Turnout Varied Wildly Tuesday

TWIN FALLS • The most important set of numbers in an election are the results.

The second? How many people showed up to determine those outcomes.

Local races, bond issues and closed primaries affected voter turnout throughout Idaho on Tuesday, with some counties seeing huge percentages and others recording abysmally low numbers.

Tim Hurst, chief deputy secretary of state, said official counts aren't in yet, but he estimated a statewide turnout of about 24 percent. That lines up with turnout in both Twin Falls and Jerome counties.

But some counties saw a flood of voters. Clark County, located in rural eastern Idaho, had a remarkable 303 of 435 registered voters show up to the polls.

That's nearly 70 percent -abig number that can partially be attributed to high-interest county races, said Clark County

Clerk Velvet Killian.

In the Magic Valley, Cassia County saw nearly 50 percent of its registered voters cast their ballots. That matched a similarly high turnout in the 2010 pri-

Cassia County Clerk Joe Larsen attributed the turnout to high interest in local sheriff and county commission races. Add that to the hotly contested Senate race between incumbent Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, and newcomer Douglas Pickett in the newly formed legislative

District 27, and voters had a lot of incentive to come to the polls, Larsen said.

Franklin and Bear Lake counties also had about 50 percent participation, Hurst said.

"The ones that we saw big turnouts in, there were local issues involved in those," he said. But that wasn't the case

everywhere. Despite a contested sheriff's race, Blaine County had a turnout of about 13 percent, with

OTTER EXPECTS GOP TO WEIGH PRIMARY AT STATE CONFAB

BOISE • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter expects Republican leaders in June at the GOP convention in Twin Falls to debate the merits of the party's new closed primary election after Tuesday's record-low turnout.

Otter told The Associated Press Wednesday that discussion there will likely center on whether forcing voters to choose an affiliation, then disclosing it as a public record discouraged some from showing up at the polls.

Otter, who opposed the closed primary, believes it's the biggest reason why only

T.F. All-day Kindergarten Clould Return, but at a Cost

Perrine Elementary seeks return of all-day class, but parents will have to chip in.

TWIN FALLS • If parents want their child in an all-day kindergarten class next year at I.B. Perrine Elementary School, they'll have to pay for it.

The Twin Falls elementary school might offer one section of all-day kindergarten in the fall, but parents must pay \$220 per month.

Principal Bill Brulotte said he sent out a flier last week to parents with incoming kindergarteners about the proposal. At least 18 students must be signed up in order to offer an allday kindergarten class.

He said Monday that parents of 12 or 13 incoming kindergartners have expressed interest.

"Some people are seeing if they can financially afford it or not," he said. A few scholarships will be available to help families with financial

It's the second time Brulotte has tried bringing back an all-day kindergarten class at Perrine Elementary. Last year, only three parents were interested - not enough to move forward with the proposal.

"This year, more parents are willing to pay," he said.

This Land's for the Ducks

A Hagerman man has pledged to keep his Snake River land undeveloped so ducks and those who love to hunt them — can enjoy it for decades to come.

HAGERMAN • One Hagerman resident is tapping into conservation efforts to expand his duck-hunting opportunities.

John Shaw – a member of Ducks Unlimited - has allowed close to 30 acres of his Hagerman Wings Farm to be managed under a conservation easement.

"I love taking someone out duck hunting for the first time," Shaw said. "It's been a real passion for mine almost all my life."

Last November, Shaw approached the Southern Idaho Land Trust about converting a section of his 270-acre farm into an easement. Under the easement agreement, the property can't be commercially developed for the next 30 years. During that time, the property owner should protect the land's resources for the public's benefit.

The new easement is now a wetlands area for ducks and other types of fowl. And as owner of a duck-hunting club, Shaw made sure to build in duck blinds along the easement for additional hunting.

"I've got the water and Ducks Unlimited put the money up for the easement. It just all came together pretty easily," Shaw said. "It's something I've wanted to do for awhile."

single digits. Ada County, which had multiple contested legislative, county commission and sheriff's races, had 16.7 percent turnout.

Those low numbers might be due to disenfranchised voters unhappy with the newly closed Republican primary, which required voters to affiliate with the party before voting on their ballot. The Democratic primary remained open to all voters, regardless of affilia-

Even in Clark County, Killian said many voters were unhappy with the new rule, and turnout may have been higher without it.

Races aside, both Larsen and Killian partially credited their counties' high numbers to politically active residents who are connected with their community.

"I think it shows the closeness of the Mini-Cassia area," Larsen said.

"We have lost employees and their family members to cancer," she said, adding that such personal experiences make participation in the Relay for Life especially meaningful.

Like Hilliard, Donaldson is anticipating a long night at the track filled with laughter, tears and lots of camaraderie.

"Everybody takes a time slot" to walk, Donaldson said. "I usually get what's left over."

Wendell Pool Management Replaced

WENDELL • A public outcry didn't save Lisa Bailey's job as Wendell's pool manager.

At its May 9 meeting, the board of the Wendell Recreation District voted to ask Carolyn McRoberts of Wendell to become the swimming pool operations manager, and Jaci Lancaster of Bliss the swimming pool business manager. Both fulltime positions are new.

The board is down to just two members – Chairwoman Lana Lamm and Anna Simmons – after it accepted the resignation of Scott Brown early in the meeting. Brown, who wasn't present, cited his job's heavy travel schedule for work as the reason for resigning.

Bailey, who had been the

pool manager for two years, didn't attend the May 19 meeting. But she told the Times-News she was never officially fired.

The board hasn't publicly given a reason for not asking Bailey to return this summer, referring to it as a personnel matter.

Upon a request from Lancaster, former lifeguard Alyssa Nelson, 18, addressed the board regarding a private lifeguard party on July 1, 2011.

The party is described in minutes from a special meeting held by the board on Aug. 25. In an interview, Bailey confirmed that it occurred.

According to the meeting minutes, some of the lifeguards decided to "remove their swimsuits and proceed to swim." The minutes say

alcohol might have been consumed at the party, though no one was cited for consumption.

Lifeguards at the party were interviewed by the recreation board in 2011. According to the meeting minutes, board members received different answers when asking where Bailey, the pool manager, was at the time - some lifeguards placed her in the pool at the time, while others said she was in the showers.

According to the minutes, Bailey said she was coming out of the restrooms and upon seeing two girls with their suit tops off, stopped the party immediately.

"The party was done. I talked with both of their parents and this issue with the board was supposed to be a done deal," she said in last week's interview.

At the May 9 meeting, Nelson told the board that four girls, not two as was claimed at the time, skinny-dipped, and said Bailey wasn't in the restroom when it happened but was swimming in the deep end of the pool.

Nelson, who didn't name the other three girls involved, said Bailey swam with them and when the girls got out of the pool undressed, Bailey took their picture.

"She was swimming with her camera," Nelson said.

After the meeting, Nelson told the Times-News she had "never told the truth about that night before."

Separately, Bailey said she is considering legal action.

"A police officer had access to my camera," Bailey

conservation easements, said Ben Collins, who works for the local land trust. This is the seventh easement that SILT has successfully managed to convert into a conservation area around Hagerman since 2002.

"We take them as we come along," Collins said. "We would like to get more, but since we're still so small we're dependent on other people offering to donate the land. We don't have resources to purchase large pieces of property yet."

The Hagerman Wings easement is located west of Hagerman along the Snake River. It's taken several months of work to convert the designated property into a wetlands area for ducks, but Shaw says it should be ready for hunting in the fall.

about 23 percent of registered voters turned out. The figure won't be official until May 30, when voting-day registrations are factored in, but it will almost certainly fall short of the 25 percent turnout of 1988, said Secretary of State Ben Ysursa.

"I am really disappointed," Otter said, after meeting with Ysursa over preliminary numbers. "I can't help but to think, at least from my point of view, that there will be some discussion of the primary. It will be, 'What should we do? Should we make any changes?""

In Ada County, Idaho's most-populous, saw only 16.7 percent of voters show up. Nez Perce County, which includes Lewiston, posted 13.5 percent turnout.

Canyon County west of Boise reported 25 percent turnout. That was on par with Twin Falls County and a bit better than Bonneville County, where election officials in eastern Idaho were reporting 23.6 percent.

Some conservative Republicans shuttered the GOP primary to all but registered voters in 2011 following a federal lawsuit, on grounds that requiring voters to publicly select a ballot would discourage

Democrats and independent voters from "crossing ballot lines" to skew results toward candidates who didn't toe the GOP line. Otter says the biggest

complaint his office received in the election run-up came from those angry about violations of their privacy in the polling booth. "I had to say, 'Wait a

minute, I was the guy who wanted to keep it the way it was," Otter said. "You're shooting at the wrong target."

Jonathan Parker, Idaho GOP director, said Republican state convention delegates in Twin Falls starting June 21 will likely make a recommendation whether to

open their 2014 primary or keep it restricted.

But it will only be a recommendation.

GOP central committee members, meeting likely in January 2013, would still have to agree to allow Democratic or unaffiliated voters to participate, something allowed by state law but only if party leaders agree.

"The whole purpose for closing the primary was not to purify the party, but was actually to uphold our constitutional right of association to allow Republican voters to select Republican candidates who will carry our banner forward in the November election," Parker said.

MAN ACCUSED OF SEVERELY INJURING ANOTHER IN MACHETE ATTACK

KIMBERLY • Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies say a California man used a machete to severely injure another man on Sunday.

Deputies were sent out to 3100 North Road and 3600 East Road, south of Kimberly, for a call about a disturbance and found a 52-yearold man with traumatic head and face injuries. After finding the man, deputies followed a trail of blood to a residence near the intersection.

Shortly prior to finding the victim, deputies responded to a vehicle crash at 4000 North Road and 3952 East Road. According to court documents, a white 2003 Ford F-150 involved in the crash was driven by Martin Hernandez-Vargas, 38, of Visalia, Calif.

"Vargas had left the scene of the accident and was attempting to evade law enforcement," the deputies' report stated.

Deputies believed the man was driving under the influence and took him to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center for a blood draw. He was later taken into custody for DUI and leaving the scene of an accident.

Court documents state a machete with a wooden handle that had blood and hair on the blade was found on the passenger floorboard of the truck, well within the reach of the driver.

When questioned about the incident, Vargas said he had recently moved into a small house on the property, where the victim lived in a trailer, according to the report. Vargas allegedly said the victim began making unwanted sexual advances after the two drank beer together, and he wanted to get away from the trailer.

Vargas said he did not remember if he hit or pushed the man on his way out of the trailer, court records state. He told deputies that when he got in the truck, he saw the victim outside with a knife.

Deputies said Vargas did not have any wounds or blood on his hands when they spoke with him, but did have a

When a deputy visited the emergency room at St. Luke's, the victim was still unconscious and hospital personnel said he would not be able to talk for quite some time, the report stated.

According to the report, the man's injuries appeared to be caused by a sharp weapon, including an apparent broken jaw and a large cut. The deputy described the victim's face as being distorted.

A preliminary hearing for Vargas is scheduled for May 25.



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

The President's 'Other Gospel'

t is one thing to talk about "fairness" when it comes to allowing gays and lesbians to marry; it is quite another to claim biblical authority for such relationships.

President Obama cited the "Golden Rule" about treating others as you would like to be treated, but in doing so he ignored the totality of Scripture and the Lord Himself, who alone gets to set the rules for human behavior.

The president says he is a "practicing Christian." It is difficult to be one while simultaneously holding a low view of the Bible, which his position on several social issues might suggest.

The same Book that informs him about the Person he told Pastor Rick Warren in 2008 is his "Savior," also speaks to the beginning of human life (he has done nothing to limit abortions), fornication between adults of the opposite sex (no word yet on his position on that subject), marriage, and adultery, which the Seventh Commandment and New Testament passages condemn.

Jesus, Whom President Obama likes to selectively quote when it suits his earthly political agenda, honored traditional marriage at a wedding feast in Cana (John 2:1). He also reaffirmed the Genesis passage in Matthew 19:5.

Paul, the Apostle of Jesus, wrote in Ephesians 5 about husbands and wives, male and female.

It also teaches that since God made us, conceived of marriage and created sex to be enjoyed within the marital bond, He gets to set the rules and establish the boundaries for human behavior, not because He is a curmudgeon who wants to deny us pleasure, but because He knows what is best for us.


Liberal theologians have tried to modify, or even change, what is contained in the Bible and there are those in our time who are following their example with the issue of same-sex marriage. People are free to accept or reject what Scripture says. What they are not free to do is to claim it says something it does not. In modern times that's called "spin." In an earlier time it was called heresy.

The Apostle John warns in Revelation 22:18-19 about the punishment awaiting anyone who adds to, or subtracts from Scripture. Deuteronomy 4:1-2 has a similar warning. The consequences aren't pretty. There are also warnings not to preach "another Gospel" (Galatians 1:8, 2 Corinthians 11:4, among others).

As he seeks to justify his position on same-sex marriage and other issues that are either questionable at best, or deny Scripture at worst, President Obama might be said to be preaching another gospel. This could possibly lead to a fissure in his solid support among African Americans, costing the president votes in November. It will also likely galvanize the culture warriors. Minorities mostly vote for Democrats, but they don't like their faith denied. That could cause some of them to stay home on Election Day, or even vote for Mitt Romney.

The negative reaction the president received from some of the African-American ministers he called last week after declaring his support for same-sex marriage should serve as a prophetic warning.





The Menace of Bipartisanship

ipartisanship, the supposed scarcity of which so distresses the high-minded, actually is disastrously prevalent. Since 2001, it has produced No Child Left Behind, a counterproductive federal intrusion in primary and secondary education; the McCain-Feingold speech rationing law (the Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act); an unfunded prescription drug entitlement; troublemaking by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac; government-directed capitalism from the Export-Import Bank; crony capitalism from energy subsidies; unseemly agriculture and transportation bills; continuous bailouts of an unreformed Postal Service; housing subsidies; subsidies for state and local governments; and many other bipartisan deeds, including most appropriations bills.

Now, with Europe's turmoil dramatizing the decadence of entitlement cultures, and with American governments – federal, state and local — buckling beneath unsustainable entitlements, Congress is absent-mindedly creating a new entitlement for the already privileged. Concerning the "problem" of certain federal student loans, the two parties pretend to be at daggers drawn, skirmishing about how to "pay for" the "solution." But a bipartisan consensus is congealing: Certain student borrowers — and eventually

all student borrowers, because, well, why not?—should be entitled to loans at

a subsidized 3.4 percent in-

terest rate forever. In 2006, Democrats, trying to capture control of Congress by pandering to students and their parents, proposed cutting in half the statutory 6.8 percent rate on some federal student loans. Holding Congress in 2007, and with no discernible resistance from the compassionately conservative Bush administration, Democrats disguised the full-decade cost of this - \$60 billion by pretending the subsidy, which now costs \$6 billion a year, would expire in five years.

years.
The five years are up July 1 and of course the 3.4 percent rate will be extended. Barack Obama supports this. So does Mitt Romney, while campaigning against a "government-centered society." What would we do without bipartisanship?

The low 6.8 percent rate — private loans for students cost about 12 percent — was itself the result of a federal subsidy. And students have no collateral that can be repossessed in case they default, which 23 percent of those receiving the loans in

question do. The maximum loan for third- and fourth- year students is \$5,500 a year. The payment difference between 3.4 percent and 6.8 percent is less than \$10 a month, so the "problem" involves less than 30 cents a day.

The 3.4 percent rate applies only to one category of federal loans, but because the Obama administration has essentially socialized the student loan business, federal loans are 90 percent of student borrowing and this "temporary" rate probably will eventually be made permanent for all federal student loans.

Unsurprisingly, Obama

has used this loan issue as an occasion to talk about himself, remembering the "mountain of debt" he and Michelle had when, armed with four Ivy League degrees (he from Columbia, she from Princeton, both from Harvard law), they graduated into the American elite. The Atlantic's Conor Friedersdorf notes that if Washington is feeling flush enough to spend another \$60 billion on education in a decade, it could find more deserving people to subsidize than a privileged minority of college students who are acquiring credentials strongly correlated with higher-than-average future earnings.

The average annual income of high school graduates with no college is \$41,288; for college gradu-

ates with just a bachelor's degree it is \$71,552. So the one-year difference (\$30,264) is more than the average total indebtedness of the two-thirds of students who borrow (\$25,250). Taxpayers, most of whom are not college graduates (the unemployment rate for persons with no college: 7.9 percent), will pay \$6 billion a year to make it slightly easier for some fortunate students to acquire college degrees (the unemployment rate for college graduates: 4 per-

Between now and July, the two parties will pretend that it is a matter of high principle how the government should pretend to "pay for" the \$6 billion while borrowing \$1 trillion this year. But bipartisanship will have been served by putting another entitlement on a path to immortality.

Campaigning recently at Bradley University in Peoria, Romney warned students about their burden from the national debt, but when he took questions, the first questioner had something else on her peculiar mind: "So you're all for like 'vay freedom and all this stuff and vay like pursuit of happiness? You know what would make me happy? Free birth control." While awaiting that eventual entitlement, perhaps she can land a subsidized loan so she can inexpensively continue to hone her interesting intellect.

Suspect Dies in Nampa Standoff

NAMPA • Police in Nampa say a man is dead after pointing a gun at officers, leading at least one of them to shoot at him.

Police Chief LeRoy Forsman officers responding to a noise complaint at a Nampa apartment at 3:45 a.m. Wednesday found a man with a gun. The man said something the officers found threatening, so they backed down the hallway.

Forsman says the man pointed a gun at the officers and at least one of the three fired at the man.

The man locked himself in his apartment. He was found dead around 7 a.m.

An autopsy will determine the cause of death. His name has not been released.

The shooting is being investigated by the Canyon County Critical Incident Task Force.

House Race Closer than Expected

BOISE • Democratic U.S. House candidate Jimmy Farris is the winner of the Democratic nomination in Idaho's 1st Congressional District.

The former NFL player had a tougher-than-expected primary fight with a rival whose highest-profile campaign appearance was with a state judge.

Cynthia Clinkingbeard's run for Congress was largely dismissed after her March 16 assault arrest, where she was accused of threatening a Boise officesupply store's employees with a handgun.

Unofficial results posted by the Idaho Secretary of State show Farris winning with 53.1 percent of the vote to 46.9 percent for Clinkingbeard.

Farris declined to debate Clinkingbeard, saying he didn't feel it was appropriate given her struggle with mental illness.

Clinkingbeard called her arrest "a fly in the ointment" but refused to quit the race.

Farris faces U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador in November.

Idaho's slice isn't much – \$76,152 — but it may be enough to get started on a gym membership.

Toddler's Cries Located Fleeing Driver

SANDPOINT • Authorities say a northern Idaho driver fled the scene of the accident on foot while carrying his 2-year-old daughter and was arrested after deputies followed the sound of the toddler's cries.

Bail was set Monday at \$10,000 for 22-year-old Stephen Paul Hindsley.

Jail records show Hindsley remained held late Tuesday in Bonner County, where he is charged with driving under the influence and leaving the scene of an injury crash.

The Bonner County Daily Bee reports Hindsley crashed his truck Friday on a rural Sandpoint road and fled on foot, leaving behind a 16-year-old injured passenger. Hindsley told deputies he lost control of the truck after he was sideswiped by another vehicle.

Tamarack Suitor Faces New Charges

BOISE • The U.S. Department of Labor has filed a complaint accusing a former suitor of the Tamarack ski resort of violating federal retirement security laws during his failed bid to buy the property.

Agency lawyers filed the complaint in federal court in Boise Wednesday against Matthew Hutcheson of Eagle.

Hutcheson is already defending himself in federal court on 31 criminal counts, including allegations he diverted \$5 million from retirement funds he was appointed to oversee.

Now, The Idaho Statesman reports that Labor Department officials say Hutcheson's misuse of the cash has left pension plans without enough money to pay benefits to participants.

Man Indicted in 2010 Idaho Bank Robbery

Robbery BOISE • A federal grand jury has indicted an Oregon man for his alleged role in a northern Idaho bank robbery two years ago.

Prosecutors say 31-yearold Bradley Monical, of Bend., Ore., was indicted Tuesday for robbing a Wells Fargo bank in Coeur d'Alene on August 27, 2010.

Monical faces up to 20 years in prison and fines up to \$250,000.

Wildlife Group Sues for Details on Bat Disease

HELENA, Mont. • A wildlife advocacy group is suing the U.S. Forest Service for the release of documents that discuss the agency's plans to keep a disease that has already killed millions of bats in the U.S. and Canada from spreading to the Northern Rocky Mountains.

The Center For Biological Diversity filed its lawsuit Wednesday after the Forest Service withheld 13 pages of records from the advocacy group's Freedom of Information Act request.

Center spokeswoman Mollie Matteson says the documents may explain why the agency has not taken any action to prevent the spread of white-nose syndrome to Montana, Idaho and parts of Washington, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Agreement in Idaho Prison Lawsuit Could Cost \$1.6M

BOISE • Lawmakers will have to approve more than \$1.6 million in staffing increases and other costs for the Idaho Department of Correction under an agreement designed to bring a decades-old lawsuit over conditions at a Boise-area

prison to an end.

Idaho State Correctional
Institution inmates and
state officials signed the
agreement Tuesday. It requires more nurses and other medical staffers at the
prison, as well as improvements to the prison pharmacy and increased
oversight.

The estimated cost is \$1.63 million, according to Department of Correction figures. Department Director Brent Reinke said Wednesday he believes the Legislature will approve the budget addition.

"I think they're going to be quite supportive once we explain to them why it's important and what we're trying to accomplish in this settlement," he said.

The money will come out

of taxpayers' pockets. While the department is insured by the state's insurer, Risk Management, costs from this type of court action aren't covered.

The lawsuit began in 1981 when inmates at the Idaho State Correctional Institution sued, alleging they were subject to violence and rape by fellow inmates, denied adequate medical care and forced to deal with extreme overcrowding. Over the next three decades they won several rulings designed to improve conditions, but the medical care has remained a contentious part of the lawsuit.

Last year, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill appointed a correctional health care expert to review the prison's medical care report back his findings.

Dr. Marc Stern told the court he found multiple problems, including nursing mistakes that likely resulted in the deaths of some inmates; overcrowding at the pharmacy site where some inmates pick up their daily medications; and terminal inmates sometimes being denied meals and left lying

in soiled linens.

But the Correction Department and its medical contractor, the Brentwood, Tenn.-based Corizon, countered that Stern's report was inaccurate and contended it misrepresented the level of care at the facility.

Still, the department agreed to make several changes in subsequent settlement talks carried out with the help of a visiting federal judge. Both Corizon and the department will add medical staffers and other employees under the deal -Corizon is expected to add the equivalent of more than 10 fulltime positions and the agency is expected to add roughly 12 full-time positions. The cost of the new Corizon employees will be passed on to the state through the contract and is included in the \$1.6 million

Jason Prince with the firm Stoel Rives is one of the attorneys representing the inmates. He said the prisoners who have been directly involved in the mediation process are satisfied with the deal.



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Custody Fight over Tenn. Boy Continues

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) • The Idaho mother of a 6-year-old boy has waged a court battle for more than 41/2 years to wrest custody of her son away from an East Tennessee man who is not related to the child by blood, marriage or adoption but has raised him since infancy.

"Why don't I have my son back?" asked the child's mother, Kelly MacCord, a 33-year-old mother of four who lives in the rural town of Kamiah, Idaho.

How the red-haired boy named Ayden, who just graduated from kindergarten, wound up with the former soldier named Jon McMillan is a matter of dispute.

MacCord claims the Maryville man took the child shortly after his birth in Texas. McMillan, who has raised the boy as his own, says the mother gave the child to him and his wife, but changed her mind when the boy was 15 months old. He says if she prevails, Ayden will be wrenched from the only home he's ever known.

"He's my son," said McMillan, a 31-year-old Iraq war veteran. "He's my pride and joy. He's the reason why I get up every day."

Anger, Drama at Ratko Mladic's Genocide Trial

THE HAGUE, Netherlands • He's no longer the swaggering general who held Sarajevo "in the palm of his hand" during Bosnia's 1992-95 war. Yet as his long-awaited genocide trial began Wednesday, Ratko Mladic still managed to reopen old wounds with the flick of his hand.

Hobbled by strokes and wearing a business suit instead of combat fatigues, the frail, 70-year-old defendant had an angry exchange of hand gestures with the families of massacre victims in the public gallery, separated by the bulletproof glass in the courtroom.

"Vulture!" said one woman in the gallery.

Watching the war crimes trial on television in Bosnia, Mevlija Malic added: "Not even an animal would behave like

Revolution on Hold

The revolutionaries who paved the way for Egypt's presidential vote now find they

CAIRO • A black smoke covered Cairo's Tahrir Square. Around a dozen protesters who had been holding a weekslong sit-in demanding an end to military rule had come to the conclusion their gathering was useless. So over the weekend, they splashed gas on their tents and banners, burned them to ashes and left.

Last year, Tahrir was the icon on the revolution, where hundreds of thousands massed daily in the uprising that ousted longtime authoritarian ruler Hosni Mubarak in the name of democracy. Now, it has seen better days, dirty and littered with trash. Street vendors sell everything from sandwiches to socks during the day. At night, young men peddle hashish.

Ahead of Egypt's historic election for a new president next week, Tahrir Square's woes reflect the disarray of the protest movement that called for a democratic transformation in the Arab world's most populous nation.

The revolutionary leaders, largely secular and leftist, have no viable candidate in the race. Instead, the vote has boiled down to a choice between former members of Mubarak's regime, who the revolutionaries believe will keep the old

system intact and will not challenge the military's grip on politics, and Islamists, who they worry will impose an equally authoritarian system but based on religion.

The youth groups behind the revolution are left divided and muddled over the election and how to handle the post-election era. Some groups call for a boycott of the vote.

Many in the movement believe that the real confrontations are still to come when they press their agenda on whatever new government

But they are divided even on how to do that. Some question the reliance on protests since Mubarak's fall. Activists staged multiple protests in Tahrir the past year that repeatedly turned in to bloody clashes with police and the military. But they often failed to reach a unified list of demands or create a cohesive political movement. And the turmoil turned sections of the population against them, guided by a persistent military line that the protesters were to blame for chaos.

"We are left with an orphaned revolution. The people don't know what the revolution wants to do," said Rami Sabri, a member of the Popular Socialist Alliance, a newly formed party.

Support from Egyptians craving stability amid

the turmoil and economic woes has vaulted two former regime figures to front-runner status ex-foreign minister Amr Moussa and ex-prime minister Ahmed Shafiq. The latest polls have them slightly on top, though the polls' reliability is unknown.

Religious constituencies have elevated two Islamists: the Muslim Brotherhood's Mohammed Morsi and a moderate, Abdel-Moneim Abolfo-

The revolutionaries who intend to vote have been split. Some — including Wael Ghonim, the Google executive famed for his role in the Facebook page that helped launch the anti-Mubarak revolt - have backed Abolfotoh, drawn by his open views and strong backing for the uprising. Another favorite is the youngest of the 13 can-

didates, Khaled Ali, a labor activist known as "the lawyer for the poor."

Ali is a distant underdog in the polls and has almost no chance of winning. But his candidacy is aimed at showing Egyptians that the revolution does have a face.

"Give the revolution a chance to rule," the 40year-old Ali proclaimed at a recent rally.

During the 18-day uprising that led to Mubarak's fall on Feb. 11, 2011, the protesters' slogan was "bread, freedom and dignity."

U.S. AGENTS ON DEADLY

U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration officials said Wednesday that their agents were working with Honduran military forces aboard a helicopter during an anti-drug operation in which

several people were reportedly slain. Human rights organizations and Honduran news media say at least four people were killed and several more were wounded when forces aboard the helicopter fired on a boat Friday night in eastern Honduras.

"We were there in a support role, working with our counterparts," DEA spokeswoman Dawn Dearden said in

Washington. U.S. government officials, speaking on condition of anonymity because their statements had not been authorized, said Honduran law enforcement did not initiate the shooting, but rather returned fire after being attacked. The officials said the DEA agents did not

When asked about the shooting, U.S. Embassy official Matthias Mitman in Tegucigalpa provided a written statement saying that "the U.S. assisted Honduran forces with logistical support in this operation" as part of efforts to fight narcotics trafficking.

The shooting took place on the Patuca River in northeastern Honduras in a region known as Gracias a Dios. National newspapers in Honduras quoted local officials as saying the victims were diving for lobster and shell-

The State Department says 79 percent of all cocaine smuggling flights leaving South America first land in Honduras, and the U.S. has been working with the Honduran military to stop the drug dealers.

The DEA has a Foreign-deployed Advisory Support Team based in Honduras, one of five in the region, according to congressional testimony. By the end of 2011, 42 Honduran law enforcement agents had been vetted to work with the DEA, according to State Department reports.

Many Will Profit if Pakistan Reopens NATO Supply Routes

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan • U.S. commanders in Afghanistan want to get war supplies rolling across Pakistan's borders again. So do Pakistanis in places both high and low — from officials trying to balance the nation's budget to black marketeers who stand ready to plunder the NATO-contracted trucks and oil tankers expected to shortly resume passage into Afghanistan after nearly six months of closed border crossings.

The deal isn't quite sealed, but Pakistan is set to announce its decision to again allow onto its territory the convoys that provision U.S.backed international forces trying to wind down the decade-long war against the

Pakistan's decision, after months of political posturing and delicate negotiations, is likely to ease strains between Washington and Islamabad. For its renewed cooperation, Pakistan would reap higher tariffs and a payout of at least \$1.3 billion in withheld Coalition Support Funds for its contribution to the fight against militant Islamic extremists.

Officials on both sides say the agreement won't provide Pakistan the full apology it wants for an incident in which U.S. jets and helicopters mistakenly bombed two outposts on the Afghan border in November, killing 24 Pakistani soldiers. The deaths prompted Pakistan's decision to close

borders.

World Leaders Set for Busy Weekend in U.S.

WASHINGTON • More than two dozen world leaders will join President Barack Obama in an extraordinary weekend of back-to-back summits to tackle Europe's mounting economic woes and solidify plans for winding down the decade-long war Afghanistan.

The Group of Eight economic summit and the national security-focused NA-TO meeting will be infused with politics from every angle. For Obama, the summits are a unique election-year opportunity to show leadership on the world stage with-

out having to leave the U.S. But with some new faces around the conference tables, Obama and the other leaders will be confronted by the

Syrian Leader Says Terrorists Are Behind Recent Unrest

BEIRUT • In his first interview since December, Syrian President Bashar Assad insisted Tuesday his regime is fighting back against foreign mercenaries who want to overthrow him, not innocent Syrians aspiring for democracy in a yearlong uprising.

The interview with Russian TV showed Assad is still standing his ground, despite widespread international condemnation over his deadly crackdown on dissent.

"There are foreign mercenaries, some of them still alive," Assad said in an interview broadcast Wednesday on Russian state news channel Rossiya-24. "They are being detained and we are preparing to show them to the world?

Assad also cautioned against meddling in Syria, warning neighboring nations that have served as transit points for contraband weapons being smuggled into the country that "if you sow chaos in Syria you may be infected by it yourself."

He did not elaborate, but rebels and anti-regime activists say Syrian forces have mined many of the smuggling routes where weapons

flow into Syria – mainly from neighboring Turkey and

Assad, who inherited power from his father in 2000, still has a firm grip on power in Syria some 14 months into a revolt that has torn at the country's fabric and threatened to undermine stability in the Middle East.

The U.N. estimated in March that the violence has killed more than 9,000 people, and hundreds more have been killed since then as a revolt that began with mostly peaceful calls for reform transforms into an armed insurgency.

A group known as the Free Syrian Army is determined to bring down the regime by force of arms, targeting military checkpoints and other government sites.

A U.N. observer team with more than 200 members has done little to quell the bloodshed, and some even have been caught up in the violence themselves.

Six observers had to be evacuated from a northern town controlled by the opposition Wednesday, a day after a roadside bomb hit their convoy and left them stranded overnight with rebel forces. None of the observers was wounded, and it was not clear who was behind the at-

The shooting started as the convoy arrived in the opposition area, said Ahmad Fawzi, spokesman for international envoy Kofi Annan.

"The U.N. observers were in their cars and heard the shooting but did not witness anyone being killed, nor could they ascertain the direction of the fire," he said. "At the same time, the bomb exploded near one of the vehicles, damaging the hood?"

Fawzi said people who had

servers ducked behind the vehicles, and according to one observer apparently some people were injured when the bomb exploded.

When the shooting subsided, he said, the observers left their vehicles and proceeded on foot to a Free Syrian Army location where they spent the night.

The U.N. said the team was treated well during their stay with rebels and returned to their base in Hama on Wednesday.

Rivals Airbrush Anti-Romney Words

WASHINGTON • Remember Newt Gingrich calling Mitt Romney a liar? Michele Bachmann saying Romney's un-electable? Rick Santorum calling Romney "the worst Republican in the country" to run against President Barack Obama?

They're hoping you don't. And acting like it never happened (even though most of their words are just clicks away online.)

One by one – with the exception of holdout Ron Paul the GOP also-rans have coughed up endorsements of their onetime rival. And as they do, they're pulling rhetorical backflips to distance themselves from their former harsh assessments of Romney.

Don't try this at home, folks. It takes a professional politician to pull it off with a straight face.

A sampling of the alsorans' anti-Romney rhetoric when they were candidates and their obligatory niceness after endorsing Romney:

Rick Santorum

The former Pennsylvania senator still doesn't have trouble curbing his enthusiasm for Romney. He waited a month after dropping out of the race to endorse Romney, then emailed his tepid endorsement in the dead of night. He finally got out the E-word in the 13th paragraph of his 16-paragraph state-

Then: "He is the worst

Republican in the country to put up against Barack Obama." Santorum later said he was referring to Romney's standing on health care re-

Now: "There are many significant areas in which we agree: the need for lower taxes, smaller government and a reduction in out-ofcontrol spending. We certainly agree that abortion is wrong and marriage should be between one man and one woman. I am also comfortable with Gov. Romney on foreign policy matters, and we share the belief that we can never allow Iran to possess nuclear weapons. And while I had concerns about Gov. Romney making a case as a candidate about fighting against Obamacare, I have no doubt if elected he will work with a Republican Congress to repeal it and replace it." – Endorsement emailed to Santorum supporters.

Newt Gingrich

Gingrich didn't formally endorse Romney when he dropped out of the race but spoke well of him and later said that was close enough. The guy who promised not to run down his GOP opponents at the start of the race had some withering things to say about Romney during the heat of the campaign. Gingrich, a former House speaker, would rather you forget that now, though: His anti-Romney videos on YouTube, once public, are now private. The man who repeatedly branded Romney

a "Massachusetts moderate" now calls him a "solid conservative."

Then: "Someone who will lie to you to get to be president will lie to you when he is president." Asked if he was calling Romney a liar: "Yes."

Now: "I'm going to campaign for him, I favor him over Obama. I went through, like, seven different issues where I favor him. I'll do everything I can to help elect Romney. ... As far as I'm concerned, I've endorsed

Michele Bachmann

Bachmann waited four months after dropping out before she endorsed Romney. The congresswoman from Minnesota campaigned with him in Virginia earlier this month but didn't bring up health care in their joint appearance.

Then: "He can't beat Obama because his policy is the basis of Obamacare. The signature issue of Obama is Obamacare. You can't have a candidate who has given the blueprint for Obamacare. It's too identical. It's not going to happen."

Now: "One thing that Mitt Romney has demonstrated, he will repeal Obamacare. That's a big compare and contrast between Barack Obama. We will never get rid of socialized medicine, which is Obamacare, under Barack Obama. Mitt Romney has committed himself to repealing Obamacare. ... A lot of people know Mitt Romney's positive agenda."

Evacs and Drills Pared near US Nuke Plants

Without fanfare, the nation's nuclear power regulators have overhauled community emergency planning for the first time in more than three decades, requiring fewer exercises for major accidents and recommending that fewer people be evacuated right

Nuclear watchdogs voiced surprise and dismay over the quietly adopted revamp — the first since the program began after Three Mile Island in 1979. Several said they were unaware of the changes until now, though they took effect in December.

At least four years in the works, the changes appear to clash with more recent lessons of last year's reactor crisis in Japan. A mandate that local responders always run practice exercises for a radiation release has been eliminated – a move viewed as downright bizarre by some emergency planners.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the Federal Emergency Management Agency, which run the program together, have added one new exercise: More than a decade after the 9/11 terrorist attacks, state and community police will now take part in exercises that prepare for a possible assault on their local plant.

Still, some emergency officials say this new exercise doesn't go far enough.

These changes, while documented in obscure federal publications, went into effect with hardly any notice by the general public.

Michael Mariotte, director of the anti-nuclear group Nuclear Information and Resource Service, normally tracks such rules very carefully. This time, he learned of them from an Associated Press reporter.

"Unless there are public interest groups out there pointing to the things these agencies are doing, they generally prefer to be operating in quiet, especially if it's likely to be controversial," he said. "A typical American does not read the Federal Register."

The Web archives of FE-MA and the NRC show no news releases on the changes during December

2011 and January 2012. The revisions took effect Dec. 23, at the peak of the holiday season when Americans tend to focus on lastminute gift shopping and social gatherings.

An AP investigative series in June exposed weaknesses in the U.S. emergency planning program. The stories detailed how many nuclear reactors are now operating beyond their design life under rules that have been relaxed to account for deteriorating safety margins. The series also documented dramatic population growth around nuclear power plants and limitations in the scope of emergency exercises. For example, local authorities assemble at command centers where they test communications, but they do not deploy around the community, reroute traffic or evacuate anyone as in a real emergency.

The latest changes, especially relaxed exercise plans for 50-mile emergency zones, are being flayed by some local planners and activists who say the widespread contamination in Japan from last year's Fukushima nuclear accident screams out for stronger planning in the United States, not weaker

FEMA officials say the revised standards introduce more variability into planning exercises and will help keep responders on their toes. The nuclear power industry has praised the changes on similar grounds.

Onsite security forces at nuclear power plants have practiced defending against make-believe assaults since 1991 and increased the frequency of these drills after the 2001 terrorist attacks. The new exercises for community responders took years to consider and adopt with prolonged industry and government consultations that led to repeated drafts. The NRC made many changes requested by the industry in copious comments.

Federal personnel will now evaluate if state and local authorities have enough resources to handle a simultaneous security threat and radiation release. Their ability to communicate with onsite security officials during an attack also will be evaluated during exercises.

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Novel Alternative Presidential Ticket Falls Short

WASHINGTON • An ambitious effort to launch an alternative presidential ticket this fall has foundered, done in by its inability to attract a toptier candidate and the grassroots support necessary to power its novel online nominating process.

Despite the backing of heavyweight political and business leaders and a \$15million effort to get on the ballot across the country, Americans Elect announced Tuesday that none of its potential candidates mustered

the minimum support needed to qualify for the group's primary. That leaves the organiza-

tion in an odd and unprecedented situation: It is already on the general election ballot in 29 states — giving it greater reach than the Green Party but it does not have a ticket.

The group's leaders are meeting Wednesday to consider their options and plan to make an announcement toady. In a statement, Chief Executive Kahlil Byrd said there was "an almost universal desire among delegates, leadership and millions of Americans who have supported AE to see a credible candidate emerge from this

But nominating a candidate without a primary would require the board to change its rules, a move that could trigger criticism that the process was being changed in midstream.

Darry Sragow, a veteran Democratic strategist and one-time political director of the group, said that it would be "incredibly frustrating and disappointing" to abandon the 2-year-old, \$35-million project now. But he cautioned that any changes to the process would have be done carefully, adding that "there will be shots fired at the Americans Elect candidate based on how that candidate got the nomination."

It's a deflating scenario for a group that pledged to break the lock of the Democratic and Republican parties and field a viable independent presidential candidate, selected through a secure online nomination convention.

But Americans Elect's secretive process - including its refusal to identify its donors - and top-down approach hobbled its attempts to trigger grass-roots enthusiasm. Historically, thirdparty or independent bids like that of H. Ross Perot in 1992 have gained momentum because of the individual running, not merely the concept of an alternative.

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



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Study Finds Java Drinkers Live Longer

MILWAUKEE • One of life's simple pleasures just got a little sweeter. After years of waffling research on coffee and health, even some fear that java might raise the risk of heart disease, a big study finds the opposite: Coffee drinkers are a little more likely to live longer. Regular or decaf doesn't matter.

The study of 400,000 people is the largest ever done on the issue, and the results should reassure any coffee lovers who think it's a guilty pleasure that may do

"Our study suggests that's really not the case," said lead researcher Neal Freedman of the National Cancer Institute. "There may actually be a modest benefit of coffee drinking?

No one knows why. Coffee contains a thousand things that can affect health, from helpful antioxidants to tiny amounts of substances linked to cancer. The most widely studied ingredient caffeine – didn't play a role in the new study's results.

It's not that earlier studies were wrong. There is evidence that coffee can raise LDL, or bad cholesterol, and blood pressure at least short-term, and those in turn can raise the risk of heart disease.

Even in the new study, it first seemed that coffee drinkers were more likely to die at any given time. But they also tended to smoke, drink more alcohol, eat more red meat and exercise less than non-coffee-drinkers. Once researchers took those things into account, a clear pattern emerged: Each cup of coffee per day nudged up the chances of living longer.

The study was done by the National Institutes of Health and AARP. The results are published in today's New England Journal of Medi-

Careful, though — this doesn't prove that coffee makes people live longer, only that the two seem related. Like most studies on diet and health, this one was based strictly on observing people's habits and resulting health. So it can't prove cause and effect.

But with so many people, more than a decade of follow-up and enough deaths to compare, "this is probably the best evidence we have" and are likely to get, said Dr. Frank Hu of the Harvard School of Public Health. He had no role in this study but helped lead a previous one that also found coffee bene-

Iran Hangs Alleged Israeli Agent

TEHRAN, Iran • At the gallows, the condemned prisoner Tuesday repeated the allegations Iran lodged against him: That he was trained by Israel's spy agency to carry out one of the first attacks on Iranian scientists in a suspected shadow war against Tehran's nuclear ambitions.

"The end of the road has nothing except repentance and rope," Majid Jamali Fashi was quoted as saying just moments before he was hanged for the January 2010 bombing that killed Tehran University physics professor Masoud Ali Mohammadi.

The execution inside Tehran's Evin Prison — and Iran's state-sanctioned coverage of his purported last words — are connected to a world of alleged covert operations and assassination plots that have stretched from the Black Sea to Bangkok, and yet have somehow not disrupted efforts at nuclear talks between Iran and world powers, which are expected to resume next week in Baghdad.

House OKs Its **Anti-domestic** Violence Bill

WASHINGTON • The House has passed Republican legislation to renew an anti-domestic violence law.

Wednesday's vote to reau-

thorize the Violence Against Women Act for five years followed an emotional debate over whether the House GOP bill would better protect women from violence and sexual assault than a Senatepassed version. The White House, most Democrats and a long list of advocacy groups say the House version doesn't go far enough to protect battered immigrants, Native Americans or gays.

The 1994 law has been renewed twice with wide bipartisan agreement. But this presidential and congressional election year gender politics bred controversy and the House and Senate must now reconcile their versions.

House Republicans said their bill did more to protect taxpayer money from fraud.

China TV Blames Dalai Lama for **Fiery Protests**

BEIJING • China has released a documentary accusing the Dalai Lama of orchestrating a wave of self-immolations by Tibetans, in its most elaborate attempt so far to shape international opinion about the protests against Chinese rule.

The documentary shown globally by state broadcaster China Central Television features police surveillance footage of the fiery protests. Mostly lone Tibetans are seen ablaze on small town roads before being blasted by security forces with fire extinguishers or covered with blankets.

All told, the piece, titled "The Dalai clique and selfimmolation violent incidents," marks the government's most extensive effort to cast blame on the exiled Tibetan spiritual leader for protests that have touched Tibetans emotionally and presented an image problem for

Chinese Activist Applies for

Passport
BEIJING • A blind Chinese activist who sparked a diplomatic crisis by fleeing into the U.S. Embassy last month filled out a Chinese passport application and posed for a photo Wednesday, moving forward in his bid to study in the United States.

Paperwork for Chen Guangcheng, his wife, and two children was completed in the hospital where the family of four has stayed since he left the embassy in Beijing two weeks ago.

The Chinese Foreign Ministry has said Chen is free to study abroad like any other Chinese citizen, but security officials have kept him under virtual house arrest in his hospital room for two weeks. Until Wednesday, there was no clear sign that the government would let him apply for a passport.

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Mladic

Mladic is accused of commanding Bosnian Serb troops who waged a campaign of murder and persecution to drive Muslims and Croats out of territory they considered part of Serbia. His troops rained shells and snipers' bullets down on civilians in the 44-monthlong siege of the Bosnian capital, Sarajevo, and killed 8,000 Muslim men and boys in Srebrenica in July 1995, Europe's worst massacre since World War II.

"The world watched in disbelief that in neighborhoods and villages within Europe a genocide appeared to be in progress," prosecutor Dermot Groome said at the U.N. court in The Hague.

Twenty years after the war that left 100,000 dead, Bosnia remains divided into two ministates - one for Serbs, the other shared by Bosnian Muslims and Croats linked by a central government.

Mladic fled into hiding after the war and spent 15 years as a fugitive before international pressure on Serbia led to his arrest last year. Now he is held in a one-man cell in a special international wing of a Dutch jail and receives food and medical care that would likely be the envy of many in Bosnia.

But the fact that he is jailed and on trial is seen as another victory for international justice and hailed by observers as evidence that

more often than not — war crimes tribunals get their indicted suspects, even if years later. In another court Wednesday in The Hague, former Liberian President Charles Taylor faced a sentencing hearing after being convicted last month of aiding rebels in neighboring Sierra Leone's civil war.

That is heartening news for the International Criminal Court, which has indicted the likes of Sudanese President Omar al-Bashir for genocide but appears nowhere close to having him arrested.

In a demonstration of Bosnia's continuing ethnic divide, Mladic's entrance in court was applauded by people who gathered in the Serb stronghold of Pale to watch the trial on TV.

"Mladic is our hero. It's sad that we see him there," said Milan Ivanovic, a 20year-old law student.

Groome told the threejudge panel that Mladic was hand-picked by Bosnian Radovan leader Karadzic because of his skills as a military commander, but also "because Karadzic believed he was willing to commit the crimes needed to achieve the strategic goals of the Bosnian Serb leadership."

He signaled that prosecutors would use Mladic's own words against him in the trial, drawing on the former general's wartime diaries, radio intercepts and appearances on television during

the war. In one such TV appearance, Mladic showed a news team around the Serb artillery dug into hills overlooking Sarajevo and denied any involvement in war crimes - foreshadowing his defense now that his actions were intended only to protect Serbs.

"I did not take part in any crimes. I have only defended my people," Mladic said. He denies wrongdoing but has refused to enter pleas to the 11 charges against him in The Hague.

A Mountain Biker's Heaven

Want to ride? A mountain bike group and Bureau of Land Management is pushing to officially authorize about 40 miles of trail at Indian Spring.

KIMBERLY • For years mountain biking enthusiasts have flocked to a system of bike trails south of Kimberly known as the Indian Spring trails. Members of bike clubs and casual mountain bikers alike use the popular trails along with hikers, runners and people on motor bikes and ATVs.

Now the Bureau of Land Management and the International Mountain Biking Association are working to officially authorize the

Why Authorize?

"What we have out there is a network of about 40 miles of user-created trails," said Mike Courtney, field manager at the BLM's Burley

Since the trails were never authorized by the BLM, Courtney is unable to approve applications for organized events such as races on the trails.

"I can't authorize them on a system of trails that's not legitimate," he said.

IMBA and its local affiliate, the Southern Idaho Mountain Biking Association, approached the BLM to find out how to make the trails official, and improve them in the process.

"They assessed the current network of trails and made recommendations about which trails are sustainable in the current conditions and which to eliminate or reroute," Courtney said. "They went a little further and said here's an opportunity to develop 20 more miles of trails."

Authorizing the trails will also help them stay in better shape for riders.

"Once it's official, then we'll be able to maintain the trails," said Mike Goudy of the Spoke and Wheel Bike Shop in Twin Falls.

This can be anything from keeping brush off the trails to keeping stream crossings safe for riders, he said.

The Process

Representatives from IMBA are scheduled to begin flagging the trails, both new and established, this week, Goudy said.

"We've got to do clearance work. The International Mountain Biking Association will flag those routes that they looked at last year and potential new routes," Courtney said.

Once the trails are marked, Courtney's staff of scientists will spend the next year trekking the trails on foot, looking for issues that could clash with a heavily used bike trail.



COEUR d'ALENE • The North Idaho Centennial Trail is getting a facelift.

Thanks to a hefty grant from the Idaho Parks and Recreation Department, almost all of the popular walking and bicycle trail will be re-sealed this summer.

Cracks along the trail will be filled in, and spots where tree roots lift the trail enough to make riding uneven will be smoothed out as well.

"This is a huge deal for us," said Charlie Miller, North Idaho Centennial Trail Foundation manager, on landing the grant that will make the work happen this summer. "We've never gotten something this substantial up in this part of the

Teamwork between several recreation-loving agencies helped land the \$117,500 state and federal grant, more than half of the project's total. The Joint Powers comprised of Coeur d'Alene, Post Falls and Kootenai

County – and the NICTF are aiming to pitch in around \$52,000 between them as matching money for the one-time funds.

The Centennial Trail last was sealed around 2005. Parts of the trail will be restriped where it crosses roadways and intersections.

Timber Turner, riding his bicycle on the trail Monday, said the maintenance work is needed, considering the amount of foot and wheel traffic that leads to wear and

"It gets a lot of use in the summer," he said. "It really is an attribute to the commu-

When it's completed, the updated trail should boast a "darker, richer" black hue,

Miller said. And rides on it, "will be

smooth as butter," he added. Kootenai County Parks and Waterways successfully secured that grant. The Coeur d'Alene Parks Department will administer it and the work contract, according to Doug Eastwood, Coeur d'Alene parks director. The KCPW is one of several agencies that meet regularly to help maintain the outdoor recreation lane.

"It's in very good hands," Eastwood said of the trail, and the teamwork behind

Trail work could be completed within 30 days, beginning at the end of the month. Parts will be closed, and re-routed, incrementally. On weekends, the entire trail will be opened. Work will cover 17 miles of the 23mile trail, leaving out the Class 2 portions that are bike lanes on streets with vehicle

The Prairie Trail, which connects with the Centennial Trail, will also be resealed as part of project. The NICTF would pay \$24,000 for that.

The Archer's Challenge

ometimes the seeds of a great idea or a grand adventure are sown with the passing of a casual com-

My epiphany came last weekend when my wife – almost as an afterthought mentioned that it would be nice to have the freezer filled with elk steaks and roasts again this fall.

Perhaps it's been the distractions of a demanding job or the pressures of a growing family. But for whatever reason, I hadn't chased elk since moving back to Idaho from the elkrich Wind River Mountains near Lander, Wyo. Now thanks to my good wife's suggestion, I'm ready to make up for those long years of neglect. This fall, however, I'll be hunting the rutting beasties with a stick and a string rather than my trusty Model 70.338.

At this point I need to preface the remainder of today's column by admitting that as an archer I am a complete novice – a beginner's beginner.

Even though I spent several falls still-hunting shimmering quaky hideouts and snaking through dank rut-scented north slope tangles, I never released an arrow at an elk. One fall a friend of mine and I did manage to cow call a decent five-point into an aspen patch, but I let down the string when the young stud hung up at 50 yards — too far to confidently thread a broadhead through the heavy cover.

What I'm planning subject to your interest and input – is to pen a series of columns designed to introduce wannabe and fledgling archers to the sport.

We'll be approaching this intriguing and somewhat intimidating sport through the eyes of a novice - me - by visitingand conferring with local experts on equipment selection, shooting facilities and techniques, and



proven hunting strategies. And as the columns unfold, I'll be soliciting your input on topics, techniques, regulations, people and products that will help unravel the intricacies of the archer's world for those of us that are new to the game.

If you think that you might want to participate in one of Idaho's many big game archery hunts this fall, now is the time to get started. For information on seasons, hunt areas, tags and fees, pick up a Fish and Game pamphlet at your local sporting goods store. To obtain an archery tag, all bowhunters must possess a valid hunting license, show proof that they have completed an approved bowhunter education course or provide evidence of having been licensed for an archery-only hunt in Idaho or another state, or complete an affidavit to that effect.

The state's Bowhunter **Education Course averages** 12 classroom hours plus a field experience day. As an alternative to the traditional classroom format, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game offers Internet-based Hunter and Bowhunter Education courses for individuals 10 years and older. Internet learners also are required to complete the six-to seven-hour field day to demonstrate safe and appropriate bow hunting behaviors. For details, visit fishandgame.idaho.gov.

The fun begins with the next column, so please join me here in the great Outdoors as we unravel the mysteries of the ancient art of pursuing game with a stick and a string. Good shooting!

Dunn, who supervises the Sun Valley Ski Patrol, works as a fly fishing guide for Silver Creek Outfitters during summer. But he also has his own guide service - Flyfish Bhutan and Beyond, the only Western guide excursion taking fly fishermen into the Himalayas.

His slide presentations before the Wood River Valley chapter of Trout Unlimited, which combine pictures of 50-pound Golden Mahseer trout with cultural photos of Bhutan's towering Punakha Dzong palace and prayer flags strung beneath waterfalls, have drawn standing room-only crowds.

And his free slide show at 6 p.m. May 23, at The Community Library in Ketchum is expected to draw a big crowd, as well.

"There's no experience like fly fishing in the Himalayas. It's a trip for the truly adventurous - someone who wants to be on the cutting edge of global fly fishing," said Dunn, who returned from a month-long trip Monday evening.

Dunn began fishing Bhutan in 2007 - shortly after the so-called "Land of the Thunder Dragon" located at the eastern end of the Himalayas opened itself up for tourism. The number of visitors has climbed from 9,000 to 38,000 in five years, Dunn said, but tourism is still tightly controlled.

Dunn was introduced to Bhutan by Ketchum kayaker and filmmaker Gerry Moffat whose American-Bhutanese corporation wanted Dunn to access the "fishability" of the kingdom for a recreational lodge it was building.

The few fly fishermen who venture to Bhutan find themselves alone on the rivers because the Bhutanese people's Buddhist beliefs do not permit them to fish.

"The Bhutanese do not fish, although their land is full of rivers and those rivers are full of fish," said Dunn.

The catch-and-release fishing that Westerners enjoy targets brown trout stocked by the British empire and snow trout, which exceed

two feet and are feisty fight-

The star, however is the golden mahseer trout, which Dunn says is the hardest fighting freshwater fish in the world, thanks to the fight it must put up in streams running off the world's tallest mountains.

"It's challenging to present a fly to these fish without spooking them," he said. "But a dedicated angler has an exceptional chance at landing one."

This past month's expedition was Dunn's first into the Indian Himalayas.

"Where we went was very remote," said Dunn, who charges clients \$4,400 on up for an experience that includes sleeping on beds in tents and meals of chicken, yak cheese and vegetables. "It took five days from the time we left Ketchum traveling by plane, train, automobile, raft and foot to our first

Dunn proposed to his wife Debby, who grew up in Twin Falls as Debby Boyd, during one fishing expedition to Bhutan.

Debby had hooked a huge trout, which eventually broke off taking her fly with it. After proposing, Bryant returned to fishing and landed that same trout, finding her fly in the corner of its mouth.

Debby recounted showing a woman who was walking to temple how to cast on the side of the road.

"They're not allowed to fish in the river because it's against their religion. But they're very curious about us. The people are incredibly

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

Skechers to Pay to Settle Charges Over Unsupported Claims • Skechers has agreed to pay \$40 million to settle charges that the company made unsupported claims about the benefits of its toning shoes, falsely asserting that they help people lose weight, tone their lower bodies and even combat heart disease. In a complaint filed Wednesday in federal court, the Federal Trade Commission said Skechers could not back up advertising hype for its Shape-ups line, such as "Get in Shape Without Setting Foot in a Gym." The company also failed to disclose that a chiropractor featured in one of its ads is married to a Skechers marketing executive and was paid to conduct a clinical study that favorably rated Skechers performance.

U.S. Economy Picks Up after Spring Slump

WASHINGTON • Maybe the U.S. economy's strength this winter wasn't just weather-related after all.

Home construction is near a threeyear high. And factory output has risen in three of the year's first four months.

The data released Wednesday suggest growth in the April-June quarter is off to a good start, helped by falling gas prices and solid hiring gains. Fears of a spring slump are easing. "It's all very encouraging," said Paul

Ashworth, chief U.S. economist at Capital Economics. "Things look good at the moment."

Builders broke ground in April at a seasonally adjusted annual pace of 717,000 homes, the Commerce Department said. That nearly matches January's pace, the best since October 2008.

Construction rose for both singlefamily homes and apartments.

Some economists have noted that a warm winter led companies to move up some hiring and accelerate other activity - including homebuilding that normally wouldn't occur until spring. That gave the appearance that the economy had strengthened in January and February and weakened in March.

But Ashworth noted that the overall trend in housing starts has been running at roughly the same annual pace approximately 700,000 — over the past six months. That's 100,000 more on average than the pace for the previous six months.

Ashworth said the higher level suggests demand is increasing and the mild winter had less effect than some economists had thought.

"We expect starts to strengthen further this year," Ashworth wrote in a note to clients.

Even with the gains, the rate of construction for all homes is only about half the 1.5 million annual pace that most economists consider healthy. But the increase, along with rising builder confidence and stronger job growth, is a sign that the home market may finally be starting to recover nearly five years after the housing bubble burst.

Single-family home construction is now 39 percent higher than its recession low. And developers are also anticipating more sales. Permits for single-family home construction rose 2 percent last month.

The growth in single-family home construction is important because those homes make up roughly 70 percent of the market. Since the recession, homeownership has declined while demand for apartments has

Economists say continued job gains could quickly reverse that trend.

"Homebuilders are reporting stronger demand," Ian Shepherdson, an economist at High Frequency Economics, said in a note to clients. "And while rental demand means the multifamily sector is much stronger than single family, that will change as the labor market improves further."

U.S. manufacturing, one of the strongest areas of the economy since the recession ended nearly three years ago, also rebounded in April after a March lull.

Factory output is now 18.3 percent higher than its low hit in June 2009, the month the recession ended. It's only 6.1 percent below its pre-recession peak.

Factories are busier in part because automakers are selling more cars and trucks. Half of the April increase in factory output reflected a 3.9 percent jump in the production of motor vehicles and parts. That was the fifth straight gain at auto plants.

Production also rose at a wide range of companies in April, from makers of computers and electronics to aerospace and furniture factories.

The modest gain shows that U.S. manufacturers aren't cutting back in the face of Europe's financial crisis and slower growth in China.

Faster output at U.S. factories has been a key reason employers have added 1 million jobs over the past five months. It's also helped lower the unemployment rate from 9.1 percent in August to 8.1 percent last month.

Manufacturing companies have added 167,000 jobs in that stretch. That's roughly 17 percent of the job gains, even though manufacturing represents less than 10 percent of the economy.

More jobs, along with record-low mortgage rates and low home prices, are making home buying more attractive to some Americans.

NEW YORK • A threat that's been hanging over the economy is starting to look a lot less menacing.

Oil and gasoline prices are sinking, giving relief to businesses and consumers who a few weeks ago seemed about to face the highest fuel prices ever.

President Barack Obama's re-election prospects could also benefit, especially if prices keep falling as some analysts expect. A majority of Americans disapproved of Obama's handling of gas prices in an AP-GfK poll early this month. But that was before the full effect of the recent drop had reached drivers.

The average U.S. retail gasoline price has dropped 21 cents a gallon to \$3.73 since hitting a 2012 peak of \$3.94 on April 6.

The economy could gain, too. Consumers who spend less on fuel have more to spend on other purchases, from autos and furniture to appliances and

vacations, that could help drive economic output and job growth. The price drop will likely boost consumer confidence. It also comes at a

timely moment: Ahead of

the Memorial Day weekend, a busy one for travel and entertainment spend-

"It's extra money in the wallets of most American consumers, and that's going to help," said James Hamilton, an economist at the University of California, San Diego who studies oil prices.

Lower oil prices also mean cheaper diesel and jet fuel for shippers and

airlines. Crude oil, which is used to make gasoline, is at a seven-month low of \$92.81 a barrel. It's down nearly 13 percent since May 1. Behind the steady drop are larger fuel stockpiles, easing fears about Iran and expectations of lower demand as the global economy slows.

The average national gasoline price is expected to fall as low as \$3.50 a gallon this summer. It could even dip near \$3 in some states. The national average is being propped up by refinery problems in California that have lifted prices well above the national average there, according to Tom Kloza, chief oil analyst at the Oil Price Information Service.

A 50-cent drop in the gasoline price would save consumers roughly \$70 billion over a year.

Verizon in \$63 Billion Faceoff with AT&T Over Family Plans

PORTLAND, Ore. • Verizon Wireless and AT&T are each preparing to roll out shareddata pricing plans this year. Whoever makes the first move will transform the way the industry charges for wireless service.

The new shared plans, which may be announced as early as next month, would let customers split one bucketful of Internet data between their phones, iPads and other wireless devices, providing an economical option for families, small businesses or people with a lot of Web-connected gadgets.

Getting the approach right could reduce customer turnover and get more users to embrace data plans, which brought in \$62.7 billion industrywide last year, according to trade group CTIA. A wrong move would lower the amount of money that subscribers pay, while increasing network traffic and the cost of maintaining networks.

"They are watching each other," said independent wireless analyst Chetan Sharma, who covers telecommunications from Issaquah, Wash. Once one U.S. carrier introduces a shared data plan, the rest of the industry, including Sprint Nextel and T-Mobile, won't be far behind, he said.

Consumers have a grow-

ing appetite for data plans, which let people surf the Web and use other Internet functions on their devices. Apple's iPhone has fueled demand by making it easy to use data-intensive features, such as online applications and the Siri voice-activated personal assistant.

While U.S. carriers already offer family plans to consumers, they're more focused on calls. Each user and device is typically assigned an individual data plan, often at \$10 to \$50 apiece.

For carriers, the rewards of offering shared data can be huge, said Reade Barber, a vice president at Rogers Communications, Canada's largest wireless carrier. His company would know: It adopted the strategy in 2009.

"The number of people using data at Rogers just exploded," he said. More than 25 percent of Rogers' familyplan subscribers use shared data plans. "We attracted a lot of new users of data."

The approach can entice consumers who only pay for voice or texting plans to pony up for data, bringing extra money to carriers. Or a family might shell out more for their data plan to let the kids have Internet access on their phones. Families may boost monthly bills by \$15, said Susan Welsh de Grimaldo, an analyst at Strategy Analytics in Newton, Mass.





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
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Postives Plenty for College of Idaho's Decision to Bring Back Football

THE NEWS: The College of Idaho's Board of Trustees overwhelmingly votes to bring back football to the Caldwell school, starting in the 2014 season.

THE MUSE: First, a little personal history. This corner didn't know the College of Idaho even existed prior to moving here last summer. And it knew nothing about the quality of the



school until talk surfaced recently that school leaders were considering bringing the sport back.

It reminded me of a story legendary in University of

Oklahoma circles. The Sooners were long a collegiate football power when, in 1964 before a state legislature budget hearing, University of Oklahoma President George L. Cross said, "We want to build a university of which the football team can be proud."

Today, OU, as it's universally known, is one of the top state universities in the

country. Among public schools, it ranks first in per capita enrollment of National Merit Scholars and in the top 10 in Rhodes Scholar graduates. It's safe to say that Cross' "vision" has been largely fulfilled.

With the College of Idaho, this story is turned on its head somewhat. It has

RICHFIELD • Michael Robinson's first trip into this rural Idaho town was as jarring as the blocks he lays on defenders as the Seattle Seahawks' fullback.

'Oh man, I had no idea. I've never been here before," Robinson said. "Riding in, you see the

(sign) that says 'Population 482,' you're kind of like, 'Whoa. OK.' I didn't even know there were towns this small."

It didn't take long for Robinson, who grew up in Richmond, Va., to feel right at home.

The six-year NFL pro was in town as part of the United Dairymen of Idaho and Idaho Dairy Council's Fuel Up to Play 60 campaign, designed fight childhood obesity by encouraging school-aged children to reap the benefits of regular exercise and good eating habits.

Time Set for **Boise State-BYU Game**

ESPN announced Wednesday that Boise State's Sept. 20 home football game against Brigham Young will kick off at 7 p.m., one of three games to be broadcast by the family of ESPN networks this fall.

The game against BYU joins the season opener against Michigan State (Aug. 31, 6 p.m., ESPN) and the Dec. 1 season finale against Nevada (time and channel TBA) on ESPN's list of Bronco broadcasts. Only back-to-back games against New Mexico (Sept. 29) and Southern Mississippi (Oct. 6) have yet to have any television details announced.

The remainder of the Broncos' schedule will be broadcast on either the NBC Sports Network or CBS Sports Network, both of which are cable channels.

ISU Escapes APR Hit

The Idaho State football team, which received a one-year postseason ban for low academic progress rates for the 2011 season, will not have any such penalty or loss of scholarships this year, the school announced in a press release.

Schools below the NCAA-mandated benchmark of 930 can expect penalties of varying degrees, dependent upon their score. Although the NCAA has not yet released its official APR scores, Idaho State is confident it will exceed the benchmark and as a result, have its full allotment of scholarships and practice time, as well as postseason eligibility - the latter being a moot point in 2011 as ISU went 2-9.

In order to move its football program to the Big East (and a much-larger TV contract that presumably will come with it), Boise State needs a stable home for its non-football teams. The Broncos were slated to join the WAC, but that league is down to five other members and facing more challenges.

Enter the Big West, a California-based nonfootball league that is adding Hawaii and San Diego State and was Boise State's conference home in the late 1990s.

The league will "entertain" adding Boise State

and has sent the Broncos the equivalent of a membership application, Commissioner Dennis Farrell

"We're open to at least explore the possibility," he told the *Idaho Statesman* on Tuesday, one day after the league concluded meetings.

Boise State needs eight votes from the league's 10 2013-14 members to be accepted into the conference. Those schools are Long Beach State, Cal State Fullerton, UC Santa Barbara, Cal Poly, UC Riverside, UC Irvine, Cal State Northridge, UC Davis, San Diego State and Hawaii.

There is no timetable for a decision, but Boise State faces a July 1 deadline to withdraw from the Mountain West.

Lee Elia: A light-hitting shortstop, he left his mark on the majors with his mouth. All in little over 3 minutes, too. Beaten down after another loss in 1983, the Chicago Cubs' manager unleashed a tirade that, at best count, included almost 50 pieces of profanity. Elia apologized to the team and city soon thereafter, and was fired later in the

Earl Weaver: For someone who tore up rulebooks and pointed the bill of his cap backward to go nose-to-nose with umpires, what the Hall of Fame manager did in 1977 seemed downright mild. But the Baltimore skipper was sure he was right, and pulled the O's off the field in Toronto down 4-0 in the fifth inning over a dispute about the tarp at Exhibition Stadium. The only forfeit in Orioles' history came during a pennant race. As for his argument with ump Marty Springstead, Weaver said: "The man gets incoherent."

Lenny Randle vs. Frank Lucchesi: Randle sometimes shows up in highlight reels for the time he got on his hands and knees and tried to blow a trickler down the thirdbase line into foul territory. But there was nothing

funny about his confrontation with the Texas manager in 1977. Having lost his starting job, Randle began arguing with Lucchesi during batting practice and then punched him in the face, breaking his cheekbone. The Rangers suspended

Later, he yanked up a pair of bases, got down on his belly to pretend he was crawling, threw the rosin bag at the umpire and blew kisses to the crowd. Oh yeah, that guy.

The other participants received a football, and Robinson handed a banner to Ward in Seahawks' colors with the number 12 on it, to signify the 12th Man and honor the boisterous Seahawks fans who watch the team play in the fall.

By offering football, the College of Idaho has ensured that those numbers will shrink. For those of us who love the game, that's a good thing.

THE NEWS: College of Southern Idaho baseball player Billy-Bob Ward is arrested and charged with three felony counts of delivery of a controlled substance, i.e. anabolic steroids.

THE MUSE: Taking a big-picture view and trying not to single out anyone at CSI, can we really say this is surprising? For all the efforts Major League Baseball has made to distance itself from the Steroid Era and ensure that steroid use isn't as rampant in the sport as it was a decade ago, the developments at CSI show there is only so much smaller organizations can do to keep their programs free of the problem. If it is happening at CSI, it is probably happening at several other junior colleges as well.

That is not an excuse or justification for what happened at CSI. On the other end of the spectrum, there are probably those who will have knee-jerk reactions toward the CSI coaching staff and head coach Boomer Walker, and conclude either that the program is out of control or that Walker is out of touch with his players.

This corner is not as immersed in the culture of CSI baseball as others who have been around longer. But when Walker says his program is not one that places winning first, second and last, he sounds sincere and believable.

Retroactively or otherwise, CSI must have a zero-tolerance policy toward steroid use. How it goes about discovering and dismissing from school those who use steroids is a matter it will have to resolve largely on its own, But with the charges levied against Ward, it has been given a head start in its search.







Olympic Torch Headed to U.K., Beckham

ATHENS, Greece • Time to get out the cameras: Britain's most photogenic man will be bringing the Olympic flame back from Greece.

David Beckham is joining officials at a handover ceremony Thursday in Athens, as the Olympic torch travels from the ruins of the ancient games in Olympia to a naval base in Cornwall, southern England.

The former England national team captain who now plays for the Los Angeles Galaxy was among those who helped London snatch the 2012 Summer Games away from Paris, the favorite. He will carry the torch back to the U.K. on a flight Friday along with Princess Anne and Olympic officials.

From there, the torch begins an Anglophile's dream tour — a 70-day, 8,000-mile journey past nearly every iconic site on the island: Big Ben, Stonehenge, the white cliffs of Dover, you name it. It ends up at Olympic Stadium in London to highlight the opening ceremony on July 27 and burns brightly until the Aug. 12 closing ceremony.

Here's a look at the torch

The Trip to Britain Parties, Parties

The torch always travels first class, gets its own seat and its own guard. This time it's on British Airways flight 2012, placed in a miner's lantern for the safety of everyone else on the plane. Once it lands in Britain, it stays safe and secure at a Royal Naval base before it goes off into the wilds of the British Isles.

From West to East, South to North

A total of 8,000 people will carry the torch during the 70-day relay that begins at Land's End — the furthest point west in England and reaches the Shetland Islands, off Scotland's northern coast. It also goes to Ireland as a special gesture of goodwill. They are neighbors, after all.

The Torchbearers

Who carries the torch? Nice people. Thousands of community organizers, cancer survivors, disabled children, veterans and other local heroes will each do a stint. Olympic organizers hope

that torchbearers will inspire the nation since they are the ones who fight real fires and save children and work to better their communities.

Keeping It Safe

Not surprisingly, the torch is a magnet for all sorts of people who want publicity. The London Olympics have a \$14.6-billion price tag for Britain and a fair number of people think the Conservative-led government could have spent the money more wisely during this economic downturn.

Just recently, a man protesting austerity measures dove into the water to interrupt the annual Boat Race between Oxford and Cambridge.

The Olympic flame has its own security team and they are well aware of the human rights protests that accompanied the 2008 Beijing Olympics torch relay as it journeyed the world. Afterward, the International Olympic Committee decided to keep the relay in the host country and had to give special permission to let the 2012 relay go to Ireland as a gesture of political goodwill.

Everywhere

Best thing about the Olympic torch relay: there are street parties and community events everywhere it goes, night after night. Brits like a good party – this is a country where the pub remains a cherished institution and a good pint is never too far away.

Derby Runner-up Is Preakness Favorite


I'll Have Another is the second-favorite in the Preakness at 5-2.



DECISION MEMO Special use Permit -Virginia Tech Small Seismometer Line Boise, Payette, Salmon-Challis, and Sawtooth National Forests

On May 14, 2012, Cecilia R. Seesholtz, Forest Supervisor of the Boise National Forest, made a decision to issue a special use permit to Virginia PolyTechnic Institute and State University (i.e. Virginia Tech) for the temporary installation of a small seismometer transect line, running roughly east to west across the Payette, Boise, Salmon-Challis, and Sawtooth National Forests. The Boise National Forest Supervisor has been designated by the Intermountain Regional Forester as the authorized officer for the proposed seismometer line to be

installed on these four National Forests in Idaho. The small seismometer transect line will enter the Payette National Forest in sec. 23, T. 14 N, R. 6 W., of the Monroe Butte area and travel east exiting the Sawtooth National Forest in sec. 25, T. 11 N., R. 16 E., of the Holman Creek area. Seismometers would be temporarily deployed every 100-500 meters along approximately 160 miles of roads and trails on National Forest System lands within the four National Forests identified above.

The small seismometers would be placed in small, hand dug holes of approximately 6 inches deep, 6 inches wide, and 18 inches long. Seismometers would typically be placed in areas previously disturbed by road construction. Where previously disturbed areas are not obvious, seismometers would be placed on the immediate edge of the road or trail segment. The placement of seismometers would occur between July and September of 2012, they would be set out for a period of 2 to 8 days and then immediately retrieved and the holes filled no later than October 1 2012

Implementation is tentatively scheduled to begin mid- to latesummer 2012 and is expected to be completed in the fall of





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
