T.F.All-day Kindergarten Clould Return, butataCost

Perrine Elementary seeks return of all-day class, but parents will have to chip in.

TWIN FALLS • If parents want their child in an all-day kindergarten clas next year at I.B. Perrine Elementary School, they'll have to pay for it. The Twin Falls elementary schoo might offer one section of all-day kindergarten in the fall, but parent Principal Bill Brulotte out a flier last week to parents with incoming kindergarteners about the proposal. At least 18 students must be signed up in order to offer an allday kindergarten class.
He said Monday that parents of 12 or 13 incoming kindergartners have expressed interest.
"Some people are seeing if they can financially afford it or not," he said. A few scholarships will be available to help families with financial need.
It's the second time Brulotte has tried bringing back an all-day kindergarten class at Perrine Ele ents were interested - not enough to move forward with the proposal. "This year, more parents are willing to pay," he said.
Brulotte said the goal is to let parents know before the end of the

## This Land's for the Ducks

A Hagerman man has pledged to keep his Snake River land undeveloped so ducks and those who love to hunt them - can enjoy it for decades to come.

HAGERMAN • One Hagerman resident is apping into conservation efforts to expand his duck-hunting opportunities.
John Shaw - a member of Ducks Unlimited - has allowed close to 30 acres of his Hagerman Wings Farm to be managed under a conservation easement.
"I love taking someone out duck hunting for
the first time," Shaw said. "It's been a real passion for mine almost all my life" sion for mine almost all my life."

Last November, Shaw approached the Southern Idaho Land Trust about converting a section of his 270 -acre farm into an ease-
ment. Under the easement agreement the property can't be commercially developed for the next 30 years. During that time, the property owner should protect the land's resources for the public's benefit.
The new easement is now a wetlands area for ducks and other types of fowl. And as owner of a duck-hunting club, Shaw made sure to
build in duck blinds along the easement for additional hunting.

## The Menace of Bipartisanship

Bipartisanship, the
supposed scarcity of supposed scarcity of which so distresses the high-minded actually is disastrously
prevalent. Since 2001, produced No Child Left Behind, a counterproductive federal intrusion in primary and secondary education; the McCain-Feingold speech rationinglaw (the Bipartisan
Campaign Reform Act); an Campaign Reform Act); an entitlement; troublemaking by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac; government-directed capitalism from the ExportImport Bank; crony capitalism from energy subsidies,
unseemly agriculture and transportation bills; continuous bailouts of an unreformed Postal Service; hous ing subsidies; subsidies for state and local governments; and many other bipartisan deeds, including most ap propriations bills.
Now, with Europe's tur dence of entitlement cultures, and with American governments - federal, state and local - buckling beneath unsustainable entitlements, ly creating a new entitlement for the already privileged. Concerning the "problem" of certain federal student loans, the two parties pretend to be at daggers drawn, "pay for" the "sout how to "pay for" the "solution." But a bipartisan consensus is borrowers - and eventually

all student borrowers, be cause, well, why not? should be entitled to loans at a subsidized 3.4 percent interest rate forever In 2006, Democrats, tryingto capture control of
Congress by pandering to students and their parents, proposed cutting in half the statutory 6.8 percent rate on some federal student loans. Holding Congress in 2007, and with no discernible resistance from the compas-
sionately conservative Bush administration, Democrats disguised the full-decade cost of this - $\$ 60$ billion by pretending the subsidy, which now costs $\$ 6$ billion a year, would expire in five years. The five years are up July 1 and of course the 3.4 percent rate will be extended. Barack Obama supports this. So does Mitt Romney, while campaigning againsta a"gov-ernment-centered society" bipartisanship? The low 6.8 percent rate private loans for students cost about 12 percent - was itself the result of a federal subsidy. And students have no collateral that can be repossessed in case they de

## Agreement in Idaho Prison LawsuitCouldCost \$1.6M

BOISE • Lawmakers will $\$ 1.6$ million in staffing increases and other costs for the Idaho Department of Correction under an agreement designed to bring a decades-old lawsuit over conditions at a Bois
prison to an end.
Idaho State Correctional Institution inmates and state officials signed the agreement Tuesday. It requires more nurses and other medical staffers at the prison, as well as improve-
ments to the prison phar macy and increased oversight.
The estimated cost is $\$ 1.63$ million, according to Department of Correction figures. Department Direc tor Brent Reinke sai Wednesday he believes the Legislature will app
budget addition.
"I think they're going to be quite supportive once we explain to them why it's important and what we're try ing to accomplish in this The money will come out
of taxpayers' pockets. While in soiled linens. the department is insured But the Correction Deby the state's insurer, Risk
Management, costs from this type of court action aren't covered.
The lawsuit began in 1981 when inmates at the Idaho State Correctional Institution sued, alleging they were subject to violence and rape
by fellow inmates, denied by fellow inmates, denied
adequate medical care and adequate medical care and overcrowding. Over the next three decades they won several rulings designed to improve conditions, but the medical care has remained a contentious part of the lawsuit. Last year, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill appointed a correctional health care expert to review the prison's medical care report back his findings. Dr. Marc Stern told the problems, including nursing mistakes that likely resulted in the deaths of some in mates; overcrowding at the pharmacy site where some inmates pick up their daily medications; and termina denied meals and left lying partment and its medical contractor, the Brentwood, Tenn.-based Corizon, countered that Stern's report was inaccurate and contended it misrepresented the level of care at the facility.
Still, the department agreed to make several
changes in subsequent set thement talks carried out with the help of a visiting federal judge. Both Corizon and the department will add medical staffers and other employees under the deal -
Corizon is expected to add the equivalent of more than 10 fulltime positions and the agency is expected to add roughly 12 full-time positions. The cost of the new Corizon employees will be passed on to the state included in the $\$ 1.6$ million estimate. The youth groups behind the revolution are how to handle the post-election era. Some groups call for a boycott of the vote. protests in Tahrir the past year that repeatedly turned in to bloody clashes with police and the military. "We areleft with an orphaned revolution. The people don't know what the revolution wants to do,'" said Rami Sabri, a member of the Popular Socialist Alliance, a newly formed party.

he turmoil and economic woes has vaulted two former regime figures to front-runner status -ex-foreign minister Amr Moussa and ex-prime minister Ahmed Shafiq. The latest polls have them slightly on top, though the polls' reliability unknown.

# U.S.EconomyPicksUpafterSpringSlump

WASHINGTON • Maybe the U.S. economy's strength this winter ust weather-related after all. Home construction is near a threein three of the year's first four months. The data released Wednesday suggest growth in the April-June quarter is off to a good start, helped by falling of a spring slump are easing,
"It's all very encouraging," said Paul Ashworth, chief U.S. economist at Capital Economics. "Things look good at the moment:'

Construction rose for both single family homes and apartments.
Some economists have noted that a warm winter led companies to move up some hiring and accelerate other activity - including homebuilding -
that normally wouldn't occur until spring. That gave the appearance that the economy had strengthened in January and February and weakened in March.
