Members of the conservative Republican Liberty Caucus have drawn fire from their GOP peers for sending altered sample ballots to voters.

They're conservative Republicans They're conservative Repubicans more Constitution-based platform through grassroots campaigning and changes to the state party platform. And because of them, party precinct races - often a primary election afterthought - are gettig County Republicans.
On a county level, precinct committeemen are volunteer, elected positions who help campaign for their party's candidates.
Billee Dinges of Castleford, who is active with the GOP, said she has never "You had to beg people to take precincts," Dinges said. "You don't get paid. You work hard. There's no glory in being a precinct person. But the races have taken a strange turn this year. Candidates are actively campaigning and sending out fliers, Most Twin Falls County Republican precinct races are challenged and some candidates have never attended a local Republican Party meeting, said Gretchen Clelland chairwoman of the Twin Falls Coun ty Republican Central Committee.
Some candidates are affiliated with the Republican Liberty Caucus, according to RLC literature. Rick Martin of Castleford is the area RLC director Some of the group's views - like on foreign policy and returning to the gold standard - don't line up with tradi tional Republican party platforms Dinges said. But by getting like-mind RLC can send delegates to the state convention, where they can change the state party's platform.
"It's really a way to hijack the party", she said.
Beth Bryan, a Buhl precinct committeeman, said RLC members elefused to campaign for Rometime candidates with whom they dis agreed. Some also disrupt monthly meetings, and have made vocal chal lenges at past state conventions. "I've been in politics for years, for generations, and I've never see
thing like this"," Bryan said But the message is getting out. On

The propsed ordinance deals with large-scale warehouse livestock operations - namely, with the disposal of waste in or near water. The ordinance sets up permitting requirements, restricts untreated waste disposal and limits the proximity the operation can sit to roads, canals and wells.

## With Pill's

 Help, AIDS FightEnters New Phaseby Lindsey tanner
CHICAGO • Condoms and other safe-sex practices have accom-
plished only so much. Now the $30-$ year battle against AIDS is on the verge of a radical new phase, with the government expected to endorse a
once-a-day pill to prevent infection once-a-day pill
with the virus.
with the virus. Some doctors are already giving patients the drug, Truvada, to ward
off infection. But Food and Drug Administration approval would expand that practice and could make the highly expensive medicine more affordable. Truvada costs around $\$ 11,000$ to $\$ 14,000$ a year.
Approval seems likely after an FDA advisory panel Thursday endorsed
the use of Truvada for prevention. In the generation-long fight against AIDS, "it's the first time we have talked about a medication for prevention of HIV," said Dr. Lisa Sterman of Francisco, who treats HIV-positive patients.
"With this recommendation, in our fight against HIV," said James Loduca, a spokesman for the San Francisco AIDS Foundation. "We know this isn't a magic bullet, and it's not going to be the right prevention strategy for everyone, but it could
save thousands of lives in the United States and potentially millions around the world""
Truvada has been FDA-approved since 2004 for treating people infected with the AIDS virus. Once a drug is on the market, doctors are free to prescribe it for off-label, or unap-
proved, uses, and that's what some proved, uses, and hat's what some patients who are healthy but in danger of getting the virus from their partners or through risky sex.
Official FDA backing of the practice would allow Truvada's maker, Gilead Sciences Inc. of Foster City, Apalif., to market it for prevention many more insurance companies to pay for the drug. And by widening the market for Truvada, it could prompt Gilead to lower the price. An FDA decision is expected by June 15. The agency is also considering approving the first over-theperts said it could help slow HIV's spread.

# Callsto Toughen Regulation FollowJPMorgan Loss 

WASHINGTON • JPMorgan Chase faced intense criticism Friday for claiming that a surprise $\$ 2$ billion loss sult of a sloppy but well-intentioned strategy to manage financial risk.
More than three years after the financial industry almost collapsed, the colossal misfire was cited as proof that threats posed by their own speculation. "It just shows they can't manage risk - and if JPMorgan can't, no one can" said Simon Johnson, the former chief economist for the International Monetary Fund.
JPMorgan is the largest bank in the United States and was the only major 2008 financial crisis. That lent credibility to its tough-talking CEO, Jamie Dimon, as he opposed stricter regulation in the aftermath.
But Dimon's contention that the $\$ 2$
billion loss came from a hedging strate-
gy that backfired, not an opportunistic bet with the bank's own money, faced doubt on Friday, if not outright ridicule.
"This is
"This is not a hedge," said Sen. Carl tee that investigated the crisis. He said the trades were instead a "major bet" on the direction of the economy, as published reports suggested.
On Friday, Dimon told NBC News, for an interview airing Sunday on
"Meet the Press," that he did not "Meet the Press," that he did not any laws or regulatory rules. He said the bank was "totally open" to regulators.
The head of the Securities and Exchange Commission, Mary Schapiro, told reporters that the agency was focused on the JPMorgan loss but de-
clined to comment further. JPMorgan's disclosure recharged a debate about how to ensure that banks are strong and competitive without allowing them to become so big and complex that they threaten the financial system when they falter

The JPMorgan loss did not cause anything close to the panic that fol-
lowed the September 2008 failure of the Lehman Brothers investment bank. But it shook the confidence of the financial industry.

Morgan Stanley and Citigroup closed down more than 4 percent, and Goldman Sachs closed down almost 4 percent. The broader stock market was down only slightly for the day.
