Finance Reports Reveal Supporters

TWIN FALLS • Who's funding the candidates? Candidates running in county and state elections turned in their primary campaign finance reports by 5 p.m. Tuesday, revealing individual and corporate supporters.

The forms divulge a lot. Here are some highlights: The contentious race between incumbent GOP Sens. Bert Brackett and Tim Corder has big money behind it. Brackett received more than twice the contributions of Corder, including donations from the Idaho Cattle Association and Sen. Jeff Sid-doway, R-Terreton.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter received more donations than Jack Johnson, but Johnson also has solid support.

Retiring Republican Rep. Leon Smith of Twin Falls donated \$1,000 from his campaign fund to Democrat Rosemary Fornshell, who is challenging Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, in the general election.

Teresa Heinz, wife of U.S. Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., donated \$500 to Idaho Sen. Michelle Stennett, D-Ketchum. Stennett is uncontested in both the primary and general elections.

Douglas Pickett received \$1,000 from the Idaho Association For Good Government, a political action committee run by Rep. Bob Nonini, R-Coeur d'Alene. Nonini, who is running for Idaho Senate, has also used his PAC to support other challengers to incumbents in north Idaho.

Pickett is challenging Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, in the primary.


Some legislative candidates who are unchallenged in the primary and general elections donated to colleagues seeking re-election. House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, donated \$11,000 to House Republican incumbents, including four colleagues targeted by political action funds supported by House Majority Leader Mike Moyle.

Moyle told the Associated Press he is actively trying to defeat House Majority Caucus Chairman Ken Roberts, one of the recipients of Bedke's donations. Bedke has spoken out against Moyle's actions.

Bergdahl's Parents Seek Action

WASHINGTON • Frustrated by what they said are stalled efforts to free a U.S. soldier taken prisoner three years ago in Afghanistan, the man's parents have gone public with previously secret U.S. attempts to trade him for Taliban prisoners in U.S. hands.

Bob Bergdahl and his wife, Jani Bergdahl, said in interviews that they are concerned the U.S. government hasn't done enough to secure the release of their son, 26-year-old Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl.

"There is a dynamic here that has to change," Bob Bergdahl said in an interview with the *Idaho Mountain Express*. "Everybody is frustrated with how slowly the process has evolved."

Bergdahl, of Hailey, was captured in June 2009 and is believed held by the Haqqani network, an insurgent group affiliated with the

Taliban, probably somewhere in Pakistan. He is the subject of a proposed prisoner swap in which the Obama administration would allow the transfer of up to five Taliban prisoners long held at the U.S. military prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

Those prisoners would most likely go to Qatar, where they would be under some form of loose house arrest or supervision, while Bergdahl would be returned to the U.S. military.

The proposed deal has been in limbo for months and faces serious opposition in

AN OUT-OF-SIGHT EYESORE

Illegal dumpers use the rugged seclusion of public land north of Twin Falls to rid themselves of tons of trash.

TWIN FALLS • An old mattress, a rusted-out car body, empty milk jugs and thousands of shotgun shell casings. It's not the landfill, it's the Snake River Canyon rim.

The area between the canyon's north rim and Interstate 84 north of Twin Falls is a popular destination for all kinds of people looking for fun, from hikers and bikers to off-roaders, horseback riders and geocachers, said Doug Erling, president of the Southern Idaho Off Road Association. But it's also popular with another set: illegal dumpers.

Although the property is in Jerome County, people come from all around — including across the bridge in Twin Falls — to dump off tons of garbage they don't want to pay to send to a transfer station or the dump, Erling said.

The offroad association and several other groups will host the 13th annual cleanup of the area Saturday.

At the first cleanup in 1999, the group hauled out 99 tons of trash. This year, Erling expects four large garbage bins to be filled and several pickup truckloads of tires to be pulled off the public land.

Erling said he's seen every kind of garbage imaginable, from construction debris to hot water heaters and the remains of meth labs.



Officials in Holding Pattern on Aquifer Change

Launching a new model to measure water in the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer is now a higher priority.

TWIN FALLS • State water officials are still in a holding pattern more than a year after receiving a petition to change the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer's boundaries.

This is the first possible boundary change the Idaho Department

of Water Resources has faced since 1994. Buhl-based Clear Springs Foods submitted the petition in November 2010 on the grounds that information used to outline the Lake Erie-sized underground water source, which provides water to much of southern Idaho, is out of date.

Although the department fin-

ished its public scoping period last May, it's held off from making a decision. The reason for the delay is because IDWR is waiting to implement its new water model for the aquifer, said Rich Rigby, senior advisor for the agency.

"The model has been developed and work is being done on testing the model," Rigby said. "We'll restart the issue when that's done."

Similar to any basic monetary

budget, the ESPA water model outlines how much water is going in and out of the aquifer, Rigby said. In July, IDWR will begin using a new version that will include water input from a handful of tributary streams previously left out of the model budget.

IDWR is including them now because enough substantial information has finally been collected over the past few years, said Sean

Vincent, the agency's hydrology section manager and part of the committee developing the new water model.

The possible boundary extension would include the Big Lost River Basin, which contains several tributary streams. Yet

some are criticizing the department's choice not to include all of the ESPA's 22 underground water flows.

"You should put in all of them," said Lynn Tominga, executive director of the Idaho Ground Water Appropriators. "They all contribute to the ESPA. Why are you picking on those three tributaries when there are so many others?"

And although it's been

several months since the department has had any activity on the boundary change, IDWR has already received 200 comments from water users expressing a wide range of concerns if the boundary line is moved.

"We got a lot of comments from a lot of users," Rigby said. "We'll look again at the question once we have the new model."

Congress if it ever gets off the ground. The Taliban walked away from talks in March, saying the U.S. had reneged on several promises. The Obama administration is trying several gambits to restart talks, including proposing looser terms for the detention or monitoring of the Guantanamo prisoners upon their release, two U.S. officials told The Associated Press.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because the talks are sensitive and elements of the U.S. engagement with the Taliban are classified.

The Associated Press has periodically reported on Bergdahl's case since his capture. But the news agency had agreed since last year not to report on the proposed prisoner swap and ongoing negotiations at the request of the Pentagon and White House, on the grounds that public discussion would endanger Bergdahl's life.

With public discussion of the deal Wednesday by Bergdahl's parents, the AP and other news organizations reported the proposed swap.

Bob Bergdahl told the Idaho newspaper that swapping Taliban prisoners at Guantanamo for his son represents a "win-win" for the United States. He said in addition to his son's safe return, the United States could foster good

will with the Afghan people.

The imprisonment of suspected militants at Guantanamo is a long-standing irritant in U.S. relations with Muslim nations including Afghanistan, which has long demanded the release of its citizens held since shortly after the U.S. invasion that toppled the Taliban government in Kabul in 2001.

A senior U.S. military official said the Pentagon believes Bergdahl to be alive, in relatively good health and in captivity somewhere along the Afghanistan-Pakistan border. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because efforts to free Bergdahl remain sensitive.

Bob Bergdahl said he and his wife are hoping for a peaceful resolution, preferably one that doesn't put other American soldiers in danger.

"We don't want to see Americans killed," he told the Idaho paper.

Even so, he said the time for a change in strategy has come, and that he hopes renewed public attention to their son's plight would help secure his release.

"I'm pushing it hard," Bob Bergdahl said.

Marine Col. David Lapan, spokesman for Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told reporters that the military has a "collaborative" relationship with Bergdahl's family, which is given quarterly updates from Washington. He said

the family is not advised on whether to discuss the case with the news media.

"Our message to them is: We are working hard to obtain Sgt. Bergdahl's release, to bring him back into U.S. hands," Lapan said.

Asked about the family's complaint that the U.S. government has not done enough, Lapan said: "It's perfectly understandable that parents whose son has been kept in captivity for several years now are frustrated. We certainly understand that. That's why we do everything thing we can to try to keep them updated, to the extent we can."

He added: "If they are angry and/or frustrated, that is certainly understandable. I would say that our leaders are frustrated as well."

Bowe Bergdahl disappeared June 30, 2009, while deployed with his U.S. Army unit. He's spent three birthdays in captivity.

To solicit support for further action, Bob Bergdahl plans to speak at an annual demonstration to recognize prisoners of war over Memorial Day weekend in Washington. The event, organized by the nonprofit POW support group Rolling Thunder, typically attracts more than 100,000 motorcyclists to the nation's capital.

"With all that's going on, we really need a diplomatic path to get this resolved," Bob Bergdahl said.

Jerome County Sheriff Doug McFall said he tries to be proactive in catching people who illegally dump in the area, but finding the time to patrol the area is difficult. By the time deputies get through with their other duties and scheduled tasks, they have little time where they can just go out and patrol an area, he said.

"Due to the ruggedness of the terrain they have to be careful in the patrol vehicles," he said, adding higher-clearance vehicles with 4-wheel drive handle the area best.

McFall said he has one range deputy who drives a 4-wheel-drive vehicle. The deputy normally handles things like animal calls or water on roadways, but one of his duties is to go to the canyon rim area and patrol every chance he gets.

When deputies find dump sites they'll search the garbage for anything that could identify the person who left it there, McFall said.

"We'll go and actually dig through and find magazines or mail with address labels and track it back," he said. "We have been known to issue citations that way."

Although that sometimes leads to the successful conviction of dumpers, there's a better chance if the suspect is caught in the act.

If a person sees someone actively dumping garbage on

public land, they should try to identify the vehicle and get a license plate number if it's safe. Then, call the county's non-emergency line, 324-1911, with the information, McFall said.

"Deputies will respond out there and make contact," he said.

While reports can be made anonymously, it's better if the person calling in the tip can also fill out a statement for deputies and offer to testify against the dumper, McFall said.

If convicted, illegal dumping can result in a misdemeanor citation.

U.S. Bureau of Land Management rangers also patrol the area, said BLM spokeswoman Heather Tiel-Nelson, but catching people illegally dumping is difficult.

Two BLM law enforcement rangers have about 4.3 million acres to look after in the region, she said.

Dumping on BLM land can be reported to any area BLM office, Tiel-Nelson said.

"We do investigate dumps that are reported to us," she said.

The class-A misdemeanor can carry a potential \$100,000 fine or a year in jail.

In the past, the agency also allowed offenders to clean up the trash as part of their punishment, she said.

"They'll work with the people," she said of the rangers. "We want to make it right."

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SAT Scores Available for High School Juniors

BOISE • Beginning today, high school juniors will receive their scores from the Idaho SAT School Day held last month.

More than 16,000 students statewide took the SAT on Idaho's first state-funded testing day, April 18.

Students who participated in the testing day can access their scores online by logging into their collegeboard.org student accounts.

Students who requested paper score reports will receive them via mail within the next few days.

Idaho SAT School Day was created as a result of 2007 Idaho law creating new graduation requirements. The goal is to ensure more students graduate from high school prepared for higher education or the workforce.

Students are required to take a college entrance exam before the end of their junior year.

During the 2011 legislative session through Students Come First education reforms, lawmakers appropriated \$963,500 for schools to offer the SAT during regular school hours for the class of 2013 at no cost.

DRYER CAUSES HOUSE FIRE IN T.F.

TWIN FALLS • A woman and two young children were unharmed by a Wednesday morning house fire in Twin Falls, but firefighters estimate the house sustained \$25,000 in damage.

The Twin Falls Fire Department got the call at 9:13 a.m. about a fire in the 500 block of Third Avenue North.

The fire started in a dryer vent on the outside of the house and burned to the porch area, said Twin Falls Fire Department Battalion Chief Jack Barnes.

A window was broken in the blaze and smoke vented into the kitchen, he said. The major

fire damage to the house was on the outside, but there is some smoke damage inside.

"It took us about 15 minutes and the fire was extinguished," Barnes said. "All the mop-up takes a lot longer!"

Fires in dryer vents are generally caused by a buildup of lint and can usually be prevented by cleaning the vent out regularly, Barnes said.

"Nationally, it's one of the more prevalent causes in home fires," he said, but added he hasn't seen it become a big problem locally.

The American Red Cross of Greater Idaho also responded to the home and assisted the family, providing them with food and shelter.

Burley Students Win Auto Contest

BOISE • Two Cassia Regional Technology Center seniors won the May 4 state finals of the Idaho Ford/AAA Student Auto Skills competition in Boise.

The team of Slade Beck and Taylor Grisham — taught by Scott Street — topped nine other teams to earn the right to represent the state during the June national finals in Dearborn, Mich.

The students received scholarships and awards totaling \$44,500 each for correctly diagnosing and repairing a 2012 Ford Fusion that was deliberately bugged by competition organizers. Each team was given an identical vehicle to diagnose and repair, and judged on the accuracy and quality of their work.

“On the strength of this team’s strong written scores and perfect workmanship, this team was able to edge out a win over another top team from Mountain Home High School,” contest committee chairman Dave Carlson said in a written release. “This team was the only Idaho team to return a ‘clean car,’ indicating they completed all repairs.”

According to a release, sponsors and schools donated prizes and scholarships totaling about \$200,000 to the competition, which intends to encourage students to pursue careers in auto technology.



Murtaugh Shooting Investigation Continues

TWIN FALLS • Investigators are awaiting results from evidence sent to the state lab from the scene of a shooting in Murtaugh last month that left one man dead and another severely injured, said Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb.

The results from the tests could tell investigators everything from if and who to charge in the case to a possible timeline of what happened during the April 24 incident.

Loeb had hoped the investigation would be completed by Friday, but completion now depends on how quickly the lab results are returned.

Loeb said he did not want to say what type of tests had been ordered yet.

“I don’t want to go into de-

tails until I have the results and know what they mean,” he said.

Murtaugh resident Jose Luis Mucio-Olayo, 42, died from his injuries due to gunshot wounds while being transported by air ambulance to St. Luke’s Magic Valley Medical Center the night of the shooting, Loeb said. Javier Carbajal-Galvan, 27, also of Murtaugh, was severely injured and was in intensive care at St. Luke’s with gunshot wounds.

Edgar T. Garcia, 23, of Burley, was shot in the wrist during the incident and drove himself to Cassia Regional Medical Center in Burley the night of the shooting. He was treated and released, Loeb said.

No charges have been filed in the incident.

IDAHO 25 PAVING NEAR RUPERT STARTS MONDAY

RUPERT • Drivers on Idaho Highway 25 between Rupert and the Interstate 84 junction should be prepared for delays associated with road work that begins Monday.

The Idaho Transportation Department announced that milling at each end of the north-south project — at the Baseline Road intersection and near the Snake River bridge — will be the first

step, with paving expected to begin in about a week.

Traffic will be reduced to one lane during work hours, with a pilot car in operation and a 45 mph speed limit in effect.

Paving is expected to be completed by mid-June and will be followed by a chip-seal coat. All work is expected to be complete by June 20.

Paul-based Kloefer Inc. is the contractor for the \$1.07 million project.

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Kimberly to Raze Old City Hall

City Council also looks to designate its library's home and advance a traffic signal project at Red Cap Corner during Tuesday's meeting.

KIMBERLY • The Kimberly City Council on Tuesday approved a bid for demolition of the town's old City Hall, clearing the way for a new health clinic.

The council approved a bid of \$24,000 submitted by Twin Falls Crane Service — the lowest of two bids received.

Kimberly city crews have been clearing the inside of the building at 132 Main St., preparing it for demolition.

"For all intents and purposes, it's clear and ready to go," Public Works Director Rob Wright told the council.

Demolition is expected to begin later this month, he said.

The city was awarded a \$500,000 Community Development Block Grant for construction of a new health care clinic on the site, operated by Family Health Services.

FHS plans to break ground on the new clinic in September.

Take Part

A public meeting on a project to revitalize downtown Kimberly is planned for 6:30 p.m. May 29 at the Kimberly Middle School Commons Room.

The meeting will allow residents to learn more about the project and provide input, City Clerk Jennifer Rowe said. No formal decisions will be made.

Bids for construction will be awarded in July.

In other business, the council authorized City Attorney William Hollifield to draft a resolution designating the old train depot and one-time City Hall building at 120 Madison St. W. as a city library.

That would resolve concerns that lack of a permanently designated home may hinder the library's ability to compete for grant funding.

The library and city offices shared space in the building for a time after the old City

Hall on Main Street was condemned. The library has been the sole occupant since March when the new City Hall was completed.

Hollifield noted a resolution would not represent any kind of separate ownership. The Kimberly library is part of the city; there is no independent library district.

"The library would like to have a more permanent home, but they are not a separate entity. They are part of the city, so you can't deed that premises to them," Hollifield told the council.

He agreed to draft a resolution for the council to consider at its next meeting on May 22.

The council also approved a revised agreement with the Idaho Transportation Department for construction of a traffic signal at Red Cap Corner — the intersection of U.S. Highway 30 and State Highway 50.

The project was originally estimated to cost \$610,000, but more recent projections put the tab closer to \$800,000, requiring an addendum.

The increased costs will be covered by ITD, Wright said.

The council also approved a request to destroy old city po-

lice records, including accident reports, citations and misdemeanors.

The paper records will be shredded, while some videotapes will be burned, said Po-

lice Chief Pat Bermingham. "These are old records that date back to 1989," he said.



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RUPERT POLICE CREATE LOSS-PREVENTION PROGRAM

RUPERT • Rupert's interim police chief briefed its City Council Tuesday on a loss-prevention program his department designed.

Chief James Wardle and Officer Matt Hawkins explained the program, designed to get them into the community.

Hawkins said it would lead to better relationships if officers sit down with business owners to discuss concerns such as check fraud and scams — teaching them ways to help prevent crime. He has been in contact with Rupert business owners, but also with bigger chain stores such as Walmart, Target, and Sportsman's Warehouse, because the bigger chains have loss-prevention officers of their own.

"This is something that, in talking with them, is definitely needed and definitely wanted," Hawkins said.

He said if a person is shoplifting in Rupert, they might be shoplifting in Burley, Twin Falls, and other local areas. Interest in the program has grown more than expected.

In other Tuesday business:

• Attorney Paul Ross was introduced. He will provide conflict legal counsel until Aug. 1, when Kelly Anthon — current city attorney and interim city — becomes the city's new, full-time superintendent.

• The council examined three pieces of property to possibly annex into the city. City Attorney Kelly Anthon said a public hearing on the annexations is in the works.

• James Taylor with the water department updated the council on an apprenticeship for reading meters. He said state certification requirements have already been met by cross-training meter trainees with the water and electric department. The matter was tabled until the June 12 meeting.

• Resident George Maas updated the council on the projects of Rupert's POW-MIA group. Those included

the benefit for Deb Anderson at the Rupert Elks, which garnered more than \$13,000. They donated a picnic table and metal sculptures for another benefit. The group will erect The Avenue of Flags beginning this week.

• Wardle reported that he has received many comments on the Friday funeral of Army Sgt. Chris Workman, and Rupert's patriotism. Brown said he was asked to personally thank Wardle for the shining job his department did.

N. Idaho Sheriff Candidate Hosts Cross Burning

SANDPOINT (AP) • A white power activist campaigning to be the next Bonner County sheriff hosted a cross burning last week with fellow Ku Klux Klan members and is defending the ceremony as a historic Christian ritual.

Shaun Winkler, 33, said mainstream society misses the point about cross-lighting rituals, seeing them only as a symbol of hate and racial intolerance.

"We look at it more as a religious symbol," Winkler told the *Bonner County Daily Bee*.

Winkler allowed media to attend the cross burning ceremony, held Friday at his property near Priest River. He said the north Idaho Ku Klux Klan holds cross burnings about once a month.

Winkler said the religious component of the ceremony has roots in Scotland, where clan members used it as a means of communication. He also considers it a Christian symbol, a representation of Jesus Christ's light spreading to the rest of the world.

Still, it's impossible to separate historic cross burnings from their more modern association with racism, terror and prejudice stemming from 20th-century KKK activities in the South and other parts of the country, said Brenda Hammond of the Bonner County Human Rights Task Force.

"It shows the need for the human rights task force has not gone away," she said. "Many of us on the task force have really regretted Bonner County's reputation for harboring racism when the vast majority of us don't think like that."

Winkler also has past ties to the Aryan Nations and

has taken part in racially charged protests in Kootenai County. He picketed Mexican food vendors in nearby Coeur d'Alene in 2011, and protested the annual Martin Luther King Jr. events at North Idaho College in January.

Winkler is courting Bonner County voters in hopes of becoming the next sheriff and has vowed to keep his personal beliefs separate from any future law enforcement responsibilities.

He has framed his campaign around the message of cracking down on methamphetamine producers and sex offenders, telling people at a candidate forum this week he favors immediate hangings for those convicted of being sexual predators.

"Most people don't know that we don't just oppose the Jews and the negroes," Winkler said, according to the newspaper. "We also oppose sexual predators and drugs of any kind."

Winkler is running in the Republican primary against Sheriff Daryl Wheeler and Ponderay police officer Tim Fry. The winner will face independent Rocky Jordan in the November election.

Potato Pest Found in More E. Idaho Fields

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Officials with the U.S. Department of Agriculture say a microscopic parasite that damages potato crops has been found in three more eastern Idaho fields, bringing the number of infected fields to 15.

Tina Gresham with the USDA in Idaho Falls, said though pale cyst nematode infestations continue to be discovered in eastern Idaho, efforts to fight the pest appear to be helping.

"There's a possibility that there could be more (infested) fields," she told the *Post*

Register. "At the same time, I do believe there is a light at the end of the tunnel."

The nematode is a microscopic parasite that attacks the roots of potato plants. It doesn't harm the potato itself and poses no threat to humans or animals, but it can devastate crop yields.

It was first found in eastern Idaho in 2006, and since then 15 infected fields have

been discovered in Bonnevill and Bingham counties.

Recent tests in five of those fields, however, uncovered only dead nematodes, Gresham said. Researchers will continue to test the soil in the fields for two years to make sure the pests are wiped out.

USDA spokesman Larry Hawkins said that since

2007, the agency has spent about \$7 million a year to try to get rid of the nematodes in eastern Idaho fields.

Gresham believes this year's newly discovered infestations began before the USDA eradication program was started. Besides fumigating the fields themselves, the agency is urging farmers to clean equipment before moving it between fields.

Taxing Jobs out of Existence

Bill Hewlett and David Packard, tinkering in a California garage, began what became Hewlett-Packard. Steve Jobs and a friend built a computer in the California garage that became Apple's birthplace. Bill Cook had no garage, so he launched Cook Medical in a spare bedroom in an apartment in this university town. Half a century ago, in flight from Chicago's winters, he settled here and began making cardiovascular catheters and other medical instruments. One thing led to another, as things have a way of doing when the government stays out of the way, and although Cook died last year, Cook Medical, with its subsidiaries, is the world's largest family-owned medical devices company.

In 2010, however, Congress, ravenous for revenues to fund Obamacare, included in the legislation a 2.3 percent tax on gross revenues — which generally amounts to about a 15 percent tax on most manufacturers' profits — from U.S. sales of medical devices beginning in 2013. This will be piled on top of the 35 percent federal corporate tax, and state and local taxes. The 2.3 percent tax will be a \$20 billion blow to an industry that employs more than 400,000, and \$20 billion is almost double the industry's annual investment in research and development.

An axiom of scarcity is understood by people not warped by working for the federal government, which can print money when it wearies of borrowing it. The axiom is: A unit of something — time, energy, money — spent on this cannot be spent on that. So the 2.3 percent tax, unless repealed, will mean not only fewer jobs but also fewer pain-reducing and life-extending inventions — stents, implantable defibrillators, etc. — which have reduced health care costs.

The tax might, however, be repealed. The medical device industry is widely dispersed across the country, so numerous members of Congress have constituencies affected by developments such as these:

Cook Medical is no longer planning to open a U.S. factory a year. Boston Scientific, planning for a more than \$100 million charge against earnings in 2013, recently built a \$35 million research and development facility in Ireland and is building a \$150 million factory in China. (Capital goes where it is welcome and stays where it is well-treated.) Stryker Corp., based in Michigan, blames the tax for 1,000 layoffs. Zimmer, based in Indiana, is laying off 450 and taking a \$50 million charge against earnings. Medtronic expects an annual charge against earnings of \$175 million. Covidien, now based in Ireland, has cited the tax in explaining 200 layoffs and a decision to move some production to Costa Rica and Mexico.

Already 235 members of the House of Representatives — 227 Republicans and eight Democrats — are co-sponsors of a bill to repeal the tax. Twenty-three Republican senators but no Democratic senators favor repeal. The Democrats who imposed this tax on a single manufacturing sector justified this discrimination by saying Obamacare would be a boon to the medical devices industry because, by expanding insurance coverage, it would stimulate demand for devices. But those insured because of Obamacare will be disproportionately young and not needing, say, artificial knees. And well before Obamacare, the law had long required hospitals to provide devices to the needy who are uninsured.

Unsurprisingly, Sen. Scott Brown, R-Mass., supports repeal of the tax. Surprisingly, so does his opponent, Elizabeth Warren, an impeccably liberal Obamacare enthusiast who notes that in Massachusetts the medical devices industry has 24,000 employees and accounts for 13 percent of the state's exports. Warren is experiencing another episode of New England remorse: “When Congress taxes the sale of a specific product through an excise tax ... it too often disproportionately impacts the small companies with the narrowest financial margins and the broadest innovative potential.”



Our Too-thirsty Forests

Ronald Reagan once justified logging with "a tree is a tree; how many more do you need to look at?" Besides, he warned, "trees cause more pollution than automobiles." We cringed at his biases. Yet due to forces none foresaw, Reagan's gaffes may now ring true.

Today, the hottest and thirstiest parts of the United States are best described as over-forested. Vigorous federal protection has stocked semiarid regions of public land with several billion trees too many. And day after day these excess trees deplete a natural resource that has become far more precious than toilet paper or 2-by-4's: water.

Scientists and water managers report that 39 states face water scarcity. Much of the nation's freshwater shortfall comes from our population growth, waste, hunger and contaminants. But we must also now implicate the escalating thirst of unnatural forests.

Water depletion from afforestation — the establishment of trees or tree stands where none previously were — is the unintended consequence of a wildly popular federal policy. For millenniums, fires set by lightning or Native Americans limited forest stocks to roughly a few dozen trees per acre. All that changed after the nationally terrifying Big Blowup wildfires of 1910, which led the United States to in effect declare war on wildfire. The government's wartime-like tactics included security watchtowers, propaganda, aerial bombing and color-coded threat alerts. Uncle Sam trained elite Hotshot and Smokejumper crews to snuff out enemy flames. Congress annually funded the war effort with an emergency blank check, now \$2.5 billion.

Decades of heroic victories against fire led to gradual defeat in the larger war. Fuel builds up, and when it ignites, the fires burn hotter, faster and more de-

structively. More new trees compete for less sunlight, thinner soil nutrients and scarcer water resources. Native wildlife suffers. Insects and diseases spread faster. Public subsidies protect private properties at the wildland-urban interface.

Ironically, Congress enacted the anti-fire 1911 Weeks Act and 1924 Clarke-McNary Act to prevent erosion and thus secure downstream navigable rivers. That logic made sense in damp Eastern states, but it had the opposite effect in the semi-arid West. There, fire exclusion degraded the integrity and runoff of high-elevation watershed recharge zones.

Naturally, forest managers focus on forest health. Yet combing through their extensive upland research, our analysis also found the larger scope of downstream casualties: suppression of fire causes suppression of flows.

Indeed, in some landscapes, you literally can't see the river for the trees.

Call it the water-fire nexus. To be sure, the dynamics are complex. Impacts fluctuate locally depending on forest slope, aspect, age, altitude, density, latitude, species composition and natural history. But adjusting for these variables reveals the nexus' overarching pattern.

First, the past century of fire suppression has resulted in roughly 112 to 172 more trees per acre in high-elevation forests of the West. That's a fivefold increase from the pre-settlement era.

But let's conservatively ignore potential vapor losses. Instead, assume that the lowest average daily sap flow rate is 70 liters per tree for an open forest acre of 112 new young trees. Even then, this over-forested acre transpires an additional 2.3 acre-feet of water per year, enough to meet the needs of four families.

Third, that pattern adds up. Applying low-end estimates to the more than 75 million acres of Sierra Nevada conifer forests suggests the water-fire nexus causes excess daily net water loss of 58 billion liters. So each year, post-fire afforestation means 17 million acre-feet of water can no longer seep in or trickle down from the Sierra to thirsty families, farms, or endangered fisheries.

So how do we unlock the nexus to replenish the Earth? A century's accumulation of dry fuel in public lands makes it too expensive and risky — for people, property, habitats or carbon emissions — to unleash prescribed fires throughout our 16-million-acre ponderosa tinderbox. Mechanical thinning generates popular distrust as long as timber industry chain saws try to cut "high grade" valuable mature growth to compensate for less profitable small-diameter "trash trees."

Happily, a lumber mill's trash has now become a water user's treasure. Thirsty downstream interests could organize to restrict thinning to scrawny excess trees simply for the purpose of releasing the liquid assets they consume. Western water rights markets value an acre-foot at \$450 to \$650 and rising. So rather than compete with forests for rain and snow, private and public institutions could invest \$1,000 per acre (average U.S. Forest Service price) to cut down fire-prone trash trees, yielding at least \$1,100 to \$1,500 worth of vital water. To reduce fuel loads and increase runoff, the water-fire nexus pays for itself.

Mechanic Finds Pound of Cocaine in Car's Engine

IDAHO FALLS • Police in Idaho Falls say a mechanic found more than a pound of cocaine in the engine compartment of an 82-year-old woman's car.

The cocaine, with an estimated street value of \$20,000, was wrapped in black electrical tape. It was found Tuesday morning.

Officers say it's likely the cocaine was hidden in the car by someone before the woman bought it. The car was a former rental.

Town Without Water after Pumps Break

IDAHO FALLS • Residents of the small southeastern Idaho town of Atomic City have been without running water for nearly a week after pumps at the city's two wells failed.

City Councilman Don Sortor says the first pump failed on April 11 and a back-up pump failed last Thursday.

The company that put in the wells said they were no longer under warranty, but council members argued they failed to properly install them.

Workers with the installation company began working on one pump Tuesday. Councilman Dave Sonnenberg says the city hired another company to fix the second pump, and a worker said the wiring was not done properly.

Residents of the community of about 25 have been filing jugs and bottles from a water truck for drinking, cooking and hygiene needs.

Trout Dying in Idaho Falls Pond

IDAHO FALLS • Idaho Fish and Game officials are trying to figure out what is killing rainbow trout in a fishing pond in Idaho Falls.

The agency says more than 100 rainbow trout died in less than a week.

Regional fisheries manager Dan Garren tells KIFI-TV that crews have been running chemical and temperature tests on the water, but have found nothing that would lead to fish deaths. They are waiting on toxicology tests on some of the dead fish.

Garren says the fish come from two separate hatcheries, he believes the problem is something happening in the lake.

He says Fish and Game has stopped stocking the pond for now.

Man Who Set Girlfriend on Fire Get 20 Years

NAMPA • A Nampa man who pleaded guilty to pouring lighter fluid on his girlfriend and lighting a match has been sentenced to 20 years in prison for third degree aggravated arson.

Third District Judge Juneal C. Kerrick sentenced 33-year-old Jesus Montes on Tuesday. Montes must serve at least eight years before he is eligible for parole.

Prosecutors say the 26-

year-old woman sustained burns on 23 percent of her body during the December argument. She was taken to a burn hospital in Salt Lake City in critical condition. Physicians told police the woman would be permanently disfigured by the burns to her hands, chest and face.

Montes pleaded guilty to the arson charge. He has previous convictions for domestic battery in the presence of a child and DUI.

Judge: Can Tamarack Suitor Afford Lawyer?

BOISE • A federal judge is questioning whether an indicted Tamarack Resort suitor should start paying for his own lawyer, rather than having taxpayers pick up the tab.

Matthew Hutcheson faces 31 criminal counts, including allegations he bilked retirement funds of \$5 million.

Now, U.S. Magistrate Candy Dale wants to know whether Hutcheson is so financially bereft that the public must pay for his attorney.

No date has been set for the hearing.

Another Arrest in Attempted Murder Case

ONTARIO, Ore. • A fourth person has been arrested in an eastern Oregon attempted murder case that began with a custody dispute.

The *Ontario Argus Observer* reports that Idaho State Police have arrested 42-year-old Todd Mulvaine of Weiser, Idaho, for investigation of attempted murder. He was taken Monday evening to the Payette County jail.

Mulvaine was arrested in the case of 19-year-old Ramon Fry.

Malheur County, Ore., District Attorney Dan Norris says Fry was shot and wounded Feb. 29 after he returned his child to the Ontario, Ore., home of the child's grandparents after a visitation.


Norris has said there had been a custody dispute involving the child.

The grandparents, 61-year-old Lester Reger and 50-year-old Erlene Reger, pleaded not guilty last month to attempted murder and other charges.

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Bodybuilding.com Agrees to Pay \$7M for Violations

BOISE • Meridian-based Bodybuilding.com LLC has agreed to pay the federal government a \$7 million fine for misdemeanor violations of the Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, according to the U.S. Department of Justice.

In addition, former Bodybuilding.com president Jeremy DeLuca has agreed to pay a \$600,000 fine, as part of a plea agreement with federal prosecutors.

The company and Jeremy DeLuca were charged Tuesday with misdemeanor counts of introduction and delivery for introduction of misbranded drugs for interstate

commerce. They have signed an agreement to plead guilty to those charges on May 24 in front of U.S. Magistrate Judge Candy Dale.

Ryan DeLuca, CEO of Bodybuilding.com, pleaded guilty in April to five federal misdemeanor counts of selling mislabeled dietary supplements that contained steroids. He agreed to pay a \$500,000 fine. Federal authorities said they would not seek jail time.

The plea agreements for both arose from a federal investigation into Bodybuilding.com that resulted in a raid on the company's Meridian headquarters and Boise warehouse in September 2009.

Saudis Emerge as Key U.S. Ally Against Terrorists

Fears that al-Qaida could try to trigger revolts in the kingdom has energized the Saudi government's war against offshoot in Yemen.

WASHINGTON • A decade after hijackers mostly from Saudi Arabia attacked the United States with passenger jets, the Saudis have emerged as the principal ally of the U.S. against al-Qaida's spinoff group in Yemen and at least twice have disrupted plots to explode sophisticated bombs aboard airlines.

Details emerging about the latest unraveled plot revealed that a Saudi double agent fooled the terror group, known as al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula, passing himself off as an eager would-be suicide bomber.

Instead, he secretly turned over the group's most up-to-date underwear bomb to Saudi Arabia, which gave it to the CIA. Before he was whisked to safety, the spy provided intelligence that helped the CIA kill al-Qaida's senior operations leader, Fahd al-Quso, who died in a drone strike last weekend.

The role of Saudi Arabia disrupting the plot follows warnings in 2010 from the oil-rich kingdom about a plot to blow up cargo planes inside the U.S., either on runways or over American cities. That plot involved a frantic chase across five countries of two packages containing bombs powerful enough to down an airplane. Twice, a bomb was aboard a passenger plane. Once, authorities were just minutes too late to stop a cargo jet with a bomb from departing for its next destination. Ultimately, no one died and the packages never exploded.

It hasn't always been this way. Saudi Arabia, the one-time home of Osama bin Laden, failed to spot and stop the 15 Saudi-born hijackers of the 19 who carried out the September 2001 terror attacks. Questions remain whether two Saudi citizens who had at least indirect links with two of the hijackers were reporting to Saudi government officials. U.S. law enforcement officials accused the Saudi government of failing to help adequately in investigations of the al-Qaida attack on the USS Cole in Yemen in 2000 and Hezbollah's bombing of the Khobar Towers housing complex, which killed 19 U.S. servicemen in 1996.

But a series of devastating al-Qaida strikes against Saudi targets in 2003 and more recently, fears al-Qaida could try to trigger Arab Spring-style revolts in the kingdom, has energized the Saudi government in its war against al-Qaida's spinoff in Yemen, which is composed mostly of ex-Saudi militants. Saudi Arabia and the U.S. — with help from Yemen's government — have joined forces to penetrate the terror group at the highest levels.

Drone strikes have killed U.S.-born Anwar al-Awlaki last summer and al-Quso, his successor, more recently.

Al-Quso personally briefed the Saudi double agent, giving him open-ended instructions to pick a U.S.-bound plane on a day of his choosing.

Al-Quso was hit in part due to information gleaned from the double-agent, according to two former officials, speaking on condition of anonymity to preserve their ability to discuss details of current intelligence matters with current officials.

FBI Director Robert Mueller said Wednesday that the FBI is examining the new al-Qaida bomb and urged Congress to renew wide-ranging surveillance authority to thwart similar terrorism plots.

Argentine Senate OKs Laws for Transgender Rights, 'Dignified Death'. Any adult who wants sex-change surgery or hormone therapy in Argentina will be able to demand that their private or public health care companies provide it under a gender rights law approved by the country's congress. And, Argentina's senate on Wednesday overwhelmingly approved a "dignified death" law giving terminally ill patients and their families more power to make end-of-life decisions.

At Least 15 Bodies Found near U.S. Retiree Hamlet in Mexico. Chopped-up parts of at least 15 bodies stuffed in two vans were discovered Wednesday on the road to Lake Chapala, Mexico's largest inland body of fresh water and a popular retirement community for U.S. citizens. The bodies found just south of Guadalajara, in Jalisco state, may be the latest victims in a bloody turf war between the vicious Zetas gang and an offshoot of the powerful Sinaloa cartel, a fight that has bloodied the area around Guadalajara for a year or so.

Postal Service to Keep Rural Post Offices Open

Bending to strong public opposition, the nearly bankrupt U.S. Postal Service on Wednesday backed off a plan to close thousands of rural post offices after Tuesday and proposed keeping them open, but with shorter operating hours. The move to halt the shuttering of 3,700 low-revenue post offices followed months of dissent from rural states and their lawmakers, who said the cost-cutting would hurt their communities the most. In recent weeks, rising opposition had led Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe to visit some rural areas in a bid to ease fears about cuts that could slow delivery of prescription drugs, newspapers and other services. In an election year, the angst over postal closings also extended to nearly half the senators, who in letters last week urged Donahoe to postpone closing any mail facility until Congress approves final postal overhaul legislation.

Obama Backs Gay Marriage

Aides say president's shift will not affect current policies and he continues to believe that marriage is an issue best decided by states.

WASHINGTON • On the fence no longer, President Barack Obama declared his unequivocal support for gay marriage on Wednesday, a historic announcement that gave the polarizing social issue a more prominent role in the 2012 race for the White House.

The announcement was the first by a sitting president, and Republican challenger Mitt Romney swiftly disagreed with it. "I believe that marriage is between a man and a woman," he said while campaigning in Oklahoma.

Gay rights advocates cheered Obama's declaration, which they had long urged him to make. Beyond the words, one man who married his gay partner in Washington, D.C., was stirred to send a \$25 contribution to the president's campaign. "Making a contribution is the best way to say thank you,"

said Stuart Kopperman.

Obama revealed his decision after a series of events that made clear the political ground was shifting. He once opposed gay marriage but more recently had said his views were "evolving."

In an interview with ABC in which he blended the personal and the presidential, Obama said "it wouldn't dawn" on his daughters, Sasha and Malia, that some of their friends' parents would be treated differently than others.

He said he also thought of aides "who are in incredibly committed monogamous same-sex relationships who are raising kids together."

Obama added that he thought about "those soldiers or airmen or Marines or sailors who are out there fighting on my behalf, and yet feel constrained even though now that 'don't ask, don't tell' is gone because they're not able to commit themselves in a marriage."

The president said he was taking a personal position. Aides said the president's shift would have no impact on current policies and he continues to believe that marriage is an issue best decided by states.

Milwaukee Mayor Will Try Again to Beat Walker

MADISON, Wis. • The Democrats' hope for ousting Scott Walker is a low-key, well-liked Milwaukee mayor whose last brush with fame came when he interceded in a fight outside the Wisconsin State Fair and got badly beaten with a tire iron.

With less than a month before the June 5 recall election, it will take all the political muscle Tom Barrett can muster to knock off the Wisconsin governor, who has become a national hero to conservatives and a fundraising powerhouse.

Barrett's recall challenge is a rematch of the 2010 governor's race. In the 18 months since the two men last appeared on the ballot together, Wisconsin has descended into political chaos

fueled by Walker and his aggressive attack on collective bargaining for public-sector workers.

The governor's foes collected more than 900,000 signatures to force the election, which is only the third gubernatorial recall in American history. Now it's up to Barrett to bring home enough votes to remove Walker.

Turnout in Tuesday's primary topped 30 percent, the highest for a

primary in Wisconsin since 1952. Barrett, who defeated three Democratic opponents, gave an impassioned speech to supporters, saying he would heal Wisconsin after more than a year of turmoil.

"He's fired up," said longtime friend Kathy Smith, who was neighbors with Barrett for 11 years around the 1990s. "He's just got this fire in his belly. He wants it!"

It won't be easy.

Since defeating Barrett, Walker has become a GOP star. He's a hot draw at Republican Party events nationwide, and he's shattered fundraising records by bringing in \$25 million, compared with less than \$1 million for Barrett. He's also blanketed mailboxes, phones and television airwaves with ads attacking Barrett.

'Fifty Shades' Too Steamy for Some Library Shelves

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. • Public libraries in several states are pulling the racy romance trilogy "Fifty Shades of Grey" from shelves or deciding not to order the best-seller at all, saying it's too steamy or too poorly written.

Even in the age of e-books and tablets, banning a book from a public library still carries weight

because libraries still play such a vital role in providing people access to books.

"When a book is removed from the shelf, folks who can't afford a Nook or a Kindle, the book is no longer available to them," said Deborah Caldwell Stone, the deputy director of the American Library Association's office for intellectual freedom.

"Fifty Shades of Grey," a nov-

el about bondage, wild sex and yes, love, has been called "mommy porn" because of its popularity among middle-aged women. It has become so well-known that "Saturday Night Live" performed a skit about it, joking that a Kindle with "Fifty Shades" uploaded on it was the perfect Mother's Day gift.

This week, the steamy books hold the top three spots on the

New York Times best-seller list.

Libraries in Wisconsin, Georgia and Florida have all either declined to order the book or pulled it from shelves. Other states may soon follow.

"It's semi-pornographic," said Don Walker, a spokesman for Brevard County, Fla., where the library put 19 copies of the book on the shelves then pulled the novel after reading reviews about it.

Honda Gets Judgment on Hybrid MPG Overturned

LOS ANGELES (AP) • A judge overturned a nearly \$10,000 small claims judgment against American Honda Motor Co. that was won by a car owner who said the automaker misrepresented that her hybrid Civic could get 50 miles per gallon, according to a ruling released Wednesday.

Superior Court Judge Dudley W. Gray II ruled Tuesday on Honda's appeal of a court commissioner's award of \$9,867 to Heather Peters.

Peters had opted out of a class-action settlement and elected instead to sue the automaker on her own.

Peters, a lawyer, also urged Honda owners to take the small-claims route as she did, and her initial success led some 1,700 other hybrid owners to opt out of the class-action settlement.

Poll: Women, Blacks Propel Obama to an Early Lead

Half of registered voters say they would re-elect Obama in November, while 42 percent favor likely Republican rival Mitt Romney.

WASHINGTON • President Barack Obama's popularity among women, minorities and independents is giving him an early edge over his likely GOP rival, Mitt Romney, according to a new Associated Press-GfK poll.

The Democratic president also earns strong marks on empathy, sincerity, likeability and social issues. But Americans are split over which candidate can best handle the economy, which might open pathways for Romney six months before the November election.

Half of registered voters say they would back Obama in November, while 42 percent favor Romney, the AP-GfK poll found. About a quarter of voters indicated they are persuadable, meaning they are undecided or could change their minds before Election Day.

Forty-one percent of voters say they are certain to vote for Obama, and 32 percent say they are locked in for Romney.

The nationwide poll of 1,004 adults comes as Romney is focusing heavily on fundraising after gaining endorsements from all but one

of his GOP rivals, and conservative voters are reminding politicians of their muscle. Republicans in Indiana on Tuesday ousted a six-term senator accused of being too friendly to Obama, and North Carolina voters

overwhelmingly approved a constitutional ban on same-sex marriage.

On Wednesday, however, Obama endorsed gay marriage, a sign that he is eager to fire up young and liberal voters even if it costs him some support in battleground states such as North Carolina, which he narrowly won in 2008.

In the AP-GfK poll, Americans give Obama an edge over Romney on numerous attributes, but handling the economy is a key exception. The public is divided over whether Obama or Romney would do a better job on the issue that strategists say will dominate the fall election. Forty-six percent prefer Obama on this topic, and 44 percent prefer Romney.

Romney, who oversaw the restructuring of several companies while at Bain Capital, says he understands the private sector better than Obama does. Democrats dispute the claim.

If the economic recovery continues to limp slowly, as it has in the past two months, Republicans say voters will become more open to Romney's campaign.

On other issues: Half of adults say Obama is the stronger leader, while 39 percent choose Romney; Obama is more trusted to handle taxes and social issues, and to protect the country.

Support for War at New Low

WASHINGTON • Support for the war in Afghanistan has hit a new low and is on par with support for the Vietnam War in the early 1970s, a bad sign for President Barack Obama as he argues that to end the war responsibly the United States must remain in Afghanistan another two years.

Only 27 percent of Americans say they back the war effort, and 66 percent oppose the war, according to an AP-GfK poll released Wednesday.

A November 1971 Harris poll showed a record-high 65 percent of Americans said that continued fighting in Vietnam was "morally wrong." By that time the United States was already drastically cutting the size of its fighting force in Vietnam on the road to a full withdrawal in 1973.

The 11-year Afghan war has not been highly popular among Americans for many years. A year ago, 37 percent favored the war, and in the spring of 2010, support was at 46 percent.

The AP poll does not spell out why people have changed their minds. But the drop-off in support parallels rising casualties, increased attacks on Americans by the Afghan soldiers they are mentoring and inconclusive battlefield gains that have increased security in many areas of the country but have failed to break the Taliban-led insurgency.

Lugar Loss Has Lessons for Obama, Romney

VALPARAISO, Ind. • President Barack Obama and his presumptive Republican challenger, Mitt Romney, can take a few lessons from veteran Sen. Richard Lugar's loss in Indiana's GOP primary.

Voters are unhappy with incumbents, an ominous sign for the Democratic president in a GOP-leaning state he won four years ago and for nervous lawmakers, many of them running in newly redrawn districts.

Tea party-backed Richard Mourdock's easy win over the six-term Senate fixture also illustrates the deep divide that persists in the Republican base and underscores the thorny task still ahead for Romney, and other GOP candidates hoping the party will unite in time to defeat Obama on Nov. 6.

"We are experiencing deep political divisions in our so-

ciety right now," Lugar, 80, one of the nation's longest-serving senators, said in a statement after Tuesday's election results were known. "These divisions have stalemated progress in critical areas. But these divisions are not insurmountable."

The loss of Lugar — who boasted of strong conservative credentials but was lambasted by critics for working

with Democrats — also highlights the degree to which deal-makers are becoming a rarity on a Capitol Hill often consumed by partisan gridlock. He follows Sen. Olympia Snowe, R-Maine, a moderate known for bipartisanship, in leaving the Senate at year's end. Others too, including former Sen. Evan Bayh, D-Ind., have left in recent years.

Wreck Found of Russia Jet on Indonesia Demo Flight

CIDAHU, Indonesia (AP) • Helicopters spotted the scattered wreckage of a Russian-made passenger plane on the side of a mist-shrouded mountain Thursday after it disappeared during a demonstration flight in Indonesia with 47 people on board. There was no sign of survivors.

Family members who spent the night at the airport broke down in tears on hearing the news.

"Rescuers on the helicopters could clearly see the wreckage located at the top of Mount Salak," including the blue-and-white of the aircraft maker, said Gagah Prakoso, a spokesman for the Search and Rescue National Agency.

"There is no sign of any of the passengers," he said. "We're trying to move in closer to the wreckage now."

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Rights Activists Say Myanmar Reforms Leave Many Political Prisoners Behind

Although the military-backed government has released hundreds of well-known dissidents over the past year, hundreds remain wrongfully locked away.

YANGON, Myanmar • In a remote prison in northwest Myanmar, Aye Aung wakes up each day as he has for nearly 14 years — alone in a dark cell on a wooden plank, a prisoner of conscience all but forgotten by the world.

For hours, the former student activist meditates and reads the books his father brings from afar every other month. But mostly, he lives in the mind-numbing boredom of captivity. Now 36, he has never seen a cell phone, never surfed the Internet, never married or had children.

Although Myanmar's military-backed government has released hundreds of well-known dissidents over the past year as part of a startling series of reforms that have earned it lavish praise and an easing of sanctions, rights advocates say hundreds more remain wrongfully locked away — their cases in danger of being forgotten amid rising hope for a more open, democratic nation.

"If this government is really changing, why have they not freed my son?" asked his mother, San Myint, as tears slid down her cheeks during an interview in Yangon.

"He's done nothing wrong," the visibly shaken 66-year-old told The Associated Press at her home, where one wall is adorned with a prominent picture of a youthful Aye Aung smiling broadly as he plays guitar beside a friend. "It's cruel and unfair. We just want him to come home."

Aye Aung's troubles began in late 1998, when he was arrested and sentenced months later to a 59-year prison term for his role in a pro-democracy student movement. He had distributed pamphlets and participated in a rare

public protest, both of which were deemed by authorities a threat to state security.

His sentence has since been halved, but he still must serve about 15 more years. Until then, he remains incarcerated in the Kalay prison of Myanmar's distant northwest, a three-day bus ride from his family's Yangon home. His parents say he suffers from stomach problems and sporadic bouts of malaria, and medical treatment in the prison is poor.

Myanmar, meanwhile, is moving on.

Global investors are lining up to do business. Tourists are arriving in droves. Foreign dignitaries jet in every few days to discuss a brighter future. U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon urged

Western nations during a visit this month to ease sanctions further and boost aid.

Win Mra, who heads a government-appointed National Human Rights Commission appointed last year, said he has made some attempt to get remaining prisoners on the agenda, but acknowledged it's not a government priority.

"If there are prisoners of conscience remaining, yes, they should be released," Win Mra said. "But it's a moot point right now because there are so many other things happening."

According to a count by Human Rights Watch, President Thein Sein's administration freed at least 659 political prisoners over the past year. They included well-

known student activists, Buddhist monks who rose up in 1988 and 2007, journalists and ethnic minority leaders.

Since then, however, the issue has largely been dropped because, after the last amnesty on Jan. 13., "the Home Ministry stated clearly that they freed all of them," Win Mra said.

That any political prisoners were released at all is significant because Myanmar's leaders traditionally have denied they exist. The government argues that the accused broke laws threatening security or national stability; rights groups say many were wrongfully convicted and given extreme sentences for actions that would not even be considered crimes elsewhere.

Myanmar's Suu Kyi Gets First Passport in 24 Years

YANGON, Myanmar (AP) • Myanmar opposition leader Aung San Suu Kyi received her first passport in 24 years on Tuesday ahead of a planned trip to Norway and Britain.

An aide to Suu Kyi, Htin Kyaw, said the passport was received from the Home Ministry.

Suu Kyi applied for the passport following recent political reforms that culminated in her election to parliament last month. Last year, a long-ruling military junta handed over power to an elected, nominally civilian government. Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy, which won 43 seats in the April by-elections, will lead the small opposition bloc.

The passport is valid for three years. She has not had a passport since she returned to Myanmar in 1988 to take care of her ailing mother, and was required by law then to hand it in.

After becoming leader of the country's pro-democracy movement, she was put under house arrest for 15 of the following 22 years of military rule. Her confinement kept her from attending the ceremony in Norway at which she was awarded the 1991 Nobel Peace Prize. She plans to visit the country in June.

During intermittent periods of freedom, Suu Kyi declined opportunities to go abroad for fear she would not be allowed to re-enter Myanmar, and so was unable to visit her British husband, Oxford don Michael Aris, before his death from cancer in 1999. They last saw each other in 1995, after which the junta denied Aris a visa.

Since her release in November 2010 from her last term of house arrest, Suu Kyi had been invited to visit by several foreign governments. Recently, U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon invited her to the U.N. headquarters in New York where she once worked.

During a brief visit to Myanmar in April, British Prime Minister David Cameron also invited Suu Kyi to visit the United Kingdom, saying it would be a sign of progress if she were able to leave Myanmar and then return to carry out her duties as a lawmaker.

Blast Near UN Car Shows Fragility of Syrian Truce

DARAA, Syria • A roadside bomb hit a Syrian military truck Wednesday just seconds after the head of the U.N. observer team drove by in a convoy, demonstrating the fragility of the international plan to end the country's bloodshed.

In Washington, meanwhile, President Barack Obama took steps to extend sanctions against the government of President Bashar Assad, saying Syria poses an "unusual and extraordinary threat" to U.S. national security and diplomatic goals.

The attack, which the regime said wounded 10 Syrian soldiers, emphasized the limits of the international community's plan to use unarmed observers to promote a cease-fire between government troops and rebels trying to topple Assad.

The team of 70 U.N. military observers now in Syria should grow to more than 100 in the coming days. It is unclear when the full team of 300 will arrive. They are to oversee a U.N.-brokered cease-fire that was intended to allow for talks on a political solution to the conflict but began unraveling shortly after it was due to take effect on April 12.

U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon condemned the attack, saying the continuing violence undermines the plan, which is "possibly the only remaining chance to stabilize the country and avert a civil war."

The peace plan has been troubled from the start, with government troops shelling opposition areas and rebels attacking military convoys

and checkpoints despite the cease-fire.

Many civilians have grown critical of the plan, saying it does not protect them from regime forces.

U.S. State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland said the roadside blast that hit troops escorting the U.N. monitors was "further evidence that the cease-fire is not holding."

Although the daily death toll has dropped in recent days, international envoy Kofi Annan said Tuesday that the level of violence is unacceptable and that the plan's failure could lead to civil war.

Wednesday's blast, witnessed by an AP reporter who was traveling with the United Nations, provided a close-up example of the attacks on security forces that have become almost daily events.

The bomb went off as Maj. Gen. Robert Mood, the Norwegian head of the U.N. observer team, rode in a clearly marked armored white Land Cruiser from the capital, Damascus, to the southern city of Daraa, where Syria's uprising began.

The explosion, which occurred at about 11:20 a.m. after the convoy had passed a military checkpoint, shattered the windows of the Syrian military truck and sent up a cloud of smoke and red sand. The truck sped into the city, where several bloodied soldiers were rushed to a hospital.

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Euro 2012 a Political Headache for Ukraine

KIEV, Ukraine • Soccer's European Championship was Ukraine's chance to shine: forge closer ties with the West, boost its international standing and aid its struggling economy.

Instead, it's turned into a major headache.

In a move reminiscent of the Cold War, top EU officials have vowed to boycott matches held in Ukraine over the alleged mistreatment of jailed former Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko. Critics warn that fans may be put off by exorbitant Ukrainian hotel prices and that the cash-strapped government has endangered the country by spending as much as \$14 billion on the championship.

"This was a chance to show off the country because a thousand journalists will come here," said Oleh Rybachuk, a member of Tymoshenko's first Cabinet who has turned into a civic activist. "Now those thousand journalists will come and write about a million problems."

"The image, political and economic benefits — I don't see any," Rybachuk said.

Ukraine was awarded the

2012 Euros along with neighboring Poland in 2007 in a decision meant to reward and promote the two soccer-loving ex-Communist Eastern European countries, with Poland already a proud member of the EU and Ukraine aspiring

to join. Back then, the Ukrainian economy was booming and the West was infatuated with the country after the 2004 pro-democracy mass protests known as the Orange Revolution brought to power a Western government.

Ukraine is an entirely different story today as the tournament opener next month approaches.

Tymoshenko, the charismatic blond-braided Orange Revolution heroine and the top opposition leader, is serving a seven-year prison

sentence for abuse of office. Western countries decried the conviction last year as politically motivated persecution by the regime of President Viktor Yanukovich, whose fraud-tainted election victory Tymoshenko helped overthrow in 2004.

Court Victory for Ex-Village People Lead Singer Willis

LOS ANGELES (AP) • A judge in Los Angeles says the original lead singer of the Village People can reclaim at least partial ownership of the copyrights to more than two dozen of the group's songs, including "Y.M.C.A.," "Macho Man," and "In the Navy."

U.S. District Judge Barry T. Moskowitz on Monday rejected a lawsuit by two music publishers who argued that Victor Willis had no right to regain ownership of 33 songs that he co-wrote for the group while under contract.

It's the first test of a decades-old copyright provision and could mean millions in additional royalties for Willis.

The former San Diego resident tells *U-T San Diego* that the ruling benefits all songwriters.

But Stewart Levy, an attorney for Scorpio Music and Can't Stop Productions, tells the *New York Times* that it doesn't lay out how much Willis will get and the case is far from over.

"I have hesitated on gay marriage in part because I thought that civil unions would be sufficient," Obama said in the interview. He added, "I was sensitive to the fact that for a lot of people the word 'marriage' was something that evokes very powerful traditions, religious beliefs and so forth."

Now, he said, "it is important for me personally to go ahead and affirm that same-sex couples should be able to get married."

He spoke on the heels of a pair of events that underscored the sensitivity of an issue that has long divided the nation.

Vice President Joe Biden said in an interview on Sunday that he is completely comfortable with gays marrying, a pronouncement that instantly raised the profile of the issue. White House aides insisted the vice president hadn't said anything particularly newsworthy, but gay rights groups cited Biden's comments in urging the president to announce his support.

On Tuesday, voters in North Carolina — a potential battleground in the fall election — approved an amendment to the state constitution affirming that marriage may only be a union of a man and a woman.

Additionally, several of the president's biggest financial backers are gay, and some have prodded him publicly to declare his support for same-sex marriage.

Senior administration officials said Obama came to the conclusion that gay couples should have the right to legally marry earlier this year and had planned to make his views known publicly before the Democratic National Convention in early Septem-

ber. They conceded that Biden's comments accelerated the timeline, but said the vice president's remarks were impromptu and not part of a coordinated effort to soften the ground for a shift by the president. They spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss internal White House deliberations.

As recently as eight years ago, conservatives in several states maneuvered successfully to place questions relating to gay marriage on the election day ballot as a way of boosting turnout for President George W. Bush's reelection.

Now, nationwide polling suggests increasing acceptance of gay marriage. In a national survey released earlier this month, Gallup reported 50 percent of those polled said it should be legal, and 48 percent were opposed. Democrats favored by a margin of roughly 2-1, while Republicans opposed it by an even bigger margin. Among independents, 57 percent expressed support, and 40 percent were opposed.

Whatever the polls, the political cross-currents are tricky, and administration officials conceded as much.

Some top aides argued that gay marriage is toxic at the ballot box in competitive states like North Carolina and said the vote there this week shows that opposition to the issue is a rallying point for Republicans.

Shifting his emphasis, even briefly, could open Obama up to Republican criticism that he is taking his eye off the economy, voters' No. 1 issue.

Yet some prominent gay donors have said publicly they wanted Obama to announce his support for gay marriage. Other Democratic supporters claim Obama's decision could energize huge swaths of the party, including young people. He also could appeal to independent voters.


The decision also creates an area of clear contrast between Obama and his Republican rival as he argues that he's delivered on the change he promised four years ago.

Obama said he sometimes talks with college Republicans on his visits to campuses, and while they oppose his policies on the economy and foreign policy, "when it comes to same sex equality, or, you know, sexual orientation, that they believe in equality. They are more comfortable with it."



A PEAK IN PASSION

A Buhl resident rides his road bike thousands of miles each year for fun and fitness.

BUHL • Ken Hulse is a nice guy, but there's a reason he usually rides his bike alone.

"I can't keep up with him," said Mike Goudy, owner of Spoke and Wheel Bike Shop in Twin Falls and a six-year friend of the Buhl resident. "He's an animal on a road bike. He really puts on the miles."

Hulse chuckles at the characterization, although it has the ring of truth. The 53-year-old cyclist has averaged 8,000 miles each of the past five years.

And he's not satisfied with that. "I want a 10,000-mile year," he said Monday before a tour along the winding roads northwest of town. That equates to more than 27 miles a day for 365 consecutive days.

Hulse is the owner of Buhl's Texaco station and works from 4 a.m. to noon. He likes the schedule because it leaves afternoons free for riding. He covers 70 miles on a typical day.



Goudy's comments notwithstanding, Hulse said his habit of riding solo is mainly because no one else is available during the afternoon.

"My wife calls me nuts, but she's very supportive," Hulse said.

He participates in events such as the 205-mile Seattle to Portland ride and the 208-mile race from

Logan, Utah, to Jackson, Wyo. The latter takes riders over three major mountain summits with 12,000 to 15,000 feet of total climbing.

Hulse said the 177-mile Tour de

Park City, another Utah event, has even more elevation gain and loss and is physically tougher. Riders crest a pass at 10,700 feet on one of the highest roads in the U.S.

"You're in nosebleed country after doing 120 miles," Hulse said, smiling at the memory. "You're beat."

By comparison, the Seattle-to-Portland jaunt is a breeze. He's

ACCESS CLOSED TO AUGER FALLS TRAIL

TWIN FALLS • Hikers and bicyclists hoping to reach the Auger Falls trail in the Snake River Canyon by its main access route are out of luck.

The city of Twin Falls has closed the road to the trailhead due to construction of a new sewer line. Dennis Bowyer, director of the Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department, said he hopes the road will re-open by early July.

Access is blocked to citizens because of safety concerns along the road, he said. Canyon Springs Road remains open to its turnoff to Canyon Springs Golf Course. Bowyer said there is access to the area from the north,

but it's only viable when Snake River water levels are low. That route begins near Jerome Golf Course, heading south on Yingst Road. A bridge spans the river to the southern trail.

"People have been accessing that route for years and years," Bowyer said.

However, Bureau of Land Management outdoor recreation planner Max Yingst hesitated to recommend the route. Yingst said the unpaved road is steep and he is unsure of the bridge's adequacy for foot traffic.

Meanwhile, when the sewer line project is completed, city officials plan to move the Auger Falls trailhead one mile west from its current site. That would reduce the 3.5-mile trail to the falls to 2.5 miles one way.

No Boredom Here

Natural Resources Camp exposes Magic Valley students to outdoors recreation and career options.

TWIN FALLS • There's one thing that Natural Resources Camp alum would like prospective campers to know — it's fun. Really.

No matter what the brochures and even news articles like this one say, Natural Resources Camp is not all about learning, all of the time. It's not a nerd camp. It's not BOR-RING..

"It's a lot of fun," said Jane Snelling. She's already getting ready to head back for her fifth year; two as a camper, one as a counselor in training and now her second year as a counselor.

Snelling says the atmosphere of camp is what draws her back year after year. "It's the beauty of being up there. You meet new people you never would meet otherwise. For the most part, everyone loves why you are up there."

In all honesty, there are lectures and labs during the day. But the instructors

work hard to incorporate fun into those sessions. And then there's the setting. Imagine spending a week north of Sun Valley learning about forestry, soils, range, wildlife and water.

"After the second or third day, you are like a big family. It's not all about the learning," she said.

Students take the basic knowledge they acquire to the field where they learn how to identify plants and range communities, test water for insects and other water quality parameters, dig soil pits, examine a soil profile and core a tree to determine its age.

Snelling has also applied principles she has learned at camp to classroom assignments. Understanding problems and recognizing how actions affect the environment are just some of the skills she has acquired.

Natural Resources Camp has also exposed her to career options in natural resources. When she had an

Known by Many Names, Sunfish Can Be Fun to Catch and Eat

DALLAS • Sunfish have more aliases than an international criminal. In the Deep South, redear sunfish are called shell crackers because of their pharyngeal teeth that allow them to crush the shells of snails and small mollusks.

Through the sunfish's considerable range, versions of these mostly small, often colorful and usually plentiful fish are variously referred to as sunny, goggle-eye, pumpkinseed, stumpknocker, chinquapin and other nicknames.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fisheries biologist Craig Bonds says the only sunfish commonly found in Texas that isn't a native is the redbreast sunfish. It's been introduced, as have a variety of bluegills, the best known of the Texas sunfish.

Though a very sporting fish to catch on light tackle and the makings of a fish fry to rival a saltwater flounder or a freshwater crappie, Bonds says most bluegills are stocked to feed largemouth bass.

"Bluegills are highly prolific compared to other sunfishes because they continue to spawn throughout the growing season," Bonds says. "Bass and bluegill interactions have been studied for over 60 years. As prolific as bluegills are, an abundant bass population can easily outstrip their prey supply, especially in small waters."

That's why TPWD still stocks bluegills. Todd Engeling, the state's director of hatcheries, estimates the agency has stocked more than 6 million bluegills in the last 10 years. The annual stocking number varies widely, depending on requests from regional biologists.

Cliff Hilbert of Plano calls sunfish "bream," pronounced "brim." He knows a thing or two about catching them, particularly on a fly rod. Hilbert holds four state records and 88 fly-fishing records for catching sunfish in various water bodies.

Rick Pope grew up fishing for sunfish, all of which were generically termed "perch" in his circle of friends and family. Pope founded Dallas-based Temple Fork Outfitters, a popular brand of fishing tackle. TFO's specialty is fly rods, including many that are perfect for sunfish.

Sunfish Facts

- A female bluegill usually spawns the first time when it's a year old, but it can spawn as early as 4 months old.
- A bluegill's body length is about 2 to 26 times its body depth.
- Bluegills readily adapt to eating fish food. Fish weighing 1 pound are not uncommon where they're fed daily.
- A bluegill may eat six times its weight in insects in a single summer.
- Bass are occasionally found dying on the surface with a bluegill that's too big to swallow lodged in the bass' mouth. It's the classic case of what your mother used to tell you about heaping too much food on your plate — your eyes are too big for your stomach.

Expert Fly-fishing Tips for Sunfish

Cliff Hilbert: Look for cover where bream can hide — logs, brush, weed beds — and fish mainly those areas. Bream like a place where they have quick access to safety if chased by predators. They also like the shade. If you see a tree hanging over the water, providing shade, cast under it.

Rick Pope: Keep your rod tip on the water. You want the retrieve to be a small twitch with no slack in the line; direct contact with the fly works best. If you keep your rod tip high, you won't have a good feel for the take and the slack line above the water will drag the fly. Also, if you feel a take, a short strip of 6 inches or so is better than trying to set the hook with the rod. If the take is a "leg nibbler," you won't take the fly completely away from the fish.

Hilbert: Fish topwater flies in the morning until

the sun comes up, then switch to sinking flies such as nymphs, cap spiders, tiny Clousers — anything that looks like an insect.

Bluegill feed mainly on insects, including larva and pupa forms.

Pope: This time of year, when sunfish are just getting on their spawning beds, catching them can be a bit of a challenge. The most fun is when the fish hit a small popper or foam critter on top. Otherwise, I like a very slow sinking fly with legs.

As with surface patterns, you really can't fish the flies too slowly.

Hilbert: This is prime bream spawning season, so look for bunches of dinner-plate sized beds in open areas. Most of the beds will be deeper than you can see, but many will be visible. When you find visible beds, fish the outer edges first so you won't spook the other fish. Also, try several yards off the beds in deeper water; because that's where the big ones hang out.

Mom, Author Shares Value of Mountain Hikes

CHICAGO • Of all the radical things Patricia Ellis Herr has done — which includes hiking 4,000-foot mountains with 4- and 5-year-olds — perhaps the most radical is a phrase she dared to put to paper.

"A child rarely needs to hear the phrase 'be careful,'" writes Herr, author of "Up: A Mother and Daughter's Peak-bagging Adventure" (Broadway).

"I remember very clearly being a child and being underestimated and, from a very young age, feeling really angry at that," Herr says. "There's a more respectful way to be safe but still let them try things and not hover."

"Up" recounts Herr's 15-month "peakbagging" journey up 48 of New Hampshire's White Mountains. (Peakbagging is a type of hiking in which the climbers aim to reach the summit of a set of mountains.) The journey is made notable, of course, by the presence of Herr's 5-year-old daughter, Alex, who braves thunderstorms, snow and meddled fellow hikers of the "Maybe your mama should take you home now" variety. (Alex, now 9, has a younger sister, Sage, 7, who started hiking the same 4,000-footers at age 4.)

In the course of conquering mountains, Herr and her daughter witnessed magnificent views, gained respect for wildlife and collected enough nuggets of wisdom to guide them through whatever life tosses their way. We spoke with Herr recently.

Q: How do you gather the courage to let a child take on this challenge?

A: It's just a general attitude I've always had. I've always been the mom who lets my kids go up the slide at the playground, as long as no one's waiting to come down. I think a lot of it comes from memories of not being allowed to do things as a kid and never being given a good reason why.

Q: How different was your childhood from your daughters'?

A: Night and day. I love my parents. They're good people. They're not hikers and aren't big outdoors people, so our life in the suburbs didn't offer much opportunity to go out and do much exploring. Hugh (Herr's husband) spent his childhood hiking and climbing and exploring. His parents would take him and his brothers and sisters away for three months each year to hike, so this isn't that far off from the way he was raised. That opportunity just wasn't there when I was a kid.

Q: Are you surprised by people who don't think you should let your daughters hike so young?

A: The vast majority of the feedback has been positive and supportive. We've been confronted by a few people, but I think it's just human nature to start doubting what you don't understand. I think the objections are more about people's own insecurities. Or they're just bored and need something to talk about.

Q: The chapters titles are some of the lessons you learned. "Ignore the naysayers." "Some risks are worth taking." Did the hikes also instill a sense of optimism in your daughter?

A: I don't know about that. I think (peakbagging) helps them understand that life's not always going to be easy and if they want to do something they can do it, but it might not be a bed of roses. I hate the fact that they have to deal with comments and expectations because they're female. We've heard multiple times a boy — right next to his mom — say things like "You're running like a girl!" or "Don't whine like a girl!" It makes me angry, but they realize they have to work hard and deal with some things they'd rather not deal with to get where they want to go. And that's life.

More M.V. Waters Open for Fishing

JEROME • Fishing in the Magic Valley region is picking up. Here are some of the waters that are open and where anglers have reported success:

Little Camas is ice free and almost backed up to Highway 20. The road is mostly dry with some ruts due to the spud trucks hauling out spuds. Boat ramp is in the water.

Anderson Ranch Reservoir is ice free. Elk Creek, Curlew and Pine boat ramps are open. No docks are in the water.

Mountain Home Reservoir is full. Anglers are out. The South Fork of the Boise below Anderson Dam is closed to all fishing until May 26.

Magic Reservoir is ice free and all boat ramps

are accessible. Little Wood Reservoir is ice free. Boat dock has not been placed at the launch yet. No report of catch rates.

At Carey Lake, fishing for bass, perch and bluegill has been very slow.

This summer the hatchery at Niagara Springs is closed to the public for construction, but this doesn't mean the fishing is closed. Niagara Springs State Park (Pugmire Park) and the day-use park located east of the hatchery are still open. Anglers can access the hatchery intake on the park side. There is no parking available at the hatchery.

New Permit Proposed for Wood River Valley Guide Service

SHOSHONE • A new permit proposal would allow a federal agency to issue a 10-year special recreation permit to a Wood River Valley guide service.

The permit would include tours in the Croy

Creek trail network; BLM trails on Bald Mountain; and Quigley Canyon, Indian Creek and Slaughterhouse roads. However, the permit would not give Sun Valley Trekking exclusive right of use of the trails and roads.

completed it three times, usually in about nine and a half hours. Going down to sea level after training at 3,700 feet is delicious, he said.

"I can crank out 25 miles an hour all day long on that one."

Hulse isn't trying to prove something with his athletic rides. Instead, he just wants to keep fit by pursuing the sport he loves. It's clearly working because he could pass for someone at least 10 years younger.

He enters about five races

a year, saying they give him motivation to ride.

Cycling wasn't Hulse's first love. The 1977 Buhl High School graduate played city league baseball and basketball as a teenager. Later he took up rock climbing, scuba, hiking, golf and any other sport that came along.

But in 2004 he broke his leg playing basketball and it changed the future. Hulse split his tibia, which required a plate and nine screws in his knee joint.

"My doctor said, 'Ken, your running and jumping days are over. I asked what I could do to stay in shape and he told me to get a bike.'"

Hulse rode 4,000 miles the first year and 6,000 the next, "Just for fun."

Now he intersperses his 100- and 200-mile races with shorter events featuring severe elevation gains. The Bogus Basin Hill Climb in Boise, for example, is 15 miles of straight climbing. A similar event in Wells, Nev., is two miles shorter but even steeper.

Hulse prefers the longer races, particularly on flat courses, because his 6-foot-4, 200-pound frame isn't built for climbing. However, he makes a nice shield for riders who draft behind him on windy days.

The father of six has three

bikes, each with its own purpose and name. "Nancy" is his racing bike — a Trek Madrone model with a carbon fiber frame that weighs less than 2 pounds. The entire bike, including wheels, weighs 15 pounds.

"Betsy" is the one Hulse rides five miles roundtrip to and from work each day that snow doesn't cover the streets. "She's my workhorse," he said.

When it's really windy or bad winter weather has set in, Hulse hops onto "Bertha," a heavy stationary bike in his home's basement. He watches videos on his laptop while a fan whirs away a few feet from

his face.

Hulse, whose resting pulse rate is 50, pushes his heart to 130-140 beats during most of his training, although he hits 175 to 190 "when I really push it."

His worst spill came during the Sawtooth Century ride north of Ketchum on an extremely windy day. Hulse led midway through the race and took a look behind, trying to spot a rider he could draft off of.

That's when a big gust knocked him off the bike with Hulse landing on his hip and shoulder. It knocked the wind out of him and he thought his hip was broken, but his concern

was elsewhere.

"The first thing I thought was, 'Oh, my bike!'"

The impact cracked his helmet, and it took a few minutes to regain his composure. Then Hulse began riding over Galena Summit and the final 50 miles to Ketchum. He still has road rash scars on an elbow and knee.

He counts himself lucky with just three falls during a combined 60,000 miles of riding. Usually there's nothing but bliss on the road and he particularly enjoys desert terrain.

"I absolutely love it," Hulse said. "I like the solitude, being able to think"

donating time, parts and labor.

I was there for much of it, watching and writing stories about the team's progress. I couldn't make it to the unveiling but was happy to know how far the team had progressed.

The unveiling was on Aug. 10, 2011, when the team gathered at KLIM Co., one of its sponsors, in Rigby. That's

also when tragedy struck.

During the event, Allinen took KLIM representative Nathan Blaylock on a celebratory ride promoting the buggy. A Chevrolet Suburban driven by Briana Tustian of Rigby mashed into the back of the machine, killing Blaylock and seriously injuring Allinen.

My stomach dropped when I heard the news.

Ever since — while Blaylock was laid to rest and Allinen was recovering from neck and back injuries — the

buggy sat alone with blood stains on its seat covers.

Allinen originally wanted to repair the machine, but memories of the crash have haunted him and his team and they couldn't bring themselves to work on it.

Thank goodness for Naylor, who visited Allinen's home April 27.

It'd be a shame, Naylor said, if the crash were the last chapter for the dune buggy.

"One chapter has ended," he said as he secured the

buggy onto a trailer. "But now another is opening."

Naylor said he's impressed with the craftsmanship that went into its customization and plans to use it as a pattern for other buggies in his

growing collection.

Allinen and his team plan to use the money from the sale to apply for nonprofit status for their intended youth center.

Still, there were mixed emotions as Naylor drove off

with the blue buggy strapped to his trailer.

"I'm sad to see it go, but happy to see it leave," said 15-year-old LBZ member Rachell Allinen.

I also felt a little tug of the heartstrings.

opportunity to job shadow through her high school, she chose to spend the day with personnel from the federal Bureau of Land Management.

That's exactly what organizers hope campers will bring home with them after a week at Natural Resources Camp.

"We hope being at Natural Resources Camp will strengthen campers' appreciation of Idaho's natural resources and help them become good stewards," said Amber Moore, University of

Idaho extension soils specialist. "And that they will develop a love of one topic that they may possibly pursue as a career."

But organizers recognize family financial resources often determine whether a potential camper can participate. And even though gas prices have begun to soften, it's still an expense that may put camp out of reach for some students. That's why the University of Idaho is helping coordinate

carpooling efforts.

Natural Resources Camp is June 25-30 at the University of Idaho 4-H Camp near Sun Valley. It is for students 12 to 14 years old.

Registration forms are available at the Balanced Rock, Snake River and Twin Falls conservation districts' office (733-5380, ext 3; or 1441 Fillmore St A., Twin Falls). To be considered for a scholarship, students must submit their applications to the conservation district office by May 21. 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


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
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

U.S. Stocks Fall as Europe Doubts Bubble to Surface

NEW YORK (AP) • Fear of European debt is once again playing havoc with Wall Street. Stocks pitched down Wednesday in the United States as borrowing rates climbed for Spain and Italy, a sign that investors are losing confidence in those countries' finances. Spain's 10-year borrowing rate leapt to 6.06 percent from 5.70 percent early Tuesday. Many fear that Spain, strangled by high unemployment and a real estate collapse, could be the next nation to require financial rescue. The Dow Jones industrial average was down as much as 184 points before recovering about half of the loss. The Dow closed down 97.03 points, or 0.8 percent, at 12,835.06. The Standard & Poor's 500 index and Nasdaq composite average both closed well above their lows for the day. The S&P fell 9.14 points, or 0.7 percent, to 1,354.58. The Nasdaq dropped 11.56, or 0.4 percent, to 2,934.71.

Cattle Prices Jump as Ranchers Begin Rebuilding

FRANKSTON, Texas • A cow runs circles in a small pen, her baby close by her side. Ranchers, their brows wrinkled, scribble in a glossy catalog while high on a podium the auctioneer slams his gavel, taking bids as the price of the pair rises rapidly.

The high-profile auction at the Neches River Ranch gave cattlemen a good indication of how long it might take to rebuild after Texas' devastating drought and what it might cost them.

A quality cow that sold last year for no more than \$1,800 now fetches about \$3,000. The average price for a bull is up \$500. And a cow with a 300-pound to 400-pound calf by her side is selling for about \$2,800, sometimes more than \$3,000 — almost double the \$1,700 they commanded two years ago.

"Since we've gotten rain and everything, the price has really jumped up," said John Dixon, a rancher near Elkhart, who with a slight nod of his head bought a \$7,000 cow. "They sold at a pretty good level all the way through."

Last year's historic drought forced ranchers to cut their herds because they had no grass and couldn't afford high hay prices. Hundreds of thousands of cattle were slaughtered or sent out of the state, leaving Texas, the largest livestock producer in the nation, with its smallest herd since the 1950s.

Then, after a year of record-breaking heat and an almost complete lack of rain, winter rains broke records. Ponds filled. The grass turned green. Ranchers began looking for cattle, and many — along with analysts, feedlots and livestock dealers — kept a close eye on the GeneTrust auction held in the rolling hills of East Texas on a ranch owned by the Caveners, a family more often known for selling boots and hats in western stores than cattle genetics.

"The big question looming in everybody's mind now is: Are we going to have another summer like we had last summer?" explained Doak Lambert, the auctioneer. "If I go and invest all this money and buy these cattle and pay a premium for them, and then we end up in a drought situation again this summer and I have to liquidate them, where do I sit financially? So there's a lot of risk involved right now?"

Yet "the mood is good," Lambert

added. "The American cattleman is, I guess, the biggest risk-taker I know, and he's also the biggest optimist I know."

Jason Cleere, a rancher and beef cattle specialist with Texas AgriLife Extension at Texas A&M University, believes that while ranchers are restocking, they remain cautious. The rains have slowed significantly in the past month, and many ranchers are heeding climatologists' warnings that the next decade in Texas will be relatively dry. They're keeping herds small so they're better prepared for the next, inevitable, dry spell.

"Ranchers in general have been a little bit more conservative on going out and rebuilding because they want to see what happens as we move into the summer," Cleere said. "Ranchers went through a lot of cash reserves last summer, and they can't do that again this year."

With cattle prices high, cash reserves low, the weather uncertain and calves taking nine months to be born and several years to be ready for slaughter, many estimate the beef industry may need five years to fully recover.

It's a layered business. There are those who raise cattle for breeding. They sell to ranchers who raise cattle for beef and breed their herds to restock. Livestock dealers buy cattle from those ranchers and sell the animals to feedlots, where they are fattened up before heading to slaughterhouses.

The drought impacts each differently.

Mary Lou Bradley raises bulls in the Texas Panhandle town of Memphis to sell to ranchers for breeding. She spent more than \$100,000 on hay to keep her animals fed during the drought, which is still gripping her area, and now she's looking for new markets. Her Bradley 3 Ranch sold a number of bulls this year in Florida, Colorado and Missouri, but because Texas has relatively few cows left, there was little need there for males for breeding.

Bradley has been keeping an eye on bull sales and hoping for a turnaround. Some saw record prices. At other auctions, barely anyone showed up. Some were cancelled because ranchers feared they would not have buyers, she said.

"People are not buying back yet," Bradley said, noting that sales in Nebraska, Montana and other states that have had good rain have been better than in Texas. Even in western Oklahoma, which has largely recovered from the drought, ranchers remain nervous.

Honda Wins Appeal of Small-claims Judgment

LOS ANGELES • A judge overturned a nearly \$10,000 small claims judgment against American Honda Motor Co. that was won by a car owner who said the automaker misrepresented that her hybrid Civic could get 50 miles per gallon, according to a ruling released Wednesday.

Superior Court Judge Dudley W. Gray II ruled Tuesday on Honda's appeal of a court commissioner's award of \$9,867 to Heather Peters.

Gray's ruling found, among other things, that Peters had standing to bring the case in state court, but it's actually federal regulations that govern fuel economy ratings and related advertising claims.

Peters had opted out of a class-action settlement giving some 200,000 owners between \$100 and \$200 each, plus a rebate if they buy a new Honda. She elected instead to sue the automaker on her own.

Peters, a lawyer, also urged Honda owners to take the small-claims route as she did, and her initial success led some 1,700 other hybrid owners to opt out of the class-action settlement. It wasn't clear how many have filed similar small claims actions, but Honda said Wednesday it had prevailed in 16 of 17 cases across the nation since January.

The ruling by Gray will not have a direct effect on any other cases. However, a legal observer said it could pose a challenge to those pursuing small claims actions.

"I think it will make it harder for them to fight their case on an individual basis," said Aaron Jacoby, a class action lawyer in Los Angeles who is not involved with the Honda case.

News Corp 3Q Beats Street Despite Probe

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Rupert Murdoch's News Corp., the global media conglomerate under fire for phone hacking and alleged bribery in Britain, posted a 47 percent increase in third-quarter net income thanks to strong performances at its U.S. pay-TV networks and movie studio.

The results beat analyst expectations. The company also announced it would buy back another \$6.1 billion worth of shares in the coming year — on top of the \$3.9 billion worth it bought in the last 11 months — a move that should bolster News Corp.'s stock and assuage lingering fears that Murdoch might squander company cash on expensive acquisitions.

The company's shares rose 51 cents, or 2.6 percent, to \$19.89 in after-hours trading.

News Corp.'s shares have traded at a discount to its media peers because of what investors view as its poor use of cash, which is generated mainly from pay TV networks such as Fox News and its broadcast TV stations. With its planned takeover of British Sky Broadcasting derailed by the hacking scandal, analysts welcomed the share buy-back plan.

"It's comforting to see them buying back stock," said Lazard Capital analyst Barton Crockett. He added that the company "delivered much better earnings than I was looking for."

Europe at the Crossroads: Splinter or Unite

BRUSSELS • The European Union, a hope for peace that rose from the fires of World War II, paused Wednesday to honor its past and ponder its future — and how it can ensure it still has one in light of the anti-austerity anger expressed this week by voters in France and Greece.

May 9 is Europe Day, a commemoration of a key event that led to the creation of the modern EU. It was on this day in 1950 that French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman issued a declaration calling for an integrated Europe.

Tens of millions of Europeans had perished in twin cataclysms of World Wars I and II. At root, Schuman's dream was simple: He wanted an economic union, a sharing of strategic resources in Europe that would "make war not only unthinkable but materially impossible."

By that measure the project has been a resounding success. The EU has grown to 27 members and the economic union has grown ever deeper, including a common market and, for 17 countries, a shared currency. The interlocking interests have helped to shield the bloc from any possibility of war.

But on Sunday voters in France and Greece voted in droves against the strategy of harsh budget cuts leaders contend is necessary to preserve the economic union that is at the heart of the European Union.

The question then arises: Is the European dream in danger? Could it all come unstuck?

"The current situation is extremely fragile and extremely dangerous," said Zsolt Darvas, a research fellow at Bruegel, a Brussels-based economic think tank.

Greece's two major parties, both of which backed a drastic package of budget cuts in order to secure a desperately needed bailout loan, were so thumped by voters that even put together they would not command a majority in Parliament.

That's alarming because it raises the prospect of protracted political paralysis, in which market panic could trigger a Greek financial meltdown and possibly force the country out of the currency union. That would endanger the viability of the entire European project.

And what of the Franco-German cooperation that was key to the EU during its inception, and more recently instrumental in charting Europe's course through its crisis?

French voters ousted Nicolas Sarkozy as president on Sunday and replaced him with the Socialist Francois Hollande, a leader not at all committed to swallowing more doses of the EU's bitter austerity.

That raises questions about the continent's key alliance, since German Chancellor Angela Merkel is the staunchest champion of Europe's strategy of belt-tightening.

However, some see the unraveling of the Merkel-Sarkozy pairing as possibly a good thing.

The two were so close they were collectively dubbed "Merkozy." They met before each EU summit to make decisions that, critics say, the other EU heads of government were simply expected to endorse.

Europeans increasingly saw a democracy deficit in which the top players were bullying weaker members into submission.

"That was not the right thing to do for Europe," said Paul De Grauwe, an economist with the London School of Economics. "This is the reason the union might break up."

Or one of the reasons. The other is the potential catastrophe of Greece breaking away from the euro.

If that were to happen, virtually every Greek with euros in the bank would rush to withdraw them and deposit them abroad, said Darvas of Bruegel. The country's financial system would collapse within days, and the country would suffer a terrible financial crisis — far worse than the one it now endures.

Beyond that, analysts say that Greece's exit from the euro would leave investors wondering which country would be next, raising the prospect of a financial contagion worse than any that has been seen in the course of the crisis.

"The European project will be in danger," Darvas said.

The irony is that Greek voters are not rejecting the European Union, just an EU strategy of unrelenting budget cuts that has pushed struggling economies deeper into the hole.

Antonis Samaras, the leader of Greece's Conservative New Democracy party, has called for the terms of the country's bailout loans to be re-negotiated to put more emphasis on stimulating growth.

Some experts say that slowing down the push for budget balancing — though not abandoning it — while stimulating the economy could form the basis of a more successful EU approach to the crisis.

But there are more radical voices on the rise. Alexis Tsipras, the left-wing politician now trying to form a government in Greece, wants to pull out of the agreement under which the country is receiving bailout funds.

Samaras said that would bring catastrophe.

"The Greek people have not given a mandate to destroy the country, nor to leave the euro," Samaras said. "Quite the opposite. And those who understood something like that are altering and misinterpreting the electoral result."

As the political wrangling in Greece continues, the question of whether the union will hold together, whether Robert Schuman's dream will survive, hangs in the balance.

EU leaders, while they have been accused of often being a half-step late in their responses to the series of crises, have nevertheless shown strong and durable political will in their efforts to save the European project.

They have faced down other crises that felt more immediately threatening, such as in December, when it was unknown whether Greece would fulfill the conditions to receive a (euro) 130 billion rescue package.

But De Grauwe says Europe is today entering more treacherous terrain.

"This is in a way deeper, because it's more political," he said. "It's testing the political viability of the project."

Low Staffing Presents a Tricky Balancing Act for Small Businesses

If you work for a small business there's a good chance that, since the recession, you have taken on additional responsibilities and are working longer hours. Some of the work that used to be done by fellow employees may be getting farmed out to freelancers or other independent contractors.

The U.S. economy is growing, but at a sluggish pace. Companies are cautious because they don't know what business will be like in the months ahead. Europe's lingering debt crisis and uncertainty about the outcome of the November elections is adding to the anxiety. It's a recipe that makes many employers reluctant to bring on new staff.

Certainly, small businesses are taking some of the same steps as larger companies to avoid hiring new workers. But for small business owners, finding a way to cope with less staff is an even more delicate balancing act because they already have fewer workers to pick up the slack when an employee leaves.

"Many of them are just at the margin of surviving," says Michael Gibbs, an economics professor at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business, who has studied and written about human resources and how organizations are structured. "There's an enormous amount of uncertainty in the economy."

Asking Workers to Do More

When the receptionist recently quit at Klemchuk Kubasta, the Dallas-based law firm decided to not to hire a replacement. Instead, staffers — but not attorneys — take turns doing the job for a half a day at a time.

"We're being careful about how many people we add," says senior partner Darin Klemchuk. "One way to lower costs is to not hire a receptionist."

It's a similar tale at Milio's, a 35-store sandwich chain in the Midwest. After the recession hit, employees were trained to do different jobs. For instance, now a

bread baker can also slice meat and run the cash register.

"This keeps employment numbers down because of more staff versatility," says Mike Liautaud, the company's president.

But Milio's didn't stop there. Two administrative workers were laid off. Salaried staffers work three to five hours more each week.

Liautaud says he's concerned about employees getting overburdened. Two weeks ago, he held a brainstorming session at the company's Madison, Wis., headquarters to determine which tasks could be shifted away from workers in the accounting and operations departments.

"I'm seeing they're now started to get taxed," he says of those workers, some of whom were losing their tempers during meetings. So the company is planning to make changes.

Liautaud also looks for ways to get help from his vendors. He's arranged with food suppliers to have their workers, rather than his own, unload delivery trucks.

Letting Technology Do the Work

In 2003, Steve Synnott had

a staff of just over 50, the most people his company, PRO Group, ever employed at one time. Today, the business, which runs the marketing campaign for 600 hardware stores, has 19 full-time employees and three part-timers.

Synnott is finding high-tech ways to hold off on hiring. In the last year, PRO Group invested in what's known as voice over Internet protocol, or VOIP, the technology that lets people talk over the Internet rather than regular phone lines. Synnott says VOIP has lowered the company's teleconferencing costs, which used to total about \$800 a month. That has allowed PRO Group to have more frequent teleconferences. And that in turn has cut the amount of time that PRO Group employees spend on the road, allowing them to stay at the company's Greenwood Village, Colo., home office and get more work done.

PRO Group is also revamping the database that hardware store owners can access to see their marketing plans. The changes mean PRO Group needs fewer staffers to give owners product and price information.

The database "will allow our company to expand by 25 to 30 percent before we

need to hire additional staff," Synnott says.

Hiring Freelancers, Not Employees

Many small businesses use freelancers instead of their own employees to get their work done. Freelancers, or independent contractors, are common in industries like media, construction and public relations where business owners often need someone with specific skills for a short time. Freelancers often cost less than employees because companies don't have to provide benefits or pay Social Security and Medicare taxes for them.

Jen Brady had three employees last year at her public relations firm, Fred & Associates, but she let them go and is now using only freelancers. Business is slower this year, but "I've been able to be profitable because I've been able to take on freelancers."

Brady also says the time and work that went into being a boss was hurting her Chicago-based company.

"I was focusing more of my time on human resources and training" instead of work for her customers, she says.

Because of the economy, she says she doesn't expect to hire employees again for at least several years.

"It would take a couple of clients that are on long-term retainers and my being able to build up the company's (cash) reserves," Brady says.

\$2M Settlement Reached in S.F. Bay Oil Tanker Spill

ALAMEDA, Calif. (AP) • The owner of an oil tanker that spilled 400 gallons of fuel into San Francisco Bay has agreed to pay nearly \$2 million as part of a settlement with state and local authorities.

The settlement by South Harmony Shipping of Panama was filed in San Francisco County Superior Court on Tuesday by the district attorneys of San Francisco and Alameda County.

The spill occurred in 2009

when a tank on the ship Dubai Star began overflowing during refueling between San Francisco and Alameda. Investigators say among other errors, the crew waited hours before calling cleanup companies.

The spill coated beaches in Alameda County and killed an estimated 186 birds.

Officials said most of the settlement money will be used to restore wildlife habitat and enhance public recreation.

Liberator of Ladies' Hair Vidal Sassoon Dies at 84

LOS ANGELES • Vidal Sassoon used his hairstyling shears to free women from beehives and hot rollers and give them wash-and-wear cuts that made him an international name in hair care.

When he came on the scene in the 1950s, hair was high and heavy — typically curled, teased, piled and shel-lacked into place. Then came the 1960s, and Sassoon's creative cuts, which required little styling and fell into place perfectly every time, fit right in with the fledgling women's liberation movement.

"His timing was perfect: As women's hair was liberated, so were their lives," Allure magazine Editor-in-Chief Linda Wells told The Associated Press in a written statement. "Sassoon was one of the original feminists."

Sassoon was at his home in Los Angeles with his family when he died Wednesday at age 84, police spokesman Kevin Maiberger said. Maiberger said police were summoned to the home but found that Sassoon had died of natural causes, and authorities wouldn't investigate further.

His exact cause of death was unclear, but publicist Mark Sejar said Sassoon had leukemia for several years.

"Vidal Sassoon was the most famous hairstylist in the history of the world," said John Paul DeJoria, a close friend of Sassoon and CEO of John Paul Mitchell Systems, a company he co-founded with the late Paul Mitchell, a Sassoon protege. "Good hairstylists never die. Vidal Sassoon and Paul Mitchell will always live on."

DeJoria said Sassoon had been scheduled to sit at his table for a fundraiser Monday night but called to cancel, saying "his body was feeling just a little bit too tired and he would be there in spirit."

Sassoon opened his first salon in his native London in 1954 but said he didn't perfect his cut-is-everything ap-

proach until the mid-1960s. Once the wash-and-wear concept hit, though, it hit big, and many women retired their curlers for good.

His shaped cuts were an integral part of the "look" of Mary Quant, the superstar British fashion designer who popularized the miniskirt.

"My idea was to cut shape into the hair, to use it like fabric and take away everything that was superfluous," Sassoon said in 1993 in the Los Angeles Times, which first reported his death. "Women were going back to work, they were assuming their own power. They didn't have time to sit under the dryer anymore."

His wash-and-wear styles included the bob, the Five-Point cut and the "Greek Goddess," a short, tousled perm — inspired by the "Afro-marvelous-looking women" he said he saw in New York's Harlem.

Paul Mitchell's son Angus Mitchell, co-owner of John Paul Mitchell systems and a prominent hairstylist in his own right, said Sassoon's simple-but-dynamic system forever changed the business because it could be replicated anywhere.

"Vidal was like Christopher Columbus," Angus Mitchell, who studied under Sassoon, told the AP in a phone interview Wednesday. "He discovered that the world was round with his cutting system. It was the first language that people could follow."

Iowa, more than half of the passengers survived — one of the most admired lifesaving efforts in aviation history.

After the accident, aviation experts conducted simulations in which test pilots and trainer pilots tried to land similarly stricken aircraft.

On Wednesday, Harris was announced as Region 18's player of the year for the 2012 season on the first day of the region tournament in West Jordan, Utah.



Peterson Progressing; Vikings Stress Caution

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. • The Minnesota Vikings were running sprints during one of their workouts a couple of weeks ago, and Adrian Peterson was watching off to the side.

Salivating like a kid asking his dad if they can stop for ice cream on the drive home, Peterson turned to head athletic trainer Eric Sugarman.

"He had a look on his face like, 'I know what you want to do,'" Peterson said.

Permission granted, Peterson took the brace off his left knee and jumped in line with the rest of the running backs and wide receivers.

"I finished in first place," he said.

Roughly four months into his post-surgical rehabilitation from the torn anterior cruciate and medial collateral ligaments he suffered in a game last Dec. 24, Peterson is still plenty fast. He's exercising without pain or problems and ahead of the average pace for this injury recovery.

That doesn't mean he's assured of being in the backfield when the Vikings start the regular season Sept. 9, no matter how determined his mind or how supernatural his body might be.

"I'm not going to say with certainty that Adrian is going to play in our first game," Sugarman said. "That wouldn't be fair to me to him or to this organization. That's a long way off from now, and we certainly have a long road to get to that point."

Peterson, though, left no

doubt. One of the most optimistic and confident players in the NFL, Peterson said he's set on playing from the start — and not in a limited role. "Full throttle," was his prediction.

"I'll be disappointed if I'm not," Peterson said.

So the Vikings must be able to find the balance between caution toward their franchise player's long-term health and acknowledgment of Peterson's unique healing ability and physical skill.

"My whole life, I've been setting my goals and pushing

forward. I've been successful with doing that. I've been smart. Don't get me wrong. I've been smart about the process," Peterson said.

Said Sugarman: "He realizes now that there's too much to lose by doing something foolish."

The Vikings opened part of Peterson's regular rehab drills to the media on Wednesday, with more than three-dozen reporters and photographers watching him run around at the indoor field at Winter Park. Peterson had the operation Dec.

30, and Sugarman said he's now safe for any activity. The current goal is to restore function, comfort and confidence in the knee and to bring his conditioning back to normal.

Peterson estimated his explosiveness is at about 50 percent. His ability to change direction and speed ahead of a cut will be the last and most critical piece of his recovery. For now, at least, he said his confidence is "light years" ahead of where it was four months ago.

Donald, McIlroy Seek to Resolve Battle for No. 1

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. • Golf's world ranking has been more like a game of musical chairs with the most turnover at the top in the 26-year history of the ranking. Rory McIlroy and Luke Donald would like the music to stop playing for good sometime this year, the sooner the better. And both want the same outcome.

"Hopefully," Donald said Wednesday, raising his hand, "it will be me."

McIlroy said the same last week at Quail Hollow, where his playoff loss at the Wells Fargo Championship was enough for him to return to No. 1 for the third time this year.

Donald has a chance to take it back from him this week at The Players Championship, which offers the most world ranking points of any tournament besides the majors. They already have taken turns at the top six times in the last 10 weeks. The last time the No. 1 ranking was even remotely this volatile was in 1997, when it changed seven times in 13 weeks among Greg Norman, Tiger Woods, Tom Lehman and Ernie Els.

The Players Championship is a rare occasion for them to get together. Already four months into the season, McIlroy and Donald have only competed in the same tournament four times: the Abu Dhabi Championship, two World Golf Championships and the Masters.

"I think the last couple of months have not been as exciting because Rory and I re-

not playing well.

The ranking shuffle speaks to a broader issue in golf. No one ever talked about the world ranking because there was no debate about No. 1.

There was no parity in golf. There was Tiger Woods.

In the 18 months since Woods abandoned his post atop the world ranking, four players have been No. 1: McIlroy, Donald, Lee Westwood and Martin Kaymer. In the 30 months since injuries and the scandal in his personal life reduced Woods to an ordinary player, no one has won more than three times in a season on the PGA Tour. That used to be considered a slump for Woods.

"Do I think it's good for the game?" Woods said of the current state of golf. "I liked it when I was up there. That's just me."

The edge going into The Players Championship belongs to McIlroy, the U.S. Open champion, based on consistency. Not only did he win the Honda Classic in early March to reach No. 1 for the first time, he has finished out of the top five only once this year. That was at the Masters, where he was one shot behind going into the weekend, closed with 77-76 and tied for 40th.

Donald, who got off to a slow start this year, has finished out of top 30 in five of his eight tournaments. He showed how determined he is to stay in the picture, though, by winning the Transitions Championship and rallying on the weekend to finish third in New Orleans.

Judge Weighs Sandusky Defense Subpoenas

BELLEFONTE, Pa. • The judge in Jerry Sandusky's criminal case Wednesday did not immediately resolve remaining disputes over what information the defense is entitled to from schools, child services agencies and others, but he said he wanted to swiftly resolve the disagreements and push the case toward trial.

Judge John Cleland also did not rule on lawyer Joe Amendola's new request to delay the start of trial, currently scheduled for June 5, but he did open a pretrial hearing Wednesday by noting the "trial is approaching" for the former Penn State assistant football coach.

Cleland said he may throw out parts of some defense subpoenas rather than quash entire demands. He also suggested he would review some of the documentation in private to try to quickly resolve some of the disagreements.

Pennsylvania law, the judge said, contains a "normally predominant principle that we should use all legitimate means to ascertain the truth."

Sandusky, 68, is largely confined to his State College home to await the start of his trial on 52 criminal counts involving 10 boys over 15 years, and was not in the courtroom for the proceeding, which lasted less than two hours.

He has denied the allegations.

Amendola has made dozens of requests for records or other material, much of it background information on the accusers, including school transcripts, medical records going back to birth, Internet search histories, Facebook account details, employment-related documents and cellphone and Twitter records. Going into the hearing prosecutors were prepared to review the state of the requests to the attorney general's office, but Amendola appeared to take them by surprise by announcing there were no remaining discovery disputes with them.

The requests to schools, agencies and others consumed the bulk of the hearing. Cleland said some elements of the defense subpoenas may be too broad, but he also suggested to lawyers that he would likely just black out the parts they do not have to provide.

In some cases, lawyers said they did not have information being sought, or were willing to turn over specific records. In other cases, they argued that material was exempt from disclosure.

"Any information we get, we will keep in the strictest confidence," Amendola said. "We have taken great lengths to keep things confidential that we receive that are private in nature."

The Department of Energy (DOE) Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program (NNPP) has issued an amended Notice of Intent (NOI) to revise the scope of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Recapitalization of Naval Spent Nuclear Fuel Handling and Examination Facilities at the Idaho National Laboratory (INL). The NNPP issued its Notice of Intent (NOI) to prepare the EIS for the Recapitalization of Naval Spent Nuclear Fuel Handling and Examination on July 20, 2010 (75 FR 42082). The NNPP was initially pursuing two recapitalization projects in the same time frame; however, since the initiation of the NEPA process, the project schedules have changed such that the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project has progressed further than the Examination Recapitalization Project. Preparing one EIS that includes both projects would require decisions about the Examination Recapitalization Project too early in the design process, prior to having sufficient information to fully analyze the environmental impacts of the project. Additionally, funding uncertainties have made the timing of the Examination Recapitalization Project speculative in nature. To ensure an EIS is completed in support of the Navy's need for the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project, it is necessary to reduce the scope of the EIS to cover only the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project.

The NNPP proposes to recapitalize the infrastructure for transferring, preparing, examining, and packaging naval spent nuclear fuel and other irradiated materials, to ensure these capabilities are maintained for the vital NNPP mission of supporting the naval nuclear-powered fleet. The recapitalization will be carried out as two projects. The first project will be the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project; the second project will be the Examination Recapitalization Project. The first project is currently being evaluated in this EIS, consistent with the reduced scope described above. The second project will be evaluated with separate NEPA documentation once more information is available.

The EIS will consider the environmental effects related to the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project. The alternatives being evaluated have been revised to remove aspects related to an Examination Recapitalization Project and to address public comments received during initial EIS scoping. The NNPP will evaluate building a new facility at two potential sites on the NRF, an ECF Overhaul Alternative, and a No Action Alternative:

- Alternative 1 - Construct and operate a new facility for spent fuel handling capabilities at one of two potential locations at the Naval Reactors Facility (NRF) on the INL.
- Alternative 2 - Overhaul the spent fuel handling capabilities of the ECF at NRF by implementing major infrastructure and water pool refurbishment projects while performing corrective maintenance and repair actions as necessary.
- Alternative 3 (No Action) - Maintain the spent fuel handling capabilities of the ECF by continuing to use the current ECF infrastructure while performing corrective maintenance and repairs necessary to keep the infrastructure in good working order (i.e., actions sufficient to sustain the proper functioning of structures, systems, and components).

On this date:
In 1611, Sir Thomas Dale arrived in the Virginia Colony, where, as deputy governor, he instituted harsh measures to restore order.

In 1775, Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys, along with Col. Benedict Arnold, captured the British-held fortress at Ticonderoga, N.Y.
In 1865, Union forces captured Confederate President Jefferson Davis in Irwinville, Ga.

In 1933, the Nazis staged massive public book burnings in Germany.

In 1941, Adolf Hitler's deputy, Rudolf Hess, parachuted into Scotland on what he claimed was a peace mission. (Hess ended up serving a life sentence at Spandau prison until 1987, when he apparently committed suicide.)

In 1960, the nuclear-powered submarine USS Triton completed its submerged navigation of the globe.

In 1977, actress Joan Crawford, 72, died in New York.

In 1981, Socialist Francois Mitterrand defeated incumbent Valery Giscard d'Estaing in the second round of France's presidential election.

In 1994, Nelson Mandela took the oath of office to become South Africa's first black president.

Ten years ago: A tense 39-day-old standoff between Israeli troops and Palestinian gunmen at the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem ended with 13 suspected militants flown into European exile and 26 released into the Gaza Strip. Cuban activists delivered more than 11,000 signatures to the National Assembly demanding a referendum on broad changes in the socialist system, an unprecedented challenge to Fidel Castro's 43-year rule. Former FBI agent Robert Hanssen was sentenced by a federal judge to life in prison without parole for spying for Moscow. NBA owners approved the Hornets' move to New Orleans, ending the team's 14-year era in Charlotte.

Five years ago: British Prime Minister Tony Blair announced he would step down June 27. (Blair was succeeded by Gordon Brown.) The Democratic-controlled House, by a vote of 255-171, defeated legislation to require the withdrawal of U.S. combat troops from Iraq within nine months. A federal jury in Santa Ana, Calif., convicted Chinese-born engineer Chi Mak of conspiring to export U.S. defense technology to China. (Mak was later sentenced to 24½ years in federal prison.)

One year ago: The bulging Mississippi River rolled into the Mississippi Delta after cresting before daybreak at Memphis, Tenn., causing widespread damage. In a one-two punch against Moammar Gadhafi's forces, NATO war planes struck a command center in Tripoli and pounded targets around the besieged port of Misrata. Burt Reinhardt, one of CNN's first presidents, died in Marietta, Ga., at age 91.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

Today's deal shows that even experts (and especially those playing complex systems) can have expensive accidents. In this deal from the 2011 Cavendish pairs championships, North and South disagreed about whether the four-diamond call followed by five no-trump — to pick a slam — suggested four diamonds or five. Put me in the camp that says four, though perhaps North could have bid five no-trump over three no-trump to avoid that problem.

In six diamonds, declarer Alex Smirnov misguessed the trump suit, naturally enough, and that was a double disaster since the field had generally been restrained enough not to reach slam. (Some players had quite sensibly opened the South hand a 15-17 no-trump to stay low.)

Zia Mahmood was not one of the cautious Souths. He and Bob Hamman bidding to six no-trump. Mahmood won the low-heart lead (best for the defenders, else a squeeze develops) and knocked out the club ace, East winning to return a low heart. Now the timing for the double-squeeze had gone, but Mahmood simply cashed off the spades from hand, led the diamond 10 to the diamond queen, then took the spade ace and club queen. At this point he decided that the opponents had been telling the truth in hearts, so the suit was 4-4. Since West was known to hold precisely three spades and two clubs, he had four diamonds. So Mahmood crossed to the diamond king and finessed in diamonds for 12 tricks. Five pairs made the no-trump slam; two went down.

ANSWER: I think the choice between one spade and one no-trump is closer than it might appear. With bad spades, only a 4-4 pattern, and a good stop in the unbid suit (clubs), I think one no-trump is the more descriptive call. You can always find spades if partner has enough values to invite game by using new minor or checkback Stayman.
