# Internal GOP Warfare Characterizes 2012 Primary

**BOISE** • Idaho Republicans stage their first-ever closed primary election Tuesday, where only registered members can vote in GOP balloting.

But debate over whether voters will stay home, rather than be forced to publicly declare partisan affiliation, is being overshadowed by political theater from within the state's dominant par-

House Republican leaders are waging internal warfare, seeking to depose their own GOP incumbents by financing libertarianleaning political action committees. Rival pro-business groups have joined the fray with independent ads of their own. Even Mitt Romney's March 6

"Super Tuesday" presidential caucus win has become an issue, with Ron Paul loyalists plotting against him.

These developments mark the evolution of a four-year-old intraparty fight where conservative, tea party-influenced activists seek to remake the Idaho GOP in their image, while establishment Republicans fear straying from the broader, pro-business message that helped them win four-fifths of the Legislature and all statewide offices since the early 1990s.

"This is the meanest dang campaign I ever saw," said Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, retiring after 30 years in the Senate. "It's the strangest, weirdest political season I've ever seen, and that's a lot of years."

For all the furor surrounding legislative races, it pales in comparison to some unusual local Republican contests.

In one, Shaun Winkler, a Ku Klux Klan imperial wizard, faces incumbent Bonner County Sheriff Daryl Wheeler in the race to be the top law enforcement officer in Idaho's rural north. Winkler, 33, held a cross-burning near Priest River last week.

It's a normal occurrence to


see Heidi Hooper's fourthgrade students using mobile devices during class.

# Sage Grouse Advisory Group Meets Tuesday in Jerome

**JEROME** • An Idaho advisory group is getting closer to submitting its suggestions on how the

state can better improve and protect sage grouse populations. On Tuesday, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's Sage Grouse

Task Force will meet for the next to last time in Jerome. The group has been meeting for the past five weeks to learn the basics on sage grouse habitat and threats. By June 1, members must submit a plan that will prevent federal officials from listing the bird as an endangered species.

In 2010, federal officials de-

clared that sage grouse warranted protection under the Endangered Species Act but held off from listing it. Shortly after, a federal judge approved a settlement that would require federal officials to finalize listing decisions for more than 250 endangered species candidates.



Results were announced last month. The survey is put together by the Center for Digital Education, the National School Boards Association and Converge Magazine.

Between the three Gooding schools, there's a classroom set of Netbooks - small laptop computers - as well as a few sets of iPads and iPod Touches.

Money to buy the equipment came from grants, as well as donations from local farmers and businesses

Superintendent Heather Williams said the school district started pushing for better use of technology about four years ago. That started with putting school board meeting agendas and packets online.

Then, the focus shifted to classroom technology. Williams said every classroom has an interactive projector and Elmo document

So how does technology affect students during a typical school day? The Times-News spent Wednesday morning shadowing two students - Cheney and high school senior Hannah Brown - to find out.

#### Fourth-grader Skyler Cheney

As the school day started at Gooding Elementary School, there were a few minutes of transition in Hooper's fourth-grade classroom.

About one dozen students headed out to take a standardized test. And students from Brandee Sabala's classroom who weren't testing came over from across the hallway.

Once students got settled, Hooper told them which lesson to work on: Adverbs.

Students took turns using iPads to log onto an online program called EdModo, where they took a quiz and watched a video.

Cheney – who is known as the class technology expert - sat at his desk as he waited for a quiz to load on his iPhone. He has been bringing his own phone to school for about three months.

He keeps it out most of the time and is allowed to play math, social studies and reading games. But like any classroom, there are rules.

"What do I always ask you?" Hooper said to him. "Is that an educational app vou're on?"

It isn't always easy to use an iPhone to do schoolwork. Cheney said it's hard to type on his phone because his fingers are "too big" for the screen.

And it's easy, he said, to accidently type the wrong letter. That can be a problem for

a quiz where spelling counts. Getting reliable wireless Internet access is also an issue sometimes. On Wednesday, about 10 students sat in the hallway outside their classroom in order to load a website.

Gooding Elementary was scheduled to get a wireless upgrade by the end of last week. That will allow students to connect to the Internet anywhere on the school campus, from classrooms to the playground.

Cheney sat next to a classmate in the hallway and helped her find a video about

adverbs. Once it loaded, he smiled.

"See, I helped her find that," he said. As another student was listening to the video, catchy music filled the hallway:

"Dolly, Dolly, get your adverbs here." Turn down the volume, Hooper reminded the student.

Hooper and her co-teacher Sabala lead a workshop with their students a few days a

week using the EdModo program. But during off-days when iPads aren't available, Hooper lets students use her Kin-

dle Fire which she received for free through the Idaho Leads Project. She also lets students use her iPad, iPod and laptop computer.

# High School Senior Hannah Brown

Across the street at Gooding High School, senior Hannah Brown sat in a computer lab answering discussion board questions for her Idaho Digital Learning Academy

For her sociology class, one recent topic was whether Cinco de Mayo is a day rooted in culture or just an excuse to party.

During her time as a student in Gooding, Brown has seen how much classroom technology has changed.

She used to get excited about using a pair of giant headphones in the elementary school computer lab. Now, as an 18-yearold, she uses iPads in some of her classes.

In English class, she had an assignment to write a will to a high school junior using an iPad. Another assignment was to create a short movie related to a book they were reading.

"I never knew it could be so exciting," Brown said.

In addition to traditional face-to-face classes, she has taken about 10 online classes including forensic science, sociology and astronomy.

"It's a lot more self-driven," Brown said, and it's easier to get behind. She communicates with her IDLA teachers mostly through email.

She has also taken dual-credit classes delivered interactively through the College of Southern Idaho and University of Idaho.

By the time she graduates, Brown will have 16 college credits. She plans to major in biology at Boise State University and hopes to eventually work with wildlife or go to veterinary school.

Brown said she'd consider taking an online class in college. And after her experience in high school, she will be ready.

Other bridges that are part of the project are I-84 overpass interchanges at exits for Glenns Ferry, King Hill, west and east Bliss, south Wendell and the Power Plant Road and Hill City Road overpasses. Work on these bridges is expected to be complete by the end of August.

Idaho Falls-based JM Concrete is the contractor for the \$1.84 million project.

#### Timmerman **Junction Paving**

Two roadway resurfacing projects near the junction of U.S. Highway 20 and Idaho Highway 75 in southern Blaine County are expected to begin as soon as today.

Paving from the Timmerman Rest Area north to milepost 105.6 is expected to be complete in about a week.

Crews will also begin work on U.S. 20, starting with repairs and maintenance to the Big Wood River Bridge at Stanton Crossing. Paving work will begin once the Idaho 75 work is complete. The project will extend from the Poison Creek crossing at milepost 171 to east of the Timmerman junction at milepost 181.

That work is expected to be completed by mid-June, followed by late-June chip-sealing in the area.

Boise-based Knife River Corp. is the contractor for the two projects totaling \$2.75

#### Idaho 75 Reconstruction

Crews will begin moving equipment and resources today in preparation to build a new section of Idaho Highway 75 north of Shoshone.

The \$13.2 million project will build a new roadway between Shoshone and Mammoth Cave Road, beginning with rock blasting, land clearing and utility relocation.

Three new bridges will be built, beginning with excavation near the Milner/Gooding Canal this month. Bridge

construction over the Big Wood River and North Gooding Canal will follow this fall and winter.

The new roadway, which will fix safety concerns related to current narrow bridges, is expected to be ready for traffic by June 2013.

Initial work is expected to have minimal impact on traffic, as the existing roadway will remain open. Occasional delays of up to 30 minutes related to rock blasting are possible through July.

Idaho Sand and Gravel of Jerome is the contractor for the project. When the new roadway is complete, the current road will be demolished and removed. All work is expected to be completed by July 2013.

On March 6, Romney won the "Super Tuesday" Idaho caucus easily over Paul, the libertarian-leaning Texas congressman.

But Paul loyalists including Ryan Davidson have said they're targeting obscure local precinct committee leader races, in hopes of sending friendly delegates to the state Republican Convention in Twin Falls in June to reverse Romney's caucus

Debbie Field, a former GOP state legislator and Romney organizer, is flabbergasted. She points out that many Paul backers wanted the caucus, thinking it could help the libertarian-leaning Texas congressman's chances.

"It's amazing," Field said. "When they don't get the results they want, they change the rules. It's a strange way of function-

Davidson declined com-

Democrats who are holding their own nominating contests Tuesday are observing the machinations from the other side of the aisle — not without a little relish.

Idaho Democratic Party chairman Larry Grant hopes this "Republicanseating-their-own" vibe translates to his party's success in November's general election, especially if ideological libertarianleaning Republicans win

"It's definitely a battle between the extremists and the more-extreme," Grant said, calling it "a full-fledged fight for the soul of the Republican

State Rep. Bob Nonini, R-Coeur d'Alene, spent at least \$12,000 on efforts to defeat fellow Republicans he doesn't like - nearly four times what he reported spending on his own campaign in the latest finance disclosures.

House Meanwhile, Speaker Lawerence Denney and Majority Leader Mike Moyle chipped in at least \$15,000 to a political action committee, Gun-Pac, that's working to oust at least six Republican incumbents, including House Majority Caucus Chairman Ken Roberts, R-Donnelly.

Besides Roberts, others on GunPac's opponent list include Reps. George Eskridge of Dover and Christy Perry of Nampa; and Sens. Shawn Keough of Sandpoint, Dean Cameron of Rupert and

# Replica of Territorial Capitol Planned in Northern Idaho

LEWISTON (AP) • Leaders in Lewiston in northern Idaho have approved a plan to build a replica of Idaho's first territorial Capitol Building in time for the 150th anniversary of Idaho becoming a territory.

The Lewiston Tribune reports that Lewiston city councilors last week agreed to a plan to build the structure that will temporarily sit in a grassy area near Lewiston City Hall.

The Idaho Territory formed March 4, 1863, under an Act of Congress.

"This looks like a good way to get it built during the sesquicentennial time-frame," Lewiston City Manager Jim Bennett told councilors.

Garry Bush is president of the First Territorial Capitol of Idaho Revitalization Project. He said the 20-foot by 30-foot replica would be built on a metal frame this summer so it can be moved when a permanent location is found.

The group said a good permanent place could be a transit bus parking lot that used to be the location

of the Idaho Territory's first school. It was also the site of the 1863 inaugural address, and the Idaho Territorial House of Representatives met there from 1863 to 1865.

"If that's a historical site, let's put it back on a historical site as soon as we can," Bush said.

The group has raised about \$30,000 for building the replica, and Bush said they have lumber from an old barn donated to use in the replica's construction.

But Lewiston city leaders are concerned about the city having to find someplace else to park buses if the if the transit bus stop is chosen as the permanent location.

"We don't want to disrupt anything that's currently being used," Bush said. "There's timing issues with transit buses. We are asking for a dedication of that site."

Other sites along Capital Street are also being eyed, but the transit bus parking site is favored because of its historical significance.

# Collaboration Offers Ideas for Idaho Panhandle Forests

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • A group representing wilderness advocates, loggers and wildlife biologists has written a 12-page letter to the supervisor of the Idaho Panhandle National Forests supporting a mix of logging, new wilderness areas, better inventories of old growth, and leaving buffers of trees around streams to shade water to help fish.

The U.S. Forest Service has been taking public comments on its draft management plan that will guide decisions for the forests for the next 10 to 15

"We thought it was time for aparadigm shift," said Bob Boeh of the Idaho Forest Group, which depends on federal timber sales to keep five sawmills operating. National Forests, so there's plenty of opportunities to have a good, suitable timber base, additions to the wilderness system, something for off-road vehicles and snowmobiles and plenty of fishing, hunting and hiking opportunities. We should all be able to have a portion if we work together."

The Forest Service plan includes a mix of recreational opportunities and timber sales along with forest restoration and healthy watersheds. Officials point out that the area has

added 100,000 residents since 1987, with many choosing to live along scenic corridors and lakes next to the forest. Some 40 percent of the 2.5-millionacre forest is within wildland-urban interface areas.

Some details of the Forest Service's plan include projected annual timber sales of 45 million to 50 million board feet, similar to current harvest levels. The plan also includes 160,000 acres listed as proposed wilderness areas in case a future Congress opts to designate the land as wilderness. Another 21,400 acres are designated as primitive lands, where timber sales are prohibited, but motorized use and mountain bikes are allowed.

Agency spokesman Jason Kirchner said the Forest Service has received more than 300 public comments.

"It makes it that much stronger when they come to us with a compromise or a shared vision," Kirchner told *The Spokesman-Review* in a story published Thursday.

"We really think this is monumental," said Liz Johnson-Gebhardt, one of the letter's signers and executive director of the Priest Community Forest Connection. "It's been a heavily litigated forest. All these folks worked really hard to reach a consensus."

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## Lasers Flashed at Two Planes Approaching **SLC** Airport

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Police are searching for someone who flashed green lasers at the cockpits of two aircraft as they made their final approach to land at Salt Lake International Airport.

Pointing a laser at a plane is a federal crime and a safety hazard, law enforcement authorities said, and they're trying to find the person who from West Jordan temporarily obscured the view of pilots Thursday night.

The first incident involved a Southwest Boeing 737 flying 9,500 feet above the ground at 9:45 p.m., while the second incident involved a Lear jet at 6,000 feet about 12 minutes later. Both planes landed safely.

The Federal Aviation Administration says lasers can blind or distract pilots and damage eyesight.

"(People think), 'Let's see if we can hit the aircraft with the laser, how fun is that," airport spokesman Dave Korzep told KSL. "But what they don't know is they're endangering air crew, passengers, and why would you want to do that? Figure something else to do in your spare time."

West Jordan police spokesman Rich Bell said it's believed the lasers were pointed from around South Valley Airport, but officers found nothing suspicious when they checked out the area Thursday night.

"We're keeping an eye on the area;" Bell told *The Salt* Lake Tribune. "We've had these (incidents) in the past and if they keep doing it, we have had some success in tracking them down."

If convicted, they could face up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

The number of incidents nationally in which people pointed lasers at aircraft nearly doubled in 2010 to 2,836 incidents, according to the FAA.

## Two Die in Separate OHV **Accidents in** Utah

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • Separate accidents involving off-highway vehicles Saturday in Utah killed two people.

Authorities say a 47year-old Vernal woman died in an ATV accident near the Iron Springs Campground in Ashley National Forest.

The woman was operating the ATV when it flipped over backwards on a steep incline. The victim, who wasn't wearing a helmet, died at the scene. Her name wasn't immediately released.

A 30-year-old American Fork man was killed when he was run over by a truck in a popular offroad area west of Utah Lake.

Authorities say Joel Larson pushed his stalled truck to a point where it could coast downhill, and was in the front of the vehicle when it began to roll forward. He was unable to get out of the way and died at the scene.

# Forest Service Trying Explosives to Fell Trees

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) • U.S. Forest Service workers have exchanged axes and saws for sticks of high explosives in southwestern Montana to bring down beetlekilled pine trees that pose unique dangers.

Crew member Gordon Ash said workers brought down hundreds of trees last week in the Pioneer Mountains by blowing up the trunks. He said beetle-killed trees often rot from the inside out, making them prone to shattering and falling in unpredictable ways.

"You'd calculate the proper amount of explosive, and then fix that on the tree with shrink wrap," Ash said. "You'd put it right where a face-cut would be, and sever it off right at the point where you put the explosive - almost like a directional fall. The idea is to link as many of those trees as possible to be efficient. In three and a half days, we did 500 trees."

The trees were also in difficult locations - overhanging parts of the Pioneer Mountain Scenic Byway in the Wise River Ranger Dis-

Charlie Showers, engineering program leader at the Missoula Technology and Development Center, said the danger of cutting down rotted trees in tough locations is another reason to use explosives.

"We just don't have a whole lot of really good sawyers," Showers told the Missoulian. "The days of going out and doing that activity are long gone in the Forest Service."

He said crews are learning the most efficient way to bring down beetle-killed trees with explosives. Depending on how that goes, workers could use explosives to take out dead trees along highways in the Helena National Forest.

"My gut feeling is telling me when you're looking at massive amounts of trees on steep ground that you can't get at with a 30-pound chainsaw, where you've got rot and limbs hanging them up in the canopy, I think this is really going to be a very viable tool for the ranger," Showers said. "Where we can't go in with logging equipment, explosives are the safest way, generally?

Robert Beckley, also of the Missoula Technology and Development Center, said he's seen little effect from the blasting on wildlife.

# Wedding Chapel Owner: Gay Marriage Would Help Nevada

RENO, Nev. (AP) • With his city no longer the marriage capital of the nation, a Reno wedding chapel owner says Nevada is missing out on a golden opportunity with its ban on same-sex marriage.

Last year saw the fewest marriage licenses issued in Reno since 1937, but the legalization of gay marriage would reverse that, said George Flint, longtime owner of the Chapel of the Bells.

He said there are thousands of gay and lesbian couples in the West who don't have options because the closest state where they can legally marry is Iowa.

"If we had that as a tourist package, of course it would be good for the state, but a lot of people don't think past their moral or religious noses," Flint said.

Former Nevada state Archivist Guy Rocha told the Reno Gazette-Journal that legalizing gay marriage would attract tourists and revive the region's struggling wedding chapels.

"It doesn't save Nevada from its economic distress, but it helps, and helps with the wedding industry," he

Nevada has the nation's highest unemployment rate at 12 percent and ranks second nationally in foreclosures.

The District of Columbia and six states (Connecticut, Iowa, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, Vermont) already have legalized same-sex marriage, making it harder for Nevada to position itself as a wedding destination.

"That opportunity is fairly rapidly diminishing," Rocha said. "If we don't make a



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# Thieves Clean Out Storage Unit of Airman on Duty

ROY, Utah (AP) • Police are searching for thieves who broke into the Utah storage unit of an airman serving in Afghanistan and took most of his personal belongings.

Among other items, thieves took wedding rings, photographs, custom snowboard equipment and an ATV from the Alpine Storage unit of Jeff LaPoint on May 5.

His former wife, Jana La-Point, told KTVX-TV that storage unit managers called her last weekend to inform her of the theft. She estimates the value of the stolen items at up to \$12,000.

"He's already having a hard time over there and now he has got to deal with this," she said, adding he's on his third tour of duty overseas.

Jana LaPoint said the airman is expected to return from Afghanistan later this month for two weeks. He's serving a one-year tour of duty.

"He left the stuff here that he was going to live off of – towels, blankets, everything;" she said.

She said while he has insurance, she's not sure if it covers the stolen items. The storage facility is not re-

sponsible for the loss. Thieves cut his unit's lock and replaced it with a lookalike. The storage facility's gate closes at 10 p.m., ac-

cording to a sign. "I think that it's sad. I think that it's sad that we have a locked gate here and people can still get through it," she said.

Jana LaPoint issued a plea to the thieves: "Bring it back. If you have a heart, drop it at the gate. They know whose (property) it is if you drop it at the gate."

# Drawing Focuses on Iran's Nuke Work

VIENNA • A drawing based on information from inside an Iranian military site shows an explosives containment chamber of the type needed for nuclear arms-related tests that U.N. inspectors suspect Tehran has conducted there. Iran denies such testing and has neither confirmed nor denied the existence of such a chamber.

The computer-generated drawing was provided to The Associated Press by an official of a country tracking Iran's nuclear program who said it proves the structure exists, despite Tehran's refusal to acknowledge it.

That official said the image is based on information from a person who had seen the chamber at the Parchin military site, adding that going into detail would endanger the life of that informant. The official comes from an IAEA member country that is severely critical of Iran's assertions that its nuclear activities are peaceful and asserts they are a springboard for making atomic arms.

A former senior IAEA official said he believes the drawing is accurate. Olli Heinonen, until last year the U.N. nuclear agency's deputy director general in charge of the Iran file, said it was "very similar" to a photo he recently saw that he believes to be the pressure chamber the IAEA suspects is at

He said even the colors of the computer-generated drawing matched that of the photo he had but declined to go into the origins of the photo to protect his source.

After months of being rebuffed, IAEA and Iranian officials meet starting Monday in Vienna, and the IAEA will renew its attempt to gain access to the chamber, allegedly hidden in a

building. Any evidence that Iran is hiding such an explosives containment tank, and details on how it functions, is significant for IAEA investigations.

Beyond IAEA hopes of progress, that two-day meeting is being closely watched by six powers trying to persuade Iran to make nuclear concessions aimed at reducing fears that it may want to develop atomic arms as a mood-setter for May 23 talks between the six and Tehran in Baghdad.

Warnings by Israel that it may attack Iran's nuclear facilities eased after Iran and the six – the United States, Russia, China, Britain, France and Germany - met last month and agreed there was enough common will for the Baghdad round. But with the Jewish state saying it is determined to stop Iran before it develops the capacity to build nuclear weapons, failure at the Iraq talks could turn such threats into

# **Greek Coalition** Talks Collapse; **Elections** Seen Likely

ATHENS, Greece (AP) • Critical talks to form a governing coalition in crisis-struck Greece foundered once more, leading the country one step closer to new elections — and bringing its continued presence in the euro into serious doubt.

Last-ditch efforts by President Karolos Papoulias to broker a deal between wrangling party leaders ended with no deal in sight late Sunday, a week after national elections produced a deadlock, with no party winning enough seats to form a government.

State television said talks would continue Monday evening between the heads of the parties that came in the top three spots in the elections, the conservative New Democracy, radical left-wing Syriza and socialist PASOK, plus the head of the small Democratic Left party, which is in a king-maker position.

But Syriza said it would not attend the talks, state television said, throwing the entire meeting into question.

# Yahoo Names Levinsohn Interim CEO

NEW YORK (AP) • Yahoo swept out Scott Thompson as CEO Sunday in an effort to clean up a mess created by an exaggeration about his education that destroyed his credibility as he set out to turn around the long-troubled Internet company.

Ross Levinsohn, who oversees Yahoo's content and advertising services, is taking over as interim CEO. He becomes the fourth person to run Yahoo in eight months.

Yahoo hired Thompson, the former head of eBay's PayPal, in January to orchestrate a reversal. Though, Yahoo is one of the Internet's most-visited websites, the company has struggled to grow in face of competition from the likes of Google and Facebook. The company's difficulties have irked investors. Thompson took the helm as Yahoo's fourth chief executive in less than five years.

Thompson's abrupt exit after just four months on the job came as part of the latest shake-up on Yahoo's board of directors, which has been in a state of flux for several months.

Yahoo Chairman Roy Bostock and four other directors who had already announced plans to step down at the company's annual meeting later this year are leaving the board immediately.

MONTERREY, Mexico • Fortynine bodies with their heads, hands and feet hacked off were found Sunday dumped on a northern Mexico highway leading to the Texas border in what appeared to be the latest carnage in an escalating war between Mexico's two

dominant drug cartels. Local and federal authorities discovered the bodies before dawn lying in a pool of blood at the entrance to the desert town of San Juan, on a highway leading from the metropolis of Monterrey to the border city of Reynosa. A white stone arch welcoming visitors was spray-painted with black letters: "100% Zeta:"

Nuevo Leon state security spokesman Jorge Domene said at a news conference that the 43 men and six women would be hard to identify because of the lack of heads, hands and feet. The bodies were being taken to a Monterrey auditorium for DNA tests.

The victims could have been killed as long as two days ago at another location, then transported to San Juan, a town in Cadereyta municipality about 105 miles westsouthwest of McAllen, Texas, and 75 miles southwest of the Roma, Texas, border crossing, state Attorney General Adrian de la Garza

said. De la Garza said he did not rule out the possibility that the victims were U.S.-bound migrants.

But it seemed more likely that the killings were the latest salvo in a gruesome game of tit-for-tat in fighting among brutal drug gangs.

"This is the most definitive of all the cartel wars;" said Raul Benitez Manaut, a security expert at Mexi-National Autonomous University.

Mass body dumpings have increased around Mexico the last six months as the fearsome Zetas gang goes head to head with the powerful Sinaloa Cartel, led by fugitive drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman.

Under President Felipe Calderon's nearly six-year assault on organized crime, the two cartels have become the largest in the country and are battling over strategic transport routes and territory, including along the northern border with the U.S. and in the Gulf coast state of Veracruz.

In less than a month, the mutilated bodies of 14 men were left in a van in downtown Nuevo Laredo, 23 people were found hanged or decapitated in the same border city and 18 dismembered bodied were left near Mexico's second-largest city, Guadalajara. Nuevo Laredo, like Monterrey, is considered Zeta territory, while Guadalajara has long been controlled by gangs loy-

al to Sinaloa. The Zetas are a transient gang without real territory or a secure stream of income, unlike Sinaloa with its lucrative cocaine trade and control of smuggling routes and territory, Benitez said. But the Zetas are heavily armed while Sinaloa has a weak enforcement arm, he said. The Zetas, founded by deserters from Mexico's elite special forces, started out as assassins for the Gulf Cartel before those two gangs had a bloody split in early 2010.

The government's success in killing or arresting cartel leaders has fractured some of the big gangs into weaker, quarreling bands that in many cases are lining up with either the Zetas or Sinaloa. At least one of the two cartels is present in nearly all of Mexico's 32 states.

A year ago this month, more than two dozen people — most of them Zetas - were killed when they tried to infiltrate the Sinaloa's territory in the Pacific Coast state of Nayarit.

But their war started in earnest last fall in Veracruz, a strategic smuggling state with a giant gulf

A drug gang allied with Sinaloa left 35 bodies at a freeway overpass in the city of Veracruz in September, and police found 32 other bodies, apparently killed by the same gang, a few days after that. The goal apparently was to take over territory that had been dominated by the

Twenty-six bodies were found in November in Guadalajara, another territory being disputed by the Zetas and Sinaloa.

Drug violence has killed more than 47,500 people since Calderon launched a stepped-up offensive when he took office in December 2006.

# Gunman Kills Member of Afghan Peace Council

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) • A gunman in a car assassinated a former high-ranking Taliban official working to end the decade-long war in Afghanistan, dealing a pow-

erful blow Sunday to the fragile, U.S.-backed effort to bring peace to the country.

Arsala Rahmani, a top member of the Afghan peace council and a senator in Parliament, was killed a week before a key NATO summit

and just hours before President Hamid Karzai announced the third stage of a five-part transition that is supposed to put Afghan security forces in control of their country by the end of

Police said an assassin with a silencer-equipped pistol shot Rahmani, who was in his 70s, as he was riding in his car in one of the capital's most secure areas, near Kab-

ul University. The gunman fired from a white Toyota Corolla that pulled up alongside Rahmani's vehicle at an intersection. Rahmani's driver rushed him to a hospital, but he died on the way, police

Rahmani was a former deputy minister of higher education in the Taliban regime that was ousted by the U.S.led invasion in 2001. He eventually reconciled with

the government and was trying to set up formal talks with the insurgents.

The killing was another setback to efforts to negotiate a political resolution to the war. In September 2011, former Afghan President Burhanuddin Rabbani, who was head of the peace council, was assassinated in his Kabul home by a suicide bomber posing as a peace emissary from the Taliban

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) • Lawenforcement officers in Southern California searched in rugged mountain terrain for a second day on Sunday for a missing FBI agent who

ing FBI agent who was said to be despondent

and possibly suicidal.
About 100 FBI agents, 40 sheriff's department rescuers and a dozen local police officers participated in the search for Los Angelesbased Special Agent Stephen Ivens. He was described as an avid hiker and runner.

FBI Special Agent Steve Gomez said dogs had tracked Ivens' scent toward the Verdugo Mountains, east of Burbank, but searchers have fanned out throughout Los Angeles County.

Ivens, 35, was last seen by family members Thursday evening, authorities said. He left his Burbank home the next morning on foot and had not been seen since, FBI officials said at a news con-

ference. His wife reported him missing Friday at 7:30 a.m.

Ivens was distraught and authorities fear he may have harmed himself, according to KABCTV. Officials did not say why Ivens was dis-

traught.
A search of his home did
not turn up his handgun and
police believe he may have
taken it with him.

Ivens was described by FBI colleagues as well liked. He is a devoted agent with no history of disciplinary action on the job, according to FBI spokeswoman Laura Fimiller

Married with a 1-year-old child, he has been working for the FBI for the past three years in the national security area. Prior to that, he worked as a Los Angeles police officer for eight years.

Gomez told reporters that foul play was not suspected and Ivens was not believed to pose a threat to others.

# AP Source: JPMorgan Exec Expected to Resign

NEW YORK (AP) • JPMorgan Chase is expected to accept the resignation of one of the highest-ranking women on Wall Street after the bank lost \$2 billion in a trading blunder, a person familiar with the matter said Sunday.

The bank will accept the resignation of Ina Drew, its chief investment officer, the person told The Associated Press, speaking on condition of anonymity because the person was not authorized to discuss the decision publicly.


Drew, 55, one of the highest-paid officials at JPMorgan Chase, had offered to resign several times since CEO Jamie Dimon disclosed the trading loss on Thursday, the person said. Pressure built on the bank over the weekend to accept.



At least two other executives at the bank will be held accountable for the mistake, the person said.

The casualties come as JPMorgan, the largest bank in the United States, seeks to minimize the damage caused

by the \$2 billion loss. Investors shaved almost 10 percent off JPMorgan's stock price on Friday.



# Facebook CEO Turns 28; IPO Could Be \$100B Gift

**NEW YORK** • Don't let the hoodie and sneakers fool you. Mark Zuckerberg is no wet-behind-the-ears CEO.

Facebook's chief executive turns 28 on Monday, setting in motion the social network's biggest week ever. The company is expected to start selling stock to the public for the first time and begin trading on the Nasdaq Stock Market on Friday. The IPO could value Facebook at nearly \$100 billion, making it worth more than such iconic companies as Disney, Ford and Kraft Foods.

At 28, Zuckerberg is exactly half the age of the average S&P 500 CEO, according to executive search firm Spencer Stuart. With eight years on the job, he's logged more time as leader than the average CEO, whose tenure is a little more than seven years, according to Spencer Stuart. Even so, the pressures of running a public company will undoubtedly take some getting used to. Once Facebook begins selling stock, Zuckerberg will be expected to please a host of new stakeholders, including Wall Street investment firms, hedge funds and pension funds who will pressure him to keep the company growing.

Young as he may seem — especially in that hooded sweatshirt—Zuckerberg will be about the same age as Michael Dell and older than Steve Jobs when those two took their companies, Dell Inc. and Apple Inc., public. In his years as Facebook's CEO he's met world leaders, rode a bull in Vietnam while on vacation, started learning Mandarin Chinese and as a personal challenge, wore a tie for the better part of a year.

Facebook, of course, got its start in Zuckerberg's messy Harvard dorm room

in early 2004. Known as Thefacebook.com back in those days, the site was created to help Harvard students — and later other college students - connect with one another online. The scrappy website later grew to include highschoolers, then anyone else with an Internet connection. Today more than 900 million people log in at least once a month, making Facebook the world's definitive social network.

All along, Zuckerberg has shown a maturity beyond his years. As the site grew rapidly and caught the eye of big media and rival Internet companies, Zuckerberg consistently rebuffed mouth-watering buyout offers, including from Google Inc. and Yahoo Inc.

"Simply put: we don't build services to make money; we make money to build better services," wrote Zuckerberg in his letter to prospective shareholders. "And we think this is a good way to build something. These days I think more and more people want to use services from companies that believe in something beyond simply maximizing profits."

# Officer: Military Could Learn from Civilian Courts

Some military justice insiders argue the way Officer Ryan Miller's case was handled, which mirrors changes in civilian law for troubled veterans, should become more common as courts-martial deal with service members affected by battle-zone trauma.

Army Staff Sgt. Ryan Miller knew that deserting his post was a serious crime. But, by then, he had a lot more on his mind and heart than his job.

Back in 2003-2004, while Miller was deployed as a cavalry scout in Afghanistan, his father died, his mother was diagnosed with cancer, and he was facing divorce. During his second tour, this time in Iraq, his best friend was killed by a roadside

A few months before his November 2007 serve-out date, while stationed at Fort Drum, N.Y., Miller learned that he had been "Stop-Loss'd" - meaning he would remain with his unit for a third deployment. He walked away twice, for a total of 19 months.

At his court-martial two years ago, Miller testified that he knew he was likely suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder, but purposely avoided treatment "in fear that I would be labeled a 'nut' and no longer be respected by my peers or subordinates."

When it came time for sentencing, the prosecutor, Capt. Christopher Goren, argued that Miller should be made an example.

"If we allow Staff Sgt. Miller to get off easy, what kind of message will that send?" he asked the judge. "It would tell all those soldiers, lower soldiers, it is OK to go AWOL, which it is

Goren asked that Miller be sentenced to seven months' confinement, reduction in rank to the lowest enlisted grade and a bad-conduct discharge – which would have cut him off from the medical and mental-health benefits usually available to

But Col. Michael Hargis, the presiding officer, recommended that all but the demotion be suspended, on the condition that Miller undertreatment counseling.

Maj. Gen. James L. Terry, then commander of the 10th Mountain Division, went along with the recommendation. Miller successfully completed his treatment and was granted an honorable discharge.

In the world of military justice, Miller's case is far from the rule. But some

voices within that system are calling for change, saying military courts can learn from the recent experience of their civilian counter-

Civilian courts across the country have acknowledged the fact that, after a decade of fighting in Afghanistan and Iraq, some veterans' crimes can be traced back to battle-zone trauma - and that they shouldn't go to jail or prison for them. The same consideration should be given by the military legal system when damaged warriors come before it, say some military law authorities, including Maj. Evan Seamone.

Seamone, an Iraq War veteran currently serving as chief of military justice at Fort Benning, Ga., makes the case in an article titled "Reclaiming the Rehabilitative Ethic in Military Justice," published recently in Military Law Review.

Too many service members, he argues, are cast out for crimes or misconduct that could be attributable to post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injury or some other service-connected ailment. Such "punitive discharges" yank away the veteran's safety net, passing the burden and risks on to the civilian system, he says.

"In its philosophy and practice, the military justice system is masking a major consequence of its sentencing procedures, which civilian courts have learned over the last two decades: Incarceration without adequate mental treatment leads to repeat offenses at a rate so alarming and harmful to society that it has created a 'national public health crisis' of 'epidemic' proportion," Seamone writes.

"In contrast to problemsolving courts, which target the illness underlying criminal conduct, courts-martial function as problem-generating courts when they result in punitive discharges that preclude mentally ill offenders from obtaining" treatment through the Veterans Administration, writes Seamone. "Such practices create a class of individuals whose untreated conditions endanger public safety and the veteran as they grow worse over time."

As awareness of PTSD, TBI and other "invisible wounds" of war has increased in the past several years, civilian courts have responded by setting up diversion programs to get eligible veterans into treatment, rather than locking them up. Seamone says nearly 100 of these so-called "veterans courts" have already been established, and another 100 or so are in the works.

But unlike these courts, Seamone writes, "military justice operates within a far smaller constellation dominated by the concept of 'good order and discipline.'"

"The lack of concern for treatment is troublesome because of its inherent assumption that somebody else, outside of the military, will someday be responsible for dealing with aggravated psychological problems," he

In an interview with The Associated Press, Seamone said he found numerous cases in which military prosecutors "actually made the argument in courts-martial that the military isn't a rehabilitation center."

"The major consideration becomes ... how to use the person as an example, as potentially a deterrent," says the soldier, who has worked as both prosecutor and defender in courts-martial.

Command control is a key difference between military justice and civilian, Seamone says. "The commander is ultimately the final authority on ... how the person should be dealt with."

The presiding officer and panel members - the equivalent of judge and jury cannot give a sentence that includes probation, he says. The commanding officer has the power to grant clemency, but Seamone says such decisions are often made during hasty meetings amid the myriad other responsibilities of running a military instal-

"I don't think it's intentional," Seamone says. "A lot of the time, it becomes this problem of, 'It's not an issue that I can deal with right now myself. It's going to be something later on down the line that someone else will have to deal with."

# Legendary Bass Player 'Duck' Dunn Dies in Tokyo

"Duck" Dunn, the bassist who helped create the gritty Memphis soul sound at Stax Records in the 1960s as part of the legendary group Booker T. and the MGs and contributed to such classics as "In the Midnight Hour," "Hold On, I'm Coming" and "Sitting on the Dock of the

Bay," died Sunday at 70. Dunn, whose legacy as one of the most respected session musicians in the business also included work with John Belushi and Dan Aykroyd's Blues Brothers as well as with Levon Helm, Eric Clapton, Neil Young and Bob Dylan, died while on tour in Tokyo.

News of his death was posted on the Facebook site of his friend and fellow musician Steve Cropper, who was on the same tour. Cropper said Dunn died in his sleep.

Dunn was born in Memphis, Tenn., in 1941, and according to the biography on his official website, was nicknamed for the cartoon character by his father. His father, a candy maker, did not want him to be a musician.

"He thought I would be-

come a drug addict and die. Most parents in those days thought music was a pastime, something you did as a hobby, not a profession," Dunn

But by the time Dunn was in high school, he was in a band with Cropper.


Cropper left to become a session player at Stax, the Memphis record company that would become known for its soul recordings and artists such as Otis Redding, Sam and Dave, Isaac Hayes and the Staples Singers.

Dunn soon followed Cropper and joined the Stax house band, also known as Booker T. and the MGs.

It was one of the first racially integrated soul groups, with two whites (Dunn on bass and Cropper on guitar) and two blacks (Booker T. Jones on organ and Al Jackson on drums), and was later inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

The group had its heyday in the 1960s as backup for various Stax artists. Dunn played on Redding's "Respect" and "Sitting on the Dock of the Bay," Sam and Dave's "Hold On, I'm Coming" and Wilson Pickett's "In the Midnight Hour."







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

# Marco Rubio Is Experienced, but...

tephen Hayes in the Weekly Standard has written a typically thorough and smart analysis of Marco Rubio, who occupies the default spot at

the top of most people's list of vice presidential nominees. In that article, Rubio defends himself against an argument about his lack of executive experience: "I chuckled when I read an article yesterday. The guy wrote that the only experience I have is being on the city commission. I mean, I'm not telling you that I'm the most experienced guy in the Capitol, but I served nine years in one of the largest legislatures in the country. I was in leadership eight of my nine years. I was majority whip, majority leader, and speaker of the house. We had a \$72 billion budget - which is larger than most states. I wasn't part of the landscaping crew until last week, either."

Great point, senator! Indeed, as the guy wrote in the article, you've got more experience than Abe Lincoln had when he became president. The question isn't whether you've got experience - you've arguably faced more political challenges than Barack Obama had in political life when he ran for president in 2008. The question is whether you've got the kind of experience the man who might be your boss thinks is crucial for the job.

How important does Mitt Romney think it is to have executive and not legislative experience? While I was looking through old Romney ads, I came upon this one which is about the centrality of executive experience. Talking about why Hillary Clinton would make such a terrible president, he said: "She hasn't run a corner store; she hasn't run a state; she hasn't run a city. She has never run anything."

If you've never run anything, former governor Romney thinks you are disqualified from office. Marco Rubio falls short of the Romney standard. Does that matter? As Hayes points out, Rubio is a talented politician. What independent voter is going to think even for a second about the academic question of whether politicians have a certain kind of experience? Voters make their choice based on their gut, and Rubio has a lot that appeals to that gut. Plus, nominees have picked running mates that contradict things they've said before. Heck, Ronald Reagan picked his opponent, George Bush. President Barack Obama picked Joe Biden, who once said Obama wasn't qualified for the office. So no big deal.

But is there a different standard for Romney, since one of his weaknesses is that he's regularly reversed positions that he previously suggested were iron-clad. Romney has been attacked for this, but he's been talented enough at showing malleability and at shifting his emphasis on things to get himself the GOP nomination. Anyone who is so sensitive to these kinds of flip-flops that they would disqualify Romney has already done so. That means the political downside to choosing Rubio and appearing to flip-flop once again — might be zero. Independent voters don't like rigidity. So, if you really wanted to push it, you could argue that by picking Rubio (who does not come across as doctrinaire) Romney might send signals to independent voters that he's not as "severely conservative" as he tried so hard to prove during the primaries.

It is a cliche of campaigns that a nominee's vice presidential pick is the first presidential-level decision he makes. Usually that is supposed to mean it's a furrowedbrow business, nonpolitical and all about the attributes required for office – like executive experience. But contradicting what you once prized with a straight face is also a necessary requirement of the presidency. So even if Romney picks Rubio, his staff can still claim he passed the first presidential test with flying colors.



# Excruciating Details Emerge on Jewish Ghettos

**NEW YORK** • Even after decades of in-depth Holocaust research, excruciating details are only now emerging about more than 1,100 German-run ghettos in Eastern Europe where the Nazis murdered hundreds of thousands of Jews.

And there were about 200 more ghettos than previously believed, said Martin Dean, editor of the recently published "Encyclopedia of Camps and Ghettos, 1933-1945, Volume II." It's part of a long-term effort to document every site of organized Nazi persecution, beyond the wellknown extermination camps like Auschwitz.

It "gives us information about ghettos that would slip into historical oblivion and be forgotten forever if we didn't have this volume," Holocaust scholar Lawrence Langer said. "Who knew there were more than 1,000 ghettos?"

More Jews died during World War II in Poland and the western Soviet Union — today's Ukraine, Belarus and Lithuania - than the estimated 1 million gassed in Auschwitz, Langer

"The people are dead, but at least we have the memory of the place where they lived and some knowledge of who killed them," said Langer, an 83-year-old professor of English emeritus at Boston's Simmons College.

Researchers at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington painstakingly collected details for the encyclopedia's more than 2,000 pages from the communities where Germans herded Jews and killed them if they tried

to escape.

Researchers and writers scoured the world to find new witnesses, study archives opened after the fall of communism and survivors' texts and testimonies in many languages.

For town after town, village after village, and even just spots in the countryside, Dean and his team assembled pieces of a grisly puzzle, which he said "shows that the Nazis made a concerted effort to find every last Jew in every last place" and eliminate each one.

Dean is a Holocaust scholar at the museum's Center for Advanced Holocaust Studies and former senior historian for the Nazi War Crimes Investigation Unit at Scotland Yard in

One tiny town in Ukraine, Mizocz, reflects the horrors repeated over and over across Eastern Europe. Its entry was written by a survivor who now lives in Pennsylvania and one of fewer than 10 percent of Eastern European ghetto dwellers who survived the war.

Helen Segall, now 81, was 11 when she witnessed SS troops torch her town of about 2,000 residents, with hundreds of hidden Jews burned to death before they could escape. Others were killed outside the town. "People had to undress and walk in small

groups into the trench and lie facedown, where they were shot by an SS man helped by a Ukrainian Schutzmann," she wrote, using a German word for local policeman.

In two days - Oct. 13 and 14, 1942 - the 300-year-old town "ceased to exist," wrote Segall, who is now writing her own memoir.

She also wrote an encyclopedia entry for Dubno, her Polish birthplace where her father and two brothers were dragged from their home and murdered in the local cemetery. The ghetto was established there on the first day of

Hunger and diseases took their toll, she wrote, and on a lilac-scented May day, a deep ditch was dug nearby. SS troops armed with whips and dogs rounded up the elderly and ill and shot them to death. The rest were forced to work for the Germans in factories and construction, and on the railroad.

Some of the Jews who lived in the Polish city of Krakow were helped by Oskar Schindler during the liquidation of the ghetto there, later working in the enamel factory portrayed in the film "Schindler's List."

Another encyclopedia on World War II ghettos was published in 2009 by the Yad Vashem in Jerusalem, Israel's official memorial to Holocaust victims. The "Encyclopedia of the Ghettos" sums up the story of each ghetto for either lay readers or researchers.

The two-part tome compiled by the U.S. Holocaust museum and published in early May by Indiana University Press includes more listings, with extensive scholarly footnotes and a bibliography. The two projects "are complementary," says

Dan Michman, the head of Yad Vashem's Institute for Holocaust Research who wrote the introduction to its encyclopedia.

The rest of the seven-volume U.S. project is expected to be completed in the next decade, tracking more than 20,000 sites of wartime persecution of both Jews and non-Jews.

The next volume will cover camps and ghettos run by states aligned with Nazi Germany like Vichy France, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Slovakia, Italy and Croatia.





# 1 in 3 Autistic Young Adults Lack Jobs, Education

**CHICAGO** • One in three young adults with autism have no paid job experience, college or technical school nearly seven years after high school graduation, a study finds. That's a poorer showing than those with other disabilities including those who are mentally disabled, the researchers said.

With roughly half a million autistic kids reaching adulthood in the next decade, experts say it's an issue policymakers urgently need to address.

The study was done well before unemployment peaked from the recession. The situation today is tough even for young adults who don't have such limitations.

Ian Wells of Allentown, N.J., is 21, autistic and won't graduate from high school until next year. He is unlikely to attend college because of his autism. He wants a job but has only found unpaid internships and is currently working part-time and unpaid as a worker at a fastener factory.

He's a hard worker, with good mechanical skills, but has trouble reading and speaking, said his mother, Barbara Wells. She said his difficulties understanding social cues and body language can make other people uncomfortable.

"I'm very afraid" about his prospects for ever finding long-term employment, she said. "It keeps me up at night."

The study, published online Monday in Pediatrics, was based on data from 2007-08. It found that within two years of leaving high school, more than half of those with autism had no job experience, college or technical education.

Things improved as they got older. Yet nearly seven years after high school, 35 percent of autistic young adults still had no paid employment or education beyond high school.

Those figures compare with 26 percent of mentally disabled young adults, 7 percent of young adults with speech and language problems, and 3 percent of those with learning disabilities.

Those with autism may fare worse because many also have each of the other disabilities studied.

The researchers analyzed

data from a national study of kids receiving special education services, prepared for the U.S. Department of Education. About 2,000 young adults with one of four types of disabilities were involved, including

500 with autism.

It's the largest study to date on the topic and the results "are quite a cause for concern," said lead author Paul Shattuck, an assistant professor at Washington University's Brown School of Social Work in St. Louis.

"There is this wave of young children who have been diagnosed with autism who are aging toward adulthood. We're kind of setting ourselves up for a scary situation if we don't think about that and how we're going to help these folks and their families," Shattuck said.

Government data suggest that one in 88 U.S. kids have autism and there's evidence that the rate is rising.

Within the next 10 years, more than 500,000 kids with autism will reach adulthood, said Peter Bell, vice president for programs and services at Autism Speaks, an advocacy group that helped pay for the study.

"It's a huge, huge issue,"
Bell said. "Unfortunately
there are many families that
really struggle to understand what that transition
ultimately entails. ... They
face the reality of having a
child who may potentially
not be able to have enough
services to keep them busy
during the day."

"It's only going to get worse ..." Bell said.

His own 19-year-old son has autism and is being home-schooled and Bell has hired therapists to prepare him for jobs and other life skills.

Carol Schall, a special education policy specialist, said the results confirm smaller studies showing difficulties facing kids with autism as they transition into adulthood, and also highlight a need for better job training services offered in public schools for special education students.

She is involved in research at Virginia Commonwealth University investigating whether onthe-job training and teaching social cues to high school students with autism makes them more employable.

# 2012 College Grads Enter Improving Job Market

The class of 2012 is leaving college with something that many graduates since the start of the Great Recession didn't have: jobs.

**NEW YORK** • The class of 2012 is leaving college with something that many graduates since the start of the Great Recession have lacked:

To the relief of graduating seniors — and their anxious parents — the outlook is brighter than it has been in four years. Campus job fairs were packed this spring and more companies are hiring. Students aren't just finding good opportunities, some are weighing multiple offers.

In some ways, members of the class of 2012 got lucky. They arrived on campus in September 2008, the same month that Wall Street investment bank Lehman Brothers collapsed, touching off a financial crisis that exacerbated the recession.

On campus, they were largely insulated from the collapsing U.S. economy. While older brothers and sisters graduated into a dismal job market, they took shelter in chemistry, philosophy and literature classes.

They used their college years to prepare for the brutal realities of the job market that would await them. They began networking for jobs much earlier, as freshmen in some cases. They pursued summer internships not simply as resume boosters, but as gateways to permanent jobs. And they developed more realistic expectations about landing a job in the ideal place and at the ideal salary.

On campuses across the country, spirits are more upbeat this spring, and the employment outlook is especially promising, according to interviews with three dozen seniors and career center directors.

"It's just been such a dramatic change from what we saw in 2008," says Mercy Eyadiel, who oversees career development at Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C. Back then, openings disappeared overnight and companies were calling recent graduates to rescind offers. "It was a very bad, ugly situation."

The job market remains tough, even for those graduating from the best universities. Hiring is not back to its prerecession level and plenty of seniors are leaving campuses without jobs. Yet this year's graduates are less likely to face

the disappointment of moving back in with mom and dad, or being forced to work at a coffee shop to pay off loans.


"I was nervous that my college degree would go to waste," says Laura Mascari, who arrived on the University of Delaware's Newark campus in the fall of 2008. Mascari, who received two job offers, will work in marketing — her major — for chemicals giant DuPont.

Between September 2008 and August 2010, 6.9 million American jobs were eliminated. In the last year and a half, 3.1 million jobs have been created. The strengthening job market has made a big difference to seniors who are jobhunting in their final semester.



The unemployment rate for college graduates 24 and under averaged 7.2 percent from January through April. That rate, which is not adjusted for seasonal factors, is down from the first four months of 2011 (9.1 percent), 2010 (8.1 percent) and 2009 (7.8 percent.) For all Americans, the unemployment rate is 8.1 percent.

# VANDAL FOOTBALL STUNNED BY MCROYAL'S DEATH

**MOSCOW** • The last time he spoke to Robb Akey, Idaho wide receiver Ken McRoyal shared his excitement about landing a scholarship for the fall. He had earned it with a stellar spring camp, and now he was leaving for Los Angeles to see his young daughter and family.

"I can still see the smile on his face," Akey said Sunday evening with a broken voice, recalling the conversation from last week.

McRoyal was shot and killed at around 1:30 a.m. Sunday at a party at the Brewery Artist Lofts in Los Angeles' Lincoln Heights neighborhood. The Los Angeles Times reported that a second man who was shot at the party was in stable condition Sunday morning at a Long Beach hospital.

McRoyal, 22, had walked on to UI last fall. The former El Camino Junior College wideout moved to California after he and his family were displaced from New Orleans because of Hurricane Katrina.

McRoyal played eight games last year for the Vandals, catching eight passes for 35 yards, and was expected to be a major contributor this fall as a senior.

"She is a really good hand," said Parke. "She works hard and is a good roper and rides really well."

Taylor, a senior at Wood River High School, says she became a real cowgirl her senior year.

"I started riding for fun and then my mom and dad introduced me to rodeo," said Taylor, who won the title of district girls all-around her freshman vear. "I started rodeoing at the Idaho Girls and Gem State junior rodeos. Going to these junior rodeos really sparked my desire to go fast and become extremely competitive. I love rodeo. It has been my passion since I started at eight years old. I never thought I would turn it into my job as a high schooler. I think as I get older, being a cowgirl is more like being a role model for the next generation."

Taylor feels that in rodeo, your attitude needs to be extremely positive because attitude effects how well you will do every run.

"With the correct mind frame it is important to have goals that you can accomplish at each rodeo and each run," Taylor said. "Before I get to the rodeo, I vision what I am going to do before each run. I have a routine that I do every time I go to do a run. Before entering the arena I watch the person right before me. If it's poles or barrels, I watch the ground to see the condition and if it's roping or goats, I watch the stock. And when it's my turn, I always suck my hat down on my head and press on my head. I

set my horse up for the run. " She packs three horses in the trailer when she travels to each rodeo for her five events.

"Picabo (barrels/poles) is my rock and I can't live without her," said Taylor. "I've been running her for seven years and plan on taking her to college with me. Most rodeo participants have some kind of practice facility but Taylor does not. She has set up her own routine for herself and her horses which include trail riding, exercise and roping the bale every night and tying goats at least three nights a week.

Taylor and Pete MacGregor from Jerome are partners in team roping.

Says MacGregor about Taylor, "She keeps her head good and is a good partner. She's always ready when she needs to be."

After graduation, Taylor plans on going to Colorado Mesa University in Grand Junction in the fall. She will compete on the school's rodeo team and plans on working towards a degree in elementary education.

For Fox, Lickley and Taylor, each believes that winning the all-around title is something much more than just being the best or fastest but also includes building better relationships.

"To me, it means being consistent, competitive and determined," said Taylor. "Being the all-around is truly being an all-around person that is willing to help others succeed, having yourself succeed and wanting the best for everyone. You have to earn it by being consistent and have a very real competitive drive in every event and every rodeo. And last is the determination

to be great." "It's not always about winning the saddle," says Lickley. "But rather about a person that is well respected and admired by everyone. That person stands for rodeo and the truly western way of life. People look up to them."

"It's the most honorable term in rodeo," says Fox. "People can master one event but to be good at five events shows you are good and have taken the time and energy to achieve that."

When McCarty and other former UI players were training this spring in advance of the NFL draft, McRoyal was one of the few current members of the roster who worked out with them.

"I knew he wanted to have a good senior year and he was putting in extra work," McCarty said. "He wanted to put in extra work to get to the NFL."

One of the biggest reasons McRoyal came to Idaho was because of quarterback Dominique Blackman. Akey said the two former Carson High players are "basically cousins,"

and both were back in the L.A. area this past week-

A grieving Blackman posted dozens of messages on his Twitter page Sunday, writing in one of them that he was going to change his jersey number from 3 to 86 this fall to honor McRoyal.

"I told (him) he would catch my 1st college pass #RIP86," Blackman wrote. "I love you I'm in your room right now thinking bout it all."

Akey said he awoke to a call from McRoyal's cousin at 6:20 a.m. Sunday. His assistant coaches then notified Vandal players and Akey called each Idaho captain.

"They're our kids, our family, however you want to (put) it," Akey said. "Having a family, I've got to make sure they all know we love them. And so I'm just glad I was able to tell K that when he left town those were probably the last words out of my mouth when I said goodbye to him."

McRoyal's death comes almost eight years after Idaho football player Eric McMillan was murdered at an off-campus Moscow apartment. Akey took over the program two years later, in December 2006.

**AUNT:** Although Amy was old enough to get her license, she is not yet mature enough to handle the responsibility that goes along with driving. For her sake I hope you will impress upon her mother that LIVES could depend upon her exerting control over her daughter.

Many states restrict conditions under which a teen may drive a car. In addition, many parents draft a driving contract that stipulates things like what kind of grade-point average their teenager must maintain to keep his or her driving privileges, limiting the number of passengers he or she can transport and certain distance limits.

Other restrictions can be added at the parents' option. A version of the following contract has appeared in my column before:

I(), agree to the stipulations stated below granting me the privilege of driving. If, at any time, I violate this agreement, my driving privileges will be forfeited.

(1) Should I get a traffic ticket, I agree to pay for the ticket, as well as the difference in the insurance premium for as long as the premium is in effect.

(2) I agree to pay for damages that I incur that are not covered by insurance.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Then, worn with toil, and tired of life,

In vain her shining traps are set." - Rose Cooke 

I try to make the deals on Mondays slightly easier than the deals later in the week. But beware! Today's deal contains an unfriendly trap.

South declares four spades, West leads the diamond king and ace, and declarer ruffs. Declarer can almost always make the contract, as long as the trumps are no worse than 4-1. But he must begin by cashing the ace and king of trump! When the 4-1 spade break appears, he plays on clubs. West ducks the first club to try to disrupt declarer's communications, then wins the second and plays another diamond.

Declarer ruffs and is now reduced to one trump in each hand, while West has two trumps left. Declarer now simply plays on hearts. (This line succeeds no matter which shape West started with — either two or three clubs.) The idea is that when West ruffs in and returns a diamond, as he must, declarer discards a club from table, ruffs in hand, and then uses his remaining clubs as substitute trumps. He runs the clubs, overruffing West whenever he ruffs in, and has the rest.

If it turned out that East had the four trumps, either declarer would be able to cash all of the side winners, or East would find himself in a situation like the one shown here.

Playing the trumps reflexively by cashing the spade ace, then the queen, sees declarer fail in this layout. West scores a second trump trick one way or another.

ANSWER: It looks very easy to lead a spade. I'm not convinced it is right, although it would certainly keep my partner happy! Right or wrong, I'd lead a low diamond (not the 10, because it runs the risk of blocking the suit) and be ready to apologize to my partner if necessary. The fact that I have a side-entry makes a big difference here.

standards of democracy. Five years ago: Daimler-Chrysler said it was selling almost all of Chrysler to private equity firm Cerberus Capital Management for \$7.4 billion, backing out of a troubled 1998 takeover. The trial of suspected al-Qaida operative Jose Padilla (hoh-ZAY' puh-DEE'-uh) opened in Miami. (Padilla and two co-defendants were convicted of terrorism conspiracy and material support after a three-month trial; Padilla was sentenced to 17 years in prison.)

One year ago: At New York's John F. Kennedy International Airport, Dominique Strauss-Kahn, head of the International Monetary Fund and potential candidate for president of France, was removed from a Paris-bound plane and charged with sexually assaulting a Manhattan hotel maid, Nafissatou Diallo (nafee-SAH'-too dee-AH'loh). (Strauss-Kahn later resigned; the charges against him were eventually dropped.)
