidency behind a discharge petition that, by advancing, compelled a Southern committee chairman to allow what became the 1964 Civil Rights Act to get to the Senate, where Johnson's meticulous cultivation of another Southern chairman prevented tax cut legislation from becoming hostage to the civil rights filibuster. By taking such arcana seriously, and celebrating Johnson's virtuosity regarding them, Caro honors the seriousness of his readers, who should reciprocate the compliment.

Caro astringently examines Johnson's repulsive venality (regarding his Texas broadcasting properties) and bullying (notably of Texas journalists, through their employers) but devotes ample pages to honoring Johnson as the most exemplary political leader since Lincoln regarding race. As vice president, he refused to attend the 400th anniversary of the founding of St. Augustine, Fla., unless the banquet would be integrated — and not, he insisted, with a "Negro table" off to the side. He said civil rights legislation would "say to the Mexican in California or the Negro in Mississippi or the Oriental on the West Coast or the Johnsons in Johnson City that we are going to treat you all equally and fairly." Caro never loses sight of the humiliations and insecurities that were never far from Johnson's mind.

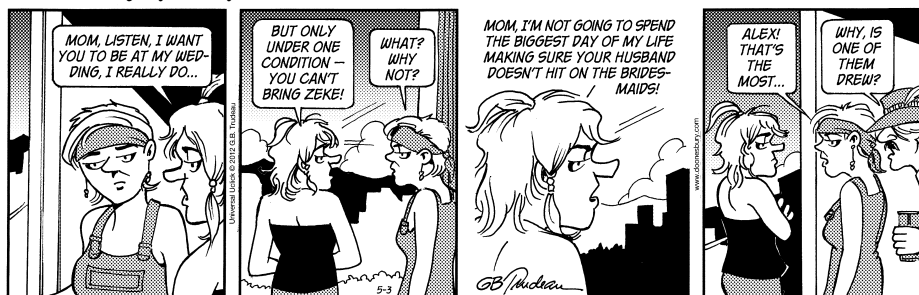

Idaho School Reform Foes Hire Outside Consultant

David Williams expects to have bipartisan help in effort to throw out GOP-backed measures.

BOISE (AP) • A political group working to overturn Idaho's new education reforms has hired an out-of-state consultant who last November helped repeal a hotly debated Ohio law that limited collective bargaining.

David Williams left his home in Bethesda, Md., last month to work on the Idaho campaign aimed at repealing new state laws that restrict teacher bargaining, eliminate tenure, phase in laptops and require online courses.

Williams expects to have

bipartisan help in the effort to throw out the Republican-backed measures, the *Idaho Statesman* reported Wednesday.

"You've got people of all political persuasions who believe that quality public schools are inherent to the quality of life," Williams said.

The laws championed by public schools chief Tom Luna and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter were approved amid outcry from the teachers union, parents and some

students. Critics gathered enough signatures to put three repeal measures on the November ballot.

Williams was hired by Idahoans for Responsible Education Reform, a political committee that gathered the signatures and includes parents and members of the Idaho Education Associa-

tion. Most of the \$390,000 raised by the group has come from the state and national teachers union.

Williams, 61, has been chief of staff to congressmen from Massachusetts, New York and Wisconsin. He also worked for public-employee unions in New England and previously spent eight years as a reporter. In Idaho, which is a right-to-work state, Williams said any focus on his union credentials is just a distraction.

Williams recently served as deputy campaign manager for We Are Ohio, a

group that won 62 percent of the vote in November to overturn a law that severely limited the bargaining rights of more than 350,000 teachers, firefighters, police officers and other public employees.

The defeat was a stinging blow to Ohio Gov. John Kasich and cast doubt on other Republican governors who have sought union-limiting measures as a means to curb spending. But backers of the Idaho laws contend the Ohio defeat won't prove a harbinger of things to come in the Gem State.

Otter picked lobbyist and

veteran campaigner Ken Burgess to help plot his strategy for rallying behind the new education laws.

"We are not Ohio," Burgess said. "There is no way you can compare the two states. In the end, it's not going to be as much about unions and union negotiations and union politics as it's going to be about what's right for educating Idaho's kids."

The political group backing Otter and Luna has yet to formally file with the state but expects to soon, said Burgess, who also sought bipartisan support.

Nearly \$6M in Idaho Lottery Prizes Unclaimed

BOISE • Idaho lottery officials are still waiting to hear from the person who won a \$1 million Powerball prize from the April 21 drawing with a ticket purchased in Nez Perce County in north-central Idaho.

The winner has 180 days from the drawing to claim the prize, but KTVB-TV reports sometimes people just don't collect.

Idaho Lottery spokesman David Workman says about \$6 million in lottery prizes went unclaimed in Idaho between July 2009 and June 2011, including a \$1 million ticket sold in eastern Idaho two years ago. The unclaimed prizes include scratch tickets and games like Powerball.

Workman says in fiscal year 2010, nearly \$3.7 million worth of prizes went unclaimed. The total for fiscal 2011 was almost \$2.3 million.

Unclaimed prize money benefits Idaho public schools and the permanent building fund.

Group Misses Mark for Medical Marijuana Initiative

BOISE • An effort to get voters to decide whether to legalize medical marijuana in Idaho has been snuffed out.

Compassionate Idaho

Lindsey Rinehart says the Boise-based group fell far short of the 47,500 signatures needed for a ballot initiative this fall.

Rinehart tells KTVB-TV the campaign struggled to overcome challenges for funding and advertising, and ultimately collected only about 5,000 signatures from registered voters.

Still, Rinehart says public surveys show support for medical marijuana in Idaho. Leaders of the group intend to launch another campaign to get the question before voters in 2014.

Idaho is surrounded by states like Washington, Oregon and Montana that have legalized the use of marijuana for medical reasons.

Republican Rep. Tom Trail failed again this year to get a bill legalizing medical marijuana approved by lawmakers.

Some N. Idaho Residents Protest Mining Waste Site

CATALDO • A small group of northern Idaho residents is pushing to close a mining waste repository in Cataldo, saying they fear metal-contaminated soil from the site could seep into the Coeur d'Alene River.

The group protested outside the repository Tuesday morning, demanding the site be relocated outside of a 100-year flood plain. Shane Stancik with the Sil-

ver Valley Community Resource Center told the *Coeur d'Alene Press* he fears efforts by the government to protect nearby land won't be enough to stop contamination from spreading.

The 4-year-old repository holds waste from Superfund cleanup efforts in the region, and it's been engineered to prevent erosion. Don Carpenter with the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality says there is regular ground and surface water monitoring at the site, as well as weekly visual inspections.

Man Gets Jail Time for Faking Motorcycle Accident

BOISE • The insurance claim seemed straightforward: Jason Preston said his motorcycle was wrecked.

His clothing was scuffed up to prove it.

But Idaho investigators figured there was something fishy about the Blackfoot man's story he'd crashed the bike to avoid hitting an animal in July 2011.

So what began as a seemingly ordinary Idaho traffic mishap has resulted in Preston being sentenced to 20 days in jail — for insurance fraud and damaging insured property.

A 6th District judge suspended Preston's one-to-four-year prison term.

Idaho Attorney General

Lawrence Wasden described Tuesday what really happened.

The 31-year-old placed his motorcycle in his truck, accelerated and pushed it off the back.

Preston's girlfriend then dragged him down the road.

The case was investigated by the Bonneville County sheriff and Idaho Department of Insurance.

Judge Denies Boise Hospital's Request for New Trial in Lawsuit

BOISE • A judge denied a Boise hospital's request for a new trial in a lawsuit filed by an MRI company.

A jury ordered Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in November to pay \$52 million to MRI Associates for violating a partnership agreement. The award was one of the largest ever to emerge from Idaho's district courts.

A request by Saint Alphonsus for a new trial, or judgment in their favor, was denied by a 4th District judge in late April, according to a story the *Idaho Statesman* published on Wednesday.

The lawsuit went to trial twice, with the first ending in a \$63 million verdict that was later overturned by the Idaho Supreme Court. After the retrial ended with a \$52 million judgment, the hospital said it may appeal.

Suspect Faces Another Lewd Conduct Charge in Sandpoint

SANDPOINT • A Sandpoint man accused of molesting a three-year-old boy has been charged with repeatedly molesting another youngster in Bonner County.

Shardan Cody Patterson was charged with another count of lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor on Friday. Judge Barbara Buchanan sustained Patterson's \$100,000 bail and forbid him from having any contact with minors if he bonds out of the Bonner County Jail.

The new complaint alleges that Patterson molested a girl from 2003 to 2009, when she was between the ages of 8 and 15 years old.

Last month, Patterson was charged with molesting a 3-year-old boy in 2010 and possession of methamphetamine on the day of his arrest.

Sheriff's detectives began investigating Patterson in 2010, but he was not prosecuted at the time because the child was too young to testify, according to court documents.

Patterson later relocated to Grand Forks, N.D., but returned to Idaho after being accused of mo-

lesting a young girl there.

Bonner County Prosecutor Louis Marshall said he does not believe Patterson has been formally charged in North Dakota and is awaiting a police report from that jurisdiction. Marshall said the girl in that case disclosed misconduct to her mother, who alerted authorities.

Patterson, 26, allegedly fled North Dakota to escape those allegations, but went from the frying pan and into the fire upon his return to Idaho.

Following his arrest last month, detectives executed a search warrant at Patterson's apartment in the 400 block of South First Avenue. A computer, mobile phones, storage devices were seized during the search.

An array of photographs and video recordings were also collected, although their contents were not disclosed in court documents. The search also turned up a young girl's shirt and underwear, court records indicate.

A preliminary hearing in the original Bonner County case is set for today in magistrate court. A preliminary hearing on the newest case is pending.

Three-vehicle Crash Near Buhl on Wednesday Hospitalizes Filer Man

BUHL • A Filer man was hospitalized Wednesday in a three-vehicle crash that shut down U.S. Highway 30 just east of Buhl for about four hours.

Gerrit P. Dragt, 56, of Filer, was transported by ground ambulance to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center before being taken by air ambulance to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise for further treatment.

According to an Idaho State Police report, Dragt was injured in a chain-reaction crash caused when his pickup truck was rear-ended by a westbound Kenworth truck hauling a tanker trailer, driven by Michael C. Franks, 36, of Jerome.

The crash occurred at about 9 a.m., and caused traffic to be diverted between 1500 and 1700 North roads

while crews investigated and cleaned the area.

"When a semi is involved it can take a long time," Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Lori Stewart said.

According to ISP, James R. Baker, 71, of Filer was headed westbound in a Ford F250 pickup when he stopped to turn left into the parking lot of Sliman and Butler Irrigation. Dragt was stopped behind him when his vehicle

was hit by Franks' semi.

That collision caused a chain reaction, as Dragt's pickup hit Baker's, causing it to travel off the road, through a fence and strike a piece of farm equipment in the Buhl Implement parking lot at 20355 U.S. Highway 30.

Dragt was not wearing a seat belt, according to ISP. The report did not indicate if any citation was issued or if an arrest was made.

Protection Sought for Rare Woodpecker

Conservationists are seeking Endangered Species Act protection for the rare woodpecker that feeds on beetles in burned forests.

RENO, Nev. • Smokey Bear has done such a good job stomping out forest fires the past half-century that a woodpecker that's survived for millions of years by eating beetle larvae in burned trees is in danger of going extinct in parts of the West, according to conservationists seeking U.S. protection for the bird.

Four conservation groups filed a petition with the U.S. Interior Department on Wednesday to list the black-backed woodpecker under the Endangered Species Act in the Sierra Nevada, Oregon's Eastern Cascades and the Black Hills of eastern Wyoming and western South Dakota.

It is the first federal petition to recognize the ecological significance and seek protection of post-fire habitat, an expert said.

In addition to fire suppression, the groups contend post-fire salvage logging combined with commercial thinning of green forests is eliminating what little remains of the bird's habitat, mostly in national forests where it has no legal protection.

"Intensely burned forest habitat not only has no legal protection, but standard practice on private and public lands is to actively eliminate it," the petition said. "When fire and insect outbreaks create excellent woodpecker habitat, salvage logging promptly destroys it."

Chad Hanson, executive director of the Earth Island's John Muir Project based in Cedar Ridge, Calif., filed the petition Wednesday with the Interior Department's U.S.

Fish and Wildlife Service in Sacramento. Co-petitioners are the Center for Biological Diversity based in Tucson, Ariz., the Blue Mountains Biodiversity Project in Fossil, Ore., and the Biodiversity Conservation Alliance in Laramie, Wyo.

Hanson, a wildlife ecologist at the University of California, Davis, said the black-backed woodpecker has been eating beetles in fire-killed stands of conifer forests for millions of years and specifically in North American forests for "many thousand years — since the last Ice Age."

"Now, it's very rare," he said.

The best science suggests there are fewer than 1,000 pairs in Oregon and California, and fewer than 500 pairs in the Black Hills, the petition said.

"Such small populations are at significant risk of extinction, especially when their habitat is mostly unprotected and is currently under threat of destruction and degradation," the document said.

The three-toed, black-backed woodpecker is a specialist at digging out wood-boring insect larvae. The bird's sooty black dorsal plumage serves to camouflage it against the deeply black, charred bark of

burned trees.

Richard Hutto, a biology professor and director of the Avian Science Center at the University of Montana, has been doing post-fire research since the early 1990s. He said it would be difficult to find a forest-bird species more restricted to a single vegetation cover type than the black-backed woodpecker is to early post-fire conditions.

Hanson believes the federal petition is the first to seek protection of post-fire habitat and recognize it as "distinct and ecologically significant."

"While it may come as a surprise to some, burned forests, and the dead trees associated with them, are essential to the survival of many wildlife species," said Justin Augustine, a San Francisco-based staff attorney for the Center for Biological Diversity.

Over the past five years, the two have been pressing for protection of the bird through legal challenges to U.S. Forest Service logging projects, primarily in burned forests in the Sierra north and south of Lake Tahoe.

A May 14 hearing is set before the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in an ongoing legal battle between the Forest Service and the John Muir Project over salvage logging in woodpecker habitat where 250 homes burned in the 2007 Angora fire at South Lake Tahoe, Calif.

Dems Continue to Outpace Republicans in Nevada

LAS VEGAS (AP) • Nevada Republicans have some catching up to do.

The secretary of state's office says the number of active Democrat voters increased by 3,915 in April, while 2,485 more voters registered as nonpartisan.

In contrast, Republicans increased their number of

active voters by 2,277 people. That's a notable improvement from March, when the GOP added 954 votes. In all, nearly 9,500 Nevadans registered to vote in April.

There are roughly 392,000 Republicans and 429,000 Democrats registered to vote in Nevada.

Deal Undone? Activist Now Wants to Leave China

BEIJING • The blind Chinese dissident who boldly fled house arrest and placed himself under the wing of U.S. diplomats balked Wednesday at a deal delicately worked out between the two countries to let him live freely in China, saying he now fears for his family's safety unless they are all spirited abroad.

After six days holed up in the U.S. Embassy, as senior officials in Beijing and Washington tussled over his fate, Chen Guangcheng left the compound's protective confines Wednesday for a nearby hospital for treatment of a leg injury suffered in his escape. A shaken Chen told The Associated Press from his hospital room that Chinese authorities has warned him he would lose his opportunity to be reunited with his family if he stayed longer in the embassy.

U.S. officials verified that account. But they adamantly denied his contention that one American diplomat had warned him of a threat from the Chinese that his wife would be beaten to death if he did not get out of the embassy.

"I think we'd like to rest in a place outside of China," Chen told the AP, appealing again for help in Washington. "Help my family and me leave safely."

Only hours earlier, U.S. officials said they had extracted from the Chinese government a promise that Chen would join his family and be allowed to start a new life in a university town in China, safe from the rural authorities who had abusively held him in prison and house arrest for nearly seven years.

That announcement had been timed to clear up the matter before strategic and economic meetings start Thursday between Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner and their Chinese counterparts — and to show the U.S. standing firm in its defense of human rights in China while engaging on other issues.

Clinton spoke to Chen on the phone when he left the embassy and, in a statement, welcomed the resettlement agreement as one that "reflected his choices and our values."

But the murky circumstances of Chen's departure from the embassy, and his sudden appeal to leave China after declaring he wanted to stay, again threatened to overshadow talks that were to focus on the global economic crisis and hotspots such as North Korea, Iran, Syria and Sudan.

The Chinese Foreign Ministry signaled its unhappiness with the entire affair, demanding that the U.S. apologize for giving Chen sanctuary at the embassy.

"What the U.S. side has done has interfered in the domestic affairs of China, and the Chinese side will never accept it," Foreign Ministry spokesman Liu Weimin said in a statement.

Chen, 40, became an international human rights figure and inspiration to many ordinary Chinese after running afoul of local government officials for exposing forced abortions carried out as part of China's one-child policy. He served four years in prison on what supporters said were fabricated charges, then was kept under house arrest with his wife, daughter and mother, with the adults often being roughed by officials and his daughter searched and harassed.

In Arkansas, Two Women Claim Discarded Lotto Ticket

Sharon Jones, an Arkansas woman who cashed a \$1 million lottery ticket may have to give up the winnings to Sharon Duncan, a woman who threw away the ticket after she bought it, according to a judge's ruling.

BEEBE, Ark. • When she plucked a winning lottery ticket out of the trash, Sharon Jones' luck changed instantly. The \$1 million prize let her pay off debts, give thousands of dollars to her children and buy a gleaming new pickup truck.

But now her jackpot is in jeopardy. A judge ruled this week that the money belongs to another woman, who says she threw the ticket away after a lottery machine incorrectly told her it was a loser. The Arkansas Lottery Commission insists there are no problems with its equipment.

"Why does she have the right to come back after she's already thrown it away and say, 'Oh no. Now that it is a winner, I want the money?'" asked Jones' husband, William, who was laid off last year after working in construction.

Sharon Jones claimed the \$1 million prize last July, turning in a scratch-off "Diamond Dazzler" ticket that the other woman, Sharon Duncan, had purchased earlier at the Super 1 Stop convenience store in Beebe, about 35 miles northeast of Little Rock.

Duncan told a judge she discarded the ticket after an electronic scanner her it was "not a winner."

"And then the next thing, you know, 10 months later, you're fighting for something that was trash," William Jones said.

Years ago, Sharon Jones quit her job washing dishes at a cafe in nearby Searcy to tend to her father-in-law as he was dying from a lung disease. To make money, she often collected discarded lottery tickets because they can qualify for secondary prizes. What used to be her father-in-law's bedroom now contains three large plastic bins full of thousands of old tickets — and a copy of the winning ticket.

Jones discovered the ticket was a winner when the state's database wouldn't let her enter the ticket number.

The state Lottery Commission said it is confident its machines work properly. "We've never had a report of a mis-scanned ticket," spokeswoman Julie Baldrige said.

William Jones said the couple was living paycheck-to-paycheck before hitting the jackpot. After the two claimed their prize money, they looked to buy a house to replace the ranch-style home they live in now.

"That was one of the first things on our agenda," he said, explaining that their plans all "got shattered" when ownership of the ticket was disputed. A judge issued a restraining order — but only after the Joneses spent some of the money.

The two now have about \$490,000 remaining from the \$680,000 they received after taxes. They say they gave tens of thousands of dollars to their children and about \$4,500 to a relative who has a child with Down syndrome.

One of Duncan's attorneys said his client isn't ready to talk about the lottery ticket yet. Another lawyer, James "Red" Morgan, argued in court that she simply made a mistake by throwing away a \$1 million ticket and that the only right she willingly parted with was to enter the ticket for the possibility of a secondary prize.

White County Judge Thomas Hughes concluded that Duncan bought the winning ticket, even though lottery records and store security video didn't synch up to the precise timing of the purchase. He ruled that Duncan never abandoned her right to claim the winnings.

"The \$1 million was never found money," the judge said Tuesday.

Lottery officials investigated Jones' account of finding the ticket and were satisfied with it, Lottery Security Chief Lance Huey testified.

Attorneys for the Joneses plan to appeal the judge's decision. In the meantime, the remaining money is in limbo. Asked what the pair would do if they had to turn over a full \$1 million, Jones laughed.

"I hope I don't have to answer that question," he said before confiding that there's no way they could pay back the money.

Afghanistan Security Deal Obama Signed Has Holes

WASHINGTON • The 10-year security compact that President Barack Obama signed with Afghan President Hamid Karzai contains promises the United States and Afghanistan cannot guarantee they will keep, and loopholes for both nations.

The deal signed Tuesday also allows either nation to walk away on a year's notice. That could allow the next U.S. president, or the next Afghan leader, to scuttle a deal negotiated by his or her predecessor.

For Obama, the agreement represents a compromise with Karzai after messy negotiations over U.S. military detention of Afghan suspects and raids on Afghan homes that offend Afghans.

U.S. concessions were relatively small, however, and the deal Obama signed in Kabul is probably the best one he could get on a tight deadline. He wants to showcase a long-term commitment to Afghan stability when he hosts NATO leaders for a summit in Chicago later this month. U.S. officials said the deal is legally binding, but it does not carry the force of a treaty as Afghanistan originally wanted.

Obama called the agreement historic, and said it "defines a new kind of relationship between our countries — a future in which Afghans are responsible for the security of their nation, and we build an equal partnership between two sovereign states."

The deal pledges Afghanistan to fight corruption, improve efficiency and protect human rights, including women's rights. All are areas where the United States already finds fault with Afghan performance, and Afghanistan has promised improvement on corruption many times before. The nine-page agreement spells out no consequences if those or other goals are not met.

The agreement uses even looser language to address the production and trafficking of illegal drugs in Afghanistan, a major opium producer. Both nations affirm that illicit drugs undermine security and legitimate economic growth but promise only to cooperate to confront the threat.

The United States promises to seek annual funding to train and equip the Afghan armed forces but gives no dollar figure. That money must be approved by Congress, which has so far supported the Obama administration's plan to build up the Afghan forces. There is growing concern in Congress, however, about the quality of those forces, and the billions of dollars they would need over 10 years is not assured.

13 Charged in Hazing Death of Florida A&M Band Member

ORLANDO, Fla. • Thirteen people were charged Wednesday in one of the biggest college hazing cases ever prosecuted in the U.S., accused in the death of a Florida A&M University drum major who authorities say was mercilessly pummeled by fellow members of the marching band.

The charges came more than five months after Robert Champion, 26,

died aboard a chartered bus parked outside an Orlando hotel following a performance against a rival school.

While the most sensational hazing cases have typically involved fraternities, sororities or athletic teams, the FAMU tragedy in November exposed a brutal tradition among marching bands at some colleges around the U.S.

"The death ... is nothing short of an American tragedy," said State Attorney Lawson Lamar. "No one should have expected that his college experience would include being pummeled to death."

Eleven defendants were charged with hazing resulting in death, a felony, and misdemeanor offenses

The agreement promises ongoing U.S. investment in a variety of development, health, education and support projects aimed at helping the poor nation one day support itself, and it commits the United States to seek annual funding from Congress “commensurate with the strategic importance of the U.S.-Afghan partnership.”

U.S. officials said they cannot make a more specific pledge because Congress controls the purse strings.

The agreement, which takes effect when U.S. and other foreign combat forces leave in 2014, also is not the last word on whether the United States leaves a much smaller contingent of troops in Afghanistan after that date.

Both of the current leaders want such a residual force. But if Iraq is a guide, the rationale for a continued U.S. military presence on the soil of a Muslim nation could change, or new leadership in Washington or Kabul could decide on a different path.

Pentagon spokesman Capt. John Kirby said the “strategic partnership agreement” is not intended to address the specific terms of an ongoing military relationship. The agreement pledges the two nations to begin work on a more detailed pact, and sets a goal of one year to complete it.

“Clearly if you’re going to have troops remaining in Afghanistan, you’re going to have to have some guidelines that govern that,” Kirby said. “What form it takes and what title it has ... we’re just not there yet.”

The U.S. promises to name Afghanistan a “major non-NATO ally,” a loose term meant to underscore U.S. commitment to Afghan stability but not one that would automatically bind the U.S. to come to Afghanistan’s defense if it were attacked. The deal does say that the United States would “regard with grave concern any external aggression against Afghanistan,” and promises urgent consultation on a diplomat-

ic, military or other response.

The agreement also sets in writing previous assurances from U.S. leaders that the United States will not build permanent military bases in Afghanistan or use its soil to launch hostile attacks on its neighbors. That does not preclude U.S. military and intelligence units from sharing space at Afghan bases, but if honored would prevent the United States from launching any future strike on Iran from inside Afghanistan.

Karzai had sought the deal as a measure of U.S. dedication to protect and underwrite his poor but strategically located country. He is worried about a political and military resurgence of the Taliban insurgency once tens of thousands of foreign forces leave, and U.S. officials share that concern.

Karzai, however, is scheduled to leave office in 2014, probably just before the new agreement would take effect.

His successor is unclear, as is the future of a political outreach to the Taliban that might draw the movement or its surrogates into some kind of power-sharing arrangement. All are factors that could affect whether Afghanistan continues to want such a deal with the United States.

Either nation can quit the agreement with one year’s written notice. If both parties want to cancel it they can do so by mutual agreement at any time.

The deal was announced the same day the Pentagon said in a new report that the counter-insurgency campaign is making good progress on the military side, but little progress on issues that depend on cooperation from the Afghan and Pakistani governments.

“The Afghan government continues to face widespread corruption that limits its effectiveness and legitimacy and bolsters insurgent messaging,” the semi-annual report to Congress said.

It identified safe havens in Pakistan where insurgents hide and re-arm for attacks on U.S. and Afghan forces as “the most critical threat” to the war effort.

Bronzed N.J. Mom: Girl’s Sunburn Not from Salon

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) • A deeply tanned New Jersey mother accused of causing skin burns to her young daughter by taking her into a tanning booth pleaded not guilty Wednesday to a child endangerment charge, and the tanning salon’s owner appeared to corroborate her story.

Patricia Krentcil faces a second-degree child endangerment charge. Through her attorney, she pleaded

not guilty in Newark Municipal Court on Wednesday morning. Krentcil is free on \$2,500 cash bond.

Before Wednesday’s court hearing, Krentcil, whose skin has a deep bronze color from regular visits to the tanning salon, called the accusation a lie.

“It’s all made up,” she said. She told The Associated

Press her daughter, who was 5 at the time of the alleged incident in mid-April and has since turned 6, got sunburned by being outside on an unseasonably warm day. She said her

daughter, however, had mentioned to school officials when she complained of itching that she had been to a tanning salon with her mother.

15 Million of World’s Babies Are Born Prematurely

The startling toll: 1.1 million of these fragile newborns die as a result, and even those who survive can suffer lifelong disabilities.

WASHINGTON • About 15 million premature babies are born every year — more than 1 in 10 of the world’s births and a bigger problem than previously believed, according to the first country-by-country estimates of this obstetric epidemic.

The startling toll: 1.1 million of these fragile newborns die as a result, and even those who survive can suffer lifelong disabilities.

Most of the world’s preemies are born in Africa and Asia, says the report released Wednesday.

It’s a problem for the U.S., too, where half a million babies are born too soon. That’s about 1 in 8 U.S. births, a higher rate than in Europe, Canada, Australia or Japan — and even worse than rates in a number of less developed countries, too, the report found.

But the starkest difference between rich and poorer countries: Survival.

“Being born too soon is an unrecognized killer,” said Dr. Joy Lawn of Save the Children, who co-authored the report with the March of Dimes, World Health Organization and a coalition of international health experts. “And it’s unrecognized in the countries where you could have a massive effect in reducing these deaths.”

Sophisticated and expensive intensive care saves the majority of preterm babies in the U.S. and other developed nations, even the tiniest, most premature ones. The risk of death from prematurity is at least 12 times higher for an African newborn than for a

European baby, the report found.

Globally, prematurity is not only the leading killer of newborns but the second-leading cause of death in children under 5.

“These facts should be a call to action,” United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon wrote in an introduction to the report.

Three-quarters of the deaths could be prevented by spreading some simple, inexpensive treatments to the neediest countries, the report concludes. For example, providing \$1 steroid shots during preterm labor hastens development of immature fetal lungs. They’re standard in developed countries; wider use in low-income countries could save nearly 400,000 babies a year.

Even more lives could be saved by teaching “kangaroo care,” in which moms carry their tiny babies nestled skin-to-skin on their bare chests for warmth when there are no incubators.

“To see babies who are 900 grams (about 2 pounds) survive without any technology, it’s fantastic,” says Lawn, who has watched kangaroo care save lives in countries like Malawi, with the highest preterm birth rate — 18.1 percent.

Also needed: Antibiotics to fight the infections that often kill newborns, and antiseptic cream to prevent umbilical cord infection.

Survival isn’t the only hurdle. No one knows how many preemies suffer disabilities including cerebral palsy, blindness or learning disorders.

That’s why preventing preterm births in the first place is the ultimate goal, one

reason for comparing countries — to learn why some do better and some worse. Previously, the groups had estimated that 13 million babies were born prematurely each year, based on regional data.

About 12 percent of U.S. births are preterm, about the same as Wednesday’s report estimates in Thailand, Turkey and Somalia. In contrast, just 5.9 percent of births in Japan and Sweden are premature.

Experts can’t fully explain why the U.S. premie rate is so much worse than similar high-income countries. But part of the reason must be poorer access to prenatal care for uninsured U.S. women, especially minority mothers-to-be, said March of Dimes epidemiologist Christopher Howson. African-American women are nearly twice as likely as white women to receive late or no prenatal care, and they have higher rates of preterm birth as well, he said.

More disturbing, the report ranks the U.S. with a worse preterm birth rate than 58 of the 65 countries that best track the problem, including much of Latin America. Add dozens of poor countries where the counts are less certain, and the report estimates that 127 other nations may have lower rates.

Whatever the precise numbers, “we have a shared problem among all countries and we need a shared solution,” Howson said.

One key: Not just early prenatal care but more preconception care, he said. Given that in the U.S. alone, nearly half of pregnancies are unplanned, health providers should use any encounter with a woman of childbearing age to check for factors that could imperil a pregnancy.

“Ensure that mom goes in to her pregnancy as healthy as possible,” Howson said.

Gingrich Ends Campaign, Urges Party to Back Romney

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) • Newt Gingrich, the colorful former House speaker and fiery partisan, formally exited the Republican presidential contest Wednesday and vowed to help Mitt Romney’s bid to defeat President Barack Obama.

Ending a campaign that seasawed between implosion and frontrunner and back again, Gingrich threw his support to his one-time rival as expected and promised his supporters he would continue to push conservative ideas. Gingrich bowed out of the race more than \$4 million in debt and his reputation perhaps damaged.

“Today, I am suspending the campaign. But suspending the campaign does not mean suspending citizenship,” Gingrich told a ballroom in a suburban Washington hotel.

“We are now going to put down the role of candidate and candidate’s spouse and take back the role of active citizens,” he said, adding he would continue to promote conservative ideas on college campuses, as well as through newsletters and films.

Fierce Clashes Stoke Tensions ahead of Egypt Key Election

CAIRO (AP) • Egypt’s worst violence in months escalated the confrontation between political forces and the ruling military ahead of a landmark presidential election, as suspected army supporters attacked mainly Islamist protesters outside the Defense Ministry Wednesday, sparking clashes that left at least 11 people dead.

Political parties swiftly blamed the ruling generals for the bloodshed and vowed the election must go ahead as planned to ensure the military’s removal from power.

Egypt has been plagued by sporadic bouts of deadly violence since the ouster of longtime authoritarian leader Hosni Mubarak last year, but Wednesday’s killings took on added significance, coming just three weeks ahead of the presidential election.

Billy Graham Backs Attempt to Outlaw Gay Marriage in N.C.

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) • The Rev. Billy Graham urged North Carolina voters Wednesday to support an amendment to the state constitution banning gay marriage, a move that an observer said was highly unusual but another said was in keeping with the minister’s moral beliefs.

“Watching the moral decline of our country causes me great concern,” said Graham, 93, who lives near Asheville. “I believe the home and marriage is the foundation of our society and must be protected.”

His complete statement about Amendment One will be part of full-page ads slated to appear in 14 North Carolina newspapers throughout the weekend.

Graham’s statement was issued by the Charlotte-based Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, which is led by Graham’s son, the Rev. Franklin Graham. Franklin Graham recorded a message last month in support of Amendment One, which is on the ballot in the election Tuesday.

that all together could bring nearly six years in prison. Two others face misdemeanor charges.

It was not immediately clear whether those charged were all students or whether they included faculty members or others involved in the road trip.

By Wednesday afternoon, two students were in custody at the Leon County jail in Tallahassee: Rikki Wills, 24, and Caleb Jackson, 23. Both are charged with felony hazing resulting in death.

Wills, who was also drum major, declined comment when reached by phone. No working phone number was available for Jackson. The names of the 11 others have not been released.

Jackson was serving probation for a felony battery charge, according to state and local records. He was arrested in 2009 by Tallahassee Community College police for battery and resisting without violence and arrested again by Tallahassee police a year later, according to county jail records.

Champion had bruises on his chest, arms, shoulder and back and died of internal bleeding, Lamar said. Witnesses told emergency dispatchers that the drum major was vomiting before he was found unresponsive aboard the bus.

The prosecutor gave no motive for the beating. But witnesses said Champion might have been targeted because he opposed the routine hazing that went on in the marching band or because he was gay, according to his family’s attorney.

Legal experts had predicted more serious charges, such as

manslaughter or second-degree murder.

Champion’s mother, Pam, said she was glad charges were brought but disappointed they weren’t more severe. “I thought it should send a harsher message,” she said.

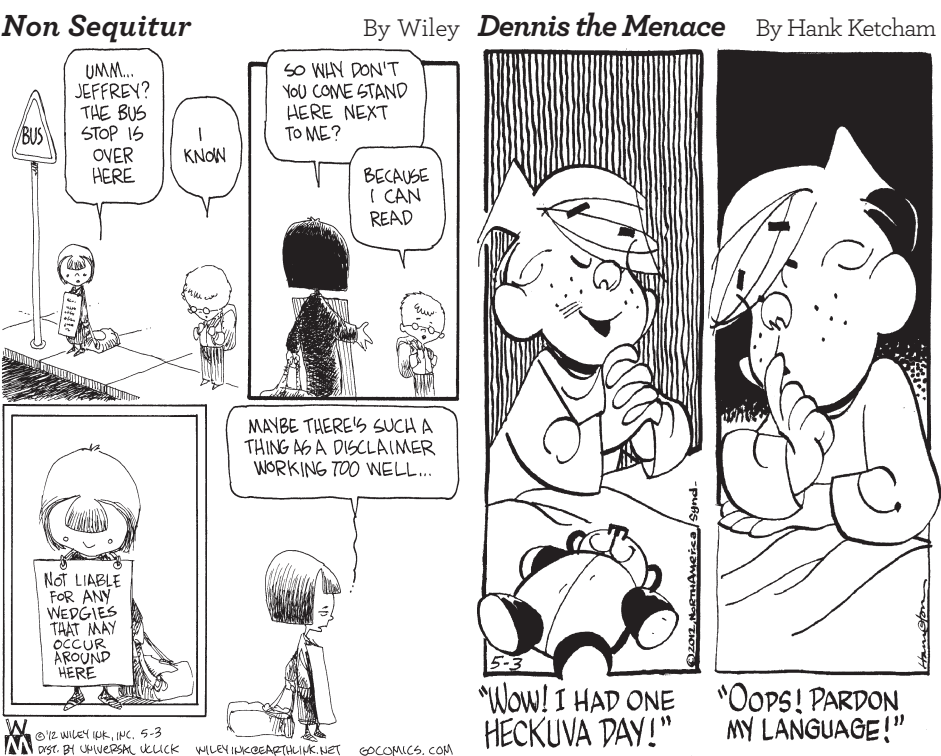
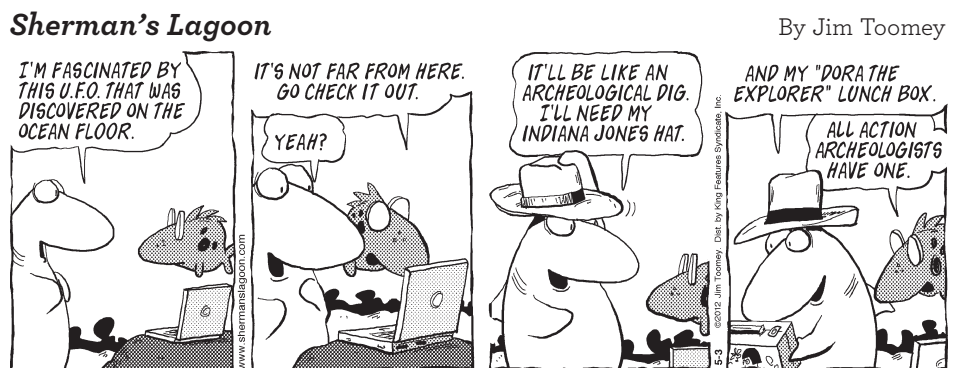
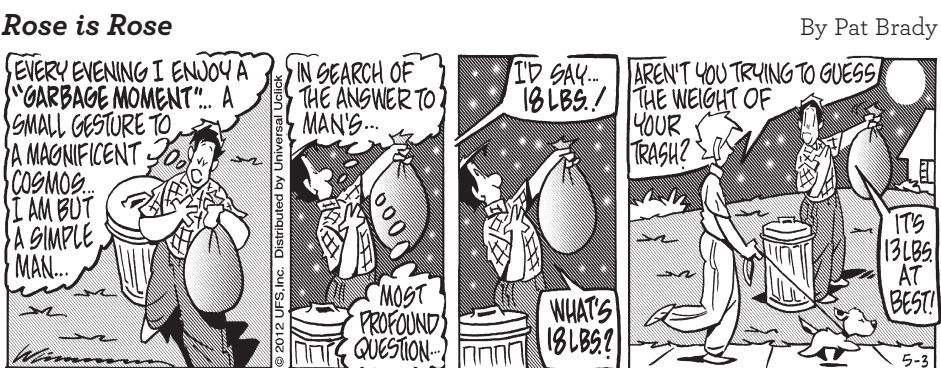
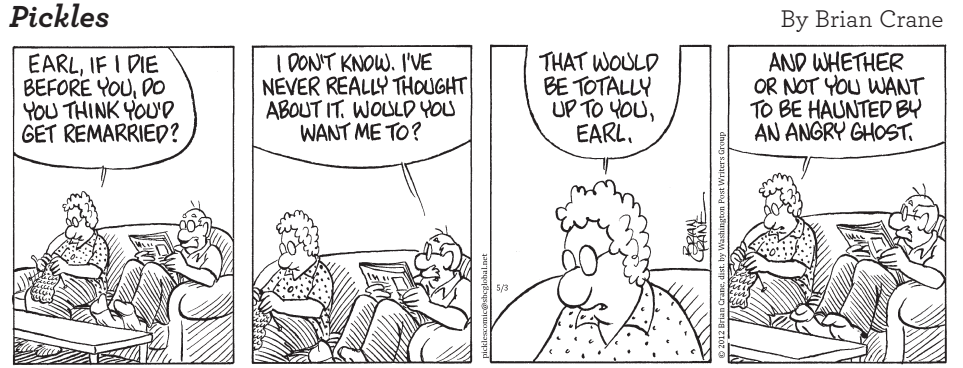
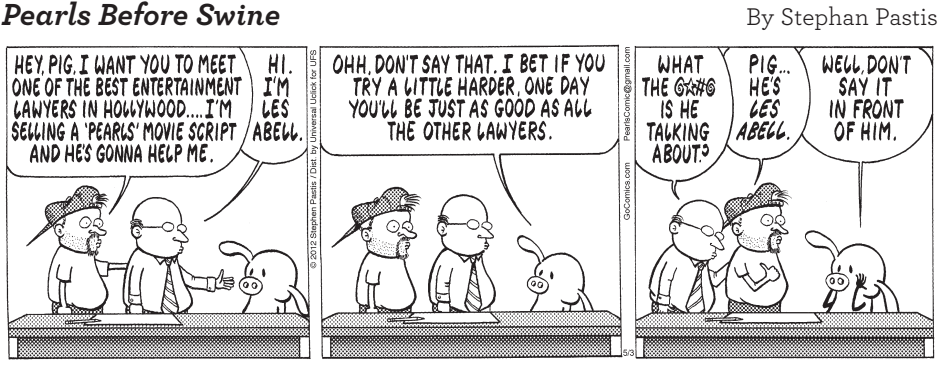
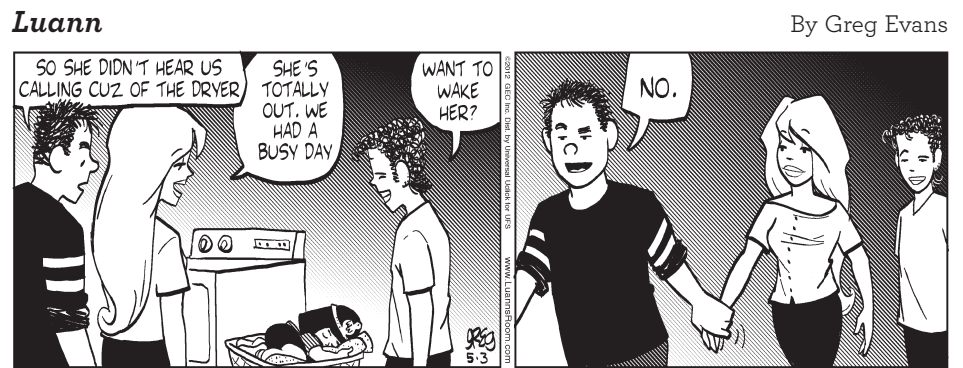
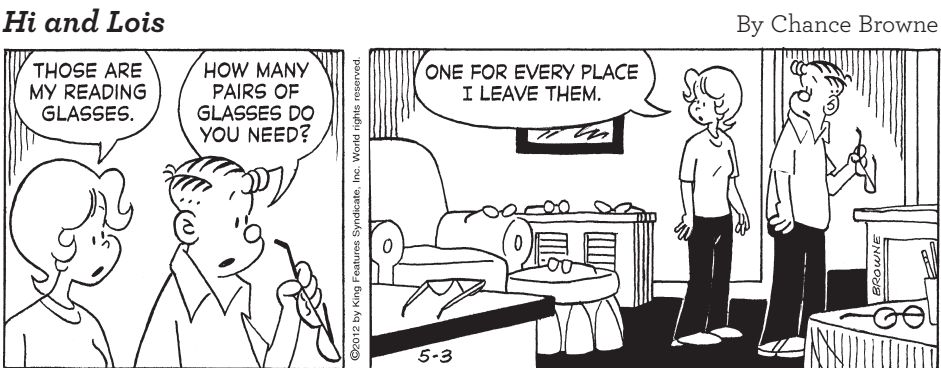
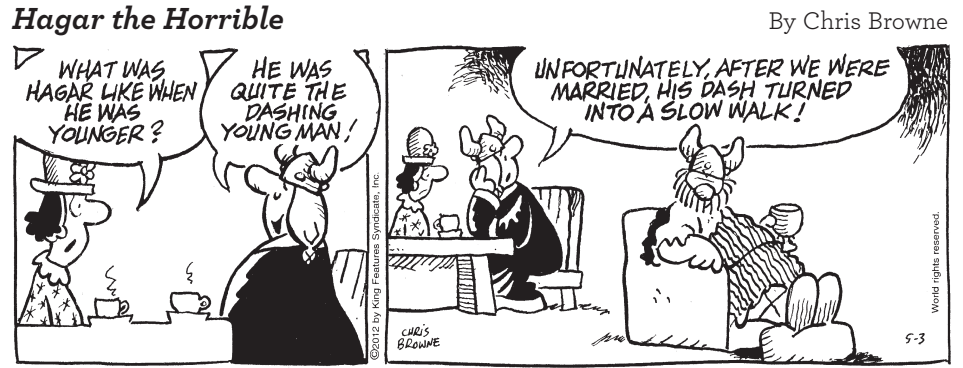
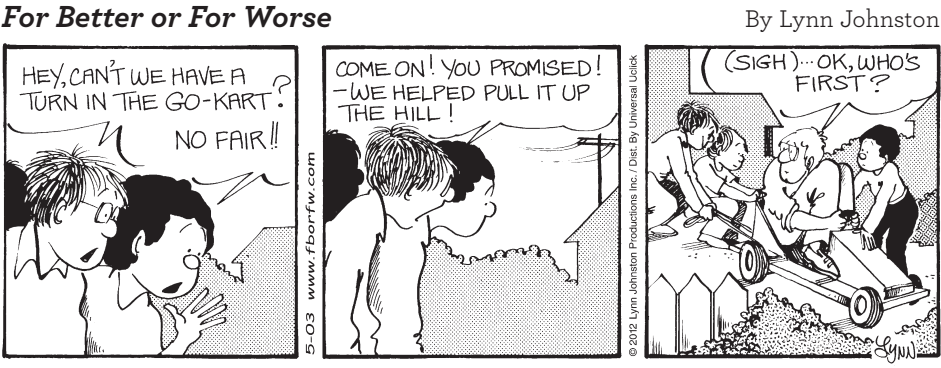
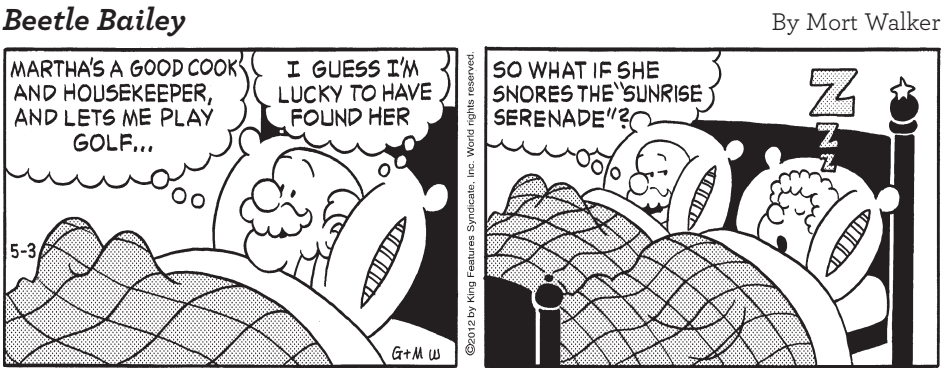
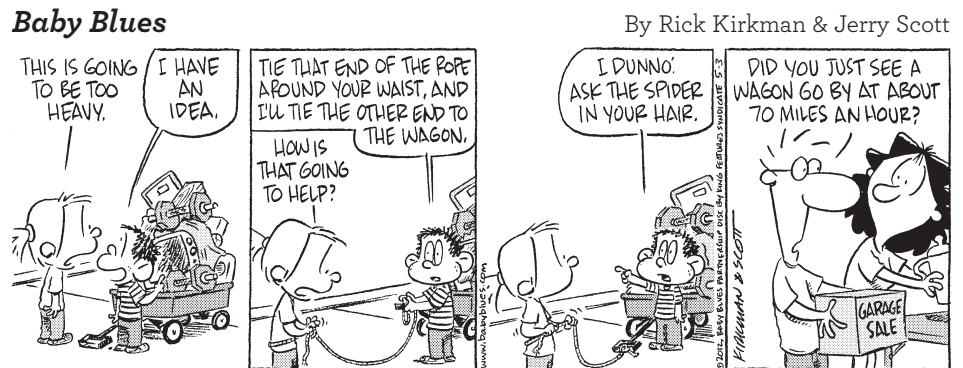
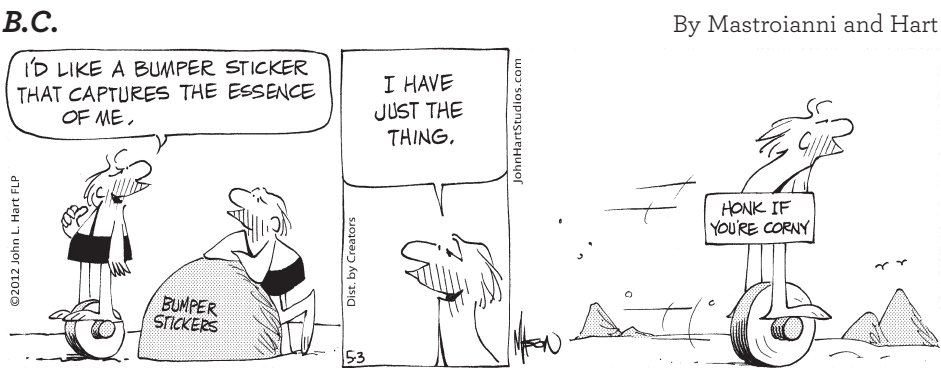
Lamar said prosecutors didn’t have the evidence to bring more serious charges.

“The testimony obtained to date does not support a charge of murder, in that it does not contain the elements of murder,” he said. “We can prove participation in hazing and a death. We do not have a blow or a shot or a knife thrust that killed Mr. Champion. It is an aggregation of things which exactly fit the Florida statute as written by the Legislature.”

Hazing in Florida was upgraded to a felony in 2005 following the death of a University of Miami student four years earlier. Chad Meredith was drunk and died trying to swim across a lake at the behest of his fraternity brothers. No charges were filed, but a civil jury ordered the fraternity to pay Meredith’s parents \$12 million.

Champion’s death has jeopardized the future of FAMU’s legendary marching band, which has performed at the Grammys, presidential inaugurations and Super Bowls and represented the U.S. in Paris at the 200th anniversary of the French Revolution. FAMU, based in Tallahassee, has suspended the band and set up a task force on curtailing hazing.

Hazing has long been practiced in marching bands, particularly at historically black colleges like FAMU in the South, where the band is often as revered as the football team and members are campus celebrities.

RUPERT • Eying the four compound bows on a table, Madeli Burgoyne spotted a lime green one and grabbed it excitedly before sauntering to a firing line with three other students, all who have child-size compound bows in hand.

Before April 27, the 14-year-old hadn't ever shot a bow. But after reading “The Hunger Games” by Suzanne Collins, she's been thinking about the sport. Her first opportunity to shoot was made possible through an event sponsored by the DeMary Memorial Library.

The library created a game inspired by the book series and movie. Aim of the event is to get youth excited about its summer program, in which kids will read the book.

“Katniss, a main character in the series, is so cool and inspiring because she depends on her bow and arrow,” said Burgoyne, who already has read the book. “She defends herself and is able to get food and everything she needs.”

Channeling Katniss, Burgoyne lifted her bow. An arrow cut through the air and landed just outside the target's boundary. Pleased with her first try, Burgoyne shoots a few more times.

“It was exciting, though I need to practice,” Burgoyne said. “It's definitely a sport I'd like to get into.”

Her 14-year-old sister Shanen Burgoyne said much the same thing.

“It wouldn't be as inspiring if Katniss shot a gun,” she said. “There is just something

about her ability with a bow. It's unique because you don't see characters in books or movies using a bow much, and it's awesome that Katniss is so good at it.”

The book and movie is inspiring kids across the country. Even though archery is already popular in Idaho, area stores attribute an up tick in sales because of “The Hunger Games.”

Sportsman's Warehouse manager Reese Widmier said the store is selling more archery equipment because of the book and movie, but deferred further comment to the corporate office, which didn't return calls.

Caleb Drake, owner of Advantage Archery in Twin Falls, said sales are up about 15 percent at his downtown store, although he doesn't know how much of that is because of Collins' work.

Drake said archery is popular anyway and sales have been on the rise for a few seasons.

“We have gotten some new customers because of ‘The Hunger Games,’ with kids excited about the sport because of the book and movie,” he said. “But I don't know how much of our increase in sales is tied to it, because I don't survey customers to that level of detail.”

Mike Biggins, a member of the Minidoka Bowmen archery club, which has an archery shooting center in Rupert, said more families are participating in the sport overall. By introducing kids to shooting through the library's recent event, he's encouraged that more will join the group.

“I think it's great that kids are inspired to at least try the sport, even if that inspiration comes from a book or movie,” Biggins said.

TWIN FALLS • Worried about the risks? Unsure about the gear? You don't have to experience the great outdoors alone.

Outfitters, as the name suggests, are companies that outfit their customers with equipment and guides for a fun, safe adventure in the wild. Many outfitters or guide services specialize — say, in backcountry or river rafting — while others have their hands in many pies.

The next time you're looking for adventure, consider these:

White Otter Adventures

This Sun Valley-based outfitter offers guided river and float fishing trips. The latter are popular for young families and senior couples who don't want a rough time on the water, said owner Doug Fenn.

Already, fishing is doing well. “There are so many fishermen in Sun Valley,” he said. “We're either getting a lot

of families with smaller kids or older folks who aren't comfortable waiting around on the beach or on the rocks. In a float they can sit up higher in the water, and they seem to really enjoy it. It's a really good way for people to get into fly fishing.”

Fenn, who's owned White Otter since 2008, said it's a pleasure for him to meet the people of southern Idaho and beyond who come to enjoy adventure on the Salmon River.

He expects steelhead fishing to be good for at least the next couple of weeks; after that, he said, warmer temperatures will cause water to rise and fishing to slow.

On average, float trips are 10 miles — sometimes farther depending on water flow and customers' wishes. A fisherman can get onto a float for \$300 for up to seven hours. Add \$25 for a second person.

Idaho Guide Service

River guide Olin Gardner has made a name for himself in southern Idaho, and

he, too, looks forward to a good season.

“There's definitely a good flow; not quite near as good as last year,” he said. “But it seems like it'll be a busy season; people are already calling.”

Besides guided river trips, the company offers rock climbing by certified staff from the American Mountain Guides Association.

Idaho Guide Service was licensed last year for technical mountaineering and rock climbing. Most of the climbs currently are at Dierkes Lake, a good place for beginners and intermediate climbers, Gardner said.

“It doesn't look like there's much there,” he said, but that's not true. “You can boulder the heck out of new routes.”

Eventually, Gardner would like to extend his climbing ventures to the City of Rocks National Reserve near Almo, but that requires extending his permit area.

A guided rock-climbing adventure starts at \$75 for a group of five for half a day.

For Pure Shooting Fun, Blast Some Reactive Targets

Regardless of how much political wrangling goes on in Washington, I truly believe that the future of the Second Amendment and recreational shooting rests in the hands of today's young people. If we can enlist them into our ranks, then these sacred rights should continue to be respected and protected as a vital part of this nation's heritage well into the current century. Ignore these young people, however, and these constitutionally guaranteed liberties might well be vanquished within our lifetimes with the sweep of the presidential pen. Recent surveys suggest that it could go either way.

Is there anything that we can do to ensure that these birthrights of American citizenship survive into the foreseeable future? The good folks at the National Shooting Sports Foundation recommend that you introduce someone new to the shooting sports this year. So that's what I did.

I invited my daughter Samantha and two of her college friends out for an afternoon of plinking at the

local gun range. Rather than slipping a package of conventional paper targets into the range bag, I stuffed it with some really cool reactive targets that I had purchased recently for testing. From my experience, few things provide more instant gratification than blasting a bunch of reactive targets with .22s. Samantha and one of the gals have limited experience with firearms; the other two girls had never handled a firearm in their lives and were understandably apprehensive.

After going over the basics of safe gun handling and instructing the ladies how to aim and operate the single shot and 10/22 rifles, we walked downrange to set out the targets. When they saw what they were going to be shooting, they literally ran back to the shooting benches to load up and commence firing. At the 25-yard line, we

had placed large pieces of sidewalk chalk, Necco candy wafers and a steel animal silhouette spinner.

You should have heard the squeals of excitement as the wafers shattered, the chalk exploded into colored puffs of dust, and the little steel animals spun around on the metal frame. They were having a blast.

Next, the sights were fixed on the 50-yard line. Here the Birchwood Casey Zombie Splattering targets nervously awaited their fate. In no time, a hail of withering gunfire reduced the undead to pulp. The neat thing about these splatter targets is that white or multi-colored halos mark the impact of each shot, providing instant feedback on where the lead is smacking Zombie flesh; gruesome.

For the day's finale, we had set a new Champion Duraseal spinner target on the 100-yard embankment. These highly reactive spinners feature a molded animal or conventional target triangle or circle. The gals didn't care that the little green fluorescent gopher was designed to absorb thousands of large and small caliber hits before giving up the ghost; they just wanted to see who could keep the little rubber rodent spinning the longest.

The ladies declared the day to be a success and each thanked us for introducing them to firearms in such a fun and non-intimidating format. Thanks to the pure joy of shooting reactive targets, I think we've made some converts. Good shooting!

The company specializes in guided rough-water rafting and kayaking trips and calm-water fishing trips near the Hagerman and Bliss portions of the Snake.

Float the Hagerman section, a class 3 rapid, for three hours and 10 miles. The trip starts at Salmon Falls Dam and ends at Hagerman Ranch. There are other options, too. Prices start at \$30 a person.

McBride said he'd love to see you on the water, as this will be his last year running the business. After 40 years of running rivers — 30 years of that at High Adventure — McBride plans to sell to employee Wayne White at the end of the season.

Hunter Targets What Deer Left Behind

FREER, Texas • As a wildlife manager and lifetime outdoorsman, Robert Sanders has always been interested in shed antlers. White-tailed deer shed their antlers after the breeding season each year and grow them back during spring and summer.

Sheds are easy to find, particularly around deer feeders, when the ground is bare. When it rains, as it has this year, whitetails rely mostly on natural food sources. On the Temple Ranch in Duval County, rain also creates lush vegetation, making shed antlers hard to see.

That's where Switch comes in. Switch is Sanders' 6-year-old Labrador retriever. He's an all-around dog, retrieving doves or quail, tracking wounded deer, lying on the bed and watching TV, cleaning up under 2-year-old Nathan Sanders' dinner chair and hunting shed antlers.

"Switch is a natural retriever, so it wasn't hard to teach him to look for sheds," Sanders said. "I'd find a fresh shed antler with some deer scent still on it and throw the antler for Switch to retrieve. He'll bring back anything if he thinks you'll throw it for him again."

Once Switch had the idea, he'd just follow Sanders on walks through the brush, sniffing out shed antlers that are sometimes concealed by vegetation. Shed-hunting dogs are becoming so popular, there's

even a shed-hunting competition. Hunters are often able to match sheds to a deer that their game cameras have photographed or a deer they've seen during the season.

Measuring and comparing an actual antler to a photograph of the deer with both antlers intact helps in the judging process. White-tail hunters continue to push the envelope on judging both a deer's age and its antler size. Where a buck sheds its antlers is also a clue as to its home territory.

Sanders loves shed hunting so much, that he used a shed antler on Valentine's Day 2004 to propose to his wife, the former Jenny Cearly. A friend met Jenny at a Women in the Outdoors event and told Sanders she was someone he needed to meet.

"I called her for a blind date, and we met in San Antonio," Sanders recalled. "It was a two-hour drive

from the ranch and a two-hour drive home, and it was worth every minute of it."

They dated and hunted wild game and shed antlers together for two years. In 2004, Robert decided to pop the question in a unique fashion. It was mid-February, which Jenny thought was too early to find many sheds, but Robert talked her into looking anyway.

He put the engagement ring on the tine of a large, bleached-by-the-sun shed and laid out some other sheds along a route that he planned to take on horseback. "It was so obvious, there was no way Jenny could miss it," he said. His boss, Buddy Temple, thought the idea was crazy because Robert salted the trail on Feb. 13 and left the ring outside all night.

"I had to lead Jenny by the ring three times before she finally saw it," Sanders said. "It worked, though."

Great Trout Fishing in Washington State

PINE LAKE, King County, Wash. • Shortly after 8 a.m., Don Whalen of Issaquah was already at the boat ramp reveling in the bright sunlight on what had been a successful fishing outing.

Whalen hasn't missed the traditional early morning wake-up of the statewide opening day for trout in 26 years.

On this trip Whalen took granddaughter Savannah Whalen and her friend Jesse Donaldson, who all managed to catch their five-trout daily limit in about one hour trolling a wedding ring lure behind their canoe.

"It was a lot of fun catching fish, and we had a really great time," said Donaldson, who attends Beaver Lake Middle School with Savannah.

Brothers Larry and Dale Karr of Lake Sammamish

also found fishing to their liking at Pine, and each had a limit of trout within two hours.

"We caught nothing big with the largest trout being about 14 inches," said Dale, who saw lots of fish jumping first thing in the morning.

The big noticeable difference as I gazed across the 88-acre lake nestled on the Issaquah Plateau wasn't so much for what was occurring, but for what really didn't happen.

An excellent catch rate with many going home early with their limits was obvious, but what struck me was a lack of fishing pressure.

"There seems to be a lot less people out fishing, and I would say it's about a third less of the crowd that I've checked at Pine compared to the past six years," said Adam Lindquist, a state Fish and Wildlife checker. "That means there should be plenty of fish to catch for the next few weeks if not longer."

Elsewhere, state Fish and Wildlife biologist Justin Spinelli and inland fish managers Chris Donley and Jim Scott trekked to four lakes across the Puget Sound region.

"We stopped by Howard, Ki, Martha (at Alderwood Manor) and

Wilderness," Spinelli said. "People were pretty successful in those waters, and each had a decent turnout. We saw a lot of kids carrying limits of trout at Wilderness, and it was terrific weather and everyone was smiling."

In Eastern Washington, Chad Jackson, a state Fish and Wildlife biologist, surveyed Warden Lake in Grant County and reported good action under excellent warm-weather conditions.

"Fishing was really good, and way better than the past couple of years," Jackson said. "I keep seeing a trend that not everybody is rushed to get out first thing in the morning."

"There is a general attitude change compared to 30 years ago when every angler was a harvester, and there was a big rush to get out early and get their fish," Jackson said. "Now most people enjoy their time fishing, and not necessarily the catching aspect part of it."

Elsewhere in Grant County, Jackson said catch rates were fantastic, and fish size across the board was good.

"All the yearlings were 11 to 13 inches," Jackson said. "Effort across the board was a pinch higher than last year."

Participants are encouraged to bring water, lunch, binoculars, spotting scopes and bird books, if they have them.

The Camas Prairie is among the top places in Idaho to watch birds because of its Centennial Marsh, a vast meadow covered with shallow water during spring and early summer. When the water's up it serves as a 10,000-acre hotel for thousands of shorebirds, wading birds, waterfowl and raptors, said marsh interpretative

specialist Terry Gregory.

They include Swainson's hawks, which migrate all the way from Argentina, and loggerhead shrikes, which impale grasshoppers on sticks and barbed wire in order to eat them. The rarest, perhaps, are the black-bellied plovers, which have a mournful, drawn-out three-note whistle.

"The reason it's so valuable to waterfowl is that it's shallow. Because it's shallow it stays warm, making it host to a lot of aquatic insects," said Gregory.

Rafts Give Comforts of Home for Walleye Run

GILL'S LANDING, Wis. • Sometime after midnight, when the boat traffic ceased and the wind abated, calm fell over the floating village.

The only motion was the swirl of the Wolf River; the only sound was the hiss of gas lanterns.

A half moon hung high in the black sky.

Life was reduced to essentials — sleep and fishing.

Casey Schalkowski of Weyauwega, Wis., my host and fishing partner, fluctuated between the two.

"If you don't mind, I'm going to catch a few," Schalkowski said, stretching out on the south bunk.

Not at all. I sat along the north wall, watching over three rods as the moonlight shimmered on the Wolf.

That's the beauty of raft fishing. The home-away-from-home is sleeping quarters, kitchen and fishing vessel rolled into one.

I joined Schalkowski on the fishing raft he built and co-owns with Eric Peters, also of Weyauwega.

They call the 18-by-21-foot structure "Da Fish Barn." It's got a steel roof and red sides like many structures in the agricultural heartland.

But this barn comes on floats. And it's designed for one purpose — to house anglers on the Wolf River during the spring walleye run.

Hundreds of custom-built rafts are launched on the Wolf each spring. It's a colorful part of the local outdoors culture.

These aren't your spur of the moment, Huck Finn-like floats.

The rafts require an annual \$5 permit as well as an initial \$20 inspection. They must have an outhouse, a fire extinguisher, smoke and

carbon monoxide detectors and life jackets.

Schalkowski and Peters built theirs on the frame of a raft handed down by Schalkowski's father and uncle.

"We were sitting around in late winter 2009, time on our hands, thinking about what we could do," Schalkowski said. "The walleye run was coming. We decided to build a raft."

Two months later, "Da Fish Barn" was ready. It features a stove, floor heater and lanterns. The walls are insulated and paneled. The floor is carpeted.

Four cabinets hang from the back wall, four bunks are set on the sides. A pair of 5-by-4-foot picture windows line the front, or river, side of the raft.

Fishing tackle is stored in the ceiling. A propane tank fuels the stove, heater and lanterns. A portable generator is sometimes used to power the lights and radio.

A welded steel railing surrounds the raft. Rod holders are clamped to the top rung.

Schalkowski, 23, and Peters, 26, tether their raft about a mile downstream from Gill's Landing.

The river makes a long S-turn in this stretch, carving out a 30-foot deep hole close to shore. The raft sits on the edge of the hole.

In another unique local custom, the raft anglers typically use long cane poles to fish crank baits.

"The rule of thumb is 20 feet of line for a 20 foot pole," said Schalkowski. "Depending on the current, we'll use from a half-ounce to 4 ounces of weight to keep the lures at the desired depth."

About 1 a.m. the middle cane pole started jumping, and then its white tip was

pulled beneath the water's surface.

I bolted out of my chair, ran onto the front deck and grabbed the 15-foot pole.

"Fish!" I yelled through the open door.

Schalkowski joined me outside and 30 seconds later slid the landing net under a 23-inch walleye.

It was a spawned out female, dropping back to the lakes after completing its mission.

Anglers here refer to "up" and "down" runs as the walleyes migrate from Lake Winnebago to the spawning marshes and back.

The first comes as the ice melts and the river rises in spring, spilling into the marshes, and drawing tens of thousands of walleyes up from the Lake Winnebago system.

The fish spawn along the edges of the river and in the marshes. The females deposit egg masses and are the first to head downriver.

The male walleyes fertilize the eggs and typically stay in the marshes for several more days.

Once the males begin descending to the Winnebago system, the fishing on the Wolf — at least for action and numbers — can peak.

With the warmer than usual weather in March, the spawning run peaked early this year.

According to Department of Natural Resources reports, the 2012 walleye run is dominated by 22- to 24-inch females of the 2005 year class and 15- to 17-inch males from the 2008 year class.

The catch energized Schalkowski and me. We set out three more rods and watched as lightning began highlighting advancing clouds.

"The action often comes

in flurries," Schalkowski said. "You never know what time it could happen."

Schalkowski works third shift at a foundry in Wau-paca. His normal schedule allows him to fish in the evening until about 9 p.m., then motor back to the landing and drive to work.

After his shift, he returns to the raft, catches a few hours sleep and then starts fishing again. Since he and Peters put it in the river March 15, he's spent at least part of each day on the raft.

Schalkowski's girlfriend, Mindy Young, 23, of Weyauwega, often joins him on the raft for dinner.

Peters, who raises beef cattle and works a construction job, gets out to the raft as many evenings and weekends as possible.

Some folks like to travel to Florida for spring break. Others take a week of vacation to fish on their home river.

Schalkowski schedules one week of vacation for the first week of April.

"It's raft time," Schalkowski said. "No place better to be."

Over the next four hours, we landed three more walleyes and lost one. Two of the three were spawned out females, which we kept. But one still had eggs and was released.

About 4 a.m. the storm moved in; hail rattled off the raft's steel roof. The lightning stayed mostly in the clouds.

At dawn, the sky began to clear and sandhill cranes called from the nearby marsh.

Boats began to ply the river again as anglers headed to their favorite spots. The sun had yet to rise, but we decided to call it a day.

When your fishing vessel is your lodge, time takes on a different dimension.

Lesser Prairie Chickens Unaware of the Greater National Debate

WICHITA, Kan. • Even before the time of the Kiowa and Comanche, lesser prairie chickens gathered on ridges of the springtime southern plains.

Their complex ritual of excited cackles, choppy calls, inflated air sacks and territorial tussles is simply done so the species can continue amid one of America's most inhospitable places.

It is a land of cactus, sand and devastating droughts when annual rainfall is best measured in drops. That any survived the brutal Dust Bowl is testament to the prairie bird's

ability to withstand the worst of Mother Nature.

That the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service wants them on the threatened and endangered list is testament to how poorly some lesser populations have fared at the hands of man.

The never-large range of the birds that demand miles of uninterrupted prairie is a bullseye for wind, oil and natural gas production and exploration.

Powerlines, roads, new cropfields and houses also annually turn productive lesser lands sterile.

Of late, lessers have been the source of great debate.

Their presence has put a hit on some multi-million dollar energy projects. Lawsuits may come from states, energy and agriculture groups hoping to block the federal listing and the limitations it could bring.

Kansas wildlife officials contend the range and population of lessers is greater than in some years past. Helicopter surveys across lesser chicken range are underway to hopefully prove their point.

Early one morning, amid the sandhills south of Kinsley, about two dozen lesser males gathered, oblivious to their role in a national controversy.

For hours they danced, fought and called the way their kind has for centuries ... and always will as long as there is even one male left.

How You Can Become a Falconer

I recently saw a television program about the sport of falconry. It looked really interesting. What are the rules and how can I become a falconer?



license is called an apprentice license. To become an apprentice falconer one must be at least 12 years of age and sponsored by a master or general class falconer. An apprentice applicant must also pass the apprentice falconry examination given by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. An apprentice applicant must pass with at least an 80 percent score. The apprentice falconer's mews (holding pens) and equipment must also pass an inspection. His sponsor who helps him capture, care for, and train his first bird of prey then mentors the apprentice. An apprentice may possess one hawk or falcon authorized by the sponsor not including eagles or any endangered species. The apprentice license is valid for three years. An apprentice may pass on to the next level, a "general falconry license" after two years with a written recommendation to the Fish and Game from the sponsor.

A general class falconer must be at least 16 years of age and have two years of

experience as an apprentice and a recommendation to pass onto the next level from the sponsor. A general falconer may possess three birds of prey of any species except eagles or any species listed as threatened or endangered by the state or federal laws.

A general class falconer may be up-graded to a master class falconer after at least five years of experience. The master class falconry license is the highest and most experienced level in falconry. Master falconers may possess up to five wild birds of prey of any species except those listed as threatened or endangered by state or federal laws. Golden eagles may be possessed under special federal permit. Master class falconers may possess any number of captive bred birds of prey or hybrids.

With the success of private captive breeding programs many falconers no longer rely on wild caught birds but choose instead to purchase birds bred and raised in captivity. Captive breeding has also allowed many hybrid birds of prey to be developed exclusively for falconry purposes. Captive-bred birds allow a falconer to select species or hybrid characteristics favorable to a type of hunting or tem-

perament of the falconer.

Use of wild-caught birds requires the falconer to "tame" the falcon so he can utilize the bird's skill to hunt and capture game. Captive-bred birds may be easier for the falconer to handle but lack hunting knowledge so the falconer must teach the young birds how to hunt and capture prey.

Obtaining food is much more difficult than buying it by the bag at the grocery store. In addition to raising and training their hawk, many falconers raise their own food such as quail, rats, rabbits, or pigeons.

The rules for falconry are tightly controlled by Fish and Game and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. A falconer's "hawk" is never a pet like a dog or cat. Generally falconers develop more a partnership with their birds, using their wild instincts and natural abilities to capture upland birds, waterfowl, small passerine birds and small mammals.

The sport of falconry demands a lot of time and patience. For those fortunate enough to possess those qualities, the rewards are a glimpse of something truly wild in the eye of a hawk!

Bush Rides with Warriors

PALO DURO CANYON STATE PARK, Texas • George W. Bush reached the top of a rocky and twisty incline called Red Star Ridge and did something unusual with his mountain bike: He stopped.

The former president — known for barreling up and down the trail — didn't necessarily need a break. But more than 15 miles into the final leg Saturday of the Bush Institute's Warrior 100K Ride, he wanted to relish the moment with all 19 veterans biking with him in the three-day trek near Amarillo.

"Let's stay and cheer 'em on," Bush told some of the warriors, who came from across the country to participate in the event the former president created to honor service members injured in Iraq and Afghanistan.

One by one the remaining veterans and other cyclists made their way to the peak, the cheers growing louder with each ascent.

Many of the wounded warriors walked back down the hill to help their comrades push through the trickiest spots. Bush sat down on the ridge's highest boulder to shout encouragement and to greet the

riders at the top.

For nearly all the veterans, Bush was their commander-in-chief, the man who made the decision to send them to war. And as many continue to struggle with wounds, both physical and mental, Bush said he hoped the ride let the men and women know that he and his wife, Laura, still "care about them."

"I'm incredibly proud that they were willing to serve, that they were courageous in service and that when wounded, they did not let that overwhelm them," Bush said. "It's amazing to be here with them."

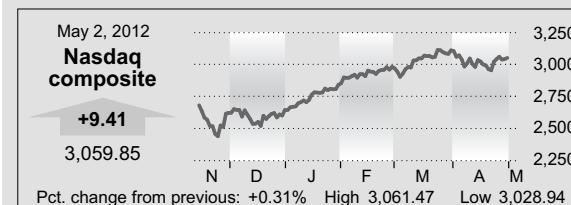
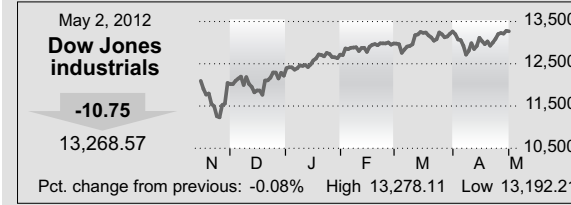

Discouraging Jobs News Leaves Stock Prices Mixed

NEW YORK (AP) • When hiring slumps, so do stock prices. That was at least the message investors sent Wednesday, when they ignored flashes of positive news about the economy and instead homed in on troubling reports about jobs in the U.S. and Europe. The Dow Jones industrial average fell as much as 87 points after a company that tracks payrolls said the U.S. added far fewer jobs in April than in March. The Dow ended the day down 10.75 points, at 13,268.57. It was a turn from the day before, when investors sent the Dow up 66 points.

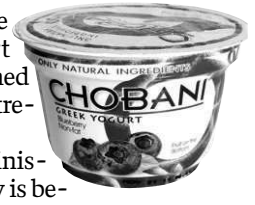

Eurozone Unemployment Hits Record High

LONDON • Pressure is growing on Europe's leaders to focus less on austerity and more on stimulating growth as the 17 countries that use the euro face record high unemployment and a recession that is spreading across the region. Eurozone unemployment rose by 169,000 in March, official figures showed Wednesday, taking the rate up to 10.9 percent — its highest level since the euro was launched in 1999. The seasonally adjusted rate was up from 10.8 percent in February and 9.9 percent a year ago and contrasts sharply with the picture in the U.S., where unemployment has fallen from 9.1 percent in August to 8.2 percent in March. Economies across the eurozone are contracting as governments enact austerity measures — spending cuts and higher taxes — to reduce their budget deficits and slow the growth of their debts. Eight eurozone countries — including Greece, Spain and the Netherlands — have seen their economies shrink for two straight quarters or more, the common definition of a recession. Austerity has been the main prescription across Europe for dealing with a debt crisis that's afflicted the continent for nearly three years and has raised the specter of the breakup of the single currency. Three countries — Greece, Ireland and Portugal — have already required bailouts because of unsustainable levels of debt. Bailout fears have intensified in recent months as Spain, Italy and other governments face rising borrowing costs on bond markets, a sign that investors are nervous about the size of their debts relative to their economic output. Austerity is intended to address this nervousness by reducing a government's borrowing needs, but there has been a negative side effect: as economic output shrinks, the debt burden actually looks worse. So as Europe's economic outlook darkens, economists are becoming more skeptical of the strict adherence to austerity. They say the region's policymakers need to dial back on short-term budget-cutting and place more emphasis on stimulating long-term growth. Pro-growth measures include

reducing red tape for small businesses, making it easier for workers to find jobs across the eurozone and breaking down barriers that countries have created to protect their own industries. Some economists go a step further and say governments should not only stop cutting spending, they should actually increase spending while economies are so weak — and make reining in deficits a longer-term goal. "The question is how long EU leaders will continue to pursue a deeply flawed strategy in the face of mounting evidence that this is leading us to social, economic and political disaster," said Sony Kapoor, managing director of Re-Define, an economic think-tank and policy advisory company. In a nod to shifting attitudes about austerity, European Central Bank president Mario Draghi recently called for a "growth pact" in Europe to work alongside the "fiscal pact" that has placed so much importance on controlling government spending. Measures aimed at balancing national budgets have led to drastic spending cuts by governments across the continent, including layoffs and pay cuts for government workers, slashing of key services including welfare and development programs, as well as tax hikes to boost government revenues. With elections in Greece and France this weekend, there are hopes — cer-

tainly among the 17.4 million people unemployed in the eurozone — that Europe may temper, if not reverse, its focus on austerity. "With the potential changing of political leaders, coupled with confirmation that nearly half of the eurozone is officially in recession, the strategy of continuing austerity is being widely challenged," said Gary Jenkins, managing director of Swordfish Research. France's Socialist presidential candidate Francois Hollande — who is leading incumbent Nicolas Sarkozy in the polls — has said he would renegotiate the eurozone's austerity-focused fiscal pact to include measures that would encourage growth. The pact requires countries to keep their budget deficits to within 3 percent of economic output — a major reason why Spain, Italy and other governments are slashing spending. Austerity has been pushed hardest by Germany, Europe's biggest economy, as a way to convince markets and international investors that the region has a grip on its problems. However, Germany's economy is beginning to show signs of vulnerability and analysts say this could prompt Chancellor Angela Merkel to moderate her stance. April unemployment figures from Germany's statistics office showed a monthly rise of 19,000, only the second increase in the past 25 months.

U.S. Factory Orders Fell in March by Most in Three Years

WASHINGTON • Demand for U.S. factory goods dropped in March by the most in three years, driven lower by a sharp fall in volatile orders for commercial aircraft. Still, more recent data suggest the decline may be temporary. The Commerce Department said Wednesday that orders for factory goods fell 1.5 percent. That was the steepest decline since March 2009, when the economy was mired in recession. Orders rose 1.1 percent in February. A key reason for the drop was aircraft orders plummeted nearly 50 percent. Those orders can fluctuate sharply from month to month. Excluding transportation goods, orders were unchanged. Demand for less durable items, such as food, chemicals and gasoline, rose 0.5 percent. "Despite this month's decline, new orders have been on a rising trend," Steven Wood, an economist at Insight Economics, said in a note to clients. "The demand for manufactured goods is recovering moderately and irregularly." Factory orders have rebounded after plummeting during the recession. Orders in March totaled \$460.5 billion, 37 percent higher than the recession's low point reached three years ago. That's still 4.2 percent below the peak reached in December 2007, the month the recession began. Other data suggest the March decrease won't endure. A private survey re-

leased Tuesday found that the manufacturing activity grew in April at the fastest pace in 10 months. New orders, production and a measure of hiring all rose. The increase in new orders points to rising output in the coming months. The April survey from the Institute for Supply Management helped the Dow Jones industrial average close Tuesday at its highest level in more than four years. It followed a series of weaker reports in recent weeks that showed hiring slowed, applications for unemployment benefits rose and factory output dropped. There were positive signs in the government's report on March factory orders, too. Orders for so-called "core" capital goods, a measure of business investment, fell only 0.1 percent. That's much less than the government reported in a preliminary estimate last week. Still, companies cut back on a variety of goods meant to last at least three years. Demand for steel and other metals, industrial machinery, and computers all dropped. Autos and auto parts orders were unchanged in March, after big gains in January and February. That indicates auto production could slow. Sales of cars and trucks in April were mixed. Toyota and Chrysler on Tuesday reported big U.S. sales gains for April, but those gains came at the expense of General Motors and Ford. Auto production has been solid in recent months as Americans have increased their purchases of cars and trucks, a good sign for further gains in factory output.

Chobani to Hold Jobs Fair Friday, Saturday

Nicki Briggs, Chobani's vice president of corporate communication, said almost 90 percent of the Twin Falls plant's 400 jobs remain open. Those are primarily for production and support staff, with many top-level managers already hired and trained at the firm's New York state plant. Wages are about \$14 per hour for production workers, she added. Briggs said Chobani has worked closely with CSI as it prepares to open the new plant, which will be three times as large as its East Coast facility.

He married Anne Elizabeth Voorhees, and they spent 32 years together and lived in Idaho, California and finally settled back in Buhl.

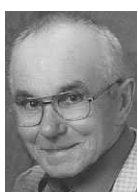

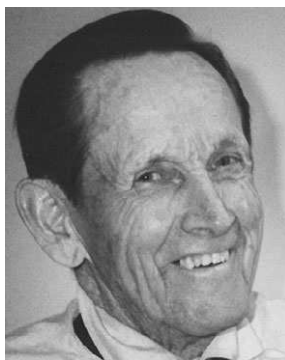

OSS Agent Who Led WWII Rescue of 500 Airmen Dies

NEW YORK (AP) • George Vujnovich, the intelligence agent who organized a World War II mission to rescue more than 500 U.S. bomber crew members shot down over Nazi-occupied Serbia, has died at his home in New York. He was 96.

Vujnovich is credited with leading the so-called Halyard Mission in what was then Yugoslavia. It was the largest air rescue of Americans behind enemy lines in any war. A long retired salesman of aircraft parts, he died April 24 of natural causes at home in Queens, according to his daughter, Xenia Wilkinson.

The Serbian-American and Pittsburgh native was an officer of the OSS, the precursor of today's CIA, when about 500 pilots and other airmen were downed over Serbia in the summer of 1944 while on bombing runs targeting Hitler's oil fields in Romania, according to U.S. government field station files.

The airmen were hidden in villages by Serbian guerrilla fighter Draza Mihailovich, leader of the Chetniks, whom Yugoslav communist officials considered to be Germany's collaborators.

"This mission would not have succeeded without the great courage of Draza Mihailovich and his brave men," Vujnovich said at a 2010 ceremony in which he was formally awarded the U.S. Bronze Star Medal.

It was no small feat to con-

vince American officials to allow him to work with Mihailovich on the clandestine mission, dubbed Halyard, meaning a rope used to hoist sails. By then, President Franklin D. Roosevelt had decided to follow British Prime Minister Winston Churchill's lead, abandoning support for Mihailovich in favor of the Yugoslav communists, the strongest grass-roots guerrilla force fighting the invading Nazis and Italian fascists.

"Vujnovich is the one who sold the mission to U.S. officials. He pushed hard," said U.S. Army Lt. Col. Steven Oluic, a former West Point professor who prepared the award submission for the Department of the Army.

On Aug. 2, 1944, three OSS agents strapped with radio transmitters were airdropped near Mihailovich's headquarters to set up the operation. Dozens of U.S. military cargo planes flew in over the months to pick up the airmen when they were downed. Serbian villagers had helped them build an airstrip by the village of Pranjani.

The fliers parachuted into a mountainous region where local farmers brought them to their houses and barns. During the next 66 days, the Americans moved each night to a different location so as not to be captured by the occupying Germans.

The story is told in a 2007 book titled "The Forgotten 500," by Gregory Freeman.

Tomas Borge, Founder of Nicaragua's Sandinistas, Dies at 81

MEXICO CITY • Tomas Borge, last living founder of Nicaragua's Sandinista movement and one of its most hard-line enforcers as it battled U.S.-backed forces for decades, has died. He was 81.

In Nicaragua, the government of

President Daniel Ortega declared three days of national mourning and Borge's remains lay in state at the National Palace of Culture.

Borge died Monday night in a military hospital in Managua, Ortega's office said. No cause of death was given, but Borge had been ill for some time,

suffering pneumonia, lung disease and other ailments.

The leftist government of Venezuela mourned the loss of "a paradigm of revolutionary militancy." "Death is but one more step to immortality," said Rosario Murillo, Ortega's wife and spokeswoman for his government.

Police: Seau Found Dead at Calif. Home

OCEANSIDE, Calif. • Junior Seau, a hometown superstar who was the fist-pumping, emotional leader of the San Diego Chargers for 13 years, was found shot to death at his home Wednesday morning in what police said appeared to be a suicide. He was 43.
Police Chief Frank McCoy said Seau's girlfriend reported finding him unconscious with a gunshot wound to the chest and life-saving efforts were unsuccessful. A gun was found near him, McCoy said. Police said no suicide note was found and they didn't immediately know who the gun was registered to.

Seau's death in Oceanside, in northern San Diego County, stunned the region he represented with almost reckless abandon. The same intensity that got the star linebacker ejected for fighting in his first exhibition game helped carry the Chargers to their only Super Bowl, following the 1994 season. A ferocious tackler, he'd leap up, pump a fist and kick out a leg after dropping a ball carrier or quarterback.
"It's a sad thing. It's hard to understand," said Bobby Beathard, who as Chargers general manager took Seau out of Southern California with the fifth pick overall in the 1990 draft. "He was really just a great guy. If you

Football Must Take Note of May 2, 2012

Wednesday, May 2 was not a good day for the sport of football.
For the National Football League, it might have been its worst day ever.



as shocking as the news of Seau's death is the fact that eight members of the Chargers' 1994 Super Bowl-playing squad have died.

No sooner had the league handed out lengthy suspensions for players and their roles in the New Orleans Saints' Bountygate affair, news broke that future Hall of Fame linebacker Junior Seau had apparently committed suicide. He was 43.
There have been moments in NFL history that involved the integrity of the game — the New England Patriots and Spygate. There have been tragic moments involving former players — Seau's fellow alum at USC, O.J. Simpson, obviously heading that list.
On Wednesday, the two moments collided like a strong safety filling the hole and smashing into a running back.
Moments like these are when people of all walks — sportswriters included — try to play doctor, offering opinions on matters in which we're really not qualified to speak.
That shouldn't stop us from asking questions. Such as:
How can the violence exhibited upon football players not have an effect on them after their playing days are over? Almost

NFL rosters carry 53 players. Think about it — 15 percent of a small group of (presumably) healthy, fit young men with the money and resources for care above and beyond what most of us have, did not even live past their mid-40s. In this day, that's a mortality rate that has forever been the domain of rock stars.
That's a very small sample size and doesn't tell the entire story — three of those players died of what could best be described as tragic accidents. But it's sobering nonetheless.
Tragedy can strike any group, but there are links to Seau's fate and his former job on the gridiron that cannot be ignored.
Last year, former Bears player Dave Duerson killed himself with a gunshot to the heart. Per a text he sent to his family prior to his death, he wanted to have his brain studied to determine if there was a link between

Spurs Blow Out Jazz 114-83 to Take 2-0 Lead

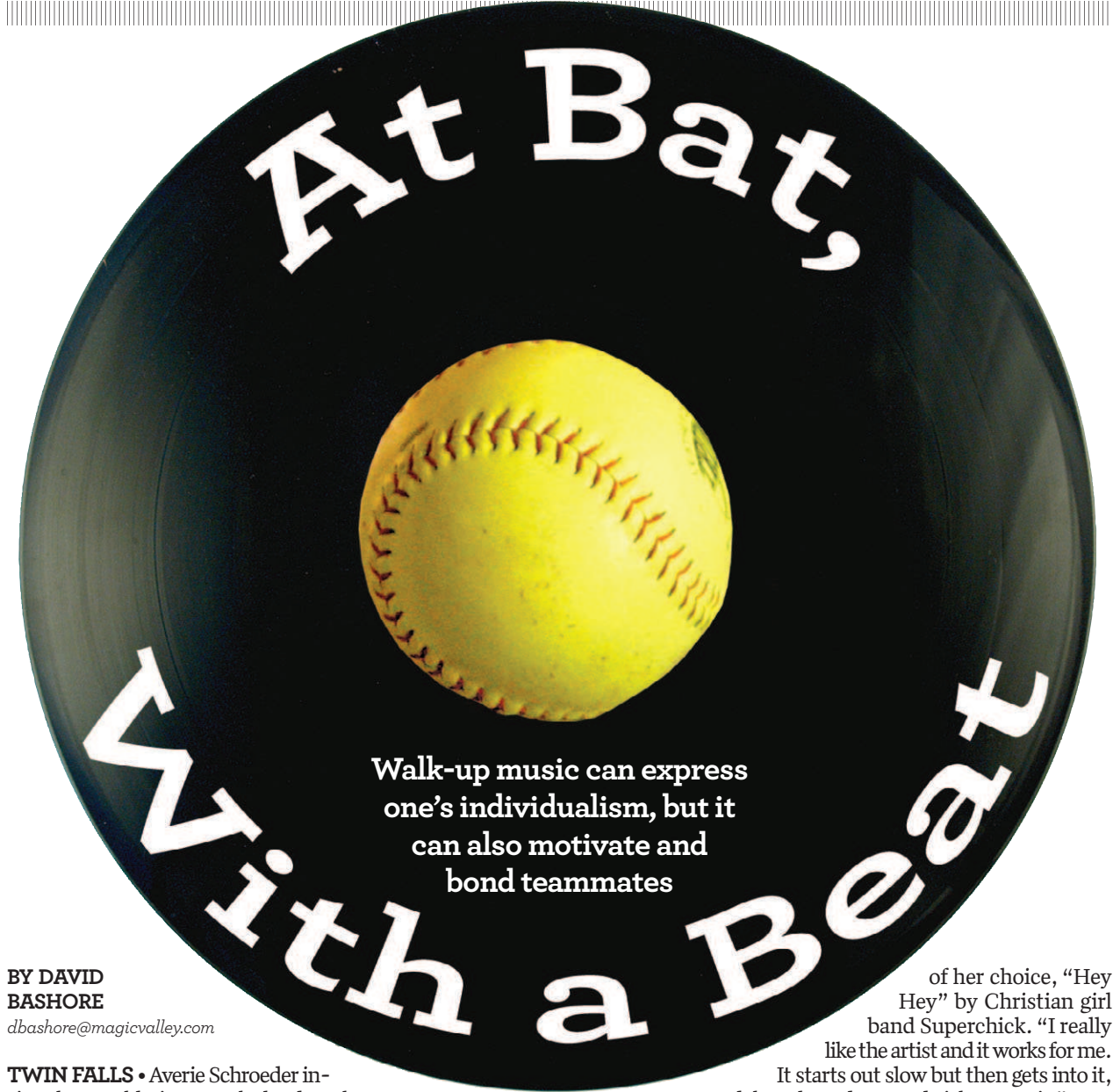
SAN ANTONIO • Tony Parker scored 18 points and the San Antonio Spurs handed Utah its second-worst playoff loss in franchise history, beating the Jazz 114-83 on Wednesday night to take a 2-0 lead in the first-round series.
NBA Coach of the Year Gregg Popovich practically put the Spurs on autopilot after a 20-0 run in the second quarter that stunned the Jazz, who had vowed to play better after the Spurs easily won Game 1. But this humiliating rout was even easier.
The Jazz never quite greeted Parker with the hard fouls the All-Star was supposed to have coming, and the Utah frontcourt of Al Jefferson and

Paul Millsap wasn't any more imposing on offense. Jefferson scored 10 points, and Millsap had nine.
Game 3 is Saturday night in Salt Lake City.
The only bigger embarrassment for the Jazz in the playoffs was a 42-point loss to Michael Jordan and the Chicago Bulls in the 1998 NBA Finals.
It's the first time the Spurs have led a series 2-0 since opening the 2008 playoffs against Phoenix. San Antonio won that series in five, and unless the Jazz can shake this off, this one will be over just as quick.
If not sooner.
"We were aggressive and we wanted to make sure we matched their energy," Parker said.

Walk-up music can express one's individualism, but it can also motivate and bond teammates

TWIN FALLS • Averie Schroeder insists the tune blaring over the loudspeakers as she steps to the plate at the College of Southern Idaho softball field has nothing to do with her decorated high school career.
Kimberly was so successful over the previous four years that DJ Khaled's hit "All I Do Is Win" was a logical choice in any case. But when it came to selecting her featured song, she turned to a more experienced voice — older brother A.J., who starred at Kimberly before her and went on to play college baseball.
"My brother told me that you want something that will either relax you or pump you up," Averie Schroeder said about her first ever walk-up selection. "We spent some time and came up with the right song. I think it's really neat because we didn't have that at Kimberly and it really makes it feel more like a college game."
Walk-up music isn't a new phenomenon in the sports world, but it's caught on at CSI for both baseball and softball. Athletes pick a song that suits them as they come to the plate for an at-bat — or in the case of pitchers, while trotting in from the bullpen.
Some pick new songs every year, or even change them during the season. Sophomore catcher Kelsie Webster has been using her walk-up for the better part of five years.
"I thought about changing it, but I like it too much," she said

of her choice, "Hey Hey" by Christian girl band Superchick. "I really like the artist and it works for me.
It starts out slow but then gets into it, and then slows down and picks up again."
"Mine just has a banjo," Lea Hopson deadpanned.
Hopson's walk-up is the one that most frequently sticks — the freshman from Sequim, Wash., uses the tough-to-forget "Sic 'Em On a Chicken" by the Zac Brown Band, her favorite group.
"I like to rock out to country music — I'm kind of the redneck on the team," said Hopson. "I like it though. Sequim is kind of podunk and it's who I am."
Hopson used that particular song after her suggestion of it brought the house down. Teammates immediately told her she simply had to use it, and it's been one of the fan favorites ever since, beating out the more commonplace hip-hop riffs from popular acts like LMFAO, T-Pain and Eminem.
While walk-up music doesn't in itself affect how a player does in a given at-bat, it does help bring the dugout — which in softball is an especially motivating force with cheers, dances and the like — into the equation.
"Indirectly it was a great way for us to bond together as a team. Not one of us picked our song without running it by somebody else on the team," said Schroeder. "It's awesome because each of our songs fits our personality and somebody always does something unique in the dugout for the different songs!"

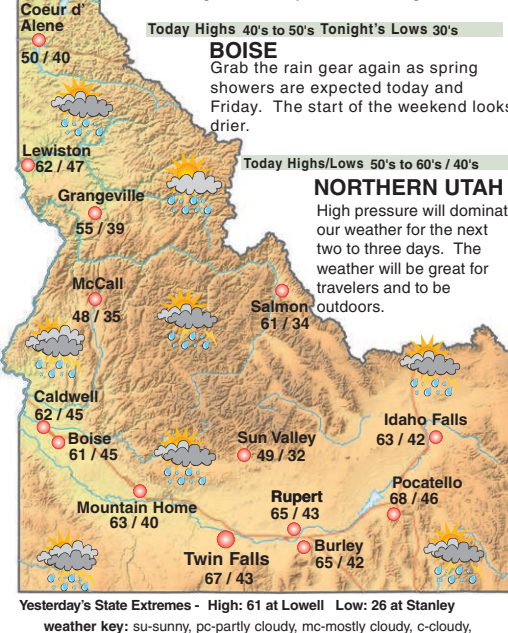

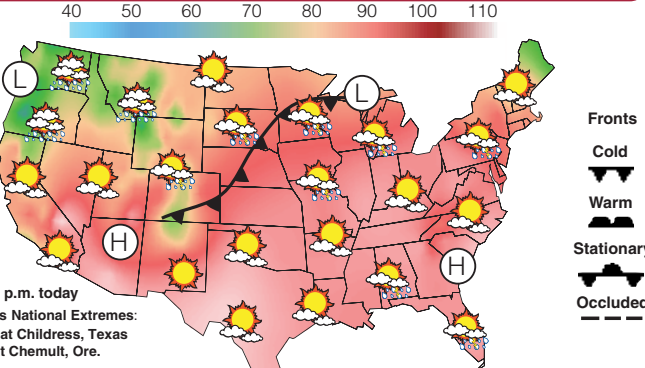

Bodemeister is Early Derby Favorite

LOUISVILLE, Ky. • Bob Baffert sure looks to be on a winning streak lately — and that applies not only to his horses but to his health as well.

The trainer certainly had good fortune in the Kentucky Derby draw where his Bodemeister was made the early 4-1 favorite after landing a good post position for Saturday's race.

Idaho-bred Rousing Sermon joined four other horses at 50-1 odds. The colt, owned by Larry D. and Marianne Williams and with Jose Lezcano on the mount, will break from the No. 7 position, to the immediate right of Bodemeister.

It's the third time Baffert has had the morning-line favorite; the first two didn't work out.

Lookin At Lucky drew the dreaded inside post in 2010, giving Baffert a sinking feeling. Sure enough, the colt got trapped along the rail and finished sixth. In 2001, Point Given was the heavy favorite and wound up fifth. He went on to win the Preakness and Belmont stakes, the final two legs of the Triple Crown.

"At least we're in a position where we have a good chance of winning," Baffert said Wednesday. "If I got the one-hole I would be thinking they just don't want me to win this Derby. After Lookin At Lucky, when he got the one-hole, the excitement just left me because I knew he had too much to overcome."

"I just hope I have a chance to get my heart rate going turning for home," said the three-time Derby champion and consummate jokester, who found a way to reference the heart attack he suffered in March. He says he's a changed man now, ex-

ercising and eating all the right foods.

Baffert fell ill in Dubai, where he had gone to watch his horse, Game On Dude, run in the \$10 million Dubai World Cup. He was rushed to a hospital, where surgeons inserted three stents in two arteries.

Speedster Bodemeister, named after Baffert's 7-year-old son Bode, drew the No. 6 post under jockey Mike Smith. Six horses have won from that position, the last being Sea Hero in 1993.

"If he gets away well, like I've been saying all along, he's given the opportunity, he's going to run extremely well," said Smith, who won his only Derby on 50-1 stunner Giacomo in 2005.

But the 3-year-old colt will have to overcome some steep history. No horse since Apollo in 1882 has won the Derby without racing as a 2-year-old.

Bodemeister is the stronger of Baffert's two horses, having won the Arkansas Derby by 9 1-2 lengths in the most dominating performance of the Derby prep races. His other, 50-1 shot Liaison, landed in

the No. 20 spot.

Union Rags was a close second choice at 9-2 in a full field of 20 horses.

Steve Assmussen, who is 0 for 9 in the Derby, will saddle two long shots in 15-1 Daddy Nose Best and 30-1 Sabercat.

Optimizer is the record 45th Derby starter for trainer D. Wayne Lukas, a four-time Derby winner. The colt will break from the No. 2 post and is one of five 50-1 shots. He got into the field when Mark Valeski was withdrawn

from consideration Tuesday. "There were a few on the board I'd rather have," Lukas said. "It's OK because we're not a speed horse anyway."

The 21st horse on the earnings list is My Adonis, an also-eligible who would need a defection before 9 a.m. EDT Friday, when Derby wagering opens, to get into the 1 1/4-mile race. If he draws into the race, My Adonis would automatically go into the No. 20 hole and all the other horses would move over one spot.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN, MINIDOKA COUNTY, IDAHO, ANNEXING CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY OWNED BY SHEILA CATMULL AND OTHERS, ADJACENT TO THE CITY AND LOCATED IN MINIDOKA COUNTY; AND DESIGNATING THE ZONING FOR SUCH LAND AS "CG" (COMMERCIAL GENERAL) AND, PROVIDING FOR ADOPTION WITH ONLY ONE READING; AND, PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City finds that the land described below, (the "Subject Property"), is contiguous to the City as set forth on the area map attached as Exhibit "A" and within its area of impact; and, WHEREAS, the said Subject Property may likely be developed for commercial uses in the future; and,

WHEREAS, the City has utility services adjacent to the Subject Property; and, WHEREAS, the City hereby determines and declares that it is in the best interests of not only the property owners of the Subject Property, but also the City as a whole for such land to be annexed into the City and that such annexation is consistent with the City's current version of the City's Comprehensive Plan and that such annexation is reasonable given all factors; and,

WHEREAS, the co-owner ("petitioner") of such Subject Property, Sheila Kay Catmull, has requested annexation and the City can proceed with the annexation as a "Category A" type of annexation as set forth in Idaho Code Section 50-222 (3) and (5)(a); and,

WHEREAS, a certain portion of the Subject Property is not owned by Petitioner and no consent for annexation has been obtained, but should be annexed for the orderly development of the City and the City has adopted an appropriate Plan of Annexation,

WHEREAS, the City has determined that the most appropriate zoning district designations for the said Subject Property would be "CG" (Commercial General); and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to the laws of the State of Idaho and the ordinances of the City, public hearings were held pursuant to public notice as follows: before the Heyburn Planning and Zoning Commission on April 9, 2012 at 7:00 P.M. and reported its recommendations to the City Council at its April 25, 2012 regular meeting; and before the Heyburn City Council on April 25, 2012 at 7:00 P.M.; and both bodies did invite and take public comment and received documents which were all admitted to the official record of the proceedings and were also duly reviewed; and,

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission, after due deliberation, recommended to the Council that such petition for annexation be granted and the Subject Property be zoned as "CG" (Commercial General); and the City Council after due deliberation, agreed that such petition should be granted and finds that such zoning designation is in the best interests of the City, its growth, economic development and is consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan; and,

FURTHER, consistent with the foregoing, the City makes the following findings and conclusions:

1. The Subject Property is contiguous to the City of Heyburn.
2. The City has domestic water and sewer facilities adjacent to the Subject Property.
3. The co-owner of a portion of the Subject Property has requested to be annexed into the City and has petitioned the City to be annexed and is therefore a "Category 'A'" annexation; and, the remainder of the described property is owned by fewer than 100 owners and has been platted, sold or set off in one of more parcels of less than 5 acres, is therefore a "Category 'B'" annexation, all as set forth in Idaho Code Section 50-222. The statutory requirements for both types of annexations have been met.
4. The Subject Property is contiguous with the existing City limits on the eastern border of the land being annexed.
5. The Subject Property can be served now or in the future by all of the City's municipal utility services.
6. The City has adequate means to provide law enforcement to the areas in the Subject Property and the City can otherwise exercise its police powers within the bounds of such property.
7. The current use of the Subject Property is agricultural. The petitioners have requested that the land be zoned commercial or light industrial. The City finds that "CG" (Commercial General) is most appropriate at this time. The Comprehensive Plan of the City designates this area for possible future commercial development.
8. Annexation of the Subject Property at this time is in the best interests of the City so that the City can continue to plan and make further arrangements to provide municipal utilities and develop appropriate roads and other infrastructure to the Subject Property in order for it to be developed as a commercial area.
9. The annexation of the Subject Property will allow for orderly growth and economic development of the City and is in the best interests of the City and its citizens.

ORDINANCE NO. 543

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN IDAHO REPEALING THE EXISTING SECTION 5-7-5 A. DEALING WITH GROUP USE OF CITY PARKS AND PROVIDING FOR NEW REGULATIONS FOR GROUP USE OF CITY PARKS INCLUDING POLITICAL USE; CLARIFICATION OF THE USE PROHIBITIONS IN PARKS AS CONTAINED IN SECTION 5-7-3 B.; AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Heyburn, Minidoka County, Idaho as follows:

Section 1: Heyburn Code Section 5-7-5 is hereby repealed and in its place shall be the following:

5-7-5 **GROUP USE OF PARKS.** Use of a Park by a group intending to or actually making joint use of a park as a group, whether for exclusive or non-exclusive use, shall be subject to the following provisions and shall apply for and be granted a permit to use a city park in order to use the same as a group. Otherwise, such a group shall be presumed to be an unlawful assembly.

A. Definitions. For the purpose of this Section, the following words shall have the following meanings:

- "Commercial activity" means any display, enterprise, promotion, arts and crafts display, exhibit, food or drink concession, yard sale or any activity at which goods or services are sold, or an admission fee or use fee is required, whether conducted by a person or a group "for profit", non-profit organization or by a public and charitable organization.
- "Public" use or a "Public organization" use shall mean use by public entities such as cities, counties, schools and other similar public or political subdivisions of the state of Idaho.
- "Charitable use" shall mean use by an organization which has obtained recognition as a charitable institution under Section 510 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- "Community Use" shall mean use by a group or organization which is primarily a not-for-profit organization and the use of the park is primarily a not-for-profit event. This would include family reunions, group gathering for which no admission is charged and which largely has a public purpose. If there is incidental sale of items or concessions, either as a convenience to the public attending the event or to raise money for a public purpose, such event, in the sole discretion of the City Council, may be permitted without cull compliance with the requirements of a commercial activity. Otherwise the event shall comply with all requirements of a commercial event.
- "Political Use" shall mean any political rally, public demonstrations or other protest events or expressions of freedom of speech as sanctioned by law. Political Use of a park requires an application in the same format as an application for commercial use, and requires the same application fee. If granted, any fee for use is waived. Political use is limited to four continuous hours in a single day and shall only occur during hours when the park is open and, in any event, may not commence before 9:00 A.M. and must conclude no later than 10:00 P.M. The event must comply with all other rules for use of the Park. The application will not be granted if another application for use has been granted for the same date and time.
- "Group" shall mean any of the following uses:
 - Any commercial activity, including any incidental sales of products, items or concession items as part of any charitable, public or community event.
 - A reservation for exclusive use of a Park by any number of people.
 - Any fundraising or sales.
 - Any political use.
 - Any event where twenty-five or more people intend to make joint use of a park or in fact do make use.

B. Commercial Activity in Public Parks Prohibited. No commercial activity shall be carried on or conducted in public parks of the City except as authorized by this Code.

C. The use which requires a permit as herein provided may not, in any event, exceed three (3) consecutive days.

D. Applications for Group Activities in Public Parks; Exceptions.

- Any person or entity seeking to conduct a group activity in a public park in the City must complete a written application form provided by the City Clerk, which shall contain the following information:
 - The name of the person or entity sponsoring the commercial activity. In the case of applicants other than natural persons, such as associations, partnerships, corporations, limited liability companies, etc., there shall be a co-applicant whose is a natural person who shall be jointly responsible for the duties of the applicant.
 - Specific description of the activities to be conducted.
 - The dates upon which the activities will be conducted.
 - The exact location within each public park where the commercial activity will be conducted.

2. Each application must be accompanied by a nonrefundable application fee of twenty five dollars (\$25.00).

3. Applications for group use of a park shall be considered by the City Council at its next regular City Council meeting following the date of the submission of the completed application to the City Clerk. Should the Council approve the application, a permit shall be issued to the applying entity to conduct the commercial activity which permit shall provide:

- The date, the name of the person or entity to which the permit is issued.
- The time, place and date at which the activity may be conducted.
- The exact nature of the activity which may be conducted, including what commercial activities are permitted.
- Effective Date. The permit shall be effective upon its issuance by the Council and upon payment of a fee to the City in an amount not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00), the exact fee to be determined by the City Council taking into account the nature of the commercial activities to be conducted, number of patrons to be drawn to the commercial activity, the extent of the potential damage to the park by the commercial activity sought to be conducted, and such other reasonable factors as the City Council may deem appropriate.

e. Prior to the issuance of the permit, the applicant shall provide proof to the City of the placement of public liability insurance in an amount not to exceed the single-limit coverage of at least five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) of which policy the City, has been made an additional insured. This requirement for liability insurance may be waived by the City Council for non-profit or charitable uses.

f. A permit shall further be issued subject to the understanding by the applicant that by obtaining the permit it agrees to hold harmless and indemnify the City, from all liability which may arise from, touch or concern the commercial activity permitted by the City.

4. Fee Exemption.

a. The City Council may, in its discretion, exempt from the requirement of paying a permit fee any bona fide, charitable or public organization proposing to conduct a charitable or non-profit activity from which all proceeds, excluding direct costs of the goods or services to be sold, will be devoted to the charitable or other public purposes for which the entity is formed or for which the activity is intended to benefit. Charitable activities shall include any and all purposes for which organizations may qualify for tax exempt status pursuant to Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(3) as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended.

b. Other Fee Exemptions. There will be no fee exemption for commercial activities. In its discretion, the City Council may waive the fee for Public or Community uses.

5. Charitable or public activities shall be given preference over other uses.

6. The applicant must agree in writing to save and hold the City harmless from any claim arising out of the applicant's use or applicant's invitees or guests at the City park. Use of the park by the applicant and applicant's guests and invitees is an assumption of any risk.

Section 2: Heyburn Code Section 5-7-3 B shall be repealed and in its place shall be the following:

B. PROHIBITED USES IN PARKS:

- Camping. Camping includes any form of overnight sleeping, and all normal uses of the word, including, but not limited to: Set up of and use of tents, shacks, or any other temporary shelter for the purpose of camping, except by special permission, nor shall any person leave in a park, after closing hours any moveable structure or special vehicle to be used or that could be used for such purpose, such as a house trailer, camp-trailer, tent, camp-wagon or the like.
- Dangerous Games: Take part in or abet the playing of any games involving thrown or otherwise propelled dangerous objects such as stones, arrows or javelins except in areas set apart for such forms of recreation. Golfing or driving golf balls is prohibited except where specific facilities have been provided.
- Horseback Riding: Ride a horse except on designated bridle trails and in specifically designated park areas. Where permitted, horses shall be thoroughly broken and properly restrained and ridden with due care, and shall not be allowed to graze or go unattended.
- Failure to observe and/or violate the rules of the use of permanent structures such as tennis courts, baseball fields, skateboard parks, all as promulgated by the City Council or duly authorized representative designated by it and posted.
- Skates or skateboards, except in places expressly designated for such use.
- Use of motor vehicles: No motor vehicle shall be permitted in or upon any park not expressly provided for parking or driving of motor vehicles. Such prohibited areas include grass, playing fields or other recreation areas, except:
 - Vehicles used by the City.
 - Vehicles making authorized deliveries within a park at the City's request or with its prior consent.

Section 3: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its three readings, passage, approval and publication.

Isn't it just like partner to bid most aggressively when you have to play the contract? That happened to George Steiner playing with Gaylor Kasle.

The heart game was no shoo-in here: It was missing the A-J-x-x of trump, with two sure diamond losers — and what about the clubs?

West led the diamond 10 in response to his partner's lead-directing double. East won the king and switched to a low spade. Steiner took the spade in dummy and called for a low heart. Up popped the jack; that was one hurdle cleared.

West took the heart ace and played a second round of diamonds to East's king. Back came the club 10. Steiner won with the ace, picked up trumps with three more rounds (as East discarded three diamonds), then played a spade to the king and ruffed a spade. It wasn't a sure thing, but it looked as though East had started with four spades. This meant that his original shape appeared to be 4-1-5-3.

If so, Steiner realized that he could catch East in a show-up squeeze. When Steiner played the last heart from dummy, East had to find a discard from the spade queen and the club 9-7. East discarded a club on the heart, and Steiner threw his spade.

When Steiner played a club from dummy and East produced the nine, Steiner was confident that the queen would drop under the king. It did, and Kasle's aggressive bid paid off with a near top.

ANSWER: Although you have a maximum hand for your first call, the combination of the negative double on your left (suggesting spade length), coupled with your partner's silence, argue for caution. I don't think you are likely to get badly hurt if you bid two spades now, but I believe you should pass and hope your partner will be able to balance if he has values and the two-diamond bid comes back to him.

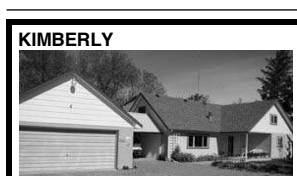

DEAR ABBY: While standing in a serving line at a restaurant, a man commented to my wife about her weight. She was very upset. My take was, "Don't talk to strange men." Later, I wondered whether I should have confronted the guy, slugged him or waited for him in the parking lot.



DEAR ABBY Jeanne Phillips

As a young man I was prone to rash actions. I would like to think in my golden years that I have outgrown this tendency. Still, I'm not sure I handled the situation correctly. I want my wife to be confident that I would come to her defense. Please advise.

DEAR TEXAS TOM: Although as a young man you were prone to rash actions, as a mature one you gained the ability to control your temper. Had you confronted the boor, the situation would have escalated and you could have wound up in the pokey charged with assault. I'm advising you that you were correct to do nothing. The man is lucky your wife didn't "serve" him a fist sandwich. A lesser woman might have.

DEAR ABBY: When my husband, "Jeff" and I married, we drew up a medical proxy and health-care directives should future incapacitation arise. Jeff is now terminally ill with brain cancer and has about five months to live. Over the last two years he has been through four surgeries, 25 doses of radiation, countless doctors' appointments, physical therapy and enough pills to fill a steamer trunk. I had to quit working because Jeff is now my full-time job.

As his illness progresses, we have discussed placing him in a hospice. But the closer he gets to death, the more he changes his mind. He demands that I lift, jerk and pull him in and out of bed. When I can no longer do this, he wants me to install a hoist. He needs assistance eating, dressing, bathing, using the toilet and is in a wheelchair.

Jeff's tumor is growing, causing pressure and affecting his mental attitude. He's impatient, demanding, selfish and nasty. I'm caring for him at home because it's his home and I am his wife. Somehow, his illness makes him feel entitled to act like a selfish child. At what point do I put him in a hospice facility without his family calling me a nasty witch and Jeff kicking and screaming to be let out and return home?

— END OF MY ROPE

DEAR END: Please accept my sympathy. Your husband is sick and in pain, probably frightened and the cancer may have affected his ability to think rationally.

If you haven't discussed this with your husband's doctor, you must. It may not be necessary to place Jeff in an in-patient facility because many terminally ill patients can receive the same care in their homes. However, it will take a referral from a doctor, certifying that your husband has six months or less to live. Much of the cost is covered by Medicare, and most insurance also covers it.

Hospice provides visits from doctors, nurses, home health care aides and volunteers who can help with bathing your husband, changing his linens and some of the lifting that you're worried about. For your sake and his, you should contact the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization. It can help you find a hospice provider. The toll-free phone number is 800-658-8898 or log onto www.nhpc.org.

Because you're afraid of criticism from Jeff's family, tell them that he — and you — need them to step in and help with his care because it has become more than you can handle alone. If they agree, it will give them precious time with him. If not, they'll be in no position to criticize you.
