THEIR WEEK ON THE RANGE MEANS MUCH BACK HOM

SHOSHONE • At times this week, the Lincoln County Gun Range – just east of Shoshone, but seemingly in the middle of the desert - sounded

Sixteen law-enforcement officers each brought 2,000 rounds of ammunition to the site, not to become better marksmen but better shooting in-

They attended a course put on by the National Rifle Association, brought out by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

The curriculum is designed to teach instructors how to better teach their officers, said NRA adjunct instructor Jeff Hall, a retired Alaska state trooper. Hall said the NRA is one of the few nongovernmental agencies qualified to certify officers on firearms instruction. After the course, the officers earned NRA shooting instructor certifi-

their firearms and tactics and to win the lethal encounter," Hall said. "Winning an encounter means coming to the encounter prepared. If your opponent has a semi-automatic you can't show up with a Taser."

Hall said the class, the second of its kind to be given in Idaho, also helped officers overcome the type of mindset that can cause hesitation in a shooting situation.

"Everyone in law enforcement can tell you about the close encounter or the outright loss to the team ... because an officer hesitated," Hall said. "Shooting someone is the very last thing an officer wants to do, but sometimes it is the very thing that needs to happen for that officer and the rest of the force."

One Injured in Accidental Shooting **During Training**

According to an emergency dispatcher, one person was shot in the thigh Friday morning.

Lincoln County Sheriff Kevin Ellis said the person injured was participating in the NRA firearms course at the range.

"We had an equipment malfunction at the range and it was a minor situation," Ellis said. "It's still under investigation."

Ellis' office continues to investigate the incident. Ellis declined to release further information about the injured officer's status and agency until his office's investigation is complete.

T.F. Co. GOP **Precinct Races Turn Contentious**

Members of the conservative Republican Liberty Caucus have drawn fire from their GOP peers for sending altered sample ballots to voters.

TWIN FALLS • They call themselves the Republican Liberty Caucus.

They're conservative Republicans who hope to return the party to a more Constitution-based platform through grassroots campaigning and changes to the state party platform.

And because of them, party precinct races - often a primary election afterthought — are getting big attention among Twin Falls County Republicans.

On a county level, precinct committeemen are volunteer, elected positions who help campaign for their party's candidates.

Billee Dinges of Castleford, who is active with the GOP, said she has never seen so much interest in the positions.

"You had to beg people to take precincts," Dinges said. "You don't get paid. You work hard. There's no glory in being a precinct person."

But the races have taken a strange turn this year. Candidates are actively campaigning and sending out fliers, something Dinges hasn't seen before.

Most Twin Falls County Republican precinct races are challenged, and some candidates have never attended a local Republican Party meeting, said Gretchen Clelland, chairwoman of the Twin Falls County Republican Central Committee.

Some candidates are affiliated with the Republican Liberty Caucus, according to RLC literature. Rick Martin of Castleford is the area RLC director.

Some of the group's views - like on foreign policy and returning to the gold standard — don't line up with traditional Republican party platforms, Dinges said. But by getting like-minded people elected to precinct spots, the RLC can send delegates to the state convention, where they can change the state party's platform.

"It's really a way to hijack the party," she said.

Beth Bryan, a Buhl precinct committeeman, said RLC members elected in the last election sometimes refused to campaign for Republican candidates with whom they disagreed. Some also disrupt monthly meetings, and have made vocal challenges at past state conventions.

"I've been in politics for years, for generations, and I've never seen anything like this," Bryan said.

But the message is getting out. On Please see GOP, A3.

Keep Hydrated During the Warmer Months

With summer approaching, I would like to know how to best keep hydrated, especially when exercising. Should I drink water or something else? - Karla, Bliss

Answered by Alisa Rawson, dietitian, Clinical Nutrition Services/Mountain States Tumor Institute

ydration is always important, especially in the summer months for physically active people at work or play. Proper hydration enhances exercise training capacity and performance and reduces the risk of injury.

With warmer temperatures approaching, exercising and sweat loss combine to increase the need for additional hydration. A good rule of thumb for everyday fluid needs is one cup of water for every 250 calories consumed in addition to compensation for fluids lost as sweat. Water is an important component in metabolizing your food for proper digestion and improved energy effi-

In addition to fluid loss during exercise, athletes lose electrolytes as they sweat. If you are an extreme athlete - exercising at least two hours per day (or with significant sweat loss during exercise) — it's important to drink a beverage containing electrolytes to compensate for both fluid and electrolyte loss. Maintaining adequate fluid and electrolyte balance (namely sodium and potassium) is recommended to prevent muscle

In the summer months in particular, don't forget that fruits and vegetables assist in providing hydration because of their high water content. Also, caffeine should not be considered a hydrating source. If you drink caffeinated beverages, it's a good idea to drink one cup of water for every cup of

For weight maintenance and diabetes management, water, diluted electrolyte replacement beverages, and low-calorie or no-calorie flavored waters are good choices. When sugar-sweetened beverages are consumed in excess, they can contribute to weight gain and/or elevated blood sugar.

used his department as an example. It has only six officers; If one was killed on duty, the loss would account for about 17 percent of the force.

"My department expects me to take what I learn and help the non-shooters get

their skills up," Anderson said. "I know not everyone is into shooting as much as I am, but at the same time I need them to know the skills and be able to back me up and maybe bail me out when I need it and vice versa."

SOME HARD TO SWAY FOR JEROME JAIL BOND

JEROME • Jerome County commissioners and Sheriff Doug McFall met with about a dozen more residents Thursday night in the second of two meetings held to discuss the \$10.7 million jail bond issue they'll be asked to approve on the May 15 ballot.

The measure would cost a taxpayer with a \$100,000 house about \$31 per year.

"Ithink this one went better than the other," County Commissioner Charlie Howell said.

Howell said questions asked were pertinent and comments were encouraging. Attendees questioned the panel about medical costs, paying for staffing and why the current jail couldn't be brought up to code, Howell said.

"The sheriff said we could meet the code if we have to, but it would only hold 20 prisoners," he said.

McFall thought the meeting went fairly well. "There were three people

who appeared to me were resistant to the idea," McFall said. At the May 3 meeting, a

question about how much more a new jail would cost to run was left unanswered. This time, McFall provided an answer.

"We're looking at a \$200,000 increase in budget to operate a new jail," he said.

That estimate doesn't include the extra \$250,000 the county spent in 2011 to transport inmates to jails in other counties when the Jerome jail

overflows, McFall said.

The county's current jail budget is about \$1.15 million and would increase to about \$1.35 million, McFall said. The cost of housing each inmate would most likely go down, he added. Currently, it costs about \$47 a night per $in mate, which \, would \, drop \, to \,$ \$41 per night with a new jail at 80 percent capacity.

McFall's opponent in the May 15 GOP primary election, Dan Chatterton, opposes passing the jail bond issue and attended Thursday's meeting.

"The thing that stood out the most is what I have been saying all along," he said. "The cost of running the new jail isn't included in the \$11 million."

The new jail includes an

increase in staff, which Chatterton said could have already been hired in order to keep the current jail more safe.

"I don't think in a fantasy world," he said. "I know the jail has aged and has prob-

After the first or second failed jail bond, Chatterton said county commissioners should have realized getting a new jail could be a long process and planned ahead to ensure the safety of deputies and inmates.

"I just wish the commissioners would have looked at options like a regional concept a lot sooner and saved the polarization of people in the county," Chatterton said. "If it passes or doesn't, there will be really hard feelings either way."

Two Sentenced in Marijuana Case

TWIN FALLS • Two people were sentenced Monday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court in a marijuana trafficking case.

Crickett Rachel Ray, 18, of and Brydon Scott Walker, 19, both of Filer, were originally charged with trafficking in between 1-5 pounds of marijuana. Charges against both were later amended to possession of more than 3 ounces of marijuana.

Ray was sentenced to serve two years of supervised probation in place of a prison sentence of two to five years.

Walker was sentenced to spend a year in the state's retained jurisdiction program, also in place of two to five years behindbars. Both defendants must pay \$825.50 in fines and fees.

On Dec. 1, 2011, Walker and Ray called police alleging three Latino males entered their Main Street Filer house at about 9 p.m. The pair said the men demanded the residents hand over meth. They claimed one man, identified only as "Juan," displayed a gun.

Ray and Walker were arrested for trafficking in marijuana at the scene after police say they found more than four pounds of marijuana and a container of different pills and drug paraphernalia throughout the house.

In a 1997 Mercury Mountaineer parked outside the house, police say they found a book called "Growing Marijuana - How to Plant, Cultivate, and Harvest Your Own Weed." Court documents allege the SUV was driven by both Ray and Walker.

John Valenciano Jr., 19, was arrested in March after being identified as "Juan" by a woman who was present during the alleged home invasion. He was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly

Friday, Dinges found one of Martin's fliers rolled up with her newspaper. Martin, who is running to represent the Castleford precinct, hasn't paid the Times-News for advertising, and it's not clear how the fliers ended up with the papers.

With the flier was an altered sample ballot that looks similar to official sample ballots available at the Twin Falls County Clerk's Office, down to the same shade of yellow paper. The difference: On the altered ballots, Martin's name is listed, but his opponent, County Commissioner Terry Kramer, isn't.

Official sample ballots don't include names of any precinct candidates, since there are dozens of precinct races between the Democrats and Republicans and the cost to add each to the sample ballots would be too high, said Twin Falls County Clerk Kristina Glascock.

Glascock said the altered ballots might lead voters to believe there is only one candidate for those races.

Martin couldn't be reached for comment Friday, but he said Thursday he was campaigning with "honorable and

reasonable means." "I, Rick Martin, am not

passing out official sample ballots that are altered," Mar-

Carter Killinger, running in Twin Falls Precinct 26, also sent out altered sample ballots to some county voters. Martin denied having anything to do with Killinger's ballot. "I don't know what Carter's

doing," Martin said. Martin's and Killinger's fliers are nearly identical in wording and for-Killinger said Friday morn-

ing that it wasn't his intent to deceive voters. "I don't want to have any

image of impropriety," Killinger said. He declined to say whose idea it was to use sample bal-

lots to campaign. Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs likened the altered sample ballots to false advertising, but said they're

not illegal. Jennifer Blair, running for precinct committeeman in Twin Falls Precinct 6, also handed out sample ballots

with only her name on them. Blair said while someone suggested she campaign with sample ballots - she declined to say who – she came up with the idea to put her name in the blank space. Instead of

Idaho Falls Council Rejects Smoking Ban

Council votes 4-2, stopping efforts to ban smoking in bars.

IDAHO FALLS • The Idaho Falls City Council killed a proposed smoking ban at bars in front of a packed City Hall on Thursday

Led by council member Mike Lehto, the panel voted 4-2 to both reject the ban and "suspend all discussion" of the issue. Council members Karen Cornwell, Ida Hardcastle and Ken Taylor joined Lehto.

Council members Sharon Parry and Tom Hally supported the prohi-

The failed ban stated "no person shall smoke within any indoors portion of the licensed premises of any

Lehto said he was reluctant to pass any law that would change the way businesses operate. He also said there are several smoke-free bars and nobody is forced to patronize a smoking bar.

"Really, for me, it comes down to a commerce issue," Lehto said. "Does the city government have the right to dictate to business owners how they should run their businesses?'

The issue surfaced in February after owners of two smoking bars - Muddy's Place and The Samoa Club - asked council members for a uniform ban, suggesting they were speaking on behalf of nine of 11 smoking bars. But in the weeks that followed, three bar owners spoke publicly against a ban, with two of them saying they were never contacted by supporters before the issue was brought forward.

Twenty-four people testified, with support and opposition split evenly.

Company Disputes ID Prison Report

BOISE • The national prison health care company Corizon says a scathing court-ordered report on the care provided at an Idaho prison is full of errors and that a review they commissioned themselves proves

But a close review of both reports show that they largely focused on different aspects of the health care system and that they noted some similar problems.

The medical care at the Idaho State Correctional Institution south of Boise is a major part of a long-running lawsuit brought by inmates against the state 30 years ago. Over the years the inmates won many of their claims, forcing the state to make changes to operations and procedures at the

And a federal court has continued to oversee some aspects of the prison. Last year, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill appointed correctional health care expert Dr. Marc Stern to review the health care at the prison in hopes of finally bringing the lawsuit to a close.

Stern's report found several

problems. He said terminal and long-term care inmates sometimes went unfed and were left in soiled linens. The report also said nursing mistakes or failures were likely to have resulted in some deaths and one inmate wasn't told for seven months that he probably had cancer.

The Brentwood, Tenn.based Corizon, which provides medical care at the prison under a contract with the state, immediately took issue with Stern's report. Corizon officials noted that the facility was accredited by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care, and the company announced it would pay for NCCHC to come out and review the prison's health care system again.

Corizon announced Thursday the new NCCHC review found the health care system at the prison to be "sufficiently organized and in substantial compliance" with health service standards.

In a prepared statement, Corizon CEO Rich Hallworth said the NCCHC report was a "complete vindication" for the company.

"We are very pleased that the Special Master's (Stern's)

report was proven to be fatally flawed and will never become an official finding of the court," he said.

But the company isn't a party to the lawsuit between inmates and the state and has no authority over whether Stern's report is deemed an official finding. Corizon spokeswoman Courtney Eller acknowledged that would be up to the judge.

The NCCHC report found that many of Corizon's policies and procedures at the Idaho prison meet national standards.

"It was evident that all inmates have access to health services and the system generally works well," the review

Still, the report mentioned

some problems in recordkeeping and the delivery of health care services and didn't address some of the issues brought up in Stern's report.

Of 42 records of "complicated" patient care reviewed by the NCCHC team, 23 were found to be satisfactory, according to the report. The rest had problems "ranging from

minor to significant?" The NCCHC report didn't go into detail on the problems found, but the findings appeared to echo some of Stern's findings.

"In our review we noted problems with the care provided to several chronic disease patients. These cases illustrate the need for closer monitoring by the medical director for both professional performance as well as continuity of chronic care," the NC-CHC review team wrote.

The NCCHC report found that Corizon had made some recent improvements to care at the prison, partly through the hiring of a new head physician and a new health services administrator. Stern also noted in his report that the company had shown some improvements during the period in which he reviewed care.

Officers ticketed 19 students for unlawful entry and malicious injury to property while six underage teens were cited for curfew violations.

School officials are allowing the students involved in the prank to take part in graduation ceremonies. Exline says school officials decided the tickets issued by police were the appropriate discipline.

Judge Gives Man 5 Years for T.V. Bank Fraud

BOISE • A California man has been ordered to spend five years in an Idaho prison and pay nearly \$190,000 in restitution for impersonating others and withdrawing funds from bank accounts.

Twenty-four-year-old Justine Lingatong must also serve five years of supervised release after his prison term expires.

Lingatong pleaded guilty in January to the crimes.

Under the plea agreement, he admitted to going into Treasure Valley banks seven different times, presenting false identification and taking out cash from accounts belonging to the people he was impersonating.

He carried out the scheme with two other women, and investigators say the trio hit banks in Arizona and Utah. His female accomplices are already serving time in prison – one for 4 years and the other for 44

N.D. Shooting Victim ID'd as Idaho Man

WILLISTON, N.D. • Authorities have identified a shooting victim in the North Dakota oil patch city of Williston as an Idaho man who came to the state about six months ago.

Police on Friday said 25year-old Kenneth Moore Jr., of Boise was recovering in a Minot hospital from multiple gunshot wounds. His condition was not available.

No arrests had been made, but Detective Cory Collings told *The Forum* newspaper that authorities believe the shooting is an isolated incident and the public is not in danger.

The shooting happened shortly after 1 a.m. Thursday in an area near Williston State College.

Collings said Moore and an acquaintance were sitting in a car outside a

building. The acquaintance was not hurt.

Fish and Game Gives Reluctant OK to Big-game **Auction Tags**

LEWISTON (AP) • Despite frustration and misgivings, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission voted Thursday to give the department staff permission to set up rules for administering a series of new and exclusive biggame auction tags.

The law was approved by lawmakers this year over objections from the commission and other critics who complained the program would create elitist trophy hunts that run contrary to Idaho's equal-opportunity legacy.

Bitterness over the new law resurfaced Thursday during the commission's meeting in Riggins.

Commissioner Kenny Anderson, of Rigby, said he is still angry with lawmakers and led debate for stalling the rulemaking process required for implementing the law.

"They just took a roadgrader over the top of us;" he said, according to a Lewiston Tribune story published Friday.

In the final days of the 2012 Legislature, the House and Senate narrowly approved a bill giving the commission the authority to issue up to three "Governor's Big Game Auction Tags" tags for elk, deer and antelope and one each for moose, mountain goat and bighorn sheep.

Supporters argued the auction could help raise as much as \$200,000 annually for the Department of Fish and Game, an agency whose budget is supported mainly by revenue generated by hunting tags and fishing licenses. A similar bill failed in 2011.

GRANTS PASS, Ore. • A young male wolf from Oregon that has won worldwide fame while trekking across mountains, deserts and highways looking for a mate has had what appears to be his first close encounter with people, and got his picture taken, to boot.

A federal trapper, a state game warden and a state wildlife biologist were visiting ranchers in Northern California on Tuesday to notify them that GPS signals showed the gray wolf was in the area, when they stopped to look over a sagebrush hill-side with binoculars, said Karen Kovacs, wildlife program manager for the California Department of Fish and Game in Redding, Calif.

"There, all of a sudden, out pops a head, and there he is," she said. "He appeared very healthy."

The wolf was hanging out with three coyotes, and appeared curious about the people watching him. But he kept his distance, about 100 yards, Kovacs said.

"He has managed to stay off the radar as far as people getting visuals of this critter," she said.

"His healthy distance has probably served him well up to this point."

California wildlife biologist Richard Shinn snapped a photo, the first shot of the animal in color, and the department posted it on its website.

The sighting happened on private land in Modoc County, the sparsely settled northeastern corner of California.

The wolf, known as OR-7, left the Imnaha pack in northeastern Oregon in September, shortly before the state put a death warrant on his father and a sibling for killing cattle. That order has

been suspended while a challenge by conservation groups is heard in court. OR-7 is a descendant of wolves introduced into the Northern Rockies in the 1990s, and represents the westernmost expansion of a regional population that now tops 1.650.

sagebrush hillside in Modoc County, Calif.

His travels took him down the Cascade Range and across the border into California in December, making him the first wolf in California in more than 80 years, according to the department. Along the way he was photographed in black and white by an automated trailside camera in Oregon. He has since gone back to Oregon and returned to California, making his first visit to Modoc County.

While his story has appeared in newspapers and websites around the world, OR-7 has yet to find a mate or even settle down since following his natural inclination to leave his home and head out on his own.

"We joked that it only

seems right that the world's most famous wolf makes an appearance in California and the paparazzi come out," said Rob Klavins of the conservation group Oregon Wild, which held a contest for children around the world to name the wolf and came up with Journey.

Klavins said he views wolf recovery as a "real-life story of redemption."

"This tells us how far we have come," he said. "His brother's story tells us how far we have to go. He was illegally shot in Idaho."

Kovacs said state biologists have been keeping close tabs on OR-7, with the help of his GPS collar, which is visible in one of the photos taken by Shinn.

Biologists have visited areas the wolf frequented after he left and found a track in the dirt in Northern California's Shasta County.

They know he has fed on the carcasses of deer, dug up the burrows of ground squirrels, and fed from livestock carcasses left out by a rancher. But as of yet, there are no reports he has killed any livestock.

The department also has been contacting ranchers to keep them up to date on the general whereabouts of the wolf, which is protected as a federally endangered species in Western Oregon and California.

"Most people have been appreciative," Kovacs said. "We want to make sure we are doing our part to protect this animal so that it isn't mistaken for a coyote" and killed

There are no plans for large poultry operations in Jerome County, but there has long been talk of the potential. Now is the time for this discussion and it shows leadership for the Planning and Zoning Commission to examine the issue proactively instead of reactively.

The propsed ordinance deals with large-scale warehouse livestock operations - namely, with the disposal of waste in or near water. The ordinance sets up permitting requirements, restricts untreated waste disposal and limits the proximity the operation can sit to roads, canals and wells.

JEERS to the paltry attendance at this and last week's public meetings to discuss the Jerome County Jail. 



With Pill's Help, AIDS Fight Enters New Phase

CHICAGO • Condoms and other safe-sex practices have accomplished only so much. Now the 30year battle against AIDS is on the verge of a radical new phase, with the government expected to endorse a once-a-day pill to prevent infection with the virus.

Some doctors are already giving patients the drug, Truvada, to ward off infection. But Food and Drug Administration approval would expand that practice and could make the highly expensive medicine more affordable. Truvada costs around \$11,000 to \$14,000 a year.

Approval seems likely after an FDA advisory panel Thursday endorsed the use of Truvada for prevention.

In the generation-long fight against AIDS, "it's the first time we have talked about a medication for prevention of HIV," said Dr. Lisa Sterman of Francisco, who treats HIV-positive patients.

"With this recommendation, we're nearing a watershed moment in our fight against HIV," said James Loduca, a spokesman for the San Francisco AIDS Foundation. "We know this isn't a magic bullet, and it's not going to be the right prevention strategy for everyone, but it could save thousands of lives in the United States and potentially millions around the world."

Truvada has been FDA-approved since 2004 for treating people infected with the AIDS virus. Once a drug is on the market, doctors are free to prescribe it for off-label, or unapproved, uses, and that's what some have been doing in giving Truvada to patients who are healthy but in danger of getting the virus from their partners or through risky sex.

Official FDA backing of the practice would allow Truvada's maker, Gilead Sciences Inc. of Foster City, Calif., to market it for prevention. Approval would also probably lead many more insurance companies to pay for the drug. And by widening the market for Truvada, it could prompt Gilead to lower the price.

An FDA decision is expected by June 15. The agency is also considering approving the first over-thecounter HIV test for use at home. Experts said it could help slow HIV's spread.

An estimated 1.2 million Americans and millions more around the world have HIV.

Putin's US No-show Sets Sour Tone

WASHINGTON • Among Vladimir Putin's first acts now that he's back in Russia's top job was to cancel a date with President Barack Obama.

Both nations insist Putin's no-show at a high-profile economic gathering tailored for his attendance is not a snub. But the decision to skip next week's meeting of the Group of Eight industrial nations in the United States and a much-anticipated Oval Office meeting with Obama, may set a sour tone for the next four years.

If Obama wins re-elec-

tion, he will have Putin as a sometime partner and sometime adversary through the end of his presidency. If Republican Mitt Romney wins, the dynamic might be very different. Romney has called Russia an "enemy," while Putin has signaled that he will hold off on any major new cooperation with the United States until he knows who will be president.

Either way, Russia watchers in and out of the U.S. government predict a more businesslike relationship than was the case under his predecessor, Dmitry Medvedev, and perhaps a more limited one. Putin has a

variety of troubles at home and isn't likely to pick a fight with the United States despite sharply negative rhetoric about Washington during his election campaign.

And It's Back to the Economy

Obama, Romney try to refocus on economic issues rather than risky talk of gay rights.

RENO, Nev. • The presidential candidates tried to put aside politically risky talk of gay rights Friday and return to Americans' top worry, the economy, in two states critical to the hopes of President Barack Obama and his rival Mitt Romney.

Obama discussed how to help homeowners seeking to avoid foreclosure in hard-hit Nevada, while Romney was focusing on jobs in North Carolina – more evidence that each views the sluggish economic recovery as the key issue in November's election.

For both, it was a day to move past the week's backand-forth on gay marriage, punctuated by Obama's announcement that he now supports it. Romney, who reiterated his opposition to same-sex marriage repeatedly, was distracted by a news report that led him to apologize for decades ago mistreating a high school classmate

who was gay. "There are things that we can do right now to help create jobs, to help restore some of the financial security that so many families have lost," Obama told Nevada voters after he met with struggling homeowners. "But I have to say that there are a few too many Republicans in Congress who don't seem to be as

optimistic as we are."

Obama also drew a contrast with Romney's plan for the nation's struggling housing market. While never mentioning Romney by name, the president criticized his rival and others in the GOP for saying the government should allow the housing market to "hit bottom and hope for the best?"

Romney will navigate a tricky course on Saturday when he gives the commencement address at an evangelical university in Virginia, a long-planned speech designed to help him reconcile with religious conservatives nervous about his record on social issues like abortion and gay rights.

The presumptive Republican nominee planned to blend social and economic

Kidnapped Girls Didn't Eat for Days

GUNTOWN, Miss. (AP) • Hope was fading that two young sisters abducted from their Tennessee home would be found alive two weeks after they vanished: Their kidnapper had already killed their mother and sister, and he was armed with a pistol as officers closed in.

Yet 12-year-old Alexandria and 8-year-old Kyliyah Bain went home to their father Friday alive, with no apparent injuries other than being tired, scared and itchy from poison ivy. They told the officers who found them that they had not had food or water for three days, said Mississippi Highway Patrol Master Sgt. Steve Crawford.

Beverly Goodman, the aunt of the slain mother, Jo Ann Bain, said she was relieved the girls were home but still saddened by the killings of Bain and Bain's

"He's been missing for so long. How do you hide out from 350 million people?" Goodman said. "I thought they were going to find them dead - the girls and him - so I am very, very relieved that those girls are home and they're not dead, like I figured they were gonna be."

20 Years After Vision, Woman Cares Daily for Shrine

WATSONVILLE, Calif. • Thousands of people have trod the dirt path leading to the shore of Pinto Lake County Park in the 20 years since a Watsonville, Calif., woman reported seeing a vision of Our Lady of Guadalupe in an oak tree

Her reported vision initially drew crowds of several hundred to the park and sparked creation of a shrine that is still being renewed daily by flowers, candles and other items brought by visi-

And while the crowd has slowed over the years, the unofficial shrine still draws a steady stream of those seeking solace and intervention from the beloved Roman Catholic icon who is said to have first appeared to a peasant, Juan Diego, on a hillside

near Mexico City 1531. The shrine, near a walkway through tule reeds over the water, is a kind of rustic outdoor chapel, with an altar.

Benches and tables are filled with colorful bouquets, candles, figurines, photographs and notes left by visitors. Colorful flags stream from the trees and the quiet is filled with the sounds of

Visitors come from San Francisco, Sacramento, Oregon, Mexico, and other places. The site once drew a lot of media attention, with Our Lady of Guadalupe being a central icon of the

Catholic Church in Mexico.

Twenty years ago, Anita Contreras Mendoza was having marital problems when she began taking walks in the park, said her cousin, Elvira Mendoza de Vidales. On June 17, 1992, the mother and cannery worker saw a vision of a woman suddenly appear before her, Vidales said. The woman told Mendoza she was Maria de Guadalupe and to tell people she was there to receive their prayers, that it was a sanctuary, Vidales said.

The woman also told Mendoza the poor needed her, Vidales said. The woman told Mendoza to close her eyes, and when she opened them, the image had vanished, but Mendoza saw her image in the trunk of an oak tree, she said.

When Mendoza became too ill to maintain the shrine six years ago, she asked Vi-

dales to do it.

These days, Vidales has a mirror that she readily brings out for visitors, tilting it with an experienced hand to shine a beam on an oval-shaped image in the bark of the tree. It is visible, several feet up the Live Oak.

Vidales, 62, visits the spot daily, culling the dead flowers and gently up righting the vases that have fallen and doing the same for the candles and mementos left there. She prays for her own five children too, asking for help with one son's drug addiction, another who is working too hard, she said.

Vidales laughs, saying she has started seeing images in other trees at the park, and even on the ground. "It's making me crazy," she

said. "But I clean here every day and people visit every day. Some come only to see, Sunday in People but most come to pray."

Kroger CEO Got 66 Percent Pay Bump in 2011

NEW YORK (AP) • The Kroger Co. gave CEO David Dillon a 66 percent pay bump last year largely as a reward for the company's improved performance.

The nation's largest traditional supermarket chain gave its top executive a pay package worth \$8.9 million, up from \$5.4 million in 2010, according to an Associated Press analysis of a regulatory filing made Friday.

The hike reflected a bigger cash performance bonus, which rose to \$2.7 million, from \$808,020. The Cincinnatibased grocer, which operates Kroger, Ralphs, Food 4 Less and other chains, uses a formula based on the company's financial results to determine annual incentive pay for its executives. The higher payout this year also included a long-term bonus of \$619,000 that was instituted in 2008.

The Osaka-based maker of Viera TVs and Lumix digital cameras reported Friday a record loss of 772.2 billion yen (\$9.6 billion), a reversal from the 74 billion yen profit a year ago and among the biggest in Japan's manufacturing history.

That comes a day after Panasonic's archrival Sony Corp. racked up a record annual loss of 457 billion yen (\$5.7 billion) in its fourth straight year of red ink.

Calls to Toughen Regulation Follow JPMorgan Loss

WASHINGTON • JPMorgan Chase faced intense criticism Friday for claiming that a surprise \$2 billion loss by one of its trading groups was the result of a sloppy but well-intentioned strategy to manage financial risk.

More than three years after the financial industry almost collapsed, the colossal misfire was cited as proof that big banks still do not understand the threats posed by their own speculation.

"It just shows they can't manage risk and if IPMorgan can't, no one can," said Simon Johnson, the former chief economist for the International Monetary Fund.

JPMorgan is the largest bank in the United States and was the only major bank to remain profitable during the 2008 financial crisis. That lent credibility to its tough-talking CEO, Jamie Dimon, as he opposed stricter regulation in the aftermath.

But Dimon's contention that the \$2 billion loss came from a hedging strate-

gy that backfired, not an opportunistic bet with the bank's own money, faced doubt on Friday, if not outright

"This is not a hedge," said Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., chair of a subcommittee that investigated the crisis. He said the trades were instead a "major bet" on the direction of the economy, as published reports suggested.

On Friday, Dimon told NBC News, for an interview airing Sunday on "Meet the Press," that he did not know whether JPMorgan had broken any laws or regulatory rules. He said the bank was "totally open" to regulators.

The head of the Securities and Exchange Commission, Mary Schapiro, told reporters that the agency was focused on the JPMorgan loss but declined to comment further.

JPMorgan's disclosure Thursday recharged a debate about how to ensure that banks are strong and competitive without allowing them to become so big and complex that they threaten the financial system when they falter.

The JPMorgan loss did not cause anything close to the panic that followed the September 2008 failure of the Lehman Brothers investment bank. But it shook the confidence of the financial industry.

Within minutes after trading began on Wall Street, JPMorgan stock had lost almost 10 percent, wiping out about \$15 billion in market value. It closed down 9.3 percent. Fitch Ratings also downgraded the bank's credit rating by one notch.

Morgan Stanley and Citigroup closed down more than 4 percent, and Goldman Sachs closed down almost 4 percent. The broader stock market was down only slightly for the day.

Greek Euro Exit No Longer Unthinkable

FRANKFURT, Germany • Let Greece go: It's a possibility that's being considered more and more publicly in Europe.

There have been two and a half years of bailouts, on top of broken promises by Greece to reform. The result: a fifth year of recession and, this week, political chaos. Voters on Sunday favored parties that either oppose the terms of the country's international bailout or want to renegotiate them. If it cannot get more rescue loans, Greece will go bankrupt and likely have to leave the eurozone, the currency union of 17 countries.

Among the possible scenarios are:

- **GREEK CHAOS**: Economists agree that Greece, where unemployment is 21.7 percent, would suffer even more turmoil and misery if it left the euro. A new drachma currency would fall by 50 percent or more against the euro.

A BOUNCE-BACK: On the plus side, the weaker drachma would make Greek exports cheaper and more competitive and could help the economy start growing

-CONTAGION: The great fear, some economists say, is that if Greece leaves the euro, other troubled eurozone countries might do the same. MAYBE NOT: Not everyone agrees that a Greek exit

would be a disaster for the eurozone. POLITICAL EMBARRASSMENT: Ultimately, a Greek exit from the eurozone would be a terrible blow to the prestige of the broader 27-country European Union. The shared currency is a pillar of hopes for a more united continent

Dismal China, India Data Signal Slowing Growth

SHANGHAI • Dismal data from China and India on Friday may signal a further weakening of the global recovery, undermining hopes the dynamic emerging economies of Asia can help prop up growth.

China reported its industrial production rose 9.3 percent from a year earlier in April, below expectations and down from nearly 12 percent in March. Investment and retail sales also slowed, though easing inflation offers leeway for


fresh moves to boost growth. India's industrial output fell 3.5 percent in March from a year earlier on weak manufacturing and investment. Output for the fiscal year ending in March rose 2.8 percent,

down from 8.2 percent the year before. The anemic indicators suggest Asia's ability to counter slowing growth in Europe may be limited. It also shows that the brief burst of vitality partly fueled by European stimu-

lus late last year is likely wearing off. "It's possible we're seeing the tailwind fall out of that," said Tony Nash, managing director at IHS Global Insight in Singapore. "We've been looking for more easing. It might

start any time given these numbers." The figures come a day after China announced that its trade surplus widened in April as imports barely budged, sharpening fears the economy is not doing enough to stimulate domestic demand and counter a slowdown.

Already, commodity prices are falling as China's slowdown bites into demand for oil, industrial components and consumer goods at a time when U.S. and European growth are weak.

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. • After breaking 70 for the first time in seven weeks, Tiger Woods headed to the back of the practice range at the TPC Sawgrass to finetune his swing. That was much better than going to the clubhouse to clean out his

The Players Championship featured Matt Kuchar, Zach Johnson and Kevin Na atop the leaderboard Friday.

What it lacked was some of the golf's biggest names.

Rory McIlroy stumbled to a 76 and became the first player at No. 1 in the world ranking to miss the cut at Sawgrass since Greg Norman in 1996. Steve Stricker had made a PGA Tour-leading 49 cuts in a row until he shot 74 and ended a streak that began in August 2009. And with 11 holes left in his round, Woods was two shots over the cut line and in jeopardy of missing back-to-back cuts for the first time in his career.

The thought never crossed his mind.

Instead, he blistered a 5wood into the breeze on the eighth hole — the toughest par 3 on the course — and watched it catch a slope on the edge of the green and roll 8 feet away from the cup. That was the first of four straight birdies for Woods, who wound up with a 68.







shorter. - PROTECTIVE MOM IN VIRGINIA DEAR PROTECTIVE



Notification of an Amended Notice of Intent

The Department of Energy (DOE) Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program (NNPP) has issued an amended Notice of Inten-(NOI) to revise the scope of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Recapitalization of Naval Spen Nuclear Fuel Handling and Examination Facilities at the Idaho National Laboratory (INL). The NNPP issued its Notice o Intent (NOI) to prepare the EIS for the Recapitalization o Naval Spent Nuclear Fuel Handling and Examination on July 20, 2010 (75 FR 42082). The NNPP was initially pursuing two recapitalization projects in the same time frame; however since the initiation of the NEPA process, the project schedules have changed such that the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project has progressed further than the Examination Recapitalization Project. Preparing one EIS that includes both projects would require decisions about the Examination Recapitalization Project too early in the design process, prior to having sufficient information to fully analyze the environmental impacts of the project. Additionally, funding uncertainties have made the timing of the Examination Recapitalization Project speculative in nature. To ensure an EIS is completed in support of the Navy's need for the Speni Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project, it is necessary to reduce the scope of the EIS to cover only the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project.

proposes to recapitalize the infrastructure for transferring, preparing, examining, and packaging naval spent nuclear fuel and other irradiated materials, to ensure these capabilities are maintained for the vital NNPP mission of the naval nuclear-powered fleet. recapitalization will be carried out as two projects. The first project will be the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project; the second project will be the Examination Recapitalization Project. The first project is currently being evaluated in this EIS, consistent with the reduced scope described above. The second project will be evaluated with separate NEPA documentation once more information is

The EIS will consider the environmental effects related to the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project. alternatives being evaluated have been revised to remove aspects related to an Examination Recapitalization Project and to address public comments received during initial EIS scoping. The NNPP will evaluate building a new facility at two potential sites on the NRF, an ECF Overhaul Alternative, and a No Action Alternative:

- Alternative 1 Construct and operate a new facility for spent fuel handling capabilities at one of two potential locations at the Naval Reactors Facility (NRF) on the INL.
- Alternative 2 Overhaul the spent fuel handling capabilities of the ECF at NRF by implementing major infrastructure and water pool refurbishment projects while performing corrective maintenance and repair actions as necessarv
- Alternative 3 (No Action) Maintain the spent fuel handling capabilities of the ECF by continuing to use the current ECF infrastructure while performing corrective maintenance and repairs necessary to keep the infrastructure in good working order (i.e., actions sufficient to sustain the proper functioning of structures, systems and components).

North-South would probably not want to get to six hearts, but several tables at the Cavendish teams in 2011 were unable to re-

sist the temptation.

On the auction shown, South was fairly confident that he was going to buy a singleton club opposite, and right he was. Michael Seamon led a top club and continued the suit to tap the dummy. Declarer, faced with the choice of what he deemed to be an unlikely squeeze or a bad trump break, played off the top diamonds, ruffed a diamond, went to the heart jack, and ruffed another diamond. The 3-1 heart split doomed him to down one.

The same fate beckoned John Kranyak and Gavin Wolpert. They also reached slam, and the defenders also led and continued clubs, but this line of defense persuaded Kranyak that hearts would not split.

Accordingly, he decided to follow a different approach. He ruffed the second club, crossed to a heart, ruffed another club, came to the spade ace, and ran the hearts. His luck was in — the spade-diamond squeeze materialized when West had sole control of those two suits, and 12 tricks were duly recorded.

Nicely defended by an unlucky expert? Yes and no! In fact, after the top-club lead, the defense must shift to a red suit (either will do). Declarer can bring in the diamonds only by drawing three rounds of trump without taking a club ruff. Four diamonds, six hearts and the spade ace make only 11 tricks.



The Department of Energy (DOE) Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program (NNPP) has issued an amended Notice of Intent (NOI) to revise the scope of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Recapitalization of Naval Spent Nuclear Fuel Handling and Examination Facilities at the Idaho National Laboratory (INL). The NNPP issued its Notice o Intent (NOI) to prepare the EIS for the Recapitalization o Naval Spent Nuclear Fuel Handling and Examination on July 20, 2010 (75 FR 42082). The NNPP was initially pursuing two recapitalization projects in the same time frame; however, since the initiation of the NEPA process, the project schedules have changed such that the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project has progressed further than the Examination Recapitalization Project. Preparing one EIS that includes both projects would require decisions about the Examination Recapitalization Project too early in the design process, prior to having sufficient information to fully analyze the environmental impacts of the project. Additionally, funding uncertainties have made the timing of the Examination Recapitalization Project speculative in nature. To ensure an EIS is completed in support of the Navy's need for the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project, it is necessary to reduce the scope of the EIS to cover only the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project.

The NNPP proposes to recapitalize the infrastructure for transferring, preparing, examining, and packaging naval spen nuclear fuel and other irradiated materials, to ensure these capabilities are maintained for the vital NNPP mission of supporting the naval nuclear-powered fleet. recapitalization will be carried out as two projects. The first project will be the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project; the second project will be the Examination Recapitalization Project. The first project is currently being evaluated in this EIS, consistent with the reduced scope described above. The second project will be evaluated with separate NEPA documentation once more information is available

The EIS will consider the environmental effects related to the Spent Fuel Handling Recapitalization Project. alternatives being evaluated have been revised to remove aspects related to an Examination Recapitalization Project and to address public comments received during initial EIS scoping. The NNPP will evaluate building a new facility at two potential sites on the NRF, an ECF Overhaul Alternative, and a No Action Alternative:

- Alternative 1 Construct and operate a new facility for spent fuel handling capabilities at one of two potential locations at the Naval Reactors Facility (NRF) on the INL.
- Alternative 2 Overhaul the spent fuel handling capabilities of the ECF at NRF by implementing major infrastructure and water pool refurbishment projects while performing corrective maintenance and repair actions as necessary
- Alternative 3 (No Action) Maintain the spent fuel handling capabilities of the ECF by continuing to use the current ECF infrastructure while performing corrective maintenance and repairs necessary to keep the infrastructure in good working order (i.e., actions sufficient to sustain the proper functioning of structures, systems, and components).





DEAR ABBY: When I was in sixth grade, my 19-yearold brother, "Ray," came into my room and fondled me late at night. I pretended to be asleep so I didn't have to deal with the situation. I told my mom afterward. She told me not to tell my father and bought a lock for my door.

Years later, when my sister found out what happened to me, she told me Ray had also done it to her. She told Dad and confronted Mom. Neither one ever said anything to Ray. They told us it was "in the past" and to leave it alone.

Because my sister is openly confrontational about it, she isn't invited to family events that he is attending. I am invited because I just ignore him, but it's uncomfortable knowing my parents took his side over that of their two daughters. I won't let my daughter be alone with him - or with him and my mom, because I don't trust her anymore.

Should I tell my parents I don't want to hear about my brother and no longer want to be around him?

 WRONGED IN GEORGIA **DEAR WRONGED:** Yes, if

it will make you feel better, by all means do. That your parents would ignore your brother's predatory behavior is appalling. By protecting him, your mother betrayed you and your sister.

You are also wise to be vigilant if he is anywhere around your daughter and to restrict contact with him to a minimum. No child is safe around your brother.

If you and your sister haven't had counseling to come to terms with what happened to you, please consider contacting the Rape, Abuse and Incest National Network (RAINN). The website is www.rainn.org, and the toll-free number is 800-656-4673. Nothing you say to the counselors will shock them, and they will be glad to refer you to someone qualified to help you.

DEAR ABBY: I think my in-laws want my husband to divorce me because I have Asperger's syndrome and bipolar disorder. Sometimes I innocently say things that other family members take offense to. My mother-inlaw then calls my husband, tells him what a "nut" I am and how upset "so-and-so" got. This results in huge fights between my husband and me, and it's hurting our marriage.

I have offered to educate my in-laws about bipolar and Asperger's, but they say I'm just making excuses for my behavior. I would like to explain to them that my thought processes aren't the same as everyone else's, so I am going to make mistakes in what I say to people.

I am hurt by their judgment and lack of tolerance. I don't do "bad" things often - maybe once or twice a year. But instead of overlooking it, they make a big deal out of it because I'm different. They should focus on the good. I do a lot of charity work and would help anyone in need. Their lack of understanding is ruining my marriage. I'm 25 and we have been married for five years. I don't want to throw that away. What do I do?

- AM HOW I AM IN ALABAMA

DEAR "HOW YOU ARE": That your marriage has lasted through five years of your mother-in-law's attempts to undercut it tells me the bond between you and your husband must be a strong one. Does HE understand how Asperger's and bipolar disorder affect the brain? If not, then the doctor who prescribes your medication should explain it to him so he can explain to his parents that what they are complaining about is not your fault. And if they don't "get it," a behavioral specialist should explain to them that they should be more patient and understanding with a member of their family.
