Making Water from Wind

Well, it's not quite like that. But a new project uses surplus wind energy to put more water back into the aquifer that feeds much of southern Idaho.

BURLEY • One local irrigation district is using one of Idaho's more abundant natural resources to renew another that's growing scarce.

For one irrigation season, Southwest Irrigation District water users will pump recharge water into the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer at nights or in the early mornings. That will take advantage of times of low demand for electricity from the Bonneville Power Administration – specifically, power generated by wind turbines.

It's all part of a pilot project in Cassia County involving BPA, United Electric Co-op and SWID. The federal energy behemoth, which funnels its electricity through the co-op, will offer the water users a discount. In turn, the water users will be expected to keep up the

BPA has had trouble handling its surplus wind energy. The project will help by increasing energy demand in the spring and fall, said Jo Elg, general manager of United Electric.

"This project did take a year before we could

get it off the ground," Elg said. "But we think it can continue to go forward. There are a lot of opportunities out there to increase recharge in

Since 2009, SWID has made recharge efforts a priority and water users have been increasing how much they pump back into the aquifer, said Brian Higgs, a hydrologist for Water Well Consultants Inc., who works with SWID.

"Everyone knows that the water in the aquifer is dropping and it's everyone's fault that it's gotten this low," Higgs said. "But if we manage it right, there's enough for all water

TWIN FALLS • Four candidates, four sets of strengths.

Today, Mayor Greg Lanting and a selection committee of councilmen Chris Talkington and Don Hall will interview finalists to fill the vacant seat on the Twin Falls City Council, which opened after Lance Clow stepped down in April.

Council candidates are normally elected. But in the event of a midterm vacancy, the mayor may appoint someone to serve until the next general election.

While the mayor has the option of making today's interviews public, he decided to keep them private, citing a desire to allow candidates to speak

The candidate whom Lanting appoints will go before the council on Monday. If the council approves the appointment, the new member will be sworn in immediately and vote in that night's meeting, at which the council will consider approving the final plat for the Canyon Park North development. The new member will also have a say in setting the city's budget and five-year strategic plan.

According to online court records, Cannon was cited on April 19 for excessive driving under the influence. According to Idaho statutes, a DUI is considered excessive when the driver's blood-alcohol content measures at least .20 - more than twice the legal limit.

"She did report to both me and an administrative district judge;" said Linda Wright, the trial court administrator for the 5th Judicial District.

In Idaho, judges are held to high standards and must follow the Idaho Code of Judicial Conduct, Wright said. That code exhorts judges to "respect and comply with the law and ... conduct themselves at all times in a manner that does not detract from public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary."

The Idaho Judicial Council, the 5th Judicial District Magistrates Commission and the Idaho Supreme Court are all aware of the issue and are giving Cannon her due process, Wright said.

The Judicial Council makes recommendations to the Supreme Court for the removal, discipline and retirement of judicial officers. The Magistrates Commission retains authority over new judges during their first 18 months.

Cannon, former Minidoka County prosecutor, became only the second female judge in the history of the 5th Judicial District when she was picked for the job in January 2011.

Cannon will not hear DUI cases while her own case is pending, and some changes have been made to her court calendar. No other steps regarding her judgeship have been taken and she will continue to hear cases, Wright

Wright said she does not know what would happen if Cannon is convicted.

The maximum punishments for excessive DUI is one year in jail, a \$2,000 fine and a minimum one-year driver's license suspension.

Miller explained to the

group how a new, more modern jail would be different from the current facility. His design, which is about 38,650 square feet, features a large sally port where inmates are brought in after arrest or transport and a mental health hold area, both lacking in the current jail.

Now, inmates are brought in through the same entrance as the general public. Holding a mental health patient out of county can cost \$1,000 a night, Jail Administrator Lt. Rob Neiwert said.

The new jail would also have plenty of space to hold inmates who are on work release, Miller said. Those inmates need to be housed away from regular inmates for safety issues, County Commissioner Charlie Howell said.

"We're big on work release," he said. "We'll be able to have an alternative for the judge and they actually pay to be on there. They don't lose their job, their family doesn't go on welfare." Several audience mem-

bers asked about the current cost to house inmates versus the cost in a new The current cost is \$47

per inmate per night, Neiwert said, but commissioners have not done a cost assessment for a new facility. Howell said commissioners would calculate the number and provide it to those asking, along with presenting it at the next informational meeting on May 10. A larger jail would cut

down on transportation costs, Neiwert told the crowd. On Thursday, the Jerome jail held 63 inmates, with more than 30 staying at jails in other counties. They currently must be transported back and forth for court dates, he said.

Howell said he was encouraged by the response from the group. Reed said he has seen smaller turnouts at similar meetings, and thought the questions asked were thoughtful and the feedback positive.

The May 10 meeting will be at 7 p.m. in the courthouse annex at 233 W. Main St. in Jerome. It will cover the same information.

SWID primarily recharges the aquifer by using injection wells located along its pipelines. Typically, recharge efforts cost water users \$40 per acre-foot. An acre-foot is enough water to cover one acre, one foot deep.

Under this project, the costs have dropped to \$16 per acre-foot. Last year, SWID pumped close to 5,000 acre-feet back into the aquifer. Water users will probably pump more this year now that energy rates are lower for recharge efforts, Higgs said.

"We're able to pump more for cheaper," Higgs said. "And man oh man, is it working out great. We're excited to take this to the next level."

The project only increases BPA's energy demand by 1.8 megawatts. However, if the utility concludes in the fall that the project was successful, future agreements could increase energy demands by 50 to 100 megawatts just in Cassia County.

"Our injection wells are thirsty for more," Higgs said. "I really hope everyone else involved is happy with this project because we want to continue doing this."

Trial Begins in Day Care Death

BOISE • The trial of a Boise woman charged with firstdegree murder in the death of a 2-year-old boy is underway in Idaho's 4th District Court.

The Idaho Statesman reports Katherine Stanfield appeared in an Ada County courtroom Wednesday to face allegations that she killed Wyatt Fesler at her day care center in December 2009

Prosecutors say the child's injuries included optic nerve swelling, nerve damage and head trauma and indicate that he was killed by blunt force trauma. Stanfield's defense attorney claims the boy, who was born with methamphetamine in his system, was prone to holding his breath and fainting spells.

Man Sentenced in Death of Baby

IDAHO FALLS • A 26year-old Idaho Falls man has been sentenced to 5 to 15 years in prison in the death of his girlfriend's 6month-old daughter.

KIFI-TV reports Mauricio Cando-Franco was sentenced Thursday by 6th District Judge Jonathan Schinderling after Cando-Franco pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter.

Prosecutors alleged Cando-Franco was babysitting his girlfriend's daughter in January 2010 when the girl's grandmother stopped by. She told police the girl looked limp. Court records say the baby suffered brain damage and a detached retina, injuries common with shaking a child.

After Cando-Franco serves his sentence, he will be deported to Mexico.

IRU Challenge Complicates Pollution-trading Plan

Irrigation return flows like at Dixie Drain aren't required to limit phosphorous under the federal Clean Water Act, though the EPA lists farming as a leading polluter.

Regional EPA officials in Seattle declined to comment, citing Idaho Rivers United's appeal.

But it's clear the pollutiontrading proposal at Dixie Drain is high on the agenda, not only for the federal agency but for Idaho's leaders in Congress.

In 2010 the EPA's top regional administrator, Dennis McLerran, toured the proposed wetlands site between Parma and Notus, giving the project what amounted to an initial blessing. McLerran was accompanied by Idaho Republican Sen. Jim Risch, who called Boise's aspirations an "innovative, first-of-itskind approach?"

Boise also is eager because it's already spent \$500,000 to buy 49 acres at the site.

Idaho Rivers United said it doesn't want to block the project, because it likes the idea of treating agricultural pollution.

"If Dixie Drain works as intended, I'd like to see a project like it at every agricultural drain in the valley," said Kevin Lewis, an activist with Idaho Rivers United.

Still, his group said in its appeal of the EPA phosphorous limits for Boise that it makes no sense to curb phosphorous discharges between May and September, while having no limits the rest of the year. Though phosphorous contributes to Brownlee's oxy-

gen-sapping algae blooms primarily during the hot summer months, they're increasingly observed at other times as the climate changes, Idaho Rivers United wrote in its appeal. Phosphorous releases between October and April also pile up in sediment on the reservoir floor, contributing to future blooms.

One alternative: The EPA could establish winter limits for Boise high enough for the city to avoid expensive plant upgrades - and stay on track at Dixie Drain.







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Biologists: Dead Animal Was Wolf Killed Illegally

PENDLETON, Ore. (AP) Authorities say they believe a carcass found in northeastern Oregon was a wild wolf killed illegally, but they are not yet saying just how it was killed.

The Oregon State Police say the 97-pound animal was found in mid-March on private land near Cove, east of La Grande on the flanks of the Wallowa Mountains, by a couple out walking. It had been dead a week, the East Oregonian reported.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game forensics laboratory in Caldwell performed tests, determining the cause of death was a criminal act, state police said. But investigators did not divulge the re-

Meanwhile, the carcass was sent to the University of Idaho for genetic testing, to determine whether it was a purebred wolf, a pet, or a wolf-dog cross, said Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife spokeswoman Michelle Dennehy. The results will also tell them whether the animal was from one of Oregon's established wolf packs, or somewhere else.

Wolves started moving back into Oregon from Idaho in the late 1990s after packs were reintroduced into the Northern Rockies as part of a federal restoration program.

One pack in Wallowa County has occasionally preyed on livestock, angering some ranchers.

The Oregon Court of Appeals last year blocked the state from carrying out a kill order on two wolves from the Imnaha pack, ruling that conservation groups had a good chance of succeeding with a legal claim that state protections for endangered species overruled a management plan that allows wolves to be killed to reduce livestock attacks.

Oregon has an estimated two dozen wolves, in four packs. Most are in northeastern Oregon, although one, OR-7, has gotten widespread attention for his travels to southwest Oregon and California.

The state police say the state Endangered Species Act protects wolves in all parts of Oregon: They can't be killed except in the defense of human life or with a special permit. They are protected by federal law in western Ore-

Besides those killed by government agents to keep them from preying on livestock, several have been found dead since the packs began establishing themselves. Nobody has been prosecuted.

Judge Rejects Challenge to Scout Land Deal

Boy Scout families and others opposed to deal with Arizona developer argued that it violates terms of the original deed for Camp Easton.

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • A judge dismissed a lawsuit challenging a proposed land deal involving a historic Boy Scout campsite along Lake

Coeur d'Alene. First District Judge John Luster on Wednesday reject ed arguments made by opponents of the proposal that involves the Inland Northwest Council of Boy Scouts and Discovery Land Co., which wants to convert the parcel into lakefront proper-

Under the proposal, the Boy Scouts would sell the 420-acre property to the Arizona-based developer, which in exchange would provide 270 acres on a separate bay on the lake while building a new camp for the

Boy Scout families and others opposed to the land swap argued that the deal violates terms of the original deed for Camp Easton.

The group, which formed the nonprofit Camp Easton Forever Inc., claimed the land donated for the camp by F.W. Fitze in 1929 was conditioned to always be used for that purpose, essentially giving the camp status as a charitable trust.

Court documents submitted by the group included minutes from a 1929 meeting in which Fitze spells out to the Boy Scouts Idaho Panhandle Council his hopes for a permanent camp. The group argued it was simply preserving the intentions of Fitze and protecting the existing camp for future scouts.

Camp Easton Forever asked the judge to halt the deal and issue a permanent injunction to prevent the property from being used for anything except a camp for scouts.

The Inland Northwest Council of Boy Scouts, which has members in northern Idaho and eastern Washington, questioned the intentions of Fitze and the validity of the 1929 meeting. The group argued the meeting minutes were never officially incorporated into the original deed and that the organization was granted title to the land.

In his ruling, Luster said the deed that transferred the land said nothing about permanent use or the creation of a permanent trust for the property. He also ruled that Camp Easton Forever had not established legal standing to oppose the sale.

"There is no asserted loss of money or property" by the plaintiffs, Luster said in his ruling. "Thus, there is no distinct palpable injury shared in substantially equal measure by all or a large

class of citizens."

The seven-member foundation board for the Boy Scouts organization voted in February to move forward with the deal. Luster's deci-

sion allows the Boy Scouts group to further pursue the deal, though no terms of sale have been established, said the organization's CEO Tim McCandless.

For this reason, the Times-News endorses Jack Johnson as the GOP's best choice for Twin Falls County sheriff.





Romney and Mormons Brace for a Mean Political Season

SALT LAKE CITY • As 20,000 Mormons streamed from the church conference center, a ragtag group of protesters stood across the street shouting that the Latter-day Saints were going to hell. Mormon families, who had gathered here for two days of speeches and spiritual guidance called General Conference, ignored the hecklers or laughed and kept walking.

This, after all, is a church accustomed to much worse.

Yet, even with a resilience built over nearly two centuries as outsiders, church members are anxious about what's ahead. Republican Mitt Romney is about to become the first Mormon nominee for U.S. president on a major party ticket. That will give them a chance like no other to explain their tradition to the public, but the church's many critics will have a bigger platform, too. And the vetting will take place amid the emotion of what may well be a nasty general election.

"People who have opposed Mormonism forever will use this as an opportunity," said Robert Millet, a religion scholar at Brigham Young University who co-founded a pioneering evangelical-Mormon dialogue. "I don't know if we're ready for this kind of deluge."


At the Salt Lake City headquarters of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, officials are preparing to defend the church.

It's an effort that began before Romney officially announced his first, ultimately unsuccessful, 2008 bid for the GOP nomination. Mormon officials met with journalists around the country about the church's nonpartisanship. Leaders were worried that any statements they made to clarify doctrine would give the impression of aiding Romney.

That concern continues this election season. LDS officials have emphasized repeatedly that the church doesn't communicate with the Romney campaign. In a lengthy statement on their main website, Mormon leaders say the church does not "endorse, promote or oppose political parties, candidates or platforms."

'I'm a Mormon'

The Latter-day Saints have been running a multimilliondollar series of ads, called "I'm a Mormon," since 2010, to dispel stereotypes by telling the stories of individual Mormons. To avoid any appearance that the ads were meant to help Romney, the church didn't buy ad time in Iowa and some other markets with early primaries, said Michael Purdy, an LDS national spokesman. At the General Conference last month, led by the highest

authorities of the church, there was no mention of the election across the pulpit.

"We're just going to do what the church does, regardless of the election," Purdy said.

The neutrality message can be a hard sell since Mormons are known to be overwhelmingly Republican and more socially conservative than many other Americans. The impression was reinforced by Mormon contributions of money and volunteers for Proposition 8, the 2008 California measure to bar same-sex marriage. (LDS officials say they were advocating for a moral, not a partisan, issue.)

The church has long contended with conspiracy theories of Mormon plots to take over America – claims that have only increased with Romney's prominence. If the former governor wins the White House, however, several political scientists predict LDS officials would be more likely to pull back from any policy debates to avoid an appearance of undue influence, even when Mormons have a clear interest.

"There is a good chance that the main way a lot of leaders of the church will respond to the election of a Mormon to the presidency will be to stay as quiet and uninvolved in politics as possible and put as much daylight as possible between that president and the institutional church," said Russell Arben Fox, a political scientist at Friends University in Wichita, Kan., and a Mormon writer. "They're a global church and have responsibilities all around the world. For them to appear to be lining up behind a Mormon president and endorsing his policies would just be bad for the church."

Despite their fears, Mormons acknowledge that Romney's nomination will be a milestone like none before for the church.

Anti-LDS Bias

Organized in 1830, Latterday Saints were persecuted from their earliest days for their doctrine and support for polygamy, which Mormons renounced in 1890. A mob assassinated founder Joseph Smith in 1844, sending Mormons fleeing into the unsettled Mountain West. Theological differences with other faith groups - about scriptures, the nature of God and heaven - provided fodder for anti-Mormon bias over the years. Christian groups challenged the Mormon assertion that the church is part of traditional Christianity. One such group, the Utah Lighthouse Ministry, operates just a few miles from Temple Square, the Salt Lake City complex at the heart of the faith.

Steve Shaw, a political scientist at Northwest Nazarene University and co-author of "The Presidents and Their Faith," compares this election to the 1960 campaign of John F. Kennedy, who confronted religious bias to become the first Roman Catholic president. Kennedy's election marked a move for Catholics more firmly into the American mainstream, a potential shift for Mormons as well in 2012. When Romney became the presumptive nominee last month, the liberal-leaning Mormon blog, "By Common Consent," posted an article titled, "Excited about Romney, Despite Myself."

"If Mr. Romney is elected, when he is sworn into office in January 2013, the history of Mormonism in this country clearly would enter a new chapter," Shaw said.

Christian groups with a competing emphasis on evangelizing worry about a flood of Mormon converts if Romney prevails over President Barack Obama. With 14.4 million members, the church is among the fastestgrowing in the world, supported by a full-time missionary force of about 55,000 young people.

Yet, with Romney in the Oval Office, the popularity of the church could fall as well as rise.

Internally, while the church has indeed been gaining new members, it has also been losing some others: A

number of younger Mormons have become disillusioned about LDS doctrine and history. Outgoing LDS church historian, Elder Marlin K. Jensen, confirmed that trend in a talk last November at Utah State University. Leaders worry that religion issues raised by the general election could exacerbate the problem. The Foundation for Apologetic Information & Research, or FAIR, a volunteer Mormon anti-defamation group, said its "Ask an Apologist'' web feature has been especially busy with queries from Mormons struggling with questions from their children.

"It's forced a lot of members of the church to examine their beliefs and how they talk with their kids," said FAIR's president, Scott Gor-

Private Practice

In surveys of non-Mormons, only a small minority say they are familiar with the church. Romney, a lifelong church member and one-time top LDS leader in the Boston area, will be their introduction. However, Romney rarely speaks about his faith while campaigning and would probably be no more forthcoming as he tried to navigate Washington and survive for a second term. The most visible member of Mormonism might end up practicing his religion in private.

But first, the church has to get to November.

FAIR has started a new website called MormonVoices.org, to combat misinformation about the church that could result from attention to the faith sparked by Romney's candidacy. Kyle Jarrett, who lives in Washington, said leaders of his LDS ward, or local congregation, organized an information session for church members on potential issues about Mormonism in the general election.

"It's a new thing for us, to hear our religion being talked about in a roundtable on MSNBC," said Jarrett, 30, who works for the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee.

WSU Considers Hormone Therapy Insurance

MOSCOW • The committee that recommends changes to student health coverage at Washington State University will consider including hormone replacement therapy in insurance plans next year.

The change was suggested by representatives from the Gay Lesbian Bisexual Transgender and Allies committee of the Associated Students of

Through hormone replacement therapy, transgender patients use hormones such as testosterone and estrogen to modify secondary sex characteristics like facial hair and breasts.

Christina Low, a graduate student, chairs the Counseling and Student Health Advisory Committee that assists in the annual evaluation of student insurance plans. She said GLBTA students have requested hormone therapy

coverage for three years. "It has been a kind of consistent point of wanting to put it into the insurance plan," she said Tuesday. "However, it's kind of been unfortunately overshadowed by all the

other stuff going on." Since 2010, the advisory committee has focused on complying with the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. Low said there wasn't time to consider further adjustments. The committee will meet this summer to begin considering next year's coverage, and, Low said, the therapy will be discussed.

"Students would likely need to be polled to see how many were in favor of adding this benefit and how many students would like to utilize this benefit," Low said. "This polling would be necessary, as benefits cannot be added a la carte and must be added for

all those on the plan, not just those who plan to use the services."

She estimated that students' annual health insurance costs would go up \$3 to \$4 if the therapy were added to the plan.

"It wasn't a ton, (but) it is another additional cost," Low said. "So it'd be something students would have a right to have input on."

WSU senior Matthew Long-Rhyne, representing the GLBTA committee, raised the therapy question at the committee's April meeting.

"I know it hasn't been done in the past three years, but next year (we'd like to) get HRT on the insurance plan," Long-Rhyne said. "It needs to get done. A lot of trans(gender) people are

coming in and can't afford it." According to WSU Health and Wellness Services, HRT can cost anywhere from \$15 to \$120 per month. Prescriptions for it can be filled on campus, but Long-Rhyne said the cost could prevent some students from getting the medicine they need.

"For many trans(gender) persons, hormones could be the decision (between) life or death," Long-Rhyne said. "Many trans(gender) persons feel extreme dysphoria, and it can really only be 'fixed' by taking hormones and getting surgery."

Not all transgender individuals choose to take hormones, but Long-Rhyne said for many people the therapy begins the transition to the gender with which they iden-

"For many trans(gender) persons, getting hormones is the first step on their way to becoming physically who they are," Long-Rhyne said. "The benefits of adding an HRT plan to the school's insurance plan more than outweigh the risks."

'Barefoot Bandit' Gets Out of Solitary

SEATTLE • The youthful thief known as the "Barefoot Bandit," who led police on a two-year crime spree in stolen boats, cars and planes, has been moved out of solitary confinement and into the general inmate population at another prison in Washington state, corrections officials confirmed Thursday.

Colton Harris-Moore, 21, had spent three weeks in "intensive management," most of which was at the Walla Walla State Penitentiary alongside inmates facing the death penalty. It was for his own protection as a high-profile convict, said Washington Department of Corrections spokesman Chad Lewis.

"Somebody might want to make a name for himself by saying, 'I took down the Barefoot Bandit," Lewis said.

Harris-Moore had been in solitary confinement at Wal-

la Walla since he arrived April 11, and he was allowed out of his cell five times per week, for an hour each time. A department spokeswoman said last month he was expected to remain in solitary confinement for as long as eight weeks while officials determined his long-term placement.

His lawyer, John Henry Browne, objected to that over concerns about his mental health.

He said Harris-Moore neither needed nor wanted the protection of solitary confinement and that it was absurd his client, never convicted of a violent crime, was being kept in conditions akin to those of the worst murderers.

On Monday, Harris-Moore was transferred across the state to Stafford Creek Corrections Center in Aberdeen. He was placed Wednesday in a medium-security unit with about 250 other offenders.

Browne credited an AP story about Harris-Moore's detention with speeding up the department's decision to move him.

"I'm very happy to tell you Colton is at Stafford Creek," Browne said. "We spoke with his counselor. He's already set up in a GED program."

Harris-Moore was sentenced in December to seven years in state prison for dozens of crimes, including burglary and identity theft, stemming from his sensational two-year run from the

A self-taught pilot, he was arrested in a hail of bullets in the Bahamas in 2010, after he crash-landed a plane stolen from an Indiana airport.

Harris-Moore sold the movie rights to his story in hopes of raising enough money to pay \$1.3 million in restitution to his victims. Academy Award winner Dustin Lance Black has met with Harris-Moore several times and has turned in a draft of the script.

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

Deal Undone? Activist Now Wants to Leave China

BEIJING • The blind Chinese dissident who boldly fled house arrest and placed himself under the wing of U.S. diplomats balked Wednesday at a deal delicately worked out be-

tween the two countries to let him live freely in China, saying he now fears for his family's safety unless they are all spirited abroad.

After six days holed up in the U.S. Embassy, as senior officials in Beijing and Washington tussled over his fate, Chen Guangcheng left the compound's protective confines Wednesday for a nearby hospital for treatment of a leg injury suffered in his escape. A shaken Chen told The Associated Press from his hospital room that Chinese authorities has warned him he would lose his opportunity to be reunited with his family if he stayed longer in the em-

U.S. officials verified that account. But they adamantly denied his contention that one American diplomat had warned him of a threat from the Chinese that his wife would be beaten to death if he did not get out of the embassy.

"I think we'd like to rest in a place outside of China," Chen told the AP, appealing again for help in Washington. "Help my family and me leave

Only hours earlier, U.S. officials said they had extracted from the Chinese government a promise that Chen would join his family and be allowed to start a new life in a university town in China, safe from the rural authorities who had abusively held him in prison and house arrest for nearly seven years.

That announcement had been timed to clear up the matter before strategic and economic meetings start Thursday between Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner and their Chinese counterparts and to show the U.S. standing firm in its defense of human rights in China while engaging on other issues.

Clinton spoke to Chen on the phone when he left the embassy and, in a statement, welcomed the resettlement agreement as one that "reflected his choices and our val-

But the murky circumstances of Chen's departure from the embassy, and his sudden appeal to leave China after declaring he wanted to stay, again threatened to overshadow talks that were to focus on the global economic crisis and hotspots such as North Korea, Iran, Syria and Su-

The Chinese Foreign Ministry signaled its unhappiness with the entire affair, demanding that the U.S. apologize for giving Chen sanctuary at the embassy.

"What the U.S. side has done has interfered in the domestic affairs of China, and the Chinese side will never accept it," Foreign Ministry spokesman Liu Weimin said in a statement.

Chen, 40, became an international human rights figure and inspiration to many ordinary Chinese after running afoul of local government officials for exposing forced abortions carried out as part of China's one-child policy. He served four years in prison on what supporters said were fabricated charges, then was kept under house arrest with his wife, daughter and mother, with the adults often being roughed by officials and his daughter searched and

In Arkansas, Two Women Claim Discarded Lotto Ticket

Sharon Jones, an Arkansas woman who cashed a \$1 million lottery ticket may have to give up the winnings to Sharon Duncan, a woman who threw away the ticket after she bought it, according to a judge's ruling.

BEEBE, Ark. • When she plucked a winning lottery ticket out of the trash, Sharon Jones' luck changed instantly. The \$1 million prize let her pay off debts, give thousands of dollars to her children and buy a gleaming new pickup truck.

But now her jackpot is in jeopardy. A judge ruled this week that the money belongs to another woman, who says she threw the ticket away after a lottery machine incorrectly told her it was a loser. The Arkansas Lottery Commission insists there are no problems with its equipment.

"Why does she have the right to come back after she's already thrown it away and say, 'Oh no. Now that it is a winner, I want the money?"" asked Jones' husband, William, who was laid off

last year after working in construction. Sharon Jones claimed the \$1 million prize last July, turning in a scratch-off "Diamond Dazzler" ticket that the other woman, Sharon Duncan, had purchased earlier at the Super 1 Stop convenience store in Beebe, about 35 miles northeast of Little

Duncan told a judge she discarded the ticket after an electronic scanner her it was "not a win-

"And then the next thing, you know, 10 months later, you're fighting for something that was trash," William Jones said.

Years ago, Sharon Jones quit her job washing dishes at a cafe in nearby Searcy to tend to her father-in-law as he was dying from a lung disease. To make money, she often collected discarded lottery tickets because they can qualify for secondary prizes. What used to be her father-in-law's bedroom now contains three large plastic bins full of thousands of old tickets - and a copy of the winning ticket.

Jones discovered the ticket was a winner when the state's database wouldn't let her enter the

The state Lottery Commission said it is confident its machines work properly. "We've never had a report of a mis-scanned ticket," spokeswoman Julie Baldridge said.

William Jones said the couple was living paycheck-to-paycheck before hitting the jackpot. After the two claimed their prize money, they looked to buy a house to replace the ranch-style home they live in now.

"That was one of the first things on our agenda," he said, explaining that their plans all "got shattered" when ownership of the ticket was disputed. A judge issued a restraining order — but only after the Joneses spent some of the money.

The two now have about \$490,000 remaining from the \$680,000 they received after taxes. They say they gave tens of thousands of dollars to their children and about \$4,500 to a relative who has a child with Down syndrome.

One of Duncan's attorneys said his client isn't ready to talk about the lottery ticket yet. Another lawyer, James "Red" Morgan, argued in court that she simply made a mistake by throwing away a \$1 million ticket and that the only right she willingly parted with was to enter the ticket for the possibility of a secondary prize.

White County Judge Thomas Hughes concluded that Duncan bought the winning ticket, even though lottery records and store security video didn't synch up to the precise timing of the purchase. He ruled that Duncan never abandoned her right to claim the winnings.

"The \$1 million was never found money;" the judge said Tuesday.

Lottery officials investigated Jones' account of finding the ticket and were satisfied with it, Lot-

tery Security Chief Lance Huey testified. Attorneys for the Joneses plan to appeal the judge's decision. In the meantime, the remaining money is in limbo. Asked what the pair would do if they had to turn over a full \$1 million, Jones laughed.

"I hope I don't have to answer that question," he said before confiding that there's no way they could pay back the money.

Afghanistan Security Deal Obama Signed Has Holes

WASHINGTON • The 10 - year security compact that President Barack Obama signed with Afghan President Hamid Karzai contains promises the United States and Afghanistan cannot guarantee they will keep, and loopholes for both nations.

The deal signed Tuesday also allows either nation to walk away on a year's notice. That could allow the next U.S. president, or the next Afghan leader, to scuttle a deal negotiated by his or her predecessor.

For Obama, the agreement represents a compromise with Karzai after messy negotiations over U.S. military detention of Afghan suspects and raids on Afghan homes that offend Afghans.

U.S. concessions were relatively small, however, and the deal Obama signed in Kabul is probably the best one he could get on a tight deadline. He wants to showcase a long-term commitment to Afghan stability when he hosts NATO leaders for a summit in Chicago later this month. U.S. officials said the deal is legally binding, but it does not carry the force of a treaty as Afghanistan originally wanted.

Obama called the agreement historic, and said it "defines a new kind of relationship between our countries a future in which Afghans are responsible for the security of their nation, and we build an equal partnership between two sovereign states."

The deal pledges Afghanistan to fight corruption, improve efficiency and protect human rights, including women's rights. All are areas where the United States already finds fault with Afghan performance, and Afghanistan has promised improvement on corruption many times before. The nine-page agreement spells out no consequences if those or other goals are not met.

The agreement uses even looser language to address the production and trafficking of illegal drugs in Afghanistan, a major opium producer. Both nations affirm that illicit drugs undermine security and legitimate economic growth but promise only to cooperate to confront the

The United States promises to seek annual funding to train and equip the Afghan armed forces but gives no dollar figure. That money must be approved by Congress, which has so far supported the Obama administration's plan to build up the Afghan forces. There is growing concern in Congress, however, about the quality of those forces, and the billions of dollars they would need over 10 years is not assured.

13 Charged in Hazing Death of Florida A&M Band Member

ORLANDO, Fla. • Thirteen people were charged Wednesday in one of the biggest college hazing cases ever prosecuted in the U.S., accused in the death of a Florida A&M University drum major who authorities say was mercilessly pummeled by fellow

members of the marching band. The charges came more than five months after Robert Champion, 26,

died aboard a chartered bus parked outside an Orlando hotel following a performance against a rival school.

While the most sensational hazing cases have typically involved fraternities, sororities or athletic teams, the FAMU tragedy in November exposed a brutal tradition among marching bands at some colleges around the U.S.

"The death ... is nothing short of an American tragedy," said State Attorney Lawson Lamar. "No one should have expected that his college experience would include being pummeled to death?

Eleven defendants were charged with hazing resulting in death, a felony, and misdemeanor offenses

Activist's Fate Deepens U.S.-China **Suspicions**

BEIJING • The diplomatic disarray deepened Thursday after a blind activist reversed course and asked to leave China with his family, aban-

doning an arduously negotiated agreement even though he had left the protection of the U.S. Embassy and was in a Beijing hospital surrounded by Chinese police.

Bewildered and alone with his wife and children, Chen Guangcheng periodically switched on a cell phone to tell friends and foreign media he felt scared and wanted to go abroad, and that he had not seen U.S. officials in over a day.

He even called in to a congressional hearing in Washington, telling lawmakers he wanted to meet with U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton. "I hope I can get more help from her," Chen

Chen's high-profile effort to keep his case in the public eye served to increase pressure on Washington and embarrass Beijing as it hosted Clinton and other U.S. officials for annual talks on global political and economic hotspots.

Taken aback at Chen's change of heart, U.S. diplomats spent much of Thursday trying to confirm that the family wanted to leave, and they eventually said they would try to help him. Still, it remained unclear how they might do so now that he has left the embassy, or whether the Chinese would be willing to renegotiate a deal that both sides thought had been settled a day earlier.

In Washington, State Department spokesman Mark Toner confirmed U.S. officials weren't able to see Chen in person Thursday but spoke twice with him by telephone, and once with his wife, Yuan Weijing, outside the hospital.

"It's our desire to meet with him tomorrow or in the coming days, Toner said. "But I can't speak to whether we'll have access to him. I just don't know.''

Earlier, State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland said U.S. officials would continue to work with Chen and his wife to try to find a satisfactory new solution. "We need to consult with them further to get a better sense of what they want to do and consider their options," Nuland said.

White House: Time for a New Tactic in Syria

It may be time for the world to acknowledge that a cease-fire is not holding in Syria, and that it is time to try another approach to stop the violence, the White House said Thursday. "If the regime's intransigence continues, the international community is going to have to admit defeat," White House press secretary Jay Carney said. It was the clearest statement yet that the Obama administration sees little chance for the cease-fire and peace plan brokered by United Nations envoy Kofi Annan last month but largely ignored by Syrian forces loyal to President Bashar Assad. "It is clear and we will not deny that the plan has not been succeeding thus far," Carney said. — Associated Press

Bin Laden Papers Reveal Concern over Failures, Plan to Kill Obama

WASHINGTON • In his final months padding around the dark third-floor room in his cinderblock Pakistan hideout, the world's most notorious terrorist mastermind spent a lot of time in his own head.

He fretted about his public image and the legacy of his organization. He wondered whether he had misnamed it al-Qaida. He fired off orders, handed out promotions, denied requests for help from the battlefield and sought to direct publicity for the looming 10th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks. And as well, he schemed to kill the man who would, in the end, give the order to shoot him dead: Barack

That's the portrait of Osama bin Laden painted by the slim collection of notes and letters made public Thursday by the Combating Terrorism Center, a think tank at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. The 17 documents represent a sliver of the vast cache of material on computer hard disks, flash drives and DVDs that Navy SEALs scooped up from bin Laden's compound after they found him a year ago in his bedroom and put a bullet in

The documents offer few revelations about how bin Laden evaded the U.S. for nearly a decade. But they do provide, with granular detail, selective insights into the mind of the terrorist leader during the years he was on the

What is missing from the tightly controlled release are details of who may have protected him, and how America's Public Enemy No. 1 had spent years just a mile from Pakistan's own version of West Point, the prestigious Kakul military academy in Abbottabad.

During those years, the documents

indicate, bin Laden was haunted by al-Qaida's failures and sought to recast his revolution. He concerned himself with the organization's inabilities to launch a second large-scale attack in the U.S., to capitalize on resentment that fueled the "Arab Spring" and to retain the trust and loyalty of Sunni Arab tribes in western Iraq.

Al-Qaida's experience in Iraq weighed heavily on bin Laden. He saw how beheadings and indiscriminate bombings that led to scores of Muslim civilian deaths turned the tribes against the group, pushing tribal leaders into an alliance with the U.S. mili-

"Bin Laden appeared to be deeply concerned that affiliates could go too far by killing too many people," said Seth Jones, an expert on al-Qaida at the Santa Monica, Calif.-based Rand Corp. think tank and author of "Hunting in the Shadows: The Pursuit of al Oa'ida Since 9/11."

Virginia's Profile Rises in Presidential Race

PORTSMOUTH, Va. • Move over Ohio and Florida. Virginia is becoming the hottest new battleground in this year's race for the White House.

Shifting demographics have President Barack Obama fighting for another win in this Southern state four years after he became the first Democratic presidential nominee to carry Virginia in more than four decades. Republican rival Mitt Romney is banking on buyers' remorse as he works to prove that Obama's unlikely 2008 victory was a fluke.

Six months before Election Day, both sides concede that Virginia is truly up for grabs. And the outcome here could have dramatic consequences – for Romney especially.

"This may well be the state that decides who the next president is," Romney told supporters Thursday in coastal Portsmouth, Va. "You're going to hear it all, right here in Virginia?

Already, Romney allies and Obama's campaign are pouring money into television ads. And, by week's end, each candidate will have visited the state.

Romney spent two days campaigning

here this week. Obama will be in the state today and Saturday – what his aides are calling his first formal day of campaigning - before traveling to Ohio.

Four years ago, Obama executed a winning strategy by registering and turning out scores of minorities and young voters who long had sat on the political sidelines.

This year, Virginia – perhaps more so than any other state - will test whether he can cobble together a similar winning coalition amidst shifting demographics and despite a challenging economic en-

GSA Offered Contractors Tax Breaks — at a Price

WASHINGTON • It was a curious offer to contractors from a government agency: We'll give you a tax deduction for making federal buildings more energy efficient if you qualify and if you'll write us a check for 19 percent of

the tax break's value. The General Services Administration, already under a cloud for a lavish Las Vegas employee conference, says that after seven months, it dropped its demand for the giveback requirement because there were no takers.

But the policy is now raising new questions about whether GSA was trying to raise money for its own budget without congressional authorization, whether that effort was legal and whether other agencies have tried anything similar.

"It was brought to our attention that certain people at agencies were asking for what looked like kickbacks in order to get alloca-

tions of a tax deduction," Rep. Charles Boustany, R-La., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee's oversight panel, said Thursday. "This is a major concern and I'm certainly going to investigate this?

GSA officials said the practice was legal and a way for them to raise money to make additional federal buildings more energy efficient. GSA manages 9,600 federally owned or leased buildings, more than any other landlord, though some federal properties are owned by the Defense Department or other agencies.

"No contractors took part in the program and no money was paid to the GSA" while the giveback requirement was in force, said GSA spokesman Adam Elkington. "We will review the letter and respond accordingly."

Boustany sent letters Thursday to 17 agencies and Cabinet-level departments, including GSA, seeking details and asking whether others have engaged in similar practices.

Facebook Sets \$28 to \$35 Price Range for IPO

NEW YORK (AP) • Facebook has set a price range of \$28 to \$35 for its initial public offering of stock.

At the high end, this could raise as much as \$11.8 billion. If the underwriters sell the extra stock reserved for overallotments, the IPO will value Facebook at \$79.3 billion at the high end of the price range.

That's much higher than any other Internet IPO in the past, even Google Inc. in 2004, which raised \$1.9 billion. The range came in a regulatory filing Thursday.

After that, Facebook will go on an "IPO roadshow," where executives talk to potential investors about why they should invest in the stock. If all goes well, Facebook's stock is expected to price on May 17 and make its public debut on

FAA Seeks to Fine Alaska Airlines, Horizon Air • Federal officials are seeking \$655,125 in fines against Alaska Airlines and its Horizon Air affiliate for alleged safety violations, including failing to inspect a plane for cracks. The Federal Aviation Administration said Thursday that Horizon operated a Bombardier Dash-8-400 aircraft on 45 flights, while it failed to follow a safety order to check for cracked or corroded fittings on the engine housing. A 2011 order required airlines to inspect the fittings every 300 hours of flight time and make repairs as needed. The FAA said Horizon used the plane on at least 45 passenger flights in March 2011 after it had passed the 300-hour mark.

U.S. Economy Recovering but Isn't Yet Accelerating

Hiring, housing, consumer spending and manufacturing all look better but remain less than healthy.

WASHINGTON • The U.S. economy's recovery looks enduring. It's just not very

Hiring, housing, consumer spending and manufacturing all appear to be improving, yet remain less than healthy. Economists surveyed by The Associated Press expect growth to pick up this year, though not enough to lower unemployment much.

A clearer picture of the nation's economic health will emerge Friday, when the government reveals how many jobs employers added in April.

"The outlook is for continued moderate growth," John Williams, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, said in a speech Thursday. "Nonetheless, we have nearly 41/2 million fewer jobs today than five years ago, and the unemployment rate remains very high at 8.2 per-

The 32 economists polled by the AP late last month are confident the economy has entered a "virtuous cycle" in which more hiring boosts consumer spending, which leads to further hiring and spending. They expect unemployment to drop from 8.2 percent in March to below 8 percent by Election

But they still think the rate won't reach a historically normal level below 6 percent until 2015 or later. And they predict hiring will slow the rest of this year from a relatively brisk December-February pace.

The government's economic data have been sending mixed signals about the health of the recovery from the Great Recession. Here's a look at the economy's vital signs:

Jobs

The job market is gradually improving, though not as fast as it had been. From December through February, employers added a strong 246,000 jobs a month. That figure sank to a weak 120,000 in March. The April jobs report could clarify whether March was a one-month dud - or evidence of a more lasting slowdown in job creation like the one that occurred in mid-2011.

The economists in the AP survey foresee average job growth of 177,000 a month from April through June and 189,000 for the next six months. The economy needs to generate about 125,000 jobs a month just to keep up with population growth.

On Thursday, the government said the number of people who applied for unemployment benefits last week fell by a sharper-than-expected 27,000 to a seasonally adjusted 365,000. That pointed to fewer layoffs and a brighter outlook for hiring.

Further cause for hope came in a government report Thursday on worker productivity: It fell from January through March by the most in a year. Declining productivity could be a positive sign for jobseekers. It may signal that

companies are struggling to squeeze more from their workforces and must hire to keep up with customer orders.

Housing

The housing market has been a dead weight on the economy. The single-family home market, in particular, is still struggling. House prices dropped for six straight months through February, according to the Standard & Poor's/Case-Shiller homeprice index. And Americans bought fewer previously owned homes in March.

The economists polled by the AP worry that the lingering effects of the housing bust are slowing the economy's expansion. They say growth can't accelerate until national home prices finally hit bottom.

Still, spending on home construction and renovations rose from January through March by the most in nearly two years. And housing investment, led by apartment construction, is expected to contribute to economic growth this year for the first time since 2005.

The warm winter may also have led more people to buy earlier in the year, essentially stealing sales from March. Reduced prices, record-low

mortgage rates, higher rents and the improving job market appear to be emboldening would-be buyers. Many seem to have concluded that prices won't drop much further, if at

And builders are laying plans to construct more homes in 2012 than at any other point in the past $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.

Consumers

Americans have proved surprisingly willing to spend in the face of a wobbly economy. In the first three months of the year, consumer spending grew at an annual pace of 2.9 percent, the fastest in more than a year.

Some economists doubt that consumers can keep it up. They probably can't afford to. Americans' after-tax income in the first three months rose just 0.6 percent from a year earlier. That was the skimpiest pay increase in two years. People spent more, in part, because they saved less. Economists worry that people won't keep spending more unless their income grows.

On Thursday, big retailers including Costco, Macy's and Target, reported that sales last month came in below expectations.

McDonald's New Menu Star: Limited Time Offers

NEW YORK • The newest stars on the

McDonald's menu won't be around for long.

The world's biggest hamburger chain is rolling out two menu items that will be available only during the summer months. A seasonal blueberry banana nut oatmeal will be available nationwide by mid-month, and an iced drink called the Cherry Berry Chiller is already available everywhere.

In the years ahead, McDonald's is expected to ramp up its pipeline of limited-time offers — which are available for only a few months at a time to keep customers flocking to its restaurants.

The Oak Brook, Ill.-based fast food company began its focus on limitedtime offers on a national scale last year after research showed that variety was a top priority for consumers, said Wendy Cook, vice president of U.S. marketing at McDonald's. Previously,





the chain's limited-time offers were mostly at the regional level. Seasonal items give loyal customers something new to try, but also bring in new customers who otherwise might go else-

"Obviously customers are out there and they're frequenting different places," Cook said. "They're starved for variety."

The new focus on limited-time offers comes as McDonald's looks to extend its dominance in a rapidly changing fast food industry. In 2006, the top three fast food chains in the U.S. in terms of sales were all hamburger chains - McDonald's, Burger King and Wendy's. Now Subway is No. 2 and Starbucks is in the No. 3 spot, with sales at both companies growing at a much faster clip, according to the food industry researcher Technomic Inc.

For McDonald's, the limited-time offer also lets the company adapt more easily to evolving consumer tastes that are leaning more toward fresh, seasonal ingredients. Since McDonald's operates on such a vast scale - it has 14,000 restaurants nationwide sourcing the fruits for offerings such as the new Cherry Berry Chiller can be difficult.

Federal Lawmaker: DEA Jail Foul-up Points to Broken System

SAN DIEGO • The case of a detained college student who was forgotten in a holding cell for more than four days suggests a breakdown in procedure and oversight within the Drug Enforcement Administration, a California federal lawmaker said Thursday.

Republican Congressman Duncan Hunter said in a letter sent Thursday to DEA Administrator Michele Leonhart that the treatment of 23-year-old Daniel Chong raises concerns about the agency's handling and monitoring of individuals in custody.

Chong was swept up in a drug raid on April 21. After questioning him, agents told him that he would not be charged and to hang tight in the holding cell until they finished the paperwork to release him. The door did not reopen until April 25 when agents found a severely dehydrated Chong cov-

ered in his own feces. Chong spent five days in the hospital. The incident was one of

forcement experts say. Hunter said he wants a full account of Chong's incarceration, the process currently in place for holding individu-

als suspected of unlawful activity and the steps that the DEA is taking to address this matter in its entirety. "The situation involving

Chong may in fact be an isolated incident," Hunter

wrote. "Regardless, my concern is that this situation could also be a symptom of a bigger problem, with errors in procedure and oversight possibly extending to the division's law enforcement function?"

Hunter said such oversight is especially important given the DEA's presence in the U.S.-Mexico border region. He is asking for information on any other investigations pertaining to the San Diego division.

A federal law enforcement

official familiar with DEA operations said the agency's protocols require that cells be checked each night. The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the matter, said the cell where Chong was held is not intended for overnight

stays because it does not have a toilet.

The top DEA agent in San Diego, William R. Sherman, said in a statement that he was "deeply troubled" by what happened to Chong and has personally ordered an extensive review of his office's policies and procedures.



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

TWIN FALLS . Three grain silos reached for the blue sky as Russ Tremayne talked about the historical

property off Shoshone Street in downtown Twin Falls.

Tremayne, a history professor at the College of Southern Idaho, stood on grass in a pocket park in the shade of the tall silos near Depot Grill. Five years ago the lot was nothing but dirt and weeds, he said. But today it's an example of what can be done with a little vision: restoring or upgrading a historical landmark.

Tremayne, Ryan Horsley of Red's Trading Post and Darrell Buffaloe of the Twin Falls Historic Preservation Commission led the Times-News on a 90minute walking tour of downtown's historical warehouse district - to give a taste of the public walking tour the commission will host May 19.

In Twin Falls, a walking tour of downtown seemed like a nice way to get people interested in its colorful past and its potentially bright future, Horsley said. He envisions the historical district one day becoming the city's hub, much like it used to be decades ago when its businesses were thriving.

A key to its progress, he said, is getting business owners to realize their buildings' potential.

Restored Photos Reveal S.V.'s Beginnings

KETCHUM • Kathleen Cameron has spent the past seven

months sifting through a treasure trove of photos. The 2,000-plus images, taken by Union Pacific photographers in the 1940s and '50s, illuminate Sun Valley's early years. Subjects range from Sun Valley's early dress shops to cowboys on horseback looking down at the lodge when lit-

tle more than a flat expanse surrounded it. The transparencies were about to be destroyed when they were rescued from Union Pacific's headquarters in Omaha, Neb., by a former head of The Community Library and brought to the Ketchum library's regional history department, librarian Sandra Hofferber said.

There they sat until Hofferber secured a grant from the Wattis-Dumke Foundation and Idaho State Historical Society to restore the photos.

stands across the street from a much newer St. Luke's financial building or "where old town meets new town," Tremayne said.

With businesses like St. Luke's and a future Glanbia office building that's being built on the former Kruzer's Nightlife lot, Horsley said, now is the perfect time for owners of downtown's historical buildings to step up and restore their properties.

"I think it's important to preserve the whole place," said Buffaloe, "I think it has a lot of potential," especially as newer businesses draw more people into the area.

At the silos, Tremayne hopes to have informational kiosks installed at the park this summer that will give visitors a brief history lesson about the iconic structures constructed in 1915 by the Twin Falls Milling and Elevator Co. The whole block once was filled with buildings, Tremayne said. East of the silos is the former company's warehouse, where grain, clover seed and beans were stored. The building was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1995.

Participants in the May 19 guided walking tour will learn more about the seven-story grain silos and other historical sites. The message: Restore old buildings, don't tear them down or leave them abandoned.

"All we are is a bunch of guys with a passion for downtown and to tell its stories," Horsley said.

The photos aren't candid. They're posed photographs taken with the bulky cameras of the day to be used by Union Pacific Railroad to market the resort that it developed as America's first destination ski resort in

But they offer a window into yesteryear as they show the fashions of the day; the old leather, checkered curtains and beer mugs at the historical Roundhouse; original lifts long since replaced by high-speed quads; and mammoth snow years when snow reached the rooftops.

"They're strikingly beautiful images," Cameron said. "A lot were taken around the lodge – they show the interiors, the food, the hot pool. They show the layout of the land before Sun Valley was built up."

Cameron, a professional photographer and multimedia specialist from Bellevue, found when she began restoration that the Kodachrome color transparencies had turned pink. Carefully, she put them in a film frame holder, scanned the images, fine-tuned the color, repaired scratches and made further refinements.

"Some looked as if someone had sneezed on them," she said. "These transparencies will continue to deteriorate, but we have these restored photos now. Some are so beautiful the depth of field makes them look as if you could step right into the picture."

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

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

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How to grow Roses

Queen Elizabeth. Don Juan. Mr. Lincoln. Whether climbing, old garden, hybrid tea or other varieties, roses have long been a favorite of many gardener. Despite their soft petals and delicate fragrance, roses are hardy plants and, once established, can survive extreme conditions and live for many seasons. Growing roses requires proper planting conditions, and sufficient water and nourishment as well as protection from pests, diseases, and winter weather.

Step 1

Plant the roses in a spot that receives at least six hours of full sun each day. The soil needs to be rich and moisture-retentive; mix in equal amounts of potting soil, peat moss and mulch to enrich the soil. Roses need a soil pH of 5.8 to 6.8. to thrive.

Water roses about 1 inch once a week, unless there is sufficient rain. This trains the rose's roots to grow deeply for moisture. Water in the morning to allow the leaves time to dry and avoid diseases caused from wet foliage.

Step 3

Spread a 2-inch layer of mulch under the rose. Mulch enriches the soil, retains moisture and reduces weeds. Unless the rose has been planted

within the last month, avoid touching the rose canes with mulch; it can damage the rose.

Step 4

Deadhead the faded rose blossoms. Trim below the faded bloom, holding sharp pruning shears at a 45-degree angle facing away from the center of the rose. This opens the bush up, which reduces disease. Clean up the trimmed leaves and petals, as well as any that fell on the ground, and discard them.

Use a complete rose food. Some are sprinkled, some poured and some sprayed on the rose. Follow the directions on the package for method and frequency of application.

Step 6

Protect and treat the rose for diseases and pests. Remove leaves, stems and canes that are affected with black spot or fungus, and spray the bush with a fungicide. Insects can be sprayed with a pesticide, either organic or chemical, or they can be picked by hand.

Step 7

Winterize the rose according to your region and the rose's needs. Many roses need to be trimmed back to prevent wind damage, or to have mulch or decaying leaves mounded around the base. Other roses do not need winterizing.

Check with your local extension agent for specific instructions for your area.

Prune established roses every three years. Once the last frost date has past, cut a third of the oldest canes, removing them completely. Remove any canes that are not at least a pencil-width thick. Prune 1/3 off the length of the remaining canes. Smear cuts with white household glue to prevent

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
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

Police: Seau Found Dead at Calif. Home

OCEANSIDE, Calif. • Junior Seau, a homegrown superstar who was the fistpumping, emotional leader of the San Diego Chargers for 13 years, was found shot to death at his home Wednesday morning in what police said appeared to be a suicide. He was 43.

Police Chief Frank McCoy said Seau's girlfriend reported finding him unconscious with a gunshot wound to the chest and lifesaving efforts were unsuccessful. A gun was found near him, McCoy said. Police said no suicide note was found and they didn't immediately know who the gun was registered to.

Seau's death in Oceanside, in northern San Diego County, stunned the region he represented with almost reckless abandon. The same intensity that got the star linebacker ejected for fighting in his first exhibition game helped carry the Chargers to their only Super Bowl, following the 1994 season. A ferocious tackler, he'd leap up, pump a fist and kick out a leg after dropping a ball carrier or quarterback.

"It's a sad thing. It's hard to understand," said Bobby Beathard, who as Chargers general manager took Seau out of Southern California with the fifth pick overall in the 1990 draft. "He was really just a great guy. If you Please see SEAU, S2

Football Must Take *Note of May 2, 2012*

ednesday, May 2 was not a good day for the sport of football. For the National Football League, it might have been its worst day ever.

No sooner had the league handed out lengthy suspensions for players and their roles in the New Orleans Saints' Bountygate affair, news broke that future Hall of Fame linebacker Junior Seau had apparently committed suicide. He was 43.

There have been moments in NFL history that involved the integrity of the game — the New England Patriots and Spygate. There have been tragic moments involving former players - Seau's fellow alum at USC, O.J. Simpson, obviously heading that list.

On Wednesday, the two moments collided like a strong safety filling the hole and smashing into a running back.

Moments like these are when people of all walks sportswriters included try to play doctor, offering opinions on matters in which we're really not qualified to speak.

That shouldn't stop us from asking questions. Such as:

How can the violence exhibited upon football players not have an effect on them after their playing days are over? Almost



as shocking as the news of Seau's death is the fact that eight members of the Chargers' 1994 Super Bowl-playing squad have died.

NFL rosters carry 53 players. Think about it -15percent of a small group of (presumably) healthy, fit young men with the money and resources for care above and beyond what most of us have, did not even live past their mid-40s. In this day, that's a mortality rate that has forever been the domain of rock stars.

That's a very small sample size and doesn't tell the entire story — three of those players died of what could best be described as tragic accidents. But it's sobering nonetheless.

Tragedy can strike any group, but there are links to Seau's fate and his former job on the gridiron that cannot be ignored.

Last year, former Bears player Dave Duerson killed himself with a gunshot to the heart. Per a text he sent to his family prior to his death, he wanted to have his brain studied to determine

NBA Coach of the Year Gregg Popovich practically put the Spurs on autopilot after a 20-0 run in the second quarter that stunned the Jazz, who had vowed to play better after the Spurs easily won Game 1. But this humiliating rout was even easier.

The Jazz never quite greeted Parker with the hard fouls the All-Star was supposed to have coming, and the Utah frontcourt of Al Jefferson and

Paul Millsap wasn't any more imposing on offense. Jefferson scored 10 points, and Millsap had nine.

Game 3 is Saturday night in Salt Lake City.

The only bigger embarrassment for the Jazz in the playoffs was a 42-point loss to Michael Jordan and the Chicago Bulls in the 1998 NBA Finals.

It's the first time the Spurs have led a series 2-0 since opening the 2008 playoffs against Phoenix. San Antonio won that series in five, and unless the Jazz can shake this off, this one will be over just as quick.



After stumbling its way to a mistrial of Clemens last year, the government is struggling again in the retrial – to the point that the crux of Pettitte's testimony might be tossed out. First, the exasperated judge criticized the questioning of Pettitte on Wednesday, then he ruled against prosecutors in another matter. Finally he cried out: "You're taking positions that are totally absurd to me."

Pettitte, Clemens' longtime friend and former teammate, was on the stand for a second day in the trial that is to determine whether Clemens lied at a 2008 congressional deposition and hearing when he denied taking steroids and human growth hormone.

During cross-examination, Clemens' lawyers got exactly the answers they wanted.

Might Pettitte have misunderstood when Clemens supposedly acknowledged using human growth hormone to Pettitte in a conversation during the 1999-2000 offseason?

"I could have," Pettitte answered.

Is it fair to say there is a "50-50" chance that Pettitte misunderstood?

"I'd say that's fair," Pettitte replied.

The government tried to salvage their witness, but prosecutor Steven Durham's follow-up questions were lacking - at least in the minds of Clemens' lawyers and, more importantly, U.S. District Judge Reggie Walton. Clemens' lawyers moved to strike Pettitte's testimony about the 1999-2000 conversation as "insufficiently definitive."

The judge seemed to agree, openly wondering why Pettitte wasn't asked for a current, definitive recollection of the conversation. He repeatedly berated Durham, who was also part of the government team last July when prosecutors showed the jury a snippet of inadmissible videotaped evidence, prompting the mistrial.

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
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

hearings were held pursuant to public notice as follows: before the Heyburn Planning and Zoning Commission on April 9, 2012 at 7:00 P.M. and reported its recommendations to the City Council at its April 25, 2012 regular meeting; and before the Heyburn City Council on April 25, 2012 at 7:00 P.M.; and both bodies did invite and take public comment and received documents which were all admitted to the official record of the proceedings and were also duly reviewed; and,

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission, after due deliberation, recommended to the Council that such petition for annexation be granted and the Subject Property be zoned as "CG" (Commercial General); and the City Council after due deliberation, agreed that such petition should be granted and finds that such zoning designation is in the best interests of the City, its growth, economic development and is consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan; and

FURTHER, consistent with the foregoing, the City makes the following findings and conclusions:

1. The Subject Property is contiguous to the City of Heyburn.

2. The City has domestic water and sewer facilities adjacent to the Subject Property.

3. The co-owner of a portion of the Subject Property has requested to be annexed into the City and has petitioned the City to be annexed and is therefore a "Category 'A"" annexation; and, the remainder of the described property is owned by fewer than 100 owners and has been platted, sold or set off in one of more parcels of less than 5 acres, is therefore a "Category "B" annexation, all as set forth in Idaho Code Section 50-222. The statutory requirements for both types of annexations have been met.

4. The Subject Property is contiguous with the existing City limits on the eastern border of the land being annexed.

5. The Subject Property can be served now or in the future by all of the City's municipal utility services. 6. The City has adequate means to provide law enforcement to the areas in the Subject Property



ORDINANCE NO. 543

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN IDAHO REPEALING THE EXISTING SECTION 5-7-5 A. DEALING WITH GROUP USE OF CITY PARKS AND PROVIDING FOR NEW REGULATIONS FOR GROUP USE OF CITY PARKS INCLUDING POLITICAL USE; CLARIFICATION OF THE USE PROHIBITIONS IN PARKS AS CONTAINED IN SECTION 5-7-3 B.: AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Heyburn, Minidoka County, Idaho as

Section 1: Heyburn Code Section 5-7-5 is hereby repealed and in its place shall be the following: 5-7-5 GROUP USE OF PARKS. Use of a Park by a group intending to or actually making joint use of a park as a group, whether for exclusive or non-exclusive use, shall be subject to the following provisions and shall apply for and be granted a permit to use a city park in order to use

the same as a group. Otherwise, such a group shall be presumed to be an unlawful assembly.

A. Definitions. For the purpose of this Section, the following words shall have the following

1. "Commercial activity" means any display, enterprise, promotion, arts and crafts display, exhibit, food or drink concession, yard sale or any activity at which goods or services are sold, or an admission fee or use fee is required, whether conducted by a person or a group "for profit", nonprofit organization or by a public and charitable organization.

2. "Public" use or a "Public organization" use shall mean use by public entities such as cities, counties, schools and other similar public or political subdivisions of the state of Idaho.

3. "Charitable use" shall mean use by an organization which has obtained recognition as a charitable institution under Section 510 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

4. "Community Use" shall mean use by a group or organization which is primarily a not-for-profit organization and the use of the park is primarily a not-for-profit event. This would include family reunions, group gathering for which no admission is charged and which largely has a public purpose. If there is incidental sale of items or concessions, either as a convenience to the public attending the event or to raise money for a public purpose, such event, in the sole discretion of the City Council, may be permitted without cull compliance with the requirements of a commercial activity. Otherwise the event shall comply with all requirements of a commercial event.

5. "Political Use" shall mean any political rally, public demonstrations or other protest events or expressions of freedom of speech as sanctioned by law. Political Use of a park requires an application in the same format as an application for commercial use, and requires the same application fee. If granted, any fee for use is waived. Political use is limited to four continuous hours in a single day and shall only occur during hours when the park is open and, in any event, may not commence before 9:00 A.M. and must conclude no later than 10:00 P.M. The event must comply with all other rules for use of the Park. The application will not be granted if another application for use has been granted for the same date and time.

6. "Group" shall mean any of the following uses:

a. Any commercial activity, including any incidental sales of products, items or concession items as

part of any charitable, public or community event. b. A reservation for exclusive use of a Park by any number of people.

c. Any fundraising or sales.

d. Any political use.

e. Any event where twenty-five or more people intend to make joint use of a park or in fact do make

B. Commercial Activity in Public Parks Prohibited. No commercial activity shall be carried on or conducted in public parks of the City except as authorized by this Code.

C. The use which requires a permit as herein provided may not, in any event, exceed three (3)

D. Applications for Group Activities in Public Parks; Exceptions.

a. Any person or entity seeking to conduct a group activity in a public park in the City must complete a written application form provided by the City Clerk, which shall contain the following information:

a. The name of the person or entity sponsoring the commercial activity. In the case of applicants other than natural persons, such as associations, partnerships, corporations, limited liability companies, etc., there shall be a co-applicant whose is a natural person who shall be jointly responsible for the duties of the applicant. b. Specific description of the activities to be conducted.

c. The dates upon which the activities will be conducted.

d. The exact location within each public park where the commercial activity will be conducted.

2. Each application must be accompanied by a nonrefundable application fee of twenty five dollars

3. Applications for group use of a park shall be considered by the City Council at its next regular City Council meeting following the date of the submission of the completed application to the City Clerk. Should the Council approve the application, a permit shall be issued to the applying entity to conduct the commercial activity which permit shall provide:

a. The date, the name of the person or entity to which the permit is issued.

b. The time, place and date at which the activity may be conducted.c. The exact nature of the activity which may be conducted, including what commercial activities are

d. Effective Date. The permit shall be effective upon its issuance by the Council and upon payment of a fee to the City in an amount not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300.00), the exact fee to be determined by the City Council taking into account the nature of the commercial activities to be conducted, number of patrons to be drawn to the commercial activity, the extent of the potential damage to the park by the commercial activity sought to be conducted, and such other reasonable factors as the City Council may deem appropriate.

e. Prior to the issuance of the permit, the applicant shall provide proof to the City of the placement of public liability insurance in an amount not to exceed the single-limit coverage of at least five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000.00) of which policy the City, has been made an additional insured. This requirement for liability insurance may be waived by the City Council for non-profit or

f.A permit shall further be issued subject to the understanding by the applicant that by obtaining the permit it agrees to hold harmless and indemnify the City, from all liability which may arise from, touch or concern the commercial activity permitted by the City.

a. The City Council may, in its discretion, exempt from the requirement of paying a permit fee any bona fide, charitable or public organization proposing to conduct a charitable or non-profit activity from which all proceeds, excluding direct costs of the goods or services to be sold, will be devoted to the charitable or other public purposes for which the entity is formed or for which the activity is intended to benefit. Charitable activities shall include any and all purposes for which organizations may qualify for tax exempt status pursuant to Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(3) as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended.

b. Other Fee Exemptions. There will be no fee exemption for commercial activities. In its discretion, the City Council may waive the fee for Public or Community uses.

5. Charitable or public activities shall be given preference over other uses.

6. The applicant must agree in writing to save and hold the City harmless from any claim arising out of the applicant's use or applicant's invitees or guests at the City park. Use of the park by the ests and invitees is Section 2: Heyburn Code Section 5-7-3 B shall be repealed and in its place shall be the

following: B. PROHIBITED USES IN PARKS:

1. Camping. Camping includes any form of overnight sleeping, and all normal uses of the word, including, but not limited to: Set up of and use of tents, shacks, or any other temporary shelter for the purpose of camping, except by special permission, nor shall any person leave in a park, after closing hours any moveable structure or special vehicle to be used or that could be used for such purpose, such as a house trailer, camp-trailer, tent, camp-wagon or the like.

2. Dangerous Games: Take part in or abet the playing of any games involving thrown or otherwise propelled dangerous objects such as stones, arrows or javelins except in areas set apart for such forms of recreation. Golfing or driving golf balls is prohibited except where specific facilities have been provided.

3. Horseback Riding: Ride a horse except on designated bridle trails and in specifically designated park areas. Where permitted, horses shall be thoroughly broken and properly restrained and ridden with due care, and shall not be allowed to graze or go unattended.

4. Failure to observe and/or violate the rules of the use of permanent structures such as tennis courts, baseball fields, skateboard parks, all as promulgated by the City Council or duly authorized representative designated by it and posted.

5. Skates or skateboards, except in places expressly designated for such use. 6. Use of motor vehicles: No motor vehicle shall be permitted in or upon any park not expressly

provided for parking or driving of motor vehicles. Such prohibited areas include grass, playing fields or other recreation areas, except: Vehicles used by the City.

b. Vehicles making authorized deliveries within a park at the City's request or with its prior consent. Section 3: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its three readings, passage, approval and publication. Isn't it just like partner to bid most aggressively when you have to play the contract? That happened to George Steiner playing with Gaylor Kasle.

The heart game was no shooin here: It was missing the A-J-x-x of trump, with two sure diamond losers — and what about the clubs?

West led the diamond 10 in response to his partner's leaddirecting double. East won the king and switched to a low spade. Steiner took the spade in dummy and called for a low heart. Up popped the jack; that was one hurdle cleared.

West took the heart ace and played a second round of diamonds to East's king. Back came the club 10. Steiner won with the ace, picked up trumps with three more rounds (as East discarded three diamonds), then played a spade to the king and ruffed a spade. It wasn't a sure thing, but it looked as though East had started with four spades. This meant that his original shape appeared to be 4-1-5-3.

If so, Steiner realized that he could catch East in a show-up squeeze. When Steiner played the last heart from dummy, East had to find a discard from the spade queen and the club 9-7. East discarded a club on the heart, and Steiner threw his spade.

When Steiner played a club from dummy and East produced the nine, Steiner was confident that the queen would drop under the king. It did, and Kasle's aggressive bid paid off with a near top.

though as a young man you were prone to rash actions, as a mature one you gained the ability to control your temper. Had you confronted the boor, the situation would have escalated and you could have wound up in the pokey charged with assault. I'm advising you that you were correct to do nothing. The man is lucky your wife didn't "serve" him a fist sandwich. A lesser woman might have.

DEAR ABBY: When my husband, "Jeff," and I married, we drew up a medical proxy and health-care directives should future incapacitation arise. Jeff is now terminally ill with brain cancer and has about five months to live. Over the last two years he has been through four surgeries, 25 doses of radiation, countless doctors' appointments, physical therapy and enough pills to fill a steamer trunk. I had to quit working because Jeff is now my full-time job.

As his illness progresses, we have discussed placing him in a hospice. But the closer he gets to death, the more he changes his mind. He demands that I lift, jerk and pull him in and out of bed. When I can no longer do this, he wants me to install a hoist. He needs assistance eating, dressing, bathing, using the toilet and is in a wheelchair.

Jeff's tumor is growing, causing pressure and affect ing his mental attitude. He's impatient, demanding, selfish and nasty. I'm caring for him at home because it's his home and I am his wife. Somehow, his illness makes him feel entitled to act like a selfish child. At what point do I put him in a hospice facility without his family calling me a nasty witch and Jeff kicking and screaming to be

let out and return home? - END OF MY ROPE **DEAR END:** Please accept my sympathy. Your husband is sick and in pain, probably frightened and the cancer may have affected his ability to think rationally.

If you haven't discussed this with your husband's doctor, you must. It may not be necessary to place Jeff in an in-patient facility because many terminally ill patients can receive the same care in their homes. However, it will take a referral from a doctor, certifying that your husband has six months or less to live. Much of the cost is covered by Medicare, and most insurance also covers

Hospice provides visits from doctors, nurses, home health care aides and volunteers who can help with bathing your husband, changing his linens and some of the lifting that you're worried about. For your sake and his, you should contact the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization. It can help you find a hospice provider. The toll-free phone number is 800-658-8898 or log onto www.nhpco.org.

Because you're afraid of criticism from Jeff's family, tell them that he - and you - need them to step in and help with his care because it has become more than you can handle alone. If they agree, it will give them precious time with him. If not, they'll be in no position to criticize you.

Actor-director Jackie Cooper died in Santa Monica, Calif., at age 88.

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


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


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
