BOISE • Idaho Republicans stage their first-ever closed primary election Tuesday, where only registered members can vote in GOP balloting.
But debate over whether voters will stay home, rather than be
forced to publicly declare partisan affiliation, is being overshadowed by political theater from within the state's dominant par-

House Republican leaders are waging internal warfare, seeking o depose their own GOP incuments by financing libertarianeaning political action commitees. Rival pro-business groups have joined the fray with independent ads of their own. "Super Tuesday" presidential caucus win has become an issue, with Ron Paul loyalists plotting against him.
These developments mark the evolution of a four-year-old in-
traparty fight where conservative, tea party-influenced ac-
tivists seek to remake the Idaho GOP in their image, while estabishment Republicans fear straying from the broader, pro-business message that helped them win four-fifths of the Legislature and all statewide offices since the "This is campaign I ever saw", said Sen Denton Darrington, R-Declo, retiring after 30 years in the Senate "It's the strangest, weirdest po-

For all the furor surrounding legislative races, it pales in comparison to some unusual local Republican contests.
In one, Shaun Winkler, a Ku Klux Klan imperial wizard, faces incumbent Bonner County Sher-

Results were announced last month. The survey is put together by the Center for DigAssociation and Converge Magazine. Between the three Gooding schools, there's a classroom set of Netbooks - small laptop computers - as well as a few sets of Pads and iPod Touches.
Money to buy the equipment came from grants, as well as donations from local farmrs and businesses. the school district started pushing for better use of technology about four years ago. So how does technology affect students during a typical school day? The TimesNews spent Wednesday morning shadowing two students - Cheney and high school senior Hannah Brown - to find out.

 technology expert - sat at his desk as he waited for a quiz to load on his iPhone. He has been bringing his own phone to school for about three months.He keeps it out most of the time and is reading games. But like any classroom, there are rules. "What do I always ask you?" Hooper
said to him. "Is that an educational app you're on?"
It isn't alwa
It isn't always easy to use an iPhone to do schoolwork. Cheney said it's hard to type
on his phone because his fingers are "too big" for the screen.
And it's easy, he said, to accidently type the wrong letter. That can be a problem for a quiz where spelling counts.
Getting reliable wireless Internet access is also an issue sometimes. On Wednesday,

Gooding Elementary was scheduled to get a wireless upgrade by the end of last week. That will allow students to connect campus, from classrooms to the playground.
Cheney sat next to a classmate in the hallway and helped her find a video about adverbs. Once it loaded, he smiled.
"See, I helped her find that", he said.

As another student was listening to the video, catchy music filled the hallway,
"Dolly, Dolly, Dolly, get your adverbs here. Turn down the volume, Hooper reminded the student.

For her sociology class, one recent topic was whether Cinco de Mayo is a day rooted in culture or just an excuse to party.
During her time as a student in Gooding Brown has seen how much classroom technology has changed.
She used to get excited about using a pair of giant headphones in the elementary school computer lab. Now, as an 18 -year old, she uses iPads in some of her classes.
In English class, she had an assignment In English class, she had an assignment to wite a will to a high school junior using an
iPad. Another assignment was to create a short movie related to a book they were reading.
"I never knew it could be so exciting," Brown said.
In addition to traditional face-to-face classes, she has taken about 10 online classastronomy. "It's a lot more self-driven," Brown said, and it's easier to get behind. She communi cates with her IDLA teachers mostly hrough email.
She has also taken dual-credit classes delivered interactively through the College of Southern Idaho and University of Idaho have 16 college credits. She plans to major in biology at Boise State University and hopes to eventually work with wildlife or go to veterinary school.

LEWISTON (AP) • Leadrs in Lewiston in $\operatorname{\bullet }$ Leaddaho have approved a plan o build a replica of Idaho's first territorial Capitol Building in time for the 150th anniversary of Idaho becoming a territory. The Lewiston Tribune councilors last week agreed to a plan to build the structure that will temporarily sit in a grassy area near Lewiston City Hall. The Idaho Territory formed March 4, 1863, un "This looks like a goood way to get it built during the sesquicentennial timeframe," Lewiston City Manager Jim Bennett told councilors.

## FacebookCE0Turns28; IP0Could Be $\$ 100$ BGift

BY BARBARA ORTUTAY NEW YORK • Don't let the hoodie and sneakers fool you. Mark Zuckerberg is no wet-behind-the-ears CEO. Facebook's chief execu-
tive turns 28 on Monday, setting in motion the social network's biggest week ever. The company is expected to start selling stock to the public for the first time and begin trading on the Nasdaq Stock Market on Friday. The IPO could value Facebook at
nearly $\$ 100$ billion, making it worth more than such iconic companies as Disney, Ford and Kraft Foods. At 28, Zuckerberg is exactly half the age of the average S\&P 500 CEO, according to executive search eight years on the job, he's logged more time as leader than the average CEO, whose tenure is a little more than seven years, according to Spencer Stuart. Even so, public company will undoubtedly take some getting used to. Once Facebook begins selling stock, Zuckerberg will be expected to please a host of new stakeholders, including Wall Street investment firms, hedge funds and pension to keep the company growing.

eration without adequate mental treatment leads to epeat offenses at a rate so alarming and harmful to so ciety that it has created a 'national public health crisis' Seamone writes.
"In contrast to problemsolving courts, which target the illness underlying crim nal conduct, courts-martial function as problem-gener ating courts when they re sult in punitive discharge hat preclude mentally ill offenders from obtaining erans Administration, writes Seamone. "Such practices create a class of individual whose untreated conditions endanger public safety and the veteran as they grow
worse over time." As awareness of PTSD TBI and other "invisible wounds" of war has in creased in the past several years, civilian courts have responded by setting up diversion programs to get eligible rather than locking themup. Seamone says nearly 100 of these so-called "veterans ourts" have already been established, and another 100 or so are in the works.

nees. In that article, Rubio defends himself against an argument about his lack of executive experience: "I chuckled when I read an article yesterday. The guy wrote that the only experience I have is being on the city commission. I mean, I'm not telling you that I'm the most experienced guy in the Capitol, but I served nine years in one of the largest legislatures in the country. I was in
leadership eight of my nine years. I was majority whip, leadership eight of my nine years. I was majority whip,
majority leader, and speaker of the house. We had a $\$ 72$ billion budget - which is larger than most states. I was n't part of the landscaping crew untill last week, either." Great point, senator! Indeed, as the guy wrote in the article, you've got more experience than Abe Lincoln had when he became president. The question isn't whether you've got experience - you've arguably faced litical life when he ran for president in 2008. The queslitical life when he ran for president in 2008 . The ques-
tion is whether you've got the kind of experience the man who might be your boss thinks is crucial for the job. How important does Mitt Romney think it is to have executive and not legislative experience? While I was looking through old Romney ads, I came upon this one which is about the centrality of executive experience. terrible president, he said: "She hasn't run a corner terrore; she hasn't run a state; she hasn't run a city. She has never run anything.
If you've never run anything, former governor Romney thinks you are disqualified from office. Marco Rubio falls short of the Romney standard. Does that matter? A Hayes points out, Rubio is a talented politician. What about the academic question of whether politicians have about the academic question of whether poiliticians have based on their gut, and Rubio has a lot that appeals to that gut. Plus, nominees have picked running mates that contradict things they've said before. Heck, Ronald Reagan picked his opponent, George Bush. President Barack Obama picked Joe Biden, who once said Obama wasn' qualified for the office. So no big deal.
But is there a different standard for Romney, since one tions that he previously suggested were iron-clad Ron ney has been attacked for this, but he's been talented enough at showing malleability and at shifting his emphasis on things to get himself the GOP nomination. Anyone who is so sensitive to these kinds of flip-flops That they would disqualify Romney has already done so, That means the political downside to choosing Rubio Independent voters don't like rigidity. So, if you really wanted to push it, you could argue that by picking Rubio (who does not come across as doctrinaire) Romney "sight send signals to independent voters that he's not as "severely conservative" as he tried so hard to prove dur ing the primaries.
It is a cliche of campaigns that a nominee's vice presidential pick is the first presidential-level decision he
makes. Usually that is supposed to mean it's a furrowed brow business, nonpolitical and all about the attributes required for office - like executive experience. But contradicting what you once prized with a straight face is also a necessary requirement of the presidency. So even if Romney picks Rubio, his staff can still claim he passed
the first presidential test with flying colors.

She also wrote an encyclopedia entry fo Dubno, her Polish birthplace where her father and two brothers were dragged from their home and murdered in the local cemetery. The
ghetto was established there on the first day of

Passover in 1942 .

Another encyclopedia on World War II ghet-
os was published in 2009 by the Yad Vashem tos was published in 2009 by the Yad Vashem
in Jerusalem, Israel's official memorial to Holocaust victims. The "Encyclopedia of the Ghettos" sums up the story of each ghetto for either lay readers or researchers.
The two-part tome compiled by the U.S. Holocaust museum and published in early May by Indiana University Press includes more list-
ings, with extensive scholarly footnotes and a ings, with ext
bibliography.
The two projects "are complementary", says Dan Michman, the head of Yad Vashem's Institute for Holocaust Research who wrote the introduction to its encyclopedia.
The rest of the seven-volume U.S. project is expected to be completed in the next decade,
tracking more than 20,000 sites of wartime tracking more than 20,000 sites of warti The next volume will cover camps and ghet tos run by states aligned with Nazi Germany like Vichy France, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Slovakia, Italy and Croatia.

lin3Autistic Young Adults Lack Jobs, Education

CHICAGO • One in three young adults with autism have no paid job experience, college or technical school nearly seven years after high school graduation, a study finds. That's a poorer showing than those with other
disabilities including those who are mentally disabled the researchers said.
With roughly half a million autistic kids reaching adulthood in the next decade, experts say it's an issue policymakers
The study was done well before unemployment peaked from the recession. The situation today is tough even for young adults who don't have such limitations. Ian Wells of Allentown,
N.J., is 21, autistic and won't g.J., is 21 , autistic and wont until next year. He is unlikely to attend college because of his autism. He wants a job but has only found unpaid internships and is currently working part-time
and unpaid as a worker at a fastener factory.
He's a hard worker, with good mechanical skills, but speaking, said his mother, Barbara Wells. She said his difficulties understanding social cues and body lanple uncomfortable. "I'm very afraid" about his prospects for ever finding long-term employment, she said. "It keeps me up at night:"
The study, published online Monday in Pediatrics, was based on data from within two years of leaving
high school, more than half high school, more than half
of those with autism had no of those with autism hadno
job experience, college or job experience, colleg
technical education. Things improved as they years after high school, 35 percent of autistic young adults still had no paid employment or education beyond high school. Those figures compare disabled young adults 7 percent of young adults with speech and language problems, and 3 percent of those with learning disabilities. Those with autism may
fare worse because many al so have each of the other disabilities studied. The researchers analyzed
data from a national study of kids receiving special education services, prepared
for the U.S. Department of Education. About 2,000 young adults with one of four types of disabilities were involved, including 500 with autism. It's the largest study to date on the topic and the results "are quite a cause for
concern", said lead author Paul Shattuck, an assistant professor at Washington University's Brown School of Social Work in St. Louis. "There is this wave of young children who have
been diagnosed with autism been diagnosed with autismwho are aging toward adut-
hood. We're kind of setting hood. We're eind of setting
ourselves up for a scary situation if we don't think about that and how we're going to helpthese folks and
their families" their families," Shattuck
said. said. Government data suggest
that one in 88 U S kjdshave autism and there's evidence that the rate is rising.
Within the next 10 years, more than 500,000 kids with autism will reach adulthood, said Peter Bell, and services at Autism Speaks, an advocacy group that helped pay for the study.
"It's a huge, huge issue," Bell said. "Unfortunately there are many families that
really struggle to underreally struggle to under-
stand what that transition ultimately entails. ...They face the reality of having a child who may potentially not be able to have enough services to keep them busy
during the day", during the day!" "It's only going to get worse ...' Bell said.
His own 19 -year-old son has autism and is being home-schooled and Bell has hired therapists to prepare him for jobs and other life skills.

Carol Schall, a special education policy specialist,
said the results confirm smaller studies showing difficulties facing kids with autism as they transition into adulthood, and also highlight a need for better in public schools for special education students. She is involved in research at Virginia Commonwealth University investigating whether on-the-job training and teaching social cues to high
school students with autism makes them more employable.

I try to make the deals on Mondays slightly easier than the deals later in the week. But beware! Today's deal contains an unfriendly trap.

South declares four spades, West leads the diamond king and ace, and declarer ruffs. Declarer can almost always make the contract, as long as the trumps are no worse than $4-1$. But he must of trump! When the ace and king of tru break appears, he plays on clubs. West ducks the first club to try to
disrupt declarer's communications, then wins the second and plays another diamond

Declarer ruffs and is now reduced to one trump in each hand, while West has two trumps left. Declarer now simply plays on hearts. (This line succeeds no matter which shape West started with - either two or three clubs.) The idea is that when West ruffs in and returns a diamond, as he must, declarer discards a club from table, ruffs in hand, and then uses his remaining clubs as substitute trumps. He runs the clubs, overruffing West whenever clubs, overruffing West whe
he ruffs in, and has the rest.
If it turned out that East had the four trumps, either declarer would be able to cash all of the side winners, or East would find himself in a situation like the one shown here.

Playing the trumps reflexively by cashing the spade ace, then the queen, sees declarer fail in this layout. West scores a second trump trick one way or another.
