

Voters to Decide on New Levy for Filer Schools

FILER • For Filer High School music

teacher Leah Pentland, there are unknowns about next

She's putting out her resume and applying to graduate schools as a back-up plan in case she doesn't have a job.

The future of teaching jobs and extracurricular programs for students hinges on what voters decide at the polls on election day May 15.

For the first time in nearly 15 years, the Filer School District is pursuing a supplemental levy. Voters will decide whether to approve the two-year, \$500,000 annual measure.

If the levy passes, it will allow the district to maintain its current level of operations. If not, the school district will make \$500,000 worth of budget


cuts next year. The district would look at cutting at least half a dozen job positions - including one of the district's three mu-

"This would be rather dire," Pentland said.

Other proposed cuts could include less funding for extracurricular activities and athletics, eliminating mid-day kindergarten busing and less funding Please see FILER LEVY, A2

SCHOOL DISTRICTS SEEK LEVY RENEWALS

TWIN FALLS • Six Magic Valley school districts are going to voters next week with supplemental levy re-

Here's information about each of the ballot measures and how the money will be used. For information on the Filer School District's levy, see the above story.

Castleford School District

The Castleford School District is seeking renewal of a two-year, \$300,000 annual supplemental levy. It's the same amount as the past four years.

Superintendent Andy Wiseman said money will go toward operating expenses and building maintenance.

One of the largest projects, he said, would be replacing the cafeteria roof, which currently leaks.

Other potential projects on the district's list include replacing the concrete in the playground, and upgrading surveillance cameras and

bathroom fixtures. The Castleford School District has about 300 stu-

Richfield **School District**

In Richfield, voters will decide whether to renew a two-year, \$225,000 annual supplemental levy.

There's a long list of how the money will be used, including for textbooks, athletics, field trips, summer school, summer maintenance programs, afterschool academy, teacher supplies, technology, trans-

portation and personnel. "It's no longer supplemental," Superintendent Barbara Thronson said. "It's become essential."

She also noted the levy which has stayed at the same amount since 2010 will be used to continue the district's all-day kindergarten program.

Thronson there's some confusion about how residents' property tax rates will be affected by the levy. It's a \$1 per month increase for \$100,000 property val-

uation, she said. The Richfield School District has about 200 stu-

T.F. Council to Mull Final Approval for Canyon Park Plat

TWIN FALLS • It's a packed schedule for Twin Falls City Council tonight.

At tonight's meeting, the council will consider three items related to the new Canyon Park development, including approving the final plat.

The issue has drawn controversy from some who oppose the development, to be located on the Snake River Canyon Rim near Golden Corral.

Barbara Beck, who previously testified against Canyon Park-related items that have come before the city council, submitted a petition to the council asking them to require substantial landscaping that will separate the development and the canyon rim walking path.

While the city normally doesn't take testimony on land use issues, the public will have an opportunity to give input because of the interest, according to a city of Twin Falls press release.

In other business, the council will consider:

- Approving appointee Suzanne Hawkins to Twin Falls City Council.
- Adopting a resolution to sell city property located at Gooding Street North and 3rd Avenue North.
- Approving an agreement with the Bureau of Land Management for the construction of a parking lot at Joslin Field, as well as an agreement with Riedesel Engineering for the construction of the parking lot.
- Discussing salaries for city employees.



Two Missing from Motel in Burley

BURLEY • The Cassia County Sheriff's Office is investigating the disappearance of two residents of the Alpine Garden Motel in Burley, but Sheriff Randy Kidd said Sunday afternoon he is not convinced a crime has occurred.

"Right now we just have some suspicious circumstances and we don't know whether we have a crime or not," Kidd told the *Times-News*.

The investigation began Friday evening at the mo-

Kidd identified the missing tenants as James Duane Ambrose and Russ Taft. He did not release their ages.

Kidd said search warrants were issued and searches were conducted, but the sheriff declined to say if the searches took place at the motel or other

Ted J. Beus, 27, of Gooding, was driving west in a 2003 Chevrolet Silverado pickup truck when he went off the right side of the road, police said in a news release. Beus overcorrected to the left and went into the median, where the vehicle rolled, according to the news release.

Police said Beus, who wore a seat belt when the crash occurred, was taken into custody.

If the school district's levy passes, it will increase property tax rates for residents with the Filer School District.

Homeowners with \$100,000 residential property value would pay an estimated \$65.45 each year.

Those who own a business or farmlands with a \$100,000 property value would pay \$130.900 each year.

Like other Magic Valley school districts, the Filer School District has seen a decline in state funding over the

But the district hasn't pursued a levy since 1998. That year, funding was used to build a high school agriculture facility.

The district has seen \$1.4 million reduction in state funding during the past three years. And they've cut \$926,350 in expenses during that same time period.

Hughes said he's concerned about the budget cuts that have already happened.

"I think it has hurt what we offer our children," he said, particularly at Filer High School.

Filer High principal Leon Madsen said they've lost three teachers at the school over the past three years. That is having a ripple effect on classes.

A few classes were cut, including family/consumer science, Spanish and some history classes.

Madsen said there weren't enough teachers to continue with an eight class period block schedule. So this year, students are taking six class-

Pentland said that means less time for students to take elective classes. She has about 60 students in her high school classes this year, down from about 100 last year.

Miskin said the supplemental levy won't bring back the block schedule. But she said it would allow other students to have the chance to take extracurricular classes.

Junior Brooke Wissenbach, 17, also doesn't have enough time this year to pursue music or art classes. She was in Madrigals during her freshman and sophomore years.

Being in the ensemble, she said, was a chance to make friends she wouldn't have known otherwise.

Shoshone School District

The Shoshone School District is pursuing a two-year, \$300,000 annual levy.

"Basically, what this will allow us to do is progress toward our main goal of increasing student achievement," Superintendent Rob Waite said.

The same levy amount has been in place for the past two years. Waite said tax amounts for residents should "generally stay the same."

Waite said the district wants to continue its all-day kindergarten program, which is currently slated for elimination during the second year of the levy.

One teacher and six paraprofessionals lost their jobs last year. If the levy isn't renewed, Waite said district administrators will have to make "deep cuts." The Shoshone School District has about 500 students.

Valley School District

In Hazelton, voters will decide on not

just one levy, but two.

One ballot measure is whether to renew the district's two-year, \$300,000 annual supplemental levy. Also, the district has a new proposal

for a five-year, \$300,000 annual plant facilities levy. If passed, the funding will go toward school building maintenance. Superintendent Arlyn Bodily said if

both levies pass, residents' tax rates will be 11.1 percent lower than last year.

That's because the district's bond - a total of about \$4.3 million - will be paid off at the end of June. The bond, passed in 1992, has been in place for 20 years and was used to build a new school facility.

Bodily said the new plant facilities levy will allow the district to create a schedule of building maintenance projects.

The Valley School District has about 600 students.

Wendell School District

The Wendell School District is seeking renewal of a two-year, \$155,000 annual supplemental levy. The amount has remained the same since 2006.

"It's not a very big levy compared to a lot of districts our size," Superintendent Greg Lowe said. The levy money is designated for

teacher salaries.

Over the past three years, the district hasn't cut any job positions. However, some positions were left vacant through attrition – such as through retirements or resignations.

The Wendell School District has 1,117 students.



On Friday, 22 men and women who hope to join Twin Falls' finest took the physical fitness tests that are the first step toward the goal of becoming a police officer.

Every time the pool of potential job candidates gets low the department holds the tests to grow the pool again, Scott said. In the last round of tests about 30 people showed up and three or four ended up being hired, Wilson said.

"That's pretty good odds," he said.

Though the tests, including sit-ups, pushups, a vertical jump and long and short distance running, are not difficult for most people in decent shape, each test knocks one or two people out of the running, he said.

After a physical test the candidates face interviews, psychological evaluations and tough background checks.

"The process is a thinning," Scott said.

In the end, Scott said, the department is left with the best candidates who will be the most likely to succeed as officers.

"We end up with a group suitable for hire," she said. "If we eliminate everyone we test again."

From the time of the physical test to being officially hired can take up to six months, said Capt. Anthony Barnhart. Once hired, there's still extensive training before officers are officially on the

After sit-ups, pushups and the vertical jump, the testers ascended the stairs to the elevated track to run a 300meter dash.

"We think it's realistic to do it on this small track," Scott said.

When chasing a suspect, they're more likely to weave around than run in a straight line, she said, and running around the track's corners mimic running around a building.

The 1.5-mile run was held outside on the busy CSI campus.

"There will be students in the way, just run around those obstacles and keep going," Wilson said.

Out of a possible 100 points testers only need to score a 50 to pass, but a prepared candidate will usually score between 75 to 90 points, Wilson said.



Ron Paul **Backers Aim** to Overturn Romney's Win

BOISE (AP) • Ron Paul backers are attempting to change the result of the presidential candidate's third-place finish in the Idaho caucus by winning enough precinct committee races in the May 15 primary so they can overturn the win by Mitt Romney and award all 32 delegates to Paul.

The Idaho Statesman reports that Paul supporters hope to get a twothirds supermajority of the delegates to the Idaho State Convention so they can vote to suspend the rules and change the re-

The March 6 caucus attracted nearly 45,000 GOP voters with 62 percent of them voting for Romney.

Rick Santorum was second and Paul third as both finished with about 18 percent.

Precinct committeewoman Eva Gay Yost of Meridian says it's an attempt to hijack the Republican Party.

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Who's Who? Obama, **Romney Projecting** Mirror Image

WASHINGTON • He's a smug, Harvard-trained elitist who doesn't get how regular Americans are struggling these days. More extreme than he lets on, he's keeping his true agenda hidden until after Election Day. He's clueless about fixing the economy, over his head on foreign policy. Who is he?

Your answer will help decide the next president.

Is it Barack Obama, as seen by Mitt Romney? Or Romney, the way Obama depicts him? For all their liberal versus conservative differences, when the two presidential contenders describe each other, they sound like they're ragging on the same flawed guy. Or mirror images of that guy.

Will voters prefer the man waving with his left hand or his right?

Blame it on two cautious candidates with more traits in common than their disparate early biographies would suggest.

No Drama Obama is panned as professorial and aloof. Romney is deemed boring when he's not being awkward.

Distrusted as too moderate within his own party, each is demonized as a radical by the other side. They don't get specific about the tough stuff, like budget cuts or taxes, that would invite more precisely calibrated negative ads.

Add a presidential contest buried beneath a single issue, the economy, and original lines of attack are scarce. The candidates take jabs anyway.

"They're trying to define each other. That's what it's all about," said Ken Duberstein, chief of staff to President Ronald Reagan. "They're throwing out different characterizations to see which one resonates."

With quickie Internet videos and instant comebacks via Twitter, "the attack and counterattack is happening in real time," said political communications expert Kathleen Hall Jamieson. "Campaigns are working to make sure nothing is missed."

Attacks big or small get batted back, even if the response amounts to "I know you are, what am I?"

Democrats accuse Republicans of a "war on women," Romney's campaign notes rising female unemployment during the Obama years.

The Obama camp jokes about Romney's dog riding on the roof of the family car; Republicans respond that Obama ate dog meat as a boy in Indonesia.

Both candidates are slammed as:

"Out of touch" with ordinary Americans.

Obama: Cloistered in the White House. Hangs out with celebrities, acting "cool?" Doesn't understand the real world because "he spent too much time at Harvard," according to Romney, who earned two Harvard degrees himself.

Romney: Grew wealthy, with a governor for a father. Worth \$200 million or more. He's the kind of guy who had a Swiss bank account and wants a car elevator for his beach house, the Democrats note.

Bad for the Middle Class

Obama: Failed to deliver on his promises to help Americans "struggling to find good jobs and make ends meet," the Romney camp says. Median household income is down, unemployment up since he took office.

Romney: Wants to reduce taxes on the wealthy while devastating Medicare and cutting education, health care and other programs the middle class need, Democrats charge. Obama says that amounts to "social Darwin-

Suspiciously Secretive

Obama: Believing his microphone off, assured the Russian president he would have "more flexibility" after Election Day. Obama will reveal "his true positions only after the election is over, Romney says. Republicans predict he would tack left on the environment, spending, gay rights and other issues.

Romney: Told campaign donors of plans to cut or eliminate the housing and education agencies as well as others - ideas he hasn't disclosed publicly. "What's Mitt hiding?" Democrats ask, demanding more about his personal tax returns and investments, too.

Too Extreme

Obama: Hopes to create "a European-style social welfare state;" Romney says, and "put free enterprise on trial." Endorsing Romney, Newt Gingrich called Obama "the most radical, leftist president in American history."

Romney: Referred to himself as "severely conservative." He's "extreme on women's issues;" Democrats contend. Obama places him to the right of Reagan and suggests he's akin to Barry Goldwater.

Unable to Fix the Economy

Obama: Can't get the jobless rate below 8 percent. He "delayed the recovery and made it anemic," according to Romney, who says Obama lacks the private sector experience necessary to understand the economy.

Romney: As a venture capitalist, laid off workers and shipped jobs to Mexico, the Obama campaign says. Also created Massachusetts jobs more slowly than other governors of the time, Democrats note.

Not Up to **Foreign Policy**

Obama: Too weak to stand up to China or Russia or to stop Iran from getting a nuclear bomb, and too eager to apologize for the United States, Romney charges.

Romney: Likely to stumble into another misguided war, according to Vice President Joe Biden. Wouldn't have had the guts to send Navy SEALs into Pakistan to get Osama bin Laden, the Obama campaign suggests.

France Gets New Leader, Europe **New Direction**

PARIS • France handed the presidency Sunday to leftist Francois Hollande, a champion of government stimulus programs who says the state should protect the downtrodden — a victory that could deal a death blow to the drive for austerity that has been the hallmark of Europe in recent years.

Mild and affable, the presidentelect inherits a country deep in debt and divided over how to integrate immigrants while preserving its national identity. Markets will closely watch his initial moves as president.

He narrowly defeated the harddriving, attention-getting Nicolas Sarkozy, an America-friendly leader who led the country through its worst economic troubles since World War II but whose policies and personality proved too bitter for many voters to

"Austerity can no longer be inevitable!" Hollande declared in his victory speech after a surprising campaign that saw him transform from an unremarkable figure to an increasingly statesmanlike one. He will take office no later than May 16.

Speaking to exuberant crowds, Hollande portrayed himself as a vehicle for change across Europe.

"In all the capitals ... there are people who, thanks to us, are hoping, are looking to us, and want to finish with austerity," he told supporters early

Monday at Paris' Place de la Bastille. "You are a movement lifting up everywhere in Europe, and perhaps the

Celebrations continued into the night on the iconic plaza of the French Revolution, with revelers waving French, European and labor union flags and climbing the base of its central column. Leftists were overjoyed to have one of their own in power for the first time since Socialist Francois Mitterrand was president from 1981 to 1995.

Sarkozy is the latest victim of a wave of voter anger over spending cuts in Europe that has ousted governments and leaders in the past couple of years.

In Greece, a parliamentary vote Sunday was seen as critical to the country's prospects for pulling out of a deep financial crisis felt in world markets. A state election in Germany and local elections in Italy were seen as tests of support for the national governments' policies.

In France, with 95 percent of the vote counted, official results showed Hollande with 51.6 percent of the vote compared with Sarkozy's 48.4 percent, the Interior Ministry said. The turnout was a strong 81 percent.

"Too many divisions, too many wounds, too many breakdowns and divides have separated our fellow citizens. This is over now," Hollande said in his victory speech, alluding to the divisive Sarkozy presidency. "The foremost duty of the president of the Republic is to unite ... in order to face the challenges that await us."

Wife Skyping with Soldier Saw Bullet Hole in Wall

DALLAS • An Army nurse showed no alarm or discomfort before suddenly collapsing during a Skype video chat with his wife, who saw a bullet hole in a closet behind him, his family said Sunday.

Capt. Bruce Kevin Clark's family released a statement describing what his wife saw in the video feed recording her husband's death in Tarin Kowt, Afghanistan.

"Clark was suddenly knocked forward," the statement said. "The closet behind him had a bullet hole in it. The other individuals, including a member of the military, who rushed to the home of CPT Clark's wife also saw the hole and agreed it was a bullet hole?"

The statement says the Skype link remained open for two hours on April 30 as family and friends in the U.S. and Afghanistan tried to get

"After two hours and many frantic phone calls by Mrs. Clark, two military personnel arrived in the room and appeared to check his pulse, but provided no details about his condition to his wife," the state-

In the statement, Susan Orellana-Clark said she was providing details of what she saw "to honor my husband and dispel the inaccurate information and supposition promulgated by other parties." U.S. officials in Afghanistan re-

ferred questions to the Pentagon, which previously referred questions to the William Beaumont Army Medical Center in El Paso, where Clark was assigned.

The Pentagon said previously that Clark's death remains under inves-

Clarence Davis, spokesman for William Beaumont Army Medical Center, declined to comment on Clark's family's statement.

Lindsey was the beanie-wearing Goober on "The Andy Griffith Show" from 1964 to 1968 and its successor, "Mayberry RFD," from 1968 to 1971. He played the same jovial character on "Hee Haw" from 1971 until it went out of production in

"America has grown up with me;" Lindsey said in an Associated Press interview in 1985. "Goober is every man; everyone finds something to like about ol' Goober."

Biden OK with Equal Rights for Married Gay Couples

WASHINGTON (AP) • Vice President Joe Biden says he's "absolutely comfortable" with gay couples who marry getting the same civil rights and liberties as heterosexual couples, a stand that gay rights advocates interpreted as an endorsement of same-sex marriage.

But the White House and President Barack Obama's re-election campaign, eager to avoid a debate on a hot-button social issue in an election year, insisted that Biden was not breaking ranks with Obama, who does not publicly support gay marriage.

Biden told NBC's "Meet the Press'' that marriage should be about being loyal to someone you love, whether that marriage is between a man and a woman, two men or two women. "I am absolutely comfortable with the fact that men marrying men, women

marrying women and heterosexual men and women marrying one another are entitled to the same exact rights, all the civil rights, all the civil liberties," Biden said in the interview broadcast Sunday.

Gay rights advocates said Biden's comments signaled unmistakable support for gay marriage, which they said made him the highest-ranking member in the Obama administration to take that position.

"I'm grateful that the vice president of the United States is now publically supporting marriage equality and I hope very soon the president and the rest of our leaders, Republicans and Democrats in Congress, will fall in line with the vice president," said Chad Griffin, a gay rights supporter and a member of the Obama campaign's national finance committee.

America's Remote-controlled War on Terror

crolling through the headlines in The Long War Journal — a website dedicated to terrorism-related news — is an education in the global drone war. Mohammed



Saeed al-Umda, one of Obama bin Laden's bodyguards, confirmed killed by a drone strike in Yemen. German jihadist Samir H killed in South Waziristan. Egyptian militant Abu Musab al-Masri killed in the Shabwa province of Yemen. The list goes on.

As President Obama has attempted to wind down messy counterinsurgency operations, drone strikes have become his tactic of choice. "No president," reports *The Washington Post*, "has ever relied so extensively on the secret killing of individuals to advance the nation's security goals."

The scale of this drone campaign has overwhelmed any possibility of secrecy. During the Obama administration, there has been an average of one drone attack in Pakistan every four days. Operations have expanded to several countries.

Criticism comes from left and right. The killings are "extra-judicial." They are too clinical and video game-like. Or, alternately, drone strikes eliminate terrorists that America could be capturing and interrogating.

These objections vary in seriousness. (Are military actions really more ethical when they expose American troops to a higher risk of injury and death?) None of the criticisms from the left, however, take the strategic provocation confronted by Obama with sufficient seriousness.

American military forces and the American public face direct threats of violence from organizations organizing and operating in ungoverned areas of the world, particularly the tribal regions of Pakistan but also parts of Yemen and Somalia. Regional governments are either unable or unwilling to confront these dangers.

In these circumstances, there is one option denied to a president: doing nothing. He is forced to make a decision among flawed options — a fair description of a president's main job. Drone strikes are the alternative to riskier, less discriminate choices, from strategic bombing to boots on the ground.

The ethics of drone attacks are not simple. Any military operation targeting terrorists who hide behind civilians risks civilian casualties. The justification for assuming this terrible risk depends entirely on the justice of the war itself. If these military operations are illegitimate, any civilian casualty is a crime. If the attacks are justified, then it is worth noting that drone strikes are some of the most precise applications of force in the history of warfare.

Obama has been criticized for saying that drone attacks have "not caused a huge number of civilian casualties" — which is true in comparison to previous global conflicts. Remember that America's good war — World War II — included 300 B-29 Superfortresses dropping half a million M-69 incendiary cylinders on Tokyo during a single night and morning, destroying 16 square miles of the city. The operators of Predators and Raptors target individuals, following decisions subjected to extensive legal review. It is a rigorous, even unprecedented, application of the just war principle of proportionality.

But applying the laws of war requires the existence of a war — which is the key to ethical judgments on drone strikes. If the war on terror is merely a metaphor, then drones are conducting executions without judicial review outside American sovereignty. If the war is real, then terrorists have made themselves morally and legally liable to attack, wherever they plan and conduct operations.

By banishing the phrase "war on terror" in 2009, the Obama administration complicated its public case. But it substitutes language that serves the same legal and moral purpose. "As a matter of international law," White House counterterrorism adviser John Brennan recently affirmed, "the United States is in an armed conflict with al-Qaeda, the Taliban and associated forces, in response to the 9/11 attacks, and we may also use force consistent with our inherent right of national self-defense." The administration's anti-terrorism strategy — from drone strikes to indefinite detention — depends on the existence of an "armed conflict" in which the laws of war, instead of the methods of criminal justice, prevail.


It is easy for conservatives to cry hypocrisy. But it is a good thing that the Obama administration is publicly recognizing a strategic reality impervious to ideology.

In the drone debate, all play their part. It is the role of human rights groups to raise ethical questions. It is the role of political opposition to second-guess Obama's choices. It is the role of the president to protect the American people from violence within the rules of war, which is exactly what he is doing.

Is It OK to Kill God's Creatures for a Good Cause?


So we got another dead rock chuck on the front page. Your article says "animal advocates" loathe this fun-filled activity.



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
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Long Fight Predicted in Guantanamo Sept. 11 Case

BAY **GUANTANAMO** NAVAL BASE, Cuba • The U.S. has finally started the prosecution of five Guantanamo Bay prisoners charged in the Sept. 11 attacks that killed nearly 3,000 people, but the trial won't be starting anytime soon, and both sides said Sunday that the case could continue for years.

Defense lawyer James Connell said a tentative trial date of May 2013 is a "placeholder" until a true date can be set for the trial of Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, the self-described mastermind of the attacks, and his co-defendants.

"It's going to take time," said the chief prosecutor, Army Brig. Gen. Mark Martins, who said he expects to battle a barrage of defense motions before the case goes to trial.

"I am getting ready for hundreds of motions because we want them to shoot everything they can shoot at us," he

Saturday's arraignment lasted 13 hours, including meal and prayer breaks, as the accused appeared to make a

concerted effort to stall the initial hearing, which didn't end until almost 11 p.m.

U.S. Airstrike Kills Senior al-Qaida Leader in Yemen

SANAA, Yemen • An airstrike Sunday killed a top al-Qaida leader on the FBI's most wanted list for his role in the 2000 bombing of the USS Cole warship, Yemeni officials said. The drone attack was carried out by the CIA, U.S. officials said.

Fahd al-Quso was hit by a missile as he stepped out of his vehicle, along with another al-Qaida operative in the southern Shabwa province, Yemeni military officials said. They were speaking on condition of anonymity in accordance with military regulations.

The drone strike that killed Quso was carried out by the CIA, after an extended surveillance operation by the CIA and U.S. military, two U.S. officials said. They spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to the media.

The strike was authorized by the Yemeni government, which then made the announcement after the operation was complete, the officials said, part of the U.S.

strategy to give the host government more public ownership of the operation being carried out on Yemeni soil.

The airstrike came as the U.S. and Yemen cooperate in a battle against al-Qaida in southern Yemen.

Georgia's **Patriarch** Baptizes 400 **Babies**

TBILISI, Georgia • The patriarch of the Georgian Orthodox Church presided over the baptism of hundreds of babies in a Tbilisi cathedral on Sunday as part of an effort credited with helping raise the birth rate in this former Soviet nation.

Patriarch Ilia II has promised to become the godfather of all babies born into Orthodox Christian families who already have two or more children. Since he began the mass baptisms in 2008, he has gained nearly 11,000 godchildren.

Georgian President Mikhail Saakashvili has said the patriarch deserves much of the credit for the rising birth rate, which in 2010 was 25 percent higher than in 2005. The number of abortions also declined by nearly 50 percent over the same five-year period.

Parents of the 400 babies baptized by an array of priests Sunday said the patriarch was instrumental in their decision to have a third or fourth child.

"This is a wonderful day for my family," said Tamar Kapanadze, a 33-year-old father of four. "Our fourth son, Lashko, was baptized by the patriarch himself, and before this he baptized our daughter Liziko. This is why we decided to have a fourth child."

5-to-1: Football in a FBS conference with Idaho's remaining sports in another Division I conference. Best near-term scenario would have the Sun Belt expanding to 12 teams by adding the Vandals and New Mexico State. The SBC has more options than just New Mexico State, although the Aggies are fairly competitive in basketball and baseball.

Would it be worth it to get to 12 teams and have a championship game? Possibly. Is it worth every Sun Belt team making a 2,000mile trip to Idaho in nearly every sport? This corner can't imagine Idaho being able to convince the league's

presidents and athletic directors, who would ultimately carry the final word that it is.

8-to-1: Football as an independent with all other sports in another Division I conference: The odds for this should be much higher, but never underestimate the ability of otherwise smart people to make dumb decisions while under duress inflicted by others.

There is a segment of influential boosters who are adamant over Idaho competing at the FCS level. They contribute a lot of money and they expect their voices to be heard. Another segment, not nearly as influential or rich, but certainly just as vocal, has no small amount of saving face attached to this decision. Would the angst be anything close to what it is if Boise State was still a junior college instead of the national football power it is today?

Exhibit A as to why independence is a bad idea is seen right in the Vandals' 2012 schedule, when it couldn't get BYU to make a return date to Moscow, while other WAC schools San Jose State and New Mexico State – are hosting BYU this year. Outside of the MWC and Mid-American Conference, Idaho hasn't lured a team to the Kibbie Dome from another FBS conference in years. Yet it will consistently get five or six per year as an independent? Good luck with

Maybe, just maybe, if Idaho can subsidize travel for the dozen-plus other sports that will have to come to Moscow for conference games and matches, this scenario can work out. But wouldn't that money be better spent in house? Is the price of full FBS conference membership worth it? That's up to the Universi-

ship in a FBS conference.

When creating a co-op, the IHSAA adds together the schools' enrollment numbers for classification purposes. For example, Declo and Burley's combined enrollment still falls in the 4A classification.

Anderson, a Raft River

junior, looked into playing baseball at Burley, which is the closest school offering the sport. But adding Raft River's enrollment to Burley's and Declo's would bump the program up to Class 5A.

So Anderson landed with Minico, a 40-minute drive from his home in Elba.

"At first it was kind of hard. I was basically going to a new school and didn't know anybody and didn't know the coaches, either," said Anderson, who also plays football for Raft River. "But I kept going over there every year and throughout Legion season. It became like I go to school there, I know them really well and we hang out a lot. It works out fine now."

Mayweather Solid, Still Shuns Pacquiao

LAS VEGAS • Floyd Mayweather Jr. was getting ready to make his ring walk about the time Manny Pacquiao arrived at Los Angeles International Airport on Philippine Airlines Flight 102. He'll be occupying a cell at the Clark County Detention Center by the time Pacquiao makes his way to this gambling city for his June 9 fight with Timothy Bradley.

The two are seemingly destined never to be in the same spot at the same time. Certainly not in the ring, something Mayweather made clear Saturday night after taking on Miguel Cotto in a bruising fight that, if not his best, was certainly among his most exciting.

"The Pacquiao-Mayweather fight is not going to happen," Mayweather said. "It's not my fault."

More on that later, though Mayweather could be called out for using some convoluted logic about why the fight won't happen. Suffice it to say he believes he's in the driver's seat for any mega-fight, and is both suspicious of Pacquiao and unwilling to take equal money for the bout.

After making a minimum \$32 million in an impressive performance Saturday night against Cotto, Mayweather could be excused for dismissing what would be the richest fight in boxing history. But, with jail time coming up for a domestic abuse charge, there will be plenty of time for reflection about his future

"I don't know where we're

going to go from here because we basically have fought everybody in this sport," Mayweather said. "I don't have to fight if I don't want to?"

Indeed, Mayweather hinted of retirement following his tough battle with Cotto, which ended with Mayweather claiming a piece of the 154-pound title with a unanimous decision. But there's huge money still to be made, and he's a fighter who burns through cash with a Money Team entourage that seems to grow with each fight.

Unlike most of his fights, though, Mayweather looked like he had been in a fight after beating Cotto. He had welts under his both eyes and he spoke deliberately, like a fighter who was exhausted by the effort needed to capture the 43rd win of his unblemished career.

He could have danced about and beaten Cotto without taking the most punishment of his career, Mayweather insisted. But he wanted to give fans a good show, and make them happy they spent \$69.95 on pay-per-view to see him fight.

Having Justin Bieber and 50 Cent accompany him into the ring was entertaining, sure. But the action in the ring was even better.

"Things happened tonight and we both had to fight. But the main thing is that we got the victory," Mayweather said. "The fans were happy. It's about impressing fans and giving them what they want to see."

white flag and hold on for the win. He did it with a plan that left both Busch and Kenseth flat-footed, and both praised Keselowski after the race.

"He's no dummy, that's for sure," said Busch, who wound up second for the second consecutive day.

Busch was the leader on the last lap of Saturday's Nationwide Series race, and was passed by Joey Logano right at the finish line. He conceded there's little the leader can do to preserve the victory on the last lap of a restrictor-plate race, and predicted how Sunday would unfold.

"If you're leading, being pushed, plan on finishing second. That's all there is to it," Busch said after Saturday's defeat.

So he should have been sitting pretty after pushing Keselowski to the front. Instead, Keselowski went high into the third turn, then pulled off of Busch's bumper to create some separation.

"That allowed me to drive untouched to the checkered flag," Keselowski said. "It wasn't easy to convince myself to do that, but it was the right move." Busch initially seemed

dumbfounded. "I must have screwed something up, because we got to turn three and came unhooked," Busch said. "Just gave the win away over there. Not sure exactly what happened. We definitely need to go back and figure out what it was."

Kenseth didn't feel much better. He led seven times for a race-high 73 laps, but believed he gave the win away on the final restart.

A nine-car accident with four laps remaining brought out the yellow flag, setting up a two-lap overtime sprint to the finish. Kenseth, as the leader, got to pick where he wanted to restart and chose the outside line so Roush Fenway Racing teammate Greg Biffle would line up behind him and presumably push him to the victo-

That put Keselowski and Busch together on the inside line, but they drifted back on the restart as Kenseth indeed was able to jump out to a huge lead.

It was probably too big of a lead.

Kenseth got a little too far away from Biffle, which gave the Keselowski-Busch tandem a chance to catch him. The two cars sailed past Kenseth on the outside line.

"I think we had the winning car, really just didn't have the winning driver," Kenseth said. "I looked forward for a second, when I looked back, Greg and I were separated, those guys were already outside of him. With me not paying attention, keeping us hooked up, just cost us a shot at the win, cost Greg a shot at the win."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"There is no security on this earth; there is only opportunity." — Douglas MacArthur

This is the normal time of year for the Cavendish tournament in Las Vegas, but this year the event will be held in Monaco in the fall. I shall be running deals all week that focus on the players in last year's event. Here is a deal that saw the winners from 2011 chalk up what seemed to be a normal, if mildly fortunate, result. But there is more to it than that.

North-South actually play a strong club, so I've simplified the auction to a standard sequence. The play in three no-trump saw declarer, Kit Woolsey, win the first heart and pass the diamond jack to East. Back came a heart, ducked, and a club shift. Woolsey won and drove out the diamond ace, and when both aces were onside, he had nine somewhat fortunate tricks — or was there more to it than that?

Contrast what happened when Justin Lall and Kevin Bathurst were West and East, respectively. East passed, South opened a 14-16 no-trump, and West and North passed, Bathurst balanced with two hearts, and North reopened with two no-trump, a nonforcing call suggesting the minors, which South judged to pass.

The heart lead was won by South, who played the diamond jack. Lall hopped up with the diamond ace and cleared the hearts. Now declarer had to guess if East had the bare diamond queen or the spade ace, and he got it wrong by repeating the diamond finesse — down two!

Lall's defense protected his partner's entry and deserved the result it achieved.

ANSWER: There is no reason to look beyond your black suits for an opening lead. Spades are an unbid suit — but either opponent might turn up with four. The advantage of a club is that your extra length and intermediates make it both more attacking and somewhat safer if partner produces any high card in the suit — but East has bid the suit. I think a club feels right; five-card suits have so much more to offer.

der of the Philippines to

Japanese forces during World War II. In 1945, Germany signed an unconditional surrender at Allied headquarters in Rheims (rams), France, end-

ing its role in World War II. In 1954, the 55-day Battle of Dien Bien Phu in Vietnam ended with Vietnamese insurgents overrunning French forces.

In 1963, the United States launched the Telstar 2 communications satellite. In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford formally declared an

end to the "Vietnam era." In Ho Chi Minh City — formerly Saigon - the Viet Cong celebrated its takeover. In 1977, Seattle Slew won the Kentucky Derby, the first

of his Triple Crown victories.

In 1984, a \$180 million out-of-court settlement was announced in the Agent Orange class-action suit brought by Vietnam veterans who charged they'd suffered injury from exposure to the

defoliant. In 1992, the latest addition to America's space shuttle fleet, Endeavour, went on its first flight. A 203-year-old proposed constitutional amendment barring Congress from giving itself a midterm pay raise received enough votes for ratification as Michigan became the 38th

state to approve it.

Ten years ago: Authorities arrested 21-year-old college student Luke J. Helder in a series of rural mailbox bombings that left six people wounded in Illinois and Iowa. (Helder was later found incompetent to stand trial, but remains incarcerated.) A China Northern Airlines jetliner crashed into the Yellow Sea, killing 112 people; Chinese authorities later blamed a saboteur who'd set a fire on board.Fifteen Israelis were killed by a suicide bomber at a pool hall in suburban Tel Aviv. Triple Crown winner Seattle Slew died at age 28, 25 years to the day after his victory in the Kentucky Derby.

Five years ago: President

George W. Bush welcomed Britain's Queen Elizabeth II to the White House, drawing laughter when he mistakenly started to say that the queen had helped the U.S. celebrate its bicentennial in "1776;" then quickly corrected himself to say "1976." Six Muslim immigrants from the former Yugoslavia and the Middle East were arrested and accused of plotting to massacre U.S. soldiers at Fort Dix, N.J. (Five were later convicted in federal court of conspiring to kill military personnel; the sixth was charged only with gun offenses, and pleaded guilty.) Yahweh Ben Yahweh, a former cult leader in Miami linked to nearly two dozen gruesome killings in the 1980s, died at age 71. One year ago: The U.S. re-

leased a handful of videos seized from Osama bin Laden's hideout showing the terrorist leader watching newscasts of himself amid shabby surroundings. The Taliban unleashed a major assault on government buildings throughout Kandahar, Afghanistan. Animal Kingdom sped past the leaders in the turn at Churchill Downs and roared down the middle of the stretch to win the Kentucky Derby. J

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
